1989 UTA Outlook

Coming into the 1989 season, Coach Butch McBroom feels that "with a little luck and everyone playing up to their potential, it could be a banner year for us. Coming out of the fall we felt that the personalities of the of the players meshed real well, something we lacked last season."

McBroom has four regulars returning off last year's squad. Howard Prager led the team in hitting with a .353 average and will move from first base to center field. Other returning starters include third baseman Gerard Giustino, who led the team in home runs with 10, second baseman Pat Varni, and designated hitter John Deller.

Top pitcher Steve Foster signed with the Cincinnati Reds organization, but six of the other seven pitchers who saw mound duty last year are back and McBroom has lined up some very promising newcomers who can step in immediately.

The Mavericks are again playing a tough schedule highlighted by games with Texas, Oklahoma State, Oklahoma and Nebraska. "We hope that playing these nationally ranked teams in the early season will prepare us to make a strong bid for the conference championship."

Last year, UTA finished third in Southland Conference play with a 10-9 league record while finishing 33-22 overall, marking the ninth straight season a McBroom-coached UTA team had won 30 games or more.

Pitching

The pitching department appears strong despite the departure of Foster, who was the 1988 SLC Pitcher of the Year

with an 11-7 record. Top returning hurlers include starters Ed LeBoeuf (5-3) and Jeff Burrow (4-2) along with reliever Raymond Schuster (4-5). Also back from last year are knuckle-baller Hector Hinojosa (3-1) and Justin Regan (3-1) along with Mark Shoop, who was 0-0, but appeared in 12 games.

Top new hurlers include junior college transfer Brad Weber, from Butler County (Kan.) Community College, and Paul Paramo, a freshman from Dallas W. T. White. Both are lefthanders and are expected to move right in to the starting rotation.

"In the fall our pitching staff was a pleasant surprise," said McBroom. "We have two proven starters in LeBoeuf and Burrow. Schuster was moved to short relief in the latter part of last season and has responded well to this role and will be the stopper this year.

"Weber pitched well enough in the fall to warrant a spot in the starting rotation and the one thing I was really pleased with in the fall was how well our incoming freshmen pitched.

"Paramo, Chris Gay and Jason LaPoint are all lefthanders who could see plenty of action this year along with righthander Cody Roberson. I am really anxious to see how well the young pitchers respond to Division I competition.

"An experiment that worked this fall was using Howard Prager out of the bullpen. He can throw hard and could help late in the game in short relief."

Catching

Gone is Todd Mraz, who did the bulk of the catching last season and was drafted by the Cleveland Indians organization. Shayne Currin saw some action there last year and is expected to share the position with Matt Webb, who saw action as a 1B-DH last year.

"We should be solid behind the plate with both Currin and Webb sharing the catching duties," said McBroom. "Both went head to head in the fall with no clear starter emerging. Both did a fine job defensively and we feel comfortable with either player behind the plate, but we are concerned at the lack of depth."

Infield

Two infield starters return to their position with Gerard Giustino back at third and Pat Varni at second. Howard Prager moves from first base to the outfield with Ted Zeigler expected to take over the first base job. Freshman Lawrence Hanlon has moved into the shortstop position vacated by senior Pat Cleveland.

"Coming out of the fall, the infield was the strong point of our ball club," said McBroom. "It is solid with the return of two starters and the key to the infield will depend on the emergence of Hanlon. He had an excellent fall and possessed all the tools to be an outstanding college shortstop."

"With Prager moving to the outfield, Zeigler will have the opportunity to maintain the consistency he has shown in the summer leagues and in the fall while manning first base."



Outfield

All three outfielders off last year's club are gone, including Pat Woodruff, Jim Hartman and Paul Hoelscher. Prager has moved to the center field spot while Baylor transfer Joe Guidry has moved into the right field slot and it is hoped that Tony Vilaros will be healthy enough to handle left field after redshirting last year. Other top hopefuls include returning squadmen Shain Sackett and Derek Howell along with freshman William Rose.

"The outfield is the big question mark this spring," said McBroom. "A lot depends on the recovery of Vilaros, who had arm surgery last August."

"Prager moved back to the outfield and will give us the needed experience that was missing at the start of the fall. Guidry came in and had an excellent fall, winning the starting right field job."

Designated Hitter

John Deller handled the DH spot most of the time last season and is expected to do so once again. Deller suffered through an injury-plagued season last year and batted .238 after hitting .344 in 1987. Several other candidates are available as a righthanded DH.

"Deller hit the ball well in the fall and we hope he can fill the DH spot again," said McBroom.

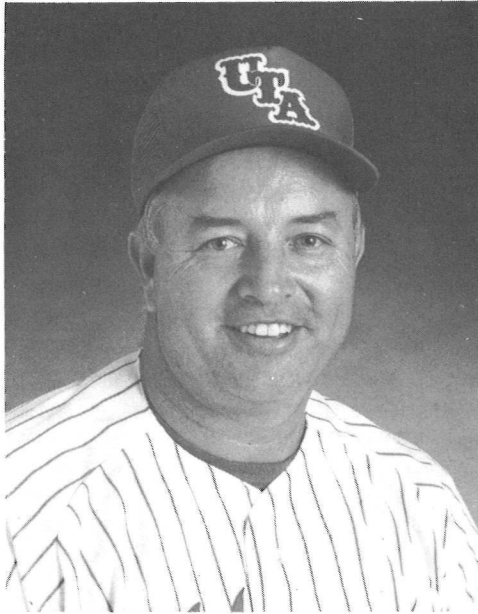
Head Coach

As Butch McBroom enters his 16th season as head baseball coach at UTA, he will undoubtedly coach the Mavericks to his 500th career victory. McBroom, in his 15 years at UTA plus two years at Union (Tenn.), has won 491 games.

During the past nine seasons, McBroom joins coach Cliff Gustafson of the University of Texas as the only two NCAA Division I coaches in the state of Texas that have led their programs to at least 30 wins in each season.

McBroom, who is currently ranked 55th in the nation for the all-time college coaching victories, has been named as the Southland Conference Coach of the Year twice, in 1981 and 1984. He has coached 28 players who have earned all-conference honors, 33 players who have gone into the coaching ranks and 31 of his former players have played professional baseball including shortstop Dave Owen who has seen major league action with the Chicago Cubs and the Kansas City Royals.

The decade of the 80's has truly been one of excellence for McBroom and UTA. He has led them to over 300 victories and a cumulative team batting average of .294. In the eight years that UTA has been in the Southland Conference during the decade (in 1987 UTA played as a major college independent) McBroom has engineered UTA to a conference record of 75 wins and 51 losses while finishing second or third six of those seasons along with a 1981 West Zone Championship.



McBroom was an all-Southwest Conference catcher while helping Baylor to the 1966 Southwest Conference championship. He also received Baylor's Outstanding Baseball Player Award that year while playing under Dutch Schroeder. During the summer of 1965 he played with the Liberal BeeJays in the National Baseball Congress World Series.

Upon completion of his playing career at Baylor, McBroom turned down an offer from the Cincinnati Reds organization to remain at Baylor as a graduate assistant. He earned his bachelor's degree at Baylor in 1967 and got his master's degree there in 1968. Following his graduation he coached for one year at Waco Connally High School. McBroom then headed back to his native Fort Worth as head baseball coach and assistant football coach at Castleberry High School for three years.

McBroom got his first chance to be a head coach in the college ranks at Union University in Jackson, Tennessee, a perennial small college baseball power. During his two years there he led them to the national playoffs both seasons. In 1972, Union was the host team for the NCAA Division II Midwest Regional and the following year finished runnerup in the NAIA regional playoffs.

After the two playoff seasons at Union, McBroom took over the UTA coaching job in the fall of 1973. UTA at this time was a non-scholarship program and he led them to a school record for the most victories in his first season.

McBroom has worn many other hats in his long distinguished coaching career. In his 17 collegiate seasons he has taught numerous classes ranging from coaching baseball to kinesiology. He has served as assistant tournament director for the NCAA regional playoffs and in 1984 worked as the program committee chairman at the NCAA baseball coaches convention. He is a member of the American Baseball Coaches Association.

During his stay at UTA McBroom has held a highly successful summer baseball camp for youngsters, while conducting numerous coaching clinics throughout the area. He has spoken frequently at awards banquets and has been the past sponsor of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes chapter at UTA.

In his spare time, McBroom loves the outdoors. He is an avid and successful fisherman along with being a snow skiing enthusiast.

McBroom was born and raised in Fort Worth, graduating from Carter-Riverside High School, where he starred in both football and baseball and played on the 1962 Connie Mack National Champions.

Butch and his wife Lynn have three children, Dana, Greg, and Chad (now playing three sports in school) and one granddaughter, Syndi Lynn.

Assistant Coach



John Mocek is beginning his seventh year as assistant baseball coach at UTA. Since 1983, Mocek has been the Mavericks' third base coach and has helped McBroom map out the strategy for each opponent. Besides those on the field duties Mocek has teamed up with McBroom to do the recruiting and administrative duties for the baseball program.

In 1986, the responsibility of the Maverick baseball field was turned over to Mocek and he is currently the supervisor of groundskeeping of what many consider to be one of the finest natural playing surfaces in the state.

Mocek first teamed up with McBroom in 1973 as a player at Union University in Jackson, Tenn. When McBroom came to UTA he brought Mocek along and he became a very productive player as a Maverick. As UTA's first baseman-designated hitter, Mocek was a four-year letterman and ended his career as the school's record holder for the most home runs and runs batted in during a conference season. Mocek then spent a brief time with the Appleton Foxes in the Class A Midwest League.

A 1977 graduate of UTA, Mocek returned to the university in 1978 as athletic business manager, a position he held through 1985. He supervised ticket sales, stadium operations and promotions of all sports at UTA. Also during that time Mocek worked with the UTA radio broadcast team on football and basketball road games and also served as

the public address announcer at men's home basketball games at Texas Hall.

Mocek currently teaches a lecture class on the history and coaching aspects of baseball and is the assistant director of the Butch McBroom summer baseball camp for youngsters. He is a member of the American Baseball Coaches Association, Sports Turf Managers Association and the Society for American Baseball Researchers.

He is an avid baseball trivia and statistics enthusiast, along with being a die-hard Chicago Cubs fan. He also has an extensive collection of baseball cards, publications and memorabilia.

Mocek was born and raised in Chicago, graduating from Schurz High School in 1972, playing football and basketball along with being an all-city catcher and first baseman. He was a member of the 1969 Illinois state high school baseball champions.

John and his wife Pattye, who is director of admissions at the Lena Pope Home in Fort Worth, have one son, John Robert, who will be three years old in May.





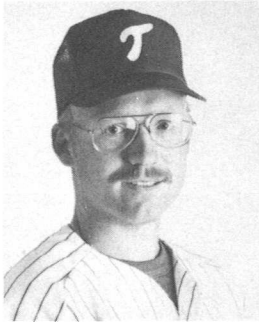
Ron Liggett Graduate Assistant Coach

Ron Liggett begins his second season at UTA assisting coaches McBroom and Mocek in all areas of on the field coaching and again will act as the Mavericks' first base coach during the year.

Liggett played his college ball at Lamar University, where he was a two-year letterman as a catcher. He was captain of the 1981 team that captured the Southland Conference crown and played in the NCAA regional playoffs. He also played a year of professional baseball for the Baseball City Royals in Florida.

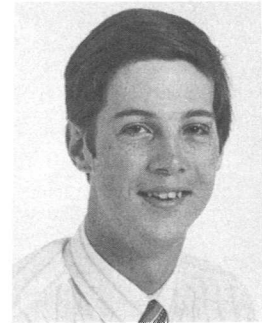

The Ballpark

UTA will begin its 16th season playing in the very friendly confines of the Arlington Athletic Center. A joint effort of the city of Arlington and the University of Texas at Arlington, the AAC was officially opened on February 15, 1974 as the Mavericks hosted TCU. That day also marked the debut of head coach Butch McBroom as the Mavericks' field boss. His first baseman in that game is now his assistant coach, John Mocek.

In the previous 15 seasons of play the Mavericks have done quite well at home. UTA has won 327 games and lost 155 for a .678 winning percentage. From 1980 to 1988 the Mavericks have amassed a record of 228 wins with just 82 losses for a .735 winning percentage.

In the summer of 1986, the center was completely renovated under the expert supervision of the Texas Rangers field superintendent Jim Anglea. A new drainage system, aided by a laser, enhanced sloping of the surface and was just the start. The entire field was resodded with the finest natural athletic turf (Hybrid Bermuda Tiff 419), and an irrigation system with nearly 50 hydraulic sprinkler stations was installed. A new infield dirt surface and the addition of a warning track surrounding the field completed the facelift.

Mocek then assumed the responsibility for the upkeep and the maintenance of the center and with the able bodied help of the Maverick baseballers, it is now considered one of the finest, playing surfaces in the Southwest. Last year, the center played host to the Texas State Junior College tournament.

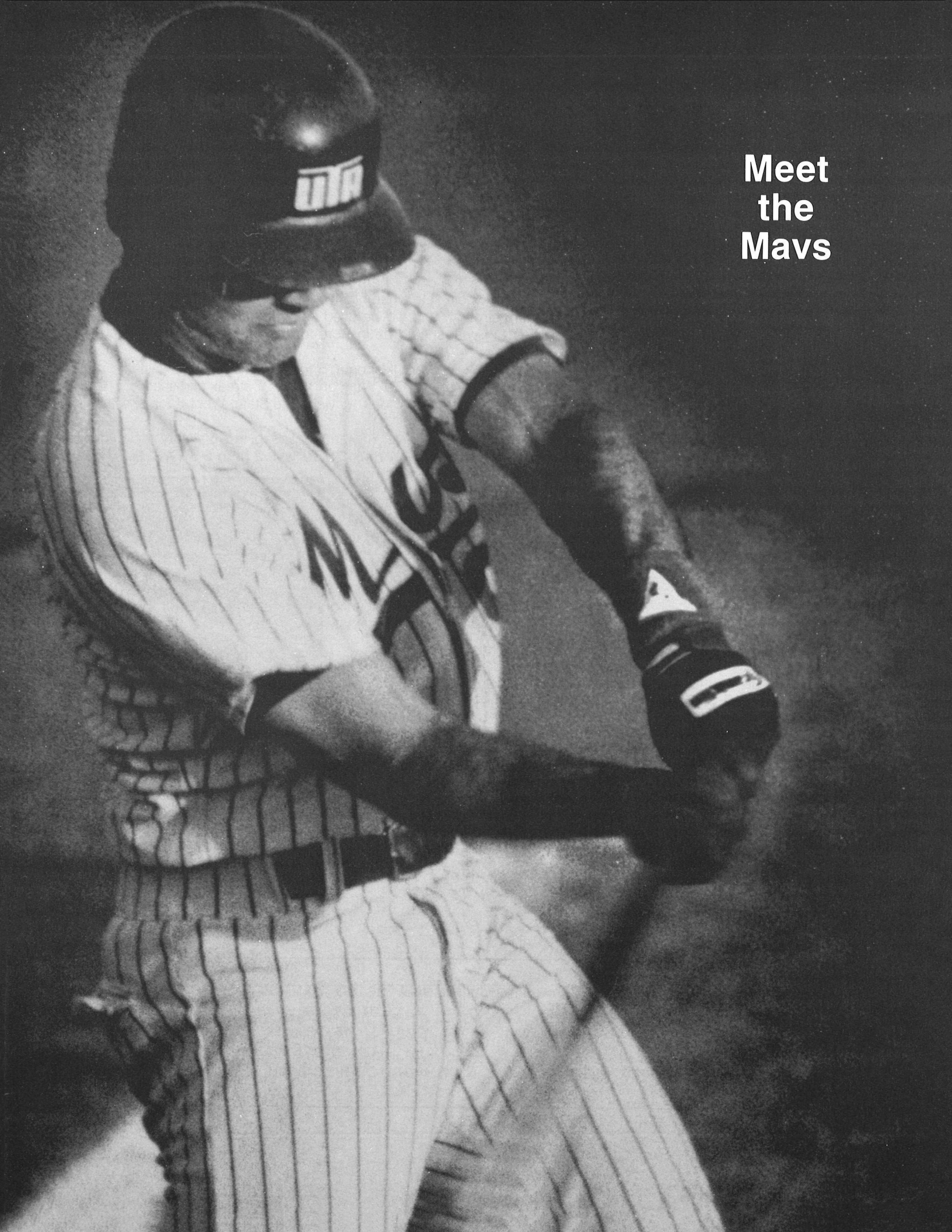
Also located at the center is a large electronic scoreboard in right field, two batting cages, a 400-square foot equipment storage building and an open air press box with a new sound system.

The field which is equipped with lights has dimensions of 330 feet down the lines, 380 feet into the power alleys and 400 feet to straight away center field. The Arlington Athletic Center has a seating capacity of 1,000.

Has led UTA in batting average the past two seasons, .389 in '87 and .353 last year. Led the Mavericks in runs scored (46), hits (61) triples (5) and walks (49) last season. As a sophomore he led the Mavericks in runs scored (47), hits (72) and RBI's (53). He has the chance to break UTA career records in at bats, runs scored, base hits and doubles. Hit .417 with 14 RBI's in Southland Conference play in 1988. Has spent the past two summers playing in the Cape Cod Collegiate League.

Coach says—"Howard has had a fine career here at UTA and has put up some great offensive numbers. He is able to utilize the whole field when hitting and has good speed for a big man. 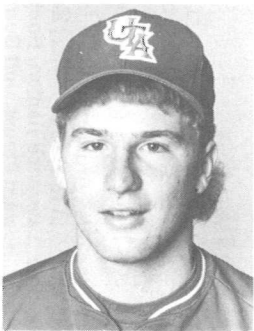
Decade of Excellence: The '80s

UTA is one of only two NCAA Division I baseball programs in the state (the other being the University of Texas) that has won 30 or more games the past nine consecutive seasons. During that period the Mavericks have won over 300 games and have had a cumulative .294 batting average, while posting a Southland Conference record of 75 wins and 51 losses...UTA has been especially tough at home winning 228 while losing just 82 for a winning percentage of .735...21 players have been named all-conference and 20 players have moved on to professional baseball.

The Highlights

- 1980** 30-plus season victory streak begins as eight players off team go on to play professional baseball...CF Randy Thorpe is second in the nation with 53 stolen bases.
- 1981** Right-handed pitcher Fred Wilburn defeats the University of Texas 6-1...McBroom is named Coach of the Year in the Southland Conference as the Mavs win the West Zone championship.
- 1982** Four-game season opening sweep over Texas Tech...Four game sweep of Top 20 ranked Pan American University.
- 1983** UTA beats eventual national champion Texas twice including a victory over Roger Clemens...Righthander Duane Mitchell no-hits Baylor 1-0.
- 1984** Three game sweep of Louisiana Tech on way to a 10-game Southland Conference winning streak... Third baseman Todd Hale sets school record with 66 rbi in 50 games.
- 1985** Two wins against Top Ranked Texas as third baseman Dave Zech hits 4 home runs and has 12 rbi... On March 1st UTA is ranked 18th in the nation...Second baseman Trey Hillman sets all-time Southland Conference record with a .442 batting average.
- 1986** February 22 coach McBroom wins 400th collegiate game... Three straight wins over 8th-ranked Oral Roberts.
- 1987** Beat TCU four times, hitting nine doubles in one game...Set school record for most home runs and extra base hits in a season.
- 1988** Two victories over 12th ranked Oklahoma...Second place finish to top-ranked Oklahoma State in the Louisiana Classic.

A Weekend to Remember



UTA's single most outstanding performance occurred on February 16th and 17th, 1985 in Austin. Maverick third baseman Dave Zech led UTA to a pair of victories over the No. 1 ranked Texas Longhorns with an awesome display of power that led Texas' Coach Cliff Gustafason to say, "It was the greatest offensive weekend an opposing player has had against us in my 20 years at UT."

Zech's assault on Texas pitching included four home runs, a double and 12 runs batted in for four games. In UTA's 14-13 victory Zech had two home runs, a double and six RBI. Zech's three run homer proved to be all UTA needed in its 7-1 victory which propelled UTA into the nation's Top 20.

1988 in Review

The 1988 season opened with a bang for the UTA Mavericks as they bombarded Hardin Simmons 14-1, highlighted by a pair of grand slam home runs by Todd Mraz and Matt Webb. The Mavericks remained hot as they defeated Baylor 3 out of 4 times including a pair of victories at home. Travelling to Hardin-Simmons, UTA then set the team single game record as they hit 5 home runs in one game while defeating the Cowboys 11-3.

UTA closed out the month of February by defeating Oral Roberts and Southwestern Louisiana to finish second at the prestigious Louisiana Classic behind the nation's top-ranked team, Oklahoma State.

The month of March started off on a big note for UTA as they hosted the 12th-ranked Oklahoma Sooners. The Mavericks came away with two thrilling wins, a 5-4 victory in 11 innings behind the complete game pitching of Steve Foster and an 11-10 victory in front of the largest home crowd of the season. The scoring outburst against Oklahoma was just a sign of what was to come two days later as UTA defeated Oklahoma City 16-15 in 10 innings. The Mavericks were down to their last strike when third basemen Gerard Giustino homered over the center field fence to tie the game at 15. Derek Howell won the game on a pinch-hit single.

The trend for late-inning heroics continued against NAIA powerhouse St. Francis as Paul Hoelscher hit a grand slam to cap off a 7-run ninth inning as the Mavs won 9-5.

As Southland Conference play began, UTA won 3 of 6 games while suffering a pair of heartbreaking losses to Northeast Louisiana that would haunt the Mavericks throughout their chase for the Southland Conference crown. The month of March finished with an offensive outburst as UTA slugged out 21 hits including nine for extra bases as they blasted TCU 19-6.

April was certainly the time for some thrilling come-from-behind victories for UTA. Against Kent State the Mavericks trailed 9-1 before scoring 9 runs in the last two innings to win 10-9. In their next game, UTA scored 5 runs in the ninth inning, including a two-run game-winning home run by Pat Cleveland, to hand Dallas Baptist an 11-10 loss. The late inning magic continued for the Mavericks as they produced 10 runs in the last three innings to beat Stephen F. Austin 11-10 to keep their Southland Conference title hopes alive.

The Mavericks then travelled to McNeese State for a showdown with the eventual Southland Conference Champions. When the dust had settled McNeese had won 2 of 3 including a come-from-behind extra-inning thriller 4-3.

As the season came to a close in early May UTA had one more day of fireworks left. The Mavs travelled to North Texas State and proceeded to smash out 25 hits in two games including 6 by Howard Prager, while beating the Eagles 11-3 and 10-0.

For the ninth consecutive season UTA finished with 30 or more victories. Their overall record of 33 wins and 22 losses produced the best overall winning percentage in the Southland Conference but the Mavericks finished in third place, a pair of games behind McNeese State.

Maverick pitcher Steve Foster was named the Southland Conference Pitcher of the Year and Pat Varni and Gerard Giustino gained second team all-conference honors.

Three UTA players moved on to the pro ranks as Steve Foster was drafted by the Cincinnati Reds and played for Billings in the Pioneer League. Catcher Todd Mraz played for the Cleveland Indians organization and Pat Woodruff signed with the Philadelphia Phillies.

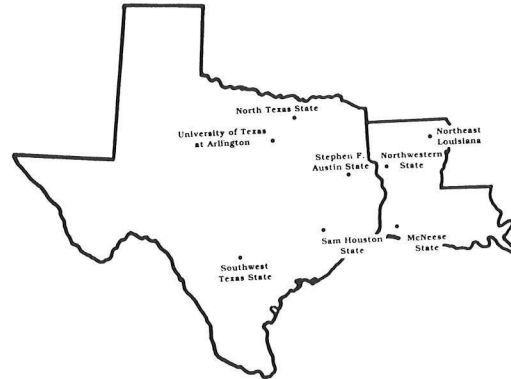
The Southland Conference

The Southland Conference was originally formed in 1963 and included UTA, Arkansas State, Abilene Christian, Lamar and Trinity. UTA is the only one remaining from the charter membership and the Mavericks left the league for one year (1987) after dropping football, but returned last season.

McNeese State joined the league in 1972 while Northeast Louisiana and North Texas came on board in 1982. In 1987, Northwestern Louisiana, Sam Houston State, Southwest Texas State and Stephen F. Austin joined the fold.

SLC offices are housed in Plano with Don Landry serving as commissioner, Don Graham is associate commissioner and Lisa Grider is assistant commissioner in charge of public information.

Team titles are determined annually in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's outdoor track and field, baseball, softball, men's and women's tennis and men's golf.

Arlington . . . The City

One of the fastest growing cities in the nation. Arlington's population has risen to 250,000. Coinciding with industrial and retail growth, the population has increased twenty-fold since 1950 and more than tripled since 1960. It is now the eighth largest city in Texas and ranks 70th among cities across the nation.

Six Flags Over Texas, located on the northeast side of the city, is the number one tourist attraction in the state, the multimillion dollar, 150-acre family amusement park draws more than two million visitors annually to Arlington. Guests of the park are treated to over 100 sophisticated rides, shows and other attractions.

Major league baseball came to Arlington in 1972 when the Texas Rangers were formed. Top industry in the city is the General Motors plant, which opened in 1954. The city also has its own water supply as work was completed on Lake Arlington in 1957. One of the newest attractions in Arlington

is Wet'n'Wild, a water amusement park.

The city was officially registered in 1877, receiving its name in honor of the Virginia hometown of Confederate hero Robert E. Lee. In the early 1890's, Arlington became a tourist attraction, extolling the virtues of mineral water as a huge well was built in the center of town—now the intersection of Main and Center streets.

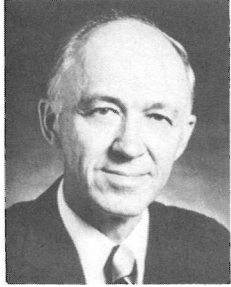
Major league professional sports abounds in the Dallas-Fort Worth area which surrounds Arlington. They include Dallas Cowboys football, Dallas Mavericks basketball and Dallas Sidekicks soccer.

The Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport, opened in 1973, is a 15-minute drive from Arlington. The 180,000-acre tract is the largest airport in the nation and the fifth busiest. Two local newspapers service the city in addition to one Fort Worth and two Dallas newspapers.
