THE UNIVERSITY



Blended into a landscape of rolling hills and tree-filled parks and bisected by a meandering creek, The University of Texas at Arlington is the second largest component of the respected University of Texas system.

The nearly 400-acre campus is midway between Dallas and Fort Worth in the heart of Arlington, a thriving, cosmopolitan community of 260,000. The enrollment of 23,900 makes UTA the fifth

largest university in the state. Its strategic location provides a wealth of community resources in business, research and the arts, and offers unique professional opportunities for its graduates and alumni.

Growth has become a tradition at UTA. Construction was recently completed on an addition to the University Center and a new engineering building, and work is currently underway to submerge



Cooper Street, a major highway that runs through the center of the campus.

The school started as a private military academy in 1895. Since then, the institution has undergone a series of name changes, including Grubbs Vocational College (1917), North Texas Agricultural College (1932), and Arlington State College (1949), before becoming a four-year school in 1959 and then changing to the current name of The University of Texas at Arlington in 1967.

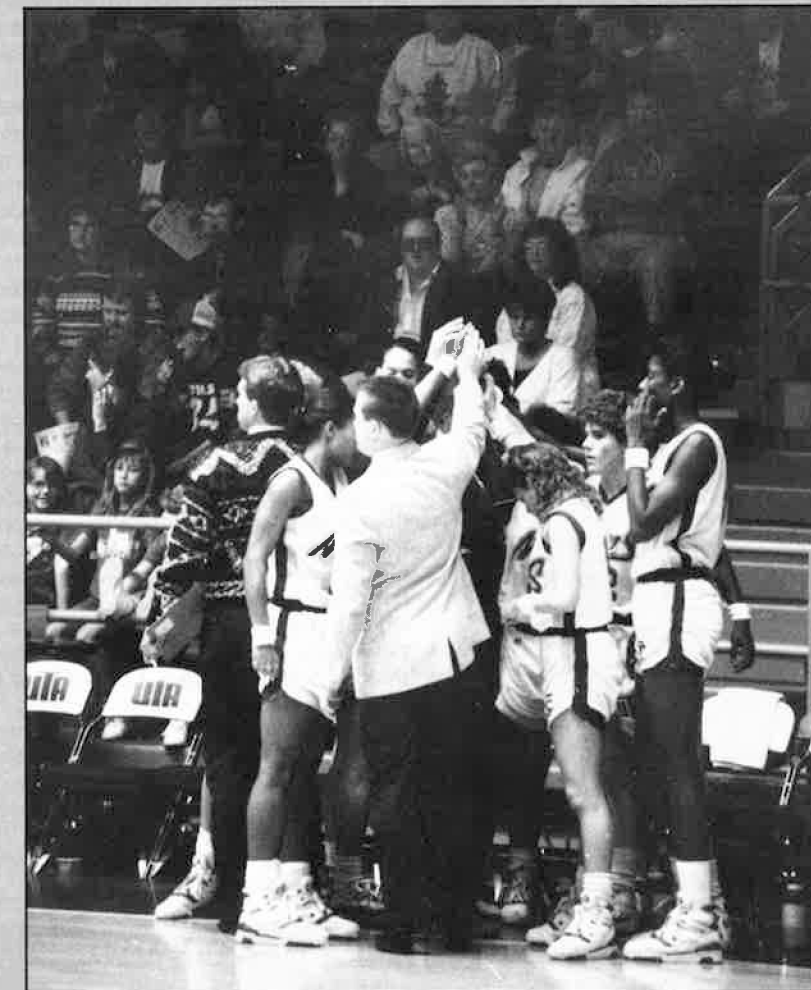

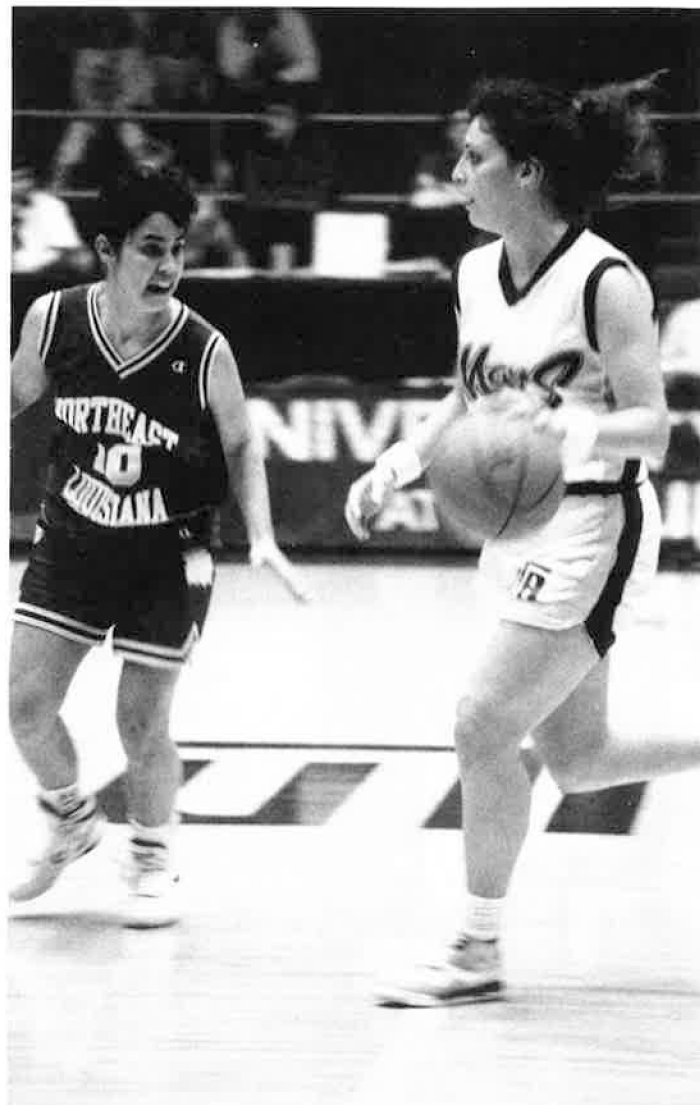

'90-91 SEASON PREVIEW

SEASON



Going into last season, there were several questions that needed to be answered: (1) how a new coach was going to put his plans into action, (2) how a new philosophy was going to work out, and (3) how new players would blend with the veterans. By the end of the season, the answers were favorable. Picked to finish last in the Southland Conference, Coach Jerry Isler and the Lady Mavericks proceeded to finish fourth in the league and advanced to the semi-finals in the conference tournament. The Lady Mavs' record was a misleading 11-17 overall because of five games that were lost by a total of 13 points, two of which were lost at the buzzer. In a long and tough conference schedule, the Lady Mavs finished 7-7 overall and won five of the last six conference matches. Along the way, they recorded the second best conference record in UTA's history and made the conference tournament for the first time ever. The Lady Mavs also shattered the conference record for free throw percentage by shooting a remarkable 77 percent. This percentage was good enough to break UTA's own team record and to finish third nationally behind Northern Illinois and Miami of Ohio.

Different questions are being asked for the upcoming season: (1) how has the team improved, (2) is the recruiting class as good as they look on paper, and (3) can this team be a legitimate contender for the conference title. When posed these questions, Coach Isler responded by saying, "I don't know if you can go from the cellar to the conference title in two years. This program has taken a giant step forward as far as respectability and having a winning attitude, we don't plan on ever going back. However, I doubt that anyone considers us a threat for the conference championship. Our goal is to finish in the top three in the conference and make the NCAA tournament. We feel that these goals are attainable just as we felt making the conference tournament was attainable last year when nobody else thought we had a prayer." Isler added that before the Lady Mavs' goals can become a reality, several things have to happen. He said that the point guard play has to improve, more consistent scoring in the post area, shooting the ball better as a team, and increasing the offensive output is a must. Isler concluded with, "I also feel that we can do a much better job of applying pressure at both ends of the floor. We have a lot of new faces which we feel will make us better athletically. How we mesh together, how hard we play, and how badly we want to succeed will determine if these areas are improved upon."



UTA

PREVIEW

The 1990-91 recruiting class is one of the best in the Lady Mavs history. Much of the credit goes to recruiting coordinator and assistant coach, Curt Cook. Isler and his staff signed one of the top players in Texas: **Kim Cann**, 5-9, from Bloomington, she played in the Whataburger Texas Coaches All-Star game. **Shawn Vest**, 6-0, from Fort Lauderdale, Florida, is the first High School All-American to sign with the Lady Mavs. Vest is expected to make an immediate impact. Height is a much needed ingredient to help this 1990-91 team. Added to the team for that reason is **Connie Erwin**, a 6-3 freshman from Montgomery, Alabama and **Sonia Wagoner**, a 6-4 redshirt from Eugene, Oregon. Experience and winning tradition was added with junior college transfers, **Christi Ensz** and **Monica Alexander**. **Ensz**, 5-9, started on the Barton County (Kansas) fourth place national team and **Alexander**, 5-10, started on an Eastern Oklahoma team that made it to the regional tournament.

Coach Isler said that, "this recruiting class is talented, but they must learn to play together quickly. At this level everyone is talented but the team that plays well together and plays hard every game will win. We will be less talented than some and more talented than others, but we'll be striving for consistency and all out effort."

The Point Guard

Returning for the Lady Mavs is **Melissa Nix**, a 5-6 junior from Sudan, and **Abby Hutchins**, a 5-4 senior from Garland. Both have had equal time playing at the point position. **Nix** was third on the team in free throw shooting with a 79 percent average. **Hutchins** led the team in three point shots (32) with a three point average of 35.2 percent. Newcomer, **Monica Alexander**, a junior college transfer from Atoka, Oklahoma will be used at point guard as well. "Alexander is a versatile player whose height and strength will add dimension to this position," says Isler. "The point position is very crucial to the success of the team and we need consistent play at this position every game."

The Off Guard

Senior **Julie Roewe**, 5-9, from Haskell leads the returnees with averages of eight points, five rebounds, and a total of 60 assists. **Roewe** is a steady performer and is expected to have a good final season. **Ensz** and **Cann** are expected to challenge heavily for this position. According to Coach Isler, **Ensz** possesses great competitiveness and is a very physical player. **Cann** is a great athlete, that Isler feels can utilize her skills in an up tempo game. Coach Isler said in our offense, we will play with two off guards that must be able to get the ball to the post players in scoring position, and be able to penetrate to create some positive situations with the offense.

The Post and Forwards

The posts and forwards will be similar in Coach Isler's offensive and defensive scheme. The forwards will have a little more freedom to step away and face the basket. However, the primary purpose of the inside players is to post up and provide consistent inside scoring and stay in good rebounding position. **Sonia Wagoner**, **Shawn Vest**, and **Connie Erwin** will all be counted on to provide solid inside play. After working out with the team last year, **Wagoner** is expected to carry a large portion of the load offensively. **Vest** will be able to play several positions, but will be needed at this position because of her strength. Last but not least, **Erwin** could be the sleeper of the recruiting class if she plays aggressively.

When asked about this young group, Coach Isler said, "a solid inside game is a must at this level. You cannot be a championship caliber team without outstanding offensive and defensive play inside. We will be extremely inexperienced, but that does not bother me as long as the team is as competitive as the coaching staff thinks they can be. There is no doubt that the players have a lot to learn but we are bigger and more athletic than we were a year ago."

Yes, this season has some unanswered questions as the Lady Mavs will take to the floor a young team, but you can tell Coach Isler has high hopes for the squad. He knows it will take hard work and mental toughness to make it to the top of the conference race.

COACHING STAFF

HEAD COACH



After completing his first season at UTA, Coach Jerry Isler has a lot of people talking about the Lady Mavs. Isler took over a program that had only won a total of four conference games in two years and had never made it to a post season tournament. Under Isler, the Lady Mavs produced the second best conference record in school history, 7-7, and finished fourth in the conference and gained their first Southland Conference Tournament birth.

Isler came to UTA from New Mexico Junior College where he had turned the women's basketball program around. He took an 8-21 team and guided them to a 15-14 record and their first ever regional playoff. The following season, Isler's squad won their first 12 games in route to a 25-7 overall record and a semi-final appearance in the regional tournament. Along that route, his team set records for most wins, most consecutive wins, most conference wins, most consecutive conference wins, longest home win streak, and highest conference finish. Isler was voted "Co-Coach of the Year" by his conference peers.

Before entering the college ranks, Isler spent two seasons coaching the girls basketball team for Grady High School in his hometown of Grady, New Mexico. He guided the 1985-86 squad to a district, regional and a state championship, finishing 28-3 and earning state "Coach of the Year" honors. The following year, the 1986-87 squad finished with a 26-3 overall record, winning the district, regional and state runner-up honors. Isler's two-year record at Grady was an impressive 54-6.

In Coach Isler's five years of coaching, he has coached five all-state players, four all-conference players, and three all-Americans.

You could say that Isler is used to winning. As a high school player he started on two state championship teams and was "New Mexico Player of the Year" in 1980. Isler then went to Clarendon Junior College where he played for UTA men's basketball coach, Mark Nixon. Isler was voted Honorable Mention all-conference his sophomore year.

Isler went on to Lubbock Christian University to play for another two seasons. He was Academic all-conference both years as a starting point guard. He earned a bachelors degree at LCU in 1985 and his masters degree from Eastern New Mexico University in 1987.

Jerry's wife Robin, is an elementary school teacher holding her bachelors degree from Texas Tech and her masters degree from Eastern New Mexico University. They have a one year old son, Jaden Trey (as in 3-point shot) and are expecting their second child in February.

JERRY ISLER

ASK THE COACH

What philosophy do you try to give your players?

"I want my players to be hard working because there is no substitute for that. I want them to handle themselves with a touch of class, to be able to set goals and sacrifice to reach those goals. It is not a failure they do not reach every goal, but failure occurs when they do not do everything possible to reach that goal. Their approach to life should be the same.

What can your players learn from basketball that can apply to life?

"The discipline and sacrifice that it takes to be successful in basketball, is the same in achieving important things in life. You will have good and bad games just as you will have good and bad experiences in life. The individuals who continue to believe and have good work habits are the ones who succeed in both basketball and life."

What are your goals for this UTA basketball program?

"Short term goals are to finish in the top three in the conference and make it to the NCAA Tournament. Long term goals are to be a consistent winner, as I believe the best progress are measured by consistency, and to graduate every player who finishes her eligibility at UTA."

What is your pet peeve concerning players?

"When players will not sacrifice to be their best and players that are selfish. There are many handicapped people that achieve great things through sacrifice. God has blessed others with healthy minds and bodies but they won't pay the price to be great. Then there are the players that are concerned with themselves more than the team's success. These type of players will not play for me."

What do you like most about basketball?

"The competition and winning. I wouldn't be fooling anyone if I said that winning isn't highly important, it is. There are other ways to measure success besides the number of wins you accumulate, but basically I hate to lose and love to win."

What is the hardest aspect of coaching?

"Coaching is extremely hard on a coach's family. I am gone a lot and my wife and son are home alone. They have no choice but to schedule their lives around basketball. Also, it is difficult to keep all the players happy. Not every player is going to play as much as they'd like. What I do is ask the players to put the team first and for everyone to accept their role in making the team successful."

Who has had the most influence in your life?

"My relationship with God is important, it gives me stability and helps me keep things in perspective. My parents and especially my wife have been a big impact in every area of my life. As far as my coaching goes, a lot of coaches have been super to me and influential. Mark Nixon is one of the coaches who has taught me a lot about coaching but has also been helpful in my personal life also."

What do you want your players to remember about playing for you?

"That I cared about them as people as well as players. That I wanted them to succeed in whatever they set out to accomplish in life. Especially that I cared enough about them to discipline them and push them to be better. I also want them to remember that I will always be there to help them if I can."



ASSISTANT COACH CURT COOK



Curt Cook begins his second season with UTA as the assistant women's basketball coach. In his short stay with the Lady Mavs, Cook has proven to be a valuable asset to this up and coming program. As a recruiting coordinator, he was instrumental in one of the best recruiting classes in this program's history.

Cook is also heavily involved in the coaching aspect, working with post players and team defense. His tireless work ethic and knowledge of the game are the assets that head coach, Jerry Isler, needed when Cook joined the Lady Maverick staff. "Curt does a tremendous job for us", says Isler. "As a head coach, you want talented and quality people around you that believe in what you are trying to accomplish. You also want someone that will work hard and get the job done. That describes Curt Cook."

Before coming to UTA, Cook had a successful record at the high school level, coaching the boys basketball team at Texico High School in Texico, New Mexico. Cook guided the Texico team to the New Mexico Class A state tournament. He had previously been head coach at Dell City, Texas, for one season, compiling a 23-3 record and earning "District Coach of the Year" honors. His team won the bi-district and area titles before being stopped in the regional semifinals.

In 1983, Cook was named head baseball coach at New Mexico State University, making him the youngest Division I head coach in the nation. He spent four years at NMSU before turning his talents toward basketball.

Cook earned his bachelor's degree in 1981 from Southwest Baptist University in Bolivar, Missouri, where he attended on a baseball scholarship. Cook was voted "Outstanding Athlete" as a senior. After graduation, Cook had the opportunity to play professional baseball for two major league clubs but decided to enter the coaching ranks. He remained at Southwest Baptist University to serve as assistant women's basketball coach for two years. Cook has been working toward a masters degree from Eastern New Mexico University.

Cook is a native of Roswell, New Mexico. Cook's wife, Dana, is an elementary school teacher at Midlothian. They have a four year old son named, Brett, and a six month old daughter, Lerrin.

NCAAAction!

ASSISTANT COACH CAMELLIA BOWEN

Camellia Bowen enters her first year as a member of the UTA coaching staff but is not stranger to the Lady Mav basketball program. Bowen was a two-year starter for the Lady Mavs and a second team all-conference performer this past season. She led the team in scoring, averaging 17 points a game, had an 82.8 free throw percentage average, and played an average of 30.8 minutes a game. Bowen led the conference in free throw percentage and was sixth in scoring. She became the ninth all-time leading scorer in UTA history with 794 total points. She also holds Lady Mav records for best free throw percentage average (82.8) in a season, most free throws made (135), most free throws made in a game (12), best free throw percentage average in a game (100), and best free throw percentage average in a career (80).

Bowen, a Dallas native, transferred to UTA from Grayson County Junior College in 1988. She graduated from Skyline High School in 1986, where she was all-district for two years and was voted "Sophomore of the Year" and was all-metro. She also played on the Skyline volleyball team, gathering "District Player of the Year" and all-metro honors.

Bowen will be involved with scouting and coaching on the floor. "Camellia is an outstanding young lady and will be a valuable asset to us this season", says head coach Jerry Isler. "She will be able to relate to our players and I have a lot of confidence in her."

A finance major, Bowen will be finishing up her studies to get her B.S. degree this year.

PRESIDENT DR. WENDELL NEDDERMAN

Dr. Wendell H. Nedderman has controlled the future of The University of Texas at Arlington from the president's chair for over 16 years and UTA continues to grow under his leadership.

While some universities in the state have no need for building programs because the student body has diminished or remained the same, UTA has continued to grow in students, in facilities for those students and in academic excellence.

Dr. Nedderman has contributed greatly to the growth. He joined UTA in 1959 as first dean of the College of Engineering, a position he held until 1969. Often filling as many as three roles simultaneously, he was named vice president of academic affairs in 1968.

During his tenure as dean, UTA's college of engineering became one of the largest in the nation, offering bachelors, masters and Ph.D. degrees in five major aspects of engineering.

Registered as a professional engineer in Iowa, Louisiana and Texas, Dr. Nedderman has been engaged in pioneering design of coastal and offshore structures since 1952. He has served as a consultant to the Gulf Oil Corporation in its international

operations, as well as 30 other firms. He has been involved with work in the Gulf of Mexico, Venezuela, Indonesia, Alaska, Nigeria, Angola, the North Sea, the Arabian Sea and offshore Brazil.

A native of Iowa, Dr. Nedderman was appointed UTA president in February, 1974. He had served as acting president for one year prior to his official appointment.

He received his bachelor's degree in civil engineering from Iowa State University, where he also received his Ph.D in 1951. He earned his master's degree from Texas A&M, where he taught for 12 years, rising from the rank of instructor to full professor.

Dr. Nedderman and his wife, Betty, have four sons.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR BILL BIBB

William C. (Bill) Bibb is in his second year as athletic director at UTA, taking over the position in September, 1989, after spending the previous 16 years at Mercer University in Macon, Georgia.

Bibb, 55, had been athletic director at Mercer University since 1980 and had been head basketball coach there for 15 years plus one year as an assistant before taking over the head coaching position.

A native of Kentucky, Bibb was an all-state basketball and baseball player at Owensboro High School. He attended the University of Kentucky where he played on the 1953-54 undefeated national championship basketball team under Adolph Rupp. Bibb played at U. of Kentucky for two seasons before transferring to Kentucky Wesleyan College, where he earned his bachelor of arts degree in physical education and biology in 1957. He earned his master's degree in education administration from the University of Kentucky.

From 1958-64, Bibb served as an assistant basketball coach and head baseball coach at Kentucky Wesleyan College before getting out of coaching for two years. He returned as an assistant basketball coach at Trinity University in San Antonio, where he spent three years. He then served as an assistant at both St. Louis University and Utah State for two years at each location.

In 1973, Bibb became the assistant basketball coach at Mercer University and in 1974, the head coach. Remaining there for 15 seasons, serving in the dual capacity of basketball coach and athletic director beginning in 1980.

He is the winningest basketball coach in Mercer history, compiling a 222-194 record in the 15 years as head coach. He took his team to the NCAA tournament in 1981 and 1985 and was named Trans America Athletic Conference "Coach of the Year" in both 1980 and 1985.

Bibb and his wife, Linda, have two sons, Chris and Brad. Chris works for an insurance company in Washington, D.C., and Brad is a TV sports announcer for the CBS affiliate in Macon.



ACADEMICS

The University of Texas at Arlington maintains one of the highest standards of academics in the Southwest, and UTA student-athletes always rank high on the academic charts.

UTA closely monitors its student-athletes' progress to ensure compliance with NCAA and institutional guide lines. For those athletes who do request assistance, on campus-tutorial services offer one-on-one counseling sessions at a time appropriate for the student.

UTA athletes are encouraged to be degree-oriented while allowing for flexibility to explore different areas.

Bachelor degrees are offered in more than 60 areas of study under the colleges of business administration, engineering, liberal arts and science, schools of architecture and nursing, the institute of urban studies, and the center for professional teacher education. Master and doctoral degrees are also available.

Several UTA academic areas are among the best in the nation. The UTA College of Business Administration has the 10th largest undergraduate enrollment in the nation. It is one of four in the U.S. named as a pilot to receive \$725,000 in business computer software for teaching purposes.

The Texas State Board of Public Accounting recognizes UTA accounting graduates' CPA exam scores as being ranked in the Top 10 nationally. The school has consistently been a leader in overall pass rate on the exam. The university's undergraduate and graduate accounting programs are among a very select number accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business. Big Eight accounting firms surveyed during 1988 in the Dallas-Fort Worth area cite UTA as the preferred provider of accounting professionals.



UTA's School of Nursing has opened the nation's first forensic nursing program, recognizing the shortage of trained medical assistance in the area.

NASA has also chosen to support UTA's new \$1.7 million Aerospace Research Center which contains a supersonic and ultrasonic wind tunnel capable of producing speeds 16 times the speed of sound.

A few UTA alumni include singer Ray Price, Texas Senator Bob McFarland, Dallas Maverick owner Donald J. Carter, astronaut Robert Stewart, actor Lou Diamond Phillips, and Texas Instruments Vice Presidents Glen Gaustad and Jesse Wilson.



ARLINGTON

One of the fastest growing cities in the nation, Arlington's population has risen to 250,000. Coinciding with industrial and retail growth, the population has increased twenty-fold since 1950 and more than tripled since 1960. It is now the eighth largest city in Texas and ranks 70th among cities across the nation.

Six Flags Over Texas, located on the northeast side of the city, is the number one tourist attraction in the state. The multimillion dollar, 150-acre family amusement park draws more than two million visitors annually to Arlington. Guests of the park are treated to over 100 sophisticated rides, shows and other attractions.

Major league baseball came to Arlington in 1972 when the Texas Rangers were formed. Top industry in the city is the General Motors plant, which opened in 1954. The city also has its own water supply as work was completed on Lake Arlington in 1957. One of the newest attractions in Arlington is Wet 'n' Wild, a water amusement park.

The city was officially registered in 1877, receiving its name in honor of the Virginia hometown of Confederate hero Robert E. Lee. In the early 1890's, Arlington became a tourist attraction, extolling the virtues of mineral water as a huge well was built in the center of town—now the intersection of Main and Center streets.

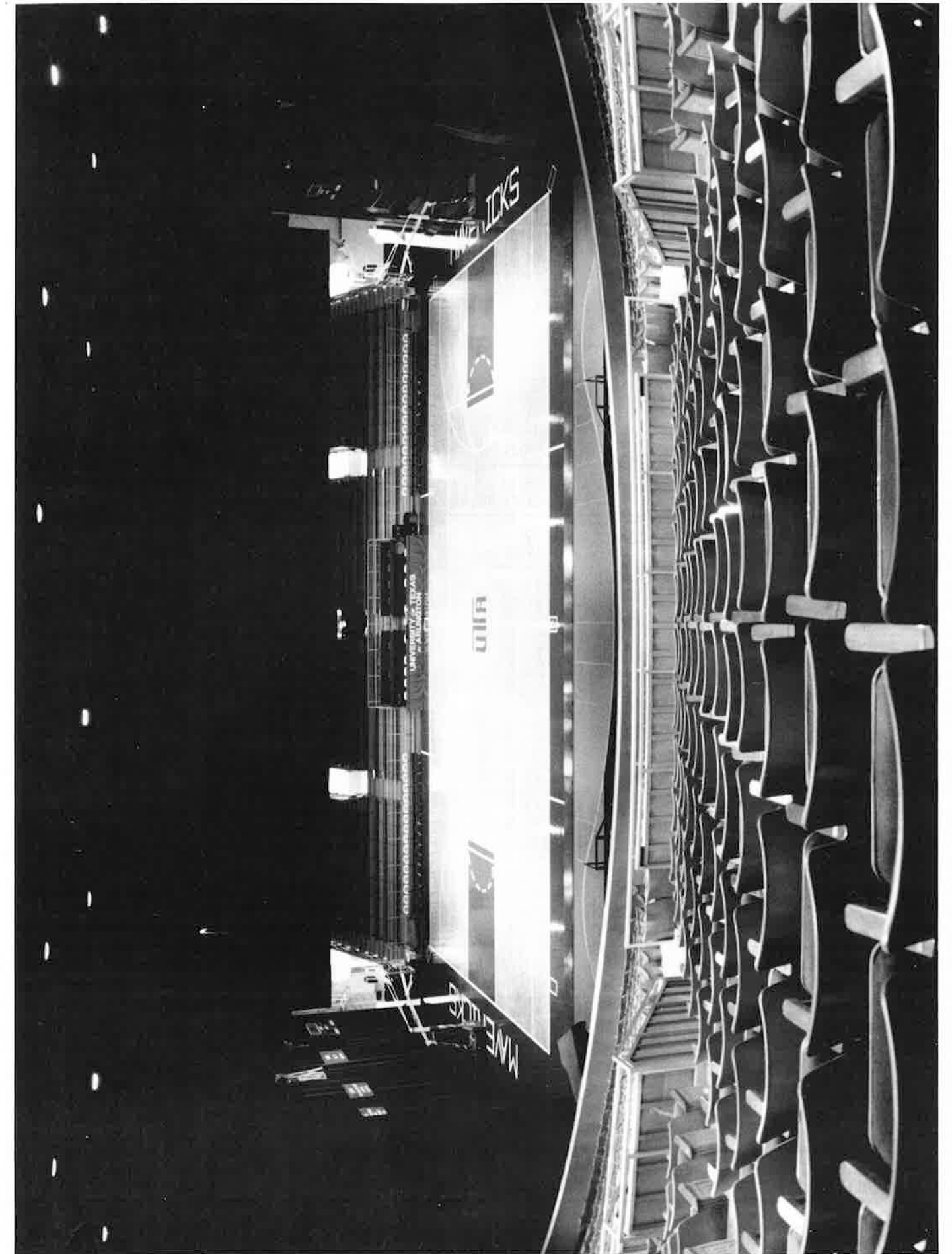
Major league professional sports abounds in the Dallas-Fort Worth area which surrounds Arlington. They include Dallas Cowboys football, Dallas Mavericks basketball and Dallas Sidekicks soccer.

The Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport, which opened in 1973, is a 15-minute drive from Arlington.

The 180,000-acre tract is the largest airport in the nation and the fifth busiest. Two local newspapers service the city in addition to one Fort Worth and two Dallas newspapers.

Texas Hall - Home of UTA Lady Mavs Basketball - Capacity 4,200

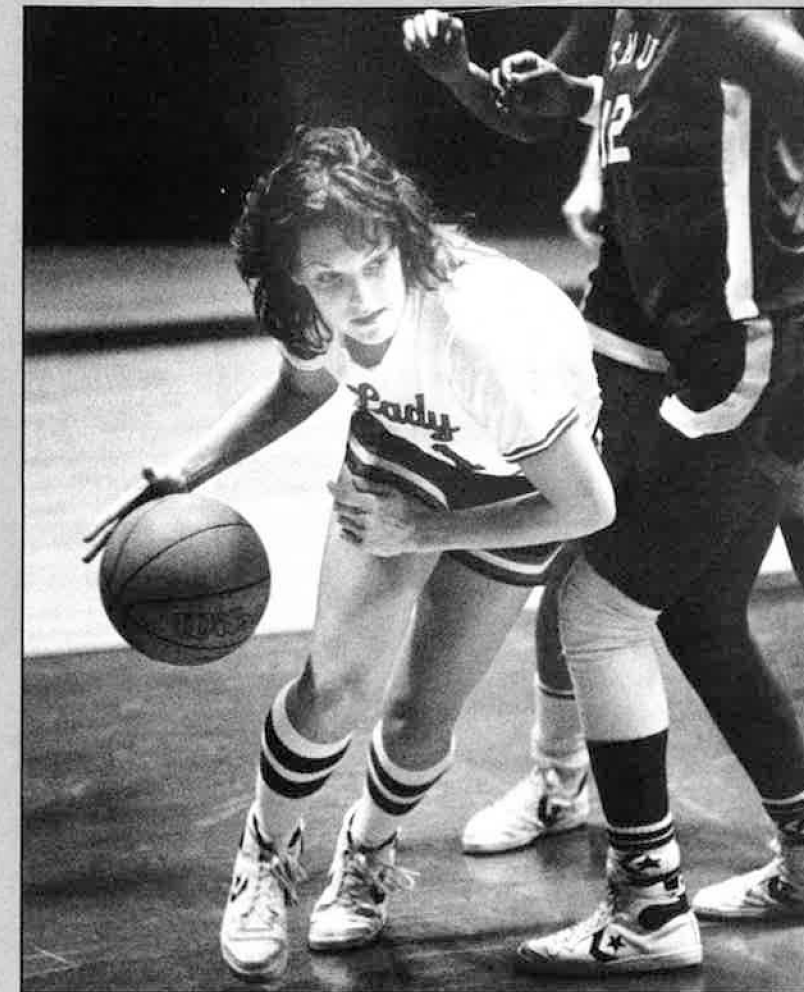

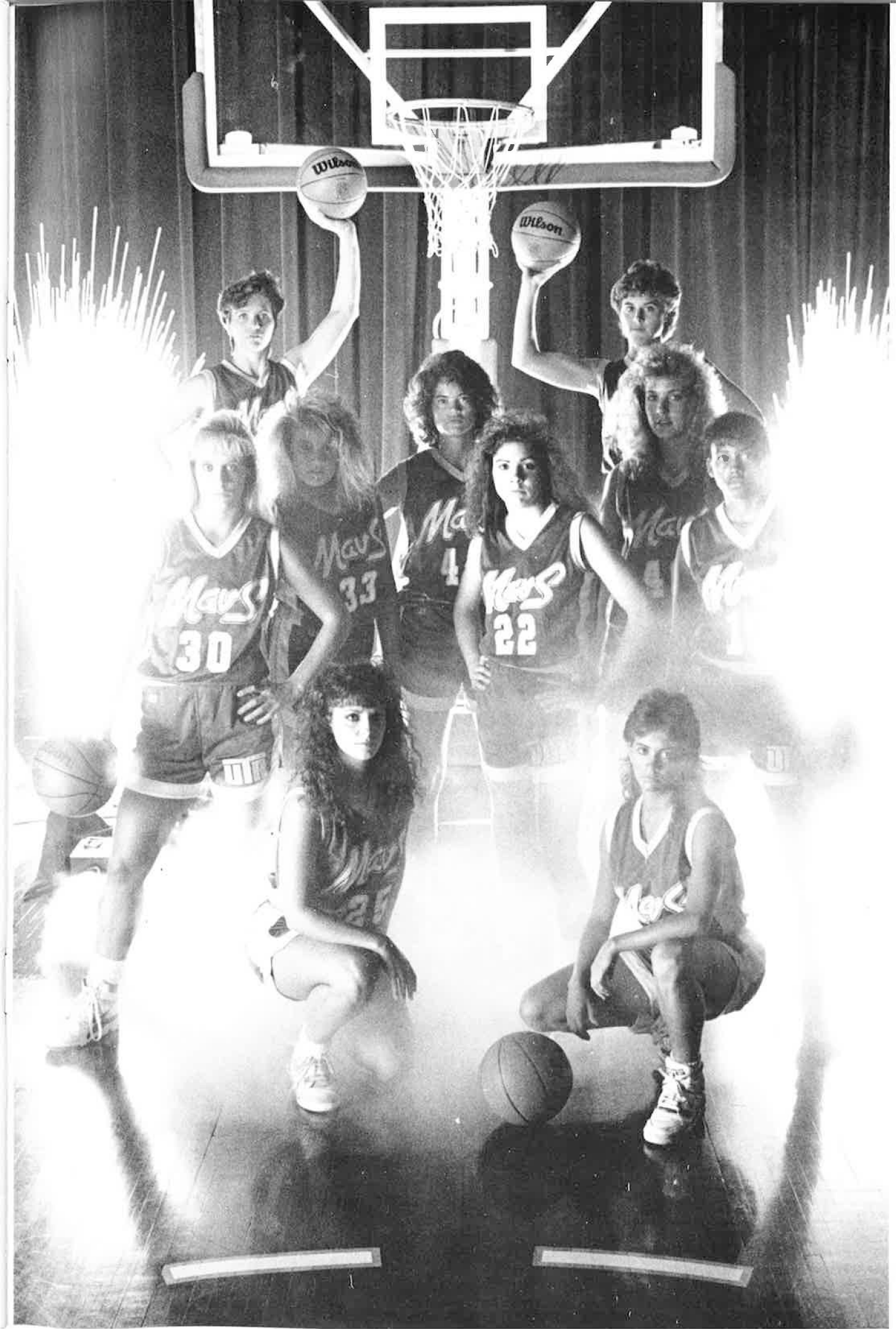
