2009 NCAA Regional Tournament



UTEP's Roger Sloan capped a stellar senior season by earning an individual bid to the NCAA South Central Regional May 14-16 in Stillwater, Okla.

He became the first Miner selected to NCAA Regionals in five years.

Sloan narrowly missed qualifying for the NCAA Finals. After struggling to a 77 on the first day of the regional, he rebounded with rounds of 72 and 74 for a seven-over-par 223.

He tied for ninth place at the regional, his team-leading fifth top-10 showing of the season.

A native of Merritt, B.C., Sloan concluded the year with a sparkling 72.7 stroke average. He was a three-time Conference USA Golfer of the Week. His best finish of the season was a tie for second place at the Wolf Pack Classic. He fired his career-low 206 at the Wyoming Cowboy Classic, tying for third place. Sloan had seven sub-70 rounds for the season, including a 66 on two occasions.



COACH RICK TODD



UTEP's first-ever All-American in 1984, Rick Todd has been head coach of the Miners since 1999.

UTEP has finished in the top three at the conference championship three times under Todd's direction. The Miners notched a runner-up showing in 2002, and took third place in 2003 and 2004.

Todd has taken UTEP to the NCAA West Regional on three occasions. The Miners were 11th in 2003, just one stroke shy of qualifying for the NCAA Championships. UTEP finished 19th in 2000 and 20th in 2004.

Two Miners have earned All-American honors under Todd's tutelage. Dan Swanson was a third team selection in 2003. Chris Baryla was an honorable mention pick in 2003 and a third team honoree in 2004.

Baryla had one of the greatest seasons in UTEP history in 2004, fashioning a 70.6 stroke average and participating in the NCAA Championships as an individual. He was tabbed the WAC Player of the Year and notched his fourth career individual title at the Barona Collegiate Cup.

Baryla joins Swanson and Nathan Fritz as one of three players to win tournament titles during the Todd era.

The Miners have captured three tournament championships in the Todd regime - the UC-Irvine Anteater Invitational in 2001, the Falcon-Antigua Invitational in 2002 and the Wyoming Cowboy Classic in 2005.

The Miners have finished second at countless tournaments under Todd, including at the 2002 WAC Championships, their best showing at the conference tournament in nine years. Three UTEP players finished in the top 10 of the individual standings that year (Baryla, Fritz and Drew Hawley).

Todd was named WAC Coach of the Year following the 2000-01 season after directing UTEP to a fourth-place showing at the conference championship.

Todd claimed second team All-America honors as a senior in 1986, and third team as a junior. He was an honorable mention All-America choice as a sophomore.

A four-time first team All-WAC selection, Todd had a 74.1 stroke average during his collegiate career, including a low of 73.1 during the 1983-84 season - his second year in the Miner orange and blue. He won four tournaments at UTEP - the Stanford Fall Invitational and New Mexico State Invitational in 1984, and the Arizona-Michelob Invitational and UCLA-Bill Bryant Invitational in 1986. Todd shattered Tom Watson's tournament record score at the Stanford Fall Invitational. He was elected to the El Paso Golf Hall of Fame in 1984. Todd enjoyed 10 top-three finishes during his UTEP career, and 20 top-10 showings.

A native of Toronto, Canada, Todd parlayed his exceptional college career into a stint on the professional circuit. He participated in the U.S. Open in 1998, and the British Open in 1996. He is a former Canadian Tour, Asian Tour, Nike Tour and Ben Hogan Tour member. Todd won the Payless Victoria Open tournament in 1997, and the Ben Hogan Dakota Dunes Open in 1991. He was a member of Canada's World Cup and Dunhill Cup teams in 1996.


Todd earned his bachelor of business administration degree in marketing from UTEP in 1986. He was born on Oct. 3, 1962. Todd and his wife, Darci, have an 11 year-old daughter, Shelbi.



UTEP'S HOME COURSES

The UTEP men's golf program is extremely fortunate to have at its disposal a number of excellent golf facilities in the El Paso area.

One of the big advantages the UTEP program has is the opportunity to play such a diverse array of courses. And the UTEP golf program receives tremendous support and cooperation from the different club presidents and head pros.

These are the facilities made available to the UTEP golf program during the season.

Butterfield Trail Golf Club

The course was designed by world-renowned architect Tom Fazio. Opened last summer, this par-72 premium daily fee public course is highlighted by natural sand dunes, and native flora and fauna.

Butterfield Trail Golf Club features over 55 feet of elevation changes and avails itself to drama and relief with vertical transitions, making each and every hole a "signature hole." Offering Dominant Plus Bent grass greens, Butterfield Trail provides an unmatched golfer experience.

Butterfield Trail was recently voted one of the "Top 10 New Courses You Can Play" by Golf Magazine.

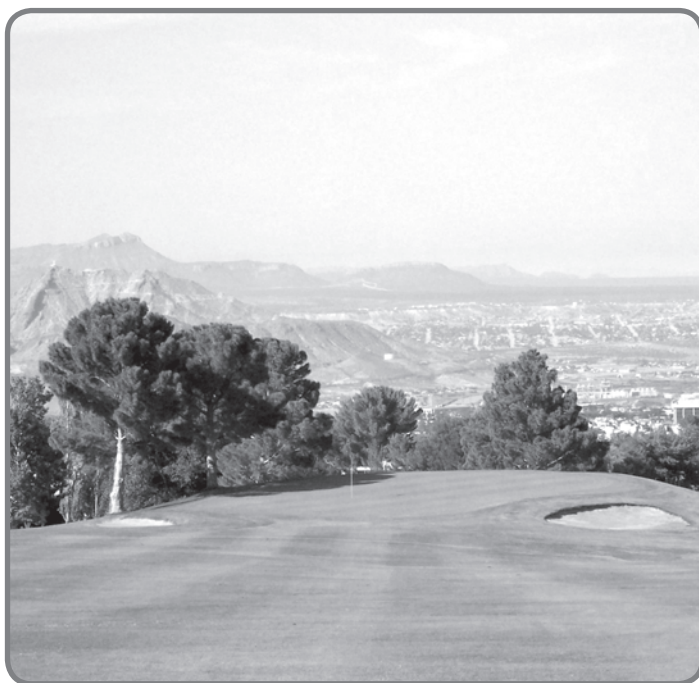
The head professional is Val D'Souza. He also holds the course record of 63.

Coronado Country Club

Coronado Country Club, founded in 1959, is one of the most beautiful and challenging courses in El Paso.

The course is located just minutes from downtown El Paso, nestled on the west side of the beautiful Franklin Mountains, at an elevation of 4,700 feet. Coronado Country Club offers a panoramic view, overlooking three states and two countries.

The course has served the Miners for many years and is well-known for its good relationship with UTEP. The course is 6,485 yards in length and is especially known for its fast greens and hilly terrain.

Coronado has hosted many professional and amateur events over the years, as well as the Western Athletic Conference Championship. The Hogan Tour has made the course a part of its season twice, and the course has hosted three men's Southwestern Amateur Events. The course served as the 1990 Western Athletic Conference Championship host course, in which UTEP placed second.

Danny Swain is the pro at Coronado Country Club. The current course record of 60 is held by Steve Haskins, the son of the late UTEP Hall of Fame basketball coach Don Haskins.

El Paso Country Club

After more than three quarters of a century, the El Paso Country Club – the oldest golf course in El Paso – is still one of the most-beautiful, yet demanding courses in the Sun City.

Opened in 1906, El Paso Country Club boasts a 6,781-yard, par 71 course, known for its fast greens and lush fairways. The course is primarily flat, but very demanding, as it requires a good degree of accuracy off the tee and for shots played into the greens. The course is located in the Rio Grande River Valley on the west side of El Paso.

Mark Pelletier is the current Director of Golf at EPCC. Former Miner Todd Fields owns the course record with a 60. The tournament is the home of the prestigious Western Refining All-American Tournament held each fall. Included among the alumni of the tournament are some of the greatest golfers of our age, including Tiger Woods, Davis Love III, Corey Pavin, Mark O'Meara, Curtis Strange, Steve Elkington, Justin Leonard, John Daly, David Duval and former UTEP head coach Tim Norris, who won the event in 1979.

Emerald Springs Golf Course

In a short period of time Emerald Springs Golf and Conference Center has become a competitive facility in the El Paso area. With lush greens and a completely remodeled clubhouse and renovated golf course, "El Paso's Newest Golfing Experience" boasts a bonafide 18-hole championship golf course that any golfer would find challenging, yet exciting.

But Emerald Springs is more than a golf course. There are four championship tennis courts located on the grounds, and if it is swimming you desire, an Olympic-size pool is available. There is also a full-service restaurant, banquet facilities, catering and an executive board room for conferences and seminars.

Luis Delgadillo owns the course record of 62.

Lone Star Golf Club

A beautifully-manicured, narrow, tree-lined par-71 municipal golf course, Lone Star Golf Course measures 6,805 yards in total distance. Lone Star is conveniently located within five minutes of the El Paso International Airport.

Lone Star offers a full range of golfing services, including a lit driving range, electric golf carts and private or group instructions from PGA professionals. Lone Star also features the Sandtrap Bar and Grill, a full-service bar and restaurant specializing in homemade Mexican food and draft beer chilled to 29 degrees.

Mike Singleton is the club pro at Lone Star. Mark Pelletier, the brother of UTEP women's golf coach Jere Pelletier, owns the course record with a spectacular 62.

Painted Dunes Desert Golf Course

One of the newest golf courses in El Paso, this 18-hole marvel on the east side of the city is both beautiful and challenging. It is one of the longest courses in town, covering 6,925 yards in length with a par of 72.

Opened in March of 1991, the course has received local and national acclaim. Shortly after it was built, Golf Digest named it as one of the best daily fee courses in the U.S. Golf Digest also ranked the course as the second-best public golf course in the nation in 1997. It was also ranked number one among public golf courses by The Dallas Morning News in 1998.

The course features modern-style greens with pot and grass bunkers, and is known for its desert layout. The course is one of the toughest the Miners utilize for practice.

Anthony Below is the general manager. The current course record is 62, set by Rex Caldwell.

Santa Teresa Country Club

Located 13 miles from downtown El Paso and just 11 miles from the UTEP campus, Santa Teresa Country Club in Santa Teresa, N.M. has two wide-open 18-hole courses – both private – at its disposal. The Yucca and the Spanish Dagger have rolling fairways with a smattering of trees just for excitement. To keep the golfer honest, both courses at the Santa Teresa Country Club have plenty of fairway bunkers and greens surrounded by traps, as well as four or five holes on each course where water comes into play.

The Yucca is a par-72 with distances varying from 7,150 yards to 6,893, depending on the tees. As for the Spanish Dagger, it, too, is 72 par, with two different distances: 6,780 and 6,237.

Santa Teresa Country Club has meeting rooms and tennis courts for members and visitors. Also on the grounds are two restaurants: The Cantina, which is a sports bar, and The Piano Room.

The Director of Golf at Santa Teresa Country Club is R.C. Ordish, who is a PGA-certified instructor of golf. Chris Thomas is the head golf pro. The staff is available for private or group lessons.

Santa Teresa Country Club is home of the Adams Tight Lies Tour. Thomas holds both course records – 62 on the Yucca and 61 on the Spanish Dagger.

Vista Hills Country Club

Underwood Golf Complex

Located at the Fort Bliss Military Range, this complex features two 18-hole golf courses – the 6,629 yard, par-72 Sunset Course and the 6,942 yard, par-72 Sunrise Course.

Built in the 1940's, the Sunset Course was originally a public course, but was taken over by the military in May of 1953 and has since been exclusively a military course.

Former UTEP men's golfer Ryan Hietala holds the current course record from the gold tees with a 10-under par 62.

The Sunrise Course was added to the complex in April of 1995. Former Miner golfer Rich Mayo holds the current record of 62 on the Sunrise course.

Bobby Kaerwer is the pro at Underwood Golf Complex.

Vista Hills Country Club

This private course was designed by Devon Von Hogge and opened on the East side of El Paso in 1975. The 18-hole championship course is a par-72 and measures at 7,032 yards.

Vista Hills Country Club has a driving range, practice putting greens, as well as a fully-stocked pro shop for members. The club offers a formal and casual dining area along with a lounge. Another amenity that members will find on the grounds is a junior olympic swimming pool.

The general manager is Tony Dominguez and the club's golf pro is Terry Jennings. The course record is 62 held by former Miner Adrian Quintela and John Sosa.

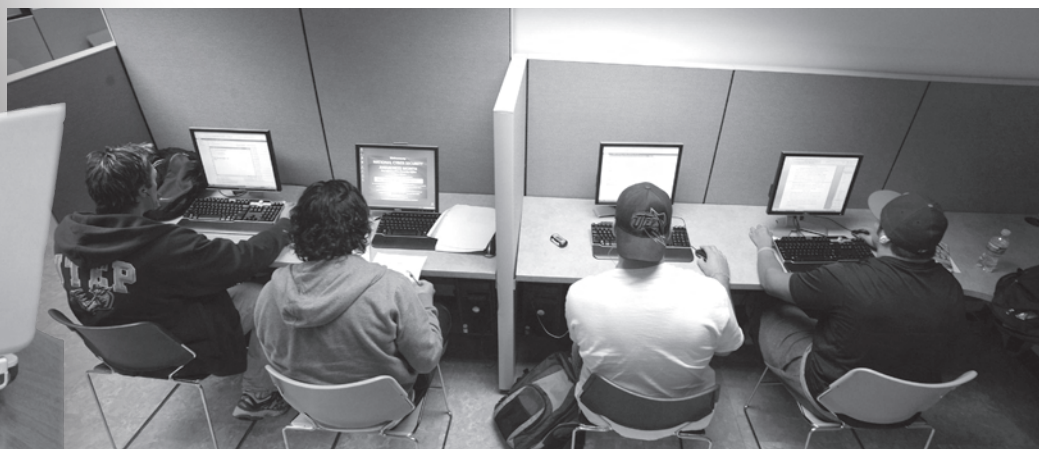
UTEP's **nationally recognized** academic programs and **innovative research** provide students a universe of opportunities.

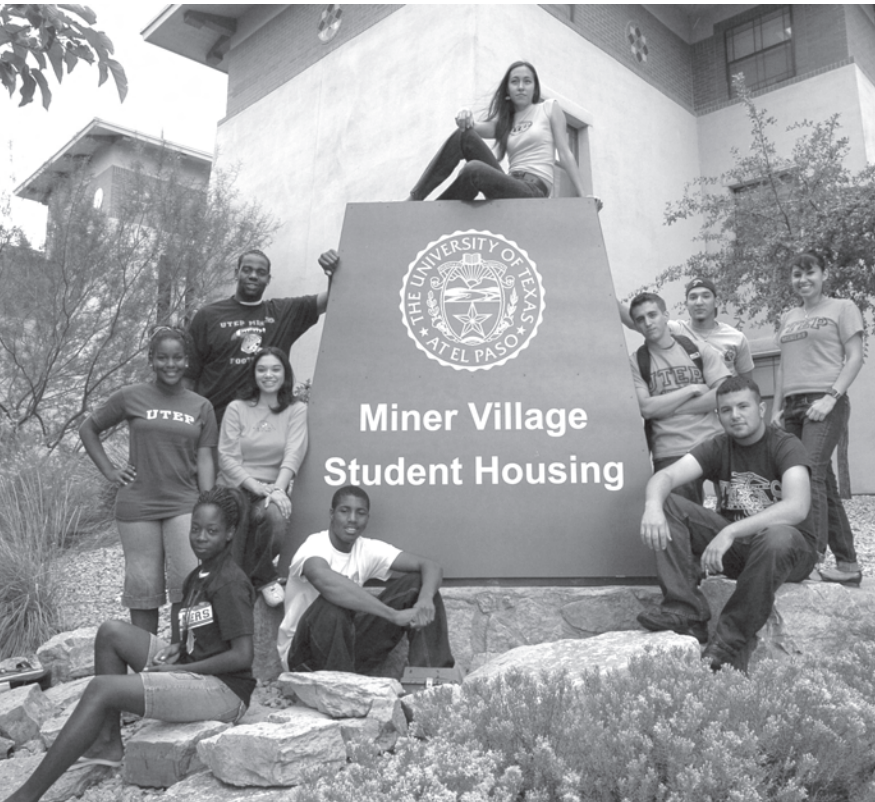

The units are within walking distance to **lectures**, labs and other activities, as well as a short distance from the **Sun Bowl** and the Don Haskins Center.

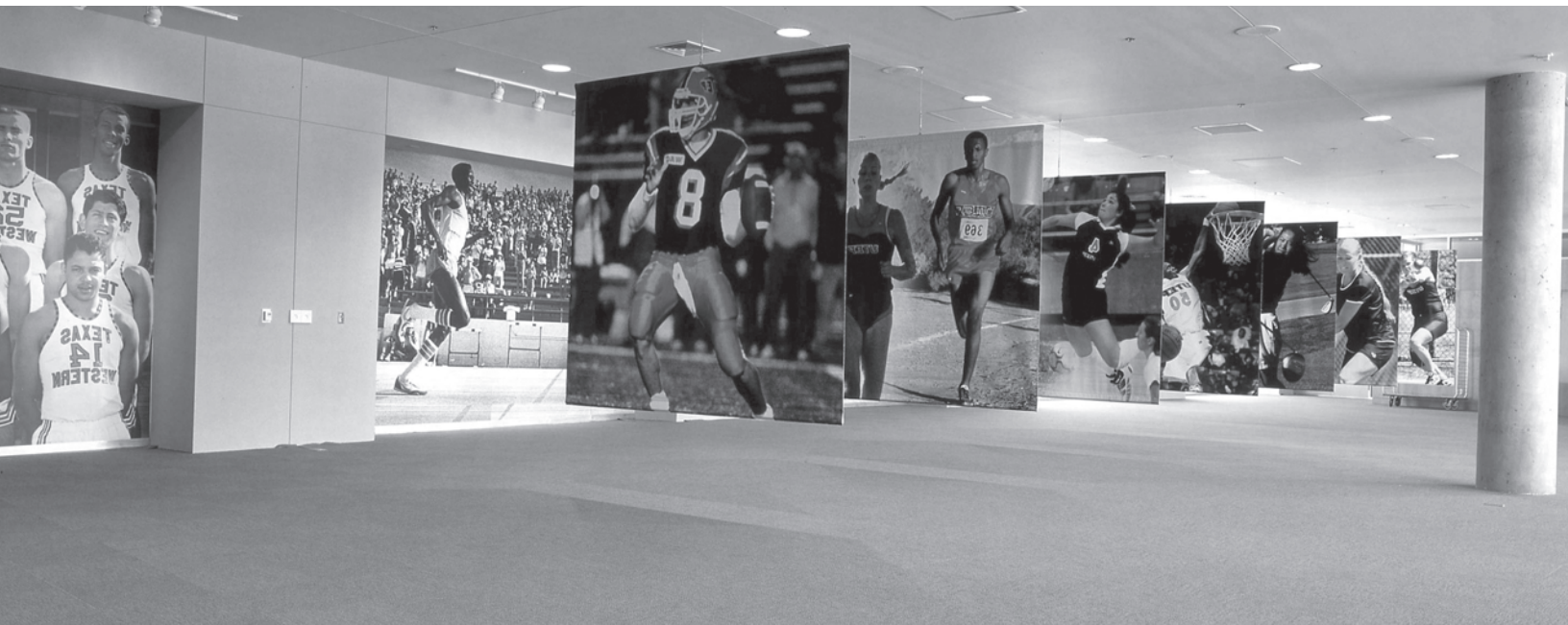

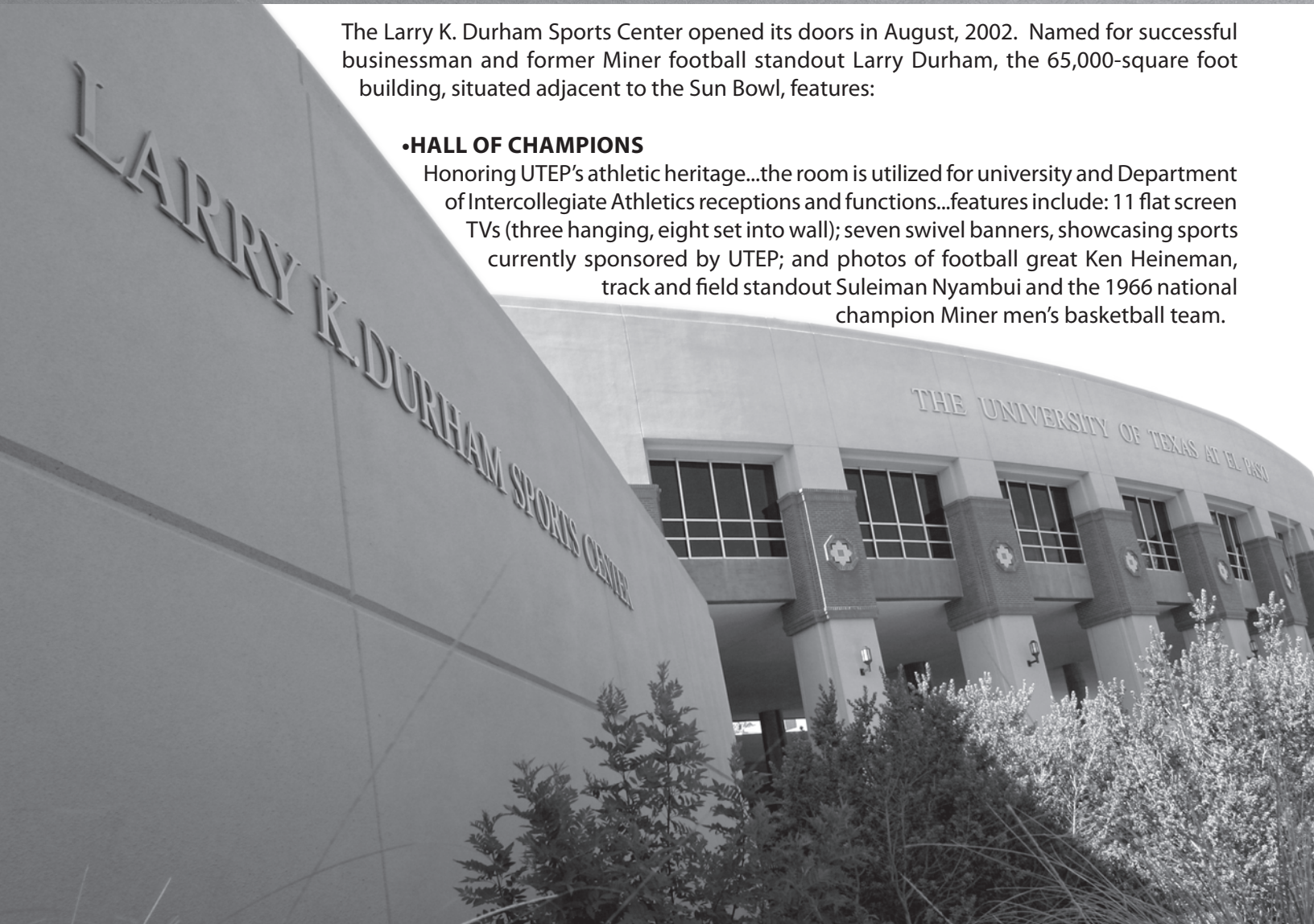
Sports Center



The Larry K. Durham Sports Center opened its doors in August, 2002. Named for successful businessman and former Miner football standout Larry Durham, the 65,000-square foot building, situated adjacent to the Sun Bowl, features:

•HALL OF CHAMPIONS

Honoring UTEP's athletic heritage...the room is utilized for university and Department of Intercollegiate Athletics receptions and functions...features include: 11 flat screen TVs (three hanging, eight set into wall); seven swivel banners, showcasing sports currently sponsored by UTEP; and photos of football great Ken Heineman, track and field standout Suleiman Nyambui and the 1966 national champion Miner men's basketball team.





•STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING CENTER

Boasts 11,420 square feet of space (old weight room was less than 5,000 square feet), and is utilized by all UTEP student-athletes...features include: open space with 22 stations for all Olympic lifting; all-new equipment; two office areas, one storage area and a juice bar.

•SPORTS MEDICINE CENTER

Encompasses 4,798 square feet of space (old training room was 2,064 square feet), and is utilized by all UTEP student-athletes... features include: taping and treatment areas; one hot and one cold whirlpool in the Hydro Therapy Center; X-ray and exam rooms.

•ATHLETE EQUIPMENT CENTER

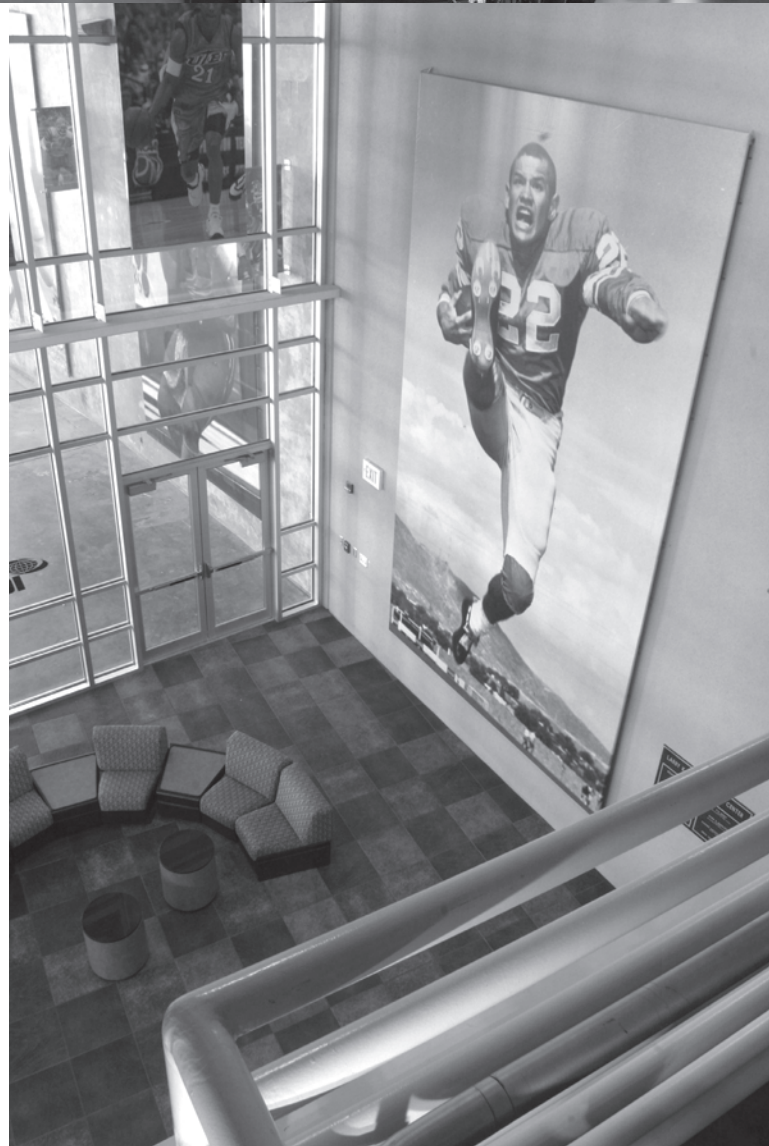
Features include: six dryers and three washers; upper space for storage, sewing machine, etc.; 160 small lockers for student-athletes to store uniforms and practice gear.

•STUDENT-ATHLETE LOUNGE AND COMPUTER CENTER

Dr. Diana Natalicio

UTEP President



Diana Natalicio was named president of UTEP in 1988. During her long and distinguished career with the university, Dr. Natalicio has served as vice president for academic affairs, dean of liberal arts, chair of the modern languages department and professor of linguistics.

Her sustained commitment to provide all residents of the Paso del Norte region access to outstanding higher education opportunities has made UTEP a national success story. Through her unwavering passion and dedication, Natalicio has led UTEP through nearly two decades of its most notable growth.

During her distinguished career as president:

- **Annual budget** has tripled to \$240 million
- **Research expenditures** have grown from less than \$5 million to \$36 million annually, ranking us among the top three academic institutions in the UT System in research spending
- **Doctoral programs** have grown from one to 14, with more in development

During Dr. Natalicio's tenure as president, UTEP's enrollment has grown to more than 20,000 students, who reflect the demographics of the Paso del Norte region from which 90 percent of them come. More than 70 percent are Mexican American, and another 10 percent commute to the campus from Ciudad Juarez, Mexico. UTEP's annual budget has tripled, from \$80 million to more than \$280 million, since 1988.

Recently, UTEP was designated as a research/doctoral-intensive university, recognized nationally for both the excellence and breadth of its academic and research programs. UTEP's externally funded research expenditures have grown from less than \$5 million to more than \$45 million per year, and doctoral programs from one to 14 during this same period. To accommodate steady growth in enrollment, academic programs and research, the university is currently managing \$264 million in facilities expansion projects in science, engineering and health sciences.

Dr. Natalicio serves on the board of trustees of the Rockefeller Foundation and the board of governors of the U.S.-Mexico Foundation for Science. She has served on the NASA Advisory Committee (NAC), and was appointed by President George H.W. Bush as a member of the Advisory Commission on Educational Excellence for Hispanic Americans.

Initially appointed to the National Science Board by President Bill Clinton in 1994, she served two six-year terms as a board member and three two-year terms as the NSB's vice chair. She also served on the board of trustees of Internet2. In addition, she is a member of the board of directors of the Sandia Corporation, Trinity Industries, the National Math and Science Initiative and the National Action Council for Minorities in Engineering.

In recognition of her success in building strong partnerships between UTEP, El Paso Community College and school districts in the Paso del Norte region, Dr. Natalicio received the Harold W. McGraw, Jr. Prize in Education in 1997.

She was inducted into the Texas Women's Hall of Fame in 1999, was honored with the Distinguished Alumnus Award at The University of Texas at Austin in 2006, and is the recipient of honorary doctoral degrees from Smith College and the Universidad Autonoma de Nuevo Leon.

A graduate of St. Louis University, Dr. Natalicio earned a master's degree in Portuguese and a doctorate in linguistics from The University of Texas at Austin.

UTEP Programs in the National Spotlight

The University of Texas at El Paso has become a national model of excellence in higher education, receiving national and international recognition and support for its academic and research programs.

- UTEP ranks fourth in the nation in awarding bachelor's degrees to Hispanics; and No. 1 in the nation in awarding bachelor's in engineering to Hispanics – Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education
- UTEP's College of Engineering is ranked the nation's No. 1 graduate engineering program for Hispanics – Hispanic Business Magazine
- UTEP received both the Rising Star Award from the National Action Council for Minorities in Engineering and the ABET Award for Diversity in 2006.
- UTEP is featured in Student Success in College: Creating Solutions that Matter, by George D. Kuh. The book looks at universities that "create a campus culture that fosters success" and identifies "diverse institutions that do an especially good job of educating students."
- UTEP is one of only 20 schools in the nation recognized for creating "a campus culture that fosters success" – National Survey of Student Engagement

Among our research grants, awards and programs:

- UTEP ranks among the top UT System and Texas academic institutions in research spending, with about \$46 million in fiscal year 2006
- UTEP is among a consortium of research groups and universities that has been awarded a \$215 million contract by the U.S. Army Research Laboratory to manage the Army's High Performance Computing Research Center.
- UTEP has been selected to house top security and defense related academic and research centers, including a Regional Geospatial Service Center, a Center for Defense Systems Research, and an Intelligence Community Center for Academic Excellence.
- The National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences awarded UTEP \$5 million to study, in partnership with the UNM Health Sciences Center, the relationship between air, soil, and household environments in asthmatic children in El Paso.
- The W.M. Keck Center for 3D Innovation, established in 2002 with a \$1 million grant from the W.M. Keck Foundation, offers biomedical modeling and tissue engineering, and rapid-prototyping services.
- UTEP received a \$169 million in-kind donation of computer-aided engineering software and equipment in spring 2005, joining an elite group of universities under the Partners for the Advancement of Collaborative Engineering Education program. PACE members include General Motors, EDS, Sun Microsystems and UGS.
- UTEP launched a new high-capacity network known as Internet2 in spring 2005, opening the door to unprecedented collaboration between numerous universities and research centers across the U.S. and Mexico.
- The Hispanic Health Disparities Research Center is an initiative in cooperation with the UT Houston Health Science Center funded through a \$4 million grant from the National Institutes of Health.
- UTEP is one of only 11 universities nationwide to receive a \$5 million Teachers for a New Era research grant from the Carnegie Corporation of New York. The grant will help UTEP become a national model for teacher education programs.
- The El Paso Collaborative for Academic Excellence, a UTEP-based coalition among higher education, public school districts and the community, is committed to increasing the academic achievement of students in this region. The Collaborative is now a national model for such partnerships.

Bob Stull

UTEP Director of Athletics



Bob Stull's initial strategic plan resulted in unprecedented growth and achievement for UTEP Athletics. Phase two of his strategic plan – which is currently being implemented – is designed to take the Miners to even greater levels of excellence.

UTEP's football coach from 1986-88, Stull took over as the school's Director of Athletics in 1998. His return has produced a myriad of accomplishments, most notably:

- The football team making three bowl appearances, including two since the arrival of former National Coach of the Year Mike Price

in 2004

- The men's basketball program reaching postseason play in four of the last five seasons, including the NCAA Tournament in 2004 and 2005

- The women's basketball team racking up 50 wins over the last two seasons, including a school-record 28-4 campaign in 2007-08 that produced a Conference USA regular season title and the school's first NCAA Tournament berth

- The women's soccer team earning its first-ever NCAA Tournament bid in 2005 and scoring a first round upset of Texas in Austin in the cross country and track and field squads capturing nine conference titles over the last five years

- The rifle program finishing eighth in the nation in smallbore in 2005

Team success, however, doesn't even begin to tell the story of the impact Stull has made at UTEP. Student-athlete graduation rates have soared since his arrival. Existing facilities have been renovated, and sparkling new buildings – once a pipe dream – have taken shape. The acquisition of major gifts has totaled \$35 million over the last five years, an all-time high.

Stull spearheaded UTEP's transition from the Western Athletic Conference – the Miners' home for over 30 years – into Conference USA. As a member of C-USA UTEP has maintained rivalries with state institutions Houston, Rice and SMU, while benefiting from increased regional and national exposure.

Stull's greatest achievement off the playing field has been widespread enhancements to UTEP's athletic facilities. The \$11 million, 65,000-square foot Larry K. Durham Sports Center opened in 2002 and features a 10,000-square foot strength and conditioning center; a sports medicine center; a student-athlete lounge and computer center; a football locker room; football coaches' offices; football positional meeting rooms; and a "Hall of Champions" which is utilized for numerous athletic department functions.

In 2005 construction was completed on the state-of-the-art, \$2.2 million Helen of Troy Softball Complex. Not only does the breathtaking facility serve as a home to UTEP's newest athletic team, but it also houses coaches' offices and locker rooms for softball and soccer.

Construction is nearly complete on the \$14.3 million, 43,000-square foot Foster Stevens Basketball Complex. The facility will feature two practice courts, strength and conditioning center, sports medicine center, academic/film room, coaches' offices, locker rooms, equipment room and lounges. The building is scheduled to open in the spring of 2009.

Renovations have also been performed on all existing facilities. These renovations include: new artificial turf, new video boards and scoreboards in the Sun Bowl (football); new floor, new video boards and scoreboards, men's and women's player and coaches' locker rooms, training room and coaches' offices in the Don Haskins Center (basketball); men's and women's locker room, lounge, lights, bleachers, video board and scorer's booth at Kidd Field (track); scoreboards and locker room in Memorial Gym (volleyball); and a complete new field including irrigation and drainage at University Field (soccer).

Stull pledged to renew El Pasoans' interest in Miner athletics when he returned to the city. His plan to increase attendance at football games included adjusting ticket prices and introducing Miner Town to attract more families to the Sun Bowl. Miner Town was created to enrich the pre-game

activity surrounding each football game, with food, games, rides and other entertainment for the entire family.

UTEP set school records for football total home attendance (287,394) and average (47,899) during the 2005 season. The Miners again led Conference USA in attendance average in 2006 (42,444). The men's basketball team has played before 18 sellout crowds of 12,000 since 2004, and women's basketball set a school record with an audience of 7,255 for the SMU game in 2008.

Under Stull's leadership, a new family of logos was introduced. The new logos were designed to produce consistent brand identity and increase product sales. Fans universally accepted the change, resulting in a 400 percent increase in sales the first year alone.

Stull has made the personal development of student-athletes a top priority as well. More than 180 student-athletes participated in community service projects this past year, totaling over 900 hours worth of service.

Stull rejoined the UTEP family after a 10-year absence. He came to El Paso from the University of Washington, where he served as associate athletic director for development for two seasons. While at Washington Stull coordinated the development and fund-raising areas for the UW Athletic Department.

Prior to joining the staff at Washington, Stull spent two years as president and CEO of the Boys and Girls Clubs of King County, Wash. The organization consisted of 11 clubs in the Seattle area serving over 200,000 children, with 300 full and part-time employees.

What Stull is best known for is his coaching exploits on the gridiron, especially as a head coach at Massachusetts, UTEP and Missouri.

At Massachusetts Stull went 3-8 in his first year, then improved to 7-4 in 1985, with the nation's second-ranked scoring defense (11.5 points per game).

Stull arrived in El Paso in 1986 and immediately produced dividends. From 1971 to 1985 UTEP football teams went through six head coaches and posted just 26 wins. In just three years with the Miners, Stull's charges won 21 games and saw postseason action for the first time since 1967.

The team was 1-10 the year prior to Stull's arrival, but he was able to forge a 4-8 record in 1986, including conference wins over Colorado State and Utah to end the season.

The next year Stull did what was once thought to be impossible – post a winning season. The 1987 Miners finished 7-4. That season UTEP enjoyed the nation's largest average attendance boost (15,265) to what was then a school-record average of 42,805 fans.

A bowl berth came in 1988, when Stull guided the Miners to a 10-2 regular-season record and a second place finish in the Western Athletic Conference – both school records. UTEP played in the Independence Bowl that year.

Stull took over Missouri's football program in December, 1988. His straightforward, collegiate demeanor resulted in a warm reception at Columbia. Attendance at Faurot Field climbed by an average of 3,000 per game, which was Missouri's first attendance increase in 10 years.

Stull was selected to coach in the 1990 Hula Bowl All-Star Game in Honolulu, Hawaii. He also was selected National Coach of the Week following the Tigers' 30-9 upset of 15th-ranked Arizona State. Probably the most-publicized game of Stull's career was the historic "fifth-down" contest against eventual national champion Colorado.

Stull began his career as the defensive coordinator at Dubuque High School in Dubuque, Iowa. He later started his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Kansas State, his alma mater.

After Kansas State Stull moved on to Kent State, where he was the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator from 1971-74.

Next came his long-running association with Washington, as Stull became the Huskies' wide receivers coach under head coach Don James in 1975. After four years of tutoring the wideouts, Stull served as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach from 1979-84. He was a part of six bowl teams and three Pac-10 championship squads at Washington. The Huskies participated in the Rose Bowl three times (1977, 1980, 1981), and beat Texas, 14-7, in the 1979 Sun Bowl in El Paso.

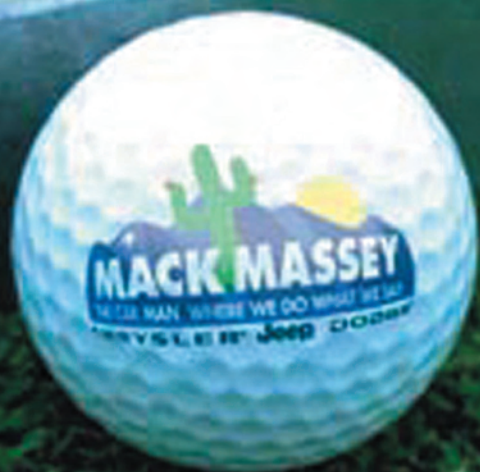
A native of Davenport, Iowa, Stull holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Kansas State, where he was a three-year letterman and captained the
