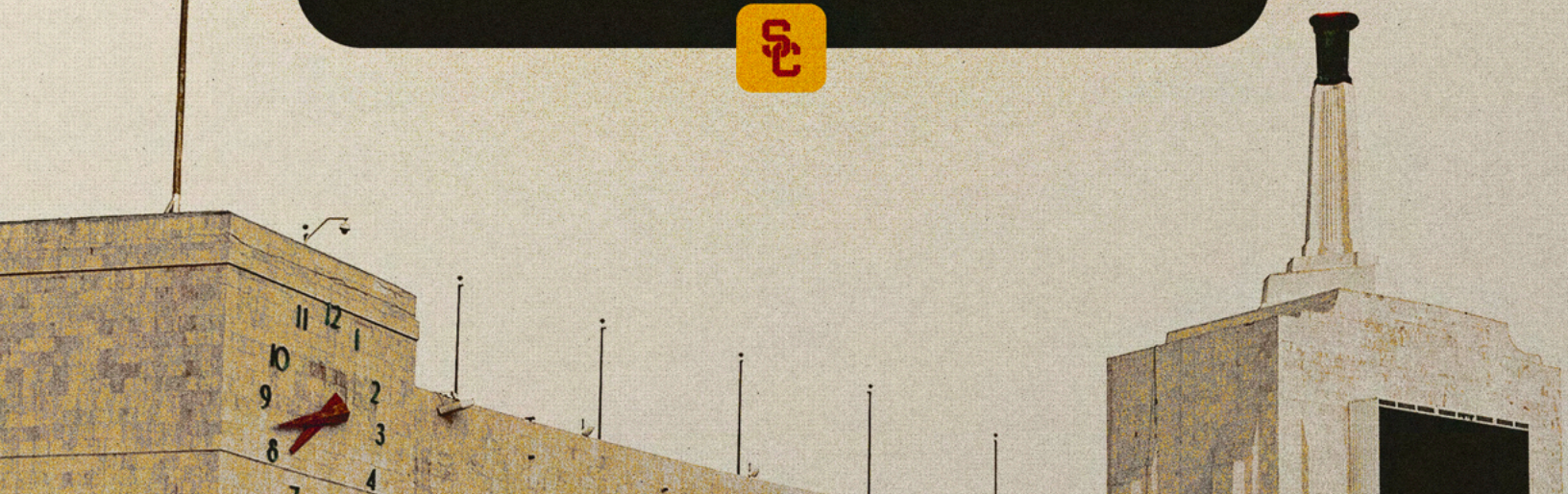

**2025 USC SPRING FOOTBALL OUTLOOK**

In the late night hours on Dec. 27, 2024, the Trojans danced to the sounds of cheers and Elvis Presley music under a shower of cardinal and gold confetti.

Marking the biggest comeback in USC bowl game history, the Trojans concluded the season with a dramatic 17-point comeback victory defeating Texas A&M 35-31.

"In some ways it was kind of a poetic ending to the season," said USC head coach Lincoln Riley. "I'm incredibly proud of this group. The resiliency that they've shown. I told them there's a toughness and a hardness developing in this program right now. You can look at a lot of different points throughout this season and certainly tonight and you see that. I have a lot of excitement about that. Our motto is 'Fight On!', and this team really embodies that."

With an exclamation point to close out the season (and yes, the Trojans were 2-0 against the SEC in 2024), the USC football team and the Trojan faithful eagerly look ahead to 2025.

And sometimes in the surge forward, one must take a glance back to the past.

The Trojans can look back to the 2002 team for inspiration. While most of the USC roster was not yet born, this iconic Trojan team, led by Carson Palmer and Troy Polamalu, could serve as motivation for the season ahead. USC entered a season coming off a 6-loss campaign. That Trojan squad rebounded by going 11-2, capturing the league title and winning the Orange Bowl.

The 2025 USC team certainly has the elements to put together a similarly successful run.

Now in those 23 years, the college football landscape has changed dramatically. From NIL to the transfer portal, college football has become increasingly more complex than ever before. Riley spent the entire offseason ensuring that the program would be taking the correct steps forward into the new age of college football.

"We're not content with any part of this program being average or even being good. That's not our mentality," Riley said.

The Trojans welcomed Chad Savage as USC's tight ends/inside receivers coach. Savage, one of the nation's top recruiters, most recently served as the wide receivers coach/recruiting coordinator at Colorado State from 2022-24. He was named the Mountain West Recruiter of the Year by 247Sports for three consecutive seasons (2022-24). Savage primarily recruited Southern California and Arizona and was instrumental in signing over 25 players from the Greater Los Angeles area to play at Colorado State. USC made another splashy hire with NFL legend Rob Ryan as the assistant head coach for defense/linebackers coach. With over 35 years of coaching experience and two Super Bowls rings to his name, Ryan is one of the most accomplished defensive coaches in NFL history. He has coached some of the NFL's top players, including numerous Hall of Famers and All-Pro selections, and has been an NFL de-

fensive coordinator for 15 years. Finally, Trovon Reed, most recently serving as the cornerbacks coach at UCF with the reputation of an exceptional recruiter, was named USC's cornerbacks coach. A rising star in the coaching profession, Reed was the only cornerbacks coach in the nation to have two of his players compete in the 2025 Reese's Senior Bowl.

Additionally, USC brought on Chad Bowden to serve as the program's general manager. Bowden, a nationally renowned college football administrator with proven success constructing championship-caliber rosters, was recently named the 2024 FootballScoop Player Personnel Director of the Year for his outstanding roster construction and exceptional utilization of the transfer portal while the general manager for Notre Dame.

USC bolstered its personnel staff with new hires by Bolden as well as promotions from within. This internal reorganization has allowed everyone to utilize their specific roles and skillsets to chase championships together.

"Our coaches are still certainly going to have a big role in evaluating and certainly going to still have a big role in recruiting," said Riley. "But [Bowden's] department is going to spearhead scouting. It's going to have a heavy role in recruiting. It's going to have a heavy role in how we construct our roster. It's going to have a heavy role in our salary cap and how we manage that, how we strategize...there's a lot of synergy but there's also separate responsibilities, and it really is going to be kind of its own department within our program. And we wanted to build a team of people that allows us to operate at a higher level where we can evaluate more players, we can recruit more players efficiently and we can manage the roster. We can take a few things off of the coaches so the coaches can really dive heavily into coaching and developing our team and allow our people in personnel, scouting and recruiting to do their jobs at a high level."

As USC moves into the new era of college football, Riley knows that these moves will propel the Trojans to the top.

"I fully believe when it's all said and done -- and I don't say this lightly -- I think it's going to be the best personnel, off-the-field staff in the country," said Riley.

2025 SCHEDULE

After its first season with new opponents, new travel and new stadiums, USC enters its second season in the Big Ten.

The Trojans will play seven home games in 2025. Troy will welcome league opponents Michigan State, Michigan, Northwestern, Iowa and UCLA to the Coliseum as well as non-conference foes Missouri State and Georgia Southern. USC will visit Purdue, Illinois, Notre Dame, Nebraska and Oregon on the road.

USC will have byes on Oct. 4 and Oct. 25.

The **Missouri State** Bears will visit the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum to open the 2025 football season on Aug. 30, 2025. While Missouri State is currently in its final year in the Missouri Valley Football Conference (FCS), it will officially join Conference USA for the 2025-26 athletic season, thus making it an FBS program. This will be the first time ever that USC has faced Missouri State.

The Trojans then welcome **Georgia Southern** of the Sun Belt Conference to Los Angeles on Sept. 6. The Eagles, who are coached by former USC head coach Clay Helton, are another new opponent for the Trojans.

USC opens Big Ten Conference play on the road at **Purdue** on Sept. 13. The Trojans are 3-1 all-time against the Boilermakers, last facing them in 1998 when USC won 27-17 in the Coliseum. The Trojans then return home to the Coliseum to host **Michigan State** on Sept. 20. USC is tied 4-4 in its series with Michigan State, last falling to the Spartans 16-17 in the 1990 John Hancock Bowl in El Paso, Texas. The Trojans wrap up the month of September by traveling to Champaign, Ill. on Sept. 27 to challenge the Fighting Illini. USC holds an 11-2 record all-time against **Illinois**, last defeating them in the 2008 Rose Bowl 49-17.

After enjoying a bye-week on Oct. 4, USC hosts **Michigan** in the Coliseum on Oct. 11. The Trojans lead 6-5 all-time in their series with the Wolverines, most recently falling to them 24-27 in Ann Arbor, Mich. in 2024. Michigan has not played in the Coliseum since 1957, when the Wolverines defeated the Trojans 16-6. USC then travels to South Bend, Ind. to challenge **Notre Dame** on Oct. 18. The Trojans are 37-52-5 all-time against the Fighting Irish (not including Troy's 2005 victory that was later vacated due to NCAA penalty; original record: 38-52-5). USC will then take its second bye of the season on Oct. 25 to prepare for its final five-game stretch of the regular season.

USC will kick off the month of November with a trip to Lincoln, Neb. to challenge the Cornhuskers on Nov. 1. USC is 5-0-1 against **Nebraska** and is 2-0 versus the Cornhuskers on the road. The Trojans return to Los Angeles to host **Northwestern** on Nov. 8. USC remains undefeated against the Wildcats boasting a 5-0 record, having last faced them in the 1956 Rose Bowl where the Trojans secured a 41-32 victory. Another home game awaits the Trojans as USC welcomes **Iowa** to the Coliseum on Nov. 15. USC is 7-3 all-time against the Hawkeyes, most recently falling to them 24-39 in the 2019 Holiday Bowl. A familiar road trip looms as the Trojans travel north to Eugene, Ore. to take on the reigning Big Ten champions, the **Oregon Ducks** on Nov. 22. USC holds a 38-23-2 all-time lead in its series with Oregon (not including 1 win vacated due to NCAA penalty; original record: 39-23-2), last falling to the Ducks 27-36 in Autzen Stadium in 2023. USC wraps Big Ten play by challenging crosstown rival **UCLA** on Nov. 29 at the Coliseum. USC leads its series with UCLA, 51-34-7 (not including Troy's 2004 and 2005 victories that were vacated due to NCAA penalty; original record: 53-34-7).

The 2025 season will conclude with the annual **Big Ten Football Championship Game** on Dec.

6, which will feature the top two teams in the overall conference standings at the end of the regular season, with the winner earning the Big Ten Championship. Tiebreaking procedures will be announced at a later date.

ROSTER

In all, 73 USC squad men return from 2024 (including 45 who saw action), 18 having started at least once last season. Joining them will be 15 promising true freshmen and 13 highly-regarded transfers who enrolled at USC for the spring semester and will participate in spring practice. Another 8 outstanding newcomers will become Trojans in the fall.

OFFENSE

Lincoln Riley's dynamic and high-powered offense will no doubt continue to pose a threat to opponent defenses. With a variety of weapons at his disposal, expect Riley's brand of creative and heart-stopping plays to be on full display under the lights in the Coliseum.

QUARTERBACKS

The USC quarterback position is unlike any other in the country. The prestige, the fame and the pressure all come with being named QB1 at USC. Additionally, these quarterbacks have the honor of working with the game's best quarterback whisperer, **Lincoln Riley**. Riley has developed 3 of the last 8 Heisman Trophy winners, and in addition to being the only head coach to tutor three Heisman Trophy winning quarterbacks, Riley is the only coach to have 3 quarterbacks selected No. 1 overall in the NFL Draft and has the most No. 1 overall draft selections in the common draft era. Additionally, offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach **Luke Huard** has proved himself as an integral part of the development of the Trojan offense, as well as an outstanding recruiter.

Redshirt junior **Jayden Maiava** returns after starting USC's last four games with a 3-1 record as the starter (including defeating crosstown rival UCLA and SEC opponent Texas A&M). Last season, Maiava went 101-of-169 (.598) for 1,201 yards and 11 TDs with 6 INTs. He also rushed for 45 yards on 20 carries with 4 TDs.

The Trojans signed the No. 1 quarterback in the state of California and one of the nation's top prospects in five-star freshman **Husan Longstreet** from Centennial (Calif.) HS. He was rat-

ed as the No. 3 quarterback in the country by On3, No. 4 by 247Sports and ESPN and No. 8 by Rivals, and the No. 13 player in the nation regardless of position. The 2025 Polynesian Bowl All-Star helped Centennial to reach the CIF-SS semifinals. He was named to the MaxPreps 2024 California All-State First Team. Longstreet enrolled "extra early" to join the Trojans for the Las Vegas Bowl in December and was allowed to practice with the team.

From the portal, USC welcomes redshirt senior **Sam Huard**, who has previous stops at Utah, Cal Poly and Washington. Huard, USC offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Luke Huard's nephew, was one of the nation's top prospects coming out of high school. While Cal Poly's starting quarterback in 2023, he broke numerous program records and worked his way up the statistical leaderboard.

Redshirt junior **Gage Roy**, redshirt sophomore **Dylan Gebbia** and redshirt freshman **Jack Stupin** also return to round out the quarterback room.

WIDE RECEIVERS

With their electric playmaking abilities and flashy moves, the USC wide receivers never fall short of entertaining the Trojan fans. Led by assistant head coach / wide receivers / pass game coordinator **Dennis Simmons**, a multiple Biletnikoff-winning coach, and inside receivers coach **Chad Savage**, an intense recruiter and proven coach, the Trojan wideouts are in good hands.

USC welcomes back junior **Makai Lemon** who should once again prove to be one of the nation's top playmakers. Lemon, an All-Big Ten Third Team selection, was USC's most versatile player of the 2024 season. The 2025 Biletnikoff candidate recorded a team-leading 52 receptions for a team-leading 764 yards (14.7 avg.) and 3 TDs. Lemon also fielded kickoff returns, recording 19 returns for 514 yards (27.1 avg.) with a long of 80 yards. He finished the season

ranked No. 6 in the nation in kickoff returns and will be a serious contender for a Paul Hornung Award in 2025. Lemon was also a crucial member of the punt coverage team downing punts for Ray Guy winner, Eddie Czaplicki.

Fellow junior **Ja'Kobi Lane** also returns for the 2025 season. In 2024, Lane was No. 5 in the nation in receiving TDs as he led the Trojans with a whopping 12, just 4 shy of USC single-season record of 16 held by Mike Williams (2002) and Dwayne Jarrett (2005). Lane, a fellow 2025 Biletnikoff candidate, recorded 42 receptions for 525 yards (12.2 avg.) last season.

Senior **Jay Fair** (8 catches for 78 yards [9.75 avg.] and 1 TD), redshirt senior **Jaden Richardson** (1 reception for 19 yards [19.0 avg.]) and redshirt senior **Josiah Zamora** (1 KOR for 17 yards [17.0 avg.]) all look to have increased roles next season.

Redshirt seniors **Asante Das** (1 game) and **Donovan Wood** and untested redshirt freshmen **Collin Fasse**, **Xavier Jordan**, **Brady Jung** and **Seth Zamora** also make up the USC wideout unit.

The Trojans welcomed junior transfer **Prince Strachan** from Boise State. In his 2-year career at Boise State (2023-24), Strachan recorded 37 receptions for 578 yards (15.6 avg.) and 3 TDs while appearing in 28 games with 7 starts. He looks to immediately compete for playing time.

Additionally, freshman **Corey Simms** out of Christian Brothers College (Mo.) HS enrolled in January at USC. Simms, a four-star recruit, was rated as the No. 2 player in the state of Missouri by Rivals, No. 4 by 247Sports and No. 6 by On3 and ESPN. He was touted as the No. 19 wide receiver in the country by Rivals, No. 58 by ESPN, No. 80 by On3 and No. 81 by 247Sports. He was 117th on the Rivals 250 List. Simms helped Christian Brothers go 10-2 overall and 4-0 in district play in 2024 and was an All-State selection in 2023.

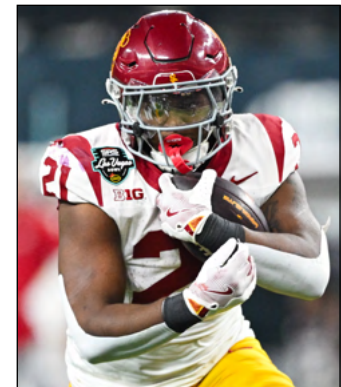
RUNNING BACKS

While USC loses an exceptional playmaker in running back Woody Marks, the young Trojans in the room, with the help of some exciting transfers, look to make the running back unit a strength of the USC offense. **Anthony Jones Jr.** returns in 2025 to lead the Trojan backfield.

Sophomore **Bryan Jackson** is back for his second season after having his break out game in front of the nation during USC's victory in the 2024 Las Vegas Bowl recording 16 carries for 66 yards and 1 TD as he bulldozed his way through the Texas A&M defense. Throughout the season, he tallied 36 carries for 188 yards (5.2 avg.) and 1 TD. Redshirt sophomore **A'Marion Peterson** (16 carries for 65 yards [4.1 avg.] and 1 TD) also returns and looks for an increased role in 2025.

USC bolsters its running back room with two experienced transfers. Junior **Waymond Jordan** won the 2024 JUCOWeekly Trophy, the equivalent of the Heisman Trophy at the junior college level. He was named the 2024 NJCAA DI Football Offensive Player of the Year after leading Hutchinson CC to win the 2024 NJCAA DI Football Championship. Jordan rushed for 1,614 yards on 218 carries (7.4 avg.) while averaging 134.5 yards per game with 20 TDs through 12 games. He finished out the 2024 season first in the nation in yards, yards per game and touchdowns, while also finishing fourth in the nation in yards per rush with 7.4. He also recorded 6 receptions for 43 yards (7.2 avg.) and 1 TD. He was named 2024 NJCAA DI Football First Team All-American and to the 2024 All-Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference First Team.

Redshirt senior **Eli Sanders** arrives at Troy after stops at New Mexico and Iowa State. In his 4-year career (3 seasons at New Mexico and 1 at Iowa State), Sanders has recorded 305 carries for 1,766 yards (5.8 avg.) with a long of 75 and 13 TDs through 33 games. He has also tallied 30 receptions for 268 yards (8.9 avg.) with a long of 31 and 1 TD. Additionally, he had 5 kickoff returns for 113 yards (22.6 avg.) with a long of 32.

TIGHT ENDS

With a new leader in coach **Chad Savage**, the Trojan tight end unit boasts experienced talent and depth entering 2025.

Redshirt senior **Lake McRee** returns as the leader of the room. In 2024, he recorded 24 receptions for 245 yards (10.2 avg.) through 10 games with 9 starts. He will remain a vital part of the Trojan offense.

Sophomore **Walker Lyons** looks to once again contribute for the Trojans. After a strong freshman debut with 6 receptions for 36 yards (6.0) with 11 appearances and 3 starts, Lyons looks to increase his role next season.

Untested redshirt freshman **Walter Matthews** and redshirt freshman **Joey Olsen** (who saw action in 1 game) both look to gain valuable reps this spring.

Redshirt junior **Carson Tabaracci** works to find his way back to the field after a season-ending injury sidelined him in 2024.

Freshman **Tanielia Tupou** from Folsom (Calif.) HS enrolled at USC in January and will participate in spring ball. Tupou, a three-star recruit, played tight end and edge in high school, but will focus on tight end at the collegiate level. He was rated as the No. 52 player in the state of California by 247Sports, No. 53 by Rivals, No. 67 by ESPN and No. 92 by On3. He was touted as the No. 36 edge in the nation by Rivals, No. 45 by 247Sports, No. 76 by ESPN and No. 146 by On3. In 2024, he helped Folsom win the San Joaquin Section Division 1 Championship.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Zach Hanson, who has coached multiple NFL offensive line draft selections, steps in to lead the Trojan trenches. The USC offensive line unit returns 3 Trojans who have at least 1 game of starting experience. USC will miss the veteran presence of four-year starter and captain **Jonah Monheim** who departs for the NFL Draft.

Redshirt sophomore **Elijah Paige** returns as the most experienced player of the group. The 2024 Freshman All-American and Big Ten Honorable Mention started in all 13 games at left tackle. Junior **Alani Noa** also returns as an experienced starter after seeing action in 13 games with 12 starts at right guard. Paige and Noa were crucial to the success of the USC offense this season. USC finished the regular season ranked No. 10 in the nation in passing offense (291.9) and No. 1 in the Big Ten and No. 23 in the nation in total offense (437.2) and second in the Big Ten.

Redshirt junior **Kilian O'Connor** (saw action in 9 games with 1 start), redshirt sophomore **Micah Banuelos** (saw action in 2 games), redshirt sophomore **Tobias Raymond** (saw action in 13 games with 1 start) and redshirt freshman **Justin Tauanuu** (saw action in 2 games) each bring playing experience to build off of this spring.

Untested redshirt freshman **Makai Saina**, redshirt sophomore **Erwin Taomi** and redshirt freshman **Hayden Treter** look to gain experience heading into the 2025 season.

Redshirt freshman **Kaylon Miller** and redshirt sophomore **Jack Susnjar**, who each saw action in 2 games, also make up the Trojan offensive line.

USC welcomes 2 transfers and 4 early enrollee freshmen to the Trojan offensive trenches.

Redshirt senior **J'Onne Reed** who transferred

to USC in the spring of 2025 from Syracuse, looks to compete for playing time at center as a redshirt senior in 2025. In his 2-year career at Syracuse (2023-24), he appeared and started in 25 games. Redshirt senior **DJ Wingfield** started on the offensive line in all 12 games at right guard as a redshirt senior in 2024 at Purdue. Both bring needed experience to the Trojan offensive line room.

Freshman **Aaron Dunn**, a four-star recruit out of Spanish Fork (Utah) HS, was ranked as the No. 76 player in the nation by ESPN and No. 150 by 247Sports. He was rated as the No. 2 player in the state of Utah by On3, 247Sports and ESPN and the No. 4 player by Rivals. He was touted as the No. 9 offensive tackle in the country by ESPN, No. 17 by 247Sports, No. 24 by On3 and No. 33 by Rivals. He was 76th on the ESPN 300 and No. 147 on the Top 247 List. Most of his snaps in high school were at right tackle, but he also took reps on the left. He helped Spanish Ford reach the 4A State Championship game.

Freshman **Alex Payne** from Gainesville (Ga.) HS, also a four-star recruit, was ranked as the No. 124 player in the nation by 247Sports, No. 159 by ESPN and No. 194 by Rivals. He was rated as the No. 17 player in the state of Georgia by 247Sports, No. 25 by Rivals, No. 27 by ESPN and No. 30 by On3. He was touted as the No. 16 offensive tackle in the nation by 247Sports, No. 19 by Rivals, No. 21 by ESPN, and No. 22 by On3. He was 124th on the Top247 List, 159th on the ESPN 300 List, 163rd on the On300 and 195th on the Rivals 250. Prior to his senior season, he was named to the 2024 Recruit Georgia Preseason All-State Class 5A Team, the 2024 Georgia High School Football Daily Class 5A Preseason All-State Team and the 2024 The Atlanta Journal-Constitution Preseason All-State Team.

Local product from South Orange County, four star **Elijah Vaikona** out of Santa Margarita Catholic (Calif.) HS was rated as the No. 38 player in the state of California by Rivals No. 41 by On3, No. 63 by ESPN and No. 90 by 247Sports. He was touted as the No. 40 offensive tackle in the country by Rivals, No. 52 by On3, No. 76 by ESPN and No. 78 by 247Sports.

Freshman **Willi Wascher** of Bellevue (Wash.) HS was rated as the No. 4 player in the state of Washington by Rivals, No. 10 by 247Sports and No. 15 by On3 and ESPN. He was touted as the No. 15 interior offensive lineman in the nation

by ESPN, No. 30 by Rivals, No. 82 by 247Sports and No. 149 by On3. Wascher, a four-year starter at Bellevue, helped his team reach the 2024 Washington 3A State Championship game.

DEFENSE

After completely rehauling the defensive coaching staff with defensive coordinator **D'Anton Lynn** at the helm, the USC defense made a massive improvement from 2023 to 2024. Under Lynn, a Broyles Award nominee, USC held opponents to an average of just 24.1 points per game, improving from 34.4 in 2023. The Trojans finished the 2024 season ranked No. 21 in the nation and No. 2 in the Big Ten Conference in third-down conversion percentage defense (0.335), compared to ranking No. 106 (0.436) in 2023. USC's defense improved in a variety of other statistical categories including ranking No. 33 in passes intercepted (12) and No. 53 in rushing defense (141.2) in 2024. The Trojan defense ranked No. 58 in turnovers gained by collecting 18 throughout the season and ranked No. 69 in red zone defense (0.830) in 2024. USC finished ranked No. 70 in team passing efficiency defense (132.50), improved to No. 77 in total defense (377.1) and was No. 86 in the nation in first downs defense (262) in 2024. The Trojans concluded the season with a 35-31 victory over Texas A&M in the Las Vegas Bowl. The win marked the biggest comeback victory in Las Vegas Bowl history. Additionally, it was the largest deficit that USC has ever overcome in a bowl game win, with the previous being a 15-point deficit against Penn State in the 2017 Rose Bowl.

With the addition of two new coaches as well as a variety of experienced players and young talent, the Trojans look to build on this solid foundation going into 2025.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

The defensive line received a dose of DAWG-WORK as **Eric Henderson** took over the unit in 2024.

Redshirt junior **Devan Thompkins** had a breakout season in 2024 and looks to be a standout on the defensive line. He recorded 24 tackles, including 2.5 for loss of 10 yards (with 1.5 sacks for minus 9 yards) and 3 PBUs. Redshirt senior **Kobe Pepe** returns as a veteran in the trenches after collecting 19 tackles and 1 PBU in 2024.

After seeing action in 10 games and recording 7 tackles in his freshman debut, sophomore **Jide Abasiri** looks to build on that foundation in 2025.

Redshirt freshman **Ratumana Bulabalavu** (1 game) and untested redshirt freshmen **Carlton Jones** and **Brendan Cho** and redshirt junior **Kash Amos** look to increase their roles in 2025.

USC also welcomed freshmen **Floyd Boucard** (a Canadian from Montreal, Quebec who was a top recruit out of Miami Central [Fla.] HS) and **Cash Jacobsen** (the No. 12 player in the state of Oklahoma by 247Sports out of Jenks [Okla.] HS).

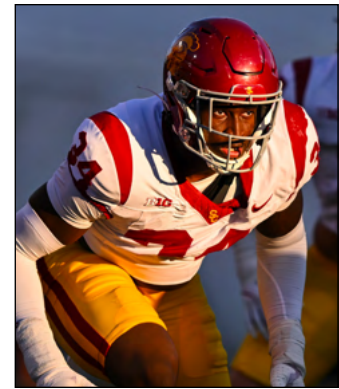

DEFENSIVE ENDS

Under the tutelage of **Shaun Nua**, the USC defensive ends have developed some young talent ready to burst onto the scene in 2025.

Senior **Anthony Lucas** will return as the most veteran of the group. After appearing in 7 games before a season-ending injury, he tallied 16 tackles and 1 PBU. Lucas looks to return to the field for fall camp.

Junior **Braylan Shleby** emerged as one of the Trojans' most fearsome defenders. After collecting 28 tackles, including 5 for loss of 22 yards (with 3 sacks for minus 14 yards), 2 QB hurries and 1 PBU, he made a critical impact on the Trojan defense and looks to bring that same energy in 2025.

After appearing in the Utah State game to start the season, sophomore **Kameryn Fountain** burst onto the scene and saw action in USC's last 7 games and tallied 19 tackles, including 4.5 for loss (with 2 sacks for minus 5 yards) and 1 QB hurry.

Redshirt freshman **Elijah Newby** (5 games and 2 tackles), redshirt freshman **Lorenzo Cowan** and redshirt junior **Garrett Pomerantz** each look to expand their roles in 2025.

USC signed the No. 1 defensive lineman in the nation in freshman **Jahkeem Stewart** out of Edna Carr (La.) HS. Stewart, one of the nation's top recruits, was rated as the No. 1 player in the state of Louisiana by ESPN and Rivals and No. 2 by On3 and 247Sports and was rated as the No. 8 player in the nation by Rivals, No. 11 by ESPN and No. 25 by On3. Before reclassifying, Stewart was the No.1 overall player in the 2026 class. He was named a 2024 MaxPreps Preseason Junior All-American, a 2024 MaxPreps Preseason All-American and 2024 PRZLA Preseason All-State honoree. Stewart had a highly productive 2023 sophomore campaign at St. Augustine with 85 tackles, including 33 for loss (with 20 sacks), 6 forced fumbles and 2 fumble recoveries. He was named to the 2023 All District 5A-9 First Team, the 2023 MaxPreps Sophomore All-American First Team and was a 2023 Louisiana Sportswriters Association 5A All-State Honorable Mention.

The Trojan linebackers will have no shortage of energy with **Rob Ryan** leading the room. The linebackers will miss the vocal leadership and veteran presence of Easton Mascarenas-Arnold and Mason Cobb, but some familiar faces return.

Trojan fans will be excited for redshirt senior **Eric Gentry** to hit the field again in 2025. With his unique 6-foot-6 frame, Gentry provides opponent offenses with a tough challenge to gameplan against. He redshirted after appearing in four games and returned for the Las Vegas Bowl versus Texas A&M at the end of the season. In 2024, Gentry totaled 33 tackles, including 6.5 for loss of 17 yards (with 2 sacks for minus 11 yards), 1 forced fumble, 1 PBU and 1 QB hurry.

After the junior college eligibility rules were revised, redshirt senior **DeCarlos Nicholson** was able to secure another season of eligibility and return to Troy for one final year. In 2024, he recorded 27 tackles and 5 PBUs. USC also welcomes back redshirt senior **Prophet Brown** (11 tackles and 1 PBU) who looks to be a leader among the cornerbacks.

Redshirt freshman **Braylon Conley** (1 tackle, including 0.5 for loss of 3 yards), redshirt freshman **Marcelles Williams** (1 tackle, including 1 for loss of 1 yard, and 1 PBU) and untested redshirt freshman **Isaiah Rubin** look to gain valuable reps this spring to increase their roles in 2025.

Redshirt freshman punter **Ryon Sayeri** saw his first action in the 2024 Las Vegas Bowl when Czaplicki suffered an injury. He recorded 1 punt for 57 yards and is ready to compete this spring.

Also available is untested punter redshirt junior **Rey Sanchez**.

KICKERS

The Trojans lose the consistent Michael Lantz at kicker, but welcome a sophomore transfer from UNLV. **Caden Chittenden** was one the nation's top kickers as a freshman at UNLV in 2024. He won a plethora of awards including being named First Team True Freshman All-American by 247Sports, Second Team Freshman All-American by The Athletic, College Football Network Honorable Mention All-American, College Football Network Freshman Specialist of the Year, College Football Network Freshman Kicker of the Year and Mountain West Freshman of the Year. Chittenden earned placement on the All-Mountain West First Team and was the first freshman from UNLV named to the All-Mountain West First Team since 2006. He was also a semifinalist for the 2024 Lou Groza Award and a three-time Mountain West Special Teams Player of the Week, as well as a three-time Mountain West Freshman of the Week.

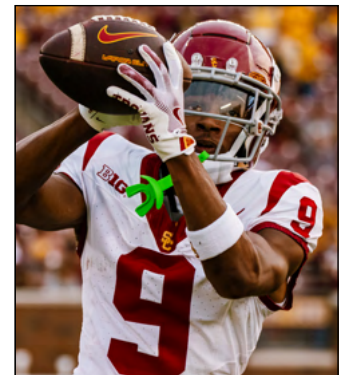

2025: Jackson will compete for playing time at running back as a sophomore in 2025.

2025: Maiava, who took over the Trojan offense at the end of the 2024 season, will compete to be USC's starting quarterback as a redshirt junior in 2025.

2024: After transferring from UNLV, Maiava took over the starting role for USC's final 4 games of the season. In 2025, he saw action in 7 games with 4 starts. Overall in 2024, he completed 101-of-169 passes (59.8%) for 1,201 yards and 11 TDs with 6 INTs, plus he rushed for 45 yards and 4 TDs. He was named to the **Polynesian Player of the Year Award Watch List**.

He hit 72.7% of his passes (8-of-11) for 66 yards with no picks against Utah State. He also ran 7 yards on 1 carry for a TD. He also recorded 1 carry for 7 yards against Wisconsin. 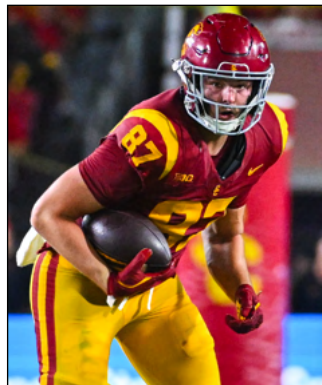

USC HEAD COACH LINCOLN RILEY



Lincoln Riley is one of the nation's most successful coaches. He's had more success by the age of 40 than any other head coach in college football history. Riley has been a head coach for 8 seasons and has developed 3 of the last

8 Heisman Trophy winners. In addition to being the only head coach to tutor three Heisman Trophy winning quarterbacks, Riley is the only coach to have 3 quarterbacks selected No. 1 overall in the NFL Draft and has the most No. 1 overall draft selections in the common draft era. From coaching 3 Heisman Trophy winners, to having a 77 percent winning record, to appearing in 3 College Football Playoffs, Lincoln Riley's coaching achievements set a standard of excellence.

And didn't take long for Riley to implement that standard at USC. In his first season as USC's head coach in 2022, the 39-year-old led the Trojans to have equaled the biggest one-season victory turnaround (+7 victories) in USC history (USC's 1962 national champs won 11 games after winning just 4 in 1961). In 2021, Troy won 4 games and in 2022, it had 11 victories. Riley tied the record for most victories by a first-year head coach (tied with John Robinson in 1976. This also ties the Pac-12 record). Riley's Trojans went 11-3 in 2022 to bring USC back to the top of the college football landscape. USC went undefeated in the Coliseum (7-0), doing so for the first time since 2017. Riley guided the Trojans to a Pac-12 Championship appearance and to a Cotton Bowl appearance. In Riley's electric offense, USC scored 579 points in 2022 compared to just 344 points scored in 2021. The Trojans finished the season nationally ranked No. 1 in turnover margin (1.57), No. 1 in turnovers lost (7), No. 1 in fumbles lost (2), No. 2 in 3rd down conversion percentage (0.536), No. 2 in passes had intercepted (5), No. 3 in first downs offense (359), No. 3 in passes intercepted (19), No. 3 in passing offense (335.4), No. 3 in scoring offense (41.4), No. 3 in team passing efficiency (169.20), No. 3 in total offense (506.6) and No. 5 in turnovers gained (29).

Riley's 2022 Trojans broke six USC records. The 2022 team now holds the USC record for most yards passing in a single season (4,696 yards in 14 games), most passes attempted in a single season (515), most touchdown passes in a single season (43), lowest percentage of passes had intercepted (0.97%, 5 in 515 attempts), most games scoring 30+ points (12) and most games scoring 40+ points (10). They also tie the USC single-game record for most touchdowns on interception returns (3 vs. Rice).

Under Riley's tutelage in 2022, quarterback Caleb Williams was named the 88th recipient of the Heisman Trophy. In addition to winning college football's most prestigious award, Williams also was named the 2022 Walter Camp Player of the Year, the 2022 AP Player of the Year, the 2022 Maxwell Award winner, the 2022 Sporting News College Football Player of the Year, the 2022 CBS Sports Player of the Year, the 2022 Action Sports Player of the Year, the 2022 CFPA National Performer of the Year and the 2022 Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year. Defensive lineman Tuli Tuipulotu was the Polynesian College Football Player of the Year, the Pac-12 De-

fensive Player of the Year, the defensive Morris Trophy winner and was a finalist for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, the Rotary Lombardi Award, the Chuck Bednarik Award, the Ted Hendricks Award, and the Lott IMPACT Trophy. Both Tuipulotu and Williams were Unanimous First Team All-Americans, USC's first since 2012. Offensive linemen Brett Neilson and Andrew Vorhees and defensive back Calen Bullock were also named First Team All-Americans. Riley's 5 First Team All-Americans were the most in a single season since 2007 when USC also had 5 first teamers. Jordan Addison, Mekhi Blackmon, Tuli Tuipulotu, Andrew Vorhees, Caleb Williams were all selected to the All-Pac-12 First Team, and Vorhees was the offensive recipient of the Morris Trophy. Four of his Trojans (Addison, Tuipulotu, Blackmon and Vorhees) were drafted in 2022. Riley was a finalist for the 2022 Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award. He threw out the first pitch at a Dodgers game in May of 2022.

His 2023 Trojans went 8-5 and 5-4 in Pac-12 play. Riley's high-powered brand of offense, led by defending Heisman Trophy winner quarterback Caleb Williams, put up points all season resulting in USC ranking No. 3 in the nation in scoring offense (41.8), No. 3 in team passing efficiency (170.88), No. 5 in passing offense (333.0) and No. 10 in total offense (467.6). Williams ranked in the national Top 20 in points responsible for per game, points responsible for, passing efficiency, passing yards per game, passing touchdowns, yards per pass attempt, total offense, passing yards, completion percentage, passing yards per completion and completions per game. He was a finalist for the Manning Award and Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award. Williams was selected as the No. 1 pick in the 2024 NFL Draft by the Chicago Bears.

Also in 2023, freshman wide receiver and electric return specialist Zachariah Branch was named USC's first-ever true freshman First Team All-American for his special teams efforts. Branch also won the Jet Award presented annually to the nation's most outstanding

return specialist. He was the first Trojan since Adoree' Jackson in 2016 to have a punt return and kickoff return for a TD, as well as at least one receiving TD in the same season. Jackson had 2 punt returns and 2 kickoff returns for TDs and 1 TD reception during the 2016 season. Since 1971 (when records are available) Branch is one of just 3 USC players to accomplish the feat, joining Jackson and Curtis Conway (1992 - 1 kickoff return TD, 1 punt return TD, 5 rec TDs). The Trojans wrapped up the season on a high-note with a thrilling Holiday Bowl victory as quarterback Miller Moss stepped in leading the Trojans to defeat No. 16 Louisville 42-28. Moss, the Holiday Bowl Offensive MVP, threw 6 touchdown passes setting the record for most touchdown passes thrown in a Holiday Bowl, most touchdown passes thrown in a USC bowl game, most touchdown passes thrown by a USC QB in his first Trojan start and tied the Pac-12 Bowl Game passing touchdown record. Wide receiver Tahj Washington also amassed 1,000 yards for the first time in his career. S Calen Bullock and RET Zachariah Branch were named to the All-Pac-12 First Team. Seven total Trojans (Williams, Washington, Calen Bullock, MarShawn Lloyd, Jarrett Kingston, Brenden Rice and Solomon Byrd) were drafted in 2024, marking the most USC players drafted since 2011.

In 2024, Riley's Trojans went 7-6, and 4-5 in USC's first season in the Big Ten Conference. USC bookended its season with victories against No. 13 LSU and a Texas A&M team that was just shy of competing in the conference championship to go 2-0 versus the SEC in 2024. All five of USC's Big Ten losses were by 7 points or less and four occurred within the last minute of the game. Offensively, the Trojans finished the season ranked in the national Top 25 in passing offense (10, 291.9), third down conversion percentage (25, 0.448), total offense (23, 437.2) and first downs offense (24, 303).

Riley completely revamped the defensive coaching staff prior to the 2024 season by bringing on DC D'Anton Lynn and a powerhouse

crew with unparalleled experience. In just one season, the Trojan defense significantly improved. USC held opponents to an average of just 24.1 points per game, improving from 34.4 in 2023. The Trojans finished the 2024 season ranked No. 21 in the nation and No. 2 in the Big Ten Conference in third-down conversion percentage defense [0.335], compared to ranking No. 106 [0.436] in 2023. USC's defense improved in a variety of other statistical categories including ranking No. 33 in passes intercepted [12] and No. 53 in rushing defense [141.2] in 2024. The Trojan defense ranked No. 58 in turnovers gained by collecting 18 throughout the season and ranked No. 69 in red zone defense [0.830] in 2024. USC finished ranked No. 70 in team passing efficiency defense [132.50], improved to No. 77 in total defense [377.1] and was No. 86 in the nation in first downs defense [262] in 2024.

Also in 2024, Trojan punter Eddie Czaplicki became USC's 177th First Team All-American and USC's first-ever Ray Guy Award winner for being the nation's best punter. Czaplicki not only earned All-Big Ten First Team honors by the coaches and the media, but he was named the Eddleman-Fields Punter of the Year by the Conference. USC ranked first in the nation in net punting [45.4]. He led the nation in percentage of punts inside the 20 for punters with a minimum of 30 attempts. Twenty-five of his punts were inside the 20, 10 were inside the 10 and 4 inside the 5. Running back Woody Marks was a powerhouse for USC in his one season at Troy. He recorded 1,133 rushing yards on 198 attempts [5.7 avg.] with 9 TDs. He sits at 24th among USC's all-time single-season rushing leaders with 1,133 yards this season. He surpassed Anthony Davis who had 1,112 rushing yards in the 1973 season. Marks became USC's first 1,000-yard rusher since Ronald Jones II rushed for 1,550 yards in 2017. Since Reggie Bush and LenDale White were 1,000-yard rushers in 2005, just five USC RBs have been 1,000-yard season rushers: Joe McKnight (2009), Curtis McNeal (2011), Javorius Allen (2014), Ronald Jones II (2016 & 2017) and Woody Marks. He also tied with wide receiver Zachariah Branch for USC's 2024 receiving leader with 47 catches for 321 yards [6.83 avg.]. He was the first Trojan running back with 40+ catches in a single season since Javorius Allen recorded 41 in 2014. Marks averaged 121.7 all-purpose yards per game, which ranked third in the Big Ten and 18th in the nation. The Trojans concluded the season with a 35-31 victory over Texas A&M in the Las Vegas Bowl. The win marked the biggest comeback victory in Las Vegas Bowl history. Additionally, it was the largest deficit that USC has ever overcome in a bowl game win, with the previous being a 15-point deficit against Penn State in the 2017 Rose Bowl. Wide receiver Ja'Kobi Lane was named the bowl MVP after recording 7 receptions for 127 yards and a Las Vegas Bowl record 3 TDs. On National Signing Day, Riley made a splash by signing the No. 1 quarterback in California, five-star Husan Longstreet and the No. 1 defensive lineman in the nation, five-star Jahkeem Stewart.

Riley was hired by USC on Nov. 28, 2021. He arrived after serving as the head coach at Oklahoma, winning 85 percent of his games in five seasons there and led the Sooners to four Big 12 titles and four New Year's Six bowls with three College Football Playoff appearances.

Riley posted a 55-10 overall record in his five years (2017-21) at Oklahoma for an impres-

sive .846 winning percentage. His Sooners were 37-7 (.841) in league play and won Big 12 championships in his first four years there as he became the first person to win outright Football Bowl Subdivision conference crowns in each of his first four seasons as a collegiate head coach. He set Oklahoma records for most victories in his first two (24), three (36) and four (45) seasons, breaking marks held by Barry Switzer and Bob Stoops.

After serving as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for two of the most prolific offenses in OU's history, Riley took over as the Sooners' head coach in 2017 when Stoops retired. He was the youngest FBS head coach [33] at the time of his hiring. He also coached the OU quarterbacks and called the offensive plays while serving as head coach, running a balanced offensive attack.

Riley led his initial Oklahoma squad to a 12-2 overall record in 2017, becoming just the fifth FBS coach with no previous head coaching experience at a four-year college to win at least 12 games in his debut season. The Sooners won the Big 12 title by going 8-1, played in the CFP semifinal in the Rose Bowl and finished third in the final AP poll. Quarterback Baker Mayfield won the Heisman Trophy that season, along with the Maxwell, Davey O'Brien, Manning, Walter Camp Player of the Year and AP Player of the Year Awards, and was the No. 1 pick of the 2018 NFL Draft. Tight end Mark Andrews won the 2017 Mackey Award.

Oklahoma was again 12-2 overall and 8-1 while winning the Big 12 championships in 2018 and 2019. He was the Big 12 Co-Coach of the Year in 2018. Quarterback Kyler Murray won the 2018 Heisman Trophy, O'Brien Award and Manning Award, was the AP Player of the Year and was the No. 1 selection in the 2020 NFL Draft, while quarterback Jalen Hurts was the Heisman runner-up in 2019. The Sooners appeared in the Orange Bowl in 2018 and Peach Bowl in 2019, both CFP semifinals. OU was fourth in the final AP poll in 2018 and seventh in 2019.

In the COVID-impacted 2020 season, Oklahoma went 9-2 overall, won the Big 12 at 6-2, beat Florida in the Cotton Bowl and was sixth in the final AP poll.

In 2021, the Sooners were 10-2 in the just-completed regular season, tied for second in the Big 12 standings at 7-2 and are ranked 13th by AP.

Riley spent 2015 and 2016 as Oklahoma's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He won the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 2015 when his offense ranked seventh nationally in total offense. In 2016, receiver Dede Westbrook won the Biletnikoff Award and was fourth in the Heisman voting, while running back Joe Mixon set the OU season all-purpose yardage record [2,331 yards] and fellow running back Samaje Perine set the school career rushing mark [4,122 yards].

Riley came to Oklahoma after five seasons (2010-14) as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at East Carolina. He added the title of assistant head coach in 2014. The Pirates, running a spread offensive scheme, set more than 50 team and individual school offensive records during his time there. His squads had the top five passing seasons in school history and top four total offense marks. In 2014, ECU set a school season mark with 6,929 yards of total offense. East Carolina appeared in the national Top 10 in such categories as passing and scoring offense, third down conversion per-

centage and red zone scoring efficiency.

His Pirate wide receivers Justin Hardy and Zay Jones became the most productive pass catchers in FBS history. Hardy caught an NCAA record 387 career passes for 4,541 yards (including a trio of 1,000-yard seasons). Jones, who Riley coached for the first two years of his career, went on to break Hardy's mark with 399 career receptions.

East Carolina quarterback Dominique Davis was the 2010 Conference USA Newcomer of the Year and set school records for career completions and TD passes. He completed an NCAA record 36 consecutive passes in 2011. He was succeeded by Shane Carden, who broke many of Davis' record. Carden set ECU season marks for passing yards [4,736 in 2014] and completion percentage [.705 in 2013] and was the Conference USA MVP in 2013 followed by the American Conference's Offensive Player of the Year in 2014.

Riley was on the football and track teams at Muleshoe (Tex.) High, a West Texas town of 5,000. He was a walk-on quarterback at Texas Tech in the spring and summer of 2003 before starting his coaching career as a student assistant there under head coach Mike Leach for three seasons (2003-05), working with the offense.

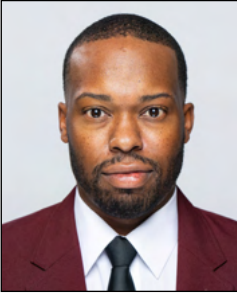
He became an offensive graduate assistant at Texas Tech in 2006, then joined the Red Raiders' fulltime staff as the wide receivers coach in 2007 and the inside wide receivers coach in 2008 and 2009. In 2009, he called plays as the interim offensive coordinator in the Alamo Bowl, producing 579 yards of offense. His wide receiver Michael Crabtree won the 2007 Biletnikoff Award while establishing Big 12 and NCAA freshman records with 134 receptions for 1,962 yards, while fellow wideout Danny Amendola also had a 100-catch, 1,000-yard season in 2007. The Red Raiders played in a bowl in each of his seven seasons and Tech quarterbacks won NCAA passing titles in 2003, 2004, 2005 and 2007.

Riley received his bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science from Texas Tech in 2006.

He was born on Sept. 5, 1983, in Lubbock, Tex. He and his wife, Caitlin, have two daughters, Sloan and Stella. His younger brother, Garrett, is the offensive coordinator at Clemson after previously coaching at TCU (where he helped coach the Horned Frogs to the 2022 National Championship game), SMU, Appalachian State, Kansas, East Carolina and Augustana College and playing quarterback at Texas Tech and Stephen F. Austin.

USC ASSISTANT COACH BIOGRAPHIES

DOUG BELK Secondary Coach



Doug Belk, one of the biggest rising stars in college football's coaching landscape, enters his second season as USC's secondary coach.

In his first season at USC in 2024, Belk's secondary and the Trojan defense significantly improved.

USC held opponents to an average of just 24.1 points per game, improving from 34.4 in 2023. The Trojans finished the 2024 season ranked No. 21 in the nation and No. 2 in the Big Ten Conference in third-down conversion percentage defense (0.335), compared to ranking No. 106 (0.436) in 2023. USC's defense improved in a variety of other statistical categories including ranking No. 33 in passes intercepted (12) and No. 53 in rushing defense (141.2) in 2024. The Trojan defense ranked No. 58 in turnovers gained by collecting 18 throughout the season and ranked No. 69 in red zone defense (0.830) in 2024. Safety Jaylin Smith earned All-Big Ten Third Team honors. He recorded 59 tackles, including 4 for loss of 5 yards, 2 PBUs and tied for a team-leading 2 INTs.

Belk spent the previous 5 seasons (2019-23) at Houston and has held the associate head coach/defensive coordinator role since 2021. From 2019-20, he was a co-defensive coordinator.

In his 5 seasons as a defensive or co-defensive coordinator at Houston, Belk has mentored 13 All-American Athletic Conference honorees, including 5 First Team selections, and 8 All-Big 12 Conference honorees, including 2 First Teamers. Five players from Belk's defenses at Houston were selected in the NFL Draft including DL Payton Turner who was taken in the first round (28th overall pick - 2021) by the New Orleans Saints and DE Logan Hall who was chosen in the second round (33rd overall pick - 2022) by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

He rebranded Houston's defensive culture by bringing back a former nickname: The Third Ward Defense. This name emphasized toughness, grit and leaned into the city's history and culture.

After a challenging 2019 season and shortened 2020 season due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Belk's defensive transformation began to come to fruition in 2021.

In 2021, Belk led one of the best pass defenses in the nation, allowing only 194 yards per game through the air, ranking 18th in the nation. Houston's 55.2 completion percentage allowed ranked eighth nationally. The 20.5 points per game allowed ranked 19th in the country and

the 302.2 total yards allowed ranked sixth. The Cougar defensive line, nicknamed "Sack Ave", racked up 45.0 sacks, ranked fifth nationally.

That season, Belk was named a semifinalist for the Broyles Award and was on the 2022 summer edition of Dave Campbell's Texas Football 40 Under 40 list.

In 2022, Houston's defense ranked 10th nationally in tackles for loss with 7.2 per game. DL D'Anthony Jones led the nation in forced fumbles and DB Jayce Rogers finished second in the conference in interceptions. Four Houston defenders earned all-conference honors during 2022 including Jones as a First Team honoree.

In 2023, DB A.J. Haulcy finished the regular season ranked No. 4 in the nation and No. 1 in the AAC in solo tackles (6.1), while DL Nelson Ceaser was No. 9 in the nation and No. 1 in the AAC in sacks (6.1).

Prior to arriving in Houston, Belk served as the cornerbacks coach at West Virginia for 2 seasons.

The 2017 Mountaineer defense ranked No. 16 nationally in most defensive three-and-outs per game and No. 24 in third-down defense.

The 2018 season saw Belk's cornerbacks play a pivotal role in West Virginia ranking second in the Big 12 and No. 20 nationally with 15 interceptions. CB Keith Washington Jr. tied for fifth in the Big 12 with 3 interceptions on the year. West Virginia recorded 12 interceptions to rank No. 1 in the conference.

From 2014-16, Belk served as a defensive graduate assistant coach at Alabama working with the defensive backs. He worked directly with Head Coach Nick Saban and Defensive Coordinators Kirby Smart and Jeremy Pruitt, assisting with all aspects of the defensive secondary as well as with special teams. During his tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide was 40-4, earning 3 College Football Playoff appearances, winning the 2015 National Championship, finishing as national runner-up in 2016 and winning 3 SEC titles (2014-16).

The 2014 Crimson Tide defense was No. 6 nationally in scoring defense and No. 12 nationally in total defense. Belk helped develop S Landon Collins, who finished his senior season as a unanimous All-American selection and was drafted by the New York Giants in the second round.

The 2015 defense was No. 3 nationally in scoring defense and total defense, No. 10 in interceptions and No. 30 in passing yards allowed. Belk tutored S Eddie Jackson, who earned All-American honors as well as CB Minkah Fitzpatrick and CB Marlon Humphrey who were named to freshman All-American teams. He also worked with CB Cyrus Jones who was drafted in the second round by the New York Giants.

The 2016 defense was No. 1 nationally in scoring defense and No. 2 in total defense. The unit was also No. 9 nationally and No. 2 in the SEC in pass efficiency defense, No. 14 in interceptions and No. 24 in passing yards allowed. That season, Fitzpatrick was named a consensus All-American, Humphrey earned All-America First-Team honors and Jackson was an All-SEC First-Teamer.

Prior to Alabama, Belk was the secondary coach at Valdosta State in Valdosta, Ga. from 2012-13. During the 2011 season, he was a defensive assistant and worked with special teams.

During his tenure, the Blazers produced a

24-10 record and won the NCAA Division II National Championship in 2012. Belk coached 2 Division II All-Americans, 2 Academic All-Americans and 3 All-Gulf South Conference selections. CBs Dominique Wheeler and Matt Pierce signed free agent contracts in the NFL with the Jacksonville Jaguars and Tennessee Titans, respectively.

RYAN DOUGHERTY Special Teams Coordinator

USC ranked first in the nation in net punting (45.4). He led the nation in percentage of punts inside the 20 for punters with a minimum of 30 attempts. Twenty-five of his punts were inside the 20, 10 were inside the 10 and 4 inside the 5.

Additionally, Makai Lemon was named to the All-Big Ten Third Team as a return specialist. Lemon led USC with 19 kickoff returns for 514 yards (27.1 avg) with a long of 80 yards. He finished the season ranked No. 6 in the nation (No. 2 in the Big Ten) in kickoff returns. Lemon also ranked No. 16 in the nation (No. 2 in the Big Ten) in combined kick returns (514). Lemon was also a crucial member of the punt coverage team downing punts for Ray Guy winner, Eddie Czaplicki.

Dougherty was a senior special teams analyst during the 2022 and 2023 seasons.

He spent the previous 5 seasons (2017-21) as the special teams analyst at Oklahoma. The Sooners played in the 2018 Rose Bowl (CFP semifinal), 2018 Orange Bowl (CFP semifinal), 2019 Peach Bowl (CFP semifinal), 2020 Cotton Bowl and 2021 Alamo Bowl.

He was the special teams coordinator and an offensive assistant at Lehigh in 2015 and 2016. Ed Mish was an All-Patriot League first team selection at punter and kicker in 2016, while Austin Devine was an all-league punter in 2015. The Mountain Hawks played in the 2016 FCS playoffs.

Before that, he was at East Carolina for 5 seasons (2010-14), the first 2 years as a special teams assistant and the last 3 as a graduate assistant working with the special teams and offense. While there, he worked with All-Conference USA punter Trent Tignor, placekicker Warren Harvey (ECU's career scoring leader) and all-league punt returners Justin Hardy and Dwayne Harris, who both played in the NFL. He was an instructor with the National Kicking Service for 6 years (2004-09). He also was a football and soccer coach from 2007 to 2009 at William R. Boone High in Orlando (Fla.), his alma mater.

He was a punter at East Carolina (2003-06), where he set Conference USA career records for punts (237) and punting yardage (10,112).

He earned his bachelor's degree in education in 2006 and master's degree in health education in 2014, both from East Carolina.

He was an All-State punter at William R. Boone High, where he also played wide receiver and was on the soccer and track teams.

ZACH HANSON

Assistant Head Coach for Offense
Offensive Line Coach



Zach Hanson, regarded as one of the game's top young coaches, enters his fourth season at USC. After the 2024 season, he transitioned to USC's offensive line coach. From 2022-23, he was USC's tight ends coach and in 2024, he added assistant head coach for offense to his title.

In 2024, he tutored a talented group of Trojan tight ends. USC finished the regular season first in the Big Ten and No. 11 in the nation in passing offense (291.7), third in the Big Ten and 19th in the nation in all-purpose yards (121.17), third in the Big Ten and No. 23 in the nation in total offense (440.3) and fourth in the Big Ten and No. 18 in the nation in first downs offense (287). The Trojans concluded the season with a 35-31 victory over Texas A&M in the Las Vegas Bowl. The win marked the biggest comeback victory in Las Vegas Bowl history. Additionally, it was the largest deficit that USC has ever overcome in a bowl game win, with the previous being a 15-point deficit against Penn State in the 2017 Rose Bowl.

In 2023, Hanson's tight ends were part of an offense that was ranked No. 3 in the nation in scoring offense (41.8) and No. 10 in the nation in total offense (467.6). USC wrapped up the season defeating No. 16 Louisville 42-28 in the 2023 Holiday Bowl.

In 2022, he led a group of tight ends who contributed to a record-setting season for the Trojan offense. USC played in the Cotton Bowl to conclude the season.

He spent the 2020 and 2021 seasons as the offensive line coach at Tulsa. He coached Tyler Smith who was selected in the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft with the No. 24 overall pick by the Dallas Cowboys. Smith was named a Second Team All-Pro in 2023. While at Tulsa, Smith was also a FWAA Freshman All-American and an All-American Athletic Conference First Team pick in 2020. In 2021, he was named to the All-AAC Second Team. Hanson also coached offensive tackle Chris Paul who was drafted in the seventh round of the 2022 NFL Draft by the Washington Commanders. In his two seasons at Tulsa, Hanson had 7 offensive linemen earn All-American Athletic Conference honors. The Golden Hurricane played in the 2020 Armed Forces Bowl and 2021 Myrtle Beach Bowl. Tulsa also played in the 2020 American Athletic Conference championship against Cincinnati. After the 2021 season, Hanson was selected for the 2022 AFCA 35 Under 35 Leadership Institute.

Hanson was a senior offensive analyst at Oklahoma in 2019 when the Sooners played in the College Football Playoff semifinal in the Peach Bowl.

In 2018, he was the tight ends coach and assistant offensive line coach at Kansas State,

his alma mater.

He spent 2016 and 2017 at North Carolina as a graduate assistant for special teams. The Tar Heels led the nation in punt return defense (0.2) and were second in kickoff returns (26.97) in 2016. Punter Tom Sheldon was a Freshman All-American in 2017. North Carolina played in the 2016 Sun Bowl.

He began his coaching career at Kansas State for 4 seasons (2012-15), serving as an offensive quality control coach in 2012 and then the final 3 years as an offensive graduate assistant. He worked with the offensive line during his first 3 years there and with the wide receivers in 2015. The Wildcats, who won the Big 12 Championship in 2012, played in the 2013 Fiesta Bowl, 2013 Buffalo Wild Wings Bowl, 2015 Alamo Bowl and 2016 Liberty Bowl.

Hanson was an offensive tackle at Kansas State (2008-11), earning 2011 All-Big 12 First Team and Academic All-Big 12 Second Team accolades. He appeared in 37 games in his career, including starting at left tackle in 2011 when the Wildcats went 10-3 and appeared in the Cotton Bowl. Kansas State also played in the 2010 Pinstripe Bowl.

He originally signed with Nevada out of high school but opted to attend Sacramento City College prior to going to Kansas State.

He earned a bachelor's degree in social sciences in 2010 and his master's degree in sociology in 2014, both from Kansas State.

He prepped at Linden (Calif.) High.

ERIC HENDERSON

Co-Defensive Coordinator
Run Game Coordinator
Defensive Line Coach



Eric Henderson, a Super Bowl Champion and award-winning coach, enters his second season as USC's co-defensive coordinator/run game coordinator/defensive line coach.

In 2024, Henderson's unit and the Trojan defense significantly improved. USC held opponents to an average of just 24.1 points per game, improving from 34.4 in 2023. The Trojans finished the 2024 season ranked No. 21 in the nation and No. 2 in the Big Ten Conference in third-down conversion percentage defense (0.335), compared to ranking No. 106 (0.436) in 2023. USC's defense improved in a variety of other statistical categories including ranking No. 33 in passes intercepted (12) and No. 53 in rushing defense (141.2) in 2024. The Trojan defense ranked No. 58 in turnovers gained by collecting 18 throughout the season and ranked No. 69 in red zone defense (0.830) in 2024. USC finished ranked No. 70 in team passing efficiency defense (132.50), improved to No. 77 in total defense (377.1) and was No. 86 in the nation in first downs defense (262) in 2024. The Trojans concluded the season with a 35-31 victory over Texas A&M in the Las Vegas Bowl. The win marked the biggest comeback victory in Las Vegas Bowl history. Additionally, it was the largest deficit that USC has ever overcome in a bowl game win, with the previous being a 15-point deficit against Penn State in the 2017 Rose Bowl. On National Signing Day, Henderson signed the No. 1 defensive lineman in the class of 2025, five-star Jahkeem Stewart.

Prior to USC, Henderson served as the defensive line coach/run game coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams (2019-23).

In the 2023 season, the Rams finished the season ranked No. 8 in run defense with a 70.2 grade per PFF. The Rams finished the regular season with 41.0 sacks with 4 players recording 6.0+ sacks. This was the first time since 1985 that the Rams have had 4 players with 6.0+ sacks on the season. DT Aaron Donald was named a Pro Bowler and earned First Team All-Pro. This marks his 10th Pro Bowl appearance and eighth First Team All-Pro recognition. In 2023, Donald tallied 56 tackles, including 8 sacks, and 3 PBUs. Henderson tutored DT Kobie Turner, who was arguably the best rookie pass rusher in the NFL in 2023 and is a strong candidate for Defensive Rookie of the Year. He led the Rams with 9 sacks. Turner recorded 58 tackles, including 9.5 sacks on the season. That sack total tied Donald's mark for the franchise's rookie record. Turner won NFC Defensive Rookie of the Month for January. He recorded 5 sacks, 15 tackles and 4 TFLs in the final 6 games of the year, helping elevate the performance of the entire defense.

In 2022, the Rams rush defense ranked among the best in the NFL. Henderson's defensive line helped the Rams finish third in fewest missed tackles on rush plays (51), eighth in percentage of opponent rushes that resulted in first downs (23.3%), ninth in defensive total rush EPA (42.97), ninth in opponent rushes for touchdowns (37.92), tied for 10th in total rushing touchdowns allowed (12) and finished 12th in total rushing first downs allowed (106). According to PFF, the Rams defense concluded the season with the highest grade against the rush (87.0) and only allowed two players to eclipse the 100-yard rushing mark on the season. The Rams were 1 of 4 teams to enter Week 17 without allowing a 100-yard rusher due to strong performances on the defensive line. The Rams defense also finished 13th in total rush yards allowed (1,956), opponent rush yards per game (115.1), and successful play rate on defensive rushes (61.5%).

In 2021, the Rams defense ranked third in sacks (50.0) and fifth in tackles for loss (85) during the regular season. Henderson also helped the Rams' defense finish fifth in yards per rush (3.96) and sixth in opponent rushing yards per game (103.2). The Rams' defense held opponents to a 51.8% red zone efficiency rate, which ranked eighth-best in the NFL. In the playoffs, the Rams tied a Super Bowl record with seven sacks in their 23-20 win over the Bengals at SoFi Stadium on Feb. 13 and had 12 overall during that postseason run. Henderson's leadership allowed perennial All-Pro DT Aaron Donald to continue stacking career accolades while also helping players such as Greg Gaines, A'Shawn Robinson and Marquise Copeland emerge as steady contributors. Gaines had a career season in 2021 with 13 starts and 55 tackles, 4.5 sacks, five tackles for loss, 14 quarterback hits and 34 pressures (including postseason). Henderson also elevated the play of A'Shawn Robinson, who had a stellar performance in Super Bowl LVI with six tackles (five solo), 1.0 sack, one tackle for loss, three pressures and one quarterback hit. Robinson finished the 2021 regular season with 89 tackles (45 solo), 3.0 sacks, two forced fumbles, three tackles for loss, three quarterback hits and 17 pressures.

After the season, Henderson was nationally recognized by winning the 2021 John Teerlinck Defensive Line Coach of the Year award, as voted by his peers. The award is given out an-

nually at the NFL Combine and is named after John Teerlinck who is widely regarded as one of the top defensive line coaches in NFL history.

In his second season in 2020, the Rams finished second in the league in sacks (53.0). The defensive front helped the No. 1 ranked defense finish third in the NFL in rush defense, while giving up the fewest points per game (18.5), passing yards per game (190.7) and total yards per game (281.9).

Under Henderson's tutelage, the Rams ranked top 5 in sacks back-to-back years (2019 and 2020). DT Aaron Donald became the third player in league history to win Defensive Player of the Year three times. He was also named the PFWA Defensive Player of the Year award for the second time. Donald finished the season with a team-high 13.5 sacks, his fourth-straight season with at least 11.0 sacks.

In Henderson's debut season in 2019, the Rams rushing defense allowed only 3.74 yards per rush, the sixth-best average in the league. This improvement marked a more than 1.0 yard per rush improvement from the 4.86 yards per rush allowed during the 2018 season, prior to Henderson's arrival. The defensive front tallied 50.0 sacks, the fourth-highest in the league. The unit also featured Donald, who recorded double-digit sacks (12.5) for the third-consecutive season and earned Pro Bowl and First Team All-Pro honors.

Prior to coaching with the Rams, Henderson served as an assistant defensive line coach for the Chargers for 2 seasons (2017-2018). In 2018, the defense finished with 38.0 total sacks and DE Melvin Ingram led the team with (7.0). Ingram was selected to the 2019 Pro Bowl marking his second consecutive appearance.

During Henderson's first season with the Chargers in 2017, the defense finished fifth in the NFL in total sacks with 43.0. DE Joey Bosa ended the season with a career-high 12.5 sacks, which ranked seventh in the league.

Henderson spent the 2016 season at the University of Texas - San Antonio as the defensive line coach. The Roadrunners went on to play in the Gildan New Mexico Bowl against New Mexico. Henderson coached junior DE Marcus Davenport, who recorded a team-high 6.5 sacks and a program-record 8 QBHs during the 2016 season. Davenport went on to be the 2017 Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year and was selected No. 14 overall by the New Orleans Saints in the 2018 NFL Draft, the highest Roadrunner ever drafted and just the second draft selection ever from UTSA.

Prior to joining the Roadrunners, Henderson spent three seasons at Oklahoma State from 2013-15. He spent his first two years in Stillwater working as a graduate assistant before transitioning to a defensive quality control coach in 2015. He was regarded as one of the Cowboys' top recruiters during his tenure. During his three years at Oklahoma State, the Cowboys posted a combined 27-12 record and made three bowl appearances. Henderson helped tutor DE Emmanuel Ogbah, who earned All-American accolades, was named 2015 Big 12 Conference Defensive Player of the Year and was drafted in the second round (32nd overall) by the Cleveland Browns.

Henderson made his coaching debut in 2012 as a defensive assistant at Georgia Military College, where he coached the linebackers and secondary. The Bulldogs finished with a 7-4 record and made an appearance in the C.H.A.M.P.S. Heart of Texas Bowl.

Henderson played three years in the National Football League with the Cincinnati Bengals from 2006-08 after being signed as an

undrafted free agent. He also spent three years (2009-11) with the Las Vegas Locomotives of the United Football League, helping the team win a pair of league championships.

Henderson was a three-time All-Atlantic Coast Conference defensive end at Georgia Tech from 2003-05. He set the school's career record for tackles for loss with 59.5 and finished with 175 tackles, 25 sacks (No. 4 in program history), 8 PBUs and 7 forced fumbles.

Henderson, a native of New Orleans, La., earned a bachelor's degree in management from Georgia Tech and is working toward a master's degree in educational psychology. He and his wife, Shanea, were married in 2021.

LUKE HUARD Offensive Coordinator Quarterbacks Coach



Luke Huard, who comes from a family of outstanding quarterbacks, enters his fourth season at USC. After transitioning from inside receivers to quarterbacks coach for the 2024 season, Huard added on offensive coordinator duties entering 2025.

In 2024, Huard mentored the Trojan quarterbacks. Offensively, the Trojans finished the season ranked in the national Top 25 in passing offense (10, 291.9), third down conversion percentage (25, 0.448), total offense (23, 437.2) and first downs offense (24, 303). QB Miller Moss went 233-of-362 (.644) for 2,555 yards and 18 TDs through 9 games. After USC's 27-20 victory over LSU to open the 2024 campaign, Moss was named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week. He also earned placement on Davey O'Brien Great 8 List twice throughout the season. QB Jayden Maiava took over the starting role for the final 4 games of the season. He went 101-of-169 (.598) for 1,201 yards and 11 TDs through 7 games. The Trojans concluded the season with a 35-31 victory over Texas A&M in the Las Vegas Bowl. The win marked the biggest comeback victory in Las Vegas Bowl history. Additionally, it was the largest deficit that USC has ever overcome in a bowl game win, with the previous being a 15-point deficit against Penn State in the 2017 Rose Bowl. On National Signing Day, Huard signed California's No. 1 quarterback, five-star Husan Longstreet.

In 2023, Huard coached a group of inside wide receivers that were a part of an offense that was ranked No. 3 in the nation in scoring offense (41.8) and No. 10 in the nation in total offense (467.6). He tutored wide receiver Tahj Washington who was USC's most reliable member of the receiving corps as well as an outstanding special teams player. Washington recorded his first-ever 1,000 yard season posting 1,062 yards on the year and ranked No. 23 nationally in receiving yards. He also ranked first in the Pac-12 Conference in yards per reception (18.00). Huard also coached star freshman wide out and electric returner, Zachariah Branch. Branch was honored as a First Team All-American as a returner (USC's first-ever true freshman First Team All-American) and earned the Jet Award as the nation's most outstanding return specialist. USC was victorious over No. 16 Louisville in the Holiday Bowl to end the season.

He joined the USC staff in February of 2022 as an offensive analyst. In March, he took

over as interim inside wide receivers coach while Dave Nichol was away from the program due to his health. He became the full time position coach in the spring of 2022.

In 2022, Huard coached a group of high-level inside receivers who contributed to a recorded-setting season for the Trojan offense. USC played in the Cotton Bowl to conclude the 2022 season.

He spent the previous 3 seasons (2019-21) as an offensive analyst at Texas A&M. The Aggies earned berths in the 2019 Texas Bowl, 2021 Orange Bowl and 2021 Gator Bowl.

Before that, he was the co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Sacramento State for 2 seasons (2017-18). The Hornets averaged 486.0 total yards and 37.6 points (fifth nationally) in 2017 as quarterback Kevin Thomson set several school season records, and then averaged 402.8 total yards in 2018.

He was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Georgia State for 4 seasons (2013-16). GSU quarterbacks Ronnie Bell and Nick Arbuckle set numerous school records, including Arbuckle's Sun Belt records in 2015 for passing yards (4,368) and total offense (4,273). Arbuckle, who ranked sixth nationally in passing yards per game in 2015, was the Sun Belt's Student-Athlete of the Year that season. Nine Georgia State pass catchers earned All-Sun Belt honors during Huard's tenure. The Panthers played in the 2015 and 2017 Cure Bowl.

He was at Illinois State for 4 seasons (2009-12), the first as the quarterbacks coach and then adding the offensive coordinator duties the next 3 years. In 2012, the Redbirds led the Missouri Valley Football Conference in passing and total offense while scoring more than 30 points per game, and they advanced to the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. Quarterback Matt Brown was a 3-time All-Conference selection, and was the 2009 MVFC Newcomer of the Year and 2012 MVFC Offensive Player of the Year.

Huard was a graduate assistant at Washington in 2007 and 2008, working with the quarterbacks. Quarterback Jake Locker was the Pac-10 Newcomer of the Year in 2007 (he went on to be an NFL first round pick).

Huard started his coaching career in 2002 as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Washington High in Tacoma (Wash.).

He then spent 4 years (2003-06) as the head coach at Interlake High in Bellevue (Wash.). In 2004, he led the team to its first winning season in 10 years. That same year, he also was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the Eastside Hawks, a semi-pro team that went 10-0 in 2004 and won the Northwest Football League title.

After being named Washington's 1997 Gatorade Player of the Year as a quarterback at Puyallup High, he played at North Carolina for 3 seasons (1998-2000) before a shoulder injury ended his career. He started 4 games as a red-shirt freshman in 1999.

He received his bachelor's degree in political science from North Carolina in 2002.

His brothers, Damon and Brock, were quarterbacks at Washington and in the NFL. Damon played at Washington (1991-95), including on UW's 1991 national champions, and then with the Miami Dolphins (1997-2000), New England Patriots (2001-2003), including on the Super Bowl XXXVI and XXXVIII champs), and Kansas City Chiefs (2004-08), and now is director of community and external relations and special advisor to the athletic director at Washington as well as an analyst on Husky football radio broadcasts. Brock played at Washington (1995-

98), then with the Seattle Seahawks (1999-2001, 2004) and Indianapolis Colts (2002-03) and now is a college football analyst for FOX Sports and a sports radio host in Seattle. His father, Mike, was inducted into the Washington State Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1998 and the Pacific Northwest Football Hall of Fame in 2011 after 17 seasons as the head coach at Puyallup High, winning the state title in 1987. His nephew, Sam, is a quarterback at USC, while his niece, Haley, is a on Montana's basketball team. His sister-in-law, Molly, played basketball at Washington (1995-99).

He and his wife, Dolly, have 2 daughters.

ANTHONY JONES JR. Running Back Coach Run Game Coordinator



Anthony Jones Jr. enters his second season as USC's running backs coach and run game coordinator.

In 2024, the Trojans finished the season ranked in the national Top 25 in third down conversion percentage (25, 0.448), total offense (23, 437.2) and first downs offense (24, 303). Jones coached running back Woody Marks who was a powerhouse for USC in his one season at Troy. He recorded 1,133 rushing yards on 198 attempts (5.7 avg.) with 9 TDs. He sits at 24th among USC's all-time single-season rushing leaders with 1,133 yards this season. He surpassed Anthony Davis who had 1,112 rushing yards in the 1973 season. Marks became USC's first 1,000-yard rusher since Ronald Jones II rushed for 1,550 yards in 2017. Since Reggie Bush and LenDale White were 1,000-yard rushers in 2005, just five USC RBs have been 1,000-yard season rushers: Joe McKnight (2009), Curtis McNeal (2011), Javorius Allen (2014), Ronald Jones II (2016 & 2017) and Woody Marks. He also tied with wide receiver Zachariah Branch for USC's 2024 receiving leader with 47 catches for 321 yards (6.83 avg.). He was the first Trojan running back with 40+ catches in a single season since Javorius Allen recorded 41 in 2014. Marks averaged 121.17 all-purpose yards per game, which ranked third in the Big Ten and 18th in the nation. The Trojans concluded the season with a 35-31 victory over Texas A&M in the Las Vegas Bowl. The win marked the biggest comeback victory in Las Vegas Bowl history. Additionally, it was the largest deficit that USC has ever overcome in a bowl game win, with the previous being a 15-point deficit against Penn State in the 2017 Rose Bowl.

Prior to USC, Jones Jr. served as the running backs coach at TCU (2022-23). The 2023 Horned Frogs went 5-7, but were ranked No. 11 in the nation in total offense (466.7), and Emani Bailey was No. 20 in the nation in rushing yards (1,209) and No. 14 in rushing yards per game (100.8).

In 2022, Jones worked side-by-side with former TCU offensive coordinator Garrett Riley and helped to coach the Horned Frogs to the 2022 College Football Playoff National Championship.

He tutored Kendre Miller, who was selected in the third round of the 2023 NFL Draft by the New Orleans Saints. Miller earned 2022 First-Team All-Big 12 honors and was a Doak Walker

Award Semifinalist. His 1,399 yards made him TCU's first 1,000-yard rusher since 2016. It was also the most by a Horned Frog since LaDainian Tomlinson led the nation with 2,158 in 2000. Jones also coached Emari Demercado to a career-best season with 681 yards rushing, including 150 yards in the CFP Semifinal win over Michigan.

He was selected for the 2021 AFCA 35 Under 35 Leadership Institute as well as the 2022 NCAA and NFL Coaches Academy.

Prior to TCU, Jones spent 4 seasons as running backs coach and recruiting coordinator at Memphis (2018-2021). The Tigers made a bowl appearance each season.

In his first 2 seasons with the running backs, Memphis totaled 6,533 rushing yards and 78 touchdowns. In 2020, Jones and the running backs helped Memphis rank 22nd in the nation in total offense (453.1) while finishing the year 17th in the nation in both passing offense (307.9) and first downs (260).

While at Memphis, 4 of his running backs were drafted in a three-year period. In the 2021 NFL Draft, Kenneth Gainwell was picked in the fifth round by the Philadelphia Eagles. Gainwell was the 2019 American Athletic Conference Rookie of the Year and Football Writers Association of America Freshman of the Year. He was second in the AAC and 12th nationally in rushing with 1,459 yards. Jones also coached Antonio Gibson who was selected in the third round by the Washington Football Team in the 2020 NFL Draft. In 2019, Darrell Henderson and Tony Pollard were both drafted. Henderson was selected in the third round by the Los Angeles Rams, while Pollard was taken in the fourth round by the Dallas Cowboys.

Jones spent 6 seasons (2013-18) as the head coach of Cordova High School in Cordova, Tenn. In his first season leading the Wolfpack, the program recorded its first winning season in 9 years. Three years later, Cordova tallied the most wins (12) in school history and advanced to the Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association Division I Class 6A state playoffs semifinal round, before falling to the eventual state champions. In 2017, Jones led Cordova to an 8-3 record and a TSSAA Division I Class 6A playoff appearance.

He was named an AutoZone Liberty Bowl High School All-Star Game assistant coach three times (2012, 2014 and 2015) and was selected to coach in the 2017 Toyota East-West All-Star Classic in Clarksville, Tenn. Jones was awarded District 16A Coach of the Year honors in 2011 and 2012 and also the District 14A Coach of the Year in 2013.

Prior to coaching at Cordova, Jones returned to his alma mater, Westwood High School in Memphis, Tenn. to serve as an assistant coach (2007-2010) before he took over head coaching duties in 2010. As the head coach at Westwood, he guided the Longhorns to their first winning season in 18 years. That marked the first of three-straight conference and regional championships (2010, 2011, 2012) for Westwood.

Throughout 6 seasons as a high school head coach, Jones coached 75 players who earned college football scholarships.

Jones worked as a graduate assistant at Tennessee at Chattanooga in 2007.

Jones was a wide receiver at Tennessee at Chattanooga where he earned First Team All-Southern Conference honors. He graduated with a degree in business. Jones also holds a master's degree in education from Union University.

Jones and his wife, Christina, have two

children: Kenzie and Kaylie.

D'ANTON LYNN Defensive Coordinator



D'Anton Lynn, who has experience coaching at both the collegiate and NFL levels, enters his second season USC's defensive coordinator.

In Lynn's first season at USC, he led a massive one-season defensive turnaround. USC held opponents

to an average of just 24.1 points per game, improving from 34.4 in 2023. The Trojans finished the 2024 season ranked No. 21 in the nation and No. 2 in the Big Ten Conference in third-down conversion percentage defense (0.335), compared to ranking No. 106 (0.436) in 2023. USC's defense improved in a variety of other statistical categories including ranking No. 33 in passes intercepted (12) and No. 53 in rushing defense (141.2) in 2024. The Trojan defense ranked No. 58 in turnovers gained by collecting 18 throughout the season and ranked No. 69 in red zone defense (0.830) in 2024. USC finished ranked No. 70 in team passing efficiency defense (132.50), improved to No. 77 in total defense (377.1) and was No. 86 in the nation in first downs defense (262) in 2024. The Trojans concluded the season with a 35-31 victory over Texas A&M in the Las Vegas Bowl. The win marked the biggest comeback victory in Las Vegas Bowl history. Additionally, it was the largest deficit that USC has ever overcome in a bowl game win, with the previous being a 15-point deficit against Penn State in the 2017 Rose Bowl.

Safety Jaylin Smith earned All-Big Ten Third Team honors. He recorded 59 tackles, including 4 for loss of 5 yards, 2 PBUs and tied for a team-leading 2 INTs.

Prior to USC, Lynn served as the defensive coordinator at UCLA (2023) where he completely transformed the Bruin defense. He elevated UCLA's defense from ranking No. 87 in 2022 to finishing the 2023 regular season ranked No. 10 in the nation.

Lynn's defense finished the regular season ranked first in the nation in rushing defense (69.6 yards per game), second in the nation in yards per rush allowed (2.33) and third in the nation in sacks per game (3.42). Opponents averaged just 299.0 yards per game, which was the lowest by a Bruin team since 1992 (297.8). Additionally, UCLA's 41 sacks rank fourth nationally and are the most by a Bruin defense since 2012. UCLA also ranks fourth in the nation in tackles for loss with 99. The Bruins allowed multiple touchdowns in just 5 games in 2023. UCLA held 9 of its opponents to 20 points or less and only allowed 3 rushing touchdowns all season.

Lynn also tutored Bruin star DE Laiatu Latu, who led the nation in tackles for loss per game (1.8) and was fourth nationally in sacks per game (1.08). Latu won the Lombardi Award and was a finalist for Bednarik Award and the Lott IMPACT Trophy.

Prior to arriving in Los Angeles, Lynn spent 9 seasons in the NFL. He was the safeties coach for the Baltimore Ravens for the 2021 and 2022 seasons. In 2022, the Ravens surrendered just 18.5 points per game, which ranked third in the NFL. Lynn guided a position group that featured Chuck Clark, who piled up a career-high 101 total tackles, and Marcus Williams, who led the de-

fense with 4 interceptions. Lynn also developed rookie Kyle Hamilton, who collected 62 tackles. He was also chosen as East head coach for the 2022 East-West Shrine Bowl in Las Vegas.

Lynn spent 2020 as the Houston Texans secondary coach after spending 2 years as their assistant secondary coach (2018-19). Houston won back-to-back AFC South championships in 2018 and 2019. The 2018 team gave up 19.8 points per game, which tied for the league's fourth-best mark. The Texans +13 turnover differential in 2018 still holds a franchise record and was second in the league. Safety Justin Reid excelled in the defensive backfield under Lynn, tallying 249 total tackles and 5 interceptions in 41 games.

In 2017, Lynn held a defensive assistant role with the Los Angeles Chargers when his father, Anthony Lynn, was the head coach. He worked primarily with a linebacker group that contributed to the NFL's best red zone defense. The Chargers defense gave up the third-fewest points per game at 17.0 and was tied for fifth in sacks with 43. Joey Bosa (12.5, seventh) and Melvin Ingram (10.5, 15th) were each listed among the league leaders for sacks.

Lynn was an assistant with the Buffalo Bills from 2015-16. He coached a defense that finished fourth in both passing touchdowns allowed with 19 and in opponent completion percentage of 59.9% in 2016. The 2015 squad tied for the league lead with 93 passes defended and held opponents to the third-lowest completion percentage of 57.6%.

Lynn began his coaching career as a seasonal intern for the New York Jets in 2014.

Prior to his coaching career, he worked in the scouting department for the Jets in 2013.

Lynn was signed by the Jets as an undrafted free agent in 2012 before finishing his playing career with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League in 2013.

Lynn was a three-time All-Big Ten honorable mention cornerback for Penn State. While playing for the Nittany Lions from 2008-11, he recorded 162 total tackles, 7.0 tackles for loss, 4 interceptions and 1 fumble recovery in 47 games, while starting 37 of his last 38 played. In 2010, Lynn was second among the Nittany Lions with 75 total tackles and tied for the team lead with 3 interceptions.

Lynn and his wife, Courtney, have two children. His father, Anthony, currently serves as the run game coordinator and running backs coach for the Washington Commanders.

SHAUN NUA Defensive Ends Coach



Shaun Nua, a former NFL Super Bowl-winning defensive end who has coaching experience in the Pac-12 and Big Ten, enters his fourth season at USC and second as defensive end coach.

In 2024, Nua's unit and the Trojan defense significantly improved. USC held opponents to an average of just 24.1 points per game, improving from 34.4 in 2023. The Trojans finished the 2024 season ranked No. 21 in the nation and No. 2 in the Big Ten Conference in third-down conversion percentage defense (0.335), compared to ranking No. 106 (0.436) in 2023. USC's defense improved in a variety of other statistical categories including ranking

No. 33 in passes intercepted (12) and No. 53 in rushing defense (141.2) in 2024. The Trojan defense ranked No. 58 in turnovers gained by collecting 18 throughout the season and ranked No. 69 in red zone defense (0.830) in 2024. USC finished ranked No. 70 in team passing efficiency defense (132.50), improved to No. 77 in total defense (377.1) and was No. 86 in the nation in first downs defense (262) in 2024. In 2023, Nua, USC's defensive line coach, tutored sophomore Bear Alexander, a Georgia transfer, who made a massive impact on the Trojan defensive line. USC was victorious over No. 16 Louisville in the Holiday Bowl to end the season. Defensive lineman Solomon Byrd was selected in the seventh round of the 2024 NFL Draft by the Houston Texans.

In 2022, Nua was a semifinalist for the Broyles Award. He coached Tuli Tuipulotu, one of the top defenders in the nation in 2022. Tuipulotu was the Polynesian College Football Player of the Year, the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year, the defensive Morris Trophy winner and was a finalist for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, the Rotary Lombardi Award, the Chuck Bednarik Award, the Ted Hendricks Award, and the Lott IMPACT Trophy. Tuipulotu was also a Unanimous First Team All-American being selected by AP, Football Coaches, Football Writers, Walter Camp and Sporting News. He led the nation in sacks with 13.5 and was second in the nation in tackles for loss with 22.0. USC played in the Cotton Bowl to conclude the 2022 season. Tuipulotu was selected in the second round of the 2023 NFL Draft by the Los Angeles Chargers.

He spent the previous 3 seasons (2019-21) as Michigan's defensive line coach. Defensive end Kwity Paye was a first round selection in the 2021 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts. In 2021, defensive end Aidan Hutchinson was a consensus All-American first teamer, Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and Academic All-American first teamer when he won the Lombardi Award, Hendricks Award and Lott IMPACT Trophy. Hutchinson was the No. 2 overall pick by the Detroit Lions in the 2022 NFL Draft. Michigan was 21st nationally in sacks (2.77) in 2019 and held 7 teams under 100 rushing yards. UM defensive linemen posted 23 tackles for loss and 15.5 sacks in 2019 and followed that with 13.5 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks during the COVID-shortened 2020 season. The Wolverines played in the 2020 Citrus Bowl and 2021 CFP semifinals in the Orange Bowl.

He was the defensive line coach at Arizona State in 2018. Defensive lineman Russell Wren was a fourth round pick in the 2019 NFL Draft by the Cincinnati Bengals. The Sun Devils played in the 2018 Las Vegas Bowl.

He spent 6 seasons (2012-17) as the defensive line coach at the U.S. Naval Academy. Defensive end Will Anthony was All-American Athletic Conference first team in 2015. The Midshipmen won a school-record 11 games, finished 18th in both polls and shared the AAC West Division title in 2015, their first season in the AAC. In 2016, Navy played in the AAC Championship Game. During his tenure, Navy beat Army 4 times, won 3 Commander-In-Chief's Trophies and played in a bowl each season (2012 Fight Hunger Bowl, 2013 Armed Forces Bowl, 2014 Poinsettia Bowl, 2015 Military

Bowl, 2016 Armed Forces Bowl and 2017 Military Bowl).

He began his coaching career at BYU, his alma mater, serving as an intern in 2009 and then a graduate assistant coach working with the defense. BYU was 24th nationally in total defense in 2010 and 13th in 2011. The Cougars appeared in the 2009 Las Vegas Bowl, 2010 New Mexico Bowl and 2011 Armed Forces Bowl.

He played 4 seasons (2005-08) in the NFL, the first 3 with the Pittsburgh Steelers and 2008 with the Buffalo Bills. He was a member of the Steelers' Super Bowl XL-winning team in 2006.

He was a defensive end at BYU for 3 seasons (2002-04), earning All-Mountain West second team honors in 2004.

He earned his bachelor's degree in youth and family recreation in 2005 and a master's degree in recreation management in 2013, both from BYU.

He was a Junior College All-American at Eastern Arizona Junior College before transferring to BYU.

He attended Tafuna High in American Samoa.

He and his wife, Hilary, have 3 children: Losi, Kelina and Malia. He is the son of Sao and Usu Nua. His cousin, Ianeta Le'i, played softball (first base) for 4 seasons (2003-06) at BYU, where she was a 3-time All-American and then served as an assistant coach (2007-13). His cousin, Devin Tavana, was an offensive lineman at Southern Utah (2010-11).

TROVON REED Cornerbacks Coach



Trovon Reed enters his first season as USC's cornerbacks coach after most recently serving as the cornerbacks coach at UCF.

During his one season at UCF, Reed developed a room of impressive cornerbacks. Redshirt senior Mac McWilliams, a Senior Bowl invitee, finished the 2024 season with 32 tackles, with 6.5 for loss of 23 yards (including 1 sack for minus 4 yards), 2 PBUs, 1 INT and 1 forced fumble. Per PFF, McWilliams was the fourth-highest graded cornerback in the Big 12.

Senior Brandon Adams, another Senior Bowl invitee, tallied 14 tackles, including 1 for loss of 1 yard. He tied for a team-leading 2 INTs and notched 2 PBUs.

Reed was the only cornerbacks coach in the nation to have two of his players compete in the 2025 Reese's Senior Bowl.

Reed also tutored freshman Chasen Johnson. A two-time PFF Freshman of the Week, Johnson collected 18 tackles, with 0.5 for loss of 1 yard and 2 PBUs while seeing action in 12 games with 4 starts.

Prior to UCF, Reed spent three seasons (2021-23) at Auburn as the Tigers' director of football and recruiting relations. While at Auburn, he became a fixture in recruiting and helped the Tigers land several top recruits. In 2024, Reed helped Auburn sign the No. 8 recruiting class in the nation, per On3 and Rivals. The Tigers also recorded two Top 20 recruiting classes in 2022 and 2023. In 2021, Auburn had a coaching vacancy, and Reed was able to be elevated into an authorized off-campus recruiter.

Reed was a five-star recruit in the Class of 2010 out of Thibodaux HS in Louisiana, rated by

the 247Sports Composite as the No. 25 player in the country. He played at Auburn from 2010-14 and was a member of Auburn's 2010 National Championship team. He helped the Tigers win two SEC Championships (2010 and 2013) and earn another appearance in the national title game (2014). He spent most of his career at wide receiver before moving to cornerback for his final season in 2014.

As an undrafted free agent, Reed spent time playing for several NFL teams from 2015-18 including the Seattle Seahawks, St. Louis Rams, Miami Dolphins, San Diego Chargers and San Francisco 49ers. He was a member of the AAF's Birmingham Iron and the XFL's St. Louis Battlehawks and Tampa Bay Vipers.

ROB RYAN

Assistant Head Coach for Defense
Linebackers Coach



Rob Ryan, a Super Bowl-winning coach with 35 years of experience enters his first season as USC's assistant head coach for defense/linebackers coach.

In his 35 years of coaching, including 24 seasons in the NFL, Ryan has served as the defensive coordinator for the Oakland Raiders (2004-08), Cleveland Browns (2009-10), Dallas Cowboys (2011-12) and New Orleans Saints (2013-15), while also holding coaching positions with the Arizona Cardinals (1994-95), New England Patriots (2000-03), Buffalo Bills (2016), Washington Redskins (2019), Baltimore Ravens (2021) and Las Vegas Raiders (22-24).

Ryan most recently served as a senior defensive assistant for the Las Vegas Raiders from 2022-24.

During the 2022 season, Ryan helped guide DE Maxx Crosby to his second Pro Bowl selection after recording career bests in tackles (88), tackles for loss (22) and sacks (12.5). Crosby's 88 tackles are the most in a single season by a Raiders defensive lineman, and he became only the second defensive lineman in franchise history to record 20+ tackles for loss in a single season. He also worked with four-time Pro Bowler DE Chandler Jones, who finished second on the team with 4.5 sacks and 15 quarterback hits. Under the guidance of Ryan, the defense ranked 19th in the NFL in rushing yards allowed per game (122.8 yards per game) and saw a slight improvement in tackles for loss (68) and stuffs (39) from the previous year.

In 2023, Ryan helped lead a unit that allowed just 331 points, the ninth best mark in the NFL and the fewest points allowed by the Raiders in a single season since 2002 (304). The Raiders defense also recorded 5 defensive touchdowns in 2023, the second most in the league and tied for the third most in a single season in franchise history - the most since 2000 (6). Ryan also helped lead the defense to a major improvement from the first half of the season to the second half after Antonio Pierce became the interim head coach in Week 9. From Week 9-18, the Raiders defense ranked first in the NFL points allowed per game (16.0), tied for third in sacks (30), first in defensive touchdowns (4) and tied for 10th in takeaways (14).

In 2024, Ryan helped Crosby earn his fourth Pro Bowl nod as he finished third in the NFL in

tackles for loss (17) despite missing four games. As one of the league's best pass rushers, Crosby finished the season with 45 tackles, including 17 for loss with 7.5 sacks, 20 quarterback hits and 5 passes defended in 12 games before a season-ending ankle surgery. Crosby has tied 12 other Raiders with 4 Pro Bowl appearances, which ranks seventh in franchise history. LB Robert Spillane notched a team-leading and career-high 158 tackles, including 10 for loss with 2 sacks, 7 deflected passes and 2 interceptions.

Ryan spent the 2021 season as the inside linebackers coach for the Baltimore Ravens. During his time with the Ravens, Ryan helped guide LB Patrick Queen as he led the team with 98 tackles. Ryan's position group was instrumental to the No. 1 ranked run defense in the NFL (84.5 yards per game).

In 2019, Ryan coached inside linebackers for the Washington Redskins, helping guide LB Jon Bostic to a career-high 105 tackles. He also tutored rookie LB Cole Holcomb, who finished second in the NFL among rookie defenders with 101 tackles.

During the 2016 season, Ryan served as the Buffalo Bills' assistant head coach/defense under his twin brother, head coach Rex Ryan. The defense ranked sixth in the NFL in passing defense (223.9 yards per game), eighth in sacks (39) and produced 4 Pro Bowlers in DT Kyle Williams, LB Lorenzo Alexander, LB Zach Brown and CB Stephon Gilmore.

From 2013-15, Ryan served as defensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints.

In 2013, Ryan led a Saints' defensive unit that finished fourth in the NFL in total defense (305.7), a 28-place improvement from the prior season. The unit ranked in the Top 10 in many defensive categories, including second in pass defense (194.1), fourth in sacks (49), fourth in scoring defense (19.0) and ninth in third down conversion percentage (34.7). Ryan helped S Kenny Vaccaro earn Pro Football Writers Association All-Rookie Team honors after leading the secondary with 77 tackles. He also mentored DE Cameron Jordan as he was selected to his first Pro Bowl after ranking fifth in the league with a career-high 12.5 sacks.

In 2014, He guided LB Curtis Lofton to a career-high 144 tackles, the fourth-most in the NFL, while DE Cameron Jordan recorded 7.5 sacks.

In 2015, Ryan led a defensive unit that was among the youngest in the NFL and helped mentor a rookie class that included LB Stephon Anthony and LB Hau'oli Kikaha. Under the guidance of Ryan, Anthony finished with 112 tackles, first among rookies, and was named to the All-Rookie Team, while Kikaha recorded 4 forced fumbles to tie for second in the NFL and rank first among rookies. Ryan helped DE Cameron Jordan earn his second Pro Bowl selection after finishing with 10 sacks.

Ryan spent two seasons as the Dallas Cowboys' defensive coordinator from 2011-12, working with OLB DeMarcus Ware who recorded double-digit sacks totals and earned Pro Bowl honors in both seasons. In 2011, Ryan helped Ware to his sixth Pro Bowl selection and fourth All-Pro First Team recognition after finishing second in the NFL with 19.5 sacks, the second most during his career. Ryan also helped second year LB Sean Lee lead the team with 105 tackles. In 2012, Ryan led a defense that produced 2 Pro Bowl selections in DE Anthony Spencer and Ware (his seventh-consecutive Pro Bowl). Spencer posted a career-high 11 sacks while Ware led the team with 11.5 sacks, making the Cowboys one of three teams in the NFL to

have two players with 11-plus sacks.

From 2009-10, Ryan served as the defensive coordinator for the Cleveland Browns. During his first season with the Browns, Ryan led a defensive unit that ranked eighth in the NFL in sacks (40).

In 2010, the Browns' defense tied for eighth in the NFL with 19 interceptions and Ryan saw 6 different players post multiple takeaways. Cleveland also ranked 13th in points allowed (20.8). Ryan guided a secondary that included rookie CB Joe Haden, who tied for fifth in the NFL and second among rookies with a career-high 6 interceptions. Ryan also mentored rookie S T.J. Ward, who finished first among all rookies and sixth among all defensive backs in the NFL with 123 tackles. Both players were named to the Pro Football Writers Association All-Rookie Team. Under Ryan's guidance, the Browns defense allowed the fourth-fewest rushing touchdowns (7).

Ryan earned his first NFL defensive coordinator position with the Raiders and spent five seasons (2004-08) with the organization, where, during that span, his units ranked sixth in the NFL in pass defense (199.2). He helped produce a pair of Pro Bowlers: DE Derrick Burgess and CB Nnamdi Asomugha. In 2005, Ryan saw Burgess named to his first Pro Bowl after leading the NFL with a career-high 16 sacks. In 2006, Ryan oversaw a defense that led the NFL in pass defense and ranked third in total defense. The Raiders defense under Ryan also ranked fourth in the NFL in fewest yards allowed per play, fifth in defense inside the 20, tied for fifth in defensive touchdowns and fifth in net passing yards per play. Ryan's defensive schemes in 2006 also helped Burgess record 11 sacks and play in his second straight Pro Bowl and DT Warren Sapp record 10 sacks, an NFL high for defensive tackles. In addition, the defensive schemes helped CB Nnamdi Asomugha post a career-high 8 interceptions to tie for third in the league.

Prior to the Raiders, Ryan spent four years (2000-03) as the linebackers coach for the New England Patriots. He was part of 2 Super Bowl championship teams (XXXVI and XXXVIII). Ryan's unit contributed to one of the best scoring defenses in franchise history in 2001, as the Patriots allowed just 14.9 points per game and recorded 29 interceptions to rank first in the NFL in both categories. New England's run defense also ranked fourth in the league (89.6). In 2003, Ryan's squad helped the Patriots defense rank first in the NFL in fewest points allowed (238) while ranking seventh overall in the NFL in total defense (291.6 yards per game). Ryan mentored Pro Bowlers LB Willie McGinest and LB Tedy Bruschi.

From 1997-99, Ryan coached college ball and was Oklahoma State's defensive coordinator, where he led the Cowboys defense to continually rank among the best in the nation. He was named Coordinator of the Year by The Sporting News in 1997. In his first season at Oklahoma State, the Cowboys defense finished among the nation's Top 20 in turnover margin, rushing defense, scoring defense and total defense, allowing just 302.7 yards per game. It was an over 100-yard improvement per game from the year before. The Cowboys produced an 8-4 record and concluded the year with an Alamo Bowl appearance. Following the season, DB R.W. McQuarters was selected by the 49ers in the first round of the NFL Draft. In 1998, the Cowboys were second in the nation in sacks with 41. In 1999, Oklahoma State was ranked 10th in the nation in total defense.

Ryan served as defensive coordinator at

Hutchinson Community College (Kan.) in 1996, where the Blue Dragons led the nation in total defense (228 yards per game) and in sacks (56). His defense also set a national record by forcing 49 turnovers.

Ryan originally entered the NFL coaching ranks in 1994 as defensive backs coach on his father's staff with the Arizona Cardinals. He was with the club for 2 years (1994-95). With Ryan as his position coach, CB Aeneas Williams earned two trips to the Pro Bowl in 1994 and 1995. The 1994 Cardinals ranked second in the NFL total defense, second in run defense and third in pass defense. In 1995, the Cardinals led the NFL with 32 interceptions and 42 total takeaways.

Ryan was a graduate assistant at Western Kentucky in 1987 and at Ohio State in 1988. Ryan then spent five seasons at Tennessee State, where he coached running backs (1989-91), linebackers (1992) and the defensive line (1993).

Ryan played outside linebacker at Southwestern Oklahoma State (1981-82). He is the son of NFL defensive coaching legend Buddy Ryan. His twin brother, Rex, was a head coach in the NFL for the New York Jets (2009-14) and Buffalo Bills (2015-16).

CHAD SAVAGE

Tight Ends / Inside Receivers Coach



Chad Savage, one of the nation's top recruiters, enters his first season as USC's tight ends/inside receivers coach.

Savage most recently served as the wide receivers coach/recruiting coordinator at Colorado State from 2022-24.

He was named the Mountain West Recruiter of the Year by 247Sports for three consecutive seasons (2022-24). Savage primarily recruited Southern California and Arizona and was instrumental in signing over 25 players from the Greater Los Angeles area to play at Colorado State. His recruiting efforts led to the signing of 2024 class wide receiver Jordan Ross, the highest-ranked recruit to ever sign with the Rams.

Savage was also named to 247Sports.com's "30 under 30" list in 2022 for being one of the nation's top young assistant coaches.

At Colorado State, Savage tutored NFL prospect wide receiver Tory Horton. Horton was a two-time All-Mountain West First Team honoree (2022 and 2023).

In 2022, Savage mentored Horton to a 1,000-yard season as he led the conference in receiving yards (1,131), yards per game (94.3) and receptions (71) while notching five 100-yard games. His receiving yards ranked 12th in the nation, while his receiving yards per game ranked 10th in the nation. He was named to the Biletnikoff Watch List and finished 2022 ranked No. 8 in single-season receiving yards, No. 10 in single-season receptions and No. 11 in single-season TD receptions (8) in program history. True freshman wide receiver Justus Ross-Simmons also became a starter and a dependable target with 26 receptions for 424 yards, averaging 16.3 yards per catch.

Horton finished the 2023 season leading the Rams with 1,136 yards on 96 receptions with 8 TDs. The wideout tallied 4 games with 100-plus yards, including a 227-yard performance against Utah Tech – seventh best in program history – with 3 scores. His 1,136 receiving yards were the eighth most in a single season, and

his 96 receptions tied for second most in a single season in program history. Horton led the Mountain West in receptions per game (8.0) and was fourth in the nation in the stat. He finished second in the conference (and No. 17 in the nation) in receiving yards (1,136) and second in the conference (and 11th in the nation) in receiving yards per game (94.7).

After suffering a season ending injury in 2024, Horton, a two-time team captain, finished his career just 35 yards shy of Colorado State's career receiving yards record. He finished fourth all-time in career receptions with 193.

Upon his arrival to Fort Collins, Colo. in 2022, Savage was initially named tight ends coach before being moved to wide receivers prior to spring practice.

Prior to Colorado State, Savage coached tight ends at Nevada in 2021, where he mentored Cole Turner, a fifth-round draft pick by the Washington Commanders in the 2022 NFL Draft. At 26-years-old, Savage was one of the youngest full-time coaches in the Mountain West.

In 2020, Savage served as the wide receivers coach at San Diego. The Toreros did not have a fall football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

From 2018-19, he was an offensive graduate assistant at Nevada.

He began his collegiate playing career at Division III Linfield College in Oregon before transferring to San Diego, where he spent one year (2014) as a wide receiver for the Toreros and three as an undergraduate assistant (2015-17) working with running backs, wide receivers and tight ends. During his time at USD he assisted with the passing game plan, scouting reports, coordinated the scout teams and worked with on-campus recruiting. The Toreros compiled a 29-7 record during Savage's first tenure and added two Pioneer Football League championships and two FCS playoff wins.

Savage also coached wide receivers for the US National High School Football Team in 2016.

Dennis Simmons, who has coached some of the collegiate game's elite receivers, enters his fourth season as the assistant head coach, wide receivers coach and offensive passing game coordinator.

Throughout his career, Simmons has coached 20 NFL Draft picks, including 5 first rounders.

In 2024, the Trojans finished the season ranked in the national Top 25 in passing offense (10, 291.9), third down conversion percentage (25, 0.448), total offense (23, 437.2) and first downs offense (24, 303). WR Makai Lemon was USC's most versatile player of the 2024 season. He recorded 46 receptions for a team-leading 665 yards (14.5 avg.) and 3 TDs. Lemon also fielded kickoff returns, recording 18 returns for 468 yards (26.0 avg.) with a long of 80 yards. He ranked No. 6 in the nation in kickoff returns. The Trojans concluded the season with a 35-31 victory over Texas A&M in the Las Vegas Bowl.

The win marked the biggest comeback victory in Las Vegas Bowl history. Additionally, it was the largest deficit that USC has ever overcome in a bowl game win, with the previous being a 15-point deficit against Penn State in the 2017 Rose Bowl. Wide receiver Ja'Kobi Lane was named the bowl MVP after recording 7 receptions for 127 yards and a Las Vegas Bowl record 3 TDs. Throughout the season, Lane recorded 43 receptions for 525 yards and a team-leading 12 TDs.

In 2023, Simmons' outside receivers were a part of an offense that was ranked No. 3 in the nation in scoring offense (41.8) and No. 10 in the nation in total offense (467.6). He tutored senior Brenden Rice who was ranked No. 9 in the nation in receiving touchdowns (12). WR Tahj Washington led the Trojans in receptions and receiving yards in 2023, recording 59 receptions for 1,062 yards (18.0 avg.), amassing over 1,000 yards for the first time in his career. He tallied 8 TDs for the Trojans. USC was victorious over No. 16 Louisville in the Holiday Bowl to end the season. Rice and Washington were both drafted in the seventh round of the 2024 NFL Draft by the Los Angeles Chargers and the Miami Dolphins, respectively.

In 2022, Simmons coached a standout group of outside receivers who contributed to a record-setting season for the Trojan offense in 2022. He tutored All-Pac-12 First Team member Jordan Addison (59 catches for 875 yards and 8 TDs). USC played in the Cotton Bowl to conclude the 2022 season.

He spent the previous 7 seasons (2015-21) at Oklahoma as the outside receivers coach. He added the associate head coach title in 2019 and 2020 and the assistant head coach and passing game coordinator roles in 2021. He was named one of the nation's Top 25 recruiters by Rivals in 2019. He coached a trio of All-American first team wide receivers at Oklahoma: 2016 Biletnikoff Award winner, Heisman Trophy finalist and unanimous All-American Dede Westbrook (81 catches for 1,524 yards and 17 TDs), Marquise Brown in 2018 (1,318 receiving yards and 10 TDs) and 2019 Biletnikoff finalist and consensus All-American CeeDee Lamb (62 catches for 1,327 yards with 14 TDs). During his tenure, Oklahoma played in the 2015 Orange Bowl (College Football Playoff semifinal), 2017 Sugar Bowl, 2018 Rose Bowl (CFP semifinal), 2018 Orange Bowl (CFP semifinal), 2019 Peach Bowl (CFP semifinal), 2020 Cotton Bowl and 2021 Alamo Bowl.

He was the outside receivers coach at Washington State for 3 years (2012-14). The Cougars led the nation in passing offense (477.7) in 2014, throwing for a Pac-12 record 5,732 yards, and were seventh in total offense and ninth in completion percentage when wide-out Vince Mayle tied for fourth nationally in receptions (106) and was fifth in receiving yards (1,483). In 2013, WSU was fourth in the nation in passing offense (368.0) and set a Pac-12 record with 470 completions while playing in the New Mexico Bowl.

He spent 2010 and 2011 as East Carolina's outside receivers coach. Wide receiver Lance Lewis was an All-Conference USA pick in 2010 (89 catches for 1,116 yards with 14 TDs), just the third Pirate ever with a 1,000-yard receiving season. ECU played in the 2010 Military Bowl.

He was Texas Tech's outside receivers coach for 2 years (2008-09). In 2008, wide receiver Michael Crabtree repeated as the Biletnikoff winner and consensus All-American (97 receptions, 1,165 yards, 19 TDs). In 2009, wide-out Alex Torres was a Freshman All-American. The Red Raiders played in the 2008 Cotton Bowl

and 2010 Alamo Bowl.

Simmons spent 2000 to 2007 in non-coaching roles at Texas Tech. He first was an assistant athletic director/quality control for the football program, then served as the chief of staff for head coach Mike Leach for 3 years (2005-07).

He coached running backs at Cornell in 1999, where also held was an assistant athletics director and chief of staff. He served as an NFL Minority Fellowship intern with the Buffalo Bills in the summer of 1999.

He began his coaching career at BYU, his alma mater, where he worked with the offensive line and special teams in 1997.

He played outside linebacker at BYU (1993-96), where he started the final 3 years. The Cougars won 4 Western Athletic Conference titles and played in the Cotton, Copper, Holiday and Aloha Bowls.

He earned his bachelor's degree in broadcast communications in 1996 and a master's degree in educational leadership in 1999, both from BYU.

He prepped at Kirby High in Memphis (Tenn.).

He and his wife, LaTosha, have a daughter, Kendyll, and son, Kannon.

BENNIE WYLIE

Director of Football Sports Performance



Bennie Wylie, one of the top strength and conditioning coaches in the country, enters his fourth season as the Director of Football Sports Performance. He joined the USC staff in December of 2021.

While at USC, the Trojans have competed in the 2023 Cotton Bowl, 2023 Holiday Bowl and 2024 Las Vegas Bowl. Throughout the offseason between the 2023 and 2024 seasons, Wylie and his staff coached the Trojans to collectively put on over 1,400 pounds of muscle.

Wylie spent the previous 4 years (2018-21) as Oklahoma's director of sports performance for football. The Sooners won the Big 12 title in 2018, 2019 and 2020, made a pair of College Football Playoff semifinal appearances in 2018 and 2019 (in the Orange and Peach Bowls, respectively) and also played in the Cotton Bowl in the 2020 season and the Alamo Bowl in 2021.

Prior to arriving at OU, he served as director of performance at The Performance Lab, a private group-training strength and fitness center in Abilene, Tex. He also provided training and obstacle fitness to United States military personnel as a staff member of Alpha Warrior.

He spent 3 years (2011-13) as strength and conditioning head coach for football at Texas. The Longhorns appeared in the 2011 Holiday Bowl and 2012 and 2013 Alamo Bowl.

He spent the 2010 season at Tennessee as strength and conditioning head coach for football. The Volunteers participated in the Music City Bowl.

He served 7 seasons (2003-09) as head strength and conditioning coach at Texas Tech. The Red Raiders competed in bowl games in each season: 2003 Houston Bowl, 2004 Holiday Bowl, 2006 Cotton Bowl, 2006 Insight Bowl, 2008 Gator Bowl, 2009 Cotton Bowl and 2010 Alamo Bowl.

He was an assistant strength and con-

ditioning coach with the Dallas Cowboys from 1999 to 2002, helping rehabilitate injured players. He also spent the spring seasons heading the strength and conditioning program for the Dallas Desperados of the Arena Football League.

He got his start in strength and conditioning as a graduate assistant at Sam Houston State in 1998 and was named the Bearkats' interim head strength and conditioning coach that same year.

He is certified by the Titleist Performance Institute and USA Weightlifting and was named a Master Strength and Conditioning Coach by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association in 2012.

He was a 4-year (1994-97) letterwinning running back at Sam Houston State, serving as the team captain in 1997 while earning All-Southland Conference second team honors. He also was on the Bearkats' track and field team.

He earned a bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Sam Houston State in 1999.

He prepped at Mexia (Tex.) High.

He was born on July 11, 1976. He and his wife, Jennifer, have twin sons, Braden and Camden, and a daughter, Hope.

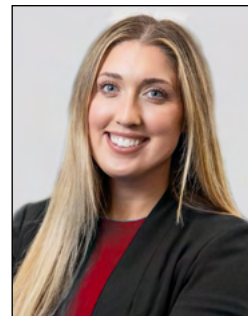

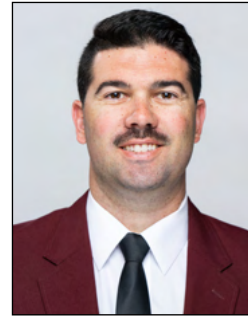

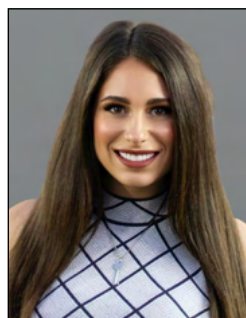

2024 GAME SUMMARIES

GAME 1 – September 1, Allegiant Stadium

It was an offseason filled with noise, but the Trojans proved the critics wrong as 9.2 million viewers (peaking at 11.1 million) watched USC win the first fight against LSU in front of a record-breaking, sold-out at Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas with a 27-20 victory.

This matchup set a new Allegiant Stadium attendance record at 63,969, surpassing Super Bowl LVIII. USC improved to 1-0 on the season and is now 2-1 over LSU all-time. This victory marked USC's 8th straight season opening win, and head coach **Lincoln Riley** remains undefeated in USC season openers. It was USC's first win when it trailed entering the fourth quarter against an AP-ranked team since the 2017 Rose Bowl 52-49 victory over Penn State. It was also the Trojans' first season-opening win against an AP-ranked team since defeating the then-No. 6 Auburn Tigers in 2003. This game was ABC's most-streamed college football game on record.

In USC's first meeting with LSU in 40 years, USC **QB Miller Moss** went 27-for-36 (.750) with 378 yards, a career-best, while throwing 1 TD to earn Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week honors. He is the first Trojan starting quarterback to debut with back-to-back wins over ranked teams since records available in 1971. He has started two games in his career: Holiday Bowl MVP in his debut and Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week in his second. Per PFF, Moss was the third highest-graded QB in the nation with a grade of 93.4 (just behind Ole Miss' Jaxon Dart [95.7] and Purdue's Hudson Card [94.5]).

Moss, with a plethora of aerial options, spread the ball around to 10 different receivers, with 6 of them recording at least 45 yards or more.

Moss dueled with LSU's QB Garrett Nussmeier, who completed 29 of 38 passes for 304 yards with 2 TDs and 1 INT. It was a battle of QBs who waited their turns after sitting behind the two most recent Heisman Trophy winners, LSU's Jayden Daniels and USC's Caleb Williams.

On LSU's opening 7-minute long drive, USC had a massive goal line stop which resulted in a turnover on downs and completely shifted the momentum of the game.

In the second quarter, USC **WR Kyron Hudson** made a "catch of the year" worthy one-handed, acrobatic catch in the second quarter mimicking Odell Beckham Jr.'s most famous catch. This play set up the first TD of the game as **RB Woody Marks** scored a 2-yard TD later in the drive to give USC a 7-0 lead. Later that evening, this catch was No. 1 on Sunday's SportsCenter Top 10.

The Tigers responded with a TD of their own as LSU WR Kyren Lacy answered with his own acrobatic catch for a 19-yard TD to tie the game midway through the second quarter.

Both teams' kickers scored FGs, but USC **K Michael Lantz** missed a crucial 29-yard FG to close out the first half of play.

USC debuted its new bolstered defense led by new defensive coordinator **D'Anton Lynn**. The defense showed grit, tackled well and made key defensive stops. The Trojan defensive line held its own against an experienced LSU offensive line, and USC limited LSU to just 3 rushing yards in the fourth quarter.

The game went back and forth with the Trojans taking a 20-17 lead with 5:44 left in regulation when Moss found **WR Ja'Kobi Lane** for a 28-yard touchdown. A 31-yard field goal from Ramos tied it at 20-20, but left 1:47 on the clock.

That proved to be too much time as Moss led the Trojan offense on an eight-play, 75-yard drive, culminating in a 13-yard rushing TD from Marks with 8 seconds left to win the jackpot and secure the critical victory.

It's officially a new era of USC Football, but it's just the beginning of the 2024 campaign. As the Trojans look ahead to non-conference opponents and the Big Ten gauntlet, there is much to be excited about. To quote Riley, "That was some pretty good Big Ten football today."

The USC Trojans displayed toughness, physicality and dominance as they defeated Utah State 48-0 in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. It was USC's first shutout since it defeated UCLA in the infamous 50-0 game in 2011.

While other perennial programs fell or struggled in Week 2, the Trojans never faltered.

The defense was the story of the evening as USC held Utah State to 190 total yards, the fewest yards allowed since the Trojans held Oregon State to 181 total yards in 2014. The 103 net yards passing by Utah State tonight was the fewest passing yards surrendered in a game by the Trojans since holding California to 93 net passing yards on Nov. 10, 2018. USC's defense gave up just 2 third-down conversions.

In his first start in the Coliseum, **QB Miller Moss** continued to be efficient. He went 21-for-30 for 229 yards and a TD.

A strong performance by the offensive line allowed both RBs **Woody Marks** and **Quinten Joyner** to dominate on the ground. Marks tallied 13 carries for 103 rushing yards (7.9 avg.) with 1 TD. It was his third career 100-yard rushing game. Joyner recorded a career-high 10 carries for a career-high 84 yards (8.4 avg.) and 2 TDs. **RB Bryan Jackson** had his first 7 carries as a Trojan, and **RB A'Marion Peterson** scored his first career TD. The Trojans rushed for 249 yards, which was the most rushing yards totaled since USC rushed for 322 yards against Oregon State in 2018.

TE Lake McRee led the Trojans with 81 yards on 4 receptions (20.3 avg.). He had a career-long reception of 34 yards in the second quarter, while **WR Makai Lemon** tied a career-best with 3 receptions for a career-high 23 yards and scored a TD.

LB Easton Mascarenas-Arnold and **LB Eric Gentry** both led the team with 7 tackles each. Mascarenas-Arnold also tallied an INT on his stat sheet.

By the fourth quarter (and after the delay of a power outage due to the LA heat), the Trojans were playing a variety of young players, providing them with invaluable game reps. And still, they managed to uphold the shutout, allowing just 89 yards in the second half.

Just two games in, there's still a lot of football left to be played. But the Trojans are optimistic. "We're still not even close to as good as we can be," Mascarenas-Arnold said.

In its first-ever Big Ten matchup, USC fell to Michigan 24-27 in the Big House in Ann Arbor, Mich.

The attendance of 110,702 was the largest crowd USC has played in front of since it faced off against Notre Dame at Soldier Field in Chicago in front of a sold out crowd of 120,000 in 1927.

QB Miller Moss went 28-of-51 (.549) with season-high 3 TDs and 1 INT. The last time a USC QB recorded at least 51 attempts in a game was when former Heisman Trophy winner Caleb Williams recorded 52 passing attempts against Tulane in the 2023 Cotton Bowl.

RB Woody Marks tallied 13 carries for 100 rushing yards (7.7 avg.). It was his fourth career 100-yard rushing game and his second consecutive 100-yard rushing game. He also recorded 5 receptions for 40 yards. In a key moment, he ripped the football out of Michigan DT Kenneth Grant's hand after the big defensive tackle had recovered a fumble for Michigan.

WR Zachariah Branch led the Trojans with a career-high 6 receptions for a career-high 98 yards.

WRs Duce Robinson, Ja'Kobi Lane and **Jay Fair** each caught TD passes from Moss. **K Michael Lantz** also scored a 29-yard FG.

LB Eric Gentry led the team with 12 tackles, including 3 for loss of 8 yards (with 1 sack for minus 6 yards). He also recorded 1 forced fumble and 1 fumble recovery.

The Wolverines finished with just 32 passing yards and 290 rushing yards.

Moss played valiantly although under pressure, and USC rallied in the second half to take the lead late in the fourth quarter following a tough first half.

The defense had stopped Michigan for the entire second half, and the Wolverines had to go 79 yards with about 2 1/2 minutes on the clock to win the game. Kalel Mullings rushed 2 yards for a TD on fourth-and-goal with 37 seconds left to claim the victory. Michigan had 19 yards of offense over its five second-half drives before Mullings' game-changing 63-yard run.

USC is now 6-5 in its series with Michigan.

It was a tough game in a hostile road stadium, but the Trojans won't face a defense like that in an environment like that the rest of the year.

The USC Trojans embodied the battle cry of "Fight On!" after battling back from a challenging first half. The Trojans trailed 10-21 at halftime, but fought back to put up 28 unanswered points in the second half to claim the victory 38-21.

QB Miller Moss went 30-of-45 (.667) with 3 TDs and 1 INT. It was his second 300-yard passing game this season and the third of his career. He spread the ball out throwing passes to 9 different receivers. He also tallied 5 carries for 17 yards and 1 TD.

WR Ja'Kobi Lane recorded a career-best 10 catches for a career-best 105 yards and 2 TDs. This was his second career 2 TD game. His first TD against the Badgers was a career-long 32-yard reception off a perfectly thrown ball from Moss, threaded between two defenders in the corner of the end zone on USC's first offensive drive of the game. This TD put USC's first points on the board at 7-0 in favor of the Trojans.

SNP Hank Pepper made a crucial play by recovering a Wisconsin muffed punt at the Badgers' 30-yard line. This play by Pepper gave the Trojans a short field which ultimately resulted in Lane's second TD. Lane caught a 6-yard pass on an important third-and-goal in the third quarter to close the point gap by the Trojans and make the score 17-21. This score was the catalyst that began USC outscoring Wisconsin 28-0 in the second half. The ball was placed by Moss exactly where Lane could grab it with all 6-foot-4-inches of his height as he reached over the Wisconsin defender to complete the catch.

Then, **WR Duce Robinson's** third quarter 8-yard TD reception pushed USC ahead 24-21.

In the fourth quarter, Moss called his own number, rushing 7-yards with a successful spin move and dive into the end zone to score a TD.

LB Mason Cobb returned a 55-yard interception for a TD in the fourth quarter to put an exclamation point on USC's 38-21 victory. The pass thrown by Wisconsin QB Braedyn Locke bounced off his intended receiver then off USC **CB Jacobe Covington's** helmet and into the sticky hands of Cobb who turned on his second gear and sprinted down the sideline to score his first-ever pick-6.'

"After the way that last week finished," USC coach **Lincoln Riley** said, "to have the first half go the way it did, then to come back and play well, says a lot about the character of the guys in this room. They're going to battle. We're not going anywhere. We don't panic."

In its second conference road game of the season, USC fell to Minnesota 17-24 in a heartbreaking loss in Minneapolis.

It was the warmest October game ever recorded at Huntington Bank Stadium with a kick time temperature of 71 degrees.

QB Miller Moss went 23-of 38 (.605) for 200 yards with 1 TD and 2 INTs.

RB Woody Marks recorded his fifth career 100-yard rushing game collecting 20 carries for 134 yards and 1 TD. He also had 4 receptions for 30 yards.

WR Kyrion Hudson led the Trojans with 5 receptions for 54 yards.

WR Duce Robinson scored the only aerial TD of the night with a 3-yard pass from Moss in the second quarter. He had 4 receptions for 39 yards and 1 TD.

After an unsuccessful first offensive series, Minnesota put the first points on the board with a 32-yard field goal by K Dragan Kesich.

In their first offensive series of the second quarter, the Trojans found their momentum and converted 4 third downs to ultimately find the end zone as Moss threw a 3-yard pass over the middle to Robinson to push USC ahead 7-3.

Minnesota responded on its next drive when QB Max Brosmer scored on a QB-keeper pushing the Gophers ahead.

After an unfortunate Trojan fumble by **RB Quinten Joyner**, Minnesota took possession, but the Trojan defense responded aggressively. On a clutch play, **S Kamari Ramsey** forced a fumble which was recovered by **DT Nate Clifton**. This play resulted in the offense driving down the field and **K Michael Lantz** scoring a career-long 54-yard FG to close out the first half, tying the score at 10-10.

Opening the third quarter, USC took 7 minutes off the clock driving down the field to culminate with a score as Moss split out on the wildcard for Marks who zipped, zapped and burst into the end zone to push USC ahead 17-10.

The fourth quarter brought havoc as the USC offensive line missed an important block which resulted in Moss being pressured off the edge by Gopher DL Jah Joynerin, forcing him to throw a pick. Minnesota took full advantage of the turnover and scored on its next drive to tie up the score at 17-17.

The Trojans got the ball back but were forced to punt (a booming season-long 62-yarder by **P Eddie Czaplicki**), but an unnecessary roughness call on the punt coverage brought the ball back from the Minnesota 10 to the 25. The Gophers drove down the field and scored on a controversial fourth-and-goal (the ruling on the field had Brosmer short, but the replay review resulted in a reversal) to jump ahead 24-17 at the end of the game.

In an attempt to score once more, the Trojans fought, but Moss was intercepted with 14 seconds left to lock down the victory for the Gophers.

USC fell 30-33 in a devastating overtime loss against No. 4 Penn State in the Coliseum.

All 3 of USC's losses have been within 1 score (3 points versus Michigan and Penn State and 7 points versus Minnesota), and all have been within the last minute of regulation play or in overtime.

QB Miller Moss went 20-of 34 (.588) for 220 yards with 2 TDs and 1 INT.

RB Woody Marks recorded his sixth career 100-yard rushing game collecting 20 carries for 111 yards (5.6 avg.). He also had 2 receptions for 44 yards.

WR Makai Lemon led the Trojans with 6 receptions for 73 yards (12.2 avg.).

After Penn State scored an early field goal, USC executed a fake reverse that fooled half of Penn State's defense, enabling **RB Quinten Joyner** to go on a career-long 75 yards to score. It was the longest play from scrimmage by a Trojan this season. It was also the longest rush by a Trojan since Ronald Jones II had an 86-yard TD run at Washington State on Sept. 29, 2017, as well as the longest from scrimmage by the Trojans since Tahj Washington had a 76-yard TD catch versus San Jose State on Aug. 26, 2023.

Joyner scored again for the Trojans on a 9-yard pass from Moss which made him the first Trojan to have a rushing and receiving TD in the same game since Austin Jones had a rushing and receiving TD versus California on Oct. 28, 2023.

LB Desman Stephens II picked off Penn State QB Drew Allar while juking and jiving to stay on his feet for 42 yards all the way back to the Penn State 26 yard line. This set up USC **K Michael Lantz** to score a 35-yard field goal.

After exchanging punts, Penn State began a successful drive down field, but was ultimately stopped by USC **S Zion Branch** on a clutch third-down situation to bring up fourth-and-11 to force the Nittany Lions to kick a field goal.

The Trojans responded with a 47-yard field goal of their own to push ahead 20-6 going into halftime.

Penn State scored twice in the third quarter to tie up the score at 20-20, but **LB Easton Mascarenas-Arnold** picked off Allar and set up Lantz to close out the quarter with a 39-yard kick to reclaim the lead.

Another field goal was scored by the Nittany Lions, and then USC **WR Kyrion Hudson** caught a go-ahead touchdown pass from Moss with 5:56 left. Penn State's Allar then converted two fourth-downs and Nittany Lion RB Nick Singleton tied up the game at 30-30 with a TD catch.

USC executed a beautiful drive down to claim the win, but Moss was picked off with 14 seconds left by Penn State S Jaylen Reed.

The Trojans responded with nabbing another INT of their own as **WR Duce Robinson** picked off Allar while playing defense to force overtime.

USC fell 28-29 to Maryland on the road at SECU Stadium in another heartbreaking loss.

All 4 of USC's losses have been within 1 score (1 point versus Maryland, 3 points versus Michigan and Penn State and 7 points versus Minnesota), and all have been within the last minute of regulation play or in overtime.

QB Miller Moss went 34-of-50 (.680) for 336 yards with 3 TDs and 1 INT. It was the 4th career 300 yard passing game for Moss and the third game this season with 3 TDs. This also marked the second time this season Moss has recorded at least 50 passing attempts (also tallied 51 passing attempts versus Michigan).

RB Woody Marks led the Trojans with 17 carries for 82 yards (4.8 avg.) and 1 TD.

WR Makai Lemon led the Trojan receivers with 8 catches for 89 yards (11.1 avg.).

WR Kyron Hudson put USC on the board first with a 22-yard TD pass from Moss. Maryland evened out the score as Terp QB Billy Edwards Jr. tossed a 16-yard TD pass to Octavian Smith Jr.

Using his 5XL gloved hands, **WR Ja'Kobi Lane** made a spectacular left hand one-handed catch to score a TD off a 15-yard pass from Moss, and Marks increased USC's lead to 21-7 with a 5-yard rushing TD to close out the first half of play.

Moss threw an unfortunate INT in the fourth quarter when he was picked off by Maryland DB Lavain Scruggs who returned the pick for 51 yards, and on the next play, Maryland scored.

USC went three-and-out on its next offensive drive, and Maryland drove 62 yards down the field to the USC 4 yard line where USC **CB Jaylin Smith** (who led the team with 11 tackles on the night) made a huge play at the goal line, intercepting a fourth-down pass.

WR Duce Robinson made an early statement in the fourth quarter scoring on a 26-yard pass from Moss, and USC led 28-14.

Maryland then drove 80 yards on a TD drive and successfully executed a two-point conversion. After Maryland blocked a potentially game-clinching FG attempt from **K Michael Lantz**, the Terps had great field position on the USC 47 and scored a TD to claim the win 29-28.

USC produced a dominate 42-20 victory over first-time opponent Rutgers in a rare Friday Night Lights showdown to snap its three-game losing streak.

QB Miller Moss went 20-of-28 (.714) for 308 yards with 2 TDs. It was his fourth 300-yard passing game this season and the fifth of his career. He spread the ball out throwing passes to 8 different receivers. He also scored a 7-yard rushing TD on his 1 carry of the night.

RB Woody Marks had a single-game career-best 3 TD runs tonight and finished leading the Trojans with 15 carries for 94 yards (6.3 avg.). The last Trojan with 3 rushing TDs in a game was Heisman Trophy winning QB Caleb Williams at Arizona on Oct. 7, 2023. The last time that USC had a running back with 3 rushing TDs in a game was RB Vavae Malepeai versus UCLA on Nov. 20, 2021. All of Marks' TDs were in the first half. The last player to score 3 rushing TDs in one half of play was Ronald Jones II on Nov. 4, 2017 against Arizona. He scored all 3 of his TDs in the second half of play.

Marks also had 5 catches for 48 yards (9.6 avg.) to extend his streak of consecutive games with at least one catch to 53, which is the longest active streak in the nation.

WR Makai Lemon had 4 catches for a career-high 134 yards (including 101 yards after catch) and tallied 3 kickoff returns for 122 yards. Per PFF, Lemon had the highest offensive grade between both USC and Rutgers with a grade of 89.9. Lemon had a career-high 256 all-purpose yards against Rutgers and it is the most by a Trojan in a game this season. The last Trojan with more all-purpose yards in a game was Adoree' Jackson with 291 versus Notre Dame on Nov. 26, 2016.

LB Easton Mascarenas-Arnold led USC with 11 tackles, including 1 for loss of 2 yards (with 1 sack for minus 2 yards). Mascarenas-Arnold has registered double figures in tackles in 3 of the last 4 games and leads USC with 67 tackles this season. The Trojans also recorded a season-high 5 sacks on the night.

The Trojan offense came out hot as USC scored a touchdown on each of its first four possessions. The last time USC scored a touchdown on its first four possessions of a game was Sept. 10, 2022 versus Stanford.

After scoring the first TD of the game on USC's opening offensive drive, Marks was set up to quickly score again because of a big special teams play from WR Makai Lemon. Lemon's kickoff return of 80 yards in the first quarter was the longest by a Trojan this season and the longest of his career. This set up Marks for his second rushing TD of the night.

WR Kyle Ford scored an 11-yard TD and Marks scored his third rushing TD to give him the hat trick. USC led 28-12 going into halftime.

Rutgers scored a TD and executed a successful 2-point conversion early in the third quarter to close the point gap 28-19.

Immediately after, Lemon recorded a 70-yard reception from Moss which was a career-best and also the longest by a Trojan this season. This gave the Trojans a short field and Moss was able to find the end zone for a rushing TD.

Lemon is the first USC player with a return of 80 or more yards and a reception of 70 or more yards in the same game since Marqise Lee versus Oregon on Nov. 9, 2012. In that game, Lee had 408 total yards.

USC closed out the third quarter with a 40-yard TD pass from Moss to Lemon.

Both teams remained scoreless in the fourth quarter and USC claimed the victory. USC's 42 points matched the most points Rutgers has allowed in a game this season.

Adding to the excitement of the evening, the Dodgers won Game 1 of the World Series against the Yankees across town on a walkoff grand slam by Freddie Freeman. It was the first time in history that USC football, the Lakers and the Dodgers all won on the same day.

All 4 of USC's losses have been within 1 score (1 point versus Maryland, 3 points versus Michigan and Penn State, 5 points versus Washington and 7 points versus Minnesota), and all have been within the last minute of regulation play or in overtime.

Since 1978 (and entering 2024), just 17 FBS teams have had at least 5 losses in a season and all of them came in a one-score game.

QB Miller Moss went 30-of-50 (.600) for 293 yards and 2 TD with 3 INTs.

RB Woody Marks led the Trojans with 22 carries for 123 yards and 1 TD.

WR Zachariah Branch led the Trojans in receiving yards with 102 on 6 receptions.

In USC's second offensive series, Moss was picked off after a ball intended for **WR Kyle Ford** was tipped into the hands of Washington LB Carson Bruener, which ended up resulting in a Husky field goal. Washington RB Jonah Coleman rushed for a 19-yard TD to close out the first quarter.

Branch caught a 25-yard pass from Moss that was originally ruled a fumble. Video review showed Branch was down, giving USC a much-needed first down in Washington territory. The drive concluded with a 1-yard TD from Marks.

Washington responded with another TD and a field goal to extend its lead to 20-7 going into halftime.

After making halftime adjustments, the Trojans regrouped and came out of the locker room aggressively. **WR Makai Lemon** scored a 37-yard TD, and then USC took a 21-20 lead after Ford scored on a 9-yard TD reception.

On USC's next possession, Moss threw a pick, which resulted in a Washington TD, but a failed two-point conversion.

The Trojans then marched down to Washington's 1-yard line in the fourth quarter with a chance to pull in front but the Huskies stopped running back Woody Marks on fourth down and took over with 5:04 left in the game.

Washington was forced to punt on its drive, and Moss led the Trojans to the Husky 14. On third-and-4, Moss' attempt to **WR Kyron Hudson** was broken up by CB Ephesians Prysock. Moss' final chance on fourth down fell incomplete.

USC defeated Nebraska 28-20 an electric atmosphere on Homecoming in the Coliseum.

QB Jayden Maiava passed for 259 yards and three touchdowns and ran for another score in his first start as a Trojan. His 3 TD passes tied a career-best (he did this twice in 2023 against New Mexico and Kansas) and the 4 total TDs are a single-game career-best. This is Maiava's third-career game with a passing TD and a rushing TD (Vanderbilt and Wyoming in 2023). He was also named to the Polynesian Player of the Year Award Watch List for his performance.

RB Woody Marks continued to prove why he is one of the best and most versatile backs in the nation. He tallied 19 carries for a career-high 146 yards against Nebraska's No. 12 ranked rushing defense to mark his sixth 100-yard rushing game of the season and the eighth of his career. His six 100-yard rushing games are the most for any USC running back in the Lincoln Riley Era. Marks also eclipsed 1,000 yards for the first time in his career recording 1,065 yards in 2024. He currently ranks No. 29 in USC's all-time single-season rushing leaders. He had 6 catches for 36 yards to extend his streak of consecutive games with at least one catch to 55, which is the longest active streak in the nation.

WR Duce Robinson scored on a 48-yard TD catch in the third quarter. It was his longest catch of the season and the second-longest TD catch of his career (a 71-yarder vs. Nevada in 2023). He tied a career-high with 4 catches (his fourth time) for a career-high 90 yards, plus a TD catch. USC is 3-0 when Robinson has at least 70 yards.

P Eddie Czaplicki, a Ray Guy Award semifinalist, earned one of the game balls from Lincoln Riley (in addition to Robinson, CB Jaylin Smith and CB Greedy Vance). He averaged 51.8 yards per punt on his 4 punts with 3 of the 4 going over 50 yards (51, 54 and 60) and all 4 pinned Nebraska inside of the 20, including a 60-yard punt to the Nebraska 1-yard line.

USC has never lost to Nebraska in these historic programs' infrequent meetings, going 5-0-1.

Early in the game, Husker and former Trojan Ceyair Wright returned an early interception 45 yards for a TD.

Maiava then hit **WR Zachariah Branch** for a 6-yard TD, Branch's first of the season and Maiava's first passing TD of the season.

In the second quarter, **WR Kyron Hudson** caught a bobbled 12-yard pass for another Trojan TD, but Nebraska evened out the score at 14-14 before going into halftime.

Early in the third, Nebraska scored a field goal to push ahead, but then Maiava hit Robinson in stride for an untouched 48-yard TD. Maiava later lost a fumble at the USC 16 while scrambling, leading to Nebraska's second field goal of the quarter to make the score 21-20.

Wright blocked a field goal attempt in the fourth quarter, but Nebraska couldn't score on its next offensive series. Marks took a fourth-down pitch from Maiava for 43 yards before Maiava finished the drive with his TD run.

Nebraska got the ball back with 2:45 left on the clock and drove to the USC 14 with 5 seconds to play. After a false start, **CB Greedy Vance Jr.** easily intercepted Raiola's final pass into double coverage in the end zone to secure the victory for the Trojans.

It was USC's version of the Michael Jordan "flu game" as the Trojans, overcoming a program-wide flu outbreak, defeated crosstown UCLA 19-13 in the Rose Bowl to bring the Victory Bell home to Troy.

QB Jayden Maiava went 19-for-35 (.543) for 221 yards with 1 TD. **RB Woody Marks** rushed for 76 yards and **K Michael Lantz** kicked 4 FGs.

It was the fifth straight year the road team has won in the series.

After UCLA scored a FG on its opening possession, the Trojans ended up in the red zone 3 times in the first half, scoring a field goal each time.

After an on-field scuffle at the end of the first half, UCLA was charged with 3 unsportsmanlike conduct penalties giving USC an opportunity for a short field to open the second half, but the Trojans turned the ball over on downs. UCLA then scored as QB Ethan Garbers hit WR Titus Mokiiao-Atimalala on a 10-yard TD pass.

USC then completely took control of the game in the fourth quarter.

P Eddie Czaplicki, the nation's best punter, put the Trojan defense in great field position with a perfect 44-yard punt downed at the UCLA 1-yard line. His other 2 punts in the game were also inside the 10, backing UCLA up to its own 7 and 9 yard lines.

After and 3-and-out by the Bruins, the Trojan offense found a spark. Maiava tossed **WR Makai Lemon** a lateral, and Lemon threw a perfect 39-yard rope to **WR Kyron Hudson** who ran out of bounds at the UCLA 4. USC scored on the next play as Maiava dodged one Bruin defender and outran another to launch a perfect throw to **WR Ja'Kobi Lane** in the back corner of the end zone for USC's only TD of the night to push USC ahead 16-13.

With 5 minutes left in the game, UCLA needed to convert a fourth-and-1 to extend its drive, and the USC front came up with a crucial stop to force a turnover on downs at the UCLA 34. USC scored a field goal on the following drive to extend its lead to 19-13.

UCLA had another opportunity with 2 minutes left and USC didn't allow the Bruins to earn a single yard which forced a turnover on downs at fourth-and-10 to seal the victory.

Maiava led another drive before throwing end-zone pick to Notre Dame S Xavier Watts, who took the same route for the clinching TD.

Lane would score another TD with 13 seconds left to secure his hat trick, but there wasn't enough time for another score and the Fighting Irish took a knee.

Under the sparkling lights of the Las Vegas Strip, USC concluded the season with a dramatic 17-point comeback victory defeating Texas A&M 35-31 in the SRS Distribution Las Vegas Bowl.

The win marked the biggest comeback victory in Las Vegas Bowl history. Additionally, it was the largest deficit that USC has ever overcome in a bowl game win, with the previous being a 15-point deficit against Penn State in the 2017 Rose Bowl.

WR Ja’Kobi Lane was named the bowl MVP after recording 7 receptions for 127 yards and a Las Vegas Bowl record 3 TDs. Lane now has 5 career receiving TDs in bowl games (3 in the 2024 Las Vegas Bowl and 2 in the 2023 Holiday Bowl versus Louisville).

WR Makai Lemon added 6 receptions for 99 yards and an electric 46-yard kick off return.

QB Jayden Maiava went 22-of-39 for 295 yards and 4 TDs with 3 INTs. Maiava tied the Las Vegas Bowl record with 4 passing TDs, joining fellow Trojan Cody Kessler, who tossed 4 in USC’s win over Fresno State in 2013.

Freshman **RB Bryan Jackson** led the ground attack for the Trojans notching 66 yards on 16 attempts with 1 TD.

USC improved to 4-0 all-time versus Texas A&M, including the last three meetings happening in bowl games. USC improved to 2-0 at Allegiant Stadium this season as the Trojans downed another SEC opponent, LSU, in the Vegas Kickoff Classic on September 1. Finally, the Trojans improved to 2-1 all-time in the Las Vegas Bowl, having defeated Fresno State in 2013 and lost to Utah in 2001.

USC ended the season on a high note going 7-6 to mark the third winning season in a row for the Trojans.

Texas A&M got on the board first with an early TD score.

Trojan **S Kamari Ramsey**, who will return for the Trojans in 2025, attempted to shift the momentum back in favor of USC. Ramsey read Aggie QB Marcell’ eyes perfectly and intercepted this pass.

The Trojans didn’t capitalize on their next series, but when it appeared that the Aggies would score again, Marcell’s ball was tipped off his receiver’s hands and then into the hands of Trojan **S Akili Arnold** who returned it 26 yards. This set up USC score as Lane scored a 30-yard TD to tie up the game at 7-7.

The game featured many young players for the Trojans stepping in in key moments, both planned and unplanned. **OL Elijah Paige** went down early causing freshman **OL Justin Tauanuu** to replace him.

After halftime, Texas A&M scored 17 points to take a 24-7 lead.

At the end of the third quarter, Lane scored his second TD of the night on a 17-yard pass from Maiava to swing the momentum back in favor of the Trojans.

Shortly thereafter, Jackson rushed for another Trojan TD to close the gap to 21-24.

Lane collected his third TD of the night with 4:30 left on the clock to give USC a 28-24 lead.

Texas A&M got the ball back, marched down the field and score a TD with 1:49 left on the clock.

Embodying the Trojan battle cry of “Fight On!”, USC drove down the field with Maiava leading the charge.

WR Kyle Ford, playing in his last game as a Trojan, scored the game winning TD with 8 seconds left on the clock -- eerily similar to **RB Woody Marks’** TD score with 8 seconds left on the clock to defeat LSU in Allegiant Stadium to open the season. Ford fell to his knees overcome with emotion after a unconventional athletic journey, with this game-winning TD to put a bow on his Trojan career.
