**Last Meeting:** W, 4-3 -- Penn State scored first at the 4:49 mark of the first period, but goals by Jedd Soleway, Jason Ford, Matthew Freytag and Corbin McGuire built the Badgers a 4-1 lead in the second period. Penn State pushed in the third, as they outshot UW 21-2 and scored twice, but UW held on for the 4-3 win. Frosh goalie Matt Jurusik stopped 46 shots for the March 5 win. The game followed one night after a 2-1 Penn State victory. Luke Kunin scored UW's lone goal, while senior Adam Miller stopped 28 saves in defeat for UW.

**Penn State Series Notes:** The teams meet for the 16th time ... UW snapped a seven-game losing streak in the series with its 4-3 victory on March 5 at the Kohl Center ... UW head coach Mike Eaves has connections to Pennsylvania, having spent two stints as an assistant coach with the Philadelphia Flyers (1989-90 & 1993-94), two seasons as head coach of the AHL's Hershey Bears (1991-93) and three seasons as an assistant coach with the Pittsburgh Penguins (1997-2000) ... four Badger letterwinners have hailed from Pennsylvania, most notably goaltenders Mike Richter and Shane Connelly ... PSU forward Eric Scheid is the son of the Jim Scheid, who played at Wisconsin from 1977-81. Jim passed away last August ... Wisconsin's last conference sweep was at Penn State, coming March 7-8, 2014, with a 4-2 victory and 3-2 overtime win ... UW met Penn State in UW's first-ever Big Ten Tournament game, winning 2-1 on March 21, 2014 at the Xcel Energy Center on the way to the 2014 crown.

### Key Notes to Consider

► Sixth-seeded Wisconsin (8-18-8, 3-13-4-2 Big Ten) begins its postseason at the 2016 Big Ten Tournament, opening up with third-seeded Penn State (20-12-4, 10-9-1-1 Big Ten) on Thursday at 4 p.m. CT in the quarterfinals. The winner will play second-seeded Michigan (22-7-5, 12-5-3-2 Big Ten) in the semifinals on Friday at 4 p.m.

All games of the tournament, which take place at the Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul, Minnesota, will air on BTN.

► The Badgers are on an eight-game winning streak at Xcel Energy Center, winning the 2014 Big Ten Tournament, the 2013 WCHA Final Five and the 2010 NCAA West Regional in the building during the streak. UW's last loss at Xcel Energy Center was a 2-0 defeat to St. Cloud State on March 19, 2010 in the 2010 WCHA Final Five semifinals.

► Wisconsin closed out its regular season last weekend by splitting at Minnesota. The Badgers won 4-3 last Friday, before falling 4-1 last Saturday.

Penn State was swept last weekend at Michigan, losing 7-1 and 6-1. PSU owns a three-game losing streak, all on the road, and has dropped four of its last five contests.

► Wisconsin and Penn State met two weeks ago at the Kohl Center, with the Badgers defeating the Nittany Lions on March 5 by a 4-3 score. PSU won the night before, 2-1.

UW is 1-3-0 against Penn State this season, winning the most recent game, 4-3, dropping a pair of one-goal games, including one in overtime, and losing 4-1.

► UW freshman goaltender Matt Jurusik (La Grange, Illinois) has totaled 137 saves in three appearances against Penn State this season to average just under 46 saves per game against PSU. That total including a 54-save, 4-3 overtime loss and a 46-save, 4-3 victory.

► UW freshman forward Luke Kunin (Chesterfield, Missouri) leads the Badgers with three goals and five points in four games against PSU, scoring UW's lone short-handed goal of the season in those contests. Sophomore defenseman Jake Linhart (Brookfield, Wisconsin) is the only other Badger with more than one goal against the Nittany Lions with two goals. Linhart's three points against PSU are tied with Cameron Hughes (3 assists) for UW's second-highest total against Penn State.

## KUNIN-HUGHES-BESSE LINE

► The line of freshman Luke Kunin (8 goals, 4 assists), sophomore Cameron Hughes (3 goals, 8 assists) and junior Grant Besse (4 goals, 8 assists) have played together in 10 of the last 11 games and have combined for 35 points during those 10 games, including 15 goals and 20 assists.

► Freshman forward Luke Kunin tallied two goals last weekend at Minnesota, giving him eight goals in his last nine games and nine goals in his last 11 contests.

Kunin leads the Badgers with 18 goals and is in position to become the first UW rookie since Dany Heatley scored 28 goals in 1999-2000 to lead the Badgers in goals. The 18 goals are also the most for a UW freshman since Heatley's 28.

Kunin's 31 points make him the first UW rookie to reach 30 points since Nic Kerdiles tallied 33 points (11 goals, 22 assists) in 32 games during the 2012-13 season. The 31 points are good for second among Big Ten freshmen, while his 0.94 points per game ranks seventh nationally among freshmen.

Kunin sits one back of UW's point lead. The last UW rookie to pace the Badgers in scoring was Kyle Turris, who had 35 points during the 2007-08 season.

Kunin has points in a career-best six games, tallying five goals and eight points during the active streak.

He scored another goal in the last minute of a period last Friday, giving the Badgers 12 goals in the final minute of a period. Kunin ranks second in the country with four of those, while his seven points in the last minute are also second. He has nine goals and 14 points in the first and last minute of periods, which both lead the country.

Kunin finished conference play as UW's leader with 13 goals and 21 points in Big Ten play. His 13 goals ranked fourth among all Big Ten skaters, while his 21 points shared eighth. Both ranked second among Big Ten freshmen.

► Junior Grant Besse's two-goal game last Friday gave him nine goals and 12 points over his last nine games against Minnesota, including his scoreless night last Saturday. Besse has five multi-point games in the last nine games against the Gophers. In seven of those nine games, he has at least one goal. He is also 2-for-2 against Minnesota in shootouts, including a shootout winner on Jan. 16, 2015.

The junior forward leads the Badgers with a career-high 32 points on 10 goals and a career-high 22 assists. He is one goal off his career goal-scoring high.

Besse has six points (3 goals, 3 assists) in his last five games.

Besse's power-play goal last Friday was his first of the season, while his empty-net goal marked the team's first empty-net tally of 2015-16 and marked his first game-winning score of the year.

► Sophomore forward Cameron Hughes (Edmonton, Alberta) had points in four-straight games and nine of his last 11 contests, before going pointless last weekend at Minnesota. He has four goals, 10 assists and 14 points over that stretch.

Hughes recent stretch gives him five goals and 24 points in 31 games this season, which ranks fourth for the Badgers.

## ALL ABOUT THE TEAM

► Wisconsin's victory last Friday over No. 19 Minnesota gave it consecutive victories over ranked opponents for the first time since the Badgers swept then-No. 1 Minnesota at the Kohl Center on Feb. 6-7, 2014.

► UW has been tied or in the lead during the third period in 25 of its 34 games, sporting an 8-9-8 record in those contests.

Wisconsin is 7-0-4 when entering the third period with a lead.

► UW's second period has been its best for most of the season, with UW scoring 44 of its 91 goals in the second frame.

The number has balanced out lately, with UW scoring 17 first-period goals, 16 second-period goals and 14 third-period goals in games since the start of January.

► UW's sophomore class ranks fourth in the country among its peers with a 3.18 points-per-game scoring average. The group

has totaled 108 points on 36 goals and 72 assists. Air Force (3.94 points per game), Notre Dame (3.53) and Holy Cross (3.36) are the only schools doing better with their sophomore classes.

UW's freshmen are 12th in the country with a 2.53 points-per-game average.

► The Badgers have 20 of their 91 goals in the first or last minute of a period this year.

► The Badgers have overcome multi-goal holes to avoid defeat on three occasions this season.

The most recent came Jan. 9 against Ohio State when UW overcame a 4-2 deficit for a 4-4 tie.

The others were Northern Michigan on Oct. 10 (3-0 deficit in third; 3-3 tie) and Michigan on Dec. 5 (trailed 2-0 in first; 6-6 tie).

► The Badgers have scored 12 goals in the final minute of a period this season.

Three of the last-minute goals were scored with UW skating with an extra attacker and resulted in ties.

Junior right winger Grant Besse had one in the third period vs. Northern Michigan on Oct. 9 that provided a 2-2 draw (19:18).

Sophomore defenseman Tim Davison had one in the third session vs. Ferris State on Oct. 23 that resulted in a 5-5 tie (19:40).

Freshman left winger Luke Kunin had one in the third period vs. No. 6 Michigan on Feb. 13 that gave UW 4-4 tie (19:33).

The Badgers have pulled their goaltender looking to tie at the end of games 12 times this season.

► UW posted its eighth tie of the season on Feb. 26 at Ohio State, tying the school record of eight ties set during the 2003-04 campaign.

The Badgers had tied 11 consecutive overtime games and were unbeaten in 12 consecutive overtime contests before losing a 4-3 overtime contest on Jan. 15 at Penn State. The Badgers went 1-0-11 over a span that dates back to March 22, 2014 and the Badgers' 5-4 overtime victory over Ohio State in the championship game of the 2014 Big Ten Tournament.

## PLAYER NOTES

► After going 18 goals without a game, junior forward Jedd Soleway now has goals in consecutive contests after scoring on the power play last Friday night. Soleway's sixth of the season is one shy of his career high from last season. His 10 points are a career best.

The Badgers are 4-0-2 when Soleway scores a goal.

Soleway leads the way in the faceoff circle for the Badgers, ranking fourth in the Big Ten and 17th in the country with a 58.8 percent win percentage. He is 201-141 on faceoffs this season. His 58.3 percent success rate last season ranked 11th in the country.

► Frosh forward Seamus Malone has points in seven of nine games (2 goals, 6 assists). He shares sixth among Big Ten rookies with 26 points.

► Sophomore forward Ryan Wagner, who is tied for second on the Badgers with 10 goals, has gone eight games without a goal, recording just one assist during the stretch. He still ranks fifth on the Badgers with 22 points. He had two goals and five points as a frosh.

► Corbin McGuire (Ridgefield, Connecticut) has played four consecutive games on defense, as well as eight of the last 12 games as a blue liner after skating his first 52 career games as a forward.

He has two of his three goals and points this season while playing on the blue line. That

includes his first-career, game-winning goal against No. 14 Penn State on March 5. He has five goals and seven points in 64 career games. He has two goals and is plus-3 in his eight games on defense.

► The combination of Luke Kunin (31 points) and Malone (26 points) gives UW two freshman with at least 20 points in a season for the first time since 2009–10 when Craig Smith (8-25=33) and Justin Schultz (6-16=22) both eclipsed the mark.

Kunin sits second among Big Ten rookies with 31 points, while Malone shares sixth.

Malone leads the Badgers with 11 power-play points (1-10=11), which is good for a share of eighth among all Big Ten skaters.

► Sophomore defenseman Jake Linhart's (Brookfield, Wisconsin) eight goals leads UW rear guards and ranks fourth on the team. Linhart's goal total is tied

for second among Big Ten defensemen behind Michigan's Zach Werenski, who has nine.

Linhart also leads UW defensemen with 18 points, which is tied for sixth among Big Ten blue liners. Kevin Schulze led UW defensemen last season with 11 points.

With two more goals, Linhart would become the first UW rear guard to reach at least 10 goals since Justin Schultz tallied 16 times during the 2011–12 season.

He is tied for most goals for a Badger defenseman since Schultz with Jake McCabe (2013–14) and John Ramage (2012–13).

Since 2000, only Schultz (18 in 2010–11 and 16 in 2011–12), Jake Gardiner (10 in 2010–11), Brendan Smith (15 in 2009–10) and Tom Gilbert (12 in 2005–06) have scored at least 10 goals from the blue line.

► Wisconsin is 8-9-5 when freshman forward Jarod Zirbel (Green Bay, Wisconsin) is in the lineup. The rookie has a goal and four points in 22 games played.

► Senior defenseman Kevin Schulze led the nation in 2014–15 with an average of 2.66 blocks per game, 0.11 shots-per-game better than Bemidji State defenseman Sam Windle (2.55). Schulze's 93 blocks were four shy of Windle's national lead.

As a team, UW ranked 10th in the country with an average of 14.83 blocks per game.

This season, teammate Eddie Wittchow ranks sixth in the nation with an average of 2.48 blocks per game. Schulze ranks 24th with a 2.03 blocks-per-game mark. Wittchow ranks 14th with 77 blocks, while Schulze ranks 25th in the country with 69 blocks.

► Four Badgers have skated in at least 100 career games, with senior defenseman Kevin Schulze leading the way at 147 games played. He has missed just one game his entire Badger career, the second one his freshman season. He has played in 146 consecutive games.

Senior defenseman Eddie Wittchow (122 GP), and junior forwards Grant Besse (102 GP) and Jedd Soleway (101 GP) are the other current Badgers in the 100 games played club.

No other Badger has played in more than 69 career games.

► Senior Eddie Wittchow has four assists in his last six games and has six points in 31 games this season. He was pointless in 25 games last season as a junior. He is still looking for his first goal since sophomore season, a stretch of 75 games.

### SPECIAL TEAMS

► UW's power play went 2-for-5 last weekend at Minnesota, as special teams played a large role in the outcome of both games. Last Friday, UW was 2-for-3 on the power play, while also scoring a goal 4-on-4 and on an empty net. Saturday, the Badgers allowed two power-play goals, a short-handed tally, and an empty-net goal, in their loss to Minnesota.

For the season, UW is 22-for-114 on the power play for a 19.3 percent success rate, good for fourth in the Big Ten and 24th in the nation. UW is 10-for-60 (16.7 percent) on the power play in Big Ten action, which also ranks fourth.

Over the last six games, UW has had more than two power plays in a game twice, with the high, the seven power-play chances it got in its 4-3 victory over Penn State on March 5. During that same six-game stretch, UW has been whistled for more than two power plays twice, including seven last Saturday in its 4-1 loss at Minnesota.

Like this week's opponent Penn State, the Badgers have allowed nine short-handed goals this season, which is tied for the second most in the country.

► UW's penalty kill was a strength for much of the season, but has allowed at least one power-play goal in each of the last five games, including two in its most recent game. UW's penalty kill still ranks third in the Big Ten at 82.3 percent (102-124). In Big Ten games, UW's kill is fifth at 78.6 percent (55-70).

Wisconsin's lone short-handed goal of the season came against Penn State. The Nittany Lions lead the nation with 12 short-handed tallies, with three of those coming against UW.

#### MISCELLANY

▶ Fan voting is underway online for the WHA-TV Jim Santulli 7th-Man Award. Named for the producer who helped start Badger hockey broadcasts on Wisconsin Public Television in the 1970's, the Jim Santulli 7th Man Award is presented to the winner in April. This is the 36th year the trophy will be awarded.

▶ UW faces one of the tougher schedules in the nation this season, with an especially grueling stretch to start the campaign. The Badgers played six of their first 12 games against teams ranked in the top five of the preseason USCHO.com poll, with at least one game against four of the top five teams.

Of its 34 total games, Wisconsin will play 14 against teams ranked in the top 13 of the USCHO.com preseason poll. Only three of UW's series this year are against a team not receiving votes in the preseason poll.

▶ Wisconsin will serve as host school for the 2016 NCAA Frozen Four set for April 7-9 at Amalie Arena in Tampa, Florida.

The Badgers last played host to the NCAA Frozen Four in 2006 when it was held at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee. The Badgers won the championship that season, defeating Boston College, 2-1, in the title game.



▶ Five Badgers were captains of their teams before arriving on campus including Kevin Schulze (Hill-Murray), Cullen Hurley (Academy of Holy Angels) and Jarod Zirbel (Notre Dame Academy), who each captained their high school teams, as well as Luke Kunin who served as a captain of the U.S. Under-18 Team and Patrick Sexton (Penticton) in the BCHL. Hurley also co-captained the Muskegon Lumberjacks in the USHL. Eddie Wittchow (co-captain) and Grant Besse (assistant captain) will earn their stripes this season as captains of the Badgers.

▶ Wisconsin boasts 13 skaters who have championships on their resumes. Three Badgers (Besse, Davison, Zirbel) own high school state titles, two (Rockwood, Sexton) own BCHL titles, Hughes won an AJHL championship, Malone won a USHL crown, McGuire won an EJHL championship and Keryluk owns an USPHL win. In addition, Kunin won a under-18 world title and Jurusik won the NAHL regular-season crown. Others include Wittchow's USHL western conference victory and Soleway's BCHL division triumph.

▶ Head coach Mike Eaves is behind the bench for his 14th season at Wisconsin. The Badgers own one NCAA title (2006), two Frozen Four appearances (2006, 2010), seven NCAA tournament appearances and two conference tournament titles (2013, 2014) during Eaves' tenure.

Eaves has seen 28 of his former Badgers go on to play in the NHL, as well as over 60 of his former players go on to play some sort of professional hockey (NHL, AHL, ECHL, overseas). Fifty NHL drafted skaters have played at Wisconsin under Eaves.

▶ Wisconsin hockey boasts five new staff members including associate head coach Luke Strand, assistant coach JB Bittner, director of hockey operations John Hamre, video coordinator Emily Engel and primary care Dr. Andrew Watson.

▶ For the new coaches, associate head coach Luke Strand came to UW from a year as general manager and coach of the first-year Madison Capitols of the USHL. He played college hockey for UW-Eau Claire. New assistant coach JB Bittner, who played his college hockey at Ohio State, arrived in Madison from a two-year assistant coaching stint for the USHL's Tri-City Storm in Kearney, Nebraska.

#### 2014-15 vs. 2015-16

▶ Wisconsin surpassed its win total from last year's 35-game season through 34 games. UW is 8-18-8 this year, doubling last year's total.

▶ Wisconsin scored 15 power-play goals last season (15-for-129 in 35 games) and has 22 power-play tallies this year (22-for-114 in 34 games).

▶ Wisconsin scored 59 total goals last season in 35 games. The Badgers have 91 goals in 34 games this season.

▶ Four Badgers scored at least five goals last season (Besse - 11, Soleway - 7, LaBate - 6, Zulinick - 5), while UW has 10 with at least five goals this season (Kunin - 18, Wagner - 10, Besse - 10, Linhart - 8, Freytag - 8, Johnson - 6, Soleway - 6, Davison - 5, Malone - 5, Hughes - 5).

▶ Wisconsin's defensemen finished with 11 total goals last year, and have 16 so far this year (Linhart - 8, Davison - 5, McGuire - 2, Schulze - 1).

▶ Wisconsin has had 51 total multi-point games this season, with 13 total players registering at least one multi-point outing through 34 games. The 51 multi-point games this year surpasses the 22 multi-point outputs from the 2014-15 season in 35 games.

Played in first career game against Arizona State on Oct. 31, recording first point of career with an assist on game-winning goal. Skated 2014-15 with the USHL's Madison Capitols under current UW associate head coach Luke Strand. Two-time team captain at Notre Dame Academy. Had an assist in 2012 Wisconsin Boys's Hockey State Championship game as Notre Dame Academy won the title with a 3-2 victory over Wausau West. Badger Tim Davison was also on that team. Also part of state champion lacrosse team.

9 Luke Kunin, Fr., F, R, 6-0, 193, Chesterfield, Mo. (USA Hockey NTDP)  
Ranked 16th in NHL Central Scouting midterm rankings for North American skaters for the 2016 NHL Draft. Eighth in UW history for goals by a freshman with his 18. Currently riding a six-game point streak, dating back to Feb. 26 against Ohio State, with eight points in those six games on five goals and three assists. Paces college hockey with nine goals in the first or last minute of a period, with 14 total points in the bookends of periods. Second among Big Ten freshmen with his 31 points, averaging 0.94 points per contest. Point total is second on UW. Team leader with 18 goals and 124 shots on goal, while he is tied for the UW lead with eight multi-point games this season. Posted a multi-point effort in UW's 4-3 win over Minnesota on March 11 with a goal and an assist. Five of his multi-point efforts came in a 12-game span from Jan. 9-Feb. 27, including three multi-point efforts in a five-game stretch from Feb. 13-Feb. 27. After netting a goal in a 4-4 tie with Ohio State on Feb. 26, he tallied a goal and an assist the next night for his seventh multi-point outing of the year. Posted back-to-back multi-point games with a goal and an assist in a 4-3 loss to Michigan State on Feb. 19 and two goals against Michigan on Feb. 13, his first career multi-goal game. His second goal against the Wolverines tied the game at four with just 27 seconds left in regulation. First UW player to reach 10-goal plateau this season when he scored against Alaska on Jan. 30. Registered a season team-high 11 shots on goal in UW's 4-1 loss at Penn State on Jan. 16, the most shots on goal for a freshman since Jack Skille put up 11 on Feb. 17, 2006. Four-point game on Jan. 9, 2016 against Ohio State (1 goal, 3 assists) was first for UW since Kyle Turriss did so in consecutive games on Oct. 19-20. Honored for his performance against Ohio State with the Big Ten Third Star of the Week. Tied for team lead with five power-play tallies,

which is tied for sixth in the conference. Registered a five-on-four goal at Ohio State (Feb. 27), a five-on-four goal vs. Alaska (Jan. 30), a five-on-four tally at Michigan (Dec. 4) in the Big Ten opener, a five-on-four marker at Ferris State (10/24), and a five-on-three power-play goal vs. Northern Michigan (10/10), which was his first career goal. Tallied first career game-winning goal with a tally in the second period of a 3-1 win against then-No. 1 North Dakota (11/6). First career multi-point contest came against Ferris State on Oct. 23 in a 5-5 tie. Had a goal in just two of his first eight games, but now has found the back of the net in seven of his last nine contests. Selected to play in the 2015 CCM/USA Hockey All-American Prospects Game for Team Roenick, Sept. 24 in Buffalo, New York, where he posted a game-high three points on two goals and an assist. Captained the U.S. Under-18 Team in 2014-15. Scored a goal against Wisconsin in an exhibition against the Badgers during the 2014-15 season. Finished high school in three years.

10 Jake Linhart, So., D, R, 5-11, 185, Brookfield, Wis. (Green Bay, USHL)  
Leads UW defenseman in scoring with his 18 points (8 goals, 10 assists). Goal total is tied for second among Big Ten defensemen. Netted first career game-winner in UW's 5-2 win over Alaska on Jan. 30. Posted his first career multi-goal game with two goals, including a power-play goal, against Penn State in UW's 4-3 overtime loss on Jan. 15. Tied for fifth on club with four multi-point efforts this season. First career goal came on power play on Oct. 9, 2015, vs. Northern Michigan. Also recorded power-play goal at Ferris State (Oct. 23). Third on the team with three power-play tallies. Tied for fifth in the conference among defenseman with his seven power-play points (3 goals, 4 assists). Doubled point output from his freshman season in just 23 games this season. Longest stretch of season without a goal was a modest six games from Oct. 24-Nov. 20, which he ended with a goal against Denver on Nov. 21 in a 6-2 loss. Registered six points on six assists in his freshman campaign. Dad played golf at Wisconsin in the 1980s.

11 Adam Rockwood, So., F, L, 5-10, 175, Coquitlam, B.C. (Coquitlam, BCHL)  
Recorded his third multi-point game of the season and sixth of his career with a pair of assists in a 5-2 win over Alaska on Jan. 30. Recorded his first multi-point game of this season with two assists on Oct. 10 against Northern Michigan, while he also had two assists in a 3-3 tie with Denver (Nov. 20). Has missed six games due to injuries, including four straight contests from Dec. 4-12. Totaled 13 points during his freshman season with three goals and 10 assists, a point total that he surpassed in his 19th game this season. Fifth in the BCHL in 2013-14 with 74 points and league-best 61 assists. Scored the short-handed tournament-winning goal to help Coquitlam capture 2014 BCHL Fred Page Cup as league champions.

12 Grant Besse, Jr., F, L, 5-10, 185, Plymouth, Minn. (Benilde-St. Margaret's H.S.)  
Leads team with his 22 assists and 32 points, with his assist total ranking sixth in the conference and point total ranking 10th in the Big Ten. Put up more assists (19) this year in his first 27 games than his first two seasons combined (17 in 68 games). Recorded a point in 10 of first 11 games. Saw his career-long eight-game point streak come to an end in a 6-2 loss to Denver on Nov. 21, which is the longest point streak to date for a UW player this season. Had nine points on three goals and six assists in that streak, stretching from Oct. 17-Nov. 20. First on team with his 16 career multi-point games, including a team-high eight this season. Potted two goals against Minnesota on March 11 for his first multi-goal game of the season and his eighth total multi-point game of the year. The second goal he scored against Minnesota was his first game-winning tally of the season. Had six multi-point efforts in 15-game stretch from Dec. 12-Feb. 27, including three different three-point games, with two coming against Ohio State on Jan. 9 and Feb. 27 and one against Michigan on Feb. 13. Also had multi-point efforts against Michigan State on Dec. 12 (2 assists), Minnesota on Jan. 23 (1 goal, 1 assist), and Michigan State on Feb. 19 (2 assists). Posted a goal and assist against Arizona State on Oct. 30 for first multi-point game of season. Eclipsed season-high point total from his sophomore season in 26 games this year with the three-point outing against Michigan. Scored at least one point in each of Wisconsin's 16 series this year, and has 11 series with two or more points. Assistant captain. Led Badgers with 11 goals and 22 points as a sophomore. Switched jersey number to 12 from 21 after freshman season. Had eight goals as a freshman. 2013 Minnesota Mr. Hockey. Led 2012 team to Minnesota Class AA title with five-goal game, including three short-handed tallies in 5-1 title-game victory over Hill-Murray. Had 12 goals and 18 points in six-game tournament.

13 Ryan Wagner, So., F, L, 5-8, 185, Park Ridge, Ill. (USA Hockey NTDP)  
Only player on UW with more than one multi-goal game, with three games this season with two goals. Tied for team lead with two game-winning goals and five power-play tallies. Power-play goal total is tied for sixth in the Big Ten. Tied for second on team with 10 goals, and fifth on team with 22 points. Saw career-long five-game point

streak, which is the third-longest streak for a UW player this season, come to an end against Michigan State on Feb. 19. Scored shootout winner against Ohio State (Jan. 9) in 1-0 shutout victory after 4-4 overtime tie. Posted career-best weekend with five points (2 G, 3 A) against Michigan (Dec. 4-5), a two-game total that matched his scoring output from his entire freshman season. Recorded first multi-goal and multi-point game of his career with a two-goal effort on Oct. 30 vs. ASU, scoring both goals in a 112-second span. Also tallied two goals at Michigan (Dec. 5) and vs. Alaska (Jan. 29). Had a power-play conversion in each of those three contests, with both goals against Michigan coming on the power play. Also had a power-play goal against Northern Michigan (Oct. 10). Recorded two assists at Michigan on Dec. 4 for his other multi-point effort. Surpassed his scoring output of his freshman season (2 G, 3 A) in just nine games this season (3 G, 3 A), recording an assist against North Dakota (Nov. 6) for his sixth point of the year. 14 Zac Keryluk, Fr., F, R, 6-1, 220, Verona, Wis. (Jersey, USPHL)  
Son of former Badger Ken Keryluk, who was part of 1981 NCAA title team. Fell in the 2013 Wisconsin Boys State Hockey Championship game with Verona High School to Eau Claire Memorial during his senior season.

15 Matthew Freytag, Fr., F, L, 6-1, 198, Wayzata, Minn. (Tri-City, USHL)  
Netted his first career shootout goal on Feb. 26 at Ohio State in UW's 1-0 shootout win in the 4-4 tie with the Buckeyes, a game that also saw him score his seventh goal of the season. Had three-game goal-scoring streak (Dec. 5-12) during which he scored four goals. Registered his first career multi-goal and multi-point game with two goals at Michigan (Dec. 5), which included the game-tying goal with less than five minutes left in regulation. One of five players with a multi-goal game this season. Ended a brief seven-game stretch without a goal with a tally against Alaska on Jan. 30. Scored first career goal in UW's 3-3 tie with Denver on Nov. 20. Assisted on game-tying goal in 2013 Minnesota State High School Hockey Tournament quarterfinal for Wayzata in 2-1 overtime victory over Centennial High School to reach semifinals. Lists Zach Parise as his favorite NHL player.

16 Alex Shuchuk, RS Fr., F, L, 5-10, 175, Madison, Wis. (Janesville, NAHL)  
Made first UW appearance in 1-0 exhibition win over Trinity Western (Jan. 1, 2016). Son of former Badger and UW assistant coach Gary Shuchuk.

17 Will Johnson, Fr., F, R, 5-10, 175, Santa Barbara, Calif. (Madison, USHL)  
Registered best weekend of his freshman season with three points against Ohio State on Feb. 26-27, which included his first career multi-point game in the series finale. Posted a goal, his sixth of the season, and added an assist in a 6-5 loss to the Buckeyes on Feb. 27 after he had an assist on Feb. 26 against OSU. Netted first career power-play goal when he found the back of the net against Michigan State on Feb. 20 in a 3-1 loss. Started the scoring in 5-2 win over Alaska on Jan. 30 with his fourth goal of the season. Posted goals in back-to-back weekends in Michigan, with a Friday night goal against Michigan on Dec. 4 and a Friday night goal against Michigan State on Dec. 11. Recorded first career goal on Oct. 23 at Ferris State, giving UW a 3-2 lead in an eventual 5-5 tie. Led the USHL with 36 points through 30 games in 2014-15 before an injury ended his season for first-year Madison Capitols. One of two UW freshmen (Jarod Zirbel) who played last season for UW Associate Head Coach Luke Strand. Wears same number as UW Head Coach Mike Eaves did when Eaves played for the Badgers from 1974-78. The Santa Barbara, California native is the ninth Badger all-time to hail from the Golden State. Five of those nine players have come during the 14-year tenure of head coach Mike Eaves, with Robbie Earl (2003-06), Matthew Ford (2004-08), Brendan Woods (2011-13) and Nic Kerdiles (2012-14). The other four California Badgers are Chris Chelios (1981-83), Mike McGrath (1983-85), Rob Mendel (1986-90) and Chris Nelson (1988-92).

18 Seamus Malone, Fr., F, L, 5-10, 180, Naperville, Ill. (Dubuque, USHL)  
Saw his season-high five-game point scoring streak come to a close in a 2-1 loss to Penn State on March 4, which was tied for the second-longest point streak by a Badger at that time. Sixth in scoring for Big Ten freshman with his 26 points, and second among Big Ten rookies with 21 assists, which is tied for eighth overall in the conference. Also has recorded 11 power play points, second most among rookies in the conference. His assist total is second-most on the club, while his six multi-point games place him in a tie for third on UW. Ended a 10-game stretch without a goal with the lone tally against Michigan State on Feb. 20 in a 3-1 defeat. Completed career-best four-point weekend against Alaska on Jan. 29-30 with two assists in each game. Also has three separate three-point weekends, with his most recent coming against Ohio State on Feb. 26-27 with a goal in the series opener and two assists the next night. His other three-point weekends were against Northern Michigan (Oct. 9-10) and Arizona State (Oct. 30-31). Put up a pair of assists at Michigan (Dec. 5), including setting up game-tying goal in the 6-6 tie. Tied for team lead with two game-winning goals this season. Posted game-winner at Michigan State on Dec. 5 in 3-0 shutout win over the Spartans. Tallied game-winning goal in UW's 2-1 win over Arizona State on Oct. 31, giving him his second multi-point game of his career. Netted first career goal at Ferris

State (Oct. 23) in UW's 5-5 tie. Posted an assist on both UW goals in season opener vs. Northern Michigan (Oct. 9), making him the first freshman since Joseph LaBate had a goal and an assist on Oct. 7, 2011 against Northern Michigan to open a season with a two-point game. Malone had an assist in the second game of the year on Oct. 10, making him the first UW freshman since Grant Besse (Oct. 11-12, 2013) to tally points in the first two games of his career. Led Dubuque with 58 points in 58 games during the 2014-15 season, ranking 11th in the USHL. Ranked 14th in the league with his 26 goals. Led USHL with a plus-29. Played in the 2014 World Junior A Challenge with the U.S. Select Team. Won bronze medal at 2013 Junior Club World Cup, scoring two goals and an assist in four games in Russia. Played in the 2013 USA Hockey/CCM All-American Prospects game. Won 2013 Clark Cup as USHL champions with Dubuque.

19 Cameron Hughes, So., F, L, 6-0, 170, Edmonton, Alberta (Spruce Grove, AJHL)  
Third on team with 19 assists. Put together four multi-point outings over the course of seven games from Jan. 30-Feb. 27. Had at least one point in nine of his last 11 games and a modest four-game point streak (Feb. 26-March 5) to tie his longest streak of the season, before going scoreless against Minnesota on March 11-12. Compiled career-best four-point weekend at Ohio State (Feb. 26-27) on a goal and three assists, with a goal and two assists in the second game for his sixth multi-point game of the season. That weekend against Ohio State earned him the Big Ten Third Star of the Week honor, the first such distinction of his career. His total of six multi-point games is tied for third on the team. Posted a goal and an assist against Michigan State in a 4-3 loss (Feb. 19). Recorded a pair of assists in the series finale against Michigan (Feb. 13) in the 4-4 tie. Registered a three-point weekend against Alaska (Jan. 29-30) to tie his then-career-high for a series, recording an assist in the series opener and a goal and an assist in the series finale. That three-point weekend helped him surpass his point total from his freshman season where he had 13 points in 34 games. Ended a 10-game stretch without a goal with his second-period tally against Minnesota on Jan. 23. Also had a three-point weekend at Michigan (Dec. 4-5), which included a two-assist game in the series finale. Netted UW's first penalty shot goal since Feb. 2, 2014 with his second-period goal against Arizona State (Oct. 30). Penalty shot goal against ASU was his first goal of the season and first in 17 games dating back to his freshman season. Had first points of season on a pair of assists at Ferris State (Oct. 23). Set up tournament-winning overtime goal to give Spruce Grove the 2014 AJHL Gas Drive Cup as league champions. Posted 21 goals and 57 points in 51 games to rank 15th in league scoring despite being one of the league's youngest players. Will be draft eligible for the first time for June's draft.

20 Eddie Wittchow, Sr., D, L, 6-4, 220, Burnsville, Minn. (Waterloo, USHL)  
Six points in a 13-game span (Jan. 15-March 12), which comes on the heels of a 47-game stretch without a point. Posted a pair of assists in the series at Minnesota (March 11-12) and at Ohio State (Feb. 26-27) with one in each game. Tallied assists in both games at Penn State on Jan. 15-16. Assisted on the game-tying goal in the third period on Jan. 15 against the Nittany Lions to end that 47-game stretch without a point. Sixth in the country with an average of 2.48 blocks per game. Tied his season high with six blocks against Penn State on March 5, a mark he also reached against Minnesota on Jan. 22. Co-captain. Member of 2012 USHL All-Rookie Team. Helped Waterloo to 2012 Western Conference title with team-best plus-22.

21 Jason Ford, So., F, L, 6-0, 180, Waunakee, Wis. (Dubuque, USHL)  
Potted his first goal of the season in his 30th game, giving UW the lead for good in the first period of a 4-3 win over Penn State on March 5. That goal snapped a 52-game drought without one, dating back to his freshman season. Registered first career multi-point game with a pair of assists at Michigan (12/4). Had an assist in each game of UW's sweep of Alaska (Jan. 29-30), the first time in his career with points in consecutive contests. Posted his first career assist at Ferris State (Oct. 23) with a helper on UW's fourth goal in the 5-5 tie. Had one goal in 21 games as a freshman. Led the state of Wisconsin with 103 points in 27 games as a senior in 2012 at Waunakee High School ... 2013 Janesville Jets (NAHL) MVP

22 Tanner Barnes, Fr., F, R, 6-0, 182, Eagan, Minn. (Johnstown, NAHL)  
Selected to play in the 2015 NAHL Top Prospects Tournament for the North Division Team ... his brother Tyler played for UW (2010-14) and his sister Lauren played for Minnesota State.

23 Aidan Cavallini, Jr., F, L, 5-10, 205, Barrington, Ill. (Brookings, NAHL)  
Registered first point of season with an assist on game-tying goal in eventual 3-1 victory over then-No. 1 North Dakota (Nov. 6). Ended a 10-game stretch without a point by setting up UW's third goal against Penn State on March 5. Has played in the USHL, BCHL, NAHL and EJHL. His mother, Katia, ran track at York University. His father, Gino, played college hockey at Bowling Green and played nine NHL seasons.

24 Jedd Soleway, Jr., F, R, 6-3, 220, Vernon, British Columbia (Penticton, BCHL)  
Surpassed his career-high point total for a season (7 G, 2 A in 2014-15) when he opened the scoring against Minnesota on March 11 in a 4-3 victory. Had goals in

back-to-back games for the first time this season, scoring against the Gophers and also opening the scoring against Penn State on March 5 in a 4-3 win. That goal against PSU ended an 18-game stretch without a goal. Both of those goals were on the power play, and now is in a tie for fourth on team in power-play goals. Now has six goals and four assists through 31 games. Halted a 13-game stretch without a point when he tallied the primary assist on the lone goal in a 3-1 loss to Michigan State (Feb. 20). Recorded first multi-point game of season with a goal and an assist against Arizona State on Oct. 30. Scored first career goal in last game of the season at 2014 NCAA tourney. One of two team captains for Muskegon for 2013-14. Brother Ryan played lacrosse at Cornell, while brother Connor is a freshman hockey player at Notre Dame.

26 Tim Davison, RS So., D, L, 5-10, 175, Green Bay, Wis. (Chicago, USHL)  
Posted fourth multi-point game of the season with a pair of assists at Minnesota on March 11, ending a seven-game stretch without a point. Had five-game point-scoring streak (Nov. 21-Dec. 12), tied for the third-longest streak for a UW player this season. Fourth on UW with two power-play tallies. Established a new career-high for points in a series with four against Michigan (Dec. 4-5), scoring two goals and adding two assists to double up previous high. Had two points in each game of that Michigan series. Recorded a goal in three-straight games (Nov. 21-Dec. 5) with five points in that span. Had five goals in 10-game span (Oct. 23-Dec. 5) after a 28-game stretch without a goal, spanning last season through the first four games of this season. Scored second goal of the season and halted an 11-game stretch without a goal with a tally in the second period of a 4-4 tie with Ohio State (Feb. 26). Notched first goal of his season in a 6-4 loss to Michigan (Dec. 4), ending a 14-game stretch without a goal. Second-tallest skater at Wisconsin in school history and taller than eight current UW men's basketball players. Recorded eight points during his freshman season in 2014-15 (4 G, 4 A). 28 Kevin Schulze, Sr., D, L, 5-10, 165, White Bear Lake, Minn. (Omaha, USHL)  
Top-25 nationally with 2.03 blocks per game, with 69 blocks through his first 34 games. Leads team with three career game-winning goals. Recorded first goal of his season and 10th of his career in a 6-6 tie with Michigan (Dec. 5). Three multi-point games this season. Tabbed two assists in season opener against Northern Michigan. Registered second multi-point game of the season in a 6-6 tie with Michigan on Dec. 5, tying his career-high with a three-point outing (1 G, 2 A). Also posted pair of assists against Alaska on Jan. 29 in a 4-3 victory. Leads returning defensemen with 11 points last season (4 G, 7 A). Had career-high 16 points in sophomore season in 2013-14 (1 G, 15 A). Captained Hill-Murray High School team. Has played in two outdoor games, including 2013 with UW at Soldier Field and in high school with Hill-Murray.

30 Matt Jurusik, Fr., G, L, 6-2, 193, La Grange, Ill. (Janesville, NAHL)  
Ranked 15th in NHL Central Scouting midterm rankings for North Americans goal-tenders for the 2016 NHL Draft. Posted the seventh-highest save total in a game in UW history with his 54 stops against Penn State on Jan. 14, becoming the first UW netminder to make 50 or more saves in a game since Bernd Brückler on Feb. 8, 2002. Stopped 46 shots against the Nittany Lions in a 4-3 win on March 5, giving him his second-highest save total for a game this year. Made 28 saves for his first-career shutout in 3-0 win at Michigan State on Dec. 12. Named a Big Ten Star of the Week in back-to-back weeks at start of November, becoming first Badger in first three seasons of the Big Ten to be honored in consecutive weeks. Big Ten Second Star of Week on Nov. 10 following UW's series split against then-No. 1 North Dakota, as he made 64 saves during the weekend and allowed just four goals. Big Ten Third Star of the Week for Nov. 3 after he helped UW to a sweep of Arizona State, stopping 43 of the 45 total shots he saw in UW's 5-1 and 2-1 wins. Won first career game in UW's 5-1 triumph over Arizona State on Oct. 30, making 18 saves. Recorded 40 saves at Boston University on Oct. 17, 2015, making him first freshman goalie to record at least 40 saves in a game since Bernd Brückler made 47 saves March 2, 2002 against

Minnesota Duluth. Produced a 29-game winning streak last season for NAHL's Janesville Jets that spanned the regular season (24) and playoffs (5). Backstopped the Jets to a league-record 100 points and the regular-season title. Led the league with 33 wins, 1.57 goals-against average, .939 save percentage and seven shutouts. Posted four shutouts in seven games and produced a shutout streak of over 300 minutes. A two-time invitee to USA Hockey's Warren Strelow National Team Goaltending Camp, which features the top goaltenders eligible for international play in select age groups. 

# Kohl Center

## Kohl Center Facts, Folklore and Traditions

- ▶ The Kohl Center, which opened in 1998, is the second largest on-campus rink in the nation (15,359). The only on-campus facility with a larger capacity is Value City Arena (17,500) in Columbus, Ohio. The building is the third-largest rink played in regularly by college hockey schools, behind Value City Arena and CenturyLink Center Omaha (16,680).
- ▶ Wisconsin has won at least 11 games in a season at the Kohl Center on 10 occasions.
- ▶ The Kohl Center played host to NCAA regional action for the first time in 2008 when the NCAA Midwest Regional took place on March 29-30. The building had previously played host to the 1998 NCAA Women's Volleyball Championships, a 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Regional and a 2007 NCAA Women's Ice Hockey Quarterfinal contest.
- ▶ The Kohl Center cost \$76.4 million to construct and is named after U.S. Senator Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW graduate who donated \$25 million towards the project.
- ▶ The Kohl Center ice sheet is 200 feet long by 97 feet wide.
- ▶ Some of the names of players from opposing teams who have played in the building include Patrick Kane, Jonathan Toews, David Backes, Duncan Keith, Ryan Miller, Carl Hagelin, T.J. Oshie, Paul Stastny, Matt Carle, Kyle Okposo, Jack Eichel and Auston Matthews, among others.

## They've seen it all

You can scour the archives and probably not find three more extreme careers in the history of the Wisconsin men's hockey program.

Seniors Adam Miller, Kevin Schulze and Eddie Wittchow will be recognized in a pregame ceremony Saturday night when the Badgers close out a Big Ten Conference series with Penn State at the Kohl Center.

They will leave with degrees and multiple championship rings.

They will depart having cultivated lifelong friendships.

They will move on with greater maturity, purpose and perspective.

"It's coming to a close," Miller said. "It's kind of a sad moment."

In many ways these three seniors are no different from their UW predecessors. They share that sense of melancholy. They wonder where the time has gone. They see the approaching fork in the road and wrestle with the uncertainty that lies beyond.

But no senior class may be better equipped to handle the vagaries of life than Miller, Schulze and Wittchow.

Oh, the things they've done and seen while playing for the Badgers.

They changed leagues: UW moved from the Western Collegiate Hockey Association, where it had been since 1969, to the Big Ten after their freshman season in 2013-14.

They saw one of their classmates suspended by the NCAA: Winger Nic Kerdiles sat out the first 10 games of 2013-14 due to a disputed amateurism issue.

They won two milestone playoff titles: The last for UW in the WCHA in 2013 and the first awarded in the Big Ten in 2014.

They won a championship in ironman fashion: UW pulled off the rare feat of winning three games in three days to claim the WCHA title and earn an automatic bid to the national tournament in 2013.

They won a title in dramatic fashion: UW trailed Ohio State 4-2 with 6 minutes, 58 seconds left in regulation in the Big Ten final, but rallied for a 5-4 overtime triumph.

They were viewed as a prime NCAA title contender: After winning the Big Ten crown, UW was one of the four No. 1 seeds for the 16-team field in 2014.

They saw a top assistant coach resign in-season to become a minister: Associate head coach Bill Butters abruptly stepped down in November of 2012, a month and a day into his third season on Mike Eaves' coaching staff.

They saw six teammates turn pro as underclassmen: Center Brendan Woods in 2013; Kerdiles and defenseman Jake McCabe in '14; and defenseman Jack Dougherty and winger Morgan Zulinick after last season.

They saw two assistant coaches, both alums, fired: Gary Shuchuk and Matt Walsh were dismissed after last season.

They set dubious records: UW set school records for fewest wins (four) and most losses in a season (26) in 2014-15.

"Definitely experienced a lot of different things," Schulze said.

Ten years from now, Schulze said he'll remember the good and bad with equal fervor, "but I'm probably going to talk more about the wins."

He smiled.

"I'm going to remember the success and the difficulties because that's life," Schulze said. "You have to take it for what it's worth."

That overview is shared by Eaves, who said he hopes his departing seniors are better for what they experienced at UW.

"They've had really good times, they've seen times that have been struggles for us as a group, they seen change and I think they look

back on these four years as, wow, it was a lifetime within itself," he said.

The three seniors are out-of-staters – Miller from Long Grove, Illinois; Schulze from White Bear Lake, Minnesota; and Wittchow from Burnsville, Minnesota – who will graduate in May with impressive degrees.

Miller will get one in biology – he's trying to get into medical school – while Schulze and Wittchow – the two co-captains – focused on economics.

Asked for his proudest moment, Wittchow didn't hesitate.

"Graduating from here with a very well-respected degree while excelling in athletics as well," he said. "That has a whole, at an institution like this, is not an easy thing. I'm very proud of the way I kind of matured and handled it."

The Badgers (6-16-8 overall, 1-11-4 in the Big Ten) have made progress since last season, but have labored to get over the hump. They have led or been tied in the third period of 23 games, but have more losses (nine) and ties (eight) than wins in that regard (six).

Still, Miller and Wittchow say the finest hours of their careers have come in the last six months.

Miller made his first career start in the season opener and made 32 saves in a 2-2 non-conference draw with Northern Michigan on Oct. 9.

"A pretty great moment," he said, mindful of the fact that freshman Matt Jurusik has become the unquestioned starter.

Serving as a career backup – Joel Rumpel and Landon Peterson dominated the goaltending depth chart from 2011 to '15 – required a lot of sacrifice from Miller.

"Sticking with everything, still coming to the rink and working hard and wanting to be here for the guys," he said. "Being able to maintain that along with school, it's definitely been tough."

Wittchow, meanwhile, has had to oversee a club dominated by underclassmen, including 10 first-year freshmen. He and Schulze and assistant captain Grant Besse, a junior right winger, have faced great challenges.

"It hasn't all been rosy obviously with our record and all of that, but the job we've done keeping this team moving in the right direction – keeping the morale and attitudes up knowing that anything can happen come the Big Ten tournament – I think we've succeeded in that," Wittchow said. "That's something we can take with us in regards to anything we do in life."

Wittchow said the last two years of his career have been a lesson in perspective and will. He said he hopes the younger players have embraced his message and example.

"Realizing that there's a better, brighter day on the other side of things," Wittchow said.

Perhaps sooner than later. The Badgers have had leads over every Big Ten foe with the exception of Minnesota, a club they face in the regular-season series finale March 11 and 12. They believe that in the one-and-done format of the league playoffs they can persevere and get an automatic berth in the NCAA tournament.

"I think we can do it," Schulze said.

"We're not done here yet," Wittchow said. "The way the Big Ten is set up, the way the NCAA tournament is set up, we're definitely not out of it. In the locker room, we know we can beat any team in the Big Ten and we're going to have to do it three times in three days."

In reflection, Miller and Schulze said former UW teammates influenced them the most. Miller lauded Rumpel and Peterson for their camaraderie and character.

"You don't always get along with your goalie partner, but we all got along really well," Miller said. "Being with those guys, seeing the work they put in on the ice and off the ice with the skills that they have, it was great for me to watch them and develop."

Schulze offered a shout-out to two former blue-line partners and captains, John Ramage and Frankie Simonelli.

"I was with them a lot in practice and talked to them a lot," Schulze said. "Off the ice I would talk to them a lot. Them being captains and great leaders, I kind of gravitated to them."

Wittchow said his influences came from both ends of the spectrum. He said he's learned from all his teammates "whether it's their mistakes or their positive actions" and that one of Eaves' favorite doctrines has taken root.

### Sweep by Minnesota serves as motivation

There was a purpose to Mike Eaves' Monday morning visit to the weight room at the Kohl Center.

But it turns out it wasn't really necessary.

Eaves made a rare stop to chat with his University of Wisconsin men's hockey players during their early workout, but not to check on their physical condition. He wanted to make sure their mental framework was in order in advance of this weekend's series at Minnesota.

The Badgers (7-17-8, 2-14-4-2 Big Ten) have a chance for some payback as they close out the regular season tonight and Saturday against No. 19 Minnesota (18-15-0, 13-5-0-0).

In a season marked by tough losses and frustrating ties, the Badgers were handed two of their worst defeats by the Gophers, who rolled to a 4-0, 9-2 sweep at the Kohl Center in January.

So Eaves was just checking to make sure the memory of that weekend hadn't faded.

"Yeah, I just wanted to bring it to a level of awareness for them," Eaves said, "make sure that everybody was on the same page as they went through their workout and as we get ready to go on the ice."

No problem, as Eaves heard exactly what he was hoping to hear.

"They said, 'We've got to redeem ourselves,'  
"We've got that opportunity here."

Nobody is looking for redemption more than freshman goaltender Matt Jurusik, who let a bad Friday night turn into an even worse Saturday.

"Probably the worst game I've ever had," he said of the second game, in which he was briefly pulled after surrendering four goals in the first period. "Season, for sure. Career, maybe.

"It was a real tough two games. But you're going to have that over the course of a career. It happens and you just move past it and try to forget about it."

Well, maybe not entirely forget. At least not without drawing on it for some lessons.

"It was just a lesson in mental toughness," Jurusik said. "I had a tough game and a couple tough goals Friday night and I didn't put it out of my head. It crept back in on Saturday night and really bit me hard in the opening period and then the following two.

"It was a tough game that I learned a lot about mental fortitude and what I have going on up top."

Eaves is hoping that the drive for redemption against the Gophers, and the confidence boost from edging Penn State 4-3 on Saturday night, will give his team a surge of momentum this weekend and moving forward into the Big Ten tournament next week.

"We've played better and lost, so I'm not going to look a gift horse in the mouth and say no thank you," he said. "It's not the way we diagrammed it out, but we found a way to win, and that in itself is a small step in the right direction.

"Different task for us in terms of our young team to finally figure out how to play with a lead and win, so another chapter in a book, another paragraph and we'll move forward from there."

### Belief, extra practice carrying Soleway, Badgers

Jedd Soleway has had some terrible luck during his 100-game-old career with the Wisconsin men's hockey team, but the junior right winger remains an unflinching optimist.

"Absolutely," he said.

Soleway has amassed 272 shots on goal over three seasons and has but 13 conversions to show for it. That .048 success rate is not what you'd expect from a guy who gets prime minutes on the power play, is generally used on one of the top two forward lines and has one of the best releases on the team.

The fact many of Soleway's chances have come in close proximity to the opposing net – he's adept at using his sturdy 6-foot-3, 220-pound frame to create time and space – only adds to the wonder.

But Soleway soldiers on expecting that a torrent of goals is about to be unleashed.

"I know I've got the talent and the ability to produce, to get those pucks in the net past the goalie," he said. "I'm just going to keep believing."

Now would be as good a time as any for Soleway to kick his production into gear. He's fresh from ending an 18-game goal-less streak and the final Big Ten Conference regular-season series is Friday and Saturday at first-place Minnesota.

Beyond that, the Big Ten tournament and its one-and-done format offers the sixth-place Badgers (7-17-8 overall, 2-12-4 with 12 points in league play) their only avenue to the NCAA tournament.

UW has to prevail three times in three days at the Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul, Minnesota, starting March 17 to win the conference playoff title and secure the automatic NCAA berth.

Eaves said. For Soleway, a journalism major from Vernon, British Columbia, the optimism he has for his stat line extends to the UW dressing room.

"We have proved this year at times that we can beat anybody and we have the talent on then team to do that," he said. "When everyone's going we can outscore teams. We've shown we can scored five, six goals a game.

"Hopefully in these next two weekends coming up, this is just putting everything together."

So many forces can affect a shot once it leaves one's stick blade. The puck can clank off pipes or crossbars. It can ricochet off bodies or skates and out of harm's way. It can flutter on end and wobble off course. A nudge or a tug by an opponent can alter the trajectory. There's also the possibility that a faulty stick can break in mid-swing and the shot will go awry.

To some degree, all have happened to Soleway during his UW career.

"I don't know why (goal-less) streaks like that happen or why pucks don't go in sometimes, but it's something I hope to figure out in the future, that's for sure," he said.

In the meantime, Soleway is doing his best to combat the forces of frustration.

"It's one thing to get those chances. That's all fine," he said. "But at some point you have to look at yourself and realize that producing is the ultimate goal. When that's not happening, it's very frustrating."

Soleway is one of the top face-off artists in the nation with a winning percentage of .585 (197-140), but is bothered by the fact he has 9 points (5 goals, 4 assists) on 94 shots this season while compiling a team-worst minus-21 rating.

"I don't think I've produced enough for the team this year," he said.

Soleway's roommate and classmate, right winger Grant Besse, can relate. Besse is on pace to lead the Badgers in scoring for the second straight season – he has 94 shots as well while showing 8-22-30

– but he had 11 conversions as a sophomore and still hasn't registered a goal on the power play this season.

"Kind of like myself, Jedd probably hasn't put the puck in the net as much as he would have liked this year," Besse said.

According to Besse, Soleway has nevertheless maintained an upbeat posture away from the rink.

"Obviously when you're not scoring there's doubt, but you try not to let it get to you and he's done a good job with that," Besse said. "I'm sure he is frustrated, but he's done a good job persevering through it."

Soleway is at his best in a physical environment, but he's learned that he must be fully engaged mentally for it all to work.

"The physical part honestly comes easy for me when the mental part is all in a line," he said. "When my head's not in the game I find myself not being as physical, not staying on my feet as well, not shooting as well."

"It definitely starts with mental preparation, clearing your head and stuff like that. Once you step on the ice if you've got all that in alignment, the physical stuff come easy."

Soleway, a seventh-round NHL draft pick of the Phoenix Coyotes in 2013, sometimes has early-morning skill drills with UW associate head coach Luke Strand. A focus is on getting shots off quickly from a variety of locations. Soleway said the biggest benefit to the extra work is confidence.

"Knowing that I've practiced certain plays and certain shots, knowing that I can get them off quicker and place them in certain spots," he said.

Getting them to locate the back of the net has been tricky, though.

"He's got one of the best releases on our team and he's been getting opportunities," Besse said. "He's obviously finding space out there to get his shot off. Hopefully down the road those will go in for him."

UW coach Mike Eaves had multiple conversations with Soleway last week prior to Soleway getting a first-period power-play goal that gave way to a 4-3 victory over Penn State. It was his first conversion since Nov. 20.

"He wants to help his team," Eaves said of Soleway. "His single goal – I have no doubt about this – is he wants to help this team win and he still feels that he can."

That's true.

"I'm just focused on being a part of this team and doing whatever I can to help," Soleway said.

Maybe a long, fulfilling hot streak is on deck for Soleway and the Badgers.

"Every day's a new day," Besse said. "Something good can happen. Hopefully we can get on a roll and finish it with a Big Ten tournament championship."

## Seniors say they'll leave with no regrets

The bond between Kevin Schulze and Eddie Wittchow began forming during their high school days in the Twin Cities area when they trained at the same facility during the summer.

Since then, it has strengthened over four seasons as teammates with the University of Wisconsin men's hockey team, as they've shared good times and bad on the ice.

And even as their days as Badgers wind down, that bond will remain intact.

"He's probably my best friend on the team and he will be one of my best friends moving forward in life," Wittchow said of Schulze. "I know he and I both cherish our relationship and it's been nice to go through this process with someone who's so alike and enjoys the same things as me. It just so happens we're from around the same area, we're both defensemen and we're both senior captains."

They will remain teammates and co-captains for at least five more games, but they are down to their last two contests in the Kohl Center this weekend as the Badgers (6-16-8, 1-11-4-2 Big Ten) take on Penn State (19-9-4, 9-6-1-1).

Wittchow and Schulze will be honored in Senior Night ceremonies before Saturday's game, along with the team's only other senior, backup goaltender Adam Miller.

It is a group that has experienced some good times, winning conference tournament championships their first two years — the Western Collegiate Hockey Association as freshmen and Big Ten Conference as sophomores — and advancing to the NCAA regional each year.

But they've also lived through two of the toughest seasons in UW history — a program-worst 4-26-5 mark last season followed by a modestly better current season.

And while they've clearly not relished the losing, they haven't let it undermine the entire experience with the program.

"Looking back on everything it's been a roller coaster," Schulze said. "The first part of the first year was down, then it was up. The second year was all up, we were great. And the last couple years obviously have been down. But taking it all in, it's been the best four years of my life. I'm just thankful I came here."

Ditto for Wittchow who, like Schulze, will graduate in May with a degree in economics.

"It's really made me who I am today, as a hockey player and as a person," Wittchow said. "Looking back, it's gone in the blink of an eye. I cherish every moment, I can remember every moment."

"I wish it wasn't coming to an end, but that's the reality of it. I'm going to take everything I've learned here, the good and the bad, and use it going forward, both in hockey and in all aspects of life."

Schulze grew up in White Bear Lake, a northeast suburb of St. Paul, and attended Hill-Murray High School in Maplewood, while Wittchow came from Burnsville, south of Minneapolis. Each spent a year in the United States Hockey League — Schulze with Omaha and Wittchow with Waterloo — before coming to UW.

"They've played a lot of games, a lot of minutes and over the last couple of years, had significant roles for us," coach Mike Eaves said. "They've had really good times, they've seen times that have been struggles for us as a group, they've seen change, and I think they look back on these four years as, wow, it was a lifetime within itself."

While they share many common traits, they have distinctly different styles. The 6-foot-4, 220-pound Wittchow is boisterous and outgoing off the ice and a physical presence on the ice. Schulze (5-10, 165) is softer-spoken in nature and relies on his speed and skating ability on the ice.

Eaves said Schulze's skating ability compares favorably with former UW defensemen Justin Schultz and Jake Gardiner.

"It's amazing," Eaves said. "You wish you could find a reason why guys when they skate, they ride the edges of their blades instead of digging in and slowing down. He is one of the fastest guys in college hockey for sure, and if he's got a chance to play at the next level it will be primarily because of his skating."

Wittchow's size and physicality figure to give him an opportunity to continue his career professionally. He was drafted by the NHL's Florida Panthers in the sixth round in 2011.

"Because of Eddie's size and mobility for a big man, he's going to have an opportunity to play at the next level at some point," Eaves said. "I think Eddie's battle sometimes with us is the fact that he wants to do a little bit too much."

"If he stays within his game and his skill set, he can be pretty effective. But he likes to get up on his horse and get going and handle the puck, and at the next level that's not going to be his job."

Wittchow insists the only part of his future he's focused on is his remaining time as a Badger.

"I know I want to continue my hockey career after leaving here," he said. "But I'll cross that bridge when I come to it. I'm just playing in the moment."

"This season's script isn't totally written yet. I totally believe we can still do something this year."

## **Kunin's quick ascension not without its hurdles**

Before forward Luke Kunin led the Badgers in goals in his freshman season, he received news from a doctor that changed his life.

In sixth grade around Christmas time, Kunin was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes. Even back then, he had hockey on his mind.

"It was a big shock to me, to be honest. The first question I asked the doctor was, 'Can I still play hockey?' because I didn't really know much about it and he said, 'Absolutely,' so then I kind of cooled down a little bit," Kunin said.

Seven years later, Kunin became the focal point of the Wisconsin offense, netting 15 goals in 29 games. He has been on a tear as of late, scoring five times in his last five games, including a two-goal night against No. 6 Michigan.

Kunin's diabetes diagnosis changed his daily life, as he has to count carbs, take insulin shots and check his blood sugar regularly, sometimes even on the bench during games. Outside of this, though, Kunin said it has never really affected hockey and he has refused to let the disease affect him negatively.

"It's just a little hiccup that I have to deal with and I just think to myself: It could be a lot worse, so it's nothing too hard," Kunin said. "I think it's helped me mature a little bit faster than most kids my age; like I said it's nothing that's going to keep me down or away from what I want to do."

This attitude could certainly be a factor behind Kunin's success this year. His numbers have been impressive enough that he's garnered several looks from NHL scouts. In fact, NHL.com analysts Mike G. Morreale and Adam Kimelman both have Kunin as a first-round draft pick in their 2016 mock drafts, as pick No. 21 and No. 24, respectively.

"He's a great player. He can pretty much do everything out there. He can shoot, pass, skate," junior forward and linemate Grant Besse said. "He's got all the skills and that's why he's a projected first rounder this year. It's been really easy playing with him because he does everything really well."

This top line of Kunin, Besse and sophomore forward Cameron Hughes has been electric over the past few weeks for the Badgers. Over the last five games, they have combined for a total of 23 points and have kept Wisconsin alive in several contests, the best example coming in its tie against Michigan. With just 27 seconds to go, Kunin lit the lamp to even the score, and both Besse and Hughes were credited with an assist. Besse also assisted on Kunin's earlier goal and added a goal of his own, which was assisted by none other than Hughes.

The following weekend, this line combined for two of the three goals in a 4-3 loss to Michigan State. Then, in a 6-5 loss to Ohio State the following weekend, the three teamed up for three of the five Badger goals.

Without the play of these three, Wisconsin's losses would most likely be a lot uglier than they are now. This can be attributed to the chemistry that Besse and Kunin have built over the year. Besse said this didn't take too long, despite not playing on the same line until the Ferris State series three weeks into the season.

Although he's having a relatively down year in the goal-scoring department, Besse continues to lead the team in points, an obvious consequence of the emergence of Kunin.

"Anytime I have an opportunity, I want to score to help this team and I probably haven't done that as much as I would have hoped," Besse said. "But I'd say with him having such a good year putting the puck in the net has maybe, in a way, kind of made up for me, not necessarily struggling, but I just haven't put up what I expected at the beginning of the year."

Senior captain Kevin Schulze, a defenseman, also noted how Kunin's prolific goal-scoring ability has helped Besse in what has been a tough year for him.

"When they play together they're very dynamic, they're both really great goal scorers," Schulze said. "Ya know sometimes in hockey you don't score and Grant is almost snake-bitten this year, but Kunin and him work well together."

Both Besse and Schulze also praised Kunin's work ethic and attitude.

"He's a really quiet guy. Real humble and goes about his work and puts his hard hat on every day and works hard, whether it's on the ice or in the weight room," Besse said. "He wants to get better and that's a pretty big trait if you want to make it to the next level and for him to develop that at such a young age, that's pretty special for him."

"He's competitive and that's the best thing you can have in a teammate," Schulze said.

Despite his quiet nature, Kunin is making some noise on the ice for Wisconsin this year and has been one of the few bright spots in an otherwise abysmal season. Schulze also added that even though Kunin's a quiet guy, once he got to know him, Kunin opened up and showed his comedic side. As if on cue, Kunin walked by and gave Schulze a shoulder bump mid-answer in an effort to throw off his concentration, drawing an ear-to-ear smile and a chuckle from Schulze.

Now, as they head into a series with No. 15 Penn State, this top line will be of vital importance if Wisconsin wants to salvage any dignity within the Big Ten.

The last time they met, the Nittany Lions swept the Badgers out of Happy Valley, winning two close games that epitomized Wisconsin's season of frustrating losses.

To earn their second Big Ten win, the Badgers will rely on this top line to find twine, and Kunin will need to continue his strong play that has attracted the attention of professional teams. Regardless of the potential of being a first-round pick, Kunin has tried to remain focused on doing what he can do, a testament to the attitude that his teammates described.

"I just worry about what I can control. Playing on the ice I try not to think about it too much," Kunin said.

That mature approach should serve him well as he continues his career. Soon enough, he may be skating for an NHL team.

## **Large freshman class not down despite losing season**

The freshman season in any sport generally is a trying experience even in the best of circumstances. But when it is accompanied by persistent and painful losses, it can become overwhelming.

Such could be the case for the University of Wisconsin men's hockey team's 11-man freshman class, nine of whom have received considerable ice time.

But rather than being demoralized, the Badgers' struggles have only strengthened the resolve of the first-year players to grow and improve.

"I know it's kind of cheesy but it's like they say, whatever doesn't kill you makes you stronger," forward Seamus Malone said. "The losses don't feel good, but I think they make us stronger."

The Badgers (6-15-7, 1-10-3-1 Big Ten Conference) will try to snap a 10-game winless streak in conference play this weekend with a series at Ohio State (9-17-2, 4-8-2-1).

With just three weekends left in the regular season, the Badgers are hopeful to put a positive spin on an otherwise troubling season.

"This is the first time I've been on a losing team," said Malone, who played three seasons for Dubuque in the U.S. Hockey League. "It's a new experience for me and it's new for a lot of the freshmen. I think we can learn from this and come back and play our best hockey at the end of the year."

Malone, who is tied for third on the team with 21 points, has played most of the season on the top line along with fellow freshman Luke Kunin and junior Grant Besse.

"I think I've matured a lot this year," Malone said.

Forward Will Johnson, who played for the Madison Capitols of the USHL last season, said it's been a major adjustment moving up to the college level.

"At the beginning I was a little nervous," Johnson said.

"I was stepping into a whole different league. It's not like jumping from Tier II Juniors to Tier I Juniors. It's a big jump going from Juniors to college and getting used to playing against guys who are a lot older."

Coach Mike Eaves singled out Johnson for praise this week as one of the freshmen who has made the most progress during the season.

"I think he's been making a steady climb," Eaves said.

One of the challenges for the newcomers has been measuring personal growth when it doesn't pay off on the scoreboard.

"It's definitely not what I would've hoped my freshman year would be," said Johnson, who scored his fifth goal of the season last Friday against Michigan State. "But you just learn and keep growing. From the beginning to now our team has grown so much and I've gotten to see it.

"We've shown that anything can happen. We've been considered this low team but we've shown we can beat North Dakota. We can play with Michigan. We can play with all these guys, so we've learned that you should never doubt yourself."

Eaves said he's been pleased with his team's resilience throughout the season.

"It really shows our mental toughness," Malone said.

"Even if it's a bad weekend and we don't get the wins we need, we come back on Monday with a smile on our face and ready to go. You have to learn from your mistakes and put them behind you. This week Michigan State is behind us and we're looking at Ohio State."

It does, however, become increasingly difficult when the weekday optimism turns into another weekend disappointment.

"It's tough," Johnson said. "You definitely go into the weekend, saying this is the week. We're playing a team we know we can beat. And then it doesn't work out.

"You just have to take away the positives and shut out the negatives. You just have to tell yourself the next week it's going to happen. And if it doesn't then, the next week it's going to happen.

"We can only keep not making it happen for so long. Eventually the door is going to break. It's going to happen and we just have to keep telling ourselves that and keep going."

## Upon further review: Seamus Malone stands

Seamus Malone is having an impactful debut season for the Wisconsin men's hockey team, but it requires close examination to fully appreciate.

A freshman center, Malone has 21 points in 28 appearances, an average of 0.75 per game that ranks outside the top 100 scorers in the nation.

In a word, modest.

Then you look at his four goals: two are game-winners and the other two pulled the Badgers even.

Then you look at his 17 assists: 10 are primary feeds and five of those factored into game-deciding sequences.

Then you look at the statistics of some of his celebrated rookie predecessors at UW: Kyle Turris and Derek Stepan, both current NHL front-liners, had 24 assists in 2007-08 and '08-09, respectively.

You have to go back six seasons, to 2009-10, to find the last freshman forward that topped 20 points for the Badgers. That was another present-day NHL mainstay, Craig Smith, who finished with 33.

So, if he'd like, Malone could take refuge in data that suggests he's a future go-to guy.

"Real skilled, poised player," is how fellow rookie Luke Kunin describes Malone.

"He's pretty crafty," another freshman front-liner, Matthew Freytag, said of Malone.

But with six Big Ten Conference regular-season games and one guaranteed playoff contest remaining, Malone is focused on the whole product and how it can be improved.

The Badgers (6-15-7 overall, 1-10-3 in league play) are in the muck of a four-game winless streak heading into their Big Ten series Friday and Saturday at Ohio State (9-17-2, 4-8-2).

Earlier this week, UW coach Mike Eaves was asked how his players were handling the emotional tumult of a season in which so many winnable games — the Badgers have had the lead or been tied in the third period in 21 of them — have ended in painful fashion. Specifically, is it different for the seven upperclassmen compared to the 10 first-year freshmen?

"I think it depends on the maturity of the player you're talking about," he said.

In that case, Malone, a 19-year-old from Naperville, Illinois, who's been on his own playing hockey since he was 16, seems in good stead.

"Seamus has always been that way ever since he left home," his father, Pat, said. "They mature quickly in junior hockey it seems like, but he's always been a mature kid."

Seamus spent the previous three seasons with Dubuque of the U.S. Hockey League, winning a Clark Cup title and twice leading the Fighting Saints in scoring.

Now he's in line to experience the first losing season of his young career, but the self-described optimist said he isn't focused on the negative.

"You've got to keep to your game plan," he said. "You have to keep working hard.

"Good things will come. That's how I've always played games. If you're going through tough times you just have to go through it.

"Times like these, when the bounces aren't going your way, you have to come to the rink with a good attitude and ready to work," Malone said.

It's an approach Malone shares with his roommates, Kunin and Freytag. All three have made important on-ice contributions this season. Kunin, a left winger, has a team-best 13 goals. Freytag, a left winger, has six conversions.

"Obviously we want to have a winning record at this point and that's tough, but in that locker room there's a lot of positive energy," Kunin said.

"As a young player coming in you have to listen to what the older guys tell us," Freytag said. "They've been through all the ups and downs, with winning teams and losing teams. You have to build off what they show to us."

Age shouldn't be a factor at this juncture of the season.

"When it comes down to games, it doesn't matter if you're a senior or freshman, everyone has to come together and find a way to win," Malone said.

Listed at 5-foot-10 and 180 pounds, Malone is a natural playmaking center, but he's played some left wing while being a part of 11 different line combinations this season.

The latest pairing, Malone between sophomore Adam Rockwood and junior Jedd Soleway, is the only one Eaves didn't tinker with at practice this week following a Big Ten series sweep at the hands of Michigan State.

The Malone line was noticeable throughout the series, but especially during a 3-1 loss on Saturday. The trio drew penalties, forced turnovers and generated what was the tying goal by Malone in the third period.

"Very dynamic," is how Eaves described the line's work from that night.

Maintaining the right attitude is a challenge for those in the UW dressing room, but it's a necessity if they are to maximize the rest of the season. Eaves harps on the process, that hard work, good habits and attention to detail will pay off eventually.

"Keep with the positives and take the good things from the weekend," Kunin said.

That's not always easy.

"It's a tough thing to go through," Pat Malone said of his son. "He's never been on a losing team. That in itself has been difficult for him because he's never been in that situation before."

But if there are UW players wearing down mentally, it doesn't sound like Seamus is on that list.

"My favorite part of the day is coming to the rink and working with my teammates," he said. "It's a nice couple hours in the day where you don't have to worry about school and not worry about life."

Away from the rink, Malone, Kunin and Freytag say they have regular conversations about improving the product, short term and long term.

"We talk about it all the time," Freytag said. "We just have to keep getting better every day and pushing everybody to get better.

"As a team, we're almost there. We're knocking on the door."

More often than not, all that knocking has been met with maddening silence. To wit, there have been 10 games this season where UW has erased a third-period deficit only to come up short of victory (0-4-6).

"Since the start of the year we've come a long way," Malone said. "I think it will show in the next couple weeks and in the next year that our young guys are ready to play.

"What's carrying me is I know this team and we're way better than our record shows. We've been in so many games where it's come down to the wire and we couldn't get the right bounce or pull it out."

That trend has to change if the Badgers are to make any noise down the stretch. Their only avenue to fulfillment is to win the Big Ten Conference playoff title, which would give them an automatic berth in the 16-team NCAA tournament field.

"What's getting me through this is that we do have that chance at the end," Malone said. "We have to have that mindset that we'll be playing our best hockey at the end of the year. That's all that matters."

### **Smallish in stature, Ryan Wagner is displaying big-time scoring touch**

Mike Eaves conceded he didn't necessarily foresee Ryan Wagner would be one of the most productive scorers this season on his University of Wisconsin men's hockey team.

But Eaves has learned it's wise to never underestimate Wagner. So when Eaves was projecting Wagner's potential output he didn't focus on the freshman who accounted for just two goals and five points in 35 games last season. Instead, he envisioned the dynamic scorer who left his mark on the prestigious Chicago Mission Midget program.

"He was a goal-scorer in AAA Midget Hockey," Eaves said of Wagner. "He helped his team win a national championship. He was the go-to guy.

"We've already documented how he didn't get off to a great start last year, had scoring chances, wasn't able to get on a roll. And this year he's come back and gotten that roll. He's feeling it again like he did when he was a Midget player. That's nice for us."

Wagner, who is on a five-game point-scoring streak, is second on the team with 10 goals and tied for second with 21 points. He scored

a goal in each game against Michigan last weekend when the Badgers lost 4-1 on Friday and tied 4-4 on Saturday.

The sophomore forward from Park Ridge, Illinois, is looking to make his presence felt this weekend as the Badgers (6-13-7, 1-8-3-1 Big Ten Conference) try to escape the Big Ten basement with a sweep of Michigan State (7-20-3, 3-10-1 Big Ten) at the Kohl Center.

"It's a huge weekend for both teams," Wagner said.

Of course, every weekend is huge for Wagner, who retains the competitive chip on his shoulder that comes with being told all along that you're not big enough to ever make it in the game.

"Growing up I was always told I was too small," said Wagner, who's listed at 5-foot-8 but admits "that's a little tippy-toeish. I remember trying out for one of my teams and I tried to play up a year and my dad said I was probably the best player out there but they wouldn't take me because I was just too small. They always said, 'He's so small, he'll never make it to college, blah, blah, blah.'

"That was pretty much my main goal, to prove everyone wrong and make my parents and my siblings proud. I'm here now. I'm small but I'm definitely not going shy away from any contact. I love sticking my nose in there and hitting guys and just causing havoc."

Wagner's dad, Dan, played baseball at Northwestern. Ryan may have followed in his footsteps had it not been for an incident in sixth grade when he was warming up a pitcher without wearing a facemask and a wayward fastball bounced up and smashed into his eye. "After that I was done with baseball," he said.

He played soccer and hockey for a couple more years before devoting himself exclusively to hockey.

Despite his diminutive stature he worked his way up to the Mission AAA Midget team, where he was a teammate of future UW teammates Seamus Malone, Jake Linhart and Peter Tischke, along with a number of other future college players.

He also gained inspiration from his cousin, Austin Farley, who played for Fargo of the United States Hockey League and now is a senior at Minnesota-Duluth despite being about the same size as Wagner.

"I always looked up to him," Wagner said. "When he made a USHL team, I was like, 'Oh, wow, I could do something with this.' That's when I put soccer on the down low and just wanted to focus on hockey and see where I could go with it."

When it comes to cousins, Wagner has plenty to draw upon for just about anything. His mom, Pattie, is one of 16 siblings and Ryan counts 63 first cousins on that side of the family, ranging from age 4 to about 35. Almost all of them live in the Chicago area.

"We're a very close family," he said. "Every Christmas and Thanksgiving we rent out a gym where we can fit everyone and everyone gets together. I could name all the cousins, but it would take a little bit. I'd have to think about it."

### **Jurusik settles down, into starting goaltender role**

Under most circumstances, the milestone that Matt Jurusik reached that Saturday afternoon in early December would have been cause for euphoria.

In his 14th start as the freshman goaltender for the Wisconsin men's hockey team, Jurusik made 28 saves and turned in his first career shutout during a 3-0 Big Ten Conference victory over Michigan State.

The win on Dec. 12 was huge at the time. It closed out a difficult first half of the season on an upbeat note. It salvaged a series split one day after UW blew a pair of two-goal leads and dropped a 4-3 decision to the Spartans. It also ended a six-game winless streak.

But as the red and white Badger Bus made its way from Munn Ice Arena to the airport in East Lansing, Michigan, Jurusik was in mourning.

His father, Mike, had just pulled him aside and told him that his maternal grandfather, Jerry Kowalski, had died in his sleep earlier that day.

"Really tough to hear," Matt said.

"It was a tough moment for both of us," the father said. "I think we both recognized how much of a fan he was of Matt."

Kowalski, the father of five and grandfather of 12, was 79. Five weeks earlier, he and his wife, Helen, accompanied their son-in-law to Madison to watch Matt play in a non-conference series opener against Arizona State. They saw Matt make 18 saves in a 5-1 victory and later had a keepsake photo – Matt between his beaming grandparents – taken at the Kohl Center.

Tracy Jurusik said the trip from Burr Ridge, Illinois, fulfilled a wish her father had.

"He really wanted to see Matthew play in Madison," she said.

"He was so glad he had a chance to."

That trip was one of the memories that came flooding back to Matt and his father as they had their poignant talk.

"We had a couple tears, but also a couple smiles reminiscing on Grandpa K and everything he did when he was around," Matt said. "We have a ton of good memories and that makes it easier."

Jurusik and his grandfather, who ran a trucking company in Summit, Illinois, were close even though Matt had been away from his home in LaGrange, Illinois, playing hockey since junior high school.

"My dad was so proud of him," Tracy said.

"I know he was my No. 1 fan," Matt said.

That emotional moment is part of a unique narrative that is Matt Jurusik's rookie season with the Badgers. Heading into a Big Ten rematch with Michigan State on Friday and Saturday at the Kohl Center, it's been anything but ordinary.

Until mid-summer, Jurusik wasn't part of the goaltending picture at UW. Wisconsin coach Mike Eaves had signed Luke Opilka out of the U.S. National Team Developmental Program and Opilka was the projected starter for 2015-16 and beyond.

But Opilka decided in early July that he would turn pro, signing with his hometown St. Louis Blues after they tabbed him in the fifth round of the NHL Entry Draft, and creating a huge void on the UW roster.

Eaves and his new staff, associate head coach Luke Strand and assistant JB Bittner, knew of Jurusik and his stellar work with Janesville of the North American Hockey League (33 wins, 1.57 goals against average, .939 save ratio) last season. Another recruiting process kicked into gear.

A host of schools had targeted Jurusik for 2016-17, but not only was he intent on playing as an 18-year-old – he's the youngest starting goaltender among the 59 NCAA Division I programs – he wanted access to as much playing time as possible.

That ultimately led him to the Badgers, whose lone returnees, senior Adam Miller and redshirt freshman Gabe Grunwald, had zero starts between them.

"A lot of colleges were interested in him, but he had it in his mind that he wanted a big-time program and he was going to hold out for that," Tracy Jurusik said.

"I knew I'd have a chance to play right away," said Matt, who also had drawn interest from multiple Major Junior clubs in Canada. "I wanted to push myself to step in as a young guy and play at this level."

Landing Jurusik wasn't all that difficult, but the mechanics of getting him admitted to school, finding housing and inserting him into an unfamiliar team setting at that late stage were "daunting," according to Eaves.

"It was so crazy," Tracy Jurusik said. "I do remember thinking it was pretty flawless, but there was a lot to do in a very short amount of time."

"It was a crazy time, but it all worked out miraculously."

Jurusik, listed at 6-foot-2 and 193 pounds, is young enough that he showed up on campus wearing braces on his teeth. They were gone before the first game, but not before he caught some good-natured flak from teammates.

"That didn't help with the chirping," he said. "But I got them off and grew up a little bit, so it's going good."

Jurusik, one of nine freshmen to play in at least 10 games for the Badgers, goes by the curious nickname of "Jannie." It was bestowed upon him by a fellow rookie, winger Luke Kunin, and refers to Steve Janaszak, the backup goaltender for Team USA in 1980 who never played for the iconic gold medal winners in the Winter Olympics.

"The first week we here he was just joking around," Jurusik said of Kunin. "It just stuck."

"I think it might have been a little of a backhanded compliment or chirp, but I like it. I think it's funny and the guys like it, too."

Jurusik has turned in some noteworthy performances. In addition to getting his first career shutout on the road, he beat the top-ranked team on the road – a 3-1 decision over North Dakota on Nov. 6 – and made 54 saves – the most by UW freshman – during a 4-3 overtime loss at Penn State.

But his overall statistics – 6-11-6, 3.40 goals against and a .893 save ratio in 25 starts – suggest there have been some struggles, too.

"They're definitely not good numbers," Jurusik said, "but I'm a young guy and I'm learning. There've been a couple blips in the road, but other than that I've had some really solid games over the course of the year."

That description fits the Badgers, who are 6-13-7 overall, but have had the lead or been tied in the third period of 18 games.

"It's about finding consistency and the numbers will come up," Jurusik said of his own game. "I see it as I need to settle down and become more consistent."

"I really don't see myself as an under .900 goalie, but that's where I am right now. I just need to work every day and get better. The better I get the better chance we have to win as a team."

Eaves said judging Jurusik's season to date means looking at the big picture, not a thumbnail sketch.

"You take all that's gone on in his life, if you're just a pure hockey person, you're thinking those numbers aren't very good," Eaves said. "But if you look at the whole picture, those numbers are darn good."

Jurusik said things have calmed down since his whirlwind introduction to college life. He said he hasn't decided on a major, but had a 2.5 grade-point average his first semester.

"It was a little hectic for a couple months there, but it settled down a couple weeks into school," he said.

Jurusik was asked if he has a philosophy for being adaptable.

"I just feel everything will work out eventually," he said.

"You just have to work hard and put your mind to it."

"You have to have fun. I haven't had a bad day here yet. I'm having fun every day."

"We're going in the right direction. I'm going in the right direction."

Before he died, Jurusik's grandfather saw him win his first collegiate game.

After he died, it's fair to wonder if Grandpa K was involved once again in his first collegiate shutout.

"I have no doubt in my mind," Tracy Jurusik said.

"A lot of people have said that, that he was watching over me as I played," Matt said. "I don't know if that's what it took to get the job done, but it got done."

## Forward Corbin McGuire makes quick adjustment in role as defenseman

Corbin McGuire admits he had to fight his forward instincts at times when he made his debut as a defenseman for the University of Wisconsin men's hockey team a couple weeks ago.

"You could see it when you go back and watch the film," McGuire said. "There were a few times you could see that I wanted to jump up in the play and get involved in the forecheck. But then I'd say, 'Oh, yeah, I'm a defenseman now, I have to pull back on the reins a little bit.'"

The confusion is understandable considering he had never played the position in a game before that series against Alaska.

McGuire was pushed into duty on defense out of necessity due to the absence of senior captain Eddie Wittchow (suspension) and freshman Patrick Sexton (lower-body injury).

McGuire, normally a third- or fourth-line forward, was told on Monday before the Alaska series he could be pressed into duty on defense, and on Tuesday he began a crash course in practice.

McGuire, a redshirt sophomore from Ridgefield, Connecticut, proved to be a quick learner as he scored the first goal of the series — just his second of the season — and finished the weekend with a plus-4 rating as the Badgers swept the Nanooks 4-3 and 5-2.

"Everybody helped me out so much, between the coaching staff and all the guys on the team," McGuire said. "They were just giving me little pointers all week."

Now that he's had two more weeks of practice, McGuire's career as a defenseman will last at least one more game as the Badgers (6-12-6, 1-7-2-1 Big Ten Conference) meet high-scoring Michigan (17-4-4, 8-2-2-1) tonight and Saturday at the Kohl Center.

On Saturday, he could be back to his old job as Wittchow returns from his three-game Big Ten ban.

"He continues to take reps in practice and for him he just plays hockey," UW coach Mike Eaves said. "Whether he's forward or defenseman, he's doing the right things in the position that he's in."

"I know on our big sheet of ice, the one thing that coach Luke (Strand) liked a lot was that the fact that he could skate and go back and get pucks and that was a big asset for us."

Strand, the associate head coach, said McGuire was the first player that came to mind when the staff began mulling possible fill-ins on defense.

"He was the first guy on the list that has the skill set that says he could adapt and take it on," Strand said. "The one thing that has helped Corbin is his maturity. He wants to be in the lineup and he has a good grasp of things."

"His attributes as a player — his skating, his stick, his compete — those things add up to be pretty good pieces of defense. And if you want a team to play faster, it has to start at the back end and they have to be able to skate or move the puck quicker. He brought both of those."

Corbin credited his partner, senior co-captain Kevin Schulze, with helping guide him through his new duties during the games.

"I joked with Kevin all week that if you don't think you need to talk, just do, because it's me back there with you," McGuire said. "So just talk me through everything and I'm a good learner that way. Every small play, just say here, here, here, do this, do that. He helped me out so much."

"There's a lot of ways you can play defense and I just told myself make simple plays, don't try to be something you're not and things will work out if you make some plays and have trust in the guys who are out there with you."

Assuming he eventually returns to playing forward, McGuire thinks his experience playing defense will prove helpful.

"I've learned that forwards want to make a nice play to beat you all the time," he said. "If you keep it simple as a forward and use

speed, that's the hardest thing as a defenseman to gap up and gauge speed. It's not the toe drags around guys that beat defensemen, it's the speed."

McGuire knows he will likely be tested against Michigan's high-powered attack, but he's looking forward to the challenge. The Wolverines, who had an eight-game unbeaten streak snapped last Friday with a 3-2 overtime loss to Michigan State, put up 12 goals against the Badgers in their first series this season in Ann Arbor.

"Michigan has a lot of very good forwards and that will be a tough test for all of our defensemen to match those guys," McGuire said. "I'm excited to get out there against some of those high-end guys they have at forward and try to shut them down. I'm sure I'll give them an earful if I do."

## Leadership more than a letter for Hughes

Leadership is not a temporary thing. You either show up with a plan and your best intentions, or you step aside and make room for someone who will.

In a way, Cameron Hughes, a sophomore center for the Wisconsin men's hockey team, is an exception to that rule.

Hughes will have an "A" on his sweater, signifying his role as an assistant captain, when the Badgers open a Big Ten Conference series with Michigan on Friday night at the Kohl Center.

But when the series finale rolls around Saturday night, Hughes figures to be back to his plain attire, that big red letter no longer on display over his heart.

Call it a technicality.

Hughes is still seen as a leader in the Wisconsin dressing room, but the mechanics of the moment call for a change.

Hughes received an honorary promotion last month after senior defenseman and co-captain Eddie Wittchow was suspended by the Big Ten for three games following his major penalty and game disqualification against Minnesota on Jan. 23.

With Wittchow sidelined for a non-conference series vs. Alaska on Jan. 29 and 30, senior defenseman and co-captain Kevin Schulze wore the "C" and Hughes joined junior winger Grant Besse as assistants.

Wittchow will remain in street clothes on Friday, but will be back in uniform on Saturday. Since the team has a self-imposed rule that three players can wear the letters of leadership, Hughes will be back to his old self.

Not that it really matters.

"Cam, he's going to be leader with or without a letter," Wittchow said. "Ever since he got her on campus he's been a consistent leader for us. It's crazy when you find out his age that he has those leadership skills."

Hughes is 19 on a team with eight players 22 or older. He was one of the youngest players in college hockey when he debuted at age 17 in October of 2014.

The decision to give Hughes the "A" came from Wisconsin coach Mike Eaves and his staff, who felt the level-headed kid from Edmonton, Alberta, had earned it with his effort and consistency.

"He definitely deserved it," Wittchow said.

The fact Hughes could be heard speaking loudly and passionately to his teammates in the aftermath of a painful, humbling Big Ten sweep at the hands of Minnesota - 4-0 and 9-2 losses at home - no doubt factored into the move.

"Definitely cool," Hughes said of the honor. "I just tried to approach it the same as any other game."

Despite missing three outings with a variety of ailments this season, Hughes has 14 points (three goals and 11 assists) and has already surpassed his point total from a year ago when he appeared in 34 games (3-10-13).

Hughes, a sixth-round NHL draft pick of Boston, has played left wing and the pivot, worked on the power play and penalty kill and is expected to center the top line for Wisconsin (6-12-6 overall, 1-7-2-1 with six points in the Big Ten) against the first-place and sixth-ranked Wolverines (17-4-4, 8-2-2-1, 27 points).

That means Hughes, Besse, the right winger, and freshman left winger Luke Kunin figure to see a lot of Michigan's electrifying CCM Line featuring left winger Kyle Connor (20-24-44), center JT Compher (10-28-38) and right winger Tyler Motte (25-14-39).

That assignment pales in comparison to other leadership challenges that Hughes has been asked to take on.

He's the oldest of four boys and his parents, Brian and Pauline, made it clear to Cameron that he would serve as a role model to 16-year-old Ryan, 13-year-old Liam and 9-year-old Ethan. That meant maximum effort, patience and respect for others.

"He has to set an example in the public eye and on the ice - all that stuff," Brian said of Cameron. "His brothers look up to him so he has to pave the way, so to speak."

It helps that all four boys love hockey - Ryan is a center for Portland of the Western Hockey League - and their parents are enthusiastic supporters.

"A lot of responsibility," Cameron said of being the oldest child.

The Hughes family is so tight-knit that the six piled into an RV and made the 1,300-mile drive from Edmonton to Madison to bring Cameron to UW the first time.

"Good times going down (from Canada)," Brian said of the adventure. "The kids will never forget it."

Cameron's instincts for leadership and accountability were molded earlier than most. He was in grade school when his father pulled him aside and told him that a classmate in the neighborhood, a girl, needed looking after.

Haley Klak lived two doors down from Cameron. They soon became best friends.

"A really special girl," Cameron said.

Klak was born with Neurofibromatosis 1, a genetically transmitted disease in which nerve cells grow tumors. The growths may be harmless or, in this case, damage nerves and other tissues.

Klak was 18 months old when a tumor developed near her optic nerve, costing her the vision in her left eye and problems with her right.

She was 9 when she suffered a stroke and spent more than two years recovering. Klak had to relearn to speak, understand the alphabet and count.

Brian Hughes was worried that kids would tease or bully the girl and gave his oldest son an assignment.

"Be her guardian," the father said.

While Cameron said there may have been moments of insensitivity early in the process, problems dissipated in middle school.

"I was always there just in case," Cameron said.

"That's a big responsibility for a kid who's 6, 7, 8 years old," Brian Hughes said.

Klak was stubborn. She didn't want people feeling sorry for her. When she was hospitalized with an inoperable brain tumor - she was 11 when she died in 2008 - she hung a sign on her door that read "Happy Faces Only."

Cameron's priorities were on display during and after Haley's memorial service. The coach of his youth hockey team had a rule that if a player missed practice he would have to sit out the start of the next game.

The memorial service conflicted with practice, so Cameron was benched to start the next game. His coach didn't know why Hughes was late until after the fact. According to Pauline Hughes, her son stood up for the coach when some of the other players' parents became angry.

When Hughes finally entered the game, he immediately scored a goal.

"A very inspirational day," Pauline Hughes said.

"I think that's part of his character now," Brian Hughes said of his son's relationship with Klak. "It gave him a little bit broader shoulders."

Cameron's career at UW hasn't gone all that well. In addition to a series of nagging injuries, his rookie season was a record-setting struggle (4-26-5) and he's yet to find a scoring rhythm.

Instead of feeling sorry for himself, he thinks of his childhood friend.

"The way she handled everything really taught me a lot," Cameron said. "She taught me a lot for sure."

Eaves compares Hughes' leadership profile to that of Adam Burish, a two-time captain who wore the "C" in 2006 when the Badgers won their last NCAA title.

"Cameron is of that same mold," Eaves said.

Hughes' growth as a team leader can be seen through the TV screen from hundreds of miles away.

"When I do see him out there I sense that he does have a sense of responsibility and [is] a leader," Brian Hughes said. "I can see it. It's a good trait to have."

### **Sew much to say: Family shows support with clever clothing**

It all began with two tiny gestures of affection.

On Nov. 28, 2014, the Wisconsin men's hockey team was hosting Ferris State in a non-conference series opener at the Kohl Center when goaltender Joel Rumpel saw something in the audience that made him smile.

There was 5-year-old Liam Wallock, sitting with his family along the glass, with Rumpel's uniform No. 33 painted on his cheeks.

When the game was over, after the Badgers played to 1-1 overtime draw and prevailed in a shootout, Rumpel skated over to where the boy was sitting and gave him a fist bump through the plexiglass.

It was a satisfying memory for Rumpel and his teammates. The decision snapped an eight-game season-opening losing streak and dovetailed into a 5-3 victory the following night.

But it was a life-altering moment for the Wallock family in part because a friend snapped a keepsake photo of the exchange. Liam went home that night and it was all he could talk about, so his father, Matthew, decided to celebrate the occasion with a creative, endearing project.

The results can be seen most every Friday home game. The Wallock kids — Liam and 4-year-old sister Aoife (pronounced Eee-fa) — come wearing T-shirts that reflect their love for the Badgers in general and certain players in particular.

Perhaps you've seen them at games or via social media? They're not sold anywhere because that would violate NCAA rules, but also because it was never the Wallocks' intent to do so.

"It turned into a way to kind of support the team," Matthew said.

"Rumpel Saves" was one of the first to create a stir. It shows Rumpel's face in a famously Biblical backdrop, complete with halo and flowing robe.

"Free Eddie" and "Jurisik Park" are two of the most recent. The former features senior defenseman Eddie Wittchow, who's been known to take a few penalties, while the latter cleverly links freshman goaltender Matt Jurisik to a Hollywood blockbuster movie.

There are others. One shines an election year spotlight on former Wisconsin women's standout Hilary Knight ("Hilary in 2016"). Another commemorates former Badgers standouts Derek Stepan and Joe Pavelski as captains for the annual Blake Geoffrion Charity Classic last summer. Still another gives some love to Trace Browning, the guy who typically mans a video board camera at the Kohl Center.

The design that speaks loudest about the Wallocks is one that reads "4-24-4. Still Here."

The T-shirt project began during the most trying season in program history. Wisconsin finished 4-26-4 overall — including a 3-11-4 mark at home — but instead of being turned off like some fans, the Wallocks became more invested. The "Still Here" shirt was seen at the final home series.

"We felt almost obligated as the season got worse and worse," Matthew said. "We didn't want to be the fans that just stopped and gave up."

Among the examples Matthew, 31, and his wife, 29-year-old Holly, set for their children are to stay until the end of every game regardless of the score and cheer for the players until all had left the ice.

"It was our very, very small way of supporting the team and the players," Matthew said.

The Wallocks are UW grads who live in Madison. Matthew, a lawyer, grew up in Plover and played varsity golf alongside Pavelski at Stevens Point High School. He said Holly's family has long followed Wisconsin hockey, which helps explain why the Wallocks have Friday season tickets along the glass in Section 101.

"The community of Badger hockey fans is really strong," Matthew said. "It's fun to be a part of it."

The T-shirt project drew the Wallocks close to their subjects, but especially Rumpel and Wittchow.

"They're such unbelievably good guys," Matthew said.

A week after having Rumpel's number painted on his face, Liam showed up for a Big Ten Conference series with Penn State with a beaded necklace bearing a picture of Rumpel. That drew a wave from Rumpel, who left after his senior season as one of the most accomplished goaltenders in school history. He finished second on the all-time list in shutouts with 10, third in save percentage at .918, fourth in minutes played and fifth in wins with 53.

When the "Rumpel Saves" T-shirt showed up on social media last season, it triggered all sorts of interest.

"I've had a number of people contact me on Twitter or even by email asking where they could buy them," Matthew said.

Wittchow and Jurusik now get the same question.

"I get texts every time after they tweet one out," Wittchow said of the Wallocks.

"I think my family would like to get a couple," Jurusik said of his parents, Mike and Tracy. "Everyone's asking me where they can pick up one of those shirts."

Wittchow said his parents, Steve and Tina, have gotten so caught up in the project that the background to Tina's cell phone is a picture of Aoife Wallock wearing her "Free Eddie" T-shirt.

Knight, the two-time Olympian and the all-time leading scorer in UW women's history, sent the Wallocks a thank-you note after seeing a picture of Aoife wearing her "Hilary in 2016" shirt.

Matthew Wallock stressed that Holly has veto power over the T-shirt topics and she's not afraid to use it.

The relationship between the Wallocks and Eddie Wittchow predates this season. Matthew once tutored Wittchow, an economics major. When Wittchow returned from an early-season injury in 2014-15, Aoife wore a "Welcome Back Eddie" shirt. The bond became stronger when Liam got an autograph from Wittchow and struck up a conversation.

According to Matthew Wallock, his son's teachers asked who Wittchow was because Liam spoke of him so often.

"It's kind of hysterical," Wittchow said. "I know right where their seats are now, so in warmups I'll give them a little wave. I know they always enjoy that."

What did Wittchow think the first time he saw one of his themed T-shirts?

"I was laughing, but humbled, too, that a family would pick me out of the crowd," he said. "It's not like I'm a high scorer or anything like that. Just a defensive defenseman, so it's not a fan-favorite type of position."

Wittchow, whose gregarious nature belies his menacing, 6-foot-4, 215-pound presence on the ice, made a point of visiting the

Wallock children at their preschool and reading books with them and their classmates. He also volunteered to come out with his sticks to show the kids how play the game.

"It's cool and very humbling," said Wittchow, whose 17 penalties are tied for most on the team. "It really shows how big the spotlight can be sometimes on guys like us. We're just college-age guys and sometimes we take our opportunities for granted and don't really think much about it.

"Then something like this comes around and gives us a moment to stop and think about what kind of mentors we are to people and how many people look up to us."

Jurusik had the same thought.

"Going through the day to day, sometimes you lose sight of how much people really look up to us and the stock in what we're doing," he said. "It's awesome to see."

## Jurusik grows during UW's down year

With gnarly beards, missing teeth and deep scars, hockey players often look menacing and intimidating.

However, goalie Matt Jurusik showed up in Madison last fall with braces on his teeth.

As if he was not already set up for jokes aimed at his youth, the freshman with self-described big cheeks had to endure a couple weeks of chirping about his braces, which senior Kevin Schulze described as endless.

Nonetheless, Jurusik has been solid as the netminder for Wisconsin this year, posting a .892 save percentage. But he has had his share of ups and down, allowing eight goals against Minnesota, a game in which he was pulled for a brief time. However, he has also posted a shutout and has allowed just one goal in three games.

"It's not been all roses that's for sure. That's been a big part of his growth are the ups and downs of being a freshman goalie and thrust into a position of being the goaltender of a Division 1 team," head coach Mike Eaves said. "There's been many games where he's been outstanding and there's been games where he would like to have some of those goals back."

The high points came after a shutout of Michigan State followed up by a 54-save night against Penn State two weeks later, a game in which the Badgers took an overtime loss.

"It helped my confidence for sure knowing I could go through a tough grueling game like that, but yeah, it was tough to lose in overtime," Jurusik said of the Penn State game.

Just one week after came the lowest of the lows, as he struggled through the contest against archrival Minnesota.

However, Jurusik handled the rough game like a seasoned veteran, turning it around the following weekend and allowing five goals over two games, both of them victories over Alaska.

"I didn't get too down about it, you just need to learn how to put those games out of your head and move on, so it was a really good lesson," Jurusik said. "Mental toughness you know, turning the page and forgetting about it and trying to prepare for the weekend we had; last weekend [against Alaska] which was really nice."

Eaves and freshman forward Luke Kunin were quick to praise Jurusik for his resilience, saying it's been the biggest part of his development as a young goaltender.

"You don't go through all easy times, they're not all bowls of cherries," Eaves said. "The nice thing about Matty is to see how he responded after that Saturday night game against Minnesota where he had a good week of practice and he came back and got a couple wins for us."

"Everyone's gonna have rough games here or there but the way you bounce back from it is I think is the biggest part," Kunin said.

“That Minnesota weekend he wishes he was better, he had a good bounceback weekend, and played great for us.”

In the highest pressure position in the sport, Jurusik was certainly given a tall task as the man between the pipes for a storied program like Wisconsin. It wouldn't be accurate to say he has blown expectations out of the water, because, as Eaves said, there's been plenty of games where he hasn't performed brilliantly.

But, possibly more important than his stat line is his mental growth as a hockey player, an area he has shown maturity in. Allowing eight goals in front of the biggest Kohl Center crowd this year could have caused a young goalie to fold over, but Jurusik picked his head up and got his team back in the win column less than a week later, an attitude that will serve him well as he continues his career.

“The sky's the limit. I don't think it's fair to put limitations on him,” said Eaves. “I think in his athleticism he reminds me of Joel Rumpel and he's got a good work ethic much like a Landon Peterson, so with that combination, with the work he's doing with Jeff Sanger, our goalie coach, I think we will find out together what his top end is.”

That's some pretty high praise for a guy who is only 18 years old. Rumpel, who posted a .902 save percentage for the Badgers last year, is currently in the San Jose Sharks organization. But Eaves is not the only one with high expectations for Jurusik. He's set some lofty goals for himself as well.

“I really want to be a dominant goaltender, no matter what age I am, no matter what class I am, I want to be one of the best goaltenders in the league and I'm working toward that right now, so hopefully I get there soon,” Jurusik said.

The baby-faced goalie with braces has grown up quite a bit in just a few short months.

## **Kunin a bright light for Wisconsin**

One night when Luke Kunin was in sixth grade, he had trouble sleeping.

“I was drinking [a lot] of water at night and was just thirsty, thirsty, thirsty and I was going to the bathroom a lot. ... I wasn't playing my best hockey and we knew something was going on,” Kunin said.

Kunin's parents took him to the doctor — where they found out he had diabetes.

“My parents were very supportive about helping me when I first got it, but I'd say after about a month or two of having it, it was pretty much all me, all my own,” Kunin said.

“It's no one else's problem to deal with and I don't want other people to be worrying about it. I don't think it was too much of an adjustment, I just took care of it all by myself and just wanted it to be my thing to worry about.”

A childhood diet of healthy foods and minimal junk food mitigated Kunin's lifestyle change.

“Counting the carbs, now you get kind of used to it,” Kunin said. “It's not as hard to calculate your insulin dosages and how much you need to take. But it's definitely been a little bit of a learning curve and I'm still learning to this day. Every day you learn more stuff as you go along with it and get more familiar with it. It's been, I wouldn't say too hard, but it's definitely been a little bit of a challenge.

“But I'm handling it really well.”

Kunin, one of Wisconsin's leading scorers, monitors his blood sugar level at least eight times a day. On game days, the forward usually monitors it a little more.

“He's a tremendously hard worker and I think that comes from the fact that he's kind of an old soul. For being 18 years old, he has very clear goals in his mind and he knows what he needs to do to achieve those goals,” Wisconsin head coach Mike Eaves said.

“He learned at a young age that here's certain things in life that you just have to take care of. ... He's willing to go on the ice early in the morning and do some extra work, get an extra workout in, and he's all figured this out even before he got here. Him being an old soul, being mature is really a big strength of his.”

The extra work is important for Kunin, who's in his draft year. The forward is one of the top freshmen in the country, a Hobey Baker Award nominee and expected first-round pick.

“He has the versatility to play in a lot of different spots and I think that'll help him as he moves up the ladder, because a lot of times as you climb you if you are versatile you give yourself a better [chance] to get a job,” Eaves said.

“He understands what the game is about, he's got a vision of the ice that allows him to make plays because he's got those puck skills. But one of his gifts is he's got a tremendous shot. And when he can get that thing off, it's truly a weapon.”

The forward is on a three-game goal-scoring streak, which started on a four-point night against Ohio State. Kunin recorded a goal and three assists, factoring in all four goals in the tie. He's certainly been a bright spot for a team that is struggling mightily for a second straight season, some positivity in a sea of negativity swirling around the team. The Badgers, two years removed from winning the inaugural Big Ten tournament, have four wins on the season.

“I just wanted to get here and help the team, help the team get better and do whatever I could to turn the program around after a rough year,” Kunin said. “It was a little disappointing to see. Obviously you always want to see the team that you're committed to do well, but I was excited to get here this summer and get to work and help the team turn it around.”

Kunin, a product of the National Team Development Program, said he's worked on his positioning. The forward has 18 points, which ranks 12th amongst freshmen in the country.

“He takes control of games, he makes plays. His speed, his strength is one of his best qualities.” Kunin's teammate and roommate Seamus Malone said.

“He's just getting stronger and stronger as the days go by and I think he's getting smarter, that hockey IQ is improving and I just think his overall skill is getting better. A lot has improved since the start of the year even though it has been a short time which just goes to show how much he can improve in the future.”

Despite Kunin's commitment, rumors were raised earlier in the year that Kunin was departing for the OHL.

“It didn't come from me or my family or anyone or around me,” Kunin said. “It was just rumors and it's nothing that I can control. [I'm] just worrying about what I can control and that's what I'm doing here at Wisconsin.”

It's the same approach Kunin has taken to this season, which is his draft year.

“He puts pressure on himself anyway. He wants to be the man every game,” Eaves said. “He's a point-producing forward and when you have that kind of mindset, when you don't produce, you feel like you let your teammates down so he's a guy that puts pressure on himself all the time and this is all part of what's he's dealt with his whole life.”

Wherever Kunin gets taken in the draft, diabetes won't be a factor.

“[There are] no problems with it, everything's good,” Kunin said. “You see guys in the NHL that have it, guys like Max Domi [who] are doing good things in the NHL at a young age that have it. It doesn't seem like a problem for them, so it's not for me either.”

## Hometown Heroes: Badgers title run deeply rooted in Wisconsin

The anniversary beckons, leaving Jake Dowell sounding incredulous.

"It doesn't really seem like it could be possible," he said.

Ten seasons ago, the Wisconsin men's hockey team traveled a unique path to winning the sixth NCAA title in program history. Dowell was a junior wing/center on that club, an Eau Claire native whose state-centric roots were a major theme in that achievement.

More than half the 25-man roster hailed from Wisconsin and, thanks to good timing and fortune, the Badgers played all four national tournament games without having to leave the state. They won the NCAA Midwest Regional at the Resch Center in Green Bay, punctuated by a stirring victory over Cornell that required three overtimes. They followed that up with Frozen Four wins over Maine and Boston College at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee.

The 2-1 triumph over BC was a watershed moment for Wisconsin hockey. It came two weeks after the women's team knocked off Minnesota 3-0 at Mariucci Arena in Minneapolis to secure the first NCAA championship in that program's history. No other school before or since has claimed both Division I titles in the same season.

The 10th anniversary of that landmark double will be celebrated on multiple fronts this weekend. Members of those two teams will be honored Saturday night during a non-league series with Alaska at the Kohl Center. Members of that women's squad will be recognized Saturday afternoon during a Western Collegiate Hockey Association series with St. Cloud State at LaBahn Arena.

Asked to define the legacy of that men's team, Dowell was direct.

"It's still the closest team I've ever been on," he said.

"Everybody for the most part has stayed in contact with everybody. It's a pretty special group."

The legacy goes much deeper than that, though.

Eleven members of that club went on to play in the NHL — including seven who skated in at least 100 games — and five are currently on active NHL rosters: goaltender Brian Elliott with St. Louis, defenseman Tom Gilbert with Montreal, winger Jack Skille and center Ben Street with Colorado and center Joe Pavelski with San Jose.

Two played for Stanley Cup champions (center Adam Burish with Chicago in 2010 and defenseman Davis Drewiske with Los Angeles in '12) and two more played in the NHL All-Star Game (Elliott with the Blues in 2012 and 2015 and Pavelski with the Sharks this year).

Dowell, Drewiske and defenseman Joe Piskula are playing for the American Hockey League affiliates of Chicago, Philadelphia and Anaheim, respectively.

Six of the '06 alums are currently playing professionally in Europe — Burish and winger Robbie Earl in Sweden and center Andrew Joudrey, defenseman Kyle Klubertanz, defenseman Jeff Likens and winger Ryan MacMurchy in Germany — which means there will be a very light turnout for the reunion.

"It sucks there won't be that many guys there, but it says something that so many guys are still playing," Dowell said.

Wisconsin coach Mike Eaves said the fact that 15 members of that club are still skating professionally and that 19 are still involved in hockey — either playing or coaching — is a testament to its quality.

"That's pretty neat," he said. "That speaks to the (talent) level of that team."

According to Dowell, a summertime reunion built around barbecues, fishing and golf is being planned during which the locals — Burish, Earl, Elliott, Gilbert, Joudrey and Pavelski are known to have homes in the Madison area — will serve as hosts.

"We'll get cozy," Dowell said wryly. "I think everyone can fit at Gilbert's house."

Dowell may be able to help because he and his wife, Carly, are looking to settle here as well. That's part of a plan that includes him securing the final six credits he needs for a degree in sociology. He would be the 15th member of that team to graduate from Wisconsin. Four others — Drewiske, Earl, Piskula and Skille — are actively pursuing degrees as well.

A lot of living can be crammed into 10 years, and no one knows that better than Dowell. He's seen death in its cruelest form, felt the crushing weight of life-threatening dread and teetered on the edge of an emotional abyss. He's also brought new life into the world, had his greatest fear dissolve into ecstasy and explored the boundaries of rebirth.

Dowell spent a good chunk of his 30 years wondering how he would die. He was 16 when his father, John, was found to have Huntington's disease, a fatal genetic disorder that kills brain cells and erodes motor skills. There is no cure. His only brother, Luke, also was diagnosed with HD. There was a 50-50 chance Jake had the gene as well.

John Dowell died Feb. 13, 2014 at the age of 58. Luke, 31, needs 24-hour care for his HD and bipolar schizophrenia.

The specter of HD followed Jake from the U.S. National Team Development Program in Ann Arbor, Michigan, to Madison and to eight different pro stops in five states and two countries. He kept putting off getting the necessary blood test in part because a positive test might affect his employment status.

"Whether I ever consciously knew I was thinking about it, it was always in the back of my mind and I knew I would have to face the music with it," he said.

During a doctor's appointment in November, Dowell, on a whim, asked that blood be drawn and forwarded to Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, for testing.

"I was really struggling with it for a little while at the end of the summer and the start of the season," he said of the decision. "There was a lot going on."

Dowell, who's played in 157 career NHL games with Chicago, Dallas and Minnesota, was out of work until he tried out for the Blackhawks' AHL affiliate in Rockford.

Luke wasn't doing well, either, and that was compounded by the fact his care facility was closing.

There also was the matter of fatherhood. Jake and Carly became parents in July when Elizabeth Claire was born.

"It all made me come back to thinking about (the test) and whether or not I was sick," Dowell said. "I said, 'I've got to get that done.'"

Three weeks passed before Dowell got a text message from his physician late on a Saturday afternoon.

"I'm leaving work in five minutes," it said. "Call me."

Dowell stepped out of the house and called knowing he had a game that night. The best possible news was delivered.

Carly didn't know her husband had gotten the text or made the call. Her reaction?

"Just shock," Jake said.

Perhaps the best call was made to Dowell's mother, Vicki, who tended to her husband and oldest son and watched them deteriorate.

"I had to get off the phone with her because she was screaming so loud I couldn't take it," Jake said. "I couldn't understand a thing she said, but it was awesome."

Can a 30-year-old man be reborn? In this case, yes.

"I know it's such a cliché to say it, but it feels like a weight's been lifted off my shoulders," he said. "It's so much lighter because I'm not thinking about it."

ESPN did an E:60 episode on Dowell's plight two years ago. They came back to film the joyous conclusion last week. Not only is Dowell the captain of the Icehogs, he was chosen to play in the AHL All-Star Game.

"To finally know that I can just be normal is amazing," he said.

Dowell said he long wanted a family, but it never crossed his mind that he'd ever have a daughter. A prenatal test comparing DNA samples determined little Ellie wasn't a carrier of the HD gene.

"I always thought about playing hockey, baseball and football with a little boy," he said.

Elizabeth Claire now owns his heart.

"Whatever it is, I get to be around for it now," Dowell said. "It's great."

As for his brother, Dowell said a woman who grew close to Luke during his stay at the care facility took him into her home and now oversees his round-the-clock care.

"It's one of those things that unless you live it, you don't have a clue what some of those people go through," Jake said.

The positive diagnosis made it easier for Dowell to reminisce about that fabled team from a decade ago, one that finished 30-10-3 overall and remains the signature achievement of the Eaves Era. To this day, most everyone is an enthusiastic participant on an email exchange.

"Just a good group of guys," Dowell said, noting that Drewiske is the godfather to his child. "There's so many little inside jokes that come out in all these emails, mocking everybody. It's all in good fun and everything. They're things you may have forgotten about and it's so funny."

Like the trophy. The original developed some — ahem — blemishes during the title-winning celebration that lasted into the wee morning hours and beyond. A replacement had to be purchased, which Pavelski invoked during a recent flurry of emails.

"I'm pretty sure we own that trophy now," he wrote. "We had to pay for it."

Thirteen members of the team were from Wisconsin, which is why their favorite memory might not be that come-from-behind win over BC before a partisan sellout crowd of 17,758 at the Bradley Center.

"It's easy to say the national championship game," Dowell said, "but the Lambeau Field game was one of the coolest experiences."

The Badgers defeated Ohio State 4-2 in the inaugural Frozen Tundra Classic at the iconic NFL facility. Dowell didn't know it at the time, but his future in-laws, both Ohio State graduates, were in the stands that early February day. His future wife, meanwhile, was a Wisconsin freshman cheering for the Badgers.

"Small world," Dowell said.

Led by the Wisconsin natives, the victory was memorably celebrated with a collective Lambeau Leap. Oddly, Dowell has played at Lambeau Field, but never been there as a spectator to see the Packers play there.

"Makes it even cooler," he said.

The men's and women's teams were close long before they picked up matching NCAA championship trophies in 2006. The two-time captain of the men's team was Adam Burish, a senior winger. An assistant captain for the women's team was his sister, Nikki Burish, a senior center. Both grew up in Madison and shared gregarious personalities.

"With Adam and Nikki being so close, they spent a lot of time together, so whenever Nikki would have some of the girls from that team around when we were all getting together," Dowell recalled.

Upon returning from Minneapolis, the newly crowned women's titlists scrawled good-natured challenges on a huge white board in a shared meeting room. When the bookends were secure, both teams shared the stage at a pep rally at the Kohl Center.

"It was really fun to be able to celebrate at the same time," Dowell said. "It was pretty cool."

Dowell was asked if there's a prevailing lesson from that team that rings true today.

"From that team specifically it was the importance of people buying into their role for the better of the team," he said. "Sometimes that's a tough pill to swallow, but you do your thing and we end up winning."

Dowell specifically cited the fourth line of center Andy Brandt and wingers A.J. Degenhardt and Nick Licari for their unselfishness.

"It's hard to even imagine that that's how deep our team was," Dowell said.

Memories of that season — how Elliott came back from a knee injury to fortify a stirring playoff run; how Pavelski emerged as a world-class talent; how the team regrouped after a 3-7-1 stretch in January and February — remain vivid 10 years later.

Eaves said a brutal February weekend at Minnesota State — 6-4 and 7-3 losses that gave way to a prolonged team meeting — proved to be a vital emotional kick-start.

"Something that appeared to be a real negative turned out to be the final piece of that team come together," Eaves said. "That's what resonates about that team."

Its signature feature remains strong a decade later.

"It was a team that really knew how to have a heck of a time," Dowell said, "but also really knew how to put the work in when we had to."

## **Recipe for Rivalry: Plenty of history in Badgers' weekend series**

The recipe for a creating a flavorful rivalry depends largely on who's doing the cooking.

History is a major ingredient, as is pain.

But what about mutual respect and dislike?

Two distinct Wisconsin hockey rivalries — one deep-seated and the other in the midst of a growth spurt — will be on display this weekend in Madison.

The men will host Minnesota in a Big Ten Conference series Friday and Saturday at the Kohl Center.

The women, meanwhile, will face North Dakota in a Western Collegiate Hockey Association series Saturday and Sunday at LaBahn Arena.

How do you define a quality rivalry?

"Something that dates back a while, a team you know very well and it's always fun to play them," said Kevin Schulze, a senior defenseman and co-captain for the Badgers men's team.

To wit: The men's squads in this series have been playing one another since 1922. These games will be the 275th and 276th in a border battle that's been staged indoors and out, under three affiliations (Big Ten, WCHA and independent) at sites in five states (Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri and Wisconsin) and nine cities (Ann Arbor, Bloomington, Chicago, Duluth, Madison, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, St. Louis and St. Paul).

"Two teams that are very competitive that have an extra kick in them when facing each other," said Rachel Jones, a senior winger for the Wisconsin women's team.

To wit: The women's squads in this series have played 54 times going back to 2004. The Badgers opened with 24 straight wins and prevailed in 34 of the first 36 meetings, but are 9-5-3 vs. North Dakota since the start of the 2012-13 season, with two of those losses coming in the semifinals of the WCHA playoffs and one coming at LaBahn.

A notable difference between the men's and women's rivalries this weekend is their pecking order.

With very few exceptions, Wisconsin players will tell you their biggest rival on the men's side is the Gophers.

"If you can't get up for the Minnesota games there's no reason to be a hockey player," senior defenseman and co-captain Eddie Wittchow said.

Schulze (White Bear Lake), Wittchow (Burnsville), freshman winger Tanner Barnes (Eagan), junior winger Grant Besse (Plymouth), freshman winger Matthew Freytag and sophomore defenseman/winger Cullen Hurley (Eagan) have the added incentive of having grown up in the land of Golden Gophers.

The second-ranked Wisconsin women, meanwhile, will tell you their top rival also wears Maroon and Gold and hails from Minneapolis.

"When you come to Wisconsin, the Gophers are automatically the No. 1 rivalry, but I'd say North Dakota is a close second," Jones said.

Minnesota has won five NCAA women's titles to the Badgers' four. Earlier this season Wisconsin (22-1-1 overall, 16-1-1 in the WCHA) ended an 18-game winless streak in the Border Battle series with a two-game sweep at LaBahn.

"I'd say Minnesota is our No. 1 rival," senior center Erika Sowchuk confirmed, "but North Dakota's definitely up there. They always give us a really good battle. You can never take them lightly."

The eighth-rated Fighting Hawks (13-6-3, 10-5-3) have the rare upper hand on Wisconsin this season. A 3-0 win and 0-0 overtime draw on Dec. 11 and 12 in Grand Forks, North Dakota, ended a season-opening 18-game winning streak by the Badgers.

Now the Fighting Hawks have their sights set on ending Wisconsin's 16-game winning streak at LaBahn that dates back to last season.

"They're known for breaking streaks, but the home-game winning streak is something that we don't really think about," junior defenseman Melissa Channell said.

Perhaps, but the eight Badgers seniors have long memories. They recall a WCHA playoff setback to North Dakota that ended their season in 2013 and another a year later. They also likely know that the Fighting Hawks have come to Madison and won at the Kohl Center as well as LaBahn.

"A little bit of pain can definitely fuel our fire," Sowchuk said.

On the men's side, the three Wisconsin seniors are 3-6-3 vs. the Gophers during their tenures, but you have to look a little deeper to appreciate the intensity. Seven of those 12 games were decided by one goal or less, with another ending with an empty-net conversion.

Wittchow said rivalries are built on games like that.

"It happens over years," he said. "Hard games played. Close games played. Just hard play."

Even though the Badgers (4-10-6, 1-5-2) and Minnesota (11-10, 6-2) are both unranked nationally, the degree of difficulty shouldn't wane.

Schulze said players on both sides of this Border Battle share the same emotions.

"We all feel that rivalry," he said.

Does a good rivalry need a healthy dose of dislike?

"To an extent, yeah," Channell said. "You love the girls on the team off the ice, but on the ice it's a whole different story."

Especially when the stakes are so high. While the Badgers are looking to atone for that lost weekend last month, North Dakota is looking to gain momentum for the stretch run and bolster its NCAA tournament resume.

"On the ice, there's always dislike," Schulze said.

"Without a doubt we respect them," Wittchow said of the Gophers, "but we also know they're our enemy, so we're going to treat them so. You wouldn't be a competitor without that."

Wisconsin has 13 first-year players on its roster and typically has eight or nine in its lineup. Sophomore center Cameron Hughes was asked if the rivalry at hand needed to be explained to the youngsters.

"They know," he said with a smile. "Coming in last year you sensed it. I think everyone's jacked up."

But dislike doesn't always mean animosity. Sowchuk said a rivalry can be based on sheer respect.

"You just have to know that team's going to give you their best game every time they step on the ice with you," she said. "You have to play them honest and respect them and give them your best game back."

Rivalry games can make for some special outcomes and memories.

"I look at it as those are the fun games to play," Jones said. "Those are the ones you want to be a part of because those are the ones to that will be fun to win, the fun ones to battle through."

The Fighting Hawks have earned that distinction.

"They always come out and give us a really good game," Jones said. "It kind of builds every game with them and, especially after the last series, it's getting more and more competitive as the season's winding down."

Hughes said history is a big piece of any rivalry and acknowledged that respect, pain and a snarly undertone can be blended in for taste. So it goes when the Gophers come to town.

"It's a special rivalry," he said, "and it'll be an exciting weekend."

## **Kunin, Jurusik high in NHL Central Scouting's midterm rankings**

With strong starts to their freshmen campaigns for the Wisconsin men's hockey team, Luke Kunin and Matt Jurusik have drawn notice from NHL scouts.

Kunin has had a superb start to his freshman season on the Badgers top line and currently leads the team in goals and is tied for the team lead in points with 18. Before the season even began, Kunin played at the CCM/USA Hockey All-American Prospects game and recorded a game-high three points. He has also been honored as a Big Ten Star of the week this season as well.

Meanwhile, Jurusik was pegged as the 15th best North American goaltending prospect and the only Division I goaltender to make the list. After Adam Miller started the second game and third games of the season in goal, Jurusik has since started the last 17 in between the posts for Wisconsin, while grabbing two Big Ten Star of the Week accolades. Jurusik also owns one shutout this season, a 3-0 blanking of Michigan State on Dec. 12.

## **Diabetes doesn't keep freshman Luke Kunin from making a quick impact**

Chances are Luke Kunin has a long, productive hockey career ahead of him.

But even if that doesn't happen, he won't blame it on his type 1 diabetes. Indeed, the disease he was diagnosed with as a sixth-grader is part of what has made Kunin one of the top players in his class for years.

Certainly, it hasn't stopped him from becoming a force for the University of Wisconsin men's hockey team. After 18 games, the freshman forward from Chesterfield, Missouri, has a team-high seven goals and is second in total points to linemate Grant Besse with 15.

Even though he's the youngest player on the team — he just turned 18 in December — Kunin has wowed coach Mike Eaves with his maturity.

"The thing that impresses you the most when you speak to him is his maturity," Eaves said. "He's an 18 year-old going on 25."

Kunin's maturing process accelerated with a visit to the doctor's office when he was in sixth grade.

"I knew something was wrong," he said.

"I was up all night. I couldn't sleep. I was going to the bathroom three or four times a night and was drinking so much water."

The diagnosis was type 1 diabetes, which is usually identified in children and young adults and accounts for about 5 percent of those who have the disease. With type 1 diabetes the body doesn't produce insulin, a hormone needed to get glucose from the bloodstream into the cells. There is no cure but it can be managed with insulin therapy.

At the time, of course, Kunin understood none of that.

"To be honest, I had no idea," Kunin said. "I'd never really heard of it before. I was at the doctor with my mom and I was just asking if I could still play hockey. I was just a young kid and I didn't know what was going on."

"They told me everything was going to be fine and my mom said everything was going to be OK. After I heard that I wasn't too worried. They took me to the hospital and taught me everything I had to know."

Kunin has been managing the disease ever since.

"I test it 8 to 10 times a day, maybe more on game days," he said. "I'm always keeping it under control, counting my carbs, taking my shots before I eat."

He received some early encouragement when hockey buddy Matthew Tkachuk, son of then-St. Louis Blues star Keith Tkachuk, helped arrange for Kunin to meet with another Blues player, B.J. Crombeen, who also has diabetes.

"That was pretty cool to talk to a guy that was in the NHL about it right away," Kunin said. "It's something I've learned a lot from and it's helped me grow up and mature a lot faster than most kids my age. I think it's helped me a lot."

Eaves believes that matter-of-fact kind of mindset has helped Kunin become an immediate impact player for the Badgers (4-8-6, 1-3-2-1 Big Ten).

"He is just about getting it done and getting it done the right way," Eaves said.

"He knows what his goals are in his life, and he just gets it done. He needs to get to a puck, he gets the puck. He does a lot of the little things but also he's got the flare to put the puck in the net and make plays."

"And he's done that in the classroom, too. I don't think going to class is his favorite thing but he gets a 3.13 (grade-point average). He just gets it done."

Kunin is coming off perhaps his best game as a Badger, contributing a goal and three assists in a 4-4 tie with Ohio State on Saturday. He hopes to keep that production going this weekend when the Badgers travel to Penn State (13-4-3, 3-1-0) for games tonight and Saturday.

"These are games we need to go out and grab," Kunin said. "We've gotten punched in the face a couple times and I think easily we could be .500 now and even have seven or eight more wins, to be honest."

"But that's what it is and we've just got to deal with it and get better."

## Taking nothing for Grant-ed

The text messages, composed by a friend and launched from 2,000 miles away, served a vital purpose for Grant Besse.

They brought perspective into an otherwise depressing experience.

They brought humor into an otherwise dour conversation.

Besse is the junior right winger and assistant captain for the Wisconsin men's hockey team, a guy that teammates, coaches and fans alike look to for offense.

The Badgers were 8-0 when he scored a goal as a freshman. He led the club in goals and points as a sophomore. He currently paces the team in assists and points heading into a Big Ten Conference series at 14th-ranked Penn State on Friday and Saturday.

Which made Besse's recent seven-game goal-less streak all the more glaring and frustrating. It equaled his longest career drought, which was set in his rookie season. It was made harsher by the fact Wisconsin was 1-4-2 during his skid.

The run ended during a 4-4 overtime draw with Ohio State on Jan. 9 at the Kohl Center. It was a meaningful conversion, too, because it came in the third period and erased a 4-3 deficit.

"It's nice to finally get one," Besse said after practice Tuesday. "I feel a little better about myself."

The goal, Besse's fifth of the season, showed the fickle nature of the game. After a series of great scoring chances went awry, Besse converted when his shot dinked off an Ohio State defender and into the net.

Scoring slumps in hockey will eat you alive if you let them. You simply cannot get down on yourself lest the emotional hole will get deeper.

"If you fret and frown and press and squeeze your stick, it gets worse," said Wisconsin coach Mike Eaves, who scored 94 career goals for the Badgers and another 90 in the NHL.

"As I've gotten older I've tried not to press because it just gets worse," Besse confirmed.

How do you keep your wits about you? Eaves typically asked himself three questions.

"Am I working hard? Am I scoring in practice? Am I getting chances in games?" he said. "If those three things are there, you can take the pressure off your own back. It's going to come. It's going to come back."

The breakthrough for Besse was celebrated in Plymouth, Minnesota, where he grew up, but also in Los Angeles. That's where one of Besse's buddies, Jack Jablonski, is a college student at Southern California.

Besse and Jablonski were teammates at Benilde-St. Margaret's (Minn.) High School in December of 2011 when Jablonski was paralyzed from the chest down by a hit he received during a game. Besse was a year ahead of Jablonski, but they have a bond.

"He's a really good friend," Besse said. "I try to keep in touch with him as much as possible to see how he's doing."

Jablonski is a quadriplegic who lives with a full-time attendant near the USC campus. He's majoring in communications, broadcast and journalism while working as an intern with the NHL's Los Angeles Kings.

"He's doing what he loves," said Besse, a fifth-round NHL draft pick of Anaheim in 2013. "He loves hockey. He loves being part of the game anyway he can, so I'm just happy to see him afforded the opportunity to be out there."

Weekly text messages from Jablonski help keep Besse grounded even through goal-scoring slumps. They're a reminder not to take things for granted.

"You realize it's a blessing to be able to come to the rink every day," Besse said.

The texts from Jablonski serve another purpose where Besse is concerned: They keep him humbly humored.

"During my little drought there he was letting me know I wasn't scoring," Besse noted with a smile. "He's giving me grief about (freshman winger Matt) Freytag having more goals than me."

Freytag, a fellow Minnesotan from Wayzata, had five goals during Besse's slump, including two vs. Michigan that kicked off a three-game goal-scoring streak.

"I had to take a couple days to reply to that (text) so I didn't say something I regret," Besse said in mock disgust. "(Jablonski) likes poking fun at me and the rest of the guys (from Benilde)."

Besse is one of the elected leaders on the team – senior defensemen Kevin Schulze and Eddie Wittchow are co-captains – which turned his slump into a balancing act.

"Guys are looking at me to put pucks in the back of the net," Besse said. "They see me not putting pucks in the back of the net and they see me sulking around, it doesn't send a good message. You want to be (scoring goals) for your teammates, but you also want to set a good example about being positive and not getting frustrated."

Besse has been a fixture on the top line along with freshman left winger Luke Kunin, who leads the Badgers with seven goals. They'll likely have a new center for the Penn State series – sophomore Cameron Hughes is doubtful with an upper-body injury; sophomore Adam Rockwood was the replacement at practice this week – so it'll be interesting to see how their chemistry evolves.

Kunin thinks he and Besse, who has 12 assists and 17 points in 18 games this season, have forged a sense of on-ice unity and it gets stronger every game.

"As a young guy, a lot of the younger guys look up to him," Kunin said. "Obviously because of his skill on the ice, but also his leadership qualities."

On a club dominated by underclassmen – six juniors and seniors; 21 freshmen and sophomores – Besse stands out, according to Kunin.

"He's pretty dialed in before games and practice," Kunin said. "He just knows what he's doing out there. When he wants to, he can really get things done."

If Besse could impart one bit of wisdom on the freshmen, what would it be?

"Just have confidence in yourself," he said. "If you have confidence in yourself and believe in yourself, you're going to make the right plays out there more times than not."

The Badgers are hoping that insight starts paying bigger dividends.

Besse, meanwhile, awaits more text messages from his inspiring friend.

## Summer retreat set tone for 2015-16 season

As bonding sessions go, this one was lively, picturesque and ultimately critical to the future of the Wisconsin men's hockey program.

A month before Mike Eaves was to begin his 14th season as coach of the Badgers, he borrowed a rural, lakeside condo from a close friend and brought his new staff together to get better acquainted.

Significant changes were made after the 2014-15 season in which the Badgers struggled to a 4-26-5 overall record. Assistants Gary Shuchuk and Matt Walsh were dismissed and Zach Remiker, the director of hockey operations, left after four seasons in that role to start his own business.

Eaves filled those openings with men of varying degrees of familiarity. Assistant coach JB Bittner was a relative unknown outside of what was revealed during the interview process. Associate head coach Luke Strand had links to Eaves through multiple parties, but there were unknowns. Meanwhile, director of hockey operations John Hamre had previously worked with Eaves.

The three-day retreat to the shores of Castle Rock Lake in August was designed to get everyone on the same page. As far as the three coaches are concerned, that session laid the foundation for a remodeling project that's about to take a major step.

Wisconsin begins the unofficial second half of the regular season Friday and Saturday when it hosts Ohio State in a Big Ten Conference series at the Kohl Center.

The Badgers (4-7-5 overall, 1-2-1 with four points in the Big Ten) are noticeably better than last season, but it remains to be seen how that will translate over the next 18 games.

They've beaten the top-ranked team in the nation on the road — a convincing 3-1 decision over North Dakota on Nov. 6 — and twice failed to win when owning a lead in the third period.

They've played one of the tougher non-league schedules in the nation — outside of first-year NCAA Division I independent Arizona State the cumulative record is 63-35-20 (.619) — but have failed to win five games in which they owned a multi-goal advantage.

They've made major improvements on special teams — the penalty kill (87.9 success ratio) and power play (22.4 conversion rate) rank seventh and 13th in the nation, respectively — but attention to detail in the defensive zone remains spotty.

The challenge for Eaves and his new staff is to take the lessons learned from the first half and apply them to the second with a lineup that has nine first-year players. That's especially vital now as Wisconsin heads into a stretch where it plays 10 of its next 12 games at home.

"It's an opportunity for us to make some hay here," Eaves said. "We saw some things in the first half that we like and now we have to build on those things and being able to do it in our own rink and not travel as much is an opportunity, so that's our push here."

The surge has roots back to the summer when Eaves overhauled his staff. Bittner, regarded as a rising star in the ranks, came from Tri-City of the U.S. Hockey League. Strand, a well-known entity from playing and coaching in the state, came from Madison of the USHL. Hamre, who worked with Eaves at the U.S. National Team Developmental Program from 2000 to '02, came from the high school ranks in Minnesota.

That process gave way to a scheduled retreat near Mauston. The four men talked hockey over coffee, dinner, barbequing and golf. They talked the game over watching video, scribbling on white boards and reading from various papers and books.

"It was great because there were no distractions," Eaves said. "It was just the four of us there. We watched video. I had some papers I wanted to share with them. We had white boards up and we were making notes and taking them down. We spent literally the whole time together."

Bittner, a two-time captain who graduated from Ohio State in 2005, said the days were consumed by conversation.

"We chatted hockey for seven, eight, nine hours," he said.

Strand, who played at UW-Eau Claire and professionally with the old Madison Monsters of the United Hockey League, said it was apparent right away that the men had some big things in common.

"We share a passion," he said. "That's the easy way to say it. We all love the rink. We all love hockey. At the end of the day we're all in it for everybody here."

Eaves said he reviewed every system he had "just to find out where our thoughts and philosophies were and creating an interior structure of what we wanted to do."

It was beneficial that Eaves and Strand are limbs on the Kevin Constantine coaching tree. Eaves became acquainted with Constantine's highly detailed systems when the two worked together in the NHL with the Pittsburgh Penguins from 1997 to 2000. Strand worked with Constantine when the two were with Houston of the American Hockey League from 2007 to '09. Troy Ward, a former Wisconsin assistant under Eaves and a mentor to Strand, also worked extensively with Constantine.

"One of the things that truly helped is the fact that both Luke and I had worked for Kevin, so there was a lot of verbiage there," Eaves said. "It was like talking to a guy I'd coached with before. There was a lot of common ground."

Bittner, meanwhile, said his connections with Ward and Sioux City coach Jay Varaday, another Constantine disciple, helped him understand the concepts.

"I had crossed paths with some people from that coaching culture before, so I knew what it was: extremely detailed, a lot of video, details of the game and doing things the right way," Bittner said. "I've never met a coach that's from that tree that people say, 'He doesn't know what he's doing.' They know the game inside and out. There's not a lot that they miss."

Eaves went through each system and ended with a question: Was it successful for you? That opened the door to a lot of give and take. It also fostered a sense of comfort.

"There were no wrong answers," Strand said. "There were thoughts. There were experiences behind people's inquisitiveness."

Some of the system changes that have taken place since last season — specifically in the defensive zone — were born out of that retreat. Eaves said Strand was a strong proponent of the idea.

"He felt comfortable enough that it would help us because it would take time and space away," Eaves said. "Because he had that expertise and experience, we said, 'Let's roll with it.'"

Strand said that change was a big step toward getting everyone on the same page regarding structure and pace of play.

"The hardest part about being a head coach is something new," he said, mindful of a role he's had at UW-Eau Claire, an NCAA Division III program, and at USHL stops in Sioux City and Madison. "He's got to take new ideas in and he's got to decide which ones are yes and which ones are no."

During the get-together Bittner and Strand were limited by their lack of knowledge about the players on the Wisconsin roster. That's no longer the case.

"We didn't know the soul of the player and now we have a pretty good handle on that," Strand said.

Not every item was crossed off the to-do list during the retreat, but an important collaborative process had begun.

"I can honestly tell you when we left there we still had a lot of work to do, but it was an ice breaker," Eaves said.

Bittner has settled into his role as the prime recruiter, meaning he's on the road constantly, including a recent trip to Europe.

"He's a dog on a bone," Eaves said.

Bittner said Eaves, whose 2006 club won the NCAA title and whose 2010 outfit reached the Frozen Four championship game, is one of the top five coaches in the country, but he's only as good as the players he has on hand.

"It's not glamorous to be on the road sometimes and getting back at 2 or 3 in the morning," Bittner said. "But there's hundreds of people that would want to be in my spot and have the job that I have. I don't see it as work."

The biggest eye-opener for Bittner since he began his new job?

"You can count on one hand the number of NCAA programs that are as prestigious as the University of Wisconsin," he said. "Everybody knows the hockey program. Everybody knows the rink's unbelievable and the facilities and campus are so good."

"What got me is ... how good the academics are here and how much support people have for that side of things. I went to a Big Ten school. I didn't really realize that or know how good this school is academic-wise."

Strand, meanwhile, has embraced a prominent presence at practices and in games. His primary focus is on defense and the penalty kill.

"I think we've all kind of filtered into areas that we're really excited about doing every day," he said. "At the same time there's enough crossover where we get to share ideas."

What was Strand's biggest cultural lesson coming to Wisconsin?

"The dynamic of the athletic department as far as the programs here and the time spent and the hours you see put in," he said. "You're not the only one working, that's for sure, because you see guys here working different hours of the day. Student-athletes studying at different times. When you watch other (Wisconsin) sports on TV, you know all the hours those student-athletes have gone through."

Watching both assistants at practice, Eaves is struck by their expertise.

"When we have been able to delegate Luke at one end and JB at the other, I can sit back and watch both ends and you can tell the guys have been around the game a long time," he said. "They are excellent in their teaching and their delivery of the message to the team and that's a really good thing for our staff."

Eaves said a notebook was kept during their summertime retreat and it's been used as reference material more than once during the season.

"We did get a lot done," he said of the gathering. "We plowed through a lot of areas."

The end result was a sense of goodwill and comfort for Eaves.

"I remember leaving there thinking, 'These are good people. They're good hockey men. They've had different experiences,'" he said. "Based on that I knew we were going in the right direction."

## **Davison in elite company**

Tim Davison, a sophomore defenseman for the Wisconsin men's hockey team, is on pace to do something extraordinary.

He has five goals in his first 14 games and shares the club lead in that category with sophomore center Ryan Wagner and freshman left winger Luke Kunin.

In the modern era of the program, which dates back to 1963, only one defenseman has led the Badgers in goals for a season. That was Justin Schultz, a two-time first-team All-American who had 16 conversions in 2011-12.

Wisconsin has a long, distinguished line of offensive-minded defensemen — from Craig Norwich and John Taft of the 1970s to Theran Welsh and Paul Stanton of the '80s to Sean Hill and Brian Rafalski of the '90s to Jamie McBain and Brendan Smith in the 2000s — but the standard in this particular category is Schultz.

From 2009 to '12, Schultz amassed 40 goals, 73 assists and 113 points in 121 career games before bypassing his senior season with the Badgers to sign with Edmonton of the NHL.

In addition to leading Wisconsin in goals as a junior, Schultz paced the team in scoring as a sophomore in 2010-11. The only others with that on their resume are McBain (2008-09), Hill (1990-91), Welsh ('79-80), Norwich ('76-77) and Don Addison (1966-67).

Schultz is also the last defenseman to score goals in three straight games for the Badgers, a feat that Davison has matched heading into a Big Ten Conference series with Michigan State Friday and Saturday in East Lansing, Michigan.

Davison said he reads the weekly pregame notes compiled by Paul Capobianco of the Wisconsin Athletic Communications office. So what was Davison's reaction to seeing his name in the same sentence with Schultz?

"To be even thought of in the same sentence or same thought as him is a pretty big honor," Davison said.

As Davison made his way to Madison — playing at Green Bay Notre Dame Academy and Chicago of the U.S. Hockey League — he made numerous trips to the Kohl Center and focused on the way Schultz played.

"He's a special player," Davison said. "It's fun to watch players like that and take little pieces of their game and try to add it to your game."

Upon joining the Badgers and redshirting in 2013-14, Davison heard the reverence veteran playmakers like winger Michael Mersch and center Mark Zengerle had for Schultz and his ability to shoot the puck with accuracy.

"I just remember how he was able to get his shot through from the point, especially on the power play," Davison said.

"We just get the puck to Justin," Mersch and Zengerle would say to Davison, "and he'd walk the line and he'd put it in the net."

Davison, listed at 5-foot-10 and 175 pounds, isn't at the level of Schultz in a lot of areas, but his offensive game is coming around and he looks right at home on a power play unit that currently ranks 10th in the nation in conversion ratio (23.6 percent).

"What Timmy has done with the puck has always been his strength," Wisconsin coach Mike Eaves said.

Davison said he honed his instincts at the offensive end growing up in DePere. His father, Marc, built an outdoor rink in the backyard and his son took up temporary residence in it.

"I was out there till the wee hours of the morning," Tim said. "Our neighbors were upset because we were banging pucks off the boards, but I lived out there."

When Davison got to Notre Dame Academy, he moved from forward to defense as a freshman in order to secure more ice time. His new position demands that he have a two-way game, but that's still very much a work in progress.

While Davison shares the team lead in goals and has eight points overall, he also has the worst plus-minus rating on the club at minus-12.

Eaves said Davison has some bad habits that accumulated over time.

"He knows about it. He's seen video," Eaves said. "The thing is we're trying to create new habits over bad habits he's had his whole life.

"We're going in the right direction. It's a slow process, but I can tell you he's aware of it and we're making strides."

Eaves said Davison's biggest sin is he drops his eyes and becomes focused on the puck as he engages an onrushing opponent. Instead of having his toes pointed up ice, playing through the man and using his stick as a deterrent, he gets lost.

"It's a mindset," Davison said of playing good, fundamental defense. "At times I have that and at times I get away from it.

"I think the biggest thing is just trusting the process and trusting the coaches. They've been on my since day one about playing defense. It's definitely something I need to work on."

Davison routinely watches video with Eaves and associate head coach Luke Strand, who oversees the defensemen.

"His gift is his offensive side," Strand said of Davison. "His workmanship has got to come from his defending side and learning that defense is going to get him the puck back quicker.

"I think his recognition of when things aren't going the correct way defensively has increased. I wouldn't say it's gone away, but he's at least recognizing now where he didn't before."

Like Schultz, Davison isn't known for being a physical defender. Schultz, he said, relied on his instincts.

"He's always a step ahead," Davison noted. "He always knew what the player was going to do."

Davison has a simple game plan in that regard.

"I'm just going to keep doing what I'm doing, trying to get better defensively," he said. "The more practice, repetitions and games I get, the more I'll improve."

The Badgers (3-6-5 overall, 0-1-1 in the Big Ten) will try and close out the first half on a high note against Michigan State (4-9-2, 0-2) at Munn Arena.

The first 14 games have been an exercise in irritation for Wisconsin players and coaches. They believe they're a better product than their record shows.

"We're doing a lot of good things," Davison said.

But there's a hump to get over. The Badgers have had the lead or been tied in the third period of 11 games, but only three wins to show for it so far.

"We're getting more goals – we have a lot more offense than last year – and at times we're playing good defensively," Davison said. "When we're all on the same page and working together that's when we're at our best."

But there aren't enough of those moments in crunch time. Davison said it seems like he and his teammates sometimes drift into the notion of playing it safe, especially when they have the lead, instead of continuing to be aggressive.

"It's been pretty frustrating not being able to win those games," he said, "but it's only going to make us a better team."

## Badgers still learning the art of closing the deal

Finishing off an opponent is a learned, treasured skill and members of the Wisconsin men's hockey team are still trying to get the hang of it.

The Badgers had multi-goal leads in both Big Ten Conference games over the weekend with Michigan, but failed to secure a victory during a series at Yost Arena in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

A 4-2 advantage in the second period of the opener Friday night dissolved into a 6-4 loss.

A 5-3 third-period lead in the series finale Saturday ended in a 6-6 overtime draw with the Wolverines prevailing in a shootout.

Wisconsin (3-6-5 overall, 0-1-1 in the Big Ten) has now had the lead or been tied in the third period of 11 games this season, but fulfillment has been elusive.

Associate head coach Luke Strand said the Badgers still seem to be caught between the act of "flipping the switch of history or turning on the switch of the present."

In other words, it's a learning process.

"I would love to say that it's tactics," Strand said. "At the same time I think it's plenty of just the mindset of what it is."

Scoring 10 or more goals in a series is usually a recipe for success, but the Badgers couldn't make that happen. The last time they hit double digits in a series and failed to win at least one game was Dec. 29-30, 1982, when they left Minnesota with a 4-4 overtime draw and a 9-8 loss.

Wisconsin would recover nicely, though, winning the Western Collegiate Hockey Association playoff title and NCAA championship during Jeff Sauer's first season as coach.

Those are distant thoughts right now, but Strand and head coach Mike Eaves came away from the weekend feeling good about several things.

Perhaps the biggest is attitude.

One night after Michigan scored four consecutive goals to erase deficits of 3-1 and 4-2, the Badgers blew a 5-3 lead and trailed by a goal midway through the third period.

But instead of retreating, freshman left winger Matthew Freytag scored his second goal of the night and Wisconsin held on for the tie.

"You're proud of the effort," Strand said. "You're proud of that resilience. You're proud of the idea that there was no give-up in the group.

"But you also have to lean back and reach back a little bit further and say, 'How do we not get in that spot and the next time we are in that spot how do we take care of it?'"

The Badgers were missing two top-line-caliber players during crunch time. Sophomore center Adam Rockwood (upper body) didn't make the trip and junior Jedd Soleway (lower body) was injured early in the series finale.

In addition to Freytag, sophomore center Ryan Wagner had his second two-goal outing of the season and senior defenseman and co-captain Kevin Schulze had a goal and two assists.

Strand noted that the Wolverines came into the Big Ten season-opening series ranked 12th nationally and armed with one of the best offenses in the country.

"It's not like it's a bad team crawling back into the game," he said. "That's a pretty electric group."

That's been the norm for the Badgers. They've faced five offenses currently ranked in the top 20 (Boston College, Michigan, North Dakota, Boston University and Denver) and three defenses situated in the top 15 (BC, North Dakota and Northern Michigan).

The only team Wisconsin has faced with a losing record is first-year independent Arizona State (5-8). The rest are a combined 62-27-21 (.659).

"We've responded in a lot of ways many, many times," Strand said, noting the difficulty of the schedule. "Now there's a next step to take."

The trend changes a bit Friday and Saturday when the Badgers close out the first half of the season with a Big Ten series at Michigan State (4-9-2) in East Lansing.

While the Spartans are in the midst of a 0-6-1 skid, they've had a majority of their success at Munn Ice Arena (3-4-1).

Another feel-good element for the Badgers is their special teams. They were 4-for-7 on the power play and 4-for-4 killing penalties against Michigan.

Wisconsin begins the week ranked 10th nationally in power play conversion rate (23.6 percent) and 14th in penalty killing (86.5 percent).

Strand was asked if the Badgers have improved since their 3-1 victory over then-top-rated North Dakota Nov. 6. They're 0-3-2 since then

"Personal growth, yes," he said. "Now we have to find that team growth as well."

Minus Rockwood and Soleway, guys like Wagner, Freytag and sophomore left winger Jason Ford were asked to do more.

"Guys stepped into some roles that they probably weren't necessarily accustomed to, but yet stepped in and did a really nice job," Strand said.

The challenge now is to take a prime lesson from the Michigan series and apply it to Michigan State.

"We know we can play at that pace," Strand said. "Now we have to use that pace to dictate and not be dictated upon."

It all comes back to a sense of confidence, especially when it comes to closing out an opponent.

"When you don't have it, you wonder about it," Strand said. "When you do have it, you know it. That's what we have to get to."

## **Kunin doing things his own way**

Luke Kunin grew up in Missouri, but he expects a sizeable homecoming when the Wisconsin men's hockey team shows up in Ann Arbor, Michigan, this weekend.

Kunin, a freshman left winger, spent two of the most meaningful years of his life there with the prestigious U.S. National Team Developmental Program.

He graduated from Pioneer High School in three years at the tender age of 17. He went from a whisper to a yell among NHL talent evaluators. He cultivated a captain's mentality, a mature, well-spoken presence defined in part by his need to manage a serious health challenge.

When the Badgers (3-5-4 overall) open Big Ten Conference play facing 12th-rated Michigan (7-2-2) at Yost Ice Arena Friday and Saturday, Kunin will have his own welcoming committee.

His parents, Mark and Sheri, will make the journey from Chesterfield, Missouri. Karl Wukie and Jaime Nelson, who opened their home to Kunin for his two years in Ann Arbor, will be there as well.

Assorted relatives, not to mention members of the NTDP entourage, will also be on hand to greet Kunin, who turns 18 on Friday.

"It's like a second home for me," he said. "Being there two years, it's a special thing to go back. It will be an exciting weekend for sure."

Of course, Kunin expects to get reacquainted with left winger Brendan Warren and defenseman Nicholas Boka, former teammates at the NTDP who now play for the Wolverines.

Kunin also hopes to see Don Granato, the former Wisconsin captain who coached Kunin with the under-17 and under-18 teams in Ann Arbor.

"He's one of those people I'd really like to thank for making me a better player," Kunin said.

Earlier this season, Granato was asked if Kunin reminded him of any one. The question was intended to measure if Kunin's game compared to someone of note in the NHL, but Granato had an interesting alternative.

Who does Kunin remind Granato of?

"Luke Kunin," he said.

What was Kunin's reaction?

"I'm my own type of player," he said.

Wisconsin fans have gotten a measure of that analysis during the first 12 games. Kunin, listed at 6-foot and 193 pounds, shares the team lead in goals with four and is second on the club in points with nine and shots with 35. Two of his conversions tied the game in the third period and another put the Badgers ahead for good in their 3-1 upset of then-top-ranked North Dakota on Nov. 6.

NHL talent judges have gotten a measure of Kunin, too. Some have him going in the first 30 picks of the 2016 draft in June, which would make him the 11th first-rounder in program history.

Scouts are so enamored with Kunin's 200-foot game, explosive shot, moxie and innate leadership skills that at least one independent evaluation service has him in the top 20.

Wisconsin coach Mike Eaves said Kunin seems to be adapting well to an advanced on-ice education.

"He's still learning," Eaves said. "He's getting used to the strength and the speed - he seems to be doing that in good stride - but every weekend is new for him because there are different players with different skill sets and different strengths."

Despite being one of the youngest players on the under-18 team last season, Kunin was the unquestioned leader as captain of the club, according to Granato.

Where did that come from?

Kunin grew up in the St. Louis Triple A midget program and rubbed elbow pads with the likes of Al MacInnis and Keith Tkachuk, NHL greats who played for the St. Louis Blues and helped coach in that organization.

Kunin said he also kept his eyes and ears open when it came to identifying role models throughout the NHL.

"You take away the right things they do at the rink and away from the rink," he said. "You're always trying to be the hardest worker and leading by example."

Having NTDP teammates such as Tkachuk's son, Matthew, and Auston Matthews, projected to be the first overall pick in the '16 NHL draft, helped in that regard.

Kunin said Granato - one of three from his family to captain the Badgers - also had an impact.

"I thought we were closer than most," Kunin said. "We kind of connected right when I got there."

Kunin, who had 27 goals and 42 points in 61 games with the NTDP under-18 squad last season, said accelerating his high school education was a decision based on confidence and awareness.

"I just thought I was ready to make the jump and ready to take my career to the next level," he said. "It was a little bit of a challenge, but I buckled down and got it done."

Kunin's father believes that some of his youngest son's advanced maturity can be traced to a moment six years ago when Luke was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes. That's when the body doesn't produce insulin, which is a hormone the body needs to get glucose from the bloodstream into the cells of the body.

Luke must keep close tabs on his blood sugar levels and diet while administering injections of insulin as needed.

"He's done fabulous and pretty much managed it on his own since the day he was diagnosed," Mark Kunin said of his son. "He never let any of that get to him."

"It's a non-factor other than sometimes he has to check his blood sugar during games - between periods - and get something like Gatorade."

"The maturity started early because of all that - of having to deal with all that."

Luke was in sixth grade when he found he was drinking a lot of water and getting up multiple times in the night to urinate. That gave way to tests that revealed a serious problem if it's not managed properly.

"I wasn't feeling that great and hockey wasn't doing well, either," he said.

"It's not an easy thing to do and being able to control that and being away from home since age 15. It's helped me be a better person and more mature."

That sense of awareness came to life last month when rumors began to circulate that Kunin was preparing to leave the Badgers and sign with Sarina, a Major Junior outfit that owns his Ontario Hockey League draft rights.

"I don't know who started them or where they were coming from, but you just worry about what you can control," he said. "Obviously they weren't true and I'm here."

"It's in your head a little bit because you don't know what other people think. I don't want my teammates thinking I'm leaving because that wasn't true."

The anonymous posting appeared on Twitter during the week leading up to a non-conference series at North Dakota. Kunin answered by tweeting out a rebuttal that said: "Can't wait to play North Dakota this weekend."

Kunin, one of 10 first-year players for the Badgers, proactively met with his Wisconsin teammates to assure them of his status.

"Obviously they saw it on social media there and they were asking me about it," he said. "I told them, 'No, it's not true. I'm a Badger and I'm here with you guys.'"

Mark Kunin said his priority was to make sure Eaves and his assistants, Luke Strand and JB Bittner, were up to speed.

"For the most part we just had to make sure that the people that matter knew what the story was," Mark Kunin said. "There's no telling how these things start or where these things start."

Mark Kunin said his son spoke with officials from Sarina prior to coming to Madison and remained true to his college commitment even amid the challenges of last season for the Badgers.

"He met with them and he was honest with them from day one," Mark Kunin said of his son. "He wanted to be up there at Wisconsin even after the challenging year of last year. He never wavered."

That's why you may see a celebration - part family reunion, part birthday party - this weekend in Ann Arbor.

## **Give that dog a bone**

There are too many scraps of evidence to think it's just a coincidence.

Since freshman defenseman Patrick "Paddy" Sexton was inserted into the lineup for the Wisconsin men's hockey team, opponents are scoring fewer goals and generating fewer shots per game.

Most notably, the Badgers are having tangible success. After going without a victory in four games minus Sexton (0-2-2) they have a winning record with him playing a regular shift (3-2-1).

Senior defenseman and co-captain Eddie Wittchow sees a pattern that can be traced to Sexton, a 6-foot-1, 198-pounder from Ottawa, Ontario, whose rookie status is somewhat skewed by the fact he's 21 and has more than 250 Junior A games on his resume.

"He knows how to play the defensive game," Wittchow said. "He's helped take some minutes away from some of the guys who may have been getting a little fatigued in those first four games."

"I definitely think it has been a pattern."

Wittchow was quick to add that the blue line unit has a whole has made strides since the Badgers opened the season with a set of

overtime draws with Northern Michigan and one-sided losses to a pair of highly ranked entities in Boston College and Boston University.

The growing comfort level of freshman goaltender Matt Jurusik is another major factor in why Wisconsin has won three of its last four games, including a resounding upset of top-ranked North Dakota on the road Nov. 6.

But the Sexton factor appears real. Another measure of its effectiveness will come Friday and Saturday nights when the Badgers (3-4-3 overall) host Denver (6-3-1) in a non-conference series at the Kohl Center.

Sexton sat out the first four games while a Big Ten Conference academic matter was being clarified. It involved a transfer of credits and wasn't completed until after an appeal by the school.

"The alternative was that I would have had to miss the whole year had that appeal not gone through, so as much as it sucked not being able to play and watching those first four, I'm happy to be in the lineup now and happy to be eligible," he said.

Since his first shift during a non-conference series opener at Ferris State on Oct. 23 - he stepped up at the blue line and delivered a thunderous check - Sexton has made his presence felt.

Most importantly he's enabled Wisconsin coach Mike Eaves to balance ice time among the defensemen and create stability for a rotation that had leaned heavily on four veterans: Wittchow, fellow senior co-captain Kevin Schulze and sophomores Tim Davison and Jake Linhart.

Sexton also fills an emotional void. Asked what the Badgers were missing without him in the lineup, Eaves tapped into favorite aura.

"He brings a base element in that he plays with his heart on his sleeve," he said of Sexton. "If you watch him play he's not the most technical player in terms of his skating or his stick position, but he plays with his heart and his soul."

"A lot of times he's limited by his natural ability, but he makes up for that with his heart and his soul. Sometimes it looks like he's scrambling, but he gets it done."

Sexton and Wittchow, an edgy 6-4, 220-pounder, are both stay-at-home defensemen whose best work tends to go unnoticed.

"We're not flashy. We just play a defensive type of game," Wittchow said. "Not to say we were missing it from anyone else, but just having Patrick and his experience come into the lineup and provide that has been huge for us."

Like Wittchow, Sexton relishes the physical side of things on the ice.

"I like to think that there's one more of us back there when he's in the lineup," Wittchow said.

Sexton, who prefers to go by the name Paddy, has strong, deep roots in the college and NHL societies.

His father, Randy, was a standout defenseman and two-time captain at St. Lawrence from 1978 to '82 before becoming an assistant coach with the Saints. From there he used his business degree to carve out a wide, impressive path in the NHL. He helped Ottawa become an expansion franchise. He's served as general manager of the Senators as well as the Florida Panthers.

He currently operates as director of amateur scouting for Pittsburgh Penguins, where he's been since 2010.

Meanwhile, Sexton's older brother, Ben, is a center playing in the Boston farm system after a four-year career at Clarkson.

Randy Sexton said his youngest son "has far more skill than I ever had" and has cultivated a sense of knowing how to be a leader. To wit, Paddy was the captain last season at Penticton, the British Columbia Hockey League powerhouse that won the league title and advanced to the Canadian Junior A championship. He spent two years with the Veers and was voted most inspirational by his teammates both seasons.

Randy Sexton described his son's style of play as "robust and physical" and said his instincts for leadership are rooted in the fact "he understands everyone has a role." The father added that Paddy goes into every game looking to be matched against the top opposing line and determined to emerge a plus performer.

Eaves, who played in the NHL after starring for the Badgers and whose father coached at the college level, said Paddy Sexton carries himself like a hockey lifer.

"He gets how the game fits together, almost like a coach's son," Eaves said.

The younger Sexton played 119 games in the Central Canada Hockey League – with Gloucester and Smiths Falls – before following in his brother's footsteps and skating in 103 games for Penticton.

"It's definitely an adjustment going from juniors to college hockey," Paddy said, "but the older guys have done a great job of helping me transition and giving me confidence."

Sexton has been paired lately with Schulze, while Wittchow has worked with Linhart and Davison with freshman Peter Tischke.

In addition to upgrades in scoring defense (from 3.75 goals allowed to 2.16) and shots yielded (from 32.5 to 30.6) the Badgers have killed off 21 of 23 opposing power plays (91.3 percent) since Sexton joined the lineup.

According to his father, Sexton was a forward until he was 16. That's when he asked his reluctant coaches to move him to the blue line. Paddy said the move fit better fit his playmaking instincts, whether it's breaking the puck out of the defensive zone or supporting the rush.

"I like to think I have pretty good hockey sense," he said. "For me, being able to play D and see the ice the way I see the ice, I'm able to make more plays and I'm better able to help my team."

The numbers show Sexton is doing just that for the Badgers.

## Crease Creature: Wagner's toughness paying dividends

Dino Ciccarelli's NHL playing career ended when Ryan Wagner was about three years old, so the Wisconsin sophomore forward never got a good look at the 50-goal scorer during the Hall of Famer's 19-year playing career (1980-99).

Ciccarelli was a 5-10 and 180-pound forward who wasn't ever the largest skater on the ice when he laced up his skates.

However, Ciccarelli made a living going to the one place on an ice sheet that may be the most difficult to get to – the front of the net.

"It's just a matter of getting the puck on the net and getting traffic in front of the goalies," Ciccarelli explained. "I don't know why more teams don't do it."

Wisconsin head coach Mike Eaves prefers a different comparison.

"The guy I would mention is Brian Gionta who played at Boston College. In the National Hockey League, he stayed in front of the net. Same tenacious kind of personality on the ice as Ryan and both have skill, determination with a quick stick and are smart in that area of the ice.

"They aren't exactly the same, but they have the same demeanor and that is what makes them effective."

It seems a simple concept. Stand in front of the net where the puck will eventually go. Might be off a goaltender's pad from the rebound of a shot, might be a centering pass from the corner of the ice, might be a point shot from a defenseman on the power play. The puck will eventually find its way there. Former Badger Michael Mersch, who just so happens to come from the same hometown as Wagner, made a living there.

"The other team doesn't like it when you are in front of their net, messing with their goalie, spraying their goalie. Just wreaking havoc," Wagner remarked. "It is a battle to get to the front of the net."

"The defenseman on the other team are pretty much, at all costs, trying to make a path for the goalie to see the puck. They are hacking and whacking and doing whatever they can to try and not allow you to get there and you are, on the other hand, trying to get past them.

They make it pretty hard, but you just have to keep your feet moving and grind your way through it."

That grind is something the 5-8, 185-pound Wagner is incorporating into his game this season. It has already paid dividends, like last Friday when Wagner produced his first career two-goal game, both from in front of the Arizona State goal.

"I think we've seen more this year of the Ryan Wagner we saw before he came to Madison," Eaves explained. "He is an offensive player. He's shown some flare so far this year."

Wagner agrees that his confidence is already at a higher level.

"I already have five points this year and we are only eight games in, so I definitely think I've improved since last year," Wagner said. "I'm a smaller guy on paper, but I don't look at myself like a smaller guy. I love getting into the dirty areas and roughing it up with people and throwing them off their own game. I like to play fast. I like to get physical. I just like to have fun with it."

"My first goal last Friday, Jarod Zirbel passed it to Jason Ford and then Jason made an unbelievable backhand pass. I was going hard to the net and I was able to redirect it to the back of the net. It is definitely rewarding once you work hard enough to get to the net, but it is very tough to get there."

One large area of improvement this season for the Badgers has been their power play, and Wagner seems to have carved out a niche on one of the team's two units, similar to that of the much larger Jedd Soleway on UW's other power-play unit.

"On the power play, I might not be the biggest guy, but I can take the eyes away from the goalie by tying up the other team and creating a double screen," Wagner stated. "Maybe tip pucks. Last weekend, Kevin Schulze's shot actually hit off me and I spun around and whacked it out of the air. It is good to have a guy in front of the net who has pretty good skill and I think that has been working out pretty well for us this year."

Getting in front of the net is not the only reason for Wagner's good start to the 2015-16 season.

"Knowing the style of play in college after playing a year, it is a lot quicker and the guys are a lot stronger than what you are used to. You develop some poise and confidence your second year," Wagner stated. "Also getting in a second summer training off the ice with Jim Snider, who is one of the best strength coaches there are. He has helped improve a lot to get stronger and get a faster, tougher game."

Everyone gets in the weight room to improve their game, but not everyone has the toughness that Wagner brings to his game. How does someone just 5-8 gain that love for playing a gritty game?

That could date back to how Wagner's hockey career started. Growing up in Park Ridge, Illinois, it was all in the large family for Wagner.

"I'd probably say my toughness comes from my mom's side," Wagner said. "She is one of 16 brothers and sisters so I have 56 first cousins just on my mom's side of the family."

"Everyone always wanted to be the best. That is where it came from. We were always competing, whether it was basketball, hockey, soccer, swimming or whatever."

"Whenever the dinner bell came, it was a race to see who could get in line first, or whatever it was -- sitting in the best seat to watch television. There was always fights for just the littlest things."

Part of Wagner's extended family lived a short two-minute walk away in Park Ridge when the sophomore was growing up, and hockey was a big part of their life.

"First they had a sport court in their backyard so we were always rollerblading back there, and they ended up getting synthetic ice," Wagner said. "It was a pretty decent size. I would say 30 feet by 40. You could easily have six people out there to play three on three with a goal. They had a big net behind the goal so pucks wouldn't go into neighbors' yards. It was a fun time growing up. I enjoyed it and I miss it a lot."

"I was pretty much over there every day. I was called their seventh son because I was always over there playing hockey. I would just head over there after school. I would do my homework and then

head straight over there. I would eat pretty much dinner there and sleep over there if I didn't have school the next day."

Those weren't just any old cousins. One of those cousin's was Austin Farley, now a senior for Minnesota Duluth, who Wagner considered a role model.

Wagner will see some more familiar faces this weekend with the Badgers trip to No. 1 North Dakota.

"[North Dakota's] Shane Gersich was on the national team with me and Nick Schmaltz was on the team with Seamus Malone, Peter Tischke, Jake Linhart and I on the Chicago Mission. So I am pretty good buds with both of them and really excited to get out there and play against them," Wagner stated.

He also played with Auston Poganski at the 2013 Ivan Hlinka Tournament.

Along with Kevin Schulze, Eddie Wittchow and Luke Kunin, Wagner is among a small group of Badgers who have skated against North Dakota at Ralph Engelstad Arena.

"It is a fun atmosphere to go in there to try and steal a few points," Wagner stated. I am really excited to head out there, hopefully keep things rolling and get a few more wins. It is definitely in our plans going forward."

### **Paying the rent every day**

If members of the Wisconsin men's hockey team know their history, their current state of euphoria will be short-lived.

The Badgers are coming off a non-conference series sweep of Arizona State at the Kohl Center over the weekend.

The 5-1 and 2-1 victories brought a sense of satisfaction that was impossible to generate during a 0-3-3 start.

"There's a feeling of fresh air," Wisconsin associate head coach Luke Strand said.

The Badgers dominated the opener against the NCAA Division I upstart, piling up 56 shots on goal and taking control of the game with a four-goal burst in the second period. Sophomore center Ryan Wagner led the way with a pair of goals, while junior right winger Grant Besse, sophomore defenseman Tim Davison and freshman left winger Luke Kunin had two-point outings.

Things didn't come so easily in the second match, but Wisconsin did enough good things to earn its first sweep in 23 regular-season series dating back to March of 2014. Freshman center Seamus Malone had a hand in both goals, scoring the winner late in the second.

Freshman goaltender Matt Jurusik stopped 42 of 44 shots he faced in the series, while the power play (2-for-9) and the penalty kill (7-for-7) continued to be productive.

But having your way at home with a first-year program is one thing. Going on the road to face an unbeaten perennial powerhouse is something else entirely. That's the task facing the Badgers (2-3-3) when they play at North Dakota (6-0-2) on Friday and Saturday night in Grand Forks, North Dakota.

Ralph Engelstad Arena can be an intimidating place to play for even the most veteran of teams. Not only did Wisconsin feature eight freshmen and seven sophomores in its sweep of the fledgling Sun Devils, there are three players on the roster who've played a game at The Ralph and none of them tasted victory.

Senior defensemen and co-captains Kevin Schulze and Eddie Wittchow were in the lineup in February of 2013 when North Dakota came away with a 1-1 overtime draw and a 4-1 win.

Kunin, meanwhile, played there last January with the under-18 squad from the U.S. National Team Developmental Program and experienced a 7-2 setback.

The Badgers are working on a seven-game winless streak against North Dakota (0-6-1) and haven't won a game in Grand Forks

December of 2009 (0-3-1), but do hold the all-time edge in Grand Forks at 36-33-8.

"Winning is an everyday thing," Strand said. "It's something we tasted and it's what we want. But there's work behind it."

After winning back-to-back games for the first time since February of last season, Wisconsin coach Mike Eaves told his players "that if you want to win you have to pay the rent every day."

"That was a good message for the guys," Strand said.

According to Strand, a prime task facing the coaches is getting a young club to cultivate matching identities - tenacious, relentless and fearless - regardless of who comes over the boards.

Four weeks into a five-month regular season the Badgers have put some promising developments on the table.

One is the power play. It ranks 15th nationally with a conversion ratio of 22.2 percent (8-for-36).

One is the penalty kill. It ranks 26th nationally with a success rate of 84.4 percent (27-for-32).

One is a more up-tempo offense that, when it's clicking, can be dangerous. Wisconsin already has two games where it topped 40 shots on goal and three outings where it's had three or more goals in a period. Contrast that to last season when it had a season-high of 38 shots and scored three goals in a period twice.

Strand said the Arizona State series saw more balance on the blue line - freshman Patrick Sexton saw extended minutes - and more energy up front thanks in part to the debut of freshman center Jarod Zirbel.

With sophomore center Adam Rockwood unavailable for the series opener due to an ankle injury, Zirbel stepped in, produced three shots on goal and helped set up the go-ahead conversion by Wagner.

When Rockwood returned for the second game, Zirbel stayed in the lineup and added two more shots.

Strand said it was good to see the sophomore class contribute so heavily to a successful weekend. In addition to Wagner's first career multi-goal outing and Davison's second conversion of the year - equaling his output all of last season - center Cameron Hughes converted a penalty shot and right winger Jason Ford was noticeable in the middle of some strong shifts.

"This is what (winning) feels like now," Strand said of the sophomores, who opened last season with a 0-8-1 streak and didn't get their first victory last season after Thanksgiving. "Now we have to take the next step."

North Dakota hasn't won a NCAA title since 2000, but it's been a consistent championship contender and that expectation hasn't changed even though there's been a change in coaches. Long-time assistant Brad Berry assumed the top spot in May when Dave Hakstol stepped down after 11 seasons to jump to the NHL and coach the Philadelphia Flyers.

The series with North Dakota continues a contentious rivalry that dates back to 1968 and includes legendary games, players and antics. The intensity has endured despite both bolting from the Western Collegiate Hockey Association. The Badgers are in the Big Ten Conference, while North Dakota inhabits the National Collegiate Hockey Conference.

"They've grown a passion for the game up there that's as strong as it gets," Strand said of the school formerly known as the Fighting Sioux. "That makes it a fun place to go and play as an opponent."

## Setting the example

The essence of leadership isn't always bold, or even apparent. Eddie Wittchow is proof of that.

He's a senior defenseman and co-captain of the Wisconsin men's hockey team whose subtle act of selflessness during the off-season helped set the stage for a unified tone in the dressing room.

Wittchow could have embraced the life of an upperclassman and immersed himself in familiar people, places and things.

Instead he literally threw open the door to a pair of newcomers and has gone about taking them under his wings.

"It's worked well," Wittchow said.

The original plan called for Wittchow and fellow senior, goaltender Adam Miller, to share their apartment on West Washington Avenue with sophomore defenseman Jack Dougherty.

But when Dougherty elected to turn pro in late July – signing with Nashville, the NHL club that drafted him in the second round in 2014 – Wittchow initiated a unique process.

First he called Jayne Lindauer, the program assistant for men's hockey, and asked if any of the 10 incoming freshmen needed housing.

"I'd much rather find teammates of ours to live with, to fill that spot in our apartment, rather than try to go and fill it with some random person," Wittchow said.

Instead of injecting his veteran influence into the matter, Wittchow turned things over to Wisconsin coach Mike Eaves.

"We left it up to coach to decide which ones he wanted to be with us," Wittchow said.

Matt Jurusik, a goaltender from LaGrange, Illinois, and Jarod Zirbel, a winger from Green Bay, now share an address with Wittchow and Miller.

It's a good place to learn if you're paying attention. Outside of having campus awareness and time management skills honed over four years, Wittchow is a two-time academic Big Ten Conference selection majoring in economics and Miller is a biology major currently seeking to enroll in medical school.

"I think it's rubbing off on them," Wittchow said of the new guys.

Wittchow, listed at 6-foot-4 and 215 pounds, is coming off an eye-catching weekend in Boston. Though the Badgers lost two games – 6-0 to Boston College and 4-1 to Boston University – he did things that define his role going forward.

Eaves noted that Wittchow led the club in hits, made strong plays in all three zones and struck a poised pose throughout.

"He was a captain," Eaves said. "He was a leader. And that's the way we hope he plays a lot this year. I think that makes people around Eddie play better."

The next step in that progression will come Friday and Saturday when the Badgers (0-2-2 overall) play their first-ever non-conference road series vs. Ferris State (1-2-1) in Big Rapids, Michigan.

Wittchow appreciated the sentiment, but was quick to point out that he spent too much time in the penalty box for his tastes – three visits overall that led to three opposing power plays – and could have been sounder on the rush.

"I definitely fell short in some places," he said.

Wittchow suggested some of the calls were iffy, but that doesn't matter in the grand scheme of things. He's ranked among the top penalty-takers on the team the last two seasons and he's determined to address that flaw.

"I don't want to be that person," he said. "I think it takes away momentum. When I go to the box, I like to think we have one of our more experienced penalty-killers unavailable."

Wittchow knows his physical presence is needed on the ice as much as possible. He's one of two seniors on the blue line – co-captain

Kevin Schulze is the other – and with age comes more defined responsibilities.

To that end, Wittchow has been asked to focus on the defensive end. He came into the season with 10 points (1 goal, 9 assists) in 91 games – he was point-less in 25 outings last season – so he was not seen as an offensive whiz.

But sometimes Wittchow tries to do too much and slides out of his comfort zone. Before this season began, he saw down with Eaves and his new staff of assistants – Luke Strand and JB Bittner – and it was decided Wittchow would simplify his game.

"A rock defensively," is how Wittchow described his role this season. "Just keeping pucks out of our net is what they need from me."

It's been an interesting college career for Wittchow, a sixth-round NHL draft pick of Florida in 2011 who turns 23 later this month.

He experienced back-to-back championship seasons as a freshman and sophomore – the Western Collegiate Hockey Association playoff title in 2012-13 and the inaugural Big Ten Conference playoff crown in 2013-14 – before enduring a 4-26-5 season as a junior in 2014-15.

Is this the most challenging moment of his life?

"I definitely say it's up there, especially now," Wittchow said.

"Just two years ago Kevin and I were the young guys on teams stacked full of older guys with experience, so it's definitely been a challenge. But I think we see positives so far."

During the first two weeks the Badgers have rallied in the third period twice to claim overtime ties vs. Northern Michigan, but also been taken to task by a pair of top-10 outfits in Boston. According to Wittchow, the message heading into the Ferris State series is to shoot for a .500 record heading into a home series with NCAA Division I upstart Arizona State on Halloween weekend.

"Obviously you want to take it game by game, but we want to be 2-2-2," Wittchow said. "We're going to take it night by night and go from there."

## Persistent Miller earns his spot between pipes

There was a time not long ago when the notion of Adam Miller starting in goal for the Wisconsin men's hockey seemed almost folly.

It was right around the time that Miller was having four surgeries – two were to repair sports hernias; two were to fix torn labrums in his hips – in a span of 14 months.

It was right around the time that he was receiving cortisone injections in his groin to ease the pain.

It was right around the time that Miller, then 18, was thinking that maybe his body was sending him a not-so-subtle message of surrender.

"There was a thought," he said. "But I'd worked so hard and it had always been my goal to play college hockey and possibly even beyond that I wanted to do whatever it took to get myself to that level.

"It definitely crossed my mind that maybe after all this it wasn't meant to be, but I didn't want to look back 10, 20 years down the road and think, 'What if I'd tried?' There's no point in not trying."

Which brings us here: After sitting on the bench for three seasons behind departed seniors Joel Rumpel and Landon Peterson, Miller, a senior walk-on and aspiring surgeon from Long Grove, Illinois, sits atop the goaltending depth chart for the Badgers.

Miller was the opening night starter Oct. 9 and made 32 saves to help Wisconsin come away with a 2-2 non-conference overtime draw with Northern Michigan at the Kohl Center.

True freshman Matt Jurusik made his college debut in the series finale the next night, turning away 22 shots during a 3-3 overtime tie with the Wildcats.

Wisconsin coach Mike Eaves said he plans to stick with that rotation – redshirt freshman Gabe Grunwald is another option – when the Badgers play at Boston College on Friday night and at Boston University on Saturday night.

"I think it's a feel-good story in that, yes, he's paid his dues, but it's also preparation meeting opportunity," Eaves said of Miller.

Curiously, Miller is one of five current Badgers who saw action the last time they played at BC in 2013. He made the trip because Rumpel was sidelined with a knee injury. When Peterson was strafed for six goals in the opening 21 minutes, 45 seconds, he was pulled in favor of Miller, who finished with 24 saves in the 9-2 loss.

"Down 4-0 after the first I'm thinking I might get a chance to go in," Miller recalled this week. "All the nerves started to store up. I hadn't played in a year and a half."

Not only were Miller's parents, Amy and Jordan, in attendance at Conte Forum, his sister, Megan, was there, too. She was a goaltender for the BC women's hockey team at the time. She subsequently transferred to Wisconsin where she's a backup to starter Ann-Renee Desbiens.

Adam allowed three goals in his second career appearance for the Badgers, but made a half-dozen highlight reel saves during his 38:15 of action.

"I was thinking if I get the chance, just go in and have fun with it," he said. "My first or second shot was (soon-to-be-crowned Hobey Baker Award winner) Johnny Gaudreau coming down on a breakaway. Luckily (the shot) just happened to hit me. After that I kind of built some confidence and went from there."

Miller said he'll have a much different mindset for the first road start of his college career Friday night.

"Completely different," he said. "I have a chance to be the starter this year. Thinking the same thing – be calm and relaxed – but have a little bit more of a focused mindset right off the bat."

After some early-game jitters, Miller said he got more and more comfortable as the season opener vs. Northern Michigan. It was his first start since 2011-12 when he played for the Jersey Hitmen of the Eastern Junior Hockey League.

"It definitely feels good to get some of the rust off and get that confidence back," he said.

Miller is merely applying the lessons he learned from Rumpel, who played 115 career games, and Peterson, who played in 42. Both predecessors finished in the top 10 in program history for career save percentage.

"It was great being here for three years and watching them and how well they did day-in and day-out," Miller said. "Petey was always a big battler, so work ethic definitely (came) from him. Joel always had this calmness about him where he seemed to be focused and ready to go. Obviously, both those guys are people I look up to and guys I learned a lot from."

Miller was regarded as an elite recruit when he was a teenager, but then came a torrent of health issues.

He said he was first diagnosed with a sports hernia on his right side at age 17. Four months after that was repaired, one was isolated on the left side.

Several months later Miller was still having issues. The initial diagnosis was scar tissue had built up in the surgically repaired areas, so he was administered four shots of cortisone.

"That was one of the more painful experiences of my life," Miller said.

When the injections didn't help, Miller was examined again. This time he was diagnosed with a torn labrum in his right hip. Rather than tempt fate, he had the other side checked and another tear was found. The surgeries were done six months apart. Six months after those were done, he was back skating.

Why did Miller stick with it? His sister knows.

"He was always determined and he saw his potential," Megan said. "He never let anyone else ever tell him otherwise."

"He didn't let setbacks get in his way. He always pushed through them."

Megan firmly believed the day would come when her brother's hard work would pay off with genuine playing time with the Badgers.

"I always knew what he was capable of," she said.

That explains why tears were shed during pregame introductions prior to the season opener.

"It's embarrassing to say, but when they announced the starting lineup I started bawling," Megan said. "My parents were sitting next to me and they had to calm me down."

A silver lining in the health issues Adam Miller endured is that he figured out what he wanted to do with his life. He wants to be an orthopedic surgeon.

"It's something where if I can help someone in the same situation as me, I have a close, personal tie to it," he said.

Miller took the Medical College Admissions Test in January and received what he said was a score that's average for accepted students nationally. Miller began applying to more than a dozen med schools around the country. Three have said no – including Wisconsin – but 10 replies have yet to come.

"I'm hoping to get some good news in the next few weeks," he said.

Miller said having his younger sister living two blocks away – they have dinners just about every Sunday – is a bonus in his adaptation process from backup to starter.

"Having that support system so close has been really special," he said.

They have a lot to talk about these days.

## **Kunin shines bright on big stage**

With Wisconsin's season less than a week away, one player has already had the chance for a preseason tune-up.

But with the performance freshman forward Luke Kunin (pronounced KUH-nihn) put on at the CCM/USA Hockey All-American Prospects game on Sept. 24, he looked more like a veteran in mid-season form.

"You want to show everyone what you're made of and what you can do against the best," the Chesterfield, Missouri native said.

Kunin did that and then some. The product of the U.S. National Team Development Program promptly stole the show in a game featuring 42 of the top prospects for the 2016 NHL Entry Draft.

"I thought I played well," Kunin said. "In a game like that, you want to show how much you can do."

Among other things, Kunin showed that he can score and score in bunches. He put up a game-high three points, was one of just two players to score two goals and was the only player with multiple goals and an assist.

Kunin arguably had the best individual showing in front of the 5,549 in attendance at the First Niagara Center in Buffalo, New York.

And there were some important people among those in the crowd.

"There's tons of scouts there watching. It's just an honor to be picked for it and show the scouts everything you've got," Kunin said.

Kunin took a little while to get warmed up two Thursdays ago, but then struck for the game's first goal 10 seconds into the first period.

It helped that one of his linemates was Matthew Tkachuk, a player he knows very well.

"I played with him my whole life, so that obviously made it a pretty easy transition," Kunin said of playing alongside Tkachuk. "It might take a few shifts to get used to it, but I thought all around the game went well for myself. I showed what I could do and it was a good time."

The prospects game, which is in its fourth year, has featured some of the brightest young stars in the game since its inception in 2012. In the three years of the game, 74 total players have gone on to get drafted in the following year's Entry Draft, including 15 total first-round picks.

The list of top picks included two of the top five players selected in the 2015 draft, Boston University's Jack Eichel (2nd overall) and Boston College's Noah Hanifin (5th overall).

Before taking part in the prospect's game, Kunin had already been recognized for his potential as a high draft pick. In NHL Central Scouting's Players to Watch List for September, Kunin was rated as an 'A' prospect, which translates into being a potential first-round candidate in next June's draft.

But even though there is already a strong link between prospects game and college-aged players getting drafted, Kunin understands he can't put too much stock into something that's still a distant landmark on his current road.

"[The draft is] obviously always in the back of your mind, but I just try to take it day by day. If you get too caught up in that stuff it can drag you down. Just stay grounded and just keep working every day to get better," Kunin said.

And although his breakout performance on a big stage gave him a boost going into his freshman campaign, he also knows there's still work to be done.

"Of course it does when you put a performance like that and you think you play well, it definitely helps going into your season," Kunin said. "But you just got to work every day to get better. It's just one game. It's in the past now."

It might have been just one game, but Kunin's scoring prowess is nothing new. Last season as captain of the USA Hockey NTDP, Kunin put up 42 points, including 27 goals in 61 games.

After a tough season offensively a year ago, Wisconsin returns 64 percent of its scoring this year, and Kunin will only help bolster that offensive attack with his scoring ability.

With his tune-up performance under his belt, Kunin and his Badger teammates are ready for the real thing.

"A lot of guys said we're looking a lot better from last year already. Just the positive things that everyone has been saying so far is really getting all of us excited for the first games coming up here," Kunin said. "All the guys are ready to go."
