POSTGAME NOTES

WISCONSIN (5-2, 2-1 BIG TEN) VS. PURDUE (1-6, 0-3 BIG TEN) - OCTOBER 17, 2015 - CAMP RANDALL STADIUM - MADISON, WIS.

TEAM NOTES

- Today's captains were senior S Michael Caputo, senior WR Alex Erickson, senior OLB Joe Schobert and senior CB Darius Hillary.
- Wisconsin extended the longest win streak by either team in the history of the series, as it earned its 10th-consecutive win over the Boilermakers.
- The Badgers recorded their second opening-drive touchdown of the year, which stretched 81 yards and included 10 plays. The other six-point score occurred against Hawai'i when UW went 97 yards in 16 plays on its first drive. Wisconsin has also put up a field goal on its first drive on two occasions (Miami (OH) and Iowa).
- UW allowed a total of 12 plays to be run on its side of the 50-yard line in the second half. In their last three games, Badgers' opponents (Iowa, Nebraska and Purdue) have run just 20 plays on Wisconsin's side of the field.
- Other than Alabama, UW has held each of its opponents to 21 points or less this year.
- After giving up one red-zone attempt to Purdue, UW has allowed opponents to reach the red zone just 11 times in seven games this season. In those 11 trips, the Badgers allowed seven scores (five touchdowns).
- The Badgers held Purdue to 191 yards of total offense and 55 rushing yards, which were both new season lows for the Boilermakers. UW gave up 136 passing yards—only 15 yards more than Purdue's season low for passing yards. Entering the affair, Purdue was averaging 17.0 points per game and 288.0 total yards per game in Big Ten competition.
- UW limited Purdue to just 191 yards, its fewest allowed in a Big Ten since holding Nebraska to 180 total yards on Nov. 15, 2014.
- After surrendering 238 rush yards to Alabama in its season opener on Sept. 5, Wisconsin has given up an average of 81.33 rushing yards per game over its last six games.
- Wisconsin gave up just three plays of 10 yards or more to Purdue, while picking up 13 plays (four rush, nine pass) of 10 yards or more on offense.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- Senior QB Joel Stave became the first QB in school history to post a 4-0 record against an opponent, beating Purdue for the fourth time in his career. Stave is also 3-0 against upcoming opponents Illinois and Minnesota.
- With the win, Stave tied Darrell Bevell for the fourth-most wins in school history (26). One more win would knot Stave with Mike Samuel in third, while Brooks Bollinger leads with 30 wins.

■ Stave finished the game with 322 yards on 30-of-39 passing, which noted the 15th 200-yard game of his career. The performance puts Stave ahead of Darrell Bevell and Scott Tolzien for the second-most 200-yard games in school history.

- Stave has now picked up at least 300 yards in the air in back-to-back games. He is the first UW quarterback to accomplish that feat since Russell Wilson in 2011. Stave is the first Badgers QB to accomplish this in back-to-back conference games since Jim Sorgi in 2003.
- The only other quarterbacks in Wisconsin history to throw for 300 yards or more in back-to-back games were Randy Wright (1983), Bevell (1995), Jim Sorgi (2003) and Wilson (2011). Wright is the lone Badger to toss for 300 yards in three-straight games, turning the trick in 1983. Stave's 322 yards passing is the 12th-highest total by a UW quarterback in a game.
- Junior RB Dare Ogunbowale tied his career-high with six catches and picked up a career-high 51 receiving yards. He finished with 56 yards rushing on 18 carries and a touchdown.
- Freshman RB Alec Ingold scored his second- and third-career touchdowns. He ran nine times for 19 yards in the game.
- Senior WR Alex Erickson had a game-high 86 yards receiving and his nine catches were one short of tying a career-high.
- Junior WR Robert Wheelwright had 61 receiving yards and tied a careerhigh with six catches.
- Sophomore WR Jazz Peavy had a career-high 48 yards receiving on two grabs.
- Junior WR Reggie Love picked up 15 yards and tied a career-high with two catches.
- Senior OLB Joe Schobert had seven tackles, including four solo tackles, half a sack and a tackle for loss in the game. Over his last eight games dating back to last season, senior OLB Joe Schobert has logged a total of 18.0 tackles for loss, which includes five games with multiples TFLs and three games with at least 3.0 TFLs.
- Through seven games, Schobert has 9.5 sacks, which is ninth-most in school history.

- Freshman ILB T.J. Edwards registered a career-high for tackles (16) and tackles for loss (1.5). The performance marked his second-career game of double-digit tackles, as he had 12 against Alabama. He also recorded his first-career forced fumble.
- Freshman ILB Chris Orr earned his first half sack of his career. He finished with seven tackles, including three solo tackles, and half a tackle for loss.
- With a 28-yard field goal in the second quarter, sophomore K Rafael Gaglianone tied John Hall (1993-96) and Vitaly Pisetsky (1997-00) for seventh in school history with 29 field goals. In his career, Gaglianone is 19-of-25 on field goal attempts in one-possession games. He finished 1-for-2 on the day.
- Senior WR/S Tanner McEvoy recorded the first fumble recovery of his career, scooping up Edwards' FF in the fourth quarter.
