# SKYHAWK FIELD

The University of Tennessee at Martin women's soccer program has called Skyhawk Field its home since 1998. It is a 120 x 75 Bermuda pitch with a press box and permanent seating for over 500 fans along the west sideline. Fans also circle the field with trucks, lawn chairs and couches to create a festive atmosphere that is intimidating to opponents.

This summer, new colorful wind screens were also added to give the field a professional exterior look. Plans are also being made to build new brick barriers around both benches. Another new feature this year are a pair of large tents that have been placed over the two adjacent sets of bleachers that sandwich the main bleachers. This provides a comfortable, shady climate for fans of all ages to enjoy.



The first match played at Skyhawk Field, was on Sept. 4, 1998, against Ohio Valley Conference foe Tennessee Tech. Although the Skyhawks dropped a tough 1-0 decision in that match, they came roaring back for the first home win in program history on their next try - a 2-1 win over OVC opponent Morehead State on Sept. 12, 1998.

Over the years, the Skyhawks have put together a 51-44-6 record while playing in front of the home crowd. However, UT Martin has enjoyed a tremendous home-field advantage over the last several seasons. Since 2002, the Skyhawks are 46-17-7 in matches played at Skyhawk Field, having lost only three matches on their home turf in the last three seasons. In those eight dominant years, UT Martin has posted a winning home record in all but one season, while only losing twice in its last 12 conference matches.



Just last year, the Skyhawks matched the best home start to any season by beginning the year 6-0-0, and ended the season with the highest single-season home winning percentage (.857) in program history.

Skyhawk Field has also been home to the PUMA Skyhawk Invitational from 2002-2007 and 2009, as well as the first round of the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament in 1999, 2003 and 2008.

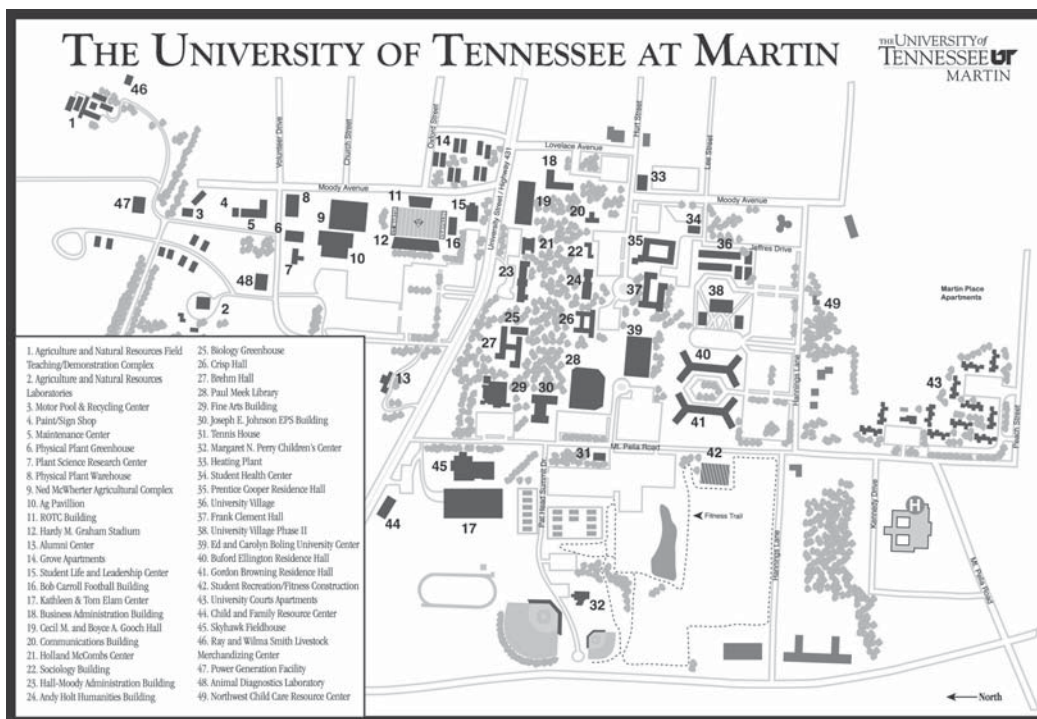

Turn right onto University Street to the intersection of Mt. Pelia road then turn onto Pat Head Summitt Drive. Skyhawk Field is located off of Pat Head Summitt Drive.

**From I-40 West (Nashville, Tenn.)**

Take Exit 108 North (Parker's Crossroads) to Highway 22. Follow Highway 22 to Martin. Exit onto Skyhawk Parkway and turn right at the first traffic light onto University Street. Make a right at the first traffic light onto Mt. Pelia Drive, then turn onto Pat Head Summitt Drive. Skyhawk Field is located off of Pat Head Summitt Drive.

**From I-40 East (Memphis, Tenn.)**

Take Exit 80-B North to Highway 45 By-pass. Follow Highway 45E (Milan Exit) to Martin. Exit onto Skyhawk Parkway and turn right at the first traffic light onto University Street. Make a right at the first traffic light onto Mt. Pelia Drive, then turn onto Pat Head Summitt Drive. Skyhawk Field is located off of Pat Head Summitt Drive.

## PRESS BOX

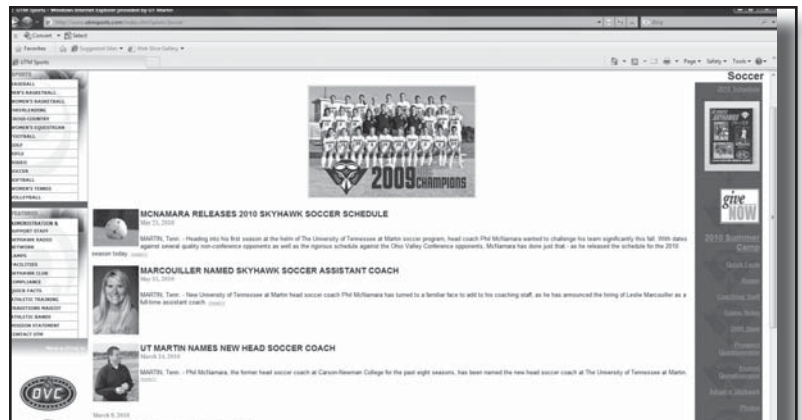

## PHIL McNAMARA

Head Coach  
 First Season  
 King College '00



Phil McNamara was named as The University of Tennessee at Martin's fourth head soccer coach on March 23, 2010.

McNamara comes to UT Martin from Carson-Newman College in Jefferson City, Tenn., where he led the Eagles to the NCAA Division II championship tournament in each of his last seven years. His teams advanced to the NCAA Final Four in back-to-back years in 2004-05 and won five regular season league titles and four South Atlantic Conference tournaments. During his eight-year tenure at Carson-Newman, he picked up the South Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year honor four times.

At Carson-Newman, McNamara's teams were consistently ranked, as his players garnered several top honors throughout his tenure. All in all, he coached 43 all-conference players, 22 all-region players, four All-SAC Tournament members, four All-SAC tournament MVP's, four All-Americans (including the first in Carson Newman history), four All-NCAA Tournament team players, three SAC Players of the Year and two SAC Freshmen of the Year. In addition to coaching the program's

first-ever national All-American, he also guided the Eagles to the program's first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance and NCAA Tournament victories. Four players also earned national or regional academic All-American awards under his watch.

McNamara's 2009 Carson-Newman team was the best in school history, as they set a single-season record for most wins (20). They finished ranked seventh in the nation after winning their third NCAA Southeast Regional title under his guidance.

In his career, McNamara has sported an overall record of 146-43-7 won-loss-tie worksheet. He also has won 11 games or more every year for the past eight years at Carson-Newman, a tremendous feat considering the Eagles had never won more than 11 games in any one season in its first 11 years of playing soccer prior to McNamara's hiring.

Before Carson-Newman, McNamara served two seasons at Virginia Intermont in Bristol, Va.. He posted a 17-12 record and he led the team to both conference and regional championships. He was named conference and regional coach of the year. He spent the 2001 season as head coach of both the men's and women's programs. The men were ranked 18th in the nation.

McNamara also served as an assistant coach for both the men's and women's programs at his alma mater, King College in Bristol, Tenn.

McNamara has three European coaching licenses and has served as a youth coach for the Irish Football Association (IFA) in Belfast, Northern Ireland. As a player, he was a YTS trainee with Ashton Villa FC in England for two years, and spent one season with the Carrickfergus Rangers FC in the Irish First Division. He was member of the Cliftonville FC in the Irish Premier League for four years before ending his playing career in the United States, spending one season playing indoor soccer with the Huntsville Fire of the Premier League and two years with the Roanoke Wraft of the PDL D-2 League.

McNamara is married to the former Jacqueline Logue of Belfast, Northern Ireland, and has two children, Halina (7) and Anthony (4).

## LESLIE MARCOUILLER

New University of Tennessee at Martin head soccer coach Phil McNamara has turned to a familiar face to add to his coaching staff, as he has announced the hiring of Leslie Marcouiller as a full-time assistant coach.

Marcouiller has spent the last three seasons as an assistant coach to McNamara at Carson-Newman, helping the Eagles to a 40-14-2 record (including a school-record 20 wins in 2009), three consecutive NCAA Division-II Tournament appearances and two South Atlantic Conference regular-season and tournament titles. At Carson-Newman, she was responsible for the organization of practices, ongoing recruitment, workouts, administrative duties such as travel and scheduling, player development and team preparation, among other things.

"I am absolutely thrilled Leslie came with me here to UT Martin," McNamara said. "She's a very good recruiter and she has a great eye for talent. More than anything, being an assistant coach at Carson-Newman gave her a good head start with regards to helping the players understand their

roles."

Not only did Marcouiller coach with McNamara at Carson-Newman, she also finished out her collegiate playing career for him from 2004 through 2006 before graduating with a bachelor's degree in applied psychology in 2007. In those three seasons, she led the team to a 53-10-3 record, including an 18-3 conference slate. A forward and outside midfielder, she led the team to back-to-back NCAA Division-II Tournament Final Fours, as well as two regular-season SAC titles and two SAC Tournament titles. Perhaps the most impressive feat is that as a player, she was part of the three most winningest seasons in Carson-Newman history at that point in time, including a then-school-record 19 wins in 2004.

Before playing at Carson-Newman, Marcouiller spent two seasons playing in Conference-USA for head coach Paul Harbin at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. As a true freshman, she logged 203 minutes and scored her first career point on an assist against Jackson State on Oct. 25, 2002. The next season, she saw limited action because of an injury. In her two years at UAB, the Blazers went 22-14-2 with a 13-7 league record.

A Marietta, Ga. native, Marcouiller was a four-year letterwinner at Sprayberry High School, where she was an all-star selection in the state of Georgia. She scored 56 goals - including a team-high 21 her junior season - in her career and led the Yellow Jackets to a state 5A quarterfinalist berth in 2001, as well as a 6AAAA Sub-Region championship and pair of 6AAAA Sub-Region runner-up appearances.

For Marcouiller, the opportunity to continue learning under McNamara at UT Martin was just too good to pass up.

"It's real exciting to officially be on board," Marcouiller said. "This is my first full-time assistant coaching job and I can't wait to bring a lot more to the table."

The fact that Marcouiller was a former player and staff member under McNamara was an attractive choice he factored in when building upon his first staff at UT Martin.

"Being a former player of mine, Leslie has good insight as to what the girls will experience under my guidance," McNamara said. "She is very qualified as a former Division-I player and that gives us an edge with her knowledge and experience required to be successful at the Division-I level."

Marcouiller has hit the ground running, and expects big things out of the Skyhawks this coming fall.

"The roster here is full with great players and there are so many exciting things going on here at UT Martin," Marcouiller said. "Just in my short time here the players have made great strides and I've really been impressed with their level of play."

Ryne Rickman begins his third year in the UT Martin sports information office. At UT Martin, Rickman is the media contact for soccer, men's basketball, baseball, women's tennis, rifle, and cross country teams. Rickman also serves as official statistician at most Skyhawk home events, produces media guides, game day programs, press releases, and serves as a media host and coordinating event operations.

While at UT Martin, Rickman has taken part in several other sports information ventures. He served as the official statistician at the 2010 Ohio Valley Conference men's and women's basketball tournament in Nashville, where he was solely responsible for all stats from the two-day, six-game semifinals and championship games. The previous year, he was a media relations assistant at the NCAA men's basketball South Regional tournament in Memphis, arranging press conferences and post-game interviews in the Sweet 16/Elite 8 rounds. He also served as official scorer of the 2008 Major/60 12 Year Old Cal Ripken World Series in Martin from Aug. 7-14, 2008, overseeing the four-day, 10-team national Babe Ruth Little League tournament.

A native of Benton, Ky., Rickman came to UT Martin from Murray State, where he graduated with a degree in journalism and a minor in recreation in May 2008. He worked part-time as a student worker in the Athletics Media Relations office for four years and was the media contact for track and field and cross country, and also the head researcher for football and basketball media guides. He was a co-contributor to Murray State's 2007 football media guide, which was named by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) as the Best in the Nation for Football Bowl Subdivision universities.

# 2010 SEASON PREVIEW

## MCNAMARA ENTERS HIS FIRST SEASON AT THE HELM LOOKING TO LEAD THE SKYHAWKS TO AN OVC CHAMPIONSHIP REPEAT

Fresh off winning their first Ohio Valley Conference title in program history, The University of Tennessee at Martin soccer team has been chosen third in the OVC preseason polls, as voted on by the league's head coaches and sports information directors.

The Skyhawks, who return 10 letterwinners and six starters from last season's championship squad, received 86 points and two of the possible 18 first-place votes. Murray State - the defending OVC Tournament champions - led the way by receiving seven first-place votes and 117 points, while Morehead State, who the Skyhawks split a share of the regular-season title with, trailed closely behind with nine first-place votes and 116 points.

"I think third place is extremely fair given the fact we won the regular season championship last year and lost in the tournament semifinals," UT Martin first-year head coach Phil McNamara said. "It's flattering that we got two first-place votes considering we have a new coaching staff that came in late and we are facing quite a bit of transition."

Tennessee Tech (77 points), Eastern Kentucky (74), Eastern Illinois (70), Southeast Missouri (60), Jacksonville State (32) and Austin Peay (16) rounded out the preseason standings.

After reaching the OVC Tournament finals in 2008 for the first time ever, the Skyhawks built off that and brought home their first regular-season title in its 12th year of existence in 2009.

Nine months after the team's early semifinal exit from the OVC Tournament, UT Martin has turned to McNamara, who has spent the last eight seasons coaching across the state at Carson-Newman. He reached double-digit wins in every season at Carson-Newman, including a school-record 20 wins in 2009. All in all, his Carson-Newman teams won five regular-season conference titles and four league tournament titles during his tenure.

In order to keep the ball rolling at UT Martin, McNamara and assistant coach Leslie Marcouiller have hit the ground running on the recruiting trail since late March, when McNamara was named the fourth head coach in Skyhawk history.

The coaching staff will finally see all the pieces come together this Thursday, Aug. 5, when the team begins its preseason fall practice. A total of 11 newcomers join a solid nucleus

that will hopefully offer a repeat performance from the previous two seasons, in which the team has broken 20 school records and perched themselves atop of the OVC.

"We are extremely excited about this group of girls," McNamara said. "We know that in order to be successful in the near future we have to come together and become a team. We are inexperienced in some areas but we are hoping our talent will prevail."

With an attacking style of coaching, McNamara hopes the Skyhawks will be able to light up the scoreboard this fall. Judging by a talented pool of forwards, that just might be the case. Sophomore Kendyl Wilson, who was a 2009 All-OVC second teamer and All-OVC Newcomer as a true freshman, returns after leading the team in scoring. Showing a true nose for the ball, three of Wilson's four goals were game-winners in 2009, including the lone goal in the OVC championship-clinching win over Eastern Illinois last Halloween.

Also returning are juniors Katie Imperiale and Tori Taylor, as well as sophomore Emily Crye. Imperiale has found the back of the net five times in her first two seasons in a Skyhawk, including four game-winners. Taylor was hampered by an injury for most of last season, but when she saw the field she was very effective - as evidenced by her spot on the PUMA Skyhawk Invitational All-Tournament team. Crye, who was a walk-on last season, brought energy off the bench for UT Martin last year, and her relentless hustle earned her the "Most Improved Player" award from her teammates at last season's postseason banquet.

Joining those four are a trio of newcomers that pack some scoring punch in junior Rosaelia Loza and freshmen Abi Sanvee and Bettina Baer. Loza enters the UT Martin program from Louisburg College in Louisburg, NC, where she scored a spectacular 48 goals and tallied 14 assists in just two seasons. Sanvee, from Evangelical Christian School in Bartlett, was a two-time finalist for the Memphis Commercial Appeal's "Best of the Preps" award and was one of the best offensive players in the state - scoring 24 goals and adding 12 assists last year. Baer comes from the prestigious K+S Raemibuehl prep school in Switzerland, where she helped her team win back-to-back Swiss championships in 2008-09.

"This is probably the deepest we have

ever been at the forward slot at UT Martin," McNamara said. "We are going to be very strong and powerful at this position and we have the capability of playing numerous different formations, rotating all six forwards on the roster. We hope this area sets ourselves apart from a lot of other teams."

The largest amount of players at one position for the Skyhawks in 2010 is midfield, where nine players are listed. Heading that group will be junior Brooke Robertson, who last season became just the ninth player in UT Martin history to earn All-OVC first team honors. Robertson has scored seven goals - six of which have been game-winners - in her brief Skyhawk career and carries a career shot-on-goal percentage of .472 heading into this fall.

Upperclassmen Jenni Duffy, Melissa Govea and Marissa Wood-Sternburgh also return to the Skyhawks in 2010. Duffy started all 16 matches and led the team in shots on goal last season and ranks fifth on the all-time career

assists list at UT Martin with eight. Govea has led the team in shots in each of the last two seasons, accumulating 13 points on five goals and three assists. Wood-Sternburgh had a successful comeback season after suffering an injury in 2008, and she seems poised to make a contribution in 2010.

Five midfielders also join this year's squad in junior Michaela Gooden and freshmen Hannah McGowen, Hannah Fessenden, Mary Thompson, Sam Dunn. Gooden was a teammate of Loza at Louisburg College and was a National Junior College Athletic Association Honorable Mention All-American after scoring 18 goals and 17 assists over the last two seasons.

McGowen was an all-state performer at Riverdale High School in Murfreesboro, scoring 86 goals with 73 assists in her spectacular four-year career. Fessenden and Thompson were high school teammates at Knoxville Christian Academy, where they led the Warriors to three state championships in four years (2006, 2008, 2009). Dunn was a four-year starter at Churchville-Chili High School in New York and brings lots of international experience, as she was selected as the first alternate to the Olympic Development National Camp in 2007.

"We are loaded numbers-wise at midfield," McNamara said. "This gives us a lot of flexibility and depth, which allows us to take advantage of our opponents because of our ability to rotate talent in those areas."

What has been such a strong point for the Skyhawks in past seasons has been the defense, which has been nationally ranked in portions of each of the last two years. However, with just three defenders on the roster heading into

the 2010 season, UT Martin will rely heavily on senior Stephanie Nilica. Nilica is a three-year letterwinner for the Skyhawks who has appeared in 47 matches in her career, starting in all but four.

Nilica, who was named the OVC Defensive Player of the Week for the week of Oct. 13 last season, will be joined by junior Kim Boldt and freshman Morgan Brandon. Boldt has played in 10 contests in the last two seasons but appears ready to contribute, while Brandon joins the Skyhawk program from prestigious Farragut High School in Knoxville, where she was a two-time all-district and all-region selection.

"It is very clear looking at the roster that we are heavy loaded in the other areas," McNamara said. "With only one player returning from the starting defensive unit from last year, we will need to be very smart with the defense early in the process. Our extra midfielders will help us cover during the course of the season."

Heading into the fall, McNamara says the starting job at goalkeeper is up for grabs amongst two newcomers to the squad in junior Lauren MacKenzie and freshman Elise Applegate. MacKenzie has allowed an 0.95 Goals Against Average and posted 15 shutouts in the last two seasons under McNamara at Carson-Newman, while Applegate was dominant at Saint Dominic Regional High School in Auburn, Maine, leading her team to the 2009 Maine Mountain Valley Conference championship by posting 10 shutouts in 17 matches.

"We are excited about the strength of our goalkeepers," McNamara said. "We have the perfect setup in a junior and a freshman so we will be really strong the next four years there given the fact that both players are equally as good as the other. It is going to be a challenge early for the starting position."

The Skyhawks play a non-conference schedule that includes teams from six other leagues, and two independent schools.

"I think the players and staff are very excited about our schedule," McNamara said. "With that said, they are excited with a feeling of fear and respect for the quality that we will compete against. This is without question the strongest schedule in the history of our program."

UT Martin will open its 2010 slate with an Aug. 20 home date against the

Mississippi State Bulldogs of the Southeastern Conference. The Bulldogs went 9-8-2 last season and will be the third SEC opponent to ever visit Skyhawk Field and first since Alabama in 2002 (Ole Miss also came to Martin in 1998).

After the home opener, the Skyhawks hit the road for five matches, beginning with a trip to Jonesboro, Ark. to take on the Arkansas State Red Wolves of the Sun Belt Conference on Aug. 22. Five days later, UT Martin will take in-state rival and Atlantic Sun Conference member Lipscomb before traveling to Springfield, Mo. to take on Missouri State, who finished in second place in the Missouri Valley Conference with a 9-6-3 overall record in 2009.

The beginning of September is highlighted by a trip to the Golden State, as the Skyhawks will play its third and fourth games in program history in California. The Skyhawks will take on independent Cal State-Bakersfield on Friday, Sept. 3 before traveling to Los Angeles for a showdown with Loyola-Marymount, who went 11-6-2 while competing in the West Coast Conference last season.

After three weeks on the road, UT Martin finally will return to Skyhawk Field on Sept. 10 when it takes on the Evansville Purple Aces of the MVC. Two days later, the Skyhawks will take on IPFW of the Summit League at home.

UT Martin hits the road again for three matches in one week, traveling to future OVC opponent SIU Edwardsville on Sept. 19. The Skyhawks then open conference play with a pair of road dates at regular-season co-champion Morehead State and Eastern Kentucky.

The Skyhawks then have a crucial stretch where they play four of five matches at home from Oct. 1 through Oct. 17, as they host Austin Peay, Jacksonville State, Tennessee Tech and defending OVC Tournament champion Murray State. Sandwiched between Tennessee Tech and Murray State is a match at Arkansas-Pine Bluff, the defending Southwestern Athletic Conference champions who went 12-7-4 in 2009.

To close out the regular season, UT Martin will travel to Eastern Illinois on Oct. 22 and Southeast Missouri on Oct. 24 before the new OVC Tournament format takes place on Nov. 4-7. This season will be the first time that all tournament matches will be featured at the regular-season champion's site, as previously two quarterfinal matches were played at the highest-seed before the semifinals were held at the host site.

"We plan on going into the season knowing the schedule is very difficult," McNamara said. "It's a fresh start with the new coaching staff and we will need to come together quickly in order to be successful. We will be young but hopefully extremely motivated to work hard, improve and compete in preparation for our conference schedule."

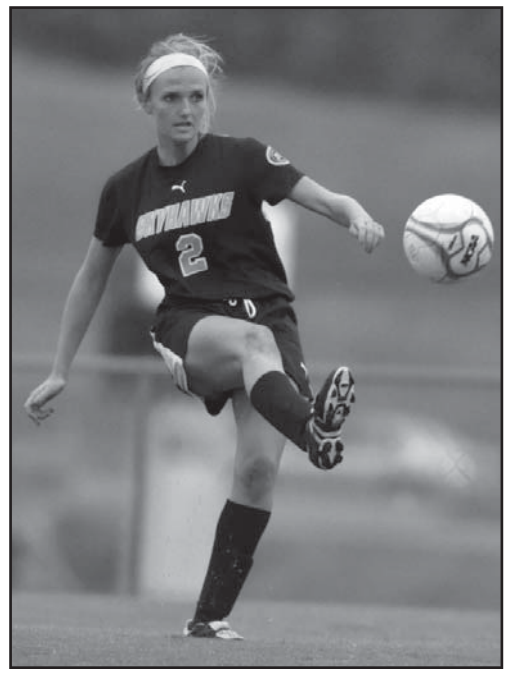

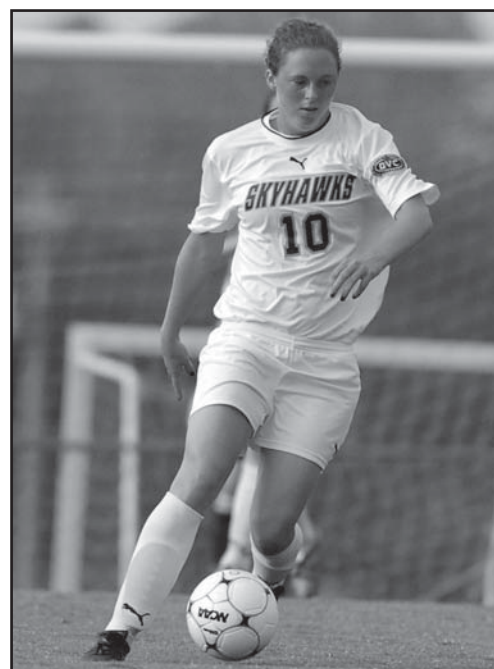

# 2009 SEASON RECAP

## SKYHAWKS SOAR TO NEW HEIGHTS BY BRINGING HOME PROGRAM'S FIRST-EVER OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE TITLE

One of the goals set forth by any collegiate soccer team before the season begins is to capture a conference championship. For The University of Tennessee at Martin soccer team, that was simply one of the goals the Skyhawks checked off their list in 2009.

With a 1-0 win against Eastern Illinois on Halloween, the Skyhawks celebrated their first-ever Ohio Valley Conference championship – culminating a remarkable final season in head coach Craig Roberts' tenure.

When Roberts took the helm of the UT Martin soccer program just weeks before the 2006 season, he was taking over a team that was coming off an eighth-place finish in the OVC. Roberts led that team to an OVC Tournament appearance. With that first year under his belt, he set the foundation for UT Martin to emerge as one of the top teams in the OVC ever since.

The next season, the Skyhawks won their first-ever OVC Tournament match, advancing to the OVC semifinals for the first time in program history. Along the way, UT Martin also set a new program benchmark for wins in a season, winning 10 matches.

In 2008, the Skyhawks were just as good, matching the school-record 10 wins they had set the previous season. Not losing back-to-back matches all season, the Skyhawks came together as a unit and reached the OVC Tournament championship match for the first time in program history.

The gradual improvement shown by the Skyhawk soccer program

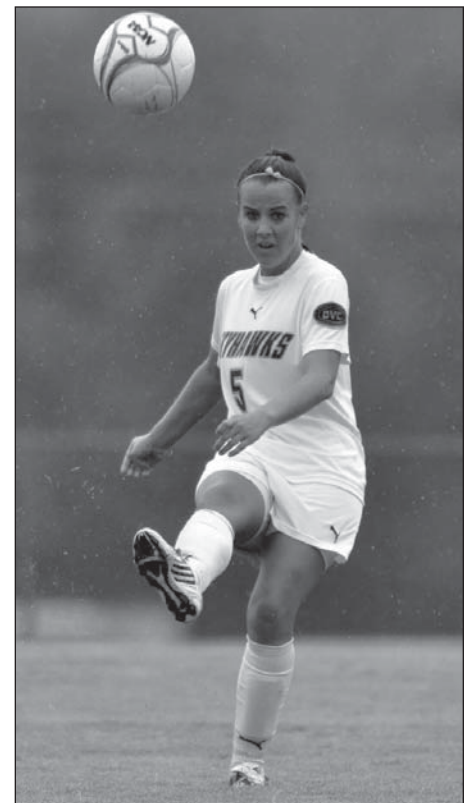
paved the way for another first in the 12-year history of UT Martin soccer in 2009 – a conference title.

After being chosen second in the OVC preseason polls – the highest they had ever been picked – the Skyhawks peaked around midseason and entered the OVC Tournament winning six of its last seven matches. The Skyhawks broke or tied eight school records, including conference wins (six), winning percentage in conference matches (.750) and longest single-season home winning streak (six).

UT Martin also matched the best home start to any season by beginning the year 6-0-0, and ended the season with the highest single-season home winning percentage (.857). The Skyhawks ranked as high as No. 20 in the NCAA Division-I statistical rankings in Goals Against Average, and had six players earn four All-OVC mentions, with two first-team honorees (Danielle Rogers, Brooke Robertson), one second team mention (Kendyl Wilson) and two All-OVC Newcomers (Wilson and Aubrey Buehler). The Skyhawks also boasted two players on the OVC All-Tournament team in seniors Sophie Cox and Nuala Deans.

One of the six all-conference performers – Rogers – earned the program's first-ever OVC Defensive Player of the Year award and became just the second player in program history to become a two-time All-OVC first-team honoree.

Proving the balance and depth of the team, the Skyhawks also tied

a program record with five OVC Players of the Week in 2009, matching the total from 2008. All in all, 16 of the 25 UT Martin players who have been named OVC Player of the Week have come under Roberts.

While the Skyhawks have gotten the job done on the pitch – they have broken or tied 34 school records in the last four seasons – they also have not slouched in the classroom, consistently



ranking amongst the top of the OVC. After averaging 9.3 players on the OVC Commissioner's Honor Roll per year through the program's first eight years, the Skyhawks have placed 41 players on the list in the last three years, for an average of 13.7 players per year. Included in that list are three players who earned an OVC Medal of Honor for their 4.0 Grade Point Average.

Winning 29 matches over the last three seasons – the same amount the program produced in its first seven years of existence – the Skyhawks relied on their trademark defense in 2009. On Sept. 11, the UT Martin defense held Missouri-Kansas City without a single shot attempt – the first time in program history that had happened. For the season, the Skyhawk defense allowed only 13 goals in 16 matches, which was just one shy of the all-time program low for goals allowed in a single-season, and collected eight shutouts, which tied a school record.

The offense also took care of its part in 2009, as 13 different players scored

at least one goal and 16 different players accumulated at least one point. For the season, the Skyhawks outshot their opponents by a 211-129 margin, averaging 13.2 shots per match.

At the team's annual postseason banquet, the season awards – as voted on by the players – were announced.

Rogers earned Team Most Valuable Player, Wilson was named Newcomer of the Year and Midfielder of the Year, Melissa Govea was named Offensive Player of the Year, Cox was named Defensive Player of the Year, and Emily Crye was named Most Improved Player.

Off the pitch, even more history was made after the season was over. Senior

midfielder Jamie Furstenberg became the first Skyhawk soccer player to be named as an OVC Scholar-Athlete, which is given annually to six student-athletes and is the highest individual honor an OVC student-athlete can receive. The Traverse City, Mich. native sported a 3.97 Grade Point Average.

Even more academic awards were in store in the weeks following the season. As a team, the Skyhawks were recognized by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA), receiving the Team Academic Award. Another trio of individual Skyhawks were also recognized by the NSCAA - as seniors Cox and Deans, as well as junior Jenni Duffy were named as NSCAA Scholar All-South Region Honorable Mention Academic All-Americans. The Skyhawks also had 10 representatives on the OVC Commissioner's Honor Roll, which marked the fifth consecutive season that UT Martin soccer had produced double-digit honorees in that category.

**MARTIN** - The 12th season of intercollegiate soccer at The University of Tennessee at Martin started off with a bang, as the Skyhawks struck for a goal in the first minute in a 2-0 victory over Lipscomb of the Atlantic Sun Conference at Skyhawk Field.

Just 60 seconds into the match, Jenni Duffy dribbled through traffic around the left side and sent a cross towards freshman Kendyl Wilson, who scooted a shot past the diving Lipscomb goalkeeper Erin Zerio to put UT Martin ahead 1-0.

Wilson's goal was the third-quickest goal to start a match in program history - as Kendal Keim scored a goal in the first 17 seconds of a 2-1 home win against Arkansas State on Sept. 12, 2004, and Ginger Parson scored off an assist from Dani Myrick in the first 36 seconds in a 10-1 home win over Morehead State on Oct. 11, 2002.

Over 71 minutes later, freshman Amy Iwanicki stayed persistent and found a wide-open net for a goal at the 72:29 mark to provide the final 2-0 score. Seconds earlier, Iwanicki - who attempted a game-high five shots off the bench in 32 minutes - fired a hard shot from point-blank range right at Lipscomb goalkeeper Ally Marler, who deflected the ball behind her. The Calgary, Alberta, Canada native then retrieved the ball and put the ball in the back of the net from five yards out.

Six other Skyhawks attempted one shot apiece, and the nationally-ranked defense from 2008 stayed true to form, allowing only four shot attempts, with one on goal. Freshman Aubrey Buehler collected one save in all 90 minutes in goal for her first collegiate victory.

UT Martin improved to 5-7 all-time in season-openers, and 6-5-1 all-time in home openers. The victory also extended the Skyhawks' win streak over Lipscomb at five, with four consecutive shutouts over the Lady Bisons.

The Skyhawks came out aggressive to begin the match, attacking the goal and outshooting the Bruins 6-3 through the game's first stanza. UT Martin looked to take an early lead in the 30th minute. A little over 11 minutes later, Trocino scored again, on a goal off a one-on-one situation to give the Bruins a 2-0 lead with 30:05 left to play.

Freshman Jordan Warnement hooked a shot from the right side that sent Lin diving, striking the right post before caroming right back to her. Warnement then whipped a quick pass to the middle to set up Jenni Duffy, who was there for her first career goal at the top of the box to make the score 2-1.

However, a Florida Gulf Coast goal with just 55 seconds left in regulation led to a heartbreaking loss for the Skyhawks in the program's first-ever match played in the Sunshine State.

**MARTIN** - After playing three consecutive matches on the road since its Aug. 28 home-opener, The University of Tennessee at Martin Skyhawks soccer team returned to Skyhawk Field and delighted the home fans, defeating the Missouri-Kansas City Kangaroos 3-0 in the nightcap of the first day of the PUMA Skyhawk Invitational. The win was the eighth straight for UT Martin in the PUMA Skyhawk Invitational, now in its seventh year.

The UT Martin offense doubled its season total today, while outshooting the Kangaroos by a 24-0 margin, marking the lowest shot total by any Skyhawk opponent in program history. The defensive showing was just another bookmark for a defense that has been amongst the best in the Ohio Valley Conference since the hiring of head coach Craig Roberts in 2006. The match was just the sixth time the Skyhawks had held its opponent to two or less shots, four of which have come under Roberts' watch.

Stephanie Nilica got the Skyhawks on the scoreboard in the fourth minute, after a UMKC foul in the box set up a penalty kick for the junior from St. Louis, Mo. Nilica's PK was successful, putting UT Martin up 1-0 at the 3:08 mark.

The Skyhawks struck again in the 19th minute, when Katie Imperiale took a perfect cross from Melissa Govea and found the back of the net at the 18:39 mark, leading to a 2-0 halftime advantage for UT Martin.

Sophomore Tori Taylor completed the scoring for the Skyhawks, beating the clock with a breakaway goal off a one-on-one situation with UMKC goalkeeper Jami Finnell, with just five seconds remaining in the match.

**JACKSONVILLE, Ala.** - The offense for The University of Tennessee at Martin soccer team has shown flashes in 2009, routinely outshooting its opponents. The Skyhawks converted a clutch opportunity off a free kick in the 81st minute, and the stingy defense remained constant in a 1-0 win at Jacksonville State.

Freshman goalkeeper Aubrey Buehler was relentless in goal, earning her second career shutout while making five saves, including four in the second half.

The lone goal of the day belonged to sophomore midfielder Brooke Robertson. Junior defensive midfielder Jenni Duffy took a free kick from about 25 yards out and the ball found Robertson, who rose above the crowd for a header to put UT Martin up 1-0.

UT Martin showed a balanced offensive attack in today's match, attempting 10 shots in the first half and 11 in the second, outshooting the Gamecocks 21 to 10. But the real story was the Skyhawk defense, who held Jacksonville State scoreless, a tough feat considering the Gamecocks entered the contest averaging 3.0 goals per match.

The Skyhawks attempted the first five and 10 of the game's first 11 shots, as Jacksonville State didn't attempt its second shot until the 44th minute.

The second half features superb goalkeeper play from both sides. UT Martin attempted the first two shots of the half, but Jacksonville State goalkeeper Alli Koenig was there for saves on both shots. The Gamecocks then attempted two shots in a span of 2:13, but Buehler matched Koenig's effort with a pair of saves of her own.

A total of four more UT Martin shots on goal over the next 29 minutes resulted in four more saves for Koenig, before the Skyhawks finally broke through on Robertson's goal at the 80:32 mark. From that point on, it was all Buehler - who displayed her toughness by making tough saves in the 82nd and 87th minutes to ensure the win.

**MARTIN** - On a chilly, wet afternoon at Skyhawk Field, The University of Tennessee at Martin offense caught fire in the first half of play - scoring two goals in the first stanza - and the defense held its ground in a 2-0 Ohio Valley Conference victory over Murray State.

While light, steady rain continued to come down throughout the match, neither team could get much offense going through the first 10 minutes. UT Martin almost had the first goal on the first shot attempt of the match, as Kendyl Wilson drew Murray State goalkeeper Katie Walsh out in front of the box. Wilson then fired a low shot that curved wide at the last instant.

The Skyhawks got on the scoreboard at the 19:33 mark off a corner kick. With the ball lofted towards the middle of the box, Danielle Rogers tapped a pass that found Robertson, who snuck the ball past Walsh from around seven yards out. The goal was the second game-winning goal in as many weeks for Robertson, and sixth of her career.

The Racers then attempted three of the match's next four shots, before UT Martin defensive midfielder Jenni Duffy had a good look at the goal but her shot hooked wide in the 34th minute.

Duffy would get a chance to redeem herself a little over 10 minutes later. After making a quick move to create separation from a Murray State defender, Duffy lofted a high-arching shot from 30 yards straight out that landed just past of the reach of Walsh to give the Skyhawks a 2-0 advantage at the 43:53 mark.

From that point forward, freshman goalkeeper Aubrey Buehler and the Skyhawk defense took over, as Buehler made all three of her saves over the last 45 minutes of play. The strong defensive effort led to the team's fifth shutout of the 2009 season.

**MARTIN** - A goal off a free kick from junior defender Stephanie Nilica from around 35 yards out in the 82nd minute capped off an outstanding offensive effort by The University of Tennessee at Martin in its 2-1 win over Southeast Missouri.

Nilica's goal was the last shot attempt of the day for the Skyhawks, as they out-shot Southeast Missouri by a 15-4 margin, including an 11-1 advantage in the second half.

Sophomore Brooke Robertson scored a goal in her third consecutive match, getting the Skyhawks on the scoreboard early in the first half. Robertson received a cross from Melissa Govea from the left side and released a quick shot from about 20 yards out that landed past the reach of Southeast Missouri goalkeeper Kristen Starkey at the 6:17 mark.

Southeast Missouri quickly answered with a goal of its own, as Ashley Runion took a long pass from Courtney Luehmann on a one-on-one situation against UT Martin goalkeeper Aubrey Buehler. Runion waited until Buehler was slightly drawn forward before tapping a shot that found the back left of the net in the 19th minute.

UT Martin headed into halftime with a 4-3 shot advantage, but the offense came out determined by consistently attacking the goal in the match's last 45 minutes. Three different Skyhawks each put a shot on goal in the first seven minutes of the half, setting the tone for UT Martin. Senior Sophie Cox then attempted three shots of her own over the next five minutes, making Starkey work for every save.

The Skyhawks' 11th shot of the half was the eventual game-winner, as a Southeast Missouri foul set up a Skyhawk free kick from the right side. Nilica unleashed a high, forceful kick from around 35 yards out that was at the perfect height to sneak past Starkey, giving Nilica her second goal in 2009.

**MARTIN** - Freshman Kendyl Wilson netted goals in the second and 36th minutes to lead The University of Tennessee at Martin to its fourth consecutive victory, as the Skyhawks shut out Eastern Kentucky 2-0 at Skyhawk Field.

The win matches a program-best home win streak, as the Skyhawks have won its first six contests at Skyhawk Field in 2009. UT Martin also won its first six home matches in 2005.

The victory also places the Skyhawks atop the OVC standings with 12 points, as Tennessee Tech (11 points) tied Eastern Illinois on the road today, 2-2.

Wilson, who scored UT Martin's first goal of the season exactly at the 1:00 mark in the season-opening 2-0 win over Lipscomb on Aug. 28, once again showed her nose for the ball early.

Just 83 seconds into the match, the Colliervillanative took a pass from Kelly Ann Hutchinson and drew Eastern Kentucky's goalkeeper Stephanie Lynch slightly out of the box. Wilson then established position and sent a hard hooking shot from the left side that found the back of the net, setting the tone for the Skyhawk offense.

Almost exactly 34 minutes later, Wilson struck again - this time from point blank range on the right side off an assist from fellow freshman Kristen Nichols.

With the goal, Wilson took over the team lead in points and notched her second game-winning goal of her young career.

Not to be outdone, the nationally-ranked Skyhawk defense produced its sixth shutout of the 2009 season. Freshman goalkeeper Aubrey Buehler tallied a career-high eight saves, producing her third OVC shutout in her last four matches.

**CLARKSVILLE** - The University of Tennessee at Martin offense produced its second-highest scoring output of the 2009 season and the steady Skyhawk defensive unit generated its seventh shutout of the season in the 3-0 win over Austin Peay.

With the win, the Skyhawks clinch at least a third-place seed in the OVC Tournament, which will be held in Morehead, Ky. on Nov. 5-8.

For the day, the Skyhawks got three goals from three different players, while the freshman duo of Aubrey Buehler and Linsie McMahan combined for the shutout in goal, which was UT Martin's fourth conference shutout so far this season.

The UT Martin offense put the pressure on Austin Peay early on in the match, attempting six shots through the first 18-plus minutes.

The Skyhawks' seventh attempt was a success, as sophomore Melissa Govea - who had attempted three shots already in the match - stole a defensive clear inside the box and sent a shot past Austin Peay goalkeeper Carley Newman, putting UT Martin up 1-0 at the 18:40 mark.

The second half seemed like a mirror image of the first half for the Skyhawk offense, as they relentlessly attacked the goal to the tune of 12 shots, putting seven of those on goal. On the other hand, the UT Martin defense allowed just three shots in the second half.

UT Martin broke through for a goal on a penalty kick in the 72nd minute. After an Austin Peay foul, junior defender Stephanie Nilica took the PK and found the back of the net.

**TERRE HAUTE, Ind.** - Freshman Kendyl Wilson converted on her team-leading fourth goal of the 2009 season in the 81st minute against Eastern Illinois, leading The University of Tennessee at Martin to a share of its first Ohio Valley Conference championship in program history and a 1-0 win at Memorial Stadium.

The match was originally scheduled to take place at Lakeside Field in Charleston on Oct. 9 but was cancelled due to standing water on the field from heavy thunderstorms throughout the previous week. The flooding continued in the Charleston area on Halloween, so the match was moved to a neutral site.

The Skyhawks got the first shot off of the match at the 38:12 mark of the first half, and kept their relentless offensive attack going through the end of the first period. At the half, the Skyhawks had outshot the Panthers by a 4-1 margin, but neither team could convert on its chances.

The Skyhawks matched their first half shot output in the first 12:05 of the second stanza, as Wilson attempted two shots and Melissa Govea and Duffy each got off a shot.

Eastern Illinois got its first shot on goal with 29:15 left to go in regulation, as a Skyhawk foul gave the Panthers a free kick opportunity from 40 yards out on the right flank. Danielle Flynn sent a pass into the center of the box that found Laura Ridolfi, who took a shot from 15 yards out that Skyhawk goalkeeper Aubrey Buehler scooped up for the save.

**MOREHEAD, Ky.** - A goal by Murray State's Ashley Fraser in the 39th minute resulted in the only offense either team could muster, as The University of Tennessee at Martin's magical 2009 season ended in a 1-0 loss to Murray State in the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament semifinals from Jayne Stadium.

UT Martin outshot the Racers by an 11-9 margin, but Murray State scored the first first-half goal of the tournament's first four matches with 6:41 left before the half, as Fraser scored her second goal of the tournament off a corner kick from Rachel Wright.

The two teams played a physical first 45 minutes, with few shot attempts ten minutes into the match. UT Martin goalkeeper Aubrey Buehler was put to work early, but responded with two saves just two minutes apart.

UT Martin missed a huge opportunity at the 33:17 mark, as Murray State goalkeeper Tara Isbell scrambled to grab a loose ball but couldn't grip it before falling to the ground. The ball shook loose and Melissa Govea hurdled Isbell to fire a hard shot on goal, but Murray State's Sophie Hargreaves dove to her left and headed the ball away for the save.

The Skyhawks came out firing in the second half, as Katie Imperiale found some space for an open shot, but the shot sailed high just 17 seconds into the half. Govea nearly had another open net at the 26:07 mark, as she drew Isbell out towards the top of the box. Govea, Isbell and the ball all met simultaneously and Isbell initially fumbled the ball before securing the save.

UT Martin had two more opportunities in a span of 60 seconds, as a free kick by Stephanie Nilica from 22 yards out was snatched out of the air from Isbell.

The Skyhawks kept making Isbell work, firing five more shots in the last 23 minutes but Murray State - the eventual tournament winner - held on for the victory.



In addition to earning All-Ohio Valley Conference first team honors, Danielle Rogers became the first Skyhawk to be named OVC Defensive Player of the Year. With her first team mention, Rogers joined Katie Behrens (2006-07) as the only Skyhawks to earn All-OVC first team honors multiple times.

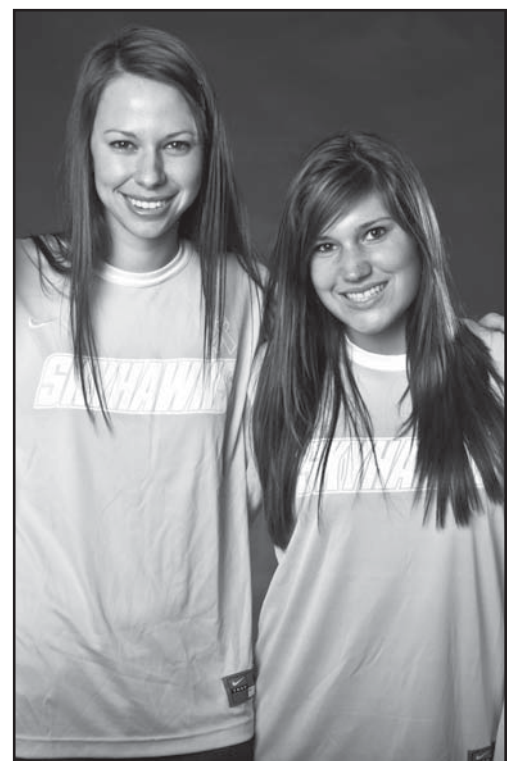



# PROGRAM TIMELINE

*Dr. Ruth Holden*



## 1998

After guiding the UT Martin women's soccer club team, Dr. Ruth Holden was hired to field the first intercollegiate squad. Holden retained 10 players from the club team and added eight true freshmen to form the first Skyhawk squad. The inaugural edition of Skyhawk soccer picked up its first victory in the third match of the season over Morehead State 2-1. UT Martin finished its first season 2-15 overall and 1-3 in the Ohio Valley Conference. Kim Thompson set a school record with four goals Oct. 7 against North Alabama.

## 1999

In its second year UT Martin managed only one win, defeating Chattanooga 2-1 Oct. 22. The 1999 campaign would be the final season for head coach Dr. Ruth Holden, who ended with a 3-34 overall record and 1-8 OVC record at UT Martin. Jane Carroll stopped a school record 18 shots in goal Oct. 1 against Tennessee Tech. Kelli Armstrong led the Skyhawks with six goals in her only year on the team.

## 2000

Nathan Pifer was hired March 15, from Midwestern State University as the second head coach of the Skyhawks. Sherrie Weeks and Lydia Lloyd led the squad with two goals apiece as UT Martin suffered through an 0-18 season.

## 2001

Pifer picked up his first win Sept. 23 in the seventh match of the season after defeating Arkansas Little-Rock 2-1. UT Martin played its first overtime match Oct. 9, falling 3-2 to Chattanooga.

## 2002

UT Martin posted its first winning season after going 9-7-3 overall and 4-3-2 in the OVC. The Skyhawks posted school records with five consecutive wins and earning five spots on the OVC All-Conference teams. The Skyhawks recorded a record 10 goals Oct. 11 against Morehead State. Dani Myrick set a freshman and school record with 16 goals on the season.

## 2003

The Skyhawks record a second consecutive winning record and host their first post season match when Southeast Missouri visited Nov. 4 and defeated UT Martin 2-0. Katie Jackson tied Dani Myrick's single season record of 16 goals. For a second consecutive year, five Skyhawks earned OVC All-Conference recognition.

## 2004

UT Martin goes 4-11-2 and misses the OVC tournament for the first time in three seasons. Freshman Katie Behrens netted three goals and earned the Skyhawks only spot on the all-conference team.

## 2005

## 2006

# OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE

Entering its 63rd year, the Ohio Valley Conference continues to build on the success that has made it the nation's eighth-oldest NCAA Division I conference. For only the second time in a decade, the Conference expanded by adding Southern Illinois University Edwardsville as the league's 11th member in 2008. The move expanded the OVC's geographical footprint to the St. Louis market and marked the first change in membership since expanding to the state of Alabama (Jacksonville State, Samford) in 2003.

The 2009-10 school year saw a change in leadership as Beth DeBauche was named the seventh full-time Commissioner in league history on July 28. She is currently one of just five females to be the head of a Division I conference, and one of just eight to lead a Division I conference all-time. The last three commissioners of the OVC have moved onto jobs as the commissioner of the Big Ten, Big 12 and the Mid-American Conferences.

The OVC's proud history past dates back to 1948, but seeds for the new league were actually planted in 1941. It was then that Roy Stewart, the athletics director at Murray State, Charles (Turkey) Hughes, the athletics director at Eastern Kentucky, and Kelly Thompson, the public relations director at Western Kentucky, first broached the idea of forming a new conference. Discussions were put on hold by World War II, but reemerged Feb. 27-28, 1948 at the Kentucky Hotel in Louisville as the three original institutions combined with Morehead State, Louisville and Evansville to form the OVC.

In the 1950s, the OVC became a pioneer on a much more significant scale socially. During times of racial segregation, league member Morehead State became one of the first non-traditionally black mid-southern institutions to accept a black student. In 1958, Marshall Banks earned athletically-related aid at Morehead, which signed a second black athlete, Howard Murphy, a year later. In 1961, Murphy earned all-conference recognition as a halfback in football. With racial barriers broken, the rest of the institutions in the league began to provide educational and athletic opportunities to African-Americans.

The OVC also has the honor of being the only conference to boast the nation's leaders in scoring, rebounding and assists all in one season. That feat was accomplished in 1991-92 by Morehead State's Brett Roberts (28.1 ppg), Murray State's Popeye Jones (14.4 rpg) and Tennessee Tech's Van Usher (8.8 apg).

In 2007-08, UT Martin guard Lester Hudson

became the first men's Division I player to record a quadruple-double in a game, when he registered 25 points, 12 rebounds, 10 assists and 10 steals in a victory over Central Baptist College. Hudson, who ranked fourth in scoring nationally as a junior, returned for his senior season in 2008-09 and was second nationally in scoring (behind Davidson's Stephen Curry) at 27.5 points a contest. Hudson earned numerous honors (including OVC Player of the Year and OVC Male Athlete of the Year in each 2008 and 2009 and All-American status from several outlets) before being drafted by the Boston Celtics with the No. 58 pick of the 2009 NBA Draft. Hudson became the first draft pick for the league since 2004 and only the third pick of the last decade for the OVC.

In the late 1970s, women's athletics began somewhat of a rebirth on the national scene as the NCAA began sponsoring and marketing women's sports. Recognizing the need to provide increased opportunities for female athletes, the OVC established women's championships in the sports of basketball, tennis and track in 1977, with cross country and volleyball added over the next four years. Those sports were initially governed by the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (IAIW), but the overall strength of women's programs in the league was demonstrated by the automatic bids the OVC instantly received when the NCAA became the governing body in 1982.

The league also had another historical moment in November 2008 when the NCAA awarded Nashville the 2014 NCAA Women's Division I Final Four. The OVC will serve as the host of the prestigious event, which is one of the biggest sporting events the city of Nashville can host. The event will be held at Bridgestone Arena in downtown Nashville.

Over its 62 years, OVC teams have garnered national championships and bowl games in football, along with national team or individual titles in the sports of rifle, cross country, track and golf.

The OVC has also produced several Olympic athletes, including Murray State's Morgan Hicks, who was a member of the 2004 United States Olympic Rifle Team and Morehead State's Brian Shimer who competed in five Winter Olympics in bobsled (winning a bronze medal in 2002) and coached the 2010 United States bobsled team to its first gold medal since 1948. In addition, some of the greatest players in professional sports were educated at OVC institutions. The list includes former greats such as football's

Phil Simms (Morehead State), basketball's Clem Haskins (Western Kentucky) and Bubba Wells (Austin Peay) and two-sport star Steve Hamilton (Morehead State) to present-day standouts like basketball player Trenton Hassell (Austin Peay), football players Tony Romo (Eastern Illinois) and Cortland Finnegan (Samford), and baseball players George Sherrill (Austin Peay) and Jon Rauch (Morehead State). Hamilton is the only athlete to ever play in the NCAA Basketball Championship, a Major League Baseball World Series (New York Yankees) and a NBA Championship Series (Los Angeles Lakers).

In 2007 the Conference had two teams in the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament for the first time in league history, former OVC member Samford earned an at-large selection while Southeast Missouri was the Conference's automatic bid.

A first in the OVC occurred in 2008, when the league had a first round draft pick in both the NFL (Tennessee State's Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie) and Major League Baseball (Eastern Kentucky's Christian Friedrich) Drafts in the same school year. A year later (2009) the league had a Major League Baseball First Round Compensation Round pick (Eastern Illinois' Tyler Kehrner who was No. 48 overall) and NBA Second Round pick (UT Martin's Lester Hudson) in the same season.

The playing field is not the only place where OVC athletes are working hard. The league also recognizes excellence in the classroom. Six Scholar-Athlete Awards are presented yearly to male and female athletes, while others are commended for their academic success by being Medal of Honor recipients or earning a spot on the Commissioner's Honor Roll. Additionally, the league annually presents one institutional Academic Achievement Award, as well as separate team awards in each Conference-sponsored sport. Since the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-America program began, the Ohio Valley Conference has had 192 student-athletes honored with the award, including 25 over the last two years (2008-09, 2009-10).

Current OVC representatives include charter members Eastern Kentucky University, Morehead State University and Murray State University, along with Austin Peay State University, Eastern Illinois University, Jacksonville State University, Southeast Missouri State University, Southern Illinois University Edwardsville, Tennessee State University, Tennessee Technological University and the University of Tennessee at Martin.

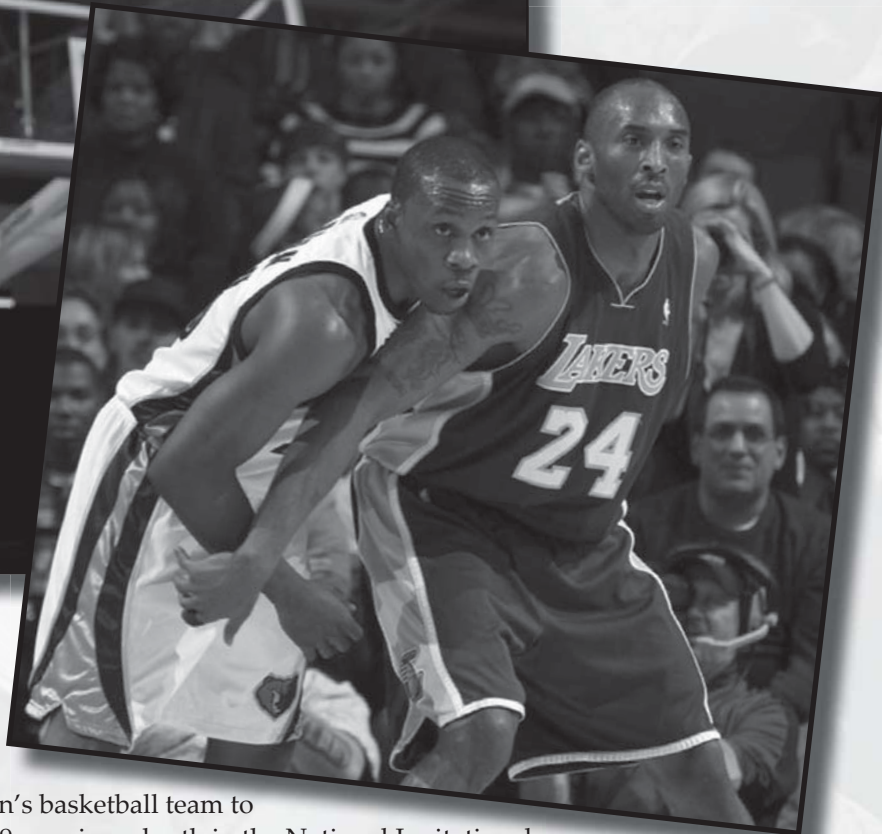

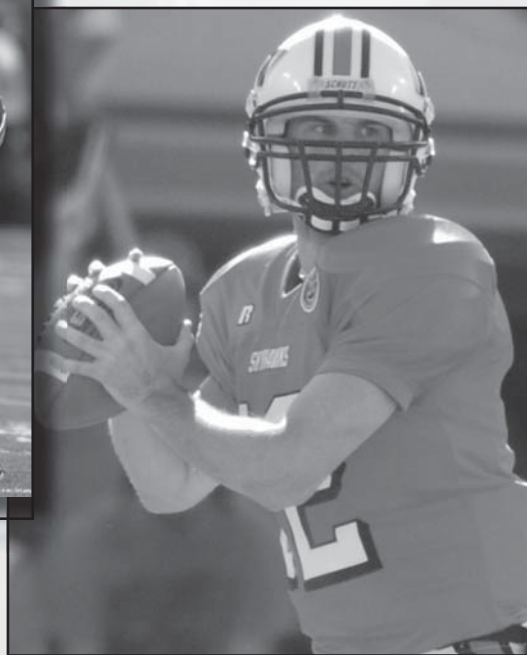
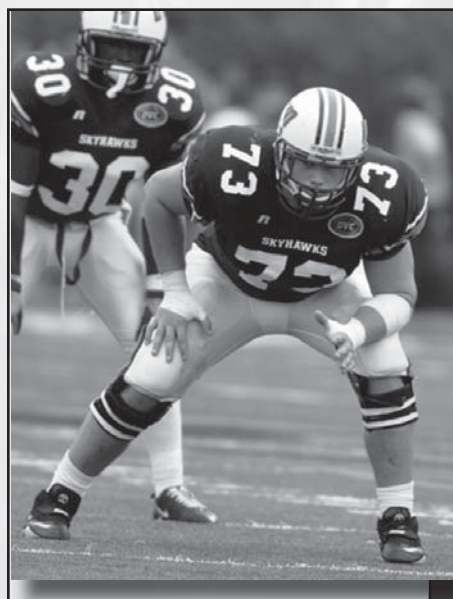

# UT MARTIN ATHLETICS



**Above:** Lester Hudson became the first Skyhawk in history to be selected in the NBA Draft when he was drafted by the Boston Celtics with the 58th overall pick. Hudson was a two-time Ohio Valley Conference male athlete of the year after he was the second leading scorer in the nation and led the UT Martin men's basketball team to its first-ever OVC regular season championship in 2009, earning a berth in the National Invitational Tournament. The first player in NCAA Division-I history to accumulate a quadruple-double, Hudson ended last season with his hometown Memphis Grizzlies.

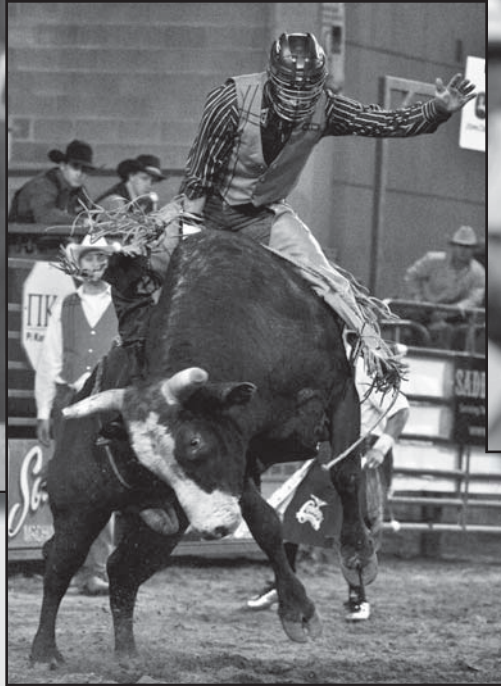

# ATHLETIC TRAINING ROOM

With three Skyhawk training room locations throughout the UT Martin athletic facilities, student-athletes can be assured of receiving the best medical attention and rehabilitation available. The primary athletic training room facilities are located in the Skyhawk Fieldhouse. There are also satellite athletic training room locations in the Bob Carroll Football Building and near Pat Head Summitt Court in Skyhawk Arena.

The Skyhawk Fieldhouse athletic training room was renovated in 2007 as part of a \$1.9 million dollar renovation of the entire Skyhawk Fieldhouse and Kathleen and Tom Elam Center. Included in the renovation was an updated whirlpool rehabilitation room where student-athletes can receive aqua rehabilitation and treatment. The athletic training room also contains multiple examination stations with the latest in rehabilitation equipment.

The athletic training staff uses a comprehensive approach to the injury care and wellness of student-athletes by utilizing state-of-the-art diagnostic and treatment equipment with the latest methods in the care and prevention of injuries.

Assistant Athletic Director Bart Belew is in his ninth year as head athletic trainer. Belew, a UT Martin graduate, went on to earn a master's degree and serve as a graduate assistant at Ole Miss where he worked with both the football and baseball programs before a stint at Freed-Hardeman led him to a return to his alma mater in 2000 as the head athletic trainer. He currently has a staff of four full-time certified athletic trainers and support staff of 16 athletic training students.

The athletic training staff is surrounded by many qualified and generous team doctors, through a partnership with Sports Orthopedic and Spine of Jackson, Tenn.. Dr. G. Bradford Wright, MD, and Dr. Steve Houseworth, MD, serve as the primary team physicians and are directly responsible for the orthopedic needs of UT Martin student-athletes. Dr. Wright has previously worked as team physician with the US Olympic Track & Field teams, West Tennessee Diamond Jaxx and Memphis Riverkings while Dr. Houseworth has served as a team physician for Louisiana Tech University.

Dr. Wright and Dr. Houseworth are also assisted in the care for Skyhawk student-athletes by the other orthopedic specialist of Sports Orthopedic and Spine; Dr. David E. Yakin, MD, Dr. Keith Nord, MD, Dr. Timothy Sweo, MD, and Dr. John P. Masterson, MD.

The athletic training staff is one support group that the athletic teams cannot do without. They are responsible for staffing all practices and games as well as handling the day-to-day rehabilitation of injured or post-surgery student-athletes.

# **SKYHAWK STRENGTH & CONDITIONING**

The UT Martin strength and conditioning facilities are for the exclusive use of Skyhawk student-athletes as they train for competition, under the direction of strength and conditioning coach Charles Rayburn.

Sport specific workouts are designed by Coach Rayburn and supervised at all times by one or more members of the strength and conditioning staff. Each student-athlete is placed in to respective developmental levels according to individual ability and specific regiments are then prescribed and continuously changed based on individual aptitude.

The Skyhawk strength and conditioning philosophy is multi-faceted with a primary emphasis on reducing injuries during the season.

The 3,500 square-foot Skyhawk weight room, located on the second level of Skyhawk Fieldhouse, includes Hammer Strength and Life Fitness machines and weights. This state-of-the-art facility is equipped with modern equipment ranging from self contained Power Lift multi-racks with 6x8 platforms, Olympic lifting bars, a complete line of rubber coated TGX dumbbells, a variety of glute/ham stations, a huge plyometric/medicine ball area, and various other supplemental pieces. The facility offers an unlimited variety of movements and exercises for the student-athlete.

The Skyhawk weight room allows for large enough groups so the student-athletes can train concurrently optimizing efficiency and effectiveness but, small enough to receive individual direction.

- Whether living in campus residence halls or University Village apartment-style housing, the university's residential experience is one of close-knit communities, access to technology, accessibility to class, campus events and dining facilities.
- When you choose to live on the UT Martin campus, you're choosing more than just living quarters. You're selecting a location that will help you benefit from college experiences, and you'll increase your chances of graduating.
- First-year students must live on campus unless commuting from the home of parents or legal guardians within a 50-mile radius, so we make sure that campus living is a positive experience.
- City and university officials work closely to make sure Martin is the best college town it can be. You'll feel welcome and secure on the campus and in the community.
- All **residence halls** are air-conditioned and have recreational opportunities. By living on campus, you're close to your classes and friends and have easy access to student-life activities. UT Martin's residence halls vary in atmosphere, size and visitation policies.
- **University Village (A-E)**, located on campus, is a fully-furnished apartment-style residence for almost 400 students. The apartments feature private bedrooms, private baths, full kitchens, washers and dryers and wireless Internet.
- **University Village, Phase II (F-H)** offers one-, two-, three- and four-bedroom apartment-style living. All three four-story buildings are elevator-equipped. Each apartment is fully furnished and features private bedrooms, kitchenette with refrigerator and two-burner cook top, a stack-unit washer/dryer and wireless Internet. One-bedroom apartments are available at an additional cost.
- University Village apartments are very popular. Apply early (fall) to be considered.
- UT Martin provides a staff of resident directors and advisers whose purpose is to attend to the needs of student residents. Campus health services, the new Student Recreation Center, food services, the bookstore, swimming pool, libraries, computer labs, gymnasiums and recreational facilities are within walking distance. 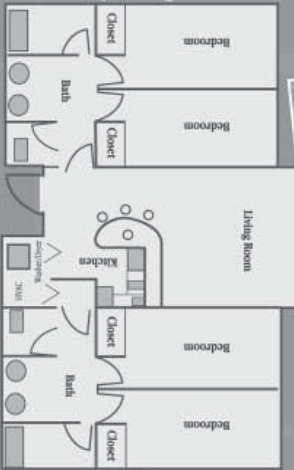

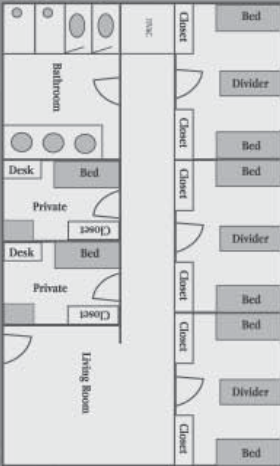

# UT MARTIN FACILITIES

Great facilities enhance the college experience. Here's just a sample of what UT Martin has to offer.

- **Student Recreation Center:** The new \$16.5 million, 96,000-square-foot Student Recreation Center officially opened in February 2010, and includes four basketball courts that can convert into volleyball and badminton courts, walking/jogging balcony, three racquetball courts, fitness center with state-of-the-art equipment, classroom, multipurpose and aerobics room, locker rooms, equipment checkout space and office suite. It also has two lobbies, which provide additional leisure recreational opportunities — pool, ping pong, foosball, air hockey and much more. The center is located near the fitness trail, providing students living on campus and commuters easy access.
- **Elam Center:** The Elam Center offers seven basketball courts with volleyball option, seven racquetball courts, an Olympic-sized pool, an equipment check-out area, a weight room, an indoor walking/jogging balcony and an aerobics room. The 4,800-seat Skyhawk Arena is home to Skyhawk basketball and many special events.
- **Hardy M. Graham Stadium:** The football home of the Skyhawks, Graham Stadium, features about 8,000 seats, modern lighting, a new playing surface and the Bob Carroll Football Building.
- **Fitness Trail:** The 1.5-mile fitness trail is convenient to the residence halls and circles Pacer Pond, a favorite spot for relaxing and outdoor recreation.
- **Intramural Fields:** Besides the fitness trail, outdoor facilities include lighted intramural fields for football and softball; two soccer fields; a 400-meter track; and 16 tennis courts (six lighted). Also located in this area are Bettye Giles Field (softball), Skyhawk Baseball Field and Skyhawk Soccer Field.
- **Computer Labs and Network Access:** State-of-the-art general student-access labs are available in the Paul Meek Library and the Boling University Center. Current software, current hardware, PCs and dual-boot Macs are available. Wireless is available throughout the campus. Academic departments have specialized computer labs, as well.
- **The Paul Meek Library:** The library features a 24-hour computer lab, a coffee bar (Captain's Coffee), a leisure reading area with fireplace, art from campus and local artists and numerous study rooms. The library collection contains a half-million volumes, including more than 38,000 electronic books, 2,100 DVDs, 4,500 videotapes, 1,100 print periodical subscriptions, and access to nearly 100 electronic databases indexing more than 10,000 full-text journals. The Rogers Media Center also offers the Learning Resource Center, picture-scanning service, a free fax service, wireless laptop computers for student use and two multimedia production stations.
- **University Center:** The Boling University Center includes a gameroom, computer lab, excellent dining facilities (including Chick-fil-A, Mein Bowl, Southern Tsunami Sushi and Sandella's) and the 500-seat Watkins Auditorium, home to free SAC movies and free popcorn.
- **The Quad:** The university's beautiful quadrangle is a campus trademark. All academic buildings are linked by the quadrangle, which features majestic trees, colorful flowers and special plantings.
- **Student Life Center:** Serves as a gathering and performance venue for students. Student productions in the center include the Miss UT Martin pageant, the Greeklife Awards ceremony, the Who's Who ceremony and All Sing. Within the center is the historic Alumni Gym (The Gym).

Computer labs are available in the library and the university center.






## TECHNOLOGY


Access to current communications and computer technology is important to students. Here's how UT Martin students stay connected:

- **Online services** are available 24 hours a day from anywhere, anytime. This makes it easy to register for classes, check grades, pay fees, view unofficial transcripts, or apply for and accept financial aid via a single sign-on through MyUTMartin.
- Residence halls have **high-speed Internet access and cable TV**.
- The campus **wireless network** is available in academic buildings, the library, the university center, University Village and the administration building.
- One-third of the computers in all labs are replaced each year; all students have Web access, email, calendars, a task-management system and up-to-date software; students have 24-hour access to some labs; most departments have specialized computer labs; wireless notebooks are available for checkout; and the library boasts two multimedia stations for all types of digital media assignments.
- **Google Apps for Education** provides email accounts to all students. Google Apps provides more than just email and calendars. It is a platform for team work and collaboration with access directly from the myUTMartin portal. **Students keep their special UT Martin Google account after graduation.**
- Classrooms utilize an online course-management system that provides an interface between faculty and students. One-third of the classroom technology is replaced each year, and all classrooms are equipped with **multimedia units**.
- The **Helpdesk** is available to students via phone, email or walk-in nearly 24 hours a day.
- Computers and accessories can be purchased through the on-campus **Computer Store**.

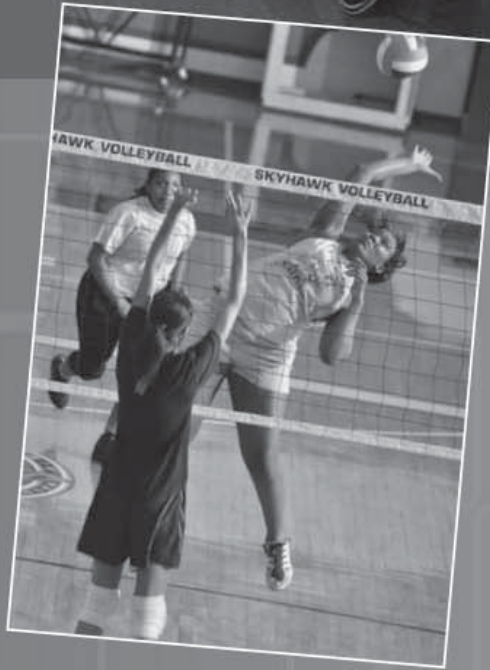

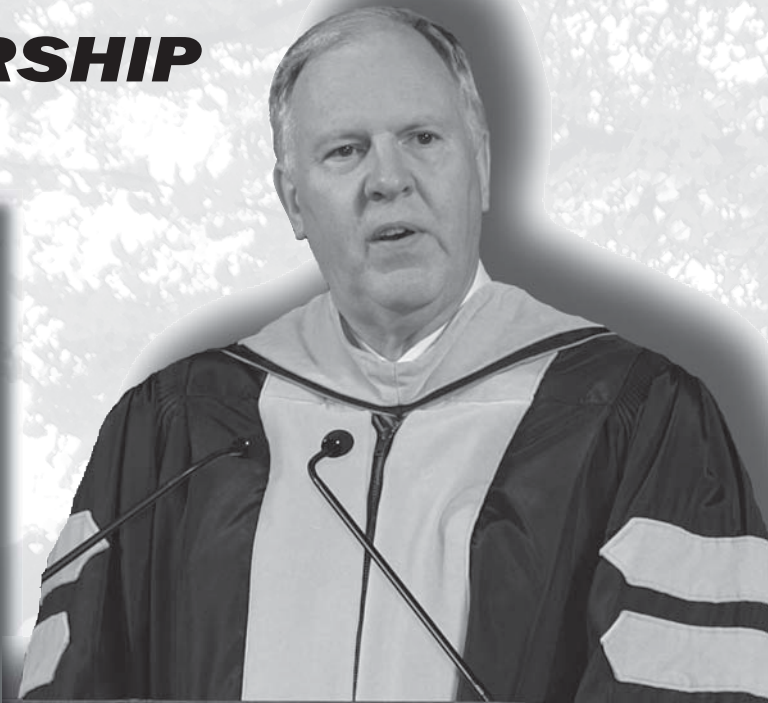

# CHANCELLOR DR. TOM RAKES



Dr. Thomas A. Rakes is the ninth chancellor at The University of Tennessee at Martin. Prior to his appointment as chancellor in 2007, he served as provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs at UT Martin. He served as interim president at The University of Louisiana at Monroe where he also held positions as provost and vice president for academic affairs, dean of graduate studies and research and dean of the College of Education and Human Development from 1995 until 2002.

A Virginia native, Dr. Rakes began his career in higher education at The University of Memphis where he spent 16 years as a faculty member, seven years as a department chair, and where he also served as director of research and development in the College of Education. He holds a Bachelor of Science in psychology from Milligan College, a Master of Arts from East Tennessee State University and a doctorate in curriculum and instruction from the University of Tennessee Knoxville. Dr. Rakes was recently awarded an honorary doctoral degree

from Hirosaki University, Japan.

During his career Dr. Rakes has authored 24 books and monographs and more than 80 national and international-level publications. He has served as principal investigator or administrator for over \$7.5 million in external grants. Dr. Rakes has been involved on numerous community boards including the Boy Scouts of America, the United Way, the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, Blue Ribbon Commission on Excellence in Education and the Chamber of Commerce. He has served as a consultant to more than 40 different colleges and universities in 21 states as well as corporate groups such as Belz Enterprises, Harcourt Brace, several insurance companies and financial institutions.

His wife, Dr. Glenda Rakes, is a professor of education at UT Martin, who specializes in instructional design and technology.

## **ATHLETIC DIRECTOR PHIL DANE**

Phil Dane begins his eleventh year as the director of athletics after serving as vice chancellor for business and finance at UT Martin for 13 years. He has overseen facility improvements, budget increases, and staffing changes which have resulted in Ohio Valley Conference championships in football, men's basketball, volleyball, softball, and women's tennis.

Dane was successful in proposing a referendum to the Student Government Association in 2007 that generates over \$600,000 annually. This funding has provided additional staff increases and budget increases for various administrative and sports programs as well as major facility improvements for baseball and softball. New grandstands were installed at both fields in 2008. New lighting was installed on both fields in 2009. Construction will begin on a \$1,000,000 baseball/softball building in November, 2009 with the debt service being paid from referendum funds. Over 63 percent of the student body voted in favor of the referendum in April 2007.

Dane oversaw the building and completion of the Bob Carroll Football Building, a \$2.5 million project. Funding for the project came from private gifts. The 17,000-square-foot facility has office space for all football personnel, meeting rooms, a locker room, a training room and a magnificent multi-purpose room overlooking H.K. Grantham Field. With the momentum from of an OVC championship season in 2006, then Chancellor Nick Dunagan, provided institutional matching funds when Skyhawk fans donated \$250,000 toward a new synthetic surface for Hardy M. Graham Stadium. That challenge was met and new FieldTurf surface was installed before the 2008 season.

In 2006 a major seating renovation was completed in the Kathleen and Tom Elam Center. More than 1,200 chair back seats were installed on the east side of the arena replacing a combination of bleachers and chair back seats. Bleachers and a press box facility at the Skyhawk Soccer Field were also completed in the fall of 2006.

Dane has guided the university through its most recent NCAA Division I Certification. In addition he is a peer reviewer in the NCAA Division I Certification Program. He has performed peer reviews at the University of Delaware, Western Kentucky University, Robert Morris University and Texas State University. Dane will serve as the chairman of the OVC Athletic Directors Council in 2010-2011. He also serves as the administrative liaison for the Ohio Valley Conference men's golf coaches.

Before he was named athletics director in 2000, Dane served as vice chancellor for business and finance from 1987-2000. In 1999, he chaired a commission to study the role and funding of intercollegiate athletics at UT Martin. The study commission developed a plan that allowed scholarship football to continue, and since 2000 Dane has worked with the university's administration

to restore funding for football scholarships to the same level as other OVC institutions.

He has held various positions at UT Martin since 1979. He is an Air Force veteran and a three-year baseball letter winner at Tennessee Tech University. He earned his bachelor's degree in 1978 and worked for Price Waterhouse and Company before beginning his association with UT Martin. He earned his MBA from UT Martin in 1984.

Dane is active in community and church organizations. He has served as commissioner of the Martin Girls Softball League and president of the Breakfast Optimist Club. He is currently a member of the Martin Rotary Club and is a deacon at the First Baptist Church of Martin.

Dane and his wife, Debbie, a third-grade teacher at Martin Elementary School, are the parents of three daughters: Shelly obtained her undergraduate and graduate degrees from UT Martin and teaches third grade at Dexter Elementary School in Cordova, Tenn.; Katie, teaches fifth grade at Martin Elementary School; and Abbey, also a UT Martin graduate, is marketing specialist with the Memphis Zoo.

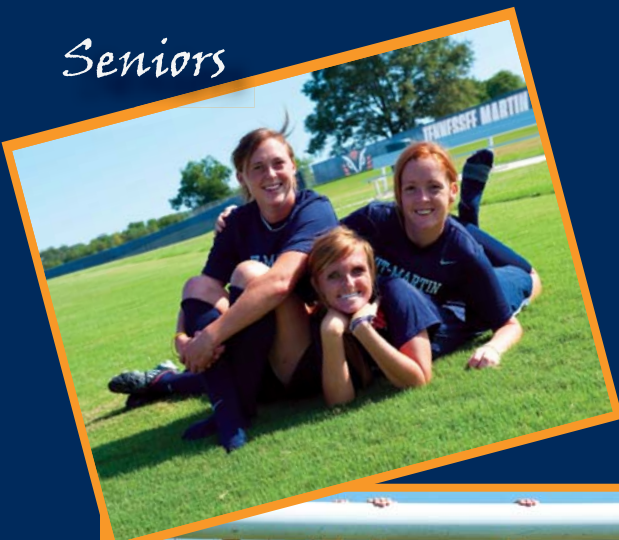
