Lisa has been a member of the varsity all of her four years at UTC. The only senior on this year's squad, Lisa is from Arab, AL. The past two seasons, Lowery has held the number five and/or six positions. Coach Tommy Bartlett commented, "Lisa is a joy to coach. She has an excellent attitude and I'm glad she has stayed with the Lady Mocs for these four years."



LORI MASSENGILL Freshman East Ridge, TN

The sophomore posted a 9-5 record for the 1981-82 Lady Mocs. A product of Nottingham, England, Sue was ranked number 16 in Great Britain last year. In 1982 she was ranked number 2 in Scotland.

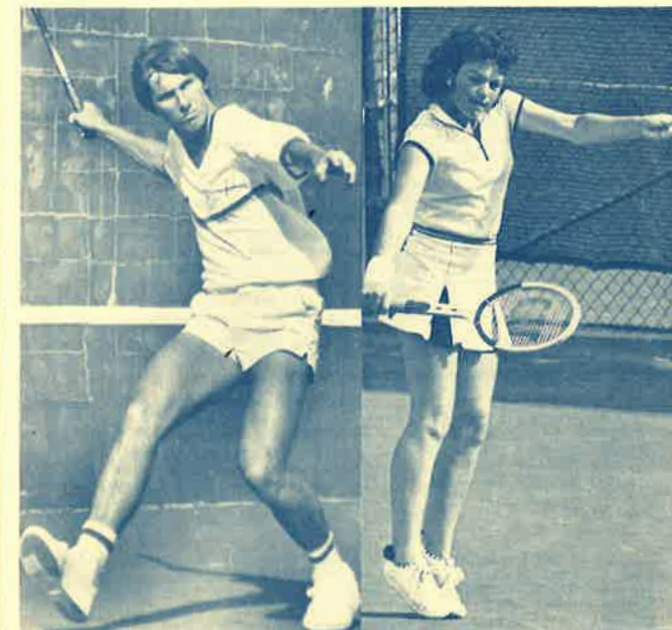

TOMMY BARTLETT
Head Coach

Coach Bartlett is one of the most respected tennis technicians in the nation. In addition to tutoring the varsity teams at UTC, he is Coordinator of Racquet Sports for the University. He supervises the sprawling Manker Patten Tennis Center on the banks of the beautiful Tennessee River which encompasses 10 clay courts, six hard courts and two indoor courts. He also oversees activities and maintenance at the UTC Racquetball and Tennis Center on the campus. It includes seven racquetball courts and two indoor tennis courts under one roof. Outside are 16 tennis courts.

Since arriving at UTC in 1979, Coach Bartlett's men's tennis teams have won three consecutive Southern Conference championships. Add the 1978 and 1979 titles to the Moc string to make it five in a row. His men's teams have compiled records of 14-2, 25-4 and 19-7. He was conference Coach of The Year in 1981 and 1982.

During his three years, the women netters have logged records of 21-6, 15-4 and 19-6. In 1980, the Lady Mocs were crowned Tennessee Division I State Champions.

Coach Bartlett's first stint as UTC tennis coach was from 1958 through 1961 when his teams compiled a 30-0 record. He was head coach at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville from 1962 through 1966, presiding over a 57-10 overall record and winning the Southeastern Conference championship in 1966 while being named the conference's Coach of The Year.

While coaching tennis teams, Coach Bartlett was also head basketball coach at The University of Chattanooga and assistant basketball coach at The University of Tennessee. In 1966, he accepted the head basketball coaching position at The University of Florida. In seven seasons at the Gator helm his teams compiled a 98-85 overall record, including the best single-season record in Florida cage history, 22-4 in 1966-67. His 1968-69 team was the only Gator team to reach the NCAA or NIT—playing in the NIT against Temple, the eventual winner of the tournament.

Having guided his tennis teams to 200 victories against only 40 losses as a collegiate coach for 10 years, Coach Bartlett also competes himself as a tennis professional.

As recently as last year, he became the first pro to be named both Southern USPTA Coach of The Year and Player of The Year. Although 54 years of age, Coach Bartlett was runnerup in 45 Singles at last year's USPTA National Tournament, and teamed to win the 45 Doubles championship. He was top-ranked in 45 Singles in both Tennessee and Southern United States Professional Tennis Associations last year. He also was ranked No. 1 in 45 Doubles in the Southern USPTA. His USPTA Southern Senior Men's Team was the national champion last year.

Prior to becoming UTC Racquet Coordinator, Coach Bartlett was General Manager and Head Professional of the Tenni-Condo Racquet Club in Tampa, FL. He has held many high offices as a tennis professional, including President of the Florida Division of USPTA in 1976-77-78. He was named Tennessee's Pro of The Year in 1980.

In addition to playing his entire collegiate career at The University of Tennessee without losing a singles match, another of Coach Bartlett's top honors as a player came in 1974 when he was the No. 1 player on the United States team which played Canada for the Gordon Trophy at Lake Placid, NY.



ZAN GUERRY
Assistant Coach

Coach Guerry affords UTC netters the opportunity to practice against an accomplished technician who earned All-America honors four consecutive years (1967-71) as a collegiate standout at Rice University. The native Chattanooga on five occasions has been ranked in the men's Top Twenty and four times won the Southern Men's Championships. As a junior he claimed national titles in the divisions for 12-year-olds, 14, 16, and 18.

DAVID BREITKOPF
Senior
Long Island, NY

David has been a member of the varsity all of his four years at UTC. The last two were championship seasons as he won the Southern Conference No. 6 crowns both seasons. He also teamed to win the No. 3 doubles title in 1981 . . . last season he won the Coach's Award after posting an impressive 21-8 record . . . He is one of the seniors who forms a strong, experienced nucleus for 1983.



STEWART LAWWILL
Senior
Chattanooga, TN

Another senior stalwart who has won Southern Conference titles on two occasions. He contributed mightily to the Mocs' league title in 1980 as a freshman by winning the No. 5 singles championship. After finishing as runnerup at No. 5 in 1981, Stewart rebounded to win the No. 4 crown last season . . . Named the Most Valuable Player in 1982, he wound up with a 23-6 record.



ORLANDO LOURENCO
Sophomore
Quaelo, Zimbabwe

A member of the Mocs' Zimbabwe connection, Orlando won the Southern Conference No. 5 singles crown and teamed to claim the No. 2 doubles title as a freshman. He was 20-5 for the season . . . His future is extremely bright as he continues to progress. He upset the No. 1 player from the United States last summer in Junior Wimbledon competition after succeeding Philip Tuckniss as the No. 1 junior player in Zimbabwe. He currently is ranked No. 2 among seniors in his home country and 47th among world juniors.



ROGER QUALEY
Senior
Chattanooga, TN

"Roger is the type of player every coach needs on his team," according to Coach Tommy Bartlett. Although he has never been a starter, Roger has stepped into critical situations and set an example of hard work in practice . . . He was the only unbeaten member of the team last season at 2-0 as a valuable reserve.



BRIAN REDMOND
Sophomore
Lithonia, GA

Counted on to continue his improvement and strengthen this year's lineup after going 7-10 last year, Brian is ranked among the Top 10 in Southern juniors. He is No. 2 in doubles among Southern juniors and No. 8 in national junior doubles . . . Played a lot during the summer and fall and has impressed as a much improved player.



GREIG RODGER
Freshman
Harare, Zimbabwe

The top-ranked junior in Zimbabwe has joined his predecessors in that prestigious position, Philip Tuckniss and Orlando Lorenc, at UTC . . . He will challenge the underclassmen on the team for a spot in the lineup. His credentials as a life-long participant in Zimbabwe tennis marks him as another promising comer.



PHILIP TUCKNISS
Senior
Harare, Zimbabwe

After an injury-marred 1982 season found him with a 10-5 record, Philip promises to be the Mocs' premier player in 1983. He is ranked 4th in U.S. amateur ranks after pulling off a stunning upset over highly-ranked Paul Anacone in the National Indoor Championships last year . . . He managed to endure a nagging abdomen injury to be the runnerup at No. 1 in the Southern Conference tournament last year. He teamed with Stewart Lawwill to win the No. 2 doubles crown . . . As a sophomore he won the No. 2 singles title and was a runnerup in No. 1 doubles. He was the No. 3 singles champion as a freshman and teamed to win the No. 1 doubles title . . . When he was recruited from Zimbabwe he was the No. 1 junior player there . . . He was recognized as an Academic All-American last season. Other honors include captain of the UTC team, the 1982 Most Valuable Player Award and the Coach's Award in 1981.



SCOTT ZACCARIA
Junior
St. Petersburg, FL

A sure standout in Southern Conference play and destined for excellent national ranking, Scott advances his skills each time he takes the court. His 22-7 record last season and consistent performances were keys to the Mocs' success . . . He was a high school All-American and won the No. 3 singles championship in the league as a freshman. Last season, he was third at No. 2 and teamed to win the No. 1 doubles championship.

1981-82 MEN'S SEASON RECAP

The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga became the Southern Conference Champions for the record-tying fifth straight year in 1982. The Mocs claimed three singles titles and all three doubles crowns. UTC totaled 67 points while second-place finisher Furman accumulated 65. Stuart Lawwill, Orlando Lourenco and David Brietkof won single's championships at numbers four, five and six. Phillip Tuckniss was the runnerup at the number one post, while Scott Zaccaria and Billy Dean earned third place at the number two and three spots respectively.

The most promising aspect of the 1982 Southern Conference Champions was the fact UTC only lost one netter off that squad in Billy Dean. The Mocs will be in a position to win their sixth consecutive title in 1983, which would break the Southern Conference record.

The men's squad completed their regular season with a record of 19-7, with highlighted victories over Georgia Tech 9-0, Jacksonville 7-1, Alabama-Birmingham 6-3, Central Florida 7-2, Tampa 9-0, Nebraska 7-2 and Furman 5-4.

1981-82 WOMEN'S SEASON RECAP

After losing 1981 graduates Sue Turberville, Kathy Kolankiewicz, Linda Baron and Judy Stanford, Head Coach Tommy Bartlett was apprehensive for the 1981-82 Lady Mocs.

But thanks to the strong recruiting of Bartlett the winning tradition continued at UTC. Bartlett signed the "European Connection" which consisted of Sue McCulloch of England, Charlotte Blomquist of Sweden, Sabine ter Riet of Holland and Pam Yates of England. The Lady Mocs finished the season with a record of 19-6, including a second place in the AIAW State Championships. Number one singles Sue McCulloch qualified for the Regionals by claiming runnerup in the 1982 State Championships. She joined teammate Pam Yates in doubles as they also earned a second place in state competition.

The 1981-82 Lady Mocs featured victories over Jacksonville 9-0, Central Florida 9-0, South Florida 9-0, Tampa 9-0, Marshall 9-0, Middle Tennessee 7-2 and Alabama-Birmingham 9-0.

The 1982-83 Lady Mocs will compete in Division II competition for the first time since 1979. The women's tennis teams won three national Division II titles in 1977, 1978 and 1979.
