The University of South Florida is one of Florida's top three public research universities. Established in 1956, it is operated under the laws of the state of Florida and governed by the Florida Board of Governors and the USF Board of Trustees. USF provides undergraduate and graduate students with opportunities to participate in research and to seek solutions to local, national and global problems.

USF is committed to providing students with high quality-learning opportunities, building community and business partnerships, and research for discovery and innovation. Successes in these endeavors led to dual designations for USF by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching as a Very-High Research and a Community-Engaged university.

USF serves more than 45,000 students on campuses in Tampa, St. Petersburg, Sarasota-Manatee, and Lakeland. It is focused on these strategic priorities:

- Student Success
- Research and Innovation
- Community Engagement
- Global Literacy and Impact
- Integrated, Interdisciplinary Inquiry



# A Leader In Research

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has placed USF in its highest classification level, which is "Research University with Very High Research Activity." Of the 4,321 colleges and universities classified, USF is one of only 63 public universities in the highest tier. Inclusion at this level affirms USF's position among the top research universities in the nation. USF was awarded more than \$300 million in research contracts and grants last year

USF is one of 76 universities in the nation designated by The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching as being most engaged with their communities and one of only 10 public research universities across the country designated as "very high research" and "community-engaged." USF is the only Florida university – public or private – to receive this classification.

At the center of the Tampa Bay region's medical, biotechnology and bioscience research, USF has become a major player in the highly competitive research arena. USF's internationally renowned researchers are making radical breakthroughs in marine science, medicine, engineering and social research. Work in counter-terrorism and biological defense, optical sensors, immunology, Alzheimer's and other neurological disorders, aging studies, laser technology and alternative fuels has gained national and international recognition.

The university is a leader in establishing public/private partnerships for the mutual exchange of resources and talent for research and development. USF is one of the anchors of the 21-county Florida High Technology Corridor that runs from the Atlantic coast to the Gulf of Mexico along Interstate 4. This innovative partnership is just one important initiative that links business and education in the Tampa Bay region, providing the muscle to grow high-tech industry here locally and ensuring a qualified and competitive workforce for the future.

The University's master-planned Research and Development Park, on the Tampa campus, links USF facilities to high-tech research firms, devoting 1.2 million square feet of space to offices, research and development activities. A hotel on the property has 1,400 square feet of conference and meeting facilities, opening new opportunities for conferences and collaborative activities.

# The Athletic Training Center

In May 2004, the USF athletic family moved into a sparkling new \$15 million facility that provides student-athletes with an outstanding environment for improving the mind and body, with impressive space for academic counseling, sports medicine and strength and conditioning, in addition to a home for the athletic department staff.

The building sits on the eastern end of campus and gives an impressive view for those entering campus on Bull Run. The facility is 104,000 square feet and brings the vast majority of the athletic department under one roof.

With the exception of men's and women's basketball, volleyball and men's and women's golf, the remainder of the 13 athletic teams call the new facility home. The basketball teams remain in the on-campus Sun Dome, where volleyball also takes up residence in its home - The Corral. The golf teams remain housed at the on-campus USF Golf Course, The Claw.

The facility includes a 10,000-square foot strength and conditioning center with state-of-the-art medical and strength equipment. It also has an ultra-impressive Academic Enrichment Center that covers one-fourth of the upper floor in the two-story complex. The AEC includes a computer study lab, a separate study lounge, a library and office space for counselors and tutors.

The Sports Medicine Clinic is also housed in the new Athletic Training Center. Opened in May of 2004, the 5,400 square foot clinic is designed with the health care of every student-athlete in mind. It features brand new modalities and rehab equipment, as well as three Hydroworx series pools. The Hydroworx 1000 is equipped with an underwater treadmill, three current jets, an underwater camera monitoring system and a computer control console. These pools are state-of-the-art and will allow the student-athletes an extra tool to return to play quickly and safely.

The Academic Enrichment Center is designed to provide the academic support and the learning environment so that each student-athlete has the opportunity to reach his or her goals. It is the home of comprehensive services including advising, tutoring, and counseling, available to all USF student-athletes.

# Academic Services

## » Academic Enrichment Program

The Academic Enrichment Program at the University of South Florida is designed to be a full-service program with the goal of providing the support and services necessary to enhance the total development of the USF student-athlete. The program is focused on the unique needs and demands of student-athletes at USF and fosters the cultivation of skills that allow for the development of potential in the classroom, on the field and for the future.

The Academic Enrichment Program provides a variety of support mechanisms for all student-athletes by way of specific events and activities designed to promote academic success, athletic success, community service, career development and personal development. The theories and tenants mirror those promoted through the NCAA CHAMPS/LifeSkills model, but are designed especially for the identified needs and challenges of our student-athlete body.

Because we are committed to academic success and to providing the appropriate level of support for all our student-athletes, the academic component of our Enrichment Program is vital. Focus is placed on identifying and meeting the needs and challenges faced by our student-athletes through assistance programs, workshops, tutoring and mentorship made available throughout the academic year. Emphasis is placed on encouraging student-athletes to take responsibility for their academic careers and to be productive and successful members of the USF academic community.

All first-year students are afforded the opportunity to participate in the EXCEL program designed to assist all newcomers with the transition to the university and to help students adjust to the rigor of the USF academic program. Components of the program include weekly meetings with an EXCEL counselor, objective-based study hall, tutoring and ongoing academic advising.



## « Making Strides

The USF men's soccer team had 15 players earn a 3.0 or higher last year, including two (Francisco Aristeguieta and Zak Boggs) that earned a 4.0 gpa. Sophomore forward Andre Mitto (pictured) was named to the BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll for the week of October 1 last season. Mitto is a successful student as well as an accomplished soccer player. Mitto represented the U.S. U-20 National Team in the Spring of 2008.

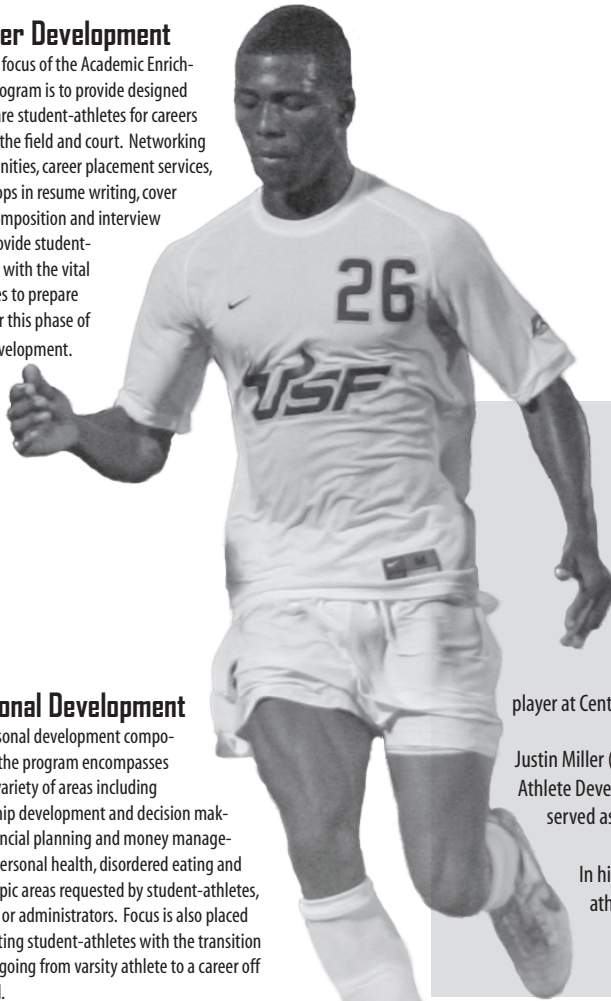


The USF Academic Enrichment Center (pictured above) opened in May of 2004 and has seen continued use from USF student-athletes, taking advantage of the outstanding Academic Enrichment Program provided to meet the needs and goals of our diverse student-athlete population. The center includes a computer lab, a large study lounge, individual tutor rooms, a distance learning lab and eight staff offices. Student-athletes have accessibility to the Academic Enrichment Center and the excellent staff throughout the entire year.



### Career Development

A major focus of the Academic Enrichment program is to provide designed to prepare student-athletes for careers beyond the field and court. Networking opportunities, career placement services, workshops in resume writing, cover letter composition and interview skills provide student-athletes with the vital resources to prepare them for this phase of their development.

One of the challenges for student-athletes is juggling the pressures of school, a social life and being an athlete. The good news for USF athletes is that they have access to an academic support team with individuals that can speak from experience about balancing those pressures and suggest paths to success.

Associate Athletics Director/SWA Amy Haworth (above left), who oversees the Academic Services Department and reports to the University Department of Student Life, was a Division I volleyball player at Central Florida. Her husband was a Division I football player.

Justin Miller (above right) is in his second year as the Assistant Athletics Director for Academics & Student-Athlete Development at the University of South Florida. Justin has been at USF since 2005, where he previously served as the Coordinator of Student-Athlete Development before being named Assistant Athletics Director.

In his current role, Justin is responsible for overseeing the academic support services for USF's student-athletes, as well as the day-to-day operations of the Academic Enrichment Center (AEC).

### Personal Development

The personal development component of the program encompasses a wide variety of areas including leadership development and decision making, financial planning and money management, personal health, disordered eating and other topic areas requested by student-athletes, coaches or administrators. Focus is also placed on assisting student-athletes with the transition process going from varsity athlete to a career off the field.



### «« Community Service

The Academic Enrichment Program serves to coordinate all of the efforts by our student-athletes and coaches as well as the SAAC organization in the area of community service. Organized, coordinated efforts in community service afford student-athletes safe, constructive and manageable opportunities to work within the greater Tampa area in providing services to hospitals, youth organizations and reading programs in local elementary schools. Service learning is an important component of the Academic Enrichment Program.

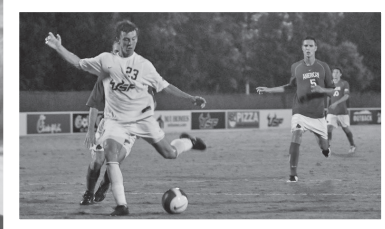

# BIG EAST Conference

Connecticut was one of seven BIG EAST teams to make the NCAA Tournament in 2007. Seven teams was the most by any conference in the country.



The BIG EAST is the largest conference in the country, with 16 teams currently competing in men's soccer.



USF defeated Georgetown in the first round of the BIG EAST Tournament by a score of 4-0.



Six BIG EAST teams were ranked in the final NSCAA/adidas national rankings for the 2007-2008 season, including USF at No. 23.



In one of the most highly competitive matches of the season, USF defeated Cincinnati 3-2 in 2 OT. The Bearcats were ranked No. 20 entering the match with the Bulls.



Three BIG EAST teams made it to the third round of the NCAA Tournament last season, USF, Connecticut, and Notre Dame.



USF is 10-3-2 all-time against BIG EAST rival West Virginia. The latest victory came in 2007, in 2 OT by a score 1-0.



Ten of the 16 teams in the BIG EAST Conference were either ranked or received votes in the NSCAA/adidas national rankings at some point during the season.

# BIG EAST Conference



## Unprecedented Competition

The 2008 season will be full of tough tests for teams competing in the BIG EAST Conference. Each of the 16 teams in the conference are expected to be very competitive throughout the season.

Last season, six BIG EAST teams were ranked in the final NSCAA/adidas national rankings for the 2007-2008 season, including USF at No. 23. Also, 10 of the 16 teams in the BIG EAST Conference were either ranked or received votes in the NSCAA/adidas national rankings at some point during the season.

USF will face 12 BIG EAST teams next season including Notre Dame, West Virginia, Louisville and DePaul, all of which received votes in last season's final NSCAA/adidas National Rankings.



# President Judy Genshaft



Appointed president of the University of South Florida in July 2000, Judy Genshaft has begun her ninth year as the top executive of the nation's ninth largest public university.

During President Genshaft's tenure, USF has risen rapidly into the ranks of America's top research universities. USF is one of only 63 public research universities in the country named by The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching to its highest tier of research productivity. It is the only Florida university designated by the Carnegie Foundation as "most engaged" — and one of only ten public research universities nationwide that hold the dual designation of "very high research" and "community engaged."

USF has been experiencing record-breaking years for research funding — more than \$300 million in research contracts and grants in 2007. The National Science Foundation survey of federally financed research and development expenditures at universities and colleges ranks USF the second highest in Florida.

Under Genshaft's leadership, USF has been making remarkable breakthroughs in medicine, biotechnology, engineering, the environment and other fields with positive impact on lives around the world. She led a successful effort to secure funding for USF's first Florida Center of Excellence. The university received top ranking of all proposals and was awarded \$8 million to create a center for biomolecular identification and targeted therapeutics. In addition, Genshaft established a bioscience research park, which serves as a hub for the integration of research and entrepreneurship for the Tampa Bay region.

One of Genshaft's top priorities has been integrating USF's research and educational missions. Initiatives such as the Undergraduate Research Experience and Undergraduate Research Symposium provide powerful learning experiences.

On a national level, Genshaft serves as vice chair of the American Council on Education and on the Big East Executive Board. She is chair of the Greater Tampa Chamber of Commerce and previously was chair of the Tampa Bay Partnership. She is a member of the Florida High-Tech Corridor Council and the Florida Council of 100. In 2007, Genshaft was named Tampa Bay Business Journal Business Woman of the Year.

Prior to joining USF, Genshaft served as provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University at Albany, State University of New York and in various positions during a 16-year tenure at The Ohio State University. She holds a bachelor's degree in social work and psychology from the University of Wisconsin at Madison and a master's degree in school counseling and a doctorate in counseling psychology from Kent State University.

## President Genshaft

President Judy Genshaft, who was named Tampa Bay's Business Woman of the Year by the *Tampa Bay Business Journal*, was appointed president of the University of South Florida in July 2000.

During Dr. Genshaft's presidency, USF has been nationally recognized as a top-tier national research university, and it is on track to be among the top public research universities in the nation. With campuses in Tampa, St. Petersburg, Sarasota-Manatee and Lakeland, USF serves more than 44,000 students in more than 200 degree programs on the undergraduate, masters, specialist and doctoral levels, including the doctor of medicine.

President Genshaft led the development and implementation of a five-year strategic plan that focuses USF resources on strategic priorities. Under her leadership, USF continues to be recognized as a powerful magnet for research, federal grants and economic development.

# Doug Woolard

## Director of Athletics

When University of South Florida Director of Athletics Doug Woolard was named to his current position at the Tampa school in May 2004, he brought with him an already impressive administrative resume in intercollegiate athletics that was highly respected nationwide. So it is no surprise to anyone across the country that Woolard has continued to build upon that resume and has positioned USF as one of the premier athletics departments in the prestigious BIG EAST Conference.

In four years at USF, Woolard has inspired and led a number of initiatives that have allowed the Bulls' program to make a successful transition into BIG EAST.

Although USF had already accepted a bid to join the BIG EAST when Woolard assumed command, his tireless work to set a strong foundation at the outset has not gone unnoticed.

The BIG EAST places the Bulls in an elite neighborhood of programs, but Woolard set a goal upon his hiring to make USF one of the best programs in the conference. To do that, he has stressed the importance of a strong partnership between staff, student-athletes and community.

Woolard has led a successful effort to earmark a new "athletics footprint" on campus that will allow the program to initiate efforts to build new facilities in a core area on campus. As the fundraising hits its peak, USF will improve facilities for baseball, basketball, softball, soccer, tennis and track and field.

That fact couldn't be more evident than over the past two years. During that span, Woolard was a major factor in helping to secure nearly \$3 million in funds from Hillsborough County which will renovate USF's soccer and track and field facility and stadium. The renovations, which are tentatively scheduled to end in September 2008, include the construction of a new eight-lane, 400-meter track that is built to IAAF specifications and utilizes a new Mondo track surface, the same surface that will be used in Beijing for the 2008 Summer Olympics. USF is just the fourth school nationwide to install the surface and the first in the State of Florida. The track will also have new and improved high jump, discus, hammer and shot put areas along with runways and pits for the long and triple jump, javelin and pole vault. A new state-of-the-art scoreboard will also be installed.

In addition, Woolard helped to solidify a \$3 million lead-gift for the Pamela and Leslie Muma Basketball Practice Facility. The new state-of-the-art facility will feature multiple basketball practice courts, new locker rooms, offices and lounges, along with video and meeting rooms.

Already, USF has added nearly \$2 million in video scoreboards to the Sun Dome, USF's basketball arena, and Woolard has a progressive plan to re-fit the entire seating configuration in the arena.

Woolard has also been proactive in retaining successful coaches, having negotiated new contracts with Jim Leavitt (football), Ken Eriksen (softball), Jose Fernandez (women's basketball) and George Kiefer (men's soccer). Leavitt, who in 2008 received a new seven-year contract extension through the 2014-15 academic year, remains the only football coach USF has ever had and led the program to three straight bowl games – the Meineke Car Care Bowl (2005), the Papajohns.com Bowl (2006) and the Brut Sun Bowl (2007) – in the program's first 11 years of existence. Eriksen has annually led his softball program into postseason competition and was an assistant coach for the 2004 USA Olympic Team. During the 2008 season, he led his softball team to the schools first-ever BIG EAST Conference regular season title and he was named the league's coach of the Year. Fernandez has led the women's basketball program to postseason play in each of the past five years – including the 2006 NCAA Tournament – the only such appearances in the program's history. Kiefer, the 2005 National Soccer Coaches Association of America South Region Coach of the Year, has turned the USF soccer program into one of the most competitive in the country taking the Bulls to two NCAA Tournaments in his six seasons, including a Sweet 16 appearance in 2007.

Woolard has also gone out and secured high-profile head coaches such as Stan Heath, to lead the men's basketball program, who came to USF after leading the University of Arkansas for five years and helping the Razorbacks to a pair of NCAA Tournaments. Woolard also hired Tampa native Lelo Prado as the schools baseball coach after Prado led the University of Louisville for 11 seasons and helped the Cardinals to their first-ever NCAA Tournament in 2002. That same year he was tabbed Coach of the Year by both Conference USA and USA Baseball. In addition, Woolard hired Denise Schilte-Brown, one of the top up and coming women's soccer coaches in America, who previously held the same position at Virginia Commonwealth University, leading the Rams to two NCAA College Cups in 2004 and 2005 before coming to USF. Woolard also hired Agustin Moreno as the schools women's tennis coach. Moreno has guided the Bulls to three consecutive BIG EAST Conference Championship matches – winning the title in 2007 – and to three-straight NCAA Championship appearances. Moreno was also named the BIG EAST Conference Coach of the Year, also in 2007.

Expanded television and radio coverage for USF programs has also been a key initiative for Woolard. In 2005, he helped complete an agreement that allows for the most electronic media exposure in school history. In addition to USF's football and men's basketball programs upgrading to more powerful stations, every USF women's basketball and baseball game is now being aired on the radio for the first time ever. Opportunities will also exist for USF's softball and volleyball programs. There is also more television exposure through re-broadcast opportunities for all of USF's athletic teams on Bright House Networks in Tampa Bay. In addition to USF's current radio network for football, Woolard next plans on securing the program's first-ever Hispanic radio agreement.

In 2007 the USF Department of Athletics entered into a ten year multimedia contract with ISP Sports, the country's leader in the college sports marketing industry. The deal, worth a minimum of \$22 million strategically aligns both ISP Sports and ESPN Regional Television as USF's multimedia rights holders.

As someone who is extremely proud of his involvement and commitment to the local community, Woolard took the "bull by the horns" and successfully oversaw the University's involvement as host of first and second rounds of the 2008 NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament and then the 2008 NCAA Women's Final Four which were both held at the St. Pete Times Forum in downtown Tampa. This marked the first time in the 28-year history of the Women's Final Four that the host school – or city – also hosted the men's first and second rounds.

In 2004 – his first year at USF and the Bulls' final season in Conference USA – Woolard helped build momentum heading into the program's initiation into the BIG EAST. The women's track, golf and softball teams earned NCAA bids and the women's basketball team had its finest season ever and played in a second-straight postseason tournament. Men's basketball built strong momentum at the end of the year with upset wins over Charlotte, Houston and Cincinnati en route to the semifinals of the Conference USA Tournament.

All of this has not been achieved without continued emphasis on academics. Woolard has taken a personal involvement in building resources that will allow USF to maintain its early success in the NCAA's new APR (Academic Progress Rate) rankings. Woolard has hired Amy Haworth to oversee the Academic Services area and their professional backgrounds provide USF student-athletes with a wealth of support. Additionally, Woolard has hired the first-ever full-time Champs/Life Skills Director at USF.

Woolard's contributions extend to the community, where he has worked hard to build on existing relationships while opening the door for new ones as well.

Woolard's leadership role is one he is fit to assume and one in which he has experience. In October 1994, he assumed leadership of the Saint Louis University Department of Athletics as its Director and guided the program through a historic period that included the school's inclusion as a founding member of Conference USA, and more recently its acceptance of membership in the Atlantic 10 Conference.

While overseeing a department that was progressive in its competitive success, Woolard also proved to be a large asset in a community that like Tampa Bay, presents the challenge of finding a niche with professional football, baseball and hockey in the market.

The Saint Louis men's basketball team has consistently ranked among the top 30 in the nation in annual attendance during Woolard's decade at the helm. Three times, the program was among the nation's top 10, peaking with an average attendance of 17,708. Further, the men's soccer program at Saint Louis is consistently in the nation's top 10 in attendance by averaging over 2,800 fans a game in a stadium that was constructed for the men and women's teams under Woolard's watch.

Further enhancing the community partnership, Woolard has remained committed to bringing all Billiken athletic events back on campus. In addition to constructing a new soccer stadium, Saint Louis has added a new softball facility and nine new tennis courts on campus. Woolard also began fundraising efforts – before coming to USF – on Chaifetz Arena, a \$70 million on-campus multi-purpose facility that is the home for Saint Louis men's and women's basketball teams. The facility opened in April 2008.

Woolard also oversaw the Saint Louis athletics department as it made considerable advances outside the athletic arena. Under his tutelage, and while the Billikens were in Conference USA, Saint Louis student-athletes recorded the highest grade point average in the league.

While maintaining an outstanding department at Saint Louis, Woolard has also become a prominent figure on national committees. Presently he is a member of the NCAA Sports Wagering Task Force, which has been charged with recommending strategies to counteract sports wagering by student-athletes. He is a past chair of the Conference USA directors of athletics committee and he also served as the league's representative on the NCAA Academic/Eligibility/Compliance (AEC) Cabinet, where he chaired the amateurism and agents subcommittee. Woolard has also served as C-USA's alternate to the NCAA Management Council, the most powerful committee in the NCAA governance structure.

Prior to joining Saint Louis, Woolard worked for the nationally respected Jim Livengood at Washington State University. Under Livengood, who is now the Director of Athletics at Arizona and a past chair of the NCAA Men's Basketball Committee, Woolard was the associate director for external operations from 1989-94 after one year (1988-89) as an assistant director of athletics.

While at Washington State, Woolard was a key member of the senior management staff that oversaw a successful football program, and he played a prominent role in the entire department's relationship with the community.

Woolard and his wife, Cherrie, have two children, Chris and Amy.

## Men's Soccer Sport Administrator

Senior Associate Athletics Director /Sports & Programs

An employee in the USF Department of Athletics since 1983, Barry Clements was promoted to his current position as Senior Associate Athletic Director for Sports and Program Services in 2007. Clements provides oversight to eight sports at USF including men's basketball, women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, women's soccer, women's indoor track and, men's and women's outdoor track. Additionally, Clements administratively oversees the Equipment Area, the Sports Medicine Department, the Strength and Conditioning Department and the Video Area.

Clements was extremely involved in the overall building of USF's athletic training center, specifically overseeing the equipment, sports medicine and strength and conditioning areas. Arguably, however, one of the biggest accomplishments that Clements was involved in was USF securing \$2.79 million to build a new track and field complex adjacent to the current track. The new facility will allow Hillsborough County to host a variety of events such as the World Disability Games, the Adult International Disability Games, Special Olympics, Florida State High School Track and Field Championships, and other events offered through the Hillsborough County Parks, Recreation and Conservation Department. The facility will also host National Collegiate Athletic Association regional meets and serve the needs of USF students through physical education classes, intramural sports activities, and campus recreation.

Clements won the 1993 Florida Athletic Trainer of the Year Award, and was also the 1992 winner in the college and professional sports division. In 2003, Clements was inducted into the Athletic Trainers Association of Florida Hall of Fame. Most recently, Clements was named the 2006 Outstanding Associate Director of Athletics by the All-American Football Foundation. He has been a lecturer on sports medicine, including tours of Sweden, Finland and Russia. In 1994, he became the first American trainer to work the European Championships. Clements has served on various USF committees and is currently on the Sun Dome Inc. Board. He also serves on a host of committees outside of USF, including the NCAA Division I Women's Soccer Committee, of which he was recently named Chair for the 2008-09 academic year, the BIG EAST Golf Committee, and was selected to be a peer reviewer for the NCAA Athletics Certification Program. Clements was also a previous administrator for the National Youth Sports Program.

Clements, 47, graduated from Ball State, where he was named an Outstanding Young Alumnus in 1994, and has a master's degree from Kent State. Clements is a native of Richmond, Ind. He and his wife, Melissa, reside in Temple Terrace with their daughter, Nicole (12).

Chris Freet was hired as the Assistant Athletics Director for Communications at the University of South Florida in August of 2007.

Since his arrival, Freet has taken over duties as the contact for the nationally-ranked football program and overseen a full-time staff of six individuals and a student contingent of 10.

The USF football program has received regular national media coverage, both in print and online, since his arrival and has reeled in an unprecedented amount of national honors. In 2007, USF went from have zero Division I All-Americans to three and one honorable mention award. Defensive end George Selvie earned NCAA consensus All-America honors after a sophomore season in which he led the country in tackles for loss and ranked second in sacks. Cornerback Mike Jenkins also pulled in first team All-America honors, while linebacker Ben Moffitt was named a third team All-American and Trae Williams was an honorable mention award winner.

Freet came to USF after five years with the nationally -recognized Athletics Media Relations Department at the University of Oklahoma.

In his most recent position with OU as Associate Director of Media Relations, Freet handled secondary duties with the Sooner football team and served as the primary contact for women's basketball.

In previous years, he also served as the contact for the softball, volleyball and men's and women's gymnastics programs.

The Mission Hills, California native oversaw the successful promotion of Courtney Paris to 2007 AP Player of the Year, while also playing an integral part in the successful promotion of Heisman trophy winner Jason White and All-Americans Adrian Peterson, Mark Clayton and Jammal Brown.

The 28-year-old resides in South Tampa and graduated from the UC Santa Barbara in 2002 with a degree in communications and minor in sports management.

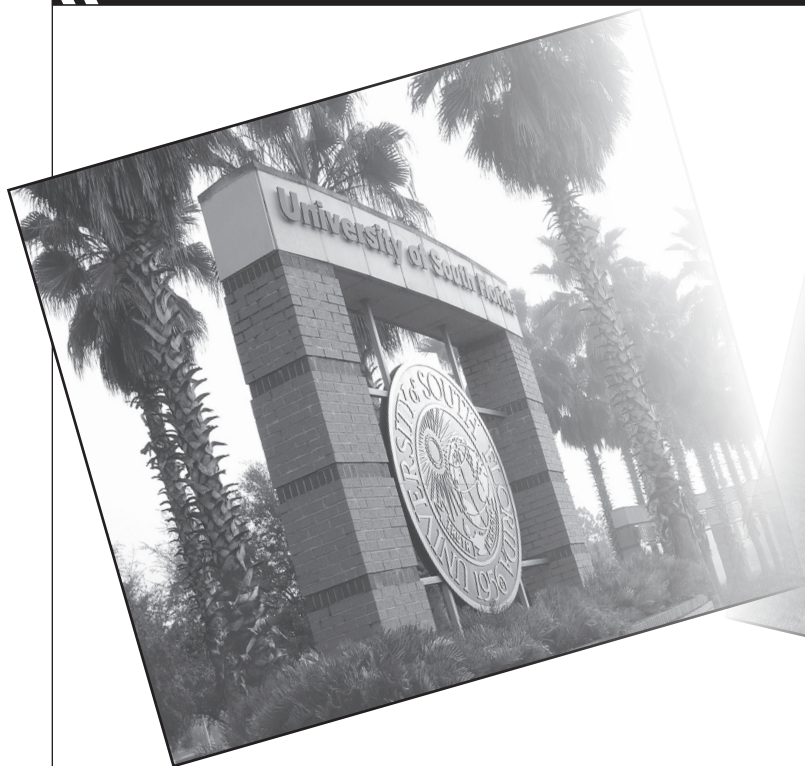

It is easiest to travel past the main entrance to the university, turning left onto Bull Run at the next traffic light (you will see the Museum of Science & Industry- MOSI- on the right). Passing the Sun Dome (on the left) and Red McEwen Field (on the right), you will see the USF Athletics Building at the intersection of Elm St. and Bull Run. Turn left on Elm St. which leads into the Visitor Parking Lot. The USF Soccer Stadium will be located to the north of the Visitor Parking Lot.

## From I-75

Follow Fowler Avenue west for two miles. Turn right onto Bull Run at the Sun Dome marquee. Passing the Sun Dome (on the left) and Red McEwen Field (on the right), you will see the USF Athletics Building at the intersection of Elm St. and Bull Run. Turn left on Elm St. which leads into the Visitor Parking Lot. The USF Soccer Stadium will be located to the north of the Visitor Parking Lot.

## What is the Bulls Club?

The Bulls Club is charged with advancing the USF Athletics program through private philanthropic support. As we enter our fourth year of BIG EAST competition, the Bulls Club is larger and stronger than ever, and its members have been the backbone of the program's incredible growth. These fans, friends and alumni provide the needed resources so our student-athletes and coaches can write the next chapter in Bulls history.

As investors in one of the fastest growing intercollegiate athletic programs in the country, donors are recognized for their critical role in advancing USF athletics and receive special consideration for priority seating and parking at USF competitions, invitations to special events and other benefits. The levels of support from fans, friends and alumni have continued to increase as the level of competition USF faces on the field becomes more challenging.

The Bulls Club has annual, capital and endowment giving goals. Annual giving, defined as annually-repeatable gifts for operating support, seeks both to "build the base out" by increasing the numbers of Bulls Club donors and to "build the base up" by growing levels of investment by existing donors. To that end, the Iron Bulls program was established for donors who make an extraordinary annual commitment to the green and gold. Iron Bulls make unrestricted annual gifts of at least \$10,000 and are recognized as leaders, helping USF compete for championships at the highest levels.

The primary capital and endowment goals for the Bulls Club over the next five years will focus on the Athletics District Master Plan and growing the scholarship endowment. # Question and Answer With Coach Kiefer

## Question: What is your outlook for the 2008 Season?

**Answer:** It is tough to come up with an outlook, but I think we are going to look at things one day at a time. The returning group we have, along with our news guys, I think we will be a team that is hard working and will fight for USF.

## Question: How much have you seen this program grow since you have been here, and what do you think is the major reason for that success?

**Answer:** Well first, I was lucky that I came into a program which had a good base. It had a good tradition and was a strong program prior to me taking it over. There was a foundation in place. On my end, the move to the BIG EAST, which I believe is the strongest soccer conference in the country, is a huge benefit. Also having an athletic director (Doug Woolard) from St. Louis for over ten years, which is committed to men's soccer and the many other factors such as the support that we receive, and the better conference, I think this program has really benefitted from it.

## Question: Why would a high school soccer player want to play soccer for USF?

**Answer:** I should say why wouldn't they? In my mind, there is no reason any player should want to go to any other school. If we get a student on our campus and with the academic support we have, and competing in the BIG EAST and the way this program is run, it's the best place to play college soccer in the country.

## Question: What type of players does USF like to recruit? What qualities do they possess and why?

**Answer:** The thing I have learned is the character of the player is the coaches buzzword, but its more than a buzzword that we really dig into. They are students first and we look at how they are academically and if they are committed to doing well in the classroom. Then we look at the soccer aspect. We play a very attractive style, which requires players to have very good technique. Also, I feel if a student is athletic overall, we take that in to consideration because we are a very athletic team. When we put all those qualities together, I feel we have a USF player.

## Question: What goals do you as a team and as a coach have for the 2008 season?

**Answer:** The biggest personal goal we have for our team is trying to get this group to help each other out and work for each other. We want to build a team that builds great friendships. Once that is established and we start wanting to fight for each other, then all the other things will take care of themselves.

## Question: Talk a little about your captains, how important are they to USF's success this season?

**Answer:** To me the captains are a huge part of the whole picture of success. Yohance Marshall has been a captain since the spring of his freshman year and he possesses great leadership qualities, while being one of the top players on the team. Captains to me are extensions

of the coaching staff. They can come into my office shut the door and are willing to tell me things that they may think I may not be comfortable hearing. Yohance has the ability to do that as well as the other captain, Francisco Aristeguieta. Francisco is a perfect 4.0 student, who does very well in the classroom and I can always look out my window and see him doing extra work on the field. The bulk of the guys personify what we are about as a program and both guys are key factors going into this season.

## Question: This year's incoming recruiting class was once again ranked one of the top classes in the country coming in at No. 13. What are your expectations for the incoming players?

**Answer:** First, I don't understand how they can rank recruiting classes, but the fact they ranked us at No. 13, I was shocked by that because we really do not have many high profile players. At the same time, I feel as good about this recruiting class as I ever have about any previous class at USF. These are a bunch of guys who are hard working, good players that have fallen under the radar a little bit. I have high expectations for anyone who we recruit at USF, because I don't recruit players just to fill the roster spots. Since we are restricted in the amount of spots, every piece is very important. Every recruit has to earn that roster spot.

## Question: Which player do you see having a breakout year this year and why?

**Answer:** One player that I think will have a breakout season will be Zack Boggs. He was a two time transfer who had to sit out a year because of transfer rules. I think he's a player you will see who is determined to have great year. I think there are a number of guys who will also have a great year. Yohance has set very high goals for himself this year and so has Kevon Neaves, who could have graduated and gone pro but decided to stay here to help the program. When you start to do things like that, getting everyone involved and not thinking about what is best for yourself, typically you're doing things for the right reason and those three guys will have great years.

## Question: Talk about this year's seniors and what they have accomplished in their careers?

**Answers:** First, the amount of seniors that will be graduating early in the fall is untypical for any student athlete. Academically, they have put forth the effort and it shows that in the classroom they have been very committed throughout their careers. Athletically, they have been to the NCAA tournament two out of the three years since they have been here. They are committed to the program and committed to succeeding. I am very excited to work with this senior class.



# Question and Answer With Coach Kiefer

**Question: The team is coming off a great year in the classroom, as well, with a team cumulative GPA over a 3.0 and 14 players being named to the 2007-08 BIG EAST All-Academic Team. What do you attribute this success to?**

**Answer:** First, success is the combination of a player's commitment and their desire to succeed in everything they do in life. Right behind that is the academic support that USF has established for athletes and I would put our system up against any other academic support system in the country. Dr. Amy Haworth, Associate Director of Athletics of Student-Athlete Development, continues to run a great program. Taking that a step further with Justin Miller, who is in charge of men's soccer. I believe he is the best man in the country with these student athletes, knowing them and helping them achieve their academic goals. Combining all those factors together makes it easy for us to succeed in the classroom.

**Question: Talk about the new stadium and what it can do for the USF soccer program.**

**Answer:** The new stadium is the final piece towards building the best soccer program in the country. You look at student athletes who get so many demands put on them. They get pulled away from classes, which we try to minimize, and secondly, if a player is to get injured, how good is the medical team and the support staff behind that. I think our Sports Medicine area is first class. The strength and conditioning program and the facilities they have to make our athletes stronger, bigger, faster. And now to have a top of the line soccer specific stadium is that last piece. There are a lot of nice college soccer stadiums all together, but when we assemble the last pieces at our stadium, such as great weather and palm trees, that these will round out the final elements of our program.

**Question: What is the biggest strength of this year's team?**

**Answer:** I think our biggest strength is how well the group gets along with each other. They are very close to each other and have formed a tight knit group. This team is a group that has three years of good experience, including making it into the Sweet 16. We are fortunate to play great teams in the BIG EAST and then go out and play the top teams in the country. They have been in the trenches together, while experiencing different opponents. We are able to stay calm against all opponents. The game is just a problem we need to solve and we are looking to solve it together.

**Question: Talk about last year's success a little bit, and what can you do to improve upon that?**

**Answer:** Getting to the Sweet 16 was great for the program and you can always think back what you could have done, should have done and how this could have been handled. I don't like to spend too much time talking about the should've, could've, would've, but as far as the '08 season, I am looking forward for the first day of preseason and getting going with our season.

**Question: Talk a little about this year's schedule, and what expectations you have for this team this year?**

**Answer:** The schedule is for guys who want to play in competitive games. Again, competing in the BIG EAST is always a great, fun schedule. This year we face teams such as Notre Dame in Notre Dame, Indiana and FIU. There are a bunch of exciting games in this season's schedule and we are looking forward to it.

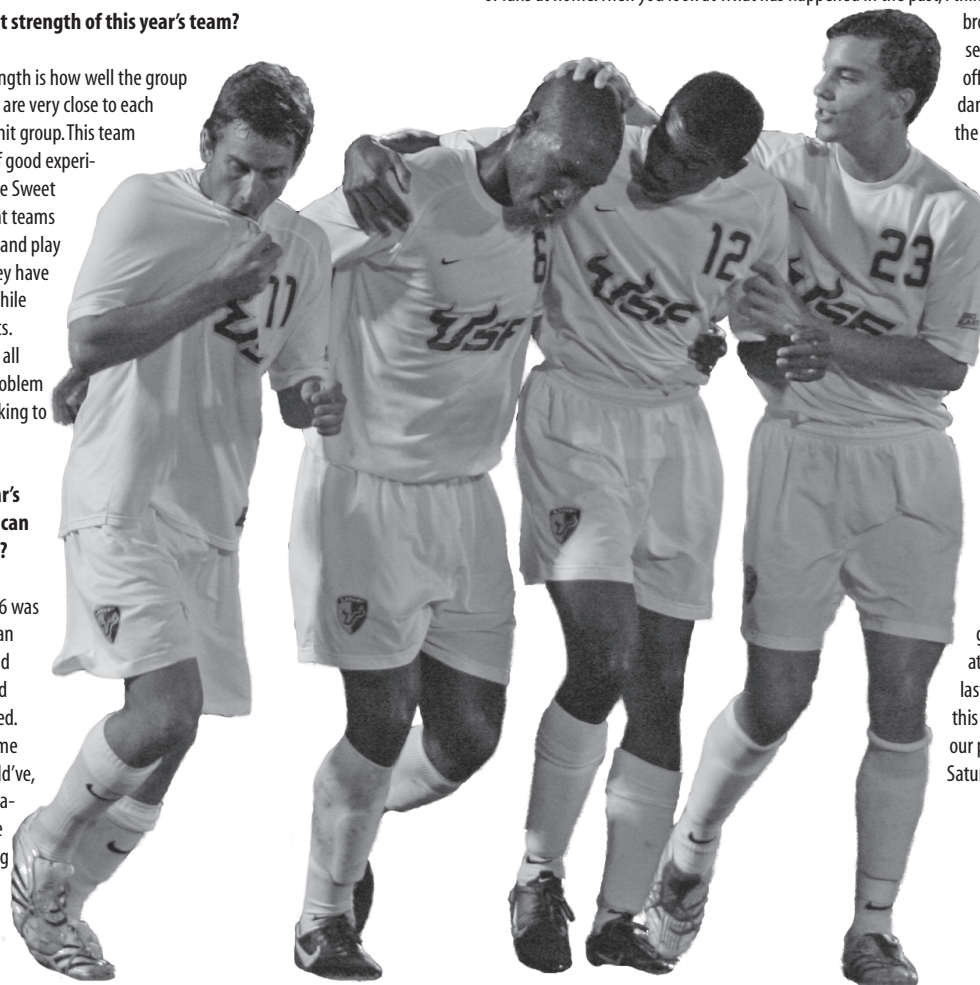
**Question: This is the second year in three seasons that the Bulls will be featured in a college game of the week on Fox Soccer Channel. What does this mean for the program?**

**Answer:** I think it speaks volumes to the program to get picked two of the three years, when they pick only about ten games in the year to broadcast. It says something about the program and where it is. Also, as far as the exposure that we receive, there is no way to really quantify that and how important it is. People all over the country will watch us play our attractive style and see the way we keep the ball and move the ball, I have no doubt it will excite them.

**Question: The last few seasons we have seen a rise in the attendance at home games, breaking the attendance record in each of the last three years. Tell me about the atmosphere at our soccer games and the impact it has on the team?**

**Answer:** Good players or any players want to play in front of a nice home crowd. Opposing teams also probably prefer to play in front of a lot of fans on the road rather than only a couple of fans at home. Then you look at what has happened in the past, I think it is great that we have

broken records. I feel this season we are going to take off when it comes to attendance and atmosphere. With the stadium renovations right now, Executive Associate Director of Athletics, Bill McGillis, his involvement and the show we are putting on outside the stadium, these are starts for another successful season. Now we have a director of soccer operations (Jim DiNobile), who is someone pushing to sell tickets for both men's and women's soccer is unique to a lot of programs. I feel great that we have broken attendance records the last three years and feel this will become the norm in our program for Friday and Saturday games.



# 2007 Review

## Bulls in the NCAA Sweet 16

The University of South Florida's men's soccer team finished their season in the Round of 16 in the NCAA Championships in 2007, falling to NCAA Championship Quarterfinalist, Connecticut. The Bulls set numerous school records along the way, posting the school's fourth-best all-time record with a total of 14 wins and a team-best two wins in the NCAA tournament. They also tied the school record for team shutouts in a season with nine.

## Bulls Receive Multiple Awards

Throughout the season, multiple members of the men's soccer team earned athletic and academic honors. Six Bulls earned weekly titles such as seven BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll awards, two Soccer America National Team of the Week accolades and a pair of College Soccer News Nationals Team of the Week honors. They were awarded to Diego Restrepo, Simon Schoendorf, Jordan Seabrook, Kevon Neaves, and Bernardo Anor. Five more Bulls were selected as part of the 2007 BIG EAST All-Conference Team as Kevon Neaves was a first team honoree, Simon Schoendorf, Yohance Marshall and Jordan Seabrook were second team players and Bernardo Anor was picked for the third team. Three Bulls were recognized on the 2007 National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Men's Division I All-Northeast Region Team. Schoendorf and Neaves were selected for first team and Yohance Marshall was a second team honoree.

## Senior Leadership Found in Simon Schoendorf

Senior, Simon Schoendorf (right), from Karlsruhe, Germany, led the Bulls with 27 points in 22 games last season. He tied the team-high record in goals scored with seven and was the team leader with 13 assists. In December, Schoendorf was tied for third in the country in assists per game with a .59 average. He earned a total of five midseason awards in 2007 and collected one Soccer News National Team of the Week awards and one Soccer America National Team of the Week honor. Head coach George Kiefer said, "Simon did a really great job leading the group. He was freshman all-conference player of the year, but then faced some unfortunate muscular injuries his sophomore and junior year. Luckily he stayed healthy because he took care of himself this last year. To have a senior getting the points he was able to get for us helps a lot. He did a good job for



## Andre Mitto Attends United States U-20 Soccer Training Camp

Freshman standout Andre Mitto, a native of Plantation, Fla., participated in the United States Under-20 National Soccer Team training camp in New Orleans, La. last February. He was one of 50 collegiate players in camp. The team played two games in a four-team event where Mitto started as a defender. "I am honored to be chosen to train with the best in the country," Mitto said. "It was a really good experience to have the opportunity to see old friends, meet the competition I play against during our season and compete with the best in the world." The team defeated DC Victoria 3-2, and tied the Honduras national team 0-0, but won the contest on penalty kicks, 4-2.

## The Bulls Earn NCAA Bid

The University of South Florida men's soccer team earned its 12th-career bid to the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Championship. The Bulls defeated Colgate in the first round 2-1 then beat Akron in Ohio 1-0. Junior Jordan Seabrook commented on hosting the first game at home. "Obviously we are happy to have a home game. That's a great thing for any program and that says a lot about how far we have come over the past few years."

# 2007 Review

## Strong Start for the Bulls

The Bulls had a solid start to the season with a 5-2 victory over UCF for their season-opening match. Juniors Kevon Neaves and Jordan Seabrook scored two goals each and freshman Tony Taylor scored his first goal of many in his Bulls career. Senior Simon Schoendorf contributed with two assists. The Bulls started a goal down, however, the team fought back in an intense match for the win. The group demonstrated maturity, heart and passion in their first match of the season. They out-shot the Knights 21-10.

## Men's Soccer Earns 3.17 GPA

The men's soccer team of the University of South Florida not only succeeded on the field, but off the field in the classroom, posting a 3.17 grade point average for the fall semester of 2007. Seventeen of the 25 members earned a 3.0 or higher and 13 of them had more than a 3.25. Impressively two members produced a 4.0 GPA. Their dedication in the classroom paid off after receiving a team academic award while in the NCAA tournament.



## Men's Soccer Advances to Sweet 16 in the NCAA Tournament

In late November, the University of South Florida's men's soccer team played in the first round of the NCAA Championship hosting Colgate. The Bulls controlled the game the first half and keeper Diego Restrepo went unchallenged. USF broke down Colgate's defense in the 19th minute when sophomore Jason Devenish scored on his first touch off a pass from Simon Schoendorf. Colgate came back at the beginning of the second half with a long-distance shot from junior Glenn Volk in the 54th minute. The Bulls' game-winning goal came in the 72nd minute off a quick corner from Tony Taylor to Kevon Neaves. The ball was floated to the back post where junior defender Yohance Marshall finished the combination. Colgate had two more solid chances in the last 10 minutes of the match, but USF's defense held them off. The 2-1 victory advanced them to the second round.

The Bulls traveled to Akron, Ohio, to challenge the University of Akron in the second round of the NCAA Tournament. The match was scoreless and the game went into overtime. One minute and 52 seconds into the second overtime, Schoendorf took a free kick 35 yards out. After a scramble in the six-yard box, Marshall chested the ball past the Akron keeper to give USF a 1-0 victory. Despite being outshot 17-8, the Bulls' defense recorded their ninth shutout of the year. Restrepo played a giant role by making 10 saves in the game. This victory gave the Bulls a trip to Connecticut for the Sweet 16 where they fell to the Huskies.
