C The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga's softball facility is named after Jim Frost, who had a dream to help provide a place to showcase the talents of thousands of young women who wanted to play softball.

C In 1998 that dream came true with Frost Stadium. Constructed at a cost of more than \$2 million, the new home of the Lady Mocs opened its doors on April 20, 1998. The stadium's first game was met with a standing room only crowd of 3,251 on hand as in-state rival, Tennessee barely escaped with a 3-1, eight-inning victory.

C In the time the complex has existed it has played host not only to some of the premiere NCAA Division I softball teams in the country. The facility has hosted the U.S. Olympic Team, American Softball Association Tournaments, the Southern Conference Tournament, the Southeastern Conference Tournament, TSSAA Spring Fling Softball and National Softball Association Tournaments.

C The Lady Mocs have won 74 percent of its games at Frost Stadium, accumulating 273 wins in the 11 years the team has played there.

C Frost Stadium's primary resident, the Chattanooga softball program boasts six NCAA Regional Tournament appearances and seven Southern Conference Tournament Championships since the stadium opened in 1998. The program has also tallied eight regular season conference titles during that time with the latest coming just last season.

C Built to NCAA fastpitch specifications, Frost Stadium seats approximately 3,000 fans with bleachers along both the 1st and 3rd base lines, outfield bleachers and 800 chairback seats behind home plate. The complex also includes video towers, climate controlled locker rooms connected to the dugouts, batting cages, bullpens and a permanent outfield fence. Among the facilities many other amenities are concession stands, restrooms, a glass-enclosed press box and two skyboxes.

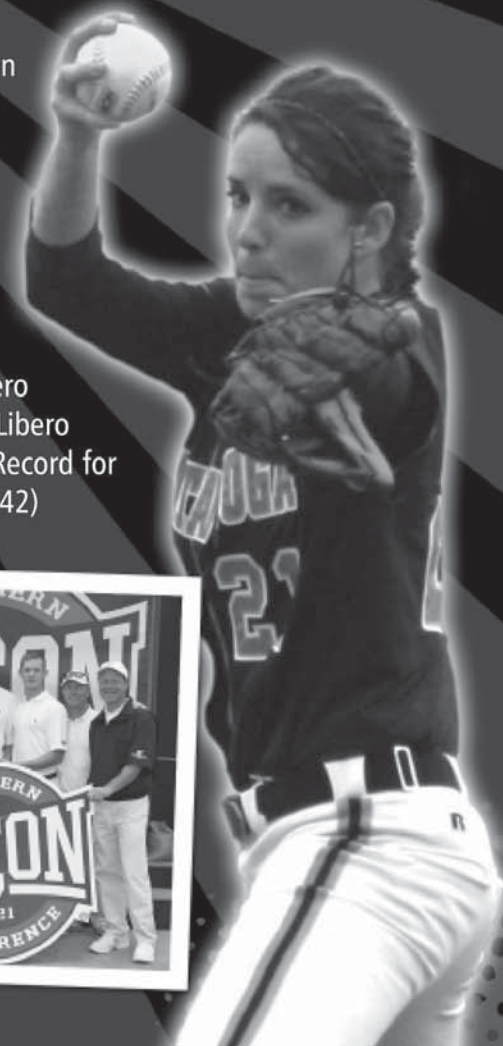
