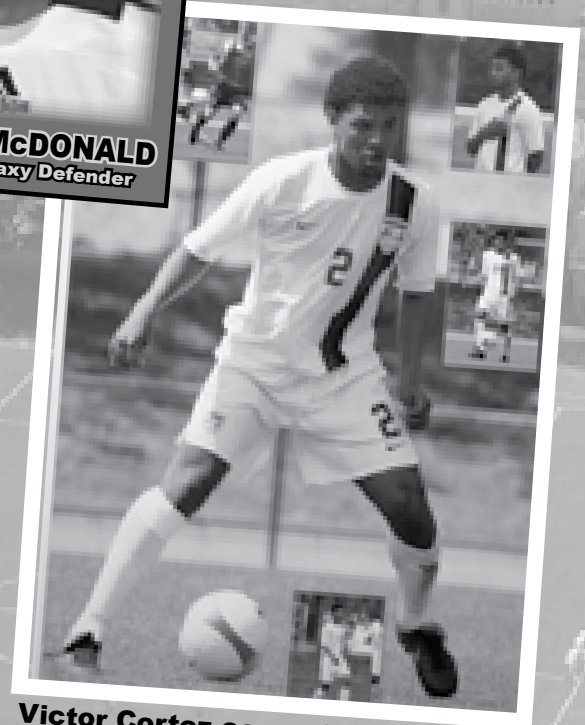
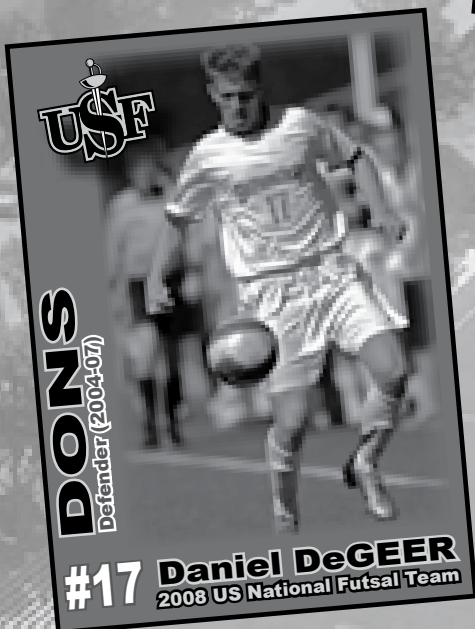


Rob Valentino, First Round Draft Pick of the New England Revolution in the 2008 MLS Super Draft

The campus isn't just a collection of buildings. It's also home to more than 100 species of native California plants-planted, potted, and positioned all over the campus's picturesque 55 acres. The grounds have twice been recognized nationally with Professional Grounds Management awards. Among the stand-outs are majestic Redwoods, spiraling Monterey Cypress, and its smaller hybridized cousin and university tree, the Leyland Cypress.

BEST PLACE TO SWEAT IN SAN FRANCISCO

Since the \$18 million center's opening in 1989, the Koret Health and Recreation Center has been named best gym in San Francisco by almost every fitness magazine and newspaper in the region. Its' Olympic size pool, the only indoor pool of its size in northern California, is state-of-the-art and keeps 400-500 swimmers happy daily. The three story, 125,000-square-foot gym attracts nearly 5,500 people, including, faculty, staff, and neighborhood residents, almost every day of the year.

THE RITZ OF RESIDENCE HALLS

The University's newest residence hall, Loyola Village, is arguably the best student housing in the country. The apartment and townhouse complex won *Builder Magazine's* Grand Award in its annual competition. For the students who call Loyola Village home, it defies the institutional dorms of yesteryear.

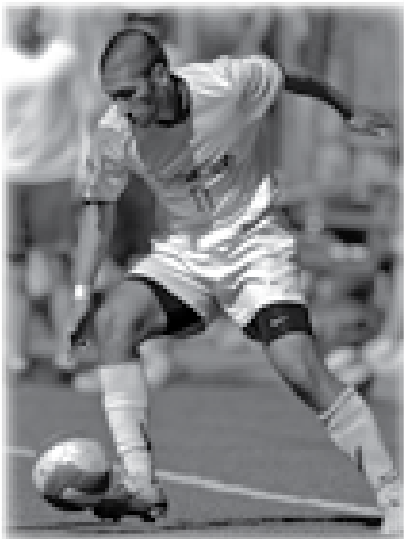

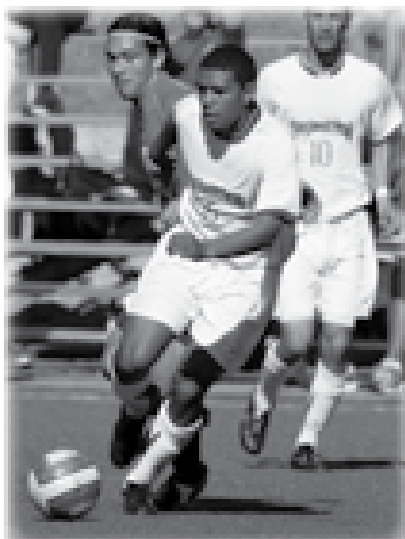

USF READY TO FIELD STRONG RECRUITING CLASS; YOUNG DONS POISED TO MAKE SOME NOISE IN THE INCREASINGLY TOUGH WEST COAST CONFERENCE; VISSER EYES RETURN TO "BLUE COLLAR" ROOTS

After a disappointing 2007 season marred by close calls and key injuries, USF looks for great things from a young and talented group in 2008. For the second consecutive season the Dons welcome a large, dynamic group of newcomers ready to make their mark for the Green and Gold. San Francisco has much to replace as four members last year's graduating class are playing on the professional or international stage.

Rob Valentino (New England), the 2006 West Coast Conference Player of the Year and Brandon McDonald (Los Angeles) were both drafted in the 2008 MLS Super Draft, while Chris Rodd is competing in Norway's top soccer division. Daniel DeGeer made the 2008 USA National Futsal Team and will compete in the FIFA World Cup in August. All were key members during the Dons run of back-to-back WCC titles and three straight NCAA Tournament berths. Now it is time for the Dons up and comers to make their mark on one of college soccer's most storied programs.

"We're going to be hungry, we're going to be athletic and we're going to be very young," USF head coach Erik Visser said. "We are going to be building a core of very fit, athletic young men who will re-install the winning attitude of a very successful cycle in the last four years. Our goal is to establish a new cycle of success for the USF Dons."

NEWCOMERS INVADE THE HILLTOP

San Francisco welcomes a talented influx of talent to the roster. No fewer than 16 newcomers look to make their mark for

the Dons this season. The USF coaching staff placed a tremendous emphasis on defense and focused on players demonstrating a "blue collar" mentality.

Eight of the incoming freshmen newcomers are back line players. Goalkeeper Ryan Amons (McLean, VA) is a highly touted last line of defense, who competed on the D.C. United Academy. Jared Cruz (Visalia, CA) was a highly decorated two-sport standout at Redwood High School. Omar Elmasri (Arcadia, CA) competed on the Chivas USA U-18 squad last season. Brian McEvoy (San Francisco) emerged as an outstanding backline player at nearby Sacred Heart Cathedral Prep. Adam Nowak (Toronto, Ontario) is a member of the Polish U-18 National Team. Victor Wennberg (Boras, Sweden) is an experienced international amateur player.

Junior midfielder Leon Williams (Manchester, Jamaica) captured NJCAA All-American honors last season at San Jacinto JC and is a member of the Jamaican Junior National Team. Junior attacking midfielder Jonathan Levi (Varberg, Sweden) is a dynamic playmaker in the middle and should make an instant difference for the Dons.

"We needed to address the loss of key personnel in the defense – Rob Valentino, Chris Rodd and Brandon McDonald," Visser said. "The number one emphasis of our recruiting was to solidify our back line. We are very comfortable in recruiting a few quality center backs – Victor Wennberg from Sweden, Omar Elmasri from Southern California and Brian McEvoy, from Sacred Heart in the City – with these three players, we feel we have

added some great defenders."

San Francisco will also get a boost from Jaime Rodriguez, a junior transfer from Chico State, who the coaching staff believes could instantly challenge for a starting role this season.

RETURNERS TESTED BY FIRE THE SOPHOMORES

USF brought in a large group of dynamic newcomers for the 2007 season and many were thrown into the fire early and often. This figures to pay off as a year of Division I experience playing an elite level of competition has prepared the group to elevate their games heading into 2008.

"Last year we had a very large and experienced senior class and a large freshmen class and we had a relatively small group of sophomores and juniors, so it was a really challenging year for the freshmen to emerge rapidly. I expect that the returning sophomores will really step up to the plate," Visser said.

Defenders Victor Cortez and Justin Warren and forwards Bryan Burke, Rafai Eddy, Jonathan McMullen and Jeff Penna headline the Dons sophomore class.

Cortez, who made 18 starts on USF's back line as a freshman, did an admirable job in the absence of 2007 Hermann Trophy candidate Rob Valentino, who suffered an ACL injury during the preseason. Warren appeared in 16 games with 10 starts in his inaugural season.

Burke scored a game-winner at LMU (10/19/07) en route to earning a WCC All-Freshman Team nod. Eddy and McMullen showed flashes of brilliance, but battled injury problems in their first season in the Green and Gold. Penna made an instant impact with two goals against Alabama A&M (9/2/07).

THE JUNIORS

USF welcomes back four juniors for 2008 and all made a mark for the team last season and figure prominently in the mix. Forward Conor Chinn headlines the group and led the team in scoring last year with six goals and 17 points. Midfielder Jesse Henderson provided strong play last season and scored the game-winner against LMU (11/16/07).

Defender Justin Kendro, who made 12 starts for USF last season could be an X-factor for the Dons and should be fully recovered from a knee injury in time for WCC action. Defender Bryan Vancura also looks poised to showcase his skills.

THE SENIORS

With only four seniors on the roster, the Dons are fortunate to have outstanding leadership and experience at key positions. Three-year letter-winners defender Kyle Schlumpf and defender/midfielder Jeff Russell bring impressive playing credentials to their final season

on the Hilltop. Goalkeepers Eric Conner, who started 16 matches last season will be pushed by fellow senior Jeremy Coupe, who started three matches, including a 2-1 victory against No. 11 Cal (9/14/07).

"We have a strong, but thin senior group," Visser said. "Eric Conner and Jeremy Coupe are both adamant to show that they are top Division I goalkeepers. I am also counting on the leadership of Kyle Schlumpf and Jeff Russell. Kyle Schlumpf has been a solid warrior for us for three years and we are counting on him having another solid year. Jeff Russell had a terrific junior year and emerged as a force both in the midfield and on the back line."

GOALKEEPERS

Conner and Coupe combined to start every match for the Dons last season and both will fight for most of the minutes between the pipes this season. Both will be challenged by Amons, who posted a sparkling 0.47 GAA in three seasons at Gonzaga College High School. Freshman Matt McDonald (Solana Beach, CA) and redshirt freshman Bryce Boyd will also vie for time in what should be a highly competitive race.

"In addition to the immediate competition, we are also looking towards the future of our goalkeeping. We feel the future in this position is very bright.

DEFENDERS

A 2007 WCC Freshman Team selection, Cortez spent time with the US U-20 National Team during its tour of Argentina. Cortez made an instant impact in his first season on the Hilltop and started 18 matches for the Dons and looks for another strong year. A three-year starter on the USF backline, Schlumpf will provide essential leadership to a young defensive unit. Vancura and Warren also look for expanded roles in their second year in the Green and Gold. Sophomore Hunter Jarrett also will fight for playing time on the Dons backline.

Although Cruz, Elmasri, McEvoy, Nowak and Wennberg look for prominent roles in their inaugural seasons on the Hilltop, three additional freshmen defenders will also take on all comers. Charlie Brennan (Salt Lake City, UT) competed on the Region IV ODP squad. Samir Najmeh (San Jose, CA) helped Bellarmine Prep to a No. 3 national ranking last season with the Bells. Luke Offutt (San Antonio, TX) was a two-time All-State selection at Central Catholic High School.

MIDFIELDERS

Russell turned in an outstanding junior campaign for the Dons and started his last 16 matches after seeing limited action as a reserve in his first two seasons on the Hilltop. Henderson enjoyed sophomore success and should be a big asset for the Dons in 2008.

Five newcomers will also fight for time in the Green and Gold midfield, headlined by Williams, who propelled San Jacinto Junior College to a 17-4 -1 record and a fourth place showing in the NJCAA Championships. Jaime Rodriguez, who scored nine goals with three assists as a freshman at Chico State figures prominently in the midfield mix. Carlos Flores-Rodriguez (Madrid, Spain) competed for the Pozuelo Football Club and captured league MVP honors last season. Adam Moguel (San Jose, CA) helped Santa Clara High School to the CCS Quarterfinals and earned SCVAL Defensive MVP accolades. Cairo Salvatierra (Carlsbad, CA) won Western League MVP honors last season after scoring 13 goals for Cathedral Catholic High School.

FORWARDS

With 10 career scoring strikes, including a team-high six last season, Chinn looks poised for a breakthrough as a junior. Chinn had a pair of two-goal matches, both coming in victories against Pac-10 opponents – No. 11 Cal (9/14/07) and Stanford (9/16/07). Chinn also recorded two goals during WCC action with one at No. 4 Santa Clara (10/12/07) and at home against the No. 3 Broncos (11/9/07).

Burke also returns for the Dons up front and looks to build off a solid freshman campaign. Eddy, McMullen and Penna all showed glimpses of offensive brilliance and look for more consistency as sophomores. Redshirt freshmen Felipe Cabrera and Daniel O'Donnell will also look to make the most of their opportunities.

THE SCHEDULE

USF men's soccer will once again play an exceptionally challenging schedule in 2008. Last season, the Dons hosted perennial national powers UCLA, California and New Mexico during the non-conference slate and this year figures to be just as difficult. San Francisco opens the season in the Midwest where it competes in the Northwestern Tournament

beginning Friday, August 29 in Evanston against the host Wildcats. USF takes on Northern Illinois before returning to the Pacific Time Zone for a match at Bay Area rival San Jose State Wednesday, September 10.

San Francisco hosts Stanford Sunday, September 14 for its home opener at Negoesco Stadium. The Dons then host the BMW/Nike Soccer Challenge, beginning Friday, September 19. The tournament field includes Penn State, co-host Saint Mary's, UNLV and the Dons.

"We're looking forward to hosting our first BMW/Nike Soccer Challenge. We're bringing in Penn State, UNLV and tournament co-host Saint Mary's and we look forward to some great soccer at Negoesco Stadium," Visser said.

THE WEST COAST CONFERENCE

Three teams represented the WCC in the NCAA Tournament last season – the most for the league since four earned berths in 2004. Gonzaga, Portland and league champion Santa Clara competed in the postseason and all figure prominently in the race for the 2008 WCC title. The Bulldogs secured their first NCAA bid since 2001, the Pilots went for the first time since 2004, while the Broncos made their fifth straight postseason.

Buoyed by returning stars and strong recruiting classes, each team in the league should be prepared for another grueling season of WCC round robin play. Although the league figures to be more competitive top to bottom this season, Visser believes Santa Clara will once again be the favorite entering the 2008 campaign.

"Santa Clara has really set the bar in our conference. They are a top-20 team in the country and obviously it is a goal of ours to challenge the Broncos this year, like other years. Other teams will be much improved in the league this year, so once again it will be a tough battle for the West Coast Conference title."

USF opens up its 28th WCC season when it travels to the Pacific Northwest to take on Gonzaga Friday, October 3. The Dons host Saint Mary's Friday, October 10 in the league home opener at Negoesco

The University of San Francisco, as one of the great traditional soccer powers in NCAA, has enjoyed a great legacy of coaches.

Following the lead of Gus Donoghue, Bob Braghetta and Stephen Negroesco, is head coach Erik Visser.

Visser, who enters his fourth decade associated with the USF soccer program, has built his legacy by leading the Dons to three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, back-to-back West Coast Conference Championships in 2004 and 2005, and top-20 national rankings over each of the past four seasons. His fellow coaches recognized his leadership by electing him 2004 NSCAA Regional and 2004 and 2005 West Coast Conference "Coach of the Year."

A True Don

Visser knows the great tradition of USF well. He was a top defender on two NCAA champion soccer teams on the Hilltop in 1978 and 1980. His marking of Indiana's Angelo DiBernardo was a key to the 1978 crown. During his playing career in the Green and Gold, the Dons posted a remarkable 91-6-5 slate, including a 10-2 record in NCAA Tournament play.

After graduating from USF in 1982 with a bachelor's degree in government, he became part of Negroesco's coaching staff.

Visser Enters 31st Season on the Hilltop

Entering the 2008 campaign, Visser has coached in a remarkable 645 games at USF and during his standout four-year playing career, competed in 102 for a total of 747 games representing the Green and Gold. He ranks third in career victories with 70 behind NSCAA Hall-of-Famers Donoghue (1946-1960), who tallied 121 and mentor Negroesco (1962-2000) who compiled a then NCAA record 544. Visser recorded his 50th career victory at Portland on November 10, 2005 and owns an overall mark of

70-56-9.

His ability to win coincides with his eye for talent, recruiting two of the last three West Coast Conference Player of the Year award winners Rob Valentino and Aaron Chandler. The last USF player to win the conference's top award prior to Chandler in 2005 was All-American Staale Soebye in 1993 and 1994. Valentino also became the first Dons' player to be selected for the WCC Defender of the Year in 2005. Three of Visser's players have been named NSCAA Far West All-Region, seven were named WCC First Team and another 13 were named WCC Second Team.

Visser's Coaching Philosophy

Following his Dutch roots, Visser's coaching is based on a strong belief in an attacking, creative style of play. That mirrors the style of Negroesco's USF teams, who played a possession game based on accurate passing and free movement. Known as a player's coach, Visser's strength has always been his communication with his teams.

Visser also is a great fit for the University, with a strong belief in the education of the student-athlete. He served as USF's assistant athletic director for



Erik Visser enters his 31st season associated with USF Soccer in 2008

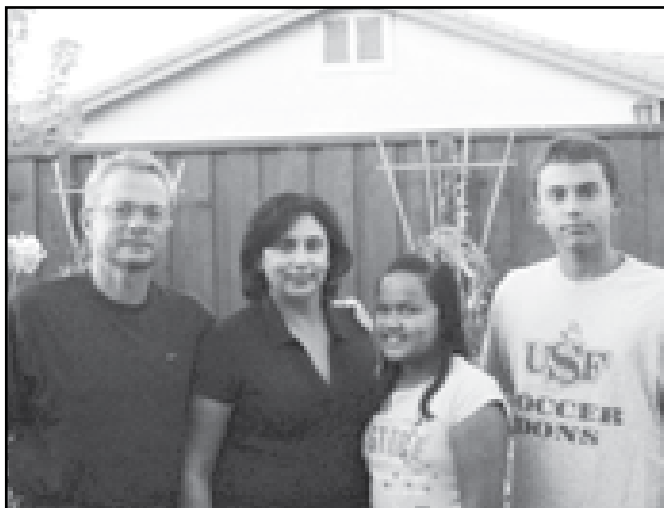
compliance and academic services for nine years at the Hilltop. He received a USF Merit Service Award for his duties to the University.

The 50-year old has strong ties to all levels of the soccer world. When USF started its women's soccer program in 1985, Visser was tabbed as the program's first head coach. He guided the women through the 1990 season.

US National Team Service

Visser was involved in the USA National Team program, having served as the top assistant for the Under-20 national team which finished 13th in the 2001 Youth World Cup in Argentina. Among the top young American stars he worked with were Landon Donovan, Bobby Convey, DaMarcus Beasley and Edson Buddle.

He also served (1996-98) as the region IV Olympic Development Under-15 head coach.

"Steve has made a huge positive impact on my life and career," said Visser upon taking over the head coaching spot after the 2000 season.

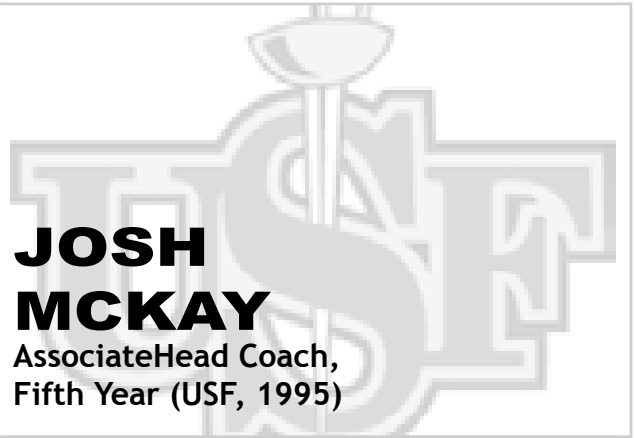
"I am very honored to continue the rich tradition of USF soccer. I believe that we have the support of the administration to ensure that USF soccer will continue its national prominence in the new millenium.

"San Francisco is a unique city and USF is a unique University. We have the opportunity to recruit both the best players from the western United States and also the world. Visser has earned two graduate degrees at USF. He received his master's degree in education in 1986 and completed his master's in sports and fitness management in 1993.

Prior to coming to USF, Visser played on the prestigious Ajax Amsterdam junior team and major division amateur soccer for AFC Amsterdam. Visser holds a US Soccer "A" license, a US Soccer Fitness license and a NSCAA Director of Coaching diploma.

Erik, his wife Martha, son, Brian, and daughter, Lauren, reside in American Canyon, in Napa County.



JOSH MCKAY
Associate Head Coach,
Fifth Year (USF, 1995)

Hired in 2003, Josh McKay has been an integral part of USF's recent success. Since the beginning of his tenure as an assistant to head coach Erik Visser, the Dons have gone 60-50-9, highlighted by three straight NCAA tournament appearances from 2004-06. Following the 2005 season, McKay was promoted to the position of associate head coach.

"Josh brings a lot to our soccer program," said Dons' head coach Erik Visser. "He was a youth soccer player in the Bay Area, played soccer at the highest collegiate level here at USF, has extensive pro experience and a USSF 'A' license. He deserves a great deal of credit for our recent success and our successes to come."

From 1996 to 2002, McKay played an impressive 153 contests in the professional ranks as a member of the Colorado Rapids of the MLS and the USL's Richmond Kickers. With the Kickers in 1997, McKay accumulated 10 points on four goals and two assists. As McKay competed on the roster from 1997 to 2002, Richmond took no worse than third in their division. In 1998 and 2001, the Kickers were crowned division champions and finished as league championship runner-ups in McKay's final season.

Known as a 'tremendous left-sided threat coming out of the back field', McKay has part of a tough Kickers defense which in 2000 recorded 13 shutouts and allowed only 25 goals. At that time Head Coach Leigh Cowlishaw said of McKay, "[Josh is a] proven A-League professional who leads by example." During his time with Richmond, McKay also served as the Kickers' Youth Soccer Club's Coach and Assistant Technical Director for three seasons.

A strong and powerful defender/midfielder, McKay hails from the soccer-rich Pleasanton area. After playing a season at UNLV, McKay returned to USF as a

sophomore and led the Dons into the NCAA tournament as a junior (1993) and senior (1994). McKay played in 67 games in his collegiate career, including 48 in his three seasons at USF. He scored six goals, including three game-winners in his career. Another highlight was making one of the three penalty kick tiebreaker goals to advance USF at Fresno State in an NCAA playoff game in 1994.

In 1995, McKay earned his Bachelor's Degree from USF in English Composition. On June 8 of 2007, McKay and his wife Barbara were welcomed by the birth of their first child, Xavier Rhys. The McKays live in Pleasanton, Calif.

Tyler Gottschalk, who received his Masters of Sport Management from USF last May, enters his fifth year as an assistant with the team.

THE WEST COAST CONFERENCE

2008 UNIVERSITY OF SAN FRANCISCO DONS MEN'S SOCCER

When the West Coast Conference got its start back in 1952, the founders really had only one goal in mind - to create a convenient way for five Bay Area schools to play basketball. What has grown from that original vision 56 years ago is a marvelous cohesive athletics league which is competitive at the national level in 13 sports.

The eight current members of the WCC span the Western United States from Canada to Mexico. Though the institutions range from the pine forests of Eastern Washington to the sun-drenched beaches of Southern California, the combined excellence in athletics and academics sets the conference apart on the national scene and draws the individual institutions together in a common mission.

The WCC sponsors championships in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross-country, men's and women's golf, women's rowing, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's tennis and volleyball.

The league was chartered by five Bay Area institutions (Pacific, Saint Mary's, San Francisco, San Jose State and Santa Clara) as the California Basketball Association, playing its first game on January 2, 1953. After two seasons of play under that name, the conference expanded to include Loyola Marymount and Pepperdine in 1955, and became the "West Coast Athletic Conference" in 1956. The name was shortened to "West Coast Conference" in 1989. The current full-time lineup of WCC schools has remained unchanged since 1979, making the WCC the third most stable conference in the country.

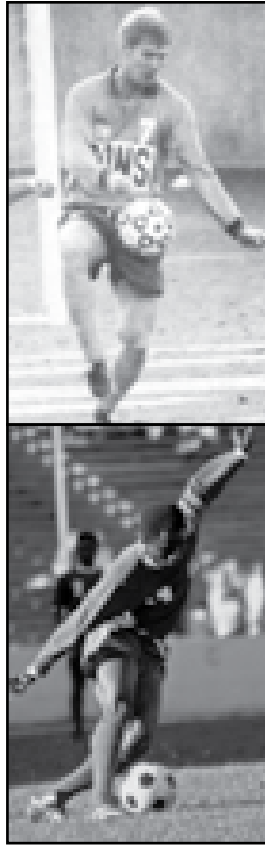

GUS DONOGHUE AWARD

His friends called him "Gus" and he is considered by most soccer enthusiasts as one of the greatest soccer coaches produced in the United States. Gus Donoghue was born March 17, 1911 in Glaskow, Scotland and first learned the game of soccer at St. Aloysius Elementary School, a Jesuit institution in Garnet Hill, Scotland.

Gus came to San Francisco in 1925 and attended St. Ignatius High School and St. Ignatius College, as USF then was known. He was USF's student body president and received his Master's Degree from the University of California in 1937 and his Ph. D. from Stanford University in 1953.

Gus was the major factor in USF's first "Golden Era" in soccer in 1932-36, when the Dons took five consecutive conference championships. He captained the Dons and was named All-American in 1934, 1935 and 1936. He was a member of the United States Olympic Team in 1936.

Coach Donoghue took over the Hilltop coaching duties in 1941 and 1942. He left USF for military duty as a Lieutenant Commander in the Navy and returned in 1946. Gus received the "Coach of the Year" award from the San Francisco Football Association in 1950. That year, USF played in the first college soccer bowl game in the US in St. Louis, Missouri and shared the first recognized national championship with Penn State.

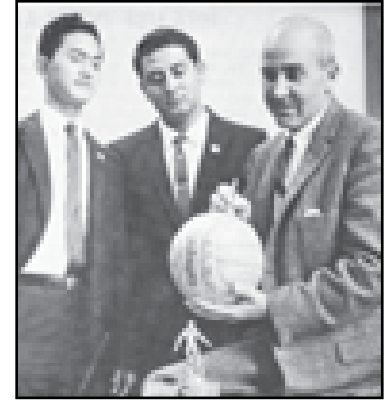
Gus retired from the USF as Director of Admissions in 1973. He passed away on September 9, 2001.

Coach Donoghue leaves a legacy that will live forever in the hearts of his team members: 121 wins, 12 losses, and 14 ties; 89 matches without a loss; 11 straight Northern California Intercollegiate Soccer Conference titles and 2 national championships. His .871 winning percentage is the best among NCAA Division I coaches.

Gus Donoghue brought dignity to the game of soccer. He impressed upon his teams the importance of skills, sportsmanship, courage and the Christian way of life. He had the unique ability and leadership to develop many inexperienced college men into great or All-American players while they were at the Hilltop.

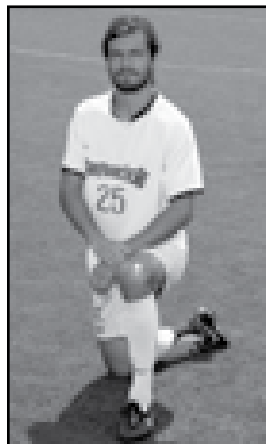
How did he do it? Gus cared, Gus recognized, Gus inspired, Gus gave of himself, Gus exemplified the highest qualities of human character.

The recipient of the Gus Donoghue Award is highly honored. It represents the highest recognition the University of San Francisco can bestow upon a soccer player wearing the green and gold.



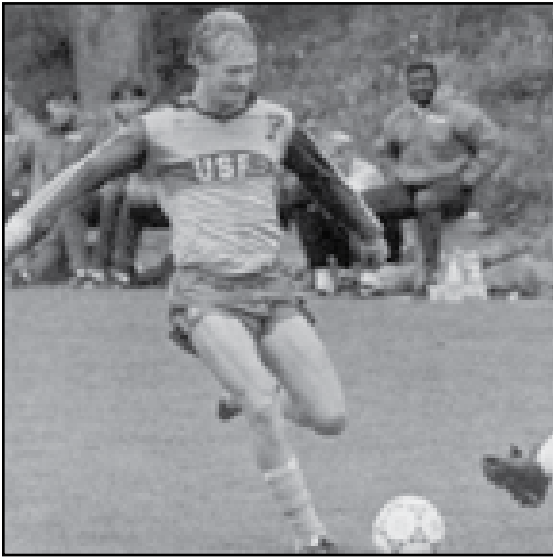

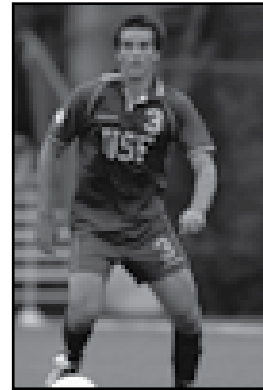

USF DONS NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

2008 UNIVERSITY OF SAN FRANCISCO DONS MEN'S SOCCER



1966

The Dons under Negoesco made the NCAA semifinals for the first time since the tournament started in 1959. Michigan State, Army, and Long Island University completed the soccer "final four" in Berkeley.

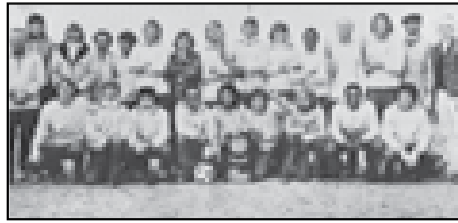
Negoesco and his Dons met Army in the semifinal game at wet and foggy Memorial Stadium. The field was a mess, forcing many of the West Point booters shot attempts to sail off target. Negoesco's talented Dons, who won their two previous games in the mud, were better prepared.

Second half goals by Luis Sagastume and Sandor Hites gave the Dons a 2-0 victory, with Olympian Mike Ivanow recording the shutout.

In improved weather conditions the following day, USF faced Long Island University, upset winners in the semifinal round. LIU took Michigan State into overtime where they triumphed 6-5 on corner kicks. Led by an outstanding effort by Sandor Hites, the Dons scored a record five goals enroute to a 5-2 win over LIU and USF's first NCAA title. Hites accounted for three of the five Dons' goals and was named the tournament's outstanding offensive player, with four goals in USF's two contests. It was the first of USF's four NCAA crowns under Negoesco, as the Hilltoppers finished 11-0-1.

1975

USF's speed and finesse made the Dons the number one team in the country in 1975. They had to prove it against a strong final four-team field in Edwardsville, Illinois that included host SIU-Edwardsville, Brown, and defending national champion Howard University.

The Dons had their hands full in the semifinal contest against a tenacious Brown University pulling out a 3-2 decision in triple overtime. Forward Greg McKeown set up the Dons' gamewinner with a pinpoint pass to a surprised and open Mal Roche who scored from ten yards to send the Dons to the title contest.

USF was faced with the challenge of taking on the host team, SIU-Edwardsville for the championship. The Cougars were coming off a win over Howard University that propelled them into the fray.

The Dons were not intimidated as they walked off with the championship by a 4-0 count. USF started the scoring just 6:24 into the match, as lanky junior Greg McKeown headed home a Roche cross. Senior Paul Korn, an eventual draftee of the Tampa Bay Rowdies, also scored on a pass from Roche just fifteen minutes later. Victor Arbelaez, another senior, would close out the first half scoring to give the Dons a 3-0 halftime cushion.

Even Southern Illinois' hometown fans had nothing but praise for the finesse game that USF displayed in the first half. USF did not let up in the second stanza, with sophomore sensation Andy Atuegbu scoring the half's only goal on a pass from Kjell Tvedt. The Nigerian sensation was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Charles Gould of the St. Louis Globe Democrat summed it up best: "If the mighty Dons from the banks of San Francisco Bay are not the best college soccer team to win the NCAA Division I Soccer Championships, then they have to be rated right near the top."



1976

After winning a national championship, the single most difficult task is living up to an established reputation, and more specifically, successfully defending that championship. That situation faced Coach Steve Negoesco and his Dons in 1976.

USF's road to a second consecutive NCAA Division I Soccer Championship became a long and winding one that began one night in South San Francisco and ended in the subfreezing temperatures of Philadelphia's Franklin Field.

The Dons arrived in Philadelphia as the underdog of the four teams. Due to their unblemished mark, Clemson topped all the rankings with Indiana a close second. Hartwick and USF rounded out the final four.

The Dons again employed their new defense to shut off the finesse of Clemson in the semifinals. Behind the second half goal of John Brooks, USF went on to a 1-0 win over the top-ranked Tigers.

The next day goalie Peter Arnautoff led the defense to still another shutout, the fifth straight for USF, as Dons successfully defended their championship with 1-0 victory over another undefeated squad, Indiana.

As was the case in the 1975 tournament, the most decisive player on the field was All-American Andy Atuegbu. With 35 minutes elapsed in the contest, he took the ball at midfield and dribbled up the left side, and unleashed one of his patented cannonball shots perfectly into the top right corner. The 20-yard blast brought USF the 1976 NCAA Division I Championship. Atuegbu was selected the tournament's Most Valuable Player for the second consecutive year.



1980

When Fidelis Atuegbu blasted a shot just inside the right post to clinch the 1980 championship for USF it kept alive a family tradition. In 1976, it was another Atuegbu who made that magic happen when Andy brought Indiana down. The win marked the third time in five years USF had beaten the Hoosiers in championship play and gave USF its fourth title in eight years.

The Hilltoppers began their drive to the National Championship by capturing the Pacific Soccer Conference crown, which had spent a one year vacation at Santa Clara. The Dons claimed the league crown with stretch drive victories over San Jose (3-1), Santa Clara (3-0) and Fresno State (4-1). Entering post-season competition with a 19-0-2 record and the #1 ranking in the nation, the Dons met UCLA for the Far West Championship and won. The quarterfinals meant long time foe St. Louis. In 19 years, the Midwesterners had stopped Coach Negoesco six out of seven times; but not this year.....USF 3-St. Louis 2.

It was onto the Sunshine State and a meeting with Alabama A&M, ranked #2 and with basically the same team that demolished the Dons in 1979, 4-1. Despite a one-half zip time score, with the Green and Gold down, late goals by Luis Felipe Magalhaes and Bjorn Tronstad pulled out the win and it was on to the title game.

For pure excitement and an improbable turn of events, there has never been a game quite like the 1980 championship. Indiana played a high pressure defense in the first half and it worked. The Dons were down 2-0 at the half, but this team had a habit of fighting back. But USF had a strong point.....endurance. The team thrived on pressure. It brought out performance. Steve Negoesco knew his players wouldn't quit and fought to a 3-3 tie at the end of regulation.

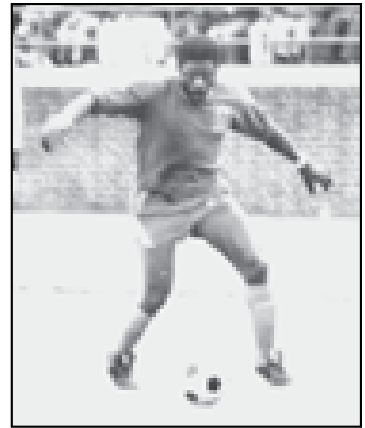
Fidelis Atuegbu was fresh and Steve knew that he had the leg and bangat 98:17 the game was history. The title once again belonged to the boys from the City by the Bay.

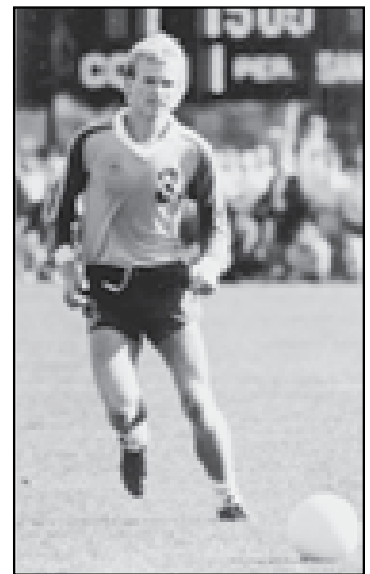
- Having reached the NCAA Tournament 30 times, USF ranks fourth in all-time NCAA appearances behind only St. Louis (44), UCLA (35) and Indiana (32). The Dons' appearance total is tops for West Coast Conference schools. The Dons also rank fourth in total NCAA Division I Championships with four behind St. Louis (10), Indiana (31) and Virginia (5).
- USF, who has made three straight tournament appearances, has an NCAA Tournament record of 44-22-1. The Dons have been to the NCAA Final seven times, semifinals 10 times.

Rev. Stephen A. Privett, S.J., began his tenure as the 27th president of the University of San Francisco on September 15, 2000.

Father Privett, 64, was born in San Francisco. He entered the Society of Jesus in 1960 and is a graduate of The Catholic University of America, the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley and Gonzaga University. He is an expert in the fields of Catechetics and the role of the Hispanic community in the Catholic Church.

Prior to his appointment at USF, Father Privett served as provost and academic vice president at Santa Clara University. As provost, he was responsible for oversight of student life, intercollegiate athletics, as well as academic affairs. While teaching at Santa Clara, he was recognized for "Teaching Excellence and Campus Leadership" with the Sears Roebuck Foundation Award. He also helped establish the Eastside Project, a program that received national recognition as a model program for community-based learning.

Early in his career, Father Privett was an instructor at Jesuit High School in Sacramento and Principal of Bellarmine College Preparatory in San Jose.

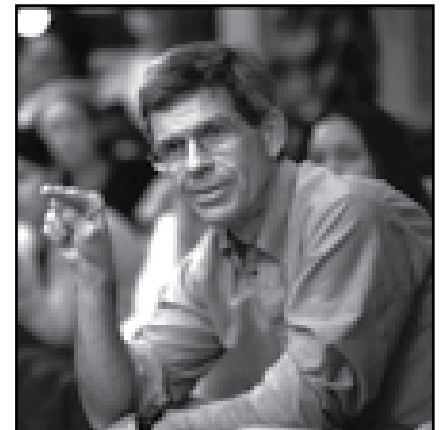
He is currently a member of the Board of Associates, Universidad Iberoamericana, and a member of the Board of Trustees of Seattle University and Brophy College Preparatory. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Fromm Institute and the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities and a member of the National Seminar on Jesuit Higher Education.

Throughout his career, Father Privett has demonstrated a commitment to "whole-person education," a traditional hallmark of Jesuit education.

Regarding USF athletics, Fr. Privett has said, "High graduation rates, participation in community outreach and success in competition all come together in our USF student-athletics. I am gratified by the high standards achieved in all areas by our student-athletes and the contribution of our Athletics program to the USF community."

Father Privett also added that he supports the commitment to provide all USF teams with the opportunity to compete for West Coast Conference titles.

"I am pleased that our trustees unanimously endorsed our Mission and Goals Statement for USF Athletics," he said. "I support this statement and am confident the goals we have set for ourselves are achievable and that USF can be a model Jesuit intercollegiate athletic program."

Debra Gore-Mann was named Athletics Director at the University of San Francisco July 21, 2006. Gore-Mann is the first female Director of Athletics at USF and just the third overall in West Coast Conference history.

Gore-Mann, who served as the Senior Associate Athletic Director and Senior Women's Administrator since 1999, played a key role in the Stanford Athletics program that has won

an unprecedented 12 consecutive Sports Academy Director's Cups, signifying the most successful Division I Athletic Department in the Nation. During her tenure in Palo Alto the Cardinal captured 14 Division I National Championships.

Just the third athletic director at USF since 1985, Gore-Mann is excited about the opportunity for continued success for the Green and Gold as she stands on the brink of her third year.

"My second year on the Hilltop proved to be equally as challenging as my first," Gore-Mann said. "I made some tough decisions but believe we are moving in the right direction now in creating a strong, broad-based athletics program that all of our USF supporters can be proud."

At USF, Gore-Mann serves as the Executive Director of the university's athletic program, which features seven women's and seven men's sports, including basketball, golf, tennis, track/field and cross country; soccer, volleyball, and baseball. A record four programs represented San Francisco in NCAA postseason play during the 2008 Spring Season in the sports of men's and women's track, women's golf and women's tennis. Freshman Jeni Heinser, of the women's tennis team, captured West Coast Conference Player and Newcomer of the Year honors en route to an appearance at the NCAA Nationals Singles Tournament – the first ever postseason berth for the program. USF track sent a pair of individuals to compete in the NCAA Regionals, also the inaugural postseason berths for both the men's and women's teams.

Gore-Mann is responsible for the management and development of one of an Athletics Department that is rich with athletics championships and tradition in one of the best cities in America. USF's athletic

staff includes more than 30 full and part-time coaches and administrative and support personnel who provide services to about 240 student-athletes.

Gore-Mann has taken important steps since her appointment to ensure and improve the quality of the USF coaching staff with key contract extensions to baseball coach, Nino Giarratano and women's basketball coach, Tanya Haave. In addition, the hiring of new men's basketball coach Rex Walters is heralded as a significant coup.

"Challenge, change and choice is how I would describe our last year's athletics performances. We did see several milestones accomplished last year including USF's first ever men's cross country individual champion, Cheyne Inman, Jenni Heinser was named WCC Player of the Year, becoming the most decorated player in program history in the process, Dominique Carter was awarded her fourth consecutive WCC First Team selection and Tavo Hall was named WCC Male Scholar Athlete of the year – just to name a few accomplishments. I am looking forward to this upcoming year and working with this core group of coaches as well as our dedicated and hard-working student-athletes."

At Stanford, Debra served as Senior Associate Athletic Director for Finance and Operations from 1999-2005 and most recently served as Senior Associate Athletics Director for External Relations and Senior Women's Administrator. Gore-Mann reported directly to Dr. Ted Leland, named one of the "10 most influential persons in college athletics" by Sports Business Journal.

She shared financial responsibility for the more than \$50 million annual Stanford Athletic Department budget and shared management of 34 sports. Gore-Mann served as Senior Project Manager on the recent Stanford Stadium renovations and served as the lead negotiator on the Cardinal all-school apparel contract with Nike, Inc.. Prior to her tenure at Stanford, Gore-Mann worked in the corporate sector for Bechtel Enterprises, Inc (1993-99), Morgan Stanley & Co. (1987-92) and Raychem Corp (1982-85).

Debi is married to former USF varsity basketball player Anthony Mann, who was a member of the 1985-86 "Return to Basketball" squad and has a 12-year old daughter, Quinci.

THE AUGUSTINE P. DONOGHUE ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP

As a tribute to his many years of contributions to both soccer and the University of San Francisco, a group of soccer alumni have established the Augustine P. Donoghue Living Scholarship Fund.

This fund will provide scholarship aid for USF soccer student-athletes exclusively in future years. The Living Scholarship was started by former head coach Stephen Negoesco and former Director of Athletics Bill Fusco. A graduate of USF in 1936, Donoghue served as soccer coach on the Hilltop for twenty years, winning 11 championships, and never experienced a losing season. The USF soccer program annually awards the "Gus Donoghue Award" to the team's outstanding student-athlete.

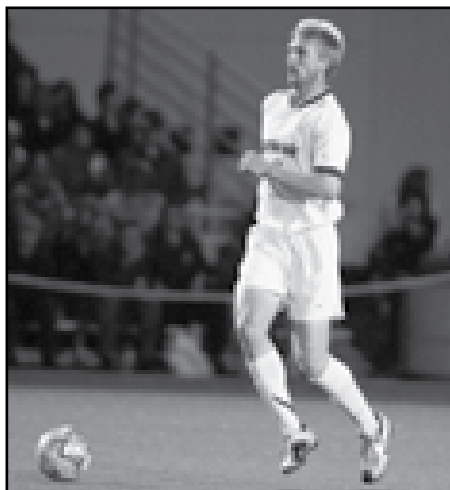

ATHLETICS WEIGHT ROOM (MORAN CENTER)

The state-of-the-art facility was developed by the University of San Francisco in collaboration with alumni, special donors and the Koret Foundation. Since its opening in 1989, the Koret Health and Recreation Center has provided an outstanding recreational and fitness environment for USF students, faculty, staff, alumni and members.

The facility features an Olympic size indoor swimming pool, two gymnasiums with a total of four full length basketball courts, five regulation racquetball courts, a 3200 square foot weight room complete with state-of-the-art equipment, an aerobics/dance room, combatives room, separate alumni and student lounges and cardiovascular alley featuring top-of-the-line aerobic training equipment.

In addition, an extensive intramural sports program is offered. The wide variety of sports include basketball, flag football, floor

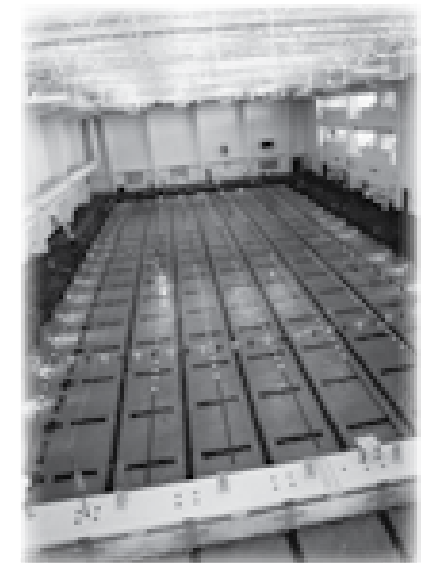

The World Class Koret Pool

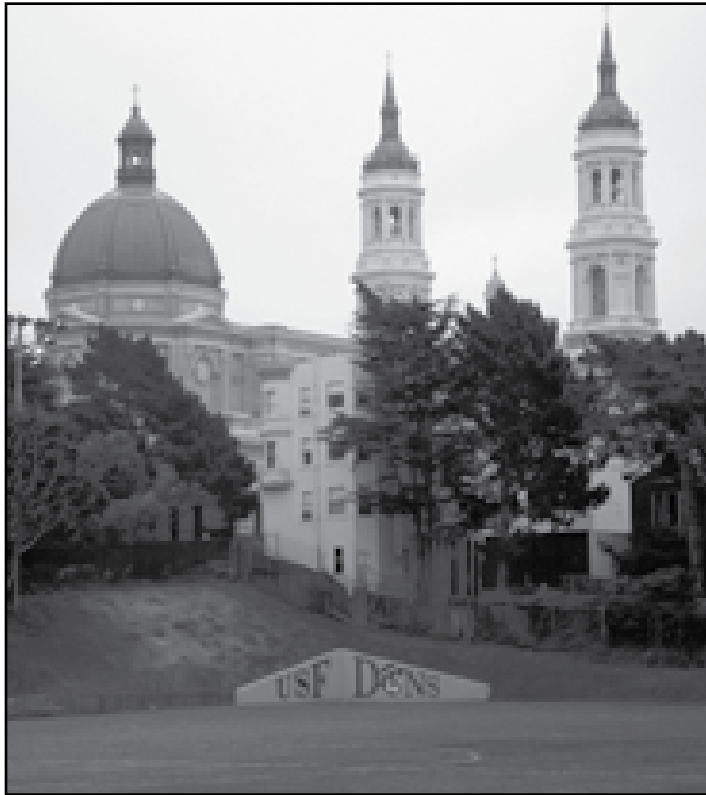


NEGOESCO STADIUM A BEAUTIFUL PLACE FOR SOCCER

One of the finest collegiate soccer only stadiums in the country, Negoesco Stadium is unmatched in its beautiful setting in the shadow of St. Ignatius Church. Dedicated to and orchestrated by USF Men's Soccer legend Stephen Negoesco, the stadium formally opened on September 17, 1982, when a sellout crowd saw USF topple Indiana, 3-2, in overtime. The building of the stadium was truly a team effort with school officials, alumni, former players and friends all lending a hand.

A series of renovations and improvements over the past couple of years, have transformed the stadium into one of the premier venues on the West Coast. The most significant change occurred prior to the 2003 season with the installation of FieldTurf, the best artificial grass surface available. FieldTurf is the highest rated artificial turf, used throughout the world as a surface that plays virtually the same as grass. With the addition of FieldTurf, the USF men's and women's soccer programs boast one of the finest playing surfaces on the West Coast.

Negoesco Stadium added television lights for the 2000 season and increased the stadium's capacity to 3,000. The facility has been used for matches involving Major League Soccer teams, most recently when the San Jose Earthquakes hosted the Los Angeles Galaxy. During the summer of 2002, the San Jose Earthquakes hosted the Shanghai Shenhua (Pumas) for an international exhibition contest. The field has also served as a site for World Cup training.

NEGOESCO STADIUM BANNER PROJECT

Additional banners will also feature USF conference titles as members of the Northern California Intercollegiate Soccer Conference/West Coast Intercollegiate Soccer Conference, Pacific Soccer Conference, and the West Coast Conference. A final banner will feature the names of all 41 NSCAA All-Americans to proudly wear the Green and Gold.

Other changes include the installation of European football-style advertising panels to acknowledge sponsors and supporters of USF Athletics and the Dons Soccer program. Additionally, protective team shells will be installed in the bench areas.
