A year after the USC women's rowing team enjoyed one of its best seasons in program history, eighth-year Trojans rowing head coach Zenon Babraj is excited about the Trojans' prospects for 2009-2010.

The Trojans return a huge portion of their varsity rowers from a squad that qualified for the program's third team bid in 2009, which was the first season that the NCAA required schools to qualify as a team. At last year's NCAA Championships, USC finished 11th overall out of 16 teams. Troy was third in both the Varsity Eight and Second Varsity Eight Petite Finals and fifth in the Varsity Four Petite Final.

With so much talent back, Babraj has his sites set not only on a return trip to the NCAA Championships but a step up in results, hopefully to the Grand Finals for all three boats.

Babraj is excited about filling out the spots in all of the Trojans' boats, which should feature veterans across the board. USC lost only one rower from both its Varsity Eight and Second Varsity Eight boats that competed at the NCAA Championships.

"Overall, this is one of our better teams from the mental aspect of things," Babraj said. "It is very disciplined, hard working and motivated. The women are all very even. There's a big group in the middle that is very close in ability and potential. We are counting on the competition for the boats will bring out the best in them."

"I think overall, this a better team than last year. Last year, our first boat was based on freshmen and those freshmen are now more mature and much better. But we have good athletes available for the other boats as well."

Leading the way in the Varsity Eight boat will be senior starboard Liene Bertasjus, a two-time Pocock All-American. Bertasjus, a 2010 co-captain, was also a CRCA West Region and All-Pac-10 first team selection. Bertasjus, who holds most of the Trojans records on the ergometer, has been instrumental in USC's Varsity Eight success the past two seasons and will be counted on for major leadership and inspiration in 2010.

"Liene is coming off of a knee injury, but she is fine now and I expect a great year from her," Babraj said. "She's been one of our best athletes since she's been here and I look forward to her leading the team as a senior."

Other starboards competing for the first boat include sophomores Ewa Tymoszevska and Magdalena Janicka, junior Kinga Mikolajczyk, seniors Andrea Vehovec and Alexandra Tapley, freshman Jelena Zelenovic and first-year juniors Helen Tinkus and Jana Vyhnanekova.

Tymoszevska had a big impact as a 2009 freshman, rowing out of the seven seat in the Second Varsity Eight boat at the NCAA Championships and from the bow in the Varsity Eight boat at the Pac-10 Championships. Vehovec, as a 2009 junior, was a staple of the Second Varsity Eight boat, rowing in the third seat at the NAAs and in the seventh at the Pac-10s.

Mikolajczyk rowed from the bow seat on USC's Varsity

Eight at the NCAA Championships for the second year in a row. She rowed in the Varsity Four boat at the Pac-10 Championships. Tapley rowed in the bow seat at the NCAA Championships in the Second Varsity Eight last year. Janicka rowed in the five seat of the Second Varsity Eight at the Pac-10 and NCAA Championships and rowed with the Varsity Eight at the San Diego Crew Classic.

Zelenovic comes to USC as an accomplished international rower and a long-time member of the Serbian National Team. Tinkus, meanwhile, comes to USC from the Tallinn University of Technology in Tallinn, Estonia. She is a four-year member of the Estonian National Team. Vyhnanekova is a Czech National Team member who also has extensive international experience.

"Jelena and Jana are both very strong athletes," Babraj said. "Helen is a very mature athlete and technically very sound."

The battle for spots on the port side of the Varsity Eight will be equally competitive and led by sophomore Ivana Filipovic. Filipovic rowed out of the six seat for the Trojans on the Varsity Eight as a freshman throughout the season.

"Anna is coming along very well," Babraj said. "She's more confident this year and more physical."

Also back on the port side from the Varsity Eight last year are sophomores Maria Wilgotsson, Anna Wierzbowska and Iskra Angelova. Wierzbowska was a big factor on USC's Varsity Eight as a freshman in the four seat while Wilgotsson, a Swedish national teamer, also had a quick impact in the two seat. Angelova, meanwhile, quickly established herself at the stroke position last year on the Varsity Eight.

"All three girls are very talented," Babraj said, "and I expect them to improve in their second seasons with us. Maria has a really good motor and mental makeup and sets a great example."

Also competing for spots on the port side are seniors Carin Andersson and Ewelina Nowak, sophomores Lenka Vrecnikova, Anna Janicka and Gabriela Zarate-DeMacedo and junior Kate McFetridge.

Vrecnikova rowed in the four seat in the Second Varsity Eight at the NCAA Championships, rowed in the second seat in the Varsity Four at the Pac-10 Championships.

"She's overcame a back injury last year to become a key player for us," Babraj said "She worked and trained hard in the off-season, made the Czech national team, and is a really big asset for us now."

Nowak rowed much of last season in the Varsity Four boat but was used in the Varsity Eight at the NCAA Championships. Anderson was a key member of the Second Varsity as a junior team captain. She rowed in the six seat at the Pac-10 and NCAA Championships. Anna Janicka, like her sister Magdalena, was a key member of USC's Second Varsity Eight last year and also rowed on the Varsity Four.

Zarate-DeMacedo usually rowed out of the second or fourth seat as a freshman last year on USC's Second Varsity Eight.

McFetridge, a junior co-captain, is in her second year on varsity, challenging for a key role, after starting her USC career on novice.

“She’s a hard worker and an inspiration for the team,” Babraj said. “She’s come from a non-rowing background to become a key player on the team.”

Sophomore Dionne Licudine was a major contributor as a freshman coxswain last year, earning a spot on the Varsity Eight at the NCAA Championships. She coxed the Varsity Four at the Pac-10s and in the win over UCLA. Fellow sophomore Lisa Kolstad also returns after a busy freshman season in which she coxed

the Second Varsity Eight at the NCAA Championships as well as at the Pac-10s and against UCLA.

Other coxswain competing for spots are freshmen Tanya Ouyang and Jennah Blau, sophomore Colby Kennedy and sophomore transfer Mary Trawick

“As a team, this will be a very exciting year,” Babraj said. “We don’t know how we’ll perform, but I’m very optimistic. The atmosphere is unique. The team is well motivated and competitive. It is different from other teams I’ve had here, more balanced, physically and mentally. I’m counting on good development throughout the season and a strong end.”

USC BOATHOUSE

THE PORT OF LOS ANGELES

The Women of Troy train at the Port of Los Angeles, in San Pedro, Calif., just a short, 20-minute drive from the USC campus. The USC Boathouse is located just steps from the water and contains 10 racing eights, five fours, six pairs and several singles.

The port experiences great weather year-round (60s and 70s in the winter months and 70s and 80s in the early fall and spring) and calm water. With very little boat traffic and 12 miles to row on, the Port of Los Angeles provides an almost flawless rowing environment.

USC shares the Port with Hollywood, as many films have been shot where the Women of Troy practice. The Port’s most prevalent landmark, the Vincent Thomas Bridge, can easily be spotted in blockbuster films such as “Face Off,” “The Usual Suspects” and “The Terminator.”

DIRECTIONS TO USC BOATHOUSE FROM USC:

Take 110 South (pass 105 and 405 freeways). Exit “C” Street. Make a RIGHT at the stop sign at “Figueroa”. Make a LEFT on “Harry Bridges”. Make a RIGHT on “Avalon”. Make a LEFT on “Water Street”. Make a RIGHT on “Yacht St”. The boathouse is on the left past the fire station.



ZENON BABRAJ • HEAD COACH/DIRECTOR OF ROWING



The 2007 Pac-10 Women's Rowing Coach of the Year who has long list of accomplishments at the international and national levels, Zenon Babraj enters his eighth season as director and head coach of the USC women's rowing program and his third year in solo command of the program.

Babraj and his wife, Kelly, were first hired as co-head coaches of the Trojans' program in June of 2002. The pair took over as only the second coaching staff in USC history since rowing was first adopted as a scholarship sport at Troy in 1996.

Babraj was instrumental in USC's finest women's rowing season in program history in 2007, produced a solid season in 2008 and then qualified all three boats to the NCAA Championships in 2009, earning its third team bid in program history.

Continuing to build his legacy at USC, Babraj led the Trojans to their second Jessop-Whittier Cup Championship at the San Diego Crew Classic, a Pac-10 Varsity Eight Championships, and the team's first ever Pac-10 Rowing Championship in 2007. The conference crown catapulted the Women of Troy to their second team appearance at the NCAA Women's Rowing Championships and the Varsity Eight's 10th consecutive trip. There, the Trojans would also enjoy their most successful showing in program history with the Varsity Four and JV Eight each winning their petite finals, finishing in seventh overall, while the Varsity Eight took third in the grand final, barely edged out of first by less than three seconds. The team's performance would earn the Trojans a fifth-place overall finish. In recognition of his crews success in 2007, Babraj was also named the CRCA West Region Coach of the Year and Pac-10 Women's Rowing Coach of the Year.

After qualifying with the Varsity Eight boat at the 2008 NCAA Championships, Babraj guided the Varsity Eight, Second Varsity Eight and Varsity Four to the 2009 NAAs, where the Trojans finished 11th overall out of 16 teams. The 2009 season marked the first year schools had to qualify as a team. USC was third in both the Varsity and Second Varsity Eight Petite Finals and fifth in the Varsity Four Petite Final.

Success however, is no stranger to Babraj. In just his first season, he gave USC rowing fans a glimpse of what was to come. The Women of Troy fielded three competitive boats at the 2003 Pac-10 Championships and the Varsity Eight earned its fifth straight at-large bid to the NCAA Championships. At those championships, USC placed sixth in the field; a finish that ranked second only to their program-best fourth-place finish in 2001.

In 2004, USC's Varsity Eight returned to the NCAA Championships for its sixth-straight appearance. Then in 2005, the Varsity Four clinched the Pac-10 Championship, and the Varsity Eight finished third. These key performances allowed the Trojans to

qualify for its first ever team bid to the NCAA Championships. While the Varsity Eight finished 12th in its event, the Trojans capped their first team trip to the national championship regatta with an 11th-place team finish overall. In 2006, although the Women of Troy fell short of earning consecutive NCAA team bids, however, the Varsity Eight still represented the Trojans at the championships, stretching USC's run of NCAA appearances to nine at the time.

A native of Warsaw, Poland, Babraj was a member of the Polish National Rowing Team for 10 years (1969-78) as both a sweep oarsman and sculler. In 1978, he was named head coach of the SKRA Warsaw club program and also assumed responsibilities as director of the Olympic Training Center. During his tenure, he led his crews to nine national championships and saw 15 of his athletes selected to Poland's National and Olympic teams.

In 1984, under martial law, Babraj defected to the United States and made his first stop in Seattle, Wash., where he served as a volunteer assistant coach at Washington under legendary Husky head coach Dick Erickson for one season.

He moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, in the spring of 1985 where he would become the director of the Cincinnati Rowing Club. During his time there, the CRC became a designated National Training Center and Babraj helped organize the National Championship Regatta. In the summer of 1986, he accepted his first position with the U.S. National Team as an assistant coach.

Babraj would later coach at Brown University and in 1986, led his freshman crews to the Intercollegiate Rowing Association (IRA) Championship in the eight and four events. That summer, Babraj returned to the U.S. National Team where he coached the pre-elite crews to gold and silver medals at the U.S. Olympic Festival.

In the summer of 1986, Babraj would return to the west coast, as the men's rowing program director at UCLA, taking over a then floundering program. In his five years with the Bruins (1987-91), he led the men to an unprecedented three straight Pac-10 Championships (1987-89) and earned Pac-10 Coach of the Year accolades each of those seasons. UCLA's 1987 Pac-10 Championship was the schools first in 17 years, while the 1988 title marked the first repeat in the 55-year history of the program. In 1990, Babraj guided the Bruins to a bronze medal at the Collegiate National Championships, marking the highest finish ever by a UCLA crew.

While at UCLA, he produced seven National Team athletes and three Olympians. In 1987, Babraj also served as an assistant coach for the U.S. at the World Championships in Copenhagen, Denmark, helping lead the eights to a gold medal. In 1989 he served as head coach for the World University Games held in Duisburg, Germany.

When funding for the UCLA varsity program was cut in 1992, Babraj and his wife Kelly moved to Alaska and opened the Alaska Sports Academy together, training individuals and teams in several sports at the high school, collegiate, and elite level. Together, they coached a number of athletes who went on to compete on U.S. National teams in their respective sports. The pair left Alaska in 1999 when Babraj was again hired as an assistant rowing coach with the U.S. National Team in preparation for the World Championships.

Babraj turned down a permanent position with the National Team in 2000 to instead rebuild a struggling program at Hobart College in Geneva, N.Y. At the same time, Kelly accepted the head coaching position at William Smith College (Hobart, a men's private college, is a brother school to William Smith, a women's private college), where the pair spent three years (2000-02). Babraj led the Statesmen to two undefeated seasons (2001-02) and his crews finished as the top Division III team at the 2002 Head of the Charles and Stonehurst Invitational.

Babraj holds a master's degree in physical education and a rowing coaching diploma from the Academy of Physical Education in Warsaw, Poland. He earned a general certificate of education from the Engineering College in Warsaw in 1974. In 1973, while attending Engineering College, he was honored with the City of Warsaw Award for saving a woman's life. Babraj also served in the Polish Special Forces and was named a top cadet in 1979.

Born in Warsaw on Sept. 1, 1954, he and his wife Kelly currently reside in Rancho Palos Verdes with their two children, Arianna (12) and Konrad (8). Babraj is the 1985 World Master's Champion in rowing and the 1997 U.S. Master's National Champion in cross-country skiing.



LIGITA KAVIERE • ASSISTANT COACH



Ligita Kaviere, one of the top rowers in the history of the USC program, is in her second season as an assistant coach for the Women of Troy in 2009-10.

Kaviere served as a student assistant coach during the 2009 season, helping Troy qualify all three boats to the NCAA Championships, earning its third team bid in program history.

Kaviere was an integral part of the 2007 squad which won the Pac-10 Championship and rowed from the six seat in the varsity eight boat which finished third in the NCAA Championships. Kaviere was also a member of the varsity eight squad which won the coveted

Jessop-Whittier Cup at the San Diego Crew Classic in 2007 for only the second time in

USC history.

Kaviere amassed many prestigious awards during her career, including being named a Pocock All-American in 2006 and 2007. She was also named CRCA All-West Region First Team and Pac-10 All-Conference in 2006 and 2007.

Kaviere rowed for the Latvian Olympic Union for three years in double scull.

She was a seven-year member of the SASS Rowing Club while in high school. SASS Rowing Club has won the quad race every year since 2000 at the Latvian National Championships and Kaviere has been a member of that boat every year. Kaviere was also a two-time Latvian Junior Champion and a five-time Latvian Champion. She won gold at the 2002 Junior Worlds, bronze at the 2003 U23 Worlds and was fourth in the 2004 U23 Worlds. In 2007 she placed seventh in doubles and 11th in singles at the U23 Championships.

Born in Cesis, Latvia, Kaviere was a 2004 graduate of the Murjanu Sports Gymnasium Jurmala Branch in Jurmala, Latvia. She enjoys rock music, dancing, beach volleyball and cooking in her spare time.

MARKETA DEQUINE • ASSISTANT COACH



Marketa DeQuine, a former Trojan team captain and four-year letter winner who helped lead USC to some of its top seasons ever, enters her third season as assistant coach with the USC rowing program in 2009-10.

DeQuine rowed for USC from 1999-2003 and brings a wealth of experience to a surging USC program. Her main duties include coaching the novice rowers and assisting with the Varsity Four.

DeQuine came to USC from the Everett Rowing Association in Everett, Wash. where she served as the Women's Head Coach, guiding the crew to its most successful season in club history.

Under her direction, the crew captured the overall points trophy at the 2007 Brentwood Regatta in Brentwood Shores, Canada, and they became the only Junior Women's Team at Junior Nationals to return to the varsity eight final for three consecutive years.

Developing a special winter conditioning program for both the men's and women's crews, her system put twenty-three young women in the U.S. High School Rowing National Championships in Cincinnati, Ohio, qualifying the most female athletes of any women's rowing team at the 2007 Junior Nationals.

Her coaching senses made DeQuine the perfect choice as a volunteer novice coach with the USC program in 2003, following the expiration of her student-athlete eligibility. That season, the USC Novice Eight qualified for the Pac-10 Championship Grand Final for only second time in program history. In the fall of 2004, DeQuine went from USC to coaching the Junior Women's Crew for a year at the Newport Beach Aquatic Center.

DeQuine was a four-year letterwinner on the USC rowing team and rowed with the Varsity Eight from the No. 4 seat in each of her four seasons. Among her highlights as a Trojan, she served as team captain in 2003 when the Varsity Eight finished sixth at the NCAA Championships and was twice named to the Pac-10 All-Academic team in 2002 and 2003.

Although she sat out the 2000 season with a stress fracture in her vertebrae, she recovered well enough to be a major factor in USC's success in 2001. That season, she helped lead the Varsity Eight to a then program-high fourth place finish at the NCAA Championships and also helped the Trojans capture their first Jessop-Whittier Cup Championship at the San Diego Crew Classic. As a freshman, she placed sixth in the world and second among collegiate rowers at the 1999 C.R.A.S.H. B Indoor Rowing Championships in Boston, Mass.

In 1996, she was named the Best Rower of the Czech Republic as a four-year member of the Czech Women's National Team and a three-year Junior National Team member. Throughout her rowing career, she competed at the Junior World Championships in Scotland (1998) and Belgium (1997) as well as the World Rowing Championships in Germany (1998) and the World Indoor Rowing Championships (1998, 1999). DeQuine was a ten-time Czech National Champion.

Born June 19, 1979, she is a native of Trebon, Czech Republic. Her father, Vaclav Vochoska, won two Olympic medals in rowing: a bronze at the 1976 Montreal games in the quadruple sculls and a bronze at the 1980 Olympic games in Moscow in the double sculls.

While at USC, she was a German language major and is fluent in English, Czech, German and Russian. Her expertise in languages landed her at the General Consulate of the Czech Republic where she worked under the Consular Department Officer. She currently resides in Hermosa Beach, Calif.

DOUG THIEMANN • RIGGER



Doug Thiemann enters his 27th year of rowing for the 2009-10 season, third as a rigger at USC.

He is a graduate of Columbia University with an engineering degree. For 6 years, he served as an "on-call" boatman for the US National Team based out of the Olympic Training Center in Chula Vista, Calif. He transported the USC boats to the Atlanta Olympics and served as the boatman for the 1999 World Championships. From 1997 to 2000 he served as the U.S. Canoe and Kayak boatman, attending the 1997 World Championships and 1999 Pan Am Games. Doug

has previously been the boatman for Stanford and Wisconsin. As the owner of Thiemann Equipment, he has designed and built trailers used by numerous rowing clubs. The cornerstone of his business is seen in almost every boathouse and regatta around the country; the folding aluminum boat sling. For six years, he served as an "on-call" boatman for the U.S. National Team based out of the Olympic Train Center in Chula Vista, Calif. With the world watching, he transported the U.S. boats to the Atlanta Olympics and served as the boatman for the 1999 World Championships.

From 1997 to 2000 he served our brethren of the water, as the U.S. Canoe and Kayak boatman, attending the 1997 World Championships and 1999 Pan Am Games. Doug has been the boatman for Stanford and Wisconsin. As the owner of Thiemann Equipment, he has designed and built trailers used by numerous rowing clubs. THE CROSSTOWN GAUNTLET

The battle for the Crosstown Gauntlet is a year-long all-sports competition between historic crosstown rivals USC and UCLA which began in the 2001-02 season.

USC and UCLA compete against each other in 18 sports. Five points are awarded (10 points in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball) to the winner of each sport's season series or, for those sports that do not meet head-to-head (cross country, men's and women's golf), the team that placed higher in the conference championship.

In the first eight years, the battle for the Gauntlet has been true to the long-standing competitive rivalry between USC and UCLA. The Trojans captured the inaugural trophy in 2002, the trophy changed hands each year until back-to-back USC wins in 2008 and 2009. The annual winner is presented with a 150-pound pewter-gilded trophy. The trophy features a gauntlet and is engraved with each year's winner.

ROWING TERMINOLOGY

DEFINITIONS

Bow: the forward end of the boat or racing shell which crosses the finish line first; the rower in the seat nearest the forward end of a shell typically has a quick catch, stable technique and a short arc to their stroke.

Blade: the end of the oar which prys the boat through the water.

Catch: an oar blades' entrance into water at the beginning of a stroke.

Coxswain (cox): crew member who steers the shell from a seat located in the stern, or from a lying position in the bow.

Ergometer (ergs): individualized rowing simulators used by rowers to develop strength and conditioning.

Feathering: turning the oar blade flat during the recovery period in order to lessen wind resistance.

Head race: the traditional fall regatta, in which boats cross the starting line at full speed, at roughly 15 second intervals. The course usually involves navigating three miles of river, around bends and under bridges.

Lightweight: a crew on which each athlete weighs under a specified amount; 130 lbs. for women.

Novice: a rower in their first year of collegiate competition.

Port: the left side of the boat.

Power 10 (or 20): a tactical burst of speed consisting of 10 or 20 strokes; frequently the stroke rate increases during these bursts.

Recovery: the time between strokes while the oar blade is traveling through the air.

Release: the point at which the oar blade is leaving the water at the finish, or end of a stroke.

Regatta: the name for rowing events in which several crews compete.

Repechage: a second chance race for crews that do not automatically advance to the finals of an event through the heat.

Rigger: the metal carbon fiber structure attached to the side of the boat into which the oar fits.

Run: the distance the shell moves during one stroke.

Sculling: rowing style where each rower uses two oars.

Shell: boat used in rowing races; seats nine people for an Eight, five people for a Four, and ranges in length from 45 feet for a Four to 58 feet for an Eight.

Sprints: a race used in collegiate competition, which features a 2000-meter course, with four to six unmarked or buoyed lanes, and a floating or staked start.

Starboard: the right side of the boat.

Stern: the back of the boat; the end which the rowers face during competition.

Stroke: a complete cycle of moving the shell through the water. Also, the designation for the rower closest to the stern.

Stroke Rate: the number of strokes completed per minute.

Sweeping: rowing style where each rower uses one oar.

Varsity: a collegiate rower who competes beyond the novice level.

8+ and 4+: Eights (8+) and Fours (4+) are the most common collegiate competitions and the two events held at the NCAA Championships. The plus indicates a coxswain on board.

2,000-meter competition: national, world and olympic competitions are 2,000 meters or approximately 1.25 miles. Most courses are divided into six buoyed lanes allowing for six boats to participate. If there are more than six crews, heats are run to determine a Petite and Grand Final.
