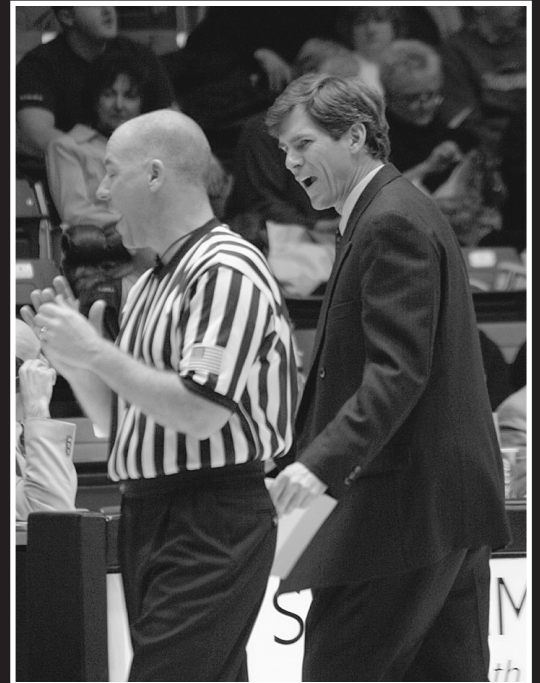
Brad Holland

Brad Holland, a two-time West Coast Conference Coach of the Year, has tallied seven winning seasons at USD and nine campaigns with .500 or better marks. Three seasons ago he guided USD to the WCC Basketball Championship and the NCAA Tournament. Coach Holland's coaching staffs have played a huge role in the program's success and he is the first to credit his assistants when talking about the success of USD basketball. This season he welcomes back top assistant George Tuttle, who plays a key role with both recruiting and coaching; sixth-year assistant Sam Scholl, a USD graduate who played for coach Brad Holland, returns as second assistant; Nick Earnest begins his third season with the program and his second as a full-time assistant; and T.J. Brown returns as Head Team Manager.

◆ The Jenny Craig Pavilion opened its doors in October of 2000, and ever since has earned a sparkling reputation as one of the finest athletic venues of its size.

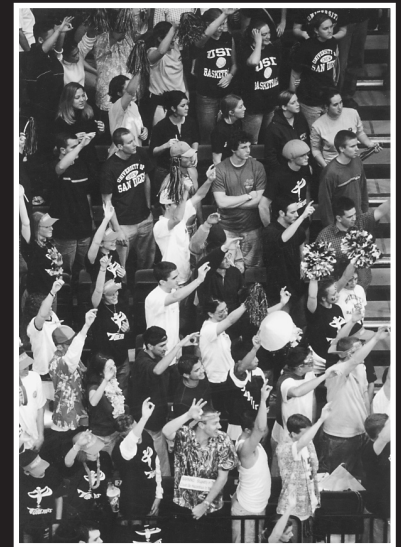
◆ In 2003, the JCP hosted the West Coast Conference Basketball Championships for the third straight year and the USD Toreros won their first ever WCC Tournament title.

◆ The USD men opened the JCP in grand fashion with the Torero Tip-Off on December 2, 2000 with an 82-71 win over Oregon State before over 4,000 fans.

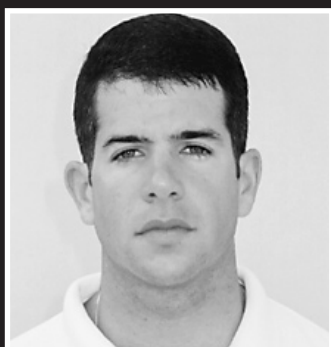

Academic Support Services are designed to enhance the student-athlete's overall collegiate experience and encourage development and attainment of academic and career goals.

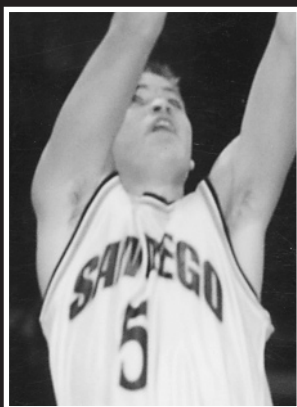
All USD student-athletes have access to advising, tutoring and mentoring services. The mentoring program, Torero Blue and MenTorero, were redeveloped in 2005 and team a graduate student in the counseling program with an athlete who would like to enhance study skills, learn about campus resources, receive guidance on goal development and attainment, and benefit from guided group study. Student-athletes also have access to a quiet area where they can study or work in the computer center. In addition, student-athletes are encouraged to utilize the campus learning centers including the Writing, Math and Logic Centers as well as to take advantage of the resources available to them in the Career Center, Counseling Center and Computer Labs.

Since arriving at USD for the 1994-95 season, head coach Brad Holland has had 34 players exhaust their NCAA Division I playing eligibility under his guidance. USD'S NBA CONNECTION ...

CAVS HAVE SAN DIEGO CONNECTIONS

CLEVELAND - (KRT) - They call themselves the "San Diego Mafia."

It sounds sinister, but this group is hardly the Cosa Nostra, though they are indeed underground.

Name the universities with notable lineage in the modern NBA, and North Carolina, Duke and UCLA will be at the top of the list. And, of course, those University of San Diego Toreros.

Sure enough, the small Catholic school might not be a collegiate power, but it has been quite the cradle of NBA coaches and executives currently shaping the league. And, now, the unofficial capital is Cleveland.

Three top members of the Cavaliers organization put down their roots at San Diego. In fact, first-year head coach Mike Brown, who is opening his training camp today, assistant coach Hank Egan and assistant general manager Chris Grant were all part of the same college team a little more than a decade ago.

They're not alone. Bernie Bickerstaff, the coach and general manager of the Charlotte Bobcats, is also an alum.

The rest of the group is scattered across the league in various positions. Former Golden State Warriors coach and current Memphis Grizzlies assistant Eric Musselman is one. Indiana Pacers vice president David Morway is another. Los Angeles Clippers assistant coach Neal Meyer was a teammate of Brown and Grant's on a team coached by Egan. Atlanta Hawks assistant coach David Fizdale succeeded Brown as the team's starting point guard in the mid-'90s.

Most of their backgrounds and stories are much the same. They were barely given anything and had to work their way up slowly through the NBA ranks.

"Which is a nice way of saying none of us were good enough to actually play in the NBA," Grant said. "I don't know if there's a single trait we all share. I think for the most part we're all hard workers who sort of followed in each other's footsteps."

The "godfather" is undoubtedly Egan, 67, who was Brown and Grant's coach at San Diego. Egan has been coaching since shortly after graduating from the Naval Academy in 1960. The Brooklyn native chose to serve his time in the Air Force, which led to an assignment in the physical education department at the Air Force Academy. He rose through the ranks to become Air Force head coach and eventually moved on to the same job with the Toreros.

Unable to compete for top-shelf players against the Pac-10 Conference, Egan often sought out hard-nosed, high-IQ players who understood the game and were able to play multiple positions. That's how he found Brown and Grant, both of whom were at junior colleges and both of whom later played multiple positions for him.

"You can say it, we weren't McDonald's All-Americans," Brown said. "We had success on the court because of effort and hard work and we've done the same in the NBA. Most of us started at the bottom of the totem pole."

When Brown was a senior and coming to grips with the fact that his playing career was coming to a close, he read an article about Bickerstaff and for the first time truly learned his background. Bickerstaff

had risen from a player at San Diego into a respected coach and NBA executive, and Brown immediately found an idol to chase.

Egan made a few calls on his behalf and talked Bickerstaff, then the general manager of the Denver Nuggets, into taking on Brown as an unpaid intern.

"He'd never had an intern before and wasn't sure about the idea," Egan said. "But I had a lot of good things to say about Mike, and he was willing to work for free."

Brown was supported by his parents for the summer internship. He ended up earning just \$1,500, half of which he had to use to repair his car. But he impressed Bickerstaff enough to offer him a full-time job in the team's video room, and soon he was on a track to becoming the NBA's second-youngest head coach.

"Coach Egan and Coach Bickerstaff are the two men most responsible for getting us into the league," Brown said. "They made calls for us and helped us with contacts. Otherwise, we'd never have made it."

Two summers later, Egan made a similar call to Atlanta Hawks general manager Pete Babcock about Grant. When Grant came to San Diego for his recruiting visit, Brown was his host, and the two have been close since. Seeing how Brown had used a contact and some hard work to get in the door in Denver, he had the same goal.

"It was sort of the same deal. Pete had never had an intern either and I just sort of gave him the idea," Egan said. "Now, that's a way a lot of young guys get into the league, but at the time it was a new idea."

Grant made a three-day drive from Southern California to Atlanta, unsure what was going to be waiting for him.

"I basically had no idea how I was going to get by," Grant said. "I figured if it didn't work out, I had my car and I could always go home."

Babcock agreed to give Grant a job in the Hawks' video room and pay him \$6 an hour. To make ends meet, he worked for the equipment manager washing towels after practices and games. After his internship, he, too, was offered a full-time job and began to work his way up.

While Brown was advancing to assistant coaching jobs in San Antonio and Indiana, Grant climbed the front-office ladder in Atlanta, eventually being named assistant general manager last season.

Egan also decided to try his hand in the NBA, leaving San Diego in 1994 to join the San Antonio Spurs coaching staff. He also worked on the Warriors coaching staff when Musselman was the head coach. Now he's working for two of his former players.

"I know technically that I'm his boss and I make more money than him," Brown said. "But I still feel like he's the one who's in charge."

It's all combined for quite an impressive legacy for the San Diego group, who try to get together at least once a year. Egan is just as proud of former players like Randy Bennett, the coach at St. Mary's in California, and Todd Lee, the coach at Kentucky Wesleyan, who have become successful in the college ranks.

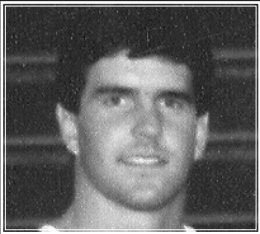
"Most of them are just really, really talented young people," Egan said. "The fact that they're all in the business and doing well isn't a surprise."

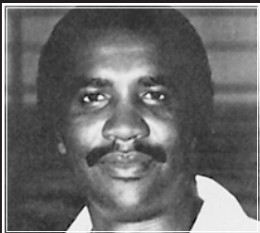
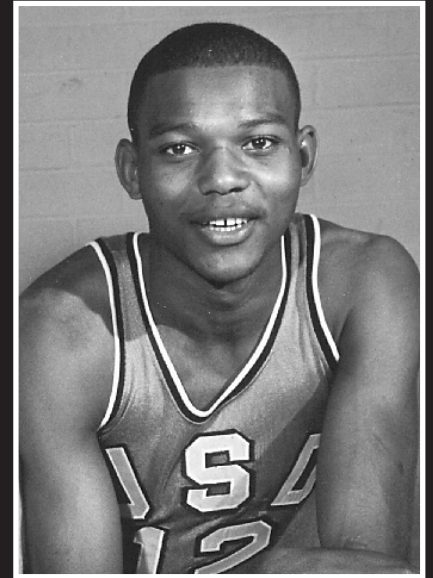


Bernie Bickerstaff

On October 11, 2003, John Cunningham was inducted into the Chet and Marguerite Pagni Family Athletic Hall of Fame. Although he coached USD baseball for 35 years, Cunningham was an assistant basketball coach for fifteen years (1962-1977). He became the seventh inductee that was involved with the USD men's basketball program, joining Bernie Bickerstaff, Mike Whitmarsh, Gus Magee, Phil Woolpert, Scott Thompson and Jim Brovelli. All of these selections made huge impacts on USD basketball and helped pave the way to its current successful position in the NCAA Division I ranks.



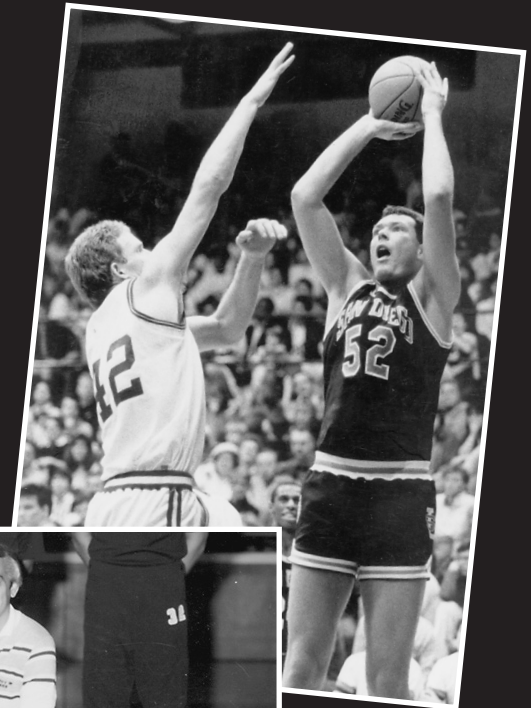
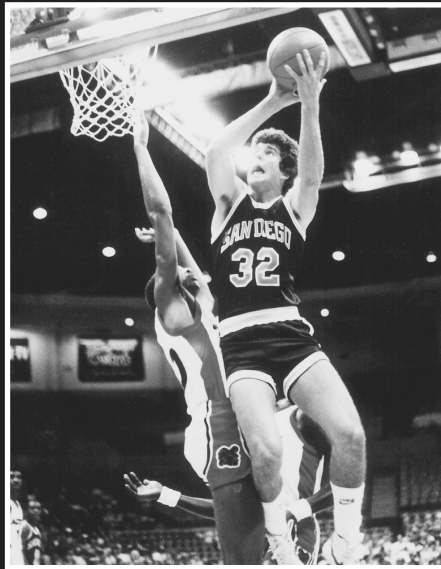

SAN DIEGO - 'AMERICA'S FINEST CITY'



San Diego is truly "America's Finest City." A modern metropolis (second largest in California) and a popular year-round resort, San Diego spreads from the coast to the desert, including cliffs, mesas, hills, canyons and valleys. San Diego also surrounds one of California's greatest natural harbors which has been a dominant factor in determining the city's history, economy and development.

Meteorologists claim San Diego as the country's only area with perfect climate. This ideal year-round environment posts an average daytime temperature of 70 degrees, with an annual rainfall average of less than 10 inches. Most days are sunny, with humidity generally low, even in the summer. The climate, attractive setting and recreational facilities make San Diego "America's Finest City."

According to Sports Illustrated, "For sheer numbers of participants, diversity of pursuits of involvement, San Diego must rank as the sports fitness capital of the U.S."

Sports are a major feature of the San Diego lifestyle. One can sail, swim, surf, scuba dive, snorkel, wind-surf on 70 miles of public beach or golf at any of the over 80 golf courses throughout the county.

Balboa Park, a 1,158-acre recreation and cultural center, offers 25 tennis courts, two gymnasiums, two municipal golf courses, and one of the nation's finest zoos. Mission Bay Park is a 4,600-acre playground for jogging, fishing, bicycling, tennis, golf, jet skiing and kite flying.

As well as participating in recreational activities, San Diego supports their professional teams -- the NFL Chargers play at Qualcomm Stadium, and the National League Padres play at downtown's Petco Park. During college football bowl week, San Diego annually hosts the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl in late December. During 1998, Qualcomm Stadium hosted the Super Bowl game between Denver and Green Bay; followed by the World Series between the San Diego Padres and the New York Yankees. The Super Bowl returned to San Diego in 2003 with the Tampa Bay Bucs beating the Oakland Raiders.

Whatever sporting activity there is, it's here in San Diego -- the sports capital of the U.S.!



Qualcomm Stadium, home to the San Diego Chargers, has hosted both the Super Bowl and World Series. It was the site of the Super Bowl in January, 2003. The Pacific Life Holiday Bowl, recognized as "America's Most Exciting College Bowl Game," will be played Dec. 29th, 2005 and feature the Pac-10 runner up against the 3rd selection from the Big 12.



2005-06 Toreros Mix Experience With Youth

HEAD COACH BRAD HOLLAND:

Head coach **Brad Holland** enters his 12th year at the helm of the Torero men's basketball program. Holland, who has tallied nine seasons of .500 or better records in eleven years, will be looking to continue his winning ways after last year's 16-13 club that finished tied for 3rd in the highly competitive West Coast Conference. For his efforts, Holland was tabbed the WCC Coach of the Year by CollegeInsider.com. With the graduation of co-MVP's Brandon Gay (17.4 ppg/6.6 rpg) and Brice Vounang (15.1 ppg/7.5 rpg), both 2nd Team District 15 picks, Holland will look for players to step up their production at both ends of the floor.

5th-YEAR SENIOR LEADERSHIP:

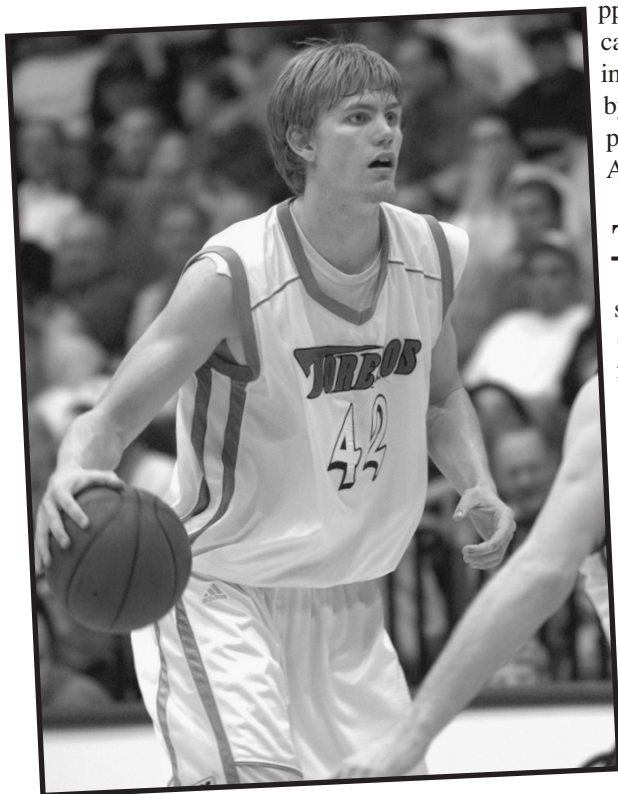
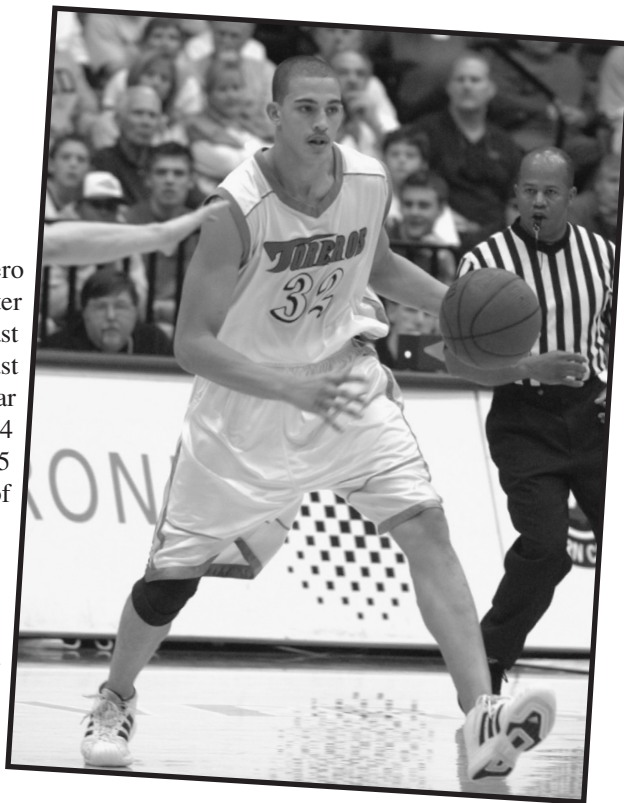
Coach Holland and his staff will have the luxury of having two experienced players that are entering their fifth year with the program - senior forwards **Corey Belser** (Spanaway, Washington) and **Nick Lewis** (Paradise Valley, Arizona). Belser, who last year was named the Mid-Major Defensive Player of the Year by CollegeInsider.com, will once again have the chore of stopping the opponent's top scorer. Look for Belser to also pick up in the scoring department, something he wasn't asked to do last year with Gay and Vounang in the line-up. Belser proved he is worthy with a 15 point/10 rebound effort in last year's impressive 95-88 road win at Wyoming; with a 17 point/8 rebound total in the team's 3-point home loss to 2nd place Saint Mary's; and with his 10 point/11 rebound game in the team's 86-80 win over Pepperdine in their quarterfinal contest of the WCC Tournament.

Nick Lewis will be one of the league's premier players at both ends of the floor. He is the team's top returning scorer (12.6 ppg) and rebounder (5.2 rpg), and should see increased production in both of those categories. He showed his offensive talents last year by scoring in double figures in 20 of 29 games played. He posted three double-doubles that was highlighted by his 28 point/10 rebound performance in the team's 92-88 home win over Pepperdine. He also posted back-to-back double-doubles in solid wins over Northern Arizona (13/10) and UC Santa Barbara (20/11).

THE REST OF THE RETURNERS:

Joining Belser and Lewis as returners from last year's 16-13 club are senior forward **Michael Shepherd** (Orem, UT), junior guards **Ross DeRogatis** (Mansfield, TX) and **Michael Hubbard** (Los Angeles, CA), and redshirt freshman **Gyno Pomare** (Oceanside, CA). DeRogatis, who joins Belser and Lewis as a returning starter, played a key role last year as the team's floor general. He averaged 7.9 ppg to go with a team-best 99 assists, but was deadly with his long-range shooting. He led the team in three-point accuracy overall (46.2%) and in WCC play (50%). Although he scored in double figures in ten games, his breakout performance came against Santa Clara at home when he poured in 28 points. In that 87-73 JCP victory he canned all six of his three-point attempts in the first half to keep the Toreros close, and finished 8-for-10 overall from beyond the painted arc.

Shepherd and Hubbard played key roles coming off the bench a year ago, but should see their playing roles increase significantly. Shepherd, who saw action in 26 games and all 14 WCC contests, played some quality minutes in giving USD's big men a rest. Hubbard continued to battle through injuries and appeared in 17 games overall and 9 league tilts. He scored 5 points in four different WCC games and totaled a season-best 9 points in the team's win





over Occidental. Local product Gyno Pomare, a 6-7 forward out of El Camino High School in Oceanside, should play a key role in USD's plans this season after redshirting last year.

THE NEWCOMERS:

USD will have more new than old this season with the addition of six new scholarship players and three new walk-ons. Through the junior college ranks the Toreros have picked up inside players **Nir Cohen**, a 6-7 forward/center out of Monroe JC in Rochester, New York, and **Theo White**, a 6-4 power forward from Tyler Community College in Tyler, Texas. Both players are expected to see action immediately and provide the Toreros with inside scoring and rebounding at both ends of the floor.

San Diego brings in an outstanding quartet of freshmen with the likes of **Brandon Johson**, a sturdy 6-0, 195 lb. point guard from Willow Ridge HS in Houston, Texas; **Danny Brown**, a 6-4, 180 lb. shooting guard from DeSoto HS in Olathe, Kansas; **Ray Murdock**, an athletic 6-3, 193 lb. wing player from Pinnacle HS in Phoenix, Arizona; and **Chris Lewis**, a 6-7, 200 lb. guard-forward from Lawrence D. Bell HS in Bedford, Texas.

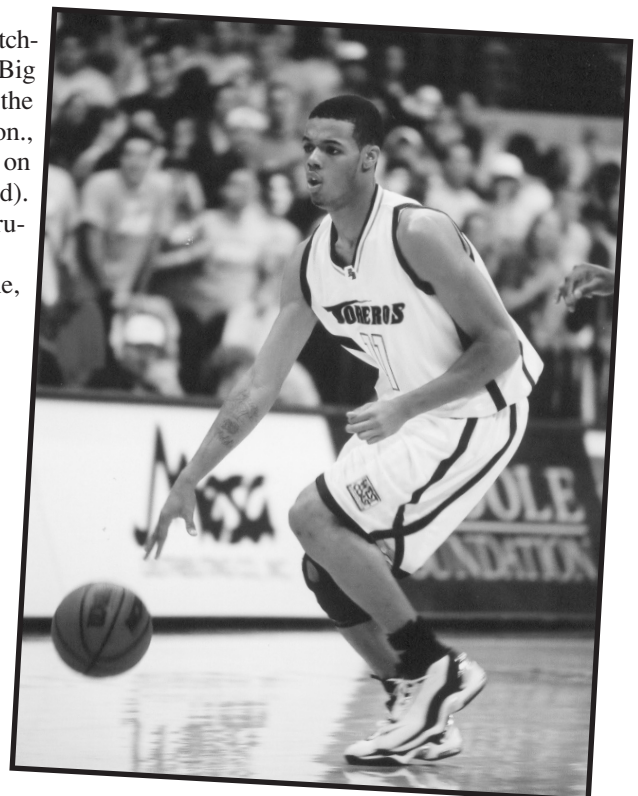
Joining the Torero squad as walk-ons this season will be a trio of juniors **Clayton Tolbert**, a 6-2 guard from San Jose, California who started his collegiate career at West Valley Junior College; **Greg Nelson, Jr.**, a 6-0 guard from nearby Carlsbad that started at Cal Poly; and **Kyle Price**, a 6-2 guard from Valencia, California. In total USD will have seven new players that have not been involved with NCAA Division I basketball, but will have a chance to play.

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE:

The Toreros will begin the 2005-06 season with four straight road games beginning with Campbell (Buies Creek, NC) on Nov. 18th. USD will follow up with three California road games at UC Santa Barbara (Nov. 21), San Jose State (Nov. 23) and UC Riverside (Nov. 26). USD's home opener will be against crosstown rival San Diego State on Wednesday, Nov. 30th. Other key nonconference games will be against Fresno State on Dec. 10th in the San Diego Slam at Cox Arena, at home versus New Mexico on Dec. 22nd, and at Eastern Washington on New Year's Day.

The West Coast Conference 2006 men's basketball schedule will be switching to a Saturday-Monday format to allow the WCC to participate on ESPN's 'Big Monday' television package. With that USD will kickoff their WCC slate on the road with games at Loyola Marymount (Sat., Jan. 7th) and Pepperdine (Mon., Jan. 9th). USD's WCC home opener will be against the Santa Clara Broncos on Monday, January 16th, followed by Gonzaga (Jan. 21st) and Portland (Jan. 23rd). USD will complete their WCC homestand with Saint Mary's on Monday, February 20th, before closing out their regular-season at Gonzaga and Portland.

The West Coast Conference Tournament will take place in Spokane, Washington (Mar. 3-6) on the campus of Gonzaga University.

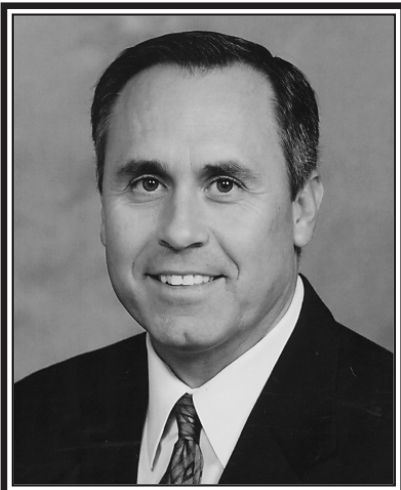

**BRAD HOLLAND****12th year****Two-time WCC Coach of the Year**

The 2005-2006 season will be Brad Holland's 12th at the helm of the USD men's basketball program. Holland has guided USD to 108 victories over the past seven seasons, including a personal-best 20 win campaign in 1999-2000. This past season he directed the Toreros to a 16-13 overall mark and 3rd place finish in the competitive West Coast Conference. USD tallied the biggest turnaround in Division I basketball with an improvement of 12 victories. With the team's 69-61 home win over San Francisco on Feb. 9th, Holland notched his 161st career USD victory to become the program's all-time winningest coach. CollegeInsider.com tabbed him the 2004-05 WCC Coach of the Year. Seniors Brandon Gay and Brice Vounang were both named to the NABC District 15 Second Team.

In 2002-03 he guided USD to an impressive 18-12 mark; to the 2003 WCC Basketball Championship title; and to the program's first trip to the NCAA Tournament in sixteen years. The season was highlighted early on by the team's 86-81 overtime win at No. 14 UCLA. The Toreros would go on to tally a 10-4 second place finish in league play. The Toreros earned a double-bye into the WCC Tournament semifinals; they knocked off USF in the semi-final, then beat Gonzaga in front of a national TV audience in the title game to earn the league's automatic bid into the NCAA Tournament. They gave the Stanford Cardinal a battle before falling 77-69 in NCAA 1st round action. Senior center Jason Keep became the program's first-ever 1st Team NABC District 15 selection.

Four seasons ago Holland guided the Toreros to a 16-13 mark and a semifinal appearance in the WCC Championships. The Toreros earned quality nonconference wins over UC Irvine and San Diego State (4th straight year), along with key WCC wins over Santa Clara (on the road) and San Francisco (twice). Senior guard Andre Laws became the first Torero since 1987 to earn NABC District 15 honors (2nd Team).

Six seasons ago Holland guided the Toreros to a 20-9 overall mark and 10-4 WCC finish. The 20 wins and 10 WCC victories were the school's most since the 1987 season. Holland was named the WCC Coach of the Year by his peers for the 2nd straight season. The Toreros won seven of their final ten games to finish strong again, a trait of Holland coached teams. The season was highlighted by WCC wins at Gonzaga (82-70), and at home over WCC champion Pepperdine (73-62). The Toreros finished 11-2 at home, and were 9-7 on the road, including an excellent 5-2 WCC road mark. He earned his first WCC Coach of the Year honor during the 1998-99 campaign when he directed USD to an 18-9 record and a 2nd place finish in the league race (9-5). Highlights from the 1998-99 squad included the team's victory over Texas in the Torero Tip-Off, and the team's upset over then No. 25 Gonzaga (75-59). In 1997-98 Holland guided USD to a 14-14 overall record and a 3rd straight semi-final appearance in the WCC Tournament. The Toreros won five of their final eight contests and earned solid victories over WCC champion Gonzaga, and two wins over runner-up Pepperdine.

Holland owns a twelve-year mark of 164-150 at USD — including his two-year stint at CS Fullerton, his career coaching record sits at 187-181. During his USD tenure he owns nine seasons with .500 or better records. In 1996-97 he directed the Toreros to a 17-11 record; the 17 wins were a personal-best for Holland in six years as a collegiate head coach. The Toreros advanced to the semifinals of the WCC Tournament after defeating Gonzaga in the opener. They finished the season on a strong note, winning seven of their final nine. Included in the team's 17 victories were solid nonconference wins against San Jose State, CS Fullerton, UC Santa Barbara and UC Irvine. Although they came up short, the Toreros played Kansas to seven points in Lawrence (72-79) and Stanford to two (70-72) at the San Diego Sports Arena. The 1995-96 club, hit with a variety of injuries throughout the year, finished strong and ended the year at 14-14. In his first year at USD Brad guided the Toreros to an 11-16 overall record and a 5th place finish in the WCC. The season was highlighted early-on when the Toreros downed visiting Notre Dame, 90-76, on December 3rd before 6,522 fans at the San Diego Sports Arena.

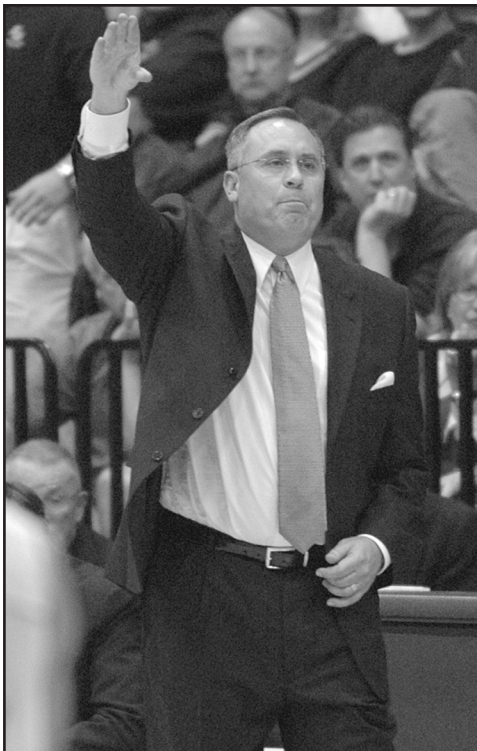
Prior to USD Holland won rave reviews for the manner in which he revitalized the Cal State Fullerton program. During the 1992-93 season, his first as a head coach, the Titans finished 15-12 and posted the school's first winning record in four years while going 10-8 in the Big West Conference. Along the way they beat every team in the conference except New Mexico State, capping the year with an exciting one-point home victory over nationally ranked UNLV. His 1993-94 team, which lost three players to season-ending injuries prior to the start of the season, finished 8-19 overall and eighth in Big West play. They did have some memorable victories — they won at Nevada; at UC Santa Barbara's Thunderdome; for the 3rd year in-a-row at UC Irvine; and they knocked off UNLV with a 84-75 victory at the Thomas and Mack Center. Prior to his appointment at Fullerton, Holland was an assistant coach on Jim Harrick's staff at UCLA from August, 1988 to March, 1992. He helped the Bruins return to national prominence while compiling a 93-35 record that took them to four NCAA tournaments.

Success as a head coach is merely the latest positive mark Holland has made on Southern California basketball. He was a basketball and football star at Crescenta Valley High School. He was a four-year basketball letterman at UCLA and played with the Los Angeles Lakers and two other National Basketball Association teams before retiring in 1982 due to a knee injury. He entered private business and also was a broadcaster for Prime Ticket from 1985 to 1988. Holland was the last player recruited by Coach John Wooden and became a part of four Pac-10 championship teams at UCLA from 1976 to 1979, two under Coach Gene Bartow and two under Coach Gary Cunningham. The Bruins went 102-17 during Holland's playing career and he was honorable mention All-America and second-team Academic All-America as a senior. That year he averaged 17.5 points and 4.8 assists and had a .598 field goal percentage, the best ever by a Bruin guard.

He graduated in 1979 from UCLA with a B.A. degree in Sociology. The Lakers drafted Holland in 1979, the 14th player taken in the first round, and went on to win the 1980 NBA championship. The rookie guard scored eight points in the decisive sixth game at Philadelphia. He finished his playing career in 1981-82 with Washington and Milwaukee.

Holland and his wife, Leslie, reside in Carlsbad. They have three children — twins Kristin and Lisa, 2005 USD graduates, and a son, Kyle.

**WCC BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT
HEADS TO PACIFIC NORTHWEST**

The West Coast Conference Basketball Tournament heads to the Pacific Northwest in 2006 as Gonzaga University hosts the WCC's premier event for the first time at the McCarthey Athletic Center. For the fourth consecutive season, the men's championship will use an 8-Team/Play-in format, while the women's championship will use the traditional 1 vs. 8 format with no byes for the second straight year. The women will play March 2-5, 2006 and the men will square-off March 3-6, 2006. The 2006 championship begins a two-year Northwest stint for the WCC Tournament, as the event will be held at the University of Portland in 2007 before returning to Southern California in 2008 and 2009.

WCC TOURNEY FORMAT

Men's Format

Under the format that was adopted in 2003, the #5 through #8 seeds will compete in the opening round to determine who will advance to the next round of the tournament. Waiting for the winners in the quarterfinals will be the #3 and #4 seeds, who will have first round byes. The winners of the quarterfinal match-ups will go head-to-head with the #1 and #2 seeds, who will have byes through the first two rounds of the tournament.

Women's Format

For the second straight year the tournament will use the traditional No. 1 seed vs. No. 8 seed format for the women's championship. All eight WCC schools will play on the first day of the tournament with the No. 1 seed facing the No. 8 seed, the No. 2 seed facing the No. 7 seed, the No. 3 seed facing the No. 6 seed, and the No. 4 seed facing the No. 5 seed. The women will play the first round on March 2, 2006 with a day off on March 3rd. Play will resume with the semifinals on March 4th and the championship game on March 5th.

NCAA COMPLIANCE

I want to play Division I intercollegiate athletics at San Diego...

What do I need to do in order to play at San Diego as a freshman?

If you intend to participate in Division I or II athletics as a freshman, you must register and be certified by the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse. Your high school counselors should provide you with a student-release form and a brochure titled, "NCAA Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete." In order to be registered with the clearinghouse, you must complete the student-release form and mail the top (white) copy of the form to the clearinghouse along with the \$50 registration fee. Give the yellow and pink copies of the form to a high-school official, who then sends the yellow copy, along with an official copy of your high-school transcript that includes your SAT or ACT score(s), to the clearinghouse. Your high school should keep the pink copy for its files. You may also register online at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. After graduation and before the school closes for the summer, your school also must send the clearinghouse a copy of your final transcript that confirms graduation from high school. Your counselors can obtain registration materials, at no cost, by calling the clearinghouse at (319) 337-1492 or (877) 262-1492.

How do I know if I'm being recruited?

You become a "prospective student-athlete" when you start ninth-grade classes. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if a college gives you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide prospective students generally. You become a "recruited prospective student-athlete" at a particular college if any coach approaches you (or any member of your family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college. Activities by coaches that cause you to become a recruited prospective student-athlete are (1) providing you with an official visit; (2) placing more than one telephone call to you or any other member of your family; or (3) visiting you or any other member of your family anywhere other than the college campus.

Boosters: In addition to general recruiting regulations, no alumni, boosters or representatives of a college's athletics interests can be involved in your recruitment. There can be no phone calls or letters from boosters. If a USD booster is contacting you, please call the San Diego Compliance Office as soon as possible at (619) 260-4755. Don't risk your NCAA eligibility!

When can I talk to the coach and have him/her see me play?

Telephone Calls: In all sports other than football, phone calls from staff members (but not boosters) are not permitted until July 1 after completion of your junior year. In sports other than football, one telephone call to a prospect may be made during March of the prospect's junior year in high school. In both men's and women's basketball, one telephone call to a prospect may be made on or after June 21 following the prospect's junior year. Only three calls to a prospect may be made in July following a prospect's junior year, with no more than one call per week. In Football, a prospect may receive one phone call in May of the prospects junior year in high school and may start receiving additional calls after September 1 of your senior year. After this, a college coach is limited to one telephone call per week to you (or your parents or legal guardians), except that unlimited calls to you (or your parents or legal guardians) may be made under the following circumstances: (1) during the five days immediately before your official visit by the college you will be visiting; (2) on the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you by that coach; (3) on the initial date for signing the National Letter of Intent in your sport through two days after the initial signing date; and (4) you (or your parents) may telephone a coach at your expense as often as you wish. After a National Letter of Intent is signed, unlimited calls may be placed to the prospect.

Off-Campus Contacts: A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus only on or after July 1 after the completion of your junior year in high school. In sports other than football, one in-person, off-campus contact with a prospect is allowed during April of the prospect's junior year of high school. The contact must take place on the prospect's high school campus and follow restrictions on the sport's recruiting calendar. A contact is any face-to-face meeting between a college coach or athletics staff member and you or your parents, during which any of you say more than "hello." Also, any such face-to-face meeting that is prearranged or that takes place on your campus, at an organized competition or practice involving you or your high school, preparatory school, two-year college or all-star team shall be considered a contact, regardless of the conversation. Currently in all sports other than football, college coaches may contact you off the college campus no more than three times. However, a college coach may visit your high school (with the approval of your high school principal) only once a week during contact period.

Evaluations: An evaluation is any off-campus activity used to assess your academic qualifications or athletics ability, including a visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or watching you practice or compete at any site. Currently in all sports other than football and basketball, a college coach is limited to seven opportunities (contacts and evaluations combined) to recruit you and not more than three of the seven opportunities may be contacts. In basketball, coaches have a limit of five opportunities with which to recruit you (contact and evaluations combined) off the college campus. Not more than three of those five opportunities may be contacts. In football, a coach has three evaluation opportunities and six contact opportunities. Once you sign a National Letter of Intent, you may be evaluated an unlimited number of times by a college coach from the college with which you have signed.

Letters: Letters and printed recruiting information may be sent to you starting September 1st at the beginning of your junior year in high school. However, you may still contact a university prior to this date to receive general (non-athletic related) information. You may also complete an athletic questionnaire prior to this date.

What Can I Receive from San Diego?

You (or your family) may not receive any benefit, inducement or arrangement, such as cash, clothing, camp, improper expenses, transportation, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or attend an NCAA college. The University of San Diego may offer you a one-year scholarship that covers room and board, tuition and fees, and required course-related books, or any part of these. The institution can recommend that this aid be renewed each year, as is the general practice at the University of San Diego.

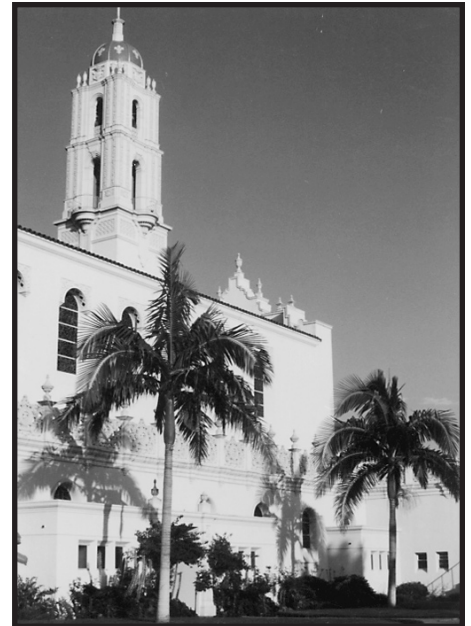

SETTING

The University of San Diego is an independent Catholic institution of higher education. Founded in 1949, USD is located on 180 acres overlooking Mission Bay, San Diego Harbor and the Pacific Ocean. The campus is named Alcalá Park and is located just 10 minutes from downtown San Diego. The campus was named after a Spanish village near Madrid - Alcalá de Henares. Founded by the Greeks as Complutum, the village was later renamed Al Kala (the Castle) by the Moslems. Christians recaptured the village centuries later and founded a university whose buildings became the inspiration for USD's architectural style.

THE CAMPUS

The USD campus is regarded as one of the most architecturally unique institutions in the country, featuring major buildings designed in an ornamental 16th century Spanish Renaissance style. Since 1984, USD has completed numerous major construction and expansion projects. In 2000 the Jenny Craig Pavilion, a 5,100-seat athletic center, opened its doors as home to USD volleyball and basketball. In the Fall of 2001 the Joan B. Kroc Institute for Peace and Justice opened on the west end of campus, and a new Science and Technology Center recently opened for the 2003-04 academic year. A five-story, Spanish Renaissance parking garage (1,100 spaces) was completed in 1998. A landscaped fountain plaza was finished in the fall of 1995, connecting the entrances of the Immaculata and Hughes Administration Center. In 1992, the university completed the 45,000 square foot Loma Hall, which includes an expanded bookstore, a larger mail center, classrooms and laboratories.



ACADEMICS

USD enrolls more than 7,400 students who have a choice of more than 60 undergraduate and graduate degree programs. The university's academic units include the College of Arts and Sciences, and the Schools of Business Administration, Education, Law and Nursing. Class size generally averages between 15-25 students with the student to teacher ratio being 14:1. Over 97 percent of USD's full-time faculty hold doctorates.

In the annual ratings of the country's colleges and universities, published by U.S. News & World Report, USD moved from the regional to national category in 1994. The university consistently ranks among the top schools in the United States.

STUDENT LIFE

Student activities include cultural events, dances, boat cruises, beach parties, BBQ's, concerts, comedy nights, symposia and much more. Students participate in a wide range of volunteer projects such as adult literacy tutoring, senior citizen outreach, and house building in Tijuana. The intramural program is also an integral part of student life on campus with over two-thirds of the USD community partaking in intramural sports.

DID YOU KNOW?

- That 9 of USD 16 intercollegiate teams last year had combined grade-point averages of 3.0 or higher.
- That 17 Torero student-athletes were selected to conference All-Academic teams.
- That 40 percent of USD's student-athletes last year earned grade-point averages of 3.2 or higher.
- That 80 student-athletes were named to the West Coast Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll for garnering 3.0 or higher grade-point averages.

ATHLETICS

The University of San Diego is a member of the West Coast Conference for nearly all sports and competes in 16 intercollegiate sports on the NCAA Division I level. The football team is in its 12th season in the Pioneer Football League. Women's sports include: basketball, cross country, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball. Men's sports include: baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, football, rowing, soccer and tennis. Since 1990 USD teams have made 45 NCAA post-season appearances; garnered 50 All-America selections; had 37 Conference Coaches of the Year; 30 Conference Players of the Year; 15 Conference Freshmen of the Year; won 15 conference championships; and 4 WCC Scholar Athletes of the Year. In 2003 the men's basketball program won their first WCC Tournament title and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 16 years.

Ky Snyder was named Executive Director of Athletics at the University of San Diego on December 10th, 2003. Dr. Mary E. Lyons, USD President, introduced Snyder who returns to USD where he was Director of Athletic Development between 1990-1996. He came back to USD from the San Diego International Sports Council where he held the position of President.

With the San Diego International Sports Council, the 43-year-old Snyder's primary responsibility was to promote San Diego/Tijuana as the preferred region for sporting events and activities that benefit the community both economically and socially. Recent accomplishments of the Sports Council bid efforts include securing for San Diego the 1997 and 1998 ESPN Summer X Games, the Suzuki Rock 'n' Roll Marathon, the 1999 Major League Soccer All-Star Game, the inaugural Bank of America/U.S. Olympic Cup, NCAA Division I Men's Basketball First & Second Round (2001) contests, the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championships (2001) and Super Bowl XXXVII.

In the spring of 2001, Snyder was named the President of the San Diego Super Bowl XXXVII Host Committee. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the San Diego NFL Youth Education Town and the San Diego Super Bowl Task Force. He is a member of the San Diego Downtown Rotary Club. Snyder was also the Executive Director of the San Diego International Sports Foundation.

Prior to joining the SDISC, Snyder was the Director of Athletic Development at the University of San Diego for six years. At USD he was responsible for establishing the Torero Athletic Association, fund-raising efforts for athletics, managing athletic special events and generating corporate sponsorship of athletics.

At USD he oversees an athletic department with sixteen NCAA Division I intercollegiate teams and approximately 400 student-athletes. He is responsible for all administrative, management and supervisory aspects of the Department of Athletics. Additionally, he oversees the strategic long-range planning and monitoring of budgets, personnel, programs, facilities, fundraising, promotions and marketing, and public relations for an NCAA Division I program consisting of eight sports for men and eight sports for women. He serves on the West Coast Conference TV Committee, Marketing Committee and Women's Basketball Committee.

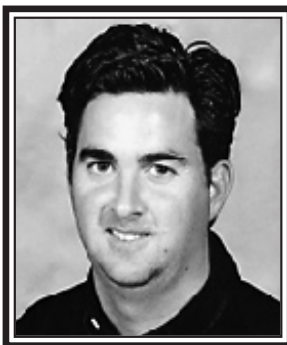
Snyder played football at San Diego State University. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in Marketing from San Diego State University and has

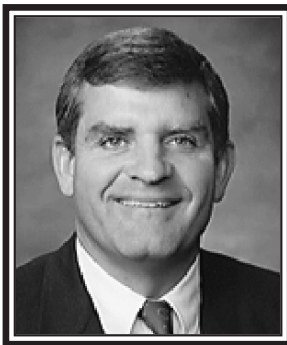


Shaney Fink, *Associate Director of Athletics/SWA*

Brian has four grown children: Bridget, Joe, Colleen, and Megan. Bridget and Colleen are both USD graduates.

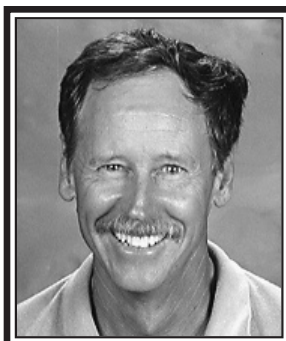


Carolyn Greer, Associate Dir. of Athletics/Sports Medicine

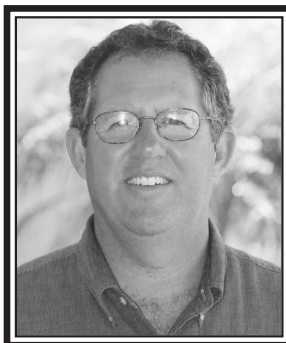


John Martin, Associate Dir. of Athletics/Facilities & Operations

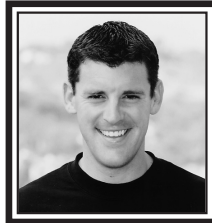


Briana Ruff, Assistant AD for Marketing

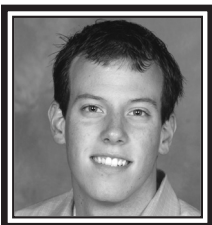
Andy Fee, Asst. AD for Athletic Facilities & Operations

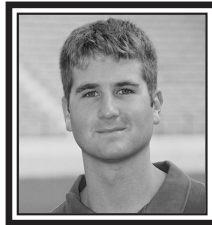


Chris Morales, Coordinator of Promotions

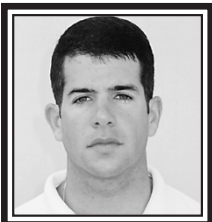
Chris is a 2004 graduate of Virginia Tech where he earned his B.A. in Marketing Management. He is from Ashburn, Virginia.

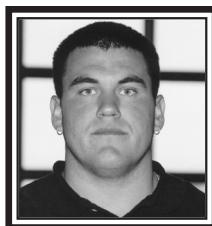


Josh Lawrence, Director of Jenny Craig Pavilion

Josh received his B.S. from UC San Diego in 1993 with a double major in Political Science and U.S. History. Josh and his wife, Lisa, reside in San Diego.

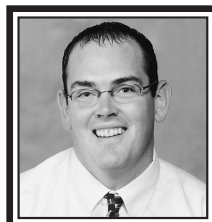


Hans Straub McNamara Fitness Center Dir./Asst. Strength & Conditioning Coach

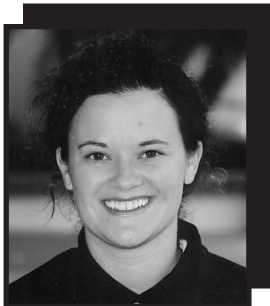
Derek Hillestad JCP Asst. Director/Events Manager

Derek Hillestad begins his fourth year as Assistant Director of the Jenny Craig Pavilion and Events Manager.

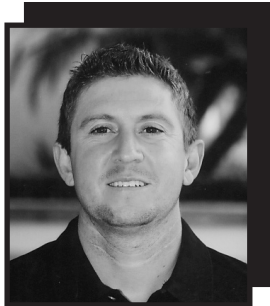

TOREROS DEFINED

The University of San Diego, which sponsors sixteen NCAA Division I intercollegiate teams, competes under the athletic nickname of Toreros. In 1961, the Most Reverend Bishop Buddy, the founding father of USD, announced that the school's nickname would change from Pioneers to Toreros. "The name Toreros is keeping with the friendly relationship which exists between San Diego and Mexico," His Excellency said at the time. Torero comes from the spanish term toro, the bull, and from the word torear, to fight bulls. All of the contestants in the ring are called toreros. Torero is a general term describing a bullfighter and signifies courage, honor and fidelity. USD student-athletes, like the Torero, represent a willingness to stand alone in the ring and accept the challenge.

The 2005-2006 school year marks the 45th season with Toreros as the official nickname for USD athletic teams.
