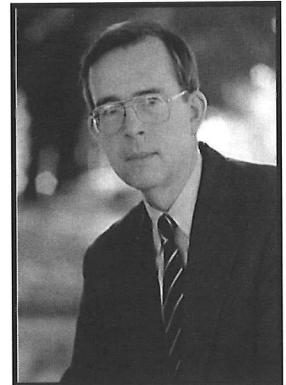

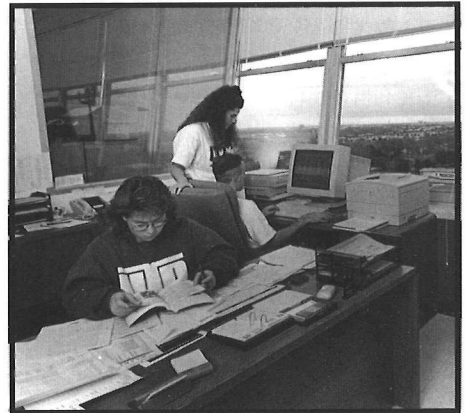
maverick academics

academic enhancement

The University of Texas at Arlington is committed to each student-athlete as a total person. While the student-athlete at UTA is given an opportunity to attain athletic goals, the objective of the UTA athletic department is to assure the academic success of each Maverick student-athlete.

Under the direction of Dr. Bill Reeves and Shannon Spriggs, the academic division of the UTA athletic department works closely with student-athletes of all 14 sports on a daily basis.

In order for student-athletes to compensate for the hours necessary to prepare for competition, a rigorous academic discipline has to be established to help achieve their potential. UTA's study hall program and tutoring sessions have proven an invaluable asset to the Mavericks. Counselors also assist student-athletes with the rigors of class schedules, registration and meeting the requirements of graduation.

classroom success

The athletes on the tennis teams at The University of Texas at Arlington have established themselves both on the court and in the classroom. Many players have found themselves being honored by the university and the athletic department for their academic success. The men's squad was named as an Academic All-America team by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association in 1996 and 1997.

A total of 23 tennis players were named to the UTA Honor Roll over the last three years. To be a member of the UTA Honor Roll, a student must pass a minimum of 12 hours and have a grade point average of 3.0 (on a 4.0 point scale) or better.

The Maverick Athletic Department also offers two academic awards to deserving student-athletes. The Scholar-Athlete award is given to student-athletes who had at least a 3.8 GPA in at least one of the previous two semesters, had a 3.25 GPA in each of the previous

two semesters or earned a 3.25 cumulative GPA for at least two semesters. Christian Jaeger and Christoph Kull were Scholar-Athletes last year.

Super-Scholars earn that distinction by earning a 3.6 GPA for the previous two semesters or having a cumulative 3.6 GPA for at least two semesters. Maff Fajkus, Christoph Kull and Kyle Wood all earned that honor in 1998.

In addition to honors and recognition from the university, UTA athletes have gained national acclaim for their prowess in the classroom and on the fields and courts of play. Other than the ITA's recognition of the entire men's squad, Scott Cross of the men's basketball team and B.G. Wilson and John Karant of the baseball team have all earned GTE Academic All-America awards in the last three years. Cross and Wilson were two-time winners of the prestigious award.

life skills program

The Maverick Athletic Department introduced the "Pursuing Responsibility and Integrity with Dedication to Excellence in Life Skills," Program in 1997. PRIDE, is an NCAA sponsored program that focuses on five components: academics, athletics, service, and personal and career development.

The goal of PRIDE is to prepare student-athletes for success not only on the playing field and in the classroom, but in life. The program, based on student-athlete input, assists the student-athlete in meeting academic, athletic, social and emotional demands associated with being both a student and an athlete.

Currently, PRIDE, which is part of the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program, consists of a freshman student-athlete orientation class and numerous community service projects.

athletic director

Pete Carlon

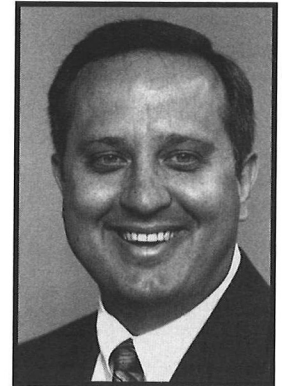
The fifth Director of Intercollegiate Athletics at UTA since 1953, Pete Carlon enters his third year after serving twice as an interim athletic director.

Carlon has been with the university's athletic department since 1981, when he came to UTA from Stephen F. Austin State as head athletic trainer. He has served as an assistant or associate athletic director since 1984. One of his first orders of business after being named assistant athletic director was initiating the UTA Athletic Hall of Honor Awards.

During Carlon's first tenure as athletic director, UTA won five team conference titles and was ranked by the Women's Sports Foundation as the second best Division I program in the nation in terms of commitment to gender equity.

Under Carlon's guidance the Mavericks claimed both the men's and women's Southland Conference All-Sports trophy in 1996-97, a first in the history of the UTA athletic department. Last year, UTA again claimed the Women's All-Sports Championship and fell just one point shy of winning its second Commissioner's Cup, recognizing the conference's best overall athletic program. Off the competitive field, Carlon engineered and won a battle against an inherited huge budget deficit. He recently teamed with University President Dr. Witt and campus leaders to spearhead the campaign for the Student Intercollegiate Athletics Fee Referendum. The passing of the referendum assured UTA a financially secure future for its athletic department.

Carlon earned a Bachelor's degree from Iowa State University and received his Master's degree from Northwest Missouri State University. He began his career at Arlington's James Bowie High School and was the school's Teacher of the Year in 1978.

Dr. Bill Reeves

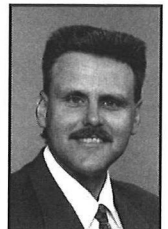
The senior member of the UTA athletic staff, Dr. Reeves has been associated with the Mavericks since earning the first of his three varsity letters in basketball during the 1959-60 season. A 1962 UTA grad, he returned in 1966 as assistant basketball coach and instructor of physical education. He served as the administrative assistant to the athletic director prior to his tenure as AD from 1975-89. He currently serves as associate athletic director, director of compliance, and supervises the academic enhancement and progress of all UTA student-athletes.

John Mocek

A former UTA student-athlete, Mocek brings more than two decades of administrative experience to his role as Assistant Athletic Director of Business and Operations. A four-year baseball letter-winner and 1977 UTA grad, Mocek has worn many hats, including business manager, promotions director, radio and television broadcaster, ticket manager and from 1983-1996 was the third base coach for one of the winningest baseball teams in the NCAA. In addition, he has been a member of the UTA faculty, teaching in the Exercise and Sports Studies program.

Janine Smith

Wearing two hats, Smith serves as both UTA's Senior Woman Administrator as well as the fifth head coach in the 26 year history of the volleyball program. Smith played on the UT-Austin 1988 volleyball team that won the national championship. She was named the Southwest Conference's Newcomer of the year that season and was also a three-time All-NCAA South Region and two-time All-SWC selection.

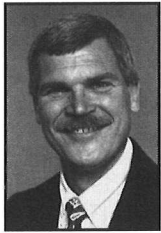

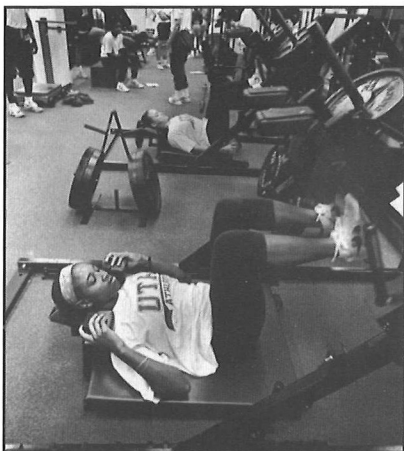

strength and conditioning

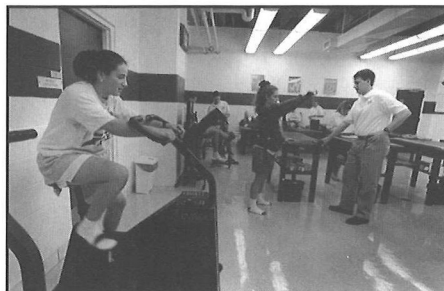


A newly designed strength and conditioning facility awaits student-athletes of all 14 intercollegiate sports at UTA. The 3,400 square foot facility located in Maverick Stadium was created to help each individual become the best student-athlete he or she could possibly be. The strength and conditioning facility contains state of the art equipment necessary to achieve maximum benefits from strength training.

The weight room offers student-athletes excellent equipment, supervision and atmosphere.

Along with a staff of experienced coaches, each student-athlete at UTA is given the best possible equipment, supervision and atmosphere. These are all ingredients for a program ready to move into the national spotlight.

athletic training room



The athletic training room offers state-of-the-art equipment for both injury treatment and rehabilitation.

The 1,400 square foot UTA athletic training room is completely supplied with state-of-the-art equipment for both injury treatment and rehabilitation.

Under the direction of Head Athletic Trainer Brian Conway and Assistant Athletic Trainer Melinda Terry, the UTA athletic training room includes: ultrasound, interferential electrical stimulation and galvanic muscle stimulation machines for treatment of injuries and a complete rehabilitation center with an orthron, fitron exercise bicycle and a N-K Table. Joining Conway and Terry, both certified athletic trainers, on the training staff are 14 student trainers and a complete staff of consulting physicians on call at all times.

UTA

home of maverick tennis

The UTA Tennis Center, home of the UTA men's and women's tennis teams, is among the best tennis facilities in the Southwest region.

The center, which received an award from the United States Tennis Association as one of the top facilities in Texas in 1986, was completely remodeled in 1995, making it even better than before. Coaches, players and spectators alike all enjoy the facility.

The UTA Tennis Center has 12 hard courts, with spectator seating for eight of the courts. Lights give participants the option of playing at any time.

When athletes need to take a break or adjust their equipment, they can head to the center's pro shop. Besides stringing machines,

Head Coach Patric DuBois' and Associate Head Coach Tory Plunkett's offices are located inside the pro shop.

Other than being the home of UTA's men's and women's teams, the UTA Tennis Center also plays host to a variety of tournaments on a local and national scale. The Intercollegiate Tennis Association summer circuit makes a stop there, as do several junior and adult sanctioned tournaments. The Mavericks will host the Southland Conference Tournament at the venue this season.

DuBois believes the UTA Tennis Center is an advantage that other conference members don't have. "I think we have one of the nicest tennis centers in the conference, for sure," DuBois said. "It is easily accessible, there is plenty of court space and it is always in good condition."

Mavs must continue to improve their focus on all aspects of the game and be confident they can beat each opponent.



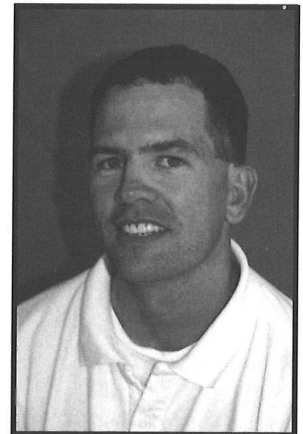
Mavericks to host SLC Tournament

Add in a Coach of the Year award as the women's coach at SLC rival Northwestern State, and DuBois has had his name engraved on five consecutive SLC Coach of the Year plaques.

Prior to joining the Mavs, DuBois produced four singles champions and a doubles crown while piling up a league-record 100 points. His top singles player, Ljudmila Pavlov, went 30-3 as a freshman and won the SLC's Athlete of the Year award. During DuBois nine years as head tennis coach he has guided five singles players and four teams to Southland Conference regular season titles, and his players have earned 27 All-Conference selections.

allowed UTA to defend its regular season championship awards in 1995 and 1996.

DuBois' coaching career began in his hometown of Kingston, N.Y., where he was associated with the city's chapter of the United States Tennis Association/National Junior Tennis League for 10 years. He served as an instructor for his first three years there before becoming the director.

Maybe it was this kind of success that led DuBois to take on the extra challenge of coaching the Maverick's women's team, in addition to the men's squad, in 1997. Although the ladies struggled in the past, DuBois believes this could be the season when the women are as competitive as the men.

While his teams have been incredibly successful on the court, DuBois' student-athletes have flourished under his guidance. Last season, Christian Jaeger earned his second consecutive SLC Athlete of the Year honor. Jaeger and Christoph Kull earned All-SLC singles honors. In 1997, the Mavericks dominated the SLC awards. Christian Jaeger and Roberto Coronado earned All-SLC singles honors and all three UTA doubles teams earned All-Con-

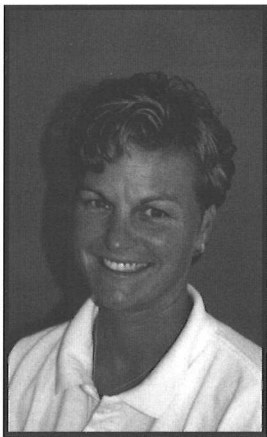

She was a two-time member of the All-Southwest Conference team and earned All-American honors in doubles play. She was further honored for her tremendous career at TCU when she was named to the SWC's All-Decade team.

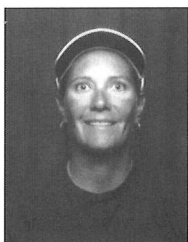

Plunkett's coaching career began in 1994, when she served her first tour of duty as an assistant coach at LITA. In 1995, Plunkett moved to The University of Texas at San Antonio as an assistant. With her help, the Roadrunners finished in second place in the Southland Conference with a 7-2 dual match record. In the conference tournament, one of her players won a singles title, while one of her squad's doubles pair took home the crown in that competition.

She returned to LITA in 1996 to help DuBois primarily with the women's team, and the head coach believes that Plunkett will be able to help make the Mavericks a top contender for the SLC crown.

SLC All-Sports Trophy**

For the fifth time in eight years, the University of Texas at Arlington's women's athletic teams brought home the SLC Women's All-Sports Championship Trophy. The trophy is awarded to the member institution that fields the most outstanding overall women's athletic program. The Maverick women won the trophy in 1990-91, '91-'92, '92-'93, and '96-'97.

UTA finished one point behind Northwestern State in the Commissioner's Cup, which is awarded to the member institution with the best combined overall athletic program. In 1996-97 UTA swept the all-sports trophies for the first time in school history and just the fifth time in conference history.

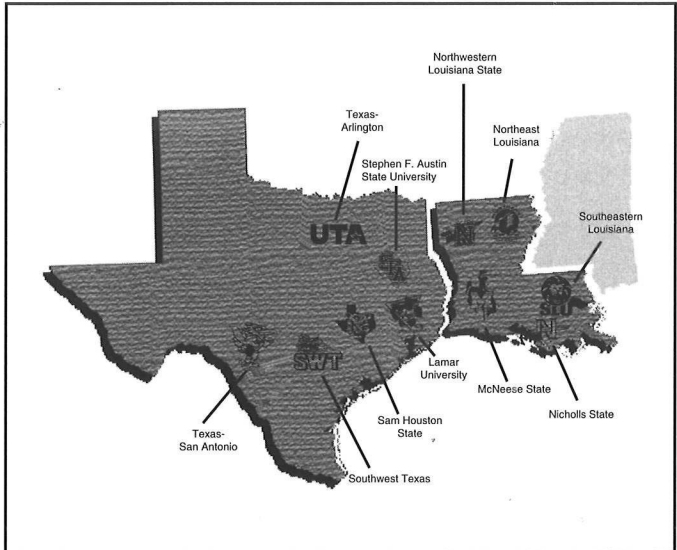
