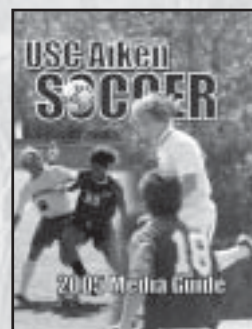

Professionally, his resume includes a diverse set of experiences. Dr. Hallman has served as an Infantry officer in the 82nd Airborne Division, a high school teacher and coach, co-owner and Creative Director of an advertising agency, executive director of a school-to-work initiative, and 23 years of work in public higher education in South Carolina.

Since 1983, he has worked in various administrative roles at USC Aiken. Dr. Hallman served as Interim Chancellor as the University conducted its search for a new chancellor following the retirement of Dr. Robert Alexander in June 2000. Dr. Hallman has also served as Vice Chancellor for Administration. In that job, he was responsible for the

Enrollment Services and Institutional Planning Division. Additionally he served as institutional liaison with several regional groups in matters related to sponsored research and local economic development.

He is a past Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Aiken Chamber of Commerce, past President of the Aiken Kiwanis Club, founding member and past Chairman of the Aiken Co. Forum, and a former Chair of Leadership Aiken County.

Dr. Hallman just completed a one-year term as President of the Peach Belt Conference for 2003-04.

Tom is married to the former Susan West, of Woodruff, S.C., a Nurse Practitioner with a private practice in Augusta, Ga. They have two children, David who is 15 and Caroline who is 13.



Randy Warrick is in his 19th year as Director of Athletics at the University of South Carolina Aiken. He was hired at USCA in 1978 as head baseball coach and intramural director and has served many different duties during his tenure.

While coaching baseball for 11 years, Warrick also served as an assistant basketball coach during the 1978-79 season and acting golf

coach in 1989-90. As baseball coach, Warrick compiled a 392-146 record, while earning various coaching awards. In 1986 his team advanced to the College World Series, the highlight of his coaching career.

Warrick was born in Rocky Mount, N.C. and attended Rocky Mount High School. He was an All-Conference player in football, basketball, and baseball. Upon graduation from high school, Warrick went to Louisburg Junior College where he played baseball for two years.

In 1975, Warrick earned his Associate of Arts degree from Louisburg and was drafted by the Kansas City Royals, but decided to stay in school.

Warrick then moved on to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he received a two-year baseball scholarship. While at North Carolina he earned Atlantic Coast Conference All-Academic honors two

straight years. He earned his Bachelor's of Arts degree in Education in 1977 and then his Master's of Arts in Teaching in 1978. While earning his master's degree, he served as a graduate assistant baseball coach. In the same season, the team advanced to the College World Series.

Warrick is a member of the College Athletic Management's Editorial Board, PBC Strategic Planning Committee, PBC Awards Committee, NCAA Division II AD's Association Board of Directors, Greater Augusta Sports Council Board, and is the chairman of the NCAA Division II National Golf Committee.

Warrick is married to Martha Blankenship Warrick of Augusta, Ga. They have one child, Tripp, who is 14 years old. The Warrick family resides in North Augusta, S.C.

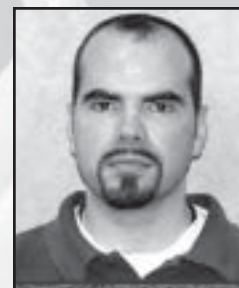
Fields is active within the ranks of Division II, serving as the Daktronics Women's Basketball Division II South Atlantic All-Region Coordinator for the past two years.

Brandon Aiken is in his sixth year as head athletic trainer at USC Aiken.

Aiken, a native of Sturgeon Bay, WI, joined the USCA training staff in 1997 as a graduate assistant. He served in that capacity for three years until stepping into the head position in 2000.

The 32-year-old is a 1997 graduate of Saint Andrews Presbyterian College in Laurinburg, N.C., where he received his Bachelor's of Science in Sports Medicine. Aiken is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) and the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA).

Aiken has also served as assistant and head athletic trainer at Hitchcock Rehabilitation Center in Aiken, S.C., for more than three years. At Hitchcock, he worked with high school, college, and professional athletes as well as general outpatient rehabilitation.

The training room, located in the Student Activities Center on the northeast side of "The Courthouse" gymnasium, offers modern equipment and techniques to assist in the prevention and rehabilitation of injuries.

THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH CAROLINA AIKEN

The University of South Carolina Aiken was chartered in 1961 after entering into an agreement with the University of South Carolina to establish a two-year center in Aiken.

The Aiken Center opened its doors in September 1961 to 139 students. Temporarily housed in Banksia, a renovated mansion in the Aiken, the Center consisted of three full-time faculty members (one of whom served as Director of the Center).

In 1968, the Center underwent an institutional self-study and was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools as a branch of the University of South Carolina and as a junior college. The first associate degrees were awarded in June 1968.

The campus of USC Aiken moved from Banksia to its present site in 1972 and physical changes began to occur rapidly. At first, the permanent campus consisted of 100 acres and one multipurpose building which housed all university operations. A library was completed in 1975 and additional land was donated increasing the campus to 144 acres. In October 1977, the Student Activities Center was opened. A classroom building was occupied in 1978 and one year later, an auxiliary services building was added.

An apartment complex for students, Pacer Downs, was ready for occupancy in fall of 1984. More construction additions to the campus included completion of the Etheredge Center, Ruth Patrick Science Education Center, the Business and Education Building and the Alan B. Miller Nursing Building. Additional land was acquired increasing the campus to 400 acres.

Academic and organizational changes also occurred rapidly. The faculty formalized its organizational structure and redefined its role in the governance of the institution in 1974-75. Also, the students reorganized their governing body and more precisely defined their role on campus; the administration and staff structures were overhauled and expanded to meet the demands of the growing academic programs.

When the full-time equivalent student enrollment reached 1,066 in the fall of 1975, the Aiken Campus was permitted to plan for senior level courses, as well as create a number



of baccalaureate degree programs. In that same year, USCA received approval as a four-year branch campus by the Board of Trustees of the University of South Carolina and USCA was designated a Recognized Candidate for Senior College Accreditation. In September 1976, the Board of Trustees granted academic autonomy to the Aiken Campus. The first bachelor's degrees were granted in May 1977 and USCA became a fully accredited senior college.

Presently, the college community is comprised of more than 3,300 students, over 100 full-time faculty, approximately 110 staff members, and 28 administrators. USCA awards bachelor's degrees in more than 20 major areas of study, an associate degree in nursing, master's degrees in two areas, and offers a varied program of continuing education courses for the wider community.

Today USC Aiken offers students a liberal education designed to develop an understanding of human experience which will equip them for life in a free society. To accomplish this, the University provides students with an opportunity to discover learning processes which enable them to grow personally and socially.

It promotes students' interaction within a community of active scholars and artists, and it encourages students to use the knowledge which they gain to deal with the problems of a rapidly changing world.

“THE COURTHOUSE”

Home of the Pacers

Known to Pacer fans as “The Courthouse”, the Student Activities Center gymnasium is the home to USC Aiken men’s and women’s basketball and volleyball teams.

This 2,500-seat arena is considered one of the toughest places to play in the Peach Belt Conference.

Most recently, it has hosted the 2002 Peach Belt Conference Volleyball Championships.

“The Courthouse” also serves as the setting for numerous academic events and school functions such as Dr. Thomas Hallman’s inauguration and December and May convocations.



Roberto Hernandez Stadium

Built with a one million dollar donation from the 15-year MLB veteran and USCA alum. Seats 1,000 fans.



J.H. Satcher Field

Formerly the home of USCA baseball, Satcher Field is now one of the best D-II softball facilities in the Southeast.

For the first time in eight years, USC Aiken Head Coach Ike Ofoje will not be coaching two soccer teams at the same time. Ofoje enters his 10th season as the head men's soccer coach but will not be USCA's head women's soccer coach.

Ofoje started the women's program at USC Aiken in 1997 and served as its head coach for eight seasons, compiling a record of 51-77-10. In 2005 however, the coach will concentrate all his focus on the men's squad. In his nine seasons at the helm of the Pacers, he has a 47-108-9 overall record.

Even though the 2004 USC Aiken men's soccer team finished 5-11-2, the Pacers showed vast improvement over the 2003 season in which they went winless at 0-11-0.

In addition to the two ties, USCA lost two more matches by just one goal. If those four close matches had swung to the win column, the Pacers would have had their first winning season since 2001.

That 2001 campaign, in which the Pacers finished 10-9-0 in Ofoje's sixth season on the USCA sideline, marked the program's first winning season since 1994 and only its second winning record since joining the NCAA Division II in 1990.

Ofoje's 2002 team reached another milestone. The Pacers entered that year's Peach Belt Conference Tournament as the seventh seed, but Andre Joseph's game winner with four minutes to play lifted USCA to a stunning 2-1 upset over eighth-ranked, and second seeded North Florida and gave the program its first-ever PBC Tournament victory.

On the women's side, after struggling through a 1-14-1 inaugural season in 1997, Ofoje led the Lady Pacers to a 45-39-7 record over the next five seasons.

In 2002 the Lady Pacers scored the program's first-ever win over a top 10 team, a 2-1 overtime victory over ninth ranked Francis Marion University.

Ofoje, a 1991 graduate of New Hampshire College, was a two-time NCAA Division II All-American and was named Most Valuable Player for his 1989 NCAA National Championship team.

As a player at New Hampshire College, Ofoje led his teams to a 72-15-4 record and four NCAA Tournament appearances. He totaled 58 goals, 36 assists, and 152 points in 75 career matches. He owns the school record for most career points, is tied for most career assists and is a member of the New Hampshire College Hall of Fame.

After graduation, Ofoje played professionally in the United Systems of Independent Soccer Leagues for the Boston Storm for two seasons.

Ofoje also played on his native country of Nigeria's junior and senior national teams.

While coaching at St. Joseph's High School in Huntington, W.Va., Ofoje earned his Master's degree in Sports Management at Marshall University.

Ofoje, who holds a USSF "A" coaching license, served as assistant women's soccer coach at Illinois State University before arriving at USC Aiken.



Anya Heminger enters her second season as USC Aiken's Graduate Assistant Coach. After finishing her playing career at Clayton State in 2002, Heminger spent the 2003 season as a student assistant for the Lakers before joining the USC Aiken family in 2004.

The Ontario, Ore., native started all 37 matches in her two-year career at Clayton State. She became the school's all-time assists leader on her way to leading the team to 22 victories in two seasons (2001-02), including a runner-up finish in the 2002

PBC Tournament. She was named to the 2001 Peach Belt All-Conference team and was named the Lakers' Most Valuable Offensive Player that same season.

Prior to playing at Clayton State, she was a two-year starter at Walla Walla Community College and was named to the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges Academic All-Conference team in 2000. Heminger received her undergraduate degree in Applied Biology from Clayton State in May 2004. She is working on her Masters degree from the University of South Carolina.

POSITIVE CHANGES TO IMPACT PACER PROGRAM as usca looks to climb ladder

For the past seven years, USC Aiken Head Men's Soccer Coach Ike Ofoje has been the head soccer coach for both the men and women. For the first time since starting the women's program in 1997, Ofoje will be coaching only the men's team. Ofoje is looking forward to focusing his efforts towards one team.

"The change is all-around beneficial to both programs," said Ofoje. "If I can give more time and attention to individuals players on and off the field, there is no reason to doubt that we will have a successful season."

Ofoje is confident the goals he has set for his team can be accomplished with his priorities now focused on one single team. After coming off a 5-11-2 season, he is hoping for all-around success but especially getting big wins in the Peach Belt Conference. With his teams strengths, he is certain their goals can be met.

"Our team goal is to turn our program around and get a winning

season," said Ofoje. "We hope to make the conference tournament, that would be major proof of success for us."

Last season, the Pacers were able to improve from years before but Ofoje is looking to his team to pull a bigger turnaround. Thirteen players will be returning to the team, including six starters. They will be joined by a group of nine new players.

Going into the first game Ofoje is happy with the progress his players have made while training in the off-season. He sees their biggest strength being the high fitness level and quickness of his players. This is an area they have struggled with in the past but he feels will be one of his teams biggest assets.

Ofoje also acknowledges that the team took a big hit after graduating six key players at the end of last season. Even with the lack of experience, Ofoje sees this as an opportunity for the new guys to step up, and for the returning players to take on the leadership role.

Ofoje noted three players he feels can do the job. Junior defensemen Dennison Scipio, junior midfielder Eugene Eshun-Philips and senior defensemen Benjamin Cawley will be the guys Ofoje is counting on to lead his team on and off the field.

"I will be looking to those guys, as they expected, to provide the leadership our team needs to be successful," Ofoje said.

GOALKEEPERS

Last season, the Pacers were equipped with four goalkeepers but will only return Harold Tate and Marcos Rodriguez. Tate showed his skills making 36 saves in the net last fall and Rodriguez kept up recording 17 saves.

It was a tight season between Tate, with a 2.44 GAA and Rodriguez, with a 2.55 GAA. During 15 of the team's 18 games the duo gave up

MIDFIELD

Eshun-Philips and sophomore Georgi Peev are returning starters at the midfield position. Both brought offensive success last season with two goals, five assists and two goals, two assists, respectively. Ofoje remains positive with the season outlook because he knows this season will be unlike the previous years. By putting all his efforts into the men's soccer program he will be able to produce a team capable of keeping up in the tough Peach Belt Conference.

"Our conference is ruthless, it's going to be tough," said Ofoje. "Any win there will be a great win for us."

But the difference is this year, the PBC title race is closer than ever.

"The conference teams are beginning to even out, it could be anybody's game, any day now," Ofoje said. "It used to be that there were two or three top teams every season and nobody else stood a chance, but this year, nobody's up there."

Coach Ofoje is eager to bring out the best team he can and knows his players want a winning season and are just as dedicated as he is. The team is growing in experience and the players are pushing themselves as far as they can to reach the goals they set for themselves.

"We will be a young team, but I think that the players are hungry

enough to make it happen and pull out some great wins," Ofoje said.

Another dynamic that has changed for Ofoje and the Pacers is the shape of the Peach Belt Conference itself. Perennial power North Florida departed, taking their entire athletics program to the NCAA Division I ranks and the Atlantic Sun Conference.

And as one program goes out, in comes a new member in 2005. North Georgia College & State University has joined the Peach Belt Conference and is in the process of transitioning to the NCAA Division II from the NAIA rankings. Although the Saints will not be allowed to compete for a conference tournament title and an automatic bid to NCAA postseason play, they still will factor in the race for regular season crown.

In addition to six tough conference matches, the Pacers will face a challenging non-conference slate. Eight of those contests will come against members of the Carolinas-Virginia Conference (CVAC) including nationally-ranked Queens University of Charlotte and NAIA power Savannah College of Art & Design (SCAD).

Vision Statement:

The Peach Belt Conference is committed to providing through its dependent collegiate members, a forum for student participation in athletic, academic and co-curricular events under the auspices of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, Division II.

We will exemplify the characteristics of a premier intercollegiate conference that prides itself on the inclusion of students of all demographic groups who wish to participate in a well-rounded sports program. Our institutions, our academic goals, our athletic aspirations reflect a communality of purpose and a commitment to excellence in the classroom and on the playing field.

History:

Since its inception in 1991, the Peach Belt Conference has worked tirelessly to become one of the elite conferences in NCAA Division II. Now in its 15th season with 23 national championships and 20 national finalists, the PBC has accomplished that goal.

Starting with only two championships in 1991, in men's and women's basketball, the conference has expanded to 12 championship sports with the addition of women's soccer in the fall of 2000.

The conference traces its roots back to November of 1988 when 11 schools first met in Greenville, S.C. to form a Division II conference. Following a second meeting on Dec. 3, 1989 hosted by USC Aiken, five of those 11 schools, plus two others, formed the Peach Belt and began play in 1991.

The Peach Belt was less than a year old before capturing a national championship. The Columbus State golf team took the honor by winning the 1992 national crown, the first of

three golf championships the Cougars own.

The PBC has seen continued success in all sports with national rankings and multiple NCAA appearances.

The 2004-05 season may have been the most successful yet with two national titles as USC Aiken won their second-straight golf championship and Armstrong Atlantic State won the women's tennis national championship. The PBC also had the second place or runner-up in baseball, softball, men's tennis and golf, giving the PBC a first or second-place in every spring sport the conference sponsors.

The seven charter members of the conference were Armstrong Atlantic State University, Columbus State University, Francis Marion University, Georgia College & State University, Lander University, USC Aiken, and USC Upstate. The name Peach Belt Athletic Conference was adopted in January of 1990 and modified to Peach Belt Conference in May 2000.

Augusta State joined the conference in 1991 and UNC Pembroke became the ninth member on July 1, 1992. They were followed by Kennesaw State on July 1, 1994, Clayton State on July 1, 1995 and the University of North Florida on July 1, 1997. Kennesaw State and North Florida departed for the Division I ranks in 2005 and the conference welcomed in North Georgia College & State University as its 11th member in the fall of 2005.

Former Augusta State basketball coach and athletic director Marvin Vanover was named the interim commissioner in April 1990, and later appointed as the conference's first full-time commissioner in July of 1991. He established the conference office in Augusta, Ga.

On July 20, Susan Vodicka was named the second head women's soccer coach at USC Aiken in the program's eight-year history.

Vodicka comes to USCA with 11 years of NCAA Division I coaching experience, including one season as the head coach at Virginia Commonwealth University. She served as an assistant at the College of William & Mary, Washington State, and George Mason University.

Ike Ofoje served as head coach of USCA's men's and women's teams since the Lady Pacers began play in 1997. Ofoje will continue as the head coach of the men's program.

Vodicka was a member of three NCAA Tournament teams as a student-athlete at George Mason. The 1983 squad made it to the national championship game and her 1985 team claimed the NCAA National Championship by beating North Carolina in the title match.

She earned a Bachelor's of Arts Degree in English from GMU in 1986 and a Virginia Secondary Teaching Certificate in 1992.

The George Mason grad most recently served as assistant coach at her alma mater from 1999 to 2003. During her five seasons, the Patriots were 49-48-7 overall but went 25-11-3 in Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) play. GMU tied for first place in the CAA in 2000 and 2001, and finished second in 2002. The team was the CAA Tournament runner-up in 2000 and 2002.

At GMU, Vodicka coached six NSCAA All-Region selections, 13 All-CAA selections and 10 All-CAA Tournament selections. More impressively, while overseeing the team's academics for all five seasons, 41 Patriot women's soccer players received the CAA Commissioner's Academic Award and the squad posted George Mason's highest team GPA in six of nine semesters. The team also captured the NSCAA Academic Award in 2002 and 2003.

Before accepting the position at her alma mater, Vodicka served as head coach for one season at Virginia Commonwealth.

The Rams posted a 7-9-2 overall record and a 2-5-1 mark in the CAA. While she spent just one season at the helm of the program, her impact was strong. VCU earned the program's first ever conference wins over James Madison and American University, and they tied 10th ranked Virginia. In addition, her squad produced two All-CAA selections.

Vodicka made her collegiate head coaching debut after serving two seasons as assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Washington State. In her first season in Pullman, Wash., the Cougars doubled their win total from the previous season.

In two seasons combined, Vodicka coached four All-PAC-10 selections while nine Cougars earned PAC-10 All-Academic honors.

The new USC Aiken soccer coach began her collegiate coaching career at the College of William & Mary where she served as assistant coach from 1993 to 1995. During Vodicka's three seasons at William & Mary, the Tribe made three NCAA Tournament appearances, posted a 43-16-2 record and went unbeaten in the CAA at 15-0-1. The team captured two CAA Championships and finished as the runner-up once. The 1994 squad went 17-4-0 (6-0-0 CAA) on its way to winning the CAA Championship and making the NCAA's Sweet 16.

While at the Williamsburg, Va., school, Vodicka coached three All-Americans, eight all-region selections and 17 All-CAA honorees. She also coached two CAA Players of the Year and two players that would later be drafted by the Women's United Soccer Association (WUSA) to play professional soccer.

Vodicka's first tour of duty as a head coach came at Centreville High School in Clifton, Va. from 1988 to 1993.

Vodicka holds a USSF "B" coaching license and has worked with both the Virginia and Washington State Olympic Development Programs.

TEAMWORK THE KEY FOR LADY PACERS as new era begins

USC Aiken will see a new face on the soccer sidelines this year, women's head coach Sue Vodicka has joined the tradition of Pacer Athletics. Vodicka is looking for success with her new players, both on and off the field. She believes any group of players can be a winning team if they focus on that which is most important to her, teamwork.

"I am trying to teach the value of being a team above anything else," Vodicka said. "I want to build a program based on teamwork, that's the most important quality to be successful."

As a new coach, Vodicka did have some apprehensions about being hired so close to the beginning of preseason.

"I was hired in a week before preseason started, which can make it very difficult on upperclassmen who are used to and comfortable with their coach and are being forced to change so close to the start of their junior and senior seasons," Vodicka said.

But when asked about the current chemistry between player and coach she's happy to mention a very positive experience.

"Surprisingly this has been one of the easiest transitions I've ever made," Vodicka said. "These players have been amazing and were very welcoming; they have embraced me as a coach and the new players."

With 10 returning players, including seven starters, Vodicka will have plenty of experience to blend with her eight new players. Although she has a lot of individual talent within her team, it is her goal to make it known that no one player is more important than the rest.

"My coaching philosophy isn't focused on individuals, we are a puzzle, no one piece is more important or bigger than the other," Vodicka said. "And if one of us is missing, we don't function."

It will take strategy and hard work to put the pieces together to make a strong, effective and winning puzzle. The Pacers are coming off a 2-12-2 season and are picked ninth in the preseason Peach Belt Conference coaches poll. Vodicka is optimistic and feels this gives her team the opportunity for improvement. But to do that, her players will need to step up their fitness level to get the wins they are looking for.

With only 18 players listed on the roster, being physically fit is going to be their biggest asset in having a winning season.

"With a small roster, you have to be fit enough to play for 90 minutes," said Vodicka. "If you're not tired or fatigued, you are going to be able to perform at a higher level for longer and I am working the players hard to get them there."

Vodicka has high hopes for this season and believes it crucial that the seniors have stepped up and really begun leading the team.

GOALKEEPER

Freshman Jacquelynn Hart is flying solo this season in protecting the Lady Pacer net as the only listed goalkeeper. She succeeds Shannon Hobbs who graduated last year after

finishing the season with 104 saves, 2.88 GAA, and ending her four-year career with 224 saves. Returning sophomore Melanie Byars also backed up Hobbs in 2004 playing three games as goalkeeper with eight saves, while adding one goal and one assist as a forward, her listed position.

DEFENSE

Vodicka will bring a strong and experienced defense to the field returning starters Andrea Lloyd, Meg Newton and Amy Meyers for their senior seasons. Other returning defenders are junior Melissa Schnoering, senior Tayo Amos and junior Beth Johnston; both were out last season due to ongoing injuries.

With such depth to their defense, the Pacers look to produce big games both in and out of the PBC.

FORWARDS

Byars will return with fellow senior starter Jen Mascarin. They will be joined by sophomore starter Jaclyn Mascarin, who played 15 games in 2004 and took two shots but was unable to put points on the board.

A four-player group of freshmen will begin in this position and try

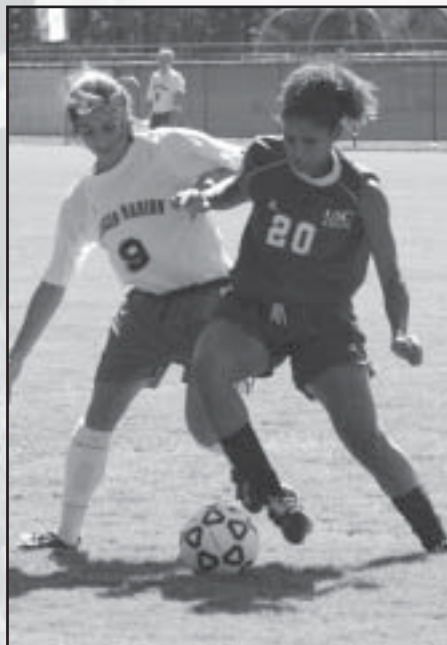

MIDFIELD

Vodicka should have much success in this position with four returning players, including starters Mascarin and junior Natasha DaCosta. In 2004, DaCosta had the Lady Pacers second-highest points scored with five goals and one assist. Mascarin made a big contribution tacking on three goals and three assists in just eight games before ending her junior season due to injury. Schnoering and Johnston will also join their veteran teammates at midfield this season.

The Pacer roster is stacked with new players at the midfield position. Five freshmen will add to the team and be joined by junior Kristi Derosiers, who transferred from C.W. Post, located in Brookville, N.Y.

Vodicka is new to the conference but has done her research and thinks Clayton State will be the team to beat this year in the PBC. It's been a tough conference for the Lady Pacers since joining in 2000, but Vodicka wants to

see her team fight their way through the pack.

"I would be thrilled to make it to conference playoffs," Vodicka said. "Ending our season ranked in the middle of the PBC would be such an improvement, I would love to see that."

Vodicka does walk into a different looking Peach Belt Conference. Perennial power North Florida departed, taking their entire athletics program to the NCAA Division I ranks and the Atlantic Sun Conference. Francis Marion took their women's soccer program to Division I as an independent.

Also, a new addition comes into the league in the form of North Georgia.

With the leadership of her seniors and an impressive group of new players, the new coaches' goals do not seem out of reach. Keeping her players fit and working them hard everyday to be a strong team will bring success to the 2005 Lady Pacers.

"It's all about working hard and everyday trying to get better," Vodicka added. "If every player takes that as a challenge then the whole team will improve and we will see the results on the field."
