Go right ahead, draw that target on their backs. But you may want to invest in some permanent markers, because the USC women's soccer team plans on wearing it for a while. Fresh off a historic season in which the Women of Troy became the first Pac-10 team to win an NCAA women's soccer championship, USC knows that underdog status is a thing of the past. Only one starter is gone from the 2007 roster. NSCAA All-Americans **Ashley Nick** and **Kristin Olsen** are back for more. Newly crowned 2008 U.S. Olympian **Amy Rodriguez** headlines a premier senior class. And two previously injured members of that blue-chip 2005 freshman class — **Meagan Holmes** and **Nini Loucks** — are healed and ready for action.

Familiar faces and feet pepper the 2008 Trojan roster, so sneaking up on opponents may not be in the cards. But considering the foundation built in just one season under head coach **Ali Khosroshahin**, the Women of Troy are focused and prepared for opponents to take aim at them in 2008.

After all, have you ever tried to hit a moving target?

Nine new faces have been added to the USC roster already loaded with talent, giving the Trojans an injection of mobility and flexibility to a lineup that overpowered all comers in 2007.

"We lost one starter, but that doesn't mean we'll have the same look as we did last year," 2007 National Coach of the Year Khosroshahin said. "It's a new year with new possibilities. We've increased our depth this year. We feel that our returners have a much better understanding of how we go about doing our business, which is going to make things a lot more helpful and a lot easier for all the newcomers to adapt. We know people will be fired up to play us, but we're ready for the challenge."

Corralling the USC attack was no easy feat last season. Shaking up the stubborn midfield was near impossible. Even harder was cracking the Trojan back line — owners of 15 shutouts with Olsen holding court in the net. And that was just the first year in a new system set by then-first-year coach Khosroshahin.

"I think defensively we're going to be very solid like we were last year, and I think we're going to be more dangerous offensively than last year. It's about experience and understanding the way we want them to play," Khosroshahin said. "We just need to be smarter. Our level of intelligence last year was not very high. Our goal this year is to be just as organized, just as hard, but more intelligent."

"We're looking to improve every game. The only thing we have control over is what we do."

What they did last season was historic. A 20-3-2 overall record was the best in program history and notched USC its first-ever NCAA women's soccer championship. To get there, the Trojans placed second in the Pac-10 behind defending champ UCLA, and later turned the tables on the Bruins with a 2-1 win in the NCAA semifinals to set that historic date with Florida State in the championship game. There, the Trojans tallied their 15th shutout of the year — another program record — and fifth of the NCAA tournament, notching a 2-0 win over the Seminoles to claim the crown in College Station, Texas.

Rodriguez was named the College Cup Offensive MVP. Olsen snagged Defensive MVP honors. And **Janessa Currier**, **Kasey Johnson** and **Marihelen Tomer** were named to the All-Tournament Team. Olsen and Nick also became just the fifth and sixth Women of Troy to earn NSCAA All-American honors.

All of them return for 2008.

GOALKEEPERS

Let's start in the back. After all, it's the save-savvy goalkeeping unit that provides USC's last line of defense in a very defensively adept squad. Some teams opt to carry three keepers on the roster, but for the Trojans the tagteam crew is a pair of juniors, **Brittany Massro** and **Kristin Olsen**. Healed up from an injury that forced her to redshirt her freshman year (she entered USC as a member of this year's senior class), Massro serves as a determined and talented option in goal. Olsen, who was a finalist for the Honda Award last season and set a new career high with eight saves in USC's semifinal win over UCLA, also returns to the field with extra experience garnered during competition with the U.S. Under-20 National Team.

"Olsen has the potential to be one of the best goalkeepers, if not in the country, but internationally as well. Her strengths are her athleticism and her hands. The area she's improved on the most is her organization and her leadership," Khosroshahin said. "Brittany has done a lot of work to improve herself. Right now they're competing for that starting position."

DEFENDERS

Not only is the USC defense — arguably the most reliable element of the Trojan gameplan — intact from last season, it is even deeper than before. Anchored by senior **Janessa Currier** in the center, the Trojan back line returns senior **Stacey Strong** and sophomores **Karter Haug** and **Kasey Johnson**.

And 2005 SoccerTimes All-American **Meagan Holmes**, who redshirted last year after tearing her ACL early in the year.

And seniors **Kelley Finch** and **Amy Massey**.

Oh, and there are five newcomers penned in to see time on the defensive front.

"I think defensively we are deeper than we've ever been back there with the additions of five new players and Holmes competing for a position in the back," Khosroshahin said, citing **Taylor Hilgert**, **Kendall Stevens**, **Brittany Davis-Roberti**, **Alex Sitta** and **Claire Schloemer** as the new faces added to the defense.

"Obviously Currier is the leader of the back four, and we're hopeful that she'll have the same type of year she had for us last year," Khosroshahin said. "Strong is another senior for us who we expect to make an impact back there. Johnson's recovering from injury and we hope to get her back; Massey is an all-around defender who can see time middle or outside; and Karter will do exactly what she did last year. She's solid and hardworking."

"Finch will be doing multiple roles for us again. Her experience in the back and in the midfield makes her a key player in the things we do. Her intelligence and leadership are going to be greatly needed."

One of two Trojans who suffered season-ending knee injuries in 2007,



Holmes' resurgence to the back line is highly anticipated. A decorated defender in her first two years at Troy, Holmes has been battling hard to get back to action for the Women of Troy.

"We're super excited to be getting Meagan Holmes back," Khosroshahin said. "We're hopeful that she'll find her fitness in the first segment of the season. She's one of the best attacking backs in the country."

MIDFIELDERS

Truth be told, USC's midfield is stacked. Under the guidance of senior captain and All-American **Ashley Nick**, the Trojans have an experienced core comprising, well, the core of the USC gameplan. Nationally recognized for her outstanding freshman year, USC's 2007 assists leader **Ashli Sandoval** steps back in for her second season in the midfield. Sophomore **Alyssa Dávila** and junior **Jamie Petrossi** add an extra dose of experience from a strong 2007 season, and **Shannon Lacy** and **Kate Gong** also return.

"Our midfield is extremely dynamic and they will be showing us a lot of new things this season," Khosroshahin said. "Ashley Nick is our captain and leader, and an all-around great human being. I still don't think we've seen Nick's best yet, and we're hoping it comes out this year. Sandoval is one of the hardest working, most fit players who is also intelligent with great vision. She's another player we think we haven't seen the best from yet."

"Jamie seems to be on the way back from her injuries and we're hopeful for her to have an impact as well. Dávila has really improved her game. She worked very hard in the offseason to get herself stronger. Expect her to score more goals for us than last year."

All-Americans who only get better? More goals? All told, it's scary prospect if you're scouting the Trojan midfield. But wait, there's more.

"We have great experience and great youth and talent that's going to allow us to improve our possession game," said Khosroshahin, introducing the world to new freshman midfielders **Brittany Kerridge**, **Carly Butcher** and **Chelsea Buehning**. "Kerridge, with all her national team experience this last year could be a possible starter as a freshmen. Carly Butcher, once she adjusts to the level of competition at training every day, we expect her to have an impact. Both are very technical players. Chelsea, with her pace and natural left foot, we're hopeful she'll also be able to contribute as a freshman."

FORWARDS

Remember those extra goals Khosroshahin is expecting from the midfield? Just imagine what the outlook is from the front lines. Once she kicks her jet lag to the curb, Olympian **Amy Rodriguez** is a certain trouble-maker for the Trojan offense as a senior sparkplug and proven goal scorer. Joining Rodriguez on the game-winning goal charts at Troy is redshirt junior **Marihelen Tomer**, and fast on her heels is sophomore striker **Megan Ohai**. Those are just the players you saw last year. In the mix for '08 is a healthy senior **Nini Loucks** and a fresh face in freshman **Ashley Freyer**. Defenses, beware.

"We are extremely excited about our strikers," Khosroshahin said. "Obviously, with Amy and all the national team experience that she's gained, we're expecting her to have an even better year than last year. We're also very happy to be getting Nini back from injury. She's a very versatile payer who can do a lot of things, but we're expecting her to score goals for us this year. Tomer seems to finally be 100 percent healthy, and we are eager to see her in real competition. She had a solid second half of the year last year and we are hopeful for her to have a complete year this year."

"Megan is much fitter than she was last year and her understanding of our play in the final third has improved tremendously. Expect her to have more goals as well as assists this year."

"And, oh, by the way, Ashley Freyer is going to cause havoc for the opposition this year."

Opposition will come fast. USC opens 2008 with three road games, though the returning Trojans are now well versed in paying visits to opposing fields. In 2007, playing on the road was hardly cause for concern, as USC spurred on from the regular season to win five NCAA games nowhere even close to the Pacific Time Zone. Meanwhile, all eight games at McAlister



McAlister Field

Beginning with the 1998 season, the USC women's soccer team no longer had to share a practice field with the football team, as the Women of Troy received a field all their own. Thanks to a \$150,000 donation from Hobart and Soni McAlister, a new field was built on the corner of 30th and Hoover. During the 2000 season, a permanent scoreboard was installed.

USC boasts an 45-12-10 (.746) record at McAlister Field, and the 2002 season represented the first time that every regular-season home game was played at the facility. In past seasons, some games were played at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.



Field and a single NCAA match at the Los Angeles Coliseum also saw the Trojans undefeated at home, giving USC an 11-match unbeaten streak as it enters this 2008 campaign.

This year, the Women of Troy play host to 11 home games. Nine will be at McAlister Field – including the home opener on September 5 against Santa Clara – and two will be showdowns at the Los Angeles Coliseum. On October 24, the Trojans host crosstown rival UCLA for a night game on a historic stage.

"It's the Coliseum – the home of two Olympic Games, the Dodgers, Rams, Raiders and the home of our football program. It's a chance to be a part of the history."

USC esteemed senior class will also have the chance to play out its final home game at the Coliseum, as the Trojans host Stanford on November 2 before rounding out the regular season on the road.

I've never had this many home games, and the UCLA game will be our first night game during the regular season in years. We're extremely excited about that."

Regardless of venue, the Trojans know they're considered the team to beat in 2008.

So while opponents spend time taking aim at the Women of Troy, and the bar has been raised to defending-NCAA-champ level, Khosroshahin and his troops are keyed in on making a calm and focused approach to the 2008 season to come.

"We have to be as smart as we can be this year," Khosroshahin said. "We need to keep the focus on ourselves and how much we improve every day. We need to help everyone be the best they can be."

"Our focus on how we play, how we're going about our business. The wins and losses will take care of themselves."

Head Coach • second season



Ali Khosroshahin enters his second season at the helm of the USC women's soccer program, fresh off a first-year run to the 2007 NCAA Championship with the Women of Troy.

Khosroshahin became the first coach to win the national title in his first season with his program, and accumulated a number of other firsts for himself and the Trojans in 2007. After leading USC to the first NCAA title for the program and for the Pac-10, Khosroshahin was named the **National Coach of the Year** by the NSCAA, SoccerBuzz and Soccer America. Also named the **SoccerBuzz West Region Coach of the Year**, Khosroshahin had garnered a career-best win total with USC's 20-3-2 overall record in 2007.

His overall coaching career record now stands at 96-43-9 (.680) as he enters his second season at USC. In his seven seasons as a head coach, Khosroshahin's teams have made a combined four NCAA appearances.

In summer 2008, Khosroshahin traveled to Africa to participate in workshops supporting the Sport for Social Change Initiative, which is working to establish a network for organizations promoting the development of girls soccer programs in Kenya. Also, as assistant coach of the Under-17 Mexican National Team, Khosroshahin was in Trinidad & Tobago to coach Mexico at the CONCACAF qualifying tournament for the 2008 FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup.

Khosroshahin (pronounced ho-SRO-sha-HEEN) came to Troy after spending six years as the head women's coach at Cal State Fullerton. While coaching the Titans, he was honored as the **Big West Coach of the Year** three times, as he guided the team to three NCAA Tournament appearances. The Titans had winning seasons in each of Khosroshahin's six years there (2001-2006).

Khosroshahin recorded a number of milestones during his time at Cal State Fullerton after taking over a fledgling program that had posted winning records only twice in its previous eight-year history. He won 64.8% of his matches (76-40-6), including a 34-13-3 (71.0%) league mark. His 76 overall wins and 34 Big West victories were more than the school had totaled in either category before he took over.

He produced 44 players who were named to All-Big West Conference squads, including 23 first teamers, plus 13 who made various All-West Region teams and two All-Americans. He twice was runner-up for Soccer Buzz West Region Coach of the Year (2001 and 2005).

Khosroshahin's 2006 squad went 12-8-2 (its third straight 10-win season), won a second consecutive Big West Tournament championship and became the first Big West school to win NCAA Tournament matches in back-to-back seasons. He was the Big West's Coach of the Year for the second season in a row.

In 2005, Cal State Fullerton was 19-4 (a school record for victories), had a 10-match winning streak, captured the Big West regular season (6-1) and Tournament crowns and became the first Big West team to advance to the third round of the NCAA tourney (the Titans did so after posting a second round win over USC).

In his 2001 debut season, he was the Big West Coach of the Year as the Titans finished 13-7 and won the Big West regular season title (8-1) while garnering the school's first-ever NCAA tourney berth. He then went 12-5-1 in 2002, 9-8-2 in 2003 (with wins or ties over three top-20 teams) and 11-8-1 in 2004 (with a seven-match winning streak) while finishing first in the Big West regular season race at 7-1-1.

Before taking over at Cal State Fullerton, he was an assistant with the Titans' women's and men's programs for four years (1997-2000). The men advanced to the NCAA playoffs in 1998 and 2000.

He began his coaching career in 1992 as the boys varsity head coach at Canyon High in Anaheim (Calif.), where he was the Century League Coach of the Year in 1993. He then was the girls varsity head coach at San Marino (Calif.) High in 1994.

He broke into the collegiate ranks in 1994, serving as a graduate assistant with

the men's team at his alma mater, Cal State Los Angeles, as the Golden Eagles advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs that season. He then became a full-time women's and men's assistant there for three seasons (1995-97) before going to Cal State Fullerton.

Khosroshahin also has coached at the international level. He was an assistant with Mexico during the 1999 Women's World Cup, was on the staff of Mexico's U-19 Women's National Program in 2004 and the U-20 squad in 2005 and helped the Mexican women's team prepare for the 2004 Olympics. He also assisted during the U.S. Women's Indoor Soccer Victory Tour following their 1999 Women's World Cup title and even coached the U.S. National team during a match.

He has been a head coach for the U.S. Olympic Development Program, the San Fernando Valley Quakes men's team of the United Soccer Leagues and numerous club teams at various age levels.

Khosroshahin was a two-year (1989-90) letterman at Cal State Fullerton before transferring to Cal State Los Angeles for his final two seasons (1991-92). He played two years (1995-96) with the Standard Falcons and then 1997 with the Valley Eagles in the United Systems of Independent Soccer Leagues (USISL). He earned his "A" coaching license from the U.S. Soccer Federation in 2002 (after getting his "C" license in 1998 and his "B" in 2001).

He received his bachelor's degree in business administration (marketing management emphasis) from Cal State Los Angeles in 1994.

Born Feb. 26, 1970, Khosroshahin is engaged to Sara Matin.



Harold Warren

Associate Head Coach • second season

Harold Warren enters his second season as associate head coach of the USC women's soccer program. He and USC head coach Ali Khosroshahin were teammates at Cal State Fullerton after spending several years playing for rival club teams in Southern California. Now reunited at Troy, the pair joined forces to help guide the Trojans to their first-ever NCAA Championship in 2007. The defensive-minded Warren joined the USC staff after serving as an assistant coach at Arizona for four seasons.

"We are extremely fortunate to have someone of Harold's experience, knowledge and management skills," head coach Ali Khosroshahin says of Warren.

"Harold could easily be running his own program, which makes it all that much easier for us to do what we do here. His work with our defense speaks for itself!"

While at Arizona, Warren helped guide the Wildcats to an NCAA Third Round appearance in 2005 under head coach Dan Tobias. In his four seasons at Arizona, the Wildcats posted a 40-35-7 overall record and went 13-19-4 in Pac-10 play.

Before arriving at Arizona, Warren served one year as an assistant at UC Irvine in 2002, where he was also responsible for directing the UC Irvine Soccer Academy. From 2001-03, Warren was the assistant coach for the California Olympic Development Program's 86-87 age group, and was an ODP scout for Southern California male and female talent.

Warren spent 17 years coaching at the club level for boys and girls teams ranging from 10-19. He won league championships with Riverside Soccer Club and Long Beach Sidekicks, and helped the West Coast Stingers to a Surf Cup semifinal. From 1991-92, he was the head coach for the boys varsity team at Savanna High School in Anaheim.

He has remained involved in club and ODP coaching, heading up the '89 Arizona ODP and the U-15 Arizona Rush Nike Team while in Tucson. He also is a U.S. Soccer Federation licensed coach.

As a player, Warren was a defender and a forward at Riverside Community College before transferring to Cal State Fullerton in 1989. He then transferred to Cal Poly Pomona, where he graduated with a bachelor of science in communications in 2002.



Laura Janke

Assistant Coach • second season

Laura Janke enters her second season as assistant coach at USC. A previous assistant to and former player for Ali Khosroshahin at Cal State Fullerton, Janke's responsibilities at Troy largely involve working with the goalkeepers — an aspect of the game with which she has a considerable amount of experience. Her work with USC goalkeeper Kristin Olsen in 2007 helped push the Trojans to the 2007 NCAA Championship, as Olsen set a program record with 12 shutouts and was named a Honda Award finalist.

"Laura is the glue that keeps this program running," head coach Ali Khosroshahin says of Janke. "She is well on her way to becoming an excellent head coach herself. Her work with the goalkeepers is truly underappreciated by everyone on the outside, but we know what an impact she has with our keepers."

As a player at Cal State Fullerton, Janke was a four-year letterwinner and a two-time All-Big West Conference selection. She holds school career records in goalkeeper victories (24), saves (234), shutouts (13) and minutes played (4,513) and set the Titans' single-season shutouts record with six in her senior year. As a sophomore, she notched 99 saves to stand No. 2 all-time in single-season saves at CSF.

Janke graduated from Cal State Fullerton in 2004 with her bachelor's degree in kinesiology and completed her master's in kinesiology in 2006.
