# VILLANOVA FOOTBALL

## ABOUT THE ATLANTIC 10

With 11 teams comprising the Atlantic 10 Football Conference, it is the largest conference in I-AA. As evidenced by the 2002 season, the success of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference is escalating, both on and off the field.

Predicted to finish 10th by the coaches and selected media in the preseason, Northeastern won a program-record 10 games and claimed its first-ever Atlantic 10 crown in 2002, the ninth different program to win at least a share of the Conference title since 1999. The Huskies shared the league crown with Maine, which posted a school-record 11 victories en route to becoming the first team since the 1991-92 Delaware squads to win at least a share of the Atlantic 10 title in consecutive seasons. In addition, Villanova also posted an 11-win season, marking the first time in league history that three teams reached the double-digit victory plateau.

The 2002 season marked the seventh time in Conference history and second consecutive year that three teams (Maine, Northeastern, Villanova) qualified for the NCAA Tournament and the 12th-straight season multiple Atlantic 10 teams reached the I-AA playoffs. Villanova became the fourth different A-10 team in league history to reach the semifinals, marking the fourth time in the last six seasons the Conference has had at least one team reach the semifinals, including Massachusetts' run to the 1998 national title.

Since the 2001 preseason polls, every team in the Atlantic 10 has been nationally ranked, a feat no other Conference in college football can match.

In 2001, former Villanova standout Brian Westbrook became the third Atlantic 10 player to win the Walter Payton Award, joining former teammate Brian Finneran (1997) and New Hampshire running back Jerry Azumah (1998). Also in 2001, linebacker Derrick Lloyd of James Madison became the first A-10 standout to win the Buck Buchanan Award and it marked the first time in I-AA history that the winners of the Walter Payton and Buck Buchanan Awards hailed from the same conference.

Three times in league history has an Atlantic 10 coach been honored with the Eddie Robinson Award, with current A-10 coaches Andy Talley of Villanova and Mickey Matthews of James Madison winning the award in 1997 and 1999, respectively.

The Atlantic 10 Football Conference officially took over the Yankee Conference on July 1, 1997, marking the end of a 50-year legacy. Yet a new era began in collegiate football. Delaware, Hofstra, James Madison, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Northeastern, Rhode Island, Richmond, Villanova and William & Mary make up the 11-team membership of the league.

The Atlantic 10 Football Conference can trace its roots to December 3, 1946 when the Code of the Yankee Conference went into effect. Originally established as an all-sports conference for the New England land grant colleges, the six charter members of the Yankee Conference included Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Vermont. In 1973, Boston University joined the Conference as its first non-land grant institution.

After the 1974 season, Vermont withdrew from the league. Then, upon the formation of Division I-AA football in 1978, the league disbanded all sports except football. Membership remained stable until 1986 when Delaware and Richmond were admitted. Villanova gained admittance in 1988 and, in 1993, the Conference grew again with James Madison, Northeastern and William & Mary joining the league. Boston University withdrew from the league when it suspended its football program following the 1997 season. Connecticut withdrew following the 1999 season and Hofstra was added beginning with the 2001 campaign.

In July of 2002, Towson University accepted an invitation to join the Atlantic 10 Football Conference, effective July 1, 2003 with competition beginning for the 2004 football season.

"We are extremely pleased that Towson has accepted our invitation to become a member of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference," said commissioner Linda Bruno. "When our directors of athletics first agreed to explore expansion, Towson was an obvious choice. It is an excellent institution, geographically preferable, and the football program is making great strides. We look forward to a long and successful relationship with Towson."

Since 1978, Atlantic 10 Football Conference members have accumulated 53 playoff berths, 12 Lambert Cups, 62 Final Top 25 rankings, and 27 Final Top 10 rankings. The Conference is fully intent on remaining the best NCAA I-AA Conference in the country. In light of the success achieved by the Yankee Conference since 1947 and the Atlantic 10 Football Conference since 1997, the Atlantic 10 seems well on its way to achieving that goal.

## COMMISSIONER LINDA BRUNO



In her nine years as commissioner of the Atlantic 10 Conference, Linda Bruno has guided the league to unprecedented prosperity and acclaim while bettering the quality of the student-athlete experience.

Since assuming the reins of the Atlantic 10 Conference in June 1994, Bruno has strengthened the Atlantic 10's membership with the additions of Dayton, Fordham, La Salle and Richmond; negotiated two television deals with ESPN — the most lucrative and extensive packages in league history; was among the first to sign contracts with College Sports Television and The Football Network; added women's rowing, men's and women's outdoor

track & field, and women's lacrosse to the Conference's championship slate; created officiating bureaus for baseball, field hockey, men's and women's soccer, and women's volleyball to better serve those Atlantic 10 programs; and spearheaded the Atlantic 10's move into college football by orchestrating the league's operational takeover of the Yankee Conference.

Her efforts have not gone unnoticed nationally as she was named 1995 Person of the Year by *Eastern Basketball* magazine and was listed among the 25 most influential people in collegiate athletics by *College Sports* magazine.

Bruno's comprehensive background in Division I athletics has provided her with extensive experience in the areas of compliance, membership, television, and licensing, which serve her well as she confronts issues affecting not only the Atlantic 10, but all Division I institutions.

In her role as Atlantic 10 commissioner, Bruno has been instrumental in ensuring that the Conference continues to maximize national television exposure. In its inaugural season, The Football Network will air eight Atlantic 10 games. Atlantic 10 basketball will be seen on ESPN, ESPN2, and ABC this year, as well as on the self-syndicated Emmy Award-winning Atlantic 10 Television Network's regional package. In addition, the Conference's contract with College Sports Television will insure that several Olympic sports will be televised during the course of the season.

Bruno also oversees the baseball, men's and women's basketball, field hockey, men's and women's soccer, women's volleyball, and football officiating programs and continues the Conference's dedication to student-athletes by endorsing the sponsorship of Academic All-Conference teams in each of its sports. She also began the Commissioner's Honor Roll, which recognizes all Atlantic 10 student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA or better.

Prior to joining the Atlantic 10, Bruno spent 11 years with the Big East Conference, where she served in various capacities. She joined the league in 1983 as its director of championships before being elevated to associate commissioner in 1987. She held that position until she was named the fourth commissioner of the Atlantic 10 Conference.

In her previous role, Bruno oversaw the administration of 18 Big East Championships, as well as serving as the league's compliance administrator. Additionally, Bruno assisted with the development of the league's women's basketball Game of the Week television package, coordinated its awards programs, and oversaw scheduling in several sports.

The Iona College graduate began her career in intercollegiate athletics in 1977 at her alma mater, serving as an administrative assistant to the director of athletics for one year. She served in several athletics administration positions during her five years at Iona before accepting the posi-

tion of manager of contests and promotions at Yale University in 1982. After her promotion to assistant athletic director, Bruno joined the Big East in 1983. Bruno was inducted into the Iona College Athletic Hall of Fame during the summer of 1998.

A native of Pelham Manor, N.Y., Bruno received her Master's Degree from Iona and currently serves on its Board of Trustees. She resides in Philadelphia, Pa.
