THE WEEK AHEAD

- ▶ The Wisconsin men's soccer team (2-4-2, 0-1-0 Big Ten) continues its road swing by jumping back into Big Ten Conference play Sunday in a matchup with Michigan slated for noon at the U-M Soccer Complex in Ann Arbor, Mich.

LOOKING BACK

- ▶ Wisconsin suffered its second-consecutive shutout loss Wednesday night, as the Badgers were blanked in a 3-0 loss to Illinois-Chicago. The Flames benefitted from two penalty-kick goals in the first half of the match and dropped UW to 0-3-0 in road games this season.
- ▶ The Badgers opened the Big Ten season last Friday with a 1-0 loss to No. 13 Indiana.

NOTEWORTHY

- ▶ Sunday's match marks the midway point of the Badgers' regular season, as they have played eight games heading into the weekend and have eight remaining on the schedule following their matchup with the Wolverines.

- ▶ The Badgers and Wolverines met twice during the 2008 season, with each matchup going down as a double-overtime draw. The teams played to a 1-1 tie in the regular season before battling to a scoreless stalemate in the opening round of the 2008 Big Ten Tournament, with the Wolverines advancing on penalty kicks.
- ▶ UW assistant coach Ernie Yarborough spent seven seasons as an assistant at Michigan, serving under Wolverines head man Steve Burns from 2000 to 2006.
- ▶ The Badgers enter the weekend looking for their first road win of the season and their first victory away from home in Big Ten play since downing Northwestern, 2-1, in Evanston on Nov. 6, 2005. UW is 0-6-3 in Big Ten road matches over the last three seasons.
- ▶ Illinois-Chicago was awarded three penalty-kick attempts in Wednesday's match, marking the seventh, eighth and ninth PKs to go to a UW opponent since the Badgers last took an attempt from the penalty spot on Oct. 13, 2007.
- ▶ The Badgers' opponents have converted seven of those eight PK attempts — including a 4-of-5 mark in 2009 — and four have gone down as game-winning goals.
- ▶ Against UIC, as the Badgers were shut out for the fourth time in eight matches this season. The Badgers have scored a total of five goals in those eight games.

Player to Watch

16 • JON RZEPKA

Junior | Midfield | Kentwood, Mich.

After missing the 2008 season due to injury, Rzepka is back in a big way for the Badgers. The junior has started each of UW's last four matches in the midfield and ranks second on the team with five shots-on-goal, including a solid strike against Indiana last Friday.

SCOUTING MICHIGAN

- ▶ The Wolverines enter Sunday's contest riding a two-game winless streak that began last Sunday with a 2-0 loss to Penn State in their Big Ten opener and continued Wednesday with a 0-0 draw against in-state rival Oakland.
- ▶ Michigan's loss to Penn State (Sept. 27) snapped a seven-game win streak for the Wolverines.
- ▶ After being shutout by Notre Dame in their season-opener, the Wolverines had no trouble finding the back of net during their seven-game win streak. They outscored those seven opponents by a 23-5 margin.
- ▶ Michigan is scoreless in its last two matches, however, and has been outscored 7-0 in the three games it has failed to win this season.
- ▶ Mauro Fuzetti leads the Wolverines' explosive attack, accounting for seven of the squad's league-leading 23 goals. Heading into Wednesday's matches, Fuzetti led the Big Ten in shots (39) and ranked second in goals and total points (16).
- ▶ Also on the offensive end, Justin Meram has contributed five goals, and Hamoody Saad has added three tallies. In all, 10 players have found the back of the net at least once this season, including four who have scored multiple goals.

ABOUT THE SERIES

- ▶ Each of the teams' last three meetings have gone to double overtime and resulted in draws. That includes both matchups in 2008 and the teams' last meeting in Ann Arbor, in 2007.
- ▶ The Badgers are unbeaten in their last three regular-season matchups with the Wolverines, each of which has gone to at least one overtime period. UW scored a 2-1 win in Madison in 2006 before the teams played to a 2-2 tie in 2007 and a 1-1 draw last season.
- ▶ Including Big Ten tournament play, the Badgers are 1-1-3 in their last five meetings with Michigan.
- ▶ UW has not won at Michigan since the Wolverines moved men's soccer to varsity status in 2000. The Badgers are 0-3-1 all-time in games played in Ann Arbor.
- ▶ Sunday's meeting will be the first between the teams at the new U-M Soccer Complex.
- ▶ Overall, Michigan owns a 7-2-3 advantage in the teams' all-time series. That includes a 5-2-2 mark in regular-season matchups.
- ▶ Michigan coach Steve Burns has been at the helm of the Wolverines program since its move to varsity competition and is 7-2-3 against the Badgers.

HERE'S JONNY

- ▶ Junior midfielder Jon Rzepka continued the road back from a foot injury that kept him sidelined for the entire 2008 season at the Milwaukee Panther Classic.
- ▶ Rzepka was in the starting 11 for the Badgers' Sept. 18 matchup with Oakland, marking his first start since Oct. 20, 2007.
- ▶ Rzepka has played in all six of UW's games this season after making his return to the field in the Badgers' season-opener against Virginia Tech on Sept. 4.

SWEET HOME, MILWAUKEE

- ▶ Wisconsin's 19th appearance in the 36-year-old Milwaukee Panther Invitational (Sept. 18-20) was another productive trip to Milwaukee for the Badgers, who went 1-0-1 on the weekend and earned a runner-up finish in the event.
- ▶ The Badgers' 1-1 draw with UC Santa Barbara was UW's first-ever tie in the event and moved the Badgers' record in the tournament to 25-12-1 all-time.
- ▶ The Badgers also improved their all-time mark at Engelmann Field to 27-16-6.

FEELS LIKE THE FIRST TIME

- ▶ Freshman Ata Ozbay made the first start of his career Sept. 13 against San Diego State, and has now appeared in all six of the Badgers' matches in his rookie season.
- ▶ Sophomore Mark Roos, also a forward, is the other UW player to make his debut in the starting lineup this season. He has started all four games for the Badgers.
- ▶ Also making their Badger debuts against San Diego State (Sept. 13) were sophomore goalkeeper Jamal Habibi, who played 27 minutes in relief of an injured Alex Horwath, and sophomore forward Ross Seagram, who scored his first goal with UW in the second half.

PENALTY KILLERS

- ▶ The Badgers have gone 33 consecutive matches without being awarded a penalty kick, dating back to Oct. 13, 2007. The last time a UW player converted a penalty kick attempt into a goal was one game earlier, when Sho Fujita netted a PK in a 1-1 tie with Milwaukee on Oct. 10, 2007.
- ▶ The Badgers have given up seven penalty-kick goals since their last try from the penalty spot, including four game-winning scores and a game-tying goal.
- ▶ The Badgers are 0-4-2 in the matches in which they've given up a PK during the streak. Here's a breakdown of those games:

ON THE BOARD

- ▶ Mark Roos' game-winning goal in the 90th minute of the Badgers' win over Western Illinois (Sept. 6) snapped a scoreless drought of 199 minutes, 57 seconds for the Badgers. The streak was the longest dry spell to open a season in school history.
- ▶ The Badgers' longest opening scoring drought prior to this season was 152:46, which came when UW opened the 1998 season with a 1-0 loss to Northern Illinois (9/4/98) and then scored in the 63rd minute of a 4-1 loss to Richmond (9/6/98).

HORWATH HONORED

- ▶ Senior goalkeeper Alex Horwath posted back-to-back shutouts to open the season, blanking both Virginia Tech (Sept. 4) and Western Illinois (Sept. 6), to earn Defensive MVP honors at the Middleton Sports and Fitness Invitational.
- ▶ Horwath, who has moved into fifth place on the Badgers' all-time shutouts list with 15 for his career, was then named Big Ten Defensive Player of Week by the league for the week of Sept. 7.

YEAGLEY MAKES COACHING DEBUT

- ▶ Todd Yeagley became the fifth head coach in Wisconsin men's soccer history when he was hired on Dec. 18, 2008. He made his head coaching debut when the Badgers took on Virginia Tech on Sept. 4, becoming the first UW head man to start his career with a tie.

REDDAN HEADS FOR THE HALL

- ▶ Wisconsin soccer pioneer Bill Reddan was among those inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletics Hall of Fame on Sept. 4 as part of the Class of 2009.
- ▶ The school's first men's soccer head coach, Reddan is credited with founding the UW program first as a club sport and then guiding the Badgers after the program achieved varsity status in 1977.
- ▶ Reddan compiled a 49-27-9 record in his five seasons as head coach, led the Badgers to their first-ever NCAA tournament berth in 1981 and served as an assistant on UW's 1995 NCAA championship team.

NETWORK CONNECTION

- ▶ For the third-consecutive season, the Badgers will have at least two of their regular-season matches televised nationally by Big Ten Network. UW's home game against defending Big Ten champion Michigan State (Oct. 11) will be carried live by the network, while the Badgers' conference finale at Penn State (Oct. 31) will air on a tape-delay basis on Nov. 1.

WHO'S NEW

- ▶ A total of five new faces join the Badgers for the 2009 season, a group composed of four freshman and a transfer.
- ▶ Freshman defender **Daniel Kohan** (Los Angeles, Calif.) finished his high school career with nine goals and 26 assists and earned All-CIF honors as a junior. He also played center back for the U.S. team at the 2009 Maccabiah Games in Israel.
- ▶ Freshman defender **Kyle McCrudden** (Willmette, Ill.) led New Trier High School to the Illinois Class 3A state championship in 2008 on his way to state player of the year and NSCAA and ESPN Rise All-America honors. He scored 42 goals and had 23 assists in three years of varsity play.
- ▶ Freshman forward **Ata Ozbay** (Barrington, Ill.) helped guide Barrington High School to an Illinois state title in 2007 and posted 38 goals and 20 assists over his final two prep seasons. An NSCAA All-Region selection last season, Ozbay also played club soccer for the Chicago Fire academy team.
- ▶ Freshman midfielder **Derek Pitts** (Middleton, Wis.) scored 11 goals to help lead Middleton High School to the Wisconsin Division 1 state semifinals as a junior and had another nine goals as a senior.
- ▶ Sophomore forward **Ross Seagram** (Dexter, Mich.) transferred to UW after playing

last season at the University of Maine, which recently suspended its men's soccer program for financial reasons. Seagram finished tied for third in scoring for the Black Bears last season with two goals. As a prep, he led Dexter High School to the 2006 Michigan state championship and finished as the school's all-time leading scorer (73 goals, 32 assists).

BADGERS PICKED FOR FIFTH

- ▶ Wisconsin has been tabbed to finish in a tie for fifth place in the Big Ten Conference this season, according to the league's annual preseason coaches' poll. Indiana was picked to win the league, which features four teams ranked in the preseason NSCAA Top 25.

- ▶ Freshman defender Kyle McCrudden has been named to *College Soccer News'* annual list of '100 Freshman to Keep an Eye On.' Last season, then-freshman Colin Monasterio was named to the same list and went on to earn Big Ten All-Freshman Team honors in his rookie year at UW.

EXAMINING THE EXHIBITIONS

- ▶ Wisconsin begins the regular season on the heels of a pair of exhibition contests in which it went 1-1. The Badgers opened the preseason with a 1-0 overtime win over UW-Parkside on Aug. 24 and then dropped a 2-1 decision to No. 3 Akron on Saturday (Aug. 29) at the National Soccer Festival in Fort Wayne, Ind.

MADISON, Wis. — Just one game into his career at the University of Wisconsin, Todd Yeagley has already earned a spot in the record books.

The fifth head coach in program history, Yeagley became the first head man to score a tie in his UW debut, presiding over the hard-fought, scoreless draw the Badgers earned against Virginia Tech in their season-opener Friday at the McClimmon Complex.

Despite the zeroes on the scoreboard, the contest featured plenty of offense from both clubs. Wisconsin launched 21 shots – just one off their season-high from 2008 – and attempted a McClimmon Complex-record 21 corner kicks.

"I didn't know what to do," said senior midfielder Pablo Delgado, who took the majority of the Badgers' attempts from the corner. "We had so many."

Virginia Tech put together several strong runs – including surge late in the second overtime period – but it was the Badgers that largely dominated the run of play after shaking off a slow start. Wisconsin put nine shots on goal, including two each from forward Scott Lorenz and defender Aaron Nichols.

Unfortunately for the Badgers, however, Virginia Tech keeper Brendan Dunn also finished the night with nine saves. UW keeper Alex Horwath also collected all three of the Hokies' shots on goal.

"We just need to get into position where our final touch, our final decision, our service and our finish are all there," said Yeagley. "These are things that we have addressed in training and we are working hard at."

"With that part I am pleased."

The Badgers had their chances, especially in the second half, when they out-shot the Hokies by a 10-5 margin.

"We started hesitating, but once we got the ball to the guys in the middle we dominated," Delgado said. "We had a few good chances to score so we have to keep working."

"Next game, we have to just get the ball in the goal."

The Badgers' next chance comes Sunday in the finale of the Middleton Sports and Fitness Invitational, when they face Western Illinois in a 2 p.m. match. The Leathernecks fell to 0-2-0 on the season after dropping a 1-0 decision to UW-Milwaukee in Friday's first game.

"What I take away from it is that I am disappointed that we didn't come up with the victory, but I am proud of the way the guys played as the game went on," Yeagley said. "We'll build from this and get ready for Sunday."

MADISON, Wis. — A quick reaction gave Austin Spohn time to place a perfect serve for Mark Roos, who headed in the game-winner with three seconds left on the clock and lifted the Wisconsin men's soccer team to a 1-0 win over Western Illinois in the finale of the Middleton Sports and Fitness Invitational.

Several pieces fell in place for the Badgers in the waning seconds of a physical contest against the Leathernecks. It began when senior Scott Lorenz was fouled with less than 20 seconds to play and the Badgers were awarded a free kick.

The ball boy then acted quickly enough to give Spohn time to set up his serve, which he placed perfectly at the peak of Roos' jump just in front of the goal.

"(Spohn) set me up like none other and all I had to do was get this big head on it," said Roos of his first career score. "I just tried my best to make contact with the ball, and the ball went in."

"I looked at the scoreboard and, wow, it was pretty crazy."

Roos' goal halted UW's scoreless streak to open the season at 199 minutes, 57 seconds. That was long enough for the Badgers (1-0-1).

"It's good to get that for the team because we've been playing so well and we just could not get a goal," Roos said. "It's great to get that off our chest as a team."

The victory also made a first-time winner of UW head coach Todd Yeagley, who was able to share in the win with his father, former Indiana head coach Jerry Yeagley, as well as former UW coach Jim Launder.

"It ended in quite a dramatic fashion," Todd Yeagley said. "We talk about focus for 90 minutes and attention to details, and that was great execution."

Alex Horwath helped anchor a UW defense that recorded its third-consecutive shutout, dating back to last season, and was named the tournament's most valuable defensive player for his work in goal.

Still, it took a breakthrough on the offensive end for the Badgers to find the win column. Wisconsin out-shot the Leathernecks, 17-11, and put a total of seven shots on goal. That included three from Lorenz and a pair from Roos.

In addition to Horwath's defensive MVP honors, the Badgers placed three players on the Middleton Sports and Fitness Invitational All-Tournament team. Roos, Lorenz and senior midfielder Brandon Miller each earned a spot on the team, as the Badgers collected a second-place finish in the event.

Virginia Tech took the tournament title on the criteria of goals scored, as the Hokies and Badgers were tied in terms of overall record (1-0-1) and the tie-breaker categories of head-to-head competition (a 0-0 tie Friday) and goal differential (+1).

UW-Milwaukee, which lost a 2-1 decision to the Hokies earlier Sunday, finished third, while Western Illinois was fourth.

SAN DIEGO, Calif. — The Wisconsin men's soccer team found its way west of the Mississippi River for the first time in more than two years Friday, but the Badgers couldn't find their way past San Diego in a 3-0 loss to open the Courtyard by Marriott San Diego Central Tournament.

A penalty-kick goal late in the first half proved to be the game-winner for the Toreros, who tacked on a pair of scores against a short-handed UW defense in the second period to remain unbeaten on the season. San Diego (3-0-0) also stifled Wisconsin's attack, holding the Badgers (1-1-1) scoreless on just five shots.

"I don't think we played to our potential tonight," UW head coach Todd Yeagley said. "Credit San Diego, though, because they looked sharp from the start and put us under some pressure."

After a stalemate in the early going, the Toreros put one in the back of the net late in the first half, as the Badgers surrendered a penalty kick when Pablo Delgado was red-carded for a foul in the 42nd minute. Conor McFadden took the attempt for USD and made it count.

"We were really playing out of it and finding our form late in the first half, and then we had the red card and the PK," Yeagley said. "That was a tough one."

McFadden's tally was the first of the season against senior goalkeeper Alex Howath, who had his run of three-consecutive shutouts snapped. Horwath hadn't allowed a goal in nearly 360 minutes, dating back to last season.

On the other end, it took 29 minutes for the Badgers to tally their first shot, which Austin Spohn launched high. San Diego had tallied six shots by that point, including four that Horwath put a glove on.

Scott Lorenz finally put a shot on frame for UW five minutes later, with USD goalkeeper Kelin Briones snagging it for his first save. Lorenz followed with another shot on goal just a minute-and-a-half later, but it was the last time the Badgers would challenge Briones.

Lorenz had three of the Badgers' shots, with Spohn and Bryan Gerster providing the others. Stephen Posa tacked on the Toreros' second goal in the 72nd minute, and Kyle Ochoa provided the final tally in the 83rd minute.

"I thought the guys battled well in the second half down a man, and we did some nice things trying to create that equalizer," Yeagley said. "We left ourselves a little vulnerable, though, and those second and third goals came from us trying to claw our way back."

SAN DIEGO, Calif. — The Wisconsin men's soccer team was burned by a penalty-kick goal for the second time in as many games Sunday, as the Badgers dropped their second-consecutive match in a 3-2, double-overtime loss to San Diego State.

Aztecs senior Evan Toft, who had forced overtime with an equalizer in the 73rd minute, also provided the game-winner when he made good on a penalty-kick attempt with just 31 seconds remaining in the second overtime period.

Toft's scores lifted San Diego State (1-2-1) to its first win of the season, while dropping the Badgers (1-2-1) to an 0-2 mark for the weekend at the Courtyard by Marriott San Diego Central Tournament.

A penalty kick also sealed the Badgers' fate in a 3-0 loss to San Diego on Friday.

The Badgers, who had been limited to a single goal in their first three matches, doubled their season scoring output with tallies from senior Taylor Waspi and sophomore Ross Seagram.

On the other side, however, the Badgers surrendered three goals for the second-consecutive match after opening the campaign with back-to-back shutouts.

The Badgers dug themselves an early hole by surrendering a goal to Khadim Diouf in the sixth minute on a rebound in front of the goal, but Waspi answered with the equalizer in the 24th minute. He took a feed from sophomore Austin Spohn off a set piece and punched home the score from short range for his first goal of the season.

Seagram then provided the go-ahead tally just on the other side of halftime, when he took a through ball from Spohn and hammered home a shot from 15 yards out to earn his first score as a Badger.

Spohn has assisted on each of the Badgers' three goals this season.

Toft evened things up in the 73rd minute, however, as he took a cross from teammate Raymundo Reza and blasted home a shot that knotted the score at 2-2.

For the game, San Diego State owned a 21-14 advantage in shots, but both teams put a total of six attempts on goal.

Senior Alex Horwath, who was lifted in the 37th minute and replaced by sophomore Jamal Habibi until midway through the second half because of an injury to a finger, allowed all three Aztec goals and finished with a pair of saves in 83 minutes of work. Habibi, making his first-ever appearance for the Badgers, also had a save.

The Badgers had a pair of chances to put things away in the first overtime period. First came a header by Waspi that went wide right in the 96th minute, before senior forward Scott Lorenz had another look that went wide with 34 seconds left in the extra frame.

Lorenz, along with fellow senior Eric Conklin, was named to the event's all-tournament team.

The Badgers out-shot Oakland, 8-4, in a scoreless first half, but each team put three shots on goal. Senior goalkeeper Alex Horwath, playing with an injured hand, stopped all three of the Grizzlies' attempts, however, to keep the match scoreless at halftime.

MILWAUKEE, Wis. — Brandon Miller didn't end up with the game-winner for the second-consecutive game, but his goal in the 82nd minute helped the Wisconsin men's soccer team finish off an unbeaten weekend in a 1-1 draw with No. 9 UC Santa Barbara on Sunday.

The Badgers (2-2-2) benefited from Miller's second goal in as many games, as well as a season-high eight saves from senior goalkeeper Alex Horwath, to earn the result on the final day of the Milwaukee Panther Invitational at Engelmann Field.

"I thought the guys really played their hearts out today," head coach Todd Yeagley said. "That's we asked of them, and we were only a few minutes away from turning a good result into a great result."

Wisconsin answered the pair of losses it suffered last weekend by going 1-0-1 this week and allowing just two goals in a pair of games. The Badgers also made sure the Gauchos (5-1-1) failed to win for just the second time in seven matches this season.

"I'm just really proud of how the team fought through things," Yeagley said. "We were disappointed we didn't get the win today, but I'm proud of the team."

Miller looked as though he would have the game-winning score for the second time in as many matches when he found the net in the 82nd minute and put the Badgers up, 1-0.

Playing close to the goal on a corner kick, Miller converted the rebound of a header attempt by Taylor Waspi that was saved by UCSB keeper Sam Hayden. Waspi and Scott Lorenz, who had the initial serve on the attempt from the corner, were credited with assists.

"Brandon really played two outstanding games this weekend," Yeagley said.

UW's advantage was short-lived, however, as Danny Barerra later took a through ball and drilled a shot from 10 yards out for the equalizer in the 87th minute.

"Giving up that goal that late, a lot of teams would have lost that game because they would have put their heads down," Yeagley said. "We really stayed disciplined, and I was proud of that. Our guys quickly put that behind them and focused on what the task was in overtime."

UCSB had a pair of opportunities early in the first extra session, but UW's Max Wilson had a chance at a game-winning score with just nine seconds left in the period. Wilson's shot was blocked, however, to keep things tied up after 100 minutes.

Horwath kept things even with a save 5 1/2 minutes into the second overtime period on a shot by Waid Ibrahim, and another on a shot by Nic Ryan with just 42 seconds left to play.

The Gauchos had a corner with 35 seconds to go, but the Badgers stopped UCSB from getting another chance at the goal.

For the match, the Badgers were out-shot, 22-7, including a 9-2 edge for the Gauchos in shots-on-goal.

"They have some many different ways to hurt you," Yeagley said of UCSB. "They're very athletic and very dynamic. We had to have all the bases covered and get them out of what they like to do. We didn't allow them too many good looks."

MADISON, Wis. — In what was largely an even match, it was an uneven number that proved to be the difference.

Will Bruin's breakaway goal in the 57th minute was the difference-maker for No. 13 Indiana, which held off the Wisconsin men's soccer team for a 1-0 win in the Big Ten Conference opener for both teams.

The match was played before a crowd of 1,703 fans that turned out for the Badgers' Pac the Mac doubleheader, filling the McClimon Complex with the sixth-largest crowd in stadium history and the largest to watch a UW men's game since 1997.

Bruin's score stood in stark contrast to what was largely a balanced, defensive struggle between a pair of teams very familiar with each other. Friday's match was the teams' first meeting since Todd Yeagley, a former player and assistant coach at IU, became the Badgers' head man in December.

The Badgers had put together a run that was halted by the Hoosiers and turned into a free-for-all near midfield. Indiana's Tommy Meyer emerged from the scrum with the ball and made a long serve to Bruin, who broke away from the UW defense and tapped a ball past UW keeper Alex Horwath for the winning score.

"We played well tonight, so that's a tough loss to swallow," Horwath said. "They're a very talented team, and we made it difficult for them to play, we created some opportunities.

"It was a pretty even game."

The goal was certainly a setback, but it didn't entirely deflate the Badgers, who put together several strong scoring chances in the minutes that followed.

"It had an effect on our play, but we tell our players to be disciplined and make the next play," Yeagley said. "We had to move on quickly, and our guys did a good job of that once the emotions settled down."

The Hoosiers (4-2-1, 1-0-0 Big Ten) put a total of eight shots on goal in the contest, and Horwath finished with six saves. In contrast, just two of the Badgers' eight shots were on frame.

Jon Rzepka and Austin Spohn had the Badgers' best looks in the second half, as each saw header attempts off set pieces sail just wide of the IU goal.

"It was the final touch, whether it was our final pass or a few excellent services that you hope deflect and land in your areas where you're making your runs, and that didn't happen tonight," Yeagley said.

Indiana's victory extended a 17-match winless streak for UW against the Hoosiers, dating back to the 1995 season.

CHICAGO, Ill. — Once again, penalties proved to be the killer for the Wisconsin men's soccer team.

A pair of penalty-kick goals helped lift Illinois-Chicago to a 3-0 win over the Badgers in a non-conference matchup Wednesday at Flames Field, as UW suffered its second-consecutive shutout loss.

The Badgers (2-4-2) have been on the wrong side of game-winning penalty kick scores three times this season, and they now have gone 33 consecutive matches without being awarded a PK attempt of their own.

The Flames (2-2-4) cracked the scoreboard in the 25th minute on the first of their two penalty kick attempts. After the Badgers were called for a foul immediately in front of their goal, UIC's Matt Spiess drilled home his PK try to give the hosts a 1-0 lead.

It was just nine minutes later that Ivan Stanisavljevic doubled that advantage for the Flames by sending Badgers goalkeeper Alex Horwath to the right and then blasting a ball high and left into the back of the net.

The scores were the sixth and seventh penalty-kick goals allowed by the Badgers since their last PK attempt, a stretch of 33 matches that dates back to Oct. 13, 2007. Of those tries from the penalty spot, four have been game-winners.

Spiess' PK score was the latest to burn the Badgers, and the third overall this year. Earlier this season, San Diego and San Diego State scored game-winning goals on PKs in consecutive matches against the Badgers.

The Flames had a chance at their third PK less than four minutes into the second half, but Horwath came up with a diving save that kept Charlie Trout's attempt from sliding in the far corner of the goal.

Paul Kopec then rounded out the scoring for the Flames in the 69th minute, collecting a ball from Spiess at the far post and putting it into an empty net after Horwath went to the ground. Trout set up the play and picked up an assist by serving the ball in on a corner kick.

UIC's scoring output matched the largest allowed by the Badgers on the year, while UW was shut out for the second-consecutive match and the fourth time this season.

It wasn't until the 52nd minute that the Badgers registered their first shot, on a blast Brandon Miller unleashed from the far side that sailed wide past the near post. UW's first shot-on-goal came in the 76th minute on an attempt by Colin Mani.

For the match, UIC owned a 9-3 edge in shots, including a 5-2 advantage in shots-on-goal.

HEAD COACH TODD YEAGLEY

Todd Yeagley, a former national player of the year who also won two NCAA championships as an assistant coach, was named head coach of the University of Wisconsin men's soccer program on Dec. 18, 2008.

Yeagley, 36, comes to Madison following a six-year stint as assistant coach at Indiana University, his alma mater. He becomes the fifth head coach in the history of the UW program.

"I am very pleased to be adding an outstanding coach like Todd to our staff," UW Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez said. "His list of accomplishments as a collegiate student-athlete, professional athlete and coach are impressive.

"I know our men's soccer student-athletes will benefit greatly from Todd's experiences as a player and coach who has competed and thrived at the game's highest levels. We're looking forward to him joining the Badger family."

The move to the head coaching ranks is a natural one for Yeagley, who has found success at each of his stops in both the college and professional games over the past 17 years.

"I would like to thank the entire Indiana soccer family for preparing me for this wonderful opportunity," Yeagley said. "I look forward to utilizing my experience as a player and coach to develop individuals and teams of championship caliber at the University of Wisconsin."

Returning to Bloomington in 2003 following a seven-year professional playing career, Yeagley did his part to continue the legacy established at Indiana by his father, Jerry Yeagley, the winningest men's soccer coach in NCAA Division I history and a member of the National Soccer Hall of Fame.

Yeagley served as a volunteer assistant coach for his father's 31st and final season as coach in 2003 and served as a full-time assistant under current IU head coach Mike Freitag beginning in 2004. This season, College Soccer News named Yeagley one of the top 12 assistant coaches in the nation.

The Hoosiers won back-to-back NCAA championships in Yeagley's first two years on the bench, going a combined 36-7-6 over the course of the 2003 and 2004 seasons.

Yeagley helped IU to Big Ten Conference tournament championships in both 2003 and 2006, with the team most recently advancing to the title match of the 2008 league tournament. The Hoosiers also won the Big Ten regular-season title four times (2003, 04, 06, 07) and qualified for the NCAA tournament in each of Yeagley's six seasons as an assistant.

In five years as a full-time assistant, Yeagley coached nine NSCAA/adidas All-Americans and had nine players drafted by Major League Soccer clubs, including 2004 Hermann Trophy award winner Danny O'Rourke.

In all, the Hoosiers advanced to the NCAA tournament in each of Yeagley's 10 seasons as a player or assistant coach. They also won five Big Ten tournament titles and six regular-season league crowns while amassing a total record of 166-40-30 (.767) during his time at IU.

Before his coaching career began in 2003, Yeagley enjoyed a seven-year run as a player with the Columbus Crew of Major League Soccer. He was selected by the Crew in the inaugural MLS SuperDraft in 1996 and went on to play in 138 games, making 113 starts.

Columbus advanced to the MLS Playoffs in five of Yeagley's seven seasons with the team and won the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup in 2002.

Following the conclusion of his playing career, Yeagley joined the Crew's front office as the team's assistant general manager.

A four-time All-American, Yeagley led the Hoosiers to three Big Ten titles (1991, 92, 94) and a 75-9-5 overall record during his four seasons as a player.

As a freshman in 1991, Yeagley earned Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors and was part of the Hoosiers' run to the inaugural Big Ten tournament title and a berth in the NCAA championship game. He earned second-team All-America honors after scoring a conference-leading 12 goals and adding 11 assists.

Yeagley led IU back to the NCAA title match as a senior in 1994, the same season he earned the Missouri Athletic Club National Player of the Year award after tallying 10 goals and 11 assists.

He remains third on IU's career assists list, with 40 for his career, and shares the Big Ten single-season assists record with the 14 he recorded in 1993.

Yeagley earned a bachelor of science degree in sociology from Indiana in 2002. He and his wife, Suzy, have three children: Ben (8), Grant (6) and Jay (3).

"The University of Wisconsin has a great history of commitment to academic and athletic excellence, and I look forward to elevating the men's soccer program to new levels of success," Yeagley said. "I'm thrilled to become part of the family of UW men's soccer student-athletes and alumni."
