Recap of Purdue

The Salukis fell, 34-17, to Purdue in their last game on Saturday. Southern found the end zone on each of its opening two drives, but didn't score again until the fourth quarter via a field goal.

Southern Illinois played in front of its fifth-largest crowd in program history last Saturday in West Lafayette, Ind., as Purdue had an attendance of 54,663. This was the eighth time where SIU has played in a game with a crowd of at least 50,000.

Against the Boilermakers, Southern totaled 283 yards on offense with 202 passing and 81 rushing. For the secondstraight game, SIU did not commit a turnover while it forced one via a Vinny Pierre Jr. interception in the third quarter.

The Salukis' first touchdown came off of a DJ Williams seven-yard run, which was followed up by Williams connecting with tight end Ryan Schwendeman one drive later. Paul Geelen drilled a career-long 53 yard field goal in the fourth quarter for SIU's final points of the game.

Series History

The Salukis and Skyhawks will meet for the 10th time in program history on Saturday in Martin, Tenn. SIU holds an 8-1 advantage over UT Martin and currently sits on a four-game winning streak. Southern's last loss vs. UT Martin was in 1994 (35-26).

Southern Illinois won the most recent meeting, 28-14, on Sept. 14, 2019, in Carbondale. The Salukis ran for a total of 264 yards against the Skyhawks in the victory.

This will be the first meeting in Martin, Tenn., since Sept. 12, 1998; a game the Salukis won by a final score of 36-7.

The first-ever meeting between SIU and UT Martin took place in 1927. The Salukis won each of the first four games in the series.

Winning the Turnover Battle

The Salukis have been among the best teams in the nation in terms of turnover margin, ranking second in the FCS at 3.00. SIU has forced six turnovers through the opening two weeks and has lost zero.

SIU is one of eight teams in the country without a turnover so far in 2025. Youngstown State is the only other team in the MVFC to also be without a turnover.

Southern's six turnovers gained are tied for fourth in the FCS with Dayton and Northern Colorado. The Salukis have recovered three fumbles and recorded three interceptions.

Capitalizing in the Red Zone

In nine trips to the red zone, the Salukis have come away with points in all nine attempts. Southern has scored eight touchdowns, four rushing and four passing, and made one field goal while in the red zone. SIU is one of 35 teams in the FCS to have a perfect percentage of 1.000.

On defense, Southern is tied for 29th with a percentage of .714. In seven attempts, opponents have scored five times against the Salukis with three touchdowns and two field goals.

Strong Start on Defense

Through the opening two games, the Southern Illinois defense, led by first-year defensive coordinator Lee Pronschinske,

has been one of the top units in both the Valley and the FCS. The Salukis are fourth in the conference and tied with Rhode Island for 23rd in the nation in scoring defense, allowing 18.5 points-per-game.

Southern is also fourth in the MVFC and 17th in the FCS in total defense. SIU has allowed an average of 282.5 yards-per-game so far in 2025.

The Salukis are 22nd in passing yards allowed (150.5) and are 41st in rushing (132.0).

DJ Williams' Hot Start to 2025

After playing in just three games in 2024 due to injury, senior quarterback DJ Williams has been one of the best in the MVFC to start the season. Williams has thrown for 429 yards and four touchdowns on a completion percentage of 66.7%, leading to a rating of 153.05.

The dual-threat quarterback has gotten it done on the ground as well. Through two games, Williams has ran for two touchdowns, with his most recent one being a seven-yard run for the opening score at Purdue.

Williams has led the Saluki offense to being ranked 32nd in the FCS in passing, averaging 220.0 yards-per-game through the air

Southern's signal caller is tied for 32nd in the country in total offense, averaging 233.0 total yards-per-game, and is tied for ninth in points responsible for at 36.

Andrew Behm's Big Performance at Purdue

Veteran linebacker Andrew Behm recorded 16 tackles against Purdue last Saturday. This is tied for 21st in program history for a single game.

Behm played in six games in 2024, missing the rest due to injury. Now fully healthy, the senior from Appleton, Wis., is tied for 13th in the FCS in total tackles with 22 on the year.

Paul Geelen Hits Career-Long Field Goal

Senior punter/kicker Paul Geelen made a 53-yard field goal at the 07:41 mark of the fourth quarter against Purdue, which set a new career-long.

Geelen was named to the Shrine Bowl

1000 Watchlist on July 28. Geelen was amongst the best in the country on special teams in 2024, ranking 19th in the FCS in punting with an average of 43.12 yards-per-punt.

In 2024, Geelen was 10-for-15 on field goals for a percentage of .667 with a long of 50, which came against North Dakota State on Oct. 12, 2024.

Stats Perform FCS Top 25

Southern Illinois is now ranked No. 17 in the latest Stats Perform FCS Top 25 Poll after previously being ranked at No. 14 last week. North Dakota State and South Dakota State remained in the top two spots respectively as both have started the year 2-0.

SIU is one of six Valley teams to be ranked in the poll.

Salukis Rise in AFCA FCS Coaches Poll

After moving up from No. 20 to No. 15 last week, Southern Illinois has again climbed in the most recent AFCA FCS Coaches Poll as it is now No. 14. Similar to the Stats Perform Poll, North Dakota State and South Dakota State sit in the top two spots.

SIU will face five ranked teams according to the poll. Its first ranked opponent will be No. 1 North Dakota State on Oct. 11 in Fargo, N.D., followed by a home matchup vs. No. 17 North Dakota on Oct. 18. Then, the Salukis will closeout the year with three-straight ranked games against No. 25 Youngstown State on Nov. 8, No. 20 South Dakota on Nov. 15 in Carbondale and No. 4 Illinois State on Nov. 22 in Normal.

Indiana State, Northern Iowa, and SEMO also all received votes.

Deep Receiver Room Showing Promising Signs Through Two Weeks

In a mostly new-look receiver room, seven different Salukis recorded at least two receptions in Week One vs. Thomas More. Vinson Davis III, who is the team's leading returning receiver, paced the team in both catches (six) and yards (97) against the Saints. Veteran Jay Jones and newcomers Fabian McCray and Jackson Parker all found the end zone in Week One.

One week later, McCray led the team in receiving with 72 yards on two receptions.

McCray comes to SIU by way of Jackson State, where he played just three games in 2024 due to injuries. The Chicago native was on the preseason HBCU+ Player of the Year Watch List prior to the injury. Parker spent five seasons at Albany (2020-24) and played in 35 games before arriving in Carbondale. During his time there, Parker tallied 94 career catches for 1,224 yards and five touchdowns.

In terms of returners, senior Jay Jones caught five passes for 132 yards and one touchdown last season. Jones played in eight games in 2024, which matches his total from his first four years at SIU combined (did not play in 2020 and redshirted in 2021).

Stats Perform Preseason All-America Teams

Colin Bohanek was Southern Illinois' lone representative on the 2025 Stats Perform Preseason All-America Teams, which was released on July 15. Bohanek was one of two linebackers to be named to the third team.

Southern Illinois Lands 13 Players on MVFC Preseason Watch List

The Salukis have 12 players on the MVFC Preseason Watch List, which came out on July 21.

Historic Crowd for SIU vs. SEMO in 2024

The 13,421 fans in attendance for Family Weekend last season on Sept. 21 versus SEMO were the second-most in stadium history, behind only the standing-room crowd of 15,276 that attended the opening of the stadium in 2010 versus Division II Quincy. Saluki Stadium seats approximately 14,000 in its horseshoe-shaped seating bowl, with an official stadium capacity of 15,774 that includes the standing-room area of the berm.

Postseason success under Hill

Of SIU's 11 playoff appearances in school history, Hill was the quarterback of two teams (2006, 2007) and head coach of three (2020, 2021, 2023). The Salukis have won 11 playoff games in school history and Hill was a part of six of them (quarterbacked three wins and coached three more).

Since 2019, only three FCS programs have won three or more playoff games (South Dakota State, North Dakota State and Southern Illinois).

A Look at the Coaching Staff

Lee Pronschinske, who coached the safeties in 2024, was promoted to defensive coordinator at the conclusion of the season and is entering his first year in the role. Pronschinske will continue coaching the safeties as well.

Darius Davis and Eriq Moore are two new additions to the staff for 2025. Davis will serve as the team's defensive line coach while Eriq Moore will coach the cornerbacks. Prior to SIU, Davis spent three years at Robert Morris (2022-24) in the same role and coached SIU transfer defensive tackle Bernadin Fleurima Jr.

Moore arrived in Carbondale in April of 2025 after coaching defensive backs for two seasons at Missouri Western State. As a player, Moore was a three-year starter at SEMO (2013-16).

Where SIU Ranked Statistically in 2024

Despite several injuries to the quarterback position, Southern Illinois still ranked third in the MVFC in passing, averaging 234.6 yards-per-game. This also ranked 30th in the country at the end of the season.

SIU's 13 interceptions were the fourth-most in the conference and were just one behind South Dakota, South Dakota State, and Illinois State for the league-lead.

The Salukis had a top five red zone defense in the Valley, as opponents converted at a rate of 79.5%. In the FCS, this ranked 47th out of 123 teams.

One of two FCS teams to beat FBS opponents in both 2022 and 2023

Southern Illinois was one of two FCS teams that beat FBS opponents in both 2022 and 2023. The Salukis defeated Northwestern in 2022 and beat Northern Illinois in 2023. Sacramento State beat Colorado State (2022) and Stanford (2023).

Jake Curry to back-up DJ Williams after Busy Freshman Year

Jake Curry became the first true freshman to start at quarterback for the Salukis in 35 years (Brendon Prenger, a true freshman walk-on QB, started at Northern Iowa on Nov. 11, 1989) in 2025 after Southern lost both Williams and Hunter Simmons due to injury. Curry took over in Game 7 vs. North Dakota State after Simmons went down.

Curry went on to play in seven games and make five starts in his first year as a Saluki. The Edwardsville, Ill., native finished the season 82-of-147 for 931 yards, three touchdowns, and seven interceptions. Curry also ran 45 times for 159 yards and three touchdowns.

Against Youngstown
State, Curry helped lead SIU
back from a 28-0 deficit to
win, 37-33, earning the then
freshman quarterback Stats
Perform National Freshman
Player of the Week honors.
Curry threw for 322 yards with
three touchdowns to go along
with 78 yards on the ground
and one touchdown.

The comeback was the largest in school history and tied for the largest in conference history.

Experience Across the Offensive Line

Southern's offensive line boasts plenty of experience

in 2025. All five projected starters – Coleon Smith, Aiden Logan, Noah Fenske, Derek Harden Jr., and Cameron Dye – are seniors with at least five years under their belt.

Fenske is entering his second year as a starter for SIU after sitting out the 2023 campaign due to NCAA transfer rules.

On the outside, tackles Dye and Smith have a combined 10 years

Entering his 10th season as head coach in 2025, Nick Hill has elevated his alma mater into one of the elite programs in FCS Football.

A native son of Southern Illinois and one of Saluki Football's all-time great quarterbacks, Hill made it his mission to restore the program to its place among the nation's best. By any standard, he has achieved that goal.

Playing in the toughest conference at the FCS level, the Salukis have advanced to the playoffs three times in the last five seasons. Southern is one of of only four FCS programs to accomplish this feat, joining North Dakota State, South Dakota State and Montana.

SIU was one of only two FCS teams in the nation to beat FBS opponents in both 2022 (Northwestern) and 2023 (Northern Illinois), joining Sacramento State, which beat Colorado State (2022) and Stanford (2023).

In its history, Saluki Football has won six games against FBS-level teams, and Hill has been a part of five of those wins (two as starting quarterback, three as head coach).

The Salukis have dominated in-state competition under Hill, winning their eight of their last nine games against instate schools (Northern Illinois, Northwestern, Illinois State twice, Western Illinois four times). The lone loss came against Illinois State Oct. 5, 2024.

Southern has beaten 11 ranked FCS teams in the last four seasons, including wins over the No. 1, No. 2, No. 3 and No. 4-ranked opponents.

Since 2020, the Salukis have been nationally ranked for 43 weeks, including 18 weeks in the top 10 and as high as No. 3. They enter the 2024 season having been ranked every week since Week 1 of 2023.

SIU has won three playoff games in the last five seasons, winning at Weber State (2020), at South Dakota (2021) and versus Nicholls State (2023), in the first home playoff game in Saluki Stadium history.

The program has produced multiple NFL players during Hill's tenure, including safeties Jeremy Chinn and Ryan Neal, cornerbacks Craig James and Madre Harper, plus tight end MyCole Pruitt. Chinn was a second-round draft pick of the Carolina Panthers and the 64th player chosen overall in 2020.

A leader on and off the field, Hill won the 2023 Fellowship of Christian Athletes Grant Teaff Coach of the Year Award, sponsored by the AFCA.

Hill's journey to the top job at SIU started just 20 miles north of campus, where he was a football and basketball icon at DuQuoin High School. During his senior year of high school in 2002-03, Hill was the area's Player of the Year in both sports and guided the Indians to the Illinois High School Association 3A state championship football game.

The legend continued on the hardwood where Hill averaged 23 points as a senior at Du Quoin and chose Western Kentucky from a host of Division I offers. A broken hand prematurely ended his freshman season at Western but ultimately led him home.

In the spring of 2004, Hill transferred to SIU to switch sports and play football under head coach Jerry Kill, just as

the program was beginning its rapid rise to the top of the league standings.

Hill initially sat behind league Player of the Year Joel Sambursky, before taking over the starting job in 2006. In two seasons as the starter, he went 21-6 and set the school record for passing yards in 2007. He still holds the best completion percentage (68.3) in school history.

Highlights of Hill's playing career include guiding Southern to a win at Indiana in 2006, in which he passed for four touchdowns as SIU became the league's first team to defeat a Big Ten opponent. Hill capped off his career in 2007 by leading the team to the Final Four of the playoffs, where the Salukis ultimately lost a 20-17 heartbreaker to Joe Flacco and Delaware. He was also a finalist for the Peyton Award in '07.

Hill played six seasons of professional football, mostly in the Arena Football League, where he played for head coach Jay Gruden, who went on to coach NFL's Washington Redskins from 2014-2019. Hill also had brief free-agent stints with the Chicago Bears in 2008 and Green Bay Packers in 2012.

Playing for Gruden, one of the game's top offensive minds, helped shape Hill's offensive philosophy. First as Southern's offensive coordinator and now as head coach, Hill has refined his own unique style of offense that combines elements of Air Raid, spread and up-tempo.

"Coaching my alma mater is a dream come true," Hill said.
"I love everything about this region and what it stands for, that blue-collar mentality. This is not my team. This is our team.
Our program is going to invest in the community and make us proud on and off the field."

Hill and wife, Alicia, a former volleyball player at SIU, reside in Carbondale and have three daughters. His brother, former Saluki quarterback A.J. Hill, coaches football at Rochester (III.) High School.
