

NCAA WOMEN ADOPT RALLY SCORING FORMAT

The NCAA and the National Association for Girls and Women in Sport (NAGWS), the official rule maker for collegiate women's volleyball, have adopted the rally scoring format for the 2001 season.

Matches will be played with rally scoring in a best three-out-of-five games. The winner will be the first team to 30 points in games one through four and 15 points in game five. All games must still be won by two points.

Other rules changes that will affect the match include: the let serve (serves that hit the net and fall in bounds are in play), one toss per serve in eight seconds with no re-serves, no team serving between games and colored balls may be used but at least one-third of it must be white or light in color.

Unlike the men, the women's game will not adopt the inclusion of the libero position. Women's college teams will continue to have 18 substitutions each per game.

2001 USC WOMEN OF TROY VOLLEYBALL: WE'RE BACK!

It takes a history lesson to put the 2001 USC women's volleyball team in perspective.

In its very first year as a scholarship sport, USC wasted no time establishing itself. With a 34-1 record, the Women of Troy were crowned 1976 AIAW National Champions.

USC repeated as national champions in 1977, this time winning the AIAW Championship with a 38-0 record – the first perfect season in collegiate women's volleyball.

On a team that featured no seniors but a strong freshman class, USC tallied its third AIAW title in 1980.

One year later, collegiate volleyball entered its first official season as an NCAA sanctioned sport. It was only appropriate that the Trojans went on to win the first-ever NCAA crown. That 1981 national championship also made USC the first-ever women's team to win four national titles.

Followed by two more trips to the NCAA finals (1982 and 1985), USC had established a strong tradition in the sport.

But, despite advancing to the NCAA Tournament nearly every year after that, it took 15 years for the Women of Troy to make it back to the national stage.

In 2000, the Trojans found themselves in familiar territory, with a Pac-10 Championship, a NCAA semifinal finish and a 29-3 overall mark, so it now safely can be said that...

USC IS BACK!

"It was a Cinderella kind of season and a great way to kick off the resurgence of this program," said head coach **Mick Haley**, who enters his first official season at the helm of the USC women's volleyball program after guiding the U.S.A. Women's National Volleyball team to a fourth-place finish at the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia. Last year, he joined the Trojans' staff midseason but assumed an observational role in order to allow interim head coach Jerritt Elliott to complete the season.

Equipped with the nation's No. 1 recruiting class (*Volleyball* magazine, *Student Sports*), USC began the 2000 season by setting a school and Pac-10 record with 38-consecutive game victories. Under Elliott, who left USC this spring to take a head coaching position at Texas, the Women of Troy spent five weeks ranked No. 1 by *Volleyball* and won a share of the Pac-10 Championship (with Arizona) with a 16-2 record.

USC was selected as the top seed of the NCAA Pacific Regional (also a program first) and swept through the first four tournament matches, including a 3-0 win over defending national champion Penn State, to earn its first Final Four appearance since 1985. But, the Trojans then fell to Wisconsin, 3-0, in the semifinals.

"Last year we had two seniors who felt that this was their last chance," said Haley, who led Texas to two national championships in 17 years with the Longhorns.

"Antoinette Polk and Janae Henry came to play and they both contributed to the team's success tremendously. It was their dream. It's what seniors play for – the chance to play for a national title.

"Everyone played such a big role. Our only junior, Jennifer Pahl, matured into an outstanding player who just exploded on the court.

"Our sophomores gave us the ability to go to a 6-2 system, something that many times caught our opponents by surprise and allowed us to attack in multiple ways.

"Then we had our dynamic group of freshmen who all contributed significantly. They were all so pivotal.

"It is going to be difficult to duplicate the kind of chemistry that team was able to create last season. Everything just fell into place but we still have all the elements to do it again this season."

The 2001 Trojans return 10 letterwinners and four starters. Among the veterans, the Women of Troy will feature the talent of All-Americans **Jennifer Pahl** (Murrieta, Calif.) and **April Ross** (Newport Beach, Calif.), in addition to two other all-conference players.

Gone are the talents and contributions made by Polk and Henry the last four years. The two outside hitters were tremendous contributors for USC on both offense and defense. Together they accounted for 5.73 kills and 6.17 digs per game in 2000. Among the Trojans' career leaders, Polk ranks fifth in digs (1164), seventh in digs per game (2.87), ninth in attacks (3162) and 10th in kills (1175), making her the 35th player in Pac-10 history and the sixth player at USC to surpass 1,000 career kills and digs. Last season's defensive leader, Henry also has her place in the record books. She ranks sixth in career digs per game (3.04) and eighth in digs (980).

"Our underclassmen are going to have to carry a much bigger burden this year with those two gone," said Haley, who ranks ninth in NCAA career win percentage with a 522-137 (.792) record in 17 years as a Division I head coach. "I don't know if everyone realized how much these seniors contributed to our success last year.

"We are a different team this year. We are obviously more athletic than we have been in previous years but everyone needs to assume new roles and learn how to play together again.

"Our setters will certainly be sharing time again and we're hoping that Pahl, Ross and Katie Olsovsky just continue to improve and really assume the positions of leadership on this team.

"This may be the toughest season for last year's freshmen because the expectation level has been set so high. They have to be leaders to the incoming freshmen, who will be just as good as they were their first year."

For the second year in a row, USC will welcome the nation's No. 1 recruiting class (according to *Volleyball*, *Student Sports*). The incoming freshmen are led by Paul Mitchell All-Americans **Alicia Robinson** (Phoenix, Ariz.), **Emily Adams** (Phoenix, Ariz.) and **Keao Burdine** (La Habra, Calif.).

The 6-2 Robinson, Arizona's 2000 Gatorade Player of the Year, and 6-1 Burdine, named the Orange County Player of the Year by numerous publications, will both compete for playing time on the left side. At 6-5, Adams brings strength and height at middle blocker. She is one of the three tallest players to ever play for the Women of Troy.

"Alicia Robinson and Keao Burdine are certainly capable of filling in on the left side in spots left behind by Janae Henry and Antoinette Polk," said Haley. "Robinson brings initial power while Burdine has the same movement potential as April Ross. Then, with the addition of Emily Adams, we have a tremendous height advantage this season.

"We're just excited to get them in the gym and see where they all fit."

The Trojans will endure many changes this season, starting with a revised coaching staff. Paula Weishoff (fifth season) remains as the first assistant, while Haley named former volunteer assistant Rob Machan as the second full-time assistant coach. The coaching staff is determined to maintain the same style of play that was utilized the last two seasons in order for the Trojans to remain an aggressive, defensive team that is quick on the attack.

"I want everyone to come back in better shape this season because we are going to have tough practices," said Haley. "For the first time in a couple of years we actually have enough players on both sides of the net so our time spent in the gym will be more effective. I want every day to be a battle. I want them to push each other with the idea that we want to get back to the Final Four and have another shot at the title this year."



The 2001 schedule will be, as usual, difficult. It is no secret that the Pac-10 remains the most dominant conference in collegiate volleyball. Last season, six Pac-10 teams earned NCAA tournament berths and three reached the regional finals. USC was the sole conference representative in the Final Four, marking the 26th time a Pac-10 team has reached the tournament finals.

The final 2000 *USA Today*/AVCA Coaches poll featured USC at No. 4, No. 5 Arizona, No. 7 UCLA and No. 19 Stanford. The Pac-10 returns eight of the conference's top 10 setters and seven of the top players in each of the following categories – kills per game, hitting percentage and blocks per game.

"The competition will be much tougher this year because opponents will be much more aware of our strategies," said Haley. "Our schedule will definitely be challenging. We may not win every match and there will be plenty of five-game battles, but I guarantee that we are going to be a well-prepared team by November."

The Women of Troy will not have to wait until the start of the conference season to face tough opposition. The challenge begins the very first weekend of the regular season. USC opens 2001 at the Irvine Invitational against UC Irvine on Sept. 1 and NCAA runner-up Wisconsin on Sept. 2. After being eliminated by the Badgers last season in the semifinals, this early season match will certainly have USC's attention.

Aside from its conference opponents, USC will also face No. 3 Hawai'i (Sept. 7/Nov. 23), No. 9 UC Santa Barbara (Sept. 18), No. 18 Pepperdine (Oct. 16) and No. 8 Pacific (Nov. 24) in 2001.

"But this is why you come to SC – to play the best teams in the country," said Haley.

Here is a look at the 2001 USC women's volleyball team by position:

SETTERS

Sophomore **Toni Anderson** (Yorba Linda, Calif.) and junior **Tracy Lindquist** (Fullerton, Calif.) may have been USC's most underrated players last season. Uncommon for most teams, the 2000 squad found great success by splitting time at setter. Both Anderson and Lindquist saw equal time on the court and were kept in constant rotation. Though their individual stats may not resemble that of a primary setter, combined the two averaged 14.7 assists per game – a mark that would have led the Pac-10.

"No matter what, we need to have both players out there," said Haley. "Toni is pretty cool out there. She's a heady player and a great leader on the court. Tracy is just one of those players who gives you 110% at all times. She is a great passer and setter, and I love having her out there because she just wants to win so badly."

With impressive performances of her own, Anderson was named to the All-Pac-10 honorable mention team and the Pac-10 All-Freshman team.

"The two of them together have great rapport," said Haley, who in his 16 seasons as head coach at Texas produced seven All-American setters. "They have different personalities which allows us to change tempo and never allows our opponents to get too comfortable."

MIDDLE BLOCKERS

For the first time in the last few years, the Trojans can claim to be deep at the middle blocker position.

Resuming her starting role in the middle is the 6-1 Pahl – the team's only senior. Named second team AVCA All-American in 2000, she led the squad and finished second in the Pac-10 with 1.27 blocks per game. In addition to the strength of her defense, Pahl also provides a valuable offensive threat at the net. In 2000 she led the team with a .405 attack percentage (334-66-662) and managed to hit above .500 in 11 outings for the Women of Troy.

Standing beside Pahl will be 6-3 sophomore **Katie Olsovsky** (Torrance, Calif.) who finished last season just steps behind her teammate at the net. Named an honorable mention Asics/*Volleyball* All-American, Olsovsky averaged 1.18 blocks and 2.74 kills per game in her first season. She finished third in the conference in blocks and sixth in attack percentage (.359). En route, she added two marks to USC's Top 10 list with a .688 hitting performance against Oregon (Sept. 30) and .750 attack percentage against Penn State (Dec. 8).

"It will be interesting to see how our middle blockers evolve," said Haley. "I expect that Jennifer Pahl will be unstoppable this year and that Katie Olsovsky, who was a great blocker and hitter last year, should be a dominant blocker and hitter this year."

Coming off the bench in 2000, 6-3 sophomore **Kelli Lantz** (Bakersfield, Calif.) quietly pieced together a terrific freshman campaign. Though only appearing in 36 games, she emerged as a key performer when needed on the court. In matches where she saw playing time in more than one game, Lantz hit above .400 six-of-eight times. With a .733 attack percentage against Cal on Oct. 19, she too made her mark in the Trojans' Top 10 chart.

Entering her first year, the 6-5 Adams completes the group of middle blockers.

"Now we have the ability to play with big teams and still maintain our quickness with Pahl in the middle," said Haley. "We have some great options and it will make it very difficult for opponents to prepare for us."

OUTSIDE HITTERS

How powerful the Women of Troy can be at outside hitter still remains to be decided. USC returns one of the most heralded players of the 2000 season in Ross, but must fill the positions vacated by Polk and Henry.

"Early in the season I'm going to have to utilize as many players as possible," said Haley. "We have a lot of talent and we need to get everybody out there to figure out the right combinations, but by November we should feel pretty comfortable about who our starters are."

Ross, a 6-1 sophomore, is a lock as one of the team's starting outside hitters. She had an outstanding freshman campaign which earned her multiple accolades, including Asics/*Volleyball* Freshman of the Year, AVCA second team All-America, Asics/*Volleyball* third team All-America, AVCA Pacific Region Freshman of the Year, Pac-10 Freshman of the Year and All-Pac-10 first team.

Ross was the only Trojan to start in all 32 matches in 2000. She led the team with 3.7 kills per game and finished second with 3.06 digs and 0.36 service aces per outing. She ranked sixth in the conference in aces and eighth in kills and digs.

"Even after such an outstanding freshman season where we tried to use her on the right, April Ross went out and really established herself on the left side while playing with the U.S.A. national team this summer,"

said Haley. "This is what makes her such a great player. She has great range and an excellent ability to run combinations, and now she has the ability to be dominating on the left, too."

"You add in Keao Burdine, who also has great range to play on the right or left, and Alicia Robinson, who is a great left-side power hitter, and our attacking will remain intact. All three of these players will be used on both sides."

"Then you have Lauren Killian who is an outstanding player on the right side. She has long arms, she can go to the net and as a left-hander on the right side, she possesses a great advantage."

Six-foot-one junior **Lauren Killian** (Los Angeles, Calif.) is an explosive hitter who has been rotated on and off the bench since her freshman year. In 2000, she averaged 1.5 kills, 0.75 blocks and a .342 attack percentage while playing in all 32 matches.

"Lauren Killian is one of the players who I'm excited about this year because she had an exceptional spring," said Haley. "Her hitting has improved tremendously and she's going to provide a lot of points for us this season. She also has become a very physical player so I'm hoping she will help Pahl at the net on that side."

"I think we have a pretty quick group of attackers this year and, no matter what, we will be deep at that position."

DEFENSIVE SPECIALISTS

The defensive specialist is the least recognized player in volleyball, yet these athletes will play an integral role this year as women's collegiate volleyball makes the transition to an international format that includes rally scoring and the let serve. Every reception error will count as a point and serves that hit the net are playable so the Trojans have compiled a deep and solid core of backrow players.

The returners include junior **Julie Mariani** (Los Altos, Calif.) and sophomores **Nicole Davis** (Stockton, Calif.) and **Jaime Carroll** (Palos Verdes, Calif.), daughter of USC football head coach Pete Carroll. Among the three, Davis led with an average of 1.30 digs in 44 games last year. "We have some nice options in the backrow this year," said Haley. "Nicole Davis improved her position on the team in the offseason by coming up with a good jump serve. She is really a player who can pass and serve well."

"Julie Mariani is an outstanding defensive player, a real vacuum cleaner in the back row, and we look forward to having her back at 100 percent this season."

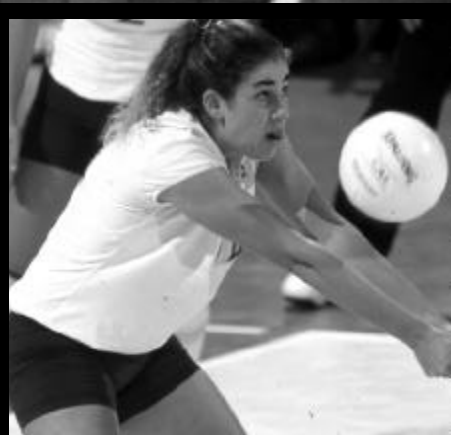

A new era of USC volleyball officially begins as Mick Haley takes the helm of the Women of Troy program for the 2001 season. With a rich tradition of its own, USC welcomes one of the elite head coaches in Division I history who brings with him his tradition of excellence.

Haley, 58, accepted the USC coaching position in June of 1999, replacing Lisa Love who guided the Women of Troy for 10 seasons, but did not assume the position until fulfilling his responsibilities with the U.S.A. Women's National Volleyball Team.

Following the 2000 Olympic Games, Haley joined USC midway through the collegiate season, but allowed Interim Head Coach Jerritt Elliott to complete the year. From the bench, Haley served as a mentor to the team and its coaching staff as the Trojans reached the NCAA Championship Semifinals for the first time in 15 years.

"This is a great opportunity for me to get back into college coaching and to be able to spend more time with my family," he said. "In USC, there is a commitment to excellence in athletics and academics that will allow us to have the opportunity to revive a national championship program."

Completing his fourth season with the U.S. National Team, Haley's squad earned a berth to the 2000 Olympics by defeating Canada to win the Nike Americas' Volleyball Challenge. In Sydney, Australia, the team surprised many by advancing to the semifinals before falling to Russia 2-3 and Brazil 0-3 in medal contention. The Americans, who were not favored to make the semifinals, much less push the powerful Russians to a fifth game, relinquished the bronze medal to Brazil with the loss and finished fourth overall.

Haley joined the U.S.A. National Team in January of 1997. In his first season, he molded an entirely new squad into an international contender. The U.S. women went 16-13 in 1997, finished second at the NORCECA Zone Championship behind 1996 Olympic gold-medalist Cuba, and posted key victories over Canada, Germany and the Dominican Republic. In 1998, the team opened the year 10-0 en route to a 31-30 mark, won the NORCECA Zonal Championship qualifier and the Canada Cup, and had impressive wins over Italy, Peru and Japan. 1999 began with much of the same success, as Haley's team swept the Dominican Republic to earn the bronze medal at the

Pan American Games, and fell to Cuba in the final match of the Continental Championship. The performance secured a spot for the U.S. at the World Cup where the team posted a 3-8 record.

But before entering the international spotlight, Haley spent 17 successful seasons (1980-96) at Texas, where he was 522-137-1 overall, won two national championships, 13 Southwest Conference titles and earned 15 NCAA tournament berths.

His teams won the AIAW national title in 1981 (going 60-6-1 overall) and the NCAA crown in 1988. After winning his second title, he was named the 1988 *Volleyball* magazine National Coach of the Year. The 1988 championship squad is the only team to date to capture the NCAA title with a perfect 15-0 game record. Until 1995, it was also the only NCAA title claimed by a non-West Coast team.

If success were measured solely by the accolades earned by a coach's players, and the numbers were but a mere side note, Haley would sit comfortably among the nation's best. In 17 years with the Longhorns, he coached 13 SWC Players of the Year and more than 20 All-Americans.

Prior to Texas, Haley coached at Kellogg Community College in Battle Creek, Mich., for six seasons (1974-79), going 251-51 overall and leading his women's team to the national junior college title in 1978 and 1979. He also coached the Kellogg men to four national crowns during that time. In 1997, he was inducted into the Junior College Coaches Hall of Fame.

As a setter at Ball State (1962-65), he helped lead the Cardinals' to the 1964 and 1965 Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Association title. He was the MIVA's MVP in 1965 and made the All-MIVA second team in 1964. Haley was later inducted into the Ball State Athletic Hall of Fame in 1984. He earned his bachelor's degree in education from Ball State in 1965.

He received a master's degree in education in 1966 from Southern Illinois, where he started a men's club team, then served as an instructor and intramural director. During that time, he also trained with the U.S. National Team and served as an assistant coach with the U.S. men's and women's programs.

Haley was born on Aug. 18, 1943. He and his wife, Carrie, have a daughter, Halie, 12, and a son, Hunter, 14. He also has a son, Heath, 25, and a daughter, Heather, 30, from a previous marriage. Haley and his family currently reside in Hermosa Beach.

PAULA WEISHOFF

5th Season • USC '00

Paula Weishoff, a three-time Olympian and former Trojan All-American who has more than a decade's worth of international experience, begins her fifth season as an assistant coach for the Women of Troy. Under first-year head coach Mick Haley, she was named the program's top assistant.

In addition to leading the Women of Troy to the 2000 NCAA Championship Semifinals and their 10th consecutive postseason appearance, Weishoff helped USC sign the nation's top recruiting classes for the 2000 and 2001 seasons.

In 1998, Weishoff was inducted into the U.S. Volleyball Hall of Fame for her outstanding performance in the sport.

Weishoff, 39, a two-time Olympic medalist, is one of her generation's most dominant middle blockers and servers. She won a silver medal for the U.S. in the 1984 Olympics, a bronze in 1992 and played on the 1996 team in Atlanta. A member of the U.S. National team since 1981, she earned USA MVP honors and was the USOC Female Volleyball Athlete of the Year in 1984. In 1992, she was voted MVP of the Olympic Games.

Weishoff played at USC in 1980 under coach Chuck Erbe, leading the Women of Troy to a 46-4 record and the AIAW national championship. In 1981 she left school to join the U.S.A. National Team.

In addition to her Olympic efforts, other accomplishments on the U.S. team include gold medals at the 1981 and 1983 NORCECA Championships and the 1995 World Grand Prix. She earned silver medals at the 1983 Pan American Games and the 1991 NORCECA, and bronze medals at the 1982 World Championships, the 1986 Goodwill Games and the 1992 FIVB Super Four.

Weishoff's international experience includes a two-year stint in Japan (1995-97) where she was named MVP after leading Daiei to the 1995 Japan pro league title. She spent nine years in the Italian League, playing for Isola Verde Modena (1992-93), Menabò Reggio Emilia (1990-92), Braglia Reggio Emilia (1988-90), Civ & Civ Modena (1985-88) and VBC Cassano (1984-85) - all member teams of the Italian First (A1) Division. She also played a year in Brazil (1994).

A graduate of West Torrance (Calif.) High, Weishoff lettered in volleyball, track, soccer and softball. She captured the volleyball silver medal at the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1979 and earned MVP accolades at the 1980 U.S. Junior Olympics.

After having left USC to join the national team in 1981, Weishoff returned to finish her undergraduate degree in 1997. She graduated with bachelor of arts in humanities and a minor in business in May of 2000.

Born May 1, 1962, she is married to Karl Hanold. They currently reside in Irvine, Calif.

ROB MACHAN

1st Season • Long Beach State

Rob Machan, a volunteer assistant coach for the USC women's volleyball team in 2000, enters his first season as a full-time assistant under head coach Mick Haley.

Machan's responsibilities include coaching the setters and helping design the offense. He also handles the program's alumni and community relations, as well as its fundraising efforts.

Last season, Machan helped lead USC to its first NCAA Final Four appearance in 15 years. The Trojans won their first-ever share of the Pac-10 title (tying with Arizona) and their fourth overall conference title while finishing with a No. 4 national ranking.

With more than 15 years of experience as a girls' volleyball coach, Machan founded the Long Beach Volleyball Club in 1986 and Power/Asics Nova Volleyball Club in 1995. He coached Long Beach Club for six seasons, worked with the Magnum Volleyball Club for two years (1993-95) and then spent the past five years with Power/Asics Nova, where he coached current USC team members Tracy Lindquist and Toni Anderson.

Since 1991, his club teams have earned medals in the Junior Olympic National Open Tournament eight times, including three gold, three silver and two bronze.

Over this nine-year span, his teams have also finished in the top three in national invitational tournaments 26 times. They have earned 15 first place, seven second place and four third place finishes.

As the La Habra (Calif.) High varsity girls' volleyball coach from 1994 to 1995, Machan led the team to consecutive league championships and

two CIF quarterfinal appearances. His head coaching experience also includes a two-year stint (1998-99) as the girls' coach at Wilson High in Long Beach, Calif., and two years (1986-87) as the boys' varsity head coach at Gahr High in Cerritos, Calif. He led Wilson to two league championships and a No. 3 final ranking in CIF Division IAA - the highest in school history.

Machan attended Long Beach State from 1985 to 1989. Prior to that, he spent three years at Long Beach City College, where he competed with the Long Beach All-Star men's club at USVBA nationals.

Machan, 36, currently owns and operates an industrial sign/graphic arts business in the Long Beach area. Machan Sign Co. has been a family business for over 80 years.

He and his wife, Christine, reside in Long Beach with daughter, Danielle (11), and son, Joshua (1).

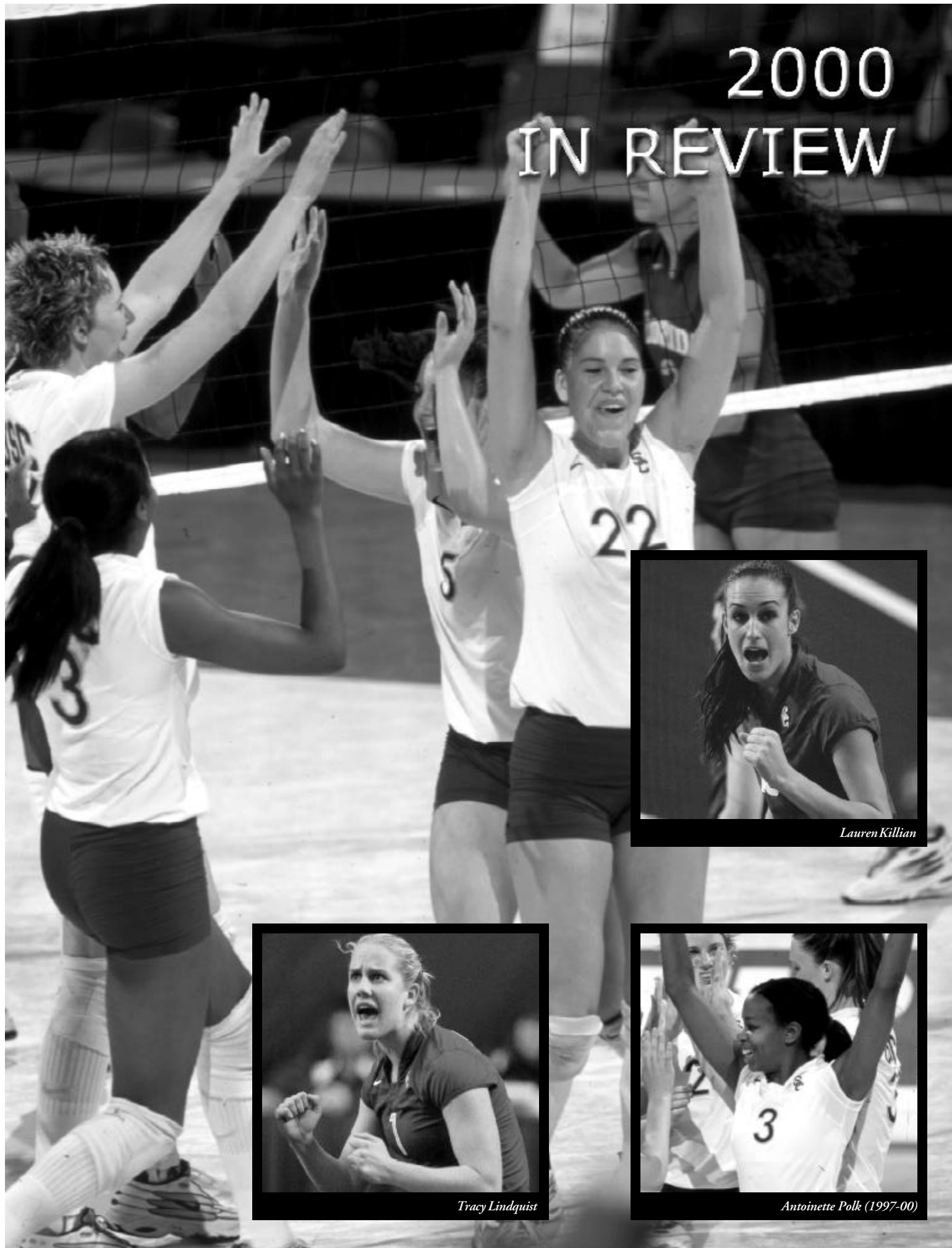

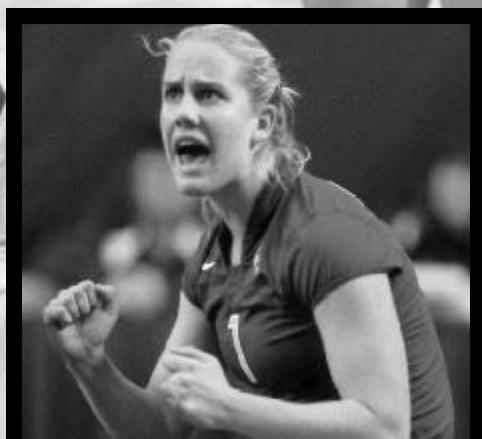

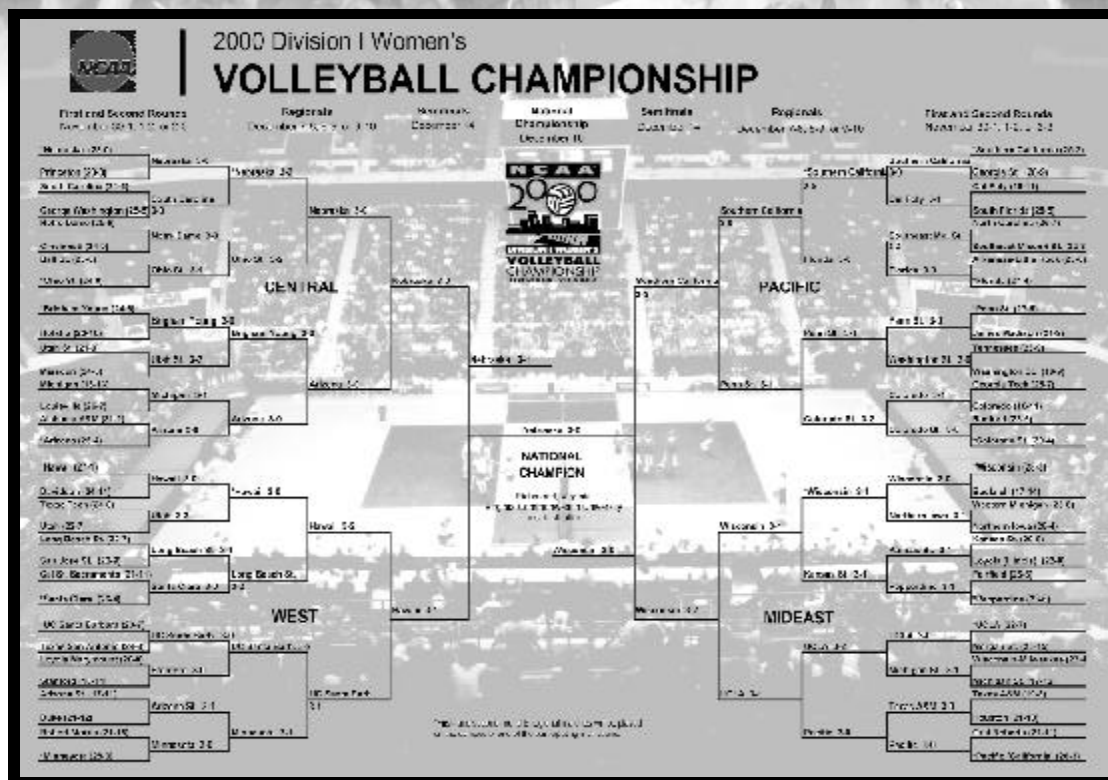

Every team sets goals. Goals are supposed to be lofty. Goals are designed to push a team to its limit.

But how often does a team actually achieve each and every one of its goals?

Not often, but the 2000 Women of Troy found a way to add a new page to USC's history books.

With the program's first-ever share of the Pac-10 conference title and its first trip to the NCAA Final Four in 15 years, last season's Trojans did not allow anything to step in the way of their goals, and en route, logged numerous program firsts and individual accomplishments.

2000 Team Highlights

- USC held on to *Volleyball* magazine's No. 1 ranking for five weeks throughout the season.
- Despite not receiving the NCAA automatic berth (UA won the tiebreaker), USC was selected as the top seed in the Pacific Region for the first time ever.
- Freshman **April Ross** was named Pac-10 Freshman of the Year, AVCA Pacific Region Freshman of the Year and *Asics/Volleyball* magazine Freshman of the Year.
- Ross and **Jennifer Pahl** were named to the AVCA All-American second team and *Asics/Volleyball* magazine All-American second and third teams, respectively.
- USC had all six starters named to all-conference teams and two honored as Pac-10 All-Academic.
- The Women of Troy made their 10th consecutive and 18th overall appearance in the NCAAAs.
- The 16-2 record was USC's 10th-consecutive winning mark in the Pac-10.
- USC swept each of its opponents in the first four rounds of the NCAA Tournament and 20 total opponents throughout the season.
- The Trojans allowed Georgia State to score only nine points in the Dec. 1 NCAA first round match - the lowest point total for a USC opponent during the season.
- The Women of Troy broke Stanford's 45-match home win streak with a 3-0 win on Sept. 22, then completed the program's first-ever regular season sweep of the Cardinal with a 3-2 win on Oct. 20.

Freshmen Bring Reminders of the Past

The nation's No. 1 freshman class made a definite impact on USC volleyball. Not only were three of the six (**April Ross**, **Katie Olsovsky** and **Toni Anderson**) starters, but their contributions were significant. Ross led the team in kills per game (3.7), Anderson split time and assists (8.11 apg) at setter, and Olsovsky finished second with an average of 1.18 blocks per game. As a group (which also included **Kelli Lantz**, **Nicole Davis** and **Jaime Carroll**), the freshmen were compared to the class of newcomers that joined USC in 1976 under head coach Chuck Erbe went on to win the 1976 ALAW National Championship.

Women of Troy Guided by Interim Head Coach

Jerritt Elliott entered his second season as interim head coach of the Women of Troy only to find even greater success this time around. Elliott was named Pac-10 Co-Coach of the Year (along with Arizona head coach David Rubio) to follow up his 1999 Pac-10 Coach of the Year honor. All six

starters in 1999 and 2000 earned all-conference recognition under Elliott's guidance and he compiled a 49-12 record in the two seasons.

Trojans Begin Season With Unbelievable Win Streak

USC put an end to a 23-year-old school record by surpassing a 28-game win streak previously set over the 1976 and 1977 championship seasons. The 2000 USC volleyball team began the season by winning 38 consecutive games (12 matches). The streak came to an end when USC dropped a game to UCLA in a 3-1 victory on Oct. 6. Ironically, the previous record was also broken by UCLA.

USC Wins First-Ever Pac-10 Championship

Before the 2000, UCLA and Stanford were the only two schools to ever win at least a share of the Pac-10 title. USC, though winning three conference titles (1976, 1977, 1980) in its 24-year program history, had never won the Pac-10 Championship since the conference's inception in 1986. But the 2000 Women of Troy made history by winning its first-ever share of the title. With a school-best 16-2 conference record, Arizona and USC split the season series (1-1) and the championship.



Stopping The Attack

After holding Georgia State (Dec. 1) to a sub .100 attack performance in the first round of the NCAAAs, the Lady Panthers became the ninth USC opponent of the season to be held below .100 hitting. In 32 matches, the Trojans held 17 opponents below a .200 attack percentage, including Penn State, which hit .159 in the re-

gional final.

Not On Our Turf

USC's record on its own territory was unblemished in 2000. The Trojans finished 18-0 at home while playing three matches in the Lyon Center, two at the Los Angeles Sports Arena and 13 at North Gym.

Polk Reaches Mark

Senior Antoinette Polk reached a historic mark on Oct. 20 with her first of two digs in the final game against Stanford. With 1,175 career kills and 1,164 career digs, Polk became just the 35th player in Pac-10 history and the sixth player at USC to surpass 1,000 in both categories. The last USC athlete to reach this mark was OH Jennifer Kessy (1995-98), who collected 1,799 kills and 1,311 digs in her four-year career.

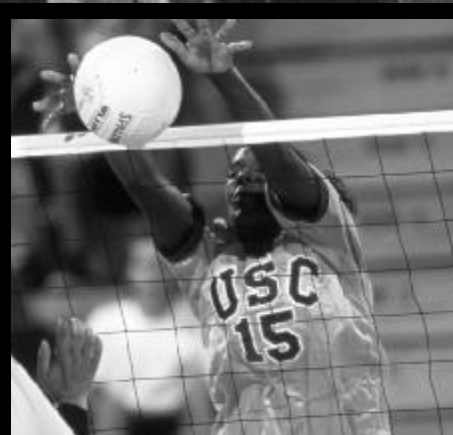

AIAW National Champions

Highlighting the 1976 Season

• With head coach Chuck Erbe in his first season at the helm of the USC women's volleyball program, the Women of Troy were ranked No. 1 by *Volleyball Magazine* in the preseason polls. They were selected to finish ahead of two-time national champion UCLA and 1975 runner-up Hawai'i.

• USC awarded scholarships for the first time in program history due to the advent of Title IX.

• Three freshman (Terry Place, Paula Dittmer-Goodwin, Debbie Green) joined one sophomore transfer (1976 USVBA All-American Debbie Landreth) and three returning starters (Julie Morgan, Lori Jepsen, Linda Vivas) on the 1976 squad.

• Coach Erbe implemented one of the most demanding schedules in USC volleyball history. The team practiced seven days a week and played as many as three games a week. It was easily twice as much as any other collegiate volleyball program.

• Winning the tournament championship at the UCLA Invitational, USC setter Debbie Green and middle blocker Terry Place were named to the all-tournament team.

• During the regular season, the Trojans lost only one match, to crosstown rival UCLA at the WIAW Regionals held at UC Davis. The loss forced the two teams to play a one-game playoff in order to advance to the AIAW Championships. USC defeated the Bruins, 15-8, to qualify.

• USC advanced to the national championships held Dec. 8-11 at the University of Texas.

First Rounds

• At the start of the tournament, USC was forced to play its first two matches without injured starters Paula Dittmer-Goodwin and Julie Morgan. Against Texas, the Trojans quickly jumped out to a 4-0 lead and never looked back, defeating the Longhorns, 15-1, 15-6, then routing Maryland, 15-1, 15-1. After the first day of competition, USC, UCLA, Pepperdine and Hawai'i were the only undefeated teams remaining. Upon Dittmer-Goodwin's return to the lineup, the Women of Troy defeated Michigan State, Eastern Kentucky and Arizona, by identical 2-0 scores.

Quarterfinals

• One day after first facing the Spartans, USC again defeated Michigan State, 15-10, 15-6, to advance to the semifinals.

Semifinals

• For the first time since the start of the championship tournament, USC was at full strength with Paula Dittmer-Goodwin and Julie Morgan healthy and back in the lineup. USC defeated Pepperdine, 15-3, 15-6, after tallying 12 unanswered points in the first game. Thus far, the Women of Troy had managed to beat every team in the tournament in two games.

Finals

• UCLA and USC advanced to the championship match and faced each other for the sixth time, as the Trojans' looked to avenge their single loss of the season. USC gained a quick lead in the first game and with impenetrable blocking, solid defense and

the quick-hitting of Paula Dittmer-Goodwin, they earned the 15-6 victory. In the second game, the Women of Troy jumped to a 3-0 lead, but the Bruins fought back to take a 13-9 advantage. The Trojans held them off and tied the score at 14 apiece but eventually surrendered the game, 14-16. Heading into the deciding game, USC relied on the efforts of Debbie Landreth and Julie Morgan, who blocked an attack by UCLA's Terry Condon for the final point of a 15-5 USC victory. The Women of Troy defeated the UCLA Bruins to be crowned *1976 AIAW National Champions*.

AIAW National Champions

Highlighting the 1977 Season

• With four returning starters from the 1976 national championship team, the addition of All-American candidates Star Clark, Sue Woodstra and Lyn Luedke, and the second-year leadership of head coach Chuck Erbe, USC was on its way to defending its national title in 1977.

• *Volleyball Magazine* ranked USC No. 1 in the pre-season polls.

• The Women of Troy opened the season by easily defeating seventh-ranked UC Santa Barbara, 15-5, 15-3, 15-0. USC faced and defeated four Top 10 opponents throughout the season: No. 2 UCLA, No. 3 Hawai'i, No. 4 Pepperdine and UCSB.

• Besides defeating all their top-ranked opponents, the highlight proved to be a 7-15, 15-9, 17-15, 14-16, 15-12 victory over UCLA. The match was played in front of 3,753 fans - the largest crowd ever to assemble for a women's sporting event at UCLA. It was considered by many to be one of the most exciting sporting events of the year.

• Held at Long Beach State, the WIAAW Regionals featured UC Davis, UC Santa Barbara, UCLA and USC. The Trojans opened tournament play with a 2-0 victory over UC Davis, not allowing the Aggies to score a single point in the two-game match. With wins over UCSB and UCLA, the Women of Troy again defeated the Bruins, 15-2, 11-15, 15-13, 15-8, in the tournament final and advanced to the national championship as the No. 1 seed.

First Rounds

• The 1977 championship tournament was held at BYU. USC swept through the opening rounds with 2-0 victories over Houston, Illinois State, Mississippi, Kansas State and Arizona.

Quarterfinals

• Still dominating competition, the remaining rounds posed a greater challenge for the Trojans. The tournament format changed to a best of five series as USC defeated Illinois State, 15-1, 15-4, 15-2, to advance.

Semifinals

• One match away from the national title, the Trojans posted a 15-3, 15-8, 15-9 victory over host BYU in the semifinals. In the other bracket, UCLA was defeated by Hawai'i, preventing a rematch of the 1976 championship.

Finals

• The final match was a battle between Hawai'i and USC. The Rainbows were aware of their challenge and took the first lead, eventually earning a 15-12 victory in game one. This was the Women of Troy's first loss of a game in eight matches. The Trojans did not allow Hawai'i to ruin their impeccable mark, as they went on to win the next three games for the match victory and the *1977 AIAW National Title*.

• With a 38-0 perfect record (34 victories won in sweeps), the Women of Troy recorded the first-ever perfect season in collegiate women's volleyball. Their accomplishment went unmatched until Long Beach State went 36-0 in 1998.

• USC's 38 wins were part of a winning streak which extended three seasons and 57 total victories.

• In his second season at Troy, and earning his second consecutive national title, Chuck Erbe was named **Volleyball Coach of the Year**.

• Five players went on to make the 1980 U.S.A. Olympic team: Debbie Landreth, Debbie Green, Sue Woodstra, Terry Place and Carolyn Becker.

Highlighting the 1980 Season

• On a team that featured no seniors and four junior returners, three-time All-American and 1979 conference MVP Cathy Stukel was responsible for leading this squad back to prominence. The young squad featured three top freshman, Paula Weishoff, Dana Smith and Iris McDonald, and one sophomore, Lori Uranich.

• To begin the season, *Volleyball Magazine* awarded the Women of Troy a No. 1 preseason rank.

• During the regular season, USC and second-ranked UCLA met six times as the Trojans prevailed with five victories. The most exciting was a four-game victory over the Bruins at the L.A. Sports Arena in front of a USC record crowd of 5,103 - the largest home attendance in program history.

• The Women of Troy collected three tournament titles at the Women's Games, San Diego State Invitational and Women's Collegiate Classic.

• Seeded No. 1 at the WIAAW Regionals held in Santa Barbara, Calif., the Trojans had their work cut out for them. Gone were the days of three-game sweeps. USC fought to earn four-game wins over Stanford, UCLA and Pacific, to advance to the finals. The final match was a USC-Pacific rematch that ended in a dramatic five-game victory for the Women of Troy. All eight teams from the regional were invited to the national championship.

First Rounds

• Cathy Stukel was sidelined at the start of the AIAW tournament after she injured her ankle at the UCLA Invitational. Junior Anna Maria Lopez was also out with an injury. But led by the power hitting of the

freshman trio (Weishoff, Smith, McDonald), USC advanced to the quarters after sweeping Colorado State, Penn State, Houston and San Diego State in pool play.

Quarterfinals

• Their first round dominance carried over against Cal Poly San Luis Obispo as the Trojans posted a 15-11, 15-12, 15-9 win.

Semifinals

• After dropping the first game, 7-15, USC allowed Hawai'i to take a quick lead in game two of the semifinal match. But with Cathy Stukel back in the USC lineup, the Trojans pushed to tie the score at 13 apiece and began to take control of the match. USC eventually defeated the Rainbows, 3-1, and set up its return to the AIAW championship match and another meeting with Pacific.

Finals

• Anna Maria Lopez rejoined the lineup in this rematch of the WIAAW final, but Pacific did not pose as great a challenge as expected. After a come-from-behind effort to win game one, USC never looked back, sweeping the Tigers, 15-11, 15-8, 15-9. The Trojans' third national title was credited to Cathy Stukel's setting and Paula Weishoff's powerful hitting. Lori Uranich gave Pacific trouble on the left side and Iris McDonald's serves kept the Tigers off balance as the Women of Troy were crowned the *1980 AIAW National Champions*.

NCAA National Champions

Highlighting the 1981 Season

• The 1981 season brought many changes for USC and the world of women's collegiate volleyball. Women's volleyball entered its first year as an NCAA sanctioned sport and the Trojans were after their fourth national title and first NCAA crown.

• The health of key players, especially three-time All-American Cathy Stukel, was a major concern for USC head coach Chuck Erbe. He had stated before the season that the 1981 Trojans did not figure to be as overpowering as his past teams largely due to the loss of Paula Weishoff and Iris McDonald.

• The Women of Troy displayed a new look as they returned to pressure defense and worked to become more of a finesse team.

• *Volleyball Magazine* ranked USC No. 3 at the start of the season with seven first place votes.

• With another demanding schedule, the Trojans struggled, placing no higher than fourth at three of the most prestigious tournaments of the season and finishing third in the WCAA.

• USC was selected to compete in the first-ever NCAA postseason tournament. Seeded eighth, the Trojans received a first round bye.

Regionals

• At the inaugural Northwest Regional tournament, USC defeated Arizona, 3-0, in the first round, then went on to upset top-ranked Hawai'i, 15-12, 15-4, 11-15, 15-5, in the regional final to advance to the 1981 NCAA Final Four. Hawai'i had only lost one match prior to entering the tournament. USC's victory was largely due to the efforts of outside hitter Dana Smith, who had 12 kills.

NCAA Final Four

• UCLA hosted the first-ever NCAA women's volleyball Final Four, featuring San Diego State, Pacific, UCLA and USC at Pauley Pavilion. In the first match, the Women of Troy faced No. 4 Pacific, an equally young and talented team.

• Eighth-ranked USC posted its second tournament upset with a five-game victory over the Tigers. In a match that seemed to last forever, the Trojans built a 10-5 lead in the deciding game and managed to hold off Pacific even after the Tigers rallied to come within one point (11-10). UCLA defeated San Diego State, 3-1, to advance to the championship match.

NCAA Championships

• The championship match drew a record-breaking crowd of 6,289 to witness two of the most dominant teams in women's volleyball.

• UCLA, which opened an 8-1 lead in the first game, earned the 15-9 win to start the match. The Trojans did not remain quiet for long, reversing the tables for a 15-12 win in the second game. In game three, the teams tied the score six times and exchanged leads four times, before the Bruins got away with a 15-10 decision on two final service aces.

• The turning point in the match came in game four. After the Bruins grabbed a 9-8 lead, the teams fought through 11-straight sideouts without a point. The Women of Troy tied the score at nine apiece, then after four sideouts, USC claimed a 15-13 win.

• After halting UCLA's momentum, USC jumped to an 8-1 lead and held off a Bruin 8-6 rally to post a final 15-7 victory in the fifth game, earning the first-ever women's volleyball *NCAA Championship*.

• USC became the first-ever women's team to win four national championships.

For the third consecutive year, the Women of Troy found themselves playing for the national title, although this time they were turned away by Hawai'i, which erased a 2-0 deficit in games to win the championship. USC ended the season at 27-8. Dana Smith and Tracy Clark earned All-America honors — Clark for the first of four straight seasons.

1999... After entering the season ranked 21st in the AVCA/USA Today Coaches Poll, the Women of Troy climbed seven spots by season's end to No. 14. With a 13-5 conference mark, USC recorded its ninth-consecutive winning record in the Pac-10 for a third place finish. 2000 NCAA FINAL FOUR... Equipped with the nation's No. 1 recruiting class, USC began the season by setting a school and Pac-10 record with 38-consecutive game victories. Under the leadership of second-year interim head coach Jerritt Elliott, the Women of Troy spent five weeks ranked No. 1 by *Volleyball* magazine. The Trojans went on to win their first-ever Pac-10 championship (tied with Arizona) and Elliott was named conference Co-Coach of the Year. USC was selected as the top seed of the NCAA Pacific Region (a program first) and swept through the first four matches, including a 3-0 win over defending NCAA champion Penn State, to earn its first Final Four appearance in 15 years. The Trojans eventually fell to Wisconsin in the NCAA Semifinals. All six USC starters were named to All-Pac-10 teams and two earned All-American honors.

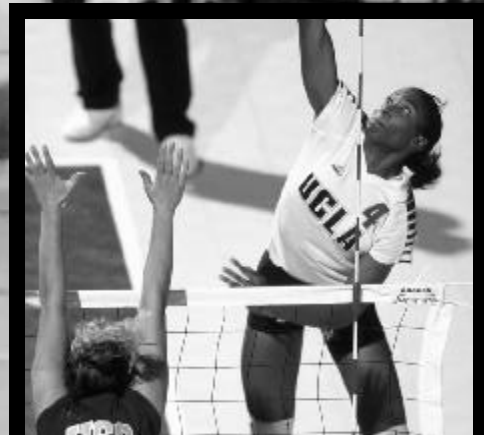
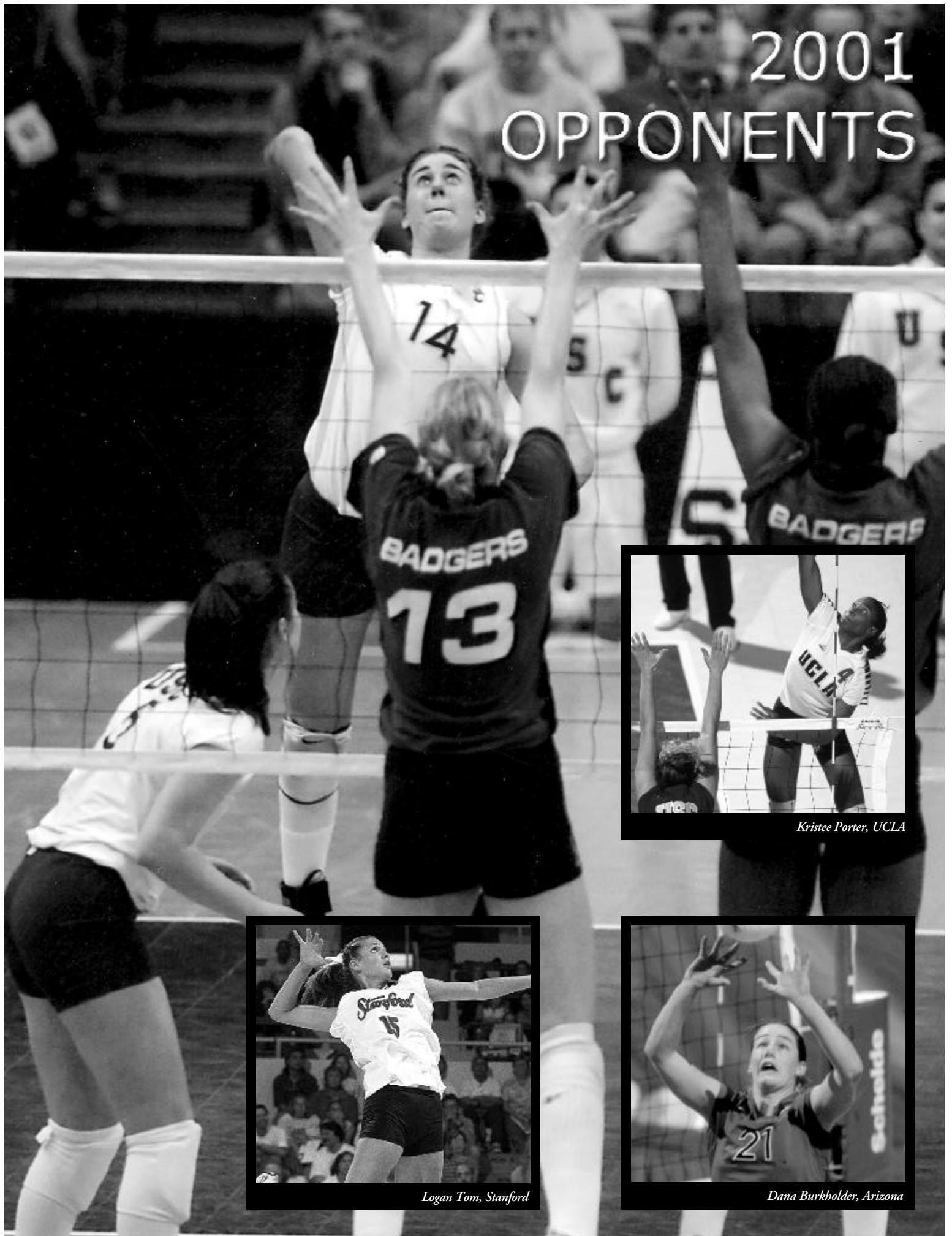

(It's like calling San Francisco "Frisco" or North Carolina "North Car."). The usage of "Southern Cal" on licensed apparel and merchandise is limited in scope and necessary to protect federal trademark rights.

After playing the last five seasons in the North Gym, the Women of Troy are returning to the Lyon Center in order to accommodate more fans in a more comfortable atmosphere.

Home to women's volleyball from 1988 through 1996, the Lyon Center hosted many of USC's top volleyball teams, including the 1990 men's National Championship teams.

The campus recreation center, opened June of 1989, includes a 20,000 square foot playing surface and seats 1,300 fans.
