Biographical Information

BASEBALL

Randy Coy, 1980-1984

Randy was a four-year starter for the Rockets in the early 1980's. Coy is in the top 10 on many career records lists at UT. He is 10th in hits and total bases, seventh in runs scored and fifth in doubles. Randy, a Sylvania Northview High School graduate, is currently a Toledo firefighter. He and his wife Nancy have two children.

Dan Cunningham, 1980-83

Dan Cunningham won letters on the baseball team in 1981 and 1983.

Paul Dexter, 1946-1948

Paul Dexter was team co-captain in 1947 and 1948. He batted cleanup all three years, hitting .420 in 1946, .397 in 1947 and .361 in 1948. He was an outstanding fielder at third base and also served as a relief pitcher.

Chris Dudics, 2008-2011

Chris Dudics made second-team All-MAC in 2010 and 2011, as well as the MAC All-Tournament Team in 2009. He led the team in batting in 2009 (.386) and 2010 (.391). His career batting average of .353 ranks No. 3 in the UT record book. He set the school record for hits in a season in 2010 with 99, a record that still stands today, and has the second-most career hits in UT history with 254. In 2010, Dudics put together an amazing 39-game hitting streak, the longest mark in UT and MAC history. Used primarily as a shortstop and second baseman, Dudics earned Academic All-MAC honors in 2009.

Aaron Dudley, 2007-2010

Aaron Dudley was named second-team All-MAC in 2010 and 2011, as well as the MAC All-Tournament Team in 2009. He is UT's all-time leader in RBIs with 150, and ranks in the top 10 in doubles (third), total bases (344), hits (seventh) and home runs (24). As a freshman in 2007, he led the team in RBIs with 45. He was an Academic All-MAC selection in 2009. A catcher, Dudley signed with the Florida Marlins as a free-agent in 2010 and spent four seasons in their organization. He signed with the Normal CornBelters in 2013 and was a Frontier League All-Star in 2014, 2015, and 2016.

Guy Elston. 1979-1981

Both a starting pitcher and top reliever for the baseball team, Elston was an Honorable Mention All-MAC honoree in 1980. He finished his career with an 11-9 record and 10 saves. He also holds the record for most pitching appearances in one season, also in 1980. Elston was signed by the New York Yankees in 1981 and played several years in the minor leagues. He has been employed with the Anderson's in Maumee for the last 24 years.

Chris Ernst, 1975-78

Chris Ernst posted a 20-6 record as a starting pitcher from 1975-78, ranking third in UT history in win-loss percentage and sixth in wins. His career ERA of 2.49 ranks third in UT annals. His best season came in his senior campaign in 1978 in which he won five games and had a 1.65 ERA, the second-lowest ERA in school history. He earned second-team All-MAC honors as a senior. He also led the team in ERA as freshman (1.12) and was co-leader in wins (7) in 1977.

Steve Hall, 1970-1974

Steve Hall was a four-year starter in baseball from 1970-1974. Hall was named first-team All-MAC as a designated hitter as a senior and second-team All-MAC as a junior. Hall was also named the Most Valuable Player during his junior year (1973). He led the team in hitting (.341) and home runs (6) in 1973, and RBIs in (18) in 1974. At the time of his graduation he was one of the career leaders in several categories.

Ben Hammer, 2009-13

Ben Hammer was a two-time All-MAC selection who also earned second-team Academic All-America honors in 2013. As a sophomore in 2011, Hammer led the team with a .330 average and was named second-team All-MAC. He led the team in RBIs with 34 in 2012 and home runs (4) and RBIs (48) in 2013. An outstanding center fielder, Hammer received first-team All-MAC accolades as a senior in 2013. For his career, Hammer ranks eighth in hits (215), eighth in doubles (39), ninth in RBIs (126) and 10th in walks (74). He was a third-team Academic All-MAC and first-team Academic All-District selection.

Drew Hoisington, 2005-2008

Drew Hoisington earned second-team All-MAC honors in 2006 and 2007. He holds UT career records for runs scored (180), walks (111) and total bases (393). He also ranks second in doubles (53), second in triples (13), fifth in home runs (27), sixth in hits (233) and ninth in RBIs (126). Hoisington, a centerfielder, holds the season record for triples in 2007 with seven. That same season he led the Rockets in home runs (12) and RBIs (50). A year later, he tied for team lead in home runs with nine. After his time in Toledo, he signed with the Washington Wild Things as a free-agent and played one season.

Jared Hoying, 2008-2010

Jared Hoying made second-team All-MAC in 2010. He has the second-most home runs (34) in UT history, and ranks third in RBIs (137), fourth in doubles (46) and sixth in total bases (338). He tied for team lead in home runs in three consecutive seasons — 2008 (9), 2009 (11), and 2010 (14), and led the team with RBIs in 2009 with 50. Hoying, who played shortstop and centerfield, was drafted by the Texas Rangers in the 2010 MLB Free-Agent Draft. He was named the MVP of the Northwest League in 2010 and was selected for the AAA All-Star Game in 2014. In 2016, Hoying was promoted to the Texas Rangers.

Max Krause, 1929-1932

He was a catcher from 1929-1932.

Joe Kruzel, 1985-1988

Joe Kruzel was a four-year starter at UT under Stan Sanders. He played second base and started every game. He served as the assistant coach from 1988-1992 and was head coach from 1993-2003, compiling a 259-331 record.

Matt Kuna, 2008-2010, 2012

Matt Kuna made first-team All-MAC and second-team all-region in 2012, and second-team All-MAC in 2009. A right-handed pitcher, Kuna went 7-1 with a 2.61 ERA and 59 strikeouts to help lead his team to MAC West Division Championship. Kuna, who missed the 2011 season with an injury, ranks sixth in career win-loss percentage (.696/16-7), sixth in fewest walks per inning (.268), seventh in saves (6) and 10th in innings pitched (228). After his time in Toledo, he played two seasons with the Schaumburg Boomers, winning a Frontier League Championship with the Boomers in 2013.

Rick Maroney, 1980-83

Rick Maroney won three letters on the baseball team.

Junie Melendez, 1996-2000

Junie Melendez was a four-year letterwinner from 1996-2000, earning first-team All-MAC honors as a junior in 1999. In that season, Melendez went 9-5 with a 3.10 ERA, compiling 72 strikeouts in 95.2 innings pitched, forming a potent 1-2 punch with teammate Jeremy Griffiths. He also set the school record with four shutouts and allowed only 19 walks. His career mark is 19-19, which ranks him seventh in UT history in career wins. He also ranks second in career complete games (16), fifth in fewest walks (0.26 per inning) and ninth in innings pitched (266.1). Melendez went 3-2 with a 12.41 ERA as a freshman, 4-5 with a 5.85 ERA as a sophomore and 3-6 with a 7.21 ERA as a senior, a year in which he also served as team captain. He served as UT's pitching coach in 2003 and was the head coach at Glen Oak CC in Centreville, Mich. from 2004-06. He has also served as a scout for the Cleveland Indians since 2006, and is currently their coordinator of international scouting for Latin America.

Robert Meyer, 1959

Robert Meyer was a UT pitcher during the 1959 season. He led the MAC in strikeouts with 82 in 62 1/3 innings. Since he played only one season at Toledo, he does not rank in any of the top 10 categories in career pitching statistics. However, his ERA of 3.03 is among the best in school history. Meyer signed with the New York Yankees and played five seasons in the major leagues.

Dave Minarcin, 1988-91

Dave Minarcin was a four-year starter in the outfield from 1988-91. Earned second-team All-MAC honors in 1989 and 1991, as well as All-District 4 Midwest Region in 1989. After hitting .305 as a freshman in 1988, Minarcin led the Rockets in hitting (.348) and RBIs (31) in 1989. In 1990, he hit .292 with three home runs and 14 RBIs. In 1991 he led the Rockets in hitting for the second time with a .360 average, one of only eight Rockets to twice lead the team in hitting. At the conclusion of his career, Minarcin ranked third in career hits (184), seventh in RBIs (91) and seventh in hitting (.327). After graduation, Minarcin continued to play baseball, participating in the Toledo Federation and Roy Hobbs leagues. He was a teacher and baseball/basketball coach at his alma mater, Northwood High School, for five years before entering the private sector.

Michael O'Reilly, 1975-1978

Michael O'Reilly was a first baseman for the Rockets, earning first-team All-MAC honors as well as first-team NCAA Regional 4 All American Team honors in his junior and senior seasons. O'Reilly hit .281 as a freshman, earning honorable mention All-MAC honors. A leg injury limited his playing time in 1976, as he hit just .232. He hit .315 as a junior and was tied for second on the team with 27 RBIs. As a senior, O'Reilly was fourth on the team with a .358 average and led the Rockets with eight home runs. O'Reilly was named UT's Scholar Athlete of the Year and first-team Academic All-MAC in 1978. After graduating from UT, he spent two seasons with the New York Yankees farm system. In 1980, he returned to UT as the assistant baseball coach. O'Reilly then spent time as the head coach at Southview High School, pitching coach for the Australian National Baseball Development Squad, a consultant to Finland's National Baseball Team, assistant coach of the 1995 Olympic Festival Silver Medalist South Team, head coach of Team Ohio in the Sunbelt National Baseball Classic and 2012 head baseball coach at St. John's Jesuit High School. He was named the 2012 Three Rivers Atlantic Conference Baseball Coach of the Year. O'Reilly is currently chairman of the All-American Selection Committee of the National High School Baseball Coaches Association.

Jerry Passman, 1964-66

Jerry Passman was a three-year letterwinner who hit .296 as a sophomore, .176 as a junior and .309 as a senior.

Deion Tansel, 2013-16*

Deion Tansel was a two-time first-team All-MAC selection, earning the honor in 2015 and 2016, and was a two-time MAC Defensive Player of the Year award winner, the first two-time winner in league history. He is one of 11 players in Toledo Baseball history to earn at least two first-team all-conference honors. A four-year starter, Tansel was also a two-time MAC All-Defensive Team selection and a career .314 hitter, hitting at least .300 in all four seasons with the Rockets. In 2015, Tansel hit a team-best .324 with 21 runs scored, nine doubles, 16 RBIs, and 12 stolen bases while leading the team in HBP (14) and on-base percentage (.413). He hit a career-best .327 as a senior in 2016 with two home runs, 12 doubles, and 29 RBIs. In his final season at Toledo, Tansel led the team in hitting, slugging percentage (.408), runs scored (44), hits (73), doubles, and stolen bases (12). He finished his career with 246 hits, which at the time ranked fifth in school history, and had 73 career multi-hit games. He played in 208 games in his career, starting 204 at second base and shortstop. Tansel was an Academic All-MAC honoree in 2015 and was drafted by the Tampa Bay Rays in the 2016 MLB Draft.

Jerry Schunk, 1984-1986

Jerry Schunk served as shortstop on teams that went a combined 83-68 during his three-year career. He ended his senior season second on the team in both runs scored and doubles, while leading the team in stolen bases. As a junior, he was named All-MAC after hitting six home runs (the second highest total on the team). His freshman season he led the team in with seven home runs and 37 RBI's. Schunk posted a .352 batting average and was drafted by the Toronto Blue Jays. He played a number of years in the Minnesota and Florida organizations.

Andrew J. Takacs, 1952-1955

Andrew lettered for four years, 1952-1955. He went on to captain UT's team in 1955. One of Andrew's interests was the campus Collegian and he contributed as the sports columnist. Andrew received the Blue Key National Honorary, 1954-1956. Andrew graduated from UT with a BA in business administration-journalism and a master's degree in political science. He then went on to being named vice president of government relations April 25, 1978 for Whirlpool Corporation. Whirlpool is the world's largest major home appliance company. Prior to joining Whirlpool, Takacs was associated with Toledo Scale Corporation, WSPD and WSPD-TV, and the Toledo Times.

Marc Wilkins, 1990-1992

After playing collegiate ball from 1990-1992, Marc Wilkins played in the majors for several years with Pittsburgh and the Oakland A's from 1996-2001. He led the Rockets in wins (4) and strikeouts (40) in 1992.

Ryan Wilkinson, 2011-14

Ryan Wilkinson was a four-year letterwinner on the baseball team from 2011-14. He earned first-team All-MAC honors in 2013 and second-team accolades in 2012 and 2014. He ranks second in UT history in career wins (24), fifth in ERA (2.73), first in innings pitched (336.2), second in fewest walks (.19 per inning), and 10th in complete games (11). For his career, Wilkinson was 24-13 with 191 strikeouts and just 65 walks. As a freshman, Wilkinson appeared in a team-high 25 games, going 4-1 with a 2.20 ERA in 45 innings pitched. The following season he was 7-4 with a 2.99 ERA, starting 11 games and helping the Rockets win the MAC West Division title. He ranked fourth in the MAC in wins and sixth in ERA, earning second-team all-league honors. As a junior, Wilkinson went 7-3 with a 2.82 ERA, nabbing first-team All-MAC honors. He ranked first in the MAC in complete games (6), second in innings pitched (111.2) and sixth in wins. As a senior, he was 6-5 with a 2.66 ERA in 101.2 innings pitched. He completed four of his 14 starts, earning second-team all-league honors. Wilkinson was a two-time Academic All-MAC selection who earned his degree in civil engineering.

MEN'S BASKETBALL***Will Babione, 1966-1968***

From 1966-1968, Babione lettered as a forward for the Rockets. In his senior season he served as co-captain. Babione was named second-team All-MAC his junior year. He holds the third-best season free-throw percentage mark in a season (29-of-32, .906 in 1967-1968).

Robert D. Borchardt Jr., 1982-1985

Robert Borchardt scored 743 points in his Rocket career. His best season came as a senior when he averaged 12.6 points and 3.7 assists. He made Academic All-MAC in his junior and senior seasons. He was a member of the honor society Phi Kappa Phi during his time at UT. Worked on the first fundraiser for the Glass Bowl. After graduating for UT in 1986 Robert was the Vice President for Sales & Marketing for Sauder Woodworking Co. He is currently working for Midwest Paper specialties as Vice President of Sales.

George Bush, 1947-1950

George Bush lettered in basketball from 1947-1950. According to UT historian Frank Kralik, Bush was an excellent set shooter and great playmaker. He was fifth on the team in scoring with 185 points in the 1947-48 season. The following year he was third with 157 points. He led the team with 239 points as a senior (1949-50). After college, Bush played several seasons with Sheboygan of the NBA and became an executive with Owens-Illinois.

Jack Feeman, 1950-1951

In one season at UT, Feeman shot .364 from the floor, .702 from the free-throw line, scored 398 points (15.3 ppg) and corralled 263 rebounds (10.1 rpg). According to Frank Kralik, Feeman "was the only player I ever saw who could shoot right or left-handed at the top of the key. He was the greatest all-around single player at UT ever."

Gerald F. Galicki, 1958-1961

Gerald (Jerry) Galicki was a three-time letterwinner, and was named second-team All-MAC in 1960-61. He received the team MVP award as a senior in 1960-61, when he averaged 14.8 points and 6.9 rebounds per game. He finished his career with 822 points. His scoring average of 12.3 points per game ranked eighth in school history at the time of his graduation. The Rockets finished with winning records in his junior and senior seasons, going 18-6 (9-3 MAC) in 1959-60 and 15-8 (8-4 MAC) in 1960-61. Galicki was drafted by the Pittsburgh Rens of the ABA (American Basketball Association) in 1961. He later served two years in the U.S. Army and earned MSEE and MBA degrees from the University of Toledo and University of Dayton, respectively.

Tim Harman, 1970-1972

Tim Harman played guard on teams that combined for a record of 46-27. He was co-captain of the 1971-72 Rockets that won the MAC co-championship. He served as sole captain in 1970-71. He was a three-year starter and averaged 10.1 points per game (793 points in 73 games) and 4.6 rebounds per game. He was known for his defensive effort and general overall team play. He made the all-tournament team at the 1972 Michigan Invitational. He was Academic All-MAC in 1971-72.

Ralph Lewis, 1959-62

Quick on his feet, three-year letterwinner Ralph Lewis was known for his outstanding defense. In his senior season, he was the second-leading scorer on the team with 11.9 points per game to go along with 5.8 rebounds. As a junior he averaged 9.7 points and 5.1 rebounds. A co-captain as a senior, Lewis excelled both on the court and in the classroom as can be seen after he earned the Ray Andrews Award for Outstanding Achievement. He earned a Bachelor of Education Degree in Comprehensive Social Sciences. After college, Lewis attended law school and was admitted on to the Ohio Board. He served as a Municipal Prosecutor, Chief Prosecutor, Civil Trial Attorney, and Chief of Litigation for the city of Toledo for 23 years.

Jim Maher, 1952-1954

Jim Maher played for the Rockets his junior and senior years after transferring from Ohio State. A 6-1 forward, Maher was best known for his speed and athleticism up and down the court. Maher played on the 1953-1954 MAC Championship team, the first ever at UT. He started in 15 of the 22 games that season, averaging 9.8 points per game (fourth on the team) while shooting 47 percent from the floor and averaging 5.8 rebounds. He had 21 points and 10 rebounds in the final regular-season game vs. Ohio to clinch the MAC title. Maher also played baseball at UT, starting in center field. Maher and his late wife, Joann Francis, were Rocket supporters and season ticket holders for many years.

Davage "Dave" Minor, 1942-43

Credited with being one of the first players ever to shoot a jump shot, Davage Minor was a rare UT athlete. He only played one year at UT, and then he was sent off to the war for three years. In his time spent as a Rocket, though, Minor was the only freshman All-American to be selected in the 1942-43 season. Known for his "showmanship," Minor led the Rockets to a win over Manhattan with his broken hand still in a cast. Along with Dallas Zuber, he led the Rockets to the finals of the 1943 NIT, scoring 11 points in a semifinal 46-49 win over Washington & Jefferson, and tying for team-high honors with nine points in the 48-27 loss in the championship game to St. John's. Minor's other notable accomplishments include being placed on the cover of *Life* magazine and being the fourth African-American to ever be drafted in the NBA. After WWII, he went on to finish his college career at UCLA, where he was an All-American for the Bruins. He went on to play professional basketball for the Baltimore Bullets, the Milwaukee Hawks, and the Harlem Globetrotters. Minor died in March 1998 at the age of 76.

Tom Nichols, 1953-1956

No information submitted.

Dr. Brad Rieger, 1980-1983

Brad Rieger was a defensive specialist and one of the quickest players for Coach Bob Nichols during his four years with the Rockets. As a junior, he was second on the team in assist ratio, trailing only Tim Reiser. He currently is the superintendent of Sylvania Public Schools.

Joe Shanks, 1932-1934

Joe Shanks was a guard for the Rockets from 1932-1934. It was likely that he would have ranked in the Top 10 for career scoring but broke his hand in a game against Heidelberg in 1934.

Abraham Steinberg, 1927-1929

Former member of the Varsity 'T' club, Abraham Steinberg lettered in basketball from 1927-1929. A graduate of Scott High School, he earned an M.D. from George Washington University in 1934. He was a practicing surgeon in Toledo for the next 50 years.

William Walker, 1927-1930

William Walker lettered in basketball from 1927 to 1930. He was captain of the 1929-30 team. He was an all-conference player each season. He was killed on December 16, 1944 at the Battle of the Bulge.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL**Melissa Goodall, 2007-11**

Melissa Goodall was a three-year starter who helped lead the Rockets to the 2011 WNIT Championship in her senior season. She was a part of Rocket teams that won 86 games, including a school-record 29 games in 2010-11. The Rockets won back-to-back MAC West titles in 2009-10 and 2010-11, making the WNIT both seasons. As a senior captain, Goodall averaged 12.9 points and led the Rockets with 6.9 rebounds. She made third-team All-MAC, the MAC All-Tournament team, twice was named MAC Player of the Week, and was named Top Interior Player on the team by her teammates. As a junior, she averaged 9.7 points, 6.4 rebounds and shot 50.5% from the field, making honorable mention All-MAC and leading the Rockets to the finals of the MAC Tournament. She finished her career with 1,131 points (22nd in UT history), 724 rebounds, 83 blocks (fifth) and 131 games played (sixth). She made the Academic All-MAC team in 2010-11 and was the 2011 Chuck Ealey Undefeated Spirit Award recipient. After graduation, she played two seasons of professional basketball in Spain and Italy.

Mitzi Hallinan, 1981-1984

Mitzi Hallinan joined the women's basketball team in 1981 after transferring from Alabama-Birmingham. Prior to coming to the United States, she had proven herself an outstanding player at the national level in her native Australia. Mitzi is 14th all-time at Toledo in career scoring with 1,124 points, second in steals (346) and sixth in assists (400). After graduating, she joined Steve Mix and Tim Selgo for two years as an assistant for the women's program. In 1986, she returned to her hometown of Sydney.

Jennifer Heisler, 1979-1983

A four-year starter and letterwinner, Jennifer Heisler was the team's MVP her freshman year and made all-tournament teams while earning academic honors as well. She was the first woman in UT history to score 1000 career points and finished her career with 1,155 total points, which ranks 14th all-time at UT. Heisler led the Rockets in scoring in 1979-80 (14.9) and 1980-81 (12.7). She also ranks ninth in career field goals made (508) and career free throw percentage (.755). Heisler became the first player to be a two-time First Team Academic All-MAC selection in 1983 and 1984. After college, she entered the teaching profession and has been teaching junior high and high school for 24 years. Today, Heisler serves as Edgerton High School's assistant athletic director.

Courtney Ingersoll, 2009-12

Courtney Ingersoll was a four-year letterwinner who earned third-team All-MAC honors as a senior in 2011-12. She started every game as a senior, averaging 11.9 points and 4.3 rebounds in 35.0 minutes per game (her 1,189 minutes played that season ranks second all-time at UT behind Sophia Wiard's 1,213 in 2023-24). She ranked first in the MAC and 13th in the NCAA in three-point field goals made per game (2.8) and second in the MAC in three-point field goal percentage (44.2%). Ingersoll participated in the 2012 State Farm College Three-Point Championships at the Final Four in New Orleans. As a junior, she was part of the team that won the WNIT Championship with six straight victories, including the 76-68 win over USC in the championship game. Ingersoll made 69 starts in her four-year career, averaging 6.3 points per contest. In Toledo's record book she is tied with Kelly Savage for most three-pointers made in a season (96 in 2011-12), is second in season three-point field goal percentage (44.2% in 2011-12). For career marks, she is seventh in three-point field goal percentage (36.6%) and three-pointers made (176). Ingersoll also earned Academic All-MAC honors as a senior.

Liz Meiring, 1983-86

Liz Meiring ranks 12th all-time in scoring at Toledo with 1,435 points. She led the Rockets in scoring and rebounding in her junior (17.0 ppg/11.0 rpg) and senior seasons (15.4/8.0). She still ranks fifth all-time with 869 career rebounds and tied for 10th with a .477 field-goal percentage. Her 11.0 rebound average in 1984-85 is the second-best season mark in UT history. Liz earned second-team All-MAC honors in 1984-85 and 1985-86, as well as honorable mention all-league honors in 1983-84. She also made the MAC All-Tournament team in 1984.

Janice Monakana, 2013-17*

Janice Monakana was a two-time All-MAC honoree, earning second team honors in 2016-17 and honorable mention in 2015-16. She was a team captain of the 2016-17 team that won the MAC Tournament Championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2001. As a senior, she averaged 12.1 points and 6.0 rebounds per game. She scored a team-high 15 points in a 67-63 win over Kent State in the MAC Tournament quarterfinals to help the Rockets advance to the semifinals. Monakana averaged 11.1 points and a team-high 5.9 rebounds as a junior, earning honorable mention All-MAC. She ranks 10th in school history in career free throw percentage (.777) and 21st in scoring (1,172 points). Started in 74 of 126 games in her college career. A native of England, she played four years for England's U-16 - U-18 National Teams from 2010-13.

FOOTBALL**Mike Alston, Jr., 2003-06**

Mike Alston, Jr. was a two-time, first-team All-MAC linebacker who finished his Rocket career with 184 tackles. He ranks fifth at UT in career sacks (21.5) and seventh in tackles for loss (36.5). As a junior in 2005, Alston earned first-team All-MAC honors, ranking third in the MAC in sacks (9.5) and 10th in tackles for loss (12.5). He had a career-best three sacks in Toledo's 45-13 GMAC Bowl victory over UTEP, including one at the end of the first half that knocked the Miners out of field-goal range. He was named Defensive MVP of that game. Alston repeated as a first-team All-MAC honoree in 2006, finishing third in the league tackles for loss (17.0) and seventh in sacks (7.0), as well as making 65 tackles. Alston played on teams that went 31-18 during his four years, won two West Division title and a MAC Championship in 2004. Alston played one season for the Cleveland Gladiators of the Arena Football League. After graduation from UT, he went on to earn an MBA from Tiffin and currently works in the insurance industry.

Darren Anderson, 1988-1991

From 1988-1991, Darren Anderson lettered as cornerback for the UT Rockets. In 1991, his senior year, Anderson served as co-captain of the team and was named first-team All-MAC. He was co-leader on the team that season with two interceptions. He was a starter on the 1990 team that went 9-2 and was MAC co-champion. Upon leaving UT, he was drafted in the fourth round of the NFL Draft by the New England Patriots, at the time the third-highest draft pick in Rocket history. He played seven years in the NFL for three teams: the New England Patriots, Tampa Bay Buccaneers and the Atlanta Falcons, with whom he made a Super Bowl appearance in 1998.

Darren also ran track, winning a MAC title in the 55 meters and finishing second in the 100 meters. He graduated with a degree in business management and is currently the CEO of Marichron Pharma.

Bruce Arthur, 1969-72

Bruce Arthur was the back-up quarterback to Chuck Ealey in 1970 and 1971, then stepped up to earn first-team All-MAC honors as a senior in 1972. In 1971, Arthur played in 11 games in a reserve role. In 1972, Arthur started in 10 games, helping the Rockets to a 6-5 record. He threw for 1,168 yards, completing 83-of-171 passes. He was MAC Player of the Week in a 35-21 upset of Miami, completing 20-of-31 passes for 339 yards (at the time the second-most yards in UT history) and two TDs. Arthur played for the Detroit Lions during the players' strike of 1974, starting in four preseason games. He returned to UT in 1976-77 to coach quarterbacks and receivers. He has been in the veterinary supply business in Florida for the past 30 years.

Lynn Aschliman, 1969-1971

Center Lynn Aschliman started 34 games during the UT Rockets 35-game winning streak from 1969-1971. In 1970 he missed one game because he had a knee injury. Only three other players started as many games as Aschliman did during "The streak." "No athlete that I have ever coached did more with less than Lynn. I have never coached a man who had more intestinal fortitude and desire," according to Coach David Hardy.

Steve Banks, 1969-1971

Cornerback Steve Banks played three seasons (35-0) with the Rockets. In 1971, Banks set the all-time season career punt returns list with 37. He remains third on the all-time career punt returns list with 65. Banks once had three interceptions in one game, vs East Carolina in 1971.

Jim Bates, 1993-97

Jim Bates was three-year letterwinner who earned second-team All-MAC honors at center as a senior in 1997. Bates was voted a team captain in 1997, a year in which Toledo went 9-3 and won its first MAC West Division title. He also played on the 1995 team that went undefeated and won the Las Vegas bowl. Jim graduated with a degree in education in 1998 and currently serves a department head for General Motors in Detroit. He and his wife Andrea reside in Livonia with their two young children, and where he coaches youth football.

Charles Barcelona, 1951-1954

In 1953, defensive lineman Charles Barcelona served as a co-captain of the football team. His senior year, he was voted All-MAC. He lettered on the gridiron for three years. In 1954, Barcelona graduated with a marketing and advertising major. He was selected as a Distinguished Military Graduate from UT and awarded a special Army Commission.

Mike Bell, 1972-1976

Bell was a three-year letterwinner at defensive end and tri-captain on the 1976 Football team. He played in 31 quarters as senior and had 62 tackles as a junior. Bell played in the 1976 Ohio Shrine Bowl Game. He is a former fire chief and is the former mayor of the city of Toledo.

John A. Brown Sr., 1964-1967

John Brown was a first-team All-MAC offensive guard as a senior on the Rockets' MAC Championship team in 1967, earning honorable mention All-America honors by the Associated Press that same year. Brown was a three-year letterwinner. He switched from defensive end to offensive guard as a sophomore and was named the team's Most Improved Player. He played special teams all three years and earned his place in the starting lineup on the offensive line as a junior. He began his junior season as a top reserve on the offensive line and eventually worked his way into the starting lineup. Brown earned a Bachelor of Education degree in 1969 from UT and a Masters of Education from Xavier University in 1980. He served two years as an officer in the United States Army, including a tour of duty in Vietnam. He was awarded the Bronze Star for Meritorious Achievement in Ground Operations. He also received Bronze Star with "V" Device for Valor and Heroism in Ground Combat. Brown was an athletic director for the Newark (NJ) City School District from 1981 until his retirement earlier

this year. In 1999, Brown was inducted into the Central District Athletic Director's Hall of Fame. A baseball umpire for over 30 years, Brown was honored again by his peers with his induction into the Ohio High School Athletic Association Officials Hall of Fame in June of 2009.

Bob Carson, 1951-1952

Bob joined the Rockets in 1951. In 1952 he led the team in scoring (37 points), pass receptions (18) and rushing (322). He still holds the record for the most extra points kicked in one game (10). A co-captain in 1952, Carson also had 428 receiving yards, a record at the time, and average of 23.8 yards per catch. After graduation Bob served as varsity backfield coach at Scott High School for five years. Bob was inducted into the Waite High School Athletic Hall of Fame March 19, 1975. He was also inducted into the Toledo City Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996.

Matt Comer, 1997-2001

Matt Comer was the left guard for Toledo's offensive line, earning four varsity letters. Matt played on three MAC West Champion teams (1997, 2000, 2001). Also, played on the MAC Championship team in 2001. And the Motor City Bowl Championship team of 2001. He started 22 games and voted Team-Captain by his teammates his senior year. By the end of his senior year, Matt was voted Outstanding Offensive Lineman for 2001, and was nominated for 2nd-Team All-MAC. Comer was also selected to be on the 2000-2001 Verizon Academic All-American District Team. Matt is now employed as a teacher and coach at North Central High School in Indianapolis. Matt teaches Computer Applications and Entrepreneur classes. He is now happily married and has two daughters.

Bob Dame, 1954-55

Bob Dame was an outstanding lineman, opening holes for great runners like Mel Triplett, Dick McKimmy, Dick Basich, Tamp Taramino and others. Dame proved there was life after football by establishing himself as a premier land developer and custom home builder in northwest Ohio. He is a valued member of the Varsity "T" Club and contributor to the Varsity 'T' All-Sports Pavilion.

Jerry Evans, 1987-1990

Jerry Evans, a tight end, was the Rockets' Most Valuable Player in 1990, leading the team to a share of the MAC title. He had 38 receptions and was named first team All-MAC. In 1991, Evans played in the All-American Bowl in Tallahassee, FL and the East-West game in Palo Alto, CA. As a freshman, he made 15 catches for 250 yards, including a 92-yard touchdown pass vs. Central Michigan, a UT record. His sophomore season, he caught 18 passes for 232 yards and two touchdowns. As a junior, he was the team's leading receiver with 43 catches for 511 yards and two touchdowns. After graduating, Evans was drafted by the Phoenix Cardinals and later played with the Denver Broncos.

Bill Flynn, 1961-65

Bill Flynn was a defensive back who lettered in 1964 and 1965. He was employed as an engineer.

Bob Flynn, 1967-70

Bob Flynn was a defensive back who won three letters from 1968-70, and was a starter in 1969 and 1970. He passed away in 2005.

Jim Gasiowski, 1949-1951

Jim Gasiowski was the starting center from 1948-1951. During the 1948 and 1949 football seasons he played both ways as a linebacker and center. In 1951, he served as the team's co-captain. He also lettered in baseball, track and tennis. After graduation, he started his career in education as a teacher only to be drafted into the Army in 1953. At the completion of boot camp, he was assigned to Fort Belvoir to play football and actually played against the University of Toledo. When he finished his tour-of-duty in the army, he returned to the Toledo area. Since 1955, Gasiowski has attended each Toledo Rocket home game and the majority of away games. In addition, he travels throughout southern Michigan talking to athletes about the opportunities UT offers. For the 36 years, Gasiowski served in public education—most notably as athletic director and later principal of Bedford

(MI) High School.

Thomas F. Gibney, 1957-1959

Thomas was a three year letterman, playing both offense (center) and defense (inside linebacker). He played the role of captain for UT in 1959. After graduating from UT with a BA degree in Business Administration in 1960, he continually supported UT athletic programs for 43 years. Tom is continually involved in Varsity “T” club functions and most recently he has held the position of Director of Finance at St. John’s High School.

Marcus Goodwin, 1989-1992

From 1989-1992, Marcus Goodwin lettered in football as a wide receiver. During his junior and senior seasons, Goodwin led the Rockets in receiving and was named first-team All-MAC. As a senior in 1992, he caught 58 passes, including 13 receptions and one TD in an upset win against Purdue. As a junior in 1991 he caught 42 passes. After earning his business degree, Goodwin went on to play in the CFL with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers for three seasons. He also played in the Arena Football League. He later became Vice President and Co-Founder of the House of Emmanuel and sits on the YMCA Harbor Health Care Boards.

Jon Gotwald, 1975-78

Jon Gotwald was a four-time letterwinner on the defensive line from 1975-78. He won the Norm Cohen “Freshman of the Year” award as a freshman, and was named a co-captain as a senior. He graduated from UT with a degree in civil engineering, and later received his master’s degree in engineering management from the University of Florida. He is currently a vice-president at George F. Young, Inc, and is involved in numerous charitable and volunteer organizations in the St. Petersburg, FL area. He is on the Board of Directors of the University of Toledo Suncoast Chapter of the Alumni Association.

Donta’ Greene, 1998-2002

Donta’ Greene was a four-year starting wide receiver on teams from 1999-2002 that won or shared three MAC West titles (2000, 2001, 2002), one outright MAC Championship (2001), went to two bowl games and compiled a record of 35-13. Greene was fourth on the all-time UT list for career receptions (188) when his career was over, and seventh in receiving yards (1,979). He is the school’s all-time leader in punt return yards (712) and punt return average (14.2). He ranks second in kickoff return average for a season (22.5 in 2002). Greene led the team in receptions in 2001 (62), was second in 2002 (63) and 2000 (31), and third as a freshman in 1999 (31). He was named to the MAC Academic Honor Roll in 1999, 2000 and 2001.

Tom Guitteau, 1959-62

Tom Guitteau played four seasons of football for the Rockets, earning a letter as a senior in 1962. He joined the varsity as a sophomore in 1960 where he played offensive and defensive end. In his junior and senior seasons he played guard. An accidental injury suffered in practice in his junior season, led him to lose sight in his left eye, and later to lose his eye altogether. Tom graduated with a bachelor’s degree in Education in History and Government / Phys Ed and Health in 1963. He received a master’s degree in educational administration in 1973. He taught social studies at St. Francis de Sales High School in Toledo, where he coached football, basketball and track. He then went on to teach at Rogers High School in Toledo where he was the head football coach and interim boys basketball coach. Since 1974, he has worked in Toledo sports radio covering local high school football. He was inducted into the St. Francis de Sales High School and Toledo City League halls of fame. He has served as president and vice president of the Varsity T Club, and is a longtime Rocket Fund member and season ticket holder for UT Football and Basketball. He has also served as an academic mentor for the Rocket football, softball, men’s golf and women’s track & field teams, and was a class encourager for the football team. Tom is active in the National Football Foundation, having served as treasurer, membership chairman and numerous committees.

Rusty Hanna, 1989-92

Rusty Hanna was UT’s career field goal leader for 26 years with 68 field goals made until Jameson Vest broke his record in 2018. His 68 career field goals tied Miami’s Gary Gussman for the most by a MAC kicker and still ranks tied for fifth all-time. Hanna still holds the UT record with 99 field goals attempted. He kicked a then-record 21 field goals as a senior in 1992, fifth-best in the nation that season and a mark that still ranks third in UT history. He also holds the single-game record with six vs. NIU in 1992. His longest field goal was 51 yards, a record at the time and still tied for the third-longest in school history. Hanna twice made second-team All-MAC, in 1990 and 1992, and was a three-time Academic All-MAC selection. Since graduating, Rusty has been a teacher and coach in Springfield Local Schools in Holland, Ohio, and has tutored numerous kickers, including former Rockets Jason Robbins and Todd France.

Tony Harris, 1968-1970

Tony Harris was a running back for the Rockets during the first two seasons of “The Streak” under Frank Lauterbur. He led the Rockets with 889 yards rushing in 1969. He was named first-team All-MAC in 1969 and was a team captain in 1970. He also earned honorable mention All-America honors from the AP in 1969. Harris was selected in the fourth round of the 1971 NFL Draft, at the time the second-highest pick in school history. In 1969, Harris averaged 5.8 yards per carry, which ranked 15th in the NCAA that year. He missed much of the 1970 season due to a knee injury but bounced back in time to gain 101 yards in the Tangerine Bowl. His single-game rushing mark was 217 yards vs. Villanova in 1969, which coincidentally was the first game of the 35-game winning streak. Harris spent three season in the NFL with San Francisco, Denver and Washington. After graduating from UT, Harris earned his master’s degree at the University of San Francisco. He currently resides in Atlanta.

Keno Hatfield, 1934-1936

Jim Hays, 1947-1950

Jim Hays was a three-year starter at running back and defensive back from 1948-50. He was voted the team’s Most Valuable Player in 1950, rushing for 572 yards, catching 11 passes and making five interceptions on defense. Hays holds the record for average yards per carry for a season with 7.73 (74 carries for 572 yards in 1950), a record that stood for 64 years until it was broken by Kareem Hunt in 2014. He also holds the No. 5 spot on that list with 6.65 yards per carry in 1949. He has the second-longest punt return in school history (90 yards) and twice returned kickoffs 90 yards for touchdowns. Hays, who lettered in track & field in 1949, was selected to play in the East-West Shrine Game after graduation and was signed as an undrafted free agent by the Chicago Bears in 1950. He returned to UT to become the asst. freshman football coach in 1951. He served as a captain in the USMC from 1952 to 1965. He earned his Master’s Degree in Education Administration in 1960 from UT and served as a teacher and coach until 1968. Hays was also the interim coach for the UT Women’s Cross Country Team in 1984. He worked for the city of Toledo from 1968-84, then as an administration assistant to the UT athletic director until 1988.

Ray Hayes, 1965-1967

From 1965-1967, Ray Hayes lettered in football as a defensive tackle. He was voted second-team All-MAC in 1966 and first team All-MAC on the MAC Championship team in 1967. As a rookie with the AFL’s New York Jets, Hayes was a member of the 1968 Super Bowl Championship team—in their “guaranteed” win over the Baltimore Colts.

Jeff Hepinstall, 1974-77

Jeff Hepinstall began his career as a wide receiver and eventually became the team’s quarterback. Hepinstall caught 49 passes for 614 yards in 1975, earning second-team All-MAC honors. In 1976 he moved to QB, throwing for 1,299 yards and eight touchdowns. In one game vs. Marshall, he rushed for four touchdowns and threw for another. As a senior co-captain in 1977, Hepinstall threw for 359 yards and two scores. He earned Academic All-MAC honors in 1975 and 1977, and earned the James Falvey Scholar-Athlete Award in 1978.

Kelly Herndon, 1995-98

Kelly Herndon won four letters and was a two-year starter at cornerback for the Rockets. He had 154 career tackles and four interceptions. As a senior he started all 12 games, finishing sixth on the team with 72 tackles and picking off three interceptions and leading the team with nine pass breakups. He has gone on to play five years in the NFL, most recently as a starter with the Seattle Seahawks where he broke the Super Bowl record for longest interception return at the 2006 Super Bowl.

Treyvon Hester, 2012-16*

Treyvon Hester was a three-time All-MAC defensive lineman who played from 2012-16. For his career he had 161 tackles and 31.5 tackles for loss. After redshirting in 2012, Hester made an immediate impact in 2013, making 3.5 sacks and 7.5 tackles for loss, earning third-team All-MAC honors. He made second-team All-MAC as a sophomore in 2014, totaling 45 tackles and 7.0 TFL. In his junior season, Hester racked up 34 tackles and 6.5 TFL. Hester finished off his career as a Rocket by making second-team All-MAC as a senior, totaling 39 tackles, 5.0 sacks and 8.0 TFL. Voted a team captain as a senior, Hester was on the official watch lists for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy (top defensive player) and Outland Trophy (top interior lineman), and was invited to play in the East-West Shrine Game. Hester went on to play three seasons in the NFL with Oakland, Philadelphia and Washington.

Roy Hodge, 1955-57

Roy Hodge played football for the Rockets from 1955-57, earning first-team All-MAC honors in 1957. He also was a Golden Gloves boxing champion in 1956.

Chris Hohenberger, 1978-1981

A local Central Catholic graduate Chris Hohenberger never missed a snap in his four year career with the Rockets (45 games). A four-year starter on the offensive line as a center, Chris was selected as an Offensive Lineman of the year as well as receiving the Rocket Club Award for consistent outstanding play. In 1979, Chris received a Playboy Pre-season All-American Special Mention. As center for the Rockets Chris was the 1981 Rocket strength and conditioning champion where he received the "Hustle Award" nine times and selected as player of the game on eight different occasions. Chris played on the 1981 Mid-American and California Bowl Champions. In 1983 Chris graduated from the University of Toledo with a degree in Education continuing his education graduating in the top 10% from the Toledo College of Law in 1987. Chris is currently the President of Root Edventure, Inc. of Toledo, OH.

Bradford Huebner, 1967

Bradford Huebner lettered in 1967 as a linebacker. Huebner served in Vietnam after graduation.

Steve Huffman, 1985-1987

Steve Huffman lettered in football as a linebacker from 1985-1987. As a senior in 1987, Huffman was selected to the second-team All-MAC, served as a co-captain for the Rockets and was named the team's Most Valuable Player. He also recorded 19 tackles in one game. As a junior, he was selected to first-team All-MAC. During the 1986 and 1987 seasons, he made Academic All-MAC. He later graduated from medical school and became a physician. He currently practices in Tipp City, OH.

Kareem Hunt, 2013-16*

A three-time All-MAC selection, Kareem Hunt is Toledo's all-time leader in career rushing and third in MAC history with 4,945 yards. He rushed for over 100 yards in 28 games as a collegian, the most in UT history, and his career rushing average of 6.32 yards per carry also ranks first all-time at UT. Four times he rushed for over 200 yards in a game, including a career-best 271 yards in a 63-44 win over Arkansas State in the GoDaddy Bowl in January of 2015. Hunt also rushed for five touchdowns in that game, tying Barry Sanders' record for most

rushing TDs in a bowl game. In 2017, just prior to his entry into the NFL, he was voted the No. 7 player in the 100-year history of Toledo football. A third-round draft pick, Hunt went on to lead the NFL in rushing as a rookie with the Kansas City Chiefs, racking up 1,327 yards and earning an invitation to the Pro Bowl. Hunt was named first-team All-MAC as a senior in 2016, rushing for 1,475 yards and 11 touchdowns. He also caught 41 passes for 403 yards that season. As a junior, Hunt battled injuries but still rushed for 973 yards and earned second-team All-MAC accolades. He helped lead the Rockets to a 10-2 record, rushing for two touchdowns in a 32-17 win over No. 24 Temple in the Marmot Boca Raton Bowl. Hunt's biggest season came in 2014 when he rushed for 1,631 yards and 16 touchdowns as a sophomore, despite missing three games due to injury. A first-team All-MAC selection, Hunt averaged a whopping 7.96 yards per carry, second-best in the country. He rushed for 265 yards in a 27-20 win over Bowling Green, then topped that with 271 yards at the GoDaddy Bowl, for which he was named MVP of that contest. Hunt gained 866 yards as a freshman, splitting time with Hall of Famer David Fluellen. Among his many distinctions, Hunt fumbled only once in his career in his freshman season, and never lost a fumble to the other team. He finished his college career with a streak of 742 chances without a fumble. Since graduation, Hunt has played five seasons in the NFL with the Chiefs and his hometown Cleveland Browns.

Tim Inglis, 1983-1986

Inglis twice made All-MAC as a linebacker. As a junior in 1985, Inglis was named first-team All-MAC after finishing second on the team in tackles (129). As a senior, he was the team's leading tackler with 157 and made second-team All-MAC. He played 11 games as a freshman, making 40 tackles and one interception. He was awarded the Cohen Trophy, an honor given annually to the "freshman player contributing the most toward the success of the team." Inglis was second on the team with tackles (133) as a sophomore during the 1984 season, leading the team to a MAC Championship and a trip to the California Bowl. Inglis led the Rockets to a first-place ranking in the MAC in total defense (1985), rushing defense (1983 & 1985) and scoring defense (1984).

Keon Jackson, 2002-05

Keon Jackson was a two-time All-MAC safety on Rocket teams that won three MAC West crowns and one MAC Championship title, and played in three bowl games. He was a first-team All-MAC pick in 2005 and a second-team selection in 2004. Jackson returned four of his 10 career interceptions for touchdowns, setting a school record and tying the MAC record for TDs off interception returns. He picked off a pass against Miami in 2004 MAC Championship Game and returned it 31 yards for a touchdown in a 35-27 Rocket victory. A four-year starter who played in 50 games in his career, Jackson finished with 286 tackles and 26 tackles for loss.

Anthony Jordan, 2002-05

Anthony Jordan earned four letters at linebacker from 2002-05, racking up 392 career tackles and 22.5 tackles for loss in 51 games, including 45 straight starts. A two-time team captain, Jordan was a second-team All-MAC selection in 2005 when he led the team with 107 tackles and was second with 10.0 tackles for loss. Jordan earned the Nicholson Award in 2005 as the team's top player, the Iron Man Award for the most dedicated in the weight room, and was named MAC Defensive Player of the Week three times. He was also listed as the No. 9 inside linebacker in the nation by The Sporting News. As a junior in 2004, he was second on the team with 107 tackles. He had a career-high 138 tackles in 2003, which led the team and was fifth in the MAC. He started eight games as a freshman, moving over to defensive end due to injuries and making 40 tackles. During Jordan's career, the Rockets tallied a 35-16 record, eighth-best in the country during that time period, including program record-tying 17 home victories in a row.

Rick Kaser, 1951-1953

Rick Kaser was football star for the Rockets who also played two years of baseball. He was a wide receiver on offense, a defensive back on defense and return specialist, starting in all but four games (knee injury) in three seasons. He was selected first-team All-MAC in 1952 (despite missing four games due to a knee injury), the first Rocket to receive this honor. Kaser was UT's leading receiver with 11 catches in 1953, and also led the team in interception yardage (114 yards in 1951, still fifth on UT's all-time list). Kaser is best remembered for leading UT to victory over Bowling Green in 1952. He caught a 29-yard TD pass and returned an interceptions 96 yards

for the winning score in a 12-6 victory in a rain-soaked game that ended in brawl. A three-time letterwinner, Kaser was drafted by the Detroit Lions in 1954 and later played in the CFL for British Columbia for two years and Ottawa for one season. He worked for Sun Oil Company for 28 years before retiring in 1989.

Zac Kerin, 2010-13

Zac Kerin was a three-time All-MAC center for the Rockets who started 38 consecutive games from 2011-13. After playing as a reserve in his redshirt freshman season in 2010, Kerin earned second-team All-MAC honors as a sophomore. He was a key part of a Rocket offense that finished eighth in the nation in scoring (42.2) and 10th in total offense (481.3). Kerin made first-team all-conference honors as a junior in 2012, making the Rimington Award Watch List as the nation's top center. He made second-team All-MAC accolades as a senior, anchoring an offensive line that allowed just six sacks, the fewest in the country that season. A civil engineering major, Kerin was a three-time Academic All-MAC selection, earning Academic All-District honors in 2012. Since graduation, he has played in the NFL with Minnesota, Detroit and Washington.

George Keim, 1971-1973

George Keim was a versatile player, being the placekicker, running back and full back and a receiver out of the back field. Keim was a member of the historic 35-0 winning streak teams, playing in the final season of 1971. George kicked 43-46 extra points during his 1971 season, finishing 83-93 in his three seasons at UT. He kicked a 30-yard field goal on the final play of his first game to give the Rockets a win over Villanova in 1971. In his three varsity seasons, George had 128 rushing attempts for 400 yards and eight touchdowns. He also compiled 11 career pass receptions for 100 yards, as well as 15 field goals and was 83-of-93 on extra points.

Edward Knecht, 1948-1949

Edward Knecht was a two-year letter winner in football. Knecht went on to a career as a teacher and coach. He served as an assistant coach at Idaho and Oregon State. He was the Athletic Director at Idaho from 1969-1974.

Jack Laraway, 1978-1981

Laraway was a four-year letterwinner at linebacker for the Rockets. Jack was captain on the 1981 UT MAC Championship team that also won the California Bowl. Laraway ranks third at UT for all-time career tackles with 459. Laraway received Honorable Mention All-MAC in both 1980 and 1981. He also ranked in the top-five in the MAC for most tackles three straight years from 1979-1981. While at UT, he started 34 straight games, missing only one game and five practices in his four years.

Tony Lee, 1981-83

Tony Lee made first-team All-MAC as a placekicker in 1982 and 1983, yet he is probably best known for a kick he made in the 1981 California Bowl, a game-winning 41-yarder with just seconds left to give UT a 27-25 victory over San Jose State. Lee made 40-of-51 field goal attempts in his career, including 10-of-13 as a sophomore, 15-of-19 as a junior and 15-of-19 as a senior. He was 82-of-85 in extra points. His 205 points ranks fifth all-time among UT kickers. He also ranks fourth in career field goals (40) and third in field-goal percentage (78.4). His best game came against Central Michigan in 1982 when he booted four field goals. Lee was named to the Academic All-MAC team in both 1982 and 1983. He went on to play for the USFL Pittsburgh Maulers for one season. Lee also won two letters in track & field as a high jumper, with a top lead of 6-feet-8 inches. Today, Lee is an assistant principal at Wooster Tri-Way High School in Wooster, Ohio, where he has also served as the head football coach.

George Linberger, 1986-1989

A four-year starter and 1989 captain for the Rockets, Linberger anchored the line that blocked for Kelvin Farmer, one of the leading rushers in UT history. Linberger received the Nicholson Award (Team MVP) and was a first-team All-MAC and UPI honorable mention All-America selection in 1989. In addition, he was nominated for the Vern Smith Conference MVP Award and was the only UT offensive lineman ever nominated for that award

until Greg Mancz won the award in 2014. A preseason All-MAC pick by the Sporting News in 1987 and 1988, Linberger was drafted in the 5th round on the inaugural World League of American football draft but was injured in camp and missed the season. He later signed as a free agent with the Detroit Lions, and played in the Arena Football League with San Antonio and Las Vegas. He was a professional heavyweight boxer from 1992-2007 with a career record of 29-9-1 with 25 KO's, holding numerous titles. He defeated Eric "Butterbean" Esch for the NABC super heavyweight title in 2005. Linberger is the CEO of the LEAP and SOAR alternative programs located throughout Northeast Ohio that he oversees, owns, and operates. His schools work with students with behavioral and learning disabilities between eight locations that work with as many as 600 challenged students each year.

Matt Lindsey, 1974-75

Matt Lindsey won letters in football in 1974 and 1975. He has been the head football coach at Fort Wayne Bishop Luers from 1987-2011. He compiled a 227-97 record with state titles in 1989, 1992, 1999, 2001, 2002, 2007, 2009, 2010 and 2011.

Mel Long, Jr. (1997-2000)

Mel Long, Jr. was a wide receiver for the Rockets from 1997-2000. He still ranks 10th all-time with 175 receptions, 10th in receiving yards (2,188) and ninth with 21 TD catches. He caught at least one pass in 46 straight games in his career, the second-best streak in UT history. He led the team in catches three times: in 1997 (47), 1999 (47) and 2000 (50). He played on teams that won or shared three MAC West titles.

Clint Longenecker, 1973-76

Dr. Clint Longenecker lettered in 1976 and had the distinction of rooming with former head coach Tom Amstutz for four years. He has served as a mentor to numerous UT football players over the years. He is a professor in the College of Business at UT.

Clarence Love, 1994-97

A cornerback, Love made first-team All-MAC in 1997 and second-team All-MAC in 1996. In 1997, had 71 tackles and three interceptions. In 1996, totaled 48 stops and one pick. He played seven seasons in the NFL for Philadelphia, Baltimore and Oakland before retiring in 2005. Love played in the Blue-Gray All-Star Game after his senior season and was drafted by Philadelphia in the fourth round of the 1998 NFL Draft.

Darryl Meadows, 1979-82

Darryl Meadows was a three-time letterwinner for the Rockets, earning first-team All-MAC honors as a defensive end in 1982. He started his career as a safety, making 17 tackles and snagging two interceptions as a sophomore. He moved to defensive end in his junior year, when he made 73 tackles, four sacks and had two picks. As a senior, Meadows was named a team captain, was fifth on the team with 89 tackles, adding three tackles for loss, one sack and two pass deflections, earning first-team All-MAC honors, as well as the team's Defensive Lineman of the Year. Meadows was a key member of the 1981 team that won the MAC and the California Bowl. After graduation, Meadows was signed as a free agent with the NFL's Houston Oilers, where he played for two seasons.

Kevin Meger, 1988-1992

A team captain in 1992, Meger finished his career with an overall record of 25-10-1, capturing a co-MAC Championship as a sophomore in 1990. He garnered second-team All-MAC honors as a junior and led the Rockets to their first win against a Big Ten opponent in 1992, a 33-29 win over Purdue. For his performance he earned offensive player of the week accolades from Sports Illustrated. Meger is also ranked fourth in passing completions and fifth in passing attempts for a single game, as he went 33-of-52 against Purdue. He earned at least one MAC player of the week award in each of his four seasons. Meger ranks fifth in UT history in career passing yardage (6,023 yds.) and passing attempts (892). In addition, he is fifth in career yards per attempt with 6.8 yards per throw and sixth in career completions with 465 completions. In his senior campaign, Meger won the Jim Nicholson Award as the team's MVP, as well as the Don Saul Spirit Award. Upon leaving UT, he played professional football in the Canadian and Arena leagues.

Dan Molls, 2009-12

Dan Molls was a two-time All-MAC linebacker and a first-team Academic All-America selection as a senior in 2012. Molls led the nation with 166 tackles in 2012, earning first-team All-MAC honors. He had at least 13 tackles in 10 games and led the team in tackling in every game but one (the bowl game in which he was injured on the game's opening kickoff). He was a Butkus Award candidate and was a national semifinalist for the National Football Foundation Scholar Athlete Award. As a junior, Molls missed six games due to an injury but still finished third on the team with 70 tackles, averaging 12.0 tackles per game in UT's last five games of the season. As a sophomore, Molls was second in the MAC and 10th in the nation with 143 tackles, earning third-team all-league honors. He also tied for the team lead with three interceptions. A three-time Academic All-MAC honoree, Molls finished his career with 422 tackles, which ranks sixth in UT history.

John Murray, 1958-1961

A three-time letterwinner, fullback John Murray was the team's rushing leader in 1960 with 608 yards and a team-best five touchdowns. He was invited to play in the Senior Bowl in Mobile, AL and the Gem Bowl in Erie, PA.

John Nemec, 1965-68

John Nemec played football for the Rockets from 1965-68. He was a commissioned officer in the U.S. Army and coached football at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. He later coached high school football in Ohio. He has been an Ohio Hall of Fame coach and administrated the Ohio Big 33 football program.

Douglas H. Neuendorf, 1971-73

Douglas was team captain of the football team in 1973, earning first-team All-MAC honors as an offensive guard. He was drafted in 1974 by the Detroit Wheels of the World Football League. He earned his master's degree in education from UT and has worked as a high school teacher and football coach for 31 years.

Steve Odom, 2003-06

Steve Odom ranks fourth all-time at UT with 216 career receptions and seventh with 2,631 career receiving yards. Runner-up for MAC Freshman of the Year in 2003 after catching 62 passes for 838 yards and six TDs. Named to sporting News All-Freshman team. Caught 53 passes as a sophomore, 55 as a junior and 46 as a senior, Caught TD passes in the 2005 GMAC Bowl and 2004 MAC Championship Game.

Todd Olsen, 1985-88

Todd Olsen was a three-time All-MAC selection at offensive guard, the only three-time all-league football player not currently in the Varsity 'T' Hall of Fame. He made second-team All-MAC in his sophomore and junior seasons, then made first-team honors as a senior in 1988. His twin brother, Tim played at the other guard spot for UT, earning second-team All-MAC honors as senior in 1988.

Aaron Opelt, 2006-09

Aaron Opelt played in 39 games as Toledo's quarterback from 2006-09, starting in 33. He ranks fifth with 46 career TD passes, sixth in career passing yards with 6,804 and ninth in career completion percentage (57.7). His best season came in 2008 when he completed 59.8 percent of his passes for 2,176 yards. His most famous victory came that season when he completed 33-of-50 passes for 257 yards in a 13-10 upset over Michigan. He also holds the record for most pass attempts in game, launching 67 attempts vs. Purdue in 2009.

Roger Peluso, 1949-53

A three-time letterwinner in football from 1950-52, Roger Peluso played guard on the offensive line for UT. He earned his bachelor's degree in history in 1953. He was the first former UT student-athlete to be named president of the Downtown Coaches Association. He and his wife Lillian live in Sylvania and have been married for 62 years.

David E. Penn, 1965-1969

Penn was the freshman captain on the football team in 1965 when he also was active in another varsity sport at Toledo. In his sophomore year he was red shirted. In 1967, his third year, Penn made the varsity and became a

starting defensive back for the Rockets when Toledo was a 9-1 MAC Championship Team. As a fifth year senior in 1969, Penn was captain for the 11-0 Rockets that would go on and win the Tangerine Bowl and finished the season as UT's leading punt and kickoff returner. As a third, fourth, fifth year on the team Penn held the record for extra points. He was honored as the team's top freshman, receiving the Cohen Trophy. After graduating, he was signed by the Seattle Seahawks and later played for the Arizona Wranglers of the USFL. Penn graduated from Toledo with a degree in engineering and has worked with IBM for 30 years.

Anthony Pizza, 1946-47

Anthony Pizza played two seasons of football at UT as a tackle alongside his brother Frank. He played with the Buffalo Bills after graduation, and later coached high school football in Pontiac, MI.

Jim Rance, 1967-1969

As an offensive tackle, Jim Rance started every game, beginning with his first year of eligibility as a sophomore. Jim was also the only sophomore to start on offense the MAC Championship of 1967. His senior season, he was All-MAC and served as the Rockets' co-captain of the offensive unit. He was awarded second-Team All-MAC honors during the 1968 season. During 1969 season, Jim was awarded first-team All-MAC honors and All-American honorable mention. The Rockets went a combined 25-5-1 during Rance's career.

Bernard Reedy, 2010-13

Bernard Reedy was a two-time All-MAC wide receiver and kick return specialist who finished his career with 195 receptions and 2,743 receiving yards. Both figures that rank sixth on UT's all-time career receiving list. As a junior in 2012, Reedy was named first-team All-MAC at wide receiver and punt returner, and second-team at kickoff returner, becoming only the second Rocket to make all-league at three positions (Eric Page turned the trick in 2011). He had a team-high 88 receptions for 1,113 yards that season, and was second in the MAC in punt return average (11.1) and kickoff returns (27.7). He returned one punt and three kickoffs for touchdowns, and was named MAC West Special Teams Player of the Week in three consecutive weeks. As senior in 2013, Reedy caught 62 passes for 840 yards, earning second-team All-MAC honors. He was also fourth in the league in kickoff return average (22.3). In his sophomore season, Reedy caught 40 passes for 758 yards and a career-high nine TDs. He was named MVP of the 2011 Military Bowl when he caught three TD passes in a 42-41 win over Air Force. Reedy has played for three teams in the NFL, most recently as a kick returner for Tampa Bay in 2017.

David Ridgway, 1977-1980

David Ridgway ended his career with a total of 119 points as a placekicker. In his senior season, he was perfect in extra points (20-for-20) and was 5-of-6 in field goal tries. Ridgway was 69-of-76 during his career in PATs and 17-of-41 on field goal attempts. He reportedly hit a field goal of 55 yards during a Rocket practice. After graduating with a degree in physical education, Ridgway, a Canadian native, played with the CFL Saskatchewan Roughriders. He was tagged with the nickname "Robo-Kicker" and became one of the most celebrated kickers in league history. When he retired in 1996, Ridgway was the league's No. 2 all-time point scorer with 2374 points in 238 games. He also was second in career field goals with 574, and is still the league's all-time leader in accuracy, hitting 78 percent of his attempts. Ridgway made the CFL all-star game six times, and was named All Western Conference seven times. In 1989, he kicked the winning field goal in the CFL Grey Cup Championship and was named the game's Canadian MVP. His kick ended the Roughriders' 23-year championship drought. In 1990, Ridgway tied the CFL record for points in a season (233) and set the record for field goals (59). He was named the league's top kicker in 1988, 1990 and 1991. In 1987 he hit a 60-yard field goal, a league record at the time, and in 1993 he connected on a record 28 consecutive field goals. In 2003, Ridgway was inducted into the CFL Hall of Fame.

David Rohrs, 1985-87

David Rohrs was a three-time letterwinner at running back who led the Rockets in rushing with 681 yards in 1987. He also competed on the track team, earning one letter. He earned his degree in physical education. After graduation, Rohrs served in the Peace Corps in Yemen before moving on to careers in modeling, teaching and personal training

Paul Sandor, 1984-88

Paul Sandor earned first-team All-MAC honors in 1987 and second-team honors in 1986. He led the team with four sacks in 1987. He later played one season of football with the Toronto Argonauts.

Ed Scott, 1971-1974

One of the leading tacklers in the country in 1973, Scott was a first-team All-MAC player as a senior and a second-team performer as a junior. He was a team captain as a senior and led the Rockets in tackles each year. Scott's 204 tackles as a junior are ranked third on UT's all-time list and his 195 tackles as a senior are sixth all-time.

Arnold Smiley, 1980-83

Arnold Smiley was a three-time letterwinner as a running back, rushing for 1,013 yards and earning second-team All-MAC as a sophomore in 1981. Smiley helped lead his team to victory in the 1981 California Bowl. Smiley was also an effective kickoff returner, leading the team in kickoff return average in 1980 (19.4) and 1983 (18.2). Smiley totaled 1,903 rushing yards in four seasons. After his playing career ended, Arnold joined the United States Air Force. He was deployed during the first Gulf War in Bahrain supporting F-4 phantom air operations in the theater.

Barry Sneed, 1964-66

Barry Sneed was a first-team All-MAC linebacker in 1966. A team captain as a senior, Sneed also earned the team's Jim Nicholson Award (MVP) that season and made AP honorable mention All-America. Sneed holds the single-season record with 240 tackles in 1964, averaging 24.0 tackles per game. He added 154 tackles as a junior in 1965, giving him 395 tackles in two seasons. Unfortunately, individual tackle statistics are not available for the 1966 season. He played in all 40 quarters that season so it is reasonable to assume he would be close to or pass the Toledo career record of 508 tackles (held by Hall of Fame Aaron Bivins). Sneed also holds the single-game record with 30 tackles, which he did twice in 1964 (vs. Villanova and Miami).

Terry Swanson, 2014-17*

Terry Swanson was a two-time All-MAC running back for the Rockets from 2014-17. He ranks fifth on Toledo's career rushing list with 3,601 yards, tied for fourth in 100-yard games (15) and sixth in yards per carry (5.86). As a senior he rushed for 1,363 yards and 14 touchdowns, both tops in the MAC, helping the Rockets go 11-3 and win the 2017 MAC Championship. He earned first-team All-MAC honors that season. His best game came in a 66-37 win over Bowling Green in which he rushed for 192 yards. Swanson burst onto the scene as a freshman in 2014, rushing for 732 yards and finishing second in the MAC and 15th in the country by averaging 6.48 yards per carry. As a sophomore, he earned second-team All-MAC honors, rushing for 923 yards and coming in second in the MAC with a 6.51 rushing average. Playing behind All-MAC teammate Kareem Hunt in 2016, Swanson rushed for 583 yards as a junior in 2016. Swanson had a brief stint in the NFL with the Houston Texans in 2018, playing in four preseason games. He later signed with the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the CFL in 2020. Swanson, who graduated from Toledo with a degree in communication in 2018, served as the Rockets' coaching staff as director of player development in 2021 and 2022.

Albert Thigpen, 1988-1991

While playing center, Albert Thigpen started in 6 of 11 games and played in 8 of 11 in his freshman year. He was awarded the Norman Cohen Trophy as "freshman of the year." In his sophomore year he started in all 11 games as center and went on to receive All-MAC honorable mention. In 1990 he was the anchor to the offensive line that led the MAC in total rushing and total scoring offense. The team also went on to be co-champions along with Central Michigan. Was named co-captain in his senior year. He received the Rockets' most outstanding offensive lineman award in his senior year. He also received first-team All-MAC honors. He was named as the Don Saul Spirit Award winner by the Downtown Coaches Association, and awarded the James P. Falvey Memorial Award for Outstanding Scholar Athlete in 1992.

Adonis Thomas, 2007-11

Adonis Thomas rushed for 2,360 yards in his career, which ranks 14th in school history. He earned second-team All-MAC honors in both his junior and senior seasons. As a senior he rushed for 1,071 yards, leading the MAC with 6.3 yards per carry. Thomas, who was on the official watch list for the Doak Walker Award, likely would have led the MAC in rushing but suffered a broken arm on his first carry vs. Syracuse, forcing him to sit out the next three games. After playing briefly vs. Miami on Oct. 22, Thomas hit his stride, racking up 683 yards and eight touchdowns in the final three games of the season. Included in that run was a 216-yard performance in a 66-63 win over Western Michigan. As a junior, Thomas rushed for 1,098 yards, leading the MAC with 6.3 yards per carry and earning second-team all-conference accolades. He rushed for a season-high 193 yards and two touchdowns vs. FIU in the 2010 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl.

Dennis Tobias, 1965-1968

Tobias received honorable mention All-MAC honors in 1967 and second-team All-MAC honors in 1968 as a receiver. He was UT's leading receiver in his senior season in 1968 with 27 receptions for 294 yards. A versatile athlete, Tobias was offered a free agent contract with the San Diego Chargers and also had a tryout with the Pittsburgh Pirates. He earned his Bachelor of Education, Master of Education, and then went on to become an Education Specialist in 1978. Tobias is a member of Varsity 'T' Club and its Executive Board. He was inducted into the Mercer County (PA) Athletic Hall of Fame in 2004.

Roger Wadsworth, 1950-1952

Roger was a defensive linebacker for the Rockets. Wadsworth, who graduated from DeVilbiss High School, was a three-time letter winner. He was also co-captain in 1952. He also participated on the wrestling team.

Morris Weinblatt, 1922-26

Both a center and defensive end, Morris Weinblatt was a member of the first Rockets' championship team (Northwest Ohio League in 1923). The 1923 team, anchored by Weinblatt on both sides of the ball, allowed just two touchdowns all season. According to the Toledo Blockhouse: "Morrie held down the pivot job, and he was a tower of strength in the center of the line. Although outweighed every game, he never allowed himself to be knocked out. He will be with us for three more years and shows promise of being one of the best centers Toledo U has ever had." Nicknamed "Boxcar," Weinblatt was named "Freshman of the Year" in 1922 and "Most Improved Player" in 1924. Academically, he graduated with honors in 1927 from the Toledo College of Pharmacy. He became Toledo's first full-time psychiatrist and created the first psychiatric unit in the Toledo area. Weinblatt went to medical school at the University of Michigan, where he also played football for the Wolverines (he was the center prior to Gerald Ford). He volunteered for the U.S. Army and served with distinction as a Captain of the Medical Corps, serving as a battlefield psychiatrist in Africa, Italy and France. In addition, Weinblatt was a lifetime member of the University of Toledo Alumni Association and the Athletic Association's Varsity 'T' Club. Weinblatt passed away in 1979. He was nominated by his son, Chuck Weinblatt.

Stephen Williams, 2005-09

Stephen Williams was a three-time All-MAC wide receiver who ranks second on Toledo's career reception list with 229 catches. He also ranks third in receiving yards (3,102) and ninth in touchdown receptions (21). Williams emerged in his sophomore season, catching 73 passes for 1,169 yards and seven touchdowns. His receiving yardage total ranked 15th in the nation that season and was the third-most ever by a Rocket at the time (now sixth). Williams, who was named second-team All-MAC, had 15 receptions in one game (tying the then UT record) and had six games with at least 100 yards receiving. As a junior, Williams repeated as a second-team All-MAC choice, ranking sixth in the league with 71 receptions for 781 yards and eight TDs. He had six receptions in a 13-10 upset over Michigan that season. Williams earned first-team All-MAC honors as a senior, catching 79 passes for 1,065 yards and seven scores, becoming Toledo's all-time leading receiver at the time (since passed by Eric Page). He had his best game at Purdue, catching 15 passes for 185 yards and two TDs. Williams was signed by the Arizona Cardinals as an undrafted free agent after his graduation from UT.

Ken Wilson, 1968-1970

Ken Wilson was a three-year starter at offensive tackle. He was first-team All-MAC his senior season in 1970 and earned honorable mention All-American Midwest District in that same year. Wilson started every game from 1968-1970 and carried a 75 percent blocking percentage.

MEN'S GOLF***Robert Hayes, 1952-1955***

Robert Hayes played golf for UT from 1952-55 after a successful career at Sylvania Burnham High School. He put up some remarkable numbers on the golf course during that time (75 collegiate career average). As a freshman he finished with the second best stroke average on the team. Hayes was selected to represent UT in a golf match on May 19, 1996 at Inverness Country Club. He graduated from UT in 1956 and is the General Manager of Cape Industries in Warren, MI.

WOMEN'S GOLF***Sathika Ruenreong, 2012-16****

Sathika Ruenreong earned first-team All-MAC honors in all four seasons of her Rocket career (2012-16) and set school season records for stroke average (73.83), most rounds (36), most rounds under 80 (36), and tied the record for most tourney titles in a season (2). She is the only Rocket to receive first-team all-conference honors on more than two occasions. Sathika ended her career ranked first in school history for lowest stroke average (74.94) and is currently the co-leader for most tournament crowns (4). She also is tied for second with lowest 54-hole score ever (210) and tied for third for lowest round ever (67). Sathika also became the first Rocket ever to appear in the NCAA Regionals as she tied for 36th place out of 96 golfers at the Shoal Creek Regional in 2016. Sathika's top finish at the MAC Championships was a second-place showing as a freshman in 2013.

WOMEN'S SOCCER***Corrie Hasenjager, 1999-2002***

Corrie Hasenjager was a four-year letterwinner on the Toledo women's soccer team (1999-2002). Hasenjager currently holds the school record for most career goals (40) and is tied for first in most goals in a single season (15). She also ranks second in UT history in career points (87) and third in shot attempts (217). The 2000 second-team all-league honoree was a two-time MAC Player of the Week (Sept. 10, 2001 & Nov. 2, 1999) and a member of the MAC Academic Honor Roll in 2001-02.

Ali Leak, 2006-09

Ali Leak was a four-year letterwinner from 2006-09, earning first-team All-MAC honors as a senior in 2009. She helped the Rockets win MAC Tournament championships in 2006, 2007 and 2008, and made the MAC All-Tournament Team in 2006, 2008 and 2009. Leak earned a spot on the NSCA All-Region Team in 2009 and the ESPN All-District team in 2007 and 2009. On UT's career leaders list, Leak ranks in the top 10 in goals (21), points (54) and assists (12). She led the team in goals (6) as a senior and was named the team's Offensive Player of the Year. She finished second behind Hall of Famer Molly Cornwell in goals and points in her freshman, sophomore and junior seasons. Leak was an Academic All-MAC and Academic All-Ohio selection in 2007, 2008 and 2009, and an Academic All-District pick in 2007 and 2009. She graduated summa cum laude with a degree in marketing and professional sales. She is currently an account executive for a genetics research firm in Columbus.

Kristen Lynn, 2008-11

Kristen Lynn was a two-time All-MAC honoree who played on teams that won three regular-season MAC titles, two MAC Tournament Championships, and made two trips to the NCAA Tournament. A forward, Lynn scored nine goals as a senior, earning second-team All-MAC honors and helping guide the Rockets to a 14-7-2 mark and a MAC Championship title. As a junior, Lynn was the team's co-leader with seven goals, earning first-team all-conference recognition. The Rockets went 15-4-2 that season and won the MAC regular-season title. For her

career, Lynn scored 22 goals, helping lead Toledo to a 56-22-9 mark in her four seasons. Lynn holds the school record (along with Amanda Brown) with four goals in a single game.

Rachel MacLeod, 2010-13

Rachel MacLeod was a two-time first-team All-MAC player who scored 33 goals in her Rocket career, tied for the second-most in school history. He 17 career assists also is tied for second all-time in the UT record books. MacLeod led the Rockets in goals for three consecutive seasons from 2011-13, earning team Offensive MVP honors all three seasons. In 2010, she scored five goals, helping the Rockets to a 15-4-2 record and a regular-season MAC Championship title. She was named MAC Freshman of the Year as well as being named to the MAC All-Freshman Team. As a sophomore in 2011, MacLeod led Toledo to regular-season and MAC Tournament Championship titles, paving the way for an appearance in the NCAA Tournament. MacLeod led the Rockets in goals (11) and assists (9) and was named MAC Offensive Player of the Year, First Team All-MAC, as well as earning a spot on the All-MAC Tournament team. She was also named Third-Team All Great Lakes Region in 2011. As a junior, MacLeod again led the Rockets in goals (5) and assists (3). In her senior season in 2013, MacLeod was named a team captain, scoring a career-best 12 goals and earning first team All-MAC for the second time in her career. After graduation, MacLeod served as director of operations at UT for one season.

Jen Whipple, 2002-06

Jen Whipple was a four-year letterwinner as a goalkeeper on the Toledo women's soccer squad (2003-06). A second-team all-conference honoree as a senior, Whipple helped lead the Rockets to their first-ever MAC Championship and NCAA appearance in 2006. She had five shutouts that season, making the MAC All-Tournament Team as well as the All-Ohio squad. She was also named the Most Valuable Senior Female athlete in the Athletic Department for the 2005-06 school year. For her career, Whipple had 17.5 shutouts (second all-time at UT) and a 1.28 goals against average (fourth). An Academic All-MAC selection in 2005 and 2006, Whipple went on to serve as the goalkeeper coach at UT from 2007-09, before moving on to coach one season at Indiana State. Whipple earned her bachelor's degree in exercise science. She has worked in the mental health field since 2011.

Erin Flynn Wierzba, 2007-10

Erin Flynn was a four-year starter as a midfielder on soccer teams that went 56-21-10 (32-9-3 in MAC play), winning two MAC Tournament titles (2007, 2008) and two regular-season crowns (2008, 2010) in that span. She earned first-team All-MAC honors and made the MAC All-Tournament Team as a senior in 2010, scoring three goals and adding four assists for the season. In 2007, Flynn made the MAC All-Freshman Team, tallying three goals and two assists on the season, including the tying goal against Bowling Green in the MAC Tournament finals that sent the game into overtime. A two-time team captain, Flynn was a three-time Academic All-MAC selection. At the completion of her career at UT, Flynn was second in school history in matches started (71) and tied for second in contests played (87). Flynn continued her soccer career as the head varsity girls soccer coach at the Atlanta Girls School in Atlanta, Ga. (six years), the Seven Hills School in Cincinnati, Ohio, the Houston Christian School in Houston, Texas, and the St. Johns School in Houston, where her team finished runner up in Southwest Preparatory Conference (SPC) tournament last season. Erin completed her Masters of Education at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. She is married to former Rocket baseball player Joshua Wierzba (Class of 2010). They currently live in Houston, Texas and have two sons, Connor (3) and Cole (1).

Kirsty Wilson, 2003-06

Kirsty Wilson was a four-year letterwinner on the Toledo women's soccer squad (2003-06). A first-team all-conference honoree as a senior, Wilson played a key role in the Rockets capturing their first MAC Tournament title in school history. She was also selected to the Great Lakes Region Third Team and All-Ohio First Team in 2006. For her outstanding efforts on the pitch during UT's postseason run as a senior, Wilson was named to the MAC All-Tournament Team. An excellent student in the classroom as well, Wilson was a member of the Academic All-MAC team in 2006, as well as part of the MAC Academic Honor Roll in 2004-06. Following the completion of her senior campaign, Wilson was awarded with the team's Defensive MVP award.

SOFTBALL***Erica Singer, 2004-08***

Erica Singer was a four-time letterwinner who earned second-team All-MAC honors as a senior in 2008. She led the Rockets in hitting in 2004 (.298) and 2008 (.355). An outfielder, Singer ranks in the Toledo career top-10 in eight offensive categories: batting average (8th/.317), home runs (6th/20), RBIs (6th/94), slugging percentage (2nd/.527), runs (4th/99), doubles (third/41) triples (2nd/10) and walks (3rd/78). She ranks 10th in MAC history in career slugging percentage, and 17th in walks. In her freshman season, Singer hit a team-best .298 with six homers and 16 RBIs. She also led the team with a .513 slugging percentage, 19 runs scored and 14 stolen bases. As a sophomore, Singer was second on the team with a .312 average, adding six homers and a team-best 29 RBIs. She hit .324 in 2006, with five homers, 10 doubles and a team-high 28 RBIs. Singer missed most of 2007 with an injury but came back to have perhaps her finest season in 2008, leading the team with a .355 average, adding three home runs, four triples, 10 doubles and 20 RBIs. Singer earned Academic All-MAC honors as a senior in 2008. She graduated with a degree in physical therapy, earning her doctorate in physical therapy from UT in 2011.

Lindsey Tobias, 2010-13

Lindsey Tobias was a three-time All-MAC outfielder from 2011-13. She ranks in the top 10 in both season and career hitting marks at UT for home runs, RBIs, total bases and stolen bases. Her career totals were 21 homers (2nd), 111 RBIs (2nd), 280 total bases (5th), 42 stolen bases (6th) and 178 hits (9th). As a sophomore, Tobias earned second-team All-MAC honors, hitting a team-best .331 with seven HRs and 29 RBIs. A year later, she led the team in 13 offensive categories, earning first-team all-league accolades. She hit .344 with eight homers, six doubles, two triples and 42 RBIs. She also finished fifth in the MAC with 17 stolen bases in 20 attempts. As a senior, Tobias made second-team All-MAC, hitting .329 with four HRs, five triples, four doubles and 29 RBIs. She also led the team with a career-best .408 on-base percentage. Tobias was an outstanding student, earning Academic All-MAC honors in her junior and senior seasons.

MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING***Brent Ransom, 1995-2000***

Brent Ransom swam the butterfly and IM for the Rockets for four seasons. He holds the fourth-fastest time in school history in 100 fly and sixth-fastest in the 200 fly. He had numerous top 10 finishes in the MAC Championship Meet in the butterfly, breaststroke and IM. He has coached swimming for many years at the collegiate and high school levels. He has coached at Toledo St. Francis High School since 2014 and was named OHSAA Boys Swimming Coach of the Year in 2023. He coached for many years at the Greater Toledo Aquatic Club.

Steve Sanford, 1984-88

Steve Sanford won four letters from 1984-88. He finished in the top four in two individual events and one relay at the MAC Championships all four years, and was UT's high point scorer in three of those years. In his four years as a Rocket, Sanford placed second, second, fifth, and third in the 200 breaststroke at the MAC Championships. He broke school records in the 100 and 200 breaststroke as a freshman, records that held up for eight years. In dual meets throughout his career, Sanford had 29 first-place finishes, and three second-place finishes. As a senior he was the recipient of the Robert Fountain Award. He later served a graduate assistant coach with the program from 1988-90 and served for many years as a park ranger with the Florida Park Service.

Robert Wohl, 1976-1979

At the 1979 Mid-American Conference Championship, Robert Wohl became the first University of Toledo swimmer to win a MAC individual event. He won the 200-yard butterfly by touching out his younger brother, from Kent State University, who was the favorite to win. He was named to the All-MAC team, was named Toledo's "Outstanding Swimmer" and earned the Outstanding Senior Scholar Athlete Award and Leadership Excellence Award that season. When he finished his UT career, Wohl held six individual (200, 500 and 1000 freestyle; 100, 200 fly; 200 IM) and three relay (400 medley, 400 free, 800 free) school records. Wohl, a Toledo St. Francis graduate, originally went to the University of Kentucky, but transferred to UT in 1975 and became eligible for

the 1976-1977 season. As a sophomore, he scored the most points during the dual meet season. He placed third in the 200 butterfly, seventh in the 100 butterfly at the 1978 MAC Swimming Championships, scoring 20 points for the Rockets. Wohl went on to serve as a graduate assistant coach for the Rockets in the 1979-80 season. He went on to coach high school swimming at Toledo St. John's, Blue Springs (Missouri) and Findlay, Ohio, as well as an assistant at Ohio State. He retired from teaching in 2022.

WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING***Kendra Akers, 1992-1995***

Kendra Akers established herself as one of the early greats in the beginning years. She is a former recipient of the Ruth Hawkins Heldt Most Valuable Swimmer Award (1994). She established UT records in the 100-freestyle, 200-freestyle and 500-freestyle. Akers also set new records as a member of all five-relay events during her career. At the MAC Championships, Akers was a perennial Championship Finalist (Top 8) in the 50, 100 and 200-freestyle. She was named All-MAC and Academic All-MAC in 1995.

Beth Rogers, 2010-14

Beth Rogers was a four-time All-MAC swimmer (three times on first team) from 2010-14 who won four MAC Championship titles in her four-year career. She still holds four school records in the 50 freestyle, 100 and 200 butterfly and 400 medley relay. As a freshman, she earned collegeswimming.com Mid-Major All-American honorable mention and Second-Team All-MAC accolades after taking second in the 200 butterfly at the MAC Championships with a school-record time of 1:59.57. A year later, she won MAC titles in the 200 butterfly, 200 medley relay, 400 medley relay and 800 freestyle relay, helping the Rockets win the 2012 MAC Championship title. She earned the first of her three first-team All-MAC honors, setting school records in the 50 freestyle (22.76), 100 butterfly (53.50) and 200 butterfly (1:57.87; MAC Record). She had 31 top-five finishes in 2012, all but two in the top two. Rogers was again named to the All-MAC First Team in 2013, with 14 first-place finishes during the season. She took third in the 100 fly and fourth in the 50 freestyle at the 2013 MAC Championship Meet. As a senior, Rogers took second place at MACs in the 100 and 200 fly, earning first-team All-MAC honors for the third time in her career.

MEN'S TENNIS***Eric Alleyne, 1962-66***

Eric Alleyne played tennis at UT from 1962-66, winning MAC Championship titles at No. 3 singles and No. 3 doubles as a senior in 1966. He was a captain on the MAC Championship team in 1966 (the first of the Rockets' seven league titles), the first African-American to hold that post at UT. Alleyne came face-to-face with Jim Crow laws on a road trip to the Carolinas, where he was not allowed to stay at the team hotel, staying in private homes instead. Nevertheless, he posted victories over No. 1 singles players from ACC and Big Ten schools Alleyne earned his degree in business at UT. After graduation, Eric served in the U.S. Army as a 2nd lieutenant and later served as an executive at several multi-national corporations, including Wal-Mart. Alleyne passed away after a battle with cancer in December of 2016.

Todd Dominiak, 1985-1988

Todd Dominiak was named first-team All-MAC in 1988. He was team captain and was the No. 1 singles player as a senior. He is the only tennis player to win nine City of Toledo Singles Championship titles. Altogether he has won 22 City of Toledo titles—nine singles, four doubles, and nine mixed doubles. He won the National Champion 35 & over Clay Court Doubles in 2002 and placed third in the Singles 35 & over National Clay Court in 2002. Todd was inducted into the St. Francis de Sales High School Hall of Fame in 2004 for his achievements in tennis. In September of 2005, Todd was recognized by the city of Toledo for his achievements of winning nine City Tennis Championships. For the past 18 years he had been the Head Professional at Laurel Hill Swim and Tennis; recently he accepted the same position at the Belmont Country Club. He coached the U.S. 10-and-under team in 2005 in international competition in Croatia. He is currently working as a color commentator on BCSN tennis broadcasts.

Brad Minns, 1983-1986

Between 1984-1986, Brad Minns was the team's No. 1 Singles player and compiled a winning record each year. He was awarded UT Student-Athlete of the Year award in 1987. Minns was nominated as Athlete Citizen of the Year in 1986 in the Lloyd Bridges Celebrity Golf Tournament and played No. 1 singles in the 1986 Dresse Cup Tournament, winning the gold medal in both singles and doubles. Minns is one of the few tennis players from Toledo to play professionally. During the 1990s he won two tournaments in addition to his careers in modeling, personal training and bodybuilding. Minns became deaf when he was three, and serves as a motivational speaker.

Richard Nagy, 1967-70

A three-time letterwinner from 1968-70, Nagy was a MAC champion at No. 4 singles in 1969 and No. 3 singles in 1970, as well as MAC runner-up at No. 6 singles as sophomore in 1968. His singles records were 11-6 in 1968, 17-5 in 1969 and 17-8 in 1970. His doubles records were 4-4, 13-8 and 7-5-1. In 1969, Nagy won the UT Scholar-Athlete Award for the varsity athlete with the highest grade point average. He was the winner of the ROTC Gold Star Award for academic excellence in 1968 and was named a student commander of the ROTC brigade in 1970. He and former teammate and Varsity T Hall of Famer Greg Morton are still competing as doubles partners, and at one point were ranked No. 4 in the nation in the USTA 55-and-over category.

George G. Spaulding, 1941

George G. Spaulding played one year of tennis at the No. 4 position as a senior in 1941, his only year at UT. He also served as interim coach that year when the head coach was drafted into the Army. Spaulding later served as a vice president for General Motors. He taught at the College of Charleston, served on the Board of Trustees for the Business School and was and Executive-in-Residence Emeritus until his death in 2015 at the age of 95.

Tim Thomas, 1970-1973

Tim Thomas won five individual titles and was elected team captain two years in a row. The team won three MAC titles with one second-place finish in his four years. Since graduating he has founded the Houston Association for Wheelchair Tennis and created a tennis program for the Houston School for Deaf Children.

WOMEN'S TENNIS***Sheila Hart-Chiricosta, 1978-81***

Sheila Hart-Chiricosta was the first Rocket women's tennis player to earn first-team All-MAC honors as a senior in 1981, an impressive feat considering she began playing tennis at the age of 16 and walked on at UT in her freshman year. She later served as the head coach of the Bowling Green women's tennis team from 1987-90. She has won numerous amateur championships since leaving UT. Among them are USPTA 2005 Midwest Player of the Year for Open Division and 35-and-over Division; 2006 USPTA Player of the Year for 35-and-over Division; 2004 USTA Mother/Son Clay Court Championship; 2004 Fiesta Bowl Champion (45 and over division); 2004 Fiesta Bowl Champion (mixed doubles division, with husband Rick); 2005 Midwest Indoor Singles Champion. She is married to former Rocket tennis player Rick Chiricosta (1974-78) and has three tennis-playing children, Matt, Christine and Nikki. She has stayed active in coaching at the junior level, coaching several top-ranked junior girls.

Martina Wodzinski, 2006-10

Martina Wodzinski was a three-time All-MAC selection, earning first-team honors as a senior in 2010, and second-team recognition in 2007 and 2008. She was named MAC Freshman of the Year in 2007. She had an all-time singles record of 73-45 and doubles record of 81-37. Wodzinski played at No. 1 singles and No. 1 doubles beginning in her sophomore season. Her singles records were 26-8 in 2006-07, 16-12 in 2007-08, 12-15 in 2008-09 and 19-10 in 2009-10. Her doubles records were 20-13, 24-5, 20-6 and 17-13. Wodzinski led the Rockets to the semifinals of the 2009 MAC Tournament, their best finish in school history.

MEN'S TRACK & FIELD/CROSS COUNTRY***Peter MacEwan, 1970s***

Peter MacEwan was the intermediate hurdles MAC champion in 1971 and held the UT school record. He was the team captain in 1971 and the assistant track coach. He held the He distinguished himself academically in the College of Engineering. After graduation he attended Stanford University, obtaining a master's degree. He has built structure in California, Texas, Colorado and Ohio.

Don Trumbull, 1979-82

Don Trumbull was a top thrower on the track team, winning the 1982 MAC Outdoor and Indoor titles in the shot put. He also set the school record in the hammer throw (since broken) to qualify for the NCAA Championships in that event. In 1981, he earned All-MAC honors in three events (shot, discuss and hammer). He won championships at the 1981 Georgia Relays (shot put) and 1982 Kentucky Relays (hammer). Trumbull graduated from UT with a degree in education.

WOMEN'S TRACK&FIELD/CROSS COUNTRY***Sandra Brazeau, 2005-09***

Sandra "Sandy" Brazeau participated in track & field from 2005-09. She is on the Toledo all-time Top 10 list for discus, shot put, hammer and weight throw. In 2006, she was ranked as one of the top freshman throwers in the Mid-American Conference. In 2017, she was inducted into the Swanton High School Hall of Fame, where she holds the record in both shot put and discus. Sandy earned her bachelor's and master's degrees in criminal justice from UT, graduating cum laude.

Barb Veselich, 1981-82

Barb Veselich was the first UT women's track and field athlete to score points at the 1982 MAC Championship Meet, placing sixth in the javelin (139-7), setting a school mark that still holds today. Veselich transferred from UT after the 1982 season. She later became a coach at Western High School in Baltimore City Public Schools, coaching swimming, basketball track& field and strength & conditioning. She then embarked on a career in powerlifting, setting nine world records and earning 12 gold medals to date.

VOLLEYBALL***Kathy (Mesteller) Bankowski, 1975-1978***

A four-year letterwinner and two-time team Most Valuable Player, Bankowski led the 1978 volleyball team to a 21-13 record. A team captain from 1976-78, she helped capture the 1978 Wayne State Tournament Championship. She has been inducted into the Waite High School Hall of Fame and the Toledo City League Hall of Fame. Upon leaving UT, she has compiled a 256-63 record coaching volleyball at Bedford High School where she guided her team to the 1988 Michigan State Final Four. Bankowski has also been named the *Monroe Evening News* Coach of the Year in 1986 and the Coach of the Decade in 1988.

Gretchen Klotz, 1990-1993

Gretchen Klotz was one of the top setters in Rocket volleyball history. As a four-year starter and a second-team All-MAC selection as a senior, she set several UT career records. Klotz holds the record for career assists (4,865), is second in career assists per set (11.56), and 10th in career digs (986). Her name sits in the top 10 for most assists in a single season for each year in which she played. In addition, she is one of three Rockets who rank in UT's top five for most assists in a match. Klotz, also ranks seventh in career assists in MAC history.

Angie May, 1996-97

Angie May transferred to UT from Youngstown State for her junior and senior seasons, helping the Rockets qualify for the MAC tournament in 1997 for only the second time in school history. She holds the school record for kills in a season (517 in 1997), attacks in a season (1,360 in 1997) and kills per set (4.31 in 1997). She was named team MVP in 1997 and also holds the UT career record for kills per set (3.83). May ranks tied for second for kills in a match with 29 vs. EMU in 1997. She also had 28 kills vs. Bowling Green in 1997. May graduated from UT, the Medical College of Ohio (now UTMC) and St. Augustine College. She is a currently a physical therapist. She and her husband Brian Strong, a UT graduate, have three children and live in Tipp City, Ohio.

Lauren Rafdal (2010-13)

A four-year letterwinner and two-time team captain, Lauren Rafdal led the Rockets to their best season ever in 2013 when they went 19-12 (12-4 MAC) and won their first and only MAC West Division title. As a senior in 2013, Rafdal earned first-team All-MAC honors and became the first and only Toledo player to make the AVCA All-Region Team. She led the Mid-American Conference with 492 kills and set the school record with 1468 attempts. For her career, Rafdal amassed 1,233 kills, which ranks sixth in school history. She was named Academic All-MAC and was awarded the MAC Medal of Excellence in 2013.

WRESTLING**Charles Biggert, Jr., 1975-79**

Charles Biggert, Jr. was a three-time letterwinner and two-time captain for the wrestling team, winning one MAC title at 150 pounds and finishing in second place twice. As a senior in 1979, Biggert won the MAC title and finished in seventh place at the NCAA Championships, earning All-America honors. He was the MAC runner-up and an NCAA qualifier in 1977 and 1978. Biggert began his college career at Ohio University, where he wrestled as a freshman on the 1975 MAC Champion squad. Biggert earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from UT, coaching as a graduate assistant for the Rockets in 1980. A three-time high school state qualifier, Biggert is a member of the Oak Harbor High School Hall of Fame. After graduation, he worked for many years as a county superintendent before retiring.

Paul Boyko, 1954

Dan Kay, 1980-83

Dan Kay was a four-year letterwinner in wrestling at UT from 1980-83, winning three straight MAC titles in 1981, 1982 and 1983 at 177 pounds. Dan redshirted his first year at UT due to a broken collar bone, but bounced back to place third in the MAC as a redshirt freshman in 1980. He was team captain his sophomore, junior, and senior years. He routinely led the team in wins and points scored, and helped the Rockets win the MAC championship in his senior season. After graduating from UT in 1983 in marketing, Dan went on to earn his Juris Doctorate from UT in 1986. He was the Deputy District Attorney in Colorado Springs from 1987-97. Since 1997 Dan has been in private practice where he lives in Colorado Springs. He is very active in the Colorado Springs community, and is involved in numerous charitable organizations. Dan and his wife Linda have raised three children and have been foster caregivers for the past seven years.

John Potts, 1981-84

John Potts was part of several MAC Championships teams.

Jeff Reiner, 1983-87

Jeff Reiner was the Mid-American Conference heavyweight wrestling champion in 1983, 1985 and 1987. Reiner is a 1989 graduate of the University of Toledo College of Engineering.

Joe Scalzo, Jr.

One of UT's top wrestlers from 1964-68. Also won Ohio state YMCA and AAU titles during his collegian years. Won the National YMCA Greco-Roman individual championship in 1966. Later became a top wrestling official. Son of UT coaching great Joe Scalzo, Sr.

Richard Tavtigian, 1956-1958

No information submitted.

Bruce Wilson, 1971-75

Bruce Wilson won a MAC title at 158 pounds as senior in 1975 and was runner-up as a freshman in 1972. He twice qualified for the NCAA tournament. In MAC dual meets, Bruce was 25-1 in his career, including a victory over two-time Olympian John Matthews. Bruce earned a trip to the 1972 Olympic Trials by placing second at the Midwest Regionals. Bruce is the son of for UT head coach and Varsity 'T' Hall of Fame member Dick Wilson.

Robert Biehl, Football 1933-1935 / Basketball & Track 1934-1936

Robert Biehl earned nine letters in three sports at UT. "Bob" was a tackle in football, a weight-man in track and center for the basketball team. During World War II, Biehl served as an Army Intelligence Officer. After his death in 1977, his estate bequeathed \$15,000 to the University Alumni Foundation. The money was used to establish the Bob Biehl Athletic Scholarship Fund.

Austin Campbell, Football 1924-1925 & Basketball 1925-1927

No information submitted.

John Flynn, Football & Track 1964-1967

A three-time letterwinner, John Flynn was chosen first-team All-MAC as a defensive back in 1967. He also handled punts and kickoff returns. Flynn was also a point winner in track in the 440 and in relays; he finished in second place in the 440 at the MAC championship Meet as a senior. Flynn went on to coach at St. Francis, Toledo Scott and Whiteford High Schools. He was athletic director at Whiteford for 28 years. Nominated by Frank Lauterbur.

Brock Kreitzburg, Football & Track & Field, 1995-98

Brock Kreitzburg was arguably the last football/track standout at UT. He caught 130 passes for 1,629 yards and 11 touchdowns in four seasons as a wide receiver. His best season came in 1997 when he caught 44 passes for 626 yards and seven TDs, earning second-team All-MAC honors. Kreitzburg, who started 42 out of 46 games played in his career, also earned first-team Academic All-MAC honors in 1997 and 1998. On the track, Kreitzburg earned All-MAC honors in the decathlon, 400-meter relay and 1600-meter relay. After graduation, Kreitzburg took up the sport of bobsled, making the 2006 U.S. Olympic Team. The U.S. finished in seventh place in Turin, Italy that year. He competed for the U.S. in six world championships in the bobsled from 2003 to 2008. He has since dedicated his life to humanitarian work for Samaritan's Purse, an international Christian relief agency. He served in South Sudan during the civil conflict in 2014. He oversaw a staff of 70 international workers and 800 Sudanese that provided services to South Sudan's thousands of refugees.

Walt Martishius, Football 1955-1957 & Baseball 1957-1958

Walt Martishius lettered in football from 1955-58. He was a tight end on the offense and a linebacker on defense. He earned baseball letters in 1957-1958 and was named to first-team All-MAC. Martishius was a student trainer for the basketball team in 1957-1958. After graduation, he was a graduate assistant coach for football in 1958

and 1959. He was an assistant football coach and teacher at Clay High School (Oregon, OH) from 1959-66 and was head football coach and guidance counselor at Springfield High School (Holland, OH) from 1966-1978. In 1978, he retired from coaching and since 1989 has been a student advisor at UT's Scott Park campus.

George Miley, Football 1947-50 and Track 1948-51

Miley earned eight varsity letters in football and track.

William Wiles, Baseball 1932-1934 & Football 1932

COACHES & ADMINISTRATORS

Ethel Allman, Women's Basketball Coach, 1979-84

Ethel Allman coached the UT women's basketball team from 1979-84. Her best season came in 1982-83 when the Rockets went 20-8, 13-5 in the MAC (second place). In her final season, UT went 18-11, 12-6 in league play.

Robert Conroy, 1965-1979

Robert Conroy was the assistant coach of the men's basketball teams alongside Head Coach Bob Nichols. During his time at Toledo, the men's basketball team won three MAC Championships (1967, 1972, and 1979) and the Rockets' only appearance in the Sweet 16 in 1979. An excellent recruiter, Conroy helped secure many All-MAC players such as Tom Kozelko, Harvy Knuckles and Jim Swaney.

Jim Flynn, Baseball, Basketball and Football Coach 1963-70

Jim Flynn was an assistant football coach from 1963-70, coaching the freshman teams. He also coached the defensive backs on undefeated football teams in 1969 and 1970. He retired after the 1970 season to go into private business.

Robert Fountain, Men's Swimming Coach 1974-81 / Rocket Club Administrator

Bob Fountain started the men's swimming program and became the school's first varsity coach, a position he held from 1974-81. As coach, Bob had numerous swimmers reach the top six in MAC Championship competition. Bob also has served for many years as the Rocket Club Administrator, generating hundreds of new memberships and thousands of dollars to support the Rockets from the mid-70's until the mid-90's. He is currently the executive director of the Downtown Coaches Association.

Desiree Hillmon, Athletic Trainer (1983-2001)

Desiree Hillmon looked after all of the student-athletes, but primarily worked with the Women's Basketball team from the years 1983-2001, as well as Women's Volleyball, Men's and Women's Tennis, Softball and Men's and Women's Swimming. Not only did she hold the role of assistant athletic trainer, but was also responsible for the Athletic Insurance Program within the department. The first minority and female athletic trainer at the University of Toledo, Hillmon obtained her MED in Kinesiotherapy at UT. She is currently the program manager in charge of an injury prevention program at GMPT Toledo and oversees an in-plant Wellness Center.

Eugene Jones, Men's Track & Field Coach (1981-89)

Eugene Jones coached the Rockets' track & field program from 1981-89, coaching his team to 18 outdoor and 10 indoor school records. He also coached the North team at the 1987 Olympic Sports Festival, where his athletes won four medals and two of his relay teams posted world-record times. He left UT to accept a position at the University of Iowa. He later became an assistant football coach at Iowa before he retired from coaching in 2000.

Jodi Steyer, Women's Basketball Assistant Coach, 1989-96

Jodi Steyer was an assistant coach on women's basketball teams that went 166-51 from 1989-96. During those seven seasons the Rockets won four MAC titles, made four NCAA Tournament appearances and two WNIT

trips. the 1990-91 team beat a powerful Rutgers team, 83-65, in the first round of the NCAA tournament, before losing to UConn, 81-80, in the second round. Steyer joined head coach Bill Fennelly at Iowa State, where she has been an assistant coach since 2002.

Richard Strahm, Football Coach 1970-1972

Richard Strahm was a defensive coordinator for Frank Lauterbur in 1970 and for Jack Murphy from 1971-1972. His defenses led the nation during the two years he coached.

Claude Watts, Baseball Coach 1921-1931 & Athletic Board 1931-1956

Claude Watts was UT's first baseball coach and then served as ticket manager and athletic department accountant for a quarter-century (1931-1956). Watts also served as a professor of accounting in Business Administration while working in the Athletic Department.

NOMINEES FOR DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Ron "Beck" Beczynski, Athletic Facilities and Game Management, 1967-2006

Ron "Beck" Beczynski worked in facilities and game management for more than 38 years before he retired from his position as director of athletic facilities in January of 2006. Beczynski, a 1961 graduate of Scott, was there when the Rockets won three straight Tangerine Bowls from 1969-71, and he was there on the sidelines when Toledo beat UTEP in the GMAC Bowl in Mobile, Ala., his 10th bowl game with the Rockets. He prepared Savage Hall for a visit from President George W. Bush in 2001, and for what turned out to be the penultimate concert by Elvis Presley, who died shortly after his Toledo appearance. Beczynski walked the track at Savage with Bob Seger, who wanted to get in a workout before his concert that night.

Rose Bollin, Cheerleader, 1940's

Rose Bollin was one of the original UT cheerleader in the 1940's. She was a school teacher for many years.

Jerry Keil, Radio Voice for Football (1964-1993) & Men's Basketball (1964-1994)

Jerry Keil served as the "voice of the Rockets" for 29 consecutive seasons. He painted word pictures over the radio that made hearing the game the next best thing to being there. His unique style gave UT sports, especially football and basketball, an excitement and flare rarely found, even in much larger markets.

Tammy Kneisley, UT administrator, 1985-2017

Tammy Kneisley worked for the athletic department from 1984-2017. She began as a part-time worker in the ticket office and then moved to the business office where she primarily assisted with student-athletes' scholarship and financial matters. A 1980 Toledo graduate, Kneisley passed away in 2020 following a battle with cancer.

William Navarre, Rocky the Rocket (1968-1969)

William Navarre was the first official Rocky the Rocket from the 1968-69 season. He was present at all home football and basketball games, along with the occasional away game.

Daniel Seeman, Member of Athletic Board 1966-1973

Daniel Seeman was a member of the Athletic Board, and from 1971 till 1993 he was the chairman of the board. Daniel was the Dean of Student Activities starting in 1967. For 12 years he served as chairman of the Blade Glass City Basketball Classic. Helped organize the intramural and sports club program. Helped develop the mentoring program for student athletes that UT still uses today. He also helped contribute to the building of Savage Hall.

David Tumbas, Student Athletic Trainer, 1982

David was a student member of Sports Medicine at UT, graduating in 1982. Following his graduation from Toledo, David became involved with the Athletic Training Staff of the Pittsburgh Pirates baseball team. He spent a total of 15 years with the organization. In 1997 David became the eighth Head Trainer for the Chicago Cubs, a position he holds today.
