FROM SOUTH AFRICA TO SOUTH ALABAMA: KLEINHANS AND VAN DER MERWE CONTINUE TO FORGE FRIENDSHIP

At the age of five, Delien Kleinhans and Lara Van der Merwe picked up a tennis racquet for the first time. By age nine they were the top two under 10 players in South Africa. Now, 10 years later, the duo plays their sport for South Alabama.

"I can't remember the first time we met. I know we played in my hometown some against each other when we were 10 years old, so I think that's where," Kleinhans said. "She was very good under 10, so I just knew there was this really good player and I was scared of her."

The two confess they were not the best of friends then like they are now.

"We were really young and at a stage where we were number one and two, so it was always back and forth," Van der Merwe said. "We were always playing each other, it gets competitive. I think when you are so young you don't really understand the whole respect each other off the court thing."

A tournament in Egypt two years after their initial meeting is where their friendship began. Kleinhans and Van der Merwe were roommates on the trip, which made the two realize how alike they were and that they needed to "stop the nonsense."

Given the small network of tennis players in South Africa, Kleinhans and Van der Merwe would travel the three hours between their

hometowns to train together since there were few options elsewhere. Throughout their careers Kleinhans and Van der Merwe continued to alternate between the number one and number two spot in their age group, however, they each have resumes filled with individual accolades.

Kleinhans has won seven International Tennis Federation (ITF) titles, with her highest ranking at 158. She also won the South African National Championship four times: U14, U16 and U18, twice.

Van der Merwe has won several national titles herself and consistently ranked in the top five players in South Africa, while her ITF ranking before college was 182.

In juniors, they both played for the national team, providing them the ability to travel the world and opportunities to represent their home country on multiple occasions. The pair most recently represented South Africa as the youngest members of the national team for the Fed Cup in Lithuania.

"I would definitely say Europe [was my

favorite place], Czech Republic was an amazing tour," Van der Merwe said.

As their time in juniors came to a close, their college prospects grew.

"One of my former assistant coaches put them on the radar for me. We recruited them a couple of years ago, but it was a tough recruiting process because they are well-credentialed in the juniors," head women's tennis coach Jaco Keyser said. "It didn't really work out with Lara at first but it did work out with Delien. It seems like it came full circle and we finally got both of them over here."

With Van der Merwe a year older, she went on to spend her freshman year at Virginia Commonwealth University. During that time, Kleinhans received offers from multiple schools, however, South Alabama was not one of them.

"South was actually not one of my options. I was torn between two other universities," Kleinhans said. "On the day when the other universities wanted me to make my decision, my mom came to me and said 'Just talk to South as

well. I was frustrated because I couldn't decide between two and now I was given a third option."

Kleinhans agreed to talk to Keyser later that day. At the conclusion of the call, she decided to ask the other universities to wait another week on her decision. During that week she spoke to Keyser every day, which ultimately persuaded her to choose South.

Meanwhile, Van der Merwe debated other options for her academic and athletic career. Throughout the process one of the men's tennis assistant coaches at VCU, who had previously worked with Keyser, suggested she consider South Alabama.

"Before I actually signed with VCU, I spoke to Jaco [Keyser] so South Alabama was originally one of my options," Van der Merwe said. "With Jaco [Keyser] being South African and then Delien [Kleinhans] also signing here made me want to come. It is so nice that he [Keyser] is helping South Africans get good opportunities."

Naturally the two moved into Stokes Hall together this past fall. After sharing rooms throughout their travels, a dorm room was no different.

"I love living together. I think it is making it so much easier to settle in and adapt to everything," Kleinhans said. "It's just really nice to have someone from your home country and a good friend that I can talk to when I'm feeling homesick or feeling down. She's a good living partner."

Of the things they miss most about home, family and friends are at the top of the list.

"The homesickness and not having family here every day is what is hard. Then your siblings, not seeing them grow up. I think family for me is the most difficult part to move on," Van der Merwe said. "Obviously the environment, culture and people are different so that's a big adjustment, but I'm enjoying it so far."

Another aspect of being away from family is also being away from their coaches. Van der Merwe's mother, a professional tennis player herself, has coached her from the beginning. Kleinhans' father, a tennis coach by trade, is who first introduced her to the sport and has nurtured her career. Despite the adjustment between what they know and what is new, the duo admits there is an extra layer of comfort in the fact that Keyser is also from their home country.

"It definitely does help [that Keyser is South African] because it's a



feeling of security just knowing that he is from our home country and knowing what our background is like," Kleinhans said. "But on the court, we don't think about him as South African or not we just see him as the coach."

In an effort to help two of his newcomers settle in, Keyser also connected them to a group of South African student-athletes on the track team.

"We have a long tradition of South African players on the tennis team, not so much recently but on the track team Coach [Paul] Brueske has kind of created a pipeline there with South African athletes," Keyser said. "It is nice to have them over here because just like with everything else it's nice to have someone from your home country. Even though it is a new experience and I don't think you should be congregating or just spending time with people from your home country, I think it is nice for the girls to be able to ease in."

The group gets together as often as their schedules allow. Between practices, classes and competitions they make time to bring to life traditions from home.

"We get together often. In South Africa, it's a big thing to barbeque all the time so we get together a lot on the weekend to do that," Van der Merwe said. "Obviously during the week with training and academics its difficult, but we try to get together a lot and bring back things from home."

With the spring season approaching, both Kleinhans and Van der Merwe hope to find their place on the team and even more so, the starting lineup. Over the course of fall tournaments, Van der Merwe earned five wins in both singles and doubles. Kleinhans had a win in each category as well.

"I am very excited to have them join our program," Keyser said. "Not just because they are from South Africa — it is nice to have someone from the country you grew up in — but they fit perfectly with what we are trying to achieve from a work ethic standpoint, from being coachable and from trying to raise the level of the program. Plus, they are just a pleasure to be around!"





**LOYAL, FAITHFUL AND TRUE:
TOLBERT STAYS HOME TO HELP
LAY FOUNDATION FOR JAGUAR
FOOTBALL**

No other words maybe more accurate or appropriate in defining University of South Alabama football's Jalen Tolbert than the 11th, 12th and 13th words of the University of South Alabama fight song "loyal, faithful and true." Of course, the athleticism and skill set displayed by Tolbert on the field is evident, but those three words have accentuated some of the key underlying aspects of the junior wide out over his five-year Jaguar career.

Tolbert was born and raised in Mobile and was around the game of football from a young age as his dad coached the sport at Williamson High School. Surprisingly, football wasn't his main passion through much of his early athletic career as he was "more of a baseball player."

"My dad coached football at Williamson High School and I was always around the game, along with players like JaMarcus Russell, Nick Fairley and Antonio Coleman, but I never really had the urge to play," Tolbert said. "When I got to high school, my friends were all about me playing so I ended up trying it out. At first, I really didn't like it, but then football started to grow on me. I love competition and working, so to be able to put those two things together was good."

Tolbert joined the football program at McGill-Toolen during his 10th-grade year and didn't play much that initial season, but remained loyal to the sport and began to put in the work.

"I didn't play at all in the 10th grade and then the summer going into the 11th grade I began to work out a lot more with football, running routes with my friends on the team, and started picking up more about the game," Tolbert stated. "We won the state championship my junior year and I played more, but the summer heading into my senior year, I really started working hard; running routes and throwing all the time."

Tolbert recorded 135 yards on 14 receptions his junior season and played a part in helping the Yellowjackets win a state title after posting a 13-1 record. The following season, he received honorable mention all-region accolades from the Mobile Press-Register/AL.com after catching 37 passes for 696 yards and nine touchdowns.

Even though he hadn't played football as a youngster, being around his father, the players and the game had laid a good foundation for Tolbert.

"That showed me the outside view of the game and how to take coaching, whether it was for football or baseball," Tolbert said of what he learned from watching his dad coach. "It showed me what type of work ethic it takes. I would see JaMarcus stay after practice and throw extra passes. Nick Fairley would run extra sprints, and I saw how it paid off for those guys. I was able to understand the competition and the urge that you have to have in order to be able to play at a high level.

"Being around my dad and seeing how he coached, while also parenting me in that same fashion, helped me out a lot."

Following the conclusion of his senior season, Tolbert remained loyal to his hometown as he flipped his commitment from Michigan State and decided to sign with South Alabama, just in the program's seventh season of competition. Surprisingly, baseball played a huge part in the Mobile native becoming a part of his hometown university.

"I received offers weekly and eventually committed to Michigan State," Tolbert stated. "I loved it up there, the environment and everything about it, but I was also still heavily into baseball and being a two-sport athlete is something that I wanted to work at being because I wasn't really sure which sport I wanted to play. I ended up de-committing from Michigan State mainly because of the baseball aspect. I came to South with the intention of playing

both sports."

Tolbert's loyalty to football would be tested early on in his collegiate career as he hurt his knee — the first injury of his career — during fall camp after being projected to contribute as a true freshman. The injury would also put on hold his plans on trying to be a dual-sport athlete that season.

Following the 2017 campaign, there was also a coaching change for the Jaguar football program.

"My freshman year, I injured my knee during football camp and had to miss both football and baseball seasons with my 11-month rehab," Tolbert said. "When Coach [Steve] Campbell and his staff came in after Coach [Joey] Jones, they didn't know anything about me and hadn't recruited me. To them at the time, I was just a hurt player with a knee injury that was working his way back. They didn't know what I was capable of doing. Having to prove myself to them in the spring took away from the baseball aspect. My thoughts were that if I went and played baseball and wasn't able to earn playing time in football in the fall, that it was kind of my own fault because I had left the sport that I was supposed to be devoting the main part of my energy to."

Tolbert appeared in every game during his redshirt-freshman season and then became a starter for South the following year, finished with 27 catches for 521 yards. He also led the team with six touchdown receptions and an average of 19.3 yards per catch while recording 10 gains of 20-plus yards, the third-highest total on the squad.

His sophomore season seemed to serve as a spring board as he was voted first-team all-Sun Belt Conference that fall and was a first-team all-league selection by Pro Football Focus and Phil Steele Publications as well. He set school season records with 64 receptions and 1,085 receiving yards — making him the first 1,000-yard receiver in program history — while matching another with eight touchdown catches. One of two 1,000-yard receivers in the Sun Belt and one of 11 in the nation, Tolbert ranked among the top 40 in the country in catches and receiving yards per game.

Following the 2020 season, the Jaguar football program saw yet another coaching change and another possible opportunity for Tolbert's loyalty to be tested coming off the impressive season. The Mobile native again chose South, and the decision was two-fold.

"I probably had an opportunity to again go somewhere else after the last coaching change, but I said 'Why not finish my career here, and show that you don't have to go to these big schools to be able to have success.' KB [Kawaan Baker] and myself both had the goal of coming here and getting drafted," Tolbert stated. "He accomplished his goal and now I'm trying to become the third person in program history to accomplish the same feat. I could have gone somewhere else where they might have had five guys drafted in a class, and I would have just been another number and another transfer that came in and got drafted. I wanted to create my own destiny and legacy.

"Of course, with the records that I've been able to accomplish this year means a lot. It also sets a standard for future players to come in and try to reach."

South Alabama's decision to bring back a familiar face for Tolbert also aided his decision to remain in Mobile instead of testing the waters elsewhere.

"He was the first player I talked to the day I got the job and I certainly understood that he had an opportunity to move on after last season, so I wanted to make sure that he knew I had his best interests in mind," South Alabama head coach Kane Wommack said. "That's the unique part of the game of football, it is certainly a team game but you also have to be

mindful that everyone has individual goals that they want to accomplish and sometimes they have to sacrifice their individuality to be part of a team. At the same time, you want to honor those goals and the things that they want to accomplish and have set out for themselves before I became their head coach. So, that was the conversation we had about what it's going to look like, letting him know that we were going to find creative ways to get him the ball — nobody will ever just be able to take him away with a one-on-one bracket to the field or the boundary — and boy have we shown how you can feature a player in this program."

For a first-year coach whose mission is to take the program to the next level and change the culture, Tolbert's decision to return was hugely important for the locker room.

"The messaging he created before I even walked in the building as the head coach was huge for the transition," Wommack noted. "It's special when you have someone like that; obviously he is a tremendous player on the field, but a lot of it was cultural and his ability to say 'I know this guy, I've built a relationship with this guy, and he's going to come in and bring our best interests at hand as players.'

"For guys to see a guy like that — that just caught 1,000 yards worth of balls — those players trust his guidance."

Tolbert's guidance is helping set the program for the future for the wide receivers that follow in his footsteps as they try to take the same mentality next fall as the 6-foot-3 wide out, who is projected to be an early round pick in this spring's NFL draft.

"They saw how I was training during the offseason and the scouts that are at practices; they see that it's truly a possible goal to accomplish, which makes me happy because that's kind of what I wanted to happen here when I came," Tolbert said. "Since I've been here, there haven't been many practices with a lot of scouts, but for the freshmen and sophomores to see the 100-plus scouts that we've probably had at practices this fall helps them know that it's just right there for them if they do the work. You can tell those younger guys really want to continue this, and the opportunity is there for them."

Of the 32 NFL teams, 20 have attended practice with almost all sending multiple scouts including some that have sent three or even four.

"There's a lot of interest in him, and those programs are going to do everything they can to get as many eyes on him and really evaluate him," Director of Player Personnel Drew Dunn said. "They all really like him. The main thing these scouts are trying to decide is how much do I need to stand on the table in order for this guy to be a second-round guy because a lot of them think that he's a high-second to third-round guy. A lot of them are intrigued by him. They want to keep digging and find out as much as they can about him and get as much tape as they can to build that argument whenever the time comes."

One thing that stands out to not only the scouts but anyone who watches Tolbert in practice is his work ethic, and one person who gets a front-row view of that is his position coach Michael Smith. Smith has over 25 years of experience as an assistant at the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision level — all but one of those with a Power 5 school — and has coached several talented players over that span, but Tolbert sticks out.

"I think that Jalen's one of the better guys that I've worked with," Smith said. "I've been blessed to have worked with guys like Tyler Lockette, Jordy Nelson and Kevin Lockette, along with the guys I coached at Arkansas and Kentucky; I could go on forever. They are all really good football players and Jalen's in the mix with them. I've only had a short period of time



with him, but I know South Alabama's been blessed to have had him because they've had a really good football player, but an even better man."

"I think a lot of it is his overall work ethic," Wommack said when asked why Tolbert is such a talented receiver. "Jalen is a very driven individual, a self-starter and one of those guys who has an internal drive to accomplish the task of becoming the greatest version of himself. I think the most exciting thing about Jalen Tolbert for NFL teams is that his best football is still ahead of him. He's learning the game, he's learned a ton of what more of an NFL system is going to look like this year under [offensive coordinator] Major Applewhite and our offensive staff. At the same time, to know that you're getting a player that does everything right on and off the field, and is a self-starter and has a drive within themselves in order to accomplish something, and is a great teammate is special — and that is what the NFL is looking for."

As you will find with a lot of elite athletes, the toughest competition and critical analysis often comes from within themselves.

"I never want to be complacent. The same way you got to a place is the same way it can be taken away from you if you're complacent," Tolbert said. "Being your hardest critic is something I feel gives you the confidence and helps you move forward because you're being real with yourself. I still think about the play against Southern Miss in week one where [the officials] said I stepped out, and it's week 12 of the season. I still think about Georgia Southern last season where if I had made a certain catch it would have sent us into overtime and maybe we win that game. When we played them earlier this year, that's all I thought about in that game. I wanted to make up for what had happened the previous year."

Entering the final week of the regular season, Tolbert leads the Sun Belt Conference in both catches, receptions per game (6.5) and receiving yards per outing with 72 receptions for 1,283 yards and seven scores, while ranking third nationally in receiving yards and fifth in yards per outing. He's recorded 100 or more yards in six contests this fall, highlighted by a season-best 174 on 11 receptions in a victory over Georgia Southern, while leading the team in the category in all 11 games thus far this fall and 15 straight contests dating back to last season's meeting at Louisiana.

The junior has either set or tied eight school records this year, including most catches in a game, receptions, receiving yards and 100-yard games in a season, and catches, yards receiving, touchdown receptions and 100-yard contests in a career. He goes into Friday's match-up versus Coastal Carolina having caught 168 balls for 2,949 yards and 21 scores in 46 appearances since the start of the 2018 campaign.

A first-team all-Sun Belt selection last season, Tolbert was a candidate for Maxwell and Biletnikoff Awards — presented to the outstanding player and receiver, respectively, in college football — earlier this season, and he is currently one of two players in the country who has posted over 1,000 yards receiving in each of the last seasons.

Being a local player and having had the success that he has had for his hometown program has meant a lot to Tolbert and validates one of the main reasons he chose to remain loyal to South at the beginning of this journey.

"It shows them that they don't have to go far off to a school in order to

have success and be recognized. They can stay here in Mobile and play at South," Tolbert said. "All they have to do is put in the work and the coaches will put them in the right position and right situation. We have an awesome staff around us here. Everybody understands and knows the goals, both personal and team. If you put those two together, you'll have a lot of success. It's big for the program to have had a local player like myself to have stayed here. Look at what happened to him, this could be you. That's something big that can help turn the program around. I can have the feeling that I helped turn the program around whether I'm here or not."

Wommack echoes the same sentiments, and what the importance of Tolbert's decision to play at South and the ramifications that his success can lead to in the building of the program.

"Mobile is special, especially when it comes to the talent that is in this area — we have to take advantage of that," he said. "Jalen was one of the first players who Power 5 offers. He had an opportunity to go play in a conference that maybe is a little bit higher level and yet he chose to stay in Mobile, he chose to build something at South Alabama. Him laying the foundation for what we're trying to build here for years to come is really important."

"I don't have to sell the vision of what that's supposed to look like, I can now point to a young man that actually accomplished that vision from this city, came to South Alabama and is now following his dreams in the Senior Bowl and onto the NFL."

As his time with the Jags begins to wind down, Tolbert received one more honor as last week he became just the eighth player in the program's 13-year history to earn an opportunity to participate in the Reese's Senior Bowl.

"It was definitely a surreal moment, especially with my parents being able to be there and the way that they surprised me," Tolbert said. "It's definitely special. My dad actually had some pictures printed out — whenever I got the invite — of me at all of the senior bowls. You can tell my age growing up each year, it's crazy that I've been to all of them from Dexter McCluster with Tim Tebow to all these guys that came down here and played. For me to have the chance to represent the university and my hometown in that game is special, I'm looking forward to the opportunity."

So where does his loyalty come from?

"My mom and dad were big on if you start something, don't quit it," Tolbert said. "Everything happens for a reason. You don't have to run from things. No matter who came into coach the program, I was still going to have to show the same thing if I was to leave. I would still have to prove myself in either situation. Something my dad had always told me was that, 'If you're good enough, it doesn't really matter where you play. There are opportunities, you just have to make the most of those opportunities when you get them.'"

"I always thought about that. Why get up and go here or there, just show people that South is a good program. I wanted to help make history at South and for myself, rather than going some other place and just being a number."

Regardless of the result in South's regular-season finale, by staying loyal, faithful and true to his hometown school the Jaguar football program will be impacted by Jalen Tolbert for years to come.



One-On-One with Shawn Jennings



You have had several ups and downs during your career here at South Alabama. What have you learned over that stretch?

"It's better to be socially involved with your teammates and coaches, because you never know when your playing time is going to end. It's always great to be involved with the community, talk to people, express your feelings and see how people are doing. It's best to get to know people, because at the end of the day that's the main thing that matters - relationships."

You began your college career at Alabama, but talk to me about how you ended up transferring to South?

"[My] Playing time, my coaches left and just a lot of different things went into that decision for me. I felt like it was best for me to transfer, so I could get on the field more so could people could see my name out there."

What about South Alabama stuck out to you and made you feel like this was the place for you to transfer to?

"Coach [Kane] Wommack. He was the first person who reached out to me, and the relationship I developed with him was a big part of my decision to come here. I was planning on going to whomever reached out to me first and it was a good thing that it was Kane. Our relationship was pretty tight. As soon as I got here, he showed me around and had me over for dinner at his house, which was nice. It showed me how much he cared about his players. It was amazing to see how everyone bonded and enjoyed their time together."

What did you take away from your brief time with the Tide program?

"The main thing I learned from [head coach Nick] Saban was be where your feet are at all times. That was something he talked about every day - always be locked into whatever you're doing. Never let your mind wander, just be locked into the job at hand."

You come from an athletic family as your older brother was a linebacker at Alabama (2015-19), and your uncle, Brad Ford, also played for The Tide at cornerback for two seasons and appeared in 14 games for the Detroit Lions during the 1996 National Football League season. What have you taken away from each of their experiences that has helped you during your career?

"Just enjoy your time and play to the best of your ability, but always know that there's life outside of football. That's the main thing they taught me, enjoy your time on and off the field."

You were here during Coach Wommack's first tenure as defensive coordinator. Describe your relationship with him both in his former role and in his current role as the head coach.

"The first time it was more getting to know him and seeing my way around, but now I feel like we're closer. Our relationship is much better than before and I feel like I can talk to him about anything. That's good for me - to be more open with the coach."

How have you improved since you arrived on campus and what's the biggest change that you have made?

"I've become a faster player than when I first got here. I lost a lot of weight. I've also just tried to lock in on the small details of the game with my eyes and hand placement on certain things. I've gotten a lot better with my gap schemes and just doing the little things right."

What do you like most about playing linebacker? Why?

"Hitting people. I wouldn't say I'm a big hitter, but I love hitting people. It's just who I am I guess. I'm a defensive-minded person, because I play every position on the field, but I would say I like hitting people more than I like getting hit."

Do you prefer to play on the inside or the outside? Why?

"I don't really care - I just like football. Wherever you put me at, I will play."

Does that mentality come from your days of playing safety in high school?

"Pretty much. Coming downhill and hitting people was my favorite thing to do, so it just stuck with me."

What type of role have you assumed on this team as one of the seniors?

"I would say I'm one of the leaders, but I'm not a very vocal guy. I'm more of a lead-by-example type of guy."

The defense faces a tough challenge with Coastal Carolina's offense this weekend. What are some things the defense needs to do in order to be successful against the Chanticleers?

"Backside pursuit needs to be great. We need to wrap up and tackle. Our eyes need to be in the right position, because I know they're going to do a lot of options. They have two different offenses depending on personnel. So, the defense needs to be locked into that and everyone needs to play sound gap [defense] and make good tackles."

With this being senior day, how do you want to end your career and what do you want fans to remember you for?

"I would like to be remembered as a player who gave it his all on the field, no matter what the circumstances. Even if I got hurt, just know I would give it my all every time I went out on the field - that's what I want to be remembered for."

I know you'll have family members at the game with it being Senior Day. How many family members do you expect to have there on Friday?

"About four or five - my mom, grandparents and a couple of my cousins."

How do you want to close out your career?

"With a win, of course, and a bowl game."

You earned your degree from South in May, and you're working toward a second degree in sport management and recreation studies. What do you want to do with those degrees after your football career is over?

"Coach, of course. I also want to get into real estate and see how far I can go with that. But mainly coaching, that's the biggest goal for me after football because I always want to be around not just football, but around sports. It's just who I am."

Who has had the biggest influence on your life?

"My older brother, he's taught me everything I know. He's always been there for me if I needed someone to talk to or tell my problems to. Same for him too, I've always been there for him. He's been my influence and my role model."

What do you like to do in your spare time?

"Hang out with friends, play video games, fish, cook sometimes, hunt. Pretty much anything."

Living along the Gulf Coast, do you prefer saltwater or freshwater fishing?

"I prefer freshwater but you can't go wrong with saltwater fishing, especially for red snappers. It's always a good time to fish on the ocean."

Kane WOMMACK

HEAD COACH

A finalist for the award given to the top NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision assistant coach last season, Kane Wommack was named the head football coach at the University of South Alabama on Dec. 12, 2020.

Wommack (pronounced WAH-mick), 34, becomes the third head coach since the inception of South's program and the youngest at the NCAA FBS level.

The Jaguars' defensive coordinator in 2016 and '17, he returned to the program after working three years as linebackers coach at Indiana including serving as the Hoosiers' defensive coordinator his final two seasons.

Wommack was one of five finalists for the Broyles Award in the fall after his efforts helped IU post a 6-2 mark overall on the way to finishing 12th in the final Associated Press poll after earning an invitation to the Outback Bowl. His unit led the Big Ten Conference with both 17 interceptions and a 64 percent red zone defensive rate — ranking first in the country in the latter category and second in the former — while also pacing the league with 20 takeaways and 3.12 sacks per contest. The Hoosiers also finished 10th nationally in turnover margin (1.00) and were among the top 25 in scoring (20.2 points per game) and passing efficiency (120.96 rating) as well in 2020.

Following the season, seven members of the IU defense earned all-Big Ten honors including a school-record four — Jamar Johnson, Jerome Johnson, Micah McFadden and Tiawan Mullen — first-team selections. Mullen also became the first cornerback in program history to earn first-team All-America honors after being recognized by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) while McFadden was a third-team Associated Press All-American.

In his first year as the youngest Power 5 defensive coordinator, Wommack led IU to top-50 rankings nationally



in scoring, total, rush and pass defense for the first time since 1993. His efforts helped the Hoosiers hold four opponents to three points or less, the most in one season since limiting five to three or fewer in 1945.

Wommack was the Jaguars' defensive coordinator and linebackers coach during the 2016 and '17 campaigns, leading a unit that was among the top 10 in the country in passing defense (174.6 ypg) while allowing over 10 points fewer than the previous season — the fifth-best improvement in the NCAA FBS that fall — his first year on the staff. In 2017, South was in the top 15 nationally in both red zone defense and fumble recoveries as the Jags recorded 20 takeaways both seasons he was in charge of the defense.

Under his direction, Jeremy Reaves — currently with the Washington Football Team in the National Football League — was a two-time first-team all-Sun Belt Conference selection and the program's first-ever individual to receive an individual award from the league after being named the Defensive Player of the Year in 2017. After ranking in the top 10 in the nation in both sacks and tackles for loss in 2016, Randy Allen was voted first-team all-Sun Belt while linebackers Bull Barge, Roman Buchanan, Kalen Jackson and Darrell Songy each earned all-league accolades during Wommack's two years at South.

Prior to his arrival at South, Wommack was the defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Eastern Illinois, where he helped the Panthers make a first-round appearance in the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoffs while finishing in the top 25 of the final national poll in 2015. That fall, EIU's defense ranked second nationally in interceptions (19), third in takeaways (31), fourth in pass efficiency defense (103.0), eighth in red zone defense (67.3%) and 10th in tackles for loss (98) while Dino Fanti was named the 2015 Ohio Valley Conference co-Defensive Player of the Year. In his first year with the program, the Panthers ranked second in the league in scoring defense and fourth in takeaways as four members of the unit earned all-OVC honors.

Wommack also has experience having worked at Tennessee-Martin in 2010, Jacksonville State in '11 — where he helped the Gamecocks claim a share of the OVC championship — and Ole Miss during the 2012 and '13 seasons.



He began his collegiate playing career at Arkansas, where he was a fullback in 2005 and '06, helping the Razorbacks win the Southeastern Conference West Division title his second year. After transferring to Southern Mississippi, Wommack helped the Golden Eagles to three straight bowl appearances before earning his undergraduate degree in political science in 2009; he began his coaching career as a volunteer assistant while at the school.

Wommack and his wife Melissa have three sons: Asher, Tatum and Jones. His father, Dave, had more than 35 years of experience coaching at the collegiate level, including serving as defensive coordinator at Ole Miss before retiring following the 2016 season.

John Smith, Interim President

Dr. John W. Smith, Interim President of the University of South Alabama, has more than 40 years of leadership experience in higher education.

After nearly 25 years at the University of Central Arkansas, including a period as Interim President, Dr. Smith arrived at the University of South Alabama in February 2008 as Vice President for Student Affairs. By 2010, his responsibilities expanded with the additional role of Special Assistant to the President in the administration of V. Gordon Moulton.

Dr. Smith was named Acting President following Moulton's death, and later served as the University's Executive Vice President in the administration of Dr. Tony Waldrop.

During Dr. Smith's tenure at South, the University greatly increased its appeal and capacity as a residential campus, with the addition of three new residence halls, a new dining hall, a new recreation center and a major renovation of the student center.

He has supervised Student Affairs offices and support functions including housing, food service, the police department, Greek affairs, student activities, multicultural affairs, counseling services, student media, the bookstore, and safety and environmental compliance.

Dr. Smith, who holds the rank of associate professor in the College of Education and Professional Studies, has served as USA's Faculty Athletic Representative to the NCAA and chair of the Athletics Council. He has been closely involved in compliance issues and established and served as chair of the Compliance Oversight Committee for Athletics.

Dr. Smith was appointed Interim President by the University of South Alabama Board of Trustees in spring 2021 at the retirement of President Waldrop. He has led the University's efforts to reopen campus to full operations after the COVID-19 pandemic limited campus functions during the 2020-21 academic year. In addition to his oversight of the main academic campus, as Interim President Dr. Smith also works with senior leadership in the management of USA Health, an academic healthcare system with two hospitals, a cancer research and treatment center and a physicians' network.

During his tenure at Central Arkansas, Dr. Smith served as Executive Vice President, Interim President, Vice President for Financial and Administrative Services, Vice President for Student Affairs and Dean of Students. He also held the rank of associate professor and taught graduate classes in ethics and law in higher education, budgeting, leadership and multicultural issues.

He holds a doctorate in educational leadership from Mississippi State University and a master's degree in guidance and counseling from West Georgia College. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Berry College in Mt. Berry, Ga.

He is married to the former Jeanne Williams. The couple has three adult sons, Brian, Eric and Timothy, along with three grandchildren.

Athletic Director, Dr. Joel Erdmann



Now entering his 13th year as Director of Athletics, Dr. Joel Erdmann has presided over one of the most successful eras in the University of South Alabama's history. Such success follows hard work and an atmosphere of excellence inspired by the Erdmann motto and department's core values, "graduation, citizenship, championships."

Over the past decade-plus, Erdmann's impact includes: milestone records both on the field and in the classroom by student-athletes, the beginning of an NCAA Division I FBS football program, new construction and/or renovation in every sport/facility, unprecedented fundraising, understanding and supporting student-athletes' name, image and likeness (NIL) rights and opportunities, and the hiring of championship-driven team of coaches as well as a stellar team of administrative professionals and staff.

Erdmann's championship mindset led to the department's best-ever Academic Progress Rate scores and GPA in the history of Jaguar Athletics and the Sun Belt Conference All-Sports Championship Vic Bubas Cups five times in the last seven years.

Over the course of his career in intercollegiate athletics, Erdmann's expertise has been called upon for service in leadership and advisory roles within universities, conferences, the NCAA, and in communities to advance the future of sports for women and men. Erdmann currently serves as the Sun Belt Conference representative on the board of the LEAD1 Association.

Over the past 24 years in athletic administration, Erdmann has been entrusted to serve on both football and baseball championship selection committees. In baseball, Erdmann served a four-year term on the prestigious NCAA Division I Baseball Championship Committee where he served as Chairman of the Championship Selection Committee for the 2016 College World Series. As chair, his leadership responsibilities include oversight of the process to select and seed the best championship field of teams and provide the best experience for student-athletes, coaches, and fans for the NCAA DI Championship Baseball Tournament in Omaha.

In football, Erdmann joined a select group of Athletic Directors in 2017 who completed a mock selection exercise for the College Football Playoff Committee.

During the 2006-07 academic year, Erdmann served on the NCAA Division II Football Championship Committee and he co-chaired the NCAA Division II Football Southeast Region Advisory Committee.

With an eye toward the future, Erdmann understands students, coaches and communities often define themselves by the places and spaces they gather. Creating a vibrant interactive game-day atmosphere for fans and a meaningful, competitive experience for student-athletes is an Erdmann hallmark for sustained success and a foundation for growth. Erdmann's tenure at the University of South Alabama has touched every aspect of brick and mortar making up Jaguar Athletics. Taking into account his experiences in the construction and renovation of numerous facilities including the new Hancock Whitney Stadium, Erdmann recognizes the unique challenges in maintaining or constructing sports venues from funding and financing, development and planning, design, architecture, engineering and systems integration, and operations and maintenance for these venues.

The list of new construction, renovations and improvements is a point of pride among the entire department, its coaches and student-athletes which include:

- Athletics, Hancock Whitney Stadium – construction of 25,000-seat football stadium located on the west side of campus that includes a state-of-the-art video board and sound system, an end-zone terrace and 18-seat suites, with a four-story administration building located behind the North end zone;
- Athletics, Jaguar Training Center – construction of covered practice facility;
- Athletics, HKS Weight Room – enhancements/renovations to 4,000-plus square foot area;
- Football, Fieldhouse – enhancements and updates to the locker room, player/coach meeting rooms and lounge;
- Baseball – construction of new Jon Lieber Clubhouse; renovated Luis Gonzalez Hitting Facility; 16' x 35' videoboard, outfield wall and bullpens, outfield decks for alumni/fans, field renovations, recognition Ring of Honor, signage and flags to building façade, parking and lighting enhancements, pre/post-game entertainment areas;
- Softball – 15' x 28' videoboard, stadium grandstand, dugouts and press box, covered hitting facility, outfield decks, field renovations, parking and lighting enhancements, pre/post-game entertainment areas;
- Men's & Women's Basketball – new videoboard and lighting installed in Mitchell Center prior to 2019-20 season; team suites, lounges and locker rooms; construction set to begin on new weight room in Fall 2021
- Soccer – field upgrades, covered player benches & fan grandstand, press box, pre/post-game entertainment areas;
- Track and Field/Cross Country – new track surface installed in 2018; locker rooms, coaches' offices, lounge, track facility enhancements including press box, spectator terraces, scoreboard and restroom facilities;
- Men's & Women's Golf – construction of practice facility at the Magnolia Grove Golf Course, team suites, office space, locker rooms, indoor hitting bay and putting studio;
- Men's & Women's Tennis – team suite, office space, lounge and locker rooms; and
- Volleyball – locker rooms, team suite, lounge and coaches offices, enhancement to playing venue, scoreboard, seating and speaker system.

A 1986 South Dakota State graduate with a degree in education, he received a master's degree in physical education from USA in 1992 and earned his doctorate from Florida State in 1995 in sports management/athletic administration. A native of Bismarck, N.D., Erdmann is married to the former Tina Milton.
