

HEAD COACH RODNEY ALLISON

Rodney Allison enters his sixth season as the head football coach at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga.

Allison continues his yearly improvements with the program, whether it's in recruiting, game attendance figures or academic progress.

The program's recruiting hauls have been ranked among the top 11 nationally in three of the last five years, including the nation's top-ranked NCAA Division I-AA signing class in 2004.

The 2007 season saw Allison guide his squad to a second straight win over Georgia Southern, the program's first ever as a visitor to the Statesboro, Ga., campus.

Under Allison, the 2007 Mocs led the Southern Conference in pass-



penalties called with 41. It was the program's lowest total since 1971 and ranked second among NCAA Football Championship Subdivision teams.

In 2006, the Mocs had to endure a seven-game road schedule. However, in the team's four home games at Finley Stadium, UTC averaged an attendance increase of over 1,300 per game.

Allison's signature moment that year came on Sept. 23 when the Mocs recorded their first victory over Southern Conference rival Georgia Southern since 1996, snapping a nine-game losing skid to the Eagles.

The top player on Allison's 2006 squad, running back Eldra Buckley, signed with the San Diego Chargers of the National Football League and will be a second-year player in 2008.

A four-game turnaround is quite an accomplishment in college football, and UTC's 6-5 winning record in 2005 is just what Allison predicted would happen. Only it occurred one year earlier than anticipated.

In his third season directing the Mocs, Allison led the 2005 squad to its first winning season since 1997. UTC improved from 2-9 the previous year to its 6-5 mark with victories over Tennessee Tech, Jacksonville State, Wofford, Liberty, Elon and The Citadel.

For his efforts, Allison received consideration for Southern Conference Coach of the Year honors.

Allison was hired by UTC on Dec. 6, 2002. Athletics Director Steve Sloan lured Allison to Chattanooga from Clemson to take his first head-coaching job. Allison was a star quarterback for Sloan's Texas Tech football squad in the mid-1970s. Sloan once hired Allison to join his coaching staff at Duke, and the teaching and leadership attributes that attracted him back then were once again the drawing cards to bring him to UTC.

In 2003 during Allison's first year, the Mocs showed marked improvement in all phases of the game. He led UTC to Southern Conference victories over Elon, The Citadel and Western Carolina. The Mocs knocked The Citadel out of a certain NCAA Divi-



ing defense, ranked fourth in total defense and third in quarterback sacks. Allison's reputation as a tough disciplinarian showed in the team's low penalty total last season. Chattanooga led the league in fewest

sion I-AA playoff berth and shut out Western Carolina's high-powered offense in a 38-0 win.

The Mocs improved to fifth place in the SoCon in 2004 with wins over Western Carolina and Appalachian State. In the victory over the Mountaineers, the two teams combined to set an NCAA and SoCon single-game record with 16 touchdowns.

With a year under his belt, Allison and his staff signed the nation's top-rated recruiting class in Division I-AA in 2004, according to Rivals.com. The staff followed up the No. 1 rating in 2005 with a fourth-ranked recruiting haul.

Prior to his arrival at UTC, Allison spent four seasons with the Clemson Tigers as the defensive ends coach for Head Coach Tommy Bowden.

Allison's impact on the Clemson defense was evident. His defensive ends helped the Tigers record nearly 100 sacks over his last three years. In 2002, the Tigers ranked 38th nationally in total defense and 50th in scoring defense. They ranked 18th in rushing defense in 2001.

Allison brings more than two decades of football coaching experience to the Mocs' program. Other than his stints at Texas Tech, Duke and Clemson, he also enjoyed coaching success at Auburn and Southern Mississippi.

He worked on Terry Bowden's Auburn staff from 1993-98, serving as running backs coach, special teams coach and offensive coordinator in different years. Allison and the Tigers forged a perfect 11-0 record in 1993, and they were ranked No. 4 in the final Associated Press Top

25 poll. The Tigers went 20-1-1 during Allison's first two years at Auburn and earned three Bowl Game berths during his stay.

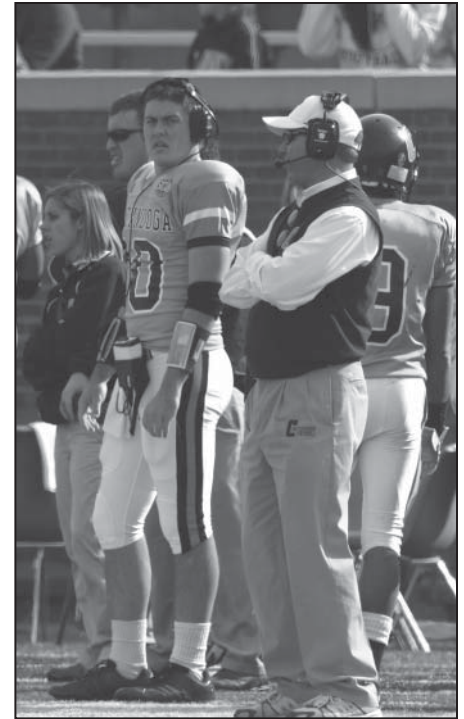
While coaching the running backs at Auburn, three of his pupils gained over 1,000 yards in a season. James Bostic led the Southeastern Conference in rushing in 1993, and Stephen Davis was tops in the SEC the following year. Both backs enjoyed success in the National Football League.

Allison worked as an assistant at Southern Mississippi from 1988-92. His star pupil while working with the Golden Eagles' quarterbacks and running backs was quarterback Brett Favre. After an outstanding college career at USC, Favre enjoyed an extraordinary career in the National Football League. He won a Super Bowl title with the Green Bay Packers in 1996 and is the NFL's only three-time Most Valuable Player honoree. He retired following the 2008 playoffs.

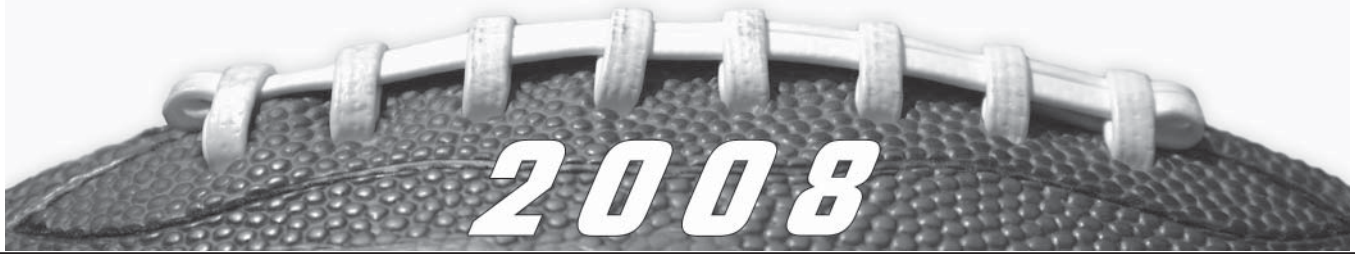
During Allison's tenure at USC, the Golden Eagles participated in two Bowl Games. They completed a 10-2 season in 1988.

Allison served on Sloan's Duke staff from 1984-86 as the running backs coach.

As a college quarterback, Allison led Texas Tech to three Bowl Games - the 1974 Peach Bowl, the 1976 Bluebonnet Bowl and the 1977 Tan-



gerine Bowl. In 1976, he passed for 1,458 yards, ran for 706 and was voted the Most Valuable Player in the Southwest Conference. In 1977, he was nominated for the Heisman Trophy. A team captain, he played in the Hula Bowl and the Japan Bowl Senior All-Star Games.



He was inducted into the Texas Tech Athletics Hall of Fame in October, 2003.

Allison played football professionally for one year for the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League in 1978. He returned to his alma mater in 1979 as a graduate assistant coach for the late head coach, Rex Dockery. The following year, he was hired full-time as the running backs coach by Jerry Moore, currently the head coach at Appalachian State.

Allison is a 1980 graduate of Texas Tech with a degree in Physical Education. He is married to the former Leigh Harris of Durham, N.C., who is a teacher at Normal Park Elementary School in Chattanooga. The couple has two children, a son, Sloan, 20, and a daughter, Ashleigh Delle, 17. Sloan is a redshirt freshman quarterback at UTC this fall.

Alton Adams Jr.

Alton Adams joined the Mocs' football staff in March, 2008, and will coach the running backs.

Adams, who goes by the name Junior, earned his coaching experience at his alma mater, Montana State, where he worked as a receivers coach from 2004 to 2006 for Head Coach Mike Kramer.

He helped lead the Bobcats to the playoffs in 2006 where Montana State defeated Furman in the opening round before losing to eventual National Champion, Appalachian State. They tied for first place in the Big Sky Conference in 2005.

While a Bobcats' mentor, he coached Rick Gatewood, a Big Sky Conference Newcomer of the Year and All-Big Sky receiver, and Mike Jefferson, an All-Big Sky performer who signed a contract with the NFL's Dallas Cowboys.

Adams worked as an assistant coach at Prosser High School in Washington for the 2007 season. He helped guide the squad to a State championship and a No. 19 final ranking by Max Prep.

As a receiver at Montana State, Adams was a First-Team All-Big Sky Conference selection as a senior in 2002 and earned Second-Team honors his junior year.

During his Bobcat career, Adams compiled 106 receptions for 1,635 yards and 14 touchdowns. Upon completing his career, he ranked fourth in career receiving touchdowns at MSU, sixth in receiving yardage and eighth in catches.

The team earned a spot in the NCAA Playoffs his senior year, facing McNeese State in 2002.

He compiled 983 yards through the air his final season, the fourth-highest single-season total in school history. He turned in a career-high 181 receiving yards in a game at Washington State, and he returned three punts for touchdowns in his junior season. Adams owns MSU's career punt return average of 17.3 yards per return and stands second in return average for a season, 19.0 in 2001.

Adams' collegiate career began at Oregon State where he was a member of the 1998, 1999 and 2000 squads. After redshirting in 1998, he played for Head Coach Dennis Erickson, was a member of the 2000 Pac-10 Conference Championship team and played in the 2001 Fiesta Bowl against Notre Dame.

A native of Fremont, Calif., he enjoyed an outstanding prep career at Amador Valley High School in Pleasanton, Calif., where he rushed for 3,385 yards and made 53 touchdowns in three seasons.

He earned his degree in Sociology from Montana State in 2003.

Bobby Allison, now in his second season on the Mocs' coaching staff, was promoted to special teams coordinator and cornerbacks coach for the 2008 season. Last year, he served as the defensive backs assistant.

Allison and former secondary coach David Bibee were responsible for directing Second-Team All-America and First-Team All-Southern Conference safety Chris Camacho in 2007. Camacho led the SoCon in tackles and the nation in solo tackles.

Allison moved to Chattanooga from the high school coaching ranks of his native state of Texas. He spent the 2004 and 2005 seasons as the defensive backs coach at Odessa High School and worked as the defensive coordinator at Sharpstown High School in Houston, Texas, in 2006.

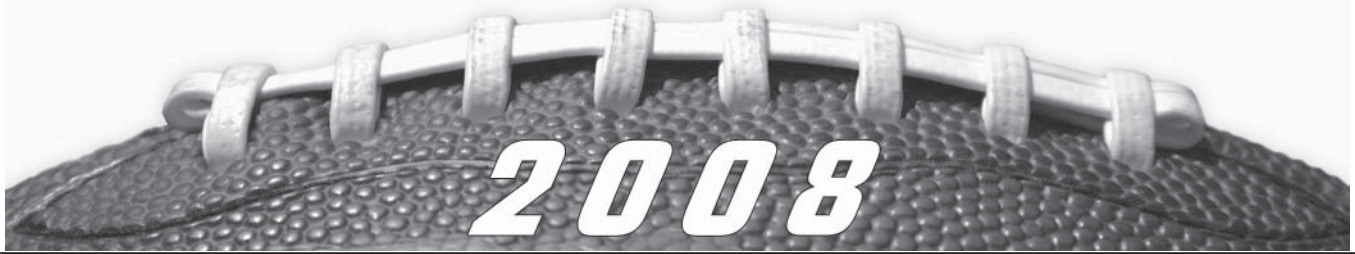
Allison is a graduate of Permian High School in his hometown of Odessa, Texas. The novel "Friday Night Lights" and the popular television show by the same name are based on Permian High School.

Allison played safety during his playing career at PHS. He led the squad in interceptions his senior year. As a sophomore, Permian advanced to the State Championship game before losing to Converse Judson High School.

A 2003 graduate of Angelo State with a degree in Kinesiology, Allison was a member of the school's football team, playing for Head Coach Jerry Vandergriff. Two knee surgeries, however, ended his career prematurely.

Allison is married to the former April Green of Odessa. The couple has a three-year-old daughter, Avery.





Kurt Corbin
LINEBACKERS COACH
ARKANSAS TECH, 2000
FIRST YEAR

Kurt Corbin begins his first year as linebackers coach on Rodney Allison's staff following two years at Northwestern State University as the line-

backers coach and defensive coordinator for the Demons.

Corbin's coaching career began in 2001 at Northwestern State, and he held two different stints at the Natchitoches, La., school.

During his first two years, he served as the Demons' defensive line coach while completing his masters' degree in Sports Administration. From 2001 to 2002, Corbin helped develop two NCAA Division I-AA All-America players in defensive ends Ahmad Willis (2001) and Roy Locks (2002). He also helped guide the Demons to back-to-back NCAA playoff appearances and a victory over Texas Christian University in 2001.

In 2002, the defense tied the school's single-season sack record with 43, led the Southland Conference and ranked 15th nationally in total defense (277 yards per game) and 11th nationally in total rushing yards allowed (99 ypg).

Corbin, who was hired at Chattanooga in February, 2008, moved on to Arkansas-Monticello for the 2003 and 2004 seasons. He worked at Arkansas Tech in 2005, as the Wonder Boys advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs under Head Coach Steve Mullins.

The Danville, Ark., native returned to Northwestern State for the 2006 and 2007 seasons, serving under Head Coach Scott Stoker. He coached the defensive line while adding the title of defensive coordinator last season.

The 2007 Demons' defense ranked first in the Southland Conference in total defense in conference games (355.0 yards per game), passing defense (175.1 yards per game) and opponent third-down conversions (29.6 percent).

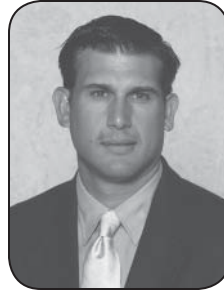
Defensive tackle Tory Collins earned All-America status in 2007 under Corbin's tutelage and ended up signing a free agent contract with the Chicago Bears of the National Football League. The Demons compiled 4-7 records in both 2006 and 2007.

An all-conference performer for the Danville High School Little Johns, Corbin went on to earn four letters as a defensive end for Arkansas Tech from 1997 to 2000. In 1999, he helped lead Tech to the Gulf South Conference championship and a berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs.



The 31-year old Corbin earned his undergraduate degree from Arkansas Tech in 2000 in Russellville, Ark., before completing his master's degree in 2002 at Northwestern State. He is married to the former Ashley Lynn of Clarksville, Ark. The couple has two daughters, Kennedy Jane (2) and Emerson Elizabeth, born August, 16, 2007.

Corbin's uncle, Art Kaufman, is the defensive line coach at Southern Mississippi. Kaufman has held defensive coordinator titles at Ole Miss, Louisiana Tech and Northwestern State.



Carmen Felus

Carmen Felus returns for his third season as the Mocs' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Felus was hired in January, 2006, after spending six seasons as an assistant coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

He was promoted in January, 2008, to assistant head coach by Head Coach Rodney Allison.

Under Felus in 2007, senior quarterback Antonio Miller ranked third among Southern Conference signal callers in passing yards and fourth in total offense. The Chattanooga offense also produced a potent running game which featured sophomore Erroll Wynn and junior Bryan Fitzgerald who combined for nearly 1,600 yards on the ground.

In 2006, under Felus' guidance, senior running back Eldra Buckley earned his second straight 1,200-yard rushing season and was named First-Team All-Southern Conference. The Mocs also produced a balanced offensive attack of 177 rushing yards per game and 162 passing yards per outing.

Buckley went on to sign a free-agent contract with the San Diego Chargers of the National Football League and will be a second-year player with the Chargers in 2008.

Felus coached quarterbacks, receivers and served as the offensive coordinator at Indiana University of Pennsylvania during his tenure. He led the Indians program to some of its most successful offensive seasons in recent history.

IUP scored 30 or more points 27 times during Felus' six-year stay. The Indians won or shared five PSAC West Division titles and advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs in 2000, 2001, 2002 and 2003. The 2002 team generated 33.2 points per game to lead the conference and rank 18th in the nation in that category.

Felus led the development of IUP quarterback Brian Eyeran. The signal caller surpassed nearly all the school's career passing records. In 2002, Eyeran was the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference West Player of the Year and a Harlon Hill Award regional finalist.

His receivers also found success. LeRon McCoy, a seventh-round Draft Pick by the NFL's Arizona Cardinals in 2005 after becoming one of the top pass catchers in NCAA Division II his senior year, is in his fourth year with the Houston Texans. Carmelo Ocasio earned All-America honors and ranks second on IUP's career receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns lists.

Prior to his stint at IUP, Felus spent two seasons coaching at Shepherd University, where he worked as the offensive coordinator and was responsible for quarterbacks, receivers and tight ends. Shepherd advanced to the NCAA



Division II playoffs in 1998 and 1999. All-America running back Damian Beane, a Harlon Hill Award national finalist, was a member of that squad.

Felus' coaching career began in 1995, coaching at Saint Francis University for two years and at Adams State College for one.

A 1995 graduate of Western Maryland College in Westminster, Md., with a degree in English Literature, Felus still ranks as one of the school's top receivers. He stands seventh on the career list with 89 receptions for 755 yards. Felus spent the first two years of his collegiate career at Lock Haven before transferring to WMC which is now referred to as McDaniel College.

He is married to the former Jennifer Podlucky of Johnstown, Pa.

Teddy Gaines was hired in March, 2008, by Head Coach Rodney Allison to coach outside linebackers. Gaines joins the Mocs' staff from the high school ranks, coming to Chattanooga from his high school alma mater, Dobyns-Bennett High School in Kingsport, Tenn.

The Kingsport native was a four-year letterwinner as a defensive back at the University of Tennessee from 1998 to 2001. He played in 49 games, starting 19 for the Vols and Head Coach Phillip Fulmer.

Gaines totaled 81 tackles during his career, including 67 solo stops, 18 pass breakups and one interception. He was a freshman on Tennessee's 1998 squad which went 13-0 and defeated Florida State, 23-16, in the first ever BCS National Championship game to claim the Vols' first national title since 1967 and sixth overall.

Gaines competed in four Bowl Games during his playing career – the 1999 and 2000 Fiesta Bowls, the 2001 Cotton Bowl and the 2002 Citrus Bowl – and was a member of the 1998 Southeastern Conference Championship team.

A seventh-round Draft pick by the San Francisco 49ers in the 2002 National Football League Draft, he spent the 2003 season with the Rhein Fire in NFL Europe and was on the 2003 Chicago Bears' roster.

Gaines also competed on the Vols' track team as a sprinter. As a high school player at Dobyns-Bennett, Gaines was a

three-year starter at defensive back where he earned All-State honors. He led the school to the state playoffs his senior year, playing both defensive back and wide receiver. He caught 42 passes with school records of 888 yards and 12 touchdowns. He also starred as a sprinter on the track team.



J. C. Harmon
OFFENSIVE LINE COACH
FERRUM COLLEGE, 1999
FIRST YEAR

J.C. Harmon was hired by Head Coach Rodney Allison in March, 2008, to coach the offensive line for the Chattanooga football program.

Harmon comes to Chattanooga from South Carolina State after two years as the tight ends/tackles and fullbacks coach for Head Coach Buddy Pough.

The Bulldogs compiled a 7-4 overall record in 2007, including a win over 25th-ranked Hampton. They ranked first in their conference in total offense and rushing yardage and ranked ninth in the nation in rushing yards. The offense scored over 50 points in two of its last three games. South Carolina State also went 7-4 in 2006 and won six of its last seven games.

The bulk of Harmon's coaching experience came from two stints at Fork Union Military Academy in Fork Union, Va. He worked under Coach John Shuman for the post-graduate-level squad. He served as the prep school's defensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator from 1999 to 2001 and returned in 2003 for another three-year term as offensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator.

While at the military prep school, Harmon helped lead in the development of over 100 student-athletes who went on to play football at the major-college level, including 15 who played in the professional ranks.

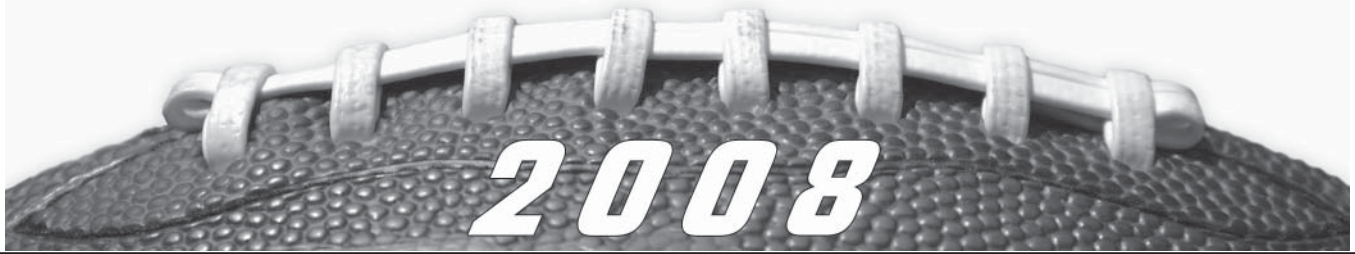
Harmon worked as an offensive assistant for Head Coach Bobby Williams at Michigan State during the 2001 and 2002 seasons. MSU went 7-5 in 2001 with wins over Notre Dame, Wisconsin and Michigan and defeated Fresno State 44-35 in the Silicon Valley Bowl. He was part of a staff which helped produce two first-round draft picks in the National Football League, running back T.J. Duckett (2001) and receiver Charles Rogers (2003).

Harmon also worked briefly in the professional ranks as the defensive secondary coordinator for the Richmond Speed of the Arena League 2.

Harmon is a 1999 graduate of Ferrum College in Ferrum, Va. While at Ferrum, he was voted the Atlantic Central Football Conference Defensive Player of the Year as a senior in 1998, playing for longtime Ferrum Head Coach Dave Davis. He earned All-ACFC honors that season while also picking up Academic All-ACFC and Academic All-District accolades. A two-time team captain, he set a Panthers' record for solo tackles in a game with 17 against Frostburg State in 1996.

Harmon is married to the former Tara Denzler of Richmond, Va. The couple has a daughter, Mazie Grace, born Oct. 2, 2007.





Dick Hopkins
**DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/
 SAFETIES COACH**
FLORIDA STATE, 1974
FIRST YEAR

With more than 30 years in collegiate football coaching, Dick Hopkins brings a wealth of experience to the defensive coordinator position. Hopkins is in his first season at Chattanooga and will also coach the safeties in addition to coordinating the defensive efforts.

His coaching stops range from the Southeastern Conference, the Atlantic Coast Conference and the Southwest Conference to the Big East, Ivy League, Atlantic 10 and Southern Conference among others.

Hopkins comes to the Mocs program from Rhode Island where he spent two seasons as defensive coordinator for former Georgia Southern Head Coach Tim Stowers. His 2006 pass defense ranked second in the Atlantic 10, giving up just 159.4 yards per game through the air.

Prior to his two seasons on the Rams' staff, Hopkins worked as the defensive coordinator at The Citadel for two seasons, working under Head Coach John Zernhelt in 2004 and current Head Coach Kevin Higgins in 2005.

Hopkins led the defense at James Madison, from 1999 to 2003. He helped direct the Dukes to an A-10 title and NCAA Division I-AA Playoff berth in 1999. Four of his defensive backs earned all-conference honors during his tenure.

He sandwiched a season as defensive coordinator at Yale (1993) with stops as an assistant coach at Temple (1989-92) and Tulane (1994-98). While at Tulane, he coached on Tommy Bowden's staff which produced the undefeated 11-0 season in 1998.

Hopkins began his coaching career as a graduate assistant for Head Coach Bobby Bowden at Florida State from 1978 to 1980. The Seminoles played in back-to-back Orange Bowls in 1979 and 1980 and recorded a combined 29-6 record during Hopkins' three years on the staff.

His job at FSU was his door to the profession as he landed the defensive coordinator position at Duke in 1981 in his first full-time post.

Former Chattanooga Athletics Director Steve Sloan took over the Duke program as its head coach in 1983 and brought a young Rodney Allison with him in 1984 to coach running backs.

Following two years at Duke, he spent the 1983 season at Cincinnati, two seasons at Rice and coached three years at Vanderbilt from 1986 to 1988 as the defensive coordinator for Head Coach Watson Brown.

A Toledo, Ohio, native, Hopkins earned his bachelor's degree in Physical Education in 1974 and his master's degree in Mass Communication in 1975. Both degrees were awarded at Florida State.

As an undergraduate at Florida State, Hopkins played tight end and quarterback from 1970 to 1973. While the NCAA did not allow freshman to play during this era, Hopkins played for Head Coach Larry Jones. During his sophomore season, Hopkins and the Seminoles participated in the very first Fiesta Bowl game, losing to eighth-ranked Arizona State, 45-38 in 1971.



Upon graduation, he settled in West Palm Beach, Fla., and coached at both Forest Hill and Twin Lakes High Schools.

Born Oct. 9, 1951, Hopkins is married to the former Debbie Liming of Mt. Orab, Ohio. The couple has four children, Erica, Amy, Geoffrey and Kelley and one grandson, Gunnar.

THIRD YEAR

Jason McManus joined Head Coach Rodney Allison's staff in 2006, accepting the duties of wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator.

McManus' leadership has turned the Chattanooga receiving corps into one of the strongest position groups in the program. He has also made his mark in recruiting as the 2008 signing class ranked among the top 15 in the Football Championship Subdivision, according to Rivals.com.

Last season, under McManus' guidance, the sophomore receiving tandem of Blue Cooper and Clint Woods ranked among the top 10 in the Southern Conference in receptions per game and receiving yards per game.

In 2006, the starting receiver duo of Emanuel Hassell and Michael Johnson combined to catch 101 passes for 1,099 yards. Hassell became the school's all-time leading pass catcher, and Johnson tied for the league lead with eight touchdown catches. Hassell has gone on to play professionally in the Canadian Football League.

UTC demonstrated improvements in the passing game from 2005 to 2006. The Mocs improved their passing yards per game average from 147.5 yards to 162.5 and their number of receiving touchdowns from six to 12.

McManus is no stranger to coaching in the State of Tennessee as he has had coaching stints at Middle Tennessee, Sewanee and Tusculum.

McManus spent the 2004 and 2005 seasons at Tusculum College in Greenville, Tenn., as the defensive backs coach and special teams coordinator for Head Coach Frankie Debusk.

While with the Pioneers, McManus coached All-America defensive backs Ra' Shun Judge and Octavius Love. Judge earned All-America honors in 2004, while Love was a 2005 All-America selection. In 2005, Love led all NCAA Division II players in punt return average and set numerous school records as a kick and punt returner. Also under McManus' guidance, Tusculum punter Cory Newton earned All-America accolades, setting school records for career punting average and longest punt (78 yards).

Prior to his arrival at Tusculum, McManus worked for one year at Sewanee. He served as the Tigers' defensive coordinator in 2003 and put together the highest-rated pass defense in the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference, giving up only 149 yards per game. He helped Sewanee go from eighth to first in pass defense and from eighth to second best in total defense. In 2003, the Tigers ranked second among league teams and 53rd in NCAA Division III in total defense (302.6 yards).



The Newton, N.C., native earned his master's degree in Physical Education from Middle Tennessee in 2001. While in Murfreesboro, McManus worked as a graduate assistant coach for the Blue Raiders, assisting with the wide receivers, secondary and special teams. During his tenure at Middle Tennessee, McManus developed the reputation as an outstanding young coach and recruiter and was responsible for signing several of MTSU's top recruits during his time with the Blue Raiders.

He was also a member of the 2001 MTSU coaching staff which claimed the inaugural Sun Belt Conference Championship.

McManus graduated from Gardner-Webb in 2000 with a degree in Physical Education. He was a two-year football letterwinner for the Bulldogs then worked as a student assistant coach in the spring of 2000.

Spencer Riley **TIGHT ENDS COACH** **TENNESSEE, 2000** **FIRST YEAR**

Spencer Riley joins Rodney Allison's staff as tight ends coach following three years at West Georgia. While at the Carrollton, Ga., school, he served for three years as the offensive line coach and added the title of offensive coordinator in 2007.

A four-year letterman for the Tennessee Volunteers from 1996 to 1999, Riley has quickly channeled the lessons he learned from his time in Knoxville toward a bright future in coaching.

His coaching career began at Karns High School in 2001 in Knoxville where he worked as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach from 2001 to 2003 before taking over as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach in 2004. He also coordinated the special teams.

In 2005, the New Market, Tenn., native was hired to coach the offensive line at West Georgia, becoming only the fifth coach at that position in the program's 47-year history. After two years in that role at the Gulf South Conference program, Riley was promoted to offensive coordinator while retaining his offensive line responsibilities for Head Coach Mike Ledford.

He installed the Spread offense for the Wolves in 2007 and was the run-game coordinator in 2006. He also served as the team's pro liaison.

While at Tennessee, Riley was a versatile four-year member of the Volunteers' offensive line. He lined up at guard in 1996 and 1997 before switching to center for his final two seasons.

During his career, he started 44 consecutive games and helped lead Tennessee to the 1998 National Championship. He was a key lineman on the 1998 squad which went 13-0 and defeated Florida State, 23-16, in the first ever BCS National Championship game to claim the Vols' first national title since 1967 and sixth overall.

He was also an integral part of back-to-back Southeastern Conference titles, in 1997 and 1998, and played in four Bowl Games – the 1997 Citrus Bowl, the 1998 Orange Bowl and the 1998 and 1999 Fiesta Bowls. He was a team captain of the 1999 squad which went 9-3 and his teams forged a combined record of 43-7.

Following his senior year, he was selected to play in the 1999 Senior Bowl and signed a free agent contract with the Buffalo Bills of the National Football League. He earned his degree from Tennessee in 2000 in Human Resource Development.

After a stellar high school career at Jefferson County High School, Riley was chosen as a Parade Magazine and Max Emfinger All-America. He was a member of the *BlueChip Illustrated* Dream Team, a Scholastic Coach All-America and was named Northeast Tennessee Player of the Year and an All-State selection.

Born on Feb. 17, 1976, Riley is married to the former Beth Dulin of Knoxville, Tenn. The couple has one daughter, Catelyn (5).



Fred Tate **DEFENSIVE LINE COACH** **SOUTHERN MISSISSIPPI,** **1997** **FIRST YEAR**

Fred Tate joined Rodney Allison's staff in January, 2008, and will coach the defensive line.

Tate's coaching experiences have focused on the defensive side of the ball. Prior to joining the Chattanooga program, he worked two years at Southern Mississippi, coaching defensive tackles and outside linebackers for Head Coach Jeff Bower.

One of his Golden Eagle defenders, Tom Johnson, earned All-Conference USA honors in 2005. USM finished 7-5 in 2005 and 9-5 in 2006. The 2005 squad was New Orleans Bowl Champions with a 31-19 victory over Arkansas State. The 2006 Eagles claimed the Conference USA East Division title, played Houston in the CUSA Championship Game and defeated Ohio University 28-7 in the GMAC Bowl.

Tate's coaching career began in 1997 at East Central Community College in Mississippi where he coached tight ends and receivers. He moved to Jacksonville State in 1998 and served as the defensive line and special teams coach for two years. While with the Gamecocks, he mentored Mark Word who played in the National Football League for the Kansas City Chiefs and the Cleveland Browns.

The 2000 season saw him return to the junior college level for one season, coaching the defensive line, punting and kicking teams at East Mississippi Community College.

His defensive line expertise led him to coach the front line at Southwest Texas State in 2001 and at Middle Tennessee in 2002. At Southwest Texas, he guided Clenton Ballard to All-America status. Ballard went on to play in the NFL for the Jacksonville Jaguars and the San Diego Chargers.

Tate joined former Southern Mississippi defensive coordinator John Thompson at East Carolina in 2003. He coached the Pirates' outside linebackers for two years and assisted with special teams.

A native of Hattiesburg, Miss., Tate enlisted in the United States Army upon high school graduation. He served five years in the Airborne Division, participated in Operation Desert Shield and was the recipient of the Army Commendation Medal and Soldier of the Quarter three times.

Following his Army career, Tate attended East Central Community College in Decatur, Miss. While on the football team, he was a JC Gridwire All-America selection as a sophomore and was voted the Most Valuable Offensive Player of the National Junior College All-Star Game.

His playing career continued at Southern Mississippi, playing defensive end and tackle in 1995 and 1996 for Coach Bower. The Golden Eagles were charter members of Conference USA in 1996 and won the league's first football championship that season with a 4-1 mark. The 8-3 overall record included a victory over Georgia and a seven-game winning streak.

Tate was born Oct. 31, 1968, and earned his bachelor's degree from USM in 1997. He is married to the former Andrea Beckles of Huntsville, Ala. The couple has a three-year-old son, Christian, and a daughter, Caitlyn, born April 23, 2007. Also included in the family are Darrion and Donovan Tate.

Brown's wife and partner is Dr. Carolyn Thompson. They have two children.

He has pledged the campus' commitment to teacher preparation, healthcare professions, business and commerce, and cultural appreciation.

Brown came to Chattanooga from the University of North Carolina at Pembroke, where he served as Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs since 2000. During his tenure at Pembroke, the campus experienced a 60 percent growth in student enrollment and added degree programs at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Previously, he had served since 1991 in various academic and administrative capacities with The University of North Carolina at Charlotte.

A political scientist with particular academic emphasis in American government, Brown earned bachelor's and master's degrees in Political Science from the University of Tennessee and the Ph.D. in Political Science from The Johns Hopkins University.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS RICK HART



Rick Hart has changed the landscape of the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga Athletics Department.

Now entering his third year as the Director of Athletics, Hart has made an immediate impact on UTC's athletics program with his leadership abilities, organizational skills and broad ideas on how it can fulfill its mission to prepare students for productive and meaningful lives.

In keeping with his commitment to positioning the UTC student-athlete as the focal point at all times, and in response to numerous challenges facing intercollegiate athletics, a more formal structure has been adopted for the Athletics Department; specifically, the Strategic Plan for UTC Athletics.

The Strategic Planning process is vital to the health and well-being of each and every student-athlete, the Department of Athletics and to our collaborative and complementary role in supporting the educational mission of the University. This includes establishing the collective vision for comprehensive excellence for UTC Athletics.

Hart's commitment to comprehensive excellence places an emphasis on the academic side of the equation. He has added staff members to the Compliance and academic Services departments, and the student-athletes have responded in each of the past two years as over 200 of them made the Athletics Department's Honor Rolls in 2006-07 and 2007-08.

The Athletics Department made drastic strides in its NCAA Academic Progress Rate for the 2006-07 academic year. The sports of wrestling and football produced single-year APR score improvements of 145 and 112 points respectively, both meeting NCAA benchmarks.

Under his guidance, the Mocs have claimed 10 Southern Conference Championships – two each in women's cross country, women's basketball, wrestling, men's golf and softball – and a North Division title in men's basketball in 2007-08. Teams and individuals representing UTC have frequently participated in NCAA post-season competition, with eight of UTC's 17 varsity sports programs represented in 2007-08.

Nine student-athletes have been selected as SoCon Athletes of the Year for their respective sports. The program has produced the overall Southern Conference Female Athlete of the

Year among all SoCon student-athletes in each of the past two years, and two wrestlers have earned All-America honors in both 2007 and 2008.

The women's programs captured the Germann Cup for the 2007-08 year, signifying the best all-around women's sports program in the Southern Conference. This accomplishment, a first for Chattanooga Athletics, further demonstrates UTC's commitment to support a comprehensive, broad-based championship athletics program.

UTC's Athletics ticket revenues increased by 34 percent in 2007-08, and sponsorship revenues increased by more than \$50,000. Game-day atmosphere at all sporting venues has improved through more robust promotional efforts, a best practices approach, and a service mindset. A new facility, the Brenda Lawson Student-Athlete Success Center, is under construction and consists of the Wolford Family Strength and Conditioning and Chattem Basketball Practice Facilities.

Balancing a budget at the mid-major level is widely known as a difficult task. Hart made it a priority for the department. With diligent leadership and a commitment from each and every member of the department, UTC Athletics achieved fiscal responsibility and ended each fiscal year with a balanced budget.



Extremely visible in the community, Hart is a member of the Chattanooga Rotary, served as Grand Marshal of the 2007 Region 4 Special Olympics, and is a sought-after speaker among the area's many civic organizations.

Campus integration has been a focal point, as the athletics department has dedicated time and energy to engaging other university departments and strengthening relationships with faculty, staff and students.

An emphasis on community outreach and participation and strategic partnerships has led to enhanced marketing, communications and overall customer service.

Hired on May 23, 2006, Hart arrived on the UTC campus after serving seven years at the University of Oklahoma in various athletics administrative capacities.

Hart's career with the Sooners began in 1999 as the Director of Marketing and Licensing. He became Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing and Licensing in 2001, and developed and implemented marketing campaigns which generated annual ticket revenues in excess of \$19.5 million.

Hart was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Program Advancement and Branding in 2003 and Senior Associate Athletics Director in 2006.

His preliminary goals for the UTC Athletics Department are all attainable under the vision he has brought to the role, including a stronger focus on the student-athlete; operating with honesty, integrity and the appropriate priorities; and engaging the community and aggressively seeking opportunities to expand and enhance the resources provided to the student-athletes, the coaches and staff.

"We want to be a leader in the Southern Conference, and we will do that through our commitment to developing the total student-athlete," Hart says. "We are going to place the needs of the institution and the athletics department ahead of the needs and interests of individuals. And we are going to provide the necessary resources to support a comprehensive, broad-based championship athletics program."

Hart has also worked in athletics for the University of North Carolina and East Carolina University and has served with the U.S. Olympic Committee. A 1994 graduate of UNC, Hart earned a bachelor's degree in Physical Education, Health and Sport Science.

Hart and his wife, Allison, also a graduate of North Carolina, have a son, Trevor, 9, and a daughter, Caroline, 6.

A third-generation athletics administrator, Hart's father, Dave, most recently served as Athletics Director at Florida State University, and his grandfather, Dave Sr., served in a variety of roles within collegiate athletics including a stint as the Commissioner of the Southern Conference from 1987-91.

Reece coordinates the department's learning enhancement program which includes comprehensive tutoring, progress monitoring, structured study environments, and study skills and learning styles assessments.

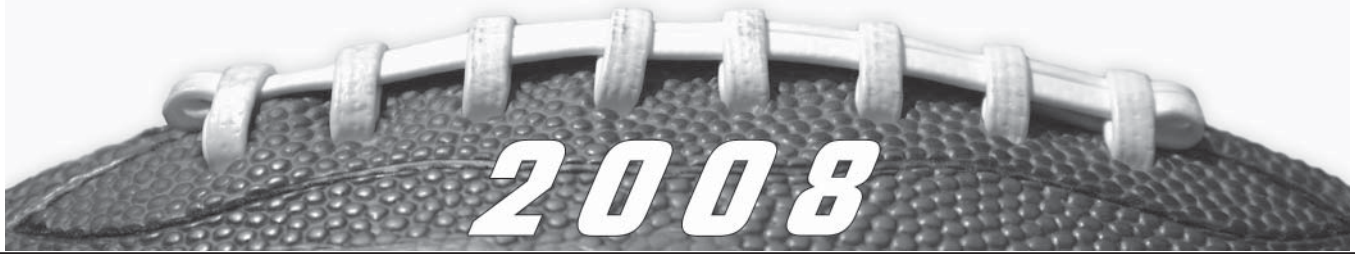

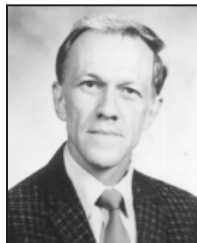
