## OFFENSE

**Strengths:** Quarterback, Receiver

**Question Marks:** Offensive Line, Running Back

As a first-time head coach last spring, Kyle Whittingham chose to retain the spread offense that had vaulted Utah to a spectacular season just a few months earlier. Given the fact that Utah had lost three first-team all-conference players from its 2004 offense—including a quarterback who became the No. 1 pick of the NFL draft—some wondered whether “spread-thin” offense might better describe Whittingham’s plan for 2006.

Since Utah proceeded to lead the Mountain West Conference in total offense again last fall, no one is questioning his choice now. And with far more play-makers returning than a year ago, watch for the Utes to spread it on even thicker in 2006.

After turning a mostly green group into a 30.0 point-per-game scorer that averaged 473.0 yards in total offense, offensive coordinator Andy Ludwig plans to spread his wings even more in 2006. For instance, while Utah’s standard set will feature four receivers, Ludwig will reintroduce the tight end into the playbook as a big-play threat.

But Ludwig’s biggest call won’t be what plays Utah will run this year, but who will run them. With three extremely talented and experienced quarterbacks vying for the starting job, the Utes are loaded behind center. To some degree, the game plan will revolve around who wins that starting job.

On-the-job training for several new receivers a year ago should translate into some good games of pitch and catch in 2006, regardless of the quarterback selection. Question marks are at running back, where very little in terms of numbers returns, and offensive line, where an all-league center and a starting guard must be replaced.

Here’s a look at Utah’s offensive personnel. Years listed are the eligibility status starting in the fall:

### Quarterback

All eyes will be focused on the quarterback derby in the spring since perhaps no school in the country is as deep at this position as Utah. **Brian Johnson** (6-2, 205, Jr.) won second-team all-MWC honors as a first-year starter in 2005 after leading the league in total offense and passing efficiency. Johnson threw for 2,892 yards while completing nearly 64-percent of his passes, and also rushed

for 478 yards as Utah’s second-leading rusher.

The 18-year-old was already situated in the top-10 of several Utah all-time single-season records when he injured his knee late in the second-to-last game of the regular season. Enter junior college transfer **Brett Ratliff** (6-4, 224, Sr.), whose stunning NCAA debut gave Utah an upset win over Brigham Young in Provo. He proved his Mountain West Conference Player-of-the-Week performance against BYU was no fluke at the Emerald Bowl, where he shredded one of the nation’s best defenses to lead Utah to a 38-10 victory over Georgia Tech.

Ratliff’s rise from obscurity to hero saw him pass for 621 yards and 8 touchdowns in his two games as the starter. He also displayed great running skills—pounding out 112 yards against BYU alone.

The much-anticipated Johnson-Ratliff showdown will have to wait until the fall since Johnson won’t be able to do much in spring camp while recovering from surgery to repair his torn ACL. But forgive the ever-confident Ratliff if he still sneaks a peek over his shoulder at contender **Tommy Grady** (6-7, 233, Jr.)—a tall, big-armed transfer from Oklahoma who impressed observers while working with the scout teams last year.

Grady has two years of eligibility remaining after playing in five games for Oklahoma in 2004 as Heisman Trophy winner Jason White’s backup and sitting out as a transfer last fall. He completed 12-of-14 (92%) pass attempts for 63 yards and a touchdown as a Sooner freshman.

Ute coaches will also take a hard look at talented redshirt freshman **Kevin Dunn** (6-3, 220, Fr.). Inopportune shoulder problems in camp last fall cost Dunn a shot at the backup job, but those troubles are behind him.

### Receiver

Rarely does a team lose its two leading receivers and still consider the position a strength. That’s the case this year with Utah, though, which lost top receivers Travis LaTendresse and John Madsen to graduation but has plenty in reserve.

**Brian Hernandez** (6-0, 175, Sr.), Utah's third-leading receiver, played on a badly injured ankle for most of 2005 and successful off-season surgery should be all it takes for him to emerge as a league leader. Hernandez conjures up memories of former Ute Steve Smith—now an all-pro receiver for Carolina—with his incredible toughness and ability to win the jump ball and take off with it. He was Utah's best after the catch a year ago as a first-year junior college transfer—averaging 18.2 yards per catch.

Ankle injuries to starters LaTendresse, Madsen and Hernandez had one bonus: underclassmen played a lot more than expected a year ago. They'll be old hands by fall.

**Brent Casteel** (5-10, 193, So.), a redshirt freshman a year ago, is slotted for one of the four starting positions. He tied Hernandez for the third-most catches a year ago (39) and showed some dazzling moves. **Marquis Wilson** (5-11, 173, So.), pulled out of a redshirt year in midseason after injuries to the upper-class starters, is ready for a full-time role. Wilson, like Casteel, cannot only catch, but is also a threat to run off the pitch, reverse and an assorted bag of tricks. Junior **Derrek Richards** (5-11, 175) started the last six games of 2006 and his blazing (4.4 40) speed makes him dangerous in the open field.

**Freddie Brown** (6-3, 217, So.), a late scholarship addition to the team last August, was pressed into duty midway through the season after injuries struck the position. Brown's tall, lanky frame gives Utah a different component and his role should increase as a sophomore.

An interesting addition to the mix is redshirt freshman **Sean Smith** (6-3, 207). Smith came to Utah as a running back, but moved to receiver in the off-season. He'll push the starters with his size and power.

#### Running Back

Without question, the biggest unknown in this year's offense—and maybe in the entire team—is running back. Gone is second-team all-conference runner Quinton Ganther, who became just the eighth Ute ever to rush for 1,000 yards (1,120) in a season. His trio of backups combined for just 194 total yards and no touchdowns.

Those three are back to fight for the starting post in the spring, and two highly-touted freshmen will join the fray in August. The early favorite to start is sophomore **Darrell Mack** (6-0, 216). Utah's main backup as a true freshman last year, he rushed 39 times for 147 yards (3.8 average). The coaches love his ability, which they hope will translate into yards now that he has a handle on the pass protection schemes.

The wild card could be speedy senior **Daryl Poston** (5-11, 197)—recipient of an extra year of eligibility from the NCAA due to past injuries. A USC transfer and former prep All-American, Poston has never hit his stride as a collegian due to a series of knee injuries. If he can stay on the field, he'll bring the talent that won him playing time as a true freshman at USC in 2002.

Another runner hoping to put injuries behind him is junior **Mike Liti** (5-10, 215). Liti played in nine games and started three as a true freshman in 2003—averaging 4.9 yards per carry. But injuries resulted in a redshirt year in 2004 and slowed his progress again in 2005.

The Ute coaches had enough confidence in their three returners to sign two freshmen, as opposed to a junior college transfer, in February. Although they won't arrive on campus until August,

freshmen **R.J. Stanford** (5-11, 180) and **Kenton Thomas** (6-1, 198) could impress their way into playing time at this wide-open position.

#### Offensive Line

Center is the central question on the offensive line, where Utah lost not only an all-conference player, but his backup as well. Spring ball will prove an important training ground for hopefuls **Kyle Gunther** (6-4, 302, Jr.) and **Jeremy Inferrera** (6-3, 292, Jr.). Gunther saw only spot duty with special teams last year and Inferrera practiced but could not play upon transferring from Hawaii.

The rest of the line is much more proven, at least from a starting standpoint. Returning at tackle are two all-conference candidates. Senior **Tavo Tupola** (6-3, 300) was second-team all-MWC a year ago and **Jason Boone** (6-4, 294, Jr.) led the line in total plays. Two part-time starters are back at guard. **Robert Conley** (6-1, 311, So.) improved by leaps and bounds during his redshirt freshman season and eventually took the starting right guard job away from **Eric Pettit** (6-4, 306, Sr.). Pettit will resume a starting role this spring—now at left guard. Once again, he'll need to defend his turf against a highly-touted redshirt freshman—this time **Zane Beadles** (6-4, 308). Two mid-year junior college transfers will participate in spring ball and could make some noise as well. They are **Dustin Hensel** (6-7, 322, So.) and **Corey Seiuli** (6-3, 326, So.).

#### Tight End

Ludwig put his own spin on the spread offense he inherited last season and he'll infuse yet another element in 2006. While the Utes will typically start the game with a four-receiver set, count on the tight ends making more than a cameo blocking appearance this fall.

Two recruited tight ends, along with three converted defensive linemen, make this position a bit of a melting pot. **Chris Joppru** (6-6, 241, Fr.) and **Lance Boreldeau** (6-4, 253, Fr.) spent last season as redshirts. Onetime defensive linemen **Jason Voss** (6-3, 268, Sr.), **Pete Moleni** (6-3, 264, So.) and **Colt Sampson** (6-4, 240, So.) are also contenders now at tight end.

# 2006 UTAH OUTLOOK

## DEFENSE

**Strengths:** Defensive Line, Defensive Backs

**Question Mark:** Linebacker

The Utes finished second in the Mountain West Conference in total defense and scoring defense last season, even while adjusting to the loss of two linemen to the NFL draft and a projected all-conference candidate to a season-ending injury. First-year defensive coordinator Gary Andersen had to replace seven starters from 2004's rugged defense—including four linemen and safety Morgan Scalley, the MWC Defensive Player of the Year.

Since Utah's 4-3 defense hinges on pressure up front, the young line's growing pains rippled all the way back to the secondary. Two things happened that reasserted Utah's defensive dominance and helped the Utes win four of their last five games: The line matured and **Eric Weddle** (6-0, 200, Sr.) gave the pass defense a shot in the arm by moving from safety to corner. A byproduct of those developments is that the 2006 defense should pick up where it left off last year—which was holding No. 24-ranked Georgia Tech to 10 points in the Emerald Bowl.

All-conference caliber returners on the line will make everyone's job behind them easier. Weddle, a bona fide All-America candidate and the 2005 MWC Defensive Player of the Year, will anchor a deep backfield. Only at linebacker are there some questions, but even there, experience is the rule rather than the exception.

### Defensive Line

With the graduation of Steve Fifita, Utah lost the league's best tackle, but playing in his shadow might have been the second best. **Kelly Talavou** (6-2, 307, Sr.) started all 12 games at nose guard last year and possesses many of Fifita's traits in a taller frame. Talavou will slide over to Fifita's spot at tackle, although he'll still play some nose guard depending on Andersen's rotation schedule.

Ready to compete for a starting job at nose guard is big **Paul Soliai** (6-4, 318, Sr.), a former junior college All-America offensive lineman who crossed the line last season when the defense got in a pinch. Bigger than most of the linemen

he now faces—and also more agile—Soliai can create some real match-up problems.

Though his upside is tantalizing, Soliai has no guarantee he'll win the job over **Derek Beardall** (6-1, 293, Sr.) and redshirt freshman **Kenapi Eliapo** (6-0, 290). Since Andersen likes to rotate four players between the two tackle positions, all three of them will play alongside Talavou unless one gets bumped out by promising freshman **Pauli Latu** (6-0, 295) when he joins the team in August.

Perhaps the most improved area of this year's defense will be the ends. A year ago, junior **Martail Burnett** (6-3, 248) had planned on apprenticing for returning starter Marquess Ledbetter while transitioning from safety to open end. Plans changed when Ledbetter suffered a season-ending injury in the summer and Burnett found himself thrown into the fire. He shared time with **Alex Puccinelli** (6-1, 236, Jr.)—as he will again

this year—but Burnett pulled away and secured the starting job by the season's midway point. He finished with 53 total tackles, 7 tackles for loss and three-and-a-half sacks. Now that he understands the position, Burnett's athleticism, speed and bigger body (he is 30 pounds heavier than his freshman year) could translate into all-league honors.

Replacing NFL draft pick Jonathan Fanene required a little more ingenuity on Andersen's part. He eventually started junior college transfer **Soli Lefiti** (6-4, 265, Sr.) after he got up to speed, but Andersen's stop-gap measure was to alternate tackles at end. Once Lefiti claimed the job, the problem was solved not only for 2005, but 2006 as well. As a bonus, there's depth now at end. Junior **Casey Sutera** (6-3, 262), a transfer from Southern Utah a year ago, will start in the spring while Lefiti recovers from off-season shoulder surgery.

### Linebacker

Utah has a ton of tackles to replace here since 2005 Mountain West Conference tackle leader Spencer Toone has graduated. **Joe Jiannoni** (6-1, 230, Jr.) looks like the best man for the job. Jiannoni totaled 73 tackles as a first-year starting middle linebacker and his numbers should rise with his move to rover.

The biggest question is who will replace Jiannoni. Going into spring ball, **Loma Olevao** (6-1, 232, Jr.) and junior college transfer **Chet Blasucci** (6-1, 241,

Jr.) are the favorites. Olevao played some last year while Blasucci is a member of the latest signing class who has already enrolled.

The deepest position is probably “stud” linebacker, where two part-time starters return in **Kyle Brady** (6-1, 232, Jr.) and **Malakai Mokofisi** (6-2, 228, Jr.). This could shape up into one of the most interesting starting battles on the defense.

### Secondary

Reigning MWC Defensive Player of the Year **Eric Weddle** (6-0, 200, Sr.) just might be the best defender at any position in the nation. Certainly, wherever Weddle plays—and whomever Utah plays—he is the best defender on the field. When Utah’s corners struggled in coverage last season, Weddle moved over from safety to fix the problem. After the change, the Utes won three of their last four games. Last seen in action, Weddle was earning Emerald Bowl Defensive MVP honors for his smothering coverage of Georgia Tech All-America receiver Calvin Johnson (who caught just two passes for 19 yards). His numbers last year provide a snapshot of his impact: 78 tackles, 11 tackles for loss, four sacks, four interceptions (one for a touchdown) and 12 pass breakups. His ability to totally disrupt the opposing passing game when he plays corner is why Weddle will likely spend most of this time there this season.

Minimizing the impact of Weddle’s move from safety is the return of second-team all-conference selection **Casey Evans** (6-0, 202, Sr.) and rising star **Steve Tate** (5-11, 197, Jr.). Evans, a former walk-on and fiery competitor, ranked second on the team in tackles as a first-year starter—accounting for 89 stops. He led Utah with five interceptions and his aptitude for making big plays altered the course of several games. Like Evans, Tate went from walk-on to starter—in the latter’s case for the final four games. Tate led everyone with 10 tackles and an interception in the Emerald Bowl, and finished the season with 46 stops. They’ll

be interchangeable, but on paper, Evans will move from free to strong safety and vice versa for Tate.

Corner is much deeper this year—and for more reasons than the addition of Weddle. Steady senior **Shawn Harper** (5-9, 180) is neck-and-neck with sophomore **Brice McCain** (5-9, 178) for the starting job at left corner. Mid-year junior college transfer **Mombroso Washington** (6-0, 173, Jr.) is expected to challenge and would give Utah better-than-average size at the corners. **Ryan Smith** (5-10,

165, Jr.) will play if he returns to his freshman form, when he started all 12 games at right corner and was named a second-team Freshman All-American. Talented **Eric Shyne** (5-10, 178, Sr.) also plans to see a lot more game action after finishing strong last year.

### SPECIAL TEAMS

**Strengths:** Return Teams

**Question Marks:** Place Kicking, Punting

For the third time in as many years, someone new will be handling the field goal and PAT duties for the Utes. Special teams co-coach Jay Hill hopes for similar results as the last two times around, when a first-year starting place kicker exceeded all expectations. Last year, in his first and only season as the starter, Dan Beardall became Utah’s first all-conference place-kicker since 1981. Beardall’s record-setting season limited true freshman **Louie**

**Sakoda**’s duties to kickoffs and punts. With the graduation of Beardall, Sakoda moves up to the first string in all three areas.

While Sakoda did a decent job punting—pinning opponents inside their own 20-yard-line 22 times and averaging 37.1 yards per punt—he struggled to boot the ball in the end zone on kickoffs (13 touchbacks on 63 kickoffs). Those numbers more reflect the fact that Sakoda was playing out of position as the punter, than the strength of his leg. In fact, his booming kicks in practice last year give the coaching staff confidence in his kicking abilities as a sophomore. Field goal kicking remains a question mark for the simple fact that 100-percent of Utah’s kick scoring points left with Beardall, who led the team in scoring (88 points), while making 16-of-19 field goals and 40-of-42 extra points. The backup field goal kicker for spring camp is sophomore **Ben Vroman**.

Both Hill and Whittingham would prefer someone else take over the punting so that Sakoda can concentrate on place kicking, and the two leading candidates in the spring are

last year’s backup **Brent Rawlings** and redshirt freshman **Bart-Jonah Gaison**.

Senior **Eric Weddle** will hold and senior **Pete Aneiro** is favored to win the starting job at snapper after playing for the scout teams last year.

Although the return teams are typically not finalized until August camp, Utah has no shortage of competitors. **Weddle** accounted for 77-percent of Utah’s punt returns a year ago, averaging 6.4 yards per return, and the position could be his again if the all-conference defensive back is not too busy at other positions. Sophomore **Marquis Wilson** began grooming for the job last year as a true freshman and **Brian Hernandez** is another potential option.

Sophomore **Brent Casteel** averaged 23.2 yards on a team-high 20 kickoff returns last year but has competition breathing down his neck from speedy **Derrek Richards** (21.6 average on 7 returns).

In reviewing Kyle Whittingham's first year as Utah's head coach, one axiom comes to mind: "The more things change, the more they stay the same." Faced with a youthful, mostly inexperienced team, and assisted by a largely new staff, Whittingham steered the 2005 Utes to a 7-5 record and a bowl victory over Georgia Tech. It marked the third bowl victory in as many years for Utah and Whittingham, but the first for him as the head coach. He became just the second Utah football coach ever to go to a bowl

game in his first year at the helm, and he is the only one to accomplish that feat without any previous head coaching experience.

Whittingham's steady demeanor and background as a longtime Ute defensive coordinator proved invaluable to a team lacking most of the big guns behind the 12-0, Fiesta Bowl championship season in 2004. Five players from that team were selected in the NFL draft, including No. 1 pick Alex Smith.

Immediately upon accepting the top post on Dec. 8, 2004, Whittingham went in search of solutions rather than excuses. Despite an almost entirely new starting lineup, the 2005 Utes succeeded both offensively and defensively—leading the Mountain West Conference in total offense (12th in the nation) and finishing second in total defense. By season's end, they resembled their No. 4-ranked predecessor when they pummeled No. 24 Georgia Tech 38-10 in the Emerald Bowl.

Taking the Utes to a bowl game as a first-year head coach wasn't Whittingham's first contribution to the record books. That milestone came in a season-opening win over Arizona, when Utah won its 17th-straight game to break a 75-year-old school record. He ran the streak to 18 games with a win over Utah State before the Utes fell in overtime to eventual league champion TCU.

The fact is that Whittingham has been part of more big wins than perhaps any other single person in Utah football history. During his tenure as an assistant coach—the last 10 as the defensive coordinator—the program



compiled an 86-41 record, played in six bowl games (winning five), won or tied for four conference titles, finished with a top-10 ranking twice, became the only non-BCS school ever to play in a BCS bowl game (the 2005 Fiesta Bowl) and unseated BYU as the preeminent football power in the state. In his new position, Whittingham coached the 2005 Emerald Bowl champs and extended Utah's win streak against BYU to four—ensuring that his seniors graduated without ever losing to their arch-rival.

As the Mountain West Conference's longest-tenured and most successful defensive coordinator from 1995-2004, Whittingham's units were always ranked at or near the top of the league. In 2002, the Las Vegas Review recognized his efforts by naming him the MWC Co-Defensive Coordinator of the Year.

Whittingham stood out from the start. In 1994, he coached a defensive line anchored by consensus All-American Luther Elliss. That team led the league in every defensive category and ranked 18th in the nation in total defense. Utah beat Arizona in the Freedom Bowl and finished the 1994 season with a 10-2 mark and ranked in the top 10 in both polls.

In 1995, he stepped in as the coordinator—replacing his father Fred, who took a job in the NFL—and the program didn't miss a beat. Utah led the conference in total defense three times under his direction (2000, 2001 and 2002). In 2002, Utah ranked No. 1 in the MWC in total defense, scoring defense

and rushing defense—finishing No. 12 in the nation in the latter. The Ute defense recorded 14 top-20 statistical rankings from 1995-2004. But Whittingham's defenses were best known for keeping opponents off the scoreboard. Utah led the league in scoring defense four times from 1999-2005 (ranking No. 2 in 2003 and 2004) and finished No. 13, 18, 13, 29, 19 and 22 in the nation during that span.

In his final year as Utah's defensive coordinator, the 2004 Utes finished 12-0 and ranked No. 4 in the nation. On January 1, 2005, with Whittingham serving as co-head coach, Utah became the first non-BCS team to play in—and to win—a Bowl Championship Series game, beating Pittsburgh 35-7.

While the Ute offense, behind Heisman Trophy finalist Smith, gathered most of the pre-game attention, Whittingham's defense earned equal accolades on the field. The Utes set a Fiesta Bowl record with nine quarterback sacks and held the Big East co-champion Panthers to just 17 rushing yards and a single third-quarter touchdown.

Whittingham began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater Brigham Young (1985-86). In 1987, he was both the defensive coordinator at College of Eastern Utah and a player for the Los Angeles Rams' replacement squad. His first full-time NCAA coaching job was at Idaho State, where he spent six years (1988-93), his last two as defensive coordinator.

### KYLE STYLE

Discipline and productivity form the cornerstones of Whittingham's coaching and personal philosophy. Quietly intense, Whittingham lets his offense and defense do the talking. He has embraced the spread offense and its multitude of options. Defensively, he has never deviated from the 4-3 formation he employed as Utah's defensive coordinator—one that emphasizes constant pressure from the line and man coverage in the secondary.



### IT'S ACADEMIC

Whittingham insists that his team perform academically, as well as athletically. The team's grade point average for the 2005 spring and fall semesters combined was a 2.621. In addition, 16 players were named to the 2005 Mountain West Conference All-Academic team, two earned

ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District honors (Spencer Toone and Jesse Boone) and one was an Academic All-American (Toone).

### KYLE'S WILES

Whittingham has been mentored by some of the best coaching minds in the business, including the legendary LaVell Edwards of BYU. Perhaps the biggest influence on his coaching style was his father Fred—a former Utah and NFL defensive coordinator. Others who have contributed to Whittingham's coaching methodology include former Utah head coaches Urban Meyer (now with Florida) and Ron McBride (now at Weber State).

### WHITTINGHAM'S PLAYING CAREER

A linebacker for Brigham Young from 1978-81, Whittingham earned first-team all-WAC and WAC Defensive Player of the Year honors in 1981. He played in the Hula and Japan Bowls after his senior year, then launched a professional career that included stints with the Denver Gold and New Orleans Breakers in the U.S. Football League (USFL) from 1983-85. He played on the Los Angeles Rams' replacement squad in 1987.

SALT LAKE CITY—Sophomore Brian Johnson passed for 220 yards and a touchdown in his first start, and coach Kyle Whittingham won in his Utah head coaching debut as the Utes beat Arizona 27-24 and extended their winning streak to a school-record 17 straight games. Quinton Ganther ran for a career-high 127 yards and took a shovel pass from Johnson 47 yards for Utah's first touchdown of the season. Other TDs came on a dazzling 59-yard run by freshman Brent Casteel, playing in his first college game, and a 24-yard interception return by Eric Weddle. Johnson shook off some first-quarter nerves to lead Utah to 446 yards of total offense split nearly evenly between rushing (226 yards) and passing (220 yards). The Utes led 27-10 after scoring 17 points in the third quarter, but had to fend off a late charge by Arizona. Two big rushing first downs by Ganther took time off the clock and a punt by freshman Louie Sakoda was downed at the Arizona 9-yard-line with 28 seconds remaining. Casey Evans sealed the win for Utah with an interception.

SALT LAKE CITY—Brian Johnson and Eric Weddle starred in a 43-13 Utah blowout against Wyoming in Rice-Eccles Stadium. Johnson completed 32-of-45 passes for 384 yards and 4 touchdowns and also led Utah in rushing with 67 yards and a TD. Weddle moved from safety to cornerback to cover the league's leading receiver and held Jovon Bouknight to 4 receptions for 43 yards—well below his season average of 105.4 yards per game. Weddle also had a team-best 9 tackles, a sack, 1.5 tackles for loss and 3 pass breakups. Wyoming took a 6-3 first-quarter lead, but the Utes erupted for 17 unanswered points to take a 20-6 lead into halftime. John Madsen, whose 12 catches was a career-high, had 117 receiving yards and 2 touchdowns. Dan Beardall made all three field goal attempts and tied a school record by improving his string of field goals without a miss to 11. Utah compiled 563 total yards against the MWC's leading defense and allowed just 279.

Brian Johnson, who finished the game with 360 passing yards and 4 touchdowns, suffered a season-ending knee injury after a 12-yard run on Utah's final drive. New Mexico was called for a personal foul on the play, moving Utah into UNM territory. Second-string quarterback Brett Ratliff completed a 21-yard pass on his first play to move Utah to the Lobo 19, but three plays later he threw an interception to end the comeback try. Travis LaTendresse, in his first game back from an ankle injury, had a career receiving game with 192 yards and Quinton Ganther rushed for 98 yards in his return from the disabled list. Utah lost John Madsen, its leading receiver on the season, to a broken ankle in the first quarter. Soli Lefiti and Steve Tate had 10 tackles—a career-best for both—to lead the defense.

PROVO, UTAH—In his NCAA debut as a starting quarterback, Brett Ratliff guided Utah to a thrilling 41-34 overtime win against rival Brigham Young before a sellout crowd of 64,312 in LaVell Edwards Stadium. Ratliff, who had seen only spot duty prior to the game, was masterful—passing for 240 yards and 4 TDs, and rushing for 112 yards and a score. Ratliff stunned BYU time and again with his big arm and gutsy running in leading Utah to a 24-3 halftime lead. The Cougars charged back with a 31-point second half but couldn't score in overtime. Quinton Ganther rushed for 131 yards and receivers Travis LaTendresse and Brian Hernandez contributed 88- and 81-yard games, respectively. Casey Evans totaled a career-high 13 tackles and set up a Ute score by forcing a fumble, which he recovered and returned 30 yards to the BYU 7-yard line. Dan Beardall set a school record by making his 12th-consecutive field goal before missing a 49-yard attempt.

## GAME 12 DEC. 29 • EMERALD BOWL

SAN FRANCISCO—Brett Ratliff and Travis LaTendresse roasted the nation's No. 12-ranked defense and led Utah to a 38-10 upset win over No. 24 Georgia Tech in the Emerald Bowl. The Utes jumped out to a 20-0 lead just minutes into the second quarter before Georgia Tech made a little run by scoring all 10 of its points. A field goal with 0:03 left in the first half would mark the end of Tech's scoring for the night, however. Ratliff's 30 completions, 381 passing yards and four touchdowns shattered the Emerald Bowl records, as well as setting new school and Mountain West Conference bowl records. LaTendresse, the game's offensive MVP, burned the Georgia Tech secondary with a bowl-record 16 receptions for 214 yards and four scores. On the ground, Quinton Ganther rushed for 120 yards and a touchdown in his final game as a Ute. Utah's defense—every bit as dominating as the offense—was spearheaded by defensive MVP Eric Weddle's superb performance against Tech's All-America receiver Calvin Johnson. Weddle hounded Johnson into a two-catch, 19-yard game. Weddle rarely left the field—also playing quarterback and on special teams. Steve Tate led Utah with 10 tackles and picked off his first career interception, which he returned 45 yards.
