At halftime of USD's football game with Valparaiso last season (Oct. 14, 2006), USD officials honored Walter J. Zable by naming the field at Torero Stadium the "Walter J. Zable Field at Torero Stadium". The University of San Diego is pleased to honor Mr. Walter J. Zable, an inspiring individual who has internationally made a name for himself in both the corporate and athletic forums. Mr. Zable has been actively involved with the University of San Diego for over 30 years. He served on the Board of Trustees from 1978-1996 and is now Trustee Emeritus. He has been a generous donor to USD and its' Athletic Department since 1974. Mr. Zable is the head of one of the nation's largest electronics firms - Cubic Corporation. He is still the active chairman, president and CEO of the company. Mr. Zable started Cubic Corporation in San Diego in 1951 as a small storefront business; Cubic Corp. now has 140 locations and employs nearly 6,000 people worldwide. Active in community and government affairs, Mr. Zable has been a member of the University of California - Cancer Center Foundation, and holds directorships on the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, and the advisory board of the San Diego Hall of Champions. Mr. Zable was the first recipient of the Distinguished American Award from the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame's San Diego Chapter. The Foundation's highest recognition for athletic and humanitarian excellence - the Gold Medal Award - was presented to him in 1980. He was an honorable mention All-America football player at William and Mary, and went on to play professional football with the New York Giants. In 1981, Mr. Zable was enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame, in South Bend, Indiana.

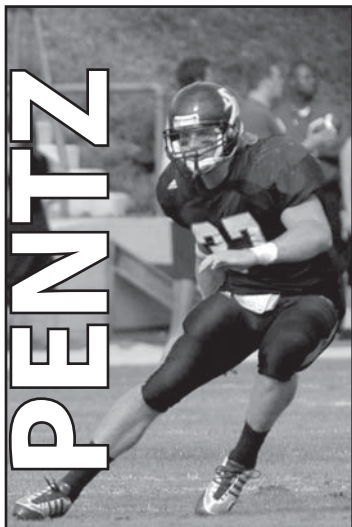
TOREROS SET TO DEFEND MID-MAJOR NATIONAL CROWN

The 2007 USD football team is under the direction of first year head coach Ron Caragher. Caragher, who became USD's 12th head

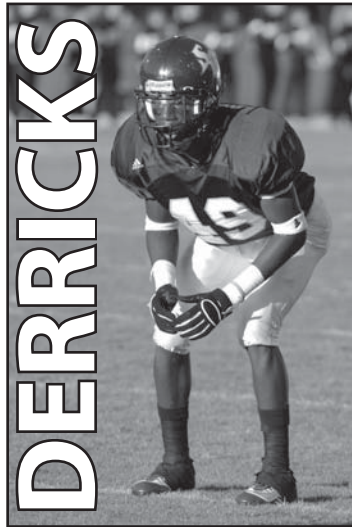

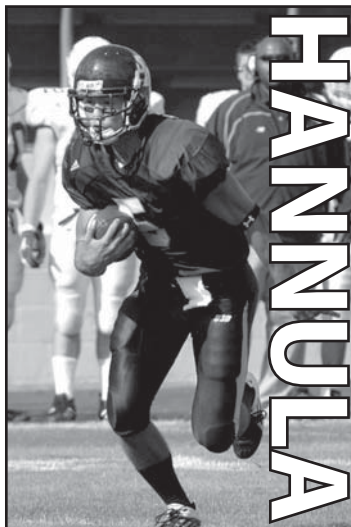

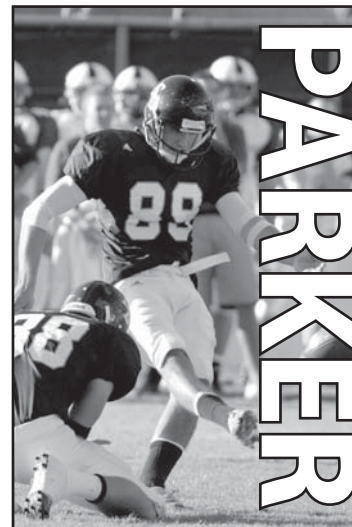

coach on January 9, 2007, replaces Stanford-bound Jim Harbaugh who in three quick years directed USD to back-to-back I-AA mid-major national titles, back-to-back PFL championships, and to a remarkable 22-2 mark the past two seasons. Caragher (CARE-ah-ger) comes to USD with an impressive coaching resume, including four years (2003-2006) at Kentucky under Rich Brooks, and a total of nine years with the UCLA Bruins (1994-2002) under Terry Donahue and Bob Toledo.

The cupboard wasn't left bare as Caragher will have the luxury of 14 starters and 46 lettermen back from last year's 11-1 squad that ranked 20th in the final I-AA Sports Network national poll.

"I think our season began back in February when I first met the team," said Coach Caragher. "We talked about goals, we talked about visions, what the team wants. Then we strategized a game plan for what it takes to achieve those goals. Spring ball went very well and the team transitioned to a new staff. We

very high expectations. They will not settle for anything less than achievement and attaining their goals. And we as coaches are on the same path. We won't let them settle for less."

A former quarterback himself when he played at UCLA, Caragher didn't have to look far for senior leadership. Running the offense will be senior QB Josh Johnson, last year's PFL Offensive Player of the Year who also finished 6th in the Payton Watch voting for the I-AA's top offensive player. As a two-year starter, Johnson owns a record of 22-2 and during this time he has completed 68.2% of his passes (506-742) for 6,576 yards and 70 touchdowns. The athletic Johnson can also beat you with his legs as he totaled 720 yards and 11 TDs in 2006.

The offense is bolstered by the return of senior center Jordan Paopao, a 2006 mid-major All-American; senior guard Gabe DeAnda, a 2006 mid-major All-American; Wes Doyle, a senior wideout who caught 52 balls for 909 yards and 11 TDs; and JT Rogan,

Kenny Stivers, running back Brendan Feliczak, receivers Mitch Ryan and Zac May, and linemen Deene Kabling and Jason McFarland.

The Torero defense, under the guidance of Defensive Coordinator Dave Adolph, has played a huge role in the team's success in recent years. Last season's squad ranked in the top-25 in twelve statistical areas including scoring defense (2nd, 12.9 ppg) and rushing defense (10th, 107.3 yards pg).

Adolph's defense will be spearheaded by senior All-America defensive end Eric Bakhtiari. Bakhtiari, the 2006 co-PFL Defender of the Year, is the team's top returning tackler (63) and sack man (8). Although he has to fill a few voids left by graduated seniors Kyson Hawkins, Josh Brisco and Chase McBride, Adolph will look to count on the play of the following returning starters: senior linebackers Ronnie Pentz and Tyler Evans, junior safety Patrick O'Neill, junior lineman Chris Gianelli, sophomore DE Matt Shearer, and sophomore

the defensive secondary.

Special teams play, under the guidance of coordinator Ed Lamb, will be in the capable hands of senior kicker Hutch Parker, sophomore punter John McSorley, sophomore kicker Ryan Jackson, and the inspired play of three-time USD Special Teams Player of the Year - Mark Cianciulli.

For the first time in school history the Toreros will take on two Football Championship Subdivision (formerly I-AA) scholarship teams in Northern Colorado and UC Davis. USD hits the road six times including back-to-back midwest trips to Butler and Valparaiso.

On January 9, 2007 the University of San Diego introduced **Ron Caragher** as its new head football coach. Caragher becomes the Toreros' 12th head football coach at USD and replaces Jim Harbaugh who is now at Stanford.

"As I talked to people around the country, I kept hearing the same things about Ron Caragher," said Ky Snyder, Executive Director of Athletics. "He is a student of the game, elite class of coach, very knowledgeable, great recruiter, develops players, motivated, competitor, great family man, high character and integrity. These are the qualities you seek in a head coach and we have found them in Ron Caragher. He has had access to some of the best minds in coaching in Terry Donohue, Bob Toledo and Rich Brooks. He has been a winner his whole life and we expect that will continue at USD."

Caragher, (pronounced "CARE-ah-ger"), spent the past four seasons (2003-2006) at the University of Kentucky as an assistant coach under Rich Brooks. He was the running backs coach all four years, and since 2005 served as Kentucky's Head Recruiting Coordinator. This past season Kentucky finished 8-5 overall, and 4-4 in the Southeast Conference Eastern Division, good for a tie for third place and the program's best league mark since 1993. The 8 wins is also the program's best win total since their 9-3 campaign back in 1984. The Wildcats finished off the 2006 season in fine fashion as they upset Clemson, 28-20, in the Music City Bowl on December 29th. It was Kentucky's first bowl appearance since 1999, and the program's first bowl win in 22 years.

"It is a privilege and honor to be here as the new head football coach at the University of San Diego," said Ron Caragher. "First and foremost, I would like to thank some people, starting with the President of this university, Dr. Mary E. Lyons; our Director of Athletics, Ky Snyder; and members of the selection committee. I want to thank

them for this opportunity to work with these young men and coach and guide them. I am just truly thankful for that. Our family is very excited about returning to our native state of California. We are very excited to be a part of the San Diego community, and in particular the family here at USD. Everyone here has been terrific and I am impressed by the support that this university extends to its student athletes. Not just in the academics, but on the playing field as well. I am also looking forward to building upon the success that coach Jim Harbaugh set. His devoted assistants and aspiring student athletes who have reached such a high level here. I am looking at taking that foundation and building upon that and continuing that upward movement towards the highest level that we possibly can. One of my first objectives as a head coach was to meet with the student athletes because they are the core of the program. To get to know these young men, and to get to know their goals, their dreams and what their desires are. As a coach, it is

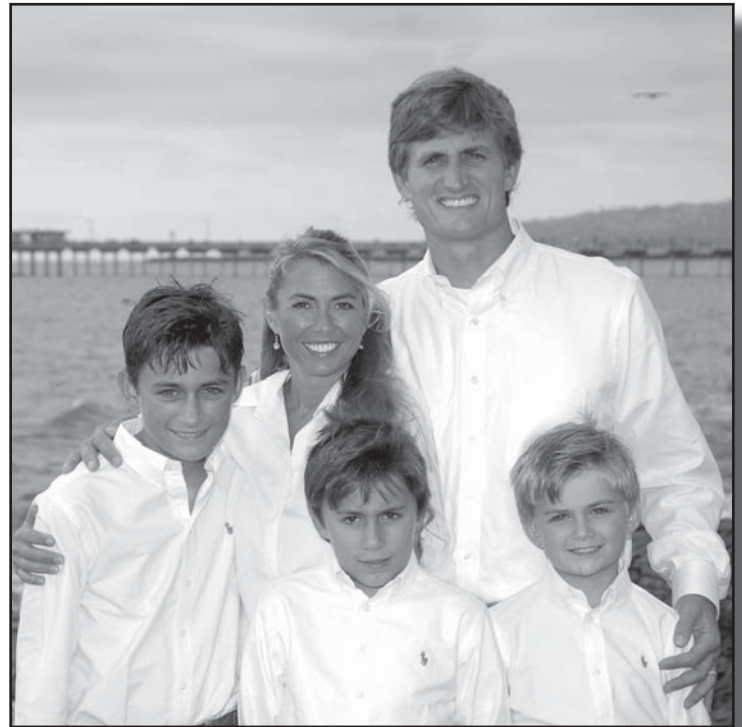

my job to see what I can do about helping them attain those goals."

The 40-year-old Caragher also has Southern California ties. He spent nine seasons (1994-2002) on UCLA's staff where he worked with both Terry Donahue and Bob Toledo. His first two seasons were as a Graduate Assistant; the last seven years with the Bruins he coached wide receivers and kickers/punters. During the 1997 and 1998 seasons, UCLA won a school-record 20 straight games and averaged more than 40 points per game while setting numerous school records. He coached in five bowl games during his term there, including the Aloha, Cotton, Rose, Sun, and Las Vegas bowls.

A native of Morgan Hill, California, Caragher was a three-sport letterman at Bellarmine College Prep (1982-84) where he earned three varsity letters as a quarterback in football. He earned an athletic scholarship to UCLA in 1985 and went on to earn four varsity letters (1986-89) and was part of teams that won four consecutive bowl games. After graduating from UCLA in 1990 with a B.A. in Psychology, Ron worked in private business (1990-93).

Caragher and his wife, Wendy, have three sons, Josh, Ryan, and Scott.

Dave Adolph enters his fourth season at USD, and his third in a full-time capacity where he will again be the Assistant Head Coach. He will also be the program's Defensive Coordinator and Linebackers coach.

The 2006 Torero defense ranked in the top-25 in twelve different areas including 2nd in scoring defense (12.9), 4th in pass efficiency defense (97.07 rating), tie-6th in turnover margin (+1.0), 10th in rushing defense (107.3 yards per game) and 12th in total defense (269.08). The Toreros posted two shutouts and a total of six games where they limited their opponent to 7 points or less.

Dave returned to coaching in 2004 following a 37-year coaching career that ended in January, 2000 when he retired from his post with the Kansas City Chiefs as assistant head coach/linebackers coach. He spent 21 years in the NFL ranks, including two tours of duty with the Chiefs. He served as the team's defensive coordinator from 1992-1994 and worked as the club's assistant head coach/linebacker coach in 1999.

This respected defensive expert spent his entire pro coaching career (21 years) in the AFC, including 14 years as a defensive coordinator and 12 seasons in the AFC West, making 11 career playoff appearances in the process. Prior to joining the Chiefs, Adolph spent two years ('97-98) as linebackers coach for the Oakland Raiders. He signed on with Oakland after a two-year stint ('95-96) as defensive coordinator for the San Diego Chargers. During his three-year tenure as Kansas City's defensive coordinator from '92-94, the Chiefs made three straight playoff appearances and allowed an average of just 18.1 points per game.

A native of Akron, Ohio, Adolph originally came to Kansas City after spending three seasons ('89-91) as defensive coordinator for the L.A. Raiders. He spent the '86-88 seasons as defensive coordinator of the Cleveland Browns. Adolph began his NFL career as the Browns defensive line coach in 1979. He took over the club's linebackers in '81 before assuming duties as defensive coordinator midway through the '84 season when Marty Schottenheimer was named head coach. He then spent one season ('85) as an assistant for San Diego before rejoining the Browns in '86.

A 16-year coaching veteran on the collegiate level, Adolph worked with the legendary Woody Hayes at Ohio State from '77-78. He also coached at Illinois ('73-76), Kentucky ('69-72), Connecticut ('65-68) and his alma mater of Akron ('63-64). An all-conference guard and linebacker for the Zips, Adolph spent three years ('59-61) as a commissioned officer in the Air Force before beginning his coaching career at Cleveland's Shaw High School in '62.

Ed Lamb enters his third year with the USD football program as coach of the secondary and special teams. Lamb came to San Diego after a two-year stint at the University of Idaho where he was the Vandals defensive coordinator. Over the span of two seasons at Idaho, the Vandals defense improved by 20 points per game allowed.

Prior to Idaho he held coaching positions with BYU and the University of Redlands. At Redlands he was the defensive coordinator for three seasons with the Bulldogs finishing number one in total defense each season and winning two Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference titles (1999 & 2000).

Lamb earned his M.A. in Education in 1998 from Redlands, and holds a B.A. in English from Brigham Young. He and his wife, Sarah, have three daughters, Anna, Amelia, and Acorn. Lamb is a 1992 graduate of Amador Valley High School in Pleasanton, California.

Jimmie Dougherty returns in 2007 for his fourth season coaching at the University of San Diego. This season he will once again coach the quarterbacks as he did in 2006 as well as coordinate the passing game.

He came to USD in 2004 and coached an outstanding wide receiver corp. That receiving group included All-American and team MVP Michael Gasperson as a senior, and Adam Hannula who went on to rewrite the school record book for career numbers the following season as a senior. Gasperson led the team with 54 catches for 894 yards with 7 TD's that season. Gasperson was signed after the season as a free agent by the Philadelphia Eagles and also was allocated to NFL Europe to play for the Cologne Centurions.

The following season Dougherty showed his versatility and coached the tight ends. This group was led by senior Matt Koller who went on to earn All Pioneer Football League Conference honors that year.

Last season Dougherty moved to coach the quarterbacks, the position that he played in college. He flourished in furthering the development of current USD quarterback Josh Johnson. Johnson led the nation last season in total offense, passing yardage, passing efficiency and points responsible for under his



tutelage. All-in-all, Johnson accounted for 4,040 yards of total offense in 2006 while throwing 34 touchdowns and only 5 interceptions. Johnson was voted to the AP 3rd Team All- America squad and finished 6th in voting for the Payton Award. He returns for his final season at USD poised to break virtually every record in the USD record books. He needs just 6 TD passes and 777 passing yards to surpass Eric Rasmussen for career numbers in those categories. Most importantly, Johnson will look to improve upon his career record as a starter at USD which now stands at 22-2.

Prior to USD, Dougherty was a graduate assistant at Illinois Wesleyan University in Bloomington, Illinois from 2002-2004. During his years there, he was the defensive backs coach. He earned his masters from Illinois State during that time in Sport Management.

Dougherty played quarterback at the University of Missouri from 1997-2001. He was a three year letter winner from 99-01. He started as a sophomore, throwing for over 1,400 yards and 7 TD's. His career was cut short as a junior when he suffered a ligament tear in his throwing elbow. Dougherty was a former All State performer at Edwardsville High School in football and basketball. He played for his father, Tim Dougherty, at Edwardsville High School where his father is still the head football coach.

Mike Rish is beginning his 24th season on the Torero staff where he will again be Senior Offensive Assistant. He returns to coach the receivers, something he has done for twenty-two of the past twenty-three Torero seasons.

Mike played for USD from 1979-83 where he posted career numbers that make him one of the best receivers ever to play at USD -- he ranks second all-time with 101 receptions, 18 receiving touchdowns and 1,722 receiving yards. He held the school marks in all three career receiving departments from 1983 through 1997; he was passed by Torero receiver Dylan Ching.

In 1983 he was selected the team's scholar-athlete by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. In the Toreros' nationally-televised game between Occidental in 1982, Rish was named the CBS Chevrolet Player of the Game.

Mike graduated from USD with an Accounting degree in 1984. He is the Vice President for Secondary Marketing for Guild Mortgage Company in San Diego.

Tanner Engstrand enters his third season with the Torero football team, and his first as the running backs coach. Last season he was an offensive assistant for the 11-1 Toreros that ranked first in the nation in total offense and scoring. The past two seasons he worked with football operations where he helped with all equipment duties and daily football operations.

Engstrand was a two-year letterman at San Diego State University (2003-2004) where he played quarterback. He saw limited action in his two seasons, serving mainly as a backup. Before enrolling at SDSU he was a First Team All-Foothill Conference and Academic All-America quarterback at Grossmont College in El Cajon, California during the 2002 season. He is currently enrolled at USD where he is working on his Master's degree in Business Administration

Steve Mooshagian begins his first year as the program's wide receivers coach. Mooshagian comes to USD with an extensive coaching background, including four years as the head coach at Sacramento State (2003-2006). In his four years at Sacramento State, Mooshagian coached five Division I-AA All-Americans, three Division I-AA Freshmen All-Americans and 48 players who earned all-Big Sky Conference honors. During his last season the team's 4-4 Big Sky conference record was the 2nd best record in the school's 11-year Division I history. In his four seasons he played a direct role in the development of All-America wide receiver Fred Amey who played for the San Francisco 49ers in 2005. Mooshagian coached the receivers in his first two seasons, including 2004 when Amey caught a school-record 72 passes and was named first team all-Big Sky for the third straight year.

A native Californian, Mooshagian has coached at the high school, junior college, college and professional levels. Prior to his post at Sacramento State, he served as the wide receivers coach with the Cincinnati Bengals from 1999-2002. In 2002, he guided the only receiving corps in the NFL to have four players with at least 40 catches. With the Bengals, he coached some of the best young receivers in the league, including all-pro Chad Johnson, Peter Warrick, Darnay Scott, Carl Pickens, and T.J. Houshmandzadeh.

Prior to working with the Bengals, Mooshagian was the offensive coordinator at the University of Pittsburg for two years (1997-98), and offensive coordinator at Nevada in 1996. That year the Wolf Pack led the nation in total offense with an average of 527.3 yards of total offense and posted a 9-3 overall record while winning the Big West title and Las Vegas Bowl. He also had coaching stops at Fresno City College (head coach, 1995), Fresno State (1985-1994) and Washington Union HS (1983-84).

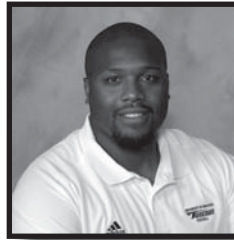
Mooshagian graduated from Fresno State with a degree in physical education (1982) and later added his master's degree in 1984 from Columbia Pacific University. He played two years for the Bulldogs (1980-81) as a wide receiver, and following graduation signed as a free-agent wide receiver with the Los Angeles Express of the USFL (1983). He and his wife, Rene, have three grown children - daughters Janaye and Danielle, and a son, Bobby.

Mike Babcock, who will be the tight ends coach and football operations director, comes to USD from the University of Colorado. The past two seasons he was the offensive quality control intern after joining the program in June 2005. Prior to CU he was at UCLA, his alma mater, for five seasons as a member of the coaching staff. He spent three years (2002-04) as a graduate assistant coach after working the two previous years as an undergraduate assistant coach with both the offense and the defense. ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE TRAINING

University of San Diego student-athletes receive elite coaching from their strength and conditioning staff in one of the premier weight rooms on the West Coast. With 5,000 square feet of floor space (plus an additional 1,600 square feet of turf), 16 all inclusive lifting stations and approximately 20,000 pounds of free weights, multiple teams can be simultaneously coached in a comprehensive strength and conditioning development program. Medicine balls, dumbbells, gymnastics rings and various pullup stations are used to enhance the training provided for all 16 of USD's varsity sports.

The USD strength staff advocates the use of ground based, multi-joint, explosive free weight exercises in the training of student-athletes. USD teams are taught the clean and jerk, snatch, squats, deadlift and the various barbell and dumbbell variations. By using the exercises, in combination with intense effort, we believe USD student-athletes will be well prepared to meet every physical challenge put to them in competition.

The 2007 season marks the 15th year for the Pioneer Football League, which returns to a non-divisional format for the second season since the 2000 season. After five seasons playing a North-South divisional format, the league saw its numbers reduced to eight after the 2005 season (Austin Peay leaving the conference to return to scholarship football) and those remaining members voted to adopt a full-round robin scheduling format for 2006. Additionally, the PFL champion will participate in the Gridiron Classic versus the champion of the Northeast Conference for the second straight year.

The PFL, a non-scholarship NCAA Division I-AA football conference, is one of only three conferences that sponsor football as its only sport (the Gateway Football Conference and Great West Football Conferences being the others). However, the PFL is a truly national conference with members on each coast and throughout the nation's heartland. The league still retains four of its charter members – Butler University, the University of Dayton, Drake University and Valparaiso University, plus the University of San Diego (joining in 1992) – which were joined in 2001 by four new teams, three of which remain today – Davidson College, Jacksonville University and Morehead State University.

In January 1991 the NCAA passed legislation to require Division I institutions to sponsor all intercollegiate sports at the Division I level. The five charter members (Evansville the fifth before dropping football in 1997), each dedicated to the enhancement and sound management of intercollegiate football as an integral part of the student-athletes' collegiate experience, joined together to form the Pioneer Football League. From the league's inception it has been a proponent of the creation of a non-scholarship football classification within Division I and adopted the moniker of Pioneer based on the intent to become the first league in that new division. The PFL is comprised of NCAA Division I universities that previously sponsored intercollegiate football at other levels with the exception of Jacksonville, which started a non-scholarship program in 1998. All are currently committed to the non-scholarship football model.

The PFL began play in 1993 with Dayton winning the league's first crown. The league spent its first season in 1993 under the administrative guidance of the Midwestern Collegiate Conference, and the office moved to St. Louis in 1994 when current commissioner Patty Viverito was named the PFL commissioner, a leadership position she continues to fill.

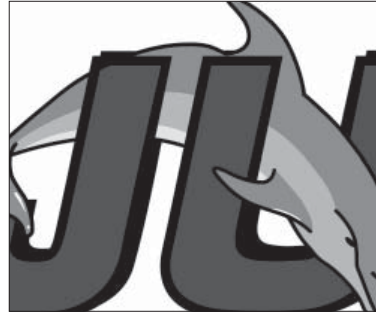

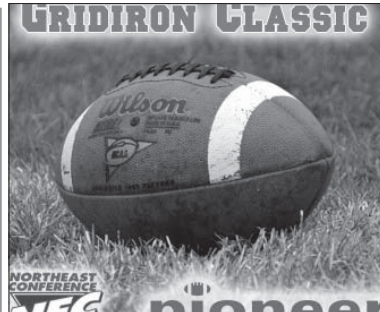

The Chet and Marguerite Pagni Family Athletic Hall of Fame

Three of the 24 USD inductees to the Chet and Marguerite Pagni Family Athletic Hall of Fame played football for the USD Toreros. **Jan Chapman**, Class of 1961, was inducted in 1995. **Matt Maslowski**, Class of 1971, was inducted in 2001, **Jeb Dougherty**, Class of 1997, was inducted in 2006.

Jan Chapman was a three-sport letter winner at the University of San Diego, but it was football where he made a name for himself. His three-year totals as quarterback included 2,573 yards and 23 touchdowns on 188-for-367 passing. His senior year was his best when he completed 85-for-167 passes for 1,087 yards and 9 TD's, ranking him 23rd in the nation. Also as a punter, he ranked 3rd in the nation his sophomore year (43.8 yards per punt) and 6th in his senior campaign (43.2). He is the current USD season record holder for yards punted (2,287) and average (43.8). Chapman is still remembered for leading USD to a 21-20 upset over the Marine Corp Recruiting Depot which touted four future NFL stars.

Chapman's leadership abilities were demonstrated on the field as well as on campus. As co-captain for football his senior year, he received the Gil Kuhn Trophy as the Outstanding Gridder, given to the player that best demonstrated sportsmanship, performance in the highest degree, and leadership. He was also president of the Associated Student Body his senior year.

Since graduating in 1961, Jan has stayed in the San Diego area, giving back to the community by teaching and coaching at the high school and community college levels.

Matt Maslowski, after playing football at Mission Bay High School and Mesa Community College in San Diego, decided to continue his career at USD. At 6'3" and 205 lbs., Matt dominated as a receiver for the Toreros. During his first season, he was the leading club football receiver in the nation with 42 catches for 799 yards in only seven games. His collegiate career was cut short in 1970 due to injury, but he still managed some remarkable numbers during his career. Playing in only 11 games for USD, Matt had 80 catches for 1,552 yards and 18 touchdowns. He averaged a remarkable 19.4 yards per catch for the Toreros.

Because of his size and speed, Matt was offered a free agent contract by the Los Angeles Rams and played for George Allen and Tommy Prothro. In addition to the Rams, Matt played for the Chicago Bears, Minnesota Vikings and finished his career with the Florida Blazers of the World Football League.

At the request of a group of students in 1969, the University of San Diego agreed to bring football back eight years after dropping the sport. Under Coach Jim Gray, they started a club program. Matt and his teammates from the club football team laid the foundation for a solid football program still going strong.

Jeb Dougherty was two-sport athlete and a classroom standout at USD. He earned Academic All-America honors in football and baseball prior to getting a bachelor's degree in Business in 1997. A defensive back in football, he ranks among the top three in career tackles, pass break-ups, kickoff-return average and forced fumbles. He was a third team Associated Press All-America selection, USD's defensive MVP, a first team All-Pioneer Football League selection and USD's scholar-athlete choice for the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame (San Diego chapter) his senior year. He was a three-time PFL All-Academic selection and a four-time PFL Player of the Week. In baseball he was an outfielder. He was USD's co-MVP in 1996, a first team All-WCC selection and an Academic All-American for District VIII. He led the team in hits, runs, and batting average his junior and senior years. He was a four-time WCC All-Academic selection. He signed with the Angels after his senior year and advanced to the Double-A level before retiring in 2001. In addition to his professional career in the sales field, Jeb currently runs local youth baseball spring training camps in the San Diego area.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT CENTER

The USD Athletic Academic Support Program is designed to promote the academic development of student-athletes. The primary objective is to offer the necessary resources for the academic success of student-athletes as they work to earn their degree. Academic Support Services are designed to enhance the student-athlete's overall collegiate experience and encourage development and attainment of academic and career goals.

All USD student-athletes have access to advising, tutoring and mentoring services. The mentoring program, Torero Blue and MenTorero, were redeveloped in 2005 and team a graduate student in the counseling program with an athlete who would like to enhance study skills, learn about campus resources, receive guidance on goal development and attainment, and benefit from guided group study. By promoting a philosophy of individual responsibility, which encourages each student-athlete to value their educational experience, the academic support program assists each athlete to realize their full potential."

NCAA COMPLIANCE**I want to play Division I intercollegiate athletics at San Diego...****What do I need to do in order to play at San Diego as a freshman?**

If you intend to participate in Division I or II athletics as a freshman, you must register and be certified by the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse. Your high school counselors should provide you with a student-release form and a brochure titled, "NCAA Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete." In order to be registered with the clearinghouse, you must complete the student-release form and mail the top (white) copy of the form to the clearinghouse along with the \$50 registration fee. Give the yellow and pink copies of the form to a high-school official, who then sends the yellow copy, along with an official copy of your high-school transcript that includes your SAT or ACT score(s), to the clearinghouse. Your high school should keep the pink copy for its files. You may also register online at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. After graduation and before the school closes for the summer, your school also must send the clearinghouse a copy of your final transcript that confirms graduation from high school. Your counselors can obtain registration materials, at no cost, by calling the clearinghouse at (319) 337-1492 or (877) 262-1492.

How do I know if I'm being recruited?

You become a "prospective student-athlete" when you start ninth-grade classes. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if a college gives you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide prospective students generally. You become a "recruited prospective student-athlete" at a particular college if any coach approaches you (or any member of your family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college. Activities by coaches that cause you to become a recruited prospective student-athlete are (1) providing you with an official visit; (2) placing more than one telephone call to you or any other member of your family; or (3) visiting you or any other member of your family anywhere other than the college campus.

Boosters: In addition to general recruiting regulations, no alumni, boosters or representatives of a college's athletics interests can be involved in your recruitment. There can be no phone calls or letters from boosters. If a USD booster is contacting you, please call the San Diego Compliance Office as soon as possible at (619) 260-7577. Don't risk your NCAA eligibility!

When can I talk to the coach and have him/her see me play?

Telephone Calls: In Football, a prospect may receive one phone call in May of the prospects junior year in high school and may start receiving additional calls after September 1 of your senior year. After this, a college coach is limited to one telephone call per week to you (or your parents or legal guardians), except that unlimited calls to you (or your parents or legal guardians) may be made under the following circumstances: (1) during the five days immediately before your official visit by the college

you will be visiting; (2) on the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you by that coach; (3) on the initial date for signing the National Letter of Intent in your sport through two days after the initial signing date; and (4) you (or your parents) may telephone a coach at your expense as often as you wish. After a National Letter of Intent is signed, unlimited calls may be placed to the prospect.

Off-Campus Contacts: A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus only on or after July 1 after the completion of your junior year in high school. The contact must take place on the prospect's high school campus and follow restrictions on the sport's recruiting calendar. A contact is any face-to-face meeting between a college coach or athletics staff member and you or your parents, during which any of you say more than "hello." Also, any such face-to-face meeting that is prearranged or that takes place on your campus, at an organized competition or practice involving you or your high school, preparatory school, two-year college or all-star team shall be considered a contact, regardless of the conversation. However, a college coach may visit your high school (with the approval of your high school principal) only once a week during contact period.

Evaluations: An evaluation is any off-campus activity used to assess your academic qualifications or athletics ability, including a visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or watching you practice or compete at any site. In football, a coach has three evaluation opportunities and six contact opportunities. Once you sign a National Letter of Intent, you may be evaluated an unlimited number of times by a college coach from the college with which you have signed.

Letters: Letters and printed recruiting information may be sent to you starting September 1st at the beginning of your junior year in high school. However, you may still contact a university prior to this date to receive general (non-athletic related) information. You may also complete an athletic questionnaire prior to this date.

What Can I Receive from San Diego?

You (or your family) may not receive any benefit, inducement or arrangement, such as cash, clothing, camp, improper expenses, transportation, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or attend an NCAA college.

THE CAMPUS...



The University of San Diego is an independent Catholic institution of higher education. Founded in 1949, USD is located on 180 acres overlooking Mission Bay, San Diego Harbor and the Pacific Ocean. The campus is named Alcalá Park and is located just 10 minutes from downtown San Diego. The campus was named after a Spanish village near Madrid - Alcalá de Henares. Founded by the Greeks as Complutum, the village was later renamed Al Kala (the Castle) by the Moslems. Christians recaptured the village centuries later and founded a university whose buildings became the inspiration for USD's architectural style.

Under the leadership of Mother Rosalie Hill of the Society of the Sacred Heart and Bishop Charles Francis Buddy of the Diocese of San Diego, the University of San Diego began as separate colleges for men and women. The first classes met in 1952; the School of Law opened its doors in 1954. By the late 1960's it became clear that both colleges would benefit from combining academic resources, and in 1972 the University of San Diego became a single coeducational Catholic university.

Now governed by a board of trustees independent from the founding organizations, USD is a Roman Catholic institution that welcomes students, faculty and staff of diverse religions, traditions and remains dedicated to the values originally articulated by Mother Hill and Bishop Buddy. Students choose from more than 60 undergraduate and graduate degrees programs in academic divisions including the College of Arts and Sciences and the schools of Business Administration, Leadership and Education Sciences, Law and Nursing and Health Science.

The USD campus is regarded as one of the most architecturally unique institutions in the country, featuring major buildings designed in an ornamental 16th century Spanish Renaissance style. Since 1984, USD has completed numerous major construction and expansion projects. In 2000 the Jenny Craig Pavilion, a 5,100-seat athletic center, opened its doors as home to USD basketball and volleyball. Two years ago, the Joan B. Kroc Institute for Peace and Justice opened on the west end of campus, and in 2003 the Donald P. Shiley Center for Science and Technology opened. A five-story Spanish Renaissance parking garage (1,100 spaces) was completed in 1998. A landscaped fountain plaza was finished in the fall of 1995, connecting the entrances of the Immaculata and Hughes Administration Center. In 1992, the university completed the 45,000 square foot Loma Hall, which includes an expanded bookstore, a larger mail center, classrooms and laboratories.

THE ACADEMICS...

USD enrolls more than 7,600 students who have a choice of more than 60 undergraduate and graduate degree programs. Admission to USD, which consistently ranks among the top schools in the nation, is highly selective. USD received more than 7,800 applications for approximately 1,100 undergraduate openings in Fall of 2005. The class of 2009 entered with a GPA of 3.74 and an average SAT score of 1176.

USD has earned recognition in such publications as the 2006 edition of The Princeton Review annual college guide as being one of the best colleges in the United States. The Princeton Review recently included USD as one of the nation's most socially conscious institutions in its book, *Colleges with a Conscience: 81 Great Schools with Outstanding Community Involvement*.

USD in 2003, joined the elite company of Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest honor society. Nationwide, only about 10 percent of all colleges and universities have Phi Beta Kappa chapters. USD was granted membership to the Mortar Board Na-



tional Honor Society in 2000.

In 2003, USD welcomed the addition of the 150,000-square-foot Donald P. Shiley Center for Science and Technology building, which provides an interdisciplinary science facility serving every USD student as he or she completes science course requirements.

The Joan B. Kroc Institute for Peace and Justice, opened in 2001, is one of 10 comprehensive peace centers nationwide with facilities for major international peace efforts.

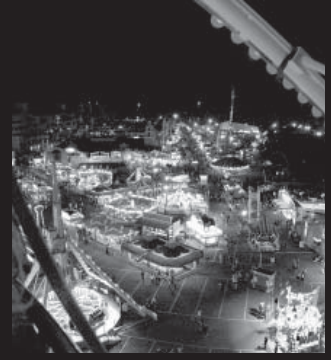
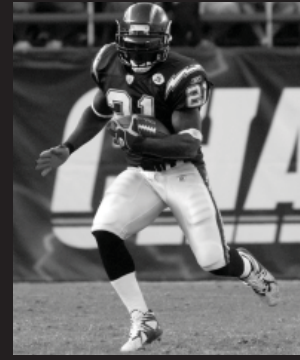

SAN DIEGO, CALIFORNIA...



San Diego is truly "America's Finest City." A modern metropolis (second largest in California) and a popular year-round resort, San Diego spreads from the coast to the desert, including cliffs, mesas, hills, canyons and valleys. San Diego also surrounds one of California's greatest natural harbors which has been a dominant factor in determining the city's history, economy and development.

Meteorologists claim San Diego as the country's only area with perfect climate. This ideal year-round environment posts an average daytime temperature of 70 degrees, with an annual rainfall average of less than 10 inches. Most days are sunny, with humidity generally low, even in the summer. The climate, attractive setting and recreational facilities make San Diego "America's Finest City."

The city has mostly avoided the evils of urban sprawl, which has allowed its downtown to remain vibrant, especially the Gaslamp Quarter. San Diego is also home to the world-famous San Diego

Zoo as well as SeaWorld. The city is great for families, but for those without kids, there is a lot to do as well.

San Diego is home to a number of military bases, primarily due to its location. In 1941, after the Pearl Harbor attacks, the U.S. established the headquarters of the Pacific Fleet in San Diego, and the city is now home to the largest air naval station on the west coast.

Unlike many cities, San Diego's airport is right next to downtown, increasing its convenience even more. It is hard to believe that San Diego is the nation's sixth-largest city, it just retains a small town feel.

According to Sports Illustrated, "For sheer numbers of participants, diversity of pursuits of involvement, San Diego must rank as the sports fitness capital of the U.S." Sports are a major feature of the San Diego lifestyle. One can sail, swim, surf, scuba dive, snorkel, wind-surf on 70 miles of public beach or golf at any of the over 80 golf courses throughout the county. Balboa Park, a 1,158-acre

recreation and cultural center, offers 25 tennis courts, two gymnasiums, two municipal golf courses, and one of the nation's finest zoos. Mission Bay Park is a 4,600-acre playground for jogging, fishing, bicycling, tennis, golf, jet skiing and kite flying.

As well as participating in recreational activities, San Diego supports their professional teams -- the NFL Chargers play at Qualcomm Stadium, and the San Diego Padres play at Petco Park. During college football bowl week, San Diego annually hosts the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl in late December. During 1998, Qualcomm Stadium hosted the Super Bowl game between Denver and Green Bay; followed by the World Series between the San Diego Padres and the New York Yankees. The Super Bowl returned to San Diego in 2003. Whatever sporting activity there is, it's here in San Diego -- the sports capital of the U.S.!

The Jenny Craig Pavilion

The Jenny Craig Pavilion serves as home to the Toreros men's and women's basketball teams as well as the women's volleyball team. This 17.5 million dollar area has a seating capacity of 5,100 as has quickly garnered major attention from around the region, and the West Coast Conference selected USD as the site of the 2001, 2002 and 2003 WCC Basketball Championships, it has hosted the 2002 California Junior College Basketball Championships, the annual Kiwanis Basketball Tournament, the Darrell Russell Celebrity Charity Basketball game, the 2003 NFL Celebrity Basketball Game, the Official Super Bowl XXXVII Luncheon, and the 2004 Judo National Championships.

Cunningham Baseball Stadium

The Cunningham Baseball Stadium serves as the home diamond to the USD Baseball team. Since its inception in 1970, the stadium has undergone several renovations. Prior to the 2003 campaign, the stadium received several significant additions. A "Turf Tech" synthetic grass surface was installed in the foul areas between first and third base. Secondly, a new press box was built at the top of Cunningham Stadium that keeps the central architectural theme of 16th century Spanish Renaissance alive. In addition, a new public address system has been added. The playing surface consists of "Bullseye" Bermuda grass and the dirt portion of the infield is crushed red brick. In 2006 the stadium received a brand new scoreboard.

Torero Stadium

Torero Stadium serves as home to both the USD football and soccer programs. The stadium received renovations that were completed in 2001 to host the WUSA San Diego Spirit, with over \$3.5 million dollars spent to enlarge the seating areas and add spectator comforts. Torero stadium capacity is now 7,000. In 2001, the installation of the upgraded lighting system took place, and the final piece of the renovations was a Daktronics video board that plays movie clips and replays, as well as scoreboard information. The playing surface is "Bullseye" Bermuda grass, with soccer dimensions measuring 118 yards x 72 yards, with football conforming to NCAA regulations. In 2006, the field was named the "Walter J. Zabel Field at Torero Stadium."

USD Softball Complex

The USD Softball Complex serves as the home diamond for the Torero softball team. The playing surface is "Bullseye" Bermuda grass, with the facility also including two batting cages that allow players to work on their hitting skills. A lighted LED Daktronics scoreboard sits over the right field fence and allows fans to be updated on game stats. Stadium seating capacity is 325, and spectators are also comforted by a full-service concessions stand and public facilities. The stadium is also lighted, enabling night games. In addition, a new public address system has been added, as well as a press box down the third base line.

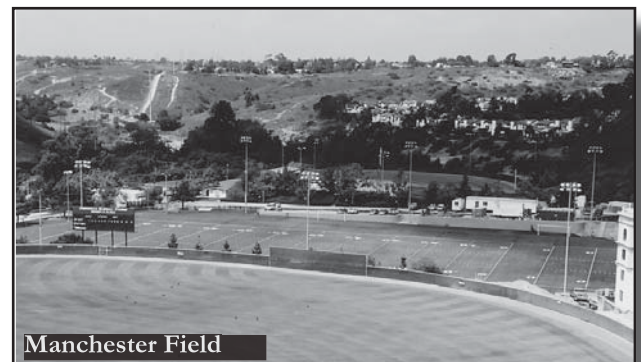

Executive Director of Athletics



Ky Snyder was named Executive Director of Athletics at the University of San Diego on December 10th, 2003. Dr. Mary E. Lyons, USD President, introduced Snyder who returns to USD where he was Director of Athletic Development from 1990 to 1996. He came back to USD from the San Diego International Sports Council where he held the position of President.

With the San Diego International Sports Council, Snyder's primary responsibility was to promote San Diego/Tijuana as the preferred region for sporting events and activities that benefit the community both economically and socially. Accomplishments of the Sports Council bid efforts during Snyder's tenure included securing San Diego the 1997 and 1998 ESPN Summer X Games, the Suzuki Rock & Roll Marathon, the 1999 Major League Soccer All-Star Game, the inaugural Bank of America/U.S. Olympic Cup, NCAA Division I Men's Basketball First & Second Round (2001) contests, the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championships (2001) and Super Bowl XXXVII.

In the spring of 2001, Snyder was named the President of the San Diego Super Bowl XXXVII Host Committee. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the San Diego NFL Youth Education Town and the San Diego Super Bowl Task Force. Snyder was also the Executive Director of the San Diego International Sports Foundation.

Prior to joining the SDISC, Snyder was the Director of Athletic Development at the University of San Diego for six years. At USD he was responsible for establishing the Torero Athletic Association, fund-raising efforts for athletics, managing athletic special events and generating corporate sponsorship of athletics.

At USD he oversees an athletic department with sixteen NCAA Division I intercollegiate teams and approximately 400 student-athletes. He is responsible for all administrative, management and supervisory aspects of the Department of Athletics. Additionally, he oversees the strategic long-range planning and monitoring of budgets, personnel, programs, facilities, fundraising, promotions and marketing, and public relations for an NCAA Division I program consisting of eight sports for men and eight sports for women. He serves on the NCAA Division I Football Rules Committee, the West Coast Conference TV Committee, Marketing Committee and Women's Basketball Committee.



Snyder played football at San Diego State University. He holds a Bachelor's degree in Marketing from San Diego State University and has studied in the Master's Leadership Program at the University of San Diego. He is a guest lecturer at the University of San Diego's MBA Sports Management program and the SDSU Hospitality Management program.

Snyder, who has been a San Diego resident for 25 years, has a very athletic family. His wife, Sue, was a former standout member of the United States women's national volleyball team who played at San Diego State and also coached the Aztecs and University of San Diego's women's volleyball teams. 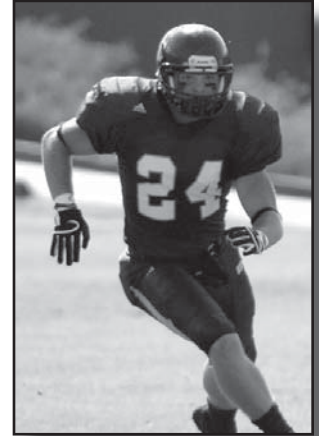

The ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Football Team, selected annually by members of the College Sports Information Directors of America, honors the nation's best student-athletes. Just as the balancing of football and academics is difficult, the standards for nomination and selection to the team are rigorous. To be nominated, a varsity starter or key reserve player must have a minimum 3.200 cumulative grade-point average (on a 4.000 scale).

The program began in the 1950s with honorees in football; later, basketball and baseball all-academic teams were added. Academic and athletics biographical data of nominees are prepared in ballot form and mailed to the CoSIDA membership, who vote in each of eight districts. From the eight district teams comes a national ballot, distributed to the 1,400 members for the final all-academic team.

"The achievements of these young men should truly be commended," said NBC sportscaster Dick Enberg, spokesperson for the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America team. In 2004 Evan Harney joined six former Torero grid-ers after being named First Team. The record-setting Torero running back carried a 3.90 grade-point average as a Business Administration major.
