The University of San Diego, which sponsors sixteen NCAA Division I intercollegiate teams, competes under the athletic nickname of Toreros. In 1961, the Most Reverend Bishop Buddy, the founding father of USD, announced that the school's nickname would change from Pioneers to Toreros. "The name Toreros is keeping with the friendly relationship which exists between San Diego and Mexico," His Excellency said at the time. Torero comes from the spanish term toro, the bull, and from the word torear, to fight bulls. All of the contestants in the ring are called toreros. Torero is a general term describing a bullfighter and signifies courage, honor and fidelity. USD student-athletes, like the Torero, represent a willingness to stand alone in the ring and accept the challenge.

The 2006-2007 school year marks the 46th year with Toreros as the official nickname for USD athletic teams.


# TOREROS LOOK TO CONTINUE WINNING WAYS

Third year head coach Jim Harbaugh and his outstanding staff will look to continue their winning ways in 2006 with a squad that features four Preseason All-Americans, 14 returning starters, 48 returning lettermen, and an outstanding recruiting class that features improved size, strength, speed and athleticism. Last season the Toreros turned in the program's best year ever as they went 11-1 overall, won the PFL North Division title outright with a 4-0 record, defeated Morehead State in the PFL Championship game, and finished as the No. 1 ranked I-AA Mid-Major program in the nation. Although the team lost some key contributors from 2005's successful run - Philip Bretsch, Adam Hannula, Nick Garton,

Matthews (14 catches for 400 yards & 6 TDs). The offensive line, anchored around Paopao, will be strong with players like Clayton Austin (6-1, 270, Sr.), Matt Vuoso (6-4, 265, Sr.), Jason McFarland (6-4, 255, So.), Gabe DeAnda (6-0, 275, Jr.; moves over from defense), **Spencer Hollison** (6-6, 300, Sr.: transfer from Washington State), Kaea Simeona (6-1, 285, Sr.), Travis Scudday (6-2, 250, So.) and Andrew Kaestle (6-4, 260, Fr.). Players competing for playing time at tight end include Chris Ramsey (6-3, 244, Jr.), Mitch Ryan (6-4, 226, So.) and Zach May (6-4, 235, So.). Also looking to make their mark and be ready to contribute with the offensive unit include the fol-


Junior Hutch Parker, a 2005 PFL honorable mention pick, returns as the team's kicker to lead the special teams unit. Last season he converted 9-of-15 field goals and a school-record 62-of-66 PAT kicks. Freshman John McSorley (Granger, Ind.) will compete for playing time at punter, and also has experience at place kicker. Newcomers Matthew Leigh (Kansas City, MO) and Andrew Aldrian (Corona, CA) are also competing at the punter position, while freshman Ryan Jackson (West Hills, CA) was a proven kicker in high school before sitting out his senior year with injury. Possible return specialists could include John Matthews, Mark Cianciulli, Ben Hannula, Ryan Echers, Josh Denton and David Allen.





lowing players - WR Ben Hannula (6-2, 205, So.), who moves over from the defensive secondary; RB Mark Cianciulli (5-9, 185, Jr.), WR Eric Gregg (6-1, 195, Sr.), RB David Allen (5-10, 195, RS-Fr.), quarterback Andrew Rolin (6-3, 210, RS-Fr.), RB Josh Denton (5-6, 160, So.), WR Taber LeMarr (6-2, 210, Jr.; transfer from Wyoming), and WR Dorian Keller (5-11, 175, Jr.; transfer from Santa Rosa JC). An outstanding freshmen group of receivers is led by Justin Fontenberry (5-9, 186, San Lorenzo HS) and Godfrey Smith (6-0, 170, Oakland Tech).

The defense, centered around All-America candidates Bakhtiari and Hawkins, will be solid once again with the return of CB Josh Brisco (6-2, 200, Sr.; 36 stops, 4 interceptions), strong safety Chase McBride (6-2, 210, Sr.; 37 tackles with 7 pass break-ups), linebacker Ronnie Pentz (6-3, 225, Jr.; 40 stops), linebacker Tyler Evans (6-3, 225, Jr.; 57 tackles), linebacker Jared Forrester (6-1, 230, So.; 33 stops), lineman Ryan Morgan (6-1, 240, Sr.), lineman Eric Stern (6-3, 258, Jr.; 11 tackles for loss), junior DB Michael Crawford (6-0, 191, Jr.), lineman Chris Gianelli (6-1, 280, So.), defensive back Ryan Echer (5-10, 188, So.), and linebacker Hanner Hart (6-2, 220, Jr.). Look for Patrick O'Neill (5-11, 200, So.) and freshman **Gabriel Derricks** (6-1, 173, Fr.) to push for starting roles with the secondary.



Once again USD's schedule will be a tough task each week. The Toreros open with a twogame homestand beginning with Azusa Pacific on September 1st, followed by Dixie State College (Sept. 9th). USD's first road trip will be to the east coast to take on Ivy League opponent Yale on Sept. 16th. USD's 7-game PFL slate begins at Davidson on Sept. 30th, and ends at home against the always tough Dayton Flyers on Nov. 11th. The 2006 PFL Champion will face the champion from the Northeast Conference on Nov. 18th in the Gridiron Classic. San Diego closes out its 2006 regular-season slate with a road contest at I-AA power UC Davis on Nov. 25th.

Matt Koller, David Greer (injury) to name a few - the Toreros head into the 2006 campaign as the No. 1 ranked I-AA Mid-Major team (The Sports Network Poll). Those winning ways also include an 8-game winning streak, 16 wins in their last 17 games, and a 13-game home field winning streak in games played at Torero Stadium.

Experience and team leadership will start with, but not be limited to, the team's four Preseason All-Americans - senior linebacker Kyson Hawkins (64 tackles in 9 games), junior defensive end Eric Bakhtiari (62 tackles, 15 for loss), junior center Jordan Paopao, and record-setting junior quarterback Josh Johnson (260-for-371 for 3,256 yards and 36 touchdowns). Johnson set numerous new single game and season records, but the one statistic that jumps off the page at you is his 70.1 completion percentage. He heads into the 2006 campaign as the I-AA active career leader in completion percentage (69.21) and passing efficiency (167.34 rating).

The offensive unit will also be bolstered by the return of some solid 2005 contributors - senior running back Jon Polk (8 TDs, 231 yards rushing), junior running back JT Rogan (944 yards, 7 TDs; 36 receptions for 320 yards and 3 TDs), junior receiver Wes Doyle (35 receptions for 427

# Jim Harbaugh Head Coach, 3rd-year

Jim Harbaugh directed the USD football team to a program-best 11-1 record in 2005 and was rewarded by being named the PFL North Coach of the Year and a candidate for the Eddie Robinson I-AA Coach of the Year. The Toreros won their first-ever Pioneer Football League Championship; won the Sports Network Cup for being the No. 1 ranked I-AA Mid-Major program at the end of the season; and became the first PFL team to defeat an Ivy League opponent with the team's 17-14 win over Yale. Four of his players earned All-America recognition, two were Academic All-Americans and sixteen were recognized as All-PFL. He enters his third year as the University of San Diego head football coach with a career mark of 18-5; winners of 16 of 17, and with a 13-game home winning streak at Torero Stadium.

In his rookie year in 2004 he directed the Toreros to an overall mark of 7-4, including 5 straight wins to end the season. USD finished 3-1 in the Pioneer Football League North Division, good for a 2nd place finish. Five of his players were recognized as All-America; twelve were recognized as All-PFL; eight players were selected to the PFL All-Academic Team; and quarterback Todd Mortensen, the PFL co-Offensive Player of the Year, signed a free agent contract with the Detroit Lions.

Harbaugh, a former NFL quarterback who played 15 seasons in the league, played locally with the Chargers between 1999-2000. The 42-year-old Harbaugh, who resides in nearby Coronado, played in 177 league games with 140 starts since originally entering the NFL as a first round pick by the Chicago Bears in 1987. For his career, he completed 2,305 of 3,918 passes for 26,288 yards with 129 touchdowns.

Harbaugh played seven seasons for the Bears and passed for a careerhigh 3,121 yards for Chicago in 1991. He played for the Indianapolis Colts from 1994-97 and in 1995, achieved career highs in completion percentage (63.7) and touchdown passes (17). While with the Colts he led the team to the AFC Championship game; was voted to the Pro Bowl; was named the 1995 Comeback Player of the Year and the AFC Player of the Year; and was runner-up in the NFL MVP voting. Harbaugh played for Baltimore in 1998, and following his two-year stint with the Chargers closed out his NFL career with Carolina in 2001.


In January, 2005, Jim was inducted into the Indianapolis Colts Ring of Honor. Harbaugh, one of the most successful and popular players in the club's 21-year Indianapolis era, played from 1994-97 with the Colts. He was inducted at halftime of the Colts-Denver Wild Card playoff game. Jim started for the majority of his Colts career, completing 746 of 1,230 passes for 8,705 yards and 49 touchdowns. He won the NFL passer rating title in 1995 at 100.7. Harbaugh joins the late Robert Irsay, Bill Brooks, Ted Marchibroda and Chris Hinton in the Colts Ring of Honor.

Harbaugh was a four-year letterman at the University of Michigan and finished his college career in the top five in passing attempts, completions, completion percentage, passing yards and touchdown passes. Playing for Bo Schembechler, he was a three-year starter and led the Wolverines to appearances in the Fiesta, Holiday, and Rose Bowl games. As a senior in 1986 he guided Michigan to a No. 2 national ranking while earning Big Ten Player of the Year honors and finishing third in the Heisman balloting.

Over his final eight seasons in the NFL (1994-2001), Jim was an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach under his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky University. Serving as an offensive consultant, he scouted and recruited high school student-athletes throughout several states including Florida, Indiana and Illinois. He was involved in recruiting 17 players on WKU's 2002 I-AA National Championship team. His dad was a football coach for 41 years, including 14-years as Head Coach at Western Kentucky. His brother, John, is currently Special Teams Coordinator with the Philadelphia Eagles; and his brother-in-law, Tom Crean, is Head Basketball Coach of Marquette University.


Harbaugh has been very active in Community Service ventures. He has been actively involved with the Harbaugh Hill Foundation, the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children (Indiana University), Western Kentucky University, the Jim Harbaugh Foundation, the Uhlich's Children's Home and the Children's Miracle Network. Jim, who resides in Coronado, is the father of three children - Jay, James, Jr. and Grace.



# Torero Coordinators



## DAVE ADOLPH Assistant Head Coach Def. Coordinator & Linebackers Coach

Dave Adolph enters his third season at USD, and his second in a full-time capacity as Assistant Head Coach. He is also the program's Defensive Coordinator and Linebackers coach. This past season the Torero defense limited four teams to 7 or fewer points

including two shutouts. USD ranked 4th in pass efficiency defense, and 10th in total defense, pass defense and scoring defense.

Dave returned to coaching for the 2004 season following a 37-year coaching career that ended in January, 2000, when he retired from his post with the Kansas City Chiefs as assistant head coach/linebackers coach. He spent 21 years in the NFL ranks, including two tours of duty with the Chiefs. He served as the team's defensive coordinator from 1992-1994 and worked as the club's assistant head coach/linebacker coach in 1999.

This respected defensive expert spent his entire pro coaching career (21 years) in the AFC, including 14 years as a defensive coordinator and 12 seasons in the AFC West, making 11 career playoff appearances in the process. Prior to joining the Chiefs, Adolph spent two years ('97-98) as linebackers coach for the Oakland Raiders. He signed on with Oakland after a two-year stint ('95-96) as defensiver coordinator for the San Diego Chargers. During his three-year tenure as Kansas City's defensive coordinator from '92-94, the Chiefs made three straight playoff appearances and allowed an average of just 18.1 points per game.

Anative of Akron, Ohio, Adolph originally came to Kansas City after spending three seasons ('89-91) as defensive coordinator for the L.A. Raiders. He spent the '86-88 seasons as defensive coordinator of the Cleveland Browns. Adolph began his NFL career as the Browns defensive line coach in 1979. He took over the club's linebackers in '81 before assuming duties as defensive coordinator midway through the '84 season when Marty Schottenheimer was named head coach. He then spent one season ('85) as an assistant for San Diego before rejoining the Browns in '86.

A 16-year coaching veteran on the collegiate level, Adolph worked with the legendary Woody Hayes at Ohio State from '77-78. He also coached at Illinois ('73-76), Kentucky ('69-72), Connecticut ('65-68) and his alma mater of Akron ('63-64). An all-conference guard and linebacker for the Zips, Adolph spent three years ('59-61) as a commissioned officer in the Air Force before beginning his coaching career at Cleveland's Shaw High School in '62.



# TIM DREVNO Off. Coordinator & Offensive Line Coach

Tim Drevno begins his fourth year with the Toreros where he will again be the Offensive Coordinator and Offensive Line Coach. Last year, Drevno helped direct a potent offense that ranked 2nd in the nation

in scoring (42.58) and passing efficiency, 3rd in total offense (485.25 yards per game) and 7th in passing offense.

The 2005 squad set new team records for touchdown passes (39), points (511), scoring average, total offense per game, total yards of offense (5,823), passing yards (3,572), pass completion percentage (68.4%), first downs (305), and touchdowns (69).

In 2004 the Torero offense averaged 432.4 yards of total offense per game, ranking them 9th in the nation. The Toreros also ranked 11th in scoring offense (36.1) and 12th in passing offense (275.4). In 2003 he directed USDs' west coast offense to 483.3 yards per game and a PFL best 39.9 points per game.

Tim came to USD from the University of Idaho where he was the Offensive Line Coach for three seasons (2000 to 2002). The Vandals offense ranked 6th in the nation in 2001 and 8th in 2000. Prior to Idaho he gained coaching experience at San Jose State as offensive line coach (1999-2000); with the UNLV Rebels as running backs coach (1998); at Montana State as running backs coach (1993-98); and at Cal State Fullerton as a graduate assistant (1991-92). It was at Montana State where he launched his coaching career with a five-year stint and showed his versatility by coaching running backs, tight ends and the offensive line.

Drevno was a two-year starter at offensive guard at Cal State Fullerton and a member of the Titan Football Pride Club. He played with the Titans after a two-year all-Mission Conference career at El Camino College. While Drevno was at El Camino, the team won the 1987 national championship.

A native of Torrance, Calif., he graduated from Cal State Fullerton in 1992 with a degree in Criminal Justice. Drevno and his wife, Shannon, have three children - McKenna, Zachary and Baylee.



# Assistant Coaches

## **LANCE ANDERSON - 2nd Year**



Lance Anderson returns for his second year with the USD football program where he will again be the defensive line coach and head recruiting coordinator. Anderson, who came to the Torero program from Utah State, offers a wealth of coaching experience. In 2004 he was the outside linebackers coach for the Aggies and head coach Mike Dennehy.

Prior to Utah State he served as the co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach at Saint Mary's College (Calif.) in 2003. Under his guidance the Gaels had four defensive players earn I-AA Independent

honors as safety Weston Borba was first-team selection, linebackers Ray Mike and Heath Villarreal were second-team picks and linebacker Anthony Woodards earned honorable mention recognition.

Before spending one season at Saint Mary's, Lance worked four years at Bucknell. He spent the 2001 and 2002 seasons as the school's defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator after working


with the tight ends and offensive line in 1999 and 2000. He also has previous coaching stops at Idaho State (1997 & 1998), and with the Mobile (Ala.) Admirals of the Regional Football League in 1999.

Born and raised in Rupert, Idaho, Lance played high school football, basketball and track before walking on to the football team at Brigham Young University in 1989. After serving an LDS mission, he walked on at Idaho State in 1993 and 1994.

He graduated from Idaho State University with a degree in biology in 1996. He and his wife Sherri have three children - Aubrey, Jaren and Braden



# ED LAMB - 2nd Year




**Ed Lamb** begins his second year with the USD football program. For the second straight year he will be the secondary coach and special team's coordinator. Prior to USD Lamb was at the University of Idaho where he was the Vandals defensive coordinator for three years.

Prior to Idaho he held coaching positions with BYU and Redlands University. At Redlands he was the defensive coordinator for three seasons with the Bulldogs winning two Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference titles (1999 & 2000). During his time as coordinator with Redlands, the Bulldogs led the SCIAC in overall defense while going a combined 21-6.

Not only does Lamb have the coaching heritage, he learned defense first hand as a player at BYU where he played safety, then moved to linebacker and eventually wound up at defensive end. Lamb said

after three years as defensive coordinator at Redlands, which followed one season as a graduate assistant, he was ready to move up the college football ladder. BYU, his alma mater, offered the chance.

Lamb earned his master's of science in education in 1998 at Redlands. He and his wife, Sarah, have a daughter, Anna. Lamb is a graduate of 1992 Amador Valley High School in Pleasanton, California.



# **DELVAUGHN ALEXANDER - 2nd Year**



**DelVaughn Alexander** enters his second season with the Toreros where he will again coach the running backs. Prior to USD he was at Oregon State with Coach Mike Riley for two seasons as receivers coach and recruiting coordinator. He helped coordinate what many have called the program's top recruiting class in 2004 and followed that up with another banner class in 2005. In 2004, his receivers set several records and were among the national leaders. Alexander played two seasons for the USC Trojans, lettering both years. He also lettered two years in track as a high jumper.

Alexander began his professional career in 1995 at USC as the assistant video coordinator, before moving to an offensive assistant position under then Head Coach John Robinson in 1996 and '97. He then moved to UNLV in 1998 as wide receivers coach before rejoining Riley in 1999 with the San Diego Chargers as an offensive assistant. During the '98 season UNLV receiver Nate Turner was selected to

the All-Mountain West Conference Team after leading the league as a senior in receptions, yardage and touchdowns.

Alexander returned to UNLV in 2000 to work for Robinson, where he stayed three seasons as the quarterbacks and wide receivers coach. Under his guidance, Rebel quarterback Jason Thomas earned the MWC's Newcomer of the Year after accounting for 25 touchdowns. He also coached 2002 all-league receiver Earvin Johnson.

Prior to arriving at USC as a player, Alexander attended West Los Angeles College. He earned two letters and was a first team All-Western States Conference selection as a receiver. Alexander also earned two letters in track and was named to the all-league team as a high jumper. Alexander is a 1995 graduate of USC with a bachelor's degree in history. He also is a graduate of West Los Angeles College. DelVaughn and his wife, Star, have two sons, J.D. and Jalen.



## JIMMIE DOUGHERTY - 3rd Year



**Jimmie Dougherty** enters his third year at USD as an assistant coach. This season he will coach the quarterbacks. He spent his first two years working with the tight ends (2005) and wide receivers (2004). Last season Torero tight end Matt Koller was named to the All-PFL North First Team. In 2004 Dougherty coached an outstanding receivers group that included team MVP Michael Gasperson. Gasperson was signed as a rookie free agent by the Philadelphia Eagles in 2005, and played for Cologne in NFL Europe this past spring.

He came to USD from Illinois Wesleyan University where he was the secondary coach since 2002. During his time in Bloomington, Illinois he assisted the team with defensive game plan preparation, offensive scout team, scouting, recruiting and off-season conditioning. For two summers (2002-2003) he also worked summer camps at the University of Illinois with the quarterback camp.

Dougherty was a three-year letterman in football at the University of Missouri (1999-2001). He started during his sophomore season throwing for 1,430 yards and 7 touchdowns. He suffered a career ending injury in 2000. He was recruited out of Edwardsville High School in Edwardsville, Illinois where he was a three-sport letterman in football, basketball and baseball. He was named an All-State quarterback by Chicago Sun Times and Champaign News Gazette. He played for his father, Tim Dougherty, with team being the 2001 and 2002 Illinois Class 7-A State Runner-up.

# MIKE RISH - 23rd Year

**Mike Rish** is beginning his 23rd season on the Torero staff. He returns as the Senior Offensive Assistant where he oversees the receivers, something he has done for twenty-one of the past twenty-two Torero seasons.

Mike played for USD from 1979-83 where he posted career numbers that make him one of the best receivers ever to play at USD — he ranks third all-time with 101 receptions, 18 receiving touchdowns and 1,722 receiving yards. He held the school marks in all three career receiving departments from 1983 through 1997. He was passed up by two Torero receivers he coached - Dylan Ching in 1999, and most recently by Adam Hannula last season.

In 1983 he was selected the team's scholar-athlete by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. In the Toreros' nationally-televised game between Occidental in 1982, Rish was named the CBS Chevrolet Player of the Game. Mike graduated from USD

with an Accounting degree in 1984. He is the Vice President for Secondary Marketing for Guild Mortgage Company in San Diego.



#### MICHAEL CHRISTIANSON - 1st Year

**Michael Christianson** is beginning his 1st season on the Torero staff. Christianson, who brings a wealth of coaching experience at both the collegiate and NFL levels, will coach the Torero tight ends in 2006. The past two seasons he was on the Nebraska staff as Senior administrative assistant for Football where he oversaw the daily operation of the football program's technology areas, including all operations involving video, computer and electronics. He also assisted on the offensive side of the ball.

Prior to Nebraska he was with the Oakland Raiders staff for a brief time when Torero coach Jim Harbaugh was there. He went on to earn a master's degree in secondary education with an emphasis in administration and computer applications from Western Oregon in 1995. Christianson and his wife, Tracy, have two sons, Taylor and Cameron.



## **DAVID SHAW - 1st Year**

**David Shaw** is beginning his 1st season on the Torero staff. He will be the Passing Game Coordinator and also coach the wide receivers. Shaw is another Torero assistant that brings a wealth of coaching experience from the NFL ranks. 


# ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE TRAINING

The University of San Diego Athletic Department has made a commitment to increase the athletic ability of the entire student-athlete population. Therefore, each student-athlete will be given a sport specific training program based on the metabolic demands of their position and sport. This is accomplished by training for the proper combination of power, strength, size, speed, agility, flexibility, endurance, and footwork. It is the responsibility of the strength and conditioning staff to design and implement workouts, teach and demonstrate proper lifting technique, and to monitor and evaluate each individual athlete's progress, while maintaining a positive environment to train in. Along with increasing athletic ability, the strength staff also has the goal of decreasing athletic injuries both in and out of the athletic arena.

Student-athletes at the University of San Diego have two facilities in which they are allowed to train. Both facilities contain olympic platforms, free weights, selectorized machines, and cardio-vascular equipment. The main facility is the 5,000 square foot sports center weight room, which is open exclusively to student-athletes throughout the day. The second facility, a 3,000 square foot fitness center is located within the Jenny Craig Pavilion, USD's 5,100-seat athletic center.

The goal of the strength and conditioning department is to educate and motivate each student-athlete to maximize their genetic potential and create an environment where athletes can develop into champions both mentally and physically.

The 2006 season marks the 14th year for the Pioneer Football League, which returns to a non-divisional format for the first time since the 2000 season. After five seasons playing a North-South divisional format, the league saw its numbers reduced to eight after the 2005 season (Austin Peay leaving the conference to return to scholarship football) and those remaining members voted to adopt a full-round robin scheduling format for 2006. Additionally, the PFL champion will participate in the Gridiron Classic versus the champion of the Northeast Conference.

The PFL, a non-scholarship NCAA Division I-AA football conference, is one of only three conferences that sponsor football as its only sport (the Gateway Football Conference and Great West Football Conferences being the others). However, the PFL is a truly national conference with members on each coast and throughout the nation's heartland. The league still retains four of its charter members – Butler University, the University of Dayton, Drake University and Valparaiso University, plus the University of San Diego (joining in 1992) – which were joined in 2001 by four new teams, three of which remain today – Davidson College, Jacksonville University and Morehead State University.

In January 1991 the NCAA passed legislation to require Division I institutions to sponsor all intercollegiate sports at the Division I level. The five charter members (Evansville the fifth before dropping football in 1997), each dedicated to the enhancement and sound management of intercollegiate football as an integral part of the student-athletes' collegiate experience, joined together to form the Pioneer Football League. From the league's inception it has been a proponent of the creation of a non-scholarship football classification within Division I and adopted the moniker of Pioneer based on the intent to become the first league in that new division. The PFL is comprised of NCAA Division I universities that previously sponsored intercollegiate football at other levels with the exception of Jacksonville, which started a non-scholarship program in 1998. All are currently committed to the non-scholarship football model.

The PFL began play in 1993 with Dayton winning the league's first crown. The league spent its first season in 1993 under the administrative guidance of the Midwestern Collegiate Conference, and the office moved to St. Louis in 1994 when current commissioner Patty Viverito was named the PFL commissioner, a leadership position she continues to fill.



# Torero Record Section

# The Chet and Marguerite Pagni Family Athletic Hall of Fame

Two of the twenty-one USD inductees to the Chet and Marguerite Pagni Family Athletic Hall of Fame played football for the USD Toreros. Jan Chapman, Class of 1961, was inducted in 1995. Matt *Maslowski*, Class of 1971, was inducted in 2001.

Jan Chapman was a three-sport letter winner at the University of San Diego, but it was football where he made a name for himself. His three-year totals as quarterback included 2,573 yards and 23 touchdowns on 188-for-367 passing. His senior year was his best when he completed 85-for-167 passes foe 1,087 yards and 9 TD's, ranking him 23<sup>rd</sup> in the nation. Also as a punter, he ranked 3<sup>rd</sup> in the nation his sophomore year (43.8 yards per punt) and 6<sup>th</sup> in his senior campaign (43.2). He is the current USD season record holder for yards punted (2,287) and average (43.8). Chapman is still remembered for leading USD to a 21-20 upset over the Marine Corp Recruiting Depot which touted four future NFL stars.

Chapman's leadership abilities were demonstrated on the field as well as on campus. As co-captain for football his senior year, he received the Gil Kuhn Trophy as the Outstanding Gridder, given to the player that best demonstrated sportsmanship, performance in the highest degree, and leadership. He was also president of the Associated Student Body his senior year.

Since graduating in 1961, Jan has stayed in the San Diego area, giving back to the community by teaching and coaching at the high school and community college levels.

Matt Maslowski, after playing football at Mission Bay High School and Mesa Community College in San Diego, decided to continue his career at USD. At 6'3" and 205 lbs., Matt dominated as a receiver for the Toreros. During his first season, he was the leading club football receiver in the nation with 42 catches for 799 yards in only seven games. His collegiate career was cut short in 1970 due to injury, but he still managed some remarkable numbers during his career. Playing in only 11 games for USD, Matt had 80 catches for 1,552 yards and 18 touchdowns. He averaged a remarkable 19.4 yards per catch for the Toreros.

Because of his size and speed, Matt was offered a free agent contract by the Los Angeles Rams and played for George Allen and Tommy Prothro. In addition to the Rams, Matt played for the Chicago Bears, Minnesota Vikings and finished his career with the Florida Blazers of the World Football League.


At the request of a group of students in 1969, the University of San Diego agreed to bring football back eight years after dropping the sport. Under Coach Jim Gray, they started a club program. Matt and his teammates from the club football team laid the foundation for a solid football program still going strong.

Academic Support Services are designed to enhance the student-athlete's overall collegiate experience and encourage development and attainment of academic and career goals.

All USD student-athletes have access to advising, tutoring and mentoring services. The mentoring program, Torero Blue and MenTorero, were redeveloped in 2005 and team a graduate student in the counseling program with an athlete who would like to enhance study skills, learn about campus resources, receive guidance on goal development and attainment, and benefit from guided group study. Student-athletes also have access to a quiet area where they can study or work in the computer center. In addition, student-athletes are encouraged to utilize the campus learning centers including the Writing, Math and Logic Centers as well as to take advantage of the resources available to them in the Career Center, Counseling Center and Computer Labs.

# NCAA Compliance

### NCAA COMPLIANCE

### I want to play Division I intercollegiate athletics at San Diego...

### What do I need to do in order to play at San Diego as a freshman?

If you intend to participate in Division I or II athletics as a freshman, you must register and be certified by the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse. Your high school counselors should provide you with a student-release form and a brochure titled, "NCAA Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete." In order to be registered with the clearinghouse, you must complete the studentrelease form and mail the top (white) copy of the form to the clearinghouse along with the \$50 registration fee. Give the yellow and pink copies of the form to a high-school official, who then sends the yellow copy, along with an official copy of your high-school transcript that includes your SAT or ACT score(s), to the clearinghouse. Your high school should keep the pink copy for its files. You may also register online at www.ncaaclearinghouse. net. After graduation and before the school closes for the summer, your school also must send the clearinghouse a copy of your final transcript that confirms graduation from high school. Your counselors can obtain registration materials, at no cost, by calling the clearinghouse at (319) 337-1492 or (877) 262-1492.

#### How do I know if I'm being recruited?

You become a "prospective student-athlete" when you start ninth-grade classes. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if a college gives you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide prospective students generally. You become a "recruited prospective student-athlete" at a particular college if any coach approaches you (or any member of your family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college. Activities by coaches that cause you to become a recruited prospective student-athlete are (1) providing you with an official visit; (2) placing more than one telephone call to you or any other member of your family; or (3) visiting you or any other member of your family anywhere other than the college campus.

**Boosters:** In addition to general recruiting regulations, no alumni, boosters or representatives of a college's athletics interests can be involved in your recruitment. There can be no phone calls or letters from boosters. If a USD booster is contacting you, please call the San Diego Compliance Office as soon as possible at (619) 260-7577. Don't risk your NCAA eligibility!

# When can I talk to the coach and have him/her see me play?

**Telephone Calls:** In all sports other than football, phone calls from staff members (but not boosters) are not permitted until July 1 after completion of your junior year. In sports other than football, one telephone call to a prospect may be made during March of the prospect's junior year in high school. In both men's and women's basketball, one telephone call to a prospect may be made on or after June 21 following the prospect's junior year. Only three calls to a prospect may be made in July following a prospect's junior year, with no more than one call per week. In Football, a prospect may receive one phone call in May of the prospects junior year in high school and may start receiving additional calls after September 1 of your senior year. After this, a college coach is limited to one telephone call per week to you (or your parents or legal guardians), except that unlimited calls to you (or your parents or legal guardians) may be made under the following circumstances: (1) during the five days immediately before your official visit by the college you will be visiting; (2) on the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you by that coach; (3) on the initial date for signing the National Letter of Intent in your sport through two days after the initial signing date; and (4) you (or your parents) may telephone a coach at your expense as often as you wish. After a National Letter of Intent is signed, unlimited calls may be placed to the prospect.

Off-Campus Contacts: A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus only on or after July 1 after the completion of your junior year in high school. In sports other than football, one in-person, off-campus contact with a prospect is allowed during April of the prospect's junior year of high school. The contact must take place on the prospect's high school campus and follow restrictions on the sport's recruiting calendar. A contact is any face-to-face meeting between a college coach or athletics staff member and you or your parents, during which any of you say more than "hello." Also, any such face-to-face meeting that is prearranged or that takes place on your campus, at an organized competition or practice involving you or your high school, preparatory school, two-year college or all-star team shall be considered a contact, regardless of the conversation. Currently in all sports other than football, college coaches may contact you off the college campus no more than three times. However, a college coach may visit your high school (with the approval of your high school principal) only once a week during contact period.

**Evaluations:** An evaluation is any off-campus activity used to assess your academic qualifications or athletics ability, including a visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or watching you practice or compete at any site. Currently in all sports other than football and basketball, a college coach is limited to seven opportunities (contacts and evaluations combined) to recruit you and not more than three of the seven opportunities may be contacts. In basketball, coaches have a limit of five opportunities with which to recruit you (contact and evaluations combined) off the college campus. Not more than three of those five opportunities may be contacts. In football, a coach has three evaluation opportunities and six contact opportunities. Once you sign a National Letter of Intent, you may be evaluated an unlimited number of times by a college coach from the college with which you have signed.

**Letters:** Letters and printed recruiting information may be sent to you starting September 1<sup>st</sup> at the beginning of your junior year in high school. However, you may still contact a university prior to this date to receive general (non-athletic related) information. You may also complete an athletic questionnaire prior to this date.

#### What Can I Receive from San Diego?

You (or your family) may not receive any benefit, inducement or arrangement, such as cash, clothing, camp, improper expenses, transportation, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or attend an NCAA college. The University of San Diego may offer you a one-year scholarship that covers room and board, tuition and fees, and required course-related books, or any part of these. The institution can recommend that this aid be renewed each year, as is the general practice at the University of San Diego.


# University Profile

#### THE UNIVERSITY OF SAN DIEGO

The University of San Diego is an independent Catholic institution of higher education. Founded in 1949, USD is located on 180 acres overlooking Mission Bay, San Diego Harbor and the Pacific Ocean. The campus is named Alcalá Park and is located just 10 minutes from downtown San Diego and the world famous San Diego Zoo. Historic Old Town is just minutes away as well. The city of San Diego along with this campus traces their origins to fifteenth century Spain. The campus was named after a Spanish village near Madrid - Alcalá de Henares. Founded by the Greeks as Complutum, the village was later renamed Al Kala (the Castle) by the Moslems. Christians recaptured the village centuries later and founded a university, the University of Alcalá, whose buildings became the inspiration for USD's style.

### THE CAMPUS

The USD campus is regarded as one of the most architecturally unique institutions in the country, featuring major buildings designed in an ornamental 16<sup>th</sup> century Spanish Renaissance style. Since 1984, USD has completed numerous major construction and expansion projects. In 2000, the Jenny Craig Pavilion, a 5,100-seat athletic center, opened its doors as home to USD volleyball and basketball. In the fall of 2001, the Joan B. Kroc Institute for Peace and Justice opened on the west end of campus and a new Science and Technology Center recently opened for the 2003-04 academic year. A five-story Spanish



Renaissance parking garage (1,100 spaces) was completed in 1998. A landscaped fountain plaza was finished in the fall of 1995, connecting the entrances of the Immaculata and Hughes Administration Center. In 1992, the university completed the 45,000 square-foot Loma Hall, which includes an expanded bookstore, a larger mail center, classrooms, and laboratories.



#### **A**CADEMICS

USD enrolls more than 7,600 students who have a choice of more than 60 undergraduate and graduate degree programs. The university's academic units include the College of Arts and Sciences, and the Schools of Business Administration, Education, Law, and Nursing. Class size generally averages between 15-25 students with the student to teacher ratio being 14:1. Over 97 percent of USD's full-time faculty hold doctorates. In the annual ratings of the country's colleges and universities, published by U.S. News & World Report, USD moved from the regional to national category in 1994. The university now consistently ranks among the top schools in the United States.

#### ATHLETICS

The University of San Diego is a member of the West Coast Conference for nearly all sports and competes in 16 intercollegiate sports on the NCAA Division I level. The football team just completed its 13th season in the Pioneer Football League. Women's sports include: basketball, cross coun-

try, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball. Men's sports include: baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, football, rowing, soccer and tennis. Since 1990, USD teams have made 49 NCAA post-season appearances; garnered 56 All-American selections; had 37 Conference Coaches of the Year; won 15 conference championships; and 4 WCC Scholar Athletes of the Year. At the end of the 2005 football season, Jim Harbaugh was named the Pioneer Football League's Coach of the Year after leading the Torerosa to the best football season in school history. USD won 11 games with one loss, claimed its first ever PFL championship and finished the season ranked No. 1 in the Sports Network poll for mid majors.

### USD Athletic Facilities

#### **USD ATHLETIC FACILITIES**

#### The Jenny Craig Pavilion

The Jenny Craig Pavilion serves as home to the Toreros men's and women's basketball teams as well as the women's volleyball team. This 17.5 million dollar area has a seating capacity of 5,100 as has quickly garnered major attention from around the region, and the West Coast Conference selected USD as the site of the 2001, 2002 and 2003 WCC Basketball Championships, it has hosted the 2002 California Junior College Basketball Championships, the annual Kiwanis Basketball Tournament, the Darrell Russell Celebrity Charity Basketball game, the 2003 NFL Celebrity Basketball Game, the Official Super Bowl XXXVII Luncheon, and the 2004 Judo National Championships.

#### Cunningham Baseball Stadium


The Cunningham Baseball Stadium serves as the home diamond to the USD Baseball team. Since its inception in 1970, the stadium has undergon several renovations. Prior to the 2003 campaign, the stadium received several significant additions. A "Turf Tech" synthetic grass surface was installed in the foul areas between first and third base. Secondly, a new press box was built at the top of Cunningham Stadium that keeps the central architectural theme of 16th century Spanish Renaissance alive. In addition, a new public address system has been added. The playing surface consists of "Bullseye" Bermuda grass and the dirt portion of the infield is crushed red brick. In 2006 the stadium received a brand new scoreboard.


#### Torero Stadium

Torero Stadium serves as home to both the USD football and soccer programs. The stadium has recently received renovations that were completed to host the WUSA San Diego Spirit, with over \$3.5 million dollars spent to enlarge the seating areas and add spectator comforts. Torero stadium capacity is now 6,000. In 2001, the installation of the upgraded lighting system took place, and the final piece of the renovations was a Daktronics video board that plays movie clips and replays, as well as scoreboard information. The playing surface is "Bullseye" Bermuda grass, with soccer dimensions measuring 118 yards x 72 yards, with football conforming to NCAA regulations.

#### USD Softball Complex

The USD Softball Complex serves as the home diamond for the Torero softball team. The playing surface is "Bullseye" Bermuda grass, with the facility also including two batting cages that allow players to work on their hitting skills. A lighted LED Daktronics scoreboard sits over the right field fence and allows fans to be updated on game stats. Stadium seating capacity is 325, and spectators are also comforted by a full-service concessions stand and public facilities. The stadium is also lighted, enabling night games. In addition, a new public address system has been added, as well as a press box down the third base line.











# San Diego, 'America's Finest City'







San Diego is truly "America's Finest City." A modern metropolis (second largest in California) and a popular yearround resort, San Diego spreads from the coast to the desert, including cliffs, mesas, hills, canyons and valleys. San Diego also surrounds one of California's greatest natural harbors which has been a dominant factor in determining the city's history, economy and development.

Meteorologists claim San Diego as the country's only area with perfect climate. This ideal year-round environment posts an average daytime temperature of 70 degrees, with an annual rainfall average of less than 10 inches. Most days are sunny, with humidity generally low, even in the summer. The climate, attractive setting and recreational facilities make San

Diego "America's Finest City."

According to Sports Illustrated, "For sheer numbers of participants, diversity of pursuits of involvement, San Diego must rank as the sports fitness capital of the U.S." Sports are a major feature of the San Diego lifestyle. One can sail, swim, surf, scuba dive, snorkel, wind-surf on 70 miles of public beach or golf at any of the over 80 golf courses throughout the county. Balboa Park, a 1,158-acre recreation and cultural center, offers 25 tennis courts, two gymnasiums, two municipal golf courses. and one of the nation's finest zoos. Mission Bay Park is a 4,600acre playground for jogging, fishing, bicycling, tennis, golf, jet skiing and kite flying.

As well as participating in recreational activities, San Diego supports their professional teams -- the NFL Chargers play at Qualcomm Stadium and the National League Padres play in their new downtown facility, Petco Park. During college football bowl week, San Diego annually hosts the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl in late December. During 1998, Qualcomm Stadium hosted the Super Bowl game between Denver and Green Bay; followed by the World Series between the San Diego Padres and the New York Yankees. The Super Bowl returned to San Diego in January, 2003. Whatever sporting activity there is, it's here in San Diego -- the sports capital of the U.S.A.

# KY SNYDER Executive Director of Athletics

Ky Snyder was named Executive Director of Athletics at the University of San Diego on December 10th, 2003. Dr. Mary E. Lyons, USD President, introduced Snyder who returns to USD where he was Director of Athletic Development between 1990-1996. He came back to USD from the San Diego International Sports Council where he held the position of President.

With the San Diego International Sports Council, the Snyder's primary responsibility was to promote San Diego/Tijuana as the preferred region for sporting events and activities that benefit the community both economically and socially. Recent accomplishments of the Sports Council bid efforts include securing for San Diego the 1997 and 1998 ESPN Summer X Games, the Suzuki Rock 'n' Roll Marathon, the 1999 Major League Soccer All-Star Game, the inaugural

Bank of America/U.S. Olympic Cup, NCAA Division I Men's Basketball First & Second Round (2001) contests, the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championships (2001) and Super Bowl XXXVII.

In the spring of 2001, Snyder was named the President of the San Diego Super Bowl XXXVII Host Committee. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the San Diego NFL Youth Education Town and the San Diego Super Bowl Task Force. Snyder was also the Executive Director of the San Diego International Sports Foundation.

Prior to joining the SDISC, Snyder was the Director of Athletic Development at the University of San Diego for six years. At USD he was responsible for establishing the Torero Athletic Association, fund-raising efforts for athletics, managing athletic special events and generating corporate sponsorship of athletics.

At USD he oversees an athletic department with sixteen NCAA Division I intercollegiate teams and approximately 400 student-athletes. He is responsible for all administrative, management and supervisory aspects of the Department of Athletics. Additionally, he oversees the strategic long-range planning and monitoring of budgets, personnel, programs, facilities, fundraising, promotions and marketing, and public relations for an NCAA Division I program consisting of eight sports for men and eight sports for women. He serves on the NCAA Division I-AA Football Rules Committee, the West Coast Conference TV Committee, Marketing Committee and Women's Basketball Committee.

Snyder played football at San Diego State University. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in Marketing from San Diego State University and has studied in the Master's Leadership Program at the University of San Diego. Snyder, who has been a San Diego resident for 24 years, has a very athletic family. ## ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans





The ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Football Team, selected annually by members of the College Sports Information Directors of America, honors the nation's best student-athletes. Just as the balancing of football and academics is difficult, the standards for nomination and selection to the team are rigorous. To be nominated, a varsity starter or key reserve player must have a minimum 3.200 cumulative grade-point average (on a 4.000 scale).

The program began in the 1950s with honorees in football; later, basketball and baseball all-academic teams were added. Academic and athletics biographical data of nominees are prepared in ballot form and mailed to the CoSIDA membership, who vote in each of eight districts. From the eight district teams comes a national ballot, distributed to the 1,400 members for the final all-academic team.

"The achievements of these young men should truly be commended," said NBC sportscaster Dick Enberg, spokesperson for the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America team. In 2004 Evan Harney joined six former Torero gridders after being named First Team. The record-setting Torero running back carried a 3.90 grade-point average as a Business Administration major.
