(95) KENNY BIGELOW JR.—Defensive Tackle, 6-3, 300, Sr.*/Sr., Elkton, MD (Eastern Christian Academy)

2017: Bigelow, whose USC career was hampered by knee injuries, saw action in USC's first 6 games as a backup defensive tackle as a senior in 2017, then retired to become a student assistant coach. Overall, he made 1 tackle (against Western Michigan). He was limited in 2017 spring practice while recuperating from the knee injury.

2016: Bigelow was set to compete for a starting defensive tackle spot as a junior in 2016, but he tore ligaments in his right knee in 2016 spring practice and was sidelined for the 2016 season while recovering.

2015: After missing the previous 2 seasons while redshirting and then recuperating from an injury, Bigelow saw action as a backup defensive tackle in 13 games (all but UCLA) as a sophomore in 2015. Overall in 2015, he had 10 tackles, including 3 sacks for minus 19 yards, plus a deflection. He had 3 tackles (with a sack) against Arkansas State, 2 stops each versus Arizona State (with a sack), Utah and Colorado (with a sack) and 1 versus Wisconsin. He was limited in 2015 spring practice while recuperating from a 2014 knee injury.

2014: Bigelow, who was set to push for key playing time at nose tackle as a redshirt freshman in 2014, instead was sidelined all season after tearing knee ligaments a month prior to 2014 fall camp.

2013: Bigelow, who enrolled at USC in the spring of 2013 after graduating a semester early from high school, redshirted as a freshman defensive tackle in 2013, his first year at USC.

HIGH SCHOOL: His 2012 honors included **Prep Star All-American Dream Team, ESPN 150, Rivals 100 and Scout 100** as a senior defensive lineman and tight end at Eastern Christian Academy in Elkton (Md.), which played an abbreviated 3-game schedule.

As a junior in 2011 at Red Lion Christian Academy in Bear (Del.), he made **ESPNHS.com Underclass All-American first team and Max Preps Junior All-American second team** while posting 40 tackles and 20 sacks.

As a 2010 sophomore, he had 39 tackles, 5 sacks and 1 fumble recovery on defense (he also played linebacker) and 6 receptions for 70 yards (11.7 avg.) with 1 TD on offense.

PERSONAL: He is a sociology major at USC.

(85) JACKSON BOYER—Wide Receiver, 6-2, 195, Sr.*/Sr., Chapel Hill, NC (East Chapel Hill HS/North Carolina)

CAREER: He has appeared in 13 collegiate games (6 at USC, 7 at North Carolina) in his career.

2017: Boyer saw brief action in 2 games (Oregon State, Arizona) as a backup walk-on wide receiver as a senior in 2017, but did not catch a pass.

2016: Boyer appeared in 4 games (Oregon, UCLA, Notre Dame, Penn State) as a reserve walk-on wide receiver and on special teams as a junior in 2016.

2015: Boyer sat out the 2015 season at USC as a walk-on sophomore wide receiver because of NCAA transfer rules after transferring to USC in the fall of 2015 from North Carolina.

NORTH CAROLINA: He appeared in 7 games as a reserve redshirt freshman walk-on wide receiver and on special teams in 2014 at North Carolina.

He redshirted as a first-year freshman walk-on wide receiver in 2013.

HIGH SCHOOL: He was a **2-time All-Conference** wide receiver at East Chapel Hill (N.C.) High. He had 76 catches for 980 yards (12.9 avg) as a 2012 senior and 99 receptions for 1,180 yards (11.9 avg) as a 2011 junior.

As a 2010 sophomore, he played quarterback, completing 75-of-146 passes (51.4%) for 917 yards and 4 TDs (he also caught 12 passes for 180 yards, 15.0 avg, with 2 TDs in 2010).

He also was on East Chapel Hill's lacrosse (3-time All-Conference), diving (fifth in the state meet) and track teams.

PERSONAL: He is a social sciences (economics) major at USC with a B average (3.04 GPA).

(80) DEONTAY BURNETT—Wide Receiver, 6-0, 170, Jr./Jr., Compton, CA (Serra HS)

CAREER: He has 152 catches for 1897 yards (12.5 avg) with 16 TDs in his career, along with 29 yards on 5 carries (5.8 avg), 4 punt returns for 26 yards (6.5 avg) and 2 tackles. In his career, he has 17 starts and has appeared in 39 games. His 152 career catches are 14th on the USC all-time list. In his 2 bowl game appearances (2017 Rose and 2017 Cotton), he combined for 25 catches for 303 yards (12.1 avg) with 3 TDs.

2017: Burnett made quite an impact while starting at wide receiver as a junior in 2017. Overall in 2017 while starting 12 games (all but Utah and Ohio State) and appearing in all 14 games, he led USC in receiving with 86 receptions for 1,114 yards (13.0 avg) with 9 TDs and he also had 2 carries for -2 yards (-1.0 avg). He is 18th nationally in receptions (6.1, third in Pac-12) and 25th in receiving TDs (9, second in Pac-12). His 86 catches in 2017 puts him ninth on USC's season receiving list. His 1,114 receiving yards is the 18th time a Trojan has had 1,000-plus receiving yards in a season. He made **2017 Phil Steele All-American fourth team, All-Pac-12 second team, AP All-Pac-12 first team, Athlon All-Pac-12 first team, Phil Steele All-Pac-12 first team and Pro Football Focus All-Pac-12 first team. He was a semifinalist for the 2017 Biletnikoff Award**. He won **USC's Bob Chandler Award**.

He had 8 catches for 142 yards (both game bests) against Western Michigan, then 9 catches for 121 yards (both game highs) with 2 TDs (22 and 25 yards) and added a 3-yard rush against Stanford. He had a game-best 8 catches for 123 yards with 2 TDs (15 and 25 yards) against Texas to earn **Rose Bowl Game Pac-12 Player of the Week** honors. He had a game-best 9 catches for 76 yards with a 4-yard TD at California, then 6 grabs for 45 yards at Washington State. He had 2 catches for 20 yards with a 16-yard TD against Oregon State, 8 catches for 99 yards (both game highs) against Utah, 8 catches for 113 yards (both game highs) with a 16-yard TD at Notre Dame, and then 4 grabs for 49 yards with a 32-yard TD at Arizona State. He had 2 receptions for 44 yards agaomst Arizona, 6 catches for 79 yards, with a 18-yard TD, at Colorado, 4 grabs for 55 yards versus UCLA and a 9-yard catch against Stanford in the Pac-12 Championship Game. He had a Cotton Bowl-record 12 catches for 139 yards against Ohio State in the Cotton Bowl

2016: The elusive Burnett was called upon often as a promising and sure-handed wide receiver as a sophomore in 2016. Overall in 2016 while appearing in all 13 games (and starting the last 5 as a third wideout), he had 56 catches (second on USC) for 622 yards (11.1 avg) with 7 TDs, as well as 3 carries for 31 yards (10.3 avg), 4 punt returns for 26 yards (6.5 avg) and 2 tackles. He made the **2016 AP All-Bowl Team first team, ESPN All-Bowl Team first team** and **ESPN Pac-12 All-Bowl Team first team**.

Burnett had 4 receptions for 26 yards and a 15-yard punt return against Alabama, 3 catches for 24 yards (with a 13-yard TD) and a 12-yard rush against Utah State and 3 receptions for 41 yards at Stanford. He had 7 catches for 93 yards against Arizona State, then 5 for 34 yards against Colorado, an 11-yard catch at Arizona and a 13-yard TD catch and a 15-yard rush against California. Against Oregon, Burnett had a game-high and career-best 7 catches for 87 yards (with a 2-yard TD) and he had a tackle. He had 4 grabs for 67 yards at Washington, 3 catches for 28 yards, a 4-yard rush and a tackle at UCLA and 5 catches for 34 yards against Notre Dame. Against Penn State, he caught 13 passes for 164 yards with a Rose Bowl record-tying 3 TDs (all career bests), including scores of 26, 3 and 27 yards (the last TD tied the game with 1:20 to play); the 13 receptions were the second most ever in a Rose Bowl.

2015: He was a reserve wide receiver as a first-year freshman at USC in 2015. Overall in 2015 while appearing in 12 games (all but Arkansas State and Stanford), he caught 10 passes for 161 yards (16.1 average). He had a 10-yard catch against Idaho, then 3 receptions for 53 yards at Notre Dame, 3 grabs for 82 yards at California, a catch for minus 6 yards against Arizona, a 9-yard reception versus UCLA and a 13-yard catch versus Wisconsin. He enrolled at USC in the fall of 2015 and was awarded a scholarship by virtue of an NCAA rule known as "blueshirting" (it allows a non-recruited student-athlete to receive athletic financial aid after beginning practice and have that student-athlete count towards the next year's signing class if the school has reached its NCAA-maximum aid limit for the current year).

HIGH SCHOOL: He made 2014 South Bay Daily Breeze All-South Bay second team and All-Mission League first team as a senior wide receiver at Serra High in Gardena (Calif.). He had 27 receptions for 545 yards (20.2 avg) with 5 TDs in 2014.

As a junior in 2013, he had 12 catches for 186 yards (15.5 avg) with 2 TDs.

He completed 8-of-11 passes (72.7%) for 65 yards with 1 TD and ran for 25 yards on 6 carries (4.2 avg) as a 2012 sophomore. Current Trojans Olajuwon Tucker, Jalen Greene, Jalen Jones, Rasheem Green, John Houston Jr., Oluwole Betiku, C.J. Pollard and Christian Herrera also prepped at Serra.

PERSONAL: He is a communication major at USC.

(14) SAM DARNOLD—Quarterback, 6-4, 220, So.*/Jr., Capistrano Beach, CA (San Clemente HS)

CAREER: Darnold has completed 549-of-846 passes (64.9%) for 7,229 yards with 57 TDs and 22 interceptions, plus he has run for 332 yards on 137 carries (2.4 avg) with 7 TDs. He is seventh on USC's career passing list (549 completions) and seventh on its all-time total offense chart (7,561 yards). He has thrown for at least 200 yards in 23 games (and 12 times in his career over 300 yards). He has thrown at least 3 TD passes in a game 10 times in his career (and 4 times with at least 4 TDs). He has won 20 of his 24 career starts and is 12-0 at home.

2017: The poised-beyond-his-years Darnold, one of the nation's elite quarterbacks known for his quick release, accuracy, mobility and heady play, started for his second season as just a sophomore in 2017. Overall in 2017 while starting all 14 games, he completed 303-of-480 passes (63.1%) for 4,143 yards with 26 TDs and 13 interceptions, plus he had 75 carries for 82 yards (1.1 avg) with 5 TDs and he made 2 tackles. In his last 9 games of 2017, he threw 17 TDs and just 5 interceptions. He is USC's season recordholder in total offense (4,225 yards in 2017) and plays (555 in 2017). His 303 completions in 2017 puts him fifth on the USC season list (12 shy of Cody Kessler's record of 315 in 2014) and he is the first Trojan to throw for 4,000 yards in a season (he has 4,143). His 8 300-yard passing games in 2017 is a USC season record and his 13 200-yard passing games in 2017 ties the USC and Pac-12 record (shared with Matt Leinart in 2005). He is 13th nationally in passing yards (295.9, third in Pac-12), 15th in total offense (301.8, second in Pac-12), 19th in completions (21.6, fourth in Pac-12) and 21st in passing TDs (26, second in Pac-12).

He made 2017 CollegeFootballNews.com All-American honorable mention, All-Pac-12 first team, AP All-Pac-12 first team, Athlon All-Pac-12 first team, Phil Steele All-Pac-12 first team and CollegeFootballNews.com All-Pac-12 first team, won USC's Co-MVP and Co-Lifter of the Year Award. He was a semifinalist for the 2017 Maxwell Award, Walter Camp Award, Manning Award and Davey O'Brien Award. He was a USC captain.

He completed 69.7% of his passes (23-of-33) for 289 yards against Western Michigan, but had 2 picked off, and he also ran for an 11-yard TD. He completed a career-best 80.8% of his passes (21-of-26), including the first 11 throws in the game, for 316 yards with 4 TDs (4, 11, 22 and 25 yards) and 2 picks against Stanford to earn Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week, CollegeSportsMadness.com Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week and O'Brien Award Great 8 honors. He hit 28-of-49 passes for 397 yards with 3 TDs (15, 56, 25 yards) and 2 picks against Texas, completing 3 straight passes under duress to lead USC 52 yards in the final 39 seconds of regulation to set up the game-tying field goal. He was 26-of-32 for 223 yards with 2 TDs (16 and 4 yards) and 1 interceptions and he also ran for 14 yards on 2 tries at California. At Washington State, he was 15-of-29 for 164 yards with a pick and also ran for 25 yards on 9 carries with 2 short TDs. He was 23-of-35 for 316 yards with 3 TDs (37, 16 and 30 yards) and an interception against Oregon State. He was 27-of-50 for 358 yards and 3 TDs (52, 17 and 1 yards) and also ran for 15 yards on 6 carries against Utah, but lost 3 fumbles. He completed 20-of-28 passes for 229 vards with 2 TDs (5 and 16 vards) at Notre Dame, but threw an interception and lost a fumble. He hit 19-of-35 passes for 266 yards with 3 TDs (32, 42 and 19 yards) at Arizona State and also ran for 19 yards on 4 tries (with a career-long 39-yard scramble), plus he had a tackle. He hit 76.9% of his passes (20-of-26) for 311 yards and 2 TDs (27 and 22 yards) with an interception against Arizona. He completed 21-of-34 passes for 329 yards with 2 TDs (10 and 18 yards) and also scrambled for a 24-yard touchdown at Colorado. He was 17-of-28 for 264 yards with an interception against UCLA and ran for 10 yards on 5 carries (with a 1-yard TD). He hit 70.8% of his passes (17-of-24) for 325 yards with 2 TDs (7 and 19 yards) against Stanford in the Pac-12 Championship Game to earn the game's MVP. He was 26-of-45 for 356 yards against Ohio State in the Cotton Bowl, but he was sacked 8 times, threw an interception that was returned for a TD and lost 2 fumbles.

2016: Darnold proved to be among the top quarterbacks in the nation as just a redshirt freshman in 2016. His insertion into the starting lineup in the fourth game of 2016 gave the USC offense a spark as the Trojans won the final 9 games of the season. Overall in 2016 while appearing in all 13 games and starting the last 10, he completed 246-of-366 passes (67.2%) for 3,086 yards with 31 TDs and 9 interceptions, plus 62 carries for 250 yards (4.0 avg) with 2 TDs and 3 tackles.

He won the 2016 Archie Griffin Award from the Touchdown Club of Columbus (given to the nation's season-long most valuable player after the bowls) and was among 10 finalists for the 2016 Manning Award and 18 semifinalists for the O'Brien Award, both awarded to the nation's top quarterback. He was the 2016 Pac-12 Freshman Offensive Player of the Year, made Football Writers Freshman All-American first team and Campus Insiders Freshman All-American second team and was All-Pac-12 honorable mention. He made the 2016 AP All-Bowl Team first team and ESPN Pac-12 All-Bowl Team first team. He won USC's 2016 Most Inspirational Player Award and Bob Chandler Award (underclassman with outstanding athletic ability, academic achievement and character).

He is the only USC quarterback in history to have back-to-back 5 passing TD games (Arizona and California in 2016). He threw multiple TD passes in 9 straight games, the most by a Trojan since Matt Leinart's 15 in 2003-04. He was ninth nationally in passing efficiency (161.1, second in Pac-12), 10th in completion percentage (.672, second in Pac-12) and 13th in passing TDs (31, fourth in Pac-12). He was second in the nation in ESPN's Total Quarterback Rating (86.8), behind only Oklahoma's Baker Mayfield. In his 10 starts, he threw 29 touchdowns and just 8 interceptions. Among freshmen quarterbacks, he was first nationally in passing efficiency (161.1), completion percentage (.672), TD passes (31) and yards per attempt (8.4). His 31 TDs in 2016 is a USC freshman season record. His 250 rushing yards in 2016 are the most in a season by a USC quarterback since Reggie Perry's 254 in 1991. He already is 15th on USC's career passing list with 246 completions (he also is tied for 10th on Troy's season passing chart with those 246 completions). His 3,336 yards of total offense in 2016 is eighth on USC's season list and 20th on USC's career list.

Playing off the bench against Alabama, he was 4-of-8 for 29 yards and he ran for 9 yards on 3 carries. Against Utah State, he was 5-of-7 for 62 yards with 2 TDs off the bench. At Stanford, he saw late action and was 5-of-7 for 45 yards and an interception. At Utah, he made his first start (just the sixth redshirt freshman to start at quarterback for USC) and hit 18-of-26 passes for 253 yards and he also ran for 41 yards on 9 carries (with an 8-yard TD), the most rushing yards in a game by a USC quarterback since Matt Leinart's 46 in 2004 against Colorado State. He completed 69.7% of his passes (23-of-33) for 352 yards and 3 TDs (all career highs) while starting against Arizona State (he also ran for 8 yards on 3 tries, with a 3-yard TD run) to earn Manning Award Star of the Week honors. Against Colorado, he threw for a career-best 358 yards with 3 TDs on 25-of-37 passing to become the first USC freshman to have back-to-back 300-yard passing games since Todd Marinovich in 1989 did so versus Notre Dame and Stanford (he earned O'Brien Award Great 8 honors), but he also had an interception and lost 2 fumbles (he ran for 22 vards on 8 carries). He threw a USC freshman record 5 TDs at Arizona on 20-of-32 passing and he added 54 yards on 6 carries (the most rushing yards in a game by a USC quarterback since Carson Palmer's 60 against Kansas State in 2001) while playing just the first 3 quarters to earn Rose Bowl Game Pac-12 Player of the Week, O'Brien Award Great 8 and Scout.com Pac-12 Player of the Week honors. For a USC record second consecutive game, he threw 5 touchdowns (also tying his USC freshman game record) as he completed 72.0% of his passes (18-0f-25) for 231 yards against California, but he threw an interception and lost 2 fumbles (and he had 5 rushes for 12 yards). Against Oregon, he hit 70.0% of his passes (28-of-40, both career highs) for 309 yards with 2 TDs but he threw an interception (he also ran for 23 yards on 5 carries). At Washington, he completed 69.7% of his passes (23-of-33) for 287 yards with 2 TDs and 2 interceptions, and also ran for 15 yards on 4 carries to earn Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week, Rose Bowl Game Pac-12 Player of the Week and O'Brien Award Great 8 honors. He completed 25-of-36 passes for 267 yards and 2 TDs (with 2 interceptions) and ran for 27 yards on 9 carries at UCLA. He was 19-of-29 passing for 205 yards and 2 TDs (52 and 2 yards) with no picks against Notre Dame and he also ran for 16 yards on 3 tries. He turned in a legendary performance when he was named the Rose Bowl Offensive Player of the Game against Penn State as he set Rose Bowl records with 5 passing TDs and 473 total yards of offense; he was 33-of-53 passing for 453 yards overall in the game (all were career highs and second most ever in a Rose Bowl and the passing yardage was a USC freshman game record), including 10-of-10 for 135 yards in the fourth quarter as he engineered 2 long touchdowns drives in the final 9 minutes to tie the score.

2015: Darnold redshirted in 2015 as the No. 3 quarterback as a first-year freshman. He was **USC's Offensive Service Team Player of the Year**.

HIGH SCHOOL: He made the 2014 Prep Star All-American Dream Team, Max Preps All-State Division II first team, Cal-Hi Sports All-State second team, Orange County Register Fab 15 second team, Tacoma News Tribune Western 100, All-CIF Southwest Division Offensive MVP and Orange County Register All-Orange County Offensive Player of the Year as a senior quarterback at San Clemente (Calif.) High as he completed 213-of-314 passes (67.8%) for 2,996 yards with 39 TDs and 8 interceptions and he ran for 785 yards on 125 carries (6.3 avg) with 13 TDs. He set school season records for passing yards, passing TDs, completions and total yards (3,770) in 2014. He twice threw a school-record 5 TDs in a game in 2014. San Clemente advanced to the 2014 CIF Southwest Division championship game (he threw for 204 yards and ran for 181 yards in the game).

He missed most of his 2014 junior season recovering from his broken foot suffered in the football season and then he broke a finger. He also played baseball at San Clemente. He was the Orange County Register Boys Athlete of the Year and the Orange County Athletic Directors Association Orange County Male Athlete of the Year for 2014-15. Current Trojans Jake Russell and Jack Sears also prepped at San Clemente.

PERSONAL: He is a communication major at USC. His father, Mike, played football (guard) at Redlands and his mother, Chris, played volleyball at Long Beach City College. His sister, Franki, played volleyball at Rhode Island (2012-15). His late grandfather, Dick Hammer, played basketball at USC (lettering in 1952 and on the Trojans' 1954 NCAA Final Four team) and was a member of the USA's 1964 Olympic volleyball team, then appeared in films, television (including in "Emergency!") and commercials (including as the Marlboro Man) and also was a captain in the L.A. County Fire Department. His grandmother, Betty Hammer, played volleyball (including training with the U.S. National Team) and softball. His great grandmother, Juanita, was a noted tennis player in Southern California. His uncle, Dan Hammer, played volleyball at Long Beach State (1980-81). His cousin, Allie Hammer, played volleyball at Irvine Valley College (2009-10) and American (2010-11), his cousin, Michele Hammer, played volleyball at Chapman (2012-15) and his cousin, A.J. Hammer, played volleyball at Concordia (2015-17).

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING ABOUT SAM DARNOLD

Kirk Herbstreit, ESPN: "On the football field, he is in a different galaxy."

Chris Fowler, ESPN: "Some people are born to do things, right? Some people are put on this earth to do one thing. Sam Darnold is a born quarterback."

Colin Cowherd, FOX: "I think he is the best quarterback I've ever seen at USC."

Kyle Bonagura, ESPN.com: "Darnold is a star, plain and simple...Darnold's poise and ability to create plays when they break down are incredible for any player, but even more so (when he did so as) a freshman...He has the ability to extend plays with his feet, both to buy time to pick out a receiver and to take off and run. He plays more on instinct because he's had less time in the program and because he's simply wired that way."

Legendary ABC announcer Keith Jackson: "He has some good in his gizzard. He's got some athletic ability, and those are the kind of guys who can beat you."

Former USC and NFL quarterback Sean Salisbury, now a sports broadcaster: "He has a chance to be the best USC has ever seen. He's that good."

David Lombardi, ESPN.com: "Darnold may well be the best quarterback in the Pac-12; the Trojans have much to be excited about entering 2017...He has a big arm, he's elusive and he hasn't made many mistakes so far."

William Quimby, FanSided: "Darnold is a cool customer, who was 10-for-10 in the fourth quarter alone (in the Rose Bowl). Let the hype begin because he is a skilled, poised, tenacious competitor who will not disappoint as his reputation grows."

Rich Hammond, Orange County Register: "Darnold's on-field decisions suggest intelligence but also a level of instinct that can't be taught."

Stanford head coach David Shaw: "I think USC has the best quarterback in the nation....He's the best college quarterback I've seen at anticipating since Andrew Luck."

Penn State head coach James Franklin: "In Sam Darnold, you look at the Aaron Rodgers of the world."

Penn State defensive coordinator Brent Pry: "We knew he was athletic, but it wasn't the same as being out there on the field with him. Rushing four is not enough for a guy like that. He just kind of jimmy-jammed through and kept the play alive and found a seam."

Washington co-offensive coordinator Jimmy Lake: "I really believe this young quarterback is going to be a star in this conference."

Former UCLA head coach Jim Mora: "I watched him on film obviously, I've seen him on TV, had a lot of respect for him coming into the (UCLA) game, but when you see him in person he's a truly special one. I'll tell you, he reminds me of a younger Tony Romo. He's bigger, but that type of ability and he's smart and he's poised and confident...He's fun to watch. He's not fun to compete against."

Utah head coach Kyle Whittingham: "The guy is incredible, as far as his skill set to play the position. He's got everything, the size, the arm strength, the mobility, the pocket presence. He seems to be a great decision-maker."

USC head coach Clay Helton: "Part of his greatness is his creativity. His ability to extend plays is part of his game."

USC offensive coordinator Tee Martin: "Sam, he has that quiet confidence and very stern, direct leadership quality that a lot of guys have who win a lot of games."

Former USC wide receiver JuJu Smith-Schuster: "If you've ever seen Aaron Rodgers throw the ball, it's a fastball. It just goes there. That's what it (Darnold's throw) is."

Stanford defensive tackle Harrison Phillips: "I was asked for a word to describe him and I said, 'Incredible.' His arm strength, what he can do with the ball. He's the type of guy where getting close to a sack or getting him off his line isn't going to be good enough."

Colorado linebacker Derek McCartney: "The thing that was interesting to me was how hard it was to get him down when you got there. Guys would get to the quarterback, and he would make them miss and extend the play. He's got great playmaking ability."

Oregon linebacker Tony Dye: "He's a great athlete. He's a great ballplayer. He makes things happen."

Utah defensive tackle Filipo Mokofisi: "He's deceivingly fast and deceivingly strong."

USC safety Chris Hawkins: "When he's playing like this, I don't think there are too many teams in the country that really want to see us."

Former USC wide receiver Darreus Rogers: "The kid has grown up fast, on and off the field. He has become a natural leader and his instincts on the field are amazing. What more can you ask for?"

Former USC Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback and current NFL star Carson Palmer: "He's a great young quarterback...He's a gamer. When you watch him play, there are so many plays that break down, and all of a sudden he fires a ball to a crossing route or finds a way to get out of a sack and keeps his eyes downfield to throw the touchdown pass. He's just a natural gamer, and guys like that only get better with repetition. Obviously, he's new on the scene and doesn't have a ton of experience, but for him to come on the scene that quickly and have the success he's had, I'm really excited to see the future he is going to have."

2017: The experienced Hawkins, the veteran of USC's secondary, started all 14 games at strong safety as a senior in 2017. Overall in 2017, he had 88 tackles (second on USC), including 6.5 for losses of 30 yards (with 3 sacks for 22 yards), plus an interception, 2 deflections and a forced fumble. He made 2017 All-Pac-12 honorable mention, AP All-Pac-12 second team and Pro Football Focus All-Pac-12 first team. He won USC's Trojan Way Leadership Award and Player of the Game Versus UCLA Award. He was a USC captain.

He had 5 tackles against Western Michigan, 6 tackles against Stanford, 5 tackles versus Texas and 5 tackles, an interception and 2 deflections at California. He had 4 tackles at Washington State, 7 tackles against Oregon State, 7 tackles (1 for a loss) against Utah and 4 tackles (1.5 for losses, with a sack) at Notre Dame. He had 2 tackles at Arizona State, 8 tackles (1 sack) against Arizona and 5 tackles at Colorado. He had a game-best 10 tackles (with a sack) against UCLA, then had a game-best and career-high 14 tackles (2 for losses) and forced a fumble against Stanford in the Pac-12 Championship Game (after learning that morning of his grandmother's passing). He had 6 tackles against Ohio State in the Cotton Bowl.

2016: Hawkins saw significant action at strong safety as a junior in 2016. Overall in 2016 while appearing in all 13 games (starting 4 times, versus Alabama, Utah State, Stanford, Oregon), he had 44 tackles, including 4 for losses of 16 yards (with a 10-yard sack), plus 2 deflections and 2 forced fumbles. He made **2016 All-Pac-12 honorable mention**. He was limited in 2016 spring practice while recovering from 2015 post-season ankle surgery.

He had 3 tackles against Alabama, then 8 tackles (1 for a loss) and a deflection against Utah State and 5 tackles (1 for a loss) and a forced fumble at Stanford. He had 3 tackles (with a sack) and a deflection against Arizona State, 2 tackles against Colorado, a team-high 5 tackles and a forced fumble at Arizona and 6 tackles versus California. He had 7 tackles against Oregon, then 2 tackles (1 for loss) at Washington and 1 tackle versus Notre Dame. He had 2 tackles against Penn State.

2015: Hawkins was moved from cornerback to free safety in 2015 spring practice and started there all of 2015 as a sophomore. Overall in 2015 while starting 14 times, he had 70 tackles (third on USC), including 1.5 for losses of 4 yards, plus 2 fumble recoveries (with a TD) and 2 interceptions. He had ankle surgery after the season.

He had 5 tackles, an interception and a fumble recovery against Arkansas State, a tackle against Idaho and 7 tackles against Stanford. At Arizona State, he had 2 tackles and returned a fumble 94 yards for a TD. He had 7 tackles against Washington, 3 tackles at Notre Dame, 5 stops against Utah and a team-best 8 tackles at California. He had 6 tackles (0.5 for loss) against Arizona, 5 tackles at Colorado and 3 tackles and an end-zone interception at Oregon. He had 2 tackles against UCLA, then 8 tackles (1 for a loss) against Stanford in the Pac-12 Championship Game and 8 tackles versus Wisconsin.

2014: Hawkins started USC's first 4 games (Fresno State, Stanford, Boston College, Arizona State) at cornerback, then served as a backup the rest of the season as a redshirt freshman in 2014. Overall in 2014 while appearing in 11 games (all but UCLA and Nebraska), he had 32 tackles, including 1 for a loss, plus 2 deflections and an interception.

He had 1 tackle against Fresno State, 6 stops at Stanford, 4 tackles and an interception at Boston College, 2 tackles against Oregon State, 5 tackles at Arizona, 9 tackles (1 for a loss) and 2 deflections against Colorado, a tackle at Utah, 2 tackles at Washington State and 2 stops against Notre Dame.

2013: Hawkins, who enrolled at USC in the spring of 2013 after graduating a semester early from high school, redshirted as a freshman cornerback in 2013, his first year at USC.

HIGH SCHOOL: His 2012 honors included Prep Star All-American Dream Team, ESPN 150, Rivals 100, Orange County Register Fab 15 first team, Tacoma News Tribune Western 100 and All-CIF Inland Division as a senior cornerback and wide receiver in 2012 at Rancho Cucamonga (Calif.) High, which went 10-3. He had 56 tackles, 2 interceptions, 6 deflections, 1 forced fumble and 1 blocked field goal on defense in 2012 and 14 receptions for 193 yards (13.8 avg.) with 2 TDs on offense.

As a 2011 junior, he made **All-CIF Inland Division** as he had 32 tackles and 2 interceptions. Rancho Cucamonga went 11-2 in 2011.

PERSONAL: He received his bachelor's degree in policy, planning and development at USC in the spring of 2017 and is working on a second bachelor's degree. He is USC's 2017 representative on the Pac-12's Student-Athlete Leadership Team and also was 1 of 2 student-athletes to represent the Pac-12 at the 2017 NCAA Legislation meeting in Chicago. His brother, Armond Jr., is a senior defensive back at Idaho.

(25) RONALD JONES II—Tailback, 6-0, 200, Jr./Jr., McKinney, TX (McKinney North HS)

CAREER: He has run for 3,619 yards on 591 carries (6.1 avg) with 39 TDs and caught 32 passes for 301 yards (9.4 avg) with 3 TDs in his career. He is fifth on USC's career rushing list with 3,619 yards, with 2 Heisman Trophy winners and 2 Heisman runnersup ahead of him. His 6.12 career yards per carry is fourth best among those on USC's Top 40 all-time rushing ladder. He has 14 100-yard rushing games in his career. He has had at least 1 TD in 19 of the last 20 games he has played (including 13 consecutive games from 2016 to 2017 until he was shut out at Notre Dame in 2017, the most in a row since Anthony Davis' 17 in 1973-74). He is the seventh Trojan to have at least a pair of 1,000-yard rushing seasons (along with O.J. Simpson in 1967-68, Anthony Davis in 1972-73-74, Ricky Bell in 1975-76, Charles White in 1977-78-79, Marcus Allen in 1980-81 and LenDale White in 2004-05). He has appeared in 40 games in his career, with 19 starts.

2017: The explosive Jones, who also has sprinted for USC's track team, started for his second season at tailback as a junior in 2017 and was among the nation's top running backs. Overall in 2017 while appearing in and starting 13 games (all but California, which he missed after suffering an ankle sprain and leg bruise against Texas), he had 261 carries for 1,550 yards (5.9 avg) with 19 TDs, plus 14 receptions for 187 yards (13.4 avg) and 1 TD (he also had 2 tackles).

He had 9 100-yard rushing games in 2017. His 1,550 rushing yards in 2017 puts him eighth on USC's season rushing list (and is the 30th time a Trojan has eclipsed 1,000 rushing yards in a season). He is fifth nationally in rushing touchdowns (19, second in Pac-12), sixth in total touchdowns (20, second in Pac-12), 14th in rushing (119.2, fifth in Pac-12), 14th in scoring (9.2, third in Pac-12) and 21st in all-purpose running (133.6, fourth in Pac-12).

He made 2017 Pro Football Focus All-American first team, Sports On Earth All-American second team, AP All-American third team, CollegeSportMadness.com All-American third team, Phil Steele All-American fourth team, CollegeFootballNews.com All-American honorable mention, All-Pac-12 first team, AP All-Pac-12 first team, Athlon All-Pac-12 first team, Phil Steele All-Pac-12 first team, CollegeFootballNews.com All-Pac-12 first team and Pro Football Focus All-Pac-12 first team. He won USC's Offensive Perimeter Player of the Year Award. He is a finalist for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award and was a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award.

He ran for a game-high 159 yards with 3 TDs (16, 1, 37 yards) on 18 carries for an 8.8 average and added a 19yard reception against Western Michigan to earn Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Player of the Week honorable mention. He had 116 yards on 23 rushes with 2 TDs (1 and 23 yards) and also had a 10-yard reception against Stanford. He had a game-best 47 yards on 18 carries and scored a TD on a zig-zagging 56-yard TD pass at the first half gun against Texas (he also had a tackle). At Washington State, he ran for a game-best 128 yards on 14 carries (a 9.1 average), including an 86-yard TD burst that was USC's longest rush since LaVale Woods' school record 96-yarder in 1996 versus Oregon State. He had a game-high 79 yards on 12 carries with a 4-yard TD along with 2 catches for 17 yards and a tackle against Oregon State. Against Utah, he had 111 yards on 17 carries, with an 11-yard somersaulting TD run late in the game for the decisive points, and he also caught a 10-yard pass. He had 32 yards on 12 carries and a 1-yard catch at Notre Dame. He ran for 216 yards on 18 carries (a 12.0 average) with 2 long touchdowns (67 and 64 yards) and he had a 1-yard catch at Arizona State to earn Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Player of the Week honorable mention. He ran for 194 yards on 27 tries (7.2 average) with 3 short TDs (5, 1, 1 yards, with the last 2 coming to seal the victory) and he caught 3 passes for 39 yards against Arizona to earn CollegeSportsMadness.com Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week and Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Player of the Week honorable mention honors. He rushed for 142 yards on 25 tries with a TD (a 22-yard cutback run) and added a 6-yard catch at Colorado. He ran for a game-best 122 yards on a then-career-high 28 carries, with 2 short TDs, and also caught a 22-yard pass against UCLA to earn Rose Bowl Game Pac-12 Player of the Week and Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Player of the Week honorable mention. He had a game-best 140 yards on a carer-high 30 carries with 2 TDs (1 and 8 yards) and he added a 6-yard reception against Stanford in the Pac-12 Championship Game. He ran for 64 yards on 19 carries with a 1-yard TD against Ohio State in the Cotton Bowl.

2016: After making quite an impression with his record-breaking showing in 2015 as a rookie, Jones was made an even bigger impact as a sophomore tailback in 2016. Overall in 2016 while appearing in all 13 games and starting the final 6 regular season games, he ran for a team-best 1,082 yards on 177 carries (6.1 avg) with 12 TDs and had 11 caches for 76 yards (6.9 avg) with 1 TD. His 1,082 rushing yards in 2016 marked the 29th time a Trojan eclipsed the 1,000-yard season rushing mark and ranks 27th on USC's season list. He had 4 100-yard rushing games in 2016, all in the last 5 regular-season contests. He ran for a TD in each of the last 7 games and had 4 multi-TD games in 2016. He made the **2016 Campus Insiders Sophomore All-American honorable mention, All-Pac-12 second team and Phil Steele All-Pac-12 second team**. He won **USC's 2016 Jack Oakie "Rise and Shine" Award** (most electrifying run).

He had 46 yards on 7 carries and caught a 2-yard pass against Alabama. Against Utah State, he had 8 yards on 5 tries before being sidelined with bruised ribs. He rushed for 63 yards on 11 carries at Stanford, with a short scoring run. He had 15 yards on 8 rushes at Utah. He had 20 yards on 5 carries against Arizona State. He had 56 yards on 10 attempts (he also had a 9-yard reception) against Colorado. At Arizona, he got his first career start and ran for 77 yards on 16 ties (with a 5-yard TD) and he had a 7-yard reception. Against California, he ran for a career-high 223 yards on 18 carries (12.4 average) with a 37-yard TD (along with non-scoring bursts of 61 and 42 yards), the most rushing yards by a Trojan since Allen Bradford also had 223 against Washington in 2010 and the second most by a USC sophomore behind Shawn Walters' 234 in 1994 versus Stanford (he also had 2 catches for 18 yards, including a 16-yard score) to earn Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Player of the Week honorable mention. Against Oregon, he tied a USC game record by rushing for 4 touchdowns (23, 3, 66, 1 yards) to become the 14th Trojan to do so (most recently, LenDale White versus Arizona in 2005) while he gained a game-best 171 yards on a career-high 20 carries (8.6 yards per rush) and, combined with his 223 yards in the previous game, his 2-game rushing total of 394 yards was the most in consecutive games by a Trojan since Reggie Bush's 554 in 2005 versus Fresno State and UCLA (he also caught 2 passes for 26 yards) and thereby earning Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Player of the Week honorable mention. At Washington, he had a game-best 94 yards on a career-high 23 carries, with a 4-yard TD. He had a game-best 121 yards on 18 carries with 2 TDs (1 and 60 yards, with the second coming on third-and-1) and he caught a 5-yard pass at UCLA. He ran for 134 yards on 16 carries (8.4 average per rush), including a 51-yard TD, against Notre Dame. He ran for 55 yards on 20 carries, with a short TD, and added 2 catches for 3 yards against Penn State (he wore jersey #4 in honor of late USC tailback Joe McKnight).

2015: Jones made an immediate impact as an often-used backup first-year freshman tailback in 2015. Overall in 2015 while appearing in all 14 games, he had a team-best 987 yards on 153 carries (6.5 avg) with 8 TDs and 7 receptions for 39 yards (5.6 avg) with 1 TD. He joined LenDale White as the only true freshmen to lead USC in rushing in a season (White did so in 2003). His 987 rushing yards broke Heisman Trophy winner Charles White's 39-year-old USC freshman season rushing record (858 yards in 1976). He was 18th nationally in yards per carry (6.5, second in Pac-12). He made **2015 All-Pac-12 honorable mention** and **Phil Steele All-Pac-12 third team**.

He had 86 yards on 6 carries with a 44-yard TD against Arkansas State. Against Idaho, he had a team-best 83 yards on 8 carries (10.4 average) with a 1-yard TD (1 play after a 44-yard burst) and caught a 15-yard pass. He had 19 yards on 6 attempts and a 5-yard reception against Stanford. He had a team-best 54 yards on 10 carries at Arizona State. He had 8 carries for 65 yards with a short TD against Washington. He had a team-best 73 yards on 6 carries (with a 65-yard run) at Notre Dame. He had a game-best 73 yards on 15 carries (with an 18-yard TD) versus Utah. He had a game-best 80 yards on 11 carries, with a 13-yard TD, at California. He set the USC freshman game rushing yardage record as he ran for 177 yards on 19 carries (breaking LenDale White's 2003 mark by 37 yards), with a 74-yard TD burst, and he also caught a 5-yard scoring pass against Arizona to earn Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Player of the Week honorable mention and USC's Jack Oakie "Rise and Shine" Award (for longest run from scrimmage). He had 61 yards on 19 tries and he caught a pass for no yards at Colorado. He had 56 yards on 14 carries (with a 12-yard TD run) and he also had a reception for minus 1 yard at Oregon. He had 63 yards on 17 tries versus UCLA to set the USC freshman season rushing yardage record and he also had a 3-yard reception. Against Stanford in the Pac-12 Championship Game, he had 50 yards on 6 tries with a 27-yard TD. He had 47 yards on 8 carries and a 12-yard reception against Wisconsin.

TRACK: He sprinted briefly for USC's track team in the spring of 2016. In his only appearance, he ran the third leg on USC's victorious 400-meter relay team in the UCLA Dual (the quartet clocked 39.89).

HIGH SCHOOL: He made **2014 Prep Star All-American Dream Team and USA Today All-Texas** as a senior running back at McKinney (Tex.) North High. He ran for 2,009 yards (8.4 avg) with 28 TDs as a senior in 2014.

As a junior in 2013, he ran for 2,406 yards (9.9 avg) with 39 TDs.

He had 520 rushing yards (7.2 avg) with 9 TDs as a 2012 sophomore. He had 4,935 yards (8.9 avg) and 76 TD on the ground in his 3-year career.

He also sprinted for McKinney North's track team, with bests of 10.37 in the 100 meters (he won his district championships in 2015) and 21.98 in the 200 meters.

PERSONAL: He is a communication major at USC. His grandfather, Charles Dockery, was on the track team at Texas Southern in the mid-1960s.

CAREER: He has 49 tackles (2.5 for losses) and a deflection in his career. He has appeared in 40 games in his career.

2017: Lopes saw significant time while appearing in all 14 games as a backup safety and on special teams as a senior in 2017. Overall in 2017, he had 26 tackles (1 for a loss of 2 yards) and a deflection. He made **2017 All-Pac-12 second team (as a special teams player) and was USC's Co-Special Teams Player of the Year.** He had 5 tackles (1 for a loss) at Colorado, 4 tackles against Arizona, 3 tackles versus UCLA, 2 stops against Stanford, Notre Dame and Arizona State and 1 each against Western Michigan, Washington State, Utah and Stanford in the Pac-12 Championship Game.

CAREER: He has 109 receptions for 1,287 yards (11.8 avg) with 11 TDs in his career, plus 5 kickoff returns for 91 yards (18.2 avg), 2 punt returns for 2 yards (1.0 avg) and 3 carries for 7 yards (2.3 avg). His 109 receptions is 25th on USC's career list. He has appeared in 42 games in his career, with 18 starts.

2017: The fleet Mitchell bounced back from a 2016 knee injury and once again was a key component of USC's wide receiver corps as a senior in 2017. Overall in 2017 while appearing in 12 games (all but Cal and Washington State) and starting 7 of those (Western Michigan, Stanford, Texas, Oregon State, Utah, Notre Dame, UCLA), he had 41 catches (third on USC) for 644 yards (15.7 avg) with 4 TDs and also had a 10-yard run. He suffered a groin injury against Texas and missed the next 2 games (California, Washington State). He made 2017 All-Pac-12 honorable mention and Phil Steele All-Pac-12 third team. He won USC's Chris Carlisle Courage Award. He was invited to play in the NFLPA Collegiate Bowl. He was limited in 2017 spring drills while recuperating from the knee injury.

He had 4 catches for 39 yards against Western Michigan, 4 catches for 94 yards with 2 scores (22 and 25 yards) versus Stanford and 6 catches for 90 yards against Texas. He had 4 catches for 46 yards at Washington State, 5 grabs for 64 yards versus Utah and 7 catches for 71 yards with a 5-yard TD at Notre Dame. He caught a 27-yard TD against Arizona, had 4 grabs for 91 yards at Colorado, 4 catches for 56 yards and a 10-yard rush against UCLA and 2 receptions for 26 against Stanford in the Pac-12 Championship Game.

2016: Mitchell was making a vital contribution at wide receiver as a junior in 2016 before a mid-season left knee injury ended his season. Overall in 2016 while appearing in USC's first 7 games and starting 3 times (Alabama, Arizona State, Colorado), he had 24 catches for 226 yards (9.4 avg) with 1 TD, 5 kickoff returns for 91 yards (18.2 avg), a 1-yard punt return and 2 carries for minus 3 yards (minus 1.5 avg).

He had 4 receptions for 22 yards against Alabama, 5 grabs for 5 yards (with a short TD) versus Utah State, 5 catches for 55 yards at Stanford, 2 grabs for 45 yards along with 3 kickoff returns for 58 yards at Utah, 2 catches for 17 yards, returned a kickoff 32 yards and had 2 carries for minus 3 yards against Arizona State, 6 catches for 63 yards against Colorado, a 19-yard catch, a 1-yard kickoff return and a 1-yard punt return before suffering a season-ending knee injury at Arizona.

2015: Mitchell was an often-employed wide receiver as a sophomore in 2015. Overall in 2015 while appearing in 12 games (all but Notre Dame and Utah) and starting 6 times (Arkansas State, Idaho, Arizona State, Washington, Oregon, Stanford), he had 37 receptions (second on USC) for 335 yards (9.1 avg) with 4 TDs and he returned a punt for 1 yard (1.0 avg). He sprained his ankle against Washington and missed the Notre Dame and Utah games.

He had 4 catches for 28 yards with a 14-yard score against Arkanas State, 2 grabs for 16 yards and a 1-yard punt return against Idaho and 3 catches for 12 yards with a pair of short TDs against Stanford. He had 4 catches for 66 yards with a 27-yard TD against Arizona State and 2 catches for 3 yards against Washington. He had 62 receptions for 1,100 yards (17.7 avg.) with 13 TDs, plus he ran for 202 yards with 5 TDs in 2012.

As a 2011 junior, he made Cal-Hi Sports All-State Underclass first team and Los Angeles Daily News All-Area first team while catching 50 passes for 1,006 yards (20.1 avg.), running for 312 yards and scoring 19 TDs (11 receiving, 5 rushing, 1 kickoff return, 1 punt return and 1 interception).
