
ABOUT VIRGINIA TECH

Dedicated to its motto, *Ut Prosim* (That I May Serve), Virginia Tech takes a hands-on, minds-on approach to education, preparing scholars to be leaders in their fields and communities. Since its founding as a land-grant college in 1872, Virginia Tech has grown to an enrollment of more than 33,000.

With a strong presence in the National Capitol Region, Roanoke, and on the main campus in Blacksburg, Virginia, as well as an international campus in Europe, Virginia Tech offers the widest range of degree choices in Virginia and is the state's leading research institution. Tech offers approximately 240 undergraduate and graduate degree programs and \$494 million in research expenditures each year.

The university's undergraduate colleges are: College of Agriculture and Life Sciences; College of Architecture and Urban Studies; College of Engineering; College of Liberal Arts and Human Sciences; College of Natural Resources and Environment; College of Science; and the Pamplin College of Business. At the postgraduate level is the Graduate School, the Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine, Pamplin College of Business and The Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine, a public-private partnership with Carilion Clinic in Roanoke.

implementation of inclusion and diversity goals throughout the university community. InclusiveVT supports the imperative of inclusion and diversity as key components of a university ecosystem rich in opportunities for experiential learning, cross-disciplinary engagement and the development of cultural awareness and empathy.

President Sands' vision for Virginia Tech embraces the university's heritage of service and community, and its motto, *Ut Prosim* ("That I May Serve"). Virginia Tech students will graduate with disciplinary mastery, technology literacy, cultural competency, resilience, empathy for others and the passions and strengths needed for a life and career of impactful service to humanity.

Before coming to Virginia Tech, President Sands served as executive vice president for academic affairs and provost of Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana. He was acting president during the summer and fall of 2012, before Mitchell E. Daniels became the 12th president of Purdue.

He earned a bachelor's degree with highest honors in engineering physics and a master's degree and doctorate in materials science from the University of California, Berkeley. He joined the Purdue faculty in 2002 as the Basil S. Turner Professor of Engineering in the schools of materials engineering and electrical and computer engineering. Prior to becoming provost, he served as the Mary Jo and Robert L. Kirk Director of the Birk Nanotechnology Center in Purdue's Discovery Park.

From 1993 to 2002, President Sands was a professor of materials science and engineering at the University of California, Berkeley, and before that, he performed research and directed research groups at Bell Communications Research (Bellcore) in Red Bank, New Jersey.

Sands is a fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE), the Materials Research Society (MRS) and the National Academy of Inventors (NAI). He serves on Governor McAuliffe's Council on Youth Entrepreneurship.

President Sands is joined at Virginia Tech by his wife, Dr. Laura Sands, a professor of gerontology in the Department of Human Development at Virginia Tech. All four of their children graduated from Purdue and are proud members of the Virginia Tech community.

Timothy D. Sands is the 16th president of Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, joining the university in June of 2014. A scientist, educator and inventor, he has dedicated much of his career to advancing the impact of research and innovation in public education. He has engaged the university community in a visionary plan to advance Virginia Tech's role as a global land grant institution, confronting the Commonwealth's, the country's and the world's most challenging problems.

The initiative, called "Beyond Boundaries", seeks to define Virginia Tech's role a generation into the future and align the educational experience with the needs and opportunities that will be created by changing world economies and the evolving landscape of higher education.

In collaboration with the provost and academic leadership, he has championed the development of signature "Destination Areas," thematic focus areas that leverage the university's signature strengths to attract talent and generate creative energy that extends across the disciplines. The development of these areas involves re-imagining Virginia Tech's Blacksburg residential campus, catalyzing the economic development of the Blacksburg-Roanoke region with a growing health science and technology center of excellence, and developing the experiential learning and research potential in the National Capital Region.

He also launched and led InclusiveVT, an initiative to provide leadership, collaboration, guidance, and resources to support and accelerate the

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Virginia Tech Athletics started a new era when Whit Babcock was formally named Virginia Tech's director of athletics on Jan. 24, 2014. The Harrisonburg, Virginia native came back to the state following stints at Cincinnati, Missouri, West Virginia and Auburn.

Babcock continues to make his mark on all facets of the athletics department, from fan engagement to facilities to fundraising and coaching hires. In fact, he received national acclaim for his work as an AD during the 2017-18 academic year, as he was named one of four FBS recipients of the Under Armour AD of the Year. The previous year, Babcock was one of five finalists for the AD of the Year honor handed out by SportsBusiness Journal and SportsBusiness Daily.

The 2017-18 academic year was another successful one for Virginia Tech under Babcock's leadership, as the Hokies came in 28th in the Learfield Directors Cup competition – its best finish ever. The previous best finish was 35th in 2014-15, which marked Babcock's first full year as the AD.

The number of successes in 2018 were notable. Four members of the men's track and field team combined to win the national championship in the distance medley relay – the program's first in distance running. Also, the Hokies won the ACC championship in wrestling, while the football team extended its bowl streak to 25 straight games, and the men's basketball squad received an NCAA Tournament bid for the second straight year. The women's basketball program made it to the finals of the WNIT, and both the women's golf and lacrosse programs earned berths to NCAA postseason play for the first time in program history.

Also, the Hokies claimed the Commonwealth Clash, an all-sports competition with rival Virginia sponsored by Virginia529, for the second consecutive year. Tech dominated the Cavaliers in 2017-18, winning by a score of 12.5-8.5.

Babcock has displayed an acumen for making great coaching hires during his relatively short tenure in Blacksburg, which has led to much of the Hokies' recent successes. Justin Fuente earned consensus honors



as the ACC Coach of the Year in 2016 after guiding the football team to 10 wins and has won 19 games in two years since succeeding legendary coach Frank Beamer, who retired after the 2015 season following 29 years as the head coach. Buzz Williams has led the men's basketball program to two NCAA Tournament appearances in four years, and Kenny Brooks has guided the women's basketball program to back-to-back postseason appearances in his two years.

Other Babcock hires faring well include wrestling head coach Tony Robie, who has led the Hokies to back-to-back ACC titles and top-10 finishes at the NCAA Wrestling Championships, and lacrosse head coach John Sung, who led Tech's squad to a school-record 14 wins and the program's first NCAA appearance in 2018.

On the fundraising front, Babcock's 2016 revamping of the Hokie Club, the athletics department's fundraising arm, continues to pay dividends, as the club raised a school-record \$47.7 million overall for the giving cycle ending March 31, 2018, with nearly \$16.8 million designated for the Hokie Scholarship Fund, which goes toward the rising costs of tuition for the school's more than 550 scholarship student-athletes.

But it's not just all about athletics, money and facilities with Babcock. The Hokies are getting it done in the classroom as well. In all 192 student-athletes made the Dean's List during the fall semester (3.40 GPA or better), and more than 300 student-athletes maintain a cumulative GPA of 3.0. Seventeen of the Hokies' 22 programs maintain a cumulative team GPA of 3.0 or better.

A student-athlete himself, Babcock lettered four seasons in baseball at James Madison University and served as team captain his senior year. He earned his bachelor's degree from JMU in 1992. In 1996, he received his master's in sports management from West Virginia University.

He and his wife, Kelly, have three sons: Andrew, Brett and Eli.

Hahn Hurst BASKETBALL PRACTICE CENTER

Virginia Tech is able to claim one of the finest practice facilities in major college basketball. The Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center affords the Hokies every convenience needed to build an elite college basketball program.

Since moving into the center in August 2009, this \$21 million facility has given the Hokies the facility so needed to compete at the highest level. The 49,000-foot building, which ties together modern, state-of-the-art amenities with the architectural integrity of the beautiful Virginia Tech campus, is a shining beacon to the commitment the university has made to basketball.

From the moment you walk through the front doors, you are engulfed with the magnitude of this beautiful facility. The two-story front lobby is a testament to the history and future promise of the Virginia Tech basketball program. From the large graphics to the various memorabilia, this area is awash with images of the greatest players in Hokie history.

The main feature of the building is the two-court, 16,609-square foot practice gym. Spa-

cious and convenient, the gym is equipped with a soft wall that can be lowered to divide the courts to allow both the men's and the women's team to practice at the same time. The courts are replicas of the main court in Cassell Coliseum, allowing each team to practice on the same surface on which it will play.

The office suites on the second floor feature offices for the assistants, a conference room and a huge office for the head coach. A view of the practice courts is available from the head coach's office, the large reception area and the connecting balcony.

Behind a secured entrance, the facility offers every feature needed to build a program. The spacious weight room has the full range of free weights, machines, treadmills, ellipticals and other equipment—all with a panoramic view of the practice courts.

Adjacent to the weight room is the modern, fully-equipped training room. This area features two examination rooms, a taping area and hot and cold immersion tubs. A state-of-the-art

Alter G rehab machine also is located in this area. The sports medicine staff can handle all aspects of treatment and rehabilitation of injuries from this room.

Across the hall is the equipment room, completely stocked with the finest gear offered by Nike. This area opens out into the parking lot, where the team begins its travel just steps from the locker room.

Speaking of the locker room, the Hokies boast the finest around. The fully appointed lounge area is outfitted with a sound system, 62-inch flat screen television, refrigerator and computer workstations. The complex also features a classroom with video and dry-erase boards, perfect for various forms of instruction and team meetings. The locker room itself is spacious, with video screens and large individual lockers with extra storage space.

Immediately behind the practice gym is a large patio area. This area is used for social events and tailgating functions.



Hahn Hurst BASKETBALL PRACTICE CENTER



The Hokies settled into their \$21 million, 49,000-square foot practice facility in August, 2009. The building boasts two practice gyms, a 3,000-square foot basketball weight room, training rooms, lounges, coaches offices, film rooms and locker rooms.



HOKIES IN THE COMMUNITY

The Virginia Tech women's basketball team has established a tradition of giving back to Blacksburg and the surrounding communities.

Each December, the women's basketball team is active with the Montgomery County Christmas Store. Fans are encouraged to bring donations to games during December, and the Hokies assist the store with set-up and help families with their holiday shopping.

Tech has been the host to both the Special Olympics and Military Appreciation Day during the month of January, and in February, the Hokies hold a day for Girl Scouts and their families to attend a game. The Hokies are always active in the Play4Kay initiative, which honors former NC State head coach Kay Yow, who lost her long battle with breast cancer. Tech wears pink in an annual game to help raise awareness and funds for breast cancer research.

The Hokies also reach out to local law enforcement, both the Blacksburg Police and Virginia Tech Police Departments. The team delivers cookies, spends time with the officers and thanks them for their service to the community and all they do to keep the town and campus safe.





STUDENT-ATHLETE SUPPORT



Sports Medicine

PROVIDING EXPERIENCED, PROFESSIONAL CARE

The Sports Medicine Department at Virginia Tech is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas utilizing state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of all Hokie student-athletes. Under the leadership of Associate Athletics Director for Sports Medicine Mike Goforth, the department is constantly improving and developing new strategies to provide the most current and comprehensive care.

The team of certified athletic trainers, orthopaedic surgeons, Board Certified primary care physicians, physical therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists, massage therapists and orthotists are available on site to manage the health care needs of Tech athletes. The staff continually looks for ways to enhance the services provided for its athletes as evidenced by its participation in local and national projects pertaining to related topics such as concussion management, prevention of antibiotic resistant types of staph infection (MRSA), high ankle sprains and collegiate health care management strategies. Research is considered instrumental to the sports medicine department. The department has participated in several projects with the engineering department and school of education, respectively.

Tech is in its 12th full year in the 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room, which consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes. There is top-of-the-line equipment and a unique style

of architecture, developed by Glenn Reynolds, AIA and Larry Perry as the consulting engineer.

Reynolds helped Tech spearhead another expansion project that doubled the size of the existing training room and united the entire medical staff, putting both the athletic trainers and doctors under one roof. Construction was completed in 2014 to convert the current training room into a functional rehabilitation space for preventative and post injury care, while also adding doctor's offices adjacent to a new treatment area.

Tech has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing it in the top five percent nationally. The training room also has offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces of rehabilitation equipment and treatment modalities. In addition, a training room has been constructed in Rector Field House for teams utilizing the facility, and the Gordon Family Mobile Sports Medicine Unit is a portable training room that can be transported to various venues.

The Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center contains a fully-equipped training room. This area features two examination rooms, a taping area and hot and cold immersion tubs. A state-of-the-art Alter G rehab machine also is located in this area. The sports medicine staff can handle all aspects of treatment and rehabilitation of injuries from this room. Team physical therapist and former Virginia Tech women's basketball player Erin Gibson works directly out of this facility in support of the basketball programs. Gibson plays a large role

in the overall program developed to return an injured athlete to 100 percent.

Athletes have many options to help prevent or protect them from injuries. The sports medicine staff takes great pride in treating athletes year-round. Special attention is paid to offseason activity. The staff will analyze past injury data from each participant and construct a preventative program.

A vital part of student-athlete medical services is access to the Carilion Clinic. Virginia Tech and Carilion Clinic have partnered in order to create the Roanoke-based Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine and Research Institute. The Hokies' student-athletes will continue to benefit from this partnership for years to come.

Team orthopaedic surgeon Dr. Chris Catterson brings a wealth of experience and skill to assist when athletes need orthopaedic consultation for certain types of sports-related injuries. Dr. Catterson brings a unique skill set and has excellent bedside manner that ensures that athletes and parents alike are comfortable and confident whenever surgery may be indicated.

Over the past 15 years, Tech has developed the reputation for producing top-level certified athletic trainers. Graduates are now employed in positions across the country at various levels of the profession.

Athletic Performance

HELPING STUDENT-ATHLETES GET BIGGER, FASTER, STRONGER

Having a top-flight strength and conditioning program is one of the most important aspects of a successful college basketball program. Long before players ever step on a court in competition, the truly successful ones have dedicated themselves to the long hours of preparation it takes to be the best. The Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is perfectly suited to develop successful student-athletes. And with the increased space in the Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center, this has proven even more so for the Hokies in the past several years.

Under the direction of assistant athletics director for athletic performance Ben Hilgart, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation, helping to make the women's basketball program one of the best as well. Greg Werner is the strength and conditioning coach for the women's team, working directly with assistant athletics director for

basketball programs, David Jackson. The results of hard work by the staff and the student-athletes have paid huge dividends, as the Hokies have continually shown improvement in this area.

The women's basketball team trains in the 4,000-square foot strength and conditioning center in the Hahn Hurst Basketball Practice Center. This dedicated weight room facility features free-weight equipment, a full line of Hammer Strength equipment, and four platforms. With this facility, Hokie basketball players do not need to split time between different weight rooms — everything needed to build a winner is under one roof.

Tech also has the use of a 10-by-40-yard sand pit located outdoors and adjacent to the weight room in the Merryman Center. This pit is used for resistive running drills to improve speed. The Hokies also have the practice fields for use in running drills.



Athletic Performance

SPORT PSYCHOLOGY

The Virginia Tech Athletics Department contracts with the Thomas E. Cook Counseling Center to provide psychological services for its student-athletes through the Sport Psychology Office. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. The mission of the sport psychology office is to promote student-athlete learning and development. Consistent with the university's mission to "educate the whole person," the sport psychology program promotes the academic, intellectual, social, emotional, athletic, and personal development of student-athletes.

On average, Bennett conducts more than 50 individual sessions per week and meets weekly with teams as the need arises.

The response to the sport psychology program has been positive. The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to student-athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.



DR. GARY BENNETT
ASSISTANT ATHLETICS DIRECTOR – SPORT PSYCHOLOGIST

Responsibilities: Bennett meets with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement. Bennett has taught and supervised pre-doctoral level interns.

Joined VT Athletics Staff: 2000 (full time since 2007); 18th year.

At Virginia Tech: Bennett began working at Virginia Tech in 1995 at the Cook Counseling Center. Now, as the sport psychologist, he also serves on the committees for nutrition, performance and substance abuse; and the planning committee for the "Summit for Student-Athlete Success" events. He also works with various teams in the area of performance enhancement.

Education: Centre (Ky.) College, 1981 (B.A. in English, where he played baseball); University of Kentucky, 1988 (master's in rehabilitation counseling); University of Kentucky, 1995 (Ph.D. in counseling psychology).

Of Note: Bennett is licensed as a clinical psychologist and has additional training in sport psychology. He is certified as a sport psychology consultant by the Association of Applied Sport Psychology and is a member of Division 47 (exercise and sport psychology) of the American Psychology Association.

Personal: Bennett lives in Blacksburg and enjoys playing golf and basketball, as well as hiking and skiing, in his spare time.

SPORTS NUTRITION

Eating healthy and making food functional for athletic performance are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life, and that's why the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program in July of 2002. Jennie Zabinsky is the department's associate athletics director of sports nutrition.

The sports nutrition program offers a wide variety of services that aim to enhance the performance of each student-athlete. Services include individual assessments, team talks, body composition analysis using the Bod Pod, grocery store tours, supplement management and education, disordered eating counseling, travel meal arrangements, and basketball training table menu planning and management. Zabinsky works closely with coaches, team physicians, athletic trainers, strength coaches and the sport psychologist to address any performance concerns. She directs the nutrition and performance committee that meets monthly to discuss student-athletes of concern.

The sports nutrition staff manages two facilities, the Nutrition Oasis and Fueling Station, that provide athletes fuel in between workouts, classes and meals. Each facility provides recovery beverages, Gatorade products, smoothies, and a variety of high performance snack options as well as nutrition education resources. In addition, Virginia Tech has started providing a training table to help promote hydration, muscle recovery, glycogen, synthesis, providing options to meet a variety of energy needs while increasing antioxidant and fiber intake.



JENNIE ZABINSKY, MAED, RD
ASSOCIATE ATHLETICS DIRECTOR, SPORTS NUTRITION

Responsibilities: Zabinsky is responsible for all nutrition and performance related concerns for varsity student-athletes including individual counseling, team talks, body composition analysis using the Bod Pod, recovery nutrition plans, grocery store tours, training table menu planning, travel meal arrangements, managing the Nutrition Oasis and Fueling Stations, and supplement education.

At Virginia Tech: Zabinsky worked as the sports nutrition graduate assistant under former director Amy Freel before being hired as director. She directs the nutrition and performance committee.



Of Note: Zabinsky is a member of the Collegiate and Professional Sports Dietitians Association (CPSDA) and Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics.

Nutrition Oasis & Training Table *USING WHOLE FOODS TO ENHANCE PERFORMANCE AND HEALTH*

The Nutrition Oasis serves as a resource room, providing fuel for athletes before, during, and after training. It includes access to protein and carbohydrate recovery drinks, Gatorade, fresh fruit, and bagels for all Olympic sport athletes. A new and improved Oasis opened during the summer of 2013 and includes a much larger space to accommodate a full-service smoothie bar, nutrition education area, food prep and storage space, an additional sports nutrition office, and room for small catered events. This space allows the sports nutrition program to continue to improve how it serves Virginia Tech student-athletes from a food and nutrition standpoint.

Virginia Tech has started providing a training table, giving teams the opportunity to come together for a meal planned out by the sports nutrition staff. The goal with the menu is to promote hydration, muscle recovery, glycogen (energy) synthesis, providing options to meet a variety of energy needs while increasing antioxidant and fiber intake. The Hokies work with a chef who interacts with the student-athletes, teaching them about the foods being prepared while encouraging them to try new foods.



SAASS

Student-Athlete Academic Support Services

Student-Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS) is committed to providing a comprehensive academic and personal development program with counseling and advising for student-athletes, offering academic counseling to ensure students receive a complete system of support consistent with university and NCAA policies.

Student-athletes have access to the department's spacious facilities, located in the west side of Lane Stadium. Opened during the 2006-07 academic year, the SAASS suite, located in the Quillen Family Academic Center, features 17 private tutor rooms, a state-of-the-art classroom, a 36-station computer lab with

printer access, a conference room, three quiet areas for reading and studying and a reference library. To accommodate the busy schedules of all of Tech's student-athletes, the SAASS office is open and available for students to access from 8 a.m. until 10 p.m. weekdays and from 6-10 p.m. on weekends. The SAASS office offers a tutor program available to Tech's student-athletes in both individual and group settings. Tutor services are available six days a week and the staff assures options for nearly every subject in which a student-athlete could request assistance. The collection of SAASS programs housed in Lane Stadium guarantees that all student-athletes achieve success during their time at Virginia Tech.

- Emery began her collegiate career at Tulane in 2015-16, where she played in all 35 of the Green Wave's contests, recording eight games of double-digit scoring. She was a two-time American Athletic Conference Freshman of the Week performer and earned AAC All-Freshman team honors.
- Emery also played for Gulf Coast State College for one season prior to her arrival in Blacksburg. She averaged 19 points per game en route to earning Region 8 Co-Player of the Year. In addition, Emery was named the Region Tournament MVP, National Tournament MVP, WBCA Player of the Year, Spalding NJCAA Player of the Year and was a third team All-American.

Kenny Brooks was named the seventh head women's basketball coach at Virginia Tech on March 28, 2016. He enters his third season at the helm of the Hokies' program heading into the 2018-19 season.

Since Brooks' arrival in Blacksburg, the Hokies have enjoyed back-to-back seasons of 20-plus wins and late runs in the month of March, making a WNIT championship game appearance in 2018 after finishing in the quarterfinals of that competition a season earlier.

To begin his tenure, Brooks and the Hokies reeled off 15 straight wins to open the 2016-17 season, Tech's strongest start to a season in 18 years. Behind that strong start, Tech climbed to as high as No. 15 in the AP Poll.

Brooks has ushered in a new era of up-tempo basketball at Virginia Tech, as his Hokies have reset the team scoring record in each of his first two seasons as well as reset the mark for most 3-pointers made.

During his time in Blacksburg, Brooks has recruited and developed Second Team All-ACC performer Taylor Emery, who set the single season scoring record in 2017-18 at 667 points. She also scored the most field goals in a single campaign with 236.

Brooks' tenure has also seen two players reach the 1,000-point plateau including forward Regan Magarity who became the program's all-time leading rebounder during the WNIT run in 2018.

Brooks joined the Hokies after an impressive 14-season stint as head coach at James Madison University where he compiled a record of 337-122 (.756), making him the winningest coach in that school's history. Brooks guided the Dukes to 11 consecutive postseason appearances, including six NCAA bids and five trips to the WNIT.

Over an 11-year stretch (2005-2016), Brooks' squads never won fewer than 24 games, averaging 26.3 wins per year. The Dukes won three consecutive CAA championships (2014-2016) under Brooks' tutelage and captured a total of five conference titles over a seven season span.

During those final three seasons in Harrisonburg, Brooks and the Dukes compiled an impressive 60-3 record in conference play.

He was named CAA Coach of the Year for a fourth time in 2015-16, while his student-athletes also garnered CAA Player and Rookie of the Year honors.



Kenny Brooks

HEAD COACH

Brooks registered winning campaigns in 13 of his 14 seasons in Harrisonburg, ascending to No. 23 in the AP Poll and No. 21 in the USA Today Coaches Poll in 2014-15 as his squad tied a school record with 29 victories. In 2013-14, he led the Dukes to their first NCAA Tournament victory since 1991 when his 11th-seeded Dukes knocked off sixth-seeded Gonzaga 72-63 in the first round. In 2007, the Dukes earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, marking only the second time a CAA team had received an at-large berth.

Under Brooks, JMU tallied six CAA Players of the Year, three Rookies of the Year and two Defensive Players of the Year. The Dukes also recorded 31 All-CAA selections, 11 Defensive team and 10 All-Rookie team selections during his tenure.

The Waynesboro, Virginia, native has coached three WNBA Draft picks; first-rounder Tamera Young, as well as Lauren Okafor and Jazmon Gwathmey, in addition to several other players who have signed professional contracts.

A 1992 graduate of James Madison, Brooks played for three seasons under legendary coach Lefty Driesell and made two NIT appearances while earning a degree in business management. He began his coaching career as a part-time assistant for the 1993-94 JMU men's squad that won the CAA Tournament and advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

After four seasons as an assistant for the men's program at VMI (1994-98), he moved back to his alma mater as a men's assistant from 1998-2002. He was named interim women's head coach on Dec. 6, 2002 before taking over those duties on a full-time basis on March 21, 2003.

Brooks and his wife, the former Chrissy Stewart have four children; Kendyl, Chloe, Gabby and Nicholas.

In his first season in Blacksburg, Brooks engineered the first 20-win season for Tech in a decade. After opening the season 15-0, including a defeat of then-No. 17 Tennessee for the second straight season, the Hokies ascended to No. 15 in the national polls, their best mark since 1999.

Brooks' 2016-17 squad set numerous records including made 3-pointers with 247 and points scored (2,405). Tech received a WNIT bid for the second consecutive year and defeated Navy, Rider and Penn State en route to an Elite Eight appearance. Three student-athletes were included on the ACC All-Academic Team during the season — Vanessa Panousis, Sami Hill and Regan Magarity.

Following their Virginia Tech careers, Panousis, Hill and Sidney Cook signed professional contracts- Panousis for Adelaide Lightning in Australia, Hill with Danau-Ries in Germany and Cook for Enea AZS Poznan in Poland.

Year two saw the Hokies continue the climb back to national prominence, amassing a record of 23-14 as the team embarked on the longest postseason run in the program's history, winning five games and finishing as runners up in the WNIT.

Once again Brooks' Hokies reset the marks for points in a season (2,673) and made 3's (295). The Hokies also won six league games for the first time in a decade and won their opening round match up at the ACC Championships. Other key wins during the season included securing a win in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge for the third consecutive season, becoming the first Virginia Tech program to win at the Carrier Dome and going to Morgantown in the semifinals of the WNIT and coming away with a dramatic 64-61 victory over West Virginia.





Jennifer Brown

ASSISTANT COACH

Jennifer Brown joined the Hokies in April 2016 as an assistant coach. Brown is entering her 11th season of collegiate coaching, having spent eight of her 10 years alongside head coach Kenny Brooks, completing six seasons at James Madison University before arriving at Virginia Tech. She also spent two seasons as an assistant at Colgate University.

Brown's primary duties with the Hokies include recruiting coordination, academic coordination, scouting and post development.

In each of her two seasons at Virginia Tech, Brown has helped the Hokies record 20-win seasons, making the postseason both years, including reaching the championship game of the WNIT in 2018.

During her six years at JMU with Brooks, the Dukes compiled an overall record of 165-43 (.793) and won four CAA Championships. The program made six straight trips to the postseason, including four NCAA appearances.

At JMU, Brown coached 2015-16 CAA Rookie of the Year Kayla Cooper-Williams, 2015 WNBA Draft selection Lauren Okafor and Toia Giggetts a 1,000-point scorer and CAA All-Rookie team member.

During JMU's 2013-14 campaign, she helped the Dukes to one of the most successful seasons in program history as JMU tied a school record 29 wins and advanced to the postseason for the ninth consecutive season. The CAA champion Dukes won their first NCAA Tournament game since 1991 with a 72-63 victory over No. 6 Gonzaga.



Brown, who was recruited to JMU by Brooks, played for the Dukes from 2006-08. In her two seasons as a player, she helped JMU to a 51-16 (.761) record, which included a trip to the NCAA Tournament and a trip to the WNIT. During her junior season (2006-07), JMU compiled a 27-6 record, was runner-up in the CAA Tournament, and earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament. The Dukes reached as high as 22nd in the AP Poll and 25th in the USA Today Poll. As a senior in 2007-08, the Dukes put together a 24-10 record, advancing to the Round of 16 of the WNIT, and received votes during the season in both major media polls.

The Brooklyn, New York native earned a bachelor's degree in justice studies in 2007 and a master's in kinesiology in 2008, both from JMU.

Brown is also a 2013 graduate of the NCAA Women's Coaches Academy and NCAA A.C.E. program in 2015.

She remains active in the community and sits on numerous committees at Virginia Tech.



Britney Anderson

ASSISTANT COACH

A key member to Virginia Tech's postseason success in the early-2000s, former women's basketball standout Britney Anderson returned to her alma mater in June 2015 as an assistant coach.

With Anderson on the sidelines, the Hokies have advanced to the postseason three straight seasons (2016-18), highlighted by a run to the 2018 WNIT Championship game.

Prior to her return to Blacksburg, Anderson served as an assistant coach at Radford University (2013-15), aiding in the resurgence of its

women's basketball program. Her responsibilities included recruiting, scouting, scheduling, community service and camp coordination, while focusing on wing player development.

Under Anderson's tutelage, the Highlanders were the Big South's top 3-point shooting team (.337) in 2014-15. In addition, Anderson helped develop two All-Big South honorees: Ayana Avery and Aisha Foy.

While playing for the Hokies from 2003-07, Anderson guided Tech to three NCAA tournament appearances and a WNIT berth. Anderson shot an impressive 44.6 percent from the floor for her career and averaged 10.2 points per game during her senior campaign.

Anderson was also a standout high school player in the NRV, leading Blacksburg High School to the Virginia High School League Group AA Girls' Basketball State Championship during her senior year. After averaging 18.2 points and 9.2 rebounds per game that season, Anderson was named Group AA State Player of the Year and Virginia's Miss Basketball.

Graduating from Virginia Tech in 2007 with a bachelor's degree in apparel design and merchandise management, Anderson served as the corporate recruiter for M.C. Dean, Inc. in Dulles, Va., from 2008 to 2013. During that time frame, Anderson also coached girls' basketball at Potomac Falls High School in Potomac Falls, Va., and in the AAU ranks with Team Unique 15U, Matrix 15U and PSPA 12U / 16U.

Anderson resides in Blacksburg with her dog, Fifi.



Shawn Poppie

ASSISTANT COACH

Shawn Poppie joined the Virginia Tech staff as assistant coach in July 2016.

Poppie came to Virginia Tech after serving at Furman for three seasons, most recently in the role of associate head coach. During his time, he helped the Paladins to a pair of trips to the postseason. In 2016, the Paladins advanced to the semifinals of the Southern Conference tournament before falling to co-champion Mercer.

Prior to his stint at Furman, Poppie spent two seasons at USC Upstate.

Poppie began his career as an assistant coach at Limestone College, where he served as recruiting coordinator. During his tenure, he recruited and signed three all-conference performers and helped the Saints to a 25-7 record, advancing to the NCAA Division II National Tournament in 2012.

A 2007 graduate of Limestone, Poppie was a two-time Carolinas-Virginia Athletic All-Conference player. He graduated as the school's all-time leader in assists (602) and steals (168) and finished third on the scoring list (1,246). Poppie earned his bachelor's degree in sports management.

DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS

Tim Clark was named Virginia Tech Women's Basketball Director of Operations in April 2016.

He previously had held the same role at James Madison under Brooks since 2010. Prior to that, Clark was a graduate assistant with the program and was in charge of film exchange, overseeing the student team manager program, ordering and maintaining equipment inventory and coordinating and scheduling the practice squad.

Clark served for four seasons as the head team manager with the Dukes, which included assisting the coaching staff in executing the day to day operations of the program and extensive experience with film exchange and general office operation. He also completed a full-time full-credit internship, as well as a 450-plus hour coaching education practicum with the program.

Basketball is in Clark's blood, as his sister is currently the head women's coach at Harcum College in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, and his father is the head women's coach at Trinity College just outside of Tampa, Florida.

Clark received his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from JMU in 2009 and completed his masters' degree at JMU in sport and recreation leadership in May 2011.

In his role at Tech, he will continue to assist the coaching staff in managing the day-to-day operations of the program, while also working with the travel plans and Hokie Hardwood Club.

Samantha Mitchell joined the Hokies in April 2016 as director of player personnel.

She previously served as the assistant director of basketball operations at James Madison. In her role with the Dukes, Mitchell assisted the director of operations with team travel, film exchange and equipment. She also oversaw members of the practice squad and student managers.

Brian Cox joined the Hokies in August 2016 as the video coordinator for the Virginia Tech women's basketball team. He is responsible for managing all film exchange and creating videos and graphics for the women's basketball team. Cox also oversees all Virginia Tech women's basketball social media outlets geared toward recruiting.

Cox spent the previous four years at Radford University, serving as the primary contact for volleyball, men's basketball, men's and women's golf, and women's lacrosse. Cox received his second promotion in a span of eight months when he was elevated to assistant AD for communications in June 2015. Prior to his promotion, Cox was the director of athletics communications. In that role, he oversaw the social media strategy of the department, the hall of fame committee and the assistant director of athletics communications. Cox also assisted with the promotion of Ferrum's 16 athletics programs, highlighted by the women's basketball and softball teams' runs in their respective NCAA Tournaments in 2012.

Autukaite plans to pursue a career in coaching women's basketball at the collegiate level. She is currently working toward earning her Masters of Arts in education in curriculum and instruction with an emphasis on instructional technology.

Brittany Clark joined the Virginia Tech women's basketball staff in the summer of 2018 after most recently serving as head coach at Harcum College in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania. She finished her time there with an overall record of 68-33 (0.673). During her tenure, Clark's teams earned a Region Championship (2017), two Region Runner-Ups, a District Championship, two Top-20 NJCAA national rankings, and a trip to the Division II NJCAA National Tournament for only the second time in school history, the previous time being when Clark was a student-athlete on the team in 2011.

HEAD S&C COACH FOR WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Greg Werner became the head strength and conditioning coach for Virginia Tech women's basketball in May 2016. He is responsible for the year-round development of the Hokies in all areas of athleticism and injury prevention. Werner was head strength and conditioning coach for most of Kenny Brooks' 14-season head coaching tenure at James Madison.

Prior to Tech, Werner was the head strength and conditioning coach for women's basketball at Auburn University for one season, and he helped the Tigers move up several spots in the SEC standings and make it to the NCAA Tournament. They won their opening round game and had a 20-win season. For 20 years, Werner was the head strength and conditioning coach at James Madison. He began that role in 1995 after working as an assistant in the program the previous three years. While at JMU, Werner directed the program for all sports. He was inducted into the JMU Athletic Hall of Fame in 2014, along with the 1994 NCAA national champion field hockey team.

Before working at JMU, Werner was an assistant strength and conditioning coach for one year at the University of The Pacific in Stockton, California, where he worked with football, volleyball, baseball, softball, tennis, swimming and water polo, and additionally taught classes in the sport sciences department.

Werner received his master's degree in kinesiology, with a concentration in exercise science, from JMU in 1994. He became interested in the science of speed, strength and conditioning while earning his bachelor's degree in human performance with an emphasis in exercise science at Austin Peay State University in 1991. While at APSU, he worked as an assistant strength coach for two years.

In his tenure as the head strength and conditioning coach at JMU, Werner grew the program from one part-time assistant to its impressive current size, with six full-time coaches working out of five weight rooms and two multi-purpose/cardio rooms, nearly 20,000-square feet of space, serving 19 teams. In addition to directing JMU's strength and conditioning

She previously served as the women's basketball athletic trainer at James Madison University for five years. In addition, she supervised the cheerleading graduate assistant, was a preceptor for the athletic training program, was an advisor for the Madison Athletic Training Student Association and the Gatorade manager for the summer camp program.

Prior to her time at JMU, Cash was a graduate assistant at Virginia Tech from 2006-09 where she worked with various athletic teams. Upon graduation, she moved to Florida State University where she was an athletics trainer from 2009-11.

Cash has been a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association since 2006. She is a licensed athletic trainer by the Virginia

program, Werner was an adjunct professor for the School of Kinesiology, where he designed and taught "KIN 425, Concepts of Strength & Conditioning" for 15 years. In 2014, he was awarded the Kinesiology Department's Professional of the Year award.

Outside of the collegiate ranks Werner has instructed several NFL, MLB, MLS, pro basketball and Olympic athletes. In 2011, he was elected by his peers to be a board of director's member for the CSCCA, and again in 2015, he was re-elected to the board for a second term. In 2006, Werner received the highest professional honor by earning the title of Master Strength & Conditioning Coach from the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association. That same year, he was nominated by his peers to be one of three finalists for the NSCA's College Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year Award. In 2005, he received the highest honor from the National Strength & Conditioning Association and earned the Coach Practitioner distinction. In 1999, he was selected the National Strength and Conditioning Association, Colonial Athletic Association Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year, and was nominated by his peers to be one of three finalists for the national professional of the year award. Also in 1999, he was selected to be the strength and conditioning specialist for the U.S. National Field Hockey team.

Werner has been active in the National Strength and Conditioning Association for several years. He served as the Virginia state director for the maximum term and has been an active speaker at the NSCA sport specific training conference, CSCS symposium and several other coach's clinics and camps. In 2014, the NSCA honored Werner with the registered strength and conditioning coach emeritus distinction and awarded him the honorary 20-year ring. In addition to coaching and teaching, Werner has published more than 30 articles in various coaching journals, magazines and websites. Werner is a National Strength and Conditioning Association certified strength and conditioning specialist and is certified through the Collegiate Strength & Conditioning Coaches Association. He is an American College of Sports Medicine certified health/fitness instructor.

Werner and wife Cyndi have two grown children, Hans Christian and Heidi Faith.





Hokie Hoops History

FROM A HUMBLE BEGINNING MORE THAN 30 YEARS AGO, VIRGINIA TECH WOMEN'S BASKETBALL HAS DEVELOPED INTO ONE OF THE NATION'S TOP COLLEGE PROGRAMS



Renee Dennis is Tech's all-time leading scorer with 1,791 points.

THE BEGINNINGS

Women's basketball at Virginia Tech began in 1970 as a club sport under the direction of coach Ganna Roberts. John Ristroph coached the squad during the 1972-73 season. In 1973, Joe Sgro, a professor at Tech, took over the team until 1976 when John Wetzel was named head coach. The team gained full varsity status beginning with the 1976-77 season.

TECH'S VARSITY COACHES

The Hokies' first varsity coach was former Tech player and former assistant coach of the NBA's Portland Trail Blazers, John Wetzel. He played on the men's team from 1963-66 and then went on to play pro ball with the Lakers, Suns and Hawks before coming back to Tech to finish his education and coach the women's squad. In his first and only season, his team recorded a 7-9 record.

Taking over for Wetzel in 1977 was Carolyn Owen, whose team registered an 8-16 mark. In 1978, Carol Alfano came on the scene, and in just her second season, guided the Tech women to their first winning record. Alfano coached the Hokies for 19 seasons, guiding them to the program's first NCAA appearances in 1994 and 1995.

Bonnie Henrickson became the Hokies' fourth head coach in 1997 and led Tech to five NCAA Tournament and two WNIT bids in her seven seasons.

Beth Dunkenberger became head coach in 2004 and guided Tech to the postseason three times while at the helm. The Hokies received bids to the NCAA Tournament in 2005 and 2006 and advanced to the WNIT third round in 2007.

Dennis Wolff became Tech's seventh head coach on March 22, 2011. Wolff helped the Hokies rebuild, taking Tech to postseason play for the first time in nine years, as the Hokies made the WNIT in 2016.

Kenny Brooks was tabbed the eighth head coach in Virginia Tech history on March 28, 2016.

FIRST SCHOLARSHIP PLAYERS

The first women's basketball player to earn any kind of scholarship was Helena Flanagan in 1977, when she received partial aid. Kim Albany (1978-82), who was recruited by Owen, was Tech's first full scholarship player. Also in 1978, Sis Spriggs received a full grant, and partials went to Donna Cooper, Pauline Landis and Sandy Berry.

RETIRED JERSEY

Renee Dennis' No. 44 jersey was retired at the conclusion of her career in 1987. Dennis, from Bridgeport, Connecticut, is one of only 14 athletes in Tech athletic history to have his or her jersey retired. She was the first female athlete to receive that honor and one of only three so far in Hokie history.

The others to have their jerseys retired are head football coach Frank Beamer, football players Cornell Brown, Carroll Dale, Jake Grove, Frank Loria, Jim Pyne, Bruce Smith and Michael Vick, men's basketball stars Dell Curry, Vernell "Bimbo" Coles, Allan Bristow and Ace Custis, baseball coach Chuck Hartman, baseball player Johnny Oates, volleyball standout Lisa Pikalek and softball All-American Angela Tincher.

PROFESSIONAL PLAYERS

Dennis played professionally in Australia, where she was her division's Player of the Year in 1989-90. Wendy Sanders played professionally in Belgium.

Tere Williams became the first Hokie to be selected in the WNBA Draft, when she was picked in the third round by the Phoenix Mercury. Ieva Kublina was drafted in the third round (31st overall) in the 2004 draft by the Indiana Fever.

At the conclusion of the 2005-06 season, the Hokies' Kerri Gardin was selected in the third round (34th overall) of the WNBA Draft by the Chicago Sky.

Nare Diawara was drafted in the third round (30th overall) of the 2007 WNBA Draft by the San Antonio Silver Stars.

Gardin, who played overseas following her collegiate career, became the first Tech player to play and start in a WNBA regular season game in 2008 as a member of the Connecticut Sun.

Ieva Kublina played in Hungary, Gardin in Israel and Lindsay Biggs and Utahya Drye both played professionally in Europe. Kublina competed in the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing, China, and Diawara led her Malian National Team to the 20th African Nations Championship in Dakar, Senegal. However, Diawara missed the Olympics due to injury.

After the 2013-14 season, the Hokies had two players sign to play overseas. Monet Tellier inked a deal to play for Artego Bydgoszcz in Poland while Uju Ugoka signed on with Italy's Vassalli 2G which plays in the country's top division. In addition, 2013 graduate, Alyssa Fenyn was a mid-season addition to MBK Ruzomberok in Slovakia where she had a standout rookie performance.

In recent years, former Hokies Hannah Young, Vanessa Panousis, Sami Hill and Sidney Cook have each gone overseas to play professional basketball.

Currently Young and Panousis, Australia natives, are active in the Australian State League.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Christi Osborne was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-America first team in 1994-95 and was a second-team member in 1993-94. Brittany Cook was selected to the third team in 2008 as was Laura Haskins in 2009. Several Hokies have been named to the CoSIDA District III Academic All-America team, including Amy Byrne (1988-89), Christi Osborne (1992-93, 1993-94, 1994-95), Maria Albertsson (1997-98, 1998-99), Amy Wetzel (1998-99, 1999-00), Sarah Hicks (2001-02), Erin Gibson (2003-04, 2004-05), Ieva Kublina (2003-04), Carrie Mason (2004-05, 2005-06), Brittany Cook (2007-08) and Laura Haskins (2007-08, 2008-09). Osborne also was a recipient of the Rawlings Scholarship Award (1994-95). Haskins was selected as the first winner of the Kay Yow Award as the ACC Women's Basketball Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

BEST OF THE METRO


The Virginia Tech women's basketball team won two championships as a member of the Metro Conference. Tech won the 1994 Metro Conference Tournament by knocking off Virginia Commonwealth, UNC Charlotte and Southern Miss in succession. The Hokies captured the 1995 Metro regular-season championship with a 10-2 league record.

ATLANTIC 10 CHAMPS

The Hokies captured the Atlantic-10 Conference Tournament championship in 1998 with a thrilling 66-64 overtime win over host Massachusetts. Virginia Tech won the Atlantic-10 regular-season title in 1998-99 with a 15-1 league record.

NATIONAL HONORS

Williams and Lisa Witherspoon were named as honorable mentions to the 1999 Associated Press All-America teams. In 1995, Jenny Root was an honorable mention selection to the Kodak All-America team. The Women's Basketball News Service named Tere Williams to the 1998 Freshman All-America third team. In 2008, Brittany Cook was a third-team selection to the ESPN The Magazine All-America team.

ALL-ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

Uju Ugoka was the most recent Hokie to be recognized by the ACC, earning second-team honors after averaging 18.4 points and 9.6 rebounds per game in 2013-14. She finished the season ranked eighth in the league in scoring and third in rebounding.

Utahya Drye was a 2010 honorable mention All-ACC selection after leading the Hokies in scoring. Kerri Gardin represented Virginia Tech on the All-Atlantic Coast Conference team, earning honorable mention honors during the 2004-05 season. Gardin averaged a double-double against the rest of the league, with 12.2 points per game during ACC play, while pulling down 10.1 rebounds a contest. Both were team highs during the conference slate.

Gardin again earned all-conference honors during the 2005-06 season. She was second on the team in scoring with 12.4 points per game, and she led the league in rebounds per contest, pulling down 10.0 per game.

Kirby Copeland was an honorable mention selection for the 2006-07 season. She led the team in scoring (15.0), assists (146) and steals (68).

Brittany Cook, after leading the ACC in scoring, was named to the 2007-08 all-conference second team.

In 2017-18, guard Taylor Emery earned second team All-ACC honors following her fantastic season where she led the Hokies in scoring at 18.5 points per game. She was the fifth leading scorer during conference play, averaging 19.0 points, and scoring 30-plus twice.

ALL-BIG EAST CONFERENCE

Williams was the first Hokie to be selected for All-BIG EAST honors after being named to the all-conference second team following the 2000-01 season. Ieva Kublina was selected as the 2001-02 BIG EAST Most Improved Player and was named to the all-conference second team. Sarah Hicks was a member of the 2001-02 all-conference third team. Kublina became the first Tech player to be named to the All-BIG EAST first team in 2002-03, and Carrie Mason was named to the 2003 BIG EAST All-Rookie team. Kublina was selected to the 2004 All-BIG EAST second team.

ALL-ATLANTIC 10 CONFERENCE

The Hokies were well represented on the All-Atlantic 10 Conference teams during their five years in the league. Michelle Houseright was the first Virginia Tech player named to the All-Atlantic 10 team in 1996 as a second-team selection and Lisa Witherspoon was a second-team pick in 1999. Other Hokies named to the team include Tere Williams, a first-team selection in 1999 and 2000 and a second-team member in 1998; Amy Wetzel, a second-team choice in 1999 and 2000; and Chrystal Starling, a member of the third team in 2000.

ALL-METRO CONFERENCE

In 14 seasons as a Metro Conference member, Virginia Tech placed 12 players on the all-conference team, including Jenny Root, who was

honored as the 1994-95 Metro Player of the Year. Hokies named to the first team include Taiqua Brittingham (1984), Renee Dennis (1986, 87), Susan Walvius (1986), Amy Byrne (1989) and Root (1994, 95). Second-team selections include Angie Kelly (1986), Maureen Donovan (1987), Michelle Bain (1988), Amy Byrne (1989), Missy Sallade (1989, '90), Jeni Garber (1991), Lisa Griffith (1992), Christi Osborne (1993, '94, '95) and Root (1993).

TOURNAMENT STARS

Virginia Tech players have left their mark in postseason play through the years. Vanessa Panousis became the Hokies' first ACC All-Tournament team selection in 2015, earning second-team honors. Ieva Kublina was named to the 2003 BIG EAST All-Tournament team and to the 2002 WNIT All-Tournament team. Tere Williams (1998) and Amy Wetzel (1999) were named to the All-Atlantic 10 Tournament team, as was Michelle Houseright (1998). Christi Osborne was a three-time member of the All-Metro Tournament team (1992, 93, 94) and was selected as the 1994 Most Valuable Player. Two-time All-Metro tournament members include Taiqua Brittingham (1983-84), Renee Dennis (1986-87), Jeni Garber (1988-89) and Sue Logsdon (1993-94).

FRESHMAN PHENOMS

Freshmen have made an immediate impact on the women's basketball program through the years. Andrea Barbour was a member of the 2007-08 ACC All-Freshman Team, and Carrie Mason was named as a 2002-03 honorable mention selection to the WomensCollegeHoops.com All-American Freshman Team and was a member of the BIG EAST All-Rookie Team. Williams was named to the 1998 Women's Basketball News Service Freshman All-American third team as well as being named Atlantic 10 Co-Rookie of the Year. Virginia Tech placed one player on the Atlantic 10 All-Rookie team in each of its five seasons in the league. Three Hokies, Garber (1988-89), Logsdon (1990-91) and Osborne (1991-92), were named to the Metro Conference All-Rookie Team.

1,000-POINT CLUB

Twenty-six Virginia Tech women's basketball players have reached the 1,000-point plateau, with the most recent members being Regan Magarity and Chanette Hicks, who each reached that mark during the 2017-18 season. Renee Dennis, Tech's all-time leading scorer, totaled 1,791 points during her Tech career. Other Hokies who have reached the 1,000-point plateau are: Tere Williams (1,750), Ieva Kublina (1,647), Jenny Root (1,582), Christi Osborne (1,500), Amy Wetzel (1,444), Vanessa Panousis (1,379), Carrie Mason (1,369), Chrystal Starling (1,340), Monet Tellier (1,331), Amy Byrne (1,291), Regan Magarity (1,181), Utahya Drye (1,166), Susan Walvius (1,161), Robin Lee (1,147), Dawn Chriss (1,121), Erin Gibson (1,117), Michelle Houseright (1,112), Chanette Hicks (1,099), Kirby Copeland (1,094), Sarah Hicks (1,092), Angie Kelly (1,092), Michelle Bain (1,068), Kerri Gardin (1,061), Lisa Griffith (1,033) and Brittany Cook (1,006).

1994 - NCAA

Virginia Tech had a 24-5 record and captured the Metro Conference Tournament title to advance to the Hokies' first NCAA Tournament. Tech was seeded eighth in the East Region and played host to Auburn in a first-round game at Cassell Coliseum. Auburn, on the strength of 24 points and 12 rebounds from Danielette Coleman, defeated the Hokies, 60-51. Tech guard Christi Osborne led the Hokies with 22 points and seven rebounds.

1995 - NCAA

Tech kept up its success by claiming the Metro Conference regular-season championship with a 21-8 record. The Hokies, again seeded eighth in the East Region, faced St. Joseph's in the first round at the University of Connecticut's Gampel Pavilion. The Hokies downed the Hawks, 62-52, behind 18 points from Christi Osborne. The Hokies' second-round opponent, UConn, ended up as the 1995 NCAA champion. Guard Jennifer Rizzotti burned the Hokies for 20 points as the Huskies advanced, 91-45.

1998 - NCAA

With former Tech assistant coach Bonnie Henrickson back in Blacksburg as the head coach, the Hokies posted their third trip to the NCAA Tournament in five years. Tech traveled to Gainesville, Florida, as the No. 11 seed in the NCAA West Region. The Hokies, behind a record-breaking performance from guard Amy Wetzel, surprised sixth-seeded Wisconsin, which was ranked No. 23 at the time, 75-64. Wetzel set a Tech record and tied an NCAA West Region free-throw mark

by converting 16 free throws for a career-high 28 points. The Hokies, however, would bow out after round two, as host Florida, ranked No. 12, won 89-57. Wetzel again led all scorers with 24 points.

1999 - NCAA

The Hokies used the 1999 season to establish themselves as one of the nation's elite programs. Henrickson led Tech to a school-record 28-3 finish, including a 15-1 Atlantic 10 mark. Cassell Coliseum was the site for NCAA First- and Second-Round games. The Hokies dispatched Saint Peter's, 73-48, before defeating Auburn, 76-61, to earn the program's first Sweet 16 appearance. Tech traveled to Greensboro, North Carolina to face second-ranked Tennessee in the NCAA East Regional. Behind 27 points from National Player of the Year Chamique Holdsclaw, the Volunteers eliminated Tech, 68-52, to advance.

2000 - WNIT

Virginia Tech posted its third consecutive 20-win season under Henrickson. The Hokies posted a 20-11 record and made their first appearance in the Women's National Invitational Tournament. Cassell Coliseum was the site of the first-round matchup against Georgia State. The Hokies used a 12-3 run midway through the second half to break open a close contest and went on to win, 80-56. Maryland was the WNIT Sweet 16 opponent two days later, and the two teams battled into overtime. The Terrapins used a 10-2 run in the last 3:11 of the extra session to eliminate the Hokies, 68-60.

2001 - NCAA

Tech received an at-large bid to the NCAA Midwest Regional as a No. 7 seed. The Hokies had compiled a 21-8 record entering the tournament in their first season in the BIG EAST Conference. Tech finished fourth in the league with an 11-5 record and advanced to the tournament semifinals before being eliminated by eventual national champion Notre Dame.

Tech's fourth consecutive postseason appearance and third invitation to the NCAA Tournament in the past four seasons, began with a resounding 77-57 victory over Denver in the first round in Lubbock, Texas. Chrystal Starling led five Hokies in double figures with 20 points, as Tech shot 55.3 percent from the field. In the second round, Tech faced Texas Tech on the Lady Raiders' home floor in front of 12,161. The Hokies played a great first half and took a 25-18 lead into the locker room at the intermission. The Lady Raiders, however, exploded in the second half, scoring 55 points to defeat the Hokies, 73-52.

2002 - WNIT

Virginia Tech received an invitation to the WNIT, which marked the Hokies' second venture to the tournament and their most successful to date.

The Hokies compiled an 18-10 record entering the WNIT after posting a 15-2 record at one point in the season, the second-best start to a season in the program's history. The two losses were by a total of three points.

Tech's four-game WNIT run, all in the Cassell, opened with a tight 51-45 win over UNC Greensboro.

The second-round contest was a renewal of the rivalry with former A-10 opponent George Washington. Trailing 32-27 at the half, Tech played one of its best halves of the year to win, 68-52.

Vermont was the Hokies' quarterfinal opponent, with the night belonging to senior Sarah Hicks, who had 22 points, including four treys. Ieva Kublina added 13 points and nine boards as Tech won, 76-48.

Tech's run in the tournament ended in a 77-72 overtime loss to Houston in front of 5,409 Hokie faithful. Kublina erupted for a career-high 32 points, which was the fourth-highest single-game total by a Tech player. For her efforts, Kublina was named to the all-tournament team.

2003 - NCAA

Tech made its sixth consecutive postseason appearance following a 21-9 regular season. The Hokies, who lost in the BIG EAST Tournament semifinals to eventual national champion Connecticut, were seeded seventh in the East Regional in West Lafayette, Indiana. Freshman Carrie Mason hit a running layup with 1.1 seconds remaining to give Tech a 61-59 win over Georgia Tech. Ieva Kublina led the way with 18 points, followed by Chrystal Starling's 15-point effort. In the second round, the Hokies faced No. 10

Purdue on the Boilermakers home floor. Despite shooting 54.9 percent from the field, Tech fell, 80-62, as the Boilermakers nailed eight 3-point shots and forced 20 turnovers.

2004 - NCAA

Tech made its seventh consecutive postseason appearance and seventh NCAA Tournament appearance in the past 11 years following a 22-8 regular season in its final season as a member of the BIG EAST Conference. The Hokies, who lost in the BIG EAST Tournament quarterfinals to eventual national champion Connecticut, were seeded eighth in the East Regional and played host to the first two rounds in Cassell Coliseum. Ieva Kublina scored 26 points to lead the hot-shooting Hokies to an 89-76 first-round win over Iowa. Tech built a 40-27 halftime lead by connecting on 51.7 percent from the field and shot a sizzling 67 percent (20-30) in the second half. In addition to Kublina's outburst, Carrie Mason followed with 19 points, including two treys.

The Hokies matched up with the region's top seed and fifth-ranked Penn State in the second round. After leading, 28-25, at the half, Tech saw the Lady Lions put together a 27-5 outburst in the second half to eliminate the Hokies, 61-48, before 7,128 fans, the eighth-largest crowd for a women's contest in Blacksburg. Mason and Kublina again led the way with 16 and 15 points, respectively.

2005 - NCAA

Virginia Tech made its eighth consecutive postseason appearance and eighth NCAA

Carrie Mason scored 19 points in helping the Hokies to a 89-76 win over Iowa in the first round of the 2004 NCAA Tournament.

Tournament in the past 12 seasons, following a 17-10 regular season. The Hokies, who lost to Wake Forest in the ACC Tournament, received an at-large bid as the No. 12 seed in the College Park, Maryland Regional. Dawn Chriss netted 20 points, but Tech could not overcome a 17-point first-half deficit, falling, 79-78, in front of 3,745 fans to No. 16 DePaul.

2006 - NCAA

Virginia Tech made its ninth consecutive postseason appearance and ninth NCAA Tournament appearance in the past 13 seasons following a 19-10 regular season. Tech earned an at-large bid as the No. 7 seed in the University Park, Pennsylvania Regional.

The Hokies had five players in double figures in the opening round, helping them knock off No. 10 seed Missouri, 82-51. Tech then fell to the No. 2 seed, Connecticut Huskies, 79-56. Dawn Chriss and Kerri Gardin each posted a team-high 16 points while Carrie Mason chipped in 13.

2007 - WNIT

Virginia Tech made it 10 in a row in the postseason with a bid to the WNIT following an 18-15 regular season. After receiving a first-round bye, Tech played host to Western Carolina and used a strong defensive performance in the second half to pull away to a 74-64 victory. A career-high 24 points from Britney Anderson proved not to be enough as the Hokies fell at home to Auburn, 81-74, in the third round.

2016 - WNIT

Virginia Tech made the postseason for the first time in nine years, receiving an at-large bid to the WNIT after posting an 18-14 regular season record. Tech played host to Elon in the opening round, defeating the Phoenix 68-59 behind 29 points from Rachel Camp. Sidney Cook added 12 points and nine rebounds. In the second round, the Hokies fell to Ohio 64-57. Cook tallied a double-double in the game with 22 points and 10 rebounds.

2017 - WNIT

Virginia Tech accepted its second straight bid to the WNIT after a 17-13 regular season finish. In the opening round, the Hokies defeated Rider 76-62 behind Regan Magarity's double-double (25 points, 12 rebounds). Chanette Hicks also scored 21 and Sami Hill added 19. The Hokies took on Navy in the second round, advancing 75-64. Hicks led four Hokies in double figures with 18. Tech traveled to Penn State for a Sweet Sixteen matchup, prevailing 64-55. Five Hokies scored 11 or more points. Vanessa Panousis knocked down five 3-pointers to lead Tech into the Elite Eight. Tech fell 80-62 to Michigan despite 17 points from Panousis to lead Tech. Magarity chipped in with 12 points and eight boards, while Hicks added 14.

2018 - WNIT

The Hokies returned to the postseason for the third consecutive season in 2018 earning another trip to the WNIT. Tech began the competition with a tight game at home versus Navy where Taylor Emery hit a late game-winner to send the Hokies into the next round. After comfortable wins at Cassell Coliseum over George Mason and Fordham, Tech found itself matched up against Alabama from the SEC. Emery, Rachel Camp and Aisha Sheppard pushed the Hokies to victory each scoring 17+ points in the game while Regan Magarity recorded a double-double. Tech hit the road for a semifinal match up against West Virginia, a squad that beat the Hokies early in the non conference portion of the schedule. In front of a raucous crowd, Tech pulled off a comeback with Emery's 3-pointer in the final seconds sending the Hokies into the finals of the competition for the first time in program history. Although the Hokies fell 57-65 to Indiana, it was a banner season, that included Emery and Magarity earning All-Tournament team honors.

Big Victories for Tech

VIRGINIA TECH'S WINS OVER NATIONALLY RANKED TEAMS

VIRGINIA TECH 86, #16 LSU 77 • 12/19/84

The Hokies defeated No. 16 Louisiana State in the Marriott-Converse Christmas Classic in Blacksburg. Angie Kelly tallied 18 points while Renee Dennis posted 15 points and pulled down 11 rebounds for the Hokies.

VIRGINIA TECH 73, #5 OLD DOMINION 72 • 11/30/85

One of the biggest wins in Tech women's basketball history came when Tech upset No. 5 Old Dominion, 73-72. Fueled by 27 points from Renee Dennis, it marked Tech's first win over the Lady Monarchs in 11 games.

VIRGINIA TECH 63, #16 JAMES MADISON 61 • 1/15/87

The Hokies upended 16th-ranked James Madison, 63-61, behind a 16-point, 13-rebound performance from freshman Amy Byrne.

VIRGINIA TECH 63, #14 SOUTH CAROLINA 59 • 2/25/89

In the middle of what was then the longest winning streak in school history, the Hokies upset No. 14 South Carolina in Blacksburg. Amy Byrne led the Hokies with 16 points and 12 rebounds.

VIRGINIA TECH 60, #18 SOUTHERN MISS 59 • 2/28/94

Virginia Tech upset No. 18 Southern Mississippi in a Cassell Coliseum barn-burner. Guard Lisa Leftwich, who led Tech with 18 points, hit a key finger roll with 42 seconds remaining.

VIRGINIA TECH 83, #19 SOUTHERN MISS 76 • 3/11/94

Shortly after having defeated Southern Miss during the regular season, the Hokies turned around a few weeks later to defeat the Golden Eagles again in one of the biggest games in the program's history. Tech defeated Southern Miss in the final of the 1994 Metro Conference Tournament. The win gave Tech its first conference title, sending the Hokies to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in their history.

VIRGINIA TECH 69, #9 VIRGINIA 62 • 1/13/95

The Hokies knocked off ninth-ranked Virginia in Cassell Coliseum, propelling Virginia Tech into the national rankings for the first time. Christi Osborne (16), Angela Donnell (14), Jenny Root (13) and Terri Garland (10) all scored in double figures for the Hokies.

VIRGINIA TECH 75, #24 WISCONSIN 64 • 3/14/98

Tech downed No. 24 Wisconsin in the first round of the 1998 NCAA Regional in Gainesville, Florida. Guard Amy Wetzel converted a school-record 16-of-17 free-throw attempts and scored 28 points to pace the Hokies.

VIRGINIA TECH 72, #6 DUKE 70 • 11/17/98

The Hokies traveled to "Tobacco Road" and knocked off sixth-ranked and eventual national runner-up Duke at Cameron Indoor Stadium. An injured Kim Seaver came off the bench to lead Tech with 14 points and nine rebounds.



Virginia Tech has knocked off ranked opponents in each of the past five seasons, including two ranked in the top 10.

VIRGINIA TECH 81, #17 VIRGINIA 65 • 11/30/98

Tech defeated in-state rival and 15th-ranked Virginia at Cassell Coliseum, helping the Hokies move into the polls the following week. Tere Williams recorded her second straight double-double of the season with 21 points and 10 rebounds.

VIRGINIA TECH 57, #17 VIRGINIA 56 • 11/30/00

Amy Wetzel hit a running 10-footer off the glass with 3.7 seconds remaining to give the Hokies a 57-56 win over 17th-ranked Virginia. The win marked the second consecutive time the Hokies had beaten the Cavaliers in Cassell Coliseum.

VIRGINIA TECH 65, #24 VILLANOVA 59 • 1/23/01

Virginia Tech used a 13-0 run over the final five minutes to secure a come-from-behind win over No. 24 Villanova. Tere Williams led Tech with 22 points followed by Amy Wetzel with 18.

VIRGINIA TECH 74, #23 VILLANOVA 67 • 3/4/01

The Hokies made an impressive debut in the BIG EAST Tournament, as they knocked off 23rd-ranked Villanova for the second time during the 2000-01 season. The Hokies claimed the 73-67 win in the tournament quarterfinals in



Storrs, Connecticut. Chrystal Starling came off the bench to lead Tech with 21 points, while Tere Williams chipped in with 20.

VIRGINIA TECH 68, #16 OLD DOMINION 62 - 11/19/01

Tech used a stingy defense and clutch free-throw shooting in the closing seconds to defeat No. 16 Old Dominion, 68-62. The Hokies held the Monarchs to only 37.7 percent from the field, while connecting on 45.5 percent. Chrystal Starling led Tech with 20 points and Sarah Hicks added 14.

VIRGINIA TECH 72, #24 BOSTON COLLEGE 53 - 1/9/02

The Hokies put together one of their best performances of the 2001-02 season with a 72-53 win over 24th-ranked Boston College. Tech shot a sizzling 59.1 percent from the field while holding the Eagles to only 31.1 percent. Ieva Kublina led the way with 19 points, 11 rebounds and five blocks, while Chrystal Starling contributed 19 points.

VIRGINIA TECH 66, #23 RUTGERS 64 - 1/22/03

Chrystal Starling, third all time in career free-throw percentage came through when needed as Tech defeated No. 23 Rutgers, 66-64 in overtime. She was fouled with 1.2 seconds remaining in the extra period and the senior calmly drained both free throws, securing the victory. Starling led Tech with 21 points, 16 of which came in the second half and overtime.

VIRGINIA TECH 74, #23 BOSTON COLLEGE 70 - 3/9/03

The Hokies used long-range shooting to pull off a 74-70 overtime victory against 23rd-ranked Boston College in the BIG EAST Tournament quarterfinals. After forcing the extra period with some clutch free-throw shooting, Tech nailed three treys in the extra session to seal the win. Ieva Kublina registered 20 points, including two 3-point baskets, while Chrystal Starling added 18 and Dawn Chriss chipped in with 14 points.

VIRGINIA TECH 63, #24 VIRGINIA 62 - 11/23/03

Tech proved there is a first time for everything, as the Hokies defeated No. 24 Virginia 63-62 for their first win in Charlottesville as a varsity team. After leading by as many as 14 points, the Hokies survived a furious Cavalier rally in the second half. UVA had two game-winning attempts in the final five seconds that missed the mark and gave Tech its historic win. Carrie Mason led the way with 18 points, including three treys.

#23 VIRGINIA TECH 63, #19 VILLANOVA 50 - 1/14/04

Virginia Tech jumped out to an early 27-9 lead and never looked back in a 63-50 win over No. 19 Villanova. Tech dominated the boards, holding a commanding 39-24 advantage, and shot 51.1 percent from the field. Kerri Gardin and Dawn Chriss led a balanced attack with 14 and 12 points, respectively.

VIRGINIA TECH 80, #24 BOSTON COLLEGE 64 - 1/24/04

Tech boasted five players in double figures after cruising to a 80-64 win over 24th-ranked Boston College. After trailing 33-31 at the half, the Hokies exploded for 49 second-half points to secure the win. Ieva Kublina led the way with 17 points, followed by Carrie Mason with 16. Erin Gibson and Dawn Chriss had 14 each, and Kerri Gardin added 13.

VIRGINIA TECH 71, #12 TEXAS TECH 70 - 12/19/04

The Hokies stunned No. 12 Texas Tech with 71-70 overtime win in Las Vegas. After trailing by eight in the first half, Tech tallied 41 points in the second half and shot 60 percent in overtime for the victory. Carrie Mason had 12 points, while Erin Gibson and Nare Diawara each hit for 11.

VIRGINIA TECH 87, #23 MARYLAND 79 - 2/24/05

Tech closed out the 2004-05 regular season with an 87-79 upset of No. 23 Maryland in College Park. The Hokies connected on 54 percent of their attempts in the game, while holding the Terps to 46 percent from the floor. Tech netted 48 points in the first half en route to a nine-point halftime lead. Kerri Gardin posted a double-double with 19 points and 12 rebounds, while Dawn Chriss also tallied a team-high 19 points in the win.

#25 VIRGINIA TECH 67, #19 BOSTON COLLEGE 62 - 1/8/06

The 25th-ranked Virginia Tech Hokies upended No. 19 Boston College 67-62 in Blacksburg. The Hokies rallied in the second half, outscoring their counterparts by 11 in the final 20 minutes for the win. Tech's defense stymied the Eagles, forcing them into 30 turnovers in the first ACC match-up of former BIG EAST foes.

VIRGINIA TECH 79, #10 NORTH CAROLINA 64 - 1/14/10

The 79-64 upset win over No. 10 North Carolina was an evening full of highlights for the Virginia Tech women's basketball program. The victory was Tech's first win over a nationally ranked opponent since a Jan. 8, 2006 home victory over No. 19 Boston College. The win also marked the first triumph over a top-10 opponent since Tech pulled off a 72-70 win on Nov. 15, 1998 at No. 6 Duke. Additionally, the victory was only the second ever in Cassell Coliseum against a top-10 team with the other occurring on Jan. 13, 1995 in a 69-62 win over No. 9 Virginia.

VIRGINIA TECH 75, #8 MARYLAND 69 - 1/25/12

Tech traveled to No. 8 Maryland to pull off the upset, as the Hokies recorded their first win over a top-8 team in over 10 years. The Terrapins held the 34-31 advantage at halftime, but the underdog Hokies out-scored Maryland 44-35 in the second period to pull off the upset on the road. Monet Tellier scored 31 points, hitting five 3-pointers and going 10-of-11 from the free-throw line. The win marked just the third in program history over a team ranked eighth or higher, with the last win Tech had over a top-8 team coming in 1998 when the Hokies defeated No. 6 Duke.

VIRGINIA TECH 71, #19 FLORIDA STATE 52 - 2/24/13

The Hokies played host to No. 19 Florida State in Cassell Coliseum, falling behind early before going on a 14-0 run in the first half to take a 33-22 lead in to the break. The Seminoles cut it down to seven in the second half, but the Hokies again answered with a 15-5 run as FSU would get no closer than 14 in the final minutes. Monet Tellier scored her 1,000th career point during the game and led the Hokies with 24, shooting 9 of 14 from the field, 2 of 3 from outside the arc and going a perfect 4 of 4 from the line.

VIRGINIA TECH 50, #11 NORTH CAROLINA 47 - 2/23/14


Virginia Tech made the trip to No. 11 North Carolina, looking for the team's first win in Chapel Hill. The Hokies opened the game with a 19-7 run capped by eight consecutive points from freshman Vanessa Panousis. Tech took the 25-24 lead in to the break. Tech maintained the lead early in the second period, but the Tar Heels came back to go on top 43-37 with just under seven minutes to go. Tech refused to back down, going on a 9-0 run to put the Hokies up 46-43 with less than two minutes to play. The Heels cut it down to a one-point game in the final minute, but UNC was unable to get a shot off and sent Panousis to the line with 19 seconds to go when she sank both to secure the win for Tech. Panousis tallied 24 points, while Uju Ugoka added 13 points and Monet Tellier grabbed 12 rebounds.

VIRGINIA TECH 57, #8 TENNESSEE 43 - 12/7/15

Virginia Tech claimed a 14-point, 57-43 decision at No. 8 Tennessee behind junior Vanessa Panousis' 21 points highlighted by 5 of 8 from outside the arc. In addition, Panousis helped seal the win by connecting on 6 of 6 from the line in the final 1:10. Regan Magarity added 13 points, going a career-high 3 of 3 from long range. The win marked Tech's first over the Lady Vols, as well as the first over a top-10 opponent since a victory over Maryland in 2012. It also snapped Tennessee's 44-game home win streak against unranked opponents. Panousis was named the ACC Player of the Week as well as ESPNW National Player of the Week, while the team earned NCAA Team of the Week honors.


VIRGINIA TECH 67, #17 TENNESSEE 63 - 11/27/16

Virginia Tech edged 17th-ranked Tennessee in Cassell Coliseum for its second straight win over the Lady Vols. Chanette Hicks led the way with 24 points, eight steals, five rebounds and three assists for the Hokies. Sidney Cook contributed a double-double of 14 points and 12 rebounds, and Regan Magarity poured in 16 more points to give Kenny Brooks his first signature win at Virginia Tech. Following the game, Hicks was named the ACC Player of the Week and the ESPNW National Player of the Week.

First Varsity Win

The Virginia Tech women's basketball team earned its first win as a varsity sport by defeating Bridgewater College, 59-55, on Dec. 14, 1976. The Hokies, who overcame a five-point deficit, outscored the Eagles by nine points down the stretch to clinch the win. Sophomore Gail Kelley led the way with 17 points, followed by Karen Garbis' 13.

50th Win

Tech's 50th win came on Jan. 28, 1981, against James Madison. Sis Spriggs was one of three Hokies in double figures with 15 points as Tech downed the Dukes, 66-58. Also in double figures were Tammie Edwards with 13 and Maureen Corrigan, who had 10 points as well as 10 rebounds.

100th Win

The Hokies hit the century mark by upsetting nationally ranked North Carolina, 74-73, in a thriller at Roanoke, Virginia on Dec. 1, 1984. Tech was paced by Renee Dennis' 17-point performance, but a number of players shined in the upset victory. Susan Walvius, a 6-2 center, added 16 points and five rebounds, guard Angie Kelly chipped in 15 points and guard Maureen Donovan contributed seven points and six rebounds.

150th Win

Tech registered win No. 150 on Jan. 16, 1988, when it squeaked past Louisville in Blacksburg, 68-67. Keying the victory was center Michelle Bain, who tallied 19 points and nine rebounds, while forward Wendy Sanders pumped in 16 points. Point guard Denise Kayajian had a career-high (at the time) eight assists to go along with nine points against the Lady Cardinals.

200th Win

Tech won its 200th game on Dec. 30, 1991, in the final of the 1991 Diamond Club Classic when it downed UNC Greensboro, 84-65, in Cassell Coliseum. Phyllis Tonkin scored 20 points and grabbed nine rebounds to lead the Tech women. Lisa Griffith kicked in 17 points, while Dayna Sonovick had nine rebounds and six assists.

250th Win

The Hokies won their 250th career game on March 9, 1994, by

knocking off 19th-ranked Southern Mississippi, 83-76, in the final of the 1994 Metro Conference Tournament in Biloxi, Miss. The win gave Tech the program's first bid to the NCAA Tournament. Southern Miss was the tournament's top seed. Christi Osborne led the way with 19 points, while Sue Logsdon had 18. Lisa Leftwich pitched in with 17, and Jenny Root contributed 14.

300th Win

Tech posted its 300th win in the program's history on Jan. 2, 1998, in an 84-60 win over Rhode Island in the Hokies' 1997-98 conference opener. The Cassell Coliseum crowd witnessed an outstanding performance from guard Amy Wetzel, who finished with 14 points and three steals. The win also marked Bonnie Henrickson's first Atlantic-10 Conference win as a head coach.

350th Win

Tech picked up win No. 350 on Jan. 6, 2000, when it coasted to an 81-38 win over Rhode Island. The victory also was Tech's 200th in Cassell Coliseum. The Hokies opened the game on a 12-0 run and cruised to a 42-16 halftime lead. The Hokies placed five players in double figures led by Nicole Jones, Kim Seaver, Chrystal Starling and Tere Williams with 12 points each. Tech outrebounded the Rams, 44-24, and blocked seven shots in the victory.

400th Win

The Hokies recorded win No. 400 on Jan. 19, 2002, with a 69-50 win over St. John's. Tech jumped out to a 39-20 halftime lead and cruised to the victory behind 16 points from Chrystal Starling along with Nicole Jones' 12 points and Sarah Hicks' 11. The Hokies held the Red Storm to only 30.8 percent from the field, while shooting a sizzling 64 percent in the first half.

450th Win

Win No. 450 on March 6, 2004, did not come easy as Tech found itself trailing Georgetown, 40-28, early in the second half of the 2004 BIG EAST Championship first-round contest. The Hokies cut the deficit to six points, 43-37, then ripped off 17 unanswered points and went on to a 56-47 victory. Tech outscored Georgetown, 28-7, over the final 14 minutes of the contest. Carrie Mason and Kerri Gardin led the comeback with 14 points each.

500th Win

The Hokies received strong performances from center Nare Diawara and forward Brittany Cook to defeat UNC Greensboro, 56-45, and record the 500th victory in the program's history on Jan. 10, 2007. Diawara recorded a double-double with 18 points and 12 rebounds, while Cook contributed 12 points and seven rebounds.

550th Win

Sophomore Shanel Harrison tallied 20 points to led the Hokies to win No. 550 on senior night in a 70-69 win over Clemson. Senior Lindsay Biggs and Utahya Drye scored the final 10 points for Tech down the stretch to preserve the victory. Drye finished her final home game with 13 points, while Biggs chipped in 10.

600th Win

Freshman Rachel Camp dropped in 22 points to lead Virginia Tech to a 73-60 win over Radford for the program's 600th win. Sophomore Vanessa Panousis also tallied more than 20 points, chipping in 21, including a trio of 3-pointers. Fellow sophomore Sidney Cook added nine points and nine rebounds.

650th Win

Four Hokies were in double figures led by Regan Magarity's 20 points and Michelle Berry's double-double (12 points, 12 rebounds) as Tech cruised past Maryland Eastern Shore 90-52 on Carilion Clinic Court.







PRESS AND PHOTO CREDENTIALS

The NCAA has established a control policy to keep the court free from congestion. Only photographers on assignment and members of the television media are given photo credentials. Freelance or amateur photographers will not be issued credentials. Accredited photographers may work along the playing floor at both ends behind the restriction line established by the NCAA. Permission to install strobe lighting must be made, in writing, to Carter Brown, women's basketball media contact, at least 10 days in advance of the game. Photographers should follow the same credentialing protocol as listed above.

Credentials will be mailed with sufficient advance notice, otherwise credentials may be picked up prior to the game from the Strategic Communications Office. Credentials not mailed or picked up will be held at the Will Call Window located at the front entrance to Cassell Coliseum.

Media parking is limited. Parking is available in the lot across from Cassell Coliseum. The entrance to this lot is on Beamer Way. Requests for parking credentials should be made by contacting Carter Brown.

Media information and game notes are available by email and will be posted on hokiesports.com.

GAME SERVICES

The Virginia Tech Strategic Communications Office will be at your service throughout the game. All media will be provided game notes, rosters, press guides and other pertinent information. Statistics will

be available at halftime and at the conclusion of the game. Information provided includes play-by-play and individual and team statistics in standard NCAA box score format and a shot chart. Members of the media work in a modern press room, located on the second floor of Cassell Coliseum, down the hall and to the left from the court entrance. This press room houses both the working press area and the post-game interview room. Only credentialed members of the media will be allowed in this work room. There is complimentary wireless internet available in the press room and on press row. Please contact a member of the athletics communications staff for log-on information.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

The Virginia Tech locker room is closed to the media. In accordance with ACC by-laws, requested players will be made available to the media following a 10-minute cooling off period. Coach Kenny Brooks and Virginia Tech student-athletes will hold postgame press conferences in the interview room. Media access to visiting coach and players will be determined by the visiting media relations contact.



BY AIR



Media parking will be assigned in Lot 1 (Cassell Lot).


VISITOR PARKING PERMITS


