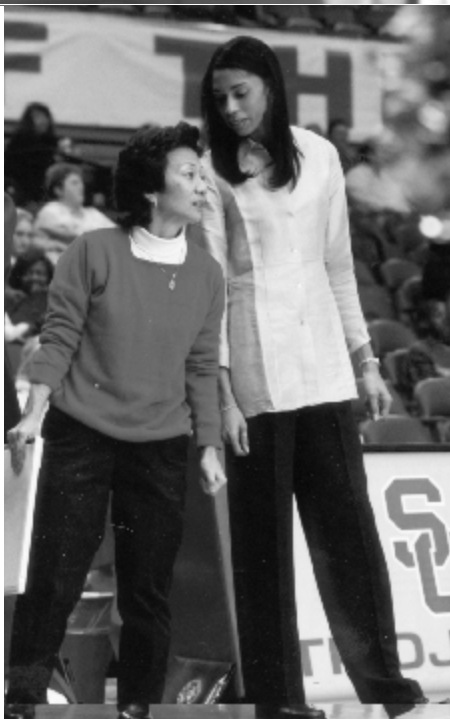

CHRIS GOBRECHT

**USC '77 • 5th season at USC
23rd season overall**



Chris Gobrecht ranks 34th in career victories (380) among active Division I head coaches.



Twenty years after graduating from USC in 1977 to embark on a coaching career, Gobrecht returned to campus to take the helm of the Women of Troy basketball program. On May 8, 1997, she replaced Fred Williams, who left after two years as USC's coach.

Gobrecht, 46, now prepares to enter her fifth season as head coach of the Women of Troy, and currently owns a 48-64 overall record at Troy.

Gobrecht has been a head coach at the Division I level for 22 years, having guided programs at Cal State Fullerton (six years), Washington (11) and Florida State (one). She was a two-time Pacific-10 Coach of the Year (1987-88) with the Huskies and has amassed a 380-267 career mark.

She reached the 300-victory plateau on Jan. 19, 1995, at the age of 39, making her one of the youngest coaches to do so in America. Gobrecht is the second-winningest coach in the Pac-10 after 14 years in the conference with a record of 160-92 (.635).

During her 11 years (1986-96) at Washington, she compiled a 243-89 (.732) record. Gobrecht, the winningest coach in Washington history, led the Huskies to nine NCAA Tournament berths (including advancing to the regionals four times), three conference championships (1986-88-90) and four second-place league finishes. Her teams won at least 16 games each season (including getting 20 wins eight times). Her 1990 team, which pinned the only loss on national champion Stanford, set a school record for victories (28) and finished No. 3 in the AP poll (the highest ranking ever in the program's history).

After two seasons with the Women of Troy, Gobrecht managed to jump-start a program that had been burdened with inconsistency over the last decade. In 2000, USC recorded its first winning record (16-14), posted its best Pac-10 finish (5th) and received its first postseason invitation (WNIT) since Gobrecht's arrival in 1998.

Entering the 2001 season, Gobrecht and her coaching staff welcomed one of the nation's top recruiting classes, including the No. 1 post player in the country. But with its youth and inexperience, last year's squad struggled to find success until capping off the regular season with four straight wins and a glimpse of what is yet to come. With three returning starters who will be entering just their second season at USC, the team's stability is no longer in question.

Aside from her collegiate coaching experience, Gobrecht has also had success sending her players to the next level. Five of her former players at Washington have competed professionally in the United States in the WNBA and the former ABL.

With her success over the past 22 years, she has turned into somewhat of a spokeswoman for the sport. In the fall of 1991, Gobrecht was a featured speaker at the NCAA-sponsored "Spotlight on Women's Basketball" media gathering in New York City. In May of 1990, she was honored by the Seattle chapter of Women in Communication at its annual Matrix Table awards presentation as a 1990 Woman of Achievement. Gobrecht won the Seattle *Post-Intelligencer* Sports Star of the Year Award in 1996, was a nominee for the award during the 1988 season.

Gobrecht came to USC after spending the 1997 season at Florida State. She began the process of reconstructing a downtrodden Seminole program and finished with a 5-22 record.

Prior to her stint at Washington, Gobrecht spent six seasons (1980-85) as the head coach at Cal State Fullerton, where she began a rebuilding process and ended with an 84-92 record. The 1985 Titans

earned a berth in the Women's NIT and Gobrecht was a national Coach of the Year finalist.

Coach Gobrecht drastically improved a struggling **Cal State Fullerton** Women's Basketball program, and led the Titans to their first WNIT* appearance.

COACHING STAFF

Gobrecht began her coaching career in 1978 as the head coach at Santa Fe Springs (Calif.) High near Los Angeles. Her team went 20-4 and advanced into the CIF AAA playoffs. In 1979, she became the head coach at Pasadena (Calif.) City College, guiding her Metropolitan Conference titlist squad to a 25-5 record and a runner-up finish in the state junior college tournament.

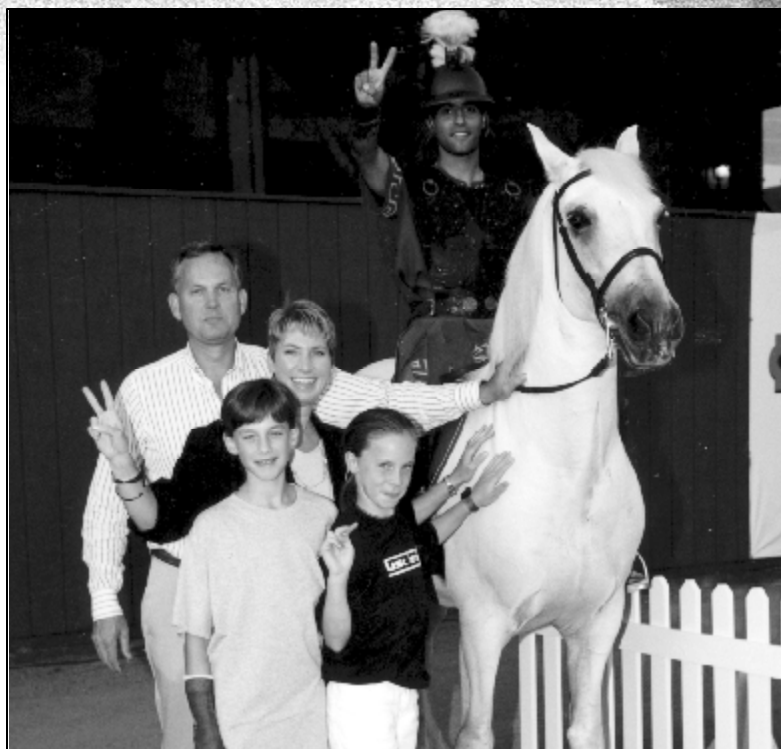
She has also coached at the national and international levels. She was an assistant for a 1990 USA Basketball select team which traveled to Czechoslovakia and Italy. In 1989, she led the East Team to a silver medal in the U.S. Olympic Festival.

Under her maiden name of Chris Geiger, she was a three-year (1974-76) starter on USC's basketball team. She also played volleyball for the Women of Troy for two years (1973-74). She received her bachelor's degree in public affairs from USC in 1977.

Following graduation, she worked as a Peace Corps volunteer, spending a year teaching English at St. Mary's College in Apia, Western Samoa.

Born in Toledo, Ohio, on Feb. 9, 1955, she prepped at Huntington Beach (Calif.) High.

She and her husband, Bob (who earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at USC), have two children: a son, Eric, 15, and a daughter, Madeline, 12. Gobrecht also has numerous family ties to USC: her father, William, was a professor at USC; her mother, Adrienne, earned a doctorate degree from USC; her sister, Gwynn, is a USC graduate; her father-in-law, Bob Sr., and sister-in-law, Carol, both earned undergraduate degrees at USC; and her nephew, Jeff Orswell, is a USC graduate who was a member of the Trojan Marching Band.

ASSISTANT COACH

STACY MCINTYRE

Kentucky '94 • 5th season at USC

Stacy McIntyre, a former All-SEC performer at Kentucky, enters her fifth year as an assistant coach at USC. She joined the Women of Troy staff in 1997 after a successful stint at Nevada.

McIntyre, 29, handles the main scouting and player development responsibilities for the Women of Troy. She also heads up Southern California recruiting, compliance and coordinates summer employment.

"Coach McIntyre communicates very well with the players and is very much respected for her honest, straightforward approach to things," said head coach Chris Gobrecht. "She really understands basketball and it is easy to see why she was such a great player."

Much to her credit, McIntyre helped the USC women's basketball program recruit one of the nation's top incoming freshmen classes of 2001. She also helped lead the 1999-2000 Women of Troy to their most successful season since 1997.

This season will be no different as USC welcomes two, top-25 recruits to add to the nucleus of a young and talented team.

McIntyre spent three seasons prior to joining USC as an assistant coach with the Wolfpack, helping rebuild the Nevada program. While at Nevada, McIntyre was the recruiting coordinator and was also in charge of the team's scouting responsibilities.

She played at Kentucky from 1988-92, finishing her career as the Wildcats' ninth all-time scorer (1,215) and was sixth in career steals (189). A co-captain in 1991 and 1992, McIntyre was the Wildcats' leading scorer those same years, averaging 15.0 points and 16.1 points, respectively. She was an All-SEC second-team and All-Academic SEC selection in 1992. McIntyre helped lead the 1991 Kentucky team to the NCAA Tournament.

McIntyre, who has a teacher's certification, graduated from Kentucky in 1994 with a degree in physical education and a minor in health.

A graduate of Scott County High in Georgetown, Ken., McIntyre played both basketball and softball as a prep.

She was born in Georgetown and currently resides in Los Angeles, Calif.

ASSISTANT COACH

SHANNON PERRY

Iowa '98 • 2nd season at USC

Entering her second season with the USC women's basketball coaching staff, Shannon Perry was named an assistant coach by head coach Chris Gobrecht in July of 2000. Perry previously served as an assistant coach at her alma mater, Iowa.

With the Women of Troy, her responsibilities include national recruiting and serving as the academic liaison for the team.

"I think (Shannon) is one of the truly bright and up-and-coming coaches in America," said Gobrecht. "The combination of her Los Angeles roots, and the experiences she gained from coaching and playing outside of California, will be a great asset to this position."

"Everyone who has ever worked with Shannon has had nothing but glowing things to say about her. She is very talented and very well thought of in this industry."

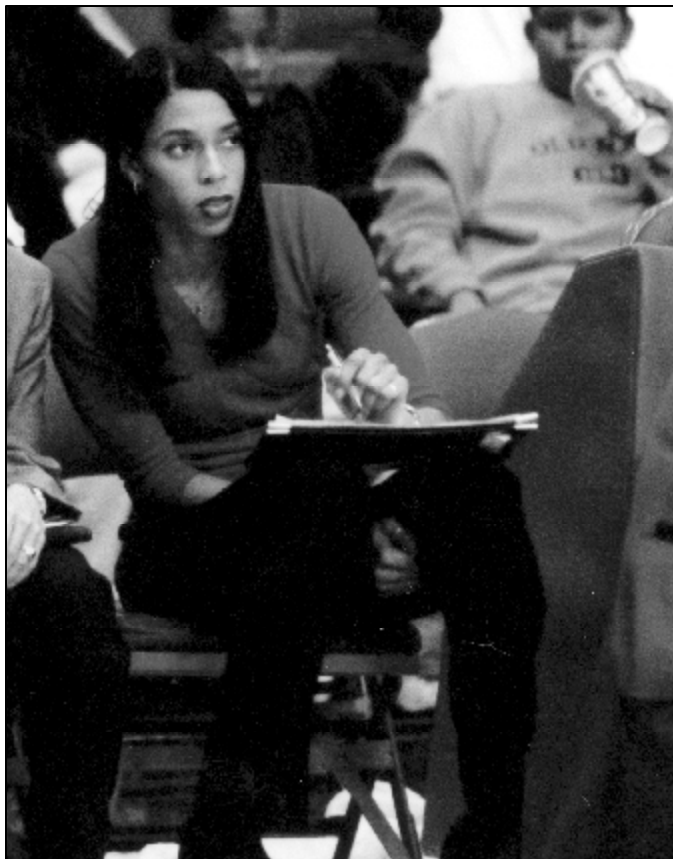
A native of Carson, Calif., Perry spent the 1999-2000 season as an assistant with the Hawkeyes, in charge of the post player development. A 1998 graduate from Iowa, she played four seasons of collegiate basketball and was regarded as the team's leading

defensive player throughout that time. During her playing career, the Hawkeyes won the Big Ten title twice (1996 and 1998) and captured the tournament championship in 1997.

Perry, 25, also has ties with USC. After receiving her bachelor of arts degree in both communications studies and journalism and mass communications from Iowa, she has been working towards her master's degree in broadcast journalism from USC.

A 1994 graduate of Cerritos (Calif.) High, Perry played basketball and volleyball as a prep.

Born on April 3, 1976 in Inglewood, Calif., Perry currently resides in Paramount.





ASSISTANT COACH

COLLEEN MATSUHARA

Sacramento State '74 • 2nd season at USC

Colleen Matsuhara, who has coached at such local women's basketball programs as the Los Angeles Sparks, UCLA, UC Irvine, Long Beach State and Cal State Fullerton, enters her second season with the USC women's basketball program. Named an assistant coach for the team by head coach Chris Gobrecht, Matsuhara's responsibilities include overseeing the individual development of the players.

"Colleen has certainly been one of the pioneers of women's basketball on the West Coast," said Gobrecht. "We feel very honored that she brought her talents, knowledge and wealth of experiences to our coaching staff and the Women of Troy because she is one of the most respected coaches in the game."

Matsuhara has 22 years of coaching experience. At the professional level, she spent two seasons (1998-99) as an assistant with the WNBA's Los Angeles Sparks who advanced to the 1999 Western Conference semifinals.

Before the Sparks, she was the head coach at UC Irvine for six seasons (1992-1997), and was honored as the 1995 Big West Coach of the Year after her Anteaters won the Big West Tournament and made the only NCAA tournament appearance in program history.

She began her coaching career as an assistant at Cal State Fullerton from 1975-77, then was an assistant at UCLA for three years (1978-80) as the Bruins won the 1978 AIAW national championship. She next served as Nebraska's head coach through the 1983 season.

From 1983 to 1985, Matsuhara was an assistant athletic director at UCLA, handling event management and scheduling for 12 sports. During that time she was the Secretariat of Competition for men's and women's basketball at the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles.

Matsuhara returned to coaching as an assistant at Texas for four years (1986-89). The Lady Longhorns were the Southwest Conference champions and SWC tourney titlists each year. In 1986, Texas won the NCAA crown, beating a Cheryl Miller-led USC team in the championship game.

She moved to Long Beach State as an assistant for the 1991 season — the 49ers were the Big West co-champs, won the Big West tournament and advanced to the NCAA West Regional semifinals — before she took over at UCI.

Among her experiences, Matsuhara has also held a variety of international coaching positions: a four-time head court coach at the Olympic Festival Trials (1991, 1993, 1994, 1995), assistant coach to the USA junior

national select team (1992), an assistant coach for the 1987 gold medal-winning Pan-American Games team, an assistant coach to the gold medal-winning USA junior national team (1982), the director of the ABA-USA Invitational Tournament (1979) and a USCSC staff member of the 1979 Women's Pre-World University Games.

Besides coaching and athletics administration, Matsuhara has worked in the entertainment and media industry.

During the summer of 2001, Matsuhara worked as the technical advisor for the Disney Channel's "Double Teamed," training co-stars Poppi Monroe and Annie McElwain. The project of director DuWayne Dunham is set to air in March, 2002.

In 1999, she served as the cast basketball coach and technical advisor for director Gina Prince-Bythewood's feature film, "Love and Basketball," where she trained and coached lead actress, Sanaa Lathan. For the past two seasons (1999-2000), she has also been the color analyst and sideline reporter for UCLA women's basketball radio broadcasts.

Last summer, Matsuhara trained and coached actors Vivica A. Fox, Miguel Nunez and Kim Wayans prior to their on-location shooting of the comedy movie, "Juwanna Mann."

As a player, she was a three-year starter at Sacramento (Calif.) State after transferring from Sacramento City College in 1970. In 1999 she was inducted to the SCC Hall of Fame for her accomplishments.

Matsuhara received her associate's degree from Sacramento City College in 1970 and her bachelor's degree in psychology and physical education at Sacramento State in 1974. She did graduate work in physical education/sports administration at Cal State Fullerton.

Born in Sacramento, Calif., Matsuhara currently resides in Culver City.

Patrick Auerbach joined the women's basketball staff as the program's first Director of Operations and Marketing in 2000. His primary operation duties include equipment management, budget supervision, facilities scheduling and team travel coordination. His mar-

keting responsibilities include directing ticket sales efforts, setting and meeting attendance goals, as well as developing comprehensive brand enhancement and community relations programs for the Women of Troy.

Auerbach arrived at USC in July of 2000 after holding the consulting positions of Year 2000 Compliance Coordinator (1999) and Marketing Works Project Manager (2000) at the Coca-Cola Company in Atlanta, Ga.

Auerbach brings with him an extensive background in women's basketball, including one year (1998) serving as the Assistant General Manager and Director of Public Relations for the Detroit Shock of the WNBA.

He spent four years as the Director of Media and Public Relations for the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (1994-98). During this time, Auerbach also served as a research and information consultant for *USA Today's* Coaches Poll program (1994-98), ESPN's exclusive NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament coverage (1996-97), and as an event operations consultant for Intersport Television's Honda Elite 4 Holiday Classic (1997).

Auerbach received his bachelor's degree in sociology and business at UCLA in 1992 and later earned a master's degree in sports administration and management from Tennessee in 1994.

Born on Aug. 22, 1970 in Van Nuys, Calif., he currently resides in Hollywood Hills.

In Memory of Barbara "B-Dub" Williams 1950-1999

"...For nearly 20 years at USC Barbara Williams was more reliable than Student Body Left. Like she did for hundreds of Olympic gold medalists, All-Pro football players, kids who rode the pine for four years, coaches, secretaries and professors, Williams greeted lost souls at the most critical juncture of their young lives and pointed them in the right direction. She was part preacher, shrink, teacher, financial adviser, fashion consultant and matchmaker.

"After working seven years in the football office, Williams moved downstairs at Heritage Hall as administrative assistant to women's basketball, where she at times single-handedly held together a program that would see four head coaches in less than four years..."

On Dec. 30, 1999, Williams suffered a brain aneurism while she slept at her Inglewood home. The women's basketball team was hit with the news after

facing Rutgers in Piscataway, N.J. As a team, the Women of Troy dedicated the 1999-2000 season to her memory. Black ribbons were placed on their uniforms in her honor.

The USC women's basketball program also re-named its annual academic award. In March of 2000, the inaugural 'Barbara Williams Academic Achievement Award' was presented to then-sophomore Carmen Krause.

"I believe that Barbara Williams spread more love and goodwill on this USC campus than any other individual. There has not been a USC women's basketball player who has not been affected in a positive way by Barbara."
