2009-10 Preview: Wildcats Begin an Exciting New Journey

The final act of the 2009-10 basketball season was, of course, written months ago. The record book will show that on March 20, No. 2 seed Villanova was dispatched from the NCAA Tournament second round by No. 10 seed Saint Mary's.

Yet, inside the Davis Center, the power of that moment still resonates for Wildcats players and staff. It is less motivational than it is a practical lesson in the collective effort required to succeed in the crucible of late-season basketball.

"We were right there in terms of doing the things we needed to do to become the kind of team we want to be," states Villanova head coach Jay Wright. "I thought if we could have made it past Saint Mary's, we could have ended our season on a high note. It didn't work out that way but rather than look at the ending of our season as a disappointment, we prefer to focus on how close we were to understanding the commitment and passion required to excel."

Though the end came sooner than the Nova Nation had hoped, there was much to like about what took place in 2009-10. The 25 wins matched the second highest total in school history and the Wildcats were ranked in the top 10 of both major polls from start to finish of the regular season. Scottie Reynolds was recognized as a first team All-American and Corey Fisher was honored as third team All-BIG EAST.

All of that, mind you, came courtesy of a roster with six first-year players and only two seniors who logged substantial minutes.

"Every season is a unique journey," notes Wright. "We had some very valuable qualities with our depth, talent and firepower. There were also some weaknesses, like our inexperience and defense. By the end of the season, we had reached a point where our weaknesses were starting to become strengths, even though it may not have shown up in wins and losses."

The benefit now, is that much of that young roster returns intact, with eight members of last season's 11-man rotation joined by a pair of high school All-Americans, James Bell (USA Today and Parade) and JayVaughn Pinkston (McDonald's and Parade).

"We really have seen a carryover from the end of last season," states Wright. "There is an increased level of commitment on all fronts and our three seniors, Corey Fisher, Antonio Pena, and Corey Stokes, have stepped up as leaders."

Of course, there is the not so insignificant matter of replacing Reynolds, the school's No.

2 all-time scorer (2,222 points) and Redding, a four-year rotation staple and defensive anchor.

"I know a lot of people are talking about the 2,222 points we have to replace," stated Wright. "To me, that's the easiest hole to plug. It's much more important that we find a way to overcome the loss of all the intangibles that Scottie and Reggie brought as leaders. They had a great understanding of all the elements that are vital to us in terms of game situations and preparation."

Much of that task will fall to a trio of seniors, each of whom played an on-court role in Villanova's 2009 run to the NCAA Final Four in Detroit and now are being counted on to help set the course in 2010-11.

After stepping forward as the BIG EAST's Sixth Man of the Year in 2008-09, guard Corey Fisher settled in as Reynolds' partner in the starting backcourt as a junior. The native of the Bronx, N.Y., was Villanova's second leading scorer at 13.3 ppg and topped the Wildcats in assists. Now, he steps out of his mentor's shadow to take the wheel firmly.

"Scottie and Fish had a great relationship that was built on Scottie preparing Fish to be the man this season," explains Wright. "It was never something we planned but it kind

of developed because of the respect they had for one another. Fish always supported Scottie and looked up to him. Scottie took Fish under his wing as a little brother. I think we'll see the fruits of that this year."

The 6-1 Fisher is a dynamic offensive force who is at his best when he is in the lane making plays among taller defenders for his teammates and himself. Part of his growth as a junior was his development as a 3-point threat - he sank a career-best .396 of his attempts from beyond the arc.

Like Fisher, senior Antonio Pena took a sizable step up in his third season of BIG EAST basketball, posting career highs in points (10.5 ppg) and rebounds (7.0 rpg). Forced to play center much of last season due to the absence of Mouphtaou Yarou, Pena figures to log more time at his more natural position of power forward in 2010-11.

"Antonio has always been a respected member of this team," states Wright. "He is a team-first guy and that's one of the reasons he is so well-liked. We think he'll be a great galvanizer as a senior."

A third senior, Corey Stokes, came to Villanova noted for his extraordinary deep shooting skills. He has slowly enhanced the rest of his game over his three seasons on the Main Line and Wright is convinced that puts him in position for a standout farewell ride through the BIG EAST.

"As a staff, we really thought Stokes had his best year (in 2009-10)," stated Wright. "He made plays, got big rebounds and defended well. We think he has completed himself as a player and is much more than just a great shooter."

The 6-5 product of Bayonne, N.J., averaged 9.5 ppg.

Beyond that group, there is a core of five holdovers who have experienced the ups and downs newcomers endure and are ready to assume larger roles.

Foremost among that contingent is sophomore guard, Maalik Wayns, a BIG EAST All-Rookie choice who thrived in Villanova's NCAA battle against St. Mary's. The 6-1 product of Philadelphia brings a fearless approach to the floor with electric quickness and playmaking skills. He averaged 6.8 ppg in his debut campaign.

"Maalik had a great freshman year for us," notes Wright. "In our eyes, he is exactly where we want him to be entering his second year. He stepped in and showed what he could do in the BIG EAST and we're thrilled with his

development.”

As mentioned, Yarou's freshman campaign was disrupted significantly by a Hepatitis B diagnosis that cost him seven critical weeks in November, December and the early part of January. The 6-10 native of Benin slowly found his footing and moved back into the starting lineup in early March. He played his best game in the NCAA Tournament victory over Robert Morris, scoring 17 points and collecting eight rebounds.

“We think Mough handled that adversity as well as any player we have ever had,” stated Wright. “We were just so impressed by his maturity and the way he returned. He was a big factor in the NCAA Tournament and we think with a full off-season to prepare, he can really become a presence for us inside.”

Another of the decorated class of 2012 who demonstrated why all the pundits were so excited about his potential was 6-6 swingman Dominic Cheek. The product of St. Anthony's High School dropped in 17 points in a January win at Rutgers and flashed terrific skills, including defensive quickness and an ability to score.

“We love Dom's ability to defend, rebound and become a complete player,” states Wright. “He had a very good year as a freshman and came as far as any of our players in developing as a Villanova basketball player. We can't wait to see how his sophomore season plays out.”

Sophomore Maurice Sutton played some important minutes for the Wildcats in the middle in 2009-10, notably at the O'Reilly Auto Parts Puerto Rico Tipoff and in the NCAA Tournament. Though still a work in progress, the 6-11 Sutton is a shot-blocking weapon whose length offers the Wildcats an intriguing defensive option.

“Mo is continuing to progress as planned,” says Wright. “It's a slow process at times and he deserves a lot of credit for keeping the course. The important thing is that he gets better every day and we feel he'll play important minutes here as his career unfolds.”

There was a time when it appeared that Isaiah Armwood, a 6-8 forward from Baltimore by way of Montrose Christian School, might be ticketed for a redshirt season. By the time the season came to a close, the Wildcats felt his absence with a knee injury that prevented him from playing in the NCAA Tournament.

“Isaiah was a surprise for us,” states Wright. “Even though he was often at a strength disadvantage as a young guy in the BIG EAST, that

never prevented him from having an impact with his energy plays. It is a shame he had the injury problems late in the year because we could have used his help.”

Stepping into the vacant roster spots are a pair of heralded recruits, Bell and Pinkston. Bell arrives from nationally ranked Montverde Academy (Fla.) where he averaged 18.3 ppg and 6.0 rpg. Pinkston meanwhile, averaged 25 points and 13 rebounds per contest for Brooklyn's Bishop Loughlin High School.

“James has already fit in very well from a chemistry standpoint with our guys,” states Wright. “He is an outstanding athlete and student and can help us right away with his ability to play defense and bring energy.”

“JayVaughn has the potential to be a great player here. The challenge for him as a freshman will be to work on his conditioning as

we head towards the season. If he can do that quickly, he will give us a different kind of threat, one capable of scoring inside or on the perimeter.”

Also joining the Wildcats is walk-on Dallas Ouano, who accepts the mantle of that role from the graduated Russell Wooten. Ouano is a junior who joins the roster this season after serving as a practice player a season ago. He played high school basketball at Christian Brothers' Academy in Lincroft, N.J.

“Dallas had a chance to observe Russell last season and came to learn the many quiet contributions the Villanova walk-on makes to this program,” says Wright. “We think he will be a fine addition to our basketball family.”

While the identities of many of the Wildcats will be the same, the sense is that the look could be much different in 2010-11. Villanova may be as deep as it was a year ago but the hope is that depth will offer greater consistency.

“We're going to have great competition,” notes Wright. “We will have more experienced depth this year and that's important. Last year, we had a talented roster but a lot of those guys were learning what it takes at this level. The hope now is that it won't take us as long this year to become the kind of team we want to be.”

Though we are probably months away from seeing a set rotation emerge there are some educated guesses to be ventured. Fisher figures to be a centerpiece at one guard spot and it would not be a surprise to see Wayns establish himself in Reynolds' old position. Stokes may have the inside track on the wing though Cheek will push hard for time there and the freshmen cannot be discounted. It is also anticipated that the 'Cats will use more of the traditional lineup favored in the late-season with Peña and Yarou the incumbents at power forward and center. But Armood, and Sutton will vie for minutes as well.

That March weekend in Providence was less than the Nova Nation had hoped for.

But the hope inside this basketball family is that it will be a prelude to something much more.

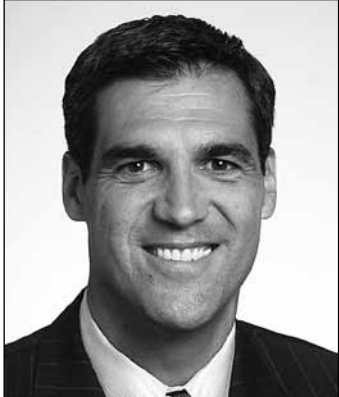

Jay Wright Head Coach ~ 10th Season



In a program long defined by achievement, Jay Wright has in nine seasons as head coach placed his own imprint of success on Wildcat basketball. Under his dynamic stewardship, which includes a pair of BIG EAST Coach of the Year awards, Villanova has re-established its place among the national elite.

Since the start of the 2004-05 campaign, VU is 151-53 (.740). In that stretch it has produced six consecutive 20-win seasons for the first time in program history. The 'Cats are 69-33 (.676) in BIG EAST regular season action in that span and are one of only two BIG EAST programs that have appeared in each of the last six NCAA Tournaments.

Villanova is 12-6 (.667) in NCAA Tournament play under Wright. It has advanced to four Sweet 16's, two Elite Eights and one Final Four. Its pulsating 78-76 triumph over Pittsburgh in March of 2009 lifted the 'Cats into the Final Four for the first time since the program captured the 1985 NCAA title under Wright's mentor, Rollie Massimino.

This period has also produced a trio of National Basketball Association draft choices (Dante Cunningham, Randy Foye and Kyle Lowry), five outright or shared Philadelphia Big Five crowns and a BIG EAST regular season championship (2006). Along the way, the Wildcats have maintained their impressive academic track record of graduating every student-athlete who spends four years in the program.

With a roster featuring six first-year players in 2009-10, Villanova nonetheless was ranked in the top 10 of both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today Coaches polls every week of the regular season. Led by consensus first team All-American Scottie Reynolds, VU enjoyed the best start in school history, climbing as high as No. 2 in the polls in early February. The Wildcats finished in a tie for second in the BIG EAST regular season and earned a No. 2 seed in the Midwest Region of the NCAA Tournament, the second highest seed in the program's history, and finished with a 25-8 record.

The 2008-09 season will long be recalled as one of the most special years in the program's rich history. Backed by an experienced cast that included senior captains Dwayne Anderson, Shane Clark, Dante Cunningham and Reynolds, Villanova established a new single season record for victories with 30. It was ranked in the Associated Press top 25

every week of the season and posted a 13-5 mark in BIG EAST play. Cunningham was the BIG EAST's Most Improved Player and Corey Fisher its Sixth Man of the Year. Wright was selected as the conference's Coach of the Year.

After receiving a No. 3 seed in the East Region, the Wildcats rallied from a 14-point second half deficit to defeat upset-minded American in the first round before eliminating UCLA and Duke by 23 and 22 points respectively. Then came the epic battle with Pitt, which ended with a dramatic length of the floor drive and basket by Reynolds, giving the 'Cats the East Regional crown and Wright his 300th career win (300-176). Villanova was then ousted by North Carolina at Ford Field, the fourth time in five seasons it was knocked out by the eventual champion.

In 2007-08 it was a tale of a young cast slowly acclimating itself to the rigors of BIG EAST basketball. With a roster devoid of seniors, the Wildcats endured growing pains as they acclimated themselves to the rigors of the BIG EAST Conference. In early February Villanova owned a 13-8 record and its post-season prospects appeared tenuous.

However, VU displayed the grit that has become such a staple of the program in the 21st century, picking up huge late season victories over West Virginia, Connecticut, Providence and Syracuse to gain an NCAA bid. Then, in another display of resiliency, the Wildcats rallied from an 18-point first half deficit to upset No. 5 seed Clemson in the opening round and followed that with a second round triumph over Siena before being eliminated by eventual champion Kansas.

It was just one more symbol of the vitality of Villanova basketball under Wright, who owns a 203-99 (.672) record as head coach of the Wildcats and a career mark of 325-184 (.639) in 15 seasons.

That strength showed itself in 2006-07 as well. Despite the loss of six seniors, including first round NBA draft choices Foye (Minnesota Timberwolves) and Lowry (Memphis Grizzlies), the Wildcats responded with a 22-11 effort, winning seven of their last nine regular season games to earn an at-large bid to the 2007 NCAA Tournament. The 'Cats also extended their school record Philadelphia Big Five winning streak to 11 straight (it would ultimately reach 13 in a row) with a perfect 4-0 record

against their City Series rivals and Reynolds joined Tim Thomas as the only Villanova players to earn BIG EAST Rookie of the Year honors.

In 2005-06, the Wildcats catalogued an impressive array of accomplishments despite the October loss of All-Big East forward Curtis Sumpter to season-ending knee surgery. Utilizing a four guard lineup, Villanova finished with 28 wins, to that point the most in school history, earning a share of the Big East Conference regular season title along the way. It spent the entire season ranked in the top 10 of both the *Associated Press* and *USA Today/ESPN* polls, climbing as high as No. 2 in February. The Wildcats were rewarded with the first NCAA Tournament No. 1 seed in the program's history and advanced to the Elite Eight for the first time since 1988.

There were plenty of individual highlights too. Foye was named a consensus first team All-American and a Wooden Award finalist as well as Big East player of the year. Senior Allan Ray was a consensus All-American, Naismith Award finalist and first team All Big East choice. Wright received national coach of the year honors from CBS/Chevrolet; the Naismith Awards; and the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC). The native of Churchville, Pa., was also named Big East Coach of the Year and earned the Harry Litwack Award as the Eastern College Coach of the Year from the Herb Good Club in Philadelphia.

In 2004-05, the Wildcats enjoyed a breakthrough campaign. The club overcame a host of significant injuries to emerge as a force in the BIG EAST Conference, recording six victories over nationally ranked teams. In its Big East opener, the Wildcats defeated No. 21 West Virginia 84-46. Three weeks later, on a snowy afternoon at the Wachovia Center, Villanova got America's attention with an 83-62 victory over No. 2 Kansas. In February, there were wins over No. 17 Pittsburgh and No. 3 Boston

College in the Pavilion.

Villanova completed the regular season with a 21-6 record (.778), its best winning percentage since 1995-96. It was awarded the school's first NCAA Tournament bid since 1999 and came up with victories over Mountain West Tournament champion New Mexico and Southeastern Conference Tournament champion Florida to reach the regional semifinal.

Wright was named Philadelphia Big Five Eastern College Coach of the Year for his efforts in leading VU to a 24-8 mark in 2004-05.

It was a significant milepost in a cycle of growth spawned when Wright returned to the university he had first served as an assistant coach to Rollie Massimino from 1987-92. From the day of his arrival as head coach on March 27, 2001 Wright's agenda was clear.

"We want to build an attitude of playing hard and playing together and playing with great passion," he stated then. "Most importantly, we want our guys to play with a pride in representing Villanova."

Today those qualities indeed define Villanova basketball.

The first three seasons of Wright's head coaching tenure at Villanova offered snapshots of promise. In 2001-02, the Wildcats surprised observers by recording 19 victories, including a win over No. 16 UCLA, and reaching the quarterfinals of the National Invitation Tournament. The next two seasons were marked by peaks and valleys as a 2002 recruiting class ranked among the nation's best acclimated itself to college. Yet Villanova continued its postseason streak, earning NIT bids in both 2003 and 2004 while also reaching the Big East Tournament semifinals in 2004.

Under Wright, Villanova basketball has grown in other ways. One of Wright's first priorities was to reach out to former Wildcat players to insure that they are an active part of the program. Towards that end, Wright's staff hosts an annual golf outing and includes former players in the annual Men's Basketball Banquet, which was moved to the floor of the Pavilion in 2009 to accommodate the growing demand for tickets.

As a product of this success, opportunities have arrived for members of Wright's staff. In April of 2009, former associate head coach Patrick Chambers was named head coach at Boston University and his staff includes former Wildcat guard Ross Condon. Tom Pecora, who was at Wright's side during his seven year run at Hofstra and then succeeded him on Long Island, is now the head coach at Fordham University. Billy Lange is the head coach at

Navy and longtime assistant Brett Gunning is a member of the Houston Rockets coaching staff (NBA).

This marks Wright's second stint at Villanova. He served as an assistant to former head coach Rollie Massimino for five seasons before moving on to the University of Nevada-Las Vegas for two more years as an assistant coach from 1992-94.

In 1994, Wright landed his first head coaching position. Hofstra University hired him to breathe life into a program that had struggled through the late 1980s and into the early part of the 1990s. Piece by piece, Wright transformed the Pride into a potent force in the America East Conference. This period was capped by a three-year run, which concluded in 2001, that saw Hofstra post a 72-22 (.766) record and make a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances.

Wright earned America East Coach of the Year honors in both 1999-2000 and 2000-01. He was also tabbed Eastern Basketball's Coach of the Year in 1999-2000.

Six of those young men Wright has tutored as a college head coach moved on to the National Basketball Association following their college careers. Cunningham became the No. 33 overall choice of the Portland Trail Blazers in 2009. Foye was taken with the seventh overall selection in the first round of the 2006 NBA Draft and spent the '09-10 season with Washington. Lowry was also selected in the first round of the 2006 draft by Memphis before being dealt to Houston, where he played in '09-10. Allan Ray spent the 2006-07 season with the Boston Celtics. Speedy Claxton, whom Wright coached at Hofstra, was a first round draft pick of Philadelphia in 2000 and enjoyed a 10-year NBA career while his former Pride teammate, Norman Richardson, spent time with Indiana.

At Hofstra, Wright's teams improved on an annual basis, culminating in a 26-5 season of 2000-01. In each of Wright's last six seasons on Long Island, the team improved its victory total from the previous year. Under Wright's watch Claxton became only the second sophomore in school history to win America East Player of the Year honors and the Pride captured the first ECAC Holiday Festival in school history in 1998.

Academic success has been a key component of Wright's coaching career. Every player who has spent four years with Wright's programs at Villanova and Hofstra has earned his college degree.

Since becoming a head coach, Wright has also taken time out to work with USA Basketball. In August 2005 he served as head

coach for the United States' entry in the World University Games which earned a gold medal. Team USA was dominant in amassing an 8-0 record by an average margin of victory of 29.9 points per game. For his efforts Wright was named USA Basketball Co-Developmental Coach of the Year. In the summer of 2007, he served as head coach of the United States' entry in the Pan American Games, leading the squad to a 3-2 record.

Wright spent five years on the Main Line as an assistant coach from 1987-92. He performed a wide range of assignments for Massimino, including scouting, on-court coaching and recruiting. During his time at Villanova the Wildcats made three NCAA Tournament appearances and reached the Elite Eight in 1988.

Wright's coaching career began in 1984 at the University of Rochester and he followed that with a season at Drexel (1985-86).

A 1983 graduate of Bucknell University with degrees in economics and sociology, Wright was a four-year letterman in basketball. He earned both the Benton A. The product of Churchville, Pa., attended Council Rock High School. He is married to the former Patricia Reilly (Villanova class of 1983). The Wrights have two sons, Taylor (17), Colin (16), and a daughter, Reilly (11).

Chris Walker Assistant Coach ~ Second Season



Villanova alumnus Chris Walker returned to his alma mater in June 2009 as an assistant coach after spending two seasons on the staff at the University of New Mexico. This move reunites Walker with Jay Wright, who was on the Villanova staff during Walker's career as a Wildcat point guard from 1988-92.

"We are thrilled to have another Wildcat alumnus join our staff," stated Villanova head coach Jay Wright. "Chris was an outstanding point guard while I was an assistant here and was one of the hardest working and committed players on our team. He has had

an outstanding coaching career since his graduation and we are very fortunate to have him here as a teacher and mentor for our student-athletes."

Walker, 40, came to Villanova from his native Houston, Tex., in 1988 to play for head coach Rollie Massimino. During his days as an undergraduate, Walker started 96 games at point guard and helped the 'Cats to two NCAA and two National Invitation Tournament appearances. His 404 career assists rank 13th on the school's all-time list and he was twice chosen to the All-Philadelphia Big Five squad.

This marks Walker's second stint as a Villanova assistant coach. He spent the 2000-01 campaign on the staff of former head coach Steve Lappas before accompanying Lappas to the University of Massachusetts. He was on the sidelines in Amherst for three seasons from 2001-05, including a one-year hiatus in 2004 when he served as the president and CEO of Spearhead Sports LLC in Houston. Walker has also served as the associate head coach at Vanderbilt (1996-99) and Pepperdine (1999-00) and head coach of the T-Mac All-Stars, a Houston based amateur unit.

In his position Walker will be responsible for on-court teaching and development, recruiting and scouting.

Born on Christmas Day 1969, Walker makes his home in Manayunk, Pa.

Jason Donnelly enters his sixth season with the Villanova program in 2010-11 and third in his current capacity as an assistant coach.

"Jason is a young, enthusiastic and experienced basketball coach," says head coach Jay Wright. "His organization and people skills made an enormous impact on our program over his first three years with our staff and now those traits serve him well as a teacher and recruiter. We look forward to watching Jason emerge as another great Villanova basketball assistant coach."

Donnelly was promoted to his current slot in the fall of 2008. In this assignment he is responsible for on-court teaching, scouting, recruiting and helps monitor the academic progress of the student-athletes in the basketball program.

In the summer of 2007, Donnelly enjoyed the unique experience of serving as the administrative assistant/manager for the United States' entry in the Pan American Games. He coordinated the trials held in Haverford, Pa., and the team's travel en route to Brazil, while assisting the coaching staff with a variety of off-court tasks.

Donnelly came to Villanova from Bishop O'Connell High School in Arlington, Va., where he served as the lead assistant coach to Joe Wootten from 1999-2005. In his final four seasons on the staff Bishop O'Connell posted a record of 116-19 (.859) and was consistently ranked in the national top 25.

Prior to that stint, Donnelly began his coaching career as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Muhlenberg College in Allentown, Pa.

As an undergraduate, Donnelly earned a history degree from Muhlenberg and played varsity basketball for coach Dave Madiera, the school's all-time leader in coaching victories.

Donnelly and his wife Rachel welcomed a son Aidan to their family in May 2010.

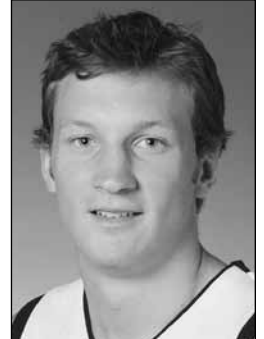
In his new position Urgo will be involved in recruiting, on-court teaching and academic oversight of the Wildcats.

"As a player, Baker had a terrific sense for the game and was a very underrated part of our success in 2006," states Wright. "Baker is an extremely intelligent young man who has all the tools to be an outstanding coach. We're thrilled to welcome him back."

Dunleavy was a standout at Jesuit High School in Portland, Ore., averaging 14 points and six rebounds per game as a senior in 2000-01. Following a post-graduate campaign at Lawrenceville (N.J.) Prep, the 6-5 swingman enrolled at Villanova as part of one of the most notable recruiting classes in the history of Villanova that included Randy Foye, Jason Fraser, Allan Ray and Curtis Sumpter.

As a Wildcat, Dunleavy appeared in 28 games over his four seasons, starting once. As a junior he was a part of the VU squad that helped the 'Cats return to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament in and a year later was part of the only Villanova team to earn a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

After earning his degree in 2006, Dunleavy settled in New York City, where he worked for Merrill Lynch before accepting his current position. His brother Mike Dunleavy is a member of the NBA's Indiana Pacers and his father, Mike Dunleavy, Sr., was the head coach for four NBA franchises, most recently the Los Angeles Clippers.

Highlights Were Plentiful Over Course of 2009-10

Boosted by the school's first visit to the NCAA Final Four since its amazing title run in 1985, the Villanova Wildcats entered 2009-10 with fresh expectations.

The 'Cats began the season ranked as high as No. 6 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll and No. 7 in the Associated Press pre-season ranking.

The heat was on the Wildcats and, as evidenced by the fact the squad remained in the top 10 of both polls from start to finish, coped well with the glare of the spotlight.

Villanova would win 25 games, tying the second highest total in school history and earn a No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament. Yet for all that was accomplished, the 'Cats still wondered what might have been if a learning curve for a roster comprised of seven first-year players had not been quite as steep.

"What's most disappointing," stated Villanova head coach Jay Wright in the wake of a second round loss to Saint Mary's that ended the season, "is that we felt like we were almost there. We just needed a little more time."

The journey began at the Pavilion beneath a banner commemorating the previous spring's run to the East Regional title. Villanova began the season by breaking open a one point game at halftime with a 49-point second half on their way to an 84-61 win.

The high-powered offense, featuring the deepest bench of Wright's nine seasons, quickly became this team's trademark.

Six 'Cats scored in double figures to power VU past Big Five rival Penn 103-65 before the club headed off to the O'Reilly Auto Parts Puerto Rico Tip-Off in San Juan.

The trip began with a setback when freshman Mouphtaou Yarou, who had started the first two games at center, was forced to return to Philadelphia over a health matter that was later revealed to be Hepatitis B. The illness would sideline him until January and do much more, derailing his campaign before it had really even begun.

Yarou's absence would be felt over time but in the short term his teammates more than picked up the slack. Classmate and fellow Montrose Christian Academy alumnus Isaiah Armwood rescued the Wildcats from an upset bid by George Mason when he calmly took a

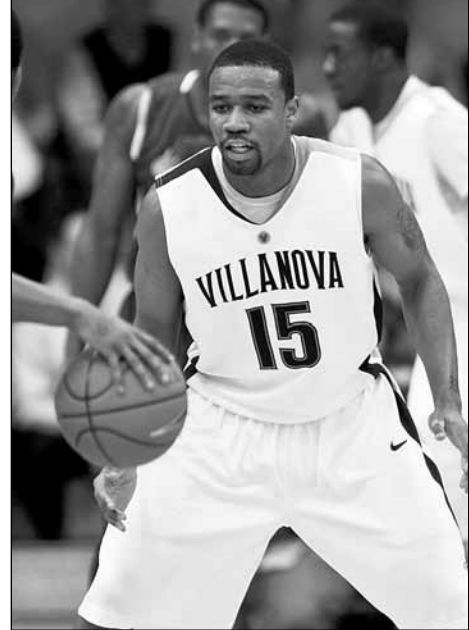
feed from a triple-teamed Scottie Reynolds and stepped into a smooth 3-point shot that lifted VU past the Patriots 69-68.

Then, forward Antonio Pena took it from there, scoring 30 points and collecting 23 rebounds in wins over Dayton and Ole Miss to help Villanova claim the championship.

Villanova was back on home soil after Thanksgiving to host another Big Five rival La Salle. Without Yarou, the Cats' were out-rebounded 51-34 but thanks to balanced scoring and solid defense, VU cruised to an 81-63 win to run its record to 6-0.

Pena (19 points) and Taylor King (16 points) did the heavy lifting in a 77-58 win over Drexel to open the month of December and then VU leaned on its offense to outlast Maryland 95-86. The catalyst was a familiar one for Villanova as Scottie Reynolds dropped in 25 points in what was the start of a two month stretch of skill that would ultimately earn the Herndon, Va., product consensus first team All-American honors.

Reynolds and King combined for 42 points in a 97-89 win over Saint Joseph's at the Palestra that gave VU its ninth straight win. However, crosstown rival Temple held

points from Juan Fernandez to hand VU its first loss on Dec. 13 at the Liacouras Center, 75-65.

Following a break for exams, VU visited the Izod Arena on Dec. 19 with senior guard Reggie Redding available for the first time after he sat out the season's first 10 games due to a violation of the university's student code of conduct.

Redding immediately made an impact, contributing 15 points and nine rebounds to spark a 96-58 win over Fordham. Four days later, Villanova took care of Delaware to complete the non-conference portion of their slate with an 11-1 mark.

For the second time in as many seasons, Villanova opened its BIG EAST slate at Marquette, this time on Jan. 2. This was a tense affair that went in the Wildcats' favor when Scottie Reynolds made a basket with 18 seconds left to lift VU to a 74-72 win.

After a 99-72 win over DePaul at the Pavilion on Jan. 6, the 'Cats found themselves in another taut battle with Marquette on Jan. 9. The Golden Eagles rallied from a 12-point half-time deficit but Reynolds thwarted them again, this time with a steal on the final possession to preserve a 78-76 triumph.

Two nights later, Reynolds was again front and center, this time helping the Wildcats overcome a 17-point first half deficit to earn a 92-84 triumph before a crowd of 20,076 at Louisville's Freedom Hall. Reynolds was 9-of-10 from the field and scored 36 points.

No. 11 Georgetown visited the Wachovia Center on Jan. 17 and it was Reynolds leading the charge with 27 points in what became an 82-77 victory. Double digit victories at Rutgers and St. John's was followed by a 90-72 win over Notre Dame before 17,619 at the Wachovia Center. Those wins allowed Villanova to close out January with a 19-1 record.

The Wildcats matched the highest ranking in school history when the polls were announced on Feb. 1. No. 2 Villanova fought off a spirited effort from Seton Hall to earn an 81-71 win and extend the best start in program history to 20-1.

Georgetown, ranked No. 7, extracted revenge on its home floor on Feb. 6 with a 103-90 triumph. But Villanova bounced back

two nights later to upend No. 5 West Virginia 82-75, its first win at the WVU Coliseum since 1999.

VU split a pair of Wachovia Center games, downing Providence 92-81 before falling to Connecticut 84-75. That was followed by a 70-65 loss at No. 19 Pitt.

On Senior Night, Reynolds - who would finish as the school's No. 2 all-time scorer behind only Kerry Kittles - was honored along with Redding and classmate Russell Wooten before a 74-49 win over USF.

In the wake of a loss to No. 4 Syracuse, VU picked up a tough road win at Cincinnati on Mar. 2 before WVU pulled out a 68-66 overtime win in the season finale to give the 'Cats a 13-5 BIG EAST record and double bye in the conference tournament.

Despite 16 points from third team All-BIG EAST choice Corey Fisher, Marquette knocked off VU 80-76 at MSG.

As for the NCAA Tournament, VU was in a hole for most of the afternoon in its first round meeting with No. 15 seed Robert Morris. With

their shots not falling, it was left to the determination of Reynolds and Yarou to pull the 'Cats through in overtime.

The Wildcats moved on to face upset minded St. Mary's and the experienced Gaels held VU to 36 percent in a 75-68 defeat that ended Villanova's season.

"We just weren't able to become the kind of defensive team we wanted to be until it was too late," stated Wright.

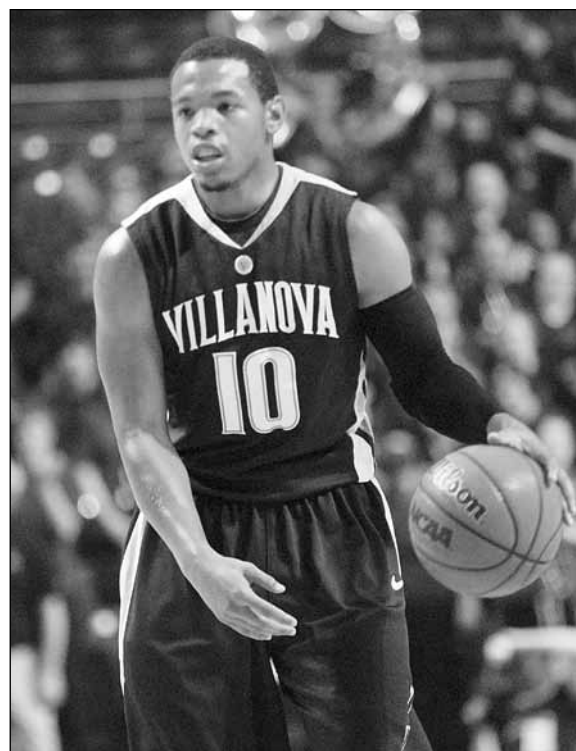
