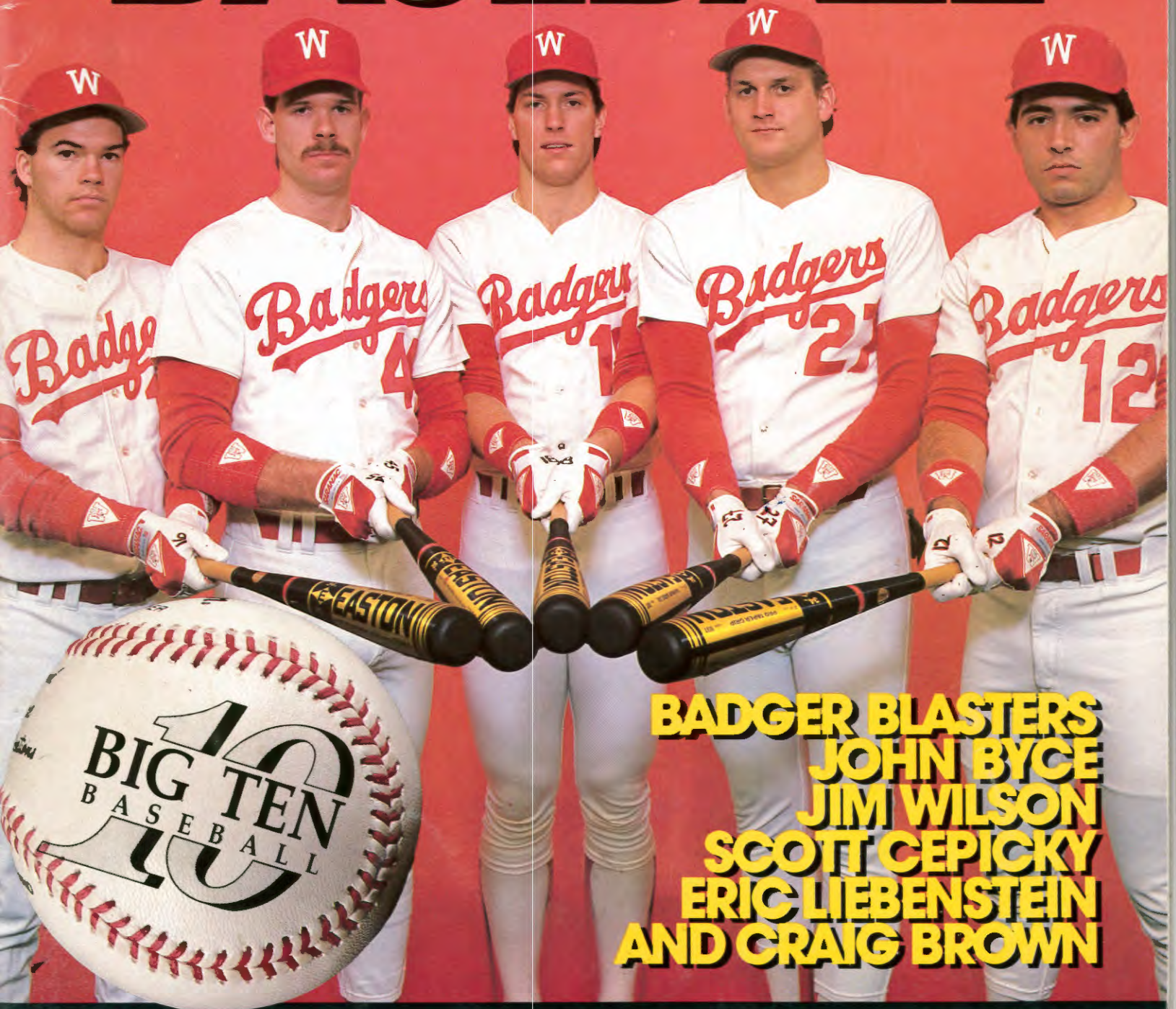

BADGERS REACH FOR PLAY-OFFS

The "promised land."

For a collegiate baseball player, the ultimate thrill is playing in the College World Series.

To get a chance at grabbing the brass ring, the Badgers first must qualify for the Big Ten play-offs. After missing a play-off berth by one game last season, Wisconsin returns a veteran team that wants one last chance to prove that it belongs.

Head coach Steve Land will be counting on 20 returning letterwinners, including six starters, to lead the Badgers to the promised land of college baseball. Despite the loss of three of the team's top four starting pitchers, Wisconsin will contend for play-off status this season.

"One of our strengths will be the experience we have in our every day lineup," Land said.

The Badgers return a solid offense that averaged six runs a game, set a school record for home runs and has improved its team speed. It includes four fifth-year seniors in the starting lineup and experience throughout the batting order.

INFIELD: VETERAN SQUAD LEADS THE PACK

Wisconsin returns a strong nucleus in the infield, including three seniors and a junior in the starting lineup.

Leading the way is senior first baseman JIM WILSON. He started last season in the outfield but moved to first base during the Big Ten opening series against Indiana. A candidate for post-season honors, including Academic All-America, Wilson hit seven home runs in 50 games.

Second base is in the hands of senior DENNIS CAMPION. A left-handed hitter, he has starting experience at second base, shortstop and third base. One of

the team's most versatile athletes, Campion could also see starts at shortstop and third base.

Junior BRIAN WOLFF enters his second season as the starting shortstop. He suffered a sophomore slump in the field but hit four home runs as the number nine hitter in the lineup.

"Wolff has the potential to excel at shortstop," Land said. "He can make the routine plays consistently."

ERIC LIEBENSTEIN is the starter at third base. He returns after missing the final 36 games a year ago with a broken wrist. Liebenstein started 19 games at first base last season but has experience at the hot corner.

"We need to have Eric healthy for a full season," Land said. "He provides the experience we need to be successful."

Liebenstein is the back-up at first base. Freshman TOM O'NEILL will see action backing up Wolff and Campion, while red-shirt freshman DUSTY FREITAG could see action at third base.

OUTFIELD: POWER & SPEED A KEY COMBO

"Our outfield should be one of our strong points this season with two all-Big Ten players leading the way," Land said. "We have the potential to excel there this season."

A 1988 first team all-Big Ten selection, SCOTT CEPICKY returns as the starter in right field. A candidate for All-America and all-Big Ten honors, he is Wisconsin's career RBI and single-season and career home run leader.

"The return of Cepicky for his final season provides us with a solid number three hitter and a fine defensive player," Land said. "He will be our cornerstone in right field."

Cepicky led the team and was 10th in the Big Ten in hitting. He earned the team's "Most Valuable Player" and "Most Valuable Hitter" awards after leading the Badgers in six offensive categories. He also hit .500 with runners in scoring position and led UW outfielders with four assists.

Also returning in the starting lineup will be senior JOHN BYCE. He missed the first 17 games last season while he was with the Badgers' WCHA championship hockey team. He is scheduled to start in left field when he joins the team following the 1989 hockey season. Byce earned all-Big Ten honors in 1987 and hit .350 in his first 12 games a year ago.

Sophomore RODNEY MYERS and junior RICK DOBROWSKI will platoon in left field until Byce returns. Myers adds power to the lineup and is also a starting pitcher. Dobrowski is a contact hitter with good speed.

"Myers showed us he can hit with power," Land said. "He will also get some at bats as a designated hitter."

Freshman TOM VILET will start in center field. A contact hitter with good speed, Land likes his abilities on defense and at the plate.

"Vilet can really go after the ball," Land said. "He's a contact hitter with good speed and could be our lead-off hitter."

Junior ERIC BECKERMAN, red-shirt freshman DUSTY FREITAG and freshman ROSS KOPFER will challenge for playing time.

CATCHING: SOLID DEPTH

The Badgers are solid behind the plate with senior CRAIG BROWN and junior CAREY SADOWSKI. Brown earned third team all-Big Ten honors last season and will captain the squad for the second consecutive season.

"Brown is a proven Big Ten player and a leader," Land said. "He has the experience to help our young pitching staff mature for the Big Ten season."

A candidate for 1989 Academic All-America and all-Big Ten honors, Brown has a strong and accurate throwing arm and can hit for average and power.

Sadowski saw limited action last season but will see more time behind the plate this season. He will also see action at designated hitter.

"Sadowski will get a chance to contribute early with our spring trip schedule," Land said. "He has a strong throwing arm and has worked hard to earn a spot in our every day lineup."

Also providing depth are senior MIKE BLASKOWSKI and red-shirt freshman DUSTY FREITAG.

PITCHING: READY TO MAKE AN IMPACT

The Badgers deep rotation of 1988 is just a memory as three of the team's top four starters are gone. But despite the loss of drafted players Tom Fischer and Scott Fuller, the cupboard isn't bare.

Junior right-hander PAUL QUANTRILL is the team's ace. He finished 11th in the conference in earned run average and completed six of his seven starts.

"Quantrill wants the ball every four days," Land says. "He's a tremendous competitor who has worked hard to improve the command of his breaking pitches. He's ready to take his place among the nation's best pitchers."

Senior left-hander LANCE PAINTER is listed as the number two starter. A proven collegiate hurler, Painter had an excellent Fall practice.

"Painter consistently throws strikes," Land says. "He should be a real plus in our starting rotation."

"After Quantrill and Painter, we have a lot of pitchers who are close in ability," Land added. "One of the questions to answer concerns the consistency of the pitching staff. Our pitchers have the potential to compete at this level but just lack collegiate experience."

RODNEY MYERS is listed as the team's third starter. He will also see action in the outfield and as a designated hitter. A power pitcher, Myers is ready to make his mark this season.

"He has great arm strength and just needs an opportunity to pitch on a regular basis," Land said.

Red-shirt sophomore MARK HAMILTON, senior SCOTT PELOWSKI and freshman MARK FLANAGAN will battle for the fourth starting role.

Hamilton appeared in only one game after suffering an injury during the team's spring trip. However, he had a 2-0 record and a 0.93 earned run average in three relief appearances in 1987 before he was sidelined by illness. His forte is keeping hitters off balance and throwing strikes.

Pelowski has battled back from injuries to contend for starting or long relief roles. Flanagan is a highly touted newcomer who could see action in long or short relief, too.

Other contenders looking to break into the rotation include right-handers GREG LYNCH, DARIN BLANG and NATE DURST.

The bullpen holds the key for success in 1989. Senior right-hander TODD BORCHARDT and sophomore KARL KLARE will contend for the role of stopper. Left-hander BRIAN DOUDNA could see action in long relief and short relief.

Flanagan, ERIC LIEBENSTEIN, DUSTY FREITAG and Myers could also see action in short relief.

BADGERS READY FOR THE CHALLENGE

The Badgers' 60-game schedule is highlighted by a pair of early season trips to Orlando, Fla. and New Orleans, La. and a 12-game spring trip to San Diego, California.

The Badgers will again play a 28-game conference schedule that will determine the regular season champion. The top four teams in the final regular season standings will then meet at the site of the school with the best record for a double-elimination tournament. The play-off champion will receive an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament.

Wisconsin plays four games each at Indiana, Iowa and Northwestern as well as a mid-week twinbill at Illinois. The Badgers will play four games each against Michigan, Minnesota and Ohio State at Guy Lowman Field. Wisconsin also hosts Illinois in a mid-week double-header.

"The emphasis is on the conference portion of the schedule and that's where it should be," Land said. "By playing 28 games, we could have a league champion and a play-off champion like we did last season. Another plus is that any four-game series is not as important as it was under the old 16-game format."

Michigan and Minnesota have dominated the conference throughout the 1980s and won't falter in 1989. With more than half the Big Ten teams breaking in new pitching staffs, the baseball season will mirror the 1988-89 basketball season in its competitiveness.

"Our goal is to finish among the top four teams so that we can qualify for the play-offs," Land said. "With a veteran every day lineup available, we should be able to hold our own. But our pitching staff will determine our chances of making it to the Big Ten play-offs and the NCAA tournament."

WISCONSIN ATHLETIC OFFICIALS



A.L. 'ADE' SPONBERG
Athletic Director

A new era of University of Wisconsin athletics began in 1987 as the school welcomed Athletic Director A.L. "Ade" Sponberg.

Sponberg was named the UW's athletic director on May 15, 1987 and thus marks the second year at the helm of the Wisconsin athletic program in 1988-89. He succeeded Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch, who served 18 successful years at the helm before announcing his retirement.

Sponberg has made an immediate impact on the Wisconsin athletic scene. He has been instrumental in instituting a comprehensive marketing program for the athletic department and has made the "business" side of the program a top priority. He has been a key figure in the addition of the Dave McClain Athletic Facility to the department and has been on a seemingly non-stop "meet the public" crusade since first coming to Madison.

The 52-year-old Sponberg assumed his duties at Wisconsin on July 1, 1987. He has nearly 22 years of experience as a collegiate athletic director, including a most recent tenure at North Dakota State University from 1973-87. In addition to his AD's position at NDSU, Sponberg also held the rank of professor and chaired the Division of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics.

The athletic program at NDSU enjoyed a highly successful period under Sponberg's leadership. From 1982-85, North Dakota State was the all-sports champion of the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, the school's football team won NCAA Division II national championships in 1983, 1985 and 1986, and the men's and women's basketball teams as well as the women's volleyball team all reached the NCAA Division II playoffs.

Among the football coaches Sponberg hired while athletic director at North Dakota State were Jim Wacker, now head coach at Texas Christian University, and current Wisconsin head coach Don Morton.

Prior to his period of service at NDSU, Ade was athletic director at Augustana College in Sioux Falls, South Dakota from 1968-73.

He has also been heavily involved in NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) governance and policymaking throughout his distinguished career as an administrator. At the time of his hiring at Wisconsin in the Spring of 1987, Ade was a member of the NCAA Council, and was NCAA Division II vice-president. He also served as an NCAA Administrative Committee member from 1984-86. Since 1976, Ade has served on nine other NCAA committees, dealing with such issues as recruiting, legislation and interpretation, television and eligibility.

Ade's academic background is impressive as well. He earned a Ph.D. in Physical Education and Athletic Administration from the University of Michigan in 1968, received a mas-

ter's degree in Physical Education from Mankato State University in 1963, and earned a bachelor's degree in Physical Education from Gustavus Adolphus College in 1958.

He and his wife, Donna, have two children - Steve, 31, and Kari, 29.



RALPH NEALE
Deputy Athletic Director

Ralph Neale is in his sixth year as Deputy Athletic Director in the Wisconsin Athletic Program. As a member of the management team, Ralph is responsible for personnel, finance and general administration of the UW Athletic Department.

Prior to his arrival at Wisconsin, Neale had an eight-year tenure as Superintendent of the Middleton-Cross Plains area, Wisconsin School District.

A 1956 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor's degree in Education, Ralph also earned both his Master's and Doctor's degrees in Education from the UW.

A native of Montello, Wisconsin, Neale was a member of the University of Wisconsin's varsity wrestling teams in 1954, 1955 and 1956. He earned a major "W" award his senior year.

He previously taught at Monroe, Wisconsin High School where he coached wrestling, football and track. He also served administrative stints at Madison LaFollette and Memorial High Schools, and at New Richmond, Wisconsin High School.

Ralph and his wife, Janis, are the parents of two children - Scott, 24, and Ann, 22.



KIT SAUNDERS-NORDEEN
Associate Athletic Director
Personnel, Public Relations
and Development

Katherine "Kit" Saunders-Nordeen, Associate Athletic Director, is in her 15th year with the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

As a member of the management team, Kit is responsible for personnel, public relations, academic services and development for the Wisconsin athletic program.

A native of Teaneck, New Jersey, Saunders-Nordeen originally joined Wisconsin's athletic staff in 1974 as its first Director of Women's Intercollegiate Athletics.

She is a 1962 graduate of Trenton (NJ) State College with a Bachelor of Arts degree

in Health and Physical Education. Kit came to Wisconsin in 1964 and earned her Master of Science degree in 1966. She then went on to earn her PhD in Education Administration in 1977 with a doctoral dissertation entitled "The Governance of Intercollegiate Athletics."

Kit has been active in all phases of women's athletics on the Wisconsin campus. She helped found the Wisconsin Women's Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WWIAC) in 1971 and served as its President in 1978-79. Kit received the WWIAC Distinguished Service Award in 1982.

Nationally, she was elected first Vice-President of the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIWA) from 1979-1982. She was the first inductee into the University of Wisconsin Women's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1984 and was selected for the YWCA Woman of Distinction Award in 1986.



DUANE KLEVEN
Assistant Athletic Director
Men's Varsity Sports

Duane Kleven is in his fifth year as an assistant athletic director for Men's Varsity Sports with the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department. He assumed his position on April 1, 1984.

A native of Stoughton, Wisconsin, Duane is a 1961 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He also earned his Master's degree in Physical Education from the UW in 1963.

Kleven was a successful wrestling coach for 13 years, and revitalized the Wisconsin wrestling program in the 1970s.

He began his coaching career at UW-Oshkosh in 1969 with a 10-7 record. He then assumed the head coaching duties at Wisconsin in 1970. His 12-year dual meet record at Wisconsin was a sparkling 134-48-5.

After retiring from the head wrestling post in 1982, Kleven was named director of the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center — better known as the "Shell." Two years later he accepted the position of assistant athletic director at Wisconsin.

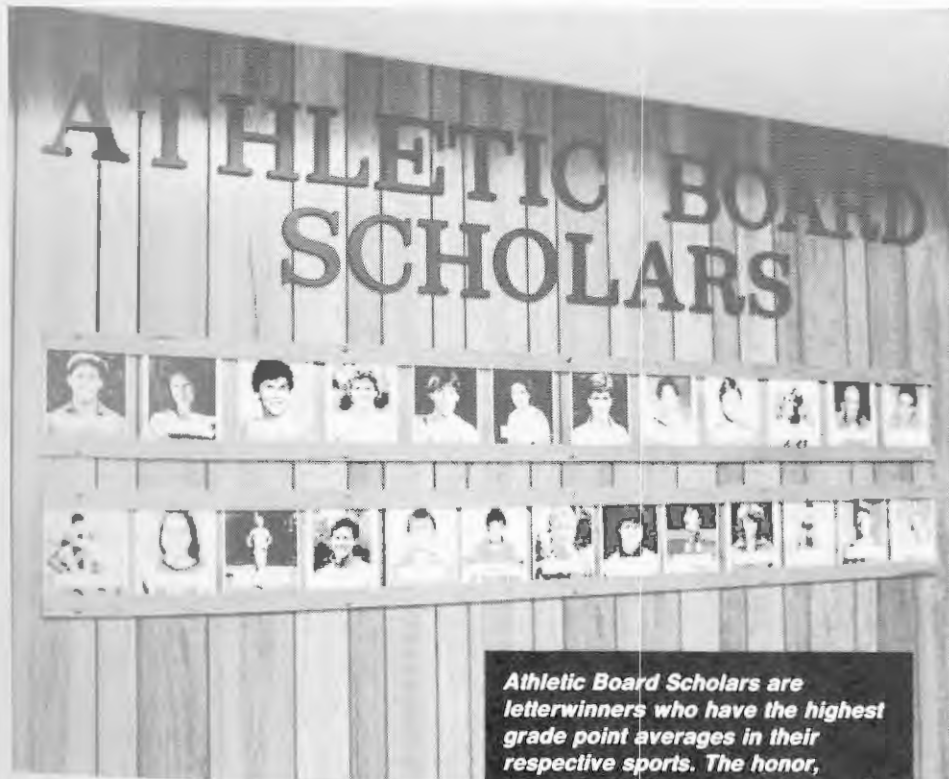
Three full-time staff members — Assistant Athletic Director **Dr. Diane Johnson** and counselors **Alan Zussman** and **Mary Weaver** — conduct the Wisconsin Student Affairs program offered. A total of 1,025 men and women student-athletes were registered for the 1988-89 fall semester. As former members of the academic dean's office, Alan and Diane have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin and a permanent line of communication with all University departments.

For those athletes who do request assistance, Diane, Alan and Mary offer counseling sessions on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are encouraged to be degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The counseling staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN —ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE



Athletic Board Scholars are letterwinners who have the highest grade point averages in their respective sports. The honor, begun in 1987, is awarded annually by the UW Athletic Board.

The 1987-88 school year proved to be another in a long line of success for University of Wisconsin athletes in the classroom.

- Don Davey (football) earned GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-American first team honors.
- Tom Senn (men's swimming) was voted to the second GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-American At-Large team.

Of the 1,042 men and women student-athletes - representing 25 sports - registered, 323 (31%) recorded a B (3.00 on a 4.00 scale) or better. A total of 98 student-athletes were named to Dean's lists in their respective colleges.

Five athletes achieved a 4.00 GPA, or straight A's — Craig Brown (baseball), Robert Waite (men's tennis), and James Almquist, Jerome Ebert and John Hill (men's crew).

This marked the 13th consecutive semester at the UW that at least 31% of the school's student-athletes achieved such excellent classroom results.

Forty-four male student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin — including Craig Brown, Mike Noelke, Tim Roman and Jim Wilson on the baseball team — earned Big Ten All-Academic honors in 1987-88 along with 34 female student-athletes.

Since 1979, seven University athletes have received the prestigious NCAA post-graduate scholarship award - an achievement unparalleled among Division I institutions.

HEAD COACH STEVE LAND



Entering his sixth season as head coach of the University of Wisconsin baseball team is Steve Land. He was named as the Badgers' head coach in July, 1983 after serving as a Badger assistant since 1970.

Land is looking for his 1989 squad to improve on last season's 28-27 mark. A 46-year-old native of DeKalb, Ill., he guided the 1986 club to a school-record 35 victories and its first post-season appearance since 1950.

Steve has posted a record of 144-123-3 in his five years at Wisconsin. Only Dynie Mansfield (441-352-5) and Tom Meyer (279-276-2) have coached the Badgers to more victories.

An all-round sports fan, Steve graduated from DeKalb High School where he earned all-conference honors in baseball four times and twice each in football and basketball.

He graduated from Northern Illinois in 1964 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education. He earned his Masters in Education from Northern Illinois in 1965.

At NIU, he continued his baseball prowess, hitting over .300 three times. As a senior, he was the Illinois Intercollegiate Athletic Conference's second leading hitter with a .350 average. Steve also played two years of football at NIU.

Following graduation, Land became an assistant coach at Northern Illinois in 1965. He then moved on to Highland Park, Ill. High School where he was head

baseball coach, an assistant football and basketball coach, and taught mathematics and physical education. In 1969, he led Highland Park to the semi-finals of the Illinois State High School Baseball Tournament.

Steve came to Wisconsin in 1970 as an assistant to Head Coach Tom Meyer. He also continued his studies in physical education with an emphasis on administration until 1973.

While an assistant, Land helped coach Badger squads that toured Germany, Holland and Italy in 1978 and Alaska in 1980. He also coached the Swedish national team in Barcelona, Spain during the 1973 championships. He later worked as a coach and clinician for the Swedish Club Baseball team during the summer of 1978.

Land was named the 1986 College Coach of the Year by the Wisconsin High School Baseball Coaches Association. He is a member of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches, and the

Wisconsin and Illinois Baseball Coaches Associations.

During his five years as the Badgers' head coach, Land has been a central figure in the improvement of the baseball program. He is respected among his peers for his field coaching and his ability to field competitive teams.

His willingness to promote the program has also been successful, especially in the growth of the annual Badger-Brewer Banquet. Land has shown the ability to successfully unite the program's support groups. He has the support of former baseball "W" award-winners, the state's high school coaches, professional scouts and the team's booster organizations — the Benchwarmers and the Dugout Club.

Steve has taught mathematics at Madison's Memorial and currently West High Schools for the past 16 years. He resides in Madison with his wife, Phyllis, and his 20-year-old twin sons, Peter and Michael.

Fuchs, 37, is a member of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches and the Wisconsin Baseball Coaches Association.

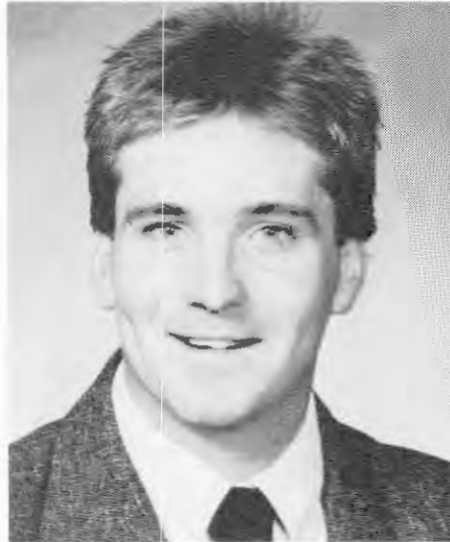

Bob graduated from Barrington High school where he lettered in baseball and basketball. He captained the 1984 conference champion basketball squad.

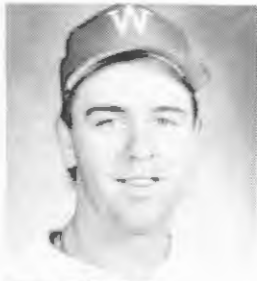

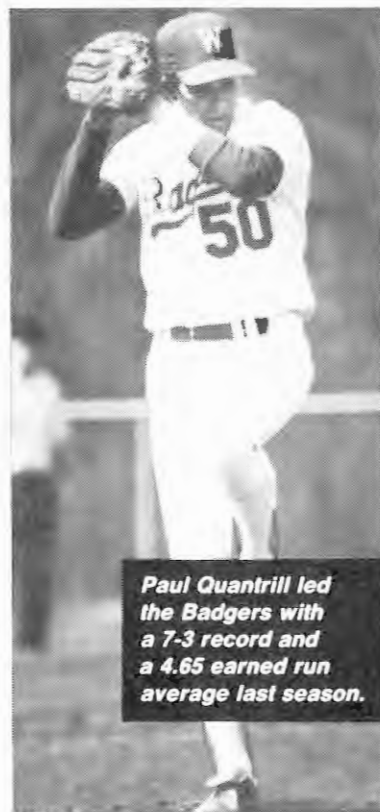

THE HISTORY OF WISCONSIN BASEBALL



The Badgers battle Michigan before a capacity crowd at Breese Stevens Field in 1950.

1870 - The University of Wisconsin baseball program begins when a group of young, diamond enthusiasts band together to form a campus club.

April 30, 1870 - The club, named the Mendotas, defeats the Capital City Club in the first and highest scoring game in UW history, 53-18.

1891 - The baseball, football and tennis associations along with the boat club merge to form the first University Athletic Association. Before 1891, baseball teams had been fielded in only seven of the previous 11 years.

1906 - Although there was no organized team in 1906, the University has fielded a team every year since. However, after a 5-1 start, the rest of the 1917 season was cancelled by the faculty after the United States entered the first World War.

1909 - The Badgers are the first Wisconsin athletic team to travel extensively. A trip to Japan covering 13,500 miles in 74 days was successful as the Badgers won five of nine games against the leading Japanese nines.

Spring 1912 - Wisconsin embarks on the first spring training trip taken by a UW team. The Badgers' first game, on March 12th against the University of Missouri at Columbia, ended in a 3-3 tie when the game was called because of darkness.

1921 - Guy Loman's Badgers lose to Michigan, 9-8, in 18 innings, the longest game ever by a Badger nine.

1930 - Wisconsin wins the Western Conference with a 9-1 record and is 15-7 overall.

April 5, 1940 - Art "Dynie" Mansfield becomes Wisconsin's head baseball coach. He compiled a 441-352-5 overall record (.556) and a 213-180-2 mark (.542) in the Big Ten.

April 11, 1941 - John Saxer fires Wisconsin's first no-hitter as he shuts out DeKalb Teachers College, 8-0.

1949 - Bob Wilson drives in seven runs against Western Michigan to set the UW single-game record. That record will stand until 1985 when Tim Eichorst ties the mark with seven RBI against Illinois-Chicago.

May 30, 1949 - The Badgers score 27 runs on 29 hits to rout Western Michigan. The runs and hits set modern single-game team records.

1950 - Wisconsin defeats Ohio State, 4-1, to win the NCAA District Four Championship, qualifying the Badgers for the College World Series in Omaha, Neb. Wisconsin is eliminated

by Rutgers, but went home with a fourth-place finish and a 19-9 season mark.

1950 - Thornton Kipper racks up 11 victories, setting a UW single-season record.

1952 - Harvey Kuenn sets a school record for triples with nine. He becomes the first Wisconsin Badger to earn first-team All-American honors.

1954 - Dave Moran drives in five runs in one inning against Bradley to set the Wisconsin record for most RBI in an inning.

April 3, 1956 - Wisconsin belts six home runs against Brown to set a team record for most home runs in a game.

April 15, 1960 - Bill Richards fans 19 Chicago batters to set a Wisconsin record for most strikeouts in a nine inning game.

1964 - Rick Reichardt becomes Wisconsin's third first-team All-American. Reichardt is the first modern-era player to win back-to-back Big Ten batting crowns (.429 and .472). His overall batting mark of .443 set a school record which has lasted for 24 years.

1970 - Dynie Mansfield retires after 31 seasons. During his career as the Badgers' head coach, Mansfield's teams won two conference championships and had 21 first division finishes.

1973 - At Milwaukee County Stadium, Wisconsin loses to the American League's Milwaukee Brewers, 6-0, in a 4 and 1/2 inning game ended by rain. This marks the first appearance for Wisconsin against a major league team.

1974 - The Badgers travel to Riverside Calif. to compete in the 8th Annual Riverside Baseball Invitational Tournament. Wisconsin finishes with a 2-7 mark at the RBI, including a win against Arizona State. Badger Duane Gustavson is the tournament's leading hitter with a .478 mark.

1976 - Wisconsin competes in the 29th Annual Rollins College Invitational Baseball Tournament and finishes as co-champions with the University of Tennessee at 4-2.

August 1978 - Wisconsin travels to Europe, the first journey out of the country for a Badger team since 1909. The Badger nine splits a two-game set with Holland and wins five straight from U.S. Air Force bases in Germany before dropping five straight to the Italian National team and ending the tour with a 6-6 record.

September 1978 - The Badger varsity posts a 5-3 win over the Badger Alumni in the first Varsity-Alumni game.

1979 - Club records for most wins in a season are set when the Badgers finish with a 13-5 record in Big Ten play and a 31-17 overall mark.

April-May 1980 - Craig Zirbel hits safely in 30 consecutive games to set a team record.

Summer of 1980 - The Badgers play baseball under the midnight sun as they travel to Fairbanks, Alaska for a nine-game trip that includes a game at midnight during the summer solstice.

1983 - Wisconsin hits .322 as a team and sets a new season record for highest batting average.

1985 - Joe Armentrout sets a UW single-season record with 61 runs scored.

1986 - The underdog Badgers were 5-2 at the Riverside (Calif.) Baseball Invitational Tournament, the highest finish by a Big Ten school in the 21-year history of the RBI.

1986 - Wisconsin wins 18 of its last 22 games to qualify for its first appearance in the post-season since 1950. Wisconsin finishes third in the Big Ten Playoffs and finishes with a school-record 35 wins.

1986 - Right-handed pitcher Jim Rosplock earns eight saves, setting a UW season record. His five saves in Big Ten play also set a conference record.

May 5, 1987 - John Byce hits safely in nine consecutive at-bats in games against Iowa and Carroll College, breaking Bill Rubin's and Joe Scime's mark of eight consecutive hits.

May 5, 1987 - Mike Larson gains national attention when he plays all nine positions in a nine-inning game against Carroll College. Starting the game in right field, Larson plays a different position each inning. He retired all three batters he faced as a pitcher in the ninth inning, including striking out two.

1987 - Mike Barker establishes single-season school records in hits (82) and doubles (19). He also hits a team-high .441, the second-highest UW regular season average.

May 5, 1988 - Tom Fischer strikes out 19 batters in a seven-inning, 12-0 victory over Iowa. His performance set a Big Ten record and tied a school record that was set by Bill Richards in nine innings in 1960.

May 5, 1988 - Scott Cepicky hits his 13th home run of the season to break John De-Merit's record of 12 set in 1956.

WISCONSIN BASEBALL FACILITIES

Facilities specifically enhancing the Wisconsin baseball program include Guy Lowman Field, Camp Randall Stadium, the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center and the Dave McClain Athletic Facility.

DAVE McCLAIN ATHLETIC FACILITY

Completed during the Fall of 1988, the Dave McClain Athletic Facility was named in honor of the late Wisconsin football coach. It is located north of the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center and adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium. A state-of-the-art facility, it is one of the finest indoor training complexes in the country.

The 76,380-square foot main floor features an artificial turf practice area. It provides a pleasant environment for practice sessions during in-season inclement weather. It is used by the Badgers for infield and outfield drills, as well as long-throwing practice and intrasquad scrimmages.

A 2,700 square ft. viewing and reception area is housed on the main level. The building's 64,320-square foot lower level houses: lockers; showers; a sauna and steam room; a rehabilitation pool; an 8,500 square foot state-of-the-art, computerized weight room; equipment storage area; training facilities; offices; and a media room.

A second floor area above the main floor entrance contains six break-out

rooms, a 140 person capacity auditorium, a student-athlete study area and a direct access to Camp Randall Stadium.

CAMP RANDALL MEMORIAL SPORTS CENTER

Located adjacent to 78,000-seat Camp Randall Stadium, the "Shell" contains four batting cages. It is used for hitting and pitching practice and also has a 220-yard Mondo-rubber track surface for running and agility drills.

CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

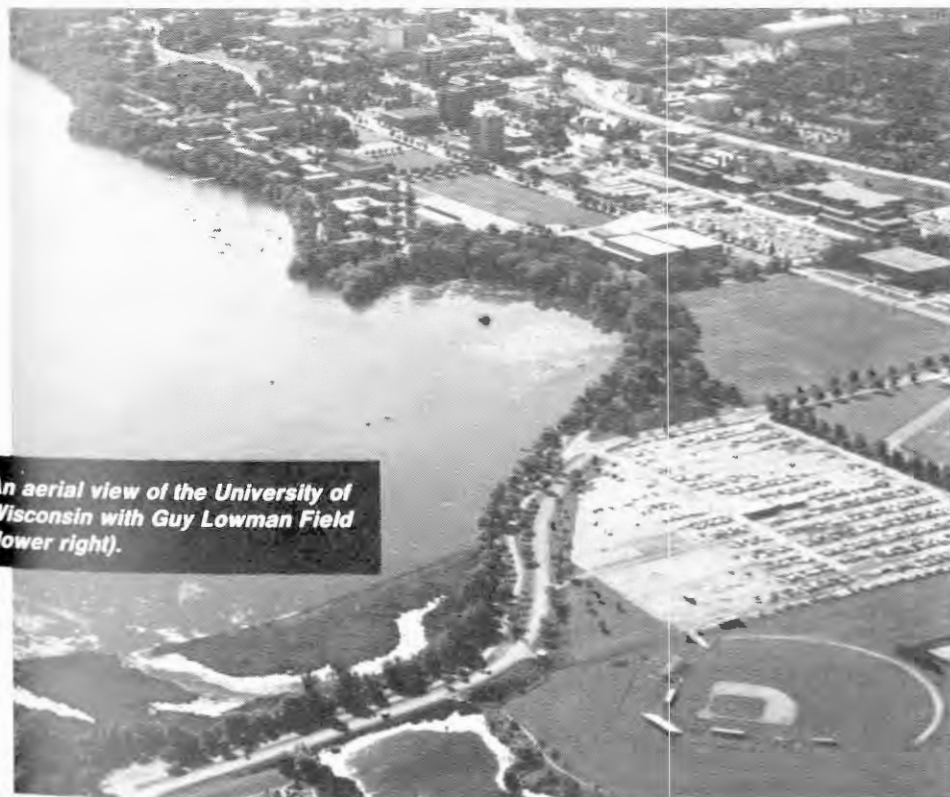
In Camp Randall Stadium, athletes use the weight training area which features Nautilus equipment, free weights and stereo music in a spacious, fully-carpeted room.

Under the guidance of Ken Ellett and Jim Hyne, the UW strength program is recognized as one of the most successful and complete in the Big Ten. For baseball, it includes a pre-season conditioning and weight training program, an in-season maintenance program, as well as summer and fall programs. The baseball team normally uses the strength training facility two hours per day, three days per week.

Camp Randall's 4,000 square foot Wisconsin weight room contains some of the finest training equipment on the market today. There are 38,000 pounds of free weights, 21 olympic bars, 21 free-weight stations, seven squat stations (of which four are electric squat racks), 10 bench press stations, four wall-pully cable stations, five pieces of Keiser equipment (based on pneumatic pressure and used especially for high-speed training), and two full set dumbbells (5-100 pounds, in five-pound increments).

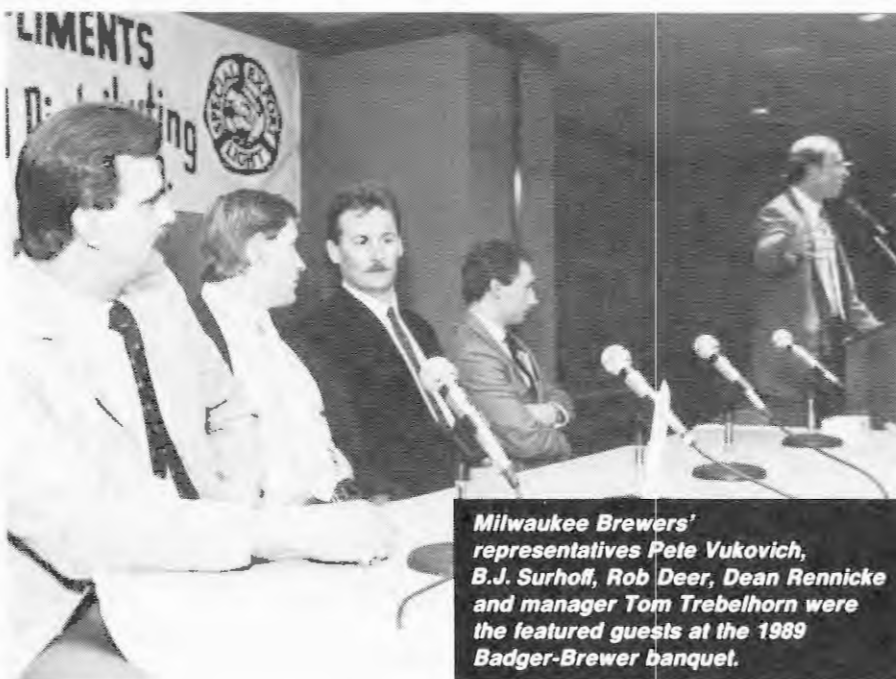
GUY LOWMAN FIELD

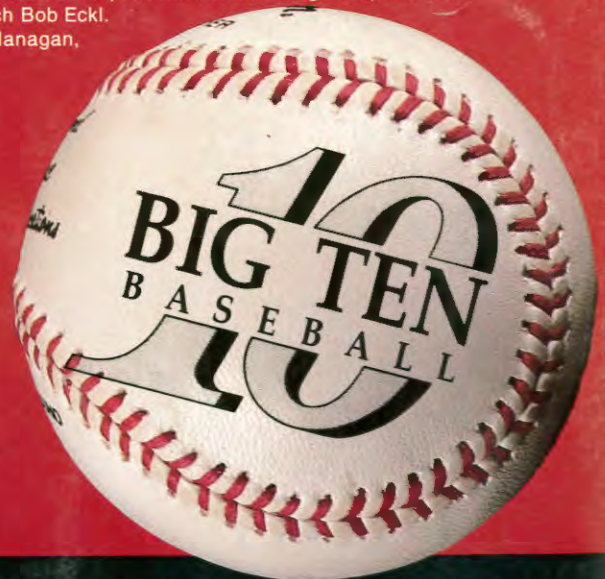

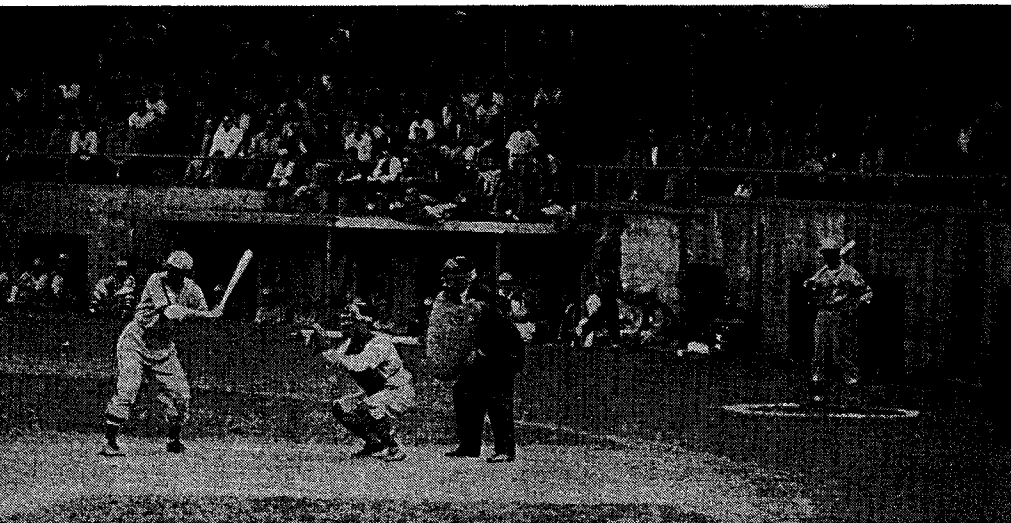

THE HISTORY OF WISCONSIN BASEBALL

The Badgers battle Michigan before a capacity crowd at Breese Stevens Field in 1950.



1870 - The University of Wisconsin baseball program begins when a group of young, diamond enthusiasts band together to form a campus club.

April 30, 1870 - The club, named the Mendotas, defeats the Capital City Club in the first and highest scoring game in UW history, 53-18.

1891 - The baseball, football and tennis associations along with the boat club merge to form the first University Athletic Association. Before 1891, baseball teams had been fielded in only seven of the previous 11 years.

1906 - Although there was no organized team in 1906, the University has fielded a team every year since. However, after a 5-1 start, the rest of the 1917 season was cancelled by the faculty after the United States entered the first World War.

1909 - The Badgers are the first Wisconsin athletic team to travel extensively. A trip to Japan covering 13,500 miles in 74 days was successful as the Badgers won five of nine games against the leading Japanese nines.

Spring 1912 - Wisconsin embarks on the first spring training trip taken by a UW team. The Badgers' first game, on March 12th against the University of Missouri at Columbia, ended in a 3-3 tie when the game was called because of darkness.

1921 - Guy Loman's Badgers lose to Michigan, 9-8, in 18 innings, the longest game ever by a Badger nine.

1930 - Wisconsin wins the Western Conference with a 9-1 record and is 15-7 overall.

April 5, 1940 - Art "Dynie" Mansfield becomes Wisconsin's head baseball coach. He compiled a 441-352-5 overall record (.556) and a 213-180-2 mark (.542) in the Big Ten.

April 11, 1941 - John Saxer fires Wisconsin's first no-hitter as he shuts out DeKalb Teachers College, 8-0.

1949 - Bob Wilson drives in seven runs against Western Michigan to set the UW single-game record. That record will stand until 1985 when Tim Eichorst ties the mark with seven RBI against Illinois-Chicago.

May 30, 1949 - The Badgers score 27 runs on 29 hits to rout Western Michigan. The runs and hits set modern single-game team records.

1950 - Wisconsin defeats Ohio State, 4-1, to win the NCAA District Four Championship, qualifying the Badgers for the College World Series in Omaha, Neb. Wisconsin is eliminated

by Rutgers, but went home with a fourth-place finish and a 19-9 season mark.

1950 - Thornton Kipper racks up 11 victories, setting a UW single-season record.

1952 - Harvey Kuenn sets a school record for triples with nine. He becomes the first Wisconsin Badger to earn first-team All-American honors.

1954 - Dave Moran drives in five runs in one inning against Bradley to set the Wisconsin record for most RBI in an inning.

April 3, 1956 - Wisconsin belts six home runs against Brown to set a team record for most home runs in a game.

April 15, 1960 - Bill Richards fans 19 Chicago batters to set a Wisconsin record for most strikeouts in a nine inning game.

1964 - Rick Reichardt becomes Wisconsin's third first-team All-American. Reichardt is the first modern-era player to win back-to-back Big Ten batting crowns (.429 and .472). His overall batting mark of .443 set a school record which has lasted for 24 years.

1970 - Dynie Mansfield retires after 31 seasons. During his career as the Badgers' head coach, Mansfield's teams won two conference championships and had 21 first division finishes.

1973 - At Milwaukee County Stadium, Wisconsin loses to the American League's Milwaukee Brewers, 6-0, in a 4 and 1/2 inning game ended by rain. This marks the first appearance for Wisconsin against a major league team.

1974 - The Badgers travel to Riverside Calif. to compete in the 8th Annual Riverside Baseball Invitational Tournament. Wisconsin finishes with a 2-7 mark at the RBI, including a win against Arizona State. Badger Duane Gustavson is the tournament's leading hitter with a .478 mark.

1976 - Wisconsin competes in the 29th Annual Rollins College Invitational Baseball Tournament and finishes as co-champions with the University of Tennessee at 4-2.

August 1978 - Wisconsin travels to Europe, the first journey out of the country for a Badger team since 1909. The Badger nine splits a two-game set with Holland and wins five straight from U.S. Air Force bases in Germany before dropping five straight to the Italian National team and ending the tour with a 6-6 record.

September 1978 - The Badger varsity posts a 5-3 win over the Badger Alumni in the first Varsity-Alumni game.

1979 - Club records for most wins in a season are set when the Badgers finish with a 13-5 record in Big Ten play and a 31-17 overall mark.

April-May 1980 - Craig Zirbel hits safely in 30 consecutive games to set a team record.

Summer of 1980 - The Badgers play baseball under the midnight sun as they travel to Fairbanks, Alaska for a nine-game trip that includes a game at midnight during the summer solstice.

1983 - Wisconsin hits .322 as a team and sets a new season record for highest batting average.

1985 - Joe Armentrout sets a UW single-season record with 61 runs scored.

1986 - The underdog Badgers were 5-2 at the Riverside (Calif.) Baseball Invitational Tournament, the highest finish by a Big Ten school in the 21-year history of the RBI.

1986 - Wisconsin wins 18 of its last 22 games to qualify for its first appearance in the post-season since 1950. Wisconsin finishes third in the Big Ten Playoffs and finishes with a school-record 35 wins.

1986 - Right-handed pitcher Jim Rosplock earns eight saves, setting a UW season record. His five saves in Big Ten play also set a conference record.

May 5, 1987 - John Byce hits safely in nine consecutive at-bats in games against Iowa and Carroll College, breaking Bill Rubin's and Joe Scime's mark of eight consecutive hits.

May 5, 1987 - Mike Larson gains national attention when he plays all nine positions in a nine-inning game against Carroll College. Starting the game in right field, Larson plays a different position each inning. He retired all three batters he faced as a pitcher in the ninth inning, including striking out two.

1987 - Mike Barker establishes single-season school records in hits (82) and doubles (19). He also hits a team-high .441, the second-highest UW regular season average.

May 5, 1988 - Tom Fischer strikes out 19 batters in a seven-inning, 12-0 victory over Iowa. His performance set a Big Ten record and tied a school record that was set by Bill Richards in nine innings in 1960.

May 5, 1988 - Scott Cepicky hits his 13th home run of the season to break John De-Merit's record of 12 set in 1956.

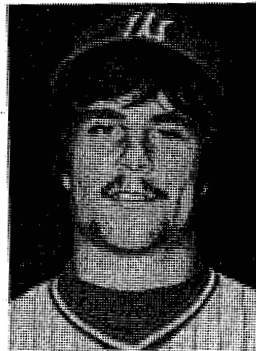

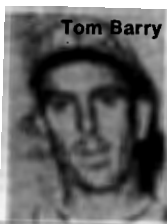
