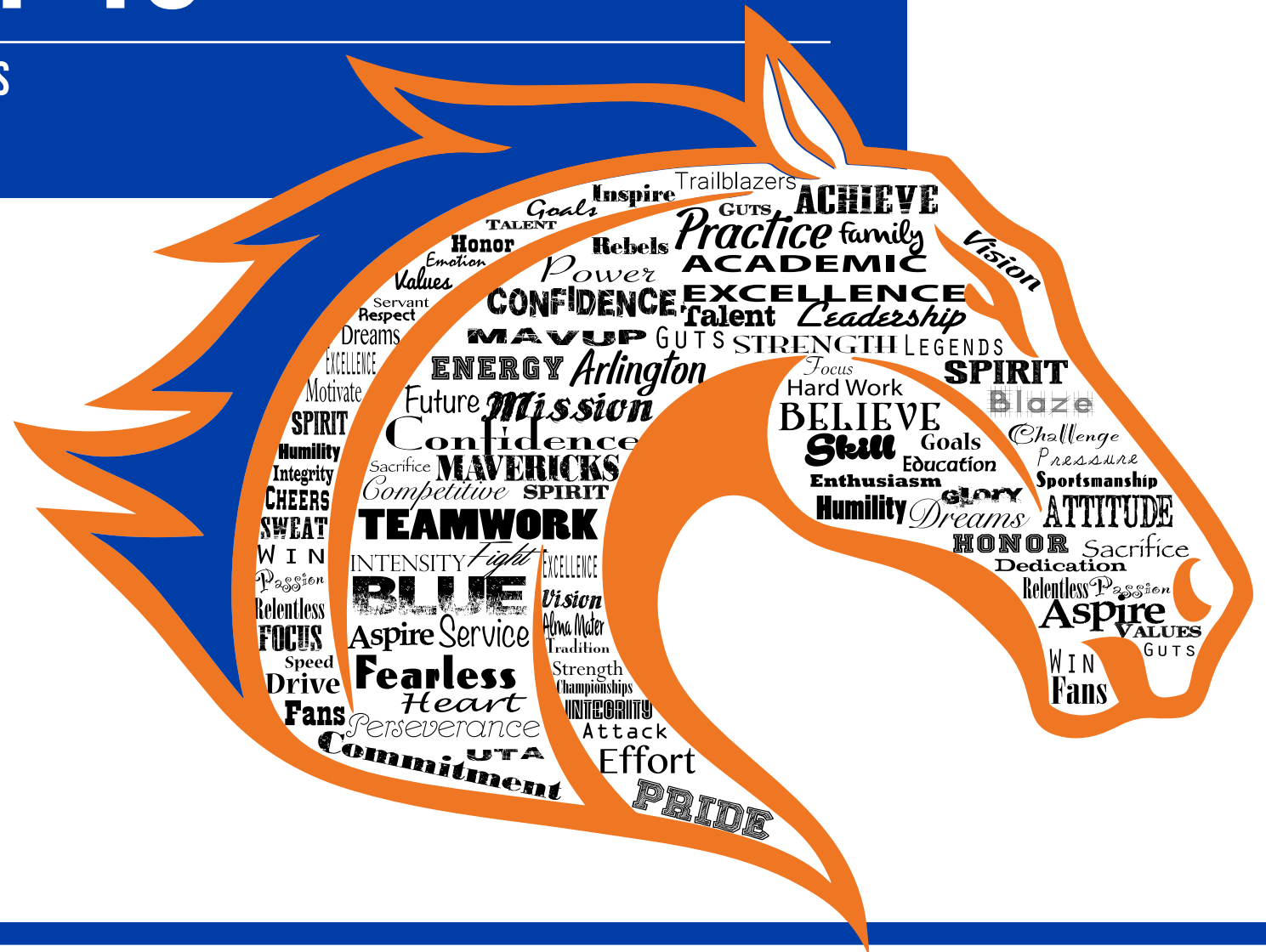

A MESSAGE FROM THE ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

Dear Friends of UT Arlington Athletics,

Another rewarding and successful year has come and gone for UT Arlington Athletics, highlighted by our numerous triumphs in competition and inside the classroom. The 2014-15 Annual Report illustrates the achievements of our student-athletes, coaches and staff, and provides a snapshot of our department and the direction in which we're headed.

Our second season in the Sun Belt Conference included a league championship in Women's Cross Country, numerous individual champions and accolades, the opening of new facilities, and the announcement of our first new sport in more than three decades.

In addition to the cross country title, your Mavericks combined to bring 29 individual conference championships back to Arlington in Men's and Women's Indoor and Outdoor Track & Field. Men's Outdoor Track & Field finished ranked 25th nationally in the NCAA.

John Sauerhage was named Men's Outdoor Track & Field Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year. Sprinter Clayton Vaughn set the school record in the 100 meters, which was also the fastest time in the NCAA this past year. Vaughn, Quentin Butler, Emil Blomberg and Roland Sales were NCAA Championship qualifiers. Vaughn finished his career with six All-American honors. Blomberg was named Sun Belt Most Outstanding Track Athlete.

We opened new clubhouse complexes as part of a \$5.5 million project to upgrade facilities for our Baseball and Softball programs. Allan Saxe Field received a complete makeover, with a new grandstand and press box. Both programs now possess the facilities needed to support our current student-athletes while appealing to potential recruits as we strive to win championships.

Women's Basketball posted the **largest turnaround in school history** and in the NCAA this past season. The Lady Mavericks won 17 games in Krista Gerlich's second season as coach, with Rebekah VanDijk being named Sun Belt Freshman of the Year and FullCourt.Com Freshman All-American. Men's Basketball celebrated the 150th career win for Coach Scott Cross and finished with a winning record.

We've hired Stuart Deane as Men's and Women's Golf coach. Yes, you read that correctly. Women's Golf is coming to UTA in the 2017-18 season, marking the first sport expansion since women's tennis in 1983. Men's Golf finished runner-up at Sun Belt Championship, with freshman Aaron Guanlao earning second-team All-Conference honors.

Volleyball celebrated the 25th year anniversary of the 1989 Final Four Team during the season. The Mavericks recorded the program's 1,000th victory, and Briana Sharratt was an All-American Honorable Mention.

The Women's Tennis doubles team of Elizabeth Thoms and Angeles de los Rios qualified for the NCAA Tournament. The women's team finished second in the Sun Belt. Thoms, de los Rios and Astrid Gehre were women's

all-conference. Mario Muniesa was men's all-conference.

Associate Athletic Director for Sports Medicine Roy Rudewick was recognized with a Life Saving Award by UT System. The Hall of Honor welcomed new members in Val Whitfield-Dunn, Elston Cawley, Hunter Pence, Mike Stamps, and 1996-2000 Men's Track & Field teams. In another nod to our past, development hosted the Ultimate Huddle Football Reunion.

Academically, 38 student-athletes graduated during 2014-15. Both our spring and cumulative departmental GPAs were 3.055, which is our highest ever. We had 86 student-athletes with a GPA of 3.0 or higher for the academic year 38 were on the Sun Belt Academic Honor Roll (3.0-3.49) and 48 were on the Sun Belt Commissioner's List (3.5-4.0).

Our story is reaching more people with each passing year. We set online records for traffic on UTAMavs.com with nearly two million page views and more than 360,000 unique visitors through 700 stories and 200 videos. Our Men's Basketball games reached a Dallas-Fort Worth radio audience through KKG 1630 AM. On campus, we've forged a strong broadcasting partnership with UTA Radio. We currently video stream all home games for Volleyball, Men's and Women's Basketball, Softball and Baseball.


As with each passing year, challenges arise both with respect to the NCAA and benefits for student-athletes. Our position remains clear: we are committed to the overall collegiate experience for student-athletes at UT Arlington and supporting their growth in every aspect of their lives.

As for the department, UTA placed third in the Sun Belt Conference Bubas Cup, just 2 points out of first place. This award measures success in all sports. More fans are experiencing our games, as attendance grew in Volleyball, Men and Women's Basketball, and Softball. We announced a new partnership with Learfield Sports. I'm excited about the future of UTA Athletics and looking forward to 2015-16. Everything we're doing at UTA is with the big picture in mind as we take this department to new heights.

Our success would not be possible without the unwavering support and leadership of UTA President Dr. Vistasp M. Karbhari. We're a team here at UTA in every sense of the word. Our accomplishments resonate across our department and campus, and are a source of pride for Mavericks everywhere.

2014-15 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Cross Country

Both teams qualified for the NCAA Championships. Women's Cross Country claimed its first conference title since 2001.

Track & Field

John Sauerhage was named Men's Outdoor Coach of the Year. Clayton Vaughn set the school record in the 100m. Emil Blomberg tabbed Sun Belt Conference Most Outstanding Men's Track Performer. NCAA track qualifiers were Vaughn, Blomberg, Quentin Butler, and Roland Sales. Eleven school records were set by both men's and women's student-athletes.

Volleyball

The Mavericks went 25-9, their most wins since 2006. Briana Sharratt became the first UTA player in 25 years to earn All-American honors.

Men's Basketball

Coach Scott Cross won his 150th career game. Lonnie McClanahan was named to the NABC District 24 second team and second-team All-Sun Belt.

Women's Basketball

Won 17 games, 13 more than the previous year to set a school record for the **biggest victory increase** in one season and the most in the NCAA last year. Rebekah VanDijk was named the Sun Belt Conference Freshman of the Year and FullCourt.com Freshman All-American.



Softball

Allan Saxe Field was rededicated and a new clubhouse opened. Team records were set in batting average (.316), runs (338), RBI (316), walks (226) and hits (456). Nina Villanueva broke the all-time single-season runs record (52), and Shelbi Sikes broke the single-season RBI record (45).

Baseball

UTA-record six players were drafted in the 2014 MLB Draft. The Mavericks had three wins over ranked opponents in 2015, including 6-5 walk-off win over No. 14 Texas at Globe Life Park. The fourth-largest attendance at Clay Gould Ballpark (1201) came in an 8-1 win over No. 2 TCU.

Men's and Women's Tennis

Women's doubles reached the NCAA Tournament. Women's Tennis reached the Sun Belt Conference Championship finals. Women's players Elizabeth Thoms, Astrid Gehre and Angeles de los Rios were all-conference, as well as men's player Mario Muniesa. Men's Tennis had one of its best seasons in recent years and reached the conference semifinals.

Golf

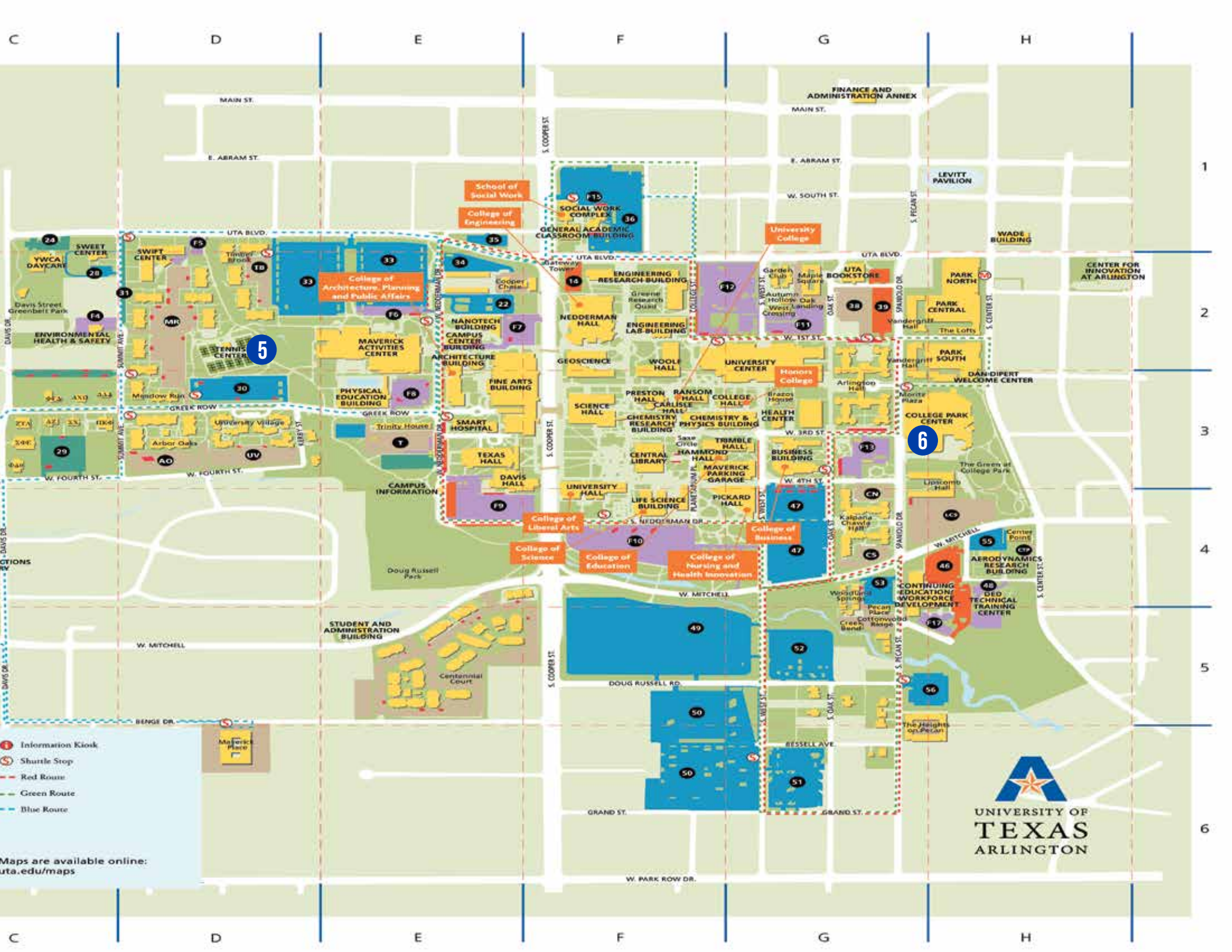

CAPITAL PROJECTS

Clay Gould Ballpark

Clay Gould Ballpark has been the home of record breakers, major leaguers and champions. The 1,600-seat facility originally opened in 1974 and has undergone several upgrades to keep the complex among the best in college baseball.

In 2015, the Mavericks opened a state-of-the-art clubhouse that gives UTA a new on-site home. The 6,000 sq. ft. facility includes a players clubhouse, an equipment and laundry room, a sports medicine training room and coaches' offices.

The 622-seat facility was rebuilt from the ground up after the completion of the 2014 season. The Mavericks opened the new Allan Saxe Field on Feb. 12, 2015 in the Maverick Invitational against Incarnate Word. UTA cut the ribbon on the clubhouse with a ceremony held on March 21, 2015 with alumni, Maverick Club members and donors taking part in the festivities.

Complementing the new grandstands, a brand new field was laid complete with turf making up the inside foul lines and natural grass comprising the outfield. The press box now features comfortable seating for up to 15 with full University internet access.

UTA COMPLETES SECOND SEASON IN SUN BELT CONFERENCE

Sun Belt Conference championships in Women's Cross Country plus Men's Outdoor Track & Field led UTA to a third-place finish in the final Bubas Cup All-Sports standings. The Mavericks moved up three spots from 2013-14 and were just two points shy of first place.

UTA's total is based on competing in 14 of the 18 sports sponsored by the Sun Belt. Seven of the 10 other schools compete in more sports than UTA, including the top two finishers.

UTA earned 104 points, with South Alabama (106) and Texas State (104.5) nabbing the top two spots.

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COMMITTEE
