Gary Andersen is entering his sixth season as Utah State's head coach as he initially led the program for four years from 2009-12 and returned for his second stint prior to the 2019 campaign as he was hired on Dec. 9, 2018. Andersen is the first of 27 coaches in USU history to serve as head coach multiple times.

In all, Andersen is beginning his 11th season as a Division I head coach and has 31 years of coaching experience. He has been involved in 13 bowl games, including four New Year's Day bowls. As a head coach, he led Utah State to the 2012 Western Athletic Conference Championship and Wisconsin to the 2014 Big Ten Conference West Division title, and has coached 17 NFL Draft picks, including seven at USU.

During his career, Andersen was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award at Utah State in 2012, along with being named the WAC Coach of the Year that same season, and a semifinalist for the Maxwell Coach of the Year Award (2013) and George Munger Coach of the Year Award (2013, 2014) as the head coach at Wisconsin. He was also a finalist for the Frank Broyles Award at Utah in 2008, which is given to the top assistant in college football.

Academically, three of Andersen's teams have finished in the top-10 nationally in Academic Progress Rate, in addition to 186 academic all-conference honorees.

During his five-year tenure with the Aggies, Andersen has posted a 33-30 overall record, including a 22-15 league mark, and the school's first back-to-back winning seasons (7-6 in 2011 and 11-2 in 2012) since 1979-80. He was also the first head coach since Phil Krueger (1973-75) to notch an overall winning record. In all, his 33 wins are the fifth-most in school history, while his 52.4 winning percentage ranks as the eighth-best.

In 2019, Andersen led Utah State to a 6-2 Mountain West record, finishing third in the Mountain Division. USU also played in its 14th bowl game in school history, including its third under Andersen, which is the second-most under any head coach in Aggie history.

During the 2019 campaign, Andersen coached 10 Aggies to all-Mountain West honors, including placekicker Dominik Eberle, who was named a Pro Football Focus Honorable Mention All-American. Furthermore, quarterback Jordan Love became just the fifth player in school history selected in the first round of the NFL Draft as he was the 26th overall pick by the Green Bay Packers. Additionally, two more Aggies signed NFL free agent contracts in Eberle (Las Vegas Raiders) and defensive end Tipa Galeai (Green Bay Packers).

Utah State also set two school records during the 2019 season as it completed 315 passes and attempted 504. Furthermore, USU had the second-most passing yards (3,628) and the third-most made field goals (21) in a single-season in school history in 2019.

When initially hired by Utah State on Dec. 4, 2008, Andersen inherited a football program that had suffered through 11 straight losing seasons and only had two winning campaigns in 28 years, while playing in just four bowl games.

In just his third year at Utah State, Andersen's 2011 club became the first Aggie team to win seven games since 1993 and the first USU team to play in a bowl game in 14 years. The following season, Andersen led USU to its best season ever with a school-record 11 wins, going undefeated in the WAC and capturing its first outright league title since 1936. USU also won just its second-ever bowl game that season with a 41-15 victory against Toledo in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. USU finished the 2012 campaign with an 11-2 record and was one of just two teams in school history at the time, along with the 1961 club, to finish the season nationally ranked as it was 16th in the final Associated Press poll, 17th in the final Coaches poll and 23rd in the final BCS standings.

During his first stint as Utah State's head coach, Andersen built an Aggie football program that set numerous school records, including wins (11), points scored (454), total offense (6,108 yards) and yards per game (469.8) in 2012, and touchdowns (60), rushing yards (3,675) and rushing touchdowns (37) in 2011. The 282.7 rushing yards per game in 2011 ranked sixth in the nation that year and are the second-most in school history. Furthermore, the 34.9 points per game scored in 2012 were the second-most in school history at the time, while that team's defense allowed just 322.1 yards and 15.4 points per game, its fewest at USU since the 1960s. Furthermore, those 15.4 points allowed per game in 2012 ranked seventh nationally.

During his final two seasons at Utah State, Andersen led the Aggies to an 18-8 record, including an 11-2 conference mark.

As Utah State's head coach from 2009-12, Andersen coached six Aggies who went on to earn All-American honors (Will Davis, Kerwynn Williams, Tyler Larsen, Nevin Lawson, Zach Vigil and Kyler Fackrell) and 10 Aggies who played in the NFL, including current Seattle Seahawks linebacker Bobby Wagner, who was selected in the second round of the 2012 NFL Draft. Furthermore, Andersen coached 27 players that earned various all-conference

honors, including running back Robert Turbin, who was named the WAC's Offensive Player of the Year in 2011 and spent eight seasons in the NFL.

Andersen came back to Utah State after spending the 2018 season as the associate head coach and defensive line coach at the University of Utah, where the Utes posted a 9-4 record and advanced to the Pac-12 Championship game after winning the Pac-12 South. At Utah, Andersen helped coach 10 defensive starters to all-conference honors, including all three of his starters on the defensive line.

In all, Andersen spent 12 years on staff at Utah during three different stints, including helping the Utes to undefeated seasons in 2004 and 2008 as they played in the Fiesta Bowl and Sugar Bowl, respectively. During his time at Utah, Andersen coached two All-Americans, two conference defensive Most Valuable Players, 22 first-team all-conference honorees and 16 NFL draft picks.

Following his first four years as Utah State's head coach, Andersen spent two seasons as the head coach at Wisconsin (2013-14) and three years as the head coach at Oregon State (2015-17). At Wisconsin, he led the Badgers to a 19-7 record, a Big Ten divisional championship in 2014 and appearances in the Capital One Bowl and Outback Bowl.

During his two years at Wisconsin, Andersen coached five All-Americans and had seven players selected in the NFL Draft. In 2013, Chris Borland was named a first-team All-American, and the Big Ten Conference Linebacker and Defensive Player of the Year. In 2014, Andersen coached Melvin Gordon, the nation's leading rusher and scorer in 2014, to the Big Ten Conference Offensive Player of the Year Award and a runner-up finish for the Heisman Trophy.

At Oregon State, Andersen had three players drafted into the NFL in Isaac Seumalo, Sean Harlow and Treston Decoud, and coached two Freshman All-Americans in Xavier Crawford and Gus Lavaka, and 12 all-league players.

Andersen's coaching career began in 1988 as the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Southeastern Louisiana, where he coached for one season before going to Ricks College from 1989-92 as the offensive line coach. His other coaching stints include Idaho State (1992-94, defensive line), Park City HS (1994-95, head coach) and Northern Arizona (1995-96, assistant head coach/defensive line/special teams). Andersen also spent the 2003 season as the head coach at Southern Utah.

A 1986 graduate of Utah, Andersen earned his bachelor's degree in political science. He played center for Utah from 1985-86 after garnering first-team juco All-America honors in 1984 at Ricks College.

Andersen is married to the former Stacey Lambert, and they have three children: Keegan (Jen), and twins Chasen (Marquelle) and Hagen (Kaitlin), one grandson (Raylen), and one granddaughter (Baylor).

Frank Maile, a 2007 Utah State graduate, is in his fifth year as the Aggies' assistant head coach. Maile will also serve as co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach this year. Overall, Maile has spent 10 years on the USU staff, as he was the tight ends coach in 2019, co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach from 2016-18, the defensive line coach from 2011-13 and a defensive graduate assistant from 2009-10. In all, this will be Maile's seventh year coaching the defensive line and fourth year as co-defensive coordinator.

In 2019, Maile (My-leh) helped four offensive players earn all-Mountain West honors, including tight end Caleb Repp, who earned honorable mention honors. Furthermore, USU's offense set school records in passes completed (315) and attempted (504), while its 3,628 passing yards are the second-most.

Maile also helped Utah State to its 14th bowl game all-time in 2019, including its eighth in the past nine seasons, as it played in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Maile helped Utah State to one of its most successful seasons in school history in 2018 as the Aggies went 11-2 and tied the school record for wins (11) and home wins (6), while being nationally ranked for six-straight weeks for the first time in school history. USU also set a school record by winning 10 straight games in 2018.

With Maile serving as the interim head coach in 2018, Utah State won its fifth bowl game in school history with a 52-13 victory against North Texas in the New Mexico Bowl and finished the season ranked 22nd in the final Associated Press poll.

During the 2018 season, Maile helped coach an Aggie defense that led the nation in turnovers forced (32), interceptions (22) and three-and-outs forced per game (5.69), while ranking third nationally with six defensive touchdowns.

As Utah State's co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach in 2018, Maile mentored three Aggies who earned honorable mention all-Mountain West honors in Adewale Adeoye, Fua Leilua and Christopher Unga.

As Utah State's co-defensive coordinator/defensive line coach in 2017, USU allowed just 182.5 passing yards per game to rank 19th nationally. Furthermore, USU was sixth in the nation with 29 forced turnovers, including tying for second nationally with its 16 forced fumbles, and ranked fourth in the nation with five defensive touchdowns.

During the 2016 season, Utah State allowed just 176.5 passing yards per game to rank 10th nationally. In 2016, Maile coached a pair of Aggies to all-conference honors in Travis Seefeldt (second team) and Ricky Ali'ifua (honorable mention), who signed an NFL free agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs and played for the Seattle Seahawks.

Maile also spent two seasons as the defensive line coach at Vanderbilt. In 2015, the Commodores' defense ranked among the top-35 nationally in nine categories, including 28th in total defense (350.5 ypg), 22nd in scoring defense (21.0 ppg) and 33rd in rushing defense (143.2 ypg).

As Utah State's defensive line coach from 2011-13, Maile coached five Aggies to all-conference honors in Levi Koskan (second team), Al Lapuaho (first team), B.J. Larsen (second team), Jordan Nielsen (second team) and AJ Pataiali'i (second team).

During his first three years as defensive line coach, USU posted a 28-13 record and played in three-straight bowl games, winning the 2012 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl and the 2013 San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, and a 2012 Western Athletic Conference title.

During the 2013 season, Maile helped the Aggie defense rank first in the Mountain West and seventh in the nation in scoring, allowing 17.1 points per game, the second-fewest allowed by the Aggies since 1971. USU also ranked first in the MW and eighth in the nation in rushing defense (106.7 ypg), its fewest allowed since 1968, and first in the MW and 12th in the nation in total defense (330.9 ypg).

During the 2012 season, Maile helped Utah State's defense rank among the top-15 in the nation in five categories, including being ranked first in the WAC and seventh in the nation in scoring defense (15.38 ppg), second in the WAC and sixth nationally in sacks (3.23 pg), second in the WAC and 13th in the country in rushing defense (113.77 ypg), and first in the WAC and 15th in the nation in total defense (322.08 ypg).

In 2011, Maile helped Utah State lead the WAC in total defense (366.2 ypg), as well as ranking second in the league in both rushing defense (127.7 ypg) and tackles for loss (5.9 pg).

Maile was a standout defensive lineman for the Aggies from 2004-07, making 21 starts in 42 career games. He posted 71 total tackles with 19.0 tackles for loss and one fumble recovery. In his senior season of 2007 as team captain, Maile accounted for 8.0 tackles for loss, tying for second on the team.

A native of West Valley City, Utah, Maile was a first-team all-state defensive lineman at Alta High School in Sandy, Utah. He served an LDS Church Mission to the Dominican Republic from 2001-03.

Maile earned his bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies from Utah State in 2007 and earned his master's in education in 2010.

Maile and his wife, Heather, have three sons, Maximus, Samson and Titan, and a daughter, Cecilia.

Stacy Collins, who is in his fifth year at Utah State, will serve as the co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach this season, after being the special teams coordinator and running backs coach in 2019. Collins also spent three seasons as the inside linebackers coach (2017-18) and special teams coordinator (2016) at USU. Overall, Collins has 22 years of coaching experience, including 15 years as a coordinator and four years as a head coach.

In 2019, Collins helped Utah State to its 14th bowl game all-time, including its eighth in the past nine seasons, as it played in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Collins also coached a trio of all-Mountain West performers a year ago in placekicker Dominik Eberle (first team), return specialist Savon Scarver (first team) and running back Gerold Bright (honorable mention). Eberle was also named an honorable mention All-American by Pro Football Focus as he finished his Aggie career with 14 school records, including 359 points scored, to go along with seven MW records. Following his collegiate career, Eberle signed an NFL free agent contract with the Las Vegas Raiders.

Collins helped Utah State to one of its most successful seasons ever in 2018 as the Aggies went 11-2 and tied the school record for wins (11) and home wins (6), while being nationally ranked for six-straight weeks for the first time in school history. USU also won its fifth bowl game with a 52-13 victory against North Texas in the New Mexico Bowl. USU also set a school record by winning 10 straight games in 2018. USU finished the season ranked 22nd in the final Associated Press poll.

During the 2018 season, Collins helped coach an Aggie defense that led the nation in turnovers forced (32), interceptions (22) and three-and-outs forced per game (5.69), while ranking third with six defensive touchdowns.

As Utah State's inside linebackers coach in 2018, Collins mentored sophomore David Woodward, who Pro Football Focus named the Mountain West's Defensive Player of the Year and a first-team All-American, while The Associated Press named him a third-team All-American. Woodward finished the 2018 season leading the MW and ranking 10th in the nation in tackles with 134 (11.2 per game).

During the 2017 season, Collins helped coach a Utah State defense that allowed just 182.5 passing yards per game to rank 19th nationally. Furthermore, USU ranked sixth in the nation with 29 forced turnovers, including tying for second nationally with its 16 forced fumbles, and ranked fourth in the nation with five defensive touchdowns.

As special teams coordinator in 2016, Collins helped Utah State rank third in the Mountain West and 38th nationally in kickoff return defense, allowing 19.47 yards per return.

Collins came to Utah State after spending four seasons as the head coach and special teams coordinator at Division II South Dakota School of Mines, where he led the Hardrockers to winning seasons in 2013 and 2015.

Under Collins' direction in 2014, South Dakota School of Mines set single-season school records with 5,282 total yards, 3,540 passing yards and 286 first downs, and led all of college football in red zone efficiency. SDSM also set single-game school records with 674 total yards vs. William Jewell and 481 passing yards vs. Northwestern. Furthermore, SDSM set the single-season school record for points scored with 386 during the 2013 campaign.

As members of the Great Northwest Athletic Conference in 2014 and 2015, South Dakota School of Mines had 14 all-conference honorees, highlighted by quarterback Trent McKinney, who twice earned first-team honors and was named the conference's Newcomer of the Year in 2014. Collins also mentored a pair of record-setting kickers at South Dakota School of Mines in Devon Jones and Kolten Jelden.

Prior to his head coaching stint at South Dakota School of Mines, Collins served as the assistant head coach and special teams coordinator at Portland State in 2011, where he coached placekicker Zach Brown, who was a first-team All-American. Along with Brown, Collins coached punter Thomas Duynham to honorable mention all-Big Sky honors.

Prior to Portland State, Collins spent three seasons (2008-10) at Central Washington as the special teams coordinator and linebackers/defensive line coach. At CWU, Collins coached an All-American and two-time first-team all-GNAC kicker in Garrett Rolsma, as well as first-team all-conference kick returners Courtney Smith and Jerome Williams.

Collins has also had coaching stops at Southern Oregon in 2007 (defensive coordinator), Idaho State from 2005-06 (linebackers coach), Western Washington from 2003-04 (linebackers coach), South Dakota School of Mines in 2002 (defensive/special teams coordinator) and Western Oregon from 1998-2001 (special teams coordinator/linebackers coach).

In addition, he spent time in Europe on the coaching staff of the Vienna Vikings (Austria), as the defensive coordinator and interim head coach from 1999-2001.

While the special teams coordinator at Western Washington in 2004, Collins coached punter Mike Koenen, who went on to play for 10 seasons in the NFL.

Collins played linebacker at Western Oregon from 1993-97, graduating with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1998 and a master's degree in education in 2001.

Bodie Reeder, who has 10 years of college coaching experience, including six years as an offensive coordinator, is in his first year as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Utah State. In all, Reeder has coached in three bowl games and four Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Playoff games, and has been a part of one conference championship.

As the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at North Texas last season, the Mean Green averaged 30.3 points and ranked 27th in the nation, and second in Conference USA in passing (283.3 ypg). UNT also led Conference USA with 33 touchdown passes, which ranked 15th nationally, while its points per game average was the fourth-best in the league.

Reeder also spent two years (2017, 2018) as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Eastern Washington. In 2018, he helped the Eagles reach the FCS title game after winning the Big Sky Championship. That year, EWU averaged 528.2 yards and 43.1 points per game to rank third and fourth in the nation, respectively. In 2017, EWU was eighth in the FCS in passing (320.5 per game), fifth in total offense (476.7), 14th in scoring (34.5 points per game) and 11th in third down conversions (46.1 percent).

During the 2018 season, the Eagles' offense set a school record with 623 points, which included six games of at least 50 points. Furthermore, EWU produced at least 600 yards of total offense five times that season and set school records with 3,839 rushing yards (255.9 ypg) and 41 rushing touchdowns.

Reeder spent the 2014-16 seasons working with quarterbacks at Oklahoma State as an offensive quality control coach.

Oklahoma State played in bowl games all three of Reeder's seasons there, including victories in the 2016 Alamo Bowl (defeated Colorado 38-8) and the 2014 Cactus Bowl (defeated Washington 30-22). The Cowboys also played in the Sugar Bowl following the 2015 season (lost to Mississippi 48-20).

The 2016 Oklahoma State team was 10-3 and second in the Big 12 with a 7-2 record. The Cowboys were ninth in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision in passing offense (323.9 per game) and 17th in scoring (38.6 per game).

At Oklahoma State, Reeder helped coach quarterback Mason Rudolph, who was ranked seventh nationally in passing in 2016 with an average of 314.7 yards per game. He completed 63 percent of his passes for a total of 4,091 yards, 28 touchdowns and just four interceptions.

The previous season, Rudolph was 19th in the FBS (290.0 per game), finishing with 3,770 yards, 21 touchdowns and nine interceptions. Quarterback J.W. Walsh accounted for 24 touchdowns (11 rushing, 13 passing) in 2015.

Prior to Oklahoma State, Reeder was an assistant at Wisconsin-Stout for three seasons, and was offensive coordinator his last three. Besides coaching the team's quarterbacks, he also taught kinesiology at the school. Among the players he coached was all-conference quarterback Hank Kujak.

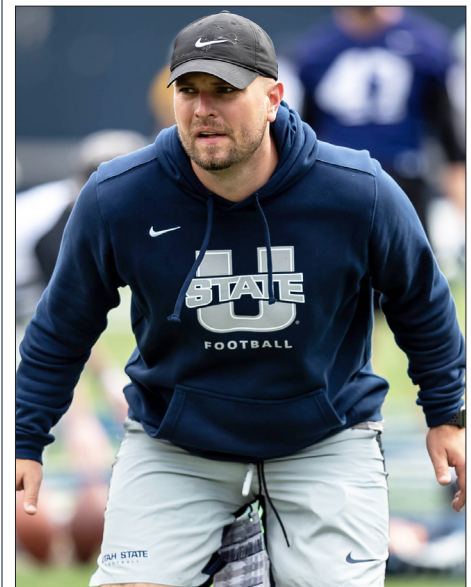
Reeder was also a graduate assistant at Eastern Illinois during the 2010 season working with defensive backs.

Reeder began his college career at Wyoming in 2005, then transferred to Eastern Illinois, where he had 3,741 passing yards, 23 touchdown passes and 356 career completions in 30 games. The Panthers advanced to the NCAA playoffs in 2007 and 2009. Reeder graduated from Eastern Illinois in 2010.

During his time at Eastern Illinois, Reeder played for current USU special teams coordinator and tight ends coach Roc Bellantoni, who coached with the Panthers from 2001-11 in various capacities, including acting head coach, associate head coach, defensive coordinator and special teams coordinator.

Reeder, a 2004 graduate of Mahomet-Seymour High School, passed for 6,582 yards and 67 touchdowns during his career. As a freshman starter, Reeder and Mahomet-Seymour HS finished 4-5. But the table was set for three straight playoff appearance as the Bulldogs compiled records of 6-4, 7-3 and 11-1 in his final three seasons.

Reeder and his wife Ashley have one son, Crew.

Roc Bellantoni, who has 27 years of coaching experience, including 15 years as a defensive coordinator and another three years as a special teams coordinator, is in his first year as Utah State's special teams coordinator and defensive coach.

In all, Bellantoni has reached the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoffs seven times, to go with two bowl appearances. He has also mentored 16 players who played professionally, including three NFL Draft picks.

Over his 27-year coaching career, Bellantoni has coached the defensive line and linebackers, served as defensive coordinator at three different stops, and reached the FCS playoffs seven different times, to go with two bowl appearances (Buffalo, 2018, Washington State, 2019).

Bellantoni comes to Utah State after spending the 2019 season as the interim defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Washington State as he helped the Cougars to an appearance in the Cheez-It Bowl. At WSU, two of his players earned all-Pac 12 honors in junior Jahad Woods (honorable mention) and freshman Travion Brown (second team all-purpose). Woods finished the regular season ninth in the country and second in the Pac-12 with 121 tackles, most by a Cougar since 1996. He also led the team with 10 tackles for loss, recorded three sacks and forced two fumbles, while posting team highs in tackles 10 times, including the final nine games. Woods recorded eight games with 10-plus tackles.

Prior to Washington State, Bellantoni coached for two seasons at Buffalo, where he served as special teams coordinator and defensive ends coach in 2018. He spent the 2017 season as director of player personnel.

In 2018, Bellantoni coached two-time and 2018 First-Team All-Mid American Conference selection Chuck Harris, who led the team in sacks and was selected to play in the 2019 Tropical Bowl. The Bulls' defense ranked second in the MAC, helping Buffalo to the 2018 Dollar General Bowl.

Bellantoni arrived at Buffalo from Florida Atlantic, where he spent three seasons as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach from 2014-16. At FAU, Bellantoni coached Trey Hendrickson, currently a defensive end for the New Orleans Saints. Hendrickson ended his storied career, three seasons of which came under Bellantoni, as the program's all-time leader in sacks, tackles for loss, quarterback hurries and forced fumbles.

Prior to FAU, he coached the defensive line and special teams at Villanova. The 2013 Villanova team finished the season ranked

No. 6 in the NCAA SRS rankings. He coached All-CAA defensive linemen Rakim Cox and Antoine Lewis, and helped lead the Wildcats to the FCS playoffs in 2012 after winning the Colonial Athletic Association.

A graduate of Iona, Bellantoni gained his most coaching experience at Eastern Illinois. He was with the Panthers from 2001-11, serving as defensive line coach, defensive coordinator, and finally, associate head coach. He was the defensive coordinator from 2002-11 and the associate head coach from 2007-11. Bellantoni helped Eastern Illinois win five Ohio Valley Conference Championships (2009, 2006, 2005, 2002, and 2001) and make six NCAA playoff appearances. The Panthers quarterback from 2006-09 was current USU offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Bodie Reeder.

Bellantoni also served as the acting head coach at Eastern Illinois for the final two games of the 2007 season, which included its FCS playoff appearance.

Bellantoni also had coaching stints at Drake and Buena Vista University. He started his coaching career at Mamaroneck High School.

He and his wife, Jenny, have four sons, Gino, Marco, Ricky and Nico.

Jason Phillips, who has 21 years of coaching experience, including five seasons as an offensive coordinator, is in his second season as Utah State's passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach. Phillips, who played professionally for eight seasons, including six years in the NFL, has coached in seven bowl games during his collegiate career.

During the 2019 season, Phillips helped four offensive players earn all-Mountain West honors, including wide receiver Siaosi Mariner, who was named to the second team.

Furthermore, USU's offense set school records in passes completed (315) and attempted (504), while its 3,628 passing yards are the second-most.

Phillips also helped Utah State to its 14th bowl game all-time in 2019, including its eighth in the past nine seasons, as it played in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Phillips came to Utah State after spending the 2018 season as the wide receivers coach for the Salt Lake Stallions of the Alliance of American Football. Prior to that, he spent the 2017 season as the passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach at Oregon State, and was the wide receivers coach at Kansas in 2016.

Prior to his one-year stint at Kansas, Phillips spent three years on the coaching staff at SMU, where he served as co-offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach from 2012-14.

Under Phillips' tutelage, SMU had multiple 1,000-yard receivers for just the third time in school history and multiple 100-reception receivers for the first time in program history.

Phillips came to the SMU program after completing his ninth season at Houston, where he served as offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach. Phillips had also served as UH's recruiting coordinator.

As offensive coordinator, Phillips capped a successful 2011 season by helping Houston to a dominating 30-14 win over Penn State in the Ticket City Bowl, which included 600 yards of total offense, its eighth that season. In all, the 2011 Cougar offense was one of the most prolific in NCAA history, averaging nearly 600 yards per game to rank second all-time just behind the 1989 Houston Cougars, who averaged 625 yards per game.

During his tenure at Houston, Phillips worked with numerous stellar players, including Donnie Avery, the first wide receiver taken in the 2008 NFL Draft. In his last four seasons at UH, Phillips produced seven 1,000-yard receiving seasons from four different players. Phillips also directed an offense led by quarterback Case Keenum, whom Phillips helped to numerous NCAA records.

Phillips began his college coaching career in 2001, when he served as an offensive assistant at Houston. He spent the following season coaching wide receivers at Texas State before returning to the Cougars as wide receivers coach in 2003. He spent the 2007 season at Baylor, serving as the recruiting coordinator and wide receivers coach. He returned to his alma mater in 2008 as co-offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator before being promoted to offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach in 2010.

In 2001, he coached as an offensive intern for the Minnesota Vikings, working under head coach Dennis Green and offensive coordinator Sherman Lewis. In that capacity, Phillips worked closely with wide receivers Randy Moss, Cris Carter, Jake Reed and Chris Walsh. The following season, Phillips served in a similar capacity with the Atlanta Falcons, where he worked under head coach Dan Reeves.

Phillips was also selected to participate in the 2008 NCAA Coaches Academy Program and the 2010 NCAA Champions Forum, both of which were designed to identify and nurture minority future head coaching candidates.

A native Houstonian who played at Ross Sterling High School, Phillips first made his mark at the University of Houston by hauling in passes from Heisman Trophy quarterback Andre Ware during the Cougars high-flying, high-scoring Run 'N Shoot heyday. Phillips led the nation in receiving yards in 1987 (875 yards) and 1988 (1,444), the first player since Tulsa's Howard Twilley accomplished that feat 23 years earlier.

In 1987, Phillips not only was an All-Southwest Conference pick and the SWC Newcomer of the Year, but was also selected to the UPI All-America team. The following year Phillips was named to the All-SWC First Team, was the SWC Co-Offensive Player of the Year and a consensus first-team All-America pick.

Phillips was also selected to the SWC's All-Decade Team for the '80s and, in 2006, Phillips' spectacular contributions to the program were recognized when he was inducted into the Houston Hall of Honor.

Phillips, who was a consensus All-America wide receiver during his playing days at Houston, was drafted by the Detroit Lions of the NFL in 1989, where he set a rookie record with a 10-catch, 155-yard performance against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Phillips, who has written about coaching and has published articles in American Football Monthly Magazine, earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Houston in 2001.





JUSTIN ENA

Justin Ena, who has 11 years of collegiate coaching experience, including six seasons as defensive coordinator, is in his second season at Utah State coaching the inside linebackers. Ena, who has coached in four bowl games, served as USU's defensive coordinator last season.

In 2019, Ena (Eh-nuh) helped four defensive players earn all-Mountain West honors, including linebacker David Woodward, who was named to the first team. Ena also helped Utah State's defense force 24 turnovers (13 fumbles, 11 interceptions) to rank second in the MW and 15th in the nation. In fact, USU's 13 fumble recoveries were tied for fifth nationally and led the conference.

At season's end, Ena helped Utah State to its 14th bowl game all-time, including its eighth in the past nine seasons, as it played in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Previously, Ena spent four seasons at Utah serving as the Utes' co-special teams coordinator for three of those years, and working with the linebackers all four seasons.

During the 2018 season, Ena helped Utah's defense rank among the top-20 in the nation in several categories, including fifth in rushing defense (101.8 yards allowed per game), ninth in tackles for loss (7.9 per game), 15th in total defense (315.1 yards allowed per game) and 16th in scoring defense (18.5 points per game allowed).

Under Ena, the linebackers helped Utah rank in the top-30 in rushing defense for four-straight seasons, including a No. 5 ranking in 2018 and a No. 6 ranking in 2015.

Individually, Ena coached Utah linebacker Chase Hansen to three All-America honors. Hansen, who led Utah with 114 tackles, led the Pac-12 and ranked fifth in the nation with 22.0 tackles for loss. He also tied for fourth nationally in tackles for loss per game (1.7). Hansen, who tied for fourth in the Pac-12 with 5.0 sacks, recorded at least 10 tackles in six games. Hansen was also named the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Week twice.

In all, Ena coached two linebackers to all-Pac-12 honors in 2018 as Hansen was named to the first team and senior Cody Barton earned honorable mention honors. Barton was drafted in the third round of the 2019 NFL Draft by the Seattle Seahawks, while Hansen signed an NFL free agent contract with the New Orleans Saints.

Linebackers Gionni Paul (first team) and Jared Norris (second team) earned all-Pac-12 honors in Ena's first season with the Utes in 2015. Paul led the Utes in tackles with 117 and was a two-time Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Week as a senior. Norris is in his fourth season as an undrafted free agent with the

Carolina Panthers.

As co-special teams coordinator at Utah, Ena's coverage units played a role in the Utes winning the NCAA net punting title in 2016, while the 2017 team finished fifth in the nation in net punting and the 2018 team ranked 15th. Furthermore, Utah had three kickers earn All-America honors in Ena's four years at Utah in punter Tom Hackett (2015), punter Mitch Wishnowsky (2016, 2017, 2018) and kicker Matt Gay (2017, 2018).

Prior to Utah, Ena was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Weber State in 2014 and a six-year assistant at Southern Utah from 2008-13, including the last four as the defensive coordinator. He was also SUU's special teams coordinator his first two seasons.

Southern Utah achieved NCAA FCS top-25 national rankings on both special teams and defense with Ena as a coordinator, including a No. 1 rank in net punting in 2009. The Thunderbirds also ranked No. 3 in punt return average and No. 6 in net punting in 2008, No. 9 in punt return average in 2009, No. 17 in scoring defense, No. 21 in total defense and No. 21 in run defense in 2010, No. 13 in sacks per game and No. 19 in pass defense in 2011, and No. 5 in turnover margin in 2012.

The 2013 T-Birds finished second in the Big Sky Conference in total defense and third in scoring defense.

Individual honors during Ena's time at SUU included two-year All-America punter Trevor Ward and return specialist Nick Miller, the nation's leader in all-purpose yards in 2008. Other accolades went to All-America defensive tackle Cody Larsen and Freshman All-Americans Zak Browning (linebacker), and James Cowser (defensive end). Browning was the Big Sky Newcomer of the Year in 2012.

The Thunderbirds placed 12 defenders on the all-Great West Conference team from 2010-11, including 10 first-team selections. Tyler Osborne became SUU's first GWC Defensive Player of the Year in 2011.

Ena earned his bachelor's degree in history from BYU in 2001. He was a three-year starter and three-time Mountain West all-conference linebacker for the Cougars. He played four seasons in the NFL, three with the Philadelphia Eagles and one with the Tennessee Titans, playing in 47 NFL games from 2002-05.

Ena and his wife, Dana, have one son, Justice, and one daughter, Olivia.

Bojay Filimoeatu is in his second season as Utah State’s outside linebackers coach.

As Utah State’s defensive ends coach in 2019, Filimoeatu (Fee-lee-moe-ee-ah-tu) helped four defensive players earn all-Mountain West honors, including defensive end Tipa Galeai, who was named to the second team. Following his collegiate career, Galeai signed an NFL free agent contract with the Green Bay Packers.

Filimoeatu also helped Utah State’s defense force 24 turnovers (13 fumbles, 11 interceptions) in 2019 to rank second in the Mountain West and 15th in the nation. In fact, USU’s 13 fumble recoveries were tied for the fifth nationally and led the MW.

At season’s end, Filimoeatu helped Utah State to its 14th bowl game all-time, including its eighth in the past nine seasons, as it played in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Filimoeatu was a two-year starting linebacker at Utah State (2011-12) for USU head coach Gary Andersen, helping the Aggies to a pair of bowl games and the 2012 Western Athletic Conference title. While at USU, he made 112 tackles (48 solo), eight sacks and one interception. He finished his college career at the 2012 Casino Del Sol College All-Star Game.

Following college, Filimoeatu spent the 2014 season playing linebacker for the Oakland Raiders, appearing in eight games.

Prior to Utah State, Filimoeatu spent two seasons as the linebackers coach at Mountain West-foe San José State and prior to that was a quality control defensive coach at Oregon State in 2016.

At San José State, Filimoeatu coached linebacker Ethan Aguayo to honorable mention all-Mountain West honors in 2018 as the junior led the Spartans in total tackles with 106 and ranked 29th nationally with an average of 9.6 tackles per game. Aguayo recorded a career-high 20 tackles against Nevada and posted double-digit stops six times during the 2018 season.

During the 2017 season, Filimoeatu coached junior linebacker Frank Ginda, who became just the second Spartan linebacker to earn first-team all-Mountain West honors. As a junior, Ginda established a single-season conference record and the eighth-best total by a Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) player with 173 tackles. His 13.31 tackles per game average presently ranks 20th-best among FBS players since the 2000 season when the NCAA standardized defensive statistics.

Prior to transferring to Utah State, Filimoeatu spent two years (2009-10) at Mt. San Antonio College in Walnut, Calif., earning first-team All-America honors, as well as

Defensive Player of the Year, for one publication. He was ranked as the No. 36 overall junior college prospect in the country after making 62 tackles, including 22.0 for loss, with 13.0 sacks, eight quarterback hurries, four pass breakups, three fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles during his career. He earned MVP honors of the state and national JC championship games.

Filimoeatu attended Granger High School in West Valley City, Utah, where he played linebacker and fullback. He earned All-Region 6 honors as a junior and senior.

Filimoeatu, who graduated from Utah State with an interdisciplinary studies degree with an emphasis in sociology and physical education in 2012, is married to former USU softball player Hailey Froton. Froton was a two-time all-conference player for the Aggies and is the school record holder with 132 career RBIs. The couple has two sons, Johnny and Kersey.





MARK ORPHEY

Mark Orphey, who has nine years of collegiate coaching experience, is in his second season as Utah State's secondary coach.

As Utah State's secondary coach in 2019, Orphey (Or-Fay) helped four defensive players earn all-Mountain West honors, including safety Shaq Bond, who was named to the honorable mention team. Bond finished the season with a team-best three interceptions, while fellow junior safety Troy Lefeged Jr. led the team with 104 tackles.

Orphey also helped Utah State's defense force 24 turnovers (13 fumbles, 11 interceptions) in 2019 to rank second in the Mountain West and 15th in the nation. In fact, USU's 13 fumble recoveries were tied for fifth nationally and led the MW.

At season's end, Orphey helped Utah State to its 14th bowl game all-time, including its eighth in the past nine seasons, as it played in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Orphey came to Utah State after spending two seasons (2017, 2018) as the secondary coach at Montana State.

During the 2018 season, Orphey helped the Bobcats to an 8-5 record, including a 5-3 mark in the Big Sky Conference, and an appearance in the NCAA FCS Playoffs for the first time since 2014. MSU also advanced to the second round of the playoffs for the first time since 2012.

In 2018, Bobcat defensive backs produced nine interceptions and six forced fumbles under Orphey's guidance, and the Cats finished in the top half of the league in interceptions (12), passing yards allowed (213.5 yards per game) and passing efficiency defense (124.16).

In his first year at Montana State in 2017, Orphey molded a youthful group of cornerbacks into a secondary that finished fifth in the Big Sky Conference in pass defense, allowing 239.5 yards per game.

During his two seasons at Montana State, Orphey coached four players to all-conference honors in safety Jahque Alleyn (2018), cornerback Greg Filer (2018), safety Brayden Konkol (2018) and safety Bryson McCabe (2017).

Prior to Montana State, Orphey spent four seasons at South Carolina, serving as a quality control assistant (2013) and defensive graduate assistant (2014-16). With the Gamecocks, Orphey helped the team to three bowl games (2013 Capital One Bowl, 2014 Independence Bowl, 2016 Birmingham Bowl) and the team's third-straight 11-win season in 2013. South Carolina also earned two of its 12 all-time bowl wins during Orphey's time there.

During his four seasons at South Caro-

lina, Orphey coached four players to all-conference honors in Chris Lammons (2015), Al Harris Jr. (2015), Brison Williams (2013) and Victor Hampton (2013).

Orphey began his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater as the cornerbacks coach at Texas Southern. During his two seasons with the Tigers, he mentored Tray Walker to all-conference and All-America honors in 2012, and Jerome Thomas to all-conference honors in 2011.

Orphey was a three-year starter at cornerback at Texas Southern, earning all-Southwestern Athletic Conference honors as a junior and senior (2009-10).

A native of Houston, Texas, Orphey graduated from Texas Southern in 2010 with a bachelor's degree in business administration and earned his master's degree from South Carolina in 2015 in health information technology.

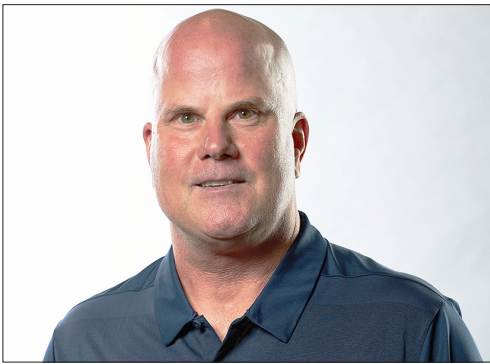

Dave Schramm, who brings 29 years of coaching experience with him to Utah State, including eight seasons as an offensive coordinator, is in his first year as Utah State's running backs coach.

In all, Schramm has coached in 13 bowl games and 10 playoff games at the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) level. He has also been a part of eight conference championship teams.

Most recently, Schramm spent two seasons (2018-19) as the offensive coordinator at Weber State, helping the Wildcats to a 21-7 overall mark and 14-2 conference record as they shared back-to-back Big Sky titles. In 2018, Weber State advanced to the FCS Playoff Quarterfinals and was ranked as high as third in the nation, its highest in school history. In 2019, the Wildcats were again ranked as high as third in the nation and advanced to the semifinals of the FCS Playoffs for the first time in school history.

During the 2019 season, Schramm coached five offensive players to all-Big Sky Conference honors, including running back Josh Davis, who earned All-America honors. Four Wildcats earned All-America honors under Schramm in 2018, while Davis won the Jerry Rice Award, which is annually awarded to the Most Outstanding Freshman at the FCS level.

Schramm spent four seasons (2012-15) as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Fresno State. In Schramm's system, the Bulldogs ranked as one of the top offenses in the nation in several categories. Schramm also coached All-American and Oakland Raiders star Derek Carr for two seasons as Fresno State led the nation in passing and was third in the nation in total offense in 2013. Schramm was also a finalist for the Broyles Award in 2013, given to the nation's top assistant coach.

In all, Schramm coached seven offensive players to the NFL and had three players earn All-American honors during his time at Fresno State, in addition to eight all-Mountain West first-team selections and 19 players that earned all-conference honors.

Prior to coaching at Fresno State, Schramm spent seven seasons (2005-11) as an assistant coach at the University of Utah, three of those alongside Andersen. He was the offensive coordinator with the Utes in 2009 and the co-offensive coordinator in 2010. Utah averaged 33.1 points per game in 2010 and 29.1 points per game in 2009. He also coached running backs, quarterbacks and tight ends and served as the recruiting coordinator during his time at Utah.

Schramm spent the 2003 and 2004 seasons as an assistant coach and recruiting

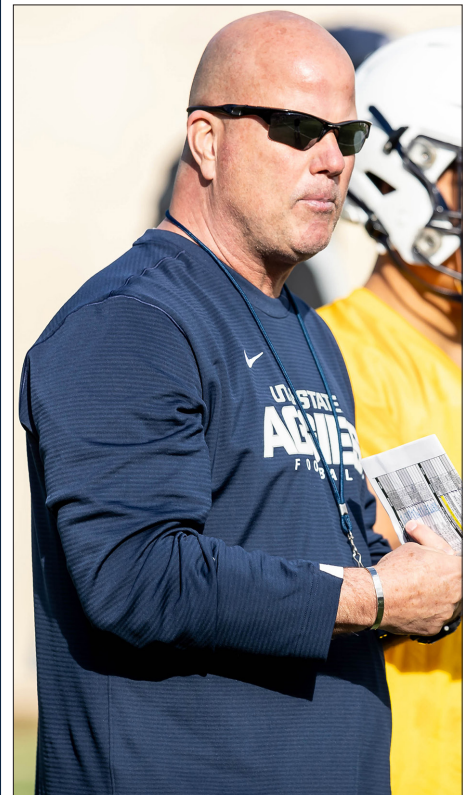
coordinator at Montana. He coached the offensive line and tight ends for the Grizzlies and was part of the 2004 Montana team that finished 12-3 and advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA championship game.

Schramm spent 12 seasons coaching at San Diego State (1990-2001), where he was the recruiting coordinator, while also coaching the offensive line, safeties, tight ends and running backs. He also spent one season coaching at Southwest Texas State in 2002, where he was the assistant head coach and running backs coach.

A native of San Diego, Schramm was a college quarterback at Cornell (Iowa) and Grossmont Junior College before playing at Adams State in Colorado. As a freshman at Cornell, he led all of Division III in touchdown passes and helped the team to a No. 1 national ranking in total offense.

His first coaching job was at Patrick Henry High School in San Diego, where he was an assistant coach from 1984-87. He began his college coaching career at Austin Peay, where he coached running backs and tight ends. He was also a graduate assistant coach at Nebraska in 1989, where he coached the secondary.

Schramm graduated from San Diego State in 1988 with a physical education degree. He and his wife Bonnie have twin sons, D.J. and Dusty.

TJ Woods, who has 17 years of collegiate coaching experience, is in his fourth season as Utah State’s offensive line coach. This is Woods’ second tenure with USU as he also coached the Aggies from 2009-12. In all, Woods is entering his 11th season under USU head coach Gary Andersen at three different schools, including his sixth at USU.

As Utah State’s offensive line coach in 2019, Woods helped four offensive players earn all-Mountain West honors. Furthermore, USU’s offense set school records in passes completed (315) and attempted (504), while its 3,628 passing yards are the second-most.

Woods also helped Utah State to its 14th bowl game all-time in 2019, including its eighth in the past nine seasons, as it played in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Before his current position, Woods spent the 2018 season as the offensive line coach at Western Kentucky. At WKU, Woods inherited an offensive line group that did not return a single starter at their respective position and just two starters – at any position – from the 2017 group. WKU was also one of only three teams in the nation without a senior offensive lineman.

From the 2017 to 2018 season, Western Kentucky’s rushing yards per game improved by 75.98, eighth-best nationally, and its yards per carry increased by 1.72, fifth-best nationally. Furthermore, WKU allowed 16 fewer sacks in 2018 as compared to 2017, the 10th-best improvement in the nation.

Woods came to Western Kentucky following a three-year stint at Oregon State, where he coached four offensive linemen to Pac-12 All-Conference honors and saw two of his linemen, Sean Harlow and Isaac Seumalo, get drafted into the NFL. Harlow was a fourth-round selection of the Atlanta Falcons in 2017, while Seumalo went in the third round to Philadelphia in 2016.

Under Woods’ direction, the Oregon State offense carried the ball for a school-record 5.2 yards per carry in 2016. Furthermore, seven of his offensive linemen were named to the Pac-12 Conference All-Academic team during his time in Corvallis.

Prior to Oregon State, Woods served as the offensive line coach at Wisconsin, where his group helped block for running back Melvin Gordon in 2014, when he won the Doak Walker Award and was a Heisman Trophy finalist. That season, Gordon rushed for 2,587 yards, second-most in a single season in FBS history, and set then-FBS single-game rushing record with 408 yards.

Behind Woods’ offensive line, Gordon and fellow running back Corey Clement set the NCAA record for rushing by two backs with 3,536 yards. That 2014 season also saw the

Badger offensive front set a school record for fewest sacks allowed with 13, as well as a Big Ten Conference record with 4,482 net rushing yards.

In his first season with Wisconsin in 2013, the Badgers set a then-school record with 3,689 rushing yards, to go along with a school record 450.8 yards per game of total offense. With Woods’ offensive line leading the way, Gordon and fellow running back James White became the first running backs in NCAA history to each eclipse 1,400 rushing yards in the same season.

In all, Woods mentored seven All-Big Ten players at Wisconsin, including four All-Americans, highlighted by Rob Havenstein, who was selected by the Los Angeles Rams in the second round of the 2015 NFL Draft.

Before Wisconsin, Woods spent four years at Utah State (2009-12), including the final two directing the offensive line. The Aggies rewrote the offensive record books by setting then-school records for total offense in consecutive seasons, concluding with 6,108 yards in 2012. Woods coached five players to All-Western Athletic Conference honors, including Tyler Larsen and Philip Gapelu in 2011. Larsen, who earned second-team All-America honors as a senior in 2013, is now a six-year NFL veteran having spent the past four seasons with the Carolina Panthers.

A former player at Azusa Pacific (2001-02) as well as Iowa State and Citrus Junior College, where he earned NJCAA All-American honors in 1999, Woods got his coaching start as a graduate assistant at Azusa Pacific in 2003. After a two-year run as the school’s tight ends coach, where he coached Ricky Burgan to NAIA All-American honors, he spent a season coaching the offensive line at Citrus before going to New Mexico for two seasons to serve as a graduate assistant on the offensive line. Offensive lineman Eric Cook was drafted by the Washington Redskins in the seventh round of the 2010 NFL Draft, while Byron Bell was named a freshman All-American in 2008.

Currently, eight of Woods’ former offensive line pupils are active on NFL rosters, including Beau Benzschawel (Detroit Lions), Blake Brandel (Minnesota Vikings), Michael Deiter (Miami Dolphins), Larsen (Carolina Panthers), Havenstein (Los Angeles Rams), Harlow (Atlanta Falcons), Seumalo (Philadelphia Eagles) and Tyler Marz (Carolina Panthers).

Woods and his wife Kelly have two daughters, Madison and McKenzie. A 2002 graduate from Azusa Pacific with a business degree, Woods continued to pursue his education and earned his master’s in physical education from Azusa Pacific in 2005.




MIKE FAVERO

- **Offensive Analyst**
- **Utah State, 1992**
- **Second Year at Utah State**



Mike Favero is in his second year with Utah State as an offensive analyst after spending 17 years as the head coach at Logan (Utah) High School.

In his first season with the Aggies, Favero helped Utah State to a third-place finish in the Mountain Division of the Mountain West with a 6-2 league record and to its eighth bowl game in the past nine seasons. Offensively, four Aggies earned various all-conference accolades, including quarterback Jordan Love, who set the school record for career total offense (9,003 yards) and single season records in both completions (293) and attempts (473). Love became just the fifth Aggie ever drafted into the NFL as the Green Bay Packers selected him 26th overall.

At Logan HS, Favero won five state championships and eight region titles, amassing an overall record of 149-60 before retiring following the 2015 season.

While at Logan HS, Favero was the recipient of several awards, including the 2018 National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame (Utah Chapter) Outstanding High School Football Coach, the National Federation of High School Football Coaches Western United States Coach of the Year (2008) and numerous Coach of the Year accolades for the Beehive State. He has been a national speaker for Glazier Clinics teaching, promoting and inspiring other coaches to improve their skills and love for the game.

Favero, whose resume includes coaching 12 Utah National Football Foundation Scholar-Leader-Athletes, coached numerous players that went on to play collegiately, including current/former Aggies Caden Andersen, Taylor Compton, Chase Nelson and Jacoby Wildman.

Other notable players that Favero coached who excelled at the next level include Chasen Andersen (Wisconsin/Utah State), Chris Cooley (Utah State/Washington Redskins), Luke Falk (Washington State/Miami Dolphins/New York Jets), B.J. Larsen (Utah State/Buffalo Bills), DJ Nelson (Utah State) and Riley Nelson (Utah State/BYU).

Favero played football at Helix High School in La Mesa, Calif., and started coaching at his alma mater the year after graduating in 1985. He went on to graduate from Utah State with a bachelor's degree in teaching in 1992, then earned his master's of education in 1998.

Favero began teaching and coaching at Logan HS in 1993. He became the head coach in 1999 and just one year later, he led them to their first state title. His other state titles came during the 2005, 2007, 2011 and 2015 campaigns, as well as a runner-up finish in 2003.

Considered one of the state's pre-eminent offensive minds, Favero went from a two-tailback 21-personnel state-championship-winning team in 2001 to a spread offensive – an identity uncommon in Utah in the early 2000s.

Once the spectrum-altering change was made, Logan HS quarterbacks now litter the passing records in the Utah High School Activities Association's record book. After stepping down from coaching in 2015, Favero continued to teach physical education at Logan HS until he retired following the 2017-18 academic year.

Favero and his wife, Heidi, have two sons: Jace (14) and Easton (11).


ZACH NYBORG

- **Assistant AD / Director of Football Operations**

- **Sixth Year at Utah State**



Zach Nyborg is in his second year serving as an Assistant Athletics Director for Football Operations at Utah State. In his current role, Nyborg oversees the day-to-day operations of the football program.

Overall, Nyborg is in his sixth year on the Aggies' staff, as he was an offensive and recruiting administrative assistant in 2010, a defensive and recruiting administrative assistant in 2011, an offensive graduate assistant for quarterbacks, recruiting coordinator and assistant to the head coach in 2012 and USU's director of player personnel in 2018.

Nyborg came to Utah State after spending three seasons as the associate athletic director for football at Oregon State. In that role, he oversaw the operations of the football program, including roster management, team scheduling and travel, all aspects of the budget and was the primary liaison for all auxiliary groups within the department. He also served on the department's senior staff, on the athletic department's strategic plan steering committee, on the athletic department's facilities master planning steering committee, and was the program's liaison to the \$46 million Valley Football Center expansion project.

Nyborg went to Oregon State after one year at BYU as the assistant athletic director/director of football operations. He was a member of the Cougars' senior leadership council, served as the liaison to all auxiliary groups, and coordinated all aspects of the football program, including team travel, game and weekly scheduling, roster management, among other duties.

From January 2013 through May 2014, Nyborg was the director of football operations at Wisconsin. While at Wisconsin, he was the department head and coordinated all aspects of football operations, including team travel, game and weekly scheduling, roster management and oversaw football support staff.

Nyborg began his career in Division I athletics as an offensive and recruiting administrative assistant at Utah State in 2010. He was the team's defensive and recruiting administrative assistant in 2011, and in 2012 was promoted to offensive graduate assistant for quarterbacks, recruiting coordinator and assistant to the head coach.

While at Utah State, the Aggies climbed into the top 25, won the Western Athletic Conference Championship, and played in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl twice (2011 & 2012). Prior to that, the Aggies hadn't appeared in a bowl game since 1993.

Nyborg spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Timpview High School in Provo, Utah, under Louis Wong, where the Thunderbirds won their second and third consecutive state championships.

Nyborg holds two degrees, earning a bachelor's degree from BYU's Marriott School of Management in business management, and a master's degree in health, physical education, and recreation from Utah State.

The native of Centerville, Utah, served a mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Knoxville, Tenn., and was a three-sport athlete at Viewmont High School, lettering in football, basketball, and track & field. He earned all-region honors as a quarterback and was a team captain. He was also a two-year captain for the track & field team and an academic all-state selection in basketball.

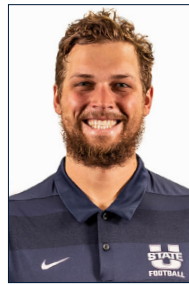
Keegan Andersen, a three-year letterwinner at tight end for the Aggies from 2011-13, is in his second year as Utah State's director of player personnel.

Andersen's responsibilities include the overall management of the recruiting process, the identification and evaluation of prospective student-athletes, program marketing and social media, and the planning and execution of all official and unofficial visits.

Andersen came to Utah State after spending the 2018 season as the assistant director of player personnel for the University of Utah football program. Prior to that, Andersen spent three seasons on staff at Oregon State, including serving as the assistant director of football operations for two years (2016-17). He also spent the 2015 season as an offensive graduate assistant coach for the Beavers, and in 2014, was a defensive graduate assistant at Wisconsin.

Andersen, who spent four seasons with the Aggies, earned Mountain West and Western Athletic Conference academic honors three times. Andersen, who is the oldest son of current USU head football coach Gary Andersen, played for his father at USU from 2010-12. Keegan and his wife, Jen, were married in June 2014. The couple has a daughter, Baylor.



TREVER McFALLS

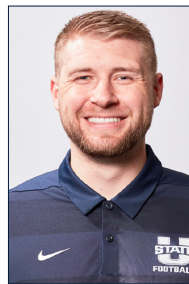

Hicks has earned his CSCS Certification from the NSCA.

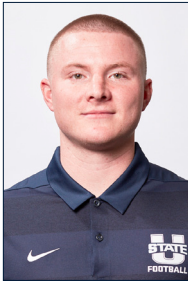

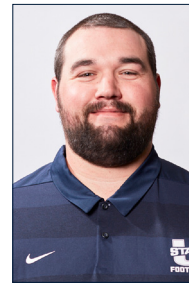
