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2007-08 Chattanooga Wrestling

Chris Bono made an immediate impact on the Chattanooga wrestling program in his first year as the Mocs' head coach in 2006-07.

Bono was named head coach on July 29, 2006. He wasted little time, directing the Mocs to their 22nd Southern Conference championship and coaching nine NCAA Qualifiers.

Bono took nine wrestlers to the 2007 NCAA Championships, a feat only matched by national-power Minnesota. Matt Keller earned All-America status, and the squad secured a 20th place finish, the program's highest finish since 1983.

The first-year head coach took the Mocs on a magical ride during the regular season. He guided the team to a 16-1 dual-match record including an 11-match win streak to start the season and a victory at No. 14 Ohio State. He received high consideration for National Coach of the Year honors from RevWrestling.com.

Bono is a former NCAA Wrestling Champion who was on the Mocs' staff in 2005-06 as an assistant coach.

"This position means the world to me," Bono said. "It has been a goal of mine to become a head coach since I got into the coaching profession. I plan on leading the team and representing UTC with integrity. We will work hard and work toward a national championship."

A member of the 2005-06 staff, Bono helped lead UTC to its 21st Southern Conference title and a 30th-place finish at the NCAA Championships. He was named the interim head coach in 2006.

Although new to his position as Athletics Director, Rick Hart was heavily involved in the national search for the head coach, and said that Bono was a perfect fit to direct the tradition-rich program.

"We are excited to have Chris Bono as our head coach on a permanent basis," Hart said. "We are appreciative of his leadership during the transition between coaches and between athletics directors. We look forward to Chris continuing the outstanding tradition of UTC wrestling, and we are confident that he and his program will represent the University and the City of Chattanooga with the utmost class and competitive spirit."

Bono joined the UTC staff in 2005 after serving nine years as a wrestling assis-

tant coach at national-power Iowa State. He worked for Head Coach Bobby Douglas and was the Cyclones' head assistant coach for the last five years.

During Bono's final year on the ISU staff, he helped direct the Cyclones to a 16-4 dual match record in 2004-05, a third-place finish in the Big 12 Conference and a sixth-place showing at the 2005 NCAA Championships.

A native of Gilbert, Iowa, Bono holds many coaching and competitive honors. He was named the National Wrestling Coaches Association Assistant Coach of the Year in 2002 for his role in ISU's success that season. The Cyclones compiled a 17-5 dual match record and were NCAA runner-ups with five wrestlers earning All-America status.

16-1 DUAL RECORD IN FIRST SEASON

Bono, who lettered at Iowa State from 1994-97, ranks fifth on the program's all-time wins list with 130 victories. He won the NCAA 150-pound title as a junior.

A four-time NCAA participant, he placed fifth at the Nationals as a sophomore and second as a senior. As a freshman, he placed eighth at the Big Eight Conference Championships. He wrestled to a Big Eight Conference runner-up finish his sophomore year, won the

Big Eight title as a junior and was named the Most Outstanding Wrestler at the inaugural Big 12 Conference Championship in 1997. He registered a 41-11 record as a sophomore, went 37-4 as a junior and was 37-2 his senior season.

Bono's wrestling success did not come to a halt upon his graduation from Iowa State. During the summer of 2004 as a freestyle competitor, Bono defeated Doug Schwab, 5-4, to take third place at the 2004 U.S. Olympic Trials in Las Vegas, Nevada. In 2003, Bono won the 145.5-pound title at the U.S. Senior Freestyle National Championships in Las Vegas, qualifying for the World Team Trials in Indianapolis, Ind., where he was runner-up at that same weight. He was a U.S. World Cup team member, earning the gold medal at the 2003 World Cup Wrestling Championships in Boise, Idaho, and was a member of the national team at the 2003 Titan Games in San Jose, Calif.

Bono's freestyle accomplishments in 2002 led to a U.S. Senior Freestyle No. 1 national ranking at 145.5 pounds and a spot on the U.S. World Team. He began the year with a first-place showing at the Dave Schultz Memorial in Colorado Springs, Colo., followed by a fourth-place finish at the Kiev Grand Prix in Kiev, Ukraine. He won a bronze medal at the Pan American Championships in Caracas, Venezuela, and placed third at the U.S. Freestyle National Championships in Las Vegas, earning a berth to the World Team Trials.

At the 2002 World Team Trials, Bono swept through the mini-tournament beating Reggie Wright (Gator WC) of Colorado



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Springs, Colo., 3-1 and Schwab (Hawkeye WC) of Iowa City, Iowa, 3-2 to advance to the finals. In the 145.5-pound championship, Bono defeated Jamill Kelly (Gator WC) of Stillwater, Okla., 3-1 and 3-0, earning his second consecutive World Team Trials title.

In a special wrestle-off for the 145.5-pound spot on the 2002 U.S. World Team, Bono defeated Bill Zadick (Hawkeye WC) of Iowa City, Iowa, two matches to one, 2-3, 3-1, 3-2 OT, to earn his second consecutive trip to the World Championships. The U.S. World Team, however, did not compete at the World Championships in Tehran, Iran.

Bono also captured top honors at the 2004 NYAC Invitational with a victory in the finals over 2004 NCAA champion Jes-

se Jantzen, formerly of Harvard, and also earned a 66 kilogram title at the 20th annual Sunkist International Open with a win in the finals over former 2003 NCAA 149-pound champion and current Arizona State assistant coach Eric Larkin.

Bono competed at the 2005 World Championships in September in Budapest, Hungary. At the 2005 World Team Trials, Bono, the number one seed, captured the title at 66 kilograms by defeating Jared Lawrence two matches to none.

In May of 2006, Bono beat Japan's Kohei Fujimoto (1-0, 2-0), Uzbekistan's Muradollo Ablokulov (2-4, 1-0, 2-0) and Russia's Jirair Oganessian (1-1, 5-4) at the Independence Cup Grand Prix in Tash-

kent, Uzbekistan. He finished with the silver medal after losing 0-1, 2-1, 1-1 to Russia's Andrey Sementsov on a takedown with 14 seconds left in the final period. Sementsov is the reigning Junior European champion.

Bono won the 2007 U.S. Freestyle national title in Las Vegas and received an automatic bid to the World Team Trials. Seeded fourth at 145.5 pounds at Nationals, he defeated second-seeded Lawrence for the title. At the 2007 World Team Trials, he finished runnerup to Schwab in the finals by a 2-1 score.

Bono earned his bachelor's degree in Exercise and Sports Science from Iowa State in 1997. He and his wife, Niki, have two daughters, Josie and Ellie.

BONO WINS HIS FOURTH U.S. FREESTYLE NATIONAL TITLE

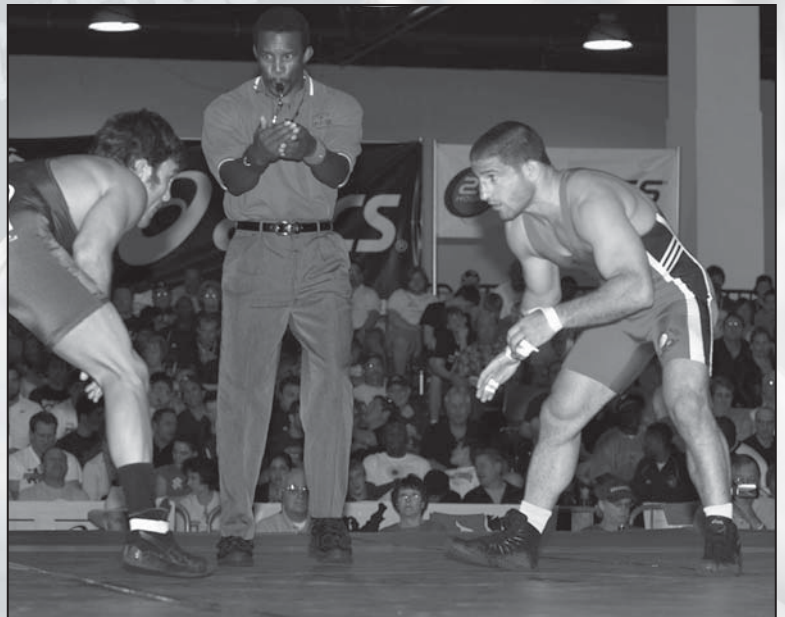
LAS VEGAS – Chris Bono claimed his third consecutive U.S. Freestyle National Championship April 7, 2007, at the 2007 U.S. National Championships in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Bono, who entered the tournament seeded fourth in the 145.5 pound division, has now won four overall U.S. Freestyle titles. He receives an automatic bid to the World Team Trials on June 9 and 10 in Las Vegas.

As a seeded wrestler, Bono did not have to go through the preliminary qualifying matches. He defeated Joe Johnston, 3-0, 1-1 and Zack Esposito, 1-1, 0-1, 3-1 to get to the semifinals. In the semis, Bono got past top-seeded Jared Lawrence, 3-0, 0-3, 1-0 before beating second-seeded Jared Frayer, 2-6, 3-1, 1-0 for the title.

The championship match came down to the third period which Bono won 1-0 after Frayer stepped out of bounds.

"Jared is a tough and dangerous wrestler," Bono said. "This is the first time I have ever beaten him. This is exciting because I'm out of the mini-tournament. I only have to wrestle two matches to be on the World Team. I'll let those other guys beat each other up before they get to me."

great for our program to bring in someone of his caliber.

"I coached Nate at Iowa State, and we come from the same system. Nate's an excellent instructor, an excellent technician and a real student of the game."

Gallick won the 141-pound Big 12 Conference title three times as a sophomore, junior and senior. Prior to winning the NCAA title as a senior in 2006, Gallick also picked up All-America honors with a second-place finish in 2005 and a fifth-place finish in 2004. He compiled 109 career victories.

Like Bono, Gallick won a U.S. Freestyle National Championship in April, 2007, at the 60 kilograms division. He was runnerup at the 2007 World Team Trials.

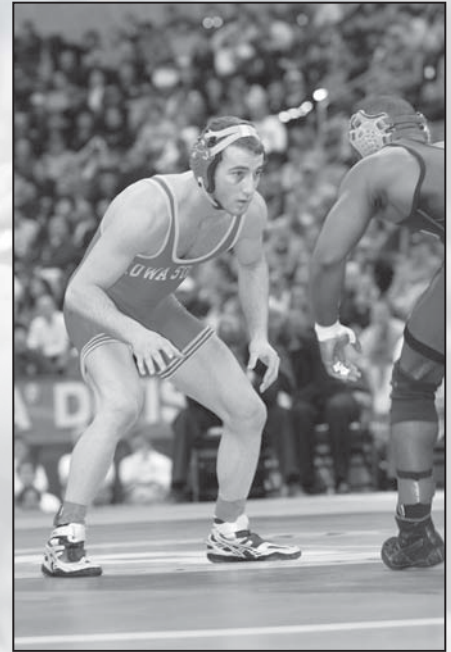
"I feel that I have a lot to offer Coach Bono and the program," Gallick said. "I think I can help Coach Bono continue to make the strides he made with the program in his first season. Plus, he is going to allow me to continue to train."

A native of Tucson, Ariz., Gallick was a High School All-America at Sunnyside High School, where he won state titles at 119 and 125 pounds. He also claimed Freestyle and Greco-Roman National Championships.

Nate Gallick, a three-time wrestling All-America and 2006 NCAA Wrestling Champion, joined Chris Bono's wrestling staff in June, 2007 as an assistant coach.

A 2007 graduate of Bono's alma mater, Iowa State University, with a degree in Sociology, Gallick spent the 2006-07 season as a volunteer with the Cyclones' coaching staff. Gallick worked with the ISU lightweights, and the Cyclones claimed the Big 12 Conference Championship and were runnersup at the NCAAs.

"Nate is going to be a tremendous fit for our program," Bono said. "I've never heard anybody say a bad word about him. He's done a great job working with the athletes at Iowa State. He's still competing and has a chance to make the World and Olympic Team and that's

versity Freestyle National Championships in Chicago.

Silva continues to compete internationally. He wrestled at the U.S. National Championships in April and is in training for other national and international meets.

Prior to his UTC career, Silva became a two-time Junior College All-America at North Idaho College. He placed second at the national tournament his sophomore year and was third as a freshman. Silva led the team to the Junior College National Championship in 2002.

A native of Marysville, Wash., Silva was a four-time state qualifier at Pilchuck High School. He captured the state title his junior season, finished as the state runnerup his final year and placed sixth as a sophomore.

Silva is an undergraduate at UTC and is nearing completion on his degree in Sociology. He was born Jan. 6, 1983 in Ensenada, Mexico. He and his wife, the former Jessica Henry, have a three-year-old son, Taythan Enrique.

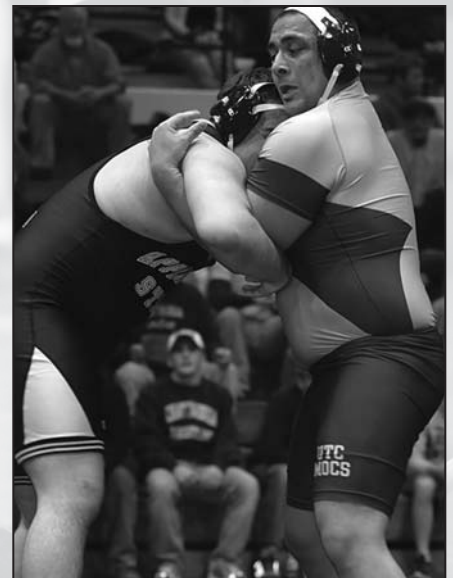
Israel Silva is serving his second season on Chris Bono's coaching staff. After working as a full-time assistant coach in 2006-07, Silva will serve as a volunteer assistant for the program this season.

Silva was a two-year starter for the Mocs from 2004 to 2006 and claimed the Southern Conference heavyweight title as a senior in 2006. He was also part of the Mocs' SoCon team championship in 2006.

With Silva's individual SoCon title, he earned an automatic berth to the NCAA Championships in Oklahoma City, Okla., and went 1-2 in heavyweight matches.

Silva compiled a 26-19 overall record at UTC with three pins. During the summer of 2005, Silva won the heavyweight division of the Uni-

DR. ROGER BROWN CHANCELLOR

Roger G. Brown, Ph.D., a native Tennessean, became Chancellor of The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga in 2005.

"In Roger Brown we have a proven academic leader with the vision and experience necessary to build on the successes of The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and to help that campus reach even greater heights," said Dr. John Petersen, University of Tennessee President.

Brown has promoted UTC's mission as a metropolitan university with special emphasis in the fields of science, mathematics, and technology.

He has pledged the campus' commitment to teacher preparation, healthcare professions, business and commerce, and cultural appreciation.

Brown came to Chattanooga from the University of North Carolina at Pembroke, where he served as Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs since 2000. During his tenure at Pembroke, the campus experienced a 60 percent growth in student enrollment and added degree programs at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Previously, he had served since 1991 in various academic and administrative capacities with The University of North Carolina at Charlotte.

A political scientist with particular academic emphasis in American government, Brown earned bachelor's and master's degrees in Political Science from the University of Tennessee and the Ph.D. in Political Science from The Johns Hopkins University.

Along with his academic achievements, Brown has maintained a high level of community involvement and service. In 2004, the North Carolina Supreme Court appointed Brown to serve the Chief Justice's Advisory Committee on the Political Conduct of Judges. He was a member of Leadership Charlotte and the Public Safety Committee of the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce.

In Chattanooga, he continues membership in Rotary International and has also been named to the United Way of Greater Chattanooga Board of Directors. He is a commissioner of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and has been appointed to the Southeast Tennessee PreK-16 Education Council.

Brown has held membership in the American Association of Higher Education, the American Political Science Association, the Academy of Political Science, the International Association for Conflict Management, the International Personnel Management Association, and the Southern Political Science Association; he has been inducted into four national and international honor societies.

Brown's wife and partner is Dr. Carolyn Thompson. They have two children.



RICK HART DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Rick Hart hit the ground running upon his arrival in Chattanooga and has no plans of slowing down.

Now in his second year as the Director of Athletics at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, Hart has made an immediate impact on UTC's athletics program with his leadership skills and broad ideas on how it can continue in

its quest to become the top mid-major athletics program in the nation.

Under his guidance in 2006-07, his first year as an athletics director, the Mocs claimed Southern Conference Championships in women's cross country, women's basketball, wrestling, men's golf and softball.

Four student-athletes were selected as SoCon Athletes of the Year for their respective sports, and one was named SoCon Female Athlete of the Year among all SoCon student-athletes. A wrestler earned All-America honors, and football attendance figures saw an increase despite a schedule which included just four home games.

Hart's commitment to comprehensive excellence also features the academic side of the equation. He has added staff members to the Academic Services department, and the student-athletes have responded as over 200 of them made the Athletics Department's Honor Rolls in his first two semesters at UTC.

Balancing a budget at the mid-major collegiate level is widely known as a difficult task. Hart made it a priority for the department. With diligent leadership, UTC Athletics achieved fiscal responsibility and ended the 2006-07 fiscal year with a balanced budget, a fact not lost on the University's administrators.

Extremely visible in the community, Hart served as Grand Marshal of the 2007 Region 4 Special Olympics, and was a sought-after speaker among the area's many civic organizations.

Campus integration has been a focal point in Hart's initial year, as the athletics department has dedicated time and energy to engaging other university departments and strengthening relationships with faculty, staff and students.

Hired on May 23, 2006, Hart comes to the UTC campus after serving seven years at the University of Oklahoma in various athletics administrative capacities.

"Rick rose to the top for us from a very strong pool of candidates," UTC Chancellor Roger Brown said at the announcement of his hiring. "His experience in athletics marketing and promotion will be a huge asset to our athletics program as we work to encourage more fans to attend our events. He also brings a strong background in fund raising, game operations, facilities management, and overall administration that will benefit both Mocs athletics and the UTC campus as a whole."

Hart's career with the Sooners began in 1999 as the Director of Marketing and Licensing, where he was responsible for brand management, campus and community relations, and marketing and promotions.

He became Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing and Licensing in 2001, adding more administrative duties to his list including contract negotiation and affiliate management and overseeing information technology.

He assisted to secure contracts for the department in a variety of areas including but not limited to food services, licensing, multi-media and sponsorships, and merchandise and apparel. He expanded OU's Internet site to include e-commerce, on-line donations and premium subscription options, and he developed and implemented marketing campaigns which generated annual ticket revenues in excess of \$19.5 million.

Hart was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Program Advancement and Branding in 2003 where his duties reached into events and facilities, game atmosphere, radio and television, strategic planning and ticket operations.

He led an effort to reconfigure seating arrangements at OU men's basketball games to increase student participation and enhance game atmosphere, he helped secure television broadcasts for a variety of sports programs on national and regional cable outlets and he instituted a comprehensive and one-of-a-kind digital ticketing system which improved attendance, event security and customer satisfaction.

His preliminary goals for the UTC Athletics Department are all attainable under the vision he has brought to the role, including a stronger focus on the student-athlete, operating with honesty, integrity and the appropriate priorities, and engaging the community and aggressively seeking opportunities to expand and enhance the resources provided to the student-athletes, the coaches and staff.

Hart has also worked in athletics for the University of North Carolina and East Carolina University and has served with the U.S. Olympic Committee. A 1994 graduate of UNC, Hart earned a bachelor's degree in Physical Education, Health and Sport Science.

Along with his wife, Allison, also a graduate of North Carolina, the couple has one son, Trevor, 8, and one daughter, Caroline, 4.

Hart's father, Dave, is currently the Athletics Director at Florida State University, and his grandfather, Dave Sr., was extremely well thought of as the Commissioner of the Southern Conference from 1987-91.

Since its founding as Chattanooga University in 1886, The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga has developed an institutional excellence which rests on an unusual blend of the private and public traditions of American education.

For 83 years the University was a private school. Three years after its founding, the University was consolidated with another church-related school, East Tennessee Wesleyan University at Athens, under the name of Grant University. In 1907 the name University of Chattanooga was adopted.

In 1969 the University of Chattanooga and a junior college, Chattanooga City College, merged with the University of Tennessee, one of the oldest land-grant universities in the nation, to form the UTC campus.

The History of the Scenic City

The name "Chattanooga" comes from the Creek Indian word for "rock coming to a point." This refers to Lookout Mountain which begins in Chattanooga and stretches 88 miles through Alabama and Georgia. The city itself started out with 2 different names: Ross's Landing and Lookout City. Ross's Landing was established in 1816 by John Ross, Chief of the Cherokee Indians. This area consisted of a ferry, warehouse, and landing. With the organization of Hamilton County in 1819, Ross's Landing served not only the Cherokee trade but also as a convenient business center for the county. In 1838, the city officially took the name of "Chattanooga". That same year, Cherokee parties left from Ross's Landing for the West on what became known as the Trail of Tears.



"Pardon Me Boy...." The First Gold Record . . .

The famous Chattanooga Choo Choo Terminal Station was built in 1908. The station still stands today as a testament of the golden age of railroad with its 85-foot freestanding dome, the world's largest free-standing dome. In addition, the song "Chattanooga Choo Choo," which was made famous by Glen Miller in the 1940's, became the first gold record.

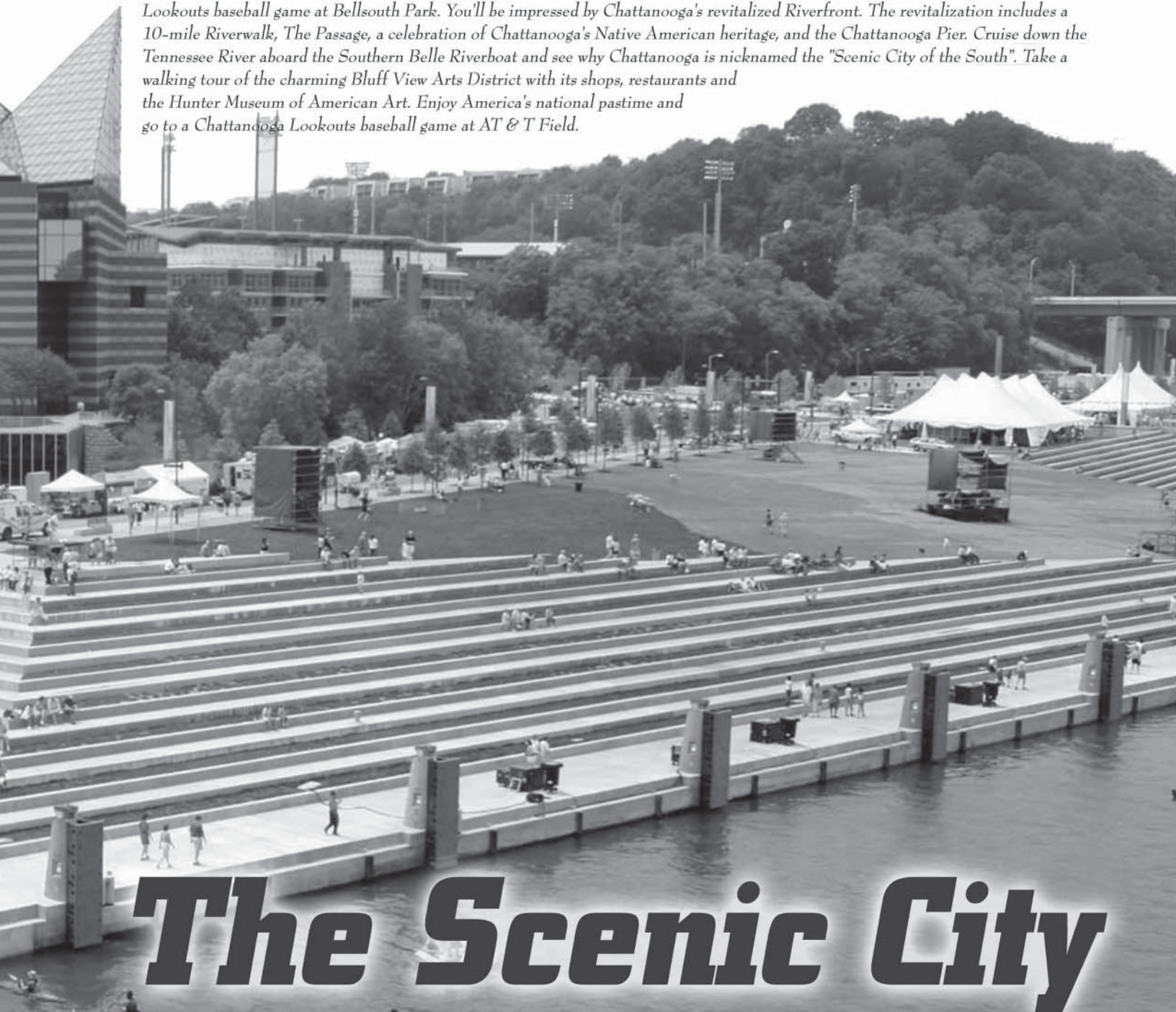

The Southern Conference, which began its 87th season of intercollegiate competition in 2007, is a national leader in emphasizing the development of the student-athlete and defining the league's role in helping to build lifelong leaders and role models.

The Southern Conference is the nation's fifth-oldest NCAA Division I collegiate athletic association. Only the Big Ten (1896), the Missouri Valley (1907), the Pacific 10 (1915) and the Southwestern Athletic (1920) conferences are older in terms of origination.

The Southern Conference has also excelled as the premier Football Championship Subdivision conference. Southern Conference member Appalachian State has won the last two Football Championship Subdivision titles. The Conference currently consists of 11 members in four states throughout the Southeast and sponsors 19 varsity sports and championships that produce participants for NCAA Division I Championships.

Academic excellence has been a major part of the Southern Conference's tradition. League athletes have been recognized countless times on Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-America and district teams. A total of 19 Rhodes Scholarship winners have been selected from conference institutions.

The Southern Conference office is located in the historic Beaumont Mill in Spartanburg, S.C. A textile mill that was in operation from 1880 until 1999, the Beaumont Mill was renovated in 2004 and today offers the SoCon a first class meeting area and offices as well as a spacious library for storage of the conference's historical documents.

Membership History

The Southern Conference was formed on February 25, 1921 at a meeting in Atlanta, Ga. as 14 institutions from the 30-member Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association (SIAA) reorganized as the Southern Conference. Those charter members included Alabama, Auburn, Clemson, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi State, North Carolina, North Carolina State, Tennessee, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Washington & Lee. Athletic competition began in the fall of 1921.

In 1922, six more schools - Florida, LSU, Mississippi, South Carolina, Tulane and Vanderbilt - joined the fold. A year later, the University of the South joined the ranks. VMI became a member in 1925 and Duke was added 1929. Since then, conference membership has experienced a series of membership changes with 42 institutions having been affiliated with the league. The league has undergone two major transitions during its history.

The first occurred in December 1932 when the Southeastern Conference was formed from the 23-school Southern Conference. The league's 13 members west and south of the Appalachian Mountains reorganized to help reduce the extensive travel demands that were present in the league at the time. In 1936, the Southern Conference invited The Citadel, William & Mary, Davidson, Furman, Richmond and Wake Forest to join the membership.

The second major shift came about in 1953 when Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest withdrew from the league to form the Atlantic Coast Conference. This change was brought about due to the desire of many of those schools to schedule a greater number of regular season basketball games against local rivals.

Today, the league continues to thrive with a membership that spans four Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia. Current league members are Appalachian State, College of Charleston, The Citadel, Davidson, Elon, Furman, Georgia Southern, UNC Greensboro, Chattanooga, Western Carolina and Wofford. On July 1, 2008, Samford will officially join the league, bringing membership of the conference to 12.

Championship History

The first Southern Conference Championship was the league basketball tournament held in Atlanta in 1922. The North Carolina Tar Heels won the tournament to become the first recognized league champion in any sport. The Southern Conference Tournament remains the oldest of its kind in college basketball.

The Southern Conference began sponsoring women's sports during the 1983-84 season. That year, league championships were held in volleyball, basketball and tennis. Cross country joined the mix in 1985 and the league began holding indoor and outdoor track championships in 1988. Most recently, the conference instituted golf and softball championships in the spring of 1994 and added soccer in the fall of 1994.

The Southern Conference currently declares champions in 10 men's sports - football, soccer, cross country, basketball, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, wrestling, baseball, tennis and golf - and nine women's sports - soccer, volleyball, cross country, basketball, indoor track and field, outdoor track & field, tennis, golf and softball.

25th Anniversary of Women's Championships

The Southern Conference will celebrate 25 years of women's championships in 2007-08. A year-long celebration of women's sports will highlight student-athletes, coaches and teams. Commissioner Ken Germann spearheaded the Southern Conference's expansion to include women's athletics. The league crowns champions in nine women's sports including cross country, soccer, volleyball, indoor track & field, basketball, tennis, golf, outdoor track & field and softball.
