USF HITS THE ROAD FOR CRUCIAL BATTLE AGAINST UCONN

The University of South Florida football team (6-3, 4-1 BIG EAST) looks to extend its three-game winning streak to a season-high four games this weekend in a crucial BIG EAST match up against Connecticut Saturday at 3:30 p.m.The game can be seen live on ABC as part of the network's regional coverage and can be seen locally in the Tampa Bay area on ABC 28 WFTS-TV ... Dr. Jerry Punch will handle the play-by-play while Terry Bowden will be the color analyst ... A win would mark the longest winning streak since the Bulls won seven consecutive games to end the 2002 season ... After playing three of its first four games at home, this week's game is the fifth road game that USF has played in its last six outings ... Saturday's game was supposed to be the final regular season game for USF, however, Hurricane Wilma forced the Bulls' Oct. 22 contest with West Virginia to be postponed to Dec. 3, in essence creating the unexpected four-game road stretch in the middle of the year ... USF is coming off one of the significant milestone games in the program's history ... The Bulls became Bowl-eligible for the third time ever in the program's short nine-year history ... They also did it in 2001 (as an independent) and 2002 ... They were not chosen either year ... USF defeated Cincinnati, 31-16, giving USF its sixth win of the season ... The victory assured the Bulls their seventh winning season in nine years of football ... Andre Hall started out slow, posting just 23 yards on 15 carries in the first half against the Bearcats, however finished the game with 100 yards on 29 carries and one touchdown ... Hall continues to lead the Bulls in both rushing and receiving, averaging 120.9 yards per game on the ground and 28.6 per outing through the air ... UConn enters this weekend's game following a much needed bye week ... The Huskies come into the contest having lost four straight after starting the season with a 4-1 record ... UConn is 4-1 at home overall, but 1-1 at home in BIG EAST play.

THE SERIES VS. THE HUSKIES

• Today marks the third-ever meeting between USF and Connecticut, with the Bulls holding a 2-0 advantage ... USF won the first meeting in 2000 by a 21-13 score in Storrs and then won again the following year (2001) by a 40-21 margin in Raymond James Stadium ... This weekend marks the first time the two teams have met at Rentschler Field.

• In the last meeting, USF quarterback Marquel Blackwell accounted for five touchdowns in the 40-21 Bulls' win ... A junior at the time, Blackwell ran for three scores and passed for two more. Chris Daley led the defense with three sacks.

• In the first-ever meeting, a brutal wind that made 49-degree temperature feel much chillier, forced both teams to play field position ... Connecticut managed a first quarter field goal for a 3-0 lead, while USF scored on a Blackwell run in the second quarter to take a 7-3 lead into half-time ... UConn entered the fourth quarter with a 13-7 advantage ... USF regained the win at its back in the fourth quarter and Blackwell led two scoring drives for the 21-13 win ... It marked

A LOOK AT UCONN

- Although Connecticut has been playing football since 1896 and USF started in 1997, the two teams share a similar I-A history ... UConn started playing I-A in 2000, while the Bulls started a year later.
- UConn comes into today's game following a bye week ... The Huskies last game was a 24-0 loss November 12 at Pittsburgh.
- Although UConn is 4-5 overall and 1-4 in BIG EAST play, the Huskies have plenty of motivation ... With a win over USF and a win next week against Louisville, UConn would become bowl eligible.
- UConn raced to a 4-1 start this season with a lone loss to Georgia Tech ... But after injuries to each of the top two quarterbacks, the Huskies then lost four straight ... UConn does have the original starting quarterback - Matt Bonislawski - back in the lineup.
- During the 4-1 start to the season, the UConn defense ranked number one in the nation ... The team still ranks a very respectable eighth in the nation, allowing just 284.33 yards per game. Comparatively, USF ranks 20th, allowing 312 yards per game.

THE BIG CHILL

- With temperatures in the Hartford area forecasted to be, at the high, in the low 40's, it will be a pretty chilly experience for the boys from the "Sunshine State" ... Ironically though, USF is 2-0 when the gametime temperature is below 50 degrees, including a 21-13 win at UConn on Oct. 28, 2000, when the temperature was 49 ... The Bulls also won at Memphis, 21-16 in 2003, when gametime temperature was 46 degrees.

DEJA VU ALL OVER AGAIN

- With the postponement of USF's Oct. 22 game with West Virginia, it marks the second-straight year that USF had a game postponed due to a hurricane ... Last year the Bulls' Sept. 6 Labor Day tilt against Pittsburgh was rescheduled to Dec. 4 due to Hurricane Frances ... The Panthers would come into Raymond James Stadium and hand USF a decisive 43-14 loss and lock up an invitation to the Fiesta Bowl ... This year the Bulls will face the Mountaineers on Dec. 3 at Ray Jay.

DEJA VU ALL OVER AGAIN ... AND AGAIN

- For the third time this season, the USF football team has swept the BIG EAST Player of the Week Awards after its 31-16 win over Cincinnati last weekend ... Andre Hall is the offensive player of the week for a third straight time, while Tim Jones has been named defensive player of the week, and Jackie Chambers is the special team's player of the week.
- Hall had 100 yards rushing and one touchdown against Cincinnati, while also picking up two receptions for 22 yards ... He also won the offensive player of the week for his efforts at Rutgers Nov. 5, and he shared the honor with Louisville quarterback Brian Brohm one week later for his

A USF WIN WOULD ...

- Extend the Bulls' winning streak to a season-high four games and also mark the longest streak since USF closed out the 2002 campaign with seven-straight victories.
- Improve the Bulls' road winning streak to three straight wins.
- Make the Dec. 3 game against No. 12/12 West Virginia at Raymond James Stadium be for the BIG EAST Championship and the league's invitation to the Bowl Championship Series.
- Give the Bulls its fourth seven-win season in five years of NCAA I-A competition ... In addition, it would mark USF's seventh, seven-win season in the school's nine-year football history.
- Raise USF's record in day games to 14-12 ... The Bulls have played five afternoon games this season against Penn State (23-13 loss) on Sept. 3 at 3:30 p.m., at Pittsburgh (31-17 loss) at 2 p.m. on Oct. 15, at Rutgers (45-31 win) on Nov. 5 at noon, at Syracuse (27-0) on Nov. 12 at 1:30 p.m. and at home against Cincinnati (31-16 win) on Nov. 19 at noon.
- Keep USF in sole possession of second place in the BIG EAST Conference.
- Raise the Bulls' all-time record in the month of November to 23-7 and 15-3 in November since going I-A.
- Improve USF's record to 3-0 over UConn and 2-0 against the Huskies at home.

A USF LOSS WOULD ...

- End the Bulls' three-game winning streak, equaling the longest of the season ... It would also end USF's road winning streak at two games.

►USF FOOTBALL FEATURED ON ABC'S GOOD MORNING AMERICA

The USF football program was featured on ABC's Good Morning America on Monday, August 15 regarding cutting-edge medical research for heat-related illnesses.

Doctors at the USF are studying new technology that will help prevent heat illness in athletes. This research allows doctors to administer an electronic pill the size of a multivitamin to athletes prior to training in hot weather. The pill monitors the body temperature from the inside of the athlete.

Thanks to a \$20,000 grant from the National Football League, Dr. Eric Coris, Director of the USF Sports Medicine Institute conducted tests on USF Bulls football players on August 12, 2005, during their first practice of the season in full pads.

"At USF, the pills are going to the offensive and defensive line, because those players tend to be larger and more at risk for heat illness," Coris said.

Players swallow the silicone coated pills two to three hours before practice. Inside each silicone-coated pill is a crystal temperature sensor, battery and electronic transmitter. The crystal vibrates in response to the temperature surrounding it, producing an accurate reading once the pill travels into the intestines. The pill transmits a low-frequency magnetic signal to an external data recorder held outside the body.

On the sidelines Dr. Coris can study the data through computer readings. If a player's body temperature is too hot, an alarm goes off to alert the trainer. This data can be used to prevent potentially life-threatening heat illness in athletes.

Dr. Coris also has applied for a federal grant to use the electronic pill on other athletes in a laboratory, where heat and humidity can be carefully controlled, to look for the earliest signs of heat illness.

The pills are made by HQ Inc., a Palmetto company that licenses the technology from Johns Hopkins University. Johns Hopkins developed the pills in the 1980s with a grant from NASA.

Athletes in the Bay Area who practice and train outdoors wearing heavy pads and helmets in scorching temperatures are most likely to suffer from heat-related illness. The issue of heat-related illness came to the forefront in 2001 when both University of Florida fullback Eraste Autin and NFL offensive tackle Corey Stringer of the Minnesota Vikings died from heat stroke.

USF players taking part in the testing in August were: offensive linemen John Miller, Frank Davis, Jerome Springfield, Chris Carothers, Walter Walker and Marc Dile, and defensive linemen Jon Simmons, Terrence Royal, Richard Clebert and Tim Jones.

• USF's first loss to Uconn in three meetings.

• Drop USF's record in day games to 11-13 all-time.

LAST TIME OUT

• USF became Bowl eligible for the third time in school history with its 31-16 win over Cincinnati Last Saturday ... The win also improved the Bulls home record this year to 4-0.

• With USF leading from wire-to-wire against the Bearcats - and with Virginia losing to Virginia Tech, and top ranked USC falling behind to Fresno State early in its game - the Bulls are now the only school in America to not trail at any point this season at home.

• Andre Hall started slowly, rushing for just 23 yards in the first half, however the standout running back finished the day with 100 yards on 29 carries and one touchdown ... He also had two receptions for 22 yards in the win.

• As a team, the Bulls rushed for 356 yards, just 21 shy of their season high of 377 yards against Florida A&M on Sept. 10.

• The touchdown scored by Cincinnati with 1:13 left in the first half was only the second touchdown allowed at home by USF during the first half this season.

DROPPING A 30 SPOT

• Last Saturday's game against Cincinnati marked the Bulls fourth-straight home game scoring 30 points or more ... USF, who is averaging 36 points per game at Ray Jay this season, tallied 37 against Florida A&M (37-3) on Sept. 10, 31 against UCF (31-14) on Sept. 17, 45 against No. 9/8 Louisville (45-14) on Sept. 22, and 31 last weekend against Cincinnati (31-16).

• In USF's six wins this season, the Bulls have tallied 30 or more points in five of the six.

USF MAKING ITS POINT

• USF has been pretty impressive offensively in BIG EAST Conference game this year ... Entering this weekend's game at Connecticut the Bulls are averaging 37 points per game in their four league wins over Louisville, Rutgers, Syracuse, and Cincinnati ... In addition, USF's average margin of victory has been 21.7 points per game.

INSTANT REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

The BIG EAST's instant replay system is designed to allow for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected during all Conference games. Replay may be available during home non-conference match-ups with prior approval by the visiting team.

THE STANDARD

There must be indisputable video evidence for an officiating call to be changed by a Replay Official working from the press box. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are corrected.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video will come directly from the television network broadcasting the game (ABC Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, ESPN Plus Television, etc.) and/or from four in-house video cameras. The review process will be limited to what is shown on television.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

The following plays are subject to review under BIG EAST instant replay:

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone and End Lone:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at side line, goal line end zone, and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
2. Passing plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/incomplete/intercepted in the field of play
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble
 - e. Illegal forward pass beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other detectable infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down
 - b. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - c. Touching of a kick
 - d. Number of players on field.

THE PROCESS

The BIG EAST Conference Instant Replay System is not the NFL Model. A review can only be triggered by the Replay Official in the press box. When deciding when a play needs to be reviewed, the Replay Officials will have available to them the video coming directly from the television network broadcasting the game and/or from four in-house video cameras. Unlike the NFL, there is no limit to the number of plays that can be reviewed and time-outs are not charged to teams based on the outcome of the reviews. In addition, the status of the game clock can also be reviewed.

• After starting the 2005 season with three of its first four games at home, USF hit the road to play five of the final seven games away from Raymond James Stadium ... This weekend's contest against the Huskies marks the fifth regular-season road contest during that stretch.

• The Bulls were not expecting a four-game road swing right in the middle of the season ... The Bulls were to face West Virginia on Oct. 22 and then enjoy a bye week on Oct. 29 ... Instead, Hurricane Wilma forced USF to have its game postponed and rescheduled until Dec. 3, taking the one home game in five games and moving it to the last game of the year.

BIG "D" IS HITTING IT'S STRIDE

• USF's defense has caused quite a few problems the last three weeks - against Rutgers on Nov. 5 Syracuse on Nov. 12, and Cincinnati last weekend ... During that two-game stretch, the Bulls have recorded seven interceptions, nine sacks (for negative 31 yards), broke up seven passes, and recovered three fumbles.

• The Bulls "D" forced the Scarlet Knights into the most turnovers committed all season - six (four interceptions and two fumbles) which led to 14 or the Bulls' 45 points ... Johnnie Jones intercepted a Rutgers pass and returned in 32 yards for a TD, and then on the next Scarlet Knight series, Terrence Royal picked up a fumble - forced by Richard Clebert - and ran it back 11 yards for a TD.

• It was the 16th time in USF history that an interception was returned for a touchdown ... At 32 yards, it tied for the ninth-longest interception return for a TD ... The last time USF returned an interception for a TD was by Sidney Simpson Nov. 13, 2004 against East Carolina.

• In addition, the last time USF returned a fumble for a TD was Nov. 29, 2003 at Memphis (J.R. Reed - 45 yards).

• The last time the USF defense had two scores in one game was Sept. 7, 2002, vs. Northern Illinois when the Bulls had a safety and Ron Hemingway returned an interception 27 yards for a TD.

• Against Syracuse, USF had four sacks (for negative 23 yards), and intercepted three passes - returning them for a total of 15 yards ... In addition to the four sacks, the Bulls also had 13 tackles for a loss for a total of a negative 43 yards in the win.

SACKS 'N TURNOVERS

• Sacks and turnovers - as in not allowing either on offense - has been instrumental in USF's six wins this season ... In six victories over Cincinnati, Syracuse, Rutgers, Louisville, UCF and Florida A&M, USF has committed a combined six turnovers and allowed just six sacks ... In contrast, in the three losses to Pittsburgh, Miami and Penn State, the Bulls have committed a total of 10 turnovers and allowed nine sacks.

MORE SACK STUFF

• Against Louisville, Rutgers and Syracuse, USF faced six of the top nine sack leaders in the BIG EAST Conference and none of the six players had a single sack against the Bulls ... Against Louisville, the Bulls held Elvis Dumervil, who leads the nation with 20 sacks, to none ... Rutgers had three of the league's top sackers - Val Barnaby (8.5), Ryan Neill (8.0) and Ramel Meekins (5.5) - and yet none of them had a sack in USF's 45-31 win three weeks ago ... Then at Syracuse, USF held Ryan LaCasse (7.0) sackless.

• By the way, the other three players among the BIG EAST's top nine sack leaders are all from USF ... Stephen Nicholas leads the Bulls with six sacks, and Jason Allen and Terrence Royal each have five ... USF has sacked opposing quarterbacks 27 times this season.

LET'S TALK TURKEY

• USF comes into this week's game with a 22-7 (.759) all-time record in games during the month of November ... After the Bulls 31-16 win over Cincinnati last weekend, USF is 14-3 (.812) in the month of November since 2001.

HALL EARNS THIRD STRAIGHT BIG EAST AWARD

• USF running back Andre Hall earned his third-straight BIG EAST Player of the Week honor after his performance against Cincinnati last weekend ... Hall rushed for 100 yards on 29 carries and

scored one touchdown ... In addition, Hall also had two receptions for 22 yards ... He also won the offensive player of the week for his efforts at Rutgers Nov. 5, and he shared the honor with Louisville quarterback Brian Brohm one week later for his efforts at Syracuse.

HE COULD GO HALL THE WAY

• Although he has just played just 20 games for the Bulls and is in his final year, Hall has established himself as one of the best running backs in the program's history ... The former junior college All-American comes into this week's game as the school's career leader in yards rushing ... He surpassed Rafael Williams (1997-00) who held the top spot, since his graduation in 2000, against Syracuse on Nov. 12 ... Hall enters Saturday's game with 2,445 career yards on just 420 carries (5.8 ypc) ... The following are USF's career rushing leaders:

• Hall moved up the I-A charts for rushing yards per game with his 222 yards against Syracuse on Nov. 12 ... The standout entered the game with the Orange 23rd in the nation averaging 109.4 yards per game ... His "monster" outing against SU steamrolled him up the list to fourth in the nation, averaging 123.5 yards per contest ... His 100 yards brought him back in the pack a little, but he is still among the nation's elite ranking sixth entering this week's game ... • Hall surpassed the 2,000-career yard plateau on the first play of USF's second series, against Rutgers, with a 14-yard scamper ... He became the third player to reach the 1,500 mark earlier this season with 156 yards against Florida A&M on Sept. 10.

• With his 1,088 rushing yards this year, coming into Saturday's game with Connecticut, Hall is the first player in school history to rush for better than 1,000 yards in more than one season ... He recorded 1,357 yards on the ground last year.

• Hall's 100 yards against the Bearcats last weekend marked the fifth time this season - including the third consecutive game - and the 11th time in his career that he eclipsed the 100-yard plateau ... Hall is already the school's career leader in 100-yard games, and surpassed Dyrall McMillian for the most 200-yard games establishing a new mark with three.

• With 110 rushing yards in the first half against Syracuse on Nov. 12, it was the third time this season he went over 100 yards in the first half alone ... He had 140 yards in the first half against Florida A&M on Sept. 10 and 121 yards prior to the intermission against Rutgers on Nov. 5..

• With his 222 yards rushing against Syracuse, Hall has rushed for better than 150 yards in eight of his last 16 outings dating back to last year ... Hall has run for 150 or more yards in back-to-back games twice this year against Florida A&M (156) and UCF (155), and most

- Hall became USF's all-time leader in career touchdowns against Rutgers on Nov. 5, and more impressively doing so in just 18 collegiate games ... He comes into this weekend's game, after finding the endzone once against Cincinnati, with 27 career touchdowns.

- Hall tied a seven-year old USF record, last year, for touchdowns in a single season ... He crossed the goal line 12 times equaling Otis Dixon's mark set in 1998 ... Last week against the Bearcats, Hall's touchdown raised his season total to 15 improving on his own mark.

- Hall set a new single season record for rushing touchdowns when he ran for one against Cincinnati last week ... That raised his total to 13 touchdowns on the ground which is also a new single season school record.

- Hall also comes into Saturday's game with 24 career rushing touchdowns, first all-time at USF, surpassing Marquel Blackwell (1999-02) who held the old record with 20.

- Hall became the first USF player to have 100 yards receiving in a game this season, and the first since Johnny Peyton did so at UAB, Nov. 3, 2004, when he hauled in seven catches for 131 yards against Pittsburgh on Oct. 15 ... He is the first-ever running back to have 100 yards receiving in a game for USF ... He is the 11th different player to do it in USF's nine seasons of football (nine players have combined for 18 100-yard games) ... Hall's 131 yards is the sixth highest single-game receiving total in USF history.

- Hall continues to also lead the team in receiving, averaging 28.6 yards per game and 12.2 yards per reception ... He has caught 21 passes on the year for 257 yards and two touchdowns ... He is the first player in school history to lead the team in both rushing and receiving.

- Hall had a career day as a receiver recording 131 yards on seven receptions and one TD against Pittsburgh on Oct. 15.

- One of Hall's seven receptions, against Pitt, was a 76-yard bomb from Pat Julmiste ... The connection was the longest play from scrimmage this season and the second longest play of the year for the Bulls behind Chad Simpson's 94-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against Louisville on Sept. 24 ... In addition, it was the third longest pass play in school history behind a 95-yard pass from Marquel Blackwell to DeAndrew Rubin against Northern Illinois on Sept. 7, 2002 and a 77-yard TD reception to Johnny Peyton from Julmiste against UAB on Nov. 3, 2004.

- Andre Hall currently leads the BIG EAST in rushing yards averaging 120.9 per contest ... In addition, he is sixth in I-A, and one of just two BIG EAST players - along with Michael Bush (116.0) of Louisville who is 13th - who are in the top 15 nationally.

- Hall enters Saturday's game tops in the conference in all-purpose yards averaging 149.4 yards per contest and 18th in the nation among all I-A players.

- Hall comes into this weekend's game second in the BIG EAST in total touchdowns this year with 15 ... He trails Louisville's Michael Bush who has 21 ... Entering this season, Hall was tied for the most touchdowns (12) of any returning player in the BIG EAST.

- Hall's three touchdowns against Syracuse on Nov. 12 was his eighth multiple touchdown contest of his career and the fifth of the season ... Earlier this season, Hall had three consecutive games with two-or-more touchdowns ... He recorded three against FAMU on Sept. 10, and two - one of which was a receiving TD - against UCF on Sept. 17 ... He would follow that up with two scores

in the win over Louisville on Sept. 24.

- His three rushing touchdowns against Syracuse tied a career high and a school record for rushing TD's in a single game for the senior ... Hall also rushed for three touchdowns this year against Florida A&M on Sept. 10.

- Hall started the season slow last year rushing for better than 100 yards just twice in the first six games ... During that stretch he ran for 547 yards (91.2 ypg) ... He then came on strong in the remaining five games recording 810 yards for 162 yards per game ... During the final five outings, Hall set a school record for yards in a game with 275 yards on 29 carries at UAB on Nov. 3, 2004.

HALL NAMED TO WALTER CAMP WATCH LIST

- Andre Hall has been included among the 40 "players to watch" for the prestigious 2005 Walter Camp Football Foundation Player of the Year award, the nation's fourth-oldest individual college football accolade ... In addition he is the first USF player ever named to the list ... Hall is one of just three BIG EAST players from two schools named to the list - along with Pittsburgh's Tyler Palko and (Tampa native) Greg Lee ... He is also one of four players from the state of Florida listed, joining Devin Hester (Miami), Chris Leak (Florida), and Leon Washington (Florida State).

- The watch list will be narrowed to ten semi-finalists in November ... The 2005 Walter Camp Player of the Year recipient, which is voted on by the 119 Division I-A head coaches and sports information directors, will be announced on the ESPN/Home Depot College Football Awards Show in December ... The winner will then receive his trophy at the Foundation's annual national awards banquet on Feb. 11, 2006 at the Yale University Commons in New Haven.

NICHOLAS ENJOYING SOLID SEASON

- Nicholas enters this weekend tied for second on the team in tackles with 57, and paces the team with 36 solo stops ... He is also tied for second on the team in pass break ups with three and has logged two forced fumbles.

- Nicholas is currently third in the BIG EAST and 35th in I-A in tackles for a loss averaging 1.3 per game ... He leads the team with 12 for negative 56 yards.

• Ben Moffitt comes into this week's game leading the Bulls in tackles with 67, including 35 solo, which is tied for second on the team with Patrick St. Louis ... His 67 stops ranks him sixth in the BIG EAST averaging 7.4 tackles per game.

• Moffitt picked up his second (and USF's second) blocked punt of the season on Pittsburgh's second possession leading to USF's first touchdown on Oct. 15 ... Moffitt's first blocked punt came vs. Florida A&M (Sept. 10) ... The block against the Panthers directly led to the Bulls' first touchdown of the game, a one-yard run by Pat Julmiste with 8:49 left in the first quarter ... Moffitt would finish the game with four tackles and one tackle for a loss (negative two yards) in the loss to Pitt.

• Moffitt turned in a season high 14 tackles, in addition to two tackles for a loss (negative 13 yards), one fumble recovery, a pass breakup, and a sack, in USF's win over Louisville.

• Moffitt had a huge outing against Miami with a game high 12 tackles, and a game-best eight solo ... He also had one forced fumble and a pass break up.

MOFFITT ADDED BRONKO NAGURSKI WATCH LIST

• For his efforts, so far this season, Ben Moffitt has been added to the Watch List for the 2005 Bronko Nagurski Trophy, which will be presented to the best defensive player in college football on Dec. 5 by the Football Writers Association of America and the Charlotte Touchdown Club ... The presentation will take place at the Westin Hotel in Charlotte, N.C.

PEYTON CONTINUES TO BE A KEY TARGET

• Johnny Peyton continues to be one of the quiet leaders on the receiving corps ... Peyton is third on the team in total catches with 16, and yards with 172 ... He is averaging 19.1 yards per game and 10.8 yards per reception ... In addition, his three touchdowns leads all Bull receivers.

• Peyton recorded his personal single-season high for touchdowns when he caught a 14-yard pass from Pat Julmiste in the fourth quarter against Miami on Oct. 1 ... His score against the Hurricanes helped him to surpass his mark set last year of two touchdowns ... Peyton would finish the game with three receptions and 29 yards.

• Peyton had a solid outing against Penn State on Sept. 3 ... The sophomore wide receiver equaled his touchdown total from all of last season with two leaping grabs in the end zone against the Nittany Lions ... Peyton pulled in four catches for 39 yards against Penn State ... Last year Peyton didn't score his first TD until Oct. 22 against Louisville, then did it again in the next game, on Nov. 3, against UAB.

A ROYAL FLUSH

• Terrence Royal's 0.56 sacks per game average is third on the team and tied for eighth in the BIG EAST Conference ... He is tied nationally for 71st in I-A.

• With his half-a-sack against Rutgers on Nov. 5, Royal now has 5.0 sacks this season, his highest single-season total in his four years at USF.

• Royal had his best game of the season against Rutgers ... He was fourth on the team in tackles with six and had one sack for negative two yards ... In addition, he recovered one fumble and rambled 11 yards for his first career touchdown and gave the Bulls a 21-0 lead.

• Royal's fumble recovery against the Scarlet Knights was the third this season and the fifth of his career ... It was his first career TD ... Royal had his first career interception in the third quarter against Rutgers and returned it 22 yards setting up another USF score..

• The Tampa native had six tackles, a sack (for negative eight yards) and two forced fumbles in the loss to Pittsburgh.

• Royal recorded two of the Bulls four sacks for a negative 14 yards against UCF on Sept. 17 ... He also had four tackles which were all solo's.

• On Sept. 10 against FAMU, Royal recorded four tackles, had one tackle for a loss - for negative five yards - which was a sack ... He also forced one fumble.

• Royal had four tackles against the Nittany Lions on Sept. 3 and shared a sack with Eric Thomas for negative six yards ... He also had one of USF's two fumble recoveries on the afternoon.

JACKIE STARTS TO BUST LOOSE

• Jackie Chambers has turned into a serious threat on special teams for the Bulls ... Against FAMU, on Sept. 10, the sophomore recorded a stellar 108 punt return yards on four attempts for a 27-yard average ... His long against the Rattlers was a career best 41 yards in the second quarter.

• Chambers had another solid day returning punts for the Bulls last weekend against Cincinnati ... Chambers recorded 78 yards on five returns, which includes a long of 35 yards ... Currently, Chambers has 287 yards - on 22 attempts - in punt returns on the year for a 13.0 yards per return average.

• Chambers' 108 return yards against Florida A&M is tied for the 14th best single-game performance in the country this year ... In addition, his 13.0 yards per return is second in the BIG EAST behind West Virginia's Antonio Lewis (19.6 ypr).

• Chambers had another solid return day against Rutgers on Nov. 5, however this time on kickoffs ... The Miami native returned five kickoffs for 89 yards (17.8) with his long being 30 yards.

• Although not USF's main target, Chambers had a huge reception against Rutgers on Nov. 5 during the second quarter which set up an Andre Hall touchdown ... On third-and-18 at the Scarlet Knight 30-yard line, Pat Jumliste connected with Chambers - on Chambers' only reception of the game - on a 28-yard pass play to bring the ball to the RU two-yard line ... Hall would extend the Bulls lead to 28-7 with a two-yard run for a touchdown on the next play.

MANY HAPPY RETURNS

• In addition to Jackie Chambers' punt return performance against Florida A&M, Amarri Jackson and Michael Jenkins also logged 29 and 27 yards respectively ... The trio teamed to establish a new school record for punt return yardage with 209 against the Rattlers ... They surpassed the old mark of 151 set against Utah State on Nov. 24, 2001.

MANY HAPPY RETURNS II

• Chad Simpson sent the USF faithful into a frenzy with a thrilling 94-yard kickoff return for a touchdown to start the second half against Louisville on Sept. 24 ... The return was the first for a TD since J.R. Reed ran one back 96 yards against Memphis on Nov. 29, 2003 ... In addition, it equals the second longest return for a touchdown in school history joining Charlie Jackson who also accomplished the feat against Charleston Southern on Nov. 1, 1997.

• Simpson's 94-yard trip to "The House" is tied for the 20th longest in I-A this year.

BAKER CARRYING ONE BIG BOOT

• Brandon Baker continues to establish himself as one of the top punters in the country ... After struggling against Rutgers, where he averaged just 30.5 yards per punt, Baker regrouped against Syracuse to average 41.4 yards per boot ... He comes into this week's game third in the BIG EAST and 27th in I-A averaging 42.3 yards per punt.

• Baker's 65-yard punt at Miami on Oct. 1 in the third quarter was the sixth 60-plus yard punt of his career.

• USF's first punt against Florida A&M was taken at 5:29 in the third quarter, however it was blocked ... That marked the first time a Bulls - and Baker - punt was blocked since Nov. 16, 2002 vs. Bowling Green, a span of 141 consecutive punts.

• Baker would finish the game against the Rattlers with three punts for 144 yards - an average of 48 yards per punt.

• Baker had a monster outing in the season opener against Penn State ... The senior averaged 45.3 yards per punt on Sept. 3 on eight kicks for 362 yards ... In addition, Baker placed two punts inside the 20 yard line.

• Baker gave the Nittany Lion faithful something to "oooh and ahhhh" about ... His 68-yard punt in the third quarter was the longest of his career and the second longest ever by a USF punter ...

• The Bulls got quite a bit of production from their backfield against UCF on Sept. 17, on the ground, including the quarterback position ... In addition to Andre Hall's 155 yards and one TD, Ricky Ponton recorded 75 yards on 19 carries and one touchdown.

• Pat Julmiste also ran 13 times for 73 yards and one touchdown ... His TD with 3:09 left in the third quarter was his 10th of his career and first of the season ... Julmiste registered nine last season.

DOUBLE "J" WAS DYN-D-MITE

• Safety Johnnie Jones only had four tackles against Rutgers on Nov. 5 and set the bar for the defense during the day ... Jones intercepted a Rutgers pass and returned in 32 yards for his first career touchdown while giving the Bulls a 14-0 lead ... It was just his second interception of his career.

• Jones recorded his second interception of the season, and his second in as many games against Syracuse last weekend ... In addition to his three tackles, including one for a loss, Jones had one pick and returned it for five yards ... His INT marked a single season record for Jones for interceptions in a season (2).

KEEPING UP WITH THE JONES'

• Tim Jones has had a very solid year for the Bulls recording 27 stops on the year, including 16 solo ... He also has six tackles for a loss (for negative 36 yards), which include three sacks (negative 30).

• Jones had one of his best outings en route to BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Week honors ... Against Cincinnati, Jones was tied for third on the team in tackles with six while recording a TFL, a fumble recovery, a pass break-up, and a sack against Cincinnati.

AMARRI LIKES THE FANCY STUFF

• Receiver Amarri Jackson's 22-yard touchdown run was the sophomore's third rushing touchdown of the year ... All three scores were on reverses ... Jackson is second on the team in receiving with 18 catches for 210 yards ... He is averaging 23.3 yards per game and 11.7 yards per reception.

D'JUAN D'WHAT?

• The interception by D'Juan Brown with 8:02 left in the third quarter, against Cincinnati, was the second interception of the season for the senior and third of his career ... It was his first-career interception for a touchdown ... In addition, Saturday was D'Juan's birthday.

DUST IN THE WIND

• USF logged its second straight 300-plus yard rushing game against UCF on Sept. 17, marking the first time in school history that the Bulls have recorded back-to-back 300-yard rushing outings ... USF finished the game with 326 yards on the ground against the Golden Knights ... On Sept. 10, the Bulls tallied 377 yards rushing against Florida A&M setting a new single-game mark.

• USF recorded its third 300-plus yard rushing game this season against Syracuse on Nov. 12 ... The Bulls rumbled for 338 yards on 51 carries ... It was the second highest single-game total this season.

• Through its 97 games of collegiate football, USF has rushed for 300-or-more yards just eight times ... In addition to the three this year, the Bulls ran for 300 yards during the 2004 season against Army (367) on Oct. 16 and at UAB (318) on Nov. 3 ... They also did it against Valparaiso (330) on Sept. 12, 1998, Kentucky Wesleyan (304) on Sept. 6, 1997, and Morehead State (328) on Nov. 21, 1998.

ON THE OTHER HAND

• They say in order to win football games you need to be able to run the ball, well that point couldn't be more evident than with the Bulls ... In USF's six wins this year the Bulls have rushed for 1,724 yards, good enough for an average of 287.3 yards per game ... In their three losses USF has scampered for just 344 yards - an average of 114.7 yards per outing ... The Bulls have rushed

for less than 240 yards just one this year as a team recording 190 against Cincinnati.

"O" LINE LOOKS TO DIG BACK IN

• Through the first four games of the year USF's offensive line had allowed just one sack for a negative four yards, with that coming at the hands of Florida A&M on Sept. 10 ... However, in the past five games the "O" line has allowed 13 sacks for a negative 88 yards, with eight of the 13 coming against Miami (four) on Oct. 1 and Pittsburgh (four) on Oct. 15.

• Andre Hall will be the first one to credit the USF offensive line for his success this season, however, the line has been stellar in pass protection as well ... USF quarterbacks have been sacked just 15 times all season, and in the Bulls' six wins the quarterback has gone down six times ... However two of those were somewhat excusable for the line ... The first came on a called quarterback draw against Florida A&M on Sept. 10 and the second was last week at Syracuse, when Pat Julmiste slipped while scrambling.

• Entering this weekend's game against Connecticut, the Bulls offensive line has pitched a shutout in sacks four times in nine games against Penn State on Sept. 3, UCF on Sept. 17, Louisville on Sept. 24, and Rutgers on Nov. 5.

• USF's offensive line did itself proud on on Sept. 3 while going up against one of the top defenses in the country ... The Bulls' "O" line didn't allow any sacks against a team that recorded 19 last season for negative 120 yards ... All this as Penn State welcomed back one of the top defenses in the country from last year, returning nine starters and 14 players that started at least one game ... The Nittany Lions were the only team in the nation to not allow more than 21 points in a game last season.

• So far this year USF one of only two teams that didn't allow the Nittany Lions to get to the quarterback ... Purdue became the second team on Oct. 29 in a 33-15 loss ... Penn State has reached the quarterback 38 times this year - against Cincinnati (4), Central Michigan (8), Northwestern (1), Minnesota (1), Ohio State (5), Michigan (3), Illinois (4), Wisconsin (9), and Michigan State (1) - for negative 254 yards.

NO DOUGHNUT HERE

• When USF scored its fourth quarter touchdown against Miami on Oct. 1, it extended the Bulls streak of consecutive games without being shut out ... USF has never been shut out in their eight-plus seasons of football entering this weekend's game at Syracuse, a stretch of 97 games.

BULLS LIKE TO WORK OVERTIME

• Entering this season, USF boasts an impressive 5-0 record in overtime games, with four of the five extra-session outings coming in the last two years ... The Bulls' last overtime game was a 45-44, double OT thriller at TCU on Sept. 25, 2004.

• USF is 3-0 at home in overtime games and 2-0 on the road ... The Bulls' last two extra session games have been road contests ... The following are USF's five overtime games:

- USF is 22-9 when the temperature is 80 degrees or higher at kickoff ... USF is 19-2 at home when the temperature is 80 degrees or better ... The Bulls are 17-1 at Raymond James Stadium when it is 80 degrees, losing only to Southern Miss (30-27), Oct. 2, 2004.
- USF is 45-11 all-time at home and 39-8 at Raymond James Stadium ... The Bulls have won 29 of the last 35, 37 of the last 44, and 42 of the last 50 at home ... Hofstra was the first team to defeat the Bulls at Raymond James Stadium, handing USF a 42-23 loss Nov. 13, 1999 ... The only other teams to defeat the Bulls at Raymond James Stadium were Western Kentucky (31-24) on Oct. 17, 1998, TCU (13-10) on Oct. 10, 2003, UAB (22-19) on Nov. 22, 2003, Southern Miss (27-20) on Oct. 2, 2004, Army (42-35) on Oct. 16, 2004, and Memphis (31-15) on Nov. 27, 2004.
- USF is 25-11 all-time following a loss and 22-7 following a loss since losing at Hofstra (50-30) on Oct. 24, 1998.
- USF is 44-9 when it scores first ... The first two losses were to Western Kentucky (31-3) in 1997 and 1998 (31-24) ... The Bulls took a 7-0 lead in the loss at Baylor (28-13) in 2000 when Marquel Blackwell connected with Scott McCready for a 29-yard catch and run ... USF took a 7-0 lead at Northern Illinois in the first week of the 2001 season before falling 20-17 on a field goal as time expired ... USF opened the 2003 season with a 7-0 lead at Alabama but lost 40-17 and led UAB 3-0, Nov. 22, 2003, but fell 22-19 ... This year USF scored on its first possession against Pittsburgh before the dropping the decision to the Panthers.
- USF is 39-7 when leading after the first quarter, 48-5 when leading at the half, and 51-3 when leading after the third quarter ... Pittsburgh was the most recent team to come back and defeat the Bulls outscoring USF 31-7 from the second quarter on - on Oct. 15 - after USF led 10-0 following one quarter ... Army came back in the fourth quarter, on Oct. 16, 2004, rebounding from a 28-14 deficit to defeat the Bulls 42-35 ... Drake (23-22) on Sept. 20, 1997, and Northern Illinois (20-17) on Aug. 30, 2001 in the season opener are the only other two teams to do that against USF.

TALK ABOUT A TOUGH SLATE

- Nobody can accuse the Bulls of facing a cupcake schedule in their inaugural BIG EAST season ... USF faced three schools, in its first six games, that have combined to win a total of 16 national championships ... Penn State, USF's season opening opponent, has won two national titles, Miami has won five, and Pittsburgh has won nine.
- Among USF's 11 opponents in 2005, seven played in Bowl Games, including Louisville (Liberty), Miami (Peach), Pittsburgh (Fiesta), West Virginia (Gator), Syracuse (Champs Sports), Cincinnati (Fort Worth) and Connecticut (Motor City) ... The seven teams on this year's slate that saw action in Bowl Games last season turned in a 4-3 record in those outings.
- Last year, the 11 teams on this years Bulls schedule turned in a 68-60 (.531) record with Louisville (11-1), Miami (Fla.) (9-3), Pittsburgh (8-4), West Virginia (8-4), and Connecticut (8-4) all recording eight or more wins.
- This season USF's non-conference I-A opponents are boasting a 26-6 (.812) combined record ... Through last weekend, Penn State is 1-1, Miami is 8-2, and UCF is 8-3.

USF VS. RANKED OPPONENTS

- Of USF's 11 opponents this season, five are either ranked or receiving votes in the Associated Press or ESPN/USA Today Top 25 polls ... In the AP Top 25, Penn State is ranked No. 4 while Miami (Fla.) drops to No. 10 after its loss ... West Virginia is No. 12 and Louisville is No. 17 ... In the ESPN/USA Today Top 25 poll, the Nittany Lions are No. 4 and Hurricanes No. 10 ... West Virginia is No. 12 and Louisville moved up to No. 18 ... UCF is receiving votes in both polls getting 12 in

the AP and 18 in the ESPN/USA Today.

- The win over No. 9/8 Louisville on Sept. 24 marked the highest ranked opponent that the Bulls' ever defeated ... It was also the first Associated Press Top 25 team that USF has ever beaten.
- Since 2000 (USF moved into I-A in 2001), the Bulls have played eight ranked I-A teams and own a 2-6 record ... Aside from the 45-14 win over Louisville, USF's last win was a 29-7 victory, on Oct. 10, 2003, against No. 25 (ESPN/USA Today) Bowling Green, when the Falcons were coached by Urban Meyer.
- Oklahoma remains the highest-ever ranked opponent USF has faced ... The Sooners were No. 2 in the AP Poll when they defeated USF 31-14 on Sept. 28, 2002 in Norman, Okla.
- USF met nine nationally ranked teams as a I-AA program between 1997-2000 and went 4-5, including a 20-10 win over No. 1 ranked Troy State, Sept. 30, 2000 in Tampa.

DUO EARNS BIG EAST P.O.W. KUDOS IN CLEAN SWEEP WHILE ANOTHER FINISHES THE WEEKEND "WITH HONORS"

- Following USF's 45-14 win over No. 9/8 Louisville, receiver Amarri Jackson and linebacker Ben Moffitt were named the BIG EAST Conference Offensive and Defensive Player of the Week, respectively ... The USF duo is the first to receive the weekly honors ... Jackson ran for two touchdowns and threw for another, all on reverse plays ... He finished the game with two receptions for 75 yards, two carries for 63 yards and the one pass for 11 yards ... Moffitt had 14 tackles, including one sack, along with a forced and recovered fumble in the game.
- Chad Simpson was also named to the BIG EAST Honor Roll for his special teams' performance ... He joins Andre Hall (earned the honor twice), Brandon Baker, and Terrence Royal as other USF players to be recognized this year ... Simpson returned the second-half kickoff 94 yards for a touchdown and a 31-7 USF lead.

ANOTHER BIG EAST CLEAN SWEEP

- For the second time this season, USF has swept the BIG EAST offensive and defensive player of the week awards with running back Andre Hall and defensive end Terrence Royal earning the distinction for their performances in USF's 45-31 win at Rutgers Nov. 5 ... Receiver Amarri Jackson and linebacker Ben Moffitt had won the awards following the Bulls' win over Louisville Sept. 24.
- In the Rutgers game, Hall carried a career-high 35 times for 168 yards and three touchdowns ... He surpassed the 2,000 career yards mark in the game and his three touchdowns made him the all-time leader in total touchdowns at USF with 23 and tied him for the career lead in rushing touchdowns with 20.
- Royal returned a fumble 11 yards for his first career touchdown and also returned an interception 22 yards to set up another USF touchdown ... Royal also had a half sack among his six tackles.

BULLS WIN TEAM HONORS

- With their 45-14 win over Louisville, USF has been named the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl National Team of the Week, as selected by the pollsters of the FWAA's Grantland Rice Super 16 Poll for games of the weekend of Sept. 24 ... The FWAA has named a national team of the week since the 2002 season ... This is the first season that the award has been sponsored by the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.
- The 16 pollsters of the Grantland Rice Super 16 Poll decide the weekly honor ... Each Monday during the 2005 college football season, the FWAA will name the Tostitos Bowl National Team of the Week through Nov. 28.

MOFFITT GATHERS MORE HARDWARE

- Ben Moffitt was named the Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Bulls' 45-14 win over Louisville on Sept. 24 ... Moffitt had 14 tackles, two for loss, one sack, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery in the Bulls' stunning upset over the No. 9/8 Cardinals in their BIG EAST Conference debut ... It was Louisville's lowest scoring output since the 2003 season.

WHO'S UP & WHO'S DOWN

- Six USF assistant coaches control the action on the field from the press box ... The offensive

coaches in the press box include offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Rod Smith, running backs coach Carl Franks, and tight ends coach Greg Gregory ... On the defensive side of the ball in the press box are co-defensive coordinator Wally Burnham, defensive ends coach Rich Rachel, and defensive graduate assistant Steve White ... On the sidelines are head coach Jim Leavitt, co-defensive coordinator Rick Kravitz, defensive line coach Earl Lane, receivers coach Lawrence Dawsey, offensive line coach Greg Frey, and offensive graduate assistant Chad Barnhardt.

SOLID AS A ROCK

• One of the major reasons for USF's success during its first eight years of intercollegiate competition has been the stability of its coaching staff ... Of the Bulls nine full time positional coaches, three - Earl Lane, Rick Kravitz, Greg Frey - have been on the staff since the program started in 1996 ... In addition, two coaches, Wally Burnham and Rick Rachel, have been on the staff since 2000, and one, Rod Smith, since 2001.

USF ADDS SECOND FORMER NFL VETERAN

• With the addition of Steve White to the coaching staff in late July, USF raises the number of former National Football League players working in the program to two, joining former eight-year NFL performer Lawrence Dawsey ... White will work primarily with USF defensive line coach Earl Lane ... White played six seasons with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and one with the New York Jets ... He was selected by the Philadelphia Eagles in the sixth round of the 1996 NFL Draft ... The Eagles attempted to convert him to linebacker but released him prior to the start of the season, when he was immediately signed by Tampa Bay ... The Buccaneers moved him back to the defensive end spot he played at Tennessee, and he went on to play 79 games for the Buccaneers between 1996 and 2001 ... After six seasons with the Buccaneers, White signed with the Jets as an unrestricted free agent ... He spent the 2001 season with the Jets and finished his seven-year career with 99 tackles and 11.5 sacks in 94 games played ... White, 31, is a native of Memphis and played 40 games with 21 starts at Tennessee from 1992-95.

LORDS OF THE RING

• When Lawrence Dawsey and Carl Franks joined the USF coaching staff last season, it doubled the number of coaches on the staff who have a national championship ring ... Co-defensive coordinator Wally Burnham and offensive line coach Greg Frey each picked up a ring in 1993 at Florida State, when Burnham was linebacker coach and Frey was an offensive lineman on the team ... In 1996, Franks was the assistant offensive coordinator and running backs coach at Florida when the Gators won the national title ... Dawsey, who was an All-American at Florida State prior to their 1993 National Championship, picked up a ring as a graduate assistant coach at LSU last season.

PACKIN' EM IN

• USF has established a record crowd in three of its first four games this year ... Following the 99, 235 that saw USF play at Penn State, the most people to ever see a USF game, the Bulls set a new Raymond James Stadium record with 43,122 against Florida A&M on Sept. 10 ... USF would turn right around and break that figure as 45,139 saw the Bulls take on UCF on Sept. 17.

• The Sept. 3 match up at Penn State set a new road attendance record for USF, surpassing the most people that the Bulls have ever played in front of, 78,900 at South Carolina on Sept. 18, 2004 ... USF has set a new road attendance mark in each of the last three seasons (78,900 at South Carolina, 76,780 at Alabama, Aug. 30, 2003, and at Oklahoma, Sept. 28, 2002) ... The Bulls won 21 consecutive before falling to TCU, 13-10 on Oct. 10, 2003 ... During that 21-game stretch, USF held the nation's second longest home winning streak with only Miami (Fla.) winning 25 straight in the Orange Bowl being longer ... A METEORIC RISE

• USF has set a standard that will likely never be matched in major college football ... The Bulls enter their ninth season this year, and during that stretch have seen their humble I-AA beginnings go from double-wide trailers as offices, to membership in a Bowl Championship Series (BCS) conference, and a lot in between ... The following are some of the programs highlights.

• On Sept. 15, 1995 the Board of Regents approves USF Football at its annual meeting in Orlando ... Jim Leavitt is hired as the Bulls' first football coach on Dec. 3, 1995.

• On Sept. 25, 1996 USF holds its first intersquad scrimmage ... Less than a year later, on Sept. 6, 1997, a home record crowd of 49,212 pack Tampa Stadium to see USF manhandle Kentucky Wesleyan 80-3 in the program's inaugural game.

• The Bulls record their first winning season with an 8-3 slate in 1998 ... The following season, USF would open the 1999 campaign, with its first-ever meeting with a Division I-A school, losing to San Diego State, 41-12 on Sept. 4.

• On Sept. 2, 2000 USF begins what would become the nation's second longest home winning streak with a 40-0 win over Jacksonville State ... The Bulls would go undefeated at home for three-plus seasons before a 13-10 loss to TCU on Oct. 10, 2003.

• USF stuns the college football world with a 35-26 win over Pittsburgh on Sept. 8, 2001 ... The next season, on Nov. 16, 2002, the Bulls gain their first win over a nationally ranked I-A team with a 29-7 win over No. 25 (ESPN-USA Today) Bowling Green ... That Bowling Green team was coached by a talented up-an-coming coach named Urban Meyer.

• On April 22, 2001 Kenyatta Jones made USF history being selected with the first pick of the fourth round of the National Football League Draft by the New England Patriots ... Little did anyone know that Jones would be the first of three straight Bulls selected 1-2-3 in the fourth round of the Draft ... • USF records its best season in its short history finishing the year 9-2 ... That season the Bulls' only losses came at Arkansas, 42-3, on Sept. 14, and at No. 2/3 (AP/ESPN-USA Today) Oklahoma in the next game, 31-14, on Sept. 28.

• The Bulls accept an invitation to join Conference USA as a football member on Oct. 11, 1999 ... After a long wait, USF defeats Army, 28-0, in its first ever C-USA game on Sept. 27, 2003.

• On Nov. 5, 2003, just 40 days after playing its first Conference USA game at West Point, USF accepted an invitation to join the BIG EAST Conference.

• In May of 2004, USF opens it's long awaited Intercollegiate Athletic Complex, at the cost of \$18 million.

• USF defeats No. 9/8 Louisville, 45-14, marking the biggest win in school history ... It was the Bulls first BIG EAST Conference win, and their first-ever win over an Associated Press Top 25 team.

► ON THE RECORD WITH HEAD COACH JIM LEAVITT

Quotes from the Florida Sportswriters Association College Football Media Weekend
July 30, 2005, Caribe Royale Resort, Lake Buena Vista, Fla.

Opening comments ... "First of all, it is great to be here. I can remember when we started with an abandoned trailer 10 years ago, and I remember that I was so excited to be coming to this event. I had never been a head coach, it was the first time that I was able to come to a forum like this, and 10 years later I'm just as excited, I really am. I think that this is a great event and I love coming here. Some coaches may not enjoy it, but I do. I absolutely love it."

"I am as excited about our program as I have ever been. When we started 10 years ago we played 18 true freshmen and one of those guys (Anthony Henry) just signed for \$25 million with the Dallas Cowboys, so we did have some talent. We knew that we had a talented group even though we went 5-6 and had a losing season. But we knew it, and knew over the next two or three years we thought we'd be pretty good. Now during the next, I guess, seven years we won, and we won in I-AA, and then we went into I-A and we went 8-3, and 9-2, and 7-4, and we won a lot of games. We stayed in those trailers and it was getting a little difficult recruiting because you don't see progress. We knew that we had a couple of years where we struggled just a little bit. So as we went into this season, we really knew that we were going into the BIG EAST, we knew that it was going to be very difficult to do I-AA, I-A, Conference USA, and BIG EAST. You talk about warped speed; it's hard to catch your breath. So this past season we played a lot of young guys. We probably had a whole boat load of freshmen that played, I can't give you a number but there were a bunch of them. We redshirted some seniors that were pretty good, knowing that we had to pause and regroup just a little bit, and we didn't have a great season, we had some great games. Beating TCU out there was pretty big; beating UAB on national TV was pretty big, in spite of all the adversity. So that just has a lot to say about the spirit of our program. I think the foundation that we built; the foundation is very, very strong, that I do know. And it's not built with smoke and mirrors. That is a huge part of all this."

"What I'm saying is that we were very young last year. We went 4-7. South Florida is going to be very strong. South Florida is going to be a very strong program. Will it happen this year, I don't know. If you look at our schedule a lot of people don't think we have a shot. I don't know if we do or not, all I do know is that our guys are going to play extremely hard. I do know that we have a lot of talent. We do have some experience at some places, but we have a lot of young guys as well, but they are as talented as there is. I will say that over the next two or three years, I think that you'll see the University of South Florida become a very, very powerful program. We've built the facility, that's helped a lot. You can't say that we are just in trailers anymore and this facility is a nice as you'll see. We play in Raymond James Stadium and we know that is very, very powerful. And the vehicle as far as the BIG EAST is a great sell to recruits. That's just the fact. Your in the room. Your in the room to play for all of the marbles. Whether you do or don't your in that room. When you go talk to players, as an example Courtney Denson who is with us now competing at quarterback. I recruited Courtney very, very hard, and we did a great job of it - he's from Miami Central - and he said to me "coach I want to as you a question, can you play for a national championship?" I said "Courtney what makes you think that any of these other schools are going to make it out of there conference championships to be involved in the national championship?" He said "coach I didn't ask that, can you play for a national championship," I said to him, "Courtney what about this school, your looking at them and I don't think that they will make it." He said, "coach," and I said, "no, you can't." You can say anything you want, and you can sell it anyway you want to sell it, but I couldn't be honest with

them and say that we could. I could try to finagle it and maneuver it; I could try to tell them that if all of these things happened, you never know the world changes. Now, if a player asks me, "coach can you play for a national championship," I can say "yes." It has taken off so much that bogs you down when you have the ability to recruit the very best, whether get them or not, I don't know, but just having that vehicle is huge in recruiting. What is the difference between South Florida and anybody else, it's who's on that field. We obviously have to do a great job recruiting, and it's not going to happen overnight. I don't want to lose this year, I want to win. I don't know any coach that goes into the season saying that they want to lose. I haven't changed since the day we started and I know that we will battle, and I know that there will be a number of close games. Whether we win or not, I don't know it depends how well we can play in that fourth quarter."

On the number of recruits that came to USF that would not have one or two years earlier because of the BIG EAST and BCS ... "I don't know how many but your coaches sell it passionately and that is huge in sales. You have to believe in what your selling, you have to believe that there is no ceiling to something. It has released our coaches as well with that excitement and enthusiasm and I think that has been very big. I would say a number of them. I don't know how many, but I'd think that if you asked each one of them they would all say it was a factor."

On playing Miami this year, and what effect it has on the programs growth ... "Just the sheer fact that we were able to get Miami to play a home-and-home. Not a two-for-one, not a one-time deal. That to me is a statement. We all know Miami is a very, very powerful program, we all know that they are loaded with talent, and know that Larry Coker is a tremendous coach. We know going there; most people will say it is impossible. We're just going to play. We're excited about it because your playing against one of the very best. There is no question about it. I mean your in a huge uphill battle in that game as well as all of it, but my god how exciting. The law of opportunity. You know the great challenges create great opportunity, and that's certainly one of them. If South Florida is ever going to make a mark, we knew that someday we had to reach this point where we had gone into the teeth of a lion. We knew that we were going to walk into something like this, but it's time to do it, it's time to make a move. If we look at this thing 20 years from now, you have to make these steps and push at the highest level. You can't just keep dangling. You are either going to be part of tradition or create it, and in a big way I think we are creating it."

On the new BIG EAST and the perception that there is pressure to perform well to be included in the next BCS contract ... "There was so much to talk about when the three schools left because it just dragged on, because nobody made a move because of money. That's the bottom line. But I didn't feel that as much as some might think at the BIG EAST gathering, I really didn't, and I'm not just saying that to protect the BIG EAST. I saw a lot of excitement, and the things that were talked about more were all of these NFL coaches that are in the BIG EAST now as head coaches. I think that you are going to see, from top to bottom, a distribution of who is going to be the juggernaut. I think that you see more of the excitement about that than any of the other stuff. I don't think that you see to many people concerned about the other right now because I think there are to many people trying so hard to develop a powerful program. Louisville has shown that they are very good, Cincinnati has a lot going for it right now, you already have tradition with West Virginia, and Syracuse is going to go. You look at the BIG EAST, every school but us and

Rutgers went to a bowl game last year. If you look at the winning percentage of the BIG EAST last year - I believe, you'll have to look this up - the top winning percentage of any conference in the country was the BIG EAST. Look at the scheduling - I believe - the BIG EAST has the toughest schedule in the country. I don't believe that those factors of whether we will be involved in the BCS or not, I don't see that being an issue."

On USF's potential attendance this year ... "I think our attendance will be pretty strong. You think about Florida A&M, you may get 50,000 there. I think we can all say that. Central Florida, you know that there will be a lot of people there. That has been a high interest game. How many people will be there? Forty-thousand, I don't know. Louisville, the last time we played them we had 40,000, I believe, or close to it. Especially since it's the BIG EAST opener. Then we've got West Virginia, that's Homecoming. You know there will be a lot of people there. Then you start thinking what we can average. Forty-thousand, maybe you could average, 45,000, 35,000, I don't know. You tell me. I think that anybody in this room would say that we are going to average 35,000-plus without even trying, because of the games. That's part of what's happening. You tell me how many will be here. I don't know, but I'll bet a lot. I bet a lot of people."

On the significance of playing UCF ... "Well it is a high interest game, there is no question about it, and it has been for a number of years. How it came about I won't even get into, but it happened. It doesn't matter whether both teams are very powerful, or are having a great year or not, it is going to be one of those rivalries that develop because of geographic's. We're both I-A programs, I-4, the whole deal. It will be a great game. Both teams and players will play with great passion, and will try their best. It will be a fun game to play. We know that it is a big game for us, we certainly know that. We're the young guys. They're the traditional school that has been around a lot longer, we look from that angle, but there are a lot of story lines on it. How significant will it be through the year, nobody knows that, we're just going to play this year, and for the next two years. We're just going to see how it goes. Certainly, if there are 60,000 people at a game like that, there is probably more of a chance that the game will be played for a lot of years. If 15 people show us, probably wouldn't. But I'm sure that it will be a pretty good crowd and there will be a lot of excitement around it."

On the move from quarterback to the defensive backfield for Louis Gachette ... "Well it's not fair to Louis because he may be a quarterback, but there is a time element involved. Louis wants to play. If Louis wants to play he is probably going to find the field quicker at free safety than he will there. He is a very good athlete. He can run pretty well. You know he's 6-3, about 200 pounds. We've just got a number of guys right now at quarterback. We don't really know who's going to be our guy at quarterback, but we've got a number of guys there. Louis played quarterback last spring, and he went into our break, I told him that it was his call. I told him that I wasn't going to tell him what to do, because it was not my life. But he came back from break and said that I'm ready to go to free safety, and I said ok, fine. In the second half of spring he worked at safety, and he worked all summer. He's on the second team right now in back of (Danny) Verpaele."

On Jerome Springfield ... "He can play both, but we have him listed at left tackle right now. Jerome is a big fellow. I was in a canoe with him this summer. He is 6-8, 340 pounds and we were trying to race another canoe, he went to the left and we went in the water. Jerome picked up the canoe, with his long arms, and walked it over to the side. But he's a big guy. Jerome is not the greatest athlete in the world, but then again at 6-8, 340 pounds you don't necessarily have to be. He understands the position, and that experience helps. He's really a good kid. His personality, his love for the game, and he works so hard, it's all of those things

that make Jerome. I know that he's a big guy; he put up almost 400 pounds on the bench the other day which is pretty good, especially for a guy with long arms. It's hard to do that. But on that left side, he and Frank Davis, Frank put up about 510 on the bench, and he's about 6-5, 320. We're starting to get some guys that have a little size, and a little strength."

On the influence that television has on USF's non-conference schedule ... "I don't know how much television has. The number one thing we look at is home-and-home. Doug Woolard, our athletic director, and I have talked about it a great deal. We're not interested in the money games right now. We'll go play Auburn and Penn State one time, Oklahoma, Arkansas, those kinds of things. We haven't thought about television that much because when you have five non-conference games to get, it's so hard anyway; we're just trying to find I-A people that will go home-and-home. That's it and then we go from there."

On using television as a marketing tool for the program ... "Well it can work both ways. If you are getting slaughtered on TV it's not always fun, whether it's good or bad. I guess as a recruiter you say come and help us, we need you, we're not very good. You can play it anyway you want in recruiting. Playing a traditional power, I wanted to play Oklahoma because of Bob (Stoops) and I. So I go involved in that with their AD. Arkansas, I wasn't involved with that one as much. I necessarily didn't want to go and play Arkansas and Oklahoma back-to-back; I was not overly excited about that. We played some people like that to help us in recruiting. As far as saying, we're going to play Oklahoma three years from now. We use that recruiting for three years because we were I-AA. We knew that we would be I-A so we were trying to recruit some athletes at that level, and we knew that playing an Oklahoma we could use that recruiting a bunch. Oklahoma, Auburn, we don't need that anymore."

On how much of the game is marketing and keeping the schools name out there by playing Wednesday, Thursday, Friday night games ... "Well it's big, it's big. It's not so much the finances of it all. You know, you get a certain amount of money for playing on television. I did not like playing a Wednesday night game last year. It hurts the players so bad in terms of grades, tests, and the distraction in the middle of the week. We won the game, and it didn't hurt us in recruiting that's for sure."

On any kind of directive or pressure from the conferences to play on television ... "Well, in the end it's your decision, but how many times am I going to go to my players and say, hey we could have been on TV, but I though we probably shouldn't because of your class schedule. I mean they are going to want to play on TV as well, because in your life, how many opportunities do you have to do that. We will do what we need to do to make sure that academics are the priority. We do know that you have shifts during the fall that can hurt that. I played baseball at the University of Missouri and that was the hardest sport there was as far as class time. But you did what you did for the sport because you had to play when you had good weather, travel, and all of those types of things. First of all, you really don't lose as much because usually your games are on the weekends. But we will do what we need to do for the athlete and the program as long as we can do it and still feel that they will have enough time to do the things they need to do academically. Now, do we get the pressure from the conference, it probably is there, but it really has never come down in my year to, hey, you need to do this. I think way before that happens we probably understand that we need to be on television. For our sake, for South Florida."

On the issue of student-athletes getting five years of eligibility ... "Do I think it's going to happen, I don't know. I know in football all of the coaches are in agreement that it should happen. How it plays to the other sports, I don't know. That's probably the biggest sticking point right now."

August 30, 2005, BIG EAST Conference Room, USF Intercollegiate Athletic Facility, Tampa, Fla.

Opening Statement ... "We had a very good practice yesterday (Monday). We went full pads and were out there quite awhile trying to get in as many repetitions as possible. We finished strong, focusing on the kicking game in preparation for Penn State."

On Penn State ... "Penn State is a tremendous program, we all know that. They are in a tremendous conference and have one of the top defenses in the country. Their quarterback is very good, probably one of the best athletes on the team, they have good speed and receiver and the offensive line is solid. Playing on the road in their stadium is a big challenge and we are going to focus on our team and playing a good football game."

On Penn State's Secondary ... "Their secondary is very good and it is obviously one of their strengths. Their group has been through a lot of battles together and know how to communicate. They were a top defensive team in the nation last year and have nearly everyone back."

On the quarterback situation ... "Both Courtney (Denson) and Pat (Julmiste) are ready to play. They have both worked very hard and are more than capable. Will we play both of them? We may. We are going to watch them in practice today and tomorrow and make a decision when we feel it is the right time."

"Pat has shown the ability to be successful in the past and Courtney is a tremendous athlete. I am expecting both players to be big for us this year. We are also giving Carlton (Hill) a lot of reps at quarterbacks as well to keep him at arms length behind."

On quarterback situation's affect on team ... "It may and in may not. We are trying to be fair to those guys competing for the job. Our guys on the offensive line rotate in and out, so there is an adjustment period there as well. It's not very often a team will go through the year not playing more than one quarterback."

On PSU quarterback Michael Robinson ... "He can do a lot of things with his athleticism. It adds a number of variables that you must contain or at least slow down and that is not going to be easy. He is a heck of an athlete playing with a lot of confidence."

On defensive end Tim Jones ... "He's been doing very well in practice and is a good leader. He has a lot of experience and I expect him to do well."

On the wide receivers ... "I am more confident with this group than I was last year. Any time you have two true freshmen come in and beat out (2004) two more experienced players, then you probably aren't as strong in that position as you would like to be. We have a little more depth this season."

On Andre Hall shouldering the load ... "Andre will always be a guy we want to get the ball to, whether it's in the first couple of games or last couple of games. He is very important to us and a very good football player."

Opening Statements ... "We had a good practice last night. Our guys worked really hard. Going back to the Penn St. game, we did a few good things and we certainly have to clean up a lot of other things. We have to play better. The key to any football team in this country is getting better and improving from week to week."

On Florida A&M ... "They are a good football team, they are athletic. We expect it to be a heck of a game. We know they are going to bring their best effort. There is going to be a large crowd. They have a big offensive line. It's probably the biggest we will face all year. They get real tight and it's going to be hard to run through them. All the receivers catch the ball well. Their offensive coordinator is outstanding. The defensive line can play."

On QB Pat Julmiste ... "Pat is our starter right now, that's as far as I go with that right now. We've got Carlton (Hill) he's worked at WR and a little at QB; we're just trying to get our offense to do some things and give Pat a chance. Beyond that I don't have any plans right now. He went out and played ok but made a few mistakes. He played better than the limited time Courtney (Densen) was in there."

On punter Brandon Baker ... "Brandon has always had a pretty good leg. He's had very good games in the past; this isn't the first time he's punted well. We expect him to do well."

On USF's wideouts ... "I wasn't happy with all the dropped passes like anybody wasn't. That part is disappointing. On the other hand, I was encouraged by the same guys going out in the second half and making big catches."

On the home opener with Florida A&M ... "I really haven't thought of it. I'm kind of a boring guy to talk to. Honestly I'm thinking about practice today, I haven't thought about there being a home game. I've been thinking about being fundamentally sound and getting better. We need to be a good football team weather we are at home or on the road. I just want to get better as a team"

On getting the first game out of the way ... "There were a lot of guys who haven't played a football game yet. I was really proud of Amari Jackson. He put a uniform and pads on, he lined up in almost the right spot. He looked like a receiver. Louis Gachette made some mistake about I told him I was really proud of him. We had a lot of guys who have never been in a college game. That part is good to get a game behind them so they can look at the game for improvement."

On USF's defensive line ... "You better have a pretty active front four if you want to have success. I think Penn St. they have a senior secondary and they made their defense go. It's always been the key to our defense. It starts up front. I trust all the guys who get in and play. We need everyone to step up and play."

Opening statement ... "Well we went out last night and had a pretty good practice, and the guys worked pretty hard. We go out in shoulder pads and helmets on Monday night's and we had a pretty good practice. We're getting ready to go today and try to focus on a good practice, and every day try to get a little more ready to play."

On UCF having nothing to lose due to their 16-game losing streak ... "I don't hear any of that (UCF having nothing to lose). It's going to be a heck of a ball game, for both teams. I don't think that anybody is going to be thinking about anything but playing a good game, and seeing if they can win the game."

On whether playing a team for the first time allows you to concentrate on your own preparation rather than the opponents ... "I don't know because every year we play a lot of teams for the first time because we haven't been around that long. Certainly with our schedule this year we haven't played Penn State, we never played Florida A&M. When you look at our schedule this year, how many teams are we playing for the first time this year? Most of them, so I don't know if it helps or not."

On whether this is the program's first real rivalry ... "Well I think it's natural. I don't think that there is any question. We haven't been playing football for that long, and we didn't play them early because they have been playing football for quite a while longer. We were a I-AA team just trying to see if we could become a football team. With the proximity of it all I would certainly think so. Everybody's already been writing about it, since the two schools are so close that it would be natural."

On whether he would like to see this game played in the future ... "I'm just focusing on this game. We'll just have to see what type of crowd we have. I haven't thought about those kinds of things. I'm just trying to focus on this game."

On what he has learned about his team from the first two games ... "Well, our guys have played hard, I've noticed that. We're a young, and they enjoy playing football."

On whether he is putting any more emphasis on this game than any other because of it being UCF ... "Well whether I do or not, the players from both teams will because of the fact that we talked about with the proximity. I put a lot of emphasis on that game every week. Now, is there more to it for this game, with the closeness and all of that, I guess it's probably natural."

On what the game means to recruiting ... "I think that there is some importance to it, and all. I don't know about the edge or not the edge. I know that a lot of these guys know each other."

On UCF quarterback Steven Moffett ... "He is a very good football player. We recruited him out of high school and we know what he can do. He's very talented. He can run and throw. He's a very talented player."

On whether UCF having an extra week to prepare for the game is good for them (UCF) ... "I think it is a good thing when you have some injuries and you can heal up. As a coach I always like playing, but as a team, sometimes it can help you, it just depends. I don't know, they had an off week and they didn't."

On whether the UCF game against South Carolina surprised him ... "No, No it don't. I've been following them. Coach (George) O'Leary is a good coach and he has a good staff. They have real good discipline and you can see what they are going for. It doesn't surprise me one bit. In fact I thought it could have gone either way in that game. I mean, this is a very good football team were playing. It's not about the past for either team. Theses are two decent football teams that are playing against each other. There are some good football players on these football team's, I'm telling you and both teams will play hard, very hard."

On what problems Louisville poses for USF ... "They are just so strong in so many ways, and their defensive front is very strong. They also run well on defense. Offensively, they have the offensive line back, their quarterback is very efficient, he's very good, and they have big receivers. They also have a very big running back. On special teams, their kicker is very good and they work real hard in that area. They are just real solid. A lot of guys that are back understand how to practice, how to do things, how to go about things. Every single play you see is just perfect. They are just a very well coached team with a lot of talent. It's just all there."

On Louisville quarterback Brian Brohm ... "He throws well, he moves in the pocket well, and he understands the offense and what he needs to do. He directs them (offense) well, and he has a very good supporting cast. The best thing about him is that he understands where to throw the ball. He has everybody on the same page, and that's very important."

On whether this is the best Louisville team he has ever seen ... "I can't tell you until after the game, but they were pretty good last year. They beat us pretty bad up there. Are they better than they were last year? They sure looked pretty good (against Oregon State). They were good last year, and they are good this year."

On keeping the team emotionally grounded and not allowing them to get to hyped up ... "I told them to go to class, go to study hall, get there homework done, and get ready for practice. They know the game's out there and I don't think that they will get to distracted."

On what may account for Pat Julmiste's consistency ... "He's getting older. He's run the offense longer. You hope that people get better as they get older and have more experience. He's been through a lot of different things."

On the significance of the Louisville game ... "I don't know, at the time of those games (other big games in the program's history) they were big games. Every game is big. I probably don't ever put any less significance on any game, because in life you are just focused on that moment in time because you never know the future, you don't know how things are going to play out. So this game is the biggest game because it is the next one we play. Is it as significant because it is a BIG EAST game, I would say yes as opposed to our first three games because it is a conference game, so that makes it bigger. Is it because it's the first BIG EAST game we have ever played, I don't know if I have thought about that as much as it's just a BIG EAST game and it's a tremendous football team. We've had other nationally ranked teams come in. We've played the No1 ranked team in the country (at Raymond James Stadium), as you recall when we were I-AA in Troy State. Bowling Green has come in and was ranked. But is this the best, yeah, by far. This is a team that people are talking about possibly winning a National Championship. So you're looking at a very good team."

Opening statement ... "We had the guys come out and practice well last night (Monday night). The guys were pretty focused and they understand about Miami. These guys are well aware of how good Miami is and how strong they are. It's going to be a heck of a challenge. There's no question about that."

On the excitement of the program going back-to-back with two Top 10 programs (formally No. 9/8 Louisville and this week's No. 9/10 Miami) ... "Well it's exciting time when you go out and just practice for me. I'm a little different than most people. When we started our football program around here and had a bunch of guys go out on the football field and see a bunch of guys run around and try to throw a pass and try to hand the ball off and tackle, to me that was the most exciting day of my life. Today to go out and practice, I'm anxious to go out on the field, and very excited about practice. Every day you get another day to go practice and play football. That's about as exciting as it gets - but that's me. For the university when you win a game I guess you get excited about it. I'm thrilled to death that we can go outside and watch our guys, have another day and play another game."

On past experiences against major college football teams preparing USF for games like Saturday's against Miami ... "I hope that our guys never get intimidated. I don't care when. The Lord blesses you with talent and hopefully you go out and do the best you can with it. I hope they don't (get intimidated). They do know that they are playing against a very good football team; there isn't any question about that. They're one of the best. The only thing that we can control is staying focused, and try to play a very good football game, and to do the best we can. And that's it. If you start to get caught up in all of that other stuff, then you have no chance."

On whether anything surprised him in the win over Louisville ... "No, I always expect the guys to play hard. I always expect the guys to play real well. Sometimes I get more disappointed if sometime we didn't, but would I ever be surprised at what this team can do - no. I don't think that I ever have been surprised since I've been here. I don't like to underestimate people what anybody can do."

On how long he was able to enjoy the win over Louisville ... "I'm probably like most coaches, you pause and feel good about what the players did and how hard the players played, but then you start thinking about the next team. That's pretty much how it's gone with me. I feel good inside watching our players play, because in the end they're the one's get it done. I wish I could play, but I can't so you have to get your excitement about watching your players going out and win."

On his emotion on the sidelines ... "I just get excited when I see our guys do some good things, I just enjoy that - I enjoy the game. I mean I'm really looking forward to practice today. But I have more fun at the games, I assure you that."

On how much the team went through last year helped them to get ready for this year ... "Every year is different, and every year is a completely different team. This team is different from last year, and last year is different from the previous year, and so forth. On the other hand I always appreciate the players that laid the foundation for South Florida and the Bulls, for the last 10 years. Whenever we have a player come and is around, it always excites me. I tell them that you are as important as anything in terms of the success that we have."

On Amarri Jackson ... "Here you have a young man who hasn't played football in a while, goes up to Penn State in front of about 100,000 people, I mean I thought he did a great job. I mean how many of us would be able to go out there and, after playing basketball for two years, and then go out there and play football, that's so difficult. I think that he'll just get better and better. But he would tell you that there are some other guys there to that aren't to bad either, so we have a few guys that may pop up when you least expect it."

Whether he is surprised with USF's start ... "Nothing surprises me. I will never underestimate any of your players; I will not underestimate our team. You won't here that from me, and you never have. I don't think about what we should do, or could do. We just go out and play."

On the challenges that Miami presents ... "They have a lot of them, I mean they're just so good. We all know that. They are very talented right across the board, offensively and defensively. You want your guys to go in and play with some confidence which is a big factor. They have to go in there and settle down and play. They have good team speed; they run real well, again, right across the board. We just need to stay focused on the game and play."

Opening Statements ... "Going back to the Miami game, our guys were ready to play; were they too ready? Maybe they were. It's such a big thing playing Miami and it was so exciting. It was a really a great place to play and we enjoyed that part of it. We didn't play a very good first quarter. After that, we went toe to toe with Miami for three quarters of football. To me that's pretty strong. I thought our guys battled all the way though. We had a chance in the third quarter with the two possessions and the missed field goal. We could have had another shot at a score. You certainly can't turn the ball over like that but we knew it would be a tough game. You take the first quarter out of it and we really battled Miami all the way to the end"

On Courtney Denson playing against Miami ... "Courtney went out there and did some things that show he has talent. He can run well he threw the ball a little better than most people expected, and that's encouraging. Both him and Pat, they are such great guys and they work so hard and it means so much to them."

On Miami's Defense ... "Their defensive line is pretty good. Even at the end with the last touchdown they got. It took them four times from first and goal to get in there. It wasn't easy for them. We really made it tough. It was real encouraging when you look at the big picture that we are trying to get to."

On the Off Week ... "You think on an off week you have some time but I don't know where you have it. I went to get a haircut yesterday and there were people waiting. I couldn't wait, I just came right back. I don't know when I can get out to do it. I told our players we don't have an off week, we just have an extended week."

On Any Similarities between Penn St. and Miami ... "They are different, it's hard to explain. I don't know if our guys knew what they can really do with Penn St. I felt like our guys felt like they can go in there and beat Miami. They felt like they had a chance. That's why they were a little disappointed. They were disappointed after Penn St. because they knew they had a shot. We went to an onside kick in the fourth quarter against Miami; that was our only shot. We needed a miracle. How are you going to know if you don't try. We didn't get a good kick. Our guys know if they play at a very high level, they always have a chance to win the game. Our guys went down to Miami to win a ball game. We knew how good Miami is."

On the Schedule ... "We're 3-2, and our guys have played hard. We got it done in three games and in two we didn't. The rest of the games are BIG EAST games, and they rest are going to be a barn burner. It is important to not get ahead of yourself and to focus on Pitt. You need to put everything you have into that game and then regardless, do the same the next week. That's really important. Our guys can do it, weather we get it down, we'll see. Every single game is that big. Every game has been an absolute huge game and it's not going to change."

On the Quarterbacks ... "Pat's our starting QB. We've always trusted Courtney. We wouldn't have started him at Penn St. if we didn't. He gives us some good things, so we're not afraid to play him. Pat and Courtney have done enough things that I don't mind then being in the game. They are the two best right now and they are the two that really have to take us."

On Carlton Hill ... "Carlton Hill will continue to work at receiver and quarterback, that won't change. Sometimes we put him at QB and sometime we use him at WR. We focused in a little more on him at WR the past few weeks, because we felt like we needed him in certain situations. We don't want to get away from him at QB. We want to get him more reps at QB again, but it doesn't mean we won't put him in at WR. We had planned a while back that Carlton will get some reps at QB. Our two guys are Pat and Courtney. Those are the guys that are going to take the load for us on the season."

On Pittsburgh ... "They are a pretty good football team. They lost to Notre Dame, that game had all the hype, they had Nebraska beat and they can very well be undefeated. We might be a little better then we were last year. They did beat the dog out of us last year. It wasn't much of a game."

On Pittsburgh QB Tyler Palko ... "He's very accurate, quick release; he's a good football player. He tore us up last year."

On the off week ... "It is what it is. We hoped we used it in a favorable way. We had some guys who rested who were banged up a bit. We tried to practice through the week and keep things going. Whether it's a good time or not, most coaches will say the same thing. We rested out played and worked on fundamentals. I imagine you would get the same answer from every coach in America; and we did a little bit of recruiting. That's usually your three big things. Whether it came at a good week or not, I don't know."

On getting back on the field after a bye week ... "I'm excited and anxious to play. I'm not a guy who likes to sit around much. I'm anxious to see if we can compete with Pitt and go up there and play the Panthers."

On The USF passing game ... "It depends on what we can and cannot do. We've thrown and run the ball. We're going to have to be able to do both in order to be successful. We work on both in practice. Hopefully we'll throw the ball to the right people and they will catch it."

On willingness to insert Courtney Denson if Pat Julmiste is off ... "I don't think about negative things, you think about negative things. I just think about Pat (Julmiste) going out and doing well. As the game plays out, we'll make those decisions. I don't think well if Pat does bad, what do I do? I don't think like that."

On the defensive line ... "We're a better group with more depth, that's obvious. Everyone is back. You hope to get better over a year. You've added Tim (Jones) in the mix as well as Jason Allen. You're adding two seniors in or front four with a lot of people back. We're a little more active."

On putting pressure on Pitt QB Tyler Palko ... "That's always going to be a key in every season of every game. The better your defensive line is the better you're going to be. It all starts with your starting four."

On reducing the amount of penalties ... "Miami has a very good defense and their coverage is pretty tight. There wasn't a lot of room for error. They worked our O-Line pretty good and go pressure to Pat and Courtney (Denson). You can't make mistakes at all. We need to play better in the offensive line, and our QB's need to make better decisions with the ball. We never practice interceptions. You always go out to practice and throw to your guys. Pat has done a pretty good job and he didn't do as good against Miami and Duke struggled a little bit too. Miami has won a lot of games there. It just doesn't happen. They are a pretty good team down there. We've won a lot of games in Tampa. You just keep practicing and working hard."

On the rematch of last years Pitt loss ... "You never liked to get whipped on like that. They beat us pretty good. A new year is a new year; different people and different players."

On USF's first ever road conference game ... "Every win in the BIG EAST is big. Everyone sees the BIG EAST as a great deal of parity. We don't know until we go through the year. Every one game is a championship game; regardless. You better be on and play well each week if you think there is any hope at a championship. We need to play a great game because they are a very good football team."

Opening Statements ... "We had a real good practice last night and I thought our guys did a real good job. We were disappointed we didn't win last week; that was obvious. I don't feel that we played as well as we could play. Sometimes you don't play great every time out, but you always want to. They practiced hard last night and I believe we will play real hard Saturday night. I believe they will be ready to play. I expect us to go out and have a good practice today. Hopefully we'll go out and do a good job."

On similarities between West Virginia and USF ... "They are a really good football team. Everyone knows that. They have such a great will. To do what they did last week against Louisville shows the team will play hard all the way through. You never give up, ever. This football team certainly didn't and doesn't. They play hard and physical. How much similarities there are? I don't know. They use different schemes in the kicking game. It's important we play well. I think our guys will play hard and it will be a very physical and emotional game. As I'm learning in the BIG EAST conference, you have to be ready to play. That's no different in any conference; you always have to be ready to play."

On the importance of the game against West Virginia ... "Every game you win is important. I think we are already there as far as expectations. We went to Pitt and lost a game to a team that has won nine national championships and we were pretty disgusted. Does that say anything right there? We are supposed to be where we want to be. The perception of what we want and what people want from the program is very high and you have to love that. I want us to go into games with expectations to win and play well at a high level. I think we created that, somewhat. I'm sure all of you listened to the radio show last Sunday and heard me talk a lot about Cumberland. We were pretty historical on that show. It was a lot of fun. We went back and talked a lot about the program. If you missed it then you really missed a moment in your life you will never get back. I'm sure all of you will sprint over to get it."

On if the West Virginia game is a must win ... "There is no question about that. As far as the BIG EAST race? I don't think there is any question about that. West Virginia is on top of the conference and if you want to win the BIG EAST, you need to beat the teams at the top."

On USF road woes ... "Most people would go back and look at Penn St., they had a good defense. Miami also has a good defense. Pitt is a good football team but I thought we could have played better. I don't have an answer. We haven't won on the road. We haven't played as well on the road as we have at home. A year ago we played well on the road and didn't play well at home. We went to UAB and TCU and won those games and got beat by teams here that weren't as strong. We weren't a very strong team last year either. We were very young. I don't really have an answer. That's probably why I was angry more so because I expect a lot out of myself, my staff and the team."

On QB Pat Julmiste and Courtney Denson ... "I never think about getting a spark, I want to score. Now whether you say that's a spark or not, I don't think about getting a spark. It's just that after a while we haven't gotten in the end zone, I want to change some things up. We always change players. We change players at wide receiver, running back and offensive line. When you change quarterback, it's always the most noticeable and last one to change."

"Pat has great courage. He is one of the hardest working young men I

have ever been around. He is one of the most enjoyable people I have ever been around. He lays it out there. We made a number of mistakes last game. He was 6 for 8 in the first half throwing the ball. That means he did some good things there. You can't put it there. We went a while after the 10 points without scoring. I do have trust in Courtney (Denson). He has put a lot of work into it. I think Courtney is a good football player. I'd like to play Courtney more, but right now Pat gives us the best shot in my opinion. At this point I really believe that. If you know about my personality, I'll lock into somebody. I locked into Chad Barnhardt a long time; I locked into Marquell Blackwell for years. I do stay with people but I do have high expectations and all our players do also. There is not one player on this team that does not want to do well. We need to put ourselves in better positions to be successful."

On the play of the USF receivers ... "We've been up and down. We're pretty young at receiver. You have to realize that this is Amarrri's (Jackson) first year back to football. He had such a great game (against Louisville) and he wants that every week. Johnny Peyton and Jackie Chambers are sophomores and neither one red shirted. Jessie (Hester) and Taurus (Johnson) are true freshmen. S.J. (Green) is the oldest guy. We're young there and our guys have done a good job but we can play better. We can play better everywhere."

On USF not being able to sustain long drives ... "Last game, that's not all year, that's just last game. If you think about it, in the 4th quarter we were inside the 30 yard line three times with no points. The last few times we didn't go for a field goal because we were two touchdowns behind. We want to be able to drive the ball down the field and finish in the end zone. We did score early but not on a long field. We did drive the ball well towards the second half but we didn't put up any points. We need to do that. Defensively, I don't think we played as well as we did in the first five games. They did some good things. We gave up two pretty good plays. They had a short field eight-yard drive. We need to stop them, but it was a short drive. Couple of interesting things happened. I thought our kicking game did some pretty good things. I really thought our punt return did well, we had a block and one pretty good return. We had one block (called a penalty) that I thought was a pretty good block. But other people that mean more than I do didn't feel that way. That was a huge call. It was a four-point game at that point. But it is what it is. You've got to play through those things and we obviously didn't."

Opening statement ... "We had a really good practice yesterday (Monday, Oct. 31). We went out in the afternoon for about an hour and a half and I thought our guys did a pretty good job. I wasn't as sure during practice until I went and looked at film that night. I didn't know if we were sharp, but the guys worked pretty well. I know there have been different questions about (sophomore free safety) Danny Verpaele. Danny Verpaele is going to red shirt this year. We're not going to play him and I know that's been something that's been up in the air. I haven't really had a chance to evaluate it until I got to spend some time with him. He's getting very close to being a 100 percent but we just feel like at this time of year that we'll probably wait on that. Jarriett Buie did play in the Bull Bowl last week. He has been practicing in full and we are going to take him. Whether we're going to play him or not, we don't know yet, but he is coming along real well so we're just going to see how that goes. But we're anxious to play. What to expect might as well be like it is for any game. Guys are excited to go out there and play hard and that's why it will be a heck of a ball game. Rutgers is a very good football team. They're playing well and got a lot of momentum going on. They're a very good football team playing some really good football. They have improved through the year, and that's what you really want for you team to get better as the year goes. They have played a few more games than we have. They've been able to evaluate through eight games and we've been able to evaluate through six. So does that help you or hurt you? I don't know. I don't really pay any attention because it is what it is. Our guys are pretty healthy right now and ready to go."

On the time off and whether Saturday's game is like a second season opener ... "On one hand we've had some time off, so that's probably good. But we have been practicing, and working, and the thing is that we do have some games to be played. So the evaluative process has already been started, and even though it's been a little while since we've played some games when you start a season you have all these new players that haven't played any games. Amarri Jackson hadn't played any games when we started. John Miller hadn't played at center for a while."

On the toughest thing about the break ... "Just waiting, wanting to play. Probably the weekend not playing and you see everybody else playing and you kind of want to play. Other than that the guys have been pretty good to be honest. I haven't had to holler or yell to do that too much to really gear them up. Our guys understand the situation. They're like anybody else, they just want to play."

On taking care of the football ... "I think that's been a difficulty. On one hand we've gotten a lot more turnovers than we've ever had on defense. But were giving up the ball up too and somehow its pretty clear to everybody that we have to try to keep from doing that. We talk about it and work on it. Obviously at times we're doing a pretty good job and there are times that we haven't. But we want to play good football - more than anything else - we just want to go out and play good football. If you really play good football then the wins will take care of themselves."

On the difference between playing Rutgers and West Virginia ... "They both play hard. Both are physical football teams. Both are very active and run well. They are both well coached. They're two pretty good teams."

On how much time he gave the players off and how they practiced ... "We gave Friday, Saturday and Sunday for the most part those days were off. On Thursday we didn't really do any hitting but we ran a fair amount to keep up our conditioning. I don't know how far you go with hitting and

not hitting. There's a fine line and I don't know if anyone has the answer and most coaches do the best they can under the circumstances. I think it's real important that you want to keep your timing, you want to keep them on edge, you want to keep the conditioning, you want to get timing and to do those kinds of things you have to do some contact. But how much contact do you do? We took some chances in the Bull Bowl because we played a lot of number two guys and it's not like we have a lot of depth. Matt Grothe hurt his shoulder and he is out for a while. It's not severe and he's going to red shirt anyway. But still some kinds of those things could have happened other places. Our entire number two offensive line played in the scrimmage. So I would say our twos got a fair amount of work. Our twos got pretty good work. Most of the top guys - our ones - didn't get as much work on Thursday. They threw the ball, did some good pick ups - those kind of things - and ran. But you don't get the 80 plays in a game that you have to play hard and go and do things and make plays and get off blocks. So that's the one thing we don't have. We don't have a game where every one of our top guys are playing. You don't have the kicking game involved. That concerns you, those kinds of things, but you do the best you can under the circumstances. I have not felt negatives in those kinds of things. We just push forward and just move forward and practice and get ready. Our guys have done a great job. Our players to this point have done a really great job."

On whether they have worked out Carlton Hill at quarterback during the break ... "We've been practicing him a fair amount at quarterback and I think that he's getting closer. I hope that's the fact. I hope he's not getting farther, and I'm not saying that sarcastically, because sometimes you put someone in at quarterback and sometimes they don't develop. He can go the other way, and you can find yourself saying that he's going to have a hard time playing. But I think he's going to be pretty good. But right now, he's getting closer."

On preparations for playing in the Carrier Dome ... "Well it's a concern. We went to Tropicana Field (home of the Tampa Bay Devil Rays) a couple weeks ago and considered that (for this week), but the only problem we had was the time it takes to get there. We don't have a dome. That's something that's a concern. It's just going to be different to get the guys used to the surroundings."

On if the ball travels differently in the dome ... "Well that's the problem. It might or might not; we don't know because we aren't in there. We'll probably do a little more on Friday to try to get used to it."

On Andre Hall ... "He's a very good football player. He works hard in practice. He hasn't been any different since he got here maturity wise. He's always worked hard, he's always been a good leader, and he's always been a catalyst for us."

On passing game consistency ... "You always want to complete every pass. Everyone wants to, but we aren't going to. I think that Pat (Julmiste) did well last week and I'm happy with the receivers. They caught the ball for the most part. We need to be able to throw and run the ball well."

On USF relying on the pass game to win ... "If we get in a situation we're going to have to throw the ball, whether I feel comfortable or not. I'd rather have balance. If you have a minute and 30 seconds to go and 80 yards for the score, you're going to have to throw the ball. Hopefully if that comes into play our guys do well."

On the possibility of winning two straight on the road and the mentality of the team after the Rutgers win ... "We just go out and work, I'm not in the locker room to find out what the guys are thinking. I'm all business and I just go to work. I hope the guys go to class and do well in school, other than that there's football. There's no time for anything else. They are happy in the locker room when we win. Either way when you win or lose, you have to move forward and they've pretty much done that."

On the improvement of the defense over last season ... "We have a little more depth in the front, that's helped. Johnnie Jones in the secondary. Terrence Royal has always been solid."

On the leadership of Terrence Royal ... "He's at practice every day; always on, always solid. He plays hard every day. He's always up beat and he's a good leader."

On the kicking game on field turf ... "They aren't used to it. This is a different surface than what we played on last week. Justin Teachey kicked it out of bounds once. They can't go out (on the field for pregame) any earlier whether they are on grass or turf. We'll probably do a little more on Friday to see if that will help."

On what a win against Syracuse will mean for the rest of the season ... "Every win is real big. Every game is significant. I don't think there is any game this year that is more important than the other. I don't think anyone would have said that Central Florida wasn't a big game. I'm sure if you talk about Miami, that's a big game also. They are all big games; all of them. The spring game last year was big. When you get to the end of the season it's huge. November is a huge month; it's a very powerful month."

On if coach Leavitt thinks about the possibility of picking up his 60th win ... "Oh yea, every minute ... No. You know me. Right now I'm all hyped up thinking about our practice and seeing if we can go out and do the right things."

On the possibility of players underestimating Syracuse and its 1-7 record ... "I hope they don't. If they do then there's no chance. I'm going to tell you right now. This team (Syracuse) can play. I don't blow smoke and this team can play. It will be very difficult."

Opening Statements ... "We had a good practice last night. Our guys worked hard. We know we have a challenge with Cincinnati. They are playing awfully good football. They are well coached and this game can be very difficult. They really are a very difficult football team and I've been watching film the past few days and they can play. Their quarterback moves well, their offensive line is big and strong. They have big running backs and receivers; their defense is very active. Their kicking game is really good; they return their long snapper and punter. The kicker does a very nice job. This is going to be a difficult challenge for us. We are going to have to play as good as we have played in the past to have a chance of winning."

On the performance of the USF offensive line ... "They have done some pretty good things. It's a combination of a lot of things. The past few weeks they have done some decent things."

On the amount of carries Andre Hall has had this season ... "He just carries the ball when his number is called. He's fine; you would have to ask him. He's always going to do the best he can."

On last weekend's shutout of Syracuse ... "It's always good. You always want to keep the other team out of the endzone."

On if people have been telling the team how good they are and patting them on the back ... "We haven't had all that much. I thought we would have a little bit. I don't think it's going to be a problem. We don't have anyone patting anyone on the back to be honest with you."

On the chance of USF becoming bowl eligible ... "I've been about the same as I've been for the past nine or 10 years. You keep focused on practice and get ready for the game. Our guys know they are going to have to play extremely well in order to win. We just have to stay focused and be as competitive as we can to put ourselves in a good position to win a football game. I haven't changed much. I talk about the team we are playing and go out and practice and watch film. Exactly what I am saying is what I've done."

On what being bowl eligible will mean to the program ... "I haven't thought about it at all, no. Today I just turned off some film of Cincinnati that I have been watching all morning and all of last night. I came down here and all I thought about is how good this Cincinnati team is. That is all I have thought about."

On the offensive balance of the team ... "We are going to try to establish balance. That is always our way. We throw the ball well some games and we run the ball well some games, it just depends on what we are able to do. Believe me, we just don't work on running the ball in practice. We know that we have to have balance. You can't be a good offensive football team if you can't do both."

On the announcement of Kansas State head coach Bill Snyder's retirement ... "He's a great man; a close friend. I don't think anyone will impact college football anymore than he has. He did a tremendous job there. He's a special person. I could never measure up to him; he's a pretty impressive coach."

On Andre Hall becoming USF all-time leading rusher ... "It's impressive. He's a good football player; a good running back"

On Courtney Denson's role on the team ... "He does both still, works with the quarterbacks and receivers. He doesn't care where he plays; he just wants to play. He wants to help his team anyway he can. He's a special guy. He has a lot of talent."

On coach Leavitt's comfort level with Carlton Hill at quarterback ... "I don't think I ever said Carlton (Hill) is our second team. I think both of them (Denson and Hill) are good and I am comfortable with both of them at quarterback."

November 22, 2005, BIG EAST Conference Room, USF Intercollegiate Athletic Facility, Tampa, Fla.

Opening Statements ... "We had a real good practice last night and our guys worked hard. We got underneath the light, which is good because this game is a 3:30 game. We'll play half the game in the sun and the other half in the lights. It was really good to do that with our kick and punt return team. They practiced well and they are pretty focused. Hopefully today we will have a good practice. Connecticut is a pretty good football team. It will be a great challenge. It will be one of those games that come down to the end. One team will obviously have more points than the other and win. It's going to be a physical 60-minute ball game. A real tough challenge for us."

On preparation for playing in cold weather ... "I don't know exactly what you would do when you think about it. The fact that we are having cold weather here helps a little bit psychologically. It's obviously going to be much colder than this. You can at least get your mind prepared for it. Last time we were up there it was very cold. We played in some cold games and this one will be cold. There isn't a whole lot more you can do. If you play in a loud stadium you can play noise and things, but there isn't much you can do for the cold. I think we are fortunate to have the weather we are having this week, just a little bit."

On whether or not playing in cold weather is more physical than mental ... "I wouldn't say that, there is both factors involved. I'm not concerned with that. Our guys go out and play. There are other factors. Holding on to the ball, catching it and throwing it. There are some other things involved. You just go out there and play"

On if Coach Leavitt ever played football in snow ... "I have, in fact, Lee Roy Selmon was at Oklahoma. We were playing and the snow was coming down. I remember returning kickoffs and doing that kind of stuff. I've played a number of times in the snow. I've coached in Minnesota; that was cold. I've been around this stuff."

On if a strong running game is important towards the end of the season ... "Do I feel that way? I don't know. I don't have any idea. I haven't looked at the other teams in the country; I guess I would have to do a whole study on that. I wouldn't know where to start. I would have to look at percentages of pass and throws and how they do in November. You got me. I have no idea."

On the status of (offensive tackle) Thed Watson ... "Better than I thought. Unsure. I don't know for sure. Today and tomorrow will be important to see if he can do some things. He won't be effective unless he can really play. It was good that he didn't play against Cincinnati. The other guys will do better than him if he can't do what he does. It was good the other guys (Marc Dile and Walter Walker) played the last game. They got used to it."

On what it is going to take to win at Connecticut ... "There is a lot to think about. You need to be able to stop the running game. Special teams are going to be very big. Turnovers are always big. That doesn't really change much. There are a lot of factors. It's going to be a hard fought contest. It's going to be a challenge."

On Connecticut's greatest strength ... "Defense. They had the No. 1 defense in the country for a while. They are strong. They run well. Offensively they are all back and going. Tight ends are good, receivers are good, and their backs are outstanding. Their quarterbacks can do some good things. They are a pretty good football team. Their problem

is that they had injuries. Their number one and two quarterback went down. It's hard to play your number three quarterback and be successful all the time."

On the buzz being generated by USF being bowl eligible ... "I really haven't been paying attention, there might be one. I'm cooped up in my office watching film. I go down to the training room, weight room, locker room to say hi to a few guys. I say hi, you look great today, I can't wait for practice and I go upstairs and put the film on. I'm always concerned about distractions."

On Amarri Jackson wearing the skunk hat ... "That's my hat, he's borrowing it. It's my hat; some really nice people gave it to me. I don't know. It probably keeps his head warm. People talk about things, but I don't mess with it. It's all about how you execute on the field. Everything else is all fun. You write articles and put this up and all that kind of stuff but it doesn't have much to do with how you play football."

On the Kansas State coaching rumors being a distraction ... "No. I'm focused on Connecticut."

On if the team has any Thanksgiving plans ... "We're going to practice earlier that day. A lot of the players are from around here. We recruit them because of Thanksgiving holidays so they can just go right home (laughter). A lot of them will take other players with them. We'll go at 10-12 in the morning. If there are some guys who don't have anywhere to go, they will go with me and we'll have a turkey sandwich and sit around and talk. We will all have plans."

On what Coach Leavitt is thankful for ... "I'm thankful for my health and the opportunity to be sitting here and talking to all of you. We are all very fortunate and take things for granted way too much. I'm not going to speak for all of us in here but it's probably human nature. Just the fact that we can live another day and do what we do is really pretty powerful. The opportunity to do what I do and coach these guys; it can't get a whole lot better than that. That's probably the biggest things."

Down 17-0 at Penn State just 21 seconds into the second quarter, the USF football team did fight back in front of 99,235 fans, but didn't have enough offensively and eventually fell 23-13 in the 2005 season opener for both teams. It was also USF's debut as a member of the Big East Conference.

USF's (0-1) defense showed plenty of promise, holding Penn State (1-0) to a field goal after Justin King broke a reverse for 61 yards midway through the first quarter. But on the very next series, USF quarterback Courtney Denson, making his first career start, fumbled on a scramble and Penn State's Alan Zemaitis scooped up the loose ball on the bounce and ran in from 16 yards to put the Nittany Lions ahead 10-0 with 4:05 in the first quarter.

Pat Julmiste replaced Denson on the Bulls' next series and although he would go on to have a solid outing, his first series ended with a deflected interception at the Bulls' 13-yard line and Penn State made it 17-0 four plays later on a one-yard run from Tony Hunt.

Julmiste recovered, and with the USF defense holding strong, he led the Bulls to an 8-play, 55-yard scoring march in just 2:00. It culminated with an eight-yard alley-oop pass to Johnny Peyton to send USF into halftime down 17-7.

The defense continued to do its job throughout the third quarter, holding Penn State scoreless, but the USF offense couldn't punch it in during the quarter either.

Penn State's hunt broke a 70-yard run in the fourth quarter, setting up a four-yard touchdown run by quarterback Michael Robinson. Jon Simmons blocked the extra point and Penn State led 23-7 with 10:16 remaining.

The Bulls bounced right back with an 85-yard drive on their ensuing possession and Julmiste and Peyton hooked up again, this time on a fourth and goal from the four-yard line to cut the margin to 23-13 after USF failed on a two point conversion.

With 2:52 left in the game, USF did recover the ensuing onside kick but were ruled to have touched the ball before it reached 10 yards and Penn State was able to run out the clock for the win.

Andre Hall ran for 156 yards and three touchdowns Saturday night, leading South Florida to a 37-3 rout of Florida A&M.

Hall scored on first-half runs of 2, 2 and 31 yards while tying a school record with the seventh 100-yard rushing performance of his career. He went over the century mark early in the second quarter and played sparingly after that, finishing with 18 carries.

The South Florida defense did its part, too, in helping the Bulls (1-1) rebound from a season-opening 23-13 loss at Penn State.

FAMU (0-2) was limited to 85 yards total offense in its second game under coach Rubin Carter, the former NFL player and assistant who has been on the job less than two months after replacing Billy Joe, who left behind a program reeling from NCAA violations and a budget crisis.

The Rattlers were held without a first down until midway through the third quarter, then benefited from two fourth-down penalties against South Florida to score its only points on Westly Taylor's 21-yard field goal.

Pat Julmiste, starting at quarterback after coming off the bench to throw for 200 yards and two touchdowns against Penn State, completed 6 of 10 passes for 71 yards before giving way to Courtney Denson in the second quarter.

Denson, a transfer from Auburn who started the season opener for the Bulls, threw a 36-yard TD pass to Cedric Hill to make it 37-0 in the third quarter and shared playing time in the second half with third-string freshman Carlton Hill.

Andre Hall ran for 155 yards and scored two touchdowns to help USF beat UCF 31-14 and extend the nation's longest losing streak to 17 games.

Hall scored on 1-yard run and 26-yard pass play in the first half, and the long-awaited first meeting between schools located less than 100 miles apart was a success at the box office but a mismatch on the field.

A crowd of 45,139, second-largest in USF's relatively brief football history, watched the Bulls (2-1) build a 21-0 halftime lead on the strength of a relentless running attack that finished with 326 yards.

UCF (0-2) was held to 45 yards rushing and was shut out until Joe Burnett returned a third-quarter punt 60 yards to the South Florida 4, setting up Steven Moffett's touchdown run on the next play.

Moffett also threw a 9-yard TD pass to Brandon Marshall late in the fourth quarter.

The Golden Knights have not won since beating Central Michigan 31-13 on Oct. 25, 2003, with the last 13 losses in their stretch of futility coming under former Georgia Tech and Notre Dame coach George O'Leary.

One play after Hall nearly scored on a 17-yard run, Pat Julmiste added South Florida's last TD on 1-yard quarterback sneak late in the third quarter. Kyle Bronson added a fourth-quarter field goal to make it 31-7.

Even though UCF remained winless under O'Leary, who took over in 2004, just playing the Bulls was a victory of sorts for the Golden Knights. Fans and alumni of the Orlando school had been pushing for a series between the teams ever since USF launched its program from scratch eight years ago, arguing that it made sense because of the proximity of the campuses and the prospect of drawing large crowds each year.

The Bulls resisted the overtures, preferring to focus on trying to build a program to rival those at Florida, Florida State and Miami rather than pursuing a more modest goal of catching up with UCF, which began its program in 1979.

The teams are scheduled to meet again in Orlando next year, however there are no assurances beyond that.

Receiver Amarri Jackson ran for two touchdowns and threw for a third Saturday night to lead USF to the biggest victory in the school's brief football history, a 45-14 rout of No. 9 Louisville in the Bulls' BIG EAST debut.

After barely playing a role in the offense in his team's first three games, Jackson was Mr. Versatile in helping USF (3-1, 1-0 BIG EAST) beat a ranked opponent for the first time in six tries and stop the nation's third-longest Division I-A winning streak at nine games.

Louisville (2-1, 0-1 BIG EAST) had not lost since a 41-38 setback at Miami last Oct. 14. The Cardinals entered the conference opener with one of the country's most prolific offenses, but never fully got on track in losing to USF on the road for the second time in three years.

USF, which is in its ninth season, also upset Louisville two years ago in the Bulls' Conference USA debut. The Bulls and Cardinals left C-USA for the higher profile BIG EAST after last season.

Jackson, who had two receptions for 15 yards in USF's first three games, set up Andre Hall's 1-yard, first-quarter TD run with a 57-yard catch-and-run on the Bulls' second offensive play.

The 6-foot-5 receiver scored on a 51-yard reverse up the right side of the field to make it 14-0, then circled left end on a 12-yard reverse for a 21-0 lead midway through the second quarter.

Three minutes after USF Chad Simpson returned the second-half kickoff 94 yards for a touchdown, Jackson struck again when took a handoff from quarterback Pat Julmiste and tossed an 11-yard scoring pass to Derek Carter to put the Bulls ahead 38-7.

Jackson finished with 63 yards rushing on two carries and two receptions for 75 yards. Hall, who added a 3-yard TD run in the fourth quarter, gained 83 rushing on 22 attempts, while Julmiste was 4-for-9 for 93 yards passing.

Michael Bush scored both of Louisville's touchdowns on 1-yard runs.

Tyrone Moss matched a career-high with three touchdowns and No. 9 Miami ended USF's (3-2) hopes of springing a second straight upset with a sloppy 27-7 win on Saturday.

Moss ran for 89 yards and had scoring runs of 1 and 19 yards in the first quarter, when Miami (3-1) took advantage of three South Florida turnovers to build an early 17-0 lead.

Miami scored on four of its first five possessions, then didn't add to the total until Moss' 1-yard, fourth-down plunge with 8:25 left. USF avoided the shutout - which would have been the first in its 93-game history - with 5:56 left, when Johnny Peyton caught a 14-yard touchdown pass from Pat Julmiste.

The teams combined for nine turnovers, with South Florida having all five of its giveaways before half-time.

The Bulls (3-2) finished with a season-low 174 total yards, more than half of them in the fourth quarter with the outcome long decided.

Andre Hall, who came in averaging 117 yards per game and cracked the 138-yard plateau in six of his previous nine starts, managed 53 yards on 19 carries. Amarri Jackson, who ran for two scores and threw for another against Louisville, was a non-factor and finished with only 7 yards receiving.

Kyle Wright completed 13 of 26 for 173 yards for the Hurricanes. Lovon Ponder had two of Miami's four interceptions, with Devin Hester and Brandon Meriweather each picking off a pass.

Julmiste completed 8 of 25 passes for 47 yards and three interceptions for USF.

Late in the first quarter, Wright fumbled a snap on second-and-goal from the Bulls' 7, and USF recovered. And midway through the second, Wright hooked up with tight end Greg Olsen for a 63-yard catch-and-run play, but USF cornerback Mike Jenkins made a touchdown-saving play.

Jenkins - one of five Bulls chasing Olsen, who was sprinting down the center of the field - punched the ball from Olsen's arm at the 6, and it bounced out of the end zone for a touchback.

For the second-straight contest early turnovers proved to be too much for the USF football team to overcome, this time resulting in a 31-17 loss at Pittsburgh in league action Saturday on the road.

Pitt (3-4, 2-1 in Big East), winning consecutive games for the first time under Wannstedt, fell behind 10-0 in the first quarter following a blocked punt and a fumble by Palko, only to surge back with three touchdowns in a six-minute span in the second quarter.

Palko, who threw for 411 yards and five touchdowns in a 43-14 win over USF in Tampa last season, found Greg Lee on a 69-yard scoring pass play on the opening play of the second quarter, then hit Lee again for 41 yards to the Bulls' 3 following a Darrelle Revis fumble recovery. Palko then threw a 3-yard scoring pass to fullback Tim Murphy to make it 14-10.

Another USF fumble, this one by quarterback Pat Julmiste, was recovered by J.J. Horne and returned eight yards to the Bulls' 12, and Palko later ran it in from a yard out to put the Panthers up 21-10 with nearly nine minutes left in the second quarter.

USF got back to 21-17 on a Julmiste-to-Andre Hall scoring pass play of 76 yards, but another fumble by a Bulls quarterback, this time by backup Courtney Denson, was returned by Bernard "Josh" Lay to the Bulls' 8. Palko then found tight end Darrell Strong on an 8-yard TD pass late in the third quarter.

Hall, the Big East's leading rusher coming into the game with 519 yards in five games, had a combined 210 yards with 19 carries for 79 yards and a game-high 131 yards on seven receptions. But his big game couldn't prevent USF's second loss in a row since the Bulls upset then-No. 9 Louisville 45-14 on Sept. 24.

Freshman LaRod Stephens-Howling led Pitt with 91 yards on 14 carries, with most of his yardage coming in the second half as the Panthers mostly kept the ball on the ground to preserve their lead.

The game was USF's first in Pittsburgh since Sept. 8, 2001, when a neophyte Bulls program scored its first victory over an established Division I-A team by surprising Pitt 35-26, one of the biggest upset losses in Pitt history.

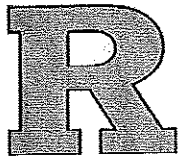

Andre Hall ran for 168 yards and three touchdowns and USF scored 28 points off six Rutgers' turnovers on the way to a 45-31 win over the Scarlet Knights on Saturday, the Bulls' first game in 21 days.

Despite two defensive scores in the span of 1:26 in the first quarter and a 20-point lead late in the third, USF needed to hold off the Scarlet Knights at the end.

Down 37-17 late in the third quarter, Rutgers came back to make it 37-31 after a 1-yard touchdown run by Brian Leonard and a 4-yard scoring catch by Clark Harris. The Scarlet Knights got the ball back with 11:47 left in the game, but a fumble by quarterback Ryan Hart ended the drive. Coming into the game, Rutgers had lost one fumble all season.

Rutgers got another chance with 6:39 left after blocking a 22-yard field goal attempt by Kyle Bronson. But USF cornerback Mike Jenkins intercepted a pass from Mike Teel, who replaced a shaken-up Hart. USF corner Trae Williams intercepted another Rutgers pass on the Scarlet Knights' final possession of the game before the Bulls kneeled down for three plays to end the game.

The Bulls took control late in the opening quarter when Johnnie Jones picked off Hart and returned the interception 32 yards to make it 14-0. USF needed just 86 seconds to go up by three scores. This time, Hart fumbled after being hit by defensive end Jason Allen. Terrence Royal scooped up the ball and returned it 11 yards for a touchdown.

Royal also set up a later 2-yard touchdown run by Hall by picking off a tipped pass from Hart.

USF quarterback Pat Julmiste was 13-for-21 for 135 yards and ran for a 1-yard score. Hall's 35 carries were a career-high and he also eclipsed the 2,000-yard career rushing mark in his 18th game at USF. Additionally, he became the school's all-time leader in total touchdowns with 23 and he tied for the career lead (with Marquet Blackwell) in rushing TDs with 20.

The Bulls looked rested when the game began. After forcing the Scarlet Knights to go three and out on the game's first drive, USF went 83 yards in 10 plays, taking a 7-0 lead when Hall went in from 2 yards out.

The two defensive scores then put South Florida up 21-0. The Bulls defense forced a total of six turnovers with four interceptions and two fumble recoveries.

Running back Andre Hall rushed for 222 yards and three touchdowns, and USF beat Syracuse 27-0 Saturday to remain in the hunt for a BCS bowl bid. It was the seventh straight loss for Syracuse.

The first play of the game from scrimmage set the tone for the day. Hall, who had 24 carries, weaved his way up the middle of the Syracuse defense for 38 yards, breaking two tackles and causing two more defenders to miss. The Orange defense then stiffened, and Kyle Bronson kicked a 29-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead.

Joe Fields, making his second straight start at quarterback for Syracuse, was intercepted on his first pass of the game by Johnnie Jones near midfield, and the Bulls quickly struck again.

Pat Julmiste rolled right on the next play and hit Marcus Edwards in stride and between two defenders for 48 yards to set up Hall's 4-yard scoring run, which gave the Bulls a 10-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

Syracuse, 114th in total offense of the 117 teams in Division I-A, lived down to its woeful statistics. The Orange punted four times and threw two interceptions on their first six possessions, gaining just one first down in the opening quarter.

The Orange seemed poised to break through in the second after a punt and two penalties pinned the Bulls at their own 7. That all changed when Hall broke a 34-yard run on a second-and-24 play and tacked on runs of 22 and 10 yards to help set up Bronson's 22-yard field goal, giving USF a 13-0 halftime lead.

Hall reeled off a 38-yard run early in the third period to become USF's all-time leading rusher, surpassing Rafael Williams' five-year-old record of 2,253 yards. Hall, a junior college transfer, has 2,345 yards in his brief career.

Hall scored on a 33-yard run midway through the third. It was his 13th touchdown of the season, a school record, and he added another on a 1-yard run with 4:22 remaining in the game to cap an 11-play, 80-yard drive.

Surprising USF remained in contention for a BCS bowl berth Saturday, pulling away in the second half to beat Cincinnati 31-16 for the Bulls' third straight Big East win.

Conference rushing leader Andre Hall went over 1,000 yards for the season and scored his 15th touchdown, and USF (6-3, 4-1) forced two third-quarter turnovers to transform a close game into a rout.

In addition to becoming bowl eligible with its sixth victory, USF stayed on course for a possible showdown with No. 13 West Virginia for the Big East's automatic spot in the lucrative Bowl Championship Series.

If the Bulls win at Connecticut next Saturday and defeat West Virginia at home on Dec. 3, USF would be assured of at least a tie for the conference title and represent the league in the BCS.

D'Juan Brown returned an interception 26 yards for a TD that made it 17-7 midway through the third quarter. Four minutes later, Cincinnati quarterback Dustin Grutza fumbled at his own 22 to leave the Bulls in position to take a commanding lead.

Receiver Amarri Jackson, the star of the 45-14 upset of Louisville that opened BCS possibilities for the Bulls in September, scored on the next play after mishandling a handoff on a reverse.

Jackson picked up the ball on the bounce and headed around right end before cutting back to the left and weaving his way through the Cincinnati defense for his third rushing TD of the season.

The 6-foot-5 sophomore ran for two touchdowns and threw for a third in USF's defeat of then-No. 9 Louisville.

A week after rushing for 222 yards and three TDs in a 27-0 shutout at Syracuse, Hall ran for 101 on 29 carries against Cincinnati (4-6, 2-4), which angered the running back last season by continuing to throw the ball late in a lopsided victory over the Bulls.

Hall expressed his dislike for the Bearcats in pregame interviews and said he'd liked to run up the score if USF got a chance Saturday.

It didn't happen. Pat Julmiste put USF up 31-7 with a 1-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter, but Bulls couldn't get into the end zone again.

Grutza completed 19 of 30 passes for 240 yards for Cincinnati, including TD throws of 25 yards to Dominick Goodman and 6 yards to Butler Benton. The Bearcats outgained the Bulls 366 yards to 345.
