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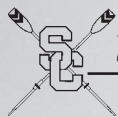

2005 SEASON OUTLOOK

There is a buzz surrounding the USC women's rowing program because 2005 marks the first year that every member of the team was recruited by third-year coaches Kelly and Zenon Babraj.

Each rower came to USC to compete under the Babrajs, and the Babrajs believe in the talent of each of these rowers. Because of that, the co-head coaches are confident that the Trojans are now in a position to be nationally competitive at every level.

Together the Babrajs—the husband and wife team were named USC's co-head coaches in June of 2002—possess a wealth of national and international coaching experience, including 13 years at the Division I level. Zenon, who coached the Polish National Team from 1978 through 1984, also serves as the Trojans' program director.

Just as it has been since the Babraj's arrived at Troy, USC's goal in 2005 is to earn its first-ever team bid to the NCAA Championships. The Trojans, who have made seven-consecutive NCAA appearances in individual races and even captured a Varsity Four national championship in their 1998 NCAA debut, have never qualified as a team (a team bid includes a Varsity Eight, Varsity Four and JV Eight boat).

"We came very close last year," said Kelly, who served as the women's head coach at UCLA for five seasons (1987-1991) and was a three-time Pac-10 Coach of the Year. "The NCAA committee members select 12 teams and we probably were 13th on their list. That was disappointing, but we just didn't have the talent we needed last year. This year, there is an enormous difference in talent and it is so exciting for us."

"Last year was still a transition year," added Zenon, who spent six seasons coaching the Bruins' men's team and led UCLA to three Pac-10 Championships (1987-89). "We did the best we could last year, but it was still a little new. Now, for the first time, we have people who were trained in this program since we came in."

USC's strength over the past few years has been the numerous accomplishments of its Varsity Eight crew, which has made six straight NCAA appearances, captured the 2001 Jessop Whittier Cup and finished as high as No. 4 nationally (2001).

Last season, the Varsity Eight finished 12th overall at the NCAAs and third at the Pac-10 Championships. Also in 2004, the Eights captured their fifth-consecutive title at the Newport Autumn Rowing Festival (a feat they again repeated this Fall for the sixth time), finished second at Head of the American (Sacramento, Calif.) and sixth at the San Diego (Calif.) Crew Classic, competing against the top teams on the West Coast. The Varsity Four and JV Eight crews won titles at the George Washington Invitational Crew Classic (Washington D.C.) and all four boats, including the Novice Eights, swept both UCLA and Stanford in dual races held in Los Angeles and in the Bay Area, respectively.

At the Pac-10 Championships, the Trojans advanced to the Grand Finals in all three main events (Varsity Eight, Varsity Four, JV Eight) for only the second time in program history (repeating their 2003 feat).

This season, the Trojans expect to benefit from the return of 15 varsity letterwinners, including four members of last season's Varsity Eight lineup. These four rowers—seniors **Sarah Pomeroy** (Simsbury, Conn.) and **Anne Molholm** (Dublin, Ohio), junior **Megan Biging** (Santa Monica, Calif.) and sophomore **Sim-**

one Manhold (Essen, Germany)—will be looked upon to help guide a team that welcomes 20 newcomers, including eight who rowed novice last season.

Manhold is the Trojans only returning award-winner. In just her first season with the Women of Troy, the No. 5-seat rower and member of the German Junior National Team, was named to the CRCA All-America second team. Former teammate and current graduate assistant coach Andrea Korom was USC's other 2004 honoree, earning first-team accolades for the second-straight season.

Molholm and Pomeroy bring a great deal of collegiate experience as they enter their third season as members of the Varsity Eight crew. Not only did they lead the Women of Troy to the NCAA Grand Final in 2003, but also helped lead William Smith College to a third-place finish at the first-ever NCAA Division III Championships in 2002, prior to transferring to USC.

The pair is joined by fellow senior **Kate Kaso** (Alameda, Calif.) as four-year varsity letterwinners. Along with Biging, three-year varsity letterwinners include seniors **Kate Donovan** (Manchester, N.H.), **Brittany Mohr** (Pasadena, Calif.), **Kathryn Weslow** (San Francisco, Calif.) and **Liz Zeanah** (Gainesville, Fla.).

In addition to Manhold, second-year rowers include junior **Lauren Derby** (Marin, Calif.) and sophomores **Lauren Cowan** (Los Angeles), **Anna Efremova** (Moscow, Russia), **Kinga Marciszewska** (Warsaw, Poland), **Barbora Varekova** (Olomouc, Czech Republic) and transfer **Kristen "Kanani" Souza** (Honolulu, Hawai'i). Souza rowed at Washington last season.

Weslow, Zeanah and Cowan are coxswains.

Pomeroy (elected as the upperclass captain) and Cowan (under-class) will share captain responsibilities this season and lead the team through example and commitment.

"Sarah has an incredible work ethic," said Kelly. "Since she has been here, she has missed maybe one practice. She is there all the time putting in extra work. She is a leader by example and never asks anyone to do anything she wouldn't do herself. This year for the first time, a lot of her teammates are putting in that kind of extra time, which had been a struggle in the past.

"Lauren is also very dedicated to this team. She is the kind of athlete that will do anything and everything she can for her team. She is not a selfish or boastful person. She is a quiet leader."

Making their USC debuts this season with the varsity squad are freshmen **Tatiana Boldyreva** (Lipetsk, Russia), **Lisa Buckley** (Marietta, Ga.), **Ariadne Chucolowski** (San Diego, Calif.), **Phebe Greenwood** (Richmond, Va.), **Diana Ivanova** (Rousse, Bulgaria), **Ligita Kaviere** (Valmieras Rajons, Latvia), **Shelley Koskovich** (Los Angeles), **Dunja Pejic** (Belgrade, Serbia), **Amanda Searles** (Irvine, Calif.), **Claire Sullivan** (San Francisco, Calif.), **Kathryn White** (Newport Beach, Calif.) and coxswain **Elizabeth O'Neill** (Bowden, England).

Eight athletes are making the jump from the 2004 novice roster to this year's varsity squad, including senior **Natalie Beglau** (Lake Arrowhead, Calif.), sophomores **Golden Broughten** (Portland, Ore.), **LaNita Campbell** (Carson, Calif.), **Laura McDaniel** (Chicago, Ill.), **Lyndsay Price** (Carlsbad, Calif.), **Jessica Shannon** (San Jose, Calif.) and **Jessica Smith** (Mission Viejo, Calif.), and redshirt sophomore **Anna Liberovsky** (Rockville Center, N.Y.).



"This year we have a very young team," said Kelly. "The freshman class is very big, but they are very good and bring a lot of diverse experience. If we do well this year, it will mean a lot for the future. It will establish a strong foundation."

The team officially kicks off the 2005 racing season when it competes against Sacramento State on Sunday, March 13, on Lake Natoma in Rancho Cordova, Calif. The Trojans will then travel to Marina del Rey to face rival UCLA in the fourth-annual Lexus Gauntlet dual on March 20.

USC will start the month of April at the San Diego Crew Classic (April 2-3) before hosting Loyola Marymount at the USC Boathouse in the Port of Los Angeles on April 9 - its only home race of the season. The regular season will end with races at Ohio State and at Princeton on April 16 and 30, respectively.

For the second-straight seasons, the Pac-10 and NCAA Championships both will be held on Lake Natoma, as the Trojans hope their familiarity with the course will bolster their performance. USC's results at the conference championships on May 15 will determine the bids awarded to the NCAA championships on May 27-29.

USC BOATHOUSE

The Port of Los Angeles

The Women of Troy train in the Port of Los Angeles, near San Pedro, just a short, 20-minute drive from USC. The USC Boathouse is located just steps from the water and contains 10 racing eights, five fours, six pairs and several singles.

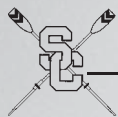
The Port provides great weather year-round (60s and 70s in the winter months and 70s and 80s in the early fall and spring) and calm water. With very little boat traffic and 12 miles to row on, the Port of Los Angeles provides an almost flawless rowing environment.

In addition, USC shares the Port with Hollywood, as many films have been shot where the Women of Troy practice. The Port's most prevalent landmark, the Vincent Thomas Bridge, can easily be spotted in "Face/Off," "The Usual Suspects" and "The Terminator."

Directions to USC Boathouse From USC:

Take 110 South (pass 105 and 405 freeways). Exit "C" Street. Make a RIGHT at the stop sign at "Figueroa". Make a LEFT on "Harry Bridges". Make a RIGHT on "Avalon". Make a LEFT on "Water Street". Make a RIGHT on "Yacht St". The boathouse is





ZENON BABRAJ Director of Rowing / Head Coach

With a long list of accomplishments at the international and national levels, Zenon Babraj begins his third season as director and head coach of the USC women's rowing program.

Babraj and his wife, Kelly, were hired as co-head coaches of the Trojans' program in June of 2002. The pair took over as only the second coaching staff in USC history since

rowing was first adopted as a scholarship sport at Troy in 1996.

"This was a great challenge for us," said Zenon. "We know that with hard work we will be able to bring this program to a very high level."

In just their first season, the Babraj's gave USC fans a glimpse of what was to come. The Women of Troy fielded three competitive boats at the 2003 Pac-10 Championships and the Varsity Eight crew earned its fifth-straight at-large bid to the NCAA Championships. At the NCAAs, USC placed sixth in the field -- second only to their program-best fourth-place finish in 2001.

In 2004, USC's Varsity Eight returned to the NCAA Championships for its sixth-straight appearance.

A native of Warsaw, Poland, Zenon was a member of the Polish National Team for 10 years (1969-78) as both a sweep oarsman and sculler. In 1978 he was named head coach of the SKRA Warsaw club program and director of the Olympic Training Center. During his tenure, he led his crews to nine national championships and saw 15 of his athletes selected to Poland's National and Olympic teams.

In 1984, under martial law, Zenon defected to the United States and made his first stop in Seattle, Wash. There he served as a volunteer assistant coach at Washington under legendary Husky head coach Dick Erickson for one season.

He moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, in the spring of 1985 where he directed the Cincinnati Rowing Club. During this time, the CRC became a designated National Training Center and Zenon helped organize the National Championship Regatta. In the summer of 1986, he accepted his first position with the U.S. National Team as an assistant coach.

Zenon was hired as an assistant coach at Brown University and in 1986 led his freshman crews to the Intercollegiate Rowing Association (IRA) Championship in the eight and four events. That summer, Zenon returned to the U.S. National Team where he coached the pre-elite crews

to gold and silver medals at the U.S. Olympic Festival.

During the summer of 1986, he was hired as the men's rowing program director at UCLA and took over a floundering program. In his five years with the Bruins (1987-91), he led the men to an unprecedented three straight Pac-10 Championships (1987-89) and earned Pac-10 Coach of the Year accolades each season. UCLA's 1987 Pac-10 Championship was the school's first in 17 years, while the 1988 title marked the first repeat in the 55-year history of the program. In 1990, Zenon guided the Bruins to a bronze medal at the Collegiate National Championships, marking the highest finish ever by a UCLA crew.

While at UCLA, he produced seven National Team athletes and three Olympians. In 1987, Zenon was an assistant coach for the U.S. at the World Championships in Copenhagen, Denmark, helping lead the eights to a gold medal. In 1989 he served as head coach for the World University Games held in Duisburg, Germany.

When the UCLA varsity program was cut in 1992, Zenon and Kelly moved to Alaska and opened the Alaska Sports Academy, training individuals and teams in several sports at the high school, collegiate, and elite level.

Together they coached a number of athletes who went on to compete on U.S. National teams in their respective sports. The pair left Alaska in 1999 when Zenon was again hired as an assistant rowing coach with the U.S. National Team in preparation for the World Championships.

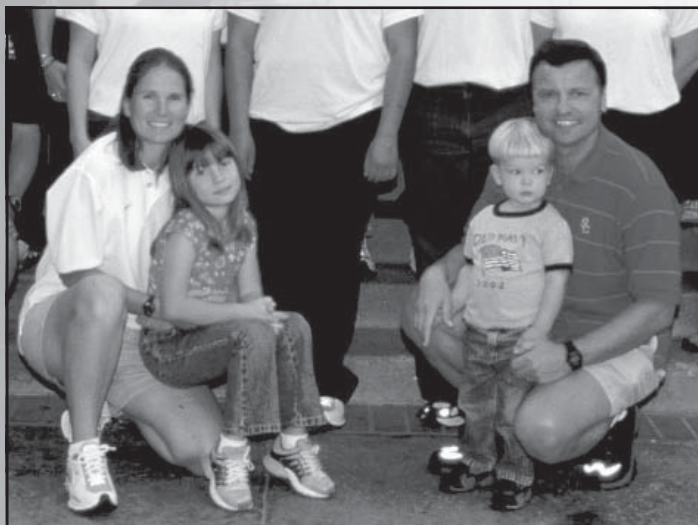
Zenon turned down a permanent position with the National Team in 2000 to instead rebuild a struggling program at Hobart College in Geneva, N.Y. At the same time, Kelly accepted the head coaching position at William Smith College (Hobart, a men's private college, is a brother school to William Smith, a women's private college), where the pair spent the past three years (2000-02). Zenon led the Statesmen to two undefeated seasons (2001-02) and his crews finished as the top Division III team at the 2002 Head of the Charles and Stonehurst Invitational.

Zenon holds a master's degree in physical education and a rowing coaching diploma from the Academy of Physical Education in Warsaw. He earned a general certificate of education from the Engineering College in Warsaw in 1974. In 1973, while attending Engineering College, he was honored with the City of Warsaw Award for saving a woman's life. Zenon also served in the Polish Special Forces and was named a top cadet in 1979.

Born in Warsaw on Sept. 1, 1954, he and Kelly currently reside in Rancho Palos Verdes with their two children, Arianna (9) and Konrad (4). Zenon is the 1985 World Master's Champion in rowing and the 1997 U.S. Master's National Champion in cross country skiing.

KELLY BABRAJ

Head Coach

Kelly Babraj, a native of Southern California with over 19 years of coaching experience, was named head coach of the USC women's rowing program in June of 2002 and is entering her third season at Troy. She and her husband, Zenon, share coaching duties, while Zenon also serves as program director.

"USC is a first-class institution with an incredible group of coaches, athletes and staff," said Kelly. "We feel very honored to be part of such a wonderful tradition of excellence and look forward to the challenge of developing winning crews with each day."

In just their first season, the Babraj's gave USC fans a glimpse of what was to come. The Women of Troy fielded three competitive boats at the 2003 Pac-10 Championships and the Varsity Eight crew earned its fifth-straight at-large bid to the NCAA Championships. At the NCAAs, USC placed sixth in the field -- second only to their program-best fourth-place finish in 2001.

In 2004, USC's Varsity Eight returned to the NCAA Championships for its sixth-straight appearance.

Kelly's coaching career began in 1986 as an assistant coach at UCLA (1986), but after only one year she was named head coach of the struggling Bruin program. By 1990, she had led UCLA to victories at the prestigious San Diego Crew Classic and the program's first Pac-10 Championship.

In her five seasons (1987-91) at the helm of the Bruin program, Kelly led UCLA to top-4 finishes at the NCAA Championships in 1990 and 1991, while winning the Pac-10 Championships both seasons. The Bruins' Pac-10 titles marked the only time a school other than Washington had won the championship and, as a result, she earned three straight Pac-10 Coach of the Year awards (1989, 1990 and 1991). UCLA's third-place finish at the 1991 national championships marked the highest finish ever for the Bruins.

That same year, the varsity crew produced three rowers and a coxswain who were selected to compete at the Pan-Am Games in Cuba and captured a gold medal. Three other members of the squad captured gold medals at the Olympic Sports Festival that year.

While at UCLA, Kelly also placed eight athletes on U.S. National and Olympic Teams, including two world champions. In 1989, she served as the women's sculling coach for the U.S. Junior National Team where she coached several promising athletes, including future World Champion and Olympic medalist Sarah Garner.

Kelly left UCLA at the end of the 1991 season when the program was cut by the athletic department.

In 1992, Kelly and Zenon moved to Alaska and opened the Alaska Sports Academy, training individuals and teams in several sports at the high school, collegiate, and elite level. Together they coached a number of athletes who went on to compete on U.S. National teams in their respective sports. The pair left Alaska in 1999 when Zenon was hired as an assistant rowing coach with the U.S. National Team in preparation for the World Championships.

The following year Kelly accepted the head coaching position at William Smith College in Geneva, N.Y., and Zenon took over as head coach at Hobart College (Hobart, a men's private college, is a brother school to William Smith, a women's private college), where the pair spent the past three years (2000-02). Kelly directed the steady improvement of the William Smith rowing program and her efforts led the 2002 squad to a third-place team finish at the first-ever NCAA Division III Rowing Championships. William Smith also had four rowers named to the 2002 CRCA All-America teams.

In 2000, Kelly helped Derith Hart become William Smith's first-ever rowing All-American.

In her three years in Geneva, she led her Varsity Eight crews to the 2000 New York State Rowing Championships and two NCAA appearances (2000 and 2002; before 2002, two Division III teams were invited annually to compete in an all-divisions championship).

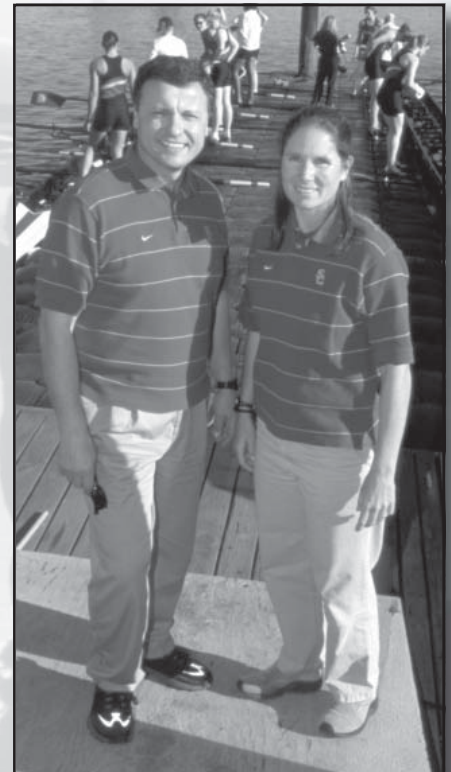
Kelly graduated from UCLA in 1985 with a bachelor of arts degree in psychology. As a senior captain of the crew team, competing under her maiden name of Kelly Martz, she helped lead the Varsity Fours to the 1985 National Collegiate Championship and a silver medal at the U.S. National Championships later that summer. She was invited to the U.S. National Team camp in 1985 and won the gold medal in the pairs at the U.S. Olympic Festival that summer.

Kelly prepped at Palos Verdes (Calif.) High where she was a team captain and all-league basketball player and swimmer. She also won several triathlons including the Malibu and Yuma triathlons and the USTS Bonelli Lake Series. In 1978 she became the first female lifeguard ever hired at Newport Beach after finishing her training among the top 10 in a field of over 200 men.

Kelly was born on May 15, 1962, in Monrovia, Calif. She and Zenon currently reside in Rancho Palos Verdes with their two children, Arianna (9) and Konrad (4). A year after the birth of Arianna, Kelly won a gold, silver and bronze medal at the Master's National Cross Country Ski Championships.

CRAIG WEBSTER

Assistant Coach

Craig Webster enters his third season as an assistant coach for the USC women's rowing program.

A former head coach at UCLA with over nine years of collegiate coaching experience, Webster is primarily responsible for coaching the Trojans' novice squad and the Varsity Fours.

In his first two seasons with the Women of Troy, Webster has led the novice squads to great success. His Novice Eight crew posted a best-ever ninth place finish at the 2003 San Diego Crew Classic and the Novice Fours captured the 2003 Pacific Coast Rowing Championship at the end of the season. Last season, the Novice Eight made its first-ever Grand Final appearance at the Pac-10 Championships.

Webster began his collegiate coaching career at UCLA as the Bruins' freshman/novice coach for his first two seasons (1992-93). After leading his squads to a fourth-place finish at the San Diego Crew Classic and consecutive appearances in the grand final of the Pacific Coast Rowing Championships, Webster was named UCLA's head coach in the summer of 1993. The Bruins' program was reverted to a club sport in 1992 and in 1994, Webster coached the first UCLA squad with non-scholarship rowers and without transitional funding, yet remained competitive against Pac-10 crews.

He spent four seasons at UCLA (1992-95) then accepted the head coaching position at Chapman University in February of 1996. Along with future wife and assistant coach, Renee, the two proceeded to build the Chapman program from the ground up. The inaugural 1997 squad finished third in the women's novice four at the California State

Championships and seventh in the men's eight at the Pacific Coast Rowing Championships. In 1999, the men's eight won a silver medal at the Western Intercollegiate Rowing Association (WIRA) Championships.

Webster moved to Atlanta, Ga., in the summer of 1999 so that Renee could pursue a doctorate in physical therapy at Emory University. Webster accepted a position as director and head coach of the Saint Andrew Junior Rowing Club coaching both the boys and girls. His boys eights crew qualified for the Youth Nationals three consecutive years (2000-02) and the boys fours qualified twice (2000, 2002). In 2001 the girls finished third at Head of the Schuylkill and eighth at the Youth Nationals, marking the club's highest finish ever.

As an undergraduate at UCLA, Webster rowed four seasons (1986-89). He was a member of the Varsity Eight that won the 1988 San Diego Crew Classic Copley Cup, the 1988 Pac-10 Championship and placed fourth overall and second among collegiate teams at the 1988 Head of the Charles. His 1988 crew also competed at the Henley Regatta in Thames, England - one of the world's most famous sporting events.

In 1989, Webster paired with former UCLA oarsman Mike Still to race nationally in the straight pair. They finished fourth at the U.S. National Championships in 1989 and 1990 and won the trials for the 1989 World University Games. Webster and Still represented the U.S. at the 1989 University Games in Duisberg, Germany, finishing sixth. Racing together in 1990, they again finished fourth at the U.S. National Championships and were training for the World Championship trials when a back injury ended Webster's competitive career.

Webster graduated from UCLA in 1992 with a bachelor's degree in biochemistry. He is a NSCA Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) and USA Weightlifting Certified Club Coach. Born on Jan. 12, 1967, in Bellflower, Calif., he currently resides in San Pedro.



ANDREA KOROM

Volunteer Novics Assistant Coach

Andrea Korom enters her first season as a volunteer assistant coach to the novice rowers. Korom was a four-year letterwinner on the USC rowing team (2001-04) and rowed with the Varsity Eight as a sophomore, junior and senior.

Among her many USC career highlights, she led the Trojans to a third-place finish at Pac-10s and a 12th-place finish at NCAAs in 2004, a fifth-place Pac-10 finish and sixth-place NCAA finish in 2003, and another fifth-place Pac-10 and eighth-place NCAA finish in 2002. She collected such honors as 2004 All-Pac-10, 2004 CRCA All-America first team, 2004 CRCA All-West Region first team, 2004 Pac-10 All-Academic second team, 2004 Marks Scholar-Athlete, 2003 CRCA All-America Second Team, 2003 CRCA All-West Region first team, 2003 All-Pac-10, 2003 Marks Scholar-Athlete

and 2003 Pac-10 All-Academic second team.

During the summer of 2003, Korom competed at the Nation's Cup and placed seventh overall in a quad boat representing Yugoslavia. She is a 2000 graduate of Svetozar Maskovic Grammer School in Subotica, Yugoslavia, and a nine-year member of the Palic Rowing Club. Korom is also a 13-time Yugoslavian champion in the single scull and once in double scull. She was the 1995-1999 Balkan Champion in the single scull, in addition to finishing fourth at the 1999 World Junior Rowing Championships in Plovdiv, Bulgaria, seventh in 1998 in Ottensheim-Linz, Austria, 11th in 1997 in Hazewinkel, Belgium, and sixth at the 2000 Nations Cup in Copenhagen, Denmark.

THE LEXUS GAUNTLET

Presented by the Southern California Lexus Dealer Association, the battle for the Lexus Gauntlet is a year-long all-sports competition between historic crosstown rivals USC and UCLA.



Years ago, knights challenged one another by throwing one of their armored gauntlets to the ground. If a rival picked up the gauntlet the two of them would enter a fearless battle.

The term "throwing down the gauntlet" has come to symbolize the ultimate call to challenge. This is what the Lexus Gauntlet is all about - champion rivals competing in a wide range of sports for the ultimate title of number one. The gauntlet was first thrown at the start of the 2000-01 season and USC and UCLA will challenge for the fourth-annual trophy this season.

The Trojans and Bruins compete against each other in 18 sports. Five points are awarded (10 points are awarded in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball) to the winner of each sport's season series or, for those sports that do not meet head-to-head (cross country, men's and women's golf), the team that placed higher in the conference championship.

In just its first three years, the battle for the Lexus Gauntlet has been true to the long-standing competitive rivalry between USC and UCLA. While the Trojans captured the inaugural trophy in 2002, the Bruins took the 2003 trophy and USC won it back in 2004. All three seasons were decided in the final weeks of competition.

The annual winner is presented with a 150-pound pewter-gilded trophy. Currently on display in Heritage Hall, the trophy features a gauntlet and is engraved with each year's winner.

The Southern California Lexus Dealer Association is the title sponsor of every USC-UCLA athletic competition. This is the first time the two universities have partnered with a corporate entity for complete rivalry sponsorship. In the fall of 2001, the schools signed a four-year contract of undisclosed terms with Lexus, America's best-selling luxury automotive manufacturer.

DUAL RACE SCORING

USC and UCLA race four boats - a Varsity Eight, JV Eight, Varsity Four and Novice Eight. The dual race winner is determined by a point system similar to the one used at the Pac-10 Championships. With only two boats in each race, three points will be awarded to the Varsity Eight winner, two to the JV Eight and one apiece to the winners of the Varsity Fours and Novice Eights for a total of seven points.

ROWING TERMINOLOGY

DEFINITIONS

Bow: the forward end of the boat which crosses the finish line first; the rower in the seat nearest the forward end of a shell typically has a quick catch, stable technique and a shorter arc.

Blade: the end of the oar which prys the boat through the water.

Catch: the entrance of the oar blade into the water at the beginning of the stroke.

Coxswain (cox): person who steers the shell from a seat located in the stern, or from a lying position in the bow.

Ergs (ergometer): individualized rowing stimulators that help strength and conditioning.

Feathering: turning the oar blade flat during the recovery in order to lessen wind resistance.

Head Race: the traditional Fall regatta, in which boats cross the starting line at full speed, at roughly 15 second intervals. The course usually involves navigating three miles of river, around bends and under bridges.

Lightweight: a crew on which each athlete weighs under a specified amount; 130 lbs. for women.

Novice: a rower in the first year of collegiate competition.

Port: the left side of the boat.

Power 10 (or 20): a tactical burst of speed of 10 or 20 strokes; frequently the stroke rate comes up during a power 10.

Recovery: the time between strokes while the oar blade is traveling through the air.

Release: the point at which the oar blade is leaving the water at the finish, or end of a stroke.

Regatta: the name of rowing events in which several crews compete.

Repechage: a second chance race for those crews which do not automatically advance to the finals of an event through the heat.

Rigger: the metal carbon fiber structure attached to the side of the boat into which the oar fits.

Run: the distance the shell moves during one stroke.

Shell: boat used in rowing races; seats nine people for an Eight, and five people for a Fours, and ranges in length from 45 feet for a Four to 58 feet for an Eight.

Sprints: a race used in collegiate competition, which features a 2000 meter course, with four to six unmarked or buoyed lanes, and an floating or staked start.

Starboard: the right side of the boat.

Stern: the back of the boat; the end which the rowers face during competition.

Stroke: complete cycle of moving the shell through the water.

Stroke Rate: the number of strokes per minute.

Sweeping: rowing style where each rower uses one oar.

Varsity: the collegiate rower who competes beyond the novice level.

8+ and 4+: Eights (8+) and Fours (4+) are the most common collegiate competitions and the two events held at the NCAA Championships. The plus indicates a coxswain on board.

2,000-meter competition: national, world and olympic competitions are 2,000 meters or approximately 1-1/4 miles. Most courses are divided into six buoyed lanes allowing for six boats to participate. If there are more than six crews, then heats are run to determine a Grand Final.
