

ing NCAA champ Stanford (22-2) is an at-large selection. MPSF Tournament runner-up California (19-7) rounds out the MPSF teams in the bracket this year as an at-large selection. The next two teams come from the Big West Conference, with UC Irvine (19-8) getting the at-large berth while conference champ Hawai'i (18-8) is in as an automatic qualifier. The remaining spots are filled by conference champions from around the country with automatic berths. Those teams are: Princeton (29-3, Collegiate Water Polo Association), UC San Diego (18-18, Western Water Polo Association), Whittier (21-14, Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference) and Wagner (25-8, Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference). In last week's play-in games, Princeton beat Wagner to advance to the final eight, while UC San Diego beat Whittier to advance to this weekend's competition.

THIS TIME LAST YEAR

USC was the No. 3 seed and host team for the 2014 NCAA Championships, held at Uytensu Aquatics Center. The defending national champions, the Trojans opened up with a 14-11 win over No. 6 seeded UC Irvine to move into the semifinals. There, USC faced rival UCLA, seeded No. 2 in the bracket, to fight for a place in the final. In a defensive battle, the Bruins managed a 5-3 victory over the Trojans. USC would move into the third-place game against No. 4 seed California, and the Trojans were ready for the Bears. USC pinned up an 11-8 win over Cal to finish third in the tourney. Stanford would go on to win it all with a victory over UCLA in the title match. At the close of action, USC's **Monica Vavic** was named to the NCAA All-Tournament First Team, with **Flora Bolonyai** and **Kaleigh Gilchrist** named to the Second Team. Vavic had scored eight goals during the tournament, with Gilchrist adding four and Bolonyai making 24 saves to add to her program-record of career saves collected in her four years as a Trojan.

BY THE NUMBERS

On the way into these final three games of the year, USC is outscoring opponents 441-137, leading all MPSF teams in offense (16.33 gpg) and third in defense (5.07 gpg). Senior **Monica Vavic** is the top scorer to date with 94 goals — second most single-season goals in USC history — as she has climbed to No. 1 all-time in career scoring (285 career goals). Next in line in scoring this year is sophomore **Stephania Haralabidis** with 60 goals, followed by **Ioanna Haralabidis** with 48, senior **Eike Daube** with 39 and junior newcomer **Melissa Bergesen** with 37. Daube cracked the 100-goal mark with her two-goal effort at UC Irvine on Feb. 28 and now holds 117 career goals to rank No. 19 all-time in scoring at USC. Stephanian Haralabidis passed the century mark on March 13 vs. ASU, and now holds 118 career goals to rank at No. 18. On the defensive end, USC has a reliable new anchor in freshman goalie **Victoria Chamorro**, who is averaging 7.3 saves per game and 4.9 goals-against per game in her 26 appearances to date.

DABOUB ON THE BOARD

During USC's winning effort at the Lancer Invitational, freshman **Brianna Daboub** was a perfect 8-for-8 on the offensive end of the pool. Her eight goals across the four games helped USC improve to 10-0 on the year, and also earned her the honor of MPSF Newcomer of the Week on Feb. 17. Daboub had scored just three goals in USC's previous six games, but stepped up and scored two goals in the opener against host Cal Baptist. She'd add another goal that day in a win over Redlands, and then upped her scoring game further the next day. Daboub delivered her first career hat trick in a win over Pomona-Pitzer and then scored twice in a win over Oc-

cidental to wrap the event with eight goals on eight attempts. It was Daboub's first career award as a Trojan, making her the second USC newcomer to win the award this season. The freshman has now provided 20 goals to date for the Trojans.

TITANS OF TRITON

USC's youth movement showed its strength early on, with sophomore **Stephania Haralabidis** named MPSF Player of the Week and freshman goalie **Victoria Chamorro** named MPSF Newcomer of the Week on Feb. 10 for their roles in helping the Trojans claim the Triton Invitational championship. Haralabidis was an offensive force for the Women of Troy, while Chamorro backed up the USC defense to great success. The respective MPSF honors were the first of each Trojans' career. Haralabidis scored five goals in the semifinal win over No. 11 CSUN and then replicated that with another five goals tallied in the 10-5 championship victory over No. 6 UC Irvine. Hot out of the gates in both games, Haralabidis had four goals in the books by halftime vs. CSUN and a first-period hat trick against UCI. She'd finish out the tournament with 14 total goals after providing two apiece in wins over Cal State East Bay and Long Beach State on the first day of competition. Chamorro set a career best for herself in hauling in 15 saves in the title match vs. No. 6 UC Irvine. She'd finish out the tournament with 27 total saves in her 13 periods of work, having played the first three frames in each of the first three games at the tourney. In all, Chamorro allowed just 11 goals during the tournament.

MONICA ON HER MARK

Senior **Monica Vavic** has blazed a trail up the career ladder at Troy and now has her name etched at the top, having decisively taken over as USC's all-time leading scorer with 285 career goals to date. The record finally fell with Vavic's third goal scored against ASU on March 13. That blast pushed Vavic past Olympian Aniko Pelle, who had set the previous best of 255 when she finished her USC career back in 2002. Vavic also is making her mark in the MPSF history books. She ranks at No. 2 all-time in the conference, needing just two goals to beat out the current top conference scorer, Pacific's Molly Smith, who finished with 286 in 2000. Earlier this year, Vavic tacked up another new record for herself, having scored a USC and MPSF record of nine goals in a single game with her effort on Feb. 14 vs. Pomona-Pitzer. That beat another USC best held by Aniko Pelle, who had an eight-goal game as a Trojan in 2001. This year, Vavic has scored at least one goal in every game the Trojans have played. Now with the career and single-game records set, the next marker for Vavic to hit would be the single-season scoring record, held by Sofia Konoukh with 104 goals scored in 2001. Vavic currently has scored 94 this year.

LOCKED AND LOADED

USC's three returning All-Americans alone have proven they can provide serious firepower. Senior All-Americans **Monica Vavic** and **Eike Daube** provide the experienced backbone for the Trojans at both ends of the pool. This season, Daube has worked her way into the top-20 all-time scoring list at USC, as has fellow All-American sophomore **Stephania Haralabidis**. Daube and Haralabidis served up a combined 102 goals last year, behind Vavic's 75. This year, USC's top four scorers are all returners, with seniors Daube and Vavic joined by Stephanian and **Ioanna Haralabidis** to account for 241 of USC's 441 total goals this year. USC's balance is evident with a glance at the nine Trojans who have scored 20 or more goals to date. Three are seniors (Daube, Vavic

and **Jennifer Stiefel**), one is a junior (**Jayde Appel**), two are sophomores (Ioanna and Stephanian Haralabidis), and three are newcomers (**Melissa Bergesen**, **Brianna Daboub** and **Brigitta Games**).

CAGE FIGHTERS

USC's backbone for the last four seasons has been in the cage. Olympian and four-time All-American goalie Flora Bolonyai has now graduated, leaving the defensive duties to a new international import. Brazilian national teamer **Victoria Chamorro** takes over as USC's starting goalie, backed up by returners **Alegria Hueso** and **Melanie Slater**, who both got in good game action last season. Head coach Jovan Vavic sees Chamorro as a burgeoning talent for the Trojans. The freshman has proven Vavic right in many ways. She's picked up two MPSF Newcomer of the Week awards (Feb. 10 & March 31) with the latest honor coming after a win over LMU, where Chamorro blocked three 5-meter penalty shots.

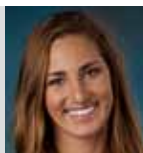
2015 OUTLOOK

Twenty years ago, **Jovan Vavic** got the ball officially rolling for women's water polo at USC. Fair to say, that ball just continues to pick up speed. Under Vavic's guidance, the Women of Troy have won four national championships since that inaugural 1995 season. And ever since winning their second title in 2004, Vavic's Trojans have reached the NCAA Tournament every single season while capturing two more crowns along the way. This year, the USC women show no signs of losing any of that postseason steam. Besides coach Vavic, there are three Women of Troy who have already had a taste of NCAA Championship glory. Junior **Jayde Appel** and senior All-Americans **Eike Daube** and **Monica Vavic** were all three members of USC's 2013 national championship team. Their veteran savvy provides the groundwork for this 2015 roster, which is also replete with plenty of talented youth to help drive USC back toward a 12th consecutive trip to the NCAA tourney after a third-place finish last season and a 26-4 overall mark. •

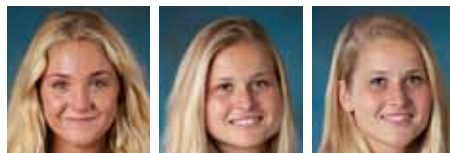
Program-Record Eight Women of Troy Earn All-MPSF Awards Monica Vavic is the first Trojan to become a four-time All-MPSF First Team selection.

The USC women's water polo team has landed a record group of eight Women of Troy on the honor roll for All-MPSF accolades this year. Senior **Monica Vavic** has made even more history for herself, as the program's all-time leading scorer is now the only Trojan to be named to the All-MPSF First Team four times. Fellow senior Eike Daube stands tall on the All-MPSF Second Team alongside sophomores Ioanna Haralabidis and Stephania Haralabidis, and freshman goalie Victória Chamorro has earned All-MPSF Honorable Mention. Chamorro doubles up on honors, too, with a spot on the All-MPSF Newcomer Team, where she is joined by freshman Brianna Daboub and transfers Melissa Bergesen and Brigitta Games. USC's eight honorees marks a new record for the program, beating out the previous best of seven Trojans selected for All-MPSF awards last year.

Senior **Monica Vavic**, who was recently named to the MPSF All-Tournament Team for the third time in her Trojan career, has gone one better with her fourth pick to the All-MPSF First Team. This season alone, she's produced a whopping 94 goals to lead the conference in scoring. About 30 goals ago, Vavic took over as USC's all-time top scorer. Now with 285 career goals, she's just two goals away from the MPSF career scoring record. Vavic's scoring ability is clearly well documented, but the senior has also proven savvy on defense as well as in the realm of assists. She's adept at nabbing steals and setting up her teammates, while also making sure to get to the back of the net in every game this year. Vavic was the MPSF Player of the Year last season and has three First Team All-American picks to her name as she enters her final NCAA tournament.



USC's 2015 All-MPSF Second Team selections fall right in line behind Vavic on the scoring front this season. **Stephania Haralabidis** has punched in 60 goals; **Ioanna Haralabidis** has scored 48; and **Eike Daube** has knocked in 39 to date. For senior Daube, this is her second All-MPSF selection, having grabbed All-MPSF Honorable Mention to go along with her All-American Honorable Mention last year. She's since climbed the career scoring ladder herself, cracking the top-20 as she now holds 117 career goals on her way into her final three games as a Trojan looking to add to another NCAA championship to her resume. Daube and Vavic were sophomores on USC's 2013 national championship team. Sophomore Stephania Haralabidis has scored in 23 games this year as she has run her career count up to 118 goals to rank No. 18 all-time in under two seasons of work as a Trojan. She was named to the MPSF All-Newcomer Team as a freshman and earned All-American Honorable Mention. Sophomore Ioanna Haralabidis is USC's third leading scorer this season and now has her first career award as an All-MPSF honoree.



With a spot on the All-MPSF Honorable Mention list, **Victória Chamorro** is just the second USC goalie ever to earn MPSF honors as a freshman. In 2006, Whitney Morgan, too, was an All-MPSF Honorable Mention recipient and had a place on the MPSF All-Freshman Team that year. Chamorro has certainly impressed in her first season as a Trojan. Her 178 saves to date is the 10th most in a single season by a Trojan goalie. On her way into next week's NCAA Tournament, Chamorro is averaging 7.3 saves per game and just 4.9 goals-against per game. She's recorded five games with at least 10 saves, and topped out with a 15-save game earlier this season. She also posted three 5-meter penalty saves in one game this season.



Chamorro's breakout freshman season has also landed her on the All-MPSF Newcomer Team, where she shares space with three other USC newcomers. Fellow freshman **Brianna Daboub** has proven herself an impact player as well, having served up 23 goals so far, scoring in 16 different games for the Trojans. Junior transfer **Melissa Bergesen** also solidified her place on the honor roll, standing as USC's fifth leading scorer. Bergesen has struck in 18 games, totaling 37 goals to date. Another transfer, sophomore **Brigitta Games**, has also stood tall in her first season as a Trojan. The powerful two-meter player has whipped in 22 goals so far.

Jovan Vavic, one of the most decorated water polo coaches in the country, serves a dual role as the head coach of both the USC men's and women's teams. He has been with the USC women's program since its inception in 1995, and has led both teams to national championships three times in the same school year (1998-99, 2003-04 and 2009-10). A 12-time National Coach of the Year and 10-time MPSF Coach of the Year, Vavic boasts a grand total of 13 combined national titles — including a six-year run with the USC men — and has coached 10 Cutino Award winners. With 13 national championships (nine men's and four women's) won during his tenure at USC, Vavic has the most team titles of any USC head coach in history.

Vavic's 2014 women's team reached the NCAA Tournament for the 11th straight season, taking third place for a 26-4 overall finish on the year. That mark improved Vavic's overall career record on the women's side to 466-136 (.774) as he now enters his 21st season as the USC's women's head coach.

In the calendar years of 2013 and 2010, Vavic swept both sides of the game, winning national championships with the women in the spring and following that with men's titles in the fall of those years. In 2013, the Women of Troy won the longest NCAA women's championship game in history, beating Stanford 10-9 in triple sudden death to claim USC's fourth national championship on the women's side, while finishing with a 27-1 overall record. The USC men would follow with a historic feat of their own, winning an unprecedented sixth straight national championship in claiming the 2013 crown. In 2010, the USC women and men went back-to-back as Vavic followed 2010 National and MPSF Coach of the Year awards on the women's side with 2010 National and MPSF Coach of the Year with the men in leading the Trojan men to their third consecutive national championship.

Following the USC men's 2009 NCAA title and the USC women's run to the 2010 national championship, Vavic saw two Trojans sweep the Cutino Awards for the third time in his career, as J.W. Krumpolz and Kami Craig went back-to-back as the 2009 and 2010 Cutino Award winners following the USC women's run to the 2010 NCAA Championship. The first Trojan pair to sweep the awards was Juraj Zatovic and Lauren Wenger in 2006.

Since 1999 when the program was fully funded, Vavic's record is 401-69 (.853), including 11 consecutive NCAA tournament appearances. Between 2003 and 2010, Vavic was named either MPSF or National Coach of the Year (or both) every year but one. His 2004 women's team won the national championship and became the first team in NCAA Championship history to go undefeated (29-0). In 1999, 2004 and 2010, Vavic was named the women's National and MPSF Coach of the Year.

Vavic oversaw the team's move from Division II in 1995 to Division I in 1996. He guided USC to its first-ever Division I National Collegiate Championships appearance in 1997 and a seventh-place national finish while the 1998 team took fifth nationally. In 1999, USC won the national championship, and Vavic was named the National Coach of the Year and the MPSF Coach of the Year. The 2000 squad added another strong showing, finishing second nationally.

Vavic came to USC in 1992 as an assistant men's water polo coach, joined John Williams as co-head coach in 1995 and took over the men's program in 1999 after Williams retired. He and Williams were named National Coaches of the Year in 1998 after leading USC to its first-ever national championship. They were also named MPSF Co-Coaches of the Year in 1996 after leading USC to the conference title. In fact, in the 1998-99 season, Vavic did something no other coach has accomplished as his teams won three national championships: besides capturing the 1998 men's and 1999 women's titles, his 1999 men's club team won the Men's Senior National Club Championship. In 19 seasons at the helm of the USC men's program, Vavic has improved his career coaching record on the men's side to 448-68 (.868) with national championships won in 1998, 2003, 2005, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2013.

Vavic, a native of Yugoslavia, spent the 1990 season as an assistant men's coach at UCLA. Previously, he coached three seasons (1987-1990) at Palos Verdes (Calif.) High, where he led Palos Verdes to two undefeated league seasons (1987-89). Vavic also served as assistant coach to the U.S. team at the 1995 World University Games, and was the head coach of the team in 2003.

In November 2012, Vavic was named interim head coach of the U.S. Men's National Team, and led Team USA to World Championship qualification with success at the 2013 UANA World Aquatic Championship Qualification Tournament in Canada.

Vavic graduated from UCLA in 1992 with a bachelor's degree in history. He and his wife, Lisa, have four children: Nikola, Monica, Marko and Stefan. Nikola and Monica both attend USC and have won national championships with their respective USC water polo teams.
