BADGERS KICK OFF BIG TEN TOURNAMENT

- Wisconsin is the No. 13 seed in the 2016 Big Ten Conference Tournament. The Badgers (7-21, 3-15 Big Ten) play No. 12-seed Northwestern (15-15, 4-14) on Wednesday at 12:30 p.m. CT at Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis. The winner of the game will advance to play fifth-seeded Minnesota (19-10, 11-7) in the second round on Thursday at approximately 1:30 p.m. CT.
- The Badgers are 10-21 in the Big Ten Tournament, advancing to the semifinals in 2002 and 2009. The Badgers lost and overtime game to Purdue in the first round in 2015, falling to 7-9 in opening-round games.

FAST BREAK FACTS

- The Badgers tied for second in the Big Ten in conference-only games with 12.72 turnovers per game. That figure ranks second on the UW season record list behind the 2010-11 mark of 12.44 giveaways per game.
- Senior **Nicole Bauman** shot 6-of-8 from 3-point range at Maryland on Feb. 25 to move into second on the UW record list for triples made with 235. She also moved into fourth in 3-pointers attempted with 570. The senior continues to be the Badgers all-time leader in 3-point percentage at 41.6 percent.
- Redshirt senior **Michala Johnson** is only 34 points away from 1,000 for her career. The 6-3 forward has 966 points and is also on track to set the UW career record for field goal percentage. She is shooting 53.5 percent at Wisconsin.
- Senior **Nicole Bauman** is on track to break the UW season record for free throw percentage, shooting 90 percent (54-of-60) from the line. The senior has made her last 18-straight charity shots. The current record is 88.7 (63-of-71) set by Katie Voigt in 1995-96.
- UW has one of the toughest schedules in the nation this season, ranking 19th for schedule strength by RPI Ratings.com. The Badgers have the fourth toughest schedule in the Big Ten, ranking behind Ohio State (third), Illinois (11th) and Rutgers (15th)
- For the second straight year, Wisconsin has two players with 100-or-more assists on the season. Senior **Nicole Bauman** leads the team with 106 helpers while senior **Dakota Whyte** adds 105 dimes. The duo had 103 and 110 assists, respectively, last season.

2016 BIG TEN TOURNAMENT

The Big Ten Tournament returns to Indianapolis for the 19th time in conference history and remains in the Circle City through 2022. From March 2-6, 2016, the Big Ten Tournament will be held at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. Featuring 13 games over five days, the tournament champion earns the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament.

The top-four finishers in the regular season receive byes in the first and second rounds, and the first two days of the tournament consist of a combined six games. The tournament bracket was announced on Feb. 28, the final day of the regular season.

LAST TIME OUT

- Wisconsin dropped a 68-48 road game to Purdue in its final regular season game Sunday. The Badgers finished the season 7-21, including a 3-15 mark in Big Ten play.
- The Badgers led by as many as five points (9-4) in the first period but Purdue tied the game up, 13-13, with a little over five minutes remaining. The Boilermakers capitalized on back-to-back 3-pointers, giving them a 22-17 advantage with 3:07 remaining in the first quarter. UW battled back to trail 26-24 at the end of the first quarter.
- Wisconsin started the second quarter off by tying the game 26-26 with a jumper by Tessa Cichy. Thanks to two scoring droughts of three-plus minutes by UW, Purdue outscored the Badgers 17-8 in the second quarter, taking a 43-32 lead into halftime.
- UW made four of its first six baskets of the second half to cut Purdue's lead to seven, 47-40, with 6:18 left to go in the third quarter but could get no closer as Purdue made a 3-pointer and a lay up to bring their lead to 52-40 with four minutes to go. The fourth quarter was low scoring, with the Boilermakers outscoring the Badgers 12-4 to provide the final margin of 68-48.
- Johnson had a team-high 18 points followed by Avyanna Young, with 10 points.
- The Boilermakers shot 47.2 percent (25-of-53) from the field, including 60 percent (9-of-15) from 3-point range. Wisconsin shot 35 percent (21-of-60) from the field, including 15.4 percent (2-of-13) from behind the arc. UW got to the free throw line six times, making four for 66.7 percent while Purdue hit 75 percent (9-of-12).
- Wisconsin was outrebounded 37-30, with Nicole Bauman leading the team with seven boards followed by Cichy with six boards.
- Wisconsin turned the ball over 14 times, allowing for the Boilermakers to score 20 points off UW giveaways. Purdue outscored the Badgers 11-0 in bench points.

TOUGH SCHEDULE

- UW has one of the toughest schedules in the nation this season, ranking 19th for schedule strength by RPI Ratings.com
- The Badgers have the fourth toughest schedule in the Big Ten, ranking behind Ohio State (third), Illinois (11th) and Rutgers (15th)
- Wisconsin also ranks 21st in strength of schedule according to RealTimeRPI.com.

ROAD STRUGGLES

- UW failed to win a Big Ten road game for the fourth time in program history, going 0-9 on the road this conference season.
- Wisconsin finished the Big Ten season at 3-15, tying for the third-fewest conference wins in program history. The Badgers also won three Big Ten games in 2013-14, 2012-13, and 1989-90.
- The Badgers are 7-21 overall, which would tie for fourth for the fewest wins in a season. It is the fewest wins for a Wisconsin team since 2002-03 when UW was also 7-21.

CLOSE CONTESTS

- In 11 losses this season, the Badgers have been within single digits in the last quarter of play, including at No. 6 Maryland on Feb. 25.
- Wisconsin has also been within five points in the final period in five games, including Sunday's game at Indiana.

GREAT ASSISTS

- For the second straight year, the Badgers have two players record 100-or-more assists in a season.
- Senior **Nicole Bauman** has a team-high 106 assists (3.79/game) while senior **Dakota Whyte** adds 105 helpers (3.89/game).
- Whyte had a team-high 110 assists (3.79/game) last season while Bauman added 103 assists (3.81/game), marking the first time since 2007-08 that two players recorded 100-or-more assists in the same season.

SCORING STRUGGLES

- After scoring 77 points against sixth-ranked Maryland on Feb. 23, the Badgers struggled to score at Purdue on Sunday. Wisconsin put up just 48 points against the Boilermakers, its second-fewest points in a game this season.
- UW scored 24 points in the first period against the Boilers but tallied just 24 points in the next three quarters combined. Wisconsin scored just four points in the fourth period, a season low point total for a quarter.
- Wisconsin's 77 points at Maryland were its most points since putting up 77 against Minnesota on Jan. 23, a span of nine games.
- On the season, Wisconsin has been getting outscored by an average of 8.2 points per game. The Badgers are averaging 64 points per game while opponents average 72.2 points per game.
- UW ranks 13th in the Big Ten in scoring offense while ranking 11th in scoring defense. Wisconsin is last in the league in scoring margin.
- In Big Ten-only games, the Badgers ranked 14th in scoring offense at 62.3 points per game, allowing 73 points per game, which ranks sixth, for a scoring margin of minus 10.7 points per game, which ranked 13th.
- The Badgers have scored 80-plus points in two games, 70-or-more points in seven games, 60-plus points in 17 games and less than 60 points in nine contests.

PUTTING UP 3-POINTERS

- The Badgers also struggled with their shooting at Purdue on Sunday, hitting just 35 percent (21-of-60) of their shots, including 15.4 percent (2-of-13) from 3-point range.
- Wisconsin has struggled with its shooting from deep at times this season, hitting less than 30 percent in 11 games, including eight Big Ten contests.
- UW has shot 40 percent or better in nine games, including a season-best 75 percent (9-of-12) against Northern Illinois on Dec. 16. That mark would rank second on the Badger single-game record list. Wisconsin also shot 66.7 percent (12-of-18) against Penn State on Jan. 10, which would tie for fifth on UW's record list.
- UW shot 53.8 percent (7-of-13) from 3-point range against Maryland on Feb. 25, their fourth game this season shooting 50 percent or better. It was also the ninth game this year with seven-or-more triples.
- Wisconsin ranks 24th nationally and fifth in the Big Ten with a 3-point shooting percent-

age of .355 (152-of-428), which would tie for second on the UW single-season record list.

- Senior **Nicole Bauman** is 21st nationally and fifth in the Big Ten in 3-pointers per game (2.7), 28th nationally and fifth in the conference in 3-point field goals made (75), and 25th nationally and sixth in the Big Ten in 3-point percentage (.405).
- In conference-only games, UW ranked seventh, shooting 34.9 percent (91-of-261) from deep, and ranks 12th with 5.1 triples per game.
- The Badgers tied a school record by making 12 3-pointers against Penn State on Jan. 10, marking the fourth game in program history with 12 triples.

BAUMAN MOVES UP CAREER LISTS

- Senior **Nicole Bauman** came out of her shooting slump in a big way at Maryland on Feb. 25. The 5-10 guard led the Badgers with 23 points, shooting 8-of-12 (66.7 percent) from the field, including 6-of-8 (75 percent) from 3-point range.
- Bauman also added one 3-pointer at Purdue on Sunday to move into second on the UW record list for triples made with 235. She also moved into fourth in 3-pointers attempted with 570. The senior continues to be the Badgers all-time leader in 3-point percentage at 41.2 percent.
- Bauman has led UW in scoring in 16 games this season, scoring in double figures in a team-best 23 games. She has upped her career total to 1,219 points, which ranks 19th at Wisconsin. Bauman needs 11 points to move into 18th, currently held by Morgan Paige (2010-14) with 1,230 points.
- Bauman picked up her first career double-double with 15 points and tying her career high with 10 rebounds at Nebraska on Jan. 27. It was also the Badgers' first double-double of the season.
- Bauman ties for 18th in the Big Ten with 15.5 points per game. She also leads the Badgers in steals with 43 (1.5/game), which ties for 17th in the conference, and ranks second on the team in assists with 106 (3.8/game), which ties for 14th in the Big Ten. Bauman has 25 blocks this season (0.9/game), which ranks second on the team and is a season-best total for the senior.

PROTECTING THE BALL

- Wisconsin is averaging just 12 turnovers per game the last four contests. UW recorded just 10 turnovers against Illinois on Feb. 17, its fewest TOs since tallying 10 vs. Maryland on Jan. 20. The Badgers also had just 11 giveaways against Northwestern on Feb. 20, 13 turnovers at Maryland on Feb. 25 and 14 giveaways at Purdue on Sunday.
- The Badgers tied for second in the Big Ten in conference-only games with 12.72 turnovers per game. That figure ranks second on the UW season record list behind the 2010-11 mark of 12.44 giveaways per game.
- UW tied a season low with nine giveaways against Penn State on Jan. 10. The Badgers also had nine turnovers against Northern

- The Badgers have 10-or-fewer turnovers in five Big Ten games this season and have recorded fewer turnovers than 10 of 18 conference foes.
- In all games, the Badgers rank sixth in the Big Ten with 14.32 turnovers per game, which would rank second on the UW season record list behind the 2010-11 mark of 14.29 giveaways per game.
- Foes are taking advantage of Badger turnovers, averaging 16.7 points per game off giveaways, compared to 13.0 points per game for UW.
- In Big Ten games, Wisconsin gave up 14.8 points per game off turnovers while scoring 12.9 off opponent giveaways.

SEASON RECORD UPDATES

- Senior **Nicole Bauman** is on track to break the UW season record for free throw percentage, shooting 90 percent (54-of-60) from the line. She has made her last 18 straight charity shots. Current record is 88.7 (63-of-71) set by Katie Voigt in 1995-96.
- Bauman has 75 3-pointers this season, which ranks third on the UW season record list. The 5-10 guard had 80 triples in 2014-15, which ranks second.
- Bauman's 3-point percentage of .405 (75-of-185) would tie for sixth on the UW season-record list. She shot a Badger best 48.8 percent (80-of-164) last season.
- She also shot 42.5 percent (48-of-113) in Big Ten-only games, which ranks fourth all-time. Bauman shot a school record 50.8 percent (61-of-120) last year. Bauman's 48 makes ranks second on the UW conference season list behind her school record 61 triples last season.
- As a team, Wisconsin is averaging 5.43 3-pointers per game, which would rank seventh all time. The Badgers' 3-point percentage of .355 would tie for second all time.
- In Big Ten-only games, UW averaged 5.06 triples per game, which would tie for ninth all time. Wisconsin's 3-point percentage of .349 ranks eighth.
- UW has just 401 turnovers this season, needing to stay below 419 to record the fewest giveaways in a season. The Badgers are also averaging 14.32 turnovers per game, which would rank second all time.

BOARD PROBLEMS

- Wisconsin had failed to outrebound a Big Ten foe until boarding Purdue 39-28 on Feb. 8. UW also outrebounded Indiana, 38-32, on Feb. 14 but has been outboarded by its last three opponents.
- On the season, UW is getting outrebounded 38.2 - 33.6 (-4.6), which ranks 13th in the conference. In Big Ten games, the Badgers were outboarded 38.1 - 31.8 (-6.3), which ranked 13th.
- Opponents are outscoring the Badgers 12.9 - 8.6 (minus 4.3) on second-chance points on the season and 12.9 - 8.8 (minus 4.1) in Big Ten games.

QUARTER STRUGGLES

- The Badgers were outscored by Maryland 21-10 in the second quarter on Feb. 25, marking the 14th time this season that UW has been outscored by 10-or-more points in a period.
- Wisconsin scored just four points in the fourth quarter at Purdue on Sunday, marking the lowest point total in a single quarter by the Badgers this season. UW also tallied just eight points in the second period against the Boilermakers.
- UW has been outscored by 10-plus points four times in the first period, six times in the second period, three times in the third period, and once in the fourth period.

- UW played its most complete game of the season against Purdue on Feb. 8, outscoring the Boilermakers in three quarters while the two teams tied in the first quarter.

LINE LABORS

- Wisconsin has struggled from the free-throw line this season, ranking 13th in the Big Ten at 67.3 percent (274-of-407). UW improved slightly in Big Ten games, shooting 68.4 percent (158-of-231) for 12th in the league.
- UW shot a perfect 4-for-4 from the line at Maryland on Feb. 25, the second time this season shooting 1.000. The Badgers also shot 1.000 (9-of-9) from the line at Rutgers on Jan. 7.
- The Badgers have shot 60 percent or less in seven games while shooting 70 percent or better in 11 contests.
- Senior **Nicole Bauman** leads the Badgers, shooting 90 percent (54-of-60) from the line while in Big Ten-only games, she shot 96.6 percent (28-of-29), missing her only free throw of the conference season at Illinois on Jan. 17. She has made her last 18 straight charity shots. The UW record for consecutive free throws is 29, set by Michele Kozelka in 1989.
- **Dakota Whyte** takes and makes the most free throws on the year, hitting 75.7 percent (78-of-103).

WHYTE OUT

- Senior **Dakota Whyte** scored a career-high 31 points against Illinois on Feb. 17, eight points better than her previous best of 23 points set against Penn State on Jan. 10.
- The 5-8 guard shot career bests of 11-of-20 from the field. She also tied her career best with five 3-pointers while attempting a career-high 11 triples. Whyte added five rebounds, two assists and three steals while recording only one turnover in 39 minutes of play.
- Whyte's career best is the most points for a Badger this season and the most since **Nicole Bauman** scored a career-high 31 points against Ohio State on Jan. 29, 2015.

- The Toronto, Ontario, native ranks second on the team this season with a career-best 12.9 points per game, leading the team in scoring in six games. She has double-figure points in 21 games this season.
- Whyte leads the Badgers with 3.9 assists per game, which ties for 10th in the Big Ten. The guard also ranks second on the team with 1.2 steals per game. She has led UW in dimes in 14 games and in steals in six contests.
- Whyte is shooting a career best 34.6 percent (27-of-78) from 3-point range, setting a season best for triples made. She is also shooting a career-best 75.7 percent (78-of-103) from the free throw line and has a season-best six blocks.

OH MICKEY, SHE'S SO FINE!

- Senior **Michala Johnson** has scored in double figures the last three games, tallying 13 points against Northwestern on Feb. 20, 18 points at Maryland on Feb. 25 and 18 points at Purdue on Sunday. The 6-3 forward just missed her fourth double-double of the season against the Wildcats as she added nine rebounds.
- Johnson had a career-best three straight double-doubles from Feb. 8 - 14. She had 19 points and a season-high 13 rebounds against Purdue on Feb. 8, 15 points and tied her season high with 13 rebounds at Michigan on Feb. 11, and had a team-high 16 points and 10 rebounds at Indiana on Feb. 14.
- Johnson has 11 double-doubles in her career and has 10-plus rebounds in 10 games.
- Johnson has scored in double figures 20 times this season, leading the team in scoring in six games and in rebounding in 12 games. She ranks third on the team with 11.8 points per game this season and leads the Badgers with 6.6 rebounds per game, which ties for 13th in the Big Ten. In Big Ten-only games, Johnson averaged 12.4 points and 6.6 rebounds per game.
- Wisconsin has four double-doubles this season as senior **Nicole Bauman** also had a double-double with 15 points and 10 rebounds at Nebraska on Jan. 27.

- Senior **Nicole Bauman** is averaging a season-best 15.5 points per game. She also has a season-high 25 blocks and 43 steals. The guard has taken and made the most free throws of her career (54-of-60).
- Senior **Tessa Cichy** has a season-best seven blocks.
- Senior **Michala Johnson** has a season best 32 blocks.
- Sophomore **Cayla McMorris** is averaging a season-best 6.5 points and 2.9 rebounds per game. She is shooting a season-best 77.4 percent from the free throw line. McMorris has a season-best nine blocks and 13 steals.
- Senior **Dakota Whyte** is averaging season bests of 12.9 points and 3.89 assists per game. She is shooting a season-best 34.6 percent from 3-point range and 75.7 percent from the free-throw line. She also has a season-best six blocks.

- This game will be the 68th meeting between the two teams. The Wildcats lead the all-time series 36-31 while the Badgers have a 2-1 edge in neutral games.
- The last time the two teams met on a neutral court was in the 2009 Big Ten Tournament with Wisconsin winning 60-51.
- Northwestern has won six straight over the Badgers, including the only meeting this season.

B1G PLAY

- The Wildcats (15-15) wrapped up the regular season in 12th place in the Big Ten standings at 4-14.
- Northwestern wrapped up the regular season with a home loss to Michigan, 70-65, on Tuesday as well as a road loss at Nebraska, 76-67, on Sunday.

WILDCAT FACTS

- Junior Nia Coffey, a 6-1 forward, leads the Wildcats with 19.7 points and 10.0 rebounds per game. Coffey takes and makes the most free throws on the team, shooting 112-of-172 (62.6 percent) from the line. She also has a team-best 57 blocks (1.9/game), which ranks fourth in the Big Ten.
- Senior Maggie Lyon, a 6-2 guard, adds 16.5 points per game. Lyon shoots a team-best 67-of-203 (33 percent) from 3-point range.
- Junior Christen Inman, a 5-10 guard, chips in 14.7 points per game while junior Ashley Deary, a 5-4 guard, adds 12.2 points per game.
- Northwestern leads the Big Ten with 10.3 steals per game with Deary averaging a Big Ten best 4.3 takeaways per game. Inman (1.6/game) and Lyon (1.6/game) also rank in the top 15.
- NU also leads the conference with a turnover margin of +5.8, averaging a Big Ten-best 12.8 giveaways per game while forcing 18.6 turnovers per game.
- The Wildcats rank fourth in the Big Ten with 17.7 assists per game. Deary ranks second in the confer-

ence with 6.7 helpers per game while Inman adds 2.9 per game and Lyon contributes 2.8 dimes per game.

- The Wildcats also rank fifth in the conference in 3-point defense, allowing opponents to shoot just 31.3 percent from deep.

THIS SEASON: NU 71, WIS 53

- The senior pair of Michala Johnson and Nicole Bauman contributed 13 points apiece in an attempt to push Wisconsin past Northwestern, but the effort wasn't enough as the Badgers fell, 71-53, in their last home game of the season.
- Wisconsin battled the Wildcats to a six-point game heading into halftime, as the Badgers trailed, 33-27 after early back-and-forth play.
- NU outscored Wisconsin 19-11 in the third quarter, increasing the gap to 14 points (52-38) as the pair closed out the third period. The Badgers continued to fight in the fourth quarter, but were outscored 19-15, as the Wildcats ended the game with an 18-point margin over UW.
- Bauman and Johnson were the only Badgers in double figures as seniors Dakota Whyte and Tessa Cichy contributed eight and seven points, respectively.
- Johnson led the Badgers in rebounds with nine while Young pulled down six and Whyte grabbed five boards. Northwestern outrebounded Wisconsin 39-30 as two players pulled down double-figure boards. The Wildcats had 13 offensive boards, scoring 21 second-chance points.
- UW shot 36.8 percent (21-of-57) from the field, including 25 percent (2-of-8) from 3-point range. Northwestern hit 46.6 percent (27-of-58) of its shots but just 23.1 percent (3-of-13) from deep.
- The Wildcats also scored well from the free-throw line, hitting 87.5 percent (14-of-16) while Wisconsin shot 69.2 percent (9-of-13) from the line.
- It was the third-straight year that Northwestern spoiled the Badgers' Senior Day.

HEAD COACH BOBBIE KELSEY

FIFTH SEASON

In her four seasons at Wisconsin, Bobbie Kelsey has been building a program the right way. By playing exciting basketball against some of the best teams in the nation, the Badgers are beginning to attract attention across the country.

Kelsey's Badgers have played some of the toughest schedules in the nation. Wisconsin played 14 teams that competed in post-season tournaments in 2013-14, finishing with the 28th toughest schedule. UW had the 15th toughest schedule in 2012-13, playing 18 games against post-season teams. Kelsey's team upset No. 8 Penn State at home in 2013 and also won a game in the Big Ten Tournament for the first time since 2010.

The Badgers have battled some of the nation's best teams, losing 11 games by single digits in 2012-13 and dropping 10 games in 2013-14 by 10-or-fewer points.

UW records have become a matter of fact under Kelsey as the Badgers set six school records in 2011-12, 13 UW single-game or season marks in 2012-13, including the school record for free throw percentage two straight seasons. Wisconsin also broke five single-game or season records in 2013-14.

Individual awards have also come to the Badgers under Kelsey. Michala Johnson earned first-team All-Big Ten honors in 2014, becoming the first UW player named to that team since 2008. Taylor Wurtz and Anya Covington earned All-Big Ten honors in 2012 while Morgan Paige and Jacki Gulczynski were honored in 2013. Nicole Bauman earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors in 2015.

Academic honors have also improved under Kelsey. After only one Academic All-Big Ten honoree in her first season, the Badgers had six honorees in 2013-14, including three-time honoree Morgan Paige. UW tied a school record with seven honorees in 2014-15.

Kelsey came to Wisconsin after four seasons as an assistant at top-ranked Stanford. The Cardinal compiled a 137-14 (.907) record, including a 69-3 (.958) mark in Pac-10 conference play, and advanced to the Final Four each year during her time there. Stanford's streak of four-straight Final Fours is tied for the second-longest streak in NCAA history. Prior to Kelsey's arrival, Stanford had not advanced to the Final Four since 1997.

In addition to coaching at Stanford under Hall of Fame head coach Tara VanDerveer for the last four seasons, Kelsey was a four-year letterwinner at Stanford from 1992-96. She helped the Cardinal to three Final Four appearances in five years as a player, including the 1992 NCAA championship. Kelsey was a team co-captain in 1995 and 1996, voted the team's Most Inspirational Player in 1992 and 1996, and named the team's most improved player in 1993.

Kelsey graduated from Stanford in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in communications. She earned her master's degree from Duquesne University from the School of Leadership and Professional Advancement in Sports Leadership.

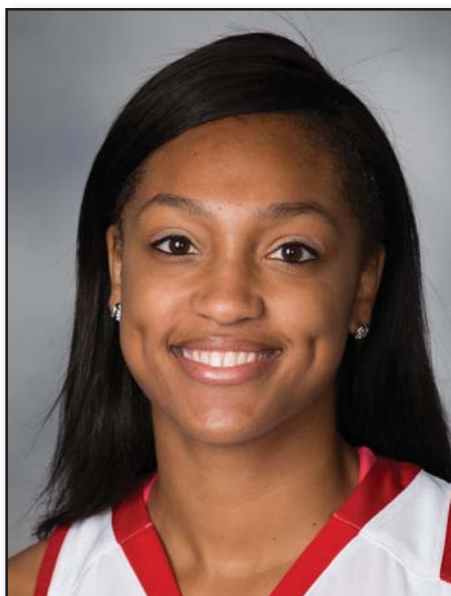

Covington, who played for the University of Wisconsin women's basketball team from 2009 to 2012, has joined coach Bobbie Kelsey's staff as an assistant coach.

Covington, a three-time captain who earned honorable mention All-Big Ten Conference honors as a senior, replaces Alysiah Bond, who left the program last week to become director of basketball operations and technology at Michigan State.

"I'm overjoyed to be back in Madison and working for my former coach," Covington said. "This is an opportunity of a lifetime for me. Not only am I extremely proud to be an alumna from this top-notch university, but I am honored to be back in a position to enhance this program with my energy, passion and the Wisconsin mentality of hard work and toughness."

After graduating with an English degree in 2012, Covington, a 6-foot-2 forward, played professionally in Europe for a season.

The Edwardsville, Illinois, native began her coaching career as a graduate assistant for former UW assistant Kathi Bennett at Northern Illinois in 2013-14. She joined another former UW assistant, Otis Epps, as an assistant at Evansville last season.

Covington is eager to get the Badgers, coming off a 9-20 season, back on the winning track.

"I am very excited to work with the current players, help them develop on and off the court and help each of them reach the greatness that is within them," she said.

Kelsey expects the leadership traits Covington exhibited as a player will serve her well as a coach.

"Anya will attract the kind of high-character, athletically skilled, academically astute recruits we covet because she will put in the time and work it requires," Kelsey said. "She is not afraid of the challenge required to build a first-class program."

Covington is the second coach to join Kelsey's staff this season. Earlier this summer Sasha Palmer was named to succeed Stacy Cantley, who left to join the staff at Western Carolina.

Veteran group fuels optimism for Bobbie Kelsey

Bobbie Kelsey dares to dream big.

Facing perhaps the most crucial season of her career as University of Wisconsin women's basketball coach, Kelsey is putting the power of positive thinking to the test.

"I love my team," said Kelsey, beginning her fifth season as the UW coach. "So I always think they're going to do great. I always think we can beat whomever we're playing. And we believe that, and we go out and play that way."

"We always have a great outlook. But I feel like we're going to have a good team. How good, is yet to be determined."

Kelsey's first four seasons have not lived up to anyone's expectations as the Badgers have compiled a 40-78 (.339) overall record and a 16-50 (.242) Big Ten Conference mark. In the wake of a 9-20 record and the third consecutive 11th-place finish in the Big Ten, Kelsey was denied a fifth-year contract extension last spring.

But with a new season on the horizon, the mood is all upbeat as Kelsey has the most experienced roster of her tenure.

The Badgers return three perimeter senior starters — 5-foot-10 Nicole Bauman, 5-8 Dakota Whyte and 6-0 Tessa Cichy. Bauman was the second-most accurate 3-point shooter in the nation (.488) and the most-improved scorer in the Big Ten, boosting her scoring average by 9.2 points to 15.3 per game. Cichy (+7.8) and Whyte (+4.9) also

were among the top 10 most-improved scorers in the conference.

Also pushing for playing time in the backcourt will be 6-0 sophomore Cayla McMorris, a highly regarded recruit who had an erratic freshman season.

Kelsey is hoping to complement that outside attack with an inside offense bolstered by the return of 6-3 senior Michala Johnson, an All-Big Ten selection in 2013-14 who was granted a sixth year of eligibility after missing most of last season with a torn ACL, and the addition of 6-1 junior Avyanna Young, a transfer from UW-Milwaukee who is eligible to play after sitting out last season.

Johnson, who averaged 16.6 points two years ago after transferring to UW from UConn, is easing her way back in practice. But Kelsey expects her to make a big impact.

"We just expect her to do what she's done in the past," Kelsey said. "She has to be doubled and when she gets back into the flow of things she's going to be that tough cover we need down on the block that we didn't have last year."

Young is being counted on to provide a similar threat. The former Milwaukee King standout averaged 13.3 points and 9.8 rebounds as a sophomore for the Panthers before deciding to take her game to a higher level.

"She just brings a level of aggression that you need in the post area," Kelsey said of Young. "Even though she's undersized for a post she has the jumping ability and the ability to read the defense and go get the ball. If she misses it, she's going to go get it. She's a ball hawk."

As a point guard, Whyte is excited about the prospect of having two inside forces on the floor.

"That's like 25 points that are added to the scoreboard," she said of Johnson's return. "She brings so much to the team. She just cannot be stopped, so it's awesome having her back.

"And Avy is an amazing player. She brings toughness to the team that we haven't had for a long time. I think with her on the court it will remind us that we have to fight every second. She just brings a different spin on things."

The Badgers' interior depth took a hit when Johnson's younger sister, Malayna, was lost for the season by a torn ACL. Rosie Gambino, a 6-4 redshirt senior whose UW career has been sidetracked by injuries, could fill that

void. Mikey Crall, a 6-3 redshirt sophomore, is sidelined by a knee injury.

Kelsey also is excited about the long-term possibilities of redshirt freshman guard Shelly Marble and true freshmen Marsha Howard and Liz Toye.

But for a senior class that has known way too much losing, there is an urgency to turn things around this season.

"I'm biased because I'm a senior," Whyte said, "but I don't want to go down with it not being better than it was my first three years. I think we definitely have a squad that can do amazing things this year.

"I wouldn't say there's pressure. We have an older team so I think those bridges have been crossed because we've been here for almost four years now. I think it's just time to do what we're meant to do."

The Badgers open with an exhibition game Nov. 8 against Minnesota State-Mankato and open the regular season against Louisiana Tech on Nov. 14.

Seniors ready to rise to the top

Tessa Cichy has spent the last four years falling in love with every aspect of being a member of the Wisconsin women's basketball team, but if it all ended today she would leave Madison with a great sense of longing.

She has some notable company in that regard.

"Obviously I've had a great time," said Cichy, a senior guard from Somerset. "I love being here. I love our coaches. I love our team. I love my past teammates. But I don't think I'd be fulfilled."

This from an enterprising former walk-on whose energetic, no-nonsense style earned her immediate minutes as a freshman in 2012-13 and ultimately made her a consistent starter and scorer for the Badgers last season as a junior.

But Cichy has issues with the big picture of her career and, for that matter, so do her fellow seniors: guards Nicole Bauman and Dakota Whyte and forward Michala Johnson.

All four have experienced individual successes over the years, but they've not yet experienced a winning season as a team.

The first of Wisconsin coach Bobbie Kelsey's recruiting classes is 31-58 overall and 11-39 in the Big Ten Conference heading into its fourth and final regular-season opener Saturday vs. Louisiana Tech at the Kohl Center.

There's a belief among the four that all those growing pains are due to pay off this season.

"We have all the tools," said Whyte, a 5-8 point guard from Toronto, Ontario.

"Our last couple seasons weren't the best, but we've slowly been improving," said Johnson, a 6-3 forward from Bellwood, Illinois. "We want to take the things we did in the past and just try to work our way up and dig ourselves out of the hole."

Bauman, a 5-10 shooting guard from New Berlin, said there's no grand objective in mind – for now – other than building on the past and the moment at hand.

"We want to start with smaller goals and build on those goals," she said. "Obviously we want to get there (win a Big Ten title), but we want to take it more slowly."

Bauman, Whyte and Cichy were the top-three scorers for the Badgers last season at 15.3, 11.1 and 9.6 points per game, respectively. All three had at least one Big Ten outing with 20 or more with Bauman accounting for 31 points – including a school-record eight three-pointers – vs. Ohio State.

Everyone is anxious for Johnson, the one-time transfer from Connecticut, to bring her considerable game to that mix. She was an All-Big Ten first-team selection in 2013-14 when she led Wisconsin in scoring at 16.1 and ranked second in rebounds per outing at 7.3.

But after scoring in double-digits five times of the first six games last season, Johnson suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament in her left knee vs. Miami (Fla.) and missed the rest of the season.

Johnson insists she's good to go, but has been monitored closely in practice and sat out two exhibition games leading up to the 2 p.m. opener vs. Tech. It wouldn't be a surprise if she got one more game off before Drake comes to the Kohl Center for a 7 p.m. tip Wednesday.

How important is Johnson to this equation?

"One of the most important keys that we have," Whyte said. "Her being out? That's like losing 20 to 25 points a game right there."

Johnson, a graduate student with a degree in human development and family studies, spends part of her time now doting over younger sister and teammate Malayna. A 6-4 junior center, Malayna will miss the upcoming season with a torn ACL of her own.

The elder Johnson – everybody on the team calls her Mickey – smiled when asked if all the misfortune she's seen with the Badgers is about to turn.

"We've been in the trenches quite some time now, so I feel as though this year could be our year," she said.

Where would you find the pulse of this team? Johnson is a logical choice given her maturity – at 24 she's at least three years older than anyone and else on the team – but you could also try the apartment shared by Bauman, Cichy and Whyte.

"If it's possible I think we're all one heartbeat together in terms of we all bring something different," Cichy said.

"In terms of heartbeat, we all have our moments. I don't think it will be possible to have just one of us and make it work."

Bauman, who set a school record by hitting 48.8 percent of her 3-point tries last season, said the three friends and roommates motivate one another every day.

"We all kind of build off each other, I think," she said. "Watching Tessa go hard makes me want to go hard."

The Badgers went 1-12 on the road in 2012-13, lost eight straight to close out 2013-14 and had two lengthy losing streaks last year minus Johnson. Was there a low point? Whyte used a broad brush stroke to identify it.

"Not fulfilling the potential we knew we had," she said.

Now that potential is brimming with confidence.

"What's nice is we have a lot more experience on the court," Bauman said.

"We have the athleticism to do things we haven't done before," Whyte said. "We have the personnel to do things we haven't done before. It has to be greater than it has been my first three years here."

Cichy, whose younger brother Jack is a sophomore inside linebacker for the Wisconsin football team, said the

overall chemistry within the women's basketball team is the best she's seen it.

"It's been amazing to see," she said.

"They're like my little sisters," Michala Johnson said. "We all have each other's back. We try to help each other even when we come at each other. It might seem kind of mean and kind of hard, but we know it's coming from a good place. We want to make each other better."

Cichy said the seniors have waited four years to have a directive voice on where the program is headed.

"I don't feel like I've had enough of a say and I think that's how we all feel," she said. "That we haven't left enough of a mark on the program for it to be okay with us leaving it how it is now."

"The legacy we kind of want to pass down is that you don't give up. You may not be the most talented. You may not be the best shooter or the best defender. But you can be good at all of them if you work hard. That's what we want to leave."

Johnson plans to do her part.

"I want to give it my all," she said. "I want to go out with a big bang."

Bobbie Kelsey excited about class of 6 players inked for 2016

Nobody had to tell Bobbie Kelsey that she needed a big 2016 recruiting class.

With a lineup full of seniors and the clock ticking on her University of Wisconsin women's basketball regime, Kelsey knew she needed to put together a class that was deep in numbers and talent.

It was a challenging assignment for Kelsey and her staff, coming off three consecutive 11th place finishes in the Big Ten Conference with an overall record of 40-78 in her four years. Those numbers have led to the inevitable rumblings about her job security.

"We're still at the point where kids kind of don't want to come because they want to know who else you got," Kelsey said. "We're still fighting that."

"And to be honest, some of them think I'm not going to be here. I can't guarantee anything. I plan to be here, I want to be here and the administration has been very supportive. But this year is a big year for us, and other people are using that against us."

Against that background, Kelsey put together a six-player class that she hopes will provide the foundation for the program going forward.

Three of the players signing a National Letter of Intent on Wednesday have been ranked in the top 100 by various recruiting services: 6-foot-3 forward Abby Laszewski of Avon, Connecticut; 6-1 forward Courtney Fredrickson of Minnetonka, Minnesota; and 5-8 guard Gabby Gregory of Irving, Texas.

The rest of the class includes 5-5 guard Suzanne Gilreath of Fridley, Minnesota; and two state players, 6-2 forward Grace Mueller of Verona and 5-5 guard Alona Johnson of Milwaukee Riverside.

"They have a chance to make history," Kelsey said.

"They can be the ones that turn it around and help you get those real high ranking ones. People want to play with good kids. These six kids have to come in here and play."

Kelsey is excited about the versatility of Laszewski and Fredrickson, who have the size and strength to post up around the basket and the shooting range out beyond the 3-point line.

Laszewski, who's dad Jay played for the Badgers in the 1980s, committed to Kelsey a year ago. At the time she was somewhat under the radar and missed time during the high school season with an injury. But she had a big summer on the AAU circuit and rocketed up the recruiting lists.

"When she blew up," Kelsey said, "people were asking, 'Who's looking at her? Aw, she's going to Wisconsin, dang.' That was nice sitting there knowing she's ours. She's really tough inside and she can really shoot it too."

Ditto for Fredrickson, a left-hander who is considered one of the top three or four players in Minnesota. She missed the summer season after having surgery to repair a lingering shoulder issue.

"She made the decision not to play this summer because she wanted to be ready for us," Kelsey said. "That tells you what kind of kid she is. She may have dropped in some rankings, but we know what she can do and so does everybody else. That was a huge get for us."

"I see someone who's going to be a problem to guard. She can guard your post but your post can't guard her. That's a problem."

Gregory was the last player to commit. She originally committed to Kansas State but had a change of heart and started reconsidering her options. Some of the schools who originally recruited her had already filled their needs by then, so she was looking at Wichita State and New Mexico State until her trainer Adrian Washington gave his old friend Kelsey a call.

"He's a straight shooter and he just wanted to see her get in a good situation," said Kelsey, who went to Texas to watch Gregory work out and meet with her family. "He trusts us. Gabby's a sweet kid and she works really hard."

"Gabby aspires to be on that level. She works hard. She can handle the ball and shoot the 3. She's a playmaker. It was a blessing for us that she was available."

The Badgers had a spot available for Gregory because they missed out on point guard Andrayah Adams, an AAU teammate of Gilreath. Adams opted for St. John's, but Gilreath, who set the Minnesota prep record with 128 3-pointers last season, connected with UW where her brother David was a wide receiver and return specialist for the football team.

"We couldn't assume she'd want to come here just because her brother did," Kelsey said. "But it opened the door."

"You've really got to guard her, so that will open things up for us. I've been to seven Final Fours and if you don't have shooters you're not going to score. She's really good and she's a worker."

She's not big but she's quick."

Quickness is the top asset of Johnson, who was the first of the group to commit more than two years ago. She was part of a group of Milwaukee players Kelsey started recruiting shortly after getting the UW job, but the others either chose to go elsewhere or couldn't qualify academically.

"People say we're not recruiting the state, but that's not true," Kelsey said. "We wanted to target the Wisconsin kids and she got on board right away."

"She's scrappy. She's little, so she's hard to contain. She's like a waterbug. It kind of hurts you on the defensive end because she can't guard everyone."

Mueller wasn't highly recruited, but she caught the eye of Kelsey and her staff during the team camp this summer with her work ethic and intangibles.

"Grace was always on our radar but we just weren't sure because she's small for a post," Kelsey said. "But what she lacks in size, she makes up for in smarts and understanding. You watch her and she goes up with two hands, she's got these broad shoulders. She makes up for lack of height with all the stuff you can't teach."

Michala Johnson excited for second chance heading into season opener

Michala Johnson's motto for life is, "With every negative there is a positive."

It is an appropriate selection for Johnson, whose basketball career has been marked by alternating negatives and positives.

It was just last December that Johnson's career with the University of Wisconsin women's basketball team appeared to have been ended by a torn anterior cruciate ligament in her left knee suffered in the sixth game of the season.

But even though she went through Senior Day ceremonies in February, Johnson will be back in the Badgers lineup today when they open the regular season against Louisiana Tech at the Kohl Center.

Johnson, a 6-foot-3 center, was granted a rare sixth season of eligibility by the NCAA and she's looking forward to a second chance to put a proper finish on her UW career.

"It was kind of stressful because I didn't know if I was going to be able to get a medical redshirt," she said. "I was blessed to be able to come back because I wanted to finish grad school."

"It's been a long process and finally I can play. So I'm excited."

The same can be said for her teammates and coach Bobbie Kelsey.

"That's like 25 points that are added to the scoreboard," senior point guard Dakota Whyte said. "She brings so much to the team. She just cannot be stopped, so it's awesome having her back."

Kelsey has been taking it cautiously with Johnson in practice so far and didn't play her in the two exhibition games. But she expects her to be ready to go and make a difference on the court.

"Anytime you have a post that you have to double, who can do some things that maybe others on your team can't, she is only going to take pressure off of other people," Kelsey said. "Anybody that we have ever played does not leave Michala one-on-one with their post player."

Johnson earned first-team All-Big Ten Conference honors in 2013-14 when she averaged 16.6 points and 7.3 rebounds.

That, however, has been the only season in her five years in college in which she played full time. She was a lightly used reserve her first two seasons at UConn and then sat out the next season after transferring to UW. Going back even further, her high school career at Montini Catholic in Lombard, Illinois, was limited by two ACL injuries.

While she was recovering from her most recent ACL, Johnson's career took an unexpected twist when she was selected in the third round of the WNBA draft in April by the New York Liberty.

"I was really surprised," Johnson said. "My eligibility was up so I can understand why my name was thrown in the bucket, but I wasn't expecting it at all. I was focusing on trying to come back and that happened. I'm pretty happy and excited about that."

Johnson and her family consulted an attorney about her options and she decided to return to UW to finish her grad school program and pursue one last year as a Badger before going off to join the Liberty.

"It was no big rush because I wouldn't have been ready to play in the WNBA anyway," she said. "They still have my rights so after the season I'll be off to New York."

In the meantime, she's also able to offer support to her younger sister Malayna, who suffered a torn ACL during preseason workouts.

"Her rehab is going well," Michala said of Malayna. "I'm there supporting her. She watched me go through it three times so she kind of knows how it is. We live together so I help her out every day."

Just turning another negative into a positive.

Guard Cayla McMorris hopes to write better chapter this season

Cayla McMorris isn't just a college basketball player. She's also an aspiring basketball analyst.

McMorris, a sophomore guard for the University of Wisconsin women's basketball team, spent a good part of her summer writing about the WNBA's Minnesota Lynx for Swish Appeal, part of the SB Nation array of websites focused on college and professional women's basketball.

McMorris started blogging for Swish Appeal while at Park Center High School in Brooklyn Park, Minnesota, where she wrote about her recruiting process.

When managing editor Mike Robinson offered her a chance to be an unpaid intern and blog about the Lynx — who would go on to win their third WNBA title behind stars such as Maya Moore, Seimone Augustus and Lindsay Whalen — McMorris jumped at it.

"I've always wanted to be a sportswriter or broadcaster," she said. "I'd go to their games, write up a blog and send it to Swish Appeal and they'd post it. That was a lot of fun. I loved it. It really opened up my mind for what I want to major in, sports broadcasting."

"Watching it you become more of a student of the game. I think that carries over to the writing field, looking at a lot of key stuff and putting that on paper."

So what would McMorris, the basketball blogger, write about her UW team that's coming off two poor performances in non-conference losses to Drake and Dayton?

"We have a lot of room to improve," McMorris said. "I don't think these first two losses define us at all. I think we have a lot of talent and we just have to all work together. If we all start to contribute and know our roles we'll be able to produce more and win."

The Badgers (1-2) will get a chance to prove that optimism isn't misplaced this weekend in the SDSU Thanksgiving Classic in San Diego. They face Delaware (2-1) Friday night and then will play host San Diego State (0-4) on Sunday.

Their prospects will be enhanced if McMorris can replicate her play in an otherwise dismal loss at Dayton on Sunday. She matched her career-high with 17 points in

28 minutes off the bench, hitting a career-best three 3-pointers.

“Cayla was a bright spot,” coach Bobbie Kelsey said. “You see what she can do.”

Expectations have been high for McMorris ever since she committed to UW, becoming Kelsey’s first top 100 recruit. She was ranked No. 48 nationally by Prospect Nation, 70th by Peach State Basketball, 86th by ESPN Hoop Gurlz and 88th by Blue Star Basketball.

But after scoring in double figures five times in her first 10 games, she went 21 games before getting out of single digits on Sunday. She was scoreless seven times in her last 19 games last season.

While Kelsey was excited about bringing a player of McMorris’ stature to the program, she understood there would be a learning process as McMorris transitioned from primarily playing inside in high school to a perimeter player in college.

“It hasn’t come easy but it never does,” Kelsey said. “To Cayla’s credit she worked on her outside shot. She played a lot of post in high school and she didn’t have a shot when she got here. She’s worked on it.”

McMorris, aka McBuckets since her sophomore year in high school, said her defense is ahead of her offense and she’s focused on improving her ballhandling and her shot. Sunday’s game also helped boost her confidence.

“I would definitely say it’s a confidence builder but there’s a lot more I have to work on and I’m hungry to improve,” she said. “I’m just working on my game every day, being more comfortable with dribbling the ball and being able to create my own shot. I know it’s definitely a key at the (Division I) level is being able to create off the dribble.”

While she has been the sixth player so far, that could be subject to change.

“She could crack that lineup,” Kelsey said. “I have no favorites when it comes to that.

“If she keeps this up, if she keeps getting stronger and keeps working on her shot and wanting to be coached, the sky’s the limit for Cayla.”

Struggling Wisconsin shifts focus to accountability

The Wisconsin Badgers (3-4) host the Florida Gators (7-1) Thursday evening in their first home game since Nov. 18.

The Badgers’ five-game road trip featured anything and everything you could imagine: a buzzer-beater win, an overtime loss, countless slow starts, a trip to the zoo, face paint and even Krispy Kreme donuts. But the biggest change of the road trip was a new starting lineup.

For the first time since her freshman year, senior point guard Dakota Whyte will not be announced in the Badgers’ pregame introductions. Whyte has come off the bench in three of the last four games, with the lone exception being a game she missed entirely due to illness.

Coming off the bench has allowed Whyte to see the game differently.

“It’s definitely a way for me to see the game without being in it right away,” White said. “You get to see where the gaps are. Where the defense is. What we’re doing wrong, what we’re doing right. What we should continue to do.”

But even more than its impact on the court, her relegation to the bench has been a wake-up call for Whyte.

“I think that when your starting spot is compromised it gives you the awareness that you gotta play every game like it’s your last,” Whyte said.

Sunday afternoon, after falling behind the Marquette Golden Eagles 20-2 seven minutes into the first quarter, the entire Badgers’ team was in need of a wake-up call.

That’s why after yet another disappointing defeat, the Badgers have practiced this week with jerseys or T-shirts without the Wisconsin logo visible. Instead, due to their inside-out T-shirts, the Badgers look more like an intramural team than a Division I athletic program.

“We gotta work for the Wisconsin on our chest,” Whyte said.

Sixth-year senior Michala Johnson has certainly worked for the front of her jersey in the past. But this season, Johnson has been inconsistent to say the least.

Johnson's 17 points against the Golden Eagles this weekend made Sunday's loss her best offensive game this season. But after scoring a combined seven points in the Badgers' prior two games, she has been far from the consistent force Wisconsin needs her to be.

"It's been kinda hard. We've been kinda streaky and inconsistent but we're working on it," Johnson said.

But on top of the offensive inconsistencies, the Badgers' effort level has also been even more of a problem. Slow starts, turnovers and rebounding struggles are pretty good indicators of just that.

Johnson admitted to being a bit fatigued in the first month of the season, a factor she conceded might have had a role in her struggles on the glass.

"I've just been trying to find a person and turn around quickly and box out. I've been kind of there, but I have to push back. That's about being mentally and physically tough," Johnson said.

The Gators visit Madison riding a seven-game win streak. Their lone loss, at the hands of the Temple Owls opening night, featured zero defensive resistance from either team.

The Gators are a lot like one of the Badgers' prior opponents, the Drake Bulldogs, in terms of their depth. Florida plays 10 players at least 10 minutes per game, a tactic that is designed to tire teams out. The Badgers seldom play more than eight players, but nevertheless are confident in they can upend a much deeper Florida team and stop the Gators' chomp.

"When they can sub five for five and it's fresh legs going against five people that have been in the game the whole time, we're going to have to adjust to that," Whyte said. "But if we play efficiently and look for our stuff we'll be fine."

Transfer Avyanna Young eager to return to form after sitting out season

It's almost like Avyanna Young is trying to make up for lost time.

But the faster she goes, the farther she gets from her destination.

After transferring from UW-Milwaukee, Young has been in a hurry to make an impact for the University of Wisconsin women's basketball team. So far, however, it's been mostly slow going as Young has struggled to recapture her form after sitting out a season.

"It's like I have to remember how to play a game again," Young said. "But I know I'm going to put a full game together ... coming up soon."

Young will get another chance to come up with that full game tonight when the Badgers (3-6) close out their non-conference season against Northern Illinois (4-3) at the Kohl Center.

For Young, a 6-foot-1 redshirt junior power forward, the goal is to get back to playing like she did two years ago as a sophomore at Milwaukee when she averaged 13.3 points and 9.8 rebounds.

"That was a fun season," Young said. "What I have to get back into now is just taking my time. That's what I did my sophomore year."

"My freshman year I was just like a roadrunner. Now again, I feel like I'm back in my freshman year, like a roadrunner. I have to adjust and take my time and look at the basket when I'm finishing. My coaches are helping me and my teammates believe in me, so I'm just going to keep pushing."

Through her first nine games as a Badger, Young is averaging 6.9 points and 6.2 rebounds, shooting just .381 from the field — well below her .525 shooting percentage as a sophomore.

Coach Bobbie Kelsey is confident Young can regain that touch — if she can just stop rushing so much.

"She's pressing," Kelsey said. "Avy's really excited to be out here and all that energy is going into the shot. Some of the shots she's missing, she's by herself."

"She knows that. It bothers her. She's in here all the time trying to slow herself down. She goes so fast. How do you help a kid with that, when that's how they operate?"

"But you'd rather that than have a kid who's standing around doing nothing. You can always pull them back, but it's hard to light the fire."

Young earned Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association first-team All-State honors her senior year at Milwaukee King when she averaged 17.1 points, 10.1 rebounds and 2.8 steals.

She committed to UW-Milwaukee coach Sandy Botham as a junior, but by the time she arrived Botham had been replaced by former Badgers player and assistant coach Kyle Rechlicz.

She averaged 4.3 points and 4.3 rebounds in a reserve role as a freshman before having her breakout sophomore season. That triggered a desire to test herself against a higher level of competition and after receiving her release from Milwaukee, she was pleasantly surprised to learn UW was interested in her.

She provided Kelsey with something of a sneak preview, with a combined 15 points and 15 rebounds in two games against the Badgers.

“She hurt us when we played them,” Kelsey recalled.

The toughest part for Young was dealing with the NCAA requirement for basketball transfers to sit out a season before becoming eligible. She almost didn’t make it, as she left the team shortly after practice began in October last year, only to return on her birthday, Nov. 2.

“The biggest thing for me was not playing,” Young said. “That was so hard. And then being here at such a huge campus, it was something I just wasn’t used to. I was nervous, I was scared, as any person coming to a new culture would be. I just wanted to go back home. I wasn’t playing; I just felt useless.

“Coach Bobbie gave me till the end of the semester to make my mind up, which a lot of coaches wouldn’t do. I just figured this is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, so this was the place for me.”

Roichelle Marble eager to face the school where her dad became a legend

For someone who grew up in a black-and-gold Iowa Hawkeyes world, Roichelle “Shelly” Marble has adjusted quite well to her cardinal-and-white University of Wisconsin existence.

Marble’s two worlds will collide tonight when the UW women’s basketball team (6-8, 2-2 Big Ten Conference) takes on the Hawkeyes (12-4, 2-2) at the Kohl Center.

While not quite as dramatic as if the game were being played in Iowa City, Marble says it will be a special

occasion to play against the school where her late father, Roy, remains a legend.

“It is special, because that’s where I’m from,” said Marble, a redshirt freshman guard.

For as long as she can remember, Marble received frequent reminders of how special it was to grow up a Marble in Iowa.

“People would always come up to me when they’d hear my last name and they’d go, ‘Any correlation to Roy Marble?’” Marble said. “I’d say, ‘Yeah, that’s my dad.’ They’d be like, ‘Oh, my God.’”

“It was always like that since I was little, before I even knew how good he was. People used to always say stuff about him but I never understood it until I got older.”

Roy Marble was indeed good. He set the Iowa scoring record with 2,116 points in a career that ran from 1985-89. He was a first-round NBA draft choice of the Atlanta Hawks, although his NBA career was brief and undistinguished. But his status as a Hawkeye icon remains untarnished.

“Everyone looked at my dad like he was a superhero,” Marble said. “I’m like, yeah, he’s a superhero because he makes me breakfast in the morning. They were talking about his acrobatic skills on the court, but I didn’t see that side of him.”

Shelly grew up to become a three-time All-State player for Des Moines East High School, earning first-team honors as a junior and senior.

But unlike her half-brother, Roy Devyn, who chose to follow in his father’s footsteps and play at Iowa, where he wound up fifth on the career scoring list (1,694 points), Shelly decided she wanted to go her own way.

Originally, she committed to attend Drake, but had a change of heart and reopened her recruiting during her senior year. Her path eventually led to UW, which also happened to be the first school to offer her a scholarship. That offer came from former coach Lisa Stone during the summer before her freshman year at East.

“I was only like 13 and I wasn’t really sure at the time how good I could be,” Marble said. “When I got that offer it just solidified how good I could be and just encouraged me to work harder and harder.

“I guess it just means I’m supposed to be here.”

Marble's UW career, however, got put on hold when she suffered a torn right Achilles tendon during summer workouts.

It was about the same time that her dad was diagnosed with terminal stage four cancer. He survived about a year before passing away on Sept. 11 at age 48.

"It was hard because I didn't really know how bad it was because I was here," Marble said. "I didn't get to see him as he got worse. I was in denial for the longest time because I didn't see him go through the transition. Honestly, it might've been better that I was here instead of there because it made it a little easier to handle.

"I knew that every time I talked to him it might be the last time I got to talk to him. I said everything I wanted to say. I have no regrets. Plus, I have a good support system here."

A big part of that system is her teammate and roommate Cayla McMorris.

"Being around her is just a blessing," McMorris said. "I know she's been through a lot and I really think our friendship has gotten stronger through what happened with her dad. Shelly's not really an emotional person but I just tried to be there when she needed someone to talk to."

Through it all, Marble has seen her role on the Badgers grow. She's averaging 4.1 points overall, but is up to 6.3 points in the first four Big Ten games. She's surprised coach Bobbie Kelsey with her 3-point accuracy, shooting 52.2 percent (12-for-23) overall and 63.6 percent (7-for-11) in Big Ten play.

"She's got ice water in her veins," Kelsey said. "She's hit some big shots. She can handle the ball, but just has to refine some things. She's willing to listen and she's coachable."

Marble was working on her shot at the Kohl Center when word of her father's passing reached Kelsey. "We were all crying as if it was our dad," Kelsey said. "I was thinking back to when Roy and Carla dropped her off her freshman year and a year later he's gone.

"You knew it was going to happen but you're never prepared for it. So her dad's not going to walk her down the aisle, he's not going to see his grandkids, he's going to miss a lot. He never got to see her play in college.

"I told her the way you honor your dad is by representing him well. Shelly's the salt of the earth. I wish he could've seen her play. He'd be very proud of her."

Tough Love

The sibling rivalry between Tessa and Jack Cichy long ago gave way to mutual respect, the foundation of a two-way support system both have leaned on while finding success in sports at Wisconsin. Along the way, the former walk-ons have followed strikingly similar paths made possible by the traits they inherently share, not least of which are toughness and a love of competition.

Photo shoots are harmless and playful, maybe a little sappy by design. And that can be a good thing, even if they are staged. So it was for Wisconsin's sister-brother duo of Tessa and Jack Cichy.

Last week, they posed for the shot on the cover of this issue. Siblings tend to be competitive, especially if they're close in age, so it was not a complete reach to have them lock hands and arm wrestle.

"We're both physical and we're both pretty tough," said Tessa Cichy, 22, a senior guard on the UW women's basketball team. "We kind of play with a chip on our shoulder."

Nobody would dispute that after the Holiday Bowl heroics of Jack Cichy, 20, a redshirt sophomore linebacker for the Badgers. Cichy had three sacks on consecutive plays against USC.

Despite sitting out the first half because of a targeting penalty that was assessed in the final regular season game at Minnesota, he was able to make up for lost time.

Cichy was named the Most Outstanding Defensive Player of the bowl after posting a team-high nine tackles in Wisconsin's 23-21 victory over the Trojans.

"I didn't want it (the targeting penalty) to be the last thing I remembered," he said. "I didn't want that one play to carry over and affect the last half of football that I could play this season.

"I wanted to leave my own stamp on the year."

That same day, Dec. 30, Tessa Cichy learned that she had mononucleosis -- forcing her to miss the Big Ten opener against Indiana the following day at the Kohl Center. She ended up missing two weeks.

"It was about 40 minutes before the (Holiday Bowl) game," said her dad, Steve Cichy. "and I put my phone on

and had her on FaceTime. When the screen comes on, she's in tears."

The Badgers' win over USC helped take her mind off things.

"She was sick in bed but I know she was still yelling at the TV," Jack Cichy said. "When I came back to my phone afterwards, she had a text, 'You're awesome. I love you.'"

While their birthdays are about 16 months apart, the Cichy siblings have the same drive and work ethic; a testament to the way they were raised and the commitment they have made to their sport.

That was echoed by Steve Cichy, a former Notre Dame defensive back. "I always believed if you sign up for something," he preached to them, "you play it to the best of your abilities."

Cichy recounted how the kids played for different AAU coaches when they were younger.

"They were totally different people (the coaches) and they came up to me and my wife Lisa at separate times," he related. "But they both said, 'Your kids play this sport like they need it (to survive).'"

Over their UW years together, Tessa and Jack Cichy have found out how much they need each other. It wasn't always like that when they were growing up, especially in middle school. But it is now.

"They're wonderful friends, best friends," Steve Cichy said. "They have an incredible amount of respect for each other. They realize what each has had to go through to get to where they're at."

Jack Cichy singled out Tessa for the stability that she has provided him. "She has always been kind of a rock," he said. "When I've needed to talk to her about something, she's always been there."

Tessa Cichy, in turn, acknowledged the bond that she has developed with her brother.

"As we've gotten older, we've become more appreciative of each other," she said. "Having him here to share in this student-athlete experience at Wisconsin has been great.

"We're in a place we love. We're doing things we love. We're with people we love."

Family is very important to both of them. Their older sister, Rochelle, graduated three years ago from UW. She

works for BMC Software and still lives in Madison. She was a good athlete, too.

"She's a little 5-6 girl, blond hair, cute," Steve Cichy said. "And she holds the record at Hill-Murray for throwing a football 41 yards. She throws a tighter spiral than I do."

Rochelle served a vital role in the relationship between her younger sister and brother.

"When me and Tessa would scrap -- we kind of clawed at each other -- Rochelle would always be the mediator," Jack Cichy said. "She was probably the most level-headed of all three of us."

That would bring a smile to Steve and Lisa Cichy's faces.

"With all of our kids, the University of Wisconsin has been a wonderful experience," Steve said. "They give me a hard time because I went to Notre Dame and nobody wanted to go where Dad went."

Tessa and Jack Cichy were both nurtured on the wisdom and motivation of Vince Lombardi even though the iconic Green Bay Packers coach died in 1970 -- nearly three decades before they were born.

Both have been fueled by Lombardi's words.

"Obviously, we're from Wisconsin, we're Packers fans, so Vince Lombardi is a legend," Tessa Cichy said. "We actually have one of his quotes in one of our rooms at home."

Jack Cichy pointed out that it was the idea of their parents to highlight the words on a big poster board in the workout room of their home in Somerset, Wisconsin, a village of 2,732 along the Apple River about 20 miles from Hill-Murray High School in the St. Paul suburb of Maplewood.

"Gentlemen," Lombardi begins, "we are going to relentlessly chase perfection knowing full well we will not catch it because nothing is perfect.

"But we are going to relentlessly chase it because in the process we will catch excellence. I am not remotely interested in just being good."

Jack was able to recite it almost verbatim. Tessa cited another famous quotation from the 1910 "Man in the Arena" speech delivered by Teddy Roosevelt at the Sorbonne in Paris.

“It’s not the critic who counts,” Roosevelt said, “not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles or where the doer of deeds could have done them better.

“The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood”

Miley Cyrus has a tattoo of the Roosevelt quote on her arm. Cadillac has used it for a television commercial. Tessa listed the quote in her online biography.

“To sum it up,” she said, “it’s better to have tried and dared than to have never tried at all.”

The late Sid Cichy could not have summed it up better than his granddaughter.

In the ’60s and ’70s, Cichy led Fargo Shanley High School to 11 undefeated seasons and 16 state football championships in North Dakota. He retired in 1977 with a record of 231-38-3.

Less than 10 years later, Cichy, who coached Roger Maris, was inducted into the National High School Hall of Fame. His class included Red Grange, Jack Nicklaus, Dan Gable and Win Brockmeyer.

The latter was Elroy (Crazylegs) Hirsch’s high school coach in Wausau.

Sid Cichy passed away in 2006. Tessa was 12.

“He still has an influence on me,” she admitted. “I still have my mom’s parents who come to all of my games and they’re very supportive, but just knowing my grandpa Cichy was a legend makes me proud. It’s very nice to know that he’s looking down from above.”

Jack can get emotional when he’s talking about his grandfather.

“Looking back on everything, he had a huge impact on me,” he said. “It’s really indescribable how big of an impact he had. A lot of it is internally. I remember asking my mom or dad, ‘What would Grandpa have done in a situation like this?’ And that helped get me through a lot of things, not just football.”

As a high school sophomore, Cichy traveled with his Hill-Murray football team to North Dakota for the season opener against Fargo North.

“We got settled at the hotel the Friday before the game,” he recalled, “and I asked my dad to take me to the cemetery where grandpa was buried.

“So I was able to be with him before my first varsity football game. I’ll always remember that.”

Since then, Jack has written his grandpa’s initials on his wrist band before each game.

“I do it more subtle now,” he said. “I tape it over. But I know it’s there. It’s always there.”

• • • •

Steve and Lisa Cichy have always been there for their kids but they’ve never pushed sports on them. Almost never.

Steve played for his dad at Fargo Shanley and never lost a game while winning four state titles. But he strayed from the Cichy clan in that he went to Notre Dame instead of North Dakota State, where his three brothers played football.

He was a two-year starter at safety for the Irish and had a hand in one of the most memorable comebacks in college football bowl history, a 35-34 win over Houston in the 1979 Cotton Bowl otherwise known as the Chicken Soup Bowl.

Notre Dame trailed 34-12 with 7:37 remaining when Tony Belden blocked a punt and Cichy returned it 33 yards for a touchdown. That opened the door for the Irish and quarterback Joe Montana, who was battling the flu and hypothermia. A bowl of chicken soup was what the doctor ordered.

From there, Montana rallied Notre Dame to the improbable win; one of the early steps on his road to stardom and the Hall of Fame. “He had a calmness about him,” Cichy said. “When the game was on the line, his demeanor never changed, he always had the confidence that he could do it.”

Lisa Cichy can hold her own in any sports conversation. She was on a New Richmond High School basketball team that competed in the first girls’ state tournament in Madison. She later played one year at Marquette before going to law school at the UW.

“We never pushed our kids to do anything,” Steve said. “I’ve always been a believer that you expose them to as many things as possible and you let them decide.

“Jack will probably kill me for saying this but Lisa and I weren’t sure when he was 10 years old if he ever wanted to play sports because he didn’t show that much interest.”

Jack had no problem with what his dad was saying because it was true.

"My friends would come over and they would want to go play catch and I kind of wanted to play Legos," he said. "At that point in my life, sports weren't high in my life.

"My parents didn't force it and that was good. Eventually I grew a love for it. It was probably around the sixth grade that I started to realize how much I liked football."

But he had some physical limitations back then.

"He was scrawny," Tessa said. "It was difficult for him to gain weight."

"In the eighth grade," Steve said, "he was 5-7, 120 pounds."

After bulking up to 132, he played linebacker on the Hill-Murray freshman team.

"It's a night-and-day difference from how I am now," sighed Jack, now 6-2, 223.

But it took a lot of work, especially in the weight room, and perseverance to get to the Big Ten.

"There was a time when he was a junior in high school," Steve said, "when I thought the kid could probably play college football but I never really thought at the Division I level."

Before this season's Northwestern game, Steve had dinner on Friday night with former UW quarterback Brooks Bollinger, who coached Jack for one season at Hill-Murray.

"We looked at each other and we were thinking the same thing," Steve said. "Did you ever think that Jack would be in this position (starting for the Badgers)? I said, 'Quite honestly, no.'"

Jack, in part, was pushed to succeed in high school by the success of his sister, Tessa.

"It pushed me to be better," he said. "It might have been selfish on my part but she had her name out in the papers a lot and I wanted that for myself. It gave me a little motivation.

"It was also nice having someone who was going through the same stuff in sports, the ups and downs. When she went to state for basketball, I was able to focus on that. I loved watching her play."

There was some friction between Jack and Tessa during those formative years.

"Typical brother-sister kind of thing," Tessa said. "We had the same groups of friends and I didn't like it when he talked to my friends. That kind of thing."

"Middle school was awful," Jack interjected. "At that point, we were really close and a lot of her friends were friends with my friends. Stupid stuff like that. But that faded away.

"It was pretty much nonexistent my sophomore and junior year. We were focused on helping each other out in whatever we could. We both realized we needed that support system."

Tessa received offers from a variety of schools but eventually chose to walk on at Wisconsin.

"I hated the process," Tessa confided. "Everyone loves it -- getting pampered or whatever. But, for me, I didn't really like it.

"They (schools) would send me letters constantly, questionnaires. And I would get to the point where I didn't even look at them. I had my mom throw them in a box."

Steve and Lisa were concerned because they both felt, "She had resigned herself internally to not play college basketball," Steve said. "It was the only time that we forced our kids to do anything."

On spring break of her senior year, the family vacationed in Europe and Steve and Lisa had a heart-to-heart with their daughter on the steps of the Paris Opera House.

"We just told her, 'We don't want you to look back five to 10 years from now and say, 'I wish I would have done that,''" he said. "So give it a try, see it through for one year.

"If you don't like it after that year, you can do what you want, no problem."

Tessa took their advice.

"I don't like to regret things," she said.

And four years and nearly 100 college games later, she has no regrets. She quickly earned a scholarship the second semester of her freshman year and developed into a key player as an upperclassman.

"I think I've handled it pretty well," she said. "I have my fellow seniors and we're on this ride together.

Unfortunately, I missed four games with the mono. That's obviously a bummer. But it actually put the season into perspective for me.

"When I was out, I was thinking, 'Well, this is what it's going to be like in two months after you're done with the season.' It was a little preview and I didn't like it.

"It made me cherish the time I do have here a little bit more. I'm OK with what I get when I get it (playing time) and I'm more appreciative of the spot that I'm in."

Tessa will graduate in May with a degree in women's studies and a certificate in global health. Less than a year ago, she went to Spain and Morocco as a part of a UW course on human trafficking. She was moved by what she saw on the continent of Africa.

"It's something I'll never forget," she said. "We saw people lining the road and just waiting to be picked up and taken across the border into Spain. None of us had ever experienced that before. And it's really important to have those experiences to know how lucky you are."

Jack Cichy recently spoke to a group of Blackhawk Middle School students. It was arranged by a teacher who just happened to be his aunt. The kids had a bunch of questions.

"And I kind of told them my story," said Cichy who, like his sister, walked on at UW. After seeing limited action as a true freshman and redshirting his second year on campus, Cichy was rewarded with a scholarship last summer.

That story will soon have a new chapter based on a new UW defensive coordinator with the departure of Dave Aranda to LSU. Cichy was here for all three of Aranda's seasons with the Badgers.

"We were all surprised that he was able to stick around after Coach (Gary) Andersen left," Jack said. "So having him here for this past year was awesome for my development and all of our guy's development and I think that will only help us going forward.

"He called me the night he made his decision (to leave) and we had about a 20-minute conversation. He told me -- which I believe -- that his scheme doesn't mean a thing if we're not the ones doing it. That's the great thing about our defense and that will carry over in the years to come.

"We're a very football savvy group. We all kind of understand that each guy has to do his 1/11th, so no

matter who our new coordinator is, we're going to keep that mindset and succeed."

Cichy, the fifth-leading tackler on the defense with 60 total stops, has the versatility to play inside linebacker or outside linebacker depending on what the team needs.

His performance against Southern Cal was certainly eye-opening and earned him considerable national recognition, though he confessed that he was a little uncomfortable with the attention.

"When I'm off the field, I like to be reserved and not say a whole lot," he said. "I'm fine with that. When I'm on the field, I'm a different person."

Watching his son record three sacks on one possession almost left Steve Cichy speechless. "It was surreal," he said. "It's the only word that I can use for it."

Laughing, he added, "I went 0-for-4 against USC when I played them."

Returning that blocked punt for a score against Houston in the Cotton Bowl was definitely a thrill. But was it a bigger thrill than witnessing the natural sack trick in the Holiday Bowl?

"I'll take what Jack did -- 100 times out of 100," Steve said. "Jack will forever be etched in the annals of Wisconsin football with what he did.

"But I asked him, 'Are you ready to start over again?' Because it's a clean slate next season with a new defensive coordinator. He said, 'I'm ready.' He's not going to rest on his laurels."

How did a 207-pound walk-on linebacker get to this point anyway?

"It's a testament to him," Steve said. "He has unbelievable instincts. He's smart. He's a student of the game. And part of that comes from his grandpa."

Part of who Jack Cichy is as a football player also comes from Tessa Cichy?

"He feeds off her toughness," Steve said. "She took a charge in the Wake Forest game on a girl that was probably 70 pound heavier and that girl went down like a ton of bricks.

"After the game, Tessa's comment to someone was, 'What did you think was going to happen?' She's not one to back down."

Neither is her “little” brother. So who does win an arm wrestling match if it was for real?

“I do today,” Jack said. “Five years ago, probably me. Ten years ago, her.”

Cichy catches glimpse of the other side

Senior reflects on experiencing an abbreviated break from basketball for the first time in her career

Adele’s hit song “Hello” from her latest album 25 broke an internet record this week, needing only 87 days to reach one billion hits on YouTube. And while Wisconsin senior guard Tessa Cichy hasn’t quite taken a billion hits in a Badger uniform, she’s not far off. Like Adele, though, Cichy recently received an abrupt “hello from the other side.”

Her broken heart became apparent less than 48 hours before the New Year when Cichy contracted mononucleosis and encountered a glimpse of what life without basketball will be like.

While at home for a few days just before her final semester of college was about to begin, Cichy felt she had a sore throat coming on. Assuming it would pass, just like any other sore throat or common cold, Cichy returned to school, but was surprised to see her health continue to deteriorate.

While on the surface her sore throat had devolved, it had actually just evolved into a rash that initially started on her chest and eventually moved up to her neck and facial region. And while it didn’t really itch, when Cichy’s rash spread to her face, she knew something was wrong.

She went to her local physician and, after taking blood, her doctor informed her she had contracted mononucleosis.

Cichy was perplexed. How could simple a rash and sore throat evolve in mono, especially during basketball season? Her doctor even told her “it was the weirdest case of mono she’d ever seen.”

But no matter how unusual her symptoms were, Cichy was unable to play and it couldn’t have come at a worse time for both herself and the Badgers.

After five days of practice, Cichy was fully prepared for the Badgers’ Big Ten opener on New Year’s Eve against

Indiana when she was told the news. To make matters worse, her brother Jack Cichy, a linebacker for the Badger football team, was about to play in the biggest game of his UW career: the Holiday Bowl against USC later that evening.

Jack was suspended for the first half of the game due to a targeting penalty issued a few weeks earlier in the second half of the Badgers’ win over Minnesota, which prompted Tessa to tweet out #freejack multiple times throughout the Badgers’ first 30 minutes of action against the Trojans.

Little did the world know that only hours later the more accurate hashtag would be #freetessa.

And Tessa needed to be freed.

The next day against Indiana, she was barred from entering the locker room. She couldn’t even sit on the bench, and instead was forced to sit just behind press row, across the floor from her teammates. Initially she was banned from even showing up to practice, but after receiving word she could enter the building, she was informed she had to sit alone in one of the corners of the Kohl Center.

When the team hit the road for Big Ten play against Michigan State and Rutgers, Cichy stayed behind in Madison, watching her teammates play on TV.

For Cichy, the experience showed her a glimpse of what her future holds, but it came just a little bit earlier than she could have ever anticipated.

“Knowing that I didn’t have that much time left, it was tough not being out there. My timetable is very short because I’m a senior, and having that cut even shorter was very depressing for me,” Cichy said. “It was a very eye-opening experience too. It was like, ‘oh my gosh, this is what it’s going to be like when the season’s over.’ So it kind of put things back into perspective for me a little bit.”

Cichy’s epiphany was profound for someone who had been playing organized basketball since she was six years old. And while she loves competing, her bonds with her teammates are what she will truly miss the most.

“It’s the competition, I love it. But being a part of a team is so much fun because not only is it exciting for your own successes, but you have other people cheering for your successes. And you get to cheer for other people’s successes,” Cichy said. “To me that’s what’s most fun about it. Someone does something well, you all work

together, scramble, play defense and get a stop, that's exciting and that's what I'll miss the most."

Cichy hadn't missed a game due to injury or illness since her seventh grade AAU team. And after a four game absence to start the Big Ten season, head coach Bobbie Kelsey eased Cichy back into the lineup by having her come off the bench, something both agreed was necessary after almost a month of inactivity.

Wednesday night in the Badgers' 75-62 loss to the Nebraska Cornhuskers, Cichy started for the first time since contracting mono. Not only did Cichy hear her name in the starting lineup for the first time this calendar year, but she never left the floor, playing the full 40 minutes for the first time this season. Cichy finished the game with 10 points and two rebounds, but struggled defensively, especially for her standards.

Nevertheless, Cichy is enjoying her final stretch with the Badgers, knowing full-well both that the end of her career is coming and what it's going to feel like.

"[My goal is] just to have fun and make the most of the opportunities both that I'm given, and us as a team are given," she said. "I do want to have fun and obviously winning is fun."

Seniors' legacy extends beyond the court

Despite mixed results throughout their careers, women's basketball seniors relished time at UW

In the eyes of many sports fans, an athlete is often solely measured in terms of their wins, losses and statistics. However, to a college athlete, their experience at a university goes way beyond those measures. To most college athletes reflecting on their career, the ability to grow and develop into a stronger and better person through playing a college sport is their standard metric.

Throughout the first few years the seniors on the Badgers women's basketball team had at UW, they were so focused on winning they did not fully comprehend what it meant to play "Wisconsin basketball." But now, as the season is coming to a close, seniors Nicole Bauman, Tessa Cichy, Michala Johnson and Dakota Whyte took some time to reflect on how Wisconsin basketball has helped develop them into the people that they are today. In light of the struggles since these seniors, in addition to

Rosanna Gambino, arrived, the impact UW basketball has had on them is not adequately reflected in the 42-78 combined record in the past four years.

To Bauman, who is from New Berlin, Wis., Wisconsin basketball has always been about playing with pride.

"I was lucky enough to play here my sophomore year of high school in the championship game and we actually won state on this court, and ever since then the floor has just been the world to me," Bauman said, referring to why playing at UW is so special. "For me and for Tessa and for [Avyanna Young] it's playing for your home state. Just playing for your home town and representing."

For Whyte, who is from Toronto, Canada, she understands the impact Wisconsin basketball has had through a different light.

"Definitely to never quit," Whyte said. "That's the number one thing that being a Badger is all about, men's side and women's side."

In addition to Badger basketball eliciting a sense of pride and determination for these seniors, UW basketball has impressed on the players the significance of putting teammates and peers above themselves. Cichy realized the importance of leaving a selfless legacy after teammate and fellow walk-on Lexy Richardson told Cichy that her attitude represents what it means to wear the Wisconsin 'W'.

"It was very rewarding knowing I had that impact on people who I respect and basketball players who I care about," Cichy said. "I think that was very special to me, having Lexy say that about me [after the senior day game], because I respect her so much and it's nice having your teammates say stuff about you. Not only does it remind you why you're here, but it reminds you that people care and that you do make a difference if it isn't through wins."

For these seniors, understanding the importance of Wisconsin basketball, and buying into its selfless nature, has helped this veteran corps see improvements in their personal life.

"It's just about being patient throughout this whole process," Johnson said, referring to the frustrating 3-15 Big Ten conference record, and 7-21 record overall for UW this season. "It's been a long season for us, it's been up and down. Of course, I wish we had more ups than downs, but I mean just being positive throughout the whole process."

Similar to the composure that Johnson has learned to embrace, Whyte has had to learn to be patient throughout the duration of her career.

"I remember my first practice here I couldn't make a three so I ran out of the gym and I laid on the floor like, 'I can't do this,' Whyte said. "But it showed me that once you put your mind to something you can continuously play."

Clearly, Whyte's extended patience and embracing of the Wisconsin "no-quit" philosophy has allowed her to expand her game over her last four years at UW. Whyte scored just 2.4 points per game and averaged a 13.3 shooting percentage from behind the arc as a freshman but has improved to 13.1 points per game (second on the team) and a 34.2 3-point shooting percentage this year.

Just as Whyte saw her game expand throughout the duration of her career, so did Cichy. Cichy, however, saw the most improvement in her leadership and interactions with her teammates.

"I've learned so much not just about myself but the world around me and how to interact with people. I think that's what I will miss the most about playing basketball. It's the team aspect because that is what really means the most to me," Cichy said. "Interacting with other people and how to succeed with other people is something that I have learned and relearned and that's something that I will always appreciate from my experience here. It's gotten me prepared for the real world."

For Cichy, the Big Ten tournament will be the final basketball games of her career, so the fact that Badger basketball has allowed her to see improvement in her personal interactions will be invaluable in the "real world." Bauman, Johnson and Whyte, conversely, do expect to continue their basketball careers after college. Bauman expects to play in Europe, Johnson in the WNBA (after a tryout with the New York Liberty) and Whyte for her Canadian national team. Still, just like Cichy, the improvements they have seen throughout their career will continue to be important in their lives going forward.

These seniors, who have experienced constant ups and downs in their career, consider Wisconsin basketball an invaluable source of their personal development.

"I don't regret anything," Cichy said. "Everything that's happened to this point has gotten me to where I am today, and I like where I am today. That's all you can ever ask for."

Seniors Nicole Bauman, Dakota Whyte and Tessa Cichy learn from losses

They came in sharing a common aspiration. And they leave four years later with those hopes unrealized.

Nicole Bauman, Dakota Whyte and Tessa Cichy signed on four years ago as the core of Bobbie Kelsey's first recruiting class, aiming to lay the foundation for a new level of success for the University of Wisconsin women's basketball program.

Little could they imagine that as they prepare for their final game at the Kohl Center Saturday against Northwestern (1 p.m., Big Ten Network), that they would have experienced twice as many losses (76) as victories (38). The numbers are even more demoralizing in Big Ten Conference play, with just 14 wins and 51 defeats. Coming off three consecutive 11th-place finishes, they find themselves tied for 12th this season.

Clearly, not what any of them signed up for, but each has learned over the years to make the best of a trying situation.

"No one ever thinks they're going to go to college and always be near the bottom," said Whyte, the starting point guard for most of the past three seasons. "This struggle, these four years of not being at the top have taught me so much and helped me in so many ways.

"I didn't expect it but I'm not mad about it. I'm not bitter but you find ways to see the positive in it.

"Coach Bobbie always talks about how maybe it's for a reason. Maybe you guys have to go through this so the next four years there's greatness."

Cichy, who came to UW as a walk-on but quickly earned a scholarship and has started for two seasons, said the experience has been particularly challenging.

"A lot of us on the team have always been winners," Cichy said. "We like to win at everything. I'm very competitive and this has really taken a toll. It's been a blow to my competitive nature.

"I'm still going to go out there and compete to the best of my ability, but it's been tough. I would've liked to have left a better legacy."

In a contrarian sort of way, Cichy believes the experience with losing has been good for her.

“You learn just as much in losing, probably more than you do in winning,” she said. “How to deal with losing is a special kind of skill to have. Obviously, nobody likes to lose but I think this experience has made me a stronger person, made me more resourceful, made me look internally more.”

Bauman has had the most individual success of the trio. Her 1,176 career points rank 19th on UW’s all-time scoring list with a good chance of passing former teammate Morgan Paige. She’s also third in career 3-pointers (227) and has a chance to surpass Jolene Anderson’s record of 248. Her career 3-point shooting percentage of .410 ranks No. 1.

While Bauman would gladly trade her personal accomplishments for more team success, she’s learned to take it all as part of the total educational experience at UW.

“It’s not what you expect and not what you want when you come in,” Bauman said. “You want to get angry, you want to get frustrated and play the blame game. But in the end you just have to keep your head up and keep going.

“We, obviously, would like to end the season better, but all in all I love this school. Just going through this, you learn a lot that will help you out in the real world.”

Indeed, the real world beckons for this senior class. Bauman will graduate in December with a degree in management and human resources from the School of Business. She will intern this summer at the Manhattan Sports Business Academy in New York and hopes to play overseas before settling on a career path.

Whyte will graduate in May but needs to return in the fall after playing with her native Canadian National Team this summer to complete her degree in community and non-profit organization management. She hopes to eventually collaborate with her mother’s non-profit group or start her own.

Cichy will graduate in May with a degree in gender and women’s studies with a certificate in global health and after some traveling hopes to work in the global health field.

Those three will be honored on Senior Day after the Badgers (7-18, 3-12 Big Ten) face Northwestern (3-12, 14-13).

They will be joined by three other seniors: Shannon Malone, who was part of the original recruiting class but saw her career ended prematurely by injuries; Michala

Johnson, who transferred to UW after two seasons at Connecticut and went through Senior Day ceremonies last year before being granted a sixth year of eligibility; and Rosie Gambino, a transfer from Iowa State who finally got some playing time this season after sitting out last season with a foot injury.
