Frank Reed begins his eighth season at the helm of the Lady Mocs in 2009 as his team looks to win back-to-back Southern Conference titles for the first time since the squad won four straight from 2000-2003. In his seven seasons in Chattanooga, Reed has amassed a 286-179 record.

During the 2008 season, the Lady Mocs finished with a 41-22 record, 13-5 Southern Conference mark, the program's tenth regular season SoCon championship, ninth SoCon Tournament championship, and the seventh highest winning percentage in the history of the program. UTC also advanced to its fifth appearance in the NCAA Regional Tournament. The 2008 team played one of the most difficult schedules in the country and saw several players place themselves in the program's record books. Reed was also honored with his second Southern Conference Coach of the Year award, joining Karen Weekly as the only other UTC softball coach to claim the honor twice.

UTC posted a stellar 16-5 mark in conference play in 2007 to claim its first regular season crown since 2004 and completed the regular season with a mark of 35-29. The season would come to end during the Southern Conference however with losses to

UNC Greensboro and eventual runner-up Georgia Southern.

Following an extremely successful 10-year stint on the junior college circuit at nearby Chattanooga State Technical Community College, Reed was introduced as Chattanooga's third coach in the program's history on August

1, 2001. He picked up where former coaches Ralph and Karen Weekly had left off and almost immediately pushed Chattanooga softball to a level it had never before seen, guiding the team to its third straight NCAA Tournament appearance. Along the way, the Lady Mocs opened the season with back-to-back no-hitters and knocked off top-25 teams in Ohio State and Baylor, all while never dropping more than two games in a row. The Lady Mocs garnered national recognition that season as they posted two upset wins over top-seeded and No. 12 ranked Florida Atlantic in the NCAA Regionals. UTC then just missed capturing a berth in the Softball College World Series as narrow losses to Georgia Tech and Florida State closed out the season at 44-15.



The Coaches

Following a fourth straight NCAA Tournament appearance in 2003, Reed and the Lady Mocs extended that program-record streak to five trips to the NCAA Championships in 2004. Chattanooga posted a 16-4 mark in league play to capture their eighth Southern Conference regular season title and laid claim to the eighth Southern Conference Tournament Championship in team history with four straight victories at Jim Frost Stadium. The title was Chattanooga's fifth straight and was the sixth time that the team had surpassed 40 victories, finishing with a mark of 45-25.

Having compiled an incredible record of 476 wins and 87 losses in 10 years at Chattanooga State, Reed's final season at CSTCC was perhaps the most spectacular. In 2001 the Lady Tigers were among the highest in the nation, posting a 62-3 record, attaining a ranking of No. 2 in the nation and finishing fourth in the 2001 national tournament. That performance marked the seventh consecutive tournament appearance in Chattanooga State history, all of which came under Reed's tenure. As a result of that season, Reed was named National Fastpitch Coaches Association National Junior College Coach of the Year in 2001. The Lady Tigers also placed fourth in the 1995 championships and finished fifth in 1999 and 2000. The team's .954 winning percentage remains in the record books as the highest in NJCAA Division I history.

Those lofty accomplishments came after Reed first established the women's softball program at CSTCC in 1990. In addition to serving as the only head coach in program history, he was also responsible for all aspects of the program, from maintaining budgets and handling purchasing to recruiting and field maintenance. Reed also directed the design and completion of a new women's softball complex on the CSTCC campus. Under Reed's guidance, the Lady Tigers won eight conference and state championships

as well as seven regional championships. They were ranked nationally in the top-10 for eight years with a high water mark of No. 2 in the nation in 1995 and 2001. This success led to Reed being selected as Conference Coach of the Year seven times in his last eight years at CSTCC.

In his final season, Reed set the National Junior College Record for winning percentage in a single season with a mark of .954 in 2001 and was twice nominated for NFCA National Coach of the Year during his tenure. Reed also organized the Eagles Softball Association, which featured youth travel teams in all age groups,



and guided the Parker Eagles summer league team to a tremendous nine-year record of 458 wins and 77 losses. During this time, the Eagles were regularly ranked among the top-10 Amateur Softball Association teams nationally and were American Softball Association national champions in 1990 and National Softball Association champions seven times. In 1998, Reed was inducted into the National Softball Association Hall of Fame.

"Frank is committed to the high ideals of UTC athletics," former Chattanooga Director of Athletics Oval Jaynes said when Reed was officially

announced in 2001. "We had several outstanding candidates from across the nation that expressed strong interest in our position. We are pleased to have someone who spent their entire life in Chattanooga and who has been involved prominently with women's softball at all levels."

In addition to his work with teams in Chattanooga, Reed has also served as the hitting instructor of the Dominican Republic's national team for four years. He became the head coach for the team in 2006 and his team spent time in United States playing several professional softball teams in preparation of the 2006 Central American and Caribbean Sports Games in Colombia. While in the Dominican Republic, Reed also ran camps in Santo Domingo for children in the area.

A life-long resident of Chattanooga and graduate of Central High School, Reed has spent more than 30 years as a City of Chattanooga employee. He most recently served as Senior Acquisition Agent for the city and was also supervisor of the Acquisition Division for major sewer, road and rights-of-way for major public works projects. Additionally, Reed has directed the review of land appraisals and coordinated settlement disputes with attorneys and property owners and managed the disposal of surplus land for city agencies.

Reed attended Chattanooga State and earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Appraisal Technology from Western States University. He also holds a Masters degree in Business Administration from Western States.

Reed and his wife, Denise, reside in Chattanooga and have two daughters, Amy Highfield and Dana, who is the head softball coach of Gordon Lee High School.

Brad Irwin

Brad Irwin is in the third year of his second stint with the UTC softball team.

Irwin rejoined the Lady Mocs coaching staff after previously coaching under Ralph and Karen Weekly from 1996-1999. He served as team manager for two years before assuming additional administrative and on-field responsibilities for two years, beginning with the 1998 season.

Following his time at UTC, Irwin coached for three seasons at Lee University, working primarily with hitters and infielders. He helped lead the Lady Flames to two national tournament appearances in 2004 and 2006. He also helped lead them to a 55-14 record in the 2006 season to finish seventh nationally in the NAIA National Poll.

In 2004, Irwin and the rest of the Lee softball

staff were named as the National Fastpitch Coaches Association Coaching Staff of the Year after finishing 33-27 and winning the Region XI Tournament Championship.

Additionally, Irwin has also coached in high school, working with the Hixson High School softball team in 2000.

Irwin graduated in 1999 from UTC with a degree in Sports Administration and also received his master's in Secondary Education from the University in 2002. He and his wife Rachel live in Chattanooga have a son, Blake.

Shaina Ervin enters her first season as an assistant coach at Chattanooga.

A native of Huntersville, N.C., Ervin comes to UTC after a year as the pitching coach at UNC Greensboro. Before her coaching career began, Ervin enjoyed a stellar career at North Carolina State. Ervin was the first-ever recruit to verbally commit to NC State and helped build the program into an ACC power by leading them to the 2006 ACC Championship in only the program's third year of existence.

Ervin, the 2006 ACC Tournament MVP, led her team to its first-ever ACC title and an appearance in the NCAA Tournament. During her career, Ervin carried a 1.81 ERA in over 700 innings and she stands second in program history for wins (55), appearances (124), starts (105), complete games (72), shutouts (19) and strikeouts (704).

Ervin earned first team All-ACC honors in 2006 and was named to the NFCA All-Region second-team in 2005. As a junior, she went undefeated in conference action. In addition, during her freshman season, she tossed back-to-back no-hitters in appearances against Binghamton and Campbell.

She was also a standout in the classroom and was named to the ACC Honor Roll and NC State Dean's List four times throughout her career. Ervin was also a 2004 NFCA Scholar-Athlete Award Recipient and she received an ACC Post-graduate Scholarship.

Since graduating from NC State, Ervin has entered the professional ranks and spent a summer competing with the Michigan Ice, a professional fastpitch team in Midland, MI.

Ervin is currently working on her Master's in Psychology at UTC.

Jeff Martin returns for his fourth season as a Volunteer Assistant Coach for the Lady Mocs.

Prior to returning to the program in 2006, Martin served as an assistant to head coach Beth Keylon-Randolph at Chattanooga State Technical Community College from 2002-05 and was an assistant coach at Chattanooga under former co-head coaches Ralph and Karen Weekly. During the five seasons Martin spent working with the Lady Mocs from 1996 to 2000, Chattanooga captured four Southern Conference tournament titles and four Southern Conference regular season championships and made two NCAA appearances in his final two seasons with the team.

As an assistant at Chattanooga State, Martin helped the Lady Tigers to four consecutive Region Seven titles and four NJCAA National Championship Tournament appearances. He has also served as the hitting instructor for the prestigious Keylon Fastpitch Academy and has worked camps and clinics all across the coun-

try. He is well respected for his knowledge and teaching concerning the catching position.

In addition to serving as an assistant coach at the college level, Martin is also the head coach of the Tennessee Raiders Fastpitch softball program, a summer league 18-and-under team. The Raiders are a highly competitive travel team consisting of players from the region that have had a tremendous impact in just two short years as they have made back-to-back ASA National Championship appearances. Martin has worked with youth softball in the Chattanooga area for more than 10 years and has seen many of the players he has coached go on to play softball at the collegiate level.

His primary responsibilities with Chattanooga Softball are working with the catchers and assisting in general coaching duties.

Martin resides in East Ridge, Tenn., with his wife, Tonya, and daughter, Jenni, who is a freshman at UTC and a member of the softball team.

In her time on the field for the Lady Mocs, Tembey was named to the All-Southern Conference team twice, as both a junior and a senior. At the end of her career, Tembey is heavily featured in the UTC record books in numerous categories. She is in the top-5 in games played (4th, 260), at bats (2nd, 805), hits (3rd, 245), triples (2nd, 17) home runs (3rd, 23), RBI (3rd, 123) and total bases (3rd, 383).

In 2005, Tembey was also named the Southern Conference's Freshman of the Year after lead-

In 2004, the North Carolina Supreme Court appointed Brown to serve the Chief Justice's Advisory Committee on the Political Conduct of Judges. He was a member of Leadership Charlotte and the Public Safety Committee of the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce.

In Chattanooga, he continues membership in Rotary International and has also been named to the United Way of Greater Chattanooga Board of Directors. He is a commissioner of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and has been appointed to the Southeast Tennessee PreK-16 Education Council.

Athletics Administration



Rick Hart has changed the landscape of the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga Athletics Department.

Now entering his third year as the Director of Athletics, Hart has made an immediate impact on UTC's athletics program with his leadership abilities, organizational skills and broad ideas on how it can fulfill its mission to prepare students for productive and meaningful lives.

In keeping with his commitment to positioning the UTC student-athlete as the focal point at all times, and in response to numerous challenges facing intercollegiate athletics, a more formal structure has been adopted for the Athletics Department; specifically, the Strategic Plan for UTC Athletics.

The Strategic Planning process is vital to the health and well-being of each and every student-athlete, the Department of Athletics and to our collaborative and complementary role in supporting the educational mission of the University. This includes establishing the collective vision for comprehensive excellence for UTC Athletics.

Hart's commitment to comprehensive excellence places an emphasis on the academic side of the equation. He has added staff members to the Compliance and Academic Services departments. The student-athletes have responded in each of the past two years as over 200 of them made the Athletics Department's Honor Rolls in 2006-07 and 2007-08.

The Athletics Department made drastic strides in its NCAA Academic Progress Rate for the 2006-07 academic year. The sports of wrestling and football produced single-year APR score improvements of 145 and 112 points respectively, both meeting NCAA benchmarks.

Under his guidance, the Mocs have claimed 10 Southern Conference Championships – two each in women's cross country, women's basketball, wrestling, men's golf and softball – and a North Division title in men's basketball in 2007-08. Teams and individuals representing UTC have frequently participated in NCAA postseason competition, with eight of UTC's 17 varsity sports programs represented in 2007-08.

Nine student-athletes have been selected as SoCon Athletes of the Year for their respective sports. The program has produced the overall Southern Conference Female Athlete of

the Year among all SoCon student-athletes in each of the past two years, and two wrestlers have earned All-America honors in both 2007 and 2008.

The women's programs captured the Germann Cup for the 2007-08 year, signifying the best all-around women's sports program in the Southern Conference. This accomplishment, a first for Chattanooga Athletics, further demonstrates UTC's commitment to support a comprehensive, broad-based championship athletics program.

UTC's Athletics ticket revenues increased by 34 percent in 2007-08 and sponsorship revenues increased by more than \$50,000. Gameday atmosphere at all sporting venues has improved through more robust promotional efforts, a best practices approach and a service mindset. A new facility, the Brenda Lawson Student-Athlete Success Center, is under construction and consists of the Wolford Family Strength and Conditioning and Chattem Basketball Practice Facilities.

Balancing a budget at the mid-major level is widely known as a difficult task. Hart made it a priority and with diligent leadership and a commitment from every member of the department, UTC Athletics achieved fiscal responsibility and ended each fiscal year with a balanced budget.

Extremely visible in the community, Hart is a member of the Chattanooga Rotary, served as Grand Marshal of the 2007 Region 4 Special Olympics and is a sought-after speaker among the area's many civic organizations.

Campus integration has been a focal point, as the athletics department has dedicated time and energy to engaging other university departments and strengthening relationships with faculty, staff and students.

An emphasis on community outreach and participation and strategic partnerships has led to enhanced marketing, communications and overall customer service.

Hired on May 23, 2006, Hart arrived on the UTC campus after serving seven years at the University of Oklahoma in various athletics administrative capacities.

Hart's career with the Sooners began in 1999 as the Director of Marketing and Licensing. He became Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing and Licensing in 2001. He developed and implemented marketing campaigns which generated annual ticket revenues in excess of \$19.5 million. Hart was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Program Advancement and Branding in 2003 and Senior Associate Athletics Director in 2006.

His preliminary goals for the UTC Athletics Department are all attainable under the vision he has brought to the role, including a stronger focus on the student-athlete; operating with honesty, integrity and the appropriate priorities; and engaging the community and aggressively seeking opportunities to expand and enhance the resources provided to the student-athletes, the coaches and staff.

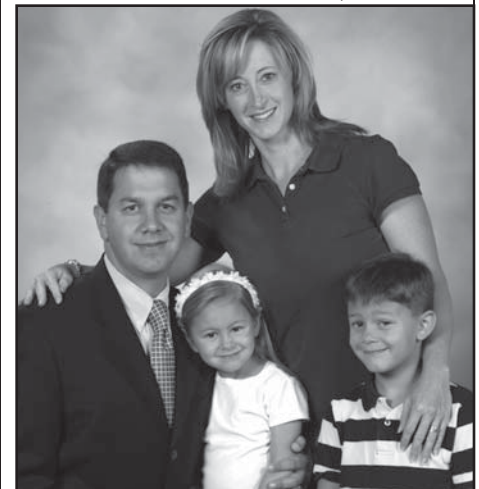
"We want to be a leader in the Southern Conference, and we will do that through our commitment to developing the total student-athlete," Hart says. "We are going to place the needs of the institution and the athletics department ahead of the needs and interests of individuals. And we are going to provide the necessary resources to support a comprehensive, broad-based championship athletics program."

Hart has also worked in athletics for the University of North Carolina and East Carolina University and has served with the U.S. Olympic Committee. A 1994 graduate of UNC, Hart earned a bachelor's degree in Physical Education, Health and Sport Science.

Hart and his wife, Allison, also a graduate of North Carolina, have a son, Trevor, 9, and a daughter, Caroline, 6.

A third-generation athletics administrator, Hart's father, Dave, is the Executive Assistant Athletics Director at the University of Alabama, and his grandfather, Dave Sr., served in a variety of roles within collegiate athletics including a stint as the Commissioner of the Southern Conference from 1987-91.
