THE MATCHUP

- This is the third meeting between Tennessee and Gardner-Webb, with the Volunteers winning each of the prior two, both at home.
- The last matchup between the two sides was **Rick Barnes'** fourth game with UT, an 89-64 victory on 11/22/15. **Kevin Punter Jr.** (24) and **Devon Baulkman** (22) combined for 46 points, while **Armani Moore** had 15 points and 16 rebounds, the second-most boards and lone 15/15 outing of Barnes' UT tenure.
- Coming off a 17-16 (11-5) campaign in 2023-24, the Runnin' Bulldogs were picked sixth in the Big South.
- Gardner-Webb lost its top five scorers from last year. Its leading returnee is **Ademide Badmus**, a senior forward who put up 5.6 ppg in 2023-24.
- The Volunteers are 28-0 all-time against the current Big South schools, including 11-0 versus UNC Asheville. They have defeated all nine members at least once.
- Rick Barnes** owns a 23-0 record versus the current Big South membership, including a 10-0 ledger at Tennessee. He has beat all nine schools at least once.

NEWS & NOTES

- Tennessee has won its last three season openers, all at home, by a combined 98 points. It won by 28 in 2021-22, by 32 in 2022-23 and by 38 in 2023-24, good for an average of 32.7 points per game.
- The Volunteers are 34-3 (.919) all-time in home openers at Food City Center, dating back to 1987-88. They are 31-1 (.969) over their last 32 such games, including 8-1 (.889) under **Rick Barnes**. The average attendance in the 36 non-COVID-season home openers is 16,785, with eight over 20,000.
- Tennessee placed third in the SEC preseason media poll, its third year in a row in the top three and seventh straight in the top five. The Volunteers also came in at No. 12 nationally in both the AP Poll and Coaches Poll, their fifth consecutive year in the preseason top-20 of each.
- The Volunteers added four transfers: two fifth-year guards, a senior forward and a junior forward. They own a combined 3,356 collegiate points across 372 outings, with three of them all-conference selections in 2023-24.

NEWS & NOTES

- Tennessee, aided by a 13-2 stretch, is coming off a year in which it won its 11th SEC regular season crown, including its sixth outright title. The Volunteers then, as a No. 2 seed, went on to earn their second Elite Eight berth.
- The Volunteers finished fifth in both major national polls in 2023-24. The AP mark tied their best closing spot ever (2021-22, 2007-08) and the Coaches Poll broke the program record (seventh in 2007-08). Tennessee also placed fifth in KenPom, surpassing the prior year (sixth in 2022-23) for its best mark ever.
- UT went 27-9 last year, marking the third time in the last six years (2018-24) under **Rick Barnes** it won 27-plus games. It hit that tally twice before his arrival.
- The 171 wins for Tennessee over the last seven years (2017-24) rank co-eighth nationally and mark the highest total in a seven-year stretch in program history. Only Kansas (191), Duke (185), Purdue (182) and Virginia (176) have more among schools in a Power Six league that entire time.

WINNING WAYS

Over the last seven seasons (2017-24), Tennessee paces all SEC teams in total wins (171) and is tied for first in postseason victories (18). It also places a close second in overall winning percentage (.722), league victories (86) and league winning percentage (.688). In that span, UT has three SEC titles, claiming the regular season crown in both 2018 and 2024, plus the tournament title in 2022.

Over just the last three years (2021-24), the Volunteers top the SEC in total victories (79) and winning percentage (.738), plus co-lead the SEC in league victories (39) and league winning percentage (.722). More information can be found on Page 3.

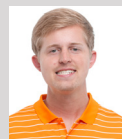

BY THE NUMBERS

800 Rick Barnes (806) is one of 15 DI head coaches ever to earn **800** victories, with **John Calipari** the only other one who is active.

60 UT has appeared in 74 of the last 77 AP Top 25 Polls, including the last **60**, the third-longest active streak in the nation.

15 Since 12/22/21, Tennessee is **15-5** versus AP top-15 foes, including 8-4 against AP top-10 teams 5-3 versus AP top-five opponents.

4 **Zakai Zeigler**, the reigning SEC DPOY, is one of four (**4**) three-time All-SEC Defensive Team honorees in league history.

TENNESSEE TABBED THIRD

- Tennessee placed third in the SEC preseason poll, as voted on by a select panel of league and national media members.
- Only the two Yellowhammer State schools, Alabama and Auburn, finished above Tennessee in the voting.
- This is the third straight year the Volunteers took a top-three position in the preseason media poll, the only school that can make such a claim. Tennessee held the top spot in 2023-24 and indeed went on to win the league title. In 2022-23, UT took third-place in the voting.
- Tennessee has claimed a top-five spot in the preseason media poll seven consecutive years, dating back to the 2018-19 edition.

- Since the Coaches Poll started in 1991-92, this is the 10th time UT has opened a season top-15 in both that and the AP Poll, including the fifth time under **Rick Barnes** and third in a row. The other years were 2023-24 (No. 9/10), 2022-23 (No. 11/11), 2020-21 (No. 12/14), 2018-19 (No. 6/6), 2009-10 (No. 10/11), 2008-09 (No. 14/13), 2007-08 (No. 7/7), 2000-01 (No. 9/8) and 1998-99 (No. 9/9).
- UT's No. 12 spot in the preseason AP Poll tied 2020-21 for the ninth-highest such mark in program history. This is also the fifth consecutive year Tennessee is featured in the preseason AP Poll, tying its longest mark ever, set 2006-07 to 2010-11. All five seasons have featured a top-20 placement—four in the top 12—good for UT's first such streak ever.
- The Vols are featured in the preseason Coaches Poll for the seventh consecutive year, dating back to 2018-19. That extends a program record, as the prior mark was five from 2006-07 to 2010-11. UT has claimed a top-20 spot in six of the seven years, placing top-12 four times.

PRESEASON PLAUDITS

- Zakai Zeigler** collected Preseason First Team All-SEC recognition from the media, alongside Auburn's **Johni Broome**, Florida's **Walter Clayton Jr.**, Alabama's **Mark Sears** and Texas A&M's **Wade Taylor IV**.
- In addition, Zeigler was one of five individuals to earn votes for SEC Preseason Player of the Year, joining Sears (the designee), Broome, Taylor and Georgia's **Asa Newell**.
- This is the third year in a row Zeigler, a second-team choice in advance of both the 2023-24 and 2022-

23 campaigns, garnered Preseason All-SEC honors from the media. He is the fourth such three-time selection in UT history, joining **Allan Houston** (first team in each of 1990-91, 1991-92 and 1992-93), **Tony Harris** (first team in each 1998-99, 1999-2000 and 2000-01) and **Tyler Smith** (second team in 2007-08, first team in both 2008-09 and 2009-10).

- The league's coaches also labeled Zeigler a Preseason First Team All-SEC choice, placing him alongside the same four players. It marked his third consecutive year receiving that distinction, the only such player in the league.
- Zeigler earned Preseason Second Team All-America plaudits from the Blue Ribbon Yearbook. The other second-team choices were Broome, Taylor, Duke's **Cooper Flagg** and Purdue's **Braden Smith**. He was named a Preseason Third Team All-American by ESPN's Jay Bilas.
- After finishing as a Midseason Top 10 List selection last year, **Zakai Zeigler** was named to the Bob Cousy Award Top 20 Preseason Watch List this season. In addition, **Chaz Lanier** earned a spot on the Jerry West Award Top 20 Preseason Watch List.
- In addition, Zeigler earned a spot on the Naismith Trophy Preseason Watch List. He was one of nine SEC players to make the cut.

SIX IN A ROW

- Tennessee has reached every NCAA Tournament since 2018. The six straight bids tie 2006-11 for the longest streak in program history. The Volunteers made five trips in a row from 1979-83.
- UT is tied with Houston and Kansas (due to a vacated appearance) for the fourth-longest active NCAA Tournament streak in the nation, trailing only Michigan State (26), Gonzaga (25) and Purdue (nine). Baylor and Colgate are next with five.
- The Vols' current streak includes three—2018, 2023 and 2024—of their 10 all-time Sweet 16 appearances and their second Elite Eight trip ever (2024).
- UT has earned a top-five seed in each of its six NCAA Tournament trips under **Rick Barnes**: No. 3 in 2018, No. 2 in 2019, No. 5 in 2021, No. 3 in 2022, No. 4 in 2023 and No. 2 in 2024.
- The Vols' No. 2 seed in 2024 matched 2019, 2008 and 2006 for their best position ever.

WINNING WAYS

- Over the last seven seasons (2017-24), Tennessee paces all SEC programs in total wins (171) and is tied for first in postseason victories (18), while placing a narrow second in winning percentage (.722). In that span, UT has three SEC titles, winning the regular season in 2018 and 2024, as well as the 2022 tournament.
- In that same seven-year stretch, the Vols are one of only two SEC schools with an overall winning percentage of over .700, alongside Auburn (.723).
- In SEC play over the same seven-year period, Tennessee (.86-39; .688) is second in the league, behind Kentucky (.87-38; .696), in both victories and winning percentage. Only Auburn (81-45; .643) and Alabama (78-48; .619) have even 70-plus wins.
- Over just the last three seasons (2021-24), UT owns a 79-28 (.7383) overall record. That is good for the most victories and the best winning percentage of any SEC team in that span. Auburn ranks second at 76-27 (.7379) during that time.
- In that same three-year span, Tennessee (39-15; .722) is tied with Kentucky for the best record in conference play among SEC teams.

RACKING UP RANKED VICTORIES...

- TOP 25:** In the past three years (2021-24), Tennessee leads all SEC teams with 20 AP top-25 wins, good for four more than any other SEC program (Alabama has 16). That mark is co-fourth nationally and Tennessee is one of only five schools with even 18-plus such wins, alongside Kansas (22), Connecticut (21), Iowa State (21) and Purdue (20).
- TOP 20:** Tennessee possesses 18 AP top-20 wins over that span, five more than any other SEC school (Alabama has 13) co-third in DI, alongside Purdue. The Volunteers and Boilermakers are among just five teams at even 16-plus, joining Connecticut (21), Kansas (19) and Iowa State (16).
- TOP 15:** The Volunteers own 15 AP top-15 decisions over the last three seasons, good for second-most in the country and three more than any other SEC program (Alabama has 12). The only team in America with more is Kansas (17), while just Purdue (14) and Iowa State (13) are even within two of UT.
- TOP 10:** Since 2021-22, Tennessee owns eight AP top-10 triumphs, tops in the SEC and co-fifth nationally, alongside North Carolina. Only Connecticut (11), Kansas (10), Purdue (10) and Iowa State (10) have more. The eight such wins in that time are #1 Alabama (2/15/23), #3 Kansas (11/25/22), #3 Auburn (2/26/22), #4 Kentucky (2/15/22), #5 Kentucky (3/12/22), #6 Arizona (12/22/21), #10 Texas (1/28/23) and at #10 Kentucky (2/3/24).
- TOP FIVE:** In that same four-year span, UT has five AP top-five wins, tied with Arizona for the most in the nation. Only four other schools have even four: Alabama, Gonzaga, Purdue and Iowa State.

...AND DOING SO EFFICIENTLY

- Tennessee, at 20-14 (.588), is the only school in the SEC with a winning record versus ranked opponents over the last three seasons (2021-24). Auburn (9-9; .500) is the lone other team without a losing record in such games.
- At 8-5 (.615), the Volunteers are the only team in the SEC with a winning record against AP top-10 foes over the last three seasons. Texas A&M (5-6; .455) places a distant second.
- The Volunteers, despite their excellent winning percentage, have played the third-most games against AP top-25 foes of any SEC team in the last three years. They trail just Texas (41) and Oklahoma (37) in such outings, while the only other school at even 30-plus is Alabama (33).

TOP-10 (AND TOP-FIVE) TAKEDOWNS

- Tennessee is 8-4 in its last 12 games against AP top-10 teams, going back to 12/22/21 against #6 Arizona.
- The Volunteers are also 5-3 in their last eight contests versus AP top-five foes, dating back to 2/15/22 versus #4 Kentucky.

ALL AROUND AMERICA

- Tennessee's 15 players hail from 10 states and two foreign countries. The Volunteers are believed to be one of just 16 DI teams with double-digit states represented on its roster.
- The other schools on that list are Army West Point (16), Navy (14), Missouri (12), Vanderbilt (12), Kansas (11), Louisville (11), Indiana (11), Milwaukee (11), Creighton, Grand Canyon, Holy Cross, Indiana State, Lehigh, Nebraska and Western Carolina.

2023-24 CONFERENCE CROWN

- The Volunteers sealed the 2023-24 outright SEC regular season crown with a 66-59 victory at #17/16 South Carolina on 3/6/24 in the second-to-last game of the conference slate.
- The decision marked Tennessee's third straight AP top-25 win in as many outings, a first in program history, and all were over top-20 foes. It also gave UT road victories over AP top-25 teams in back-to-back games for the first time.
- The triumph handed Tennessee its 11th SEC regular season title: 1935-36, 1940-41, 1942-43, 1966-67, 1971-72 (shared), 1976-77 (shared), 1981-82 (shared), 1999-2000 (shared four ways), 2007-08, 2017-18 (shared) and 2023-24.
- The Volunteers now own six outright regular season SEC titles: 1935-36, 1940-41, 1942-43, 1966-67, 2007-08 and 2023-24.
- Last year was the 13th season in which Tennessee has won at least one SEC title, as it also claimed the SEC Tournament crown in 1978-79 and 2021-22 after not placing first in the regular season.
- The Volunteers have now earned at least one of the SEC crowns—regular season or tournament—in three of the last seven seasons (2017-18, 2021-22 and 2023-24), all under **Rick Barnes**, after notching two in the prior 35 campaigns (1982-2017).
- Over the last seven seasons (2017-24), the only teams with at least two SEC regular season titles and/or three-plus SEC championships of any kind are Alabama, Auburn and Tennessee.

2023-24 ELITE EIGHT

- Second-seeded Tennessee advanced to the Elite Eight in 2024, marking the second such trip in program history (2010).
- The Volunteers beat No. 15-seeded Saint Peter's, 83-49, in the Round of 64 in a matchup between **Zakai Zeigler** and his half-brother **Armoni Zeigler**. They then earned a 62-58 win over seventh-seeded Texas, where **Rick Barnes** coached from 1998-2015, in the Round of 32. Both games took place at the Spectrum Center in Charlotte, N.C.
- Tennessee knocked off third-seeded and No. 11-ranked Creighton, 82-75, in the Sweet 16 at Little Caesars Arena in Detroit despite five-year starter **Santiago Vescovi** missing the game with an illness.
- **Dalton Knecht** set a UT record in NCAA Tournament play with 37 points in the Elite Eight against top-seeded, third-ranked Purdue, but Tennessee fell just short, 72-66, in Detroit.

VARIETY OF VICTORIES IN 2023-24

- The Volunteers posted 27 wins last year, their fifth time ever hitting that mark. Three of those campaigns have come in the last six seasons under **Rick Barnes**.
- Tennessee had 24 regular season triumphs, tying the 1999-2000 season for the third-most in program history. It won 28 in 2007-08 and 27 in 2018-19. Two of UT's top four marks all-time are under Barnes.
- The Vols finished with eight true road wins last season, matching 2017-18 and 1999-2000 for the program's second-highest total ever. Only the 2007-08 team logged more, totaling nine.
- UT's 14 SEC victories put them in a five-way tie for their fourth-most ever. It claimed 16 such decisions in 1976-77, as well as 15 in both 2018-19 and 1966-67.
- With seven AP top-25 wins, UT tied the program record set in 2021-22. The Vols have won six-plus such games in three straight years after doing so just thrice previously (2006-07, 1999-2000 and 1976-77).
- UT notched four AP top-15 victories, tied for its third-most ever. It was the third straight year the Vols logged at least four after doing so just once previously. They had six in 2021-22, five in 2022-23 and four in 1976-77.

POLL PRESENCE

- Tennessee has played 203 games as a ranked team in the AP Poll in **Rick Barnes'** tenure, posting a 151-52 (.744) record. Over 66.9 percent of the Volunteers' 303 games since Barnes arrived in 2015-16 have come with the team ranked in the AP Poll, all since 2017-18 (203 of 237, 85.7 percent).
- UT is 130-47 (.734) while in the AP top 20 under Barnes, 99-34 (.739) while top-15, 79-25 (.760) while top-10, 36-12 (.750) while top-five, 17-2 (.895) while top-three and 7-1 (.875) while No. 1.
- The Vols are 28-22 (.560) in AP top-25 matchups under Barnes, including 22-15 (.595) with both teams in the top 20, 13-9 (.591) with both in the top 15 and 7-6 (.538) with both in the top 10.

TOP-TIER TRIUMPHS

- Tennessee is 22-22 (.500) against top-15 teams in Rick Barnes' tenure, including 15-5 (.750) in its last 20 such games. It is 13-13 (.500) versus top-10 foes, including 11-7 (.611) in its last 18 such contests. UT is 9-8 (.562) against top-five opponents under Barnes, including 5-3 (.625) in its last eight such affairs. It is also 4-5 (.444) versus top-three teams in his tenure, including 3-3 (.500) in its last six such games.
- Under Barnes, the Volunteers are 11-4 (.733) at Food City Center when facing top-15 teams, including a 7-1 (.875) mark with six straight wins against top-10 foes. In addition, UT is a perfect 5-0 versus top-five teams in Knoxville with Barnes at the helm.
- The Vols won 12 straight home games against AP top-25 foes from 1/30/21 to 2/28/24. That is an SEC record, per CBS Sports, and the longest in DI since Kansas had 17 straight from 1/11/14 to 2/13/17. Nine of those victories were versus top-15 foes, with five against the top 10 and three over top-five teams.

- The Volunteers are 5-1 against AP top-five teams in SEC play under Barnes with four consecutive wins.
- Tennessee also has two exhibition wins over top-five foes in Barnes' tenure. Prior to the 2022-23 season, it defeated #2 Gonzaga, 99-80, on 10/28/22 in Frisco, Texas. In advance of this season, it knocked off #4 Michigan State, 89-88, on 10/29/23 in East Lansing, Mich.

TAKING DOWN THE TEAM AT THE TOP

- With its 68-59 home victory over top-ranked Alabama on 2/15/23, Tennessee became one of 17 DI schools with at least six wins over AP No. 1 teams.
- **Rick Barnes** has led UT to two of those victories, as the program won each of its first two matchups with the AP No. 1 team during his tenure. The Volunteers, now 2-1 in such contests under Barnes, previously defeated Gonzaga, 76-73, on 12/9/18 in Phoenix.

PRO PRODUCER

- Ten players whom Rick Barnes coached in college are active in the NBA in 2024-25: **Kevin Durant** (Suns), **Keon Johnson** (Nets), **Cory Joseph** (Magic), **Dalton Knecht** (Lakers), **Julian Phillips** (Bulls), **Jaden Springer** (Celtics), **Tristan Thompson** (Cavaliers), **P.J. Tucker** (Clippers), **Myles Turner** (Pacers) and **Grant Williams** (Hornets). Eight of them were first-round picks, with two top-five selections.

NUMBER 800

- A 86-51 win over Texas A&M (2/24/24) gave **Rick Barnes** the 800th victory of his 37-year career. He is the 15th DI coach all-time (min. 10 years in DI) with 800-plus victories, including the second among active coaches, alongside Kentucky's **John Calipari**.
- Barnes, Calipari and **Adolph Rupp** are the only coaches to hit 800 while in the SEC. **Cliff Ellis** and **Eddie Sutton** did so after leaving the league.
- Just 26 NCAA coaches, at any level, own 800 wins. Barnes, Calipari and **Dave Holmquist** of DI Biola are the only three active members of that group.

NUMBER 200 x2

- With recent home wins over Norfolk State (1/2/24), Tarleton State (12/21/23), Georgia Southern (12/12/23), George Mason (12/5/23) and #10 Texas (1/28/23), **Rick Barnes** upped the number of current DI schools he has defeated as a head coach to 200.
- Barnes, who served as the head coach at two of those five schools, then topped Saint Peter's (3/21/24) and Creighton (3/29/24) in the NCAA Tournament to increase the mark to 202.
- In that same NCAA Tournament opener against Saint Peter's (3/21/24), Barnes hit another 200 mark, as he became the second coach to win 200 games at Tennessee.
- Barnes is one of 19 coaches with 200-plus wins at two DI schools, just eight of whom are active. *The full list can be found on page 18.*

NUMBER 100

- In Tennessee's 66-59 victory at #17/16 South Carolina on 3/6/24 to clinch the outright 2023-24 SEC regular season title, **Rick Barnes** improved to 100-60 in SEC play. He became the 24th coach in league history to reach triple-digit conference wins.
- Barnes is the third coach to win 100 SEC games at UT, joining **Ray Mears** (182-76 in 15 years from 1962-77) and **Don DeVoe** (107-91 from 11 years from 1978-89). DeVoe went 3-15 at Florida in 1989-90 to finish 110-106 in SEC competition.
- Among active SEC coaches, only Arkansas' **John Calipari** and Auburn's **Bruce Pearl** have more SEC victories than Barnes. Pearl's total includes a 65-31 in six years at the helm of Tennessee from 2006-11.

FANTASTIC FIVE

- In 2023-24, **Rick Barnes**, just months after becoming a Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame first-time nominee, led his team to the DI NCAA Tournament for the 28th time, tying **Bob Knight** for fourth in history. Only **Mike Krzyzewski** (36), **Jim Boeheim** (35) and **Roy Williams** (30) have earned more bids.

BEATING THE BEST

- Under **Rick Barnes**, Tennessee has 38 total victories over 12 (of the 37) NCAA champions: Arizona, Arkansas (7x), Cincinnati, Duke, Florida (9x), Kansas (2x), Kentucky (11x), Louisville, Maryland, North Carolina, NC State (2x) and Wisconsin.
- The Volunteers also own non-conference wins during Barnes' tenure over schools such as Colorado, Creighton, Georgia Tech, Gonzaga, Illinois, Iowa, Memphis, Purdue, Texas, Wake Forest, Washington, West Virginia and VCU.
- In his 37 years as a head coach, Barnes owns 178 total wins over 28 (of the 37) programs with a national title. He has never met six of the other nine.

VETERAN VIBES

- Tennessee has 11 scholarship players on its roster, with two fifth-years, four seniors, one junior, three sophomores and one freshman.
- Seven of the 11 Vols are in at least their third year of college, with six in at least their fourth campaign. Just one does not have prior collegiate experience.

330 WEEKS IN THE TOP 25

- In 38 years as a head coach, **Rick Barnes** has guided his teams to a total of 330 weeks in the AP Top 25 Poll, including 155 in the top 10 and 73 in the top five.

SCHOOL-BY-SCHOOL SUCCESS

- Providence, in a 23-season stretch from 1978-2001, earned a spot in the AP rankings just six times, a third of which came during Barnes' six-year stint.
- Clemson has earned a single-digit ranking in the AP Poll 11 times, all in Barnes' tenure. The Tigers did so nine times in 1996-97 (top-five four times, high of second) and twice in 1997-98 (both fifth).
- Texas had just one AP top-five ranking ever (1/25/82) prior to the hiring of Barnes, who guided it to 40 such marks across six different years. The Longhorns had 25 top-10 marks, all in 1978-79 and 1981-82, before Barnes led them to 84 over 10 separate campaigns.
- Tennessee earned 74 AP top-25 rankings and 28 AP top-10 nods in the 14 seasons before the 2015 arrival of Barnes, who has posted 114 and 57, respectively, at UT. The Vols' 27 top-five rankings under Barnes far eclipse their full total (17) prior to his tenure.

POLL VOLS

- Tennessee has appeared in every AP Poll since the 2021-22 preseason rankings, a total of 60 releases in a row, vastly surpassing the prior program record of 37 from March 1999 to Feb. 2001. The Volunteers have been in the top 10 in 32 of those 59 releases, including the top five on 13 occasions.
- UT's 60-week streak is the third-longest in the country, behind only Houston (86) and Kansas (65). The only other team at even 45-plus is Arizona (58).
- Dating back to the 2020-21 preseason poll, UT has made 74 of 77 releases (not the final three of 2020-21), with 38 top-10 spots and still 13 in the top five.
- UT peaked at fourth last season, ascended to second in 2022-23, ended 2021-22 at a season-best fifth and placed as high as sixth in 2020-21.
- The Vols, who reached No. 1 in 2018-19, have been in the AP top six in five of the past seven years (2018-25), including each of the last four completed campaigns (2020-24), after hitting that mark six times in program history before **Rick Barnes'** tenure.
- UT has been in the AP top five in four of the last seven seasons (2018-25), including each of the past three completed ones (2021-24). It achieved that feat five times before Barnes' arrival (2007-08, 2000-01, 1999-2000, 1967-68 and 1958-59).
- The 2024-25 campaign marks the eighth in a row Tennessee has earned a top-20 AP ranking. The prior such program record was seven straight seasons (1966-67 to 1972-73).
- UT's 15-week AP top-10 streak (12/18/23 to 4/9/24) to close the 2023-24 campaign was the second-longest in program history. Three of the Vols' five all-time double-digit streaks have come since 2018-19 under **Rick Barnes**.

HIGH-CALIBER COMPANY

- Tennessee, Alabama, Arizona, Connecticut, Houston, Kansas and Purdue are the only seven teams to earn an AP top-five ranking in three of the last four seasons (2021-25). Only the Volunteers, Wildcats, Jayhawks and Boilermakers did so each year from 2021-22 to 2023-24.
- In addition, Tennessee, Alabama, Baylor, Gonzaga, Houston and Kansas are the only six schools to reach the AP top six in at least four of the past five

years (2020-25).

- UT is one of only eight teams to reach the AP top six in at least five of the last seven seasons (2018-25), joining Alabama, Baylor, Duke, Gonzaga, Houston, Kansas and Kentucky. Those are eight of the only 12 schools in the AP top five in at least four of the past seven years (2018-25), alongside Michigan, Michigan State, North Carolina and Virginia.
- Tennessee is one of just five schools to earn an AP top-20 ranking in each of the past eight years (2017-25), alongside Duke, Gonzaga, Kansas and North Carolina. Just three others—Kentucky, Michigan State and Villanova—have even reached the AP top 25 in each of those seasons.

DYNAMITE "D" A UT TRADEMARK

- The Volunteers finished third in 2023-24 in KenPom adjusted defensive efficiency (90.2) and placed fifth in DI in field-goal percentage defense (39.4).
- In 2022-23, Tennessee led the nation in KenPom adjusted defensive efficiency (87.5), holding the top spot for 15 total weeks. The Vols also led all DI teams in 3-point defense (26.5) that year, as well as ranked third in both scoring defense (57.9) and field-goal percentage defense (37.3).
- In five of the last seven seasons, UT has finished top-10 in KenPom adjusted defensive efficiency: third in 2023-24, first in 2022-23, third in 2021-22, fourth in 2020-21 and sixth in 2017-18.
- UT, through 2023-24, has won 35 times in a row when holding its foe under 60 points, including posting a dazzling 22-0 mark in 2022-23.
- The Vols, through 2023-24, have won 46 straight when allowing 50 points or fewer, since 12/29/12. That includes 12 such victories in 2022-23, matching Houston for the most of any team that season.

SEEING THE SECOND WEEKEND

- Tennessee has reached the Sweet 16 in seven of the past 17 NCAA Tournaments (since 2006-07). That mark is tied for ninth-most in the country during that span, matching Michigan, Purdue, Syracuse, Wisconsin and Xavier.
- The Volunteers' trips have come under three coaches: **Rick Barnes** (2024, 2023, 2019), **Cuonzo Martin** (2014) and **Bruce Pearl** (2010, 2008, 2007).
- The only eight schools that own more second-weekend bids over that span are North Carolina (11), Duke (10), Gonzaga (10), Kansas (nine, plus one vacated), Michigan State (nine), Arizona (eight), Kentucky (eight) and UCLA (eight).
- The SEC top-three in that stretch is Kentucky (eight), Tennessee (seven) and Florida (six). No other school has greater than three.

HOLDING SERVE

- In 2023-24, Tennessee went undefeated on its home court in non-conference play (7-0) for the fourth consecutive season. It has won 28 consecutive non-conference home games, dating back to the 2020-21 season opener (12/8/20).
- Per Elias Sports Bureau, Tennessee's 28-game streak ranks eighth nationally, behind only Auburn (54), Drake (43), Baylor (38), Texas Tech (31), Texas (30), Akron (29) and Wake Forest (29). Only five other schools are at even 24-plus entering 2024-25: Connecticut (27), Iowa State (27), Providence (27), Arizona (26) and Purdue (26).
- The only other schools with 28-plus non-conference regular season home wins—NIT and CBI games are not included—and no such losses over the past four seasons are Texas Tech (31-0) and Baylor (29-0).
- During its streak, Tennessee owns wins over programs such as Arizona, Cincinnati, Colorado, Illinois, Kansas and Texas.

HAPPY AT HOME

- Over the last four seasons, since 2020-21, the Volunteers are 57-7 (.891) on their home court.
- In nine seasons under head coach **Rick Barnes**, the Vols are 122-24 (.836) at Food City Center. Twice during the Barnes era, UT has gone undefeated at home: 18-0 in 2018-19 and 16-0 in 2021-22.

SHARPSHOOTERS

- Darlinstone Dubar**, **Jordan Gainey**, **Chaz Lanier**, **Igor Miličić Jr.** and **Zakai Zeigler** all enter 2024-25 with at least 105 made 3-pointers as collegians.
- That quintet possesses a combined career 3-point mark of 764-of-2,063 (37.0 percent).
- The four guards (all except Miličić) own upwards of 150 makes to begin the year. Four of them (all except Zeigler) are over 35.5 percent in their careers.
- The two fifth-year guards, Dubar and Lanier, are a combined 339-of-896 (37.8 percent) from deep.

1K CLUB

- Tennessee has three players who enter the 2024-25 season with over 1,000 points and another who is just 71 away from that mark.
- Darlinstone Dubar** owns 1,359 points in 116 outings, good for 11.7 ppg across four seasons.
- Jordan Gainey** possesses 1,175 points in 100 contests, an average of 11.8 ppg over three years.
- Zakai Zeigler** has 1,052 points in 101 appearances, giving him a 10.4 ppg average in three seasons.
- Chaz Lanier** is closing in on 1,000 points, as he begins 2024-25 with 929 points in 104 outings, an 8.9 ppg ledger across four campaigns.

MR. MASHACK

- Jahmai Mashack** is the chair of the 2024-25 SEC Men's Basketball Leadership Council, as voted by his peers. This is Mashack's third straight year on the committee. He served as the vice chair in 2023-24.
- Mashack, for the second consecutive year, is the SEC's representative on the NCAA Men's Basketball Oversight Committee (MBOC) Student-Athlete Engagement Group.
- In 2023-24, Mashack earned SEC Community Service Team designation. In Tennessee, he works with Second Harvest to address the food scarcity crisis, personally providing food to over 3,500 people and aiding in the fundraising of over \$1 million. At home in the Los Angeles area, he and his family regularly feed members of the homeless community.
- Additionally, Mashack is a member of both V.O.I.C.E., a black student-athlete council for community service, and Fellowship of Christian Athletes, through which he speaks at schools and churches.
- Mashack was a member of the VOLeaders Academy in 2022-23. That program ended with a service and cultural emersiontrip to the Philippines in July 2023.

ACADEMIC ACCOLADES

- In each of the last three years, Tennessee has earned the NABC's Team Academic Excellence Award (3.0+ GPA). UT had a 3.28 mark in 2021-22, a 3.33 ledger in 2022-23 and a 3.32 GPA in 2023-24.
- The Volunteers have also posted a perfect 1000 multi-year APR in each of the last three years.
- Six Volunteers made the NABC Honors Court in 2023-24, including returnees **Grant Hurst** and **Jahmai Mashack**. Eight UT players were on the 2023-24 SEC Winter Honor Roll, including returnees Hurst, Mashack and **Zakai Zeigler**.
- During the 2023 fall semester, UT posted a 3.39 GPA, its best mark ever in a single semester.

IN-STATE SUCCESS

- Tennessee is 14-1 (.933) in its last 15 games against in-state opponents and is 31-6 (.838) overall against fellow Volunteer State foes under **Rick Barnes**.
- Those 31 wins have come against Vanderbilt (15x), Tennessee Tech (6x), ETSU (3x), Lipscomb (2x), Austin Peay, Chattanooga, Memphis, Tennessee State and UT Martin.

BEATING THE BLUEGRASS BLUE BLOOD...

- From 1993-2015—a 22-season stretch that spanned the tenures of seven Tennessee coaches—the Volunteers went 9-35 (.205) against Kentucky, including 7-28 (.200) versus ranked Wildcat squads and 2-21 (.087) with UK in the top 10.
- Since **Rick Barnes** arrived in 2015-16, UT is 11-10 (.524) against Kentucky. No other team has even seven-plus wins over UK in that time, while just Auburn (six) and Kansas (six) have even five-plus. In that time, the Vols own a 10-6 (.625) ledger against ranked Wildcat teams, good for twice as many wins as any team in that time (Kansas has five).
- The Vols are 7-1 against Kentucky teams ranked in the top 10 under Barnes, including 6-1 when the Wildcats are in the top six and 5-1 when they are in the top five. UT is 6-0 in non-road games versus top-10 Kentucky teams in Barnes' tenure.
- UT has topped Kentucky at least once in eight of Barnes' nine seasons, including each of the first seven. It went 2-1 in 2021-22, 2018-19 and 2017-18. The Vols beat UK in Knoxville four years in a row, 2015-16 through 2018-19, and again in 2021-22.
- Under Barnes, UT is 7-3 against UK with both teams in the AP top 25 and 4-1 with both in the top 10.
- The Vols are 4-3 on the road in the last seven seasons (since 2017-18) after going 2-36 in the prior 38 years (1979-2017). **Santiago Vescovi** and **Josiah-Jordan James** both went 3-2 at Rupp Arena.
- UT's most recent win at Kentucky was a 103-92 decision on 2/3/24. The 103 points marked the Vols' co-second-most ever against the Wildcats, including their top total on the road, eclipsing the prior high of 90 on 1/10/76 (pre-Rupp Arena). It also marked the fourth time any visitor has ever scored triple digits at Rupp Arena, including the second time an SEC team has done so, joining Arkansas on 1/25/92 (105). The Vols had last scored triple digits in an SEC road game on 2/16/93, notching 101 at Arkansas.
- Under Barnes, UT is 5-4 at home against Kentucky, 4-5 on the road and 2-1 in the SEC Tournament.

...BEHIND BARNES' TUTELAGE

- Rick Barnes** is tied for seventh all-time with 12 wins against Kentucky as a head coach. That figure is first among all active DI head coaches and includes an 11-10 record during his Tennessee tenure. He went 0-1 at Texas and 1-1 at Clemson, putting him at 12-12.
- The only other active DI head coach in double figures is Auburn's **Bruce Pearl**, who owns a 10-18 mark. That includes a 4-9 mark during his tenure at Tennessee (2006-11) and a 6-9 record with Auburn.
- The six coaches above Barnes on the list are **Dale Brown** (18), **Billy Donovan** (17), **Bob Knight** (15), **Ray Mears** (15), **Roy Skinner** (14) and **Dean Smith** (13).
- Just seven others, including Barnes and Pearl, are in double figures. Those individuals are **Kevin Stallings** (12), **Don DeVoe** (11), **Wimp Sanderson** (11), **C.M. Newton** (10) and **Roy Williams** (10).
- Of the 13 coaches with 10-plus such wins, four coached the Volunteers: Barnes (2015-present), Pearl (2006-11), DeVoe (1978-89) and Mears (1962-77). DeVoe went 11-12 at UT and 0-2 at Florida (11-14 overall), while Mears totaled a 15-15 mark exclusively with the Volunteers.

SECOND TIME'S A CHARM

- Over the last seven years (2017-24), **Rick Barnes** has led Tennessee to a 26-8 (.765) record in the second leg of regular season home-and-home series.

SHOOTING TO SUCCEED

- Over the last three seasons (2021-24), Tennessee is 34-6 (.850) when hitting double-digit 3-pointers in a game, including 21-2 (.913) at home.
- During **Rick Barnes**' first six seasons on Rocky Top, 2015-16 to 2020-21, Tennessee was a strong 20-12 (.625) in such games, including 12-3 (.800) at home, but the last three years have been even better.

OVER 96 PERCENT

- Tennessee owns a 94-3 (.969) record under **Rick Barnes** when leading by double digits at halftime.
- The Volunteers have not lost such a game since 11/23/17 against #5/3 Villanova in the Battle 4 Atlantis semifinals in Paradise Island, Bahamas.

A SUPERB SIGN

- Tennessee is 118-14 (.894) under **Rick Barnes** when holding its opponent to 39.0 percent or worse field-goal shooting, including 63-7 (.900) when its foe shoots 35.0 or below. The Volunteers are a perfect 20-0 (1.000) in Barnes' tenure when holding their opponent to a field-goal clip of 30.0 or under.

DOMINANT DECISIONS

- Since the start of the 2022-23 campaign, Tennessee has 23 wins by 20-plus points. Twelve of them, a single-season program record, came in 2022-23.
- Of the Volunteers' 25 SEC victories over the last two years, 11 are by at least 20 points (five in 2022-23, six in 2023-24).
- Over the last two seasons, UT has 14 wins by 30-plus points (nine in 2022-23, five in 2023-24), including 10 by 35-plus (four and six, respectively) and four by 40-plus (all in 2022-23).

KD'S COACH

- Rick Barnes** is one of only four active college head coaches who has developed an NBA MVP, as **Kevin Durant**, his protégée at Texas, claimed the award in 2014. He is joined on the list by Arkansas' **John Calipari** (**Derrick Rose** [Memphis], 2011), Kansas' **Bill Self** (**Joel Embiid**, 2023) and Santa Clara's **Herb Sendek** (**James Harden** [Arizona State], 2018), the latter of whom was Barnes' assistant at Providence in 1988-89.
- Barnes and Missouri State's **Cuonzo Martin** are the only active DI coaches who have coached an NBA Finals MVP. Barnes coached Durant (2017, 2018) at Texas, while Martin coached **Jaylen Brown** (2024) at Cal. Martin served as the head coach at Tennessee from 2011-14.
- The only active DI head coaches who have coached an NBA All-Star Game MVP are Barnes and Arkansas' **John Calipari**. Durant (2012, 2019) played for Barnes at Texas, while **Anthony Davis** (2017) played for Calipari at Kentucky.
- Barnes and Calipari are also the only active DI coaches who had multiple players win medals at the Paris 2024 Olympics. For Barnes, Durant won gold with the USA and **Uroš Plavšić** claimed bronze with Serbia, becoming the third men's basketball medalist in Tennessee history. For Calipari, a trio of former Kentucky players won gold with the USA: Davis, **Bam Adebayo** and **Devin Booker**.

BRINGING IN BURGER BOYS

- For the first time since 2018-19, Tennessee does not have a McDonald's All-American on its roster.
- Rick Barnes** signed a McDonald's All-American each year from 2019-22 after Tennessee had inked two total in the prior 20 years (1999-2018) and eight in its history. Three of recent four were one-and-done NBA draft picks, with two going in the first round.
- In total, Barnes has coached 20 McDonald's All-Americans, including signing 19 out of high school.

HOOPS DNA

- Tennessee Vice Chancellor/Director of Athletics **Dr. Daniel J. White** played college basketball at both Towson (1998-2000) and Notre Dame (2000-02). The Fighting Irish reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament both of his years there.
- Danny's father, **Kevin White**, was a legendary athletic director, leading six departments, including five at the DI level and three in a Power Five conference, over a 38-year career. Duke won two national titles in men's basketball (2010, 2015) during his 13-year tenure there, which ended with his retirement in 2021. Notre Dame also won a title in women's basketball (2001) during his first season there, also Danny's first year as a student there.
- Danny's younger brother, **Brian White**, is the athletic director at Florida Atlantic. In his fifth year there, 2022-23, the Owls reached the Final Four in men's basketball for the first time and defeated Tennessee, 62-55, in the Sweet 16.
- Danny's older brother, **Mike White**, a four-year starter at Ole Miss from 1995-99, is in his 13th year as a DI head coach, including his 10th in the SEC and third at Georgia. He served as the head coach at Florida from 2015-22 and made four NCAA Tournament trips, reaching the 2017 Elite. White was the head coach at Louisiana Tech from 2011-15, going 101-40.

- **Rick Barnes** is one of six active UT head coaches who have led their team to a No. 1 national ranking.
- Five of those coaches, including Barnes, have led their team to a No. 1 ranking since 2018.

"EVERYTHING SCHOOL"

- In 2023-24, Tennessee claimed its third straight SEC All-Sports Trophy. The Volunteers have earned the trophy in all three of **Daniel J. White's** full years as the AD after never previously winning it.
- After setting a school record by finishing sixth nationally in the 2022-23 LEARFIELD Directors' Cup, Tennessee exceeded that mark with a third-place finish in 2023-24, leading all SEC institutions and trailing only Texas (then in the Big 12) and Stanford. The Volunteers totaled 1,217 points and received at least 25 from all 20 of their athletic teams.
- All of Tennessee's athletic teams, for the first time in school history, made the postseason in 2023-24. Only one other Power Five institution, Texas A&M, recorded a postseason appearance in every sport last year.
- In 2023-24, 13 of UT's 20 teams finished in the national top 25, all in the top 20. Ten placed top-10 and four took a top-five spot. The full list is below:

- In each of **Zakai Zeigler's** three seasons, Tennessee has finished top-15 nationally in assist rate, per KenPom. It ranked No. 13 in 2023-24 (61.0), second in 2022-23 (66.2) and sixth in 2021-22 (63.0).
- The Volunteers posted 20-plus assists 11 times in 2023-24 and reached 25-plus thrice, with a high of 28 against Vanderbilt (2/17/24).
- Tennessee recorded 20-plus assists 23 times in 2021-22, logging 25-plus on 10 occasions, with a high of 29 versus USC Upstate (12/14/21).

ATTACKED REHABILITATION

- Zakai Zeigler** suffered a season-ending left ACL tear three minutes into Tennessee's 2022-23 home finale against Arkansas (2/28/23).
- Zeigler underwent surgery 13 days later (3/13/23) and then spent the 2023 offseason rehabbing under the collaborative direction of athletic trainer **Chad Newman**, director of sports performance **Garrett Medenwald** and director of rehabilitation **John Dean**.
- After missing the final six-plus games of 2022-23, all three contests during the Italian foreign tour and both 2023-24 exhibition outings, Zeigler returned for last season's opener, notching five assists in 12 minutes versus Tennessee Tech (11/6/23).
- Zeigler came off the bench for the Volunteers' first six games of 2023-24 before reentering the starting lineup at North Carolina (11/29/23). From that point on, he averaged 13.3 ppg, 6.7 apg and 1.9 spg, while shooting 36.4 percent from 3-point range.

- On 2/26/22, **Zakai Zeigler's** mother's apartment complex in Queens, N.Y., was destroyed by a fire. His mother, **Charmane Zeigler**, and Zakai's special-needs nephew, Nori, whom Charmane is raising, lost everything.
- On 3/2/22, aided by Tennessee Athletics' compliance office and administration, Zeigler launched a [GoFundMe](#) fundraiser. UT fans collectively donated over \$363,000 in under 24 hours.
- That summer, thanks to Vol fans' generosity of Volunteer fans, Charmane and Nori permanently relocated to Knoxville, Tenn.

- The only players on both lists—those possessing 1,000 points, 400 assists and 150 steals—are **Zakai Zeigler**, **Santiago Vescovi** and **C.J. Watson**. Zeigler reached that mark in his third season, while Vescovi did so in his fifth and Watson in his fourth.

MAJOR MERITS

- In 2023-24, **Zakai Zeigler** won SEC Defensive Player of the Year honors, becoming third the individual under 6-foot to do so, joining LSU's **Tremont Waters** (2018-19) and Kentucky's **Tyler Ullis** (2015-16).
- Zeigler also earned SEC All-Defensive Team status for the third straight year, becoming the fourth player in league history to do so. The others are Ole Miss' **Reginald Buckner** (2010-13), Vanderbilt's **Jeffrey Taylor** (2009-12) and Mississippi State's **Jarvis Varnado** (2007-10).
- En route to leading the SEC in assists average for the second year in a row—he is just the 10th player in league history to do so, including the second Volunteer—Zeigler was named First Team All-SEC by the league's coaches and Second Team All-SEC by the Associated Press. It marked the second straight year Zeigler garnered those exact distinctions.
- Also for the second year in a row, Zeigler was among 10 select semifinalists for the Naismith Defensive Player of the Year and among 25 Lefty Driesell Defensive Player of the Year finalists.
- Zeigler earned Bob Cousy Award Midseason Top 10 List designation in 2023-24, one of two SEC players to do so, alongside Texas A&M's **Wade Taylor IV**.
- Finally, Zeigler was named to the NCAA Midwest Region All-Tournament Team after helping lead Tennessee to its second Elite Eight berth. He is one of five players in UT history to receive NCAA All-Tournament plaudits.

HOME HOOPS DURING THE BARNES ERA

- UT is 122-24 (.836) at Food City Center under **Rick Barnes**, including 61-20 (.753) in SEC play.
- Barnes has led the Vols to a 17-7 (.708) home record against AP top-25 foes, including a 14-6 (.700) mark versus top-20 teams, an 11-4 (.733) ledger against the top 15, a 7-1 (.875) tally versus top-10 opponents and a perfect 5-0 record against the top five.
- The Vols won 12 straight home games versus ranked teams, an SEC record per CBS Sports, from 1/30/21 to 2/28/24. That is the longest streak in DI since Kansas notched 17 in a row from 1/11/14 to 2/13/17.

20,000 STRONG

- In **Rick Barnes'** nine seasons, Tennessee has played in front of a home crowd of at least 20,000 on 37 occasions (28-9), with 26 sellouts (20-6).
- In 2022-23, the Volunteers had five sellout crowds, at the time tying an arena single-season record.
- UT well eclipsed that mark last season by selling out eight home games, its most ever at Food City Center: Illinois (12/9/23), Ole Miss (1/6/24), Alabama (1/20/23), LSU (2/7/24), Vanderbilt (2/17/24), Texas A&M (2/24/23), Auburn (2/28/24) and Kentucky (3/9/23). SEASON TICKETS EXCEED 13K AGAIN

- For the sixth straight full-capacity season, Tennessee has sold over 13,000 season tickets. The Vols sold out of the full allotment of 14,500 this year.

NATION'S MOST PASSIONATE FANS

- In both 2022-23 and 2023-24, Tennessee was the only school in America to rank in the top 10 in average home attendance for football, men's basketball and women's basketball.
- In 2023-24, Tennessee totaled 1,161,218 fans across the three sports, good for the highest mark in the country. It placed over 96,000 above second-place LSU despite hosting six fewer games.
- Tennessee's average attendance of 30,558 across the three sports in 2023-24 led the country and ranked over 3,500 above second-place Michigan.
- In 2023-24, UT placed third and fourth, respectively, in football total and average attendance, making it the only school top-five in football and men's basketball. It ranked ninth and seventh, respectively, in women's basketball.

ONE FLY, WE ALL FLY

- With approximately 14:00 left on the clock, Tennessee executes its "One Fly, We All Fly" unified slam dunk, a tradition that started in 2018-19.
- Each game's dunker is determined by feel. His teammates circle the paint before he explodes toward the rim. When he takes flight, so do his teammates. As the ball is slammed and the Vols land in unison, UT fans let out a roar. The Vols then briefly return to the locker room for final preparations.
- Teams from all levels of basketball across the globe—including multiple NBA teams (even **LeBron James** weighed in on Instagram)—have replicated "OFWAF," which is believed to have been named by VFL **Admiral Schofield**.

Food City Center is the fifth-largest venue in the country, including third-largest among on-campus arenas. It is also the second-largest non-ACC facility in America, including the largest among the other Power Five conferences. It is one of just seven venues with over 20,000 seats.

One of the two schools with a larger arena, UNC Greensboro, only uses it part of the time, as it also has an on-campus facility. The same applies to St. John's, which ranks eighth with its off-campus venue.

VOLS IN THE PROS

EIGHT VOLS DRAFTED SINCE 2019

- Over the last six NBA Drafts (2019-24), eight Volunteers have been selected, the most in program history in a six-year span. The list includes four first-round picks.
- Three Volunteers were picked in the 2019 NBA Draft, matching the program record set in both 1977 and 1950 when the draft had double-digit rounds.
- Tennessee is one of just six schools with at least eight draftees in the last six years, alongside Duke, Connecticut, Gonzaga, Kentucky and Michigan. The Volunteers are also one of 15 teams with four-plus first-rounders in the past six drafts.
- Only six schools have produced an NBA draftee in at least five of the past six years. Tennessee joins Arkansas, Duke, Gonzaga, Kentucky, and USC on that list.
- Tennessee, Duke, Gonzaga and Kentucky are the lone four programs represented in at least five of the last six NBA Drafts while producing eight-plus total draftees.
- The eight Volunteers chosen in the past six years are guard **Dalton Knecht** (No. 17 in 2024), forward **Julian Phillips** (No. 35 in 2023), guard **Kennedy Chandler** (No. 38 in 2022), guard **Jaden Springer** (No. 28 in 2021), guard **Keon Johnson** (No. 21 in 2021), guard **Jordan Bone** (No. 57 in 2019), forward **Admiral Schofield** (No. 42 in 2019) and forward **Grant Williams** (No. 22 in 2019). Half of them—Phillips, Chandler, Springer and Johnson—were one-and-done collegians.
- Tennessee, Baylor, Connecticut, Duke, Gonzaga and Kentucky are the only schools with an NBA draftee in each of the past four years (2021-24).
- When **Rick Barnes** arrived on Rocky Top in 2015-16, only seven Vols had been picked in the prior 22 NBA Drafts (1994-2015), with just two in the first round.

CRUSHING THE COMBINE

- Under the tutelage of UT Director of Sports Performance **Garrett Medenwald**, a Tennessee alum has posted the highest max vertical leap at three of the last four NBA Combine. Twice, that individual also had the top standing vertical leap.
- In 2021, **Keon Johnson** set the all-time NBA Combine record in the max vertical leap at 48 inches, shattering the 20-year-old mark by 2.5 inches. **Kennedy Chandler** finished first in 2022 at 41.5, while **Julian Phillips** did so in 2023 at 43.
- Johnson (41.5) and Phillips (36) both ranked first in standing vertical leap, as did **Jordan Bone** (36) in 2019. That year, Bone also led the way in the shuttle run (2.78) and lane agility (9.97), while **Grant Williams** did so in max bench reps (20).
- Most recently, in 2024, **Dalton Knecht** paced all NBA Draft Combine participants in the shuttle run (2.79), plus placed second in lane agility (10.56).
- Over the last six NBA Draft Combines, a Tennessee player has posted the No. 1

result among all participants in 10 different events: max vertical (3x), standing vertical (3x), shuttle run (2x), lane agility and max bench press.

VOLS WELL REPRESENTED IN THE NBA

- Tobias Harris** (2010-11) is in his 14th season in the NBA and the first year of his second stint with the Detroit Pistons, whom he signed a two-year, \$52 million deal with in July 2024. He earned nearly \$251 million in his first 13 years in the league, while averaging 16.3 PPG on 47.8 percent shooting for five franchises.
- Josh Richardson** (2011-15) is in now in his 10th NBA season, including the second of his second stint with the Miami Heat. He totaled nearly \$60 million in his first nine years, while putting up 11.6 PPG on 36.4 percent 3-point shooting for six organizations. He averaged 16.6 ppg for the Miami Heat in 2018-19.
- Grant Williams** (2016-19) is now a sixth-year pro and is in his first full season with his hometown Charlotte Hornets. He is in the second season of a four-year, \$53 million deal he inked with the Dallas Mavericks in July 2023. Williams averaged career highs in PPG (10.3), APG (2.3) and MPG (28.0) in 2023-24.
- Keon Johnson** (2020-21) is a fourth-year pro in his second full season with the Brooklyn Nets. He made over \$8 million and averaged 5.9 PPG in his first four seasons and signed a two-year, \$4.5 million contract with Brooklyn in July 2024.
- Jaden Springer** (2020-21) is coming off an NBA title with the Boston Celtics in 2023-24. He is the third Volunteer to win an NBA championship ring. Springer is in his fourth year in the league, including his first full season with Boston.
- Julian Phillips** (2022-23) is in his second year in the NBA, all with the Chicago Bulls. He appeared in 40 games as a rookie and made \$1.6 million.
- Dalton Knecht** (2023-24) is a rookie with the Los Angeles Lakers. He averaged 21.3 PPG in the NBA 2K25 Summer League. That, among players with at least three appearances, put him fifth overall and first among rookies
- Aided by seven Vols, tied for the fourth-most of any SEC team, there were 103 players from SEC schools on opening-day NBA rosters, 15 more than any other league. All but one 30 NBA team had an SEC player to start the season. Over the last seven NBA Drafts (2018-24), 65 players from an SEC team have been picked.

SECOND YEAR OF A NEW NAME

Tennessee Vice Chancellor/Director of Athletics **Danny White** announced Aug. 23, 2023, a multi-year naming-rights agreement with longtime UT Athletics corporate champion Food City that rebrands UT's on-campus arena as Thompson-Boling Arena at Food City Center.

The agreement with Food City was negotiated by Tennessee Athletics' multimedia rights partner, LEARFIELD/The Vol Network. Food City's overall commitment to UT Athletics will allow the University to invest in excess of \$20 million over 10 years and will aid new and needed renovations of the arena and upgrades to the facility's interior and exterior.

Among the planned additions to the venue will include new club amenities, updates to the Ray Mears Room and a state-of-the-art center-hung video board. The exterior façade of the facility will be modernized and the look will be more in line with Tennessee's other athletics venues.

Food City's longstanding commitment to supporting UT Athletics and the department's mission of leading the way in college sports dates to 1997. The privately held family-owned company is headquartered in Abingdon, Va., and operates 152 retail locations in Tennessee, Virginia, Kentucky, Georgia and Alabama.

Opened in the fall of 1987, the arena is named for the late B. Ray Thompson and former UT President Dr. Edward J. Boling. The venue has undergone multiple phases of renovations in its 36-year history, most notably an overhaul in 2007 that included the addition of two levels of premium suites and one level of premium loge seating spanning the arena's north end.

JUSTIN GAINEY

Associate Head Coach • NC State, 2000

- A native of Kansas City, Mo., Clark spent the 2020-21 season as an assistant coach at Austin Peay in nearby Clarksville, Tenn.
- Clark's first stop as a collegiate coach came in 2019-20 at UIC, where he was hired at just 26 years old.
- From 2017-19, Clark served as the top assistant coach at Sunrise Christian Academy, a prep powerhouse in Bel Aire, Kan., while also working with MoKan Elite.



GREGG POLINSKY

Assistant Coach • Northern Arizona, 1981

- Now in his fourth year on the Tennessee staff, Polinsky served as a volunteer analyst in 2021-22 and was promoted to assistant coach following the season.
- The St. Louis native was a DI head coach at Georgia Southern (1995-99), as well as an assistant at Texas (1983-86), Alabama (1986-94) and Howard College (1981-83).
- Spent over two decades in NBA scouting and front-office positions with the New Jersey/Brooklyn Nets (1999-2018) and the Detroit Pistons (2018-21).
- Polinsky played at New Mexico for two seasons before transferring to Northern Arizona for the final season of his college career.

- In his 10th season at Tennessee, as he joined Rick Barnes from day one, after working for him as a graduate manager (2012-14) and strength intern (2014-15) at Texas.
