## Quick Hits

● **Season Openers:** UT has won more than three-quarters of its season openers, going 82-24-6 (.759) dating to 1891. In the last 25 seasons, Tennessee is 20-3-2 (.860) in season openers. Of those 25 games, 12 were played against teams not currently in a BCS conference, and the Vols are a perfect 12-0 in those contests.

● **Home Openers:** The Vols have been even more dominant in home openers, going 88-18-5 (.815) all-time in the first game at Neyland Stadium each season. Tennessee has won 14 consecutive home openers dating to the 1994 season.

● **Coaching Debuts:** Lane Kiffin is Tennessee's 21st head coach, and he has the opportunity to be the 17th to win his inaugural game. Tennessee coaches are 16-4 all-time in their first game as coach, though General Robert R. Neyland had three "first" games, going 3-0 and improving the overall mark to 18-4.

● **On Sept. 5:** Tennessee is 5-1 all-time on Sept. 5. In their last five contests on that date, the Vols have averaged 38.2 points per game.

● **vs. the Sun Belt:** Tennessee and Western Kentucky have never met on the gridiron, but the Vols are 5-1 all-time against teams that currently comprise the Sun Belt Conference.

● **Win Streaks:** Tennessee coach Lane Kiffin inherits two wins streaks concerning the Western Kentucky game. The Vols have won 14-consecutive home openers since a 1994 loss to Florida in Knoxville. Tennessee has also won five straight vs. teams now in the Sun Belt Conference since a 1975 loss to North Texas State.

● **A win would:** A victory over Western Kentucky would be the first season-opening win for the Vols since 2006. It would also make Lane Kiffin the 17th out of 21 UT head coaches to earn a win in his debut.

● **A loss would:** A loss would be Tennessee's third-straight in a season opening game and its second-ever loss to a Sun Belt Conference team.

● **New Network:** Tennessee gets the privilege of being the first SEC team to play on the SEC Network, which will air one SEC home game in syndication each week for the duration of the 2009 season. The Vols are 6-4-2 all-time in their first appearance on a television network.

## Berry Leads Vols To Battle

After a sophomore season that included an NCAA-best seven interceptions and an SEC record 265 interception return yards, junior strong safety Eric Berry is again expected to excel in 2009. Berry was a preseason first-team All-America selection by every preview publication and a unanimous first-team All-SEC selection by the league's coaches. He also received 62 of a possible 64 first-team All-SEC votes from media members at SEC Kickoff, giving him more than any other player in the league.

In his career, Berry has an interception return total of 487 yards, which is a school and SEC record and just 14 yards shy of the NCAA career record of 501 yards held by Terrell Buckley of Florida State.

## Kiffin Coaches Football Too

Tennessee hired Lane Kiffin as its 21st head football coach on Dec. 1, 2008. The Vols new coach--the youngest head coach in FBS and one of 11 in college football with NFL head coaching experience--will finally coach a game after an offseason spent raising the profile of Tennessee football.

● **Star-Studded Staff:** Kiffin's first task was assembling a well-respected coaching staff that included his father and famed NFL defensive coordinator Monte Kiffin, former Ole Miss head coach Ed Orgeron, four other assistants with SEC coaching experience and two more with NFL coaching credentials to their credit.

● **Top-10 Class:** Kiffin had just two weeks with his full staff, but still managed to sign a recruiting class on Feb. 4 that ranked among the best in the nation according to the major recruiting services. The class included the No. 1 ranked player in the country, running back Bryce Brown.

● **Making His Media Mark:** Kiffin has appeared almost everywhere since taking the reins of the UT football. His offseason media resume includes a Sports Illustrated cover and feature, a Sporting News feature, an ESPN Outside the Line piece, and a USA Today front-page story.

● **Camp Kiffin:** Kiffin got the attention of his players, the fans and local media by having physical, full-contact practices throughout fall camp and opening those workouts to the fans.

**Healthy Hardesty Emerges From Crowded Backfield**

Tennessee enters the 2009 season with four healthy scholarship running backs and only room for three in Lane Kiffin's offensive rotation. Senior Montario Hardesty made sure he had the first of those spots during fall camp, emerging early on as the Vols top back.

The senior from New Bern, N.C. has rushed for 1,046 career yards and worked primarily as a goal-line back last season, scoring six touchdowns. Hardesty is injury-free for the first time in his college career and hoping for a breakout senior season.

**Crompton Gets The Call at QB**

Lane Kiffin named Jonathan Crompton his starting quarterback three weeks into fall camp, and the senior from Waynesville, N.C. is intent on making the most of a second chance under center after losing his job to backup Nick Stephens after four games last season.

Crompton has played under four different offensive coordinators in his five seasons on Rocky Top, performing his best under David Cutcliffe in a brief starting stint in place of an injured Erik Ainge in 2006. His best effort in 2008 was a 240-yard, two touchdown game vs. UAB early in the season.

**Sullins Wins Starting Job at Center**

The clearest proof of Lane Kiffin's every-position-is-always-up-for-grabs philosophy is that senior center and former walk-on Cody Sullins beat out Josh McNeil, a three-year starter with a 35-game start streak, for the right to play the first offensive snap vs. Western Kentucky.

Sullins is has lettered in each of the last two seasons and was put on scholarship by former head coach Phillip Fulmer prior to the 2008 season. He has played in just five career games and never previously started.

McNeil is a former Freshman All-America and honorable mention All-SEC selection, but battled injuries throughout fall camp.

**Offensive Line Returns Three Starters**

Tennessee has an experienced starter returning a three of the five offensive line positions. In all, the first unit has combined for 45 starts and is led by senior Chris Scott's 26-game start streak. Cody Sullins and either Jarod Shaw or Aaron Douglas will make their first career starts.

**Stocker Wins Tight End Battle**

One position that did not go through its fair share of offseason fluctuation was tight end, where two seasoned veterans return for 2009. Senior Jeff Cottam (35 career games) and junior Luke Stocker (2008 starter) battled throughout camp with Stocker eventually winning the job.

The two have combined for 21 career catches for 169 yards, but both will see significant time in 2009 thanks to their experience and blocking prowess.

**Youth Should Equal Depth at Tailback**

While Montario Hardesty clearly set himself apart from Tennessee's younger running backs in fall camp, the Vols have a sophomore and two true freshmen who will all see the field in 2009. Tauren Poole returns with a 3.9 yards-per-carry average from limited action last season and has been elusive throughout fall camp.

Joining Poole are two of the nation's top running back recruits in Bryce Brown and David Oku. Brown has worked with the first team in camp and Oku will at least see kick return duty.

**Injuries Present Opportunity at WR**

Injuries to three of Tennessee's top returning wide receivers presented ample opportunity for incoming freshmen and position transfers to make their mark during fall camp.

Injuries to Austin Rogers (leg--season) and Denarius Moore (foot--2-4 weeks) and Gerald Jones (ankle--3-6 weeks) mean Quintin Hancock and Brandon Warren and will carry the pass-catching load among returning players. Hancock did not catch a pass in 2008 and Warren moved from tight end during spring practice.

Tennessee will have a total of 279 career receiving yards in its wideout corps for the Western Kentucky game.

Newcomers that took advantage of an opportunity during camp include Nu'Keese Richardson and Marsalis Teague who worked themselves onto the two-deep depth chart.

**Vols in Search of Playmakers**

The Tennessee offense produced just 34 offensive plays of longer than 20 yards last season, which averages to less than three per game. Players who return for 2009 were responsible for just 17 of those plays, and injured junior wideout Gerald Jones accounted for seven of those 17 plays.

The Vols will seek to add playmakers from a freshman class that that was recruited with an emphasis on the offensive skill positions and overall speed.

• **100,000 Strong:** Neyland Stadium's current capacity is 101,011, making it the nation's fourth-largest college football venue trailing Penn State's Beaver Stadium (107,282), Michigan Stadium (106,201) and Ohio State's Ohio Stadium (102,329).

• **Second Nationally in Total Wins:** Tennessee has won 422 all-time games at Neyland Stadium. Only Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd Stadium (428 wins) has hosted more victories for its team—and Bobby Dodd Stadium (1913) opened eight years before Neyland Stadium (1921).

• **.793 All-Time Winning Percentage:** The 2009 season marks Tennessee's 88th year of football in Neyland Stadium. The Volunteers own a 422-104-17 all-time record at home, giving them a Rocky Top winning percentage of .793.

• **Crowds of More than 100,000:** In their last 84 home games at Neyland Stadium, the Tennessee Vols have played in front of crowds of at least 100,000 fans 79 times. Since the stadium's capacity was expanded to more than 100,000 in 1996, the Vols have had just five home crowds of less than six figures.

• **Retired Jerseys:** A group of seven celebrated Volunteers now have their respective jerseys permanently displayed on lighted signage just below the upper deck at Neyland Stadium.

## One of Nation's Top Defenses Gets New Coordinator

The UT defense finished the 2008 campaign as one of the best in the country. In the final 2008 NCAA statistics, the Vols finished tied for third in total defense (263.50 yards per game), fourth in pass defense (160.42 yards per game), 12th in rushing defense (103.1 yards per game) and 10th in scoring defense (16.8 points per game).

Among Southeastern Conference schools, Tennessee was tied for first with Alabama in total defense, first in pass defense, third in rushing defense and third in scoring defense.

The 2009 Vols return just five full-time starters, but they have added one of the top defensive coordinators in all of football in Monte Kiffin, who comes to Knoxville to coach with his son after 26 seasons in the National Football League.

## Experience Makes Safety a Strength

All-America safety Eric Berry is the unquestioned star of the UT secondary, and he has a mixed bag of experience and youth around him. The Vols return one other starter in Dennis Rogan and several experienced backups from the 2008 unit that helped Tennessee finish fourth in the nation in pass defense and tied for 20th in interceptions. Rogan has moved to free safety after starting 10 games at right corner last season.

Marsalous Johnson also returns with three years experience and nine career starts, likely to play in the nickel packages.

Brent Vinson, a starter in 2007, also returns but has battled injuries throughout fall camp.

Three other Vols expected to see their first significant playing time are corners Art Evans and Anthony Anderson along with safety Prentiss Waggner. Three newcomers will also see action in corner Mike Edwards and safeties Darren Myles, Jr. and Janzen Jackson.

Berry, Rogan and Johnson combined for 136 tackles, eight interceptions and 14 passes defended last season.

## McCoy Takes On Leadership Role at LB

Linebacker Rico McCoy will keep up a recent Tennessee trend by being the one linebacker from which leadership and experience can be drawn during the 2009 season.

McCoy finished last season second on the team and ninth in the SEC with 87 tackles while also posting 3.5 tackles-for-loss and three passes defended. He led the team in tackles in six games, including the last five of the season. He is the Vols top returning tackler and also has more career tackles than any other player on the UT roster.

The Washington, D.C., native was voted second-team All-SEC last season. He missed most of the early portions of camp with a knee injury but has practiced regularly for two weeks.

## Williams Arrives During Fall Camp

Tennessee entered fall camp with 21 of 22 positions declared open, and one player who took advantage of the opportunity was junior defensive end Gerald Williams, who emerged a week into camp as the top left defensive end and has yet to relinquish his grip on the spot.

Williams arrived late to camp in 2008 due to NCAA Clearinghouse issues and was never able regularly contribute last season, playing in 10 games but posting only 12 tackles. He entered fall camp in 2009 third on the depth chart at left end.

## Cunningham Takes Over Punting Duties

For the first time since 2000, Tennessee will enter a football season without a Colquitt on the roster and handling the punting duties. Replacing the departed Britton Colquitt in 2009 is Chad Cunningham, who handled the punting duties for five games in 2008 while Colquitt served a suspension.

## Rogan A Kick Return Threat

Defensive back Dennis Rogan now stands in fifth place on UT's career kickoff return list with 1,101 total yards. Rogan's career average of 26.37 yards per kickoff return ranks second in school history and 11th among all active FBS players.

For his career, the Knoxville native has 1,308 combined kick and punt return yards and that mark ties him for sixth place on the Tennessee career list.

Rogan averaged 24.9 yards per kickoff return in 2008 after posting the third-best single-season mark in school history in 2007 at 29.5 yards per return.

Rogan's finished the 2008 season with 698 kickoff return yards, which is a single-season record at Tennessee. His 28 returns also tied a school record.

Rogan earned preseason acclaim from two publications for his kick return success, taking second-team All-SEC honors from Athlon Sports and Phil Steele.

Berry was a Thorpe Award finalist last season and a Walter Camp first-team All-America selection.
- **2008 NCAA Consensus All-America:** Berry became just the 12th player in Tennessee history and one of only nine players nationwide to earn Consensus All-America honors in 2008. He was also named preseason First-Team All-America by every publication and media outlet prior to the 2009 season.
- **2008 SEC Defensive Player of the Year:** The Southeastern Conference coaches voted Berry the 2008 Defensive Player of the Year after he had one of the best seasons ever by a Tennessee defensive back. He finished third on the team with 72 tackles and posted an FBS-best seven interceptions. He returned those interceptions for a single-season school and conference record 265 yards, scoring two touchdowns along the way.
- **SEC Career Interception Return Leader:** Berry snagged seven interceptions and posted 265 interception return yards in 2008. Added to his five picks and 222 interception return yards from 2007, he now ranks atop the Southeastern Conference career list with 487 total pick return yards. He stands just 15 yards shy of the NCAA record held by Terrell Buckley of Florida State.

## Primed to Succeed

Lane Kiffin has the pedigree and the experience necessary to succeed at the highest level of college football. He is the son of the finest defensive coordinator in the game, Monte Kiffin, and has studied under the likes of Tom Coughlin, Dom Capers, Jeff Tedford and Pete Carroll.

In six seasons as a full-time college coach, Kiffin's teams have amassed a 65-12 record, made five BCS bowl appearances and won two national championships.



## A Great Offensive Mind

Kiffin is at the helm of a college program for the first time, but with his legendary father monitoring the defense and his own track record of offensive success, very little is likely to slip through the cracks when it comes to X's and O's.

During his three seasons as a coordinator at Southern California, Kiffin-led offenses produced record numbers. In 2004, Kiffin's passing game produced a 3,300-yard passer, three 500-yard receivers and 34 touchdowns through the air. In 2005, Kiffin's offense was among the national elite in total offense, scoring offense, rushing, passing and passing efficiency. In 2006, he coordinated an offense that ranked in the top six nationally in every offensive category. The Trojans scored 50 points a school-record seven times that season, finished first in the Pac-10 in passing efficiency and produced two 1,000-yard receivers and a 3,000-yard passer.

With the Oakland Raiders in 2007, Kiffin improved scoring by more than a touchdown and presided over a rushing offense that ranked sixth in the league.

## A Builder of Star Players

The list of names by itself would be enough. It reads as a who's who of college football stars and early-round NFL Draft picks. Lane Kiffin has coached three Heisman Trophy winners (Carson Palmer, Matt Leinart and Reggie Bush) and NFL Draft picks Matt Cassell, Dwayne Jarrett, Steve Smith, LenDale White, Mike Williams and Keary Colbert.

In 2006, Leinart threw for 3,322 yards passing and 33 touchdowns. In 2005, Kiffin tutored Bush to 1,740 yards on 200 carries and 16 touchdowns. In 2002, Palmer threw for school-record marks of 3,942 yards and 33 touchdowns while also setting a school record for completions with 309.

In the NFL, Kiffin worked several other great players including Darren McFadden and JaMarcus Russell, both of whom came to the NFL from the Southeastern Conference.

## A Five-Star Recruiter

Kiffin had only two months as head coach to put together his 2009 signing class, and he had a full coaching staff to help him for only the last three weeks before National Signing Day. Nonetheless, Kiffin and his staff assembled one of the nation's top classes, a group ranked in the top 10 in the country by both Rivals.com and Scout.com.

Tennessee signed 23 prospective student-athletes, including two who earned a five-star rating from one of the two recruiting services and 13 who were rated as four-star prospects.

One of the five-star prospects, running back Bryce Brown was considered the No. 1 prospect in the nation by multiple recruiting publications, making him the highest-rated prospect ever to sign with Tennessee. Of the 19 prospects who signed on or after February 4th, 18 qualified academically to enroll at Tennessee and play the 2009 season.

As recruiting coordinator at Southern California in 2005-06, Kiffin signed the nation's top-ranked class both years, helping the Trojans dominate in the Pac-10 and nationally.

## The Youngest Head Coach in FBS Football

Kiffin was the NFL's youngest-ever head coach when he took over the Oakland Raiders in 2007, and two seasons later he is youngest head coach in major college football. Kiffin will be 34 years and four months old when the Vols kick off vs. Western Kentucky on Sept. 5. He is just less than seven months younger than Northwestern's Pat Fitzgerald. Kiffin is one of only five coaches in the FBS who will coach the 2009 season under 40 years of age and one of only three who will do so in a BCS conference.

The Vols didn't participate in scrimmages, but rather "preseason games" that included pregame, halftime and postgame trips to the locker room. Coaches also followed the NFL model for playing time, with starters increasing reps through three preseason games, then resting during the fourth.

**Five Vols on Preseason Watch Lists**

Five Tennessee athletes find themselves on preseason watch lists for various awards. Eric Berry is on the watch list for the Jim Thorpe Award, presented to the nation's top defensive back, the Walter Camp Player of the Year Award and the Chuck Bednarik Award. Tight end Jeff Cottam is on watch list for the John Mackey Award, while center Josh McNeil made the Outland Trophy watch list and kicker Daniel Lincoln made the Lou Groza Award preseason list. Linebacker Rico McCoy also found himself on the Bednarik Award list.

**Four Knoxville Natives Likely to Start**

Tennessee could have as many as four starters vs. WKU who hail from East Tennessee, three of which will play on defense: Cornerback Anthony Anderson, linebacker Nick Reveiz and safety Dennis Rogan. Those three and wideout Brandon Warren give Tennessee four starters from the local area, more than any UT team since 1984 when eight East Tennessee natives--six from Knoxville--were regular starters for the Vols.

**Six Vols Change Positions**

With a new coaching staff came new positions a number of Vols. A total of six players will line up in a different position in 2009 than in 2008.

Notable within those changes are that Brandon Warren and Wes Brown will start at their new positions, and Aaron Douglas could play the first snap. Rod Wilks moved from defensive back to wide receiver less than two weeks before the season opener due to injuries at the position. Gerald Williams also changed from defensive end to linebacker and then back to defensive end during spring practice.

**Vols Not Long For Losing Seasons**

In 76 seasons since the forming of the Southeastern Conference, Tennessee has suffered through just eight losing seasons and has never posted sub-.500 marks in back-to-back seasons. They own the longest such active streak in the nation at 93 seasons.

In the seasons immediately following losing campaigns, Tennessee has won 66 percent of its games, averaged 6.9 wins per season, won at least eight games three times and claimed the 1989 conference title with an 11-1 mark.

**The Southeastern Conference**



- **Television Coverage:** The Southeastern Conference signed a 15-year deal with ESPN for the rights to every SEC home football game not on the CBS package. All league matchups will be shown on an ESPN outlet, including at least 20 a year on ESPN or ESPN2.

- **BCS Success:** The Southeastern Conference has an all-time BCS bowl win total of 12, three more than the next-closest league (Pac-10 - 9 wins). The league's winning percentage of .710 (12-5) is also the highest among all BCS conferences. The league has won five BCS national titles and the last three in a row.

- **Bowl Wins:** During the last three seasons, the SEC has gone 19-7 (.731) in bowl games. No other conference has won more than 12 bowl games during that same span.

- **Non-conference Dominance:** In 2008, the SEC led all NCAA FBS conferences with a 76.7 winning percentage in non-conference games. It marks the third year in a row that the SEC has led all NCAA FBS conferences in non-conference winning percentage.

- **Attendance:** The SEC drew 6.4 million fans to its games in 2008. In 83 game dates, the SEC averaged 76,832 fans per game, which is the highest mark in NCAA history.

**Tennessee in the SEC**

- **All-Time Wins:** Tennessee ranks second in the Southeastern Conference with 776 all-time victories and with an all-time winning percentage of .694 (776-327-53). Only Alabama has more all-time wins or a higher winning percentage.

- **All-Time SEC Wins:** Tennessee ranks second in the conference with 311 all-time league wins and second in all-time league winning percentage at .656 (311-158-53). Only the Crimson Tide has accomplished more within the league since its inception in 1932.

- **Interdivisional Excellence:** The Vols own the best interdivision record among SEC teams, going 36-15-1 (.701) against the Western Division since the league split in 1992.

- **Shutouts:** Since conference expansion in 1992, Tennessee ranks tied for second in the SEC in shutouts posted by its defense with 13 (tied with Auburn). The Vols have recorded at least one shutout in three of the last eight years.

- **On the Road in the SEC:** Since 1992, Tennessee owns one of the best road records in league games among SEC teams, going 49-19 for a mark of .720.

- **Attendance:** Tennessee has led the league in attendance for 35-consecutive seasons and ranked among the top four nationally for 33 seasons.

● **Tennessee in the NFL Draft:** Ten former Vols have been selected in the first round of the NFL Draft since 2000. In the history of the draft, seven times more than one UT player has been selected in the first round. The Vols lead the SEC with 39 all-time first-round picks and have had one in each of the last two seasons (Robert Ayers - 2009 and Jerod Mayo - 2008).

● **Super Bowl Vols:** Tennessee has had a representative in 20 of the last 22 Super Bowls. A total of 48 former Vols have played in the big game and 18 have done so since 2000.

● **Vols in the Pro Bowl:** Former Vols Albert Haynesworth, Peyton Manning and Jason Witten earned 2009 Pro Bowl invitations. Thirty-four former UT athletes have received 102 all-time invitations.

● **Atkins, White Enshrined in Canton:** Legendary defensive linemen Doug Atkins (1950-52) and Reggie White (1980-83) represent UT in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Atkins starred for the Chicago Bears (1955-66) and the New Orleans Saints (1967-69). White is remembered as one of the best pass rushers in NFL history. He retired as the NFL's all-time sacks leader and is the only player in league history to have recorded nine consecutive seasons of double-digit sack totals. White passed away Dec. 26, 2004.

● **Manning a 3-time NFL MVP:** Former Tennessee great Peyton Manning has won three NFL MVP awards (2003, 04, 08) and is ranked among the all-time top-10 in touchdown passes, completions, and passing yards.

## 14 Starters Return from 2008

Tennessee returns a total of 14 players who started at least six of 12 games last season, but only seven who started every game in 2008. On offense, center Josh McNeil, tackle Chris Scott and tight end Luke Stocker were in the starting lineup every Saturday a year ago. On defense, it was defensive backs Eric Berry and Dennis Rogan, defensive end Wes Brown, and linebacker Rico McCoy. Aside from those seven Vols, only fullback Kevin Cooper and kicker Daniel Lincoln started at least 10 games.

In all, the Vols return a total of 95 offensive starts and 60 defensive starts from 2008. Three Vols, Eric Berry, Josh McNeil and Chris Scott have active start streaks longer than 20 games.

The VOLScholar program, an initiative of UT's Thornton Athletics Student Life Center in cooperation with the men's and women's athletics departments, is a comprehensive academic and citizenship-building program that has gained enthusiastic support from several of UT's athletic teams. Student-athletes earned the right to wear the VOLScholar patch on their uniform by achieving a 3.0 grade-point average in the previous fall and/or spring semester.

“We have a lot of outstanding young men and women in our program that are doing great things on and off the field of competition,” said Mike Hamilton, men's athletics director. “This is just another way to recognize them for their behavior and prepare them for life after school.”

### Vols Regulars on Television

Since 1990, Tennessee has had 190 games broadcast on national or regional television. More than 80 percent of UT's total games played since 1990 have been televised.

### Scoring Streak

Tennessee has scored in 183 consecutive games dating to a 31-0 shutout by Florida in Knoxville in 1994. It is the SEC's second-longest streak, trailing Florida's 254. UT's home scoring streak is at 96, while it has scored in 159 straight games away from Neyland Stadium. UT's last road shutout was a 44-0 loss at Georgia in 1984.

### Vols Finish 2008 Fourth Nationally In Attendance

Tennessee finished the 2008 season fourth in the nation in attendance with an average of 101,448 fans per game entering the gates of Neyland Stadium.

The Vols have ranked in the top four in attendance each of the last 33 seasons and been the highest-drawing team in the SEC for each of the last 35 seasons.

Six SEC schools ranked in the top-10 nationally in attendance.

## Neyland Gets New Look

For the third season in a row, Volunteer fans entering Neyland Stadium for the season opener on Sept. 5 will see an improved facility.

The Neyland Stadium Master Plan, a five-phase, multi-year renovation project is in its third phase during the spring and summer of 2009.

Phase III, the largest and most expensive phase of the renovations began after the 2008 football season and will feature a number of changes for the 2009 and 2010 seasons.

At the Western Kentucky game, fans will notice renovation of the top level concourse of the west lower sideline, removal of the scissor ramps leading to the west upper deck, the addition of elevators and stairwells on the west side, improvements to the west tower sky boxes and press center and the construction of the West Club section.

Upgrades scheduled for completion by the beginning of the 2010 season include a plaza outside Gate 21, a renovated lower northeast concourse, a brick and wrought iron facade along the north and west sides of the stadium, a statue of Gen. Neyland on the west side and the Tennessee Terrace along the west upper deck.

## SEC Signs Deals With CBS, ESPN

The Southeastern Conference recently signed a 15-year deal with ESPN to televise sporting events, including football and men's and women's basketball.

The agreement announced in August is the longest ESPN has ever signed and matches the length of the powerhouse league's deal with CBS earlier in the month.

ESPN's various outlets will carry more than 5,500 SEC events over the 15-year period, including league championships in women's basketball, baseball, softball and gymnastics.

CBS will carry a football game of the week along with prime-time games and doubleheaders. The CBS agreement also covers other platforms, including certain digital and Internet rights.

## New Rules for 2009

- **Uniform Colors:** Teams can now both wear colored jerseys as long as the home team agrees and the home team's conference agrees that the colors are sufficiently contrasting.

- **Helmet to Helmet:** Conferences will review video of certain plays deemed dangerous due to helmet contact and, if necessary, impose further punishment. If a player is ejected, the review is required.

- **Punter Protection:** Punters will lose special protection if they run outside of the tackle box before kicking the ball. This will apply to rugby-style punters, who will lose protection from roughing and running-into-the-kicker calls if they are more than 5 yards from either side of where the ball was snapped.

- **Illegal Formations:** The offensive formation rule now limits backfield players to four, thus eliminating illegal-formation penalties if only 10 men are on the field. Previously, the rule was written to require seven players on the line of scrimmage.

- **Untimed Downs:** End-of-quarter penalties won't cause an extra play if the infraction results in a loss of down.

Tennessee safety Eric Berry, a preseason Sporting News All-America selection, is among 18 college football stars who'll write weekly diaries throughout the season in Sporting News Today, the world's first digital daily sports newspaper.

Others from the Southeastern Conference participating are Ciron Black of LSU, Antonio Coleman of Auburn, Mike Johnson of Alabama and Jevan Snead of Ole Miss.

## Up Next: UCLA

Tennessee tees it up vs. a Pac-10 opponent for the fourth-consecutive season, taking on the UCLA Bruins at Neyland Stadium on Sept. 12 (4 p.m. ET, ESPN).

The Vols own a 7-5-2 advantage in the series and are 4-1-2 all-time vs. the Bruins in Knoxville. The two storied programs hooked up in Pasadena last season with UCLA grabbing a 27-24 win in overtime.

UCLA finished the 2008 campaign 4-8 overall and 3-6 in the Pac-10. Eighteen of 24 starters return for 2009.

UT head coach Lane Kiffin and UCLA boss Rick Neuheisel have twice been on opposing sidelines. Southern California went 1-1 vs. Washington in 2001 and 2002 while Neuheisel was the head coach for the Huskies and Kiffin was a position coach at USC. The Trojans lost 27-24 at Washington in 2001 and won 41-21 at home a year later.

## Noting the Hilltoppers



- Western Kentucky becomes the 120th – and newest – member of the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision this season.

- The Hilltoppers have traveled to face an SEC opponent six times in six years. WKU has played at Alabama, Kentucky, Florida, Georgia and Auburn (twice).

- The Hilltoppers lost six defensive starters on defense. Sophomore safety Mark Santoro started four games last season and is WKU's leading returning tackler (60).

- Jack Gaebler's 125 career receptions ranks third on the Hilltoppers career list – just 24 away from the WKU record. Gaebler caught 54 passes for 588 yards and four touchdowns in 2008

## UT-WKU Connections

- Q-School:** UT senior Quintin Hancock and WKU junior Quinterrance Cooper led St. Augustine High School to the 2005 Class 3A state championship and an undefeated record. Both wide receivers are slated to start. WKU freshman defensive lineman Brandon Whitty also comes from St. Augustine H.S.

- Pahokee Pals:** Tennessee freshman Nu'Keese Richardson and WKU redshirt freshman Anthony Sheppard led Pahokee High School to back-to-back Florida Class 2B State Championships in 2006 and 2007. In the 2007 state finals, Sheppard, the Blue Devils' quarterback, tossed Richardson a screen pass that he turned into a 77-yard score that set the tone in a 53-14 blowout. In 2008, Richardson replaced Sheppard at quarterback and led Pahokee to its third consecutive state title. The former teammates and quarterbacks are both playing wide receiver in their first collegiate seasons.

- Stone Mountain Stars:** Western Kentucky sophomore defensive lineman Jared Clendenin and UT freshman linebacker Nigel Mitchell-Thornton were teammates at Stephenson H.S. in Stone Mountain, Ga.

## Battles to Watch

- UT Defensive Backs vs. WKU Wide Receivers:** Two senior returning starters will haul in the passes for a WKU team that is expected to run a number of three and four receiver sets and spread formations. Waiting in the UT secondary are All-America safety Eric Berry and senior Dennis Rogan, along with a group of inexperienced younger players.

- UT Running Backs vs. WKU Linebackers:** Senior Montario Hardesty is slated to start at tailback for UT. Looking to stifle UT's rushing attack will be a trio of experienced WKU linebackers: seniors Darvis McBride and Taurean Smith, junior Mike Gothard McBride was sixth on the team with 50 tackles in 2008, while Smith was right behind at 49 stops.
