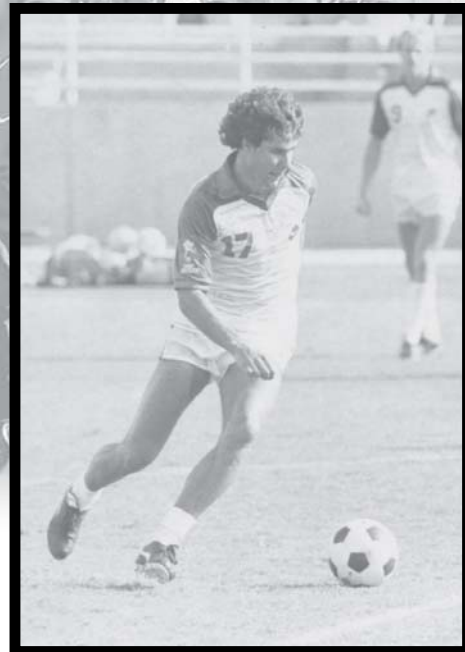
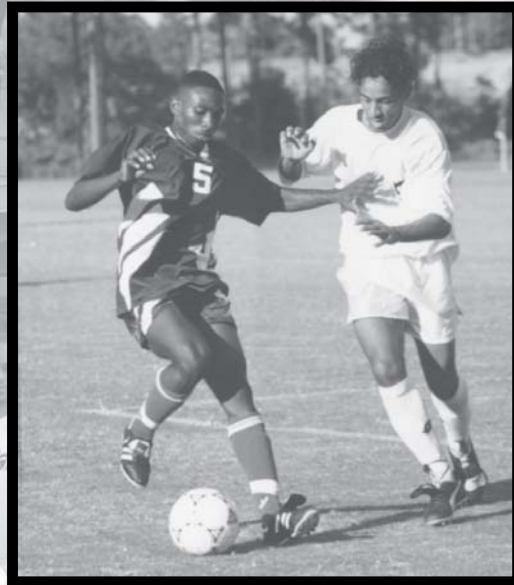
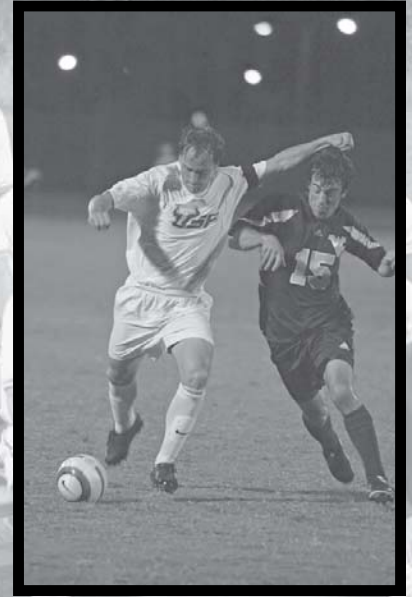


Nearly Half A Century of Success

The University of South Florida men's soccer team has garnered 15 conference championships and has advanced to 11 NCAA Tournaments in its 42-year history.

Six coaches have guided the Bulls to an overall record of 430-218-52.

USF has had a total of 138 all-conference selections, while a Bull has received All-America honors 15 times.





One of the Finest Soccer Facilities in the Southeast

The home to the men's soccer program since 1965, the USF Soccer Stadium has played host to a number of conference championships as well as the 1990 and 1991 NCAA Men's Final Four.

With permanent seating for 4,000 fans, the soccer stadium has been the site for 340 USF men's soccer matches with the Bulls owning a 241-76-23 record all-time at the facility.

The stadium, which was originally called the USF Soccer Field, played host to the first-ever intercollegiate event in school history (a men's soccer game between USF and

Florida Southern on Aug. 25, 1965 which USF won 4-3 in two overtimes).





State of the Art Facilities



In May 2004, the USF athletic family moved into a sparkling new \$15 million facility that provides student-athletes with an outstanding environment for improving the mind and body with impressive space for academic counseling, sports medicine and strength and conditioning, in addition to a home for the athletic department staff.



State of the Art Facilities



The building sits on the eastern end of campus and gives an impressive view for those entering campus on Bull Run. The facility is 104,000 square feet and brings the vast majority of the athletic department under one roof. With the exception of men's and women's basketball, volleyball and men's and women's golf, the remainder of the 13 athletic teams call the new facility home. The basketball teams remain in the on-campus Sun Dome, where volleyball also takes up residence in its home - The Corral. The golf teams remain housed at the on-campus USF Golf Course.





The new facility includes a 10,000-square foot strength and conditioning center with state-of-the-art medical and strength equipment. It also has an ultra-impressive Academic Enrichment Center that covers one-fourth of the upper floor in the two-story complex. The AEC includes a computer study lab, a separate study lounge, a library and office space for counselors and tutors.

State of the Art Facilities



The Sports Medicine Clinic is housed in the new Athletic Training Center. Opened in May of 2004, the 5,400 square foot clinic is designed with the health care of every student-athlete in mind. It features brand new modalities and rehab equipment, as well as three Hydroworx series pools. The Hydroworx 1000 is equipped with an underwater treadmill, three current jets, an underwater camera monitoring system and a computer control console. These pools are state-of-the-art and will allow the student-athletes an extra tool to return to play quickly and safely.

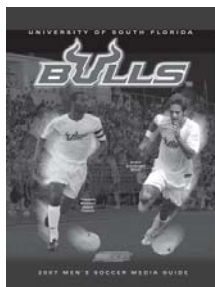

The 2007 USF men's soccer media guide is designed to assist members of the media in its coverage of the Bulls soccer program. Additional information, including press releases and photographs, may be obtained by contacting the USF Sports Information Office at (813) 974-4029. Please take a moment to review the following policies and services that are intended to assist you in your coverage of USF men's soccer this season.

Media Credentials

All requests for press, broadcast and photo credentials for USF home soccer matches should be directed to Adam Hollen, Sports Information Assistant, via e-mail (ahollen@admin.usf.edu), phone (813-974-5755) or fax (813-974-5328). All requests should be made at least one week prior to the event.

As a general rule, working space is allocated on the following basis: (1) daily newspapers/beat writers and wire-service writers covering for next-day publications; (2) radio and television personnel for broadcast origination; (3) newspaper and television photographers. A television deck is located on the west end of the press box.

Photographers

Photographers are restricted to the grandstand sideline and the endlines (upto the near 18-yard box line) unless given permission by Adam Hollen. Photographers are asked to shoot atleast 10 yards from the field of play as to not interfere with the game.

TV/Video

A video deck is located on the west side of the press box. Power will be provided to those who need it.

Media Will Call

A media pass list will be left at the ticket gate of the USF Soccer Stadium.

Media Parking

Parking for all USF home soccer matches is located in the Visitor Parking Lot south of the USF Soccer Stadium and north of the Sun Dome. Parking is also available in the lot located southwest of the stadium on Maple Dr. Parking is free, two hours prior to the start of the match on weekdays and all day during the weekend.

Athlete Interviews

All media requests for interviews with USF soccer players should be directed to SID Assistant Adam Hollen (office: 813-974-5755), preferably 24 hours in advance. The best time for in-season interviews, either in person or on the phone, is prior to or following practice. Most USF practices begin at 2 p.m. and end at approximately 4 p.m. Practice is open to the media to film and photograph. Practices are held at the soccer practice fields (located to the north of the USF Athletics Building). Interviews conducted following practice should be held to a brief Q & A session. With advanced notice, interviews with players can be arranged for other hours. Calling players at home or on cell phones without permission from SID Adam Hollen will not be tolerated. The players' dorms, training room and weight room are also off limits. On game days, players are unavailable until after the match.

Head Coach Interviews

All interviews with Head Coach George Kiefer should be arranged through SID Adam Hollen (813-974-5755). The best time to interview Kiefer is in the morning. Coach Kiefer is also available for a brief Q&A following practice.

Covering Practice

Media members who want to cover or watch practice sessions are asked to contact Adam Hollen by the morning of that days practice. All practice all held at the USF soccer practice fields (located just north of the Athletics Building).

Postgame Interviews

Head Coach George Kiefer and requested players will be available for post-game interviews following a brief cool-down period. All interviews will be conducted on the field.

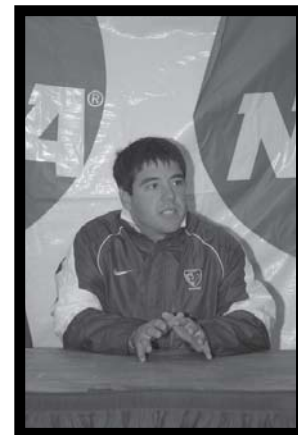

Media Services

The USF soccer press box is located at the top of the south grandstands. Two phone lines are located in the press box - the press box phone number (813-974-4256) and one phone line for visiting SID/radio (if needed). Power will be available for those who need it. The press box will also be equiped with wireless capability. High speed internet connections are available upon request.

Media members can access biographical data on the entire coaching staff and the current roster. The site also includes updated statistics for the team and individual athletes, meet recaps, weekly notes packages, photo galleries and several historical features.

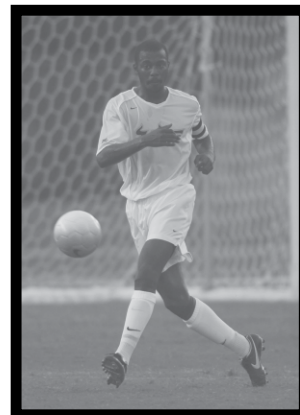
2007 Outlook

After coming off a season that included several milestone games, the University of South Florida men's soccer team looks to turn a new page in its historical achievements. Not only did the squad record its 700th game played last year, but head coach George Kiefer also earned his 50th career victory. In addition, the team also secured its second-straight berth in the BIG EAST Tournament, making at least the quarterfinal match in each year that the team has been with the league.

For Kiefer, however, these highlights are still far from the overall goal. "We're at a point where we need to prove ourselves," the sixth-year head coach says. "A year ago, we did very well against the top teams in the league and we let our guard down against some of the teams that finished lower than the top teams."

While this record still translated into Kiefer's fourth winning season since taking over the program in 2002, his standards remain high.

The feelings that he has regarding the 2007 season are positive as he highlights a deep core of talented players that he hopes will bring USF its second league title since joining the BIG EAST. "We have a good returning group and then we also have a large incoming group, whether they be freshmen, sophomores or some transfers. The team is very well balanced and I'm really open-minded about a lot of spots on the field. I feel like we brought in the highest quality athletes and they will all help us at some point, whether it be right away, or in two weeks or sometime on down the line. We literally have a guy or two guys for every spot on the field and that's nice. We've never had that at USF since I've been here."

BACK LINE

At perhaps the deepest position on the field for the team, the Bulls will look to continue the trend they set last season with a stifling defense that posted a .80 goals against average. Anchoring that defense is junior center-back and team captain **Yohance Marshall**. Though he only played in seven games last year due to injury, the Malabar Arima, Trinidad native is poised to help the Bulls build on a defense that finished fifth in the league last year in GAA. **Joris Claessens** will assist Marshall on the left side as the other returnee to the back line, with the final two spots up for grabs among the slew of talented players.

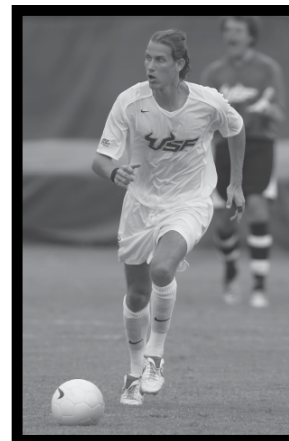
"We really have eight backs," says Kiefer. "Of that, obviously Yohance is the captain, our starting center back. Joris is a left back that has started for the last two years. **Tom Markey** and **Tony D'Oyley** had a very productive spring. To compete for those spots, you have **Andre Mittoo** who we expect to compete at the center-back spot, there's also **Gonzalo Ramella** who we expect to compete at the center-back spot and then we have **Javed Mohammed** to compete at the left-back or left midfield spot and then **Jermaine Hardy** to compete at the right-back spot."

To further enhance the depth at the back of the field, Region III team member and Florida state Olympic Development Program participant **Casey Tafuri** waits in the wings.

"We feel like we're very balanced with the back of our team and we have good depth."

MIDFIELD

The midfield for the 2007 Bulls should be full of mostly familiar faces as junior **Kevon Neaves** and sophomore **Francisco Aristeguieta** will look to garner playing time. Neaves tied for third on the team in total points (eight) last season, scoring two goals and assisting on four. Aristeguieta saw time in eight games and recorded five shots, with two on goal. One new inclusion to the mid-line will be senior **Simon Schoendorf**, who will transition from striker.

"If you go into the midfield, it's likely that you'd see Kevon and Francisco competing for starting jobs and we're going to move Simon back into the midfield, whether it be attacking midfielder or out on the right," stated Kiefer. "Depending on what we do with Jordan (Seabrook), we may move Jordan into the midfield and have him compete for that right-side spot. Then we have **Kris Raad** and **Jason Devenish** returning, they're the two returning outside midfielders. We've also tweaked our formation a little bit to allow our outside midfielders to cheat up a little more and play more like wingers at times."

USF will have further help with sophomore **Marc Doherty** and junior transfer **Armante Marshall** seeing more time on the field. Freshmen **Marshall Schultz**, **Bernardo Anor**, **Luke Magill** and Gaither High talent **Fernando Gonzalez** are all looking to contribute right away as well.



STRIKERS

With the Bulls out-shooting (264-246) and outscoring (25-16) opponents again last year, much of the success that the squad hopes to have will rely on the front attack. Junior **Jordan Seabrook**, who was the leading scorer in the BIG EAST two seasons ago and who led USF in scoring with six goals, three assists for 15 total points last year, looks to provide most of the support up front. Seabrook provides stability at the position, being one of only two returning players who played in every game last season, (Joris Claessens was the other). Sophomore **Ogi Perucica** will also likely see advanced playing time up front to compliment Seabrook. "Ogi finished the spring very strong," said Kiefer. Perucica was credited with 12 shots in 16 games last season and recorded one assist.

With Schoendorf moving back to the midfield, he will still be in integral part of the attack, but will leave a spot open for one of the exciting newcomers that the team boasts. "We're excited about **Tony Taylor** and **Zak Boggs**, who we expect to both challenge a little bit," Kiefer continued.

IN NET

Replacing graduated keeper Dane Brenner this year will be no easy task, but the Bulls are confident that sophomore **Diego Restrepo** is right for the job. Though he has yet to see time in a match, Kiefer illustrates why the West Palm Beach native inspires such assurance. "Diego finished the spring strong and got some experience with the U-20's over the summer so he's a seasoned goalkeeper," says Kiefer. "He had a good year with his PDL teams, being named all-conference. It's his job to lose. I feel confident with him."

As with the rest of the 2007 squad, the Bulls employ depth even at keeper with talented freshmen **Michal Canard** and **Jeff Attinella**. "Both Jeff and Mike are regional team goalkeepers. They've shown to be very good keepers on good teams that have won big events. I feel we're very balanced in goal as well," adds Kiefer.

2007 will give the Bulls 17 regular season matches in which to show their might. The slate features ten home dates and 11 total contests against BIG EAST foes. Six of the league match-ups will take place in the USF Soccer Stadium. Including exhibition play, the Bulls will face seven total NCAA teams from 2006: Saint Louis (ex.), UVA (ex.), Connecticut, WVU, Rutgers, Cincinnati and St. John's. "I think we have a demanding schedule," Kiefer said. "It's nice being in the BIG EAST because you're guaranteed a very competitive schedule before you even look outside of the conference."

The Bulls will open the season with three exhibition matches. The renewed rivalry of the Rowdies Cup against the University of Tampa will take place at home on Aug. 18 and Saint Louis will come to town for the second exhibition date on Aug. 21. USF travels to Charlottesville, Va., on Aug. 25 for the final warm-up date against Virginia. The Cavaliers finished the 2006 season ranked Nos. 4/6 in the country.

Regular season action begins Aug. 31 against in-state rival UCF at the USF Soccer Stadium. USF will go on the road for the first time on Sept. 2 to Stetson. The Bulls hold an 18-3-4 all-time advantage over the Knights and are a combined 40-7-5 against both teams.

USF will see two non-conference opponents in the Connecticut Tournament in early September. The squad faces FIU on Sep. 7 and South Carolina on Sep. 9. The latter meeting will be the first time USF has competed against an SEC school since 1999.

BIG EAST Conference play will commence when USF welcomes Connecticut on Sep. 21 to kick off a five game stretch against league opponents. A second stretch of six-straight games against BIG EAST teams will be the longest of the season for USF, during which the team will see back-to-back 2006 NCAA teams Rutgers in Piscataway (Oct. 20), and Cincinnati four days later in Tampa.

The Bulls will also tangle with national powers West Virginia on Sep. 30 and St. John's on Nov. 3. The Mountaineers ended the Bulls' 2006 campaign with a 1-0 defeat in the quarterfinals of the BIG EAST Championships and finished the year with Nos. 5/18 rankings. The match against St. John's will be the regular season finale. The Red Storm concluded 2006 ranked 13/23.

"A key is to take it one game at a time," Kiefer continued. "The first game against UT is the one that's on our mind right now and learning from that game and getting better after every game so we won't look ahead too much. They're all tough."

With so many benchmarks already set by the USF men's soccer team and with all that the Bulls have going for them this season, it is not hard to imagine many more milestones being met in the near future.

USF Soccer Stadium

The University of South Florida Bulls call the site of the 1990 and 1991 NCAA Men's Soccer Final Four — the USF Soccer Stadium — home.

One of the finest soccer facilities in the Southeastern United States, the stadium has a seating capacity of 4,000.

Originally called the USF soccer field, it has been the home for the USF men's soccer program since 1965. The very-first intercollegiate event was held at the soccer field when the men's soccer team hosted Florida Southern on Aug. 25, 1965. The Bulls won that contest, 4-3.

The 4,000-seat grandstands were completed in 1983. Lights were installed during the summer of 1985. The field is surrounded by a 400-meter track that was resurfaced in the spring of 1998.

The facility features concessions stands, restrooms and a first aid room while a press box at the top of the stands accommodates media members covering USF.

The Stadium served as host for the Conference USA men's soccer championships from 1996-98 and also in 2001. It played host to the 2003 C-USA Women's Soccer Championship.

In 2005, the first-ever BIG EAST contest was held with USF downing Seton Hall, 3-2 (OT) on Sept. 16. Later that season, the Quarterfinals of the BIG EAST Championship were played at the stadium, resulting in a 4-1 win for USF over West Virginia (Nov. 5).

The NCAA Tournament returned to the USF Soccer Stadium on Nov. 18, 2005 when the Bulls played host to in-state rival Stetson in a first-round matchup. The event marked the first-ever NCAA Tournament victory at home for the Bulls with a one-sided 3-0 win over the Hatters.

CBS Sports televised the 1990 and 1991 NCAA championship matches to a national audience from the facility and 16,000 were attracted to the two Final Fours.

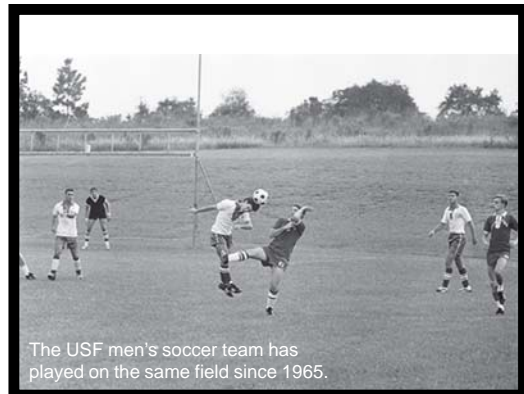
USF also hosted the 1998 C-USA Men's and Women's Outdoor Track and Field Championships at the facility.

George Kiefer

George Kiefer, entering his sixth season at the University of South Florida, has quickly become one of the nation's most successful and respected coaches. The 2005 NSCAA South Region Coach of the Year looks to continue to build on the foundation laid over the past five seasons in making USF one of the nation's top soccer programs.

A native of Bay Shore, N.Y., Kiefer was named USF's head coach on June 21, 2002, becoming the program's sixth coach in its 40-year history. Since arriving in Tampa, Kiefer has compiled a 50-32-11 (.597) record in five years at USF, leading the Bulls to three seasons of 10-or-more wins and a 28-8-7 (.733) record at home. Under Kiefer, USF has faced 23 ranked opponents, registering a 10-9-4 record versus the nation's elite.

A total of 19 all-conference selections have been honored under Kiefer as well as eight NSCAA All-South Region selections, three Freshman All-Americans and three Conference USA Freshmen of the Year.

USF has not only found success on the field but off the field as well. Under Kiefer, the Bulls have earned 27 C-USA Commissioner's Honor Roll selections (GPA of 3.0 or better), seven C-USA Academic Medals (GPA of 3.75 or better), a C-USA Sports Academic Award (2003-04 - top men's soccer team GPA), an ESPN Academic All-District (GPA of 3.2 or better, Dane Brenner - 2006) and an ESPN Academic All-American (Chris Raye in 2004). USF also received the NSCAA Team Academic Award in 2003-04.

Since stepping foot on the USF campus, Kiefer has made it a point to bring the best talent to the men's soccer program. Since 2003, Kiefer's recruiting classes have been recognized as one of the nation's best.

The 2005 season proved to be the most successful to date for USF under Kiefer. The 13 wins produced by that year's squad were the most since the 2001 season. In its first year in BIG EAST action, USF finished with a conference-best 9-2 record, leading the Bulls to the BIG EAST Red Division title. The Bulls were runners-up to the Connecticut Huskies in the BIG EAST Tournament. USF finished the season riding a 10-game winning streak at home - the most since a 12-game winning streak that extended from the end of the 1982 season to the beginning of the 1983 season. The 10-straight home wins in a single season are the most in school history. The Bulls broke the school record for conference victories (9). Six players earned 31 accolades during the 2005 season. After dropping three of its first four contests, USF closed out the 2005 regular season winning 10 of its last 12 games as well as being recognized in the national polls (No. 19 by Soccer America, No. 24 by SoccerTimes and No. 21 by College Soccer News).

Kiefer assembled one of the most potent offenses in not only the BIG EAST but in the nation (18th). In 2005, USF recorded 44 goals and 54 assists for 142 points. The offensive output by that squad was the most by any team coached under Kiefer. His squad kept the pressure on its opponents, outshooting the opposition 322-242.

Kiefer guided USF's return the NCAA Tournament in 2005 for the first time in five years, defeating Stetson, 3-0, in the first NCAA Tournament game held at the USF Soccer Stadium since 1998. The Bulls then traveled to Charlottesville, Va., to face the Virginia Cavaliers in the second round, scoring a school-record number goals in the NCAA Tournament match with four, only to be eliminated in a penalty kick shootout, 7-6.

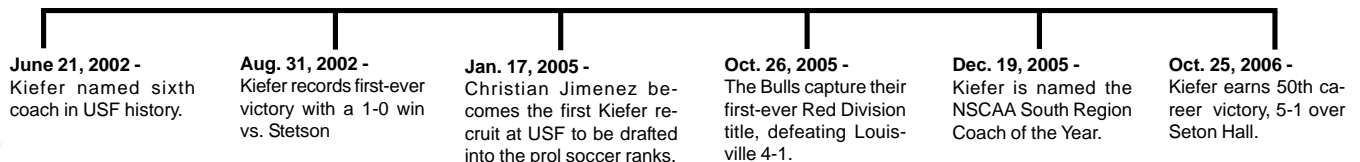
The Bulls returned to the BIG EAST Championship yet again in 2006, following the third-straight winning season, and fourth overall, posted by Kiefer at USF. With a season-high scoring effort of five goals, the Bulls eliminated Seton Hall 5-1 in the first round of the tournament in front of a raucous home crowd. The win was USF's ninth of the season and gave Kiefer his 50th overall career victory.

Despite falling just short of a fourth ten-win season, the Bulls out shot (264-246) and outscored (25-16) opponents by a wide margin during the '06 campaign. The men's soccer program concluded 2006 by playing in the 700th game in the program's history, a rematch against No. 4 West Virginia in the quarterfinals of the conference championship. The Bulls fell 1-0 to the Mountaineers despite putting twice as many shots on goal (six to three) than the No. 1 seeded team.

Following a 7-8-3 season in 2003 (the only sub-.500 season under the Bulls head coach), Kiefer guided USF to a 10-5-2 record in 2004. That season, the Bulls were recognized in each of the national polls for most of the year, ranking in the top 10 in all four polls (No. 9 by Soccer America; No 9 by NSCAA; No. 7 by SoccerTimes; No. 9 by College Soccer News). The Bulls started the season riding a nine-game unbeaten streak (the third longest in school history).

The 2004 season marked the first year that one of Kiefer's recruits at USF had been drafted by an MLS team. Christian Jimenez was selected by Chivas USA as the 14th overall pick in the 2005 MLS Draft.

Kiefer took the reigns from former head coach John Hackworth, who led the program to a regular season Conference USA title (shared), a conference tournament title and two NCAA tournament appearances in his four short seasons at USF. Kiefer continued that success in 2002, guiding the Bulls to an 11-7 mark - the program's seventh-straight season posting double-digit wins.

Kiefer, 34, came to USF with seven years experience as an assistant coach, having assisted Ray Reid at Southern Connecticut State University from 1995-96 and, most recently, at the University of Connecticut from 1997 through the spring of 2002. Tabbed by Reid as "one of the top up-and-coming coaches in the country," Kiefer helped the two Connecticut programs achieve an extraordinary amount of success.

A player-turned-coach, Kiefer played professionally with the Connecticut Wolves (USISL) from 1994-95 and played his college ball for SCSU from 1990-93, helping lead the Owls to two NCAA National Championships and four-straight New England Collegiate Conference (NECC) Championships. He is a USSF "A" licensed coach and has been a Region I Olympic Development Program Assessor and a Connecticut Olympic

Development Program Head Coach. He earned his bachelor's degree in corporate communications in 1994 and his master's in physical education in 1997, both from SCSU.

Following a graduate assistantship at SCSU in 1994, during which the Owls made an NCAA Division II National Semifinal appearance, Kiefer joined Southern's coaching staff full-time in 1995. In just two seasons as an assistant, Kiefer helped lead the Owls to an NCAA National Championship in 1995 and an NCAA National Semifinal appearance in 1996. He also coached six first team All-Americans, two of whom were named NCAA Division II Player of the Year and one that was named CoSIDA's Division II Player of the Year. Two of these players, Mike Petke and Chris Houser, went on to play in Major League Soccer (MLS) for the New York/New Jersey MetroStars and the (former) Tampa Bay Mutiny, respectively.

In 1997, Kiefer followed Reid to UConn, where he quickly established himself as one of college soccer's top recruiters.

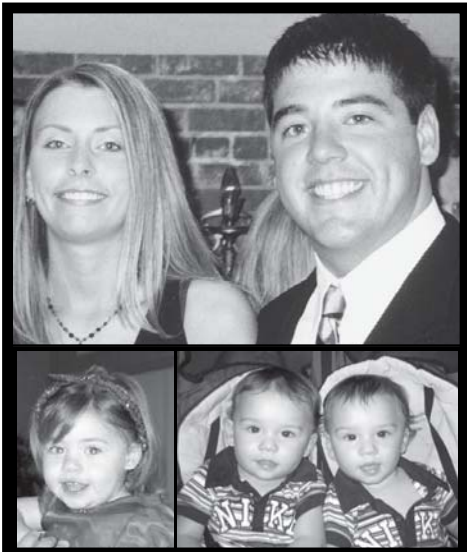
Under a dry spell with only one BIG EAST Championship since 1989, the Huskies needed only one season under Kiefer's recruiting guidance to reverse their BIG EAST fortune. After finishing seventh in conference play in 1997, UConn posted a first-place regular-season finish in 1998, its first of four consecutive titles, and added a Big East Tournament Championship in 1999. The Huskies were 40-12-2 (.759) in regular-season conference games and 7-4 (.636) in the BIG EAST tournament from 1997-2001.

Above and beyond the BIG EAST, Kiefer helped guide UConn to two College Cup appearances, including an NCAA semifinal bid in 1999 and an NCAA title in 2000. The Huskies made it to the first and second rounds of the tournament in 1998 and 2001, respectively, and earned five-straight tournament berths. UConn posted an 82-24-6 (.759) overall mark from 1997-01, including an 8-3 (.727) record in NCAA tournament play.

While at UConn, Kiefer successfully recruited and coached nine All-Americans, including Hermann Trophy winner Chris Gbandi (Dallas Burn) and Herman Trophy finalist Brent

Rahim (Levski Sofia of Bulgaria and a member of the Trinidad and Tobago National Team), and seven BIG EAST Player of the Year Award winners. Six of these players have gone on to be drafted by and/or currently play with MLS teams.

Kiefer is married to wife Lauren and the couple has a daughter, Kendall (3), born on Feb. 7, 2004 and twin sons Jack (three minutes older) and Max, born Sep. 6, 2006.

Ryan Anatol enters his third season as assistant coach with the USF men's soccer program. A former standout with the Bulls, Anatol was hired on April 19, 2005. During his first season back at USF, Anatol helped guide the Bulls to a 13-6-2 record and a BIG EAST conference-best 9-2 record and the BIG EAST Red Division title. The Bulls were runners-up to the Connecticut Huskies in the BIG EAST Tournament and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Anatol has not yet seen a .500 season or below since joining the USF coaching staff.

"Ryan is an excellent addition to our coaching staff," said Head Coach George Kiefer. "He has championship experience both as a player and a coach. It's always good to bring back one of your own. Having played here at USF during a very successful period, Ryan understands what it takes for this program to become one of the nation's elite."

Anatol played for the Bulls for four seasons (1997-00) under coaches David Christiansen and John Hackworth serving as team co-captain in 2000. During his career USF, Anatol won Conference USA Championships in 1997 and 1998 and competed in the NCAA Tournament both seasons. In 1997 the Bulls won 14 games and advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight, the best showing for the team to date.

From 2003-05, Anatol served as an assistant coach at the University of Akron. During his tenure with the Zips, Akron compiled a 28-10-5 record, while winning the Mid-American Conference (MAC) title in 2004 and earning back-to-back NCAA Tournament berths. The 2003 Zips squad advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen.

While at Akron, Anatol also coached with the Everest Soccer Club and the Ohio North Olympic Development Program State Team (2003-05). There he was responsible for the selection and development of the top youth players in the state.

Prior to joining the Zips' staff he spent one year as the assistant men's soccer coach at Lakeland College in Wisconsin. At Lakeland, Anatol assisted recruiting, scouting and co-coordinating camps apart from his coaching duties. In his one season Anatol also created and operated the Lakeland Soccer Coach's Club, a booster club that developed alumni and community involvement for the college.

Anatol spent the 2001 as a volunteer assistant coach at USF. A 2002 graduate of USF with a degree in mass communications, Anatol worked with the Bulls' goalkeepers and assisted with recruiting.

The Trinidad & Tobago native spent 1995-96 as a member of the Under-20 National Team and was voted to the island's All-Star Eleven team as a senior. Anatol and his wife Natalie reside in Land O' Lakes.

2006 Season Review



Highlights of the 2006 USF Men's Soccer Season

- USF earned a berth in its second-straight BIG EAST Championship, having finished as the No. 4 seed in the Red Division this past year.
- In the BIG EAST Championship, the Bulls handed Seton Hall a 5-1 loss, holding the league's then-third best offense to just one score. The 5-1 win was the most-lopsided victory for the Bulls since 2002 and the one-sided result in post-season play since 1984.
- USF was ranked as high as ninth in the nation by Soccer America and No 16 by the NSCAA. The Bulls spent seven weeks ranked among the nation's best.
- USF was the only team in the BIG EAST to earn a point versus the West Virginia Mountaineers (2-2 tie on Sept. 15).
- USF handed No. 8 Notre Dame its first conference loss of the season with a 2-0 win at Notre Dame on Sept. 8.
- USF boasted the 25th-best defense in the nation, recording a 0.80 GAA in 2006.
- The Bulls also ranked 20th in the nation in save percentage (0.826)
- No team scored more than two goals versus the Bulls. USF held its opponents to one goal or less, 16 times this season.
- The Bulls shutout the high-powered offense of Cincinnati on Oct. 7 (in Cincinnati), earning a 0-0 draw.
- During the 2006 season, USF out-shot its opponents 264-146 (120-92 on goal).
- Two of the Bulls six losses this season have come against teams currently ranked in the top 25. All six of USF's losses have been one-goal outings.
- USF faced a total of five ranked opponents in 2006, registering a 1-2-2 record in those contests.
- The Bulls opened up the 2006 season playing four of its first five games on the road.
- USF's Rodrigo Hidalgo was a candidate for the 2006 M.A.C. Hermann Trophy.

Bulls Begin Season At The Top

The BIG EAST office announced that the University of South Florida men's soccer team has been chosen to finish first in the Red Division in the 2006 BIG EAST Preseason Poll (as selected by the league's head coaches). Comprised of 16 teams, the BIG EAST is broken up into two divisions of eight teams (Red and Blue). USF made a strong impression in its 2005 rookie year in the league. Compiling a record of 13-6-2 overall, and a league-best 9-2-0 mark within the conference, USF made a run for the league championship title, falling in the final game to Connecticut, 1-0. The Bulls earned nine first-place votes and 106 total points in this year's preseason poll. Holding a national ranking as high as No. 16, USF advanced to the second round of the 2005 NCAA Tournament before being knocked out on penalty kicks by Virginia.

USF Boasts The Most Players On Pre-Season Team

Junior Rodrigo Hidalgo and sophomores Jordan Seabrook and Yohance Marshall have also been recognized by the conference by being named to the Preseason All-Conference Team. Having lost only one senior, USF returns three Preseason All-BIG EAST Team members: Hidalgo, Seabrook and Marshall. The Bulls have the most players of any league school on the preseason team.

The National Spotlight

The Oct. 12 match between the University of South Florida men's soccer team and the Stetson Hatters was broadcast live on Fox Soccer Channel as NSCAA College Match of the Week. The Thursday-night contest (8 p.m.) marked the 27th match all-time between USF and Stetson with the Bulls holding a 21-4-1 edge all-time in the series history. USF hosted Stetson twice during the 2005 season, winning both contests, including a 3-0 Bulls' victory during the first round of the NCAA Tournament. The mid-week, non-conference battle took place in front a raucous, record-breaking crowd on the USF campus as the two teams meet for the 27th time. The first 100 fans at the USF Soccer Stadium received a free USF t-shirt as USF won the match 3-1.

Deep Into the BIG EAST Championships Again

The University of South Florida men's soccer team (9-5-4, 4-3-4 BIG EAST) scored five times to down the Seton Hall Pirates (9-8-1, 7-4-0 BIG EAST), 5-1, during the first round of the BIG EAST Championships at the USF Soccer Stadium on Wednesday, Oct. 25. Sparked by the return of some key offensive players, USF scored on its first three shots of the game and never looked back. Two goals by Hermann Trophy candidate Rodrigo Hidalgo highlighted USF strong offensive outing as both scores were recorded in the first half. Goals by Hunter West, Kris Raad and Anthony D'Oyley, Jr., rounded out the night for USF, scoring a season-high in the contest and improving the team's conference tournament record to 2-1-1 all-time.

Goalkeeper Dane Brenner registered seven saves en route to his ninth win of the season. The High Point, N.C., native picked up his second-career victory over the Pirates and improved his BIG EAST Championship record to 2-1-0.

Four Bulls Earn All-Conference Accolades

Four players from the University of South Florida men's soccer team earned post-season BIG EAST honors as announced by the league. Kareem Smith (Second Team All-BIG EAST), Kevon Neaves (Third Team), Jordan Seabrook (Third Team All-BIG EAST) and Rodrigo Hidalgo (Third Team All-BIG EAST) were each honored by the BIG EAST Conference for their accomplishments this season.

Brenner Earns Academic All-District

University of South Florida men's soccer player Dane Brenner has been named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District III First Team, as announced by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

Brenner, who carried a 3.73 GPA in sociology, was been one of the nation's top goalkeepers in 2006. Ranking 29th in the nation in goals against average, Brenner has notched six shutouts and has posted a career-best 0.80 GAA this season. He has recorded a career-best 74 saves in 2006 and is 24th in the country in save percentage (.822).

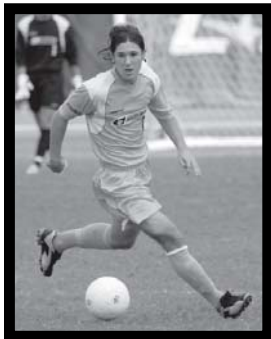

Professional Bulls



Mark Chung was the sixth overall selection in the inaugural MLS college draft in 1996. A member of the Kansas City Wizards from 1996-9-8, he has also played for the New York/New Jersey MetroStars (1999-01) and the Colorado Rapids (2002-2005). Chung closed out his MLS career with the San Jose Earthquakes at the end of the 2005 season. Chung was a five-time MLS All-Star (1997, 1999, 2000, 2002 and 2003) and three-time three-time MLS Best XI selection (1997, 2002 and 2003). Beyond MLS, Chung earned 24 caps for the U.S. Men's National Team, scoring two goals and adding two assists. Chung was a Bull from 1988-92.

Jeff Cunningham was taken ninth overall by the Columbus Crew in the 1998 MLS college draft. Since posting eight goals and an assist as rookie, he became a fixture in Columbus' attack. In 2001, Cunningham became the first-ever member of the Crew to post double digits in both goals and assists in a season. In 2002, he joined fellow Bull alum Mark Chung as one of MLS' Best XI. Cunningham was named an MLS All-Star in 2005 and helped the Colorado Rapids to the Western Conference Finals. He was traded to Real Salt Lake prior to the start of 2006. Called up to the U.S. Men's National Team in 2005, Cunningham has made eight appearances, including four in games leading up to the team's historic World Cup quarterfinal finish (2002).

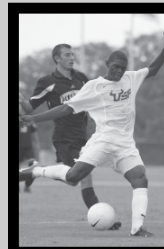

Christian Jimenez was selected 14th overall by Chivas USA in the 2005 MLS Draft. He spent his rookie season in a developmental role for Chivas before being traded to Real Salt Lake at the start of the 2006 season. Jimenez, who was one of the Bulls' top midfielders, only played one season (2004) at USF before deciding to enter the MLS draft. While at USF, the San Dimas, Calif., native played in all 17 games for the Bulls, posting three goals and four assists and finishing fourth on the team in points (10). He was also named to the Conference USA All-Freshman Team.

Anthony Wallace, was tabbed by FC Dallas with the ninth pick of the 2007 MLS SuperDraft, making him the third-highest selection in school history. Wallace started all 19 matches in 2006, his lone campaign with the Bulls. He concluded the year with one assist from his position in the defense and helped USF's back line develop into one of the best in the BIG EAST. A highly touted recruit with U.S. National U-20 Team experience, The St. Petersburg, Fla., native was named one of the "100 freshmen from coast to coast to keep an eye on" by "College Soccer News."

The University

Discover USF



The University of South Florida is among America's largest and most dynamic research universities. Founded in 1956, USF opened its doors with an enrollment of nearly 2,000. Today, the University serves more than 44,000 students at four campuses located in Tampa, St. Petersburg, Sarasota-Manatee and Lakeland.

The ninth largest university in the nation and a member of the BIG EAST Athletic Conference, USF has achieved distinction in all areas of academics, sports, research and funding. The University offers 217 degree programs at the undergraduate, graduate, specialty and doctoral levels, including the doctor of medicine.

USF's student body is as diverse as its academic program profile. More than 30 percent of the University's students are African American, Black, Asian American, Hispanic or Native American, and USF is home to scholars from every state in the U.S. and more than 125 countries across the globe. Almost 60 percent of students are women. USF students are taught by highly regarded faculty who came to USF from many of the world's leading universities and research institutions.



Top Research University

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has placed USF in its highest classification level, which is "Research University with Very High Research Activity." Of the 4,321 colleges and universities classified, USF is one of only 63 public universities in the highest tier. Inclusion at this level affirms USF's position among the top research universities in the nation. USF was awarded more than \$310 million in research contracts and grants in 2006.

USF is one of 76 universities in the nation designated by The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching as being most engaged with their communities and one of only ten public research universities across the country designated as "very high research" and "community-engaged." USF is the only Florida university – public or private – to receive this classification.



At the center of the Tampa Bay region's medical, biotechnology and bio-science research, USF has become a major player in the highly competitive research arena. USF's internationally renowned researchers are making radical breakthrough in marine science, medicine, engineering and social research. Work in counter-terrorism and biological defense, optical sensors, immunology, Alzheimer's and other neurological disorders, aging stud-

ies, laser technology and alternative fuels has gained national and international recognition.

The University is a leader in establishing public/private partnerships for the mutual exchange of resources and talent for research and development. As one of the major anchors in the creation and development of the 21-county Florida High Technology Corridor that runs from the Atlantic coast to the Gulf of Mexico along Interstate 4, USF attracts hundreds of high-tech businesses and creates thousands of jobs in the heart of central Florida.





The University's master-planned Research and Development Park, on the Tampa campus, links USF facilities to high-tech research firms, devoting 1.2 million square feet of space to offices, research and development activities. A hotel on the property has 1,400 square feet of conference and meeting facilities, opening new opportunities for conferences and collaborative activities.

Economic Impact

The impact of the University on the Tampa Bay Region is intellectual, cultural and economic. In January 2006, USF released the findings of an economic impact study. The results reported that USF makes a \$3.2 billion annual economic impact on the regional economy of Tampa Bay through direct and indirect spending of payroll, student tuition, student expenses, construction and research.

Hundreds of computers are available seven days a week in 12 labs conveniently located on all four campuses with free Internet access.

Dr. Judy Genshaft
President

Judy Genshaft was appointed president of the University of South Florida in July 2000.

During Dr. Genshaft's presidency, USF has been nationally recognized as a top-tier national research university, and it is on track to be among the top public research universities in the nation. With campuses in Tampa, St. Petersburg, Sarasota-Manatee and Lakeland, USF serves more than 44,000 students in more than 200 degree programs on the undergraduate, masters, specialist and doctoral levels, including the doctor of medicine. USF has 12,000 employees and a budget of more than \$1.6 billion annually.

President Genshaft led the development and implementation of a five-year strategic plan that focuses USF resources on strategic priorities. She has also developed a more focused plan to move USF into the top tier of public research universities. The plan strengthens USF's faculty and program quality, student selectivity and achievement, research quality and productivity, and private support.

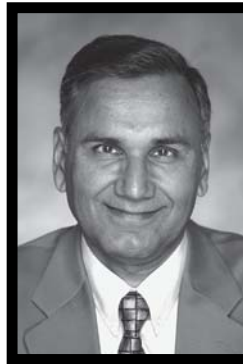
As the leader of a metropolitan research university, President Genshaft has established herself as a leader for economic development, especially related to high-technology and bioscience. President Genshaft has focused on partnering university research—which under her leadership topped \$310 million last year—with corporate and entrepreneurial partners. She launched the university's high-tech business incubator and Research Park which is a hub for bioscience research and entrepreneurship. Last year she successfully led the efforts to recruit SRI International to affiliate with the University's College of Marine Science and its Center for Ocean Technology, bringing a major economic engine to the St. Petersburg area.

President Genshaft is active on a national level, serving on the American Council on Education (ACE) and the BIG EAST Executive Board, as well as the current Chair of the Tampa Bay Partnership, Vice Chair of the Greater Tampa Chamber of Commerce, a member of the Florida High-Tech Corridor, the Florida Council of 100 and the NCAA.

Prior to joining USF, President Genshaft served as provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University at Albany, State University of New York. She also held various positions during a 16-year tenure at The Ohio State University. She holds a bachelor's degree in social work and psychology from the University of Wisconsin at Madison, a master's degree in school counseling from Kent State University, and a doctorate in counseling psychology from Kent State.

Faculty Representative

While the 2007-08 academic and athletic year at the University of South Florida will mark Dr. Suresh Khator's second as Faculty Representative for the Bulls, he has been, for many years, a valuable member of the staff at USF.

Khator arrived on campus as an assistant professor in 1983 and has continued to further his career at the University. He was promoted to professor of Industrial & Management Systems Engineering in 1993 and is currently serving as the Director of Engineering Computing.

In his current capacity, he is responsible for planning and supervision of computing in the College of Engineering. The computing facilities in the College consist of five open-access and teaching labs with more than 180 computers. He has held his current position since June of 1998.

Career highlights at USF also include serving as the Interim Associate Dean (Academics) of the College of Engineering (1994-95) and the Director of Undergraduate Program of the Department of Industrial & Management Systems Engineering (1983-86 and 1990-92).

Dr. Khator has always been heavily involved in campus activities, serving as Faculty Senate Vice President from 1999-2001. He has also served on numerous committees during his tenure at USF.

Dr. Khator earned his bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering (with distinction) from Jiwaji University in Gwalior, India, in 1969. He went on to claim a master's of technology in production and industrial engineering (with distinction) in 1971 before receiving his doctorate of philosophy in industrial engineering from Purdue in 1975.

An already distinguished career includes a long and impressive list of appointments, publications, presentations and grants.

Dr. Khator's connection with USF doesn't stop with his accomplishments. His wife, Dr. Renu Khator, was appointed Provost and Senior Vice President at the University in 2004.



Doug Woolard
Director of Athletics

In just three years at the University of South Florida, Doug Woolard has inspired and led a number of initiatives that have allowed the Bulls' program to make a successful transition into the prestigious BIG EAST Conference.

Although USF had already accepted a bid to join the BIG EAST when Woolard assumed command in May 2004, his tireless work to set a strong foundation at the outset has not gone unnoticed.

The BIG EAST places the Bulls in an elite neighborhood of programs, but Woolard set a goal upon his hiring to make USF the best program in the conference. To do that, he has stressed the importance of a strong partnership between staff, student-athletes and community.

Since May 2004, Woolard has led a successful effort to earmark a new "athletics footprint" on campus that will allow the program to initiate efforts to build new facilities in a core area on campus. As fundraising allows, Woolard will lead the staff in improving facilities for baseball, basketball, softball, soccer and tennis.

Already, USF has added nearly \$2 million in video scoreboards to the Sun Dome, USF's basketball arena, and Woolard has a progressive plan to re-fit the entire seating configuration in the arena.

Woolard has also been proactive in retaining successful coaches, having negotiated new contracts with Jim Leavitt (football), Ken Eriksen (softball) and Jose Fernandez (women's basketball). Leavitt remains the only football coach USF has ever had and he led the program to a bowl game in 2005, only the ninth season of competition, and to a bowl championship in its 10th season in 2006. Eriksen has annually led his softball program into postseason competition and was an assistant coach for the 2004 USA Olympic Team. Fernandez has led the women's basketball program to postseason play in each of the past four years - the only such appearances in the program's history.

Always looking to keep USF in the forefront of athletics nationally, Woolard has taken an aggressive approach in hiring searches that have led to the addition of Stan Heath (men's basketball), Lelo Prado (baseball) and Denise Schilte-Brown (women's soccer), three coaches that have led their previous programs to NCAA Tournaments.

Expanded television and radio coverage for USF programs has also been a key initiative for Woolard. In 2005, he helped complete an agreement that allows for the most electronic media exposure in school history. In addition to USF's football and men's basketball programs upgrading to more powerful stations, every USF women's basketball game is now being aired on the radio for the first time ever. Opportunities will also exist for USF's baseball and softball programs, in addition to volleyball. There is also more television exposure through rebroadcast opportunities for all of USF's athletic teams on Bright House Networks in Tampa Bay.

In 2004 - his first year at USF and the Bulls' final season in Conference USA - Woolard helped build momentum heading into the program's initiation into the BIG EAST. The women's

track, golf and softball teams earned NCAA bids and the women's basketball team had its finest season ever and played in a second-straight postseason tournament. Men's basketball built strong momentum at the end of the year with upset wins over Charlotte, Houston and Cincinnati en route to the semifinals of the Conference USA Tournament.

All of this has not been achieved without continued emphasis on academics. Woolard has taken a personal involvement in building resources that will allow USF to maintain its early success in the NCAA's new APR (Academic Progress Rate) rankings. Woolard has hired Dr. Amy Haworth to oversee the Academic Services area and her professional background provides USF student-athletes with a wealth of support. Additionally, Woolard has hired the first-ever full-time Champs/Life Skills Director at USF.

Woolard's leadership role is one he is fit to assume and one in which he has experience. In October 1994, he assumed leadership of the Saint Louis University Department of Athletics as its Director and guided the program through a historic period that included the school's inclusion as a founding member of Conference USA, and more recently its acceptance of membership in the Atlantic 10 Conference.

While overseeing a department that was progressive in its competitive success, Woolard also proved to be a large asset in a community that like Tampa Bay, presents the challenge of finding a niche with professional football, baseball and hockey in the market.

The Saint Louis men's basketball team consistently ranked among the top 30 in the nation in annual attendance during Woolard's decade at the helm. Three times, the program was among the nation's top 10, peaking with an average attendance of 17,708. Further, the men's soccer program at Saint Louis is consistently in the nation's top 10 in attendance by averaging over 2,800 fans a game.

Further enhancing the community partnership, Woolard remained committed to bringing all Billiken athletic events back on campus. In addition to constructing a new soccer stadium, Saint Louis added a new

softball facility and nine new tennis courts on campus.

While maintaining an outstanding department at Saint Louis, Woolard has also become a prominent figure on national committees. Presently he is a member of the NCAA Sports Wagering Task Force, which has been charged with recommending strategies to counteract sports wagering by student-athletes. He is a past chair of the Conference USA directors of athletics committee and he also served as the league's representative on the NCAA Academic/Eligibility/Compliance (AEC) Cabinet, where he chaired the amateurism and agents subcommittee. Woolard has also served as C-USA's alternate to the NCAA Management Council, the most powerful committee in the NCAA governance structure.

Prior to joining Saint Louis, Woolard worked for the nationally respected Jim Livengood at Washington State University. Under Livengood, who is now the Director of Athletics at Arizona and a past chair of the NCAA Men's Basketball Committee, Woolard was the associate director for external operations from 1989-94, after one year (1988-89) as an assistant director of athletics.

While at Washington State, Woolard was a key member of the senior management staff that oversaw a successful football program, and he played a prominent role in the entire department's relationship with the community.

Woolard and his wife, Cherrie, have two children, Chris and Amy.





Barbara Sparks-McGlinchy
Senior Associate Director of
Athletics

A member of the University of South Florida Athletic Department family since March 1982, Barbara Sparks-McGlinchy was elevated to senior associate athletic director in 1998.

Coinciding with Sparks-McGlinchy's increasing responsibilities within the athletic department, there has been a rapid growth period within the overall athletic program. During her tenure, USF has added women's cross country, men's and women's track and field, women's soccer, football and women's sailing.

At the same time, USF moved first from the Sun Belt Conference (1976-1991) into the Metro Conference in 1991. Following four seasons in the Metro Conference, USF became a member of Conference USA in 1995 and transitioned into the BIG EAST in 2005. Along with that transition came a steady increase in USF's competitive demands, and the Bulls have responded impressively.

USF's volleyball team won back-to-back Conference USA Championships in 1997 and 1998 and has made four NCAA appearances in the past nine years, while the women's tennis team won the 1997 and 2000 Conference USA titles and had been to four-straight NCAA Championships from 1997-2000. Meanwhile, the softball team has reached the NCAA Championships eight of the last 11 seasons, including an appearance in the Super Regional in 2006. The men's soccer team has made six trips to the NCAA's since Sparks-McGlinchy's arrival at USF, most recently a second round berth in 2005 and its most successful run with an Elite 8 appearance in 1997. The men's tennis and women's golf teams have also been regulars in postseason NCAA competition.

In her current role, Sparks-McGlinchy has administrative supervision of five athletic teams at USF, including men's baseball and soccer, and women's sailing, softball and volleyball. Sparks-McGlinchy also serves as USF's senior woman administrator and has oversight responsibility for Title IX compliance. She was an integral part of the team that planned, designed and oversaw construction of the Athletics Training Facility and she is the Athletic Department's liaison to the USF Board of Trustees Academics and Campus Environment workgroup.

Selected to the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Business and Finance Cabinet in 1997, Sparks-McGlinchy was also a member of that cabinet's marketing committee. She represented USF on the State Council on Equity in Athletics for over 15 years and served as chair of the Finance Committee for the Council. Additionally, she was the chair of the Conference USA Senior Woman Administrators for 1999-2000.

Currently Sparks-McGlinchy serves on the BIG EAST Conference Championships and Competitions Committee and is a member of the conference's Men's Soccer Committee.

Sparks-McGlinchy serves on the Board of Directors of the Police Athletic League (PAL) of Tampa. She is the past president of the Temple Terrace Chamber of Commerce and is the president of the St. Vincent de Paul Conference at Corpus Christi Catholic Church.

Sparks-McGlinchy has a bachelor's degree in business management and a master's degree in guidance and counselor education, both from USF. She and her husband John reside in Temple Terrace. They have three grown children: Shawn, John and April.

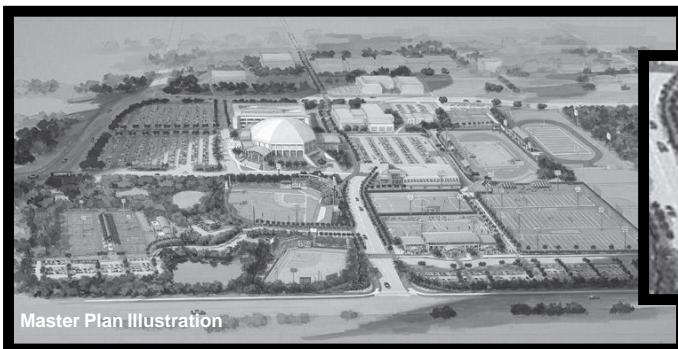

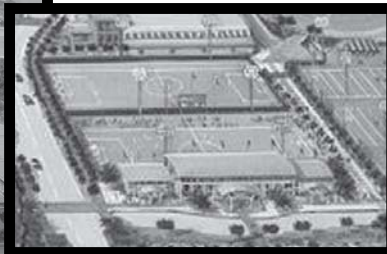

Academic Enrichment Center

The USF Academic Enrichment Center opened in June of 2004 and has seen continued use from USF student-athletes, taking advantage of the outstanding Academic Enrichment Program provided to meet the needs and goals of our diverse student-athlete population. The center includes a computer lab, a large study lounge, individual tutor rooms, a distance learning lab and eight staff offices. Student-athletes have accessibility to the Academic Enrichment Center and the excellent staff throughout the entire year.

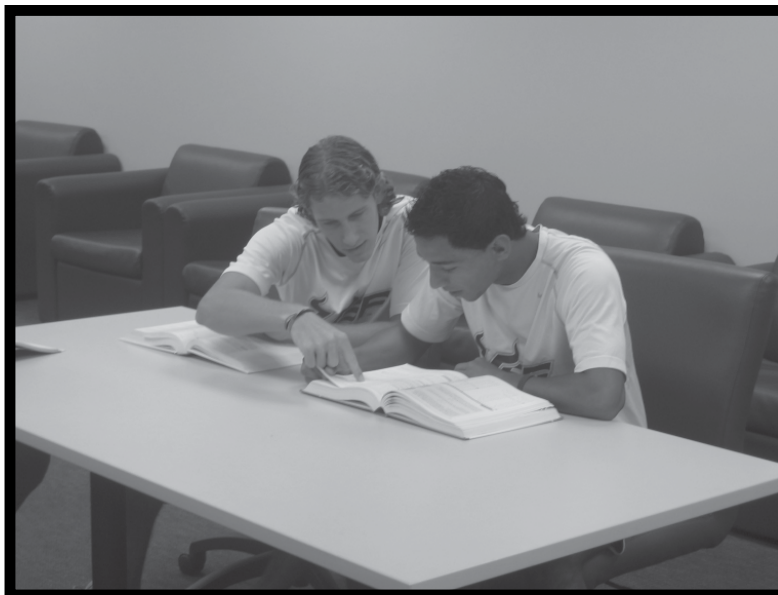

Academic Enrichment Program

The Academic Enrichment Program at the University of South Florida is designed to be a full-service program with the goal of providing the support and services necessary to enhance the total development of the USF student-athlete. The program is focused on the unique needs and demands of student-athletes at USF and fosters the cultivation of skills that allow for the development of potential in the classroom, on the field and for the future.

The Academic Enrichment Program provides a variety of support mechanisms for all student-athletes by way of specific events and activities designed to promote academic success, athletic success, community service, career development and personal development. The theories and tenants mirror those promoted through the NCAA CHAMPS/LifeSkills model, but are designed specifically for the identified needs and challenges specific to our student-athlete body.

Because we are committed to academic success and to providing the appropriate level of support for all our student-athletes, the academic component of our Enrichment Program is considered most vital. Focus is placed on identifying and meeting the needs and challenges faced by our student-athletes through providing assistance programs, workshops, tutoring and mentoring made available throughout the academic year. Emphasis is placed on encouraging student-athletes to take responsibility for their academic careers and for being productive and successful members of the USF academic community.



All first-year students are afforded the opportunity to participate in the EXCEL program designed to assist all newcomers with the transition to the university and to help students adjust to the rigor of the USF academic program. Components of the program include weekly meetings with an EXCEL counselor, objective-based study hall, tutoring and ongoing academic advising.



In addition to the emphasis on the classroom and academic success, the Academic Enrichment Program provides support and programming in the areas of career development, community service, personal development and leadership. The athletic success of our student-athletes is supported through our coaching staffs as well as the various support staffs provided for them, including the strength and conditioning staff, athletic training staff, sports information staff, facilities staff and the equipment room staff. In addition, programming in the areas of nutrition, performance enhancement, leadership development, sports agents and gambling, ethical behavior, sportsmanship and amateurism are provided throughout the academic year.

Career Development

A major focus for the program is to provide programming and services designed to prepare student-athletes for careers beyond the field and court. Networking opportunities, career placement services, workshops in resume writing, cover letter composition and interview skills provide student-athletes with the vital resources to prepare them for this phase of their development.

Community Service

The Academic Enrichment Program serves to coordinate all of the efforts by our student-athletes and coaches as well as the SAAC organization in the area of community service. Organized, coordinated efforts in community service afford student-athletes safe, constructive and manageable opportunities to work within the greater Tampa area in providing services to hospitals, youth organizations and reading programs in local elementary schools. Service learning is an important component of the Academic Enrichment Program.

Personal Development

The personal development component of the program encompasses a wide variety of areas including leadership development and decision making, financial planning and money management, gender violence prevention, personal health, disordered eating and other topic areas requested by student-athletes, coaches or administrators. Focus is also placed on assisting student-athletes with the transition process going from varsity athlete to a career off the field.

USF Academic Facts

◆ In 2006-07, 164 student-athletes compiled a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better. Eight student-athletes earned perfect GPA's of 4.0.

◆ On April 30, 2007, the USF men's cross country and golf teams and the women's golf and softball teams earned public recognition from the NCAA for having a multi-year Academic Progress Rate (APR) among the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports.

◆ Thirteen USF student-athletes have earned the Academic All-America distinction. Chris Heintz (baseball), Tiffany Stewart (softball) and Minna Rasimus (track & field/cross country) have garnered the honor twice in their careers.

◆ Seven USF football players earned 2006 BIG EAST Conference All-Academic Football Team honors. S.J. Green and Marcus Edwards garnered the accolade for the second-straight year, while Colby Erskin, Ryan Gilliam, Mike Padilla, Eric Setser and Anthony Severino earned their first honor.

◆ Men's golfer Justin Fetcho and women's golfer Daniella Ronderos were selected as the 2006-07 BIG EAST/Aeropostale Scholar-Athletes of the Year.

◆ In the 2005-06 academic year, 139 USF student-athletes were named to the BIG EAST Academic All-Star Team.

◆ During USF's tenure in Conference USA, 22 student-athletes were named Scholar Athletes of the Year in their respective sports. In USF's first year (2005-06) in the BIG EAST, student-athletes continued to gain recognition for their outstanding academic achievements as **Hunter West (men's soccer)** and Tiffany Stewart (softball) were named BIG EAST/Aeropostale Scholar Athletes.



Sports Medicine

The health of every student-athlete at the University of South Florida is the primary concern of the USF Sports Medicine Staff, a group that covers every facet of the health care spectrum.

Under the guidance of Assistant Athletic Director and Head Football Athletic Trainer Steve Walz, Associate Athletic Trainer Keith Abrams, and Assistant Athletic Trainers' Donna Jordan and Jen Ross, the USF Sports Medicine staff offers comprehensive health care with special emphasis placed on injury prevention methods. The Sports Medicine staff offers daily service to every student-athlete.



Steve Walz
M.A., ATC/L

Walz has been with USF Sports Medicine in several different capacities since 1992. He returned to USF most recently in 2000 after working as the sports medicine director at Shawnee Mission Medical Center in Kansas City, Kan. Walz was the first-ever football athletic trainer for USF from 1996-98.

Walz oversees all aspects of the sports medicine program while serving as the primary athletic trainer for USF football.

A 1992 graduate from the University of Missouri, Walz also holds a master's degree from USF, which he obtained in 1994 when he was the men's basketball athletic trainer for two seasons. Following the 1993-94 basketball season, he accepted a position with the Florida Orthopedic Institute, where USF student-athletes received care and underwent injury rehabilitation. During his stint at FOI, Walz also served as head athletic trainer for the Tampa Bay Storm of the Arena Football League during their 1996 World Championship season.

Walz was a two-time elected official for the Athletic Trainers Association of Florida Executive Board as the West Coast Representative and currently serves as the secretary/treasurer for the BIG EAST Sports Medicine Society. Walz was honored as the Outstanding USF Staff Member in 2005 and the Athletic Trainer of the Year for the State of Florida for 2006. He also serves as an adjunct professor in the Athletic Training Education program, having taught a variety of courses.

Walz and his wife, Shelley, have a five-year-old son, Henry.



Andrew Sufficool
BS, ATC/LAT

Andrew Sufficool begins his first season with the USF sports medicine department as a graduate assistant, serving as the athletic trainer for the men's soccer team. Sufficool completed his undergraduate work at Catawba College in Salisbury, N.C., and worked at Appalachian State University in Boone, N.C., assisting the men's soccer and baseball teams. Sufficool is currently pursuing his master's degree in exercise science at USF.

The Sports Medicine Staff is comprised of eight graduate assistant certified athletic trainers who complement Walz, Abrams, Ross, and Jordan.

The USF Sports Medicine Department is privileged to be affiliated with the very best physicians in the Tampa Bay area. USF student-athletes benefit from the close proximity, both in relationship and geography, with USF Health. Drs. David Leffers and Eric Coris serve as the primary team physicians and are assisted by Larry Collins and Dave Kotun, physician assistants. Seth Gasser, Adam Morse, Scott Welsh, John Small and Jeff Stone also serve as orthopedic team physicians. Michelle Pescascio and Arnold Ramirez serve as family practice team physicians.



The University of South Florida Sports Medicine Department is housed in both the Sun Dome and in the brand new Intercollegiate Athletic Facility. This new facility of over 5,200 square feet is equipped with the latest tools and technology. The department also works closely with the USF Athletic Training Education Program and provides clinical experiences for athletic training students.

Strength & Conditioning

It is the mission of the USF strength and conditioning program to maximize the genetic potential in every component of athleticism and decrease the potential for injury in a manner that is safe and intense for each student-athlete.

In this regard, yearlong strength and conditioning programs at USF are designed specific to each student-athlete. Each program is tailored to be sport and position-specific by assessing the muscular and metabolic demands of the respective sport. Programs are evaluated and monitored continuously and adjusted as necessary to reach optimal gains.

With the new intercollegiate athletic facility that opened in June of 2004, USF's student-athletes have a state-of-the-art, 10,900 square-foot strength room to meet its conditioning needs. The spacious facility has been designed to provide student-athletes with everything it needs to succeed, including Mondo Sport impact flooring, Power Lift combo racks, Iron Grip custom urethane plates and dumbbells, Useaka bumper plates and bars, cardio equipment, mirrors and a state-of-the-art stereo system.



Ronnie McKeefery
Strength & Conditioning Coach

Specific to football, each player is trained to maximize on-field performance. Strength and power training, speed development, lateral speed and agility, anaerobic conditioning and flexibility are all considered when designing a player's program. The strength and conditioning staff also strives to educate the student-athletes on nutrition, dietary supplements and related issues.

The strength and conditioning program is administered by USF Associate Director of Athletics Barry Clements and operated day-to-day by Assistant Athletic Director Ron McKeefery, who manages a staff of four additional strength coaches. Together they are responsible for designing and implementing strength and conditioning programs for the student-athletes.



McKeefery is in his eighth season at USF. A former all-conference defensive back at Ottawa University in Ottawa, Kan., he earned bachelor's degrees in biology and physical education in 1997, while also being named a two-time Academic All-American. In addition, he earned his master's degree in adult education from the University of South Florida in 2004.

After one year as coach at Ottawa, he made the switch to strength and conditioning, working first as an intern with the Kansas City Royals. He then worked as a part-time assistant for two years with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers before becoming the head strength coach for the Berlin Thunder in NFL Europe.



Jeremy Powers
Graduate Assistant

McKeefery joined the USF program prior to the 2000 football season. He is certified by both the National Strength & Conditioning Association (NSCA) and the Collegiate Strength & Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCA).

Jeremy Powers is beginning his first year as a Graduate Assistant at USF after graduating cum laude with a bachelor's degree in exercise science from Florida State in Spring 2006. While at

Florida State, Jeremy spent a year and a half as a student assistant with the Strength and Conditioning department, working mainly with football, volleyball, and golf. He also spent five semesters as a certified personal trainer in the fitness department of Campus Recreation. In addition to working with both men's and women's soccer as well as football, Jeremy will be assisting Dr. Marcus Kilpatrick in conducting research and exercise testing for the Department of Exercise Science. Jeremy recently took the Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) exam through the NSCA and plans to seek certification with United States Weightlifting in the future.



In The Community

The student-athlete experience at the University of South Florida is enhanced by the involvement of Bulls from every sport in activities that support and aid the Tampa Bay community and its residents. In addition to their studies, practices and games, the USF men's soccer team takes great pride in making an impact in the lives of the young and old alike.

The men's soccer team joins with athletic department staff and student-athletes from throughout USF's 18-sport athletic program to form a solid base in the Tampa Bay community.

Since 1998-99, the "USF Student-Athlete Speakers Bureau" has seen student-athletes visit local recreation centers and speak to youth about the importance of staying in school and how that, plus athletics, has personally aided USF student-athletes in their quests to receive an education.

Last season, the men's soccer program participated in "Paint Your Heart Out" where staff and student-athletes are split into two groups to spruce up a selected home when the owner is not able to do so. The first group prepares the home for painting, while the second handles the painting duties.

A select group of international student-athletes - which included members of the men's soccer program - took time out of their busy schedule to take part in the "Neighbors from Around the World Conference". The USF athletes spoke to local area elementary school children about their respective countries, similarities and differences to the United States.

Another popular event in the community for athletes at USF is participation in the annual Great American Teach-In. Held each year, members of the USF community spend time in local area schools to speak to students and teach them about their respective sports and the positive affects teamwork and sportsmanship have on their every day lives.

USF's female student-athletes are also involved in the "National Girls and Women in Sports Day" when they visit local schools and speak to female students about the impact athletics has had on their lives and the opportunities — like college scholarships — athletics can provide, provided the students stay in and do well in school.

USF student-athletes are also popular visitors to those students who participated in the Hillsborough County Parks and Recreation Center "Reading Incentive Program." In conjunction with Hillsborough County Schools, Bull student-athletes have breakfast with those students who have reached reading goals.

Children at the Shriner's Hospital, located on the USF campus, also look forward to visits from USF student-athletes. Unlike most Shriner's Hospital's (most of which are burn units), the one located on the campus of the University of South Florida is a pediatric bone and growth unit. The patients there have had or will have surgery on bones that are severely damaged. It is a special treat not only for the kids at the hospital but also for the USF student athletes as well. USF has made a tradition of visiting with the kids at the Shriner's Hospital for the last 11 years. Not only do they carve pumpkins with them, they participate in a Christmas door decorating contest and weekly visits to play interactive games with the patients. This is a long-lasting relationship, which remains a staple with USF athletes.

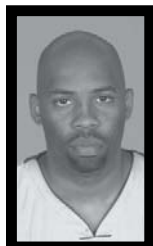

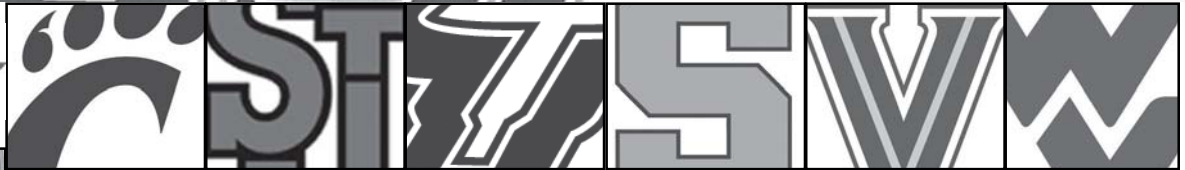

In 2007-08, the BIG EAST will be in its third academic year as a 16-member conference. While many outside the league were curious and sometimes skeptical of the long-term prospects of the largest Division I-A conference, the student-athletes concentrated on their tasks at hand and continued the league's proud tradition of success.

BIG EAST teams earned plenty of recognition at the highest levels in 2006-07. In basketball, the Georgetown men's team and the Rutgers women's team each advanced to their respective Final Fours with Rutgers playing in the national championship game.

The 2006 football season was the BIG EAST's best ever. Louisville, West Virginia and Rutgers all finished in the top 12 in the final national polls. The BIG EAST posted a 5-0 bowl record and won the ESPN Bowl Challenge Cup.

On the diamond, the Louisville

baseball team played its way to the College World Series. In softball, DePaul also participated in the College World Series. The Notre Dame women's soccer team advanced to the NCAA title game and the Connecticut field hockey team made it to the Final Four.

The BIG EAST took the men's and women's M.A.C. Hermann Trophy, the top individual award in soccer. The winners were Joseph Lapira and Kerri Hanks, both of Notre Dame.

The goals of the BIG EAST have never changed. The league aims and expects to compete at the highest level and does so with integrity and sportsmanship.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A group in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets will contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 124 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 350 student-athletes have earned academic all-America honors. Last year in football, Brian Leonard of Rutgers won the Draddy Award, known as the academic Heisman. In addition, Rhema Fuller of Con-

necticut and Jay Henry of West Virginia were named national scholar-athlete award winners by the National Football Foundation.

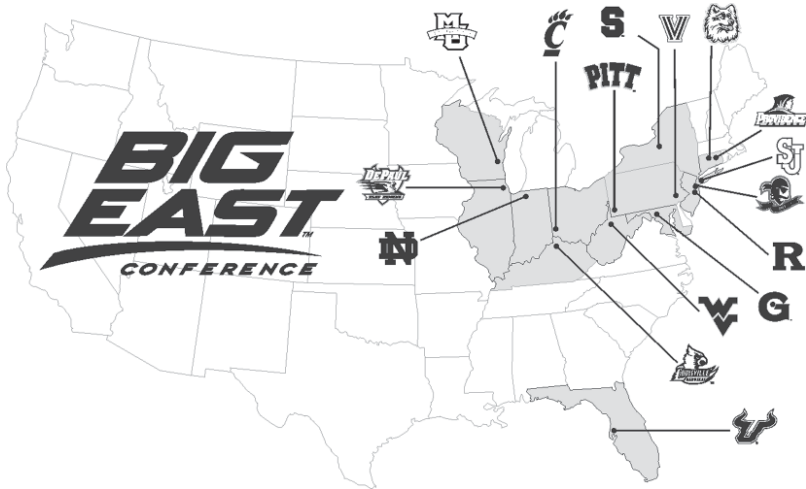
Louisville field hockey standout Jessica Javelet, the 2006 BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year, was named first team academic all-America. The Louisville team, which earned a berth in the NCAA Championship, was recognized by the National Field Hockey Coaches Association for the highest team GPA in the nation for a second straight year.

The BIG EAST has continued its basketball success in the 21st century. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women took home the NCAA crowns. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last nine NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken five of the last eight NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The first women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.



While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed longstanding relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant in soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 550 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned all America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last five summer Olympiads.

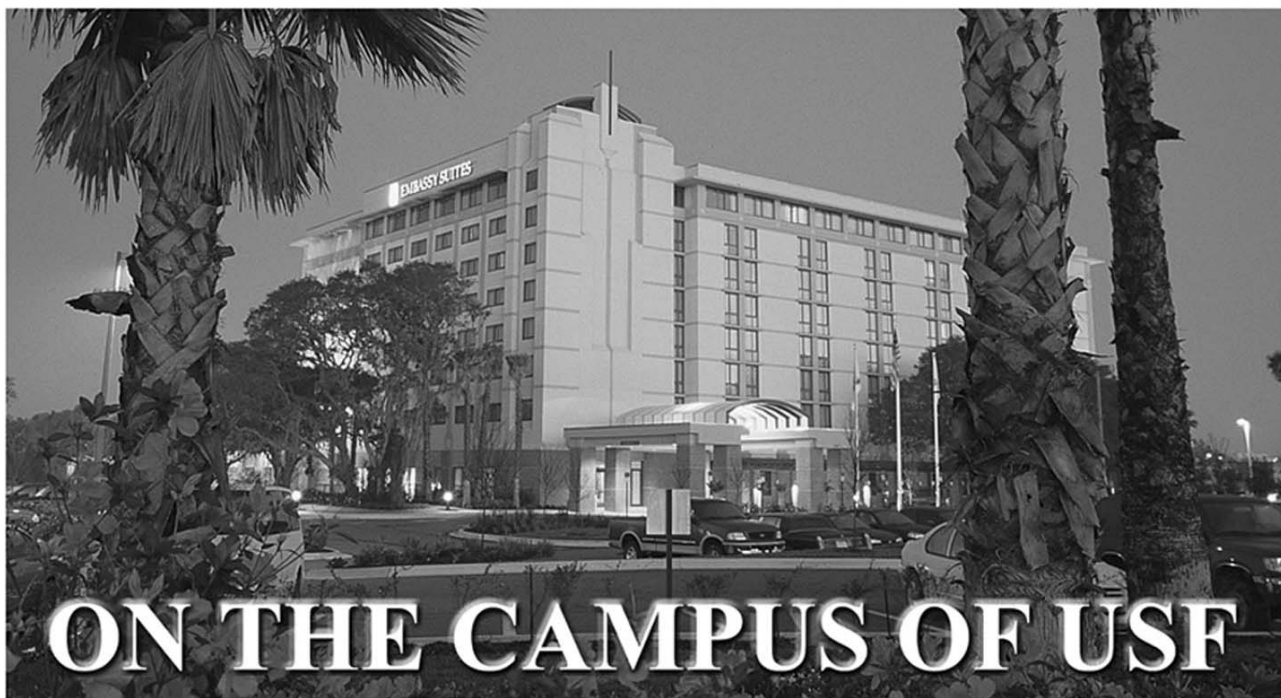
The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes in 23 sports.

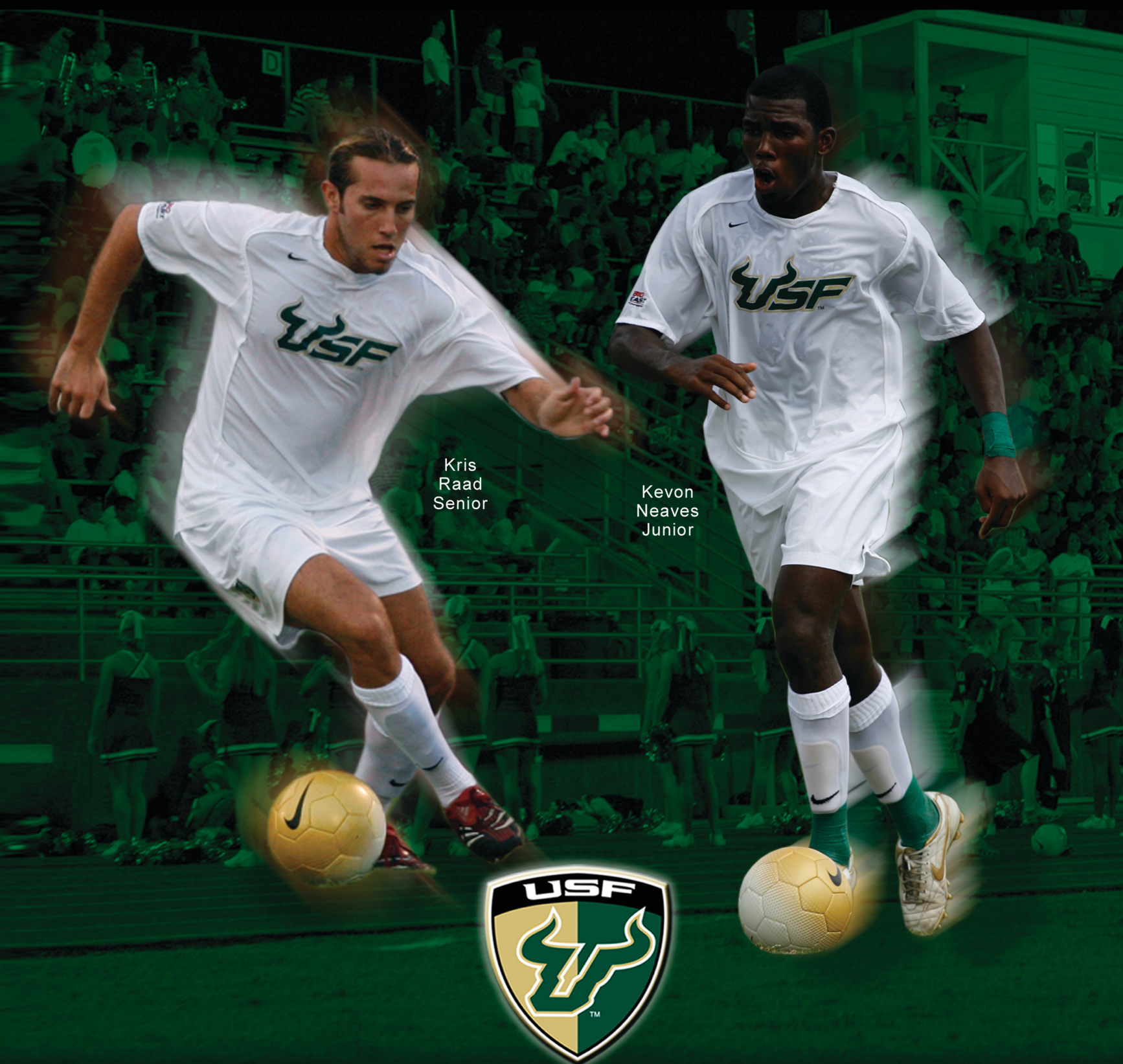
