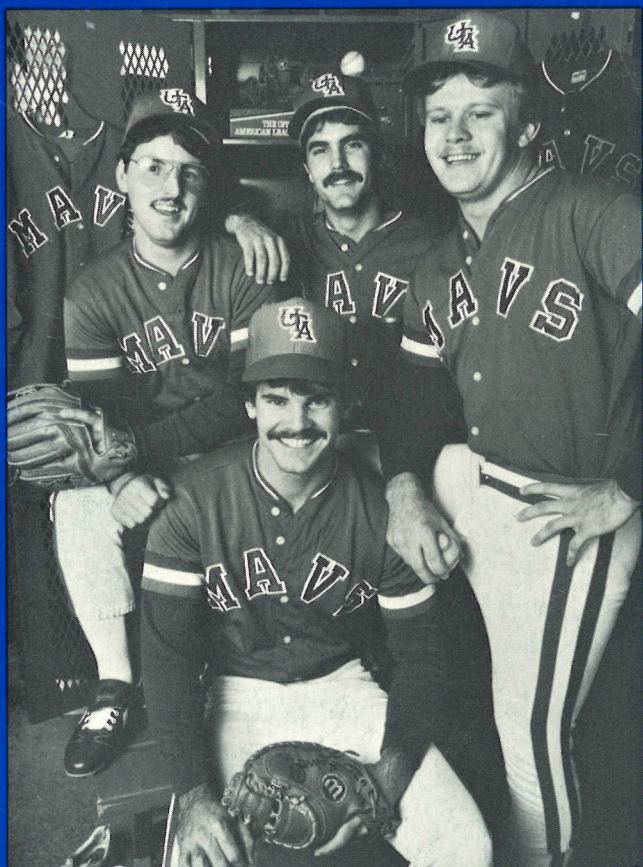

The University of Texas at Arlington is located in the heart of the Metroplex, midway between Dallas and Fort Worth.

The university, with an enrollment at approximately 22,000 takes advantage of its ideal location, bringing in guest lecturers, securing adjunct professors, and placing students in jobs where they can practice what they've learned in the classroom.

And the Metroplex has a lot to offer in the way of entertainment and recreation.

The city of Arlington has a population of 180,000. With the Texas Rangers, Six Flags Over Texas, and good shopping and housing facilities, it's such a complete community that more than half of the students at UTA live either on campus or nearby.

UTA now spans almost 350 acres with many modern buildings. In fact, growth has become a tradition with UTA construction continually underway. The university has recently completed a planetarium and nursing building.

It all started in 1895 as a private military academy. During these last 80 years, the institution has undergone a series of name changes, including Grubbs Vocational College (1971), North Texas Junior Agricultural College (1932), and Arlington State College (1949).

UTA is the second largest of the 13 components in The University of Texas System, one of the largest and best recognized educational systems in the nation. Having joined the System in 1965, the institution's name was changed in 1967 to the University of Texas at Arlington.

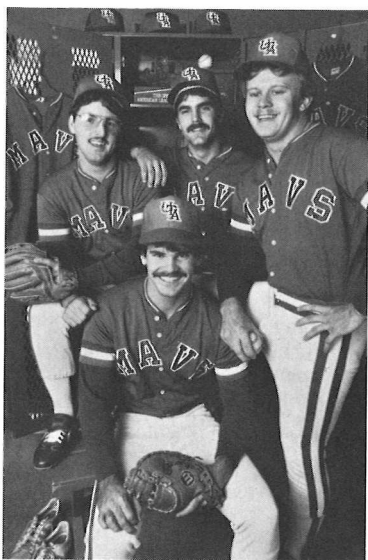

1984 UTA Baseball

Entering his eleventh season at the helm of the Mavericks, head coach Marvin "Butch" McBroom has compiled a 331-276 record at UTA.

Last year McBroom fielded a team that won 30 games against 23 losses, including a 9-9 west zone record in Southland Conference for second place.

His 1982 team flirted with a forty-win season. However, the Mavs closed with a 37-20 record after a late-season slump.

In 1981 McBroom's Mavs tallied 38 wins—a school record—while losing 23 times. Together with a two-year stint at Union University in Jackson, Tenn., McBroom's 12-year coaching record is 331-276, a winning percentage of .545.

When the 1981 team won 38 games, it reset the school record it had broken the year before with a 35-25 mark.

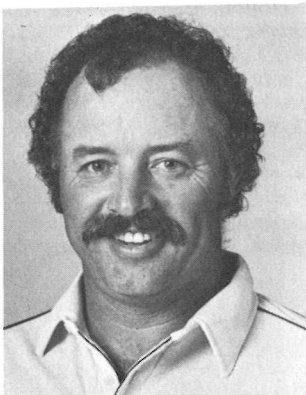
His teams at Union advanced to the NCAA College Division Midwest Regional in 1972 and the NAIA District Tournament in 1973.

After 23-28 and 22-27 records his first two years at UTA, McBroom's third-year squad jumped to a 29-21 mark. In 1977 the Mavs dipped to a 14-39 record, but then climbed to a 34-27 season the following year. In 1979 the Mavs were 21-28.

The Fort Worth native and former football and baseball standout at Carter-Riverside High School received his bachelor's degree in physical education and history from Baylor in 1967. McBroom gained his master's in physical education the following year.

While at Baylor McBroom was an all-Southwest Conference catcher in 1966 and was also named the team's most outstanding player. McBroom served as head baseball coach and assistant football coach at Waco Reicher in 1966-67. He coached baseball, football and basketball the next year at Connally Junior High in Waco before taking over at Fort Worth Castleberry in 1968 for three seasons as head baseball coach and football assistant.

A cancerous tumor was found in McBroom's left leg in the summer of 1983. Amputation to remove his leg became necessary. He rested in the fall while UTA athletic business manager John Mocek, a former player for McBroom, served as acting head baseball coach in the interim during fall workouts.



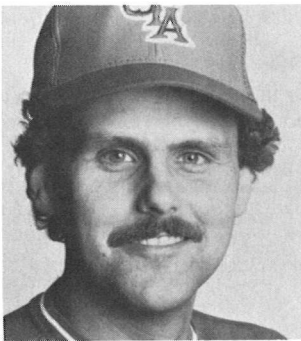

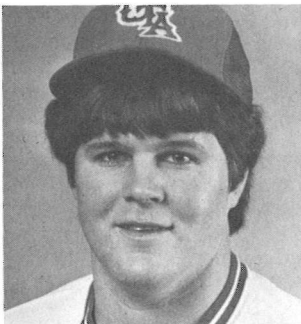
John Mocek Assistant Coach

John Mocek is in his first year as an assistant baseball coach, but he has served five previous years as UTA's athletic business manager.

Mocek will continue his duties as the business manager, an assignment which also has him handling promotions and ticket sales for athletic events. He is also the public address announcer at UTA home basketball games.

A native of Chicago, Mocek graduated on the dean's list in 1977 from UTA, where he lettered four years as a first baseman / designated hitter for the Mav baseball team. When he completed his baseball career, he held UTA records for most home runs and

runs batted in during a conference season, and he had the most RBIs in a conference game. Mocek attended Schurz High School in Chicago. He is single. In the fall of '83, Mocek managed fall baseball workouts as UTA head baseball coach Butch McBroom recuperated from surgery to remove his left leg.



Ken Rose Student Assistant Coach

Ken Rose is in his first season as a student assistant coach for the Mavs after finishing up an outstanding baseball career at UTA last spring.

The Southland Conference's best catcher in 1982, Rose was an excellent all-around player. He hit .312 as a junior when he was named all-SLC after batting .290 as a sophomore. As a senior he batted .257 with 25 RBIs, fourth best on the team.

Defensively, Rose threw out over half of the base stealers he faced, with 36 and 35 assists in his junior and senior campaigns, respectively.

Rose, 23, is working toward his degree in physical education.

A native of Wise, Va., Rose is a 1979 graduate of Arlington Bowie High School, where he lettered three times in baseball and twice in football.

While the hitting will look as strong as last season, Texas-Arlington head baseball coach Butch McBroom was left with unsettled situations as fall workouts concluded.

"I'm not worried about our hitting at all, and we've improved our defense on the infield," said the 10-year Mav coach. "However we are left with some questions in the outfield, our pitching staff and behind the plate."

Pitchers

The Mav pitching staff is McBroom's biggest concern. He must replace starters Fred Wilburn and Duane Mitchell, who were lost to graduation. That duo combined for 16 of UTA's 30 wins last year.

"Our pitching is questionable this year," McBroom says. "I have only one starter back who has proven himself over the course of a full year. No one else has done that."

That starter is Mark Farrar, who was 3-2 last year with a 4.55 earned run average.

"We will have a good club if we have some guys come out of the pack to throw well for us," McBroom says.

Two other spots in the starting rotation should be filled by Robert McCallum and Steve Sullivan, who were 0-1 and 4-2, respectively, in 1983. Both had impressive falls.

Out of "the pack" will come the fourth starter and top relievers. Mike Krieg, Gary Moore and Othel Young are among the hurling returnees.

Catchers

UTA will be inexperienced behind the plate. Keith Coover was tutored at catcher his first two years behind Ken Rose, the solid receiver who is now assistant coach for the Mavs. After seeing next to no action at catcher then, he was used at first base last year. He has been switched back to the catching chores because, simply, he's the best the Mavs have. He is a solid hitter, having never hit below .313 in his career.

McBroom says you can take your pick on who will be Coover's backup.

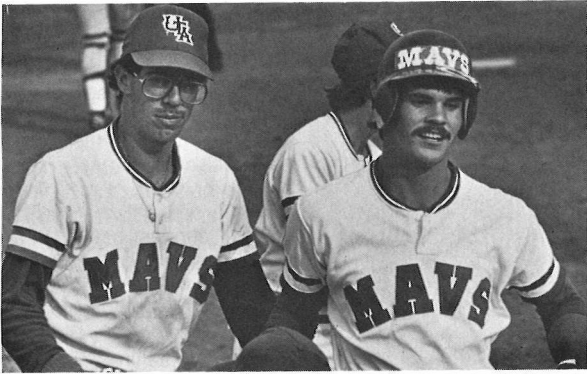
Infielders

"This may be the best infield we've ever had. Our defense on the infield and their offensive strength are the two plus factors for us this year," says McBroom.

Indeed, you would be hard pressed to find a better hitting infield. UTA's three top hitters return from last year. Third baseman Todd Hale hit .339 with a team-high 7 game winning RBIs. Shortstop-turned-second baseman, Trey Hillman was a .335 hitter with a team high 38 RBIs and a school record 15 doubles. And Craig Jennings, who played backup behind Coover at first base last year, hit .323 primarily as a designated hitter.

The other infield spot is the shortstop slot where freshman phenom James Rains is firmly entrenched. His defensive skills provided the move of Hillman to second. And his bat will only add to UTA's solid hitting if his fall average of .442 is any indication.

Utility men Scott Maynard and juco transfer Lindsey Armstrong will be the primary backups in the infield.

Outfielders

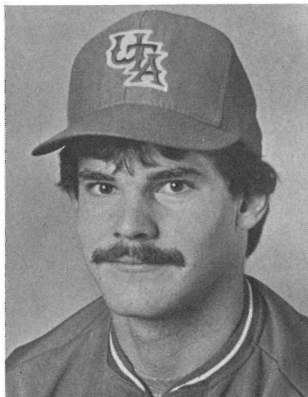
Because of his experience, senior Chuck Burnes will probably be McBroom's center fielder, although he has played left field well in his three previous seasons.

Burnes hit .283 last year, and McBroom will use strong throwing Javier Garza primarily in right field. Garza batted .253, but he will also see action on the mound, where McBroom will use his most live arm on the team due to the lack of quality pitching.

"In years past our outfield was above average when you consider our offensive power and speed," said McBroom. "But now, if I had to give us a grade, I would rate our outfield at a "C." That's because we have to fill one position since Roger Piacenti graduated, and then we'll have two new outfielders when Javier is pitching."

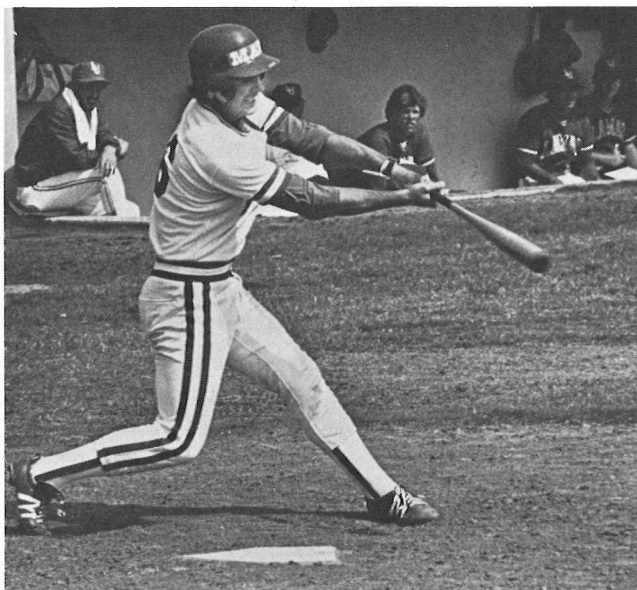
UTA has four other players battling for the outfield duties, including Todd Cox and Greg Farnik. They will likely see designated hitter action as well.

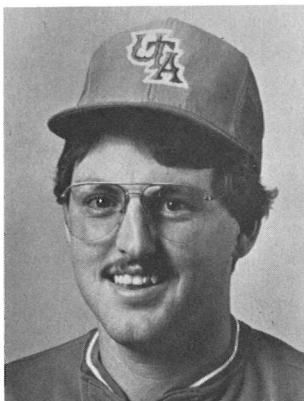
Bats right, throws right .. Batted .318 for the second year in a row, fourth best on the team last year ... strong contact hitter ... As a junior he struck out 10 times, but as a sophomore he was the second toughest batter to fan in the nation when he struck out only three times in 160 at bats ... Has speed, stealing seven bases in 10 tries last year ... Big news is that he's switching back to catcher from first base ... Was listed as a catcher his first two years, but saw very little game time there behind Ken Rose ... Played first base well last year with a fielding percentage of .990 ... Says McBroom, "Keith prefers to play first, but out of necessity we had to move him to catcher. After the fall we were unsettled at catcher, and since he's the best we have we will play him there, although first base is his best position." ... Needs to improve throwing arm ... Despite the .318 average last year, his productivity dropped off to 20 RBIs ... Could see some designated hitting duty, which is what he did so well his first two years ... A 1980 graduate of Hurst L. D. Bell High School, he earned three baseball letters and two in football ... Was district MVP as a senior catcher, and was named to the all-district team twice ... Also was an all district tailback in football ... Majoring in accounting at UTA ... Hobbies include raquetball ... Born September 18, 1961 in Fort Worth ... Son of Theresa A. Coover, ... Hurst ... 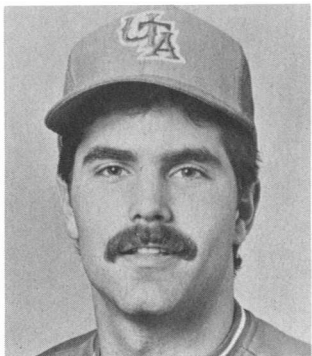


**Todd Hale,

Outstanding addition to the Mavs last year as a juco transfer from Carl Albert Junior College in Poteau, Okla ... Best Mav in the clutch last year with 7 game winning RBIs ... An excellent defensive play by Lamar's third baseman, Chris Zink, robbed Hale of driving in the potential GWRBIs for the conference zone championship ... Missed 13 games with a broken finger, but still led UTA with a .339 average.

Nearly had as many doubles (14) as teammate Trey Hillman, who set the school record with 15 in all 53 games ... Fielded .924 at the hot corner ... Says McBroom, "He just had a super year for us. If we could just get a repeat performance from him I'd be perfectly happy. He was excellent in the clutch and solid in the field." In 40 games he had 42 hits, 29 runs, 27 RBIs, 14 doubles, 4 homers ... Earned two letters and was juco all-conference and all-region selectee at Carl Albert ... A 1980 graduate of Eulesless Trinity High School, where he earned three baseball letters and two basketball letters ... Arlington (Sam Houston)**

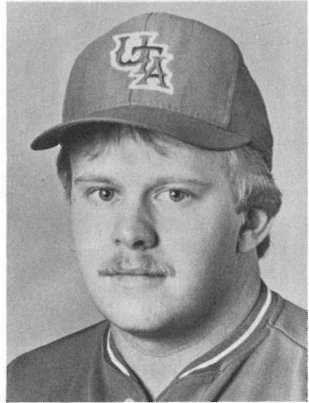
Bats right, throws right ... was the starting shortstop from day one as a freshman, but will be moved to second base this year to make room for freshman James Rains at shortstop ... Says McBroom, "He was the all-Southland Conference shortstop last year, even though he didn't field that well defensively (.908). In the fall he showed us he's a better second

baseman. He will be solid there. He does a better job there because he doesn't have to rush so much. You can't afford to make a mistake at shortstop, but if you make a mistake at second you can recover in time." ... Has displayed outstanding offensive skills, leading the Mavs in hitting as a freshman with a .342 average ... His .335 average last year was second only to Todd Hale's .339 ... Set the school record with 15 doubles last year, collecting five of them in the four-game series against Texas in Austin to lead off the season ... Selective hitter, drawing 54 walks in two years ... Played all 53 games in 1983, leading UTA in at bats (197), runs scored (37), hits (66), RBIs (38), doubles (15), and total bases (93) ... 131 assists and 21 errors also led the Mavs ... A 1981 graduate of Arlington Sam Houston High School, where he earned three letters each in baseball and football ... In baseball he was all-city and all-district as a senior shortstop, batting .367 ... Also played on a state championship American Legion team in 1979 ... 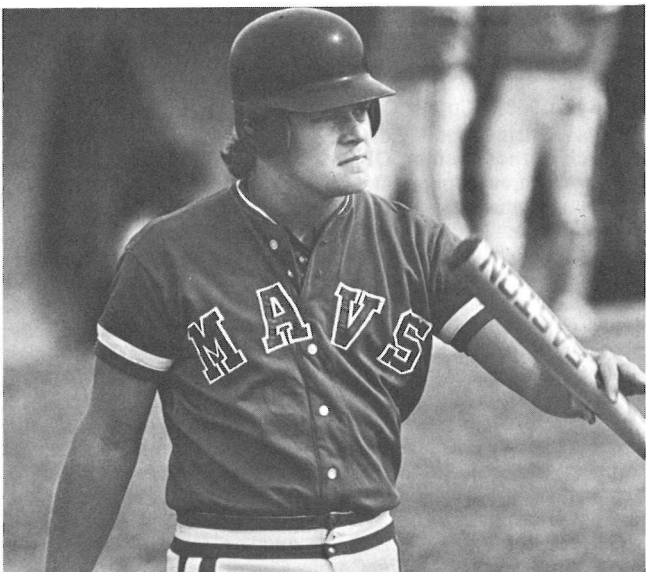


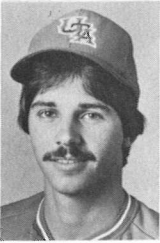
**Craig Jennings,

Has been used mostly as a designated and pinch hitter previously ... Says McBroom "Craig had an outstanding fall. He showed some power and played good on defense. He's beginning to do what we've wanted him to. I hope he continues, because we need his bat in the lineup" ...

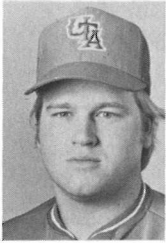


In the fall he hit .349 with 15 RBIs and three homers ... Played in 36 games last year and banded out 30 hits, including five homers and five doubles ... His .323 average was third best on the team, despite 25 strikeouts in 93 at bats ... Says McBroom, "He's going to strike out some, but he'll hit the ball out of the park some, too." ... 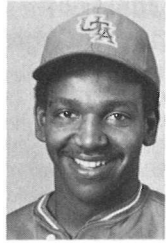

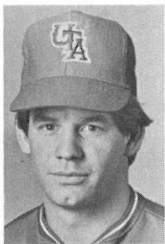

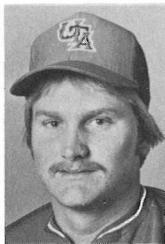

Chuck Burnes, Senior, OF, 5-9, 160, Corpus Christi (King)

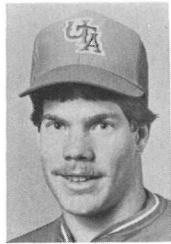

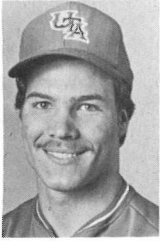

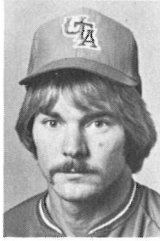
Mike Burr, Junior, Catcher, 5-11, 185, Cherry Hill, N.J., (East)

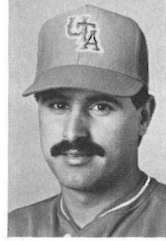
Todd Cox, Sophomore, OF, 5-11, 165, Fort Worth (Western Hills)

Greg Farnik, Sophomore, OF, 6-1, 195, Arlington (Sam Houston)

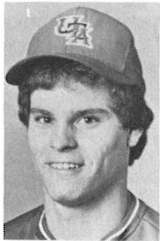

Mark Farrar, Senior, P, 6-0, 175, Arlington (Sam Houston)

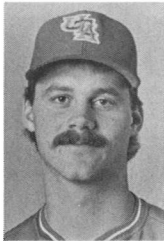

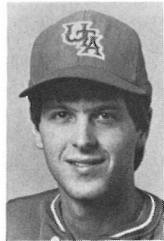

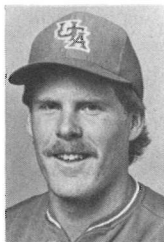

Mike Krieg, Junior, P, 6-2, 170, Portland (Gregory-Portland)

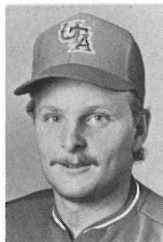

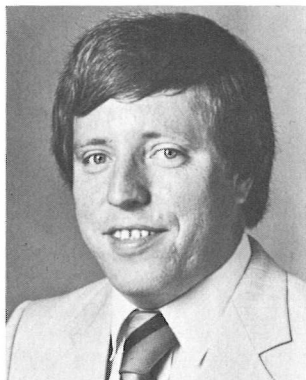
Jim Patterson Sports Information Director

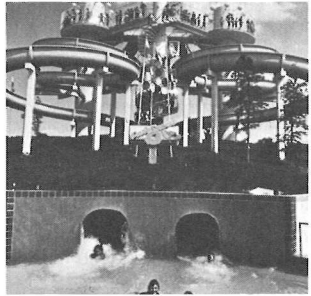
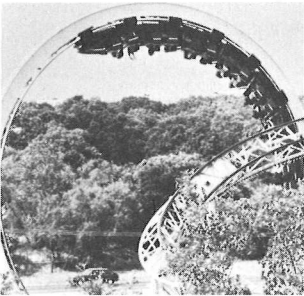
Six Flags Over Texas, located in the heart of the city, is the number one tourist attraction in Texas. The multimillion dollar, 150-acre family amusement park draws more than two million visitors annually to Arlington. Guests of the park are treated to a hundred sophisticated rides, shows and other attractions.

Arlington Stadium is home of the Texas Rangers. It was built in 1964 with a capacity of 10,000 and has been enlarged to its present capacity of 41,000.

The Dallas Cowboys and their official home, Texas Stadium, are located in nearby Irving, while the Dallas Mavericks basketball team plays at Reunion Arena in downtown Dallas.

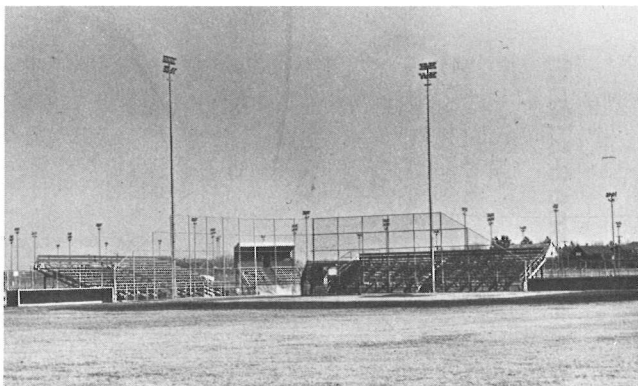
The Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport, opened in 1973, is a 15-minute drive from Arlington. The 180,000 acre tract is the largest airport in the United States, and it is the fifth busiest. Two local newspapers service the city in addition to one Fort Worth and two Dallas newspapers.

Arlington is Texas' fastest growing industrial-residential city. Throughout the 1970's Arlington ranked among the top 50 cities in the nation for homebuilding.

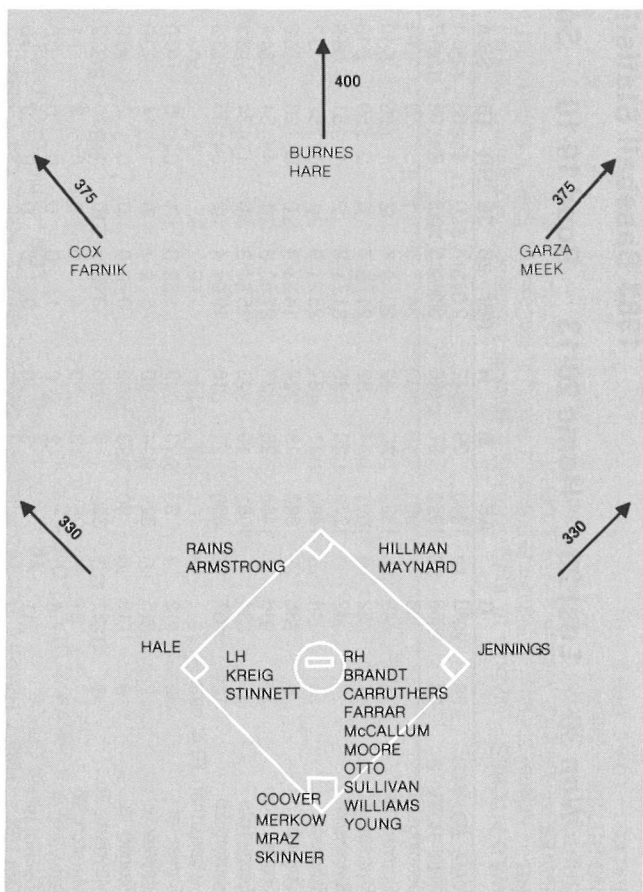


Six Flags Over Texas, Wet N' Wild, and exciting Texas Rangers baseball are three of Arlington's top attractions.

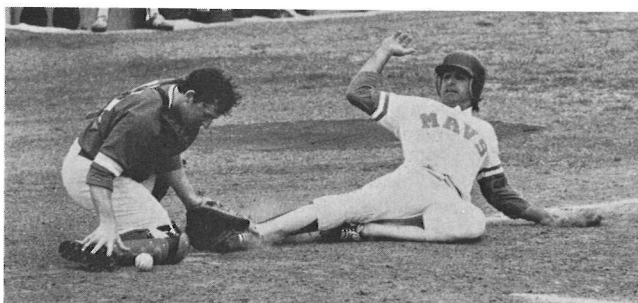
