UP NEXT: UW HOSTS IU LOOKING TO EXTEND STREAKS

- ▶ After a bye weekend, the Badgers return home on Tuesday, Jan. 26, looking to extend a pair of streaks, one modest, one impressive. UW seeks its first 3-game win steak of the season, while taking aim at a 14th straight home win over Indiana.
- ▶ Up next, UW will travel to Champaign to take on Illinois on Sunday, Jan. 31 (6:30 p.m. on BTN). The Badgers have won the last 8 meetings with the Illini.

NOTES TO KNOW

1 **TOUGH SLEDDING:** According to the RPI, Wisconsin has played the nation's 6th-toughest schedule and its 4 Big Ten losses have come by an average 3.8 points. UW has played a total of 7 games decided by 3 points or less, the most among major conference teams.



Freshman Ethan Happ owns a Big Ten-best 7 double-doubles with 20 pts. 11 rebs at Penn State.

- 2 CHANGING OF THE GARD: The Badgers are 4-4 since Greg Gard assumed the head coaching duties on Dec. 15. Over that span, Wisconsin is shooting 44.3% (36.1% 3FGs) under Gard after hitting on just 41.2% (32.9%) in the 12 contests prior to him taking over. In Big Ten play, UW is averaging just 9.6 turnovers/game (11.9 during non-con).
- **3 HAYES-ING:** Preseason All-Big Ten pick Nigel Hayes is 1 of just 2 players in the Big Ten averaging at least 16.0 ppg, 6.0 rpg and 3.5 apg. He has scored in double figures in all but 2 games, including 25 points vs. Michigan State.
- **4 BEEN HERE BEFORE:** Prior to this season, the last time UW was .500 in January was during the 2001-02 season. That year, a win over a ranked MSU team sparked a run of wins in 10 of the final 13 Big Ten games to win the conference championship. The Badgers are hoping their 77-76 win over No. 4 MSU propels them in a similar fashion.
- **5 ANOTHER TOP-5 TAKEDOWN:** Including the win over No. 4 MSU, Wisconsin has won 7 of its last 10 games against teams ranked in the AP top 5 dating back to 2013. During that same span, no other Big Ten team has a winning record or posted more than 5 wins over the AP top 5. Overall, UW has won 9 of its last 13 home games vs. ranked teams.
- **6 KOENIG HEATING UP:** Over the last 6 games, Bronson Koenig has found his touch, shooting 42.1% (16-38) from 3-point range. The junior guard has hit a triple in 31 consecutive games, the 5th-longest streak in the country.
- 7 MAKING IT HAPP-EN: Averaging 12.0 ppg and 8.3 rpg, freshman Ethan Happ leads the Big Ten with 7 doubles-doubles. After hitting the game-winner vs. MSU, Happ scored a career-high 20 points with 11 boards at Penn State.
- 8 THAT 70S SHOW: Wisconsin has won 28 consecutive games when scoring at least 70 points.

ALL-TIME VS. INDIANA

Tuesday's game marks the 165th meeting between Wisconsin and Indiana dating back to 1910. The Hoosiers lead the all-time series 95-69, but the two teams are tied 40-40 in meetings in Madison.

- Including a 59-58 Indiana win in Bloomington earlier this season, the Badgers have still defeated the Hoosiers in 14 of the last 16 meetings, overall.
- The Badgers have won 13 consecutive games against the Hoosiers in Madison. In fact, Indiana's last win at the Kohl Center was in 1998.

UW's active home win streak vs. IU is the thirdlongest ever against the Hoosiers.

- ► IU's 13 straight losses in Madison is by far their longest active streak against Big Ten teams. The Hoosiers' next longest road losing streak is 2 straight at Michigan State and Purdue.
- Since Tom Crean got to Indiana, Wisconsin owns a 12-2 all-time record vs. the Hoosiers.
- Bo Ryan-lead teams went 20-4 (.833) alltime vs. the Hoosiers. Prior to Ryan, UW was 49-90 (.353) all-time vs. Indiana. Ryan's .833 win percentage against IU is the 2nd-best mark all-time among Big Ten coaches, trailing only Ralph Jones (ILL/PUR), who was 12-0 from 1910-20.
- UW has held IU to an average of 60.4 ppg during the 13 meetings of the Crean era. The Hoosiers currently lead the Big Ten in scoring (86.1 ppg).

NOTES FROM UW'S LAST GAME

UW 66, PSU 60 - 1/22/16 - Bryce Jordan Center

- ► The Badgers picked up their first Big Ten road win under head coach Greg Gard with a 66-60 win at Penn State last Thursday.
- ► UW led by as many as 17 points in the second half as freshman Ethan Happ scored a career-high 20 points to go with 11 rebounds and two steals. Happ's seventh double-double of the season including a career-high 10-for-15 effort at the free throw line. As a team, the Badgers went 22-for-35 at the stripe, the second straight game UW has attempted at least 35 free throws.
- ▶ Junior **Nigel Hayes** tallied 15 points to go with a game-high 5 assists. Freshman Alex Illikainen chipped in 9 points (all in the first half) and a careerbest 7 rebounds in a career-high 26 minutes.
- ▶ UW shot 41.7% while holding PSU to just 38.6% shooting. The Badgers also out-scored the Nittany Lions, 24-12 in the paint.

- ▶ Wisconsin jumped out to a 9-point first-half lead but was plagued by a cold-shooting second half in a 59-58 loss at Indiana on Jan. 5.
- ► The Badgers shot 47.6% in the opening half, but that fell to 36.0% in a second half that featured a long scoring drought. Despite that, UW pulled even at 53-53 with 0:52 remaining.

However, 6 points from IU's Youi Ferrell and a costly TO were too much to overcome.

- ▶ UW held the Hoosiers to a season-low 59 points, (27.7 below their avg.). The Badgers also forced 19 turnovers, held a 10-0 edge in second-change points and a 26-22 advantage in the paint. But IU shot 48.8% overall (41.2% 3) FGs) and went a perfect 10-for-10 at the FT line.
- ▶ Nigel Hayes and Bronson Koenig had 15 points apiece for Wisconsin. Freshman Ethan Happ finished with 10 points and 8 rebounds.

THE GREG GARD ERA BEGINS

With the retirement of Bo Ryan on Dec. 15, 2015, associate head coach Greg Gard took over the title of interim head coach and will lead the Badgers through the remainder of the season.

- ► Gard officially becomes the 16th head coach in program history and the second coach to hold the interim tag in the last 20 years. Brad Soderberg coached the Badgers to a 16-10 record in 2000-01 when Dick Bennett retired 3 games into the season.
- ▶ One of the most respected assistant coaches in the nation, Gard was ranked as the fourth-best "X&O" assistant coach in college basketball by coachstat.net in November of 2015. The rankings were made upon receipt of votes from a panel of national college basketball media, scouts and coaches.
- ▶ In addition to his on-floor coaching duties as associate head coach, Gard served as UW's recruiting coordinator in addition to on-floor coaching duties, opponent scouting and game preparation, and the constructing of future game schedules. He was also the director of the Badger Boys Basketball Summer Camps.

► A native of Cobb, Wisconsin (pop. 456), Gard's coaching career began in 1990 during his sophomore year at UW-Platteville when he answered a flier to serve as the junior varsity coach at Southwestern High School in Hazel Green, Wis.

Three years later, Gard would move to the head coaching job at Platteville High School and join Bo Ryan's staff at the University of Wisconsin-

OFFENSE GROWING UNDER GARD

► Since taking over the head coaching duties, Greg Gard has had an immediate impact on the Badgers at both ends of the floor. In Big Ten play -- against teams with a combined record of 86-23 (.789) -- UW has shown improvement.

► Gard's promotion to head coach has also coincided with Wisconsin increasing its depth.

In 12 games under Bo Ryan, UW's starters were playing 80.8% of the minutes. In the 7 games since, that number has dropped to 73.1%.

As a result, the Badgers are getting more production from their reserves (11.6 ppg under Gard). Over the final 6 games prior to Gard taking over, UW's bench was averaging just 5.3 ppg, scoring 0 points vs. Marquette and 1 at Syracuse.

► Sophomore Jordan Hill and freshman Alex Illikainen have been affected by the change more than anyone. During the first 12 games of the season, Hill did not score a point in 27 minutes. He has scored 30 points in 145 minutes (20.7 mpg) in the 7 games since. Illikainen was averaging 1.8 ppg in 4.8 mpg under Ryan, but has been averaging 4.3 ppg in 17.3 mpg under Gard.

STRENGTH IN SCHEDULING

- ► According to ESPN.com RPI rankings, UW has faced the 6th-toughest schedule in the NCAA and the highest among Big Ten teams.
- ► From an RPI standpoint, the Badgers faced one of the toughest non-conference schedules in the Big Ten. A total of 9 of UW's 13 non-con games came against RPI top-150 foes. Among Big Ten team, only Illinois (10) faced more top-150 teams.
- ► The Badgers' 5 home losses have come by a combined 14 points (2.8 avg.). In each of the defeats, UW was either tied or within one score in the final 2:00. In fact, the Badgers had a game-winning/tying shot attempt in the closing seconds of 3 of the losses.

PARALLELS TO 2002?

Prior to Sunday's win over MSU, the Badgers owned a .500 record (9-9) with 13 Big Ten games remaining. The last time Wisconsin owned a .500 record in January came in 2002, Bo Ryan's first season in Madison, when UW was also 8-8 with 13 Big Ten games left.

Like they hope will happen this season, the 2002 Badgers jump-started their season by knocking off No. 25 Michigan State (64-63) to climb above .500. UW would go on to win 10 of it's final 13 games and claim a share of the 2002 Big Ten Championship.

TOP-5 TAKEDOWNS

- ► The Badgers are 2-3 against teams ranked in the AP poll this season, after going 5-3 against the top-25 last season. Since 2001, UW is 36-15 against AP top-25 teams at the Kohl Center.
- ▶ Behind a 77-76 win over No. 4 Michigan State last weekend, Wisconsin has won 7 of its last 10 games against teams ranked in the AP top 5.

HAYES FOR DAYS

- ▶ Junior **Nigel Hayes** entered the season a preseason All-American pick and consensus All-Big Ten selection. Through 20 games, he has lived up to the billing.
- ► Hayes ranks 6th in the Big Ten averaging 16.3 ppg to go with 6.2 rpg and a team-high 3.7 apg. He has dished 74 assists with just 42 turnovers (1.8 ratio) and leads the Big Ten in both FTs (109) and FTAs (148).

Hayes is one of just 2 Big Ten players and one of 6 major conference players averaging at least 16.0 ppg, 6.0 rpg and 3.5 apg.

- ► Hayes ranks among the top 15 in the Big Ten in all 3 major categories: points (6th), rebounds (12th) and assists (11th). He is also 5th in the conference with 2.5 offensive rebounds per game.
- ► Hayes enjoyed one of his best games vs. No. 4 MSU when he scored 25 points, going 2-for-3 from deep and 9-for-10 on FTs with 7 boards.
- ▶ With 1,114 career points, Hayes ranks 32nd on Wisconsin's all-time scoring list. He also owns 476 career rebounds, needing just 24 more caroms to become the 9th Badger to record 1,000 points and 500 rebounds in his first 3 seasons.
- ► Hayes has scored in double figures in all but 2 game this season, including a career-high 32 points against Milwaukee, going 9-for-18 from the field (2-3 3FGs) and 12-for-19 from the FT line.

Hayes' 32 points are the most by a Badger since Frank Kaminsky posted a school-record 43 points in 2013. His 19 FTAs vs. Milwaukee equaled the 3rd-most in UW history and the most since 1991.

- ► Hayes posted 3 straight double-doubles earlier this season (at OU, at SYR and TEM), equaling the longest double-double streak at UW in the Kohl Center era (1998). Frank Kaminsky, who had a pair of 3-game double-double streaks last season is the only other Badger to turn the trick in the last 18 years.
- ► The Toledo, Ohio, native is 109-for-148 (.736) from the FT line this season, leading the Big Ten in FTs and FTAs. His 148 FTAs rank 16th in the NCAA.

► Last season, Hayes averaged 12.4 ppg and ranked 13th in the Big Ten with 6.2 rpg. He also led UW in steals (34). Hayes ranked 9th in the Big Ten shooting 49.7% from the field and shot 39.6% from 3-point range, which ranked 13th in the Big Ten.

KOENIG ON POINT

When Traevon Jackson went down with a foot injury at Rutgers on Jan. 11, 2015, **Bronson Koenig** took over the starting point guard role for the Badgers and flourished in the new role.

Now a junior, the preseason All-Big Ten pick is the unquestioned lead guard at Wisconsin.

► Koenig ranks 2nd on the Badgers and 15th in the Big Ten averaging 14.0 ppg while shooting 40.4% from the field and 38.4% (48-125) from 3-point range. The junior is hitting an average of 2.4 triples per game (5th in the Big Ten).

Koenig is also tallying 2.6 rpg, 2.4 apg.

- ► In UW's upset of No. 4 Michigan State, Koenig scored a career-high 27 points, going 4-for-8 from 3-point range and 7-for-7 at the FT line. His big day included a 3-pointer that pulled the Badgers within one at 76-75 with 22 seconds remaining.
- ► Koenig has made at least one 3-pointer in 31 consecutive games, which ranks as the 5th-longest active streak in the nation. Koenig has hit multiple triples in 25 of those contests, including 18 of 20 games this season.

- ► Koenig ranks 14th in the Big Ten shooting 79.2% from the FT line (42-for-53). During conference play he has been even better, making 16-of-20 (80.0%).
- ► In UW's 74-73 win over VCU, Koenig scored a game-high 22 points, including the game-winning shot on a spinning, left-handed lay-in with 5.9 seconds remaining.

He then drained a step-back jumper with 22.2 seconds remaining to tie the game at 60-60 with No. 3 Maryland.

- ► Koenig entered the season with a career-high of 19 points, but has already eclipsed that three times this season. He scored 27 vs. Michigan State, 23 against Siena and 22 vs. VCU.
- ► Koenig has an uncharacteristically low assistto-turnover ratio this season, dishing 47 assists to 34 turnovers (1.38 ratio). Last season, Koenig had 98 assists to just 33 TOs and his 2.97 ratio was tops among Big Ten players with at least 75 assists.
- ► Koenig's 3FG% is also a little behind his norm, connecting on 38.4% from long range after shooting 40.5% on 3-point attempts (62-153) last year.
- ▶ In 24 games as the Badgers' starting point guard last season, Koenig averaged 11.5 points, 2.2 rebounds and 2.7 assists per game. He also went 50-for-113 (44.2%) from 3-point range over those 24 games.

MAKING IT HAPP-EN

The reigning two-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week (Jan. 18 and 25), **Ethan Happ** is averaging 12.0 ppg and leading the Badgers with 8.3 rpg.

- ► The last UW freshman to average at least 10.0 ppg was Alando Tucker (12.0) in the 2002-03 season.
- ► Happ's 8.3 rebounds per game rank 2nd in the Big Ten. UW has not had a player lead the league in rebounding since Rashard Griffith (11.2 in 1995).

Among freshmen, Happ ranks 10th in the nation in rebounds per game (8.3).

Happ is tied also 3rd in the Big Ten averaging 2.6 offensive rebounds per game.

► Happ leads the Big Ten with 7 double-doubles, tied with Purdue's Caleb Swanigan.

Since 1984, Rashard Griffith (9) is the only UW freshman with more double-doubles than Happ. In fact, Happ already owns the second-highest single-season total for double-doubles over the last 20 years (Frank Kaminsky had 14 in 2014-15).

- ► In UW's win at Penn State, Happ scored a career-high 20 points with 11 rebounds, becoming the first UW freshman to post at least 20 points and 10 rebounds in a game since Alando Tucker in 2002.
- ► Happ is one of just 3 freshman to lead his team in rebounds, blocks and steals, joining LSU's Ben Simmons and ECU's Kentrell Barkley.
- ► The Milan ("MY-lin"), III. native is also shooting a team-high .542 from the floor (11th in the Big Ten).

Happ also leads UW with 21 blocks and ranks 4th in the Big Ten with 27 steals (1.4 per game).

- ► Happ scored the game-winning basket in UW's win over No. 4 Michigan State, muscling in a lay-up with 10 seconds remaining for 2 of his 14 points.
- ► Happ enjoyed the best game of his young career at No. 14 Syracuse, tallying career highs with 18 points, 15 rebounds and 3 blocks. Happ scored 14 of his 18 in the second half and overtime.
- ▶ With back-to-back double-doubles at the 2K Classic in New York, Ethan Happ became the first UW freshman to post consecutive double-doubles since Mike Wilkinson in 2002. Happ had 12 pts, 11 reb vs. Georgetown and 12 pts, 10 reb against VCU.
- ► Happ became just the 3rd freshman to start the season opener under Bo Ryan, joining Devin Harris (2001) and George Marshall (2012).



Ethan Happ has won back-to-back Big Ten Freshman of the Week honors. With 20 points and 11 rebounds at Penn State, Happ became first UW freshman with at least 20 and 10 since Alando Tucker in 2002.

"VELVET" VITTO BROWN

During his first 2 years on campus, junior forward **Vitto Brown** was best-known for his singing prowess. Now in the Badgers' starting lineup, Brown is proving his game might be as strong as his voice.

- ► Brown has started every game this season and is 4th on the Badgers in scoring at 8.4 ppg and ranks 3rd with 5.4 rpg.
- ► After averaging just 1.8 ppg last season, Brown has increased his scoring by 6.6 ppg. Among Big Ten players, that ranks as the 5th-largest increase.
- ► He tallied a career-high 16 points vs. Siena and is 28-for-37 (.757) from the FT line on the year.

The Bowling Green, Ohio, native has scored in double figures in 8 games this season. He had a total of one double-digit scoring game entering the year.

- ► Brown posted his first double-double with 12 points and a career-high 16 reb. vs. Texas A&M-CC.
- ► A talented crooner who has been performing with his family's singing group, "Shades of Brown," since a young age, Brown has performed the national anthem before several UW games, including at the Final Four in Indianapolis last season.

ON THE REBOUND

- ► Wisconsin has shown a strong ability to control the glass this season. The Badgers have been outrebounded just 4 times in 20 games and own a +5.2 average margin.
- ► UW leads the Big Ten with 12.7 offensive rebounds per game.

Three Badgers rank among the Big Ten's top 10 in off. boards per game: Ethan Happ is 3rd (2.6), Nigel Hayes is 5th (2.5) and Vitto Brown is 10th (1.9).

- ► UW's offensive rebounding prowess has led to an average of 11.5 second-chance points per game. Conversely, the Badgers are allowing 8.6 opponent second-chance points.
- ► The Badgers held Indiana to a season-low 4 offensive rebounds and zero 2nd-chance points. The Hoosiers lead the Big Ten in off. rebounding pct.
- ► Individually, the Badgers have 2 of the top overall rebounders in the Big Ten. Happ ranks 2nd in the Big Ten with 8.3 rpg while Hayes ranks 12th with 6.2 rpg.
- ► Wisconsin out-rebounded Syracuse 51-25 on Dec. 2, marking just the 7th time in the Bo Ryan era the Badgers have amassed 50+ rebounds in a game. Prior to the Syracuse game, UW had never posted 50 rebounds against a major conference for under Ryan.

STEALING THE SHOWALTER

After playing the role of maximum effort, spark off the bench player, junior **Zak Showalter** has emerged as a well-rounded threat in 2015-16.

► On the strength of a career-high 21 points against Rutgers, Showalter is averaging 7.9 ppg, 4.0 rpg and is 3rd on the team with 46 assists in 32.5 mpg.

Against the Scarlet Knights (1/2), Showalter was a perfect 8-for-8 from the floor, including 4-for-4 from 3-point range and 1-for-1 at the FT line.

- ► Showalter posted his first career double-double against Marquette with 10 points and 10 rebounds.
- ► Entering the season, Showalter had made just 4-of-24 (16.7%) from 3-point range in his career. He is 22-for-60 (36.7%) from long range this season, the 2nd-best mark on the team (minimum 10 3FGAs).
- ► Showalter leads the Badgers shooting 28-for-32 (.875) at the free throw line. His miss vs. Maryland snapped a string of 24 made FTs, a streak that began in the second game of the season.
- ► "Showy's" offensive contributions haven't come at the expense of the other areas of his game. Showalter still ranks 2nd on the Badgers with 23 steals and has already taken a team-high 13 charges.

TAKING THE SHOW ON THE ROAD

UW is renowned for its incredible home success, but it has been just as good on the road lately.

- ► Wisconsin is 40-12 (.769) away from home over the last two seasons, including a mark of 21-2 last year (10-2 on the road and 11-1 in neutral).
- ▶ UW won 10 true road games last season, equaling the school single-season record set in 2007-08.
- ► Kentucky (10-0) and Virginia (11-1) were the only major conference teams with a better road win percentage than Wisconsin (10-2) last season.
- Among major conference teams, UW owns the most wins and the 2nd-best win percentage away from home over the last 3 seasons.

YOUTH BEING SERVED

The 2015-16 Badgers are the youngest in Bo Ryan's 15 seasons. No school in the country has more freshmen on its roster than Wisconsin (8). Cornell and UTEP are the only other schools with 8 freshmen.

- ► In addition to Ethan Happ, true freshmen Khalil Iverson, Charlie Thomas and Alex Illikainen have each seen extensive action off the Badgers' bench.
- ► Wisconsin's freshman have played 30.8% of the team's minutes this season.
- ► Illikainen scored a career-high 10 points vs. Purdue and finished with 9 points and 7 rebounds in a career-high 26 minutes vs. Penn State. In 8 games under Greg Gard, Illikainen is averaging 4.3 ppg in 17.3 mpg. On the year, he is shooting 20-for-40 (.500) from the field this season, including 5-for-14 (.357) from 3-point range.
- ► Thomas is seeing an average of 12.4 mpg and tallying 3.4 ppg and 2.6 rpg. Thomas posted career highs of 12 points and 6 rebs vs. Prairie View A&M.
- ► Iverson is playing 13.9 minutes per game off the bench and producing 2.9 ppg and 2.2 rpg to go with 7 blocks and 8 steals. Iverson notched a career high with 9 points against Prairie View A&M.
- ► UW's other active scholarship freshmen **Brevin Pritzl** suffered a broken foot in August and re-injured it on Dec. 1. He appeared in just 1 game (vs. Siena).

Andy Van Vliet is forced to sit out this season after the NCAA ruled him ineligible for not enrolling in college within a year of high school graduation.

FINISHING MOVES

- ► The Badgers held a narrow 68-65 lead against No. 4 Michigan State with 5:00 remaining on Jan. 17 before closing out the 77-76 win. That effort continued a very Mariano Rivera-like trend at Wisconsin.
- ▶ Dating back to February of 2011, UW is 128-5 (.962) when leading or tied with 5:00 left, including a mark of 11-1 this season. UW lost to Milwaukee when leading 58-55 at the 5:00 mark.

The only other losses over the last 5 years have been to Duke (tied 56-56) in the 2015 National Championship, Kentucky (led 69-65) and Ohio State (led 54-50) in 2014 and at Minnesota in 2012-13 season (led 49-43).

▶ UW has also won 146 of its last 149 games (.980) when shooting a higher FG% than its opponents. The Badgers streak of consecutive wins when shooting a higher percentage was snapped at 37 with the loss to Milwaukee. The Badgers shot 36.4% while the Panthers connected on just 35.8%.

SECURITY SPECIALISTS

- ► Since 2001-02, no team has taken better care of the ball than Wisconsin... and it's not close.
- ► This season has been uncharacteristic for the Badgers as they rank 5th in the Big Ten, turning it over 11.1 times per game.
- ▶ During conference play, UW has taken much better care of the ball, ranking 2nd in the Big Ten with 9.6 TOs per game.
- ► Last season, UW led the nation and set an NCAA record averaging a mere 7.40 turnovers per game.

The Badgers broke their own NCAA single-season record for fewest turnovers per game. In fact, UW now owns 3 of the 4 lowest marks in NCAA history.

▶ Twice this season Wisconsin has had at least 20 turnovers, but they have won both contests. UW had 20 turnovers in its win at No. 14 Syracuse. That marked the Badgers' first such win since posting 20 turnovers in a 68-58 win over Valparaiso in 2007. The Badgers' last road win with 20+ TOs came with 22 cough ups in a 70-66 win at Marquette in 2006.

UW also turned is over 26 times in it's 84-79 win vs. Green Bay (12/23).

▶ Wisconsin looks to replace 5 of the top 7 scorers from a year ago, but does return a pair of starters in juniors Nigel Hayes and Bronson Koenig. Overall, the Badgers bring back just 38.1% of their minutes played from last season, the lowest total since Bo Ryan inherited a 2001-02 team that returned 30.0% of its minutes.

UW returns 34.3% of its scoring and 31.5% of its rebounding from 2014-15, both are the fewest of any team in the Big Ten.

- ▶ The 2015-16 season will mark the first year under Bo Ryan in which the Badgers do not have a scholarship senior. The only senior on the roster is walk-on G Jordan Smith. Wisconsin has had at least one senior starter in each of Ryan's first 14 seasons in Madison. In fact, the Badgers have started at least two seniors in 10 of those 14 seasons.
- ▶ Defending Big Ten regular season and tournament champions, the Badgers enter the 2015-16 season seeking back-to-back conference titles for the first time since 2002-03. Wisconsin will also take aim at a third-consecutive Final Four appearance, something only 11 schools have done in the history of the NCAA tournament. The most recent team to turn the three-peat was UCLA (2006-08).

ALL-BIG TEN DUO: HAYES, KOENIG

Wisconsin juniors **Nigel Hayes** and **Bronson Koenig** comprise one of the top duos in college basketball. The juniors were both named to the Wooden Award preseason Top 50 as were both tabbed to the 2015-16 Preseason All-Big Ten Team.

This is one of just 4 schools to have a two players on the Wooden Award preseason list in consecutive seasons as Frank Kaminsky and Sam Dekker earned the distinction last year (with Duke, Kentucky, Wichita State).

► Hayes and Koenig were also named to watch lists for the Julius Erving Award and Bob Cousy Award, respectively, as announced by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

Each watch list contains the top 20 players at its position, as the Julius Erving Award recognizes the top small forward in the nation and the Bob Cousy Award recognizes the top point guard in the country.

Dekker was a finalist for the Erving Award last season. Jordan Taylor (2012) was UW's last finalist for the Cousy Award.

► Junior Nigel Hayes was named a preseason All-American by *The Sporting News* and finished 9th in the AP preseason All-American balloting.

2014-15 LOOK BACK

Record: 36-4 | **Big Ten:** 16-2 (1st)

▶ Playing in its 17th-consecutive NCAA tournament after earning the first No. 1 seed in school history, Wisconsin returned to the Final Four for the 2nd-straight season and the 4th time in school history. UW is just the 9th Big Ten team in history to reach back-to-back national semifinals.

With a 71-64 win over No. 1 Kentucky, the Badgers advanced to their first national title game since 1941. UW would fall to Duke in the title game, 68-63.

- ▶ UW set a school single-season record with 36 wins, winning at least 30 games in back-to-back seasons and the 4th time in program history (all 4 since 2007). Kansas (6) and Duke (5) are the only schools in the nation with more 30-win seasons since 2007.
- ► At 36-4, UW is just the 3rd Big Ten team to win at least 35 games in a season and the first since Ohio State (35-3) in 2006-07. The B1G record is 37 wins by Illinois in 2004-05.
- ► After winning 3 games in 3 days in Chicago, the Badgers added 2015 Big Ten Tournament Champions to a resume that already included the outright 2015 regular-season championship.

With a mark of 16-2, UW matched its best-ever 18-game conference record and claimed the 18th regular season championship in school history and the 4th title under Bo Ryan (also in 2002, 2003 and 2008).

- ► Senior Frank Kaminsky put together the greatest season in Wisconsin history, becoming the first Badger player to earn consensus National Player of the Year honors. The 21st consensus All-American in school history, Kaminsky swept the national awards winning the Wooden, Naismith, Robertson and AP Player of the Year. Kaminsky averaged 18.8 ppg, 8.2 rpg while shooting 54.7% overall and 41.6% 3FGs.
- ► Kaminsky and junior Sam Dekker became the first Badgers duo to be drafted in the first round of the NBA Draft. Selected 9th overall by Charlotte, Kaminsky is the 2nd-highest drafted UW player in the last 60 years. Dekker was picked 9 spots later by the Houston Rockets. Senior Duje Dukan also signed a rookie contract with the Sacramento Kings.
- ► According to Ken Pomeroy's rankings, UW boasted the No. 1 offense in the nation, averaging 127.9 points per 100 possessions. During conference play, UW ranked 2nd in the Big Ten in scoring (70.3 ppg) and tops in shooting (47.7%).

WINNING AT WISCONSIN

► The Badgers won a school-record 36 games last season, reaching 30 wins for the 4th time in school history. All 4 have come in the last 9 years. Bo Ryanled teams own each of the top 11 spots in the UW record book for single-season wins.

▶ Including last season, Ryan's teams won at least 20 games in 12 of his 14 seasons at UW. Illinois (10) is the only other Big Ten team with 10 20-win seasons since 2001-02. Prior to Ryan's arrival, the Badgers had just four 20-win seasons in 103 years of basketball.

UW has won at least 20 games in each of the last 8 seasons, the 2nd-longest active streak in the Big Ten.

► Over the last two seasons, the Badgers have posted 66 win, the third-highest total in the nation. Only Arizona (67) and Kentucky (67) have won more.

BIG TEN, BIG RESULTS

- ► Since Bo Ryan took over in 2001, UW has won 7 Big Ten championships (4 regular season and 3 tourn.). Only OSU (10; 5 regular season, 5 tourn.) has won more titles during Ryan's tenure. MSU and ILL have 5, but no other school has more than 3 over that span.
- ► Ryan's teams posted a 172-68 (.717) Big Ten record, the best mark in the conference over the last 13 seasons. Michigan St. is second at 161-79 (.671) and Ohio St. is third at 156-84 (.650).

- ► Last season, Wisconsin won the Big Ten with a record of 16-2 in conference play. The Badgers have notched double-digit conference wins in 13 of 14 years under Bo Ryan and have never finished lower than fourth place in the Big Ten standings.
- ▶ UW has posted a winning conference record in each of the last 14 seasons. Among the 6 major conferences, only Kansas (23 seasons) has a longer active streak of finishing above .500 in league play.

ALL WE DO IS WIN, WIN, WIN

During Bo Ryan's 14 full seasons, Wisconsin accumulated an overall record of 357-125 (.741). That win total and percentage put the Badgers in pretty exclusive company.

Wisconsin's .741 win percentage ranked 9th among all NCAA Div. I teams in that span.

NCAA TOURNEY REGULARS

- ▶ UW qualified for the NCAA tournament in each of Bo Ryan's 14 seasons in Madison, posting a 25-14 record over that span. Under Ryan, UW won at least one game in 12 of the last 14 NCAA appearances. Among Big Ten teams, only MSU (28) has won more NCAA tourney games than UW since 2001-02.
- ▶ UW has made 17 consecutive NCAA tourneys 1 of just 6 schools with an active streak of at least 16 years: Kansas (26), Duke (20), Mich St. (18) & Gonzaga (17).
- ▶ Wisconsin advanced to the Final Four in both 2014 and 2015, becoming one of 8 Big Ten teams to reach back-to-back Final Fours. The Badgers have advanced to the Final Four a total of 4 times, winning the national championship in 1941 and reaching the national semifinals in 2000.
- ► UW has reached the Sweet 16 or better in 4 of the last 5 years. No team in the nation has gone more frequently over that span.

Greg Gard's first win as interim head coach

GREG GARD INTERIM HEAD COACH

Long considered one of the most best assistant coaches in all of college basketball, Greg Gard was named the interim head men's basketball coach at the University of Wisconsin on Dec. 15, 2015. A coaching

veteran of more than 20 years, Gard is in his 15th season on the Badger basketball staff, serving as the team's associate head coach since July of 2008.

"Greg is ready, the staff is ready, all the way through, and I feel really good about that," Bo Ryan said upon his retirement. "There are people that have received head coaching jobs who were assistants at places, without anywhere near the record that he has. There's nobody more prepared than him."

As associate head coach, Gard served as the Badgers' recruiting coordinator in addition to on-floor coaching duties, opponent scouting and game preparation, and the constructing of future game schedules. He was also the director of the Badger Boys Basketball Summer Camps.

In November of 2015, Gard was ranked as the fourth-best "X&O" assistant coach in college basketball by coachstat.net. The rankings were made upon receipt of votes from a panel of national college basketball media, scouts and coaches.

2012, Gard was named No. 3 on the list of top assistant coaches in college basketball according to Bleacher Report. Fox Sports also listed Gard No. 10 on its list of the nation's top 25 assistant coaches.

"Greg knows why we do drills the way we do them," Ryan said in 2014. "Why we do things in a game the way we do them. He understands the personalities and the interactions of the players. Greg's a guy that knows the teams in the league, works extremely hard at scheduling, which is a very difficult job. Scouting reports. He just does it all."

Gard has helped pilot the Badgers to four Big Ten regular season titles and three Big Ten tournament championships, most recently winning both crowns in 2015. UW has made the NCAA tournament in each of Gard's 14 seasons, advancing to seven Sweet 16s three Elite Eights and two Final Fours.

"We almost have two head coaches in Coach Ryan and Coach Gard," former guard Josh Gasser said in 2014. "Coach Gard's got that head coach mentality, that moxie about him. And that's perfect to have."

Gard came to the Badgers after spending the previous two seasons as Ryan's assistant at UW-Milwaukee, where he had responsibilities in scouting, summer basketball camp operations and on-floor coaching, as well as involvement with recruiting.

Previously, Gard served as an assistant coach to Ryan at UW-Platteville from 1993-99. During Gard's years on the Pioneer staff, UW-Platteville compiled a 161-13 (.925) record and won three NCAA Division III titles, five straight Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC) championships and appeared in six consecutive NCAA tournaments. In his final year at UW-Platteville, Gard served as Ryan's top assistant in charge of recruiting, camp operations and scouting. He also worked as

an advisor in the admissions office.

Prior to joining Ryan's staff in Platteville, Gard spent three seasons at Southwestern High School and one at Platteville High School, where he served in junior high and assistant varsity coaching capacities.

Gard is a 1995 graduate of UW-Platteville with a degree in physical and health education. He received a master's degree in counselor education from Platteville in 2007. Gard and his wife, Michelle, have two daughters Mackenzie and Peyton and a son, Isaac.

The Bo Ryan Era

Ryan took UW to new heights

- ◆ A 2015 Naismith Men's College Coach of the Year finalist, the basketball hall of fame credentials of Bo Ryan span well beyond the 15 seasons during which he was at the helm of the University of Wisconsin men's basketball program. Ryan elevated the UW program to heights previously unseen in Madison.
- With 363 wins, Bo Ryan finished his career as the all-time wins leader in Wisconsin history. Ryan was also the author of 172 Big Ten wins, the most in UW annals.
- Ryan passed Hall of Famer Bud Foster to set the UW wins record in just 365 games and 11 seasons. Foster reached the milestone in 532 games and 25 seasons.
- ◆ In 31-plus seasons, Ryan put together a career record of 747-233 (.762). His 747 wins rank 27th on the NCAA's all-time wins list, passing legendary Kansas coach Phog Allen with his final victory in Madison.

 Among all-time coaches with 700 career wins (regardless of NCAA classification), Ryan's win percentage ranks 8th. There are just 4 active Div. 1 head coaches with more victories.
- ◆ Ryan ends his career ranked 9th in Big Ten history with 172 career conference wins. With a career record of 172-68 (.717) in Big Ten play, Ryan owns the highest winning percentage in conference history.
- ◆ Ryan tied legendary Indiana coach Branch McCracken as the 2nd-fastest coach in conference history to record 100 Big Ten wins, doing so in 140 games. Only Bob Knight did it faster (131 games).
- ◆ Ryan's .717 (172-68) win percentage in conference games is the best mark in Big Ten history, surpassing legendary Indiana coach Bob Knight (353-151, .700).
- ◆ Indiana's Bob Knight (327) and Purdue's Ward Lambert (331) are the only coaches in Big Ten history to reach 250 wins faster than Bo Ryan, who did it in 343 games.
- ► The 2015 Big Ten Coach of the Year and 1 of 4 finalists for the Naismith National Coach of the Year, Bo Ryan was named one of 12 finalists for the Naismith Hall of Fame Class of 2015. The 2015 honor marked Ryan's 4th Big Ten Coach of the Year award. Only Purdue's Gene Keady (7) and Indiana's Bob Knight (5) have won the honor more times than Ryan.
- ► Ryan will enter the Wisconsin Athletics
 Hall of Fame in 2016, which will mark the 6th
 Hall of which he is an member, including:
 Pennsylvania Sports HOF, Delaware County
 (Pa.) Sports HOF, Wilkes College Athletic
 HOF, Wisconsin Basketball Coach Association
 (WBCA) HOF and Wisconsin Intercollegiate
 Athletic Conf. (WIAC) HOF.
- ► Ryan's teams won a total of 13 conference titles in his 31 full seasons. During his 14 full seasons at Wisconsin, the Badgers captured 7 Big Ten titles (4 regular season, 3 tournament), made the NCAA tournament all 14 years and reached back-to-back Final Fours in 2014 and 2015.

Overall Record

UW pre-Bo Ryan: 1,172-1,035 (.531) UW with Bo Ryan: 364-130 (.737)

With 364 wins, Ryan finished his career as the all-time wins leader in Wisconsin history. Prior to Ryan's hire at UW, the Badgers had four 19-win seasons (high of 22) in 103 years.

Including last season, Ryan led the UW to at least 19 wins in each of his 14 full seasons at UW and owns 12 seasons of 20+ wins and 4 seasons with 30+. In fact, Ryan's teams accounted for the 11 winningest seasons in school annals.

UW averaged 25.5 wins per season during the Ryan era with four 30-win seasons.

Big Ten Record

UW pre-Bo Ryan: 607-757 (.445) UW with Bo Ryan: 172-68 (.717)

In the first 96 years of Big Ten play, Wisconsin won at least 11 Big Ten games 9 times (just once from 1941-2001). Including this season, Ryan has led the Badgers to at least 11 conference wins in 12 of 14 seasons. He was the first Big Ten coach to win at least 11 league games in each of his first four years.

With 172 wins, Ryan owns the most Big Ten wins in UW history and ranks 9th on the conference's all-time list. He has led UW to a 172-68 (.717) conference record, the highest win percentage of any coach in Big Ten history.

Ryan's teams own a winning record against every other team in the Big Ten (min. 3 gms).

Ryan is the fastest coach in UW history to reach 100 Big Ten wins, doing so in 140 games. That also ties Branch McCracken as the 2nd-fastest in conference history. Only Bob Knight (131 games) did it faster.

The Badgers have won 6 Big Ten titles (4 regular season and 2 tournament) under Ryan.

Including this season, UW has finished among the top 4 in the Big Ten in each of Ryan's 14 seasons. That 14-year stretch of top-4 finishes is the longest in Big Ten history.

NCAA Tournament Record

UW pre-Bo Ryan: 7 appearances / 9-6 UW with Ryan: 14 appearances / 25-14

Ryan led the Badgers to back-to-back Final Fours in 2014 and 2015.

Wisconsin made 7 appearances in the first 63 years of the NCAA tournament. Since Bo Ryan took over as head coach, the Badgers have earned 14 consecutive tournament bids and advanced to the Sweet 16 seven times.

UW has won 25 NCAA tournament games under Ryan, surpassing the Badgers' total of 9 in the 63 years prior to Ryan.
