## Alice Tym - 2008 ITA Hall of Fame

Alice Luthy Tym blazed a trail as founder of the women's tennis team while a student at the University of Florida in 1960, and continued her myriad contributions to the game as a champion player, collegiate coach and teaching professional. A standout junior player in her native Peoria, Illinois, Tym captained her college team all four years while earning Phi Beta Kappa academic honors. She went on to earn an M.A. from UF in

1966 as a Ford Foundation Fellow. From 1964 to 1970, she played on the international circuit, winning titles on five continents and securing a world ranking as high as No. 13 in 1969.

As head coach at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga from 1974 to 1978, Tym started the varsity women's program and guided her teams to two AIAW Small College National Championships.

Appointed director of tennis at Yale in 1978, she coached the nationally ranked women's team for four years and won the Ivy Championships in 1981. Tym returned to UTC to take up a distinguished teaching career in the Geography Department, maintaining her involvement in athletics as an active horsewoman and gold medalist in the National Senior Olympics.

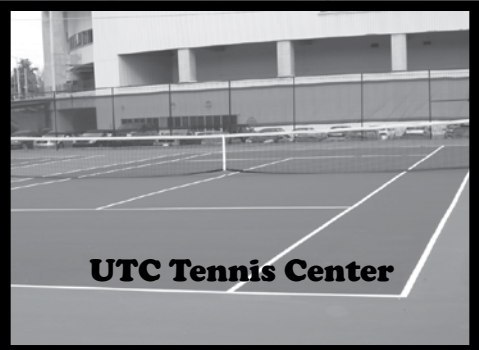

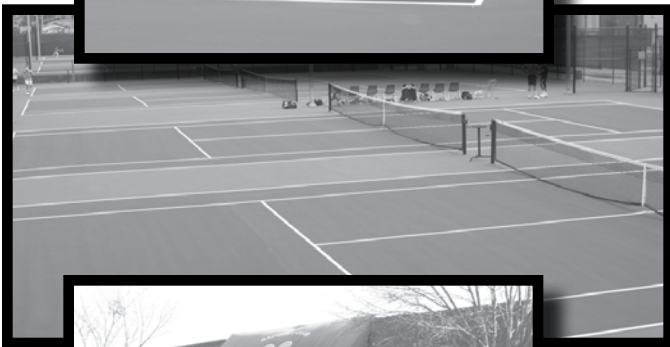

## FACILITIES

The Chattanooga men's and women's tennis teams are fortunate to have three places to call home. On campus, the Mocs use the UTC Tennis Complex that houses seven newly remodeled courts and the DeSales-Harrison Racquet Center with two indoor courts. In the early stages of the spring season when the weather is cold and unpredictable, Chattanooga moves its contests to the Hixson Racquet Court which features six courts and a viewing vantage point from the lobby. In the fall, the Mocs host the prestigious Steve Baras Fall Classic at the Champions Club Tennis Complex as well as several spring dual matches. The Club features 26 hard courts, a two-story, 6,000 sq. ft. clubhouse with lockers, restrooms with showers and a pro shop. The facility - inside and outside - is ADA accessible. The Mocs also have access to the Manker Patten Tennis Club located next to the UTC campus in cases of bad weather.

When the head women's coaching position became vacant in the fall of 2007, Chattanooga Athletics Director Rick Hart turned to a familiar face and proven winner: Jeff Clark. A native Chattanooga and a former UTC head coach, Clark returned to the university on December 17, 2007 to lead the women's tennis program. Hart said, "Jeff Clark has great experience as a teacher of tennis and a leader of young people. His teams have demonstrated what we are looking for athletically and academically, and he has always held sportsmanship on the court in high esteem."

Clark has enjoyed success throughout his collegiate coaching career. From 2002 to 2006 Clark served as the men's assistant coach at the University of Mississippi, one of the top programs in all of college tennis. Working with legendary coach Billy Chadwick, he helped coach the Rebels to four consecutive top-ten national team rankings, back-to-back SEC team titles, four SEC West titles, one Final Four appearance, and numerous All America singles and doubles honors. One of his Ole Miss players, Catalin Gard, achieved the number one singles ranking in college tennis during the 2004-05 season. In 2006 Clark was named ITA Southeast Region Assistant Coach of the Year and thus nominated for ITA National Assistant Coach of the Year.

Clark served as head coach for both the men's and women's tennis teams at UTC from 1998-2001, compiling a record of 85-56. During that time his men captured the 2000 Southern Conference tournament title, earning the university's only NCAA Division I tennis tournament bid. That same year he guided his women's squad to the SoCon Tournament finals. In the spring of 1999, his first season as head coach, Clark's Men reached the conference tournament final. Among his other accomplishments at UTC, he coached four singles players and four doubles teams to All-SoCon honors. One of those players, Jason Ontog, was a two-time All-SoCon selection and the 2001 conference Player of the Year. Clark's women's team maintained the highest grade point average among all

UTC athletics teams from 1999 to 2001, and the 2001 squad was honored as an ITA All-Academic Team.

He took over the head-coaching duties at UTC in the summer of 1998 after then-head coach Jim Thompson left for a head coaching job at Virginia Tech. Thompson hired Clark in 1997 to work as the assistant for both the men's and women's programs. Their coaching partnership proved to be an immediate success, as the UTC men won the Southern Conference tournament and the women reached the tournament final.

In addition to his college coaching, Clark has mentored and developed many junior tennis players. He has worked with the tennis programs at the McCallie School from 1995-1997 and, more recently, from 2006-2007, coaching alongside Eric Voges, one of the top junior coaches in the Southeast. In 2001 Clark created a unique tennis program at the Bethlehem Community Center, a school and sports facility for inner-city youth in Chattanooga.

Clark is a 1995 graduate of Vanderbilt University, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in English. While a member of the Commodore tennis team, Clark led Vanderbilt to its first-ever NCAA Regional as the team captain his senior year, playing number four singles and number one doubles. After college Clark competed professionally, participating in ITF satellites and money tournaments in Europe and competing for his club team in Germany, TC Philippsburg, where he played in 1997 and 1998.

During his first stint coaching at UTC from 1997 to 2001, he earned his master's degree in English Literature from the university. Clark is married to the former Laura Brown of Signal Mountain, Tenn. The couple has three children: Peter (7), Caroline (4), and Henry (2). They reside in North Chattanooga.

## HEAD MEN'S COACH CARLOS GARCIA

Carlos Garcia has served as the head coach for the UTC men's tennis team for the past three years and was hired on Aug. 21, 2001 to oversee the school's men's and women's programs. Since concentrating his efforts solely on the men's team, Garcia has led the Mocs to the championship match of the Southern Conference Tournament for two consecutive years, in 2005 and 2006. Last season, Garcia directed the men's team to an impressive 17-9 overall record and a 5-4 mark in the always-difficult Southern Conference. The Mocs entered the SoCon Tournament seeded fourth and defeated fifth-seeded Wofford and top-seeded Elon en route to the tournament finals against eventual-champion Furman. Under Garcia's guidance, UTC produced two Second-Team All-SoCon doubles teams in Josh Bales/Mark Fynn and Badr Bouabdellah/Artyom Vlasenko. In singles play, Bouabdellah had an outstanding dual-match season, registering a 24-2 singles record and a perfect 9-0 mark in SoCon matches. In 2005, the Mocs earned an 18-11 overall record. Garcia also coached two Second-Team All-SoCon performers in No. 1 singles player Arturo Navarro and No. 4 singles player Vlasenko. The seventh-seeded Mocs upended UNC Greensboro, Furman and the College of Charleston in the conference tournament to go up against top-seeded East Tennessee State. Garcia took over the supervision of both programs in 2001 following the departure of former head coach Jeff Clark. During his two-year run as head coach of both programs, both teams compiled 45 victories and advanced to the semifinal rounds of the SoCon Championships. He coached 10 All-SoCon performers and a two-time SoCon Sportsman of the Year. In 2001-02, the Lady Mocs finished in second place in the regular season while the men took fourth. The following year, the women's team was third in the SoCon, and the men placed sixth. Under Garcia's guidance, Jason Ontog and Cynthia Oulevay were both named First-Team All-SoCon in 2002. Oulevay went undefeated in league competition, while Ontog lost just once in 10 matches. Ontog and doubles partner Tim Kutschera were listed First-Team All-SoCon. Fabian Bechara and Charlotte Goude were Second-Team All-SoCon selections in 2003 as were the

doubles teams of Ontog and Thomas Knizat and Oulevay and Catherine Allen. Ontog, the 2001 SoCon Men's Player of the Year and No. 1 singles champion, received the Buddy Hartsell-Don Bunch Sportsmanship Award two times and achieved an Intercollegiate Tennis Association ranking as high as No. 67. In the classroom, the 2001-02 men's team earned Academic All-America honors, while James Dickerson and John Hangstefer were named ITA Scholar-Athletes. Garcia's collegiate coaching career began in 1994 when he served as a men's assistant at his alma mater, the University of Tennessee, until 1999. In 1999, Garcia moved on to the University of North Carolina to become the men's assistant coach. The Tar Heels finished the season ranked 20th in the nation, and Garcia was named Regional Assistant Coach of the Year by the ITA in 1999 and 2000. Garcia took his coaching talents to a new level when he left North Carolina in 2000 to become the personal coach to Davis Cup standout and former NCAA singles champion Chris Woodruff. Garcia was a two-year member of the Davis Cup squad as a coach and coached Woodruff, a former Tennessee player, to his second ATP singles title at the ATP Hall of Fame Championships in Newport, R.I. as well as a quarterfinal showing at the 2000 Australia Open. Prior to accepting the job at UTC, Garcia was the teaching professional at Cedar Bluff Racquet Club in Knoxville, Tenn. Garcia is a 1987 honors graduate of Tennessee with a bachelor's degree in General Business. While a member of the Volunteers' tennis team, he earned three tennis letters and was a member of the 1986 Southeastern Conference Championship squad. A competitive player himself, Garcia and teammate Mark Harrison, won the USTA National 35s Grass Court Doubles Championship in 2002 and USTA Indoor 35s National Doubles Championship in 2005 with partner Jeff Wright. Garcia and Harrison were runners up at the 2005 National Clay Court Doubles Championships. Garcia finished fifth in August of 2006 in the USTA National 40s Grass Court Championships, while he and doubles partner Eric Burke took fourth place in the doubles event. Born Aug. 3, 1964, Garcia served for three years on the NCAA Southeast Regional Selection Committee.

## WOMEN'S VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT REAVES ROBINETTE



Reaves Robinette joins the Chattanooga women's tennis staff as Volunteer Assistant Coach in the fall of 2008. A 2007 graduate of Virginia Tech with a degree in Psychology, Robinette "brings a high level of enthusiasm and tennis knowledge to the Lady Mocs," according to Head Coach Jeff Clark. "Our team will benefit because of his coaching,"

continues Clark.

Robinette lettered three years for the Hokies, where he played for former UTC men's and women's coach Jim Thompson. Prior to his time in Blacksburg, Robinette starred for coach Eric Voges at the McCallie School in Chattanooga.

Currently Robinette is a private tennis instructor at the Hixson Racquet Club. His sister, Grace, is a sophomore at UTC and also a member of the women's tennis team.

## MEN'S STUDENT ASSISTANT BADR BOUABDELLAH



Badr Bouabdellah joins the men's tennis staff as a student assistant this spring after playing four years for the Mocs.

Badr, a four-year letter winner and all-conference athlete, played every position for the Mocs and posted an overall record of 68-28 and was 20-14 in Southern Conference action.

In his senior year at UTC, he had an overall record of 13-8 with a perfect 7-0 at the No. 2 spot. In doubles action, Badr paired with current UTC senior Pavel Vostrikov and had an overall mark of 10-8 and was 2-7 in league play. At the No. 2 spot, the pair was 7-2 overall. He was named All-Conference in doubles in his sophomore year after putting together a 14-match win streak. He was named to the school's Dean's List, Athletics Director's Honor Roll and awarded the SoCon Commissioner's Medal for a 3.5 GPA.

## KERRI CRAMER GRADUATE ATHLETIC TRAINER



Kerri is in her first year at UTC and is the Athletic Trainer for the men's and women's tennis teams.

She is a graduate of Olivet Nazarene University in Bourbonnais, Ill., where she earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Athletic Training with a minor in Biology.

While at Olivet Nazarene, she worked with the football team as well as cross country, track, baseball and women's basketball.

She is enrolled in the graduate school at UTC working on her Masters in Clinical Exercise Physiology. She also works as the Athletic Trainer for the cross country, track and field teams as well as women's golf.

## Dr. Roger Brown - Chancellor



Roger G. Brown, Ph.D., a native Tennessean, became Chancellor of The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga in 2005.

"In Roger Brown we have a proven academic leader with the vision and experience necessary to build on the successes of The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and to help that campus reach even greater heights," said Dr. John Petersen, University of Tennessee President.

Brown has promoted UTC's mission as a metropolitan university with special emphasis in the fields of science, mathematics, and technology. He has pledged the campus' commitment to teacher preparation, healthcare professions, business and commerce, and cultural appreciation.

Brown came to Chattanooga from the University of North Carolina at Pembroke, where he served as Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs since 2000. During his tenure at Pembroke, the campus experienced a 60 percent growth in student enrollment and added degree programs at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Previously, he had served since 1991 in various academic and

administrative capacities with The University of North Carolina at Charlotte.

A political scientist with particular academic emphasis in American government, Brown earned bachelor's and master's degrees in Political Science from the University of Tennessee and the Ph.D. in Political Science from The Johns Hopkins University.

Along with his academic achievements, Brown has maintained a high level of community involvement and service. In 2004, the North Carolina Supreme Court appointed Brown to serve the Chief Justice's Advisory Committee on the Political Conduct of Judges. He was a member of Leadership Charlotte and the Public Safety Committee of the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce.

In Chattanooga, he continues membership in Rotary International and has also been named to the United Way of Greater Chattanooga Board of Directors. He is a commissioner of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and has been appointed to the Southeast Tennessee PreK-16 Education Council.

Brown has held membership in the American Association of Higher Education, the American Political Science Association, the Academy of Political Science, the International Association for Conflict Management, the International Personnel Management Association, and the Southern Political Science Association; he has been inducted into four national and international honor societies.

Brown's wife and partner is Dr. Carolyn Thompson. They have two children.

## Rick Hart - Athletics Director



Rick Hart hit the ground running upon his arrival in Chattanooga and has no plans of slowing down.

Now in his third year as the Director of Athletics at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, Hart has made an immediate impact on UTC's athletics program with his leadership skills and broad ideas on how it can continue in its quest to become the top mid-major athletics program in the nation.

Under his guidance in 2006-07, his first year as an athletics director, the Mocs claimed Southern Conference Championships in

women's cross country, women's basketball, wrestling, men's golf and softball.

Four student-athletes were selected as SoCon Athletes of the Year for their respective sports, and one was named SoCon Female Athlete of the Year among all SoCon student-athletes. A wrestler earned All-America honors, and football ticket revenues and attendance figures saw an increase despite a schedule which included just four home games.

Hart's commitment to comprehensive excellence also features the academic side of the equation. He has added staff members to the Compliance and Academic Services departments, and the student-athletes have responded as over 200 of them made the Athletics Department's Honor Rolls in 2006-07.

Balancing a budget at the mid-major level is widely known as a difficult task. Hart made it a priority for the department. With diligent leadership, UTC Athletics achieved fiscal responsibility and ended the fiscal year with a balanced budget.

Extremely visible in the community, Hart served as Grand Marshal of the 2007 Region 4 Special Olympics, and was a sought-after speaker among the area's many civic organizations.

Campus integration has been a focal point in Hart's initial year, as the athletics department has dedicated time and energy to engaging other university departments and strengthening relationships with faculty, staff and students.

In preparation for a formal strategic planning effort, feedback has been solicited from a variety of constituents. The data that is collected will be used to enhance marketing, communications and overall customer service.

Hired on May 23, 2006, Hart arrived on the UTC campus after serving seven years at the University of Oklahoma in various athletics administrative capacities.

Hart's career with the Sooners began in 1999 as the Director of Marketing and Licensing. He became Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing and Licensing in 2001, and developed and implemented marketing campaigns which generated annual ticket revenues in excess of \$19.5 million.

Hart was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Program Advancement and Branding in 2003.

His preliminary goals for the UTC Athletics Department are all attainable under the vision he has brought to the role, including a stronger focus on the student-athlete; operating with honesty, integrity and the appropriate priorities; and engaging the community and aggressively seeking opportunities to expand and enhance the resources provided to the student-athletes, the coaches and staff.

"We want to be a leader in the Southern Conference, and we will do that through our commitment to developing the total student-athlete," Hart says. "We are going to place the needs of the institution and the athletics department ahead of the needs and interests of individuals. And we are going to provide the necessary resources to support a comprehensive, broad-based championship athletics program."

Hart has also worked in athletics for the University of North Carolina and East Carolina University and has served with the U.S. Olympic Committee. A 1994 graduate of UNC, Hart earned a bachelor's degree in Physical Education, Health and Sport Science.

Along with his wife, Allison, also a graduate of North Carolina, the couple has one son, Trevor, 9, and one daughter, Caroline, 6.

A third-generation athletics administrator, Hart's father, Dave, is currently the Executive Athletics Director at his alma mater, the University of Alabama, and his grandfather, Dave Sr., served in a variety of roles within collegiate athletics including a stint as the Commissioner of the Southern Conference from 1987-91.

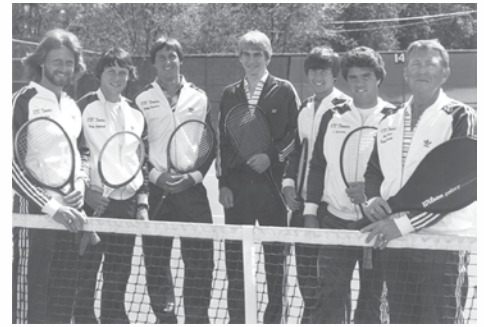

# 2009 CHATTANOOGA TENNIS



The Southern Conference, which began its 88th season of intercollegiate competition in 2008, is a national leader in emphasizing the development of the student-athlete and in helping to build lifelong leaders and role models.

The Southern Conference has been on the forefront of innovation and originality in developing creative solutions to address issues facing intercollegiate athletics. From establishing the first conference basketball tournament (1921), tackling the issue of freshmen eligibility (1922), developing women's championships (1984) and becoming the first conference to install the three-point goal in basketball (1980), the Southern Conference has been a pioneer.

The Southern Conference is the nation's fifth-oldest NCAA Division I collegiate athletic association. Only the Big Ten (1896), the Missouri Valley (1907), the Pacific 10 (1915) and the Southwestern Athletic (1920) conferences are older in terms of origination.

Academic excellence has been a major part of the Southern Conference's tradition. Hundreds of Southern Conference student-athletes have been recognized on ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America and all-district teams. A total of 19 Rhodes Scholarship winners have been selected from conference institutions.

The Conference currently consists of 12 members in five states throughout the Southeast and sponsors 19 varsity sports and championships that produce participants for NCAA Division I Championships.

The Southern Conference offices are located in the historic Beaumont Mill in Spartanburg, S.C. A textile mill that was in operation from 1880 until 1999, Beaumont Mill was renovated in 2004 and today offers the league first class meeting areas and offices as well as a spacious library for storage of the conference's historical documents.

## Membership History

On Feb. 25, 1921, representatives from 14 of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association's (SIAA) 30 members met at Atlanta's Piedmont Hotel to establish the Southern

Intercollegiate Conference. On hand at the inaugural meeting were officials from Alabama, Alabama Polytechnic Institute (Auburn), Clemson, Georgia, Georgia School of Technology (Georgia Tech), Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi A&M (Mississippi State), North Carolina, North Carolina State, Tennessee, Virginia, Virginia Polytechnic Institute (Virginia Tech) and Washington & Lee.

Dr. S.V. Sanford of Georgia was chosen as acting chairman and N.W. Dougherty of Tennessee was named secretary. The decision to form a new athletic conference was motivated by the desire to have a workable number of conference games for each league



member. With 30 schools in the SIAA by the early 1920s, it was impossible to play every school at least once during the regular season and many schools went several years between playing some conference members. In addition, in 1920, the SIAA voted down proposed rules that an athlete must be in a college a year before playing on its teams and refused to abolish a rule permitting athletes to play summer baseball for money.

Play began in the fall of 1921 and a year later, six more schools joined the fledgling league including Tulane (which had attended the inaugural meeting but had elected not to join), Florida, Louisiana (LSU), Mississippi, South Carolina and Vanderbilt. VMI joined in 1925 and Duke was added in 1929.

By the 1930s, membership in the Southern Conference had reached 23 schools. C.P. "Sally" Miles of Virginia Tech, president of the Southern

Conference, called the annual league meeting to order on Dec. 9, 1932 at the Farragut Hotel in Knoxville, Tenn. Georgia's Dr. Sanford announced that 13 institutions west and south of the Appalachian Mountains were reorganizing as the Southeastern Conference. Members of the new league included Alabama, Alabama Polytechnic Institute, Florida, Georgia, Georgia School of Technology, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Mississippi A&M, University of the South, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt.

According to the minutes of the meeting, Dr. Sanford stated that the division was made along geographical lines. Florida's Dr. J.J. Tigert, acting as spokesman for the withdrawing group, regretted the move but believed it was necessary as the Southern Conference had grown too large. The resignations were accepted and the withdrawing schools formed the new league which began play in 1932.

The Southern Conference continued with membership of 10 institutions including Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina, Virginia, VMI, Virginia Tech and Washington & Lee.

The second major shift occurred some 20 years later. By 1952, the Southern Conference included 17 colleges and universities. Another split occurred when seven schools including Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest departed to form the Atlantic Coast Conference which began play in 1953. The revamped Southern Conference included members The Citadel, Davidson, Furman, George Washington, Richmond, VMI, Virginia Tech, Washington & Lee, West Virginia and William & Mary.

Today, the league continues to thrive with a membership that includes 12 institutions and a footprint that spans five states: Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Alabama and Georgia. Current league members are Appalachian State, College of Charleston, The Citadel, Davidson, Elon, Furman, Georgia Southern, UNC Greensboro, Samford, Chattanooga, Western Carolina and Wofford.
