1976-77 ANALYSIS

With JIM MORGAN

The Schedule . . .

"This is undoubtedly the most ambitious schedule we've ever undertaken." Such are the sentiments of wrestling coach Jim Morgan, now in his eighth year at the helm of the Moccasin grapplers. Although this year's schedule is filled with powerhouses, Morgan still retains his optimistic attitude. "This type schedule will lend itself to strengthening the team barring injury and unforeseen difficulties." Look at the schedule that has everyone concerned.

Tough Southeastern Conference opponents Auburn, Alabama, Tennessee, Georgia, and Kentucky will be facing UTC. Also on the card are Division II powerhouses Iowa State and Mankata State. Appalachian State and The Citadel of the Southern Conference and Florida Tech will also be looking to ambush the Mocs this year, as will old rivals Middle Tennessee and Maryville College.

The People . . .

When a team loses all-time greats like Turner Jackson, John Kalvelage, and Tim Brennan, it just has to leave a hole in the program. But Morgan still has a few surprises ready. "The team is basically young and inexperienced except for about four weight classes. However, I feel that the potential is there much as it was five years ago when all those responsible for the last two years of success were freshmen."

Morgan has a solid base from which to build for 1976-77 with Randy Batten, already a two-time 118-pound national champion with a 62-4 collegiate record, and 177-pound national champion David Weeks. They will be joined by 11 other lettermen from last year's squad.

Batten plans to wrestle at 126 pounds until after the Christmas holidays, and Weeks, along with lettermen 118-pounder Danny Gilbert and 134-pounder John Noblit, will be ineligible until the start of the winter semester, thus missing the first two dual meets against Auburn and Florida Tech.

One of the finest crops of freshmen since he's been at UTC greeted Morgan when practice began this fall.

By Weights . . .

The 118-pound division will be wide open with lettermen Charlie Davis, Danny Gilbert, and Rick Upchurch battling for the top spot. But they will have a tough time with top freshmen Bryon McGlathery, Jerry Thomas, Dirk Siron, James Evins, David Bailey, and Mike Agnew.

Since Noblit will be ineligible until after Christmas the 134-pound slot will be up for grabs between three freshmen: Jeff Pair, Rick Waller, and Alfonso Banks.

Senior Duane Bennett, who lettered last year as a 150-pounder, is going down to the 142-pound class. He will have to battle freshman Dan Colvard, last year's Tennessee 145-pound champion, and Doug Schaefferkoetter. Also contenders for the slot are James Hoff and Joe Waddell.

Dean Smith, who took third place in the SEIWA meet last year, returns at 150 pounds, and appears to be a serious national title contender this year. He will have to overtake Larry Bone and Wes Smith to win his starting berth.

The injury-plagued Jody Bevilaqua, who wrestled behind Turner Jackson for two years, is expected to start at 158 pounds. He will have to resist the challenges of freshmen Joe Hannah and Tom Pelfrey, as well as Anthony Parris, and two sophomores, Fred Shaw and Jack Moyers.

The 167-pound berth is up for grabs between Steve Culpepper, Joe Pair, and Bill Wilson, plus freshmen Mike See and David Higgins. Willie Staggs, sophomore letterman, was expected to win this spot until being injured playing intramural football and is lost for the season.

With Weeks ineligible until after Christmas, last year's regular 190-pounder, Tom Flanagan, has dropped to 177 pounds. He still has to contend with freshman Bobby Orand.

Flanagan's drop enables the team's hardest working and most conscientious wrestler, Bob Fentress, to slip into the 190-pound slot.

SEIWA champion Ralph Zigner from Kenosha, Wisconsin, who pinned 20 of his opponents last year, returns at heavyweight. He will battle Greg Pressley for the position.

Summary . . .

With the loss of three All-Americans, and the toughest schedule ever facing them, this should prove to be an interesting year. But Jim Morgan has a way of coming through. If history has anything to do with it you can be sure that when the season ends, Jim Morgan will be on the winning side of the slate. The challenge is there and Morgan and his troops will be ready to meet the challenge when the season begins.



THE COACHES

Reaching 100 victories in any sport is a milestone, whether it be by coaching or playing.

But the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga seems to have an abundance of people reaching that milestone, especially on the wrestling coaching staff.

Head coach Jim Morgan, going into his ninth year at the helm of the UTC matmen, has a 106-25-3 mark, while assistant coach Turner Jackson, the most successful wrestler in UTC history, has a career record of 116-15 wins on the mat.

Morgan, an administrative assistant to athletic director Harold Wilkes as well as head wrestling coach, is one of the most successful in his field in the country, turning out third place and runnerup finishes in the NCAA's Division II tournament for the past two years.

In addition to that, Morgan has, in the past three years, had five national champions, a runnerup, a third-place finisher, two fourth-place finishers and a sixth-place finisher in NCAA tournaments.

In the last six seasons, Morgan's teams have gone 15-1-1, 19-1, 13-5-1, 13-2-1, 16-3, and 12-1, plus winning the Southeastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association Tournament for the first time ever last year and the Atlanta Open.

For his success, Morgan has been honored by his peers at least three times in the past two years, as SEIWA coach of the year in 1975, the highest honor obtainable by a wrestling coach.

Morgan's Background . . .

Morgan, who has great rapport with his wrestlers, is a 1956 honor graduate of Chattanooga's McCallie School and an award-winning student at the University of Chattanooga, where he won the Dayle May award for the senior athlete with the highest grade point average and wrestled.

After graduation from UC, Morgan coached in junior high school and prep school before joining the University in 1968.

His first team went 9-5 and was runnerup in the SEIWA and he was second for

Morgan currently is vice president of the Chattanooga Takedown Club, secretary of the NCAA Division II Coaches Association and a member of the all-powerful NCAA Rules Committee.

He and his wife, the former Martha (Sis) Jones, have an 18-month old boy, James David, and are expecting another child in December.

Jackson's Background . . .

Jackson, Morgan's apprentice this year, enters his first year of coaching after what some people term as one of the most illustrious collegiate careers ever.

About all the Huntsville, Alabama, native did was win two NCAA titles, three SEIWA championships, two Southern Open crowns and one Atlanta Open title.

That's all in addition to winning 59 consecutive matches at one point during his sophomore, junior and senior years and winning 65 of his final 66 matches.

Jackson, who came to UTC as a walkon at the invitation of coach Morgan, is completing his requirements for a BS degree in Health and Physical Education and taking courses to gain admission to graduate school.

His illustrious record speaks for itself as he went 26-11 in his freshman year, 18-2 his sophomore year, 8-0 in a redshirt year that was necessitated because of injury, 33-0 in his junior year and 31-2 his senior year.

That all came after he took on Mr. Wrestling in the United States, former Olympic champion Dan Gable, in the Southern Open in 1971 in the first collegiate match of his career.

Gable pinned Jackson in that contest but there are many who believe he could have given Gable a good battle in later years.

It had been a long season, starting back in the second week of September, 1975. But near the stroke of midnight on the first Saturday of the following month of March, only five seconds separated the UT-Chattanooga Moccasins from the NCAA Division II wrestling championship.

It all came down to the final two matches on a sub-zero night in frigid Fargo, N.D. UTC's sophomore 118-pounder, Randy Batten, and senior 158-pounder, Turner Jackson, already had claimed their second straight individual national championships, and 177-pounder David Weeks had captured his first after taking fourth place the year before.

But the final totals on the scoreboard score Cal State-Bakersfield 92½, UT-Chattanooga 88¼ with defending national champion Northern Iowa in third place with 83. And it was 23 more points back to fourth-place Mankato State.

"We didn't lose it. Cal-Bakersfield won it", Chattanooga coach Jim Morgan offered afterwards. "The had to come get us, and they did. They did what they had to do, even though it was the narrowest of margins."

UTC's second place finish in the NCAA Tournament itself made the 1975-76 season the best ever in the school's history, but there were other milestones, too. Senior 134-pounder John Kalvelage was the bronze medalist again with a 7-2 decision over Northern Iowa's Bruce McClure in the consolation finals, and senior Tim Brennan became the Mocs' fifth All-American of the year when he battled his way to a sixth place finish in the 167-pound class.

Incredible as the goal seemed at the start of the season, the Mocs had improved upon their showing of the year before when they had come home from East Stroudsburg, Pa., with the third place team trophy, two individual champions, four All-Americans, the NCAA Tournament's Most Outstanding Wrestler Award for Batten and the NCAA Coach of the Year Award for Morgan

And while the Moccasins had posted better dual meet records than the 15-1-1 worksheet for 1975-76 (they had gone 19-1 just the year before), they still were able to rack up the 106th dual meet triumph in just eight seasons under Morgan's leadership. during that span they had lost only 25 and tied 3.

But one of the things the Moc fans probably will remember most is the fact that they finally won the Southeastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association team championship for the first time ever after six runnerup finishes in the previous seven years.

Jackson, who had seen a 59-match winning streak severed by Tennessee's Ethan Reeve via a 1-0 decision in the Southern Open finals back in November, finally was selected as the recipient of the SEIWA's Best Wrestler Award after winning his third individual title.

A default in the quarterfinals of the NCAA University Division finals because of a knee injury that later required surgery was only Jackson's second loss of the season after 31 victories. That also enabled him to close out his UTC career with a phenomenal 116-15 record, which is even more amazing when you consider that all of those losses came during his freshman year. He had been introduced to intercollegiate wrestling by the fabled Dan Gable in his very first match in the 1970 Southern Open. But before he was through he made 44 other wrestlers his own pin victims and added two Southern Open gold medals to his trophy case, along with the two NCAA titles.

When it was all over Morgan suggested, "Turner very well may be the greatest athlete ever to perform for Chattanooga in any sport."

You won't find many contradictions to that.

Meanwhile, the equally amazing Batten was stretching his own winning streak to 44 matches in a row. The skein was finally stopped by Iowa State's John Jones on an 8-6 decision in the NCAA University Division Championship quarterfinals. And Jones ended up with the silver medal at Tucson, Ariz.

Other highlights of the unforgettable year included Southern Open individual championships for Batten and Weeks, as well as runnerup spots for Kalvelage, Jackson and heavyweight Pat Walker from among a total of 11 place winners, whereas the Moc matmen had not won a single match during the inaugural Southern Open six years earlier.

The seniors of '76 certainly left their marks. David Noblit departed with a 43-23-1 collegiate record, Kalvelage left with a 77-15 remembrance. Shipley was 39-27-3 over his four years and Brennan finished up at 84-34-2. Walker was the only one under .500 with 25-31-1.

But, of course, Jackson's 116-15 record is the one at which future Mocs will be aiming.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN WRESTLING OR "It's Not Hard To Understand"

FIRST—Both wrestlers come forward from the corners of the mat to the edge of the center circle, step forward, shake hands, and step back to the edge of the center circle.

NEXT—The referee blows his whistle and signals "wrestle".

NOW—Each wrestler is trying to get control of the other by getting behind him or on top of him—a **TAKE DOWN**.

POINTS—The first points are likely to be given for a **TAKE DOWN**. When one wrestler gets a take down, the referee signals two points with his right hand.

THEN—The **defensive** (bottom or down) wrestler is trying to **ESCAPE** or **REVERSE** his position—to get free to a neutral position or to reverse to a top position.

Every match has **three periods**, the first two minutes in length, the last two each three minutes in length (unless terminated by a fall).

FIRST PERIOD: Starts from standing or neutral position. Both wrestlers must attempt to stay inside the circle while on their feet.

SECOND PERIOD: Starts from the "Referee's Position". choice of position is decided by the toss of a coin—the winner of the toss may choose either up or down.

SCORING

Part I: Individual Match Score

TAKEDOWN 2 points
When a wrestler gets behind, or on top of his opponent from the neutral or standing position.

ESCAPE 1 point
Getting out from underneath an opponent to a neutral, or standing, position—facing him.

REVERSAL 2 points
Getting out from underneath the opponent and behind or on top of him.

NEAR FALL 3 points
Having control of an opponent in a pinning situation and: (a) holding both shoulders flat less than one full second, or; (b) holding one shoulder on the mat and the other shoulder within one inch of the mat for two full seconds.

PREDICAMENT 2 points
Having control of an opponent in a pinning situation and: (a) holding one shoulder on the mat and holding the other shoulder within an angle of 45° or less with the mat for one second, or; (b) stopping both shoulders, even momentarily, within four inches of the mat.

RIDING TIME 1 point
At the end of the match a point is added to the score of the wrestler who has at least one minute more riding time advantage than his opponent, up to two points maximum for at least two minutes of riding time.

STALLING First offense, warning
Second and Third offense, one point; Fourth offense, two points; Fifth offense, disqualify. Stalling is avoiding wrestling in the bottom, or neutral position.

ILLEGAL HOLDS, TECHNICAL VIOLATIONS, ROUGHNESS
First and Second offense, one point; Third offense, two points; fourth offense, disqualify.

PART II: Team Score

PIN OR FALL 6 points
To the team whose wrestler holds the shoulders or shoulder blades of the other wrestler in contact with the mat for at least one second; this also ends the match.

SUPERIOR DECISION 5 points
Winning a match by 12 or more points.

MAJOR DECISION 4 points
Winning a match by 8 or more points.

DECISION 3 points
Awarded to the team whose wrestler scores the most "match points", neither wrestler having secured a fall.

DRAW To each team: 2 points
When both wrestlers have the same number of "match points", neither having secured a fall.

DEFAULT OR FORFEIT 6 points
Awarded to opponents when a wrestler is unable to continue or fails to show up.

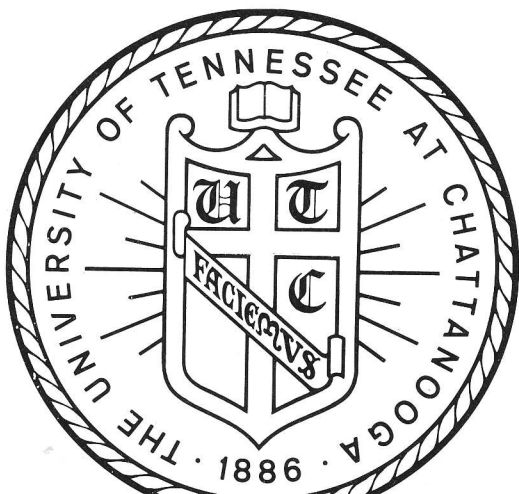
