A Glimpse of Villanova



Founded in 1842 by the friars of the Order of St. Augustine, Villanova is a comprehensive Roman Catholic institution that welcomes students of all faiths. The University offers an extensive variety of undergraduate and graduate degree programs in business, engineering, law, liberal arts, nursing and the sciences.

A Solid Academic Reputation

The oldest and largest Catholic university in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Villanova is one of 262 institutions-and one of 18 Catholic colleges or universities-in the nation to

have a chapter of the Phi Beta Kappa, the prestigious liberal arts honor society. For more than a decade, Villanova University has been ranked #1 by *US News and World Report* in the Best Universities-Master's category in the northern region.

The Student Body

Villanova enrolls more than 10,000 students annually in undergraduate and graduate programs. This academically talented and diverse group comes from 49 states, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the District of Columbia, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and more than 40 foreign countries.

The Faculty

Villanova's 545 full-time faculty members, 90 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field, teach classes that average 22 students. The undergraduate stu-

dent/faculty ratio is 13:1.

The Campus

Located in a suburban community 12 miles (or 20 kilometers) west of Philadelphia, the picturesque 254-acre campus features more than 60 buildings, including a library with more than 800,000 volumes, an 12,000 seat stadium, state of the art academic facilities, and 26 residence halls.

The Experience

Villanova students may choose to study abroad for a summer, semester, or year; compete

on one of 11 men's or 13 women's NCAA Division I level (football is Division IAA) sports teams, immerse themselves in Campus Ministry, and take part in any of more than 130 campus organizations.

Financial Assistance

In 2006-2007, Villanova offered more than \$7.49 million in merit-based academic scholarships to first year undergraduate students. Villanova also offered more than \$31 million in need-based financial assistance to prospective freshmen through the Villanova grant program.

Accreditation

Villanova and its programs have received accreditation through the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the AACSB International, the American Chemical Society, the American Bar Association, the Association of American Law Schools, the Pennsylvania State Board of Nurse Examiners, the National League for Nursing Accreditation Commission, the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education, the Computing Accreditation Commission and the Engineering Accreditation Commission of ABET, the National Catholic Education Association, and the Computing Sciences Accreditation Board. Villanova is a member in good standing of the National Association for College Admission Counseling.





The City Of Philadelphia

Villanova University is located 12 miles west of the city of Philadelphia, Pa., birthplace of American independence. Philadelphia is an absolutely indispensable resource easily accessible for Villanova's student community. Buses and trains stop regularly on our campus, and you can be in Center City in a matter of minutes.

There, the cultural attractions of one of the nation's most historic areas are yours to choose from: Independence Hall, where the Declaration of Independence was adopted, and the U.S. Constitution was written; the Academy of Music, home of the world-renowned Philadelphia Orchestra; the Liberty Bell; the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the country's third-largest art

NHL's Philadelphia Flyers. The Major Indoor Lacrosse League's Philadelphia Wings play at the Wachovia Spectrum. The Wachovia Center, the Wachovia Spectrum, Citizens Bank Park and Lincoln Financial Field are home to numerous other events, concerts and festivals.

There is also Philadelphia's famous South Street for shopping and strolling. Philadelphia's excellent restaurants are world-famous; equally famous is the city's more casual cuisine, like cheesesteaks, hoagies and soft pretzels.

Philadelphia also contains one of the country's largest concentrations of colleges, with over 30 campuses located within a 15 mile radius of Villanova. This gives students an opportunity to take advantage of libraries, cultural offerings, and other facilities, as well as giving them thousands of students and peers with whom to share good times.

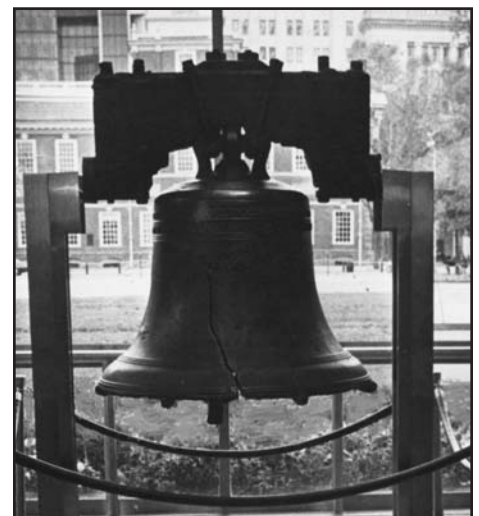

President, Rev. Peter M. Donohue, O.S.A.

On June 1, 2006, the Rev. Peter M. Donohue, O.S.A., began serving Villanova University as its 32nd president. He has been an integral member of the Villanova community for nearly two decades, during which time he has been immersed in all aspects of campus life.

An Active Member of the Villanova Community

Father Donohue is a tenured professor who from 1992 to 2006 served as chairman of the Villanova Theatre Department. He is an award-winning director whose productions have received nearly 30 nominations for Barrymore Awards, which recognize excellence in Philadelphia-area theatre. In 2002, Father Donohue's direction of "Chicago" won him the Barrymore's Harold Prince Award, presented for outstanding direction of a musical.

A visible presence at Villanova, Father Donohue may be best known among students for his vibrant liturgies, his longtime role as chaplain of the University's Naval ROTC program, and for regularly hosting groups for dinner at Burns



Hall, one of the Augustinian friaries on campus. Father Donohue also assists at St. Thomas of Villanova Parish on weekends and has officiated at numerous weddings of University alumni throughout the country.

Father Donohue is a member of the Augustinian Institute Advisory Board, has served as a faculty representative on the Board of Trustees

Academic Affairs Committee, and has been a member of numerous committees at Villanova, including the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences Diversity Committee, the Strategic Planning Committee, and the University Judicial Boards. In addition, he was a member of the NCAA Certification Self-Study committees of 1996-1997 and 2001-2002. Father Donohue also served two terms as a member of the Board of Trustees of Merrimack College in North Andover, Mass.

A Villanova Alumnus

Born in Bronx, N.Y., and raised in Royal Oak, Mich., Father Donohue received a Bachelor

of Arts degree from Villanova in 1975. He was ordained a Roman Catholic priest in the Order of Saint Augustine in 1979. In 1983, he received a Master of Arts in theatre from the Catholic University of America and in 1985 received a Master of Divinity from the Washington Theological Union. In 1990, he was inducted into Phi Kappa Phi, the nation's oldest, largest, and most selective honor society for all academic disciplines. Father Donohue received his doctorate in theatre history in 1992 from the University of Illinois, where he also was recognized for outstanding teaching.

A Vision for the Future

Father Donohue will be officially inaugurated as University president Sept. 8, 2006. He has chosen as the theme for his inauguration *Veritas, Unitas, Caritas: Instructing the Mind, Igniting the Heart, Illuminating the Spirit*. This theme is rooted in the principles of *truth, unity, and love*, which are central components of the University's Augustinian heritage and mission and which inspire Father Donohue's vision for Villanova's future.

Director Of Athletics Vince Nicastro

Vince Nicastro enters his seventh year as the Villanova University Director of Athletics in 2006-07. Nicastro oversees all aspects of the Wildcat athletics program and provides the leadership to bolster the Villanova "Tradition of Excellence" in the 21st century.

In his first six seasons at the helm, Nicastro has overseen significant success in the key areas of intercollegiate athletics.

Under his stewardship, the men's basketball program advanced to the Elite Eight in 2006 and Sweet 16 in 2005 and the Wildcat women's soccer team participated in four of the last five NCAA Tournaments, including a 2003 Sweet 16 berth. The Wildcat women's basketball team has tallied 20 wins or more in five of the last six seasons en route to earning seven straight postseason appearances, including a visit to the Elite Eight in 2003. The football team reached the NCAA I-AA semi-finals in 2002 and Brian Westbrook earned the Walter Payton Award in 2002.

In his tenure as director, Nicastro has been instrumental in the growth of the V Club, the Athletic Department's fundraising arm. Since its inception in 2000, the V Club has generated over 14 million in contributions. During that period, Nicastro has overseen the planning and development of numerous major endowment, capital gifts and facility upgrades to benefit Villanova Athletics. The most recent capital undertaking is the Intercollegiate Athletics and Recreation Center that will serve as a state-of-the-art practice facility for use by the men's and women's basketball programs and greatly improve the recreational and fitness offerings for the campus community. Other recent facility upgrades under Nicastro's watch include the new Villanova Ballpark at Plymouth Meeting; a new Softball Press Box; the Villanova Stadium Turf Replacement; and numerous team locker room enhancements.

Achievement in the classroom has also remained a priority under Nicastro's leadership. In the 2005-06 academic year, Villanova student-athletes posted a 3.096 grade point average, while achieving exemplary graduation rates. Villanova has now had eight consecutive semesters with its student-athletes registering a GPA of 3.0 or better. In the two-year NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR), Villanova earned an overall APR of 985 which represents the top APR in the Big East and is among the best in the nation.



Those beyond the Villanova zip code have taken notice. *U.S. News and World Report* listed Villanova as one of the Top 20 athletic programs in the nation in 2003. In 2004, Villanova was recognized as the top program in the Big East Conference in a study conducted by the Laboratory for the Study of Intercollegiate Athletics at Texas

A&M. In its first presentation of the Excellence in Athletics Cup, Villanova was cited for success in areas including NCAA postseason success, graduation rates, gender equity position and operating efficiency. Each of the six BCS conferences were assessed, and Villanova emerged on top of the Big East.

In 2003, Nicastro oversaw the second cycle of the NCAA's re-certification of Villanova University Athletics. He has also guided the University's implementation of a comprehensive Title IX compliance program which has increased opportunities for female student-athletes and enhanced resources for Villanova's women's programs.

Nicastro joined the Villanova Athletics Department in 1994 when he was hired as the school's Director of Ticket Operations. He was promoted to Assistant Athletics Director in 1997, and then elevated to the position of Associate Athletics Director soon thereafter. As an Associate Athletics Director, he was responsible for overseeing the department's administrative functions, including business operations, personnel and staffing and the sports medicine and strength/conditioning programs.

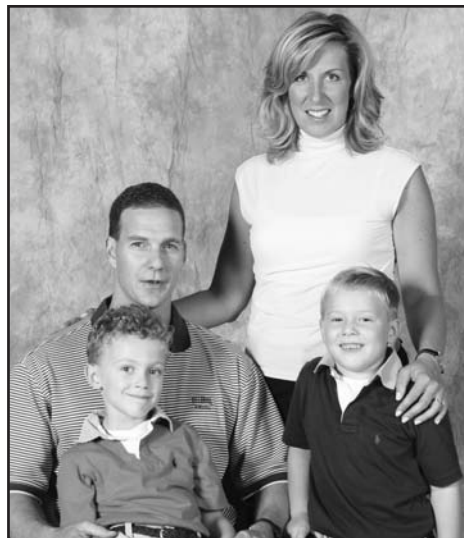
On his path to the Director's office, Nicastro served as the designated sport administrator for many of Villanova's men's and women's varsity programs, working closely to plan and develop all aspects of their sport's programs. Nicastro also coordinated Villanova's summer camp programs and the department's information technology issues.

As the Director of Athletics, Nicastro is responsible for the overall supervision of a Villanova Athletics Department that is committed to excellence both in competition and in the classroom. The broad-based Wildcat athletics program is comprised of 24 men's and women's varsity sports and over 500 student-athletes. In addition, club sports and an extensive intramurals program fall under the auspices of the Athletic Department. Villanova is a member of

the Big East Conference and the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

Nicastro has also been active both inside and outside the University, serving on many key committees. He is currently Chair of both the Big East Conference Championships and Competitions Committee, and is the former chair of the Big East Conference Finance Committee. He is also a current member of the Big East Athletic Directors' Executive Committee. Nicastro recently served as a member of the Big East Television Committee which negotiated the most comprehensive media agreements in conference history. In addition, Nicastro is a member of the Villanova University's President's Council and the Villanova Administrative Planning and Budget Committee. He is also a member of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference Executive Committee, the Executive Committee of the Philadelphia Sports Congress, is on the Board of Advisors for the Florida Atlantic University Sports Management Program and is a board member of the National Sports Marketing Network Philadelphia Chapter. He was also just recently selected to serve as a member of the Gatorade Athletic Director Advisory Board.

A 1987 graduate of Bloomsburg University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration/Accounting, Nicastro earned his MBA from St. Joseph's University in 1994. Nicastro and his wife Liz reside in Drexel Hill, Pa., with their six-year old twin sons, Jake and Casey.

Athletic Administration



Bob Steitz

Senior Associate AD/External Operations

Bob Steitz enters his fifth year as Villanova's Senior Associate Athletics Director for external operations in 2006. In his role, Steitz oversees the department's marketing and promotion initiatives and manages the Villanova Athletics Radio Network.

Steitz arrived at Villanova in 2002 from the Atlantic 10 Conference where he had been since 1990. He served as Associate Commissioner at the Atlantic 10 since 1994 with his primary responsibilities being the Executive Producer of the Atlantic 10 Television Network, coordinating and implementing the league's marketing and television strategies, overseeing all aspects of the men's basketball tournament, and planning and implementing the conference's basketball and football schedules.

Prior to being named Associate Commissioner at the Atlantic 10, Steitz was the Associate Commissioner at the Northeast Conference where he oversaw NCAA Compliance and was the Director of Championships.

Steitz began his career in collegiate athletics at Fordham University where he was the Athletic Operations Coordinator for one year from 1982 to 1983. He was then promoted to Assistant Director of Athletics in August of 1983, a position he held until August of 1985 when he left to become Assistant Director of Athletics at Florida International University.

Steitz has been a key figure on a number of athletic committees and currently serves on the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee. He previously served as chair of the NCAA Honor Committee. Steitz has also played key roles in a number of different events: the 2001 NCAA Men's Division I Basketball East Regional, the 1992 Basketball Tournaments of the Americas, the 1990 Goodwill Games, and the 1984 Summer Olympics Basketball Staff.

A 1980 graduate of Springfield College with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Health, Physical Education and Recreation, Steitz went on to earn his Master's of Education Degree in Athletic Administration from Springfield in 1981.

Steitz and his wife, Pam, reside in Blue Bell, Pa., with their 10-year old daughter Jessica and six-year old son, Michael.



Mary Anne Dowling

Associate Athletics Director/Student Services

Mary Anne Dowling is in her 28th season as a part of Villanova Athletics, and begins her 11th year as Associate Athletics Director for Student Services.

In her current capacity, Dowling serves both the Wildcat student-athletes and the administration in a variety of functions.

Her top priority is coordinating Villanova's Student Services, which is designed to counsel and advise all the Wildcat student-athletes during their stay at Villanova. Since assuming this role, she has instituted the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and Awareness Program, oversees drug and alcohol education, conducts student-athlete exit interviews and acts as a liaison with the Office of Academic Advising.

Dowling graduated from West Chester State College in 1970 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education, and went on to earn a Master's Degree in Education from West Chester in 1975. She is an inductee of the West Chester University Hall of Fame.

Prior to her most recent position at Villanova, Dowling had spent the majority of her time on the Main Line as the Assistant Athletic Director for Women's and Club Sports. Under her guidance, the Wildcat women's program grew from an AIAW Division I small college to national prominence in all NCAA Division I sports.

Dowling and her husband, Jim, reside in Downingtown, Pa. The couple has two children, Kevin and Kristen.



Lynn Tighe

Senior Associate AD/SWA

Lynn Tighe is in her ninth season at Villanova, and currently is a Senior Associate Athletics Director and the Senior Women's Administrator. She returned to her alma mater in November, 1998 as an Assistant Athletics Director, and earned a promotion to Associate Athletics Director in August, 2000. She was recently promoted to Senior Associate Athletics Director.

Prior to her current stint on the Main Line, Tighe served as the Director of Game Operations and Special Events for the American Basketball League's Philadelphia Rage from 1997-1998. As director, Tighe was responsible for planning, coordinating and implementing all game day operations and special events. She was also the Director of Merchandising, and created and directed the Merchandising Department. Tighe currently serves on the Division I Women's Basketball Issues Committee.

Tighe is a 1987 graduate of Villanova University, where she earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Economics. A four-year member of the Wildcat women's basketball team, Tighe ranks second in program history in career assists. The starting point guard for three seasons, Tighe helped lead the team to Big East Tournament titles and NCAA Tournament appearances in 1986 and 1987. She was chosen as a first team All-Big East performer as a senior in 1987. Tighe was inducted into the Villanova Athletic Hall of Fame in November 1998 and to the Big Five Hall of Fame in January 1998.

Tighe returned to Villanova in 1987 as an assistant women's basketball coach for head coach Harry Perretta, a position she maintained until 1989. From 1989-91, she served as a volunteer assistant coach for the Wildcats. Tighe is single and resides in Newtown Square, Pa.

Associate AD

In his fourth season at Villanova University, Rev. Rob Hagan, O.S.A. is an Associate Director of Athletics. As part of his role in the Athletic Department, he oversees the areas of Personnel, Sports Medicine and Strength and Conditioning. Father Hagan came to Villanova in 2003 as the Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance, and was promoted to his current position in July 2004.

Hagan graduated from Villanova with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1987. He went on to earn a J.D. from Widener University School of Law in 1990. After receiving his law degree, Hagan spent seven years as an attorney with Gillin and Associates, where he served as Criminal Defense Counsel, in addition to handling contract negotiations, arbitrations and mediations. He also served as assistant counsel to the Solicitor for the Delaware County Solid Waste Authority and the Delaware County Register of Wills.

Hagan entered the Order of Saint Augustine in 1997. He served as Chaplain at Thomas Jefferson University Hospital in Philadelphia, and at the University of Maryland, College Park, and received a Masters in Theology from the Washington Theological Union in 2003. He is a current member of the Pennsylvania Bar Association, and past member of the Philadelphia Bar Association, Delaware County Bar Association, and the Delaware County Association of Criminal Defense Attorneys. Father Hagan also serves as the Chaplain for the Villanova University men's basketball and football teams.

Dean Kenefick enters his fifth year as Assistant Athletics Director for Communications in 2006. He had previously been the Department's Director of Media Relations since 1998, before being promoted to his current position in June 2002.

In his role, Kenefick oversees all aspects of Villanova's Media Relations Department. He is also beginning his 11th season as the contact for both the football and women's basketball programs. In 2006, he will begin his second year as the sport administrator for the women's lacrosse program.

A 1994 graduate of Villanova with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Secondary Education and a Minor in Geography, Kenefick earned a Master's Degree in Education from Villanova in July 1999. He was named Director of Media Relations in the fall of 1998 after serving as the Assistant Director from 1995-98. Kenefick is single and resides in Drexel Hill, Pa.



Gordon Finch

Assistant AD/Compliance

Gordon Finch begins his third season at Villanova University in 2006. In his capacity as the Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance, he oversees all matters pertaining to compliance with National Collegiate Athletics Association rules and regulations.

Finch arrived at Villanova from the University of Connecticut, where he served in a similar capacity from March 2002 to August 2004. Among his responsibilities were coordination and implementation of all aspects of compliance systems, the development and implementation of rules education for staff members and outside constituents regarding Big East and NCAA legislation. Prior to his tenure at Connecticut, Finch spent four years serving as a Membership Services Representative for the NCAA at its Indianapolis and Kansas City offices.

Finch received a J.D. degree in 1994 from the University of Iowa College of Law. His areas of specialization included litigation, corporate, criminal and family law. He also holds a Master of Arts and Bachelor of Science Degrees from the University of Iowa. Finch spent two years as a law clerk for the Honorable Douglas L. Richards in Faribault County, Minnesota.

As an undergraduate athlete, Finch was a track & field standout at Iowa, where he owned the school record in the triple jump from 1988-90. Gordon and his wife, Julie, make their home in Coatesville, Pa. and are the parents of two children, Kate (10) and Alex (7).



Brian Murray

Assistant AD/Business Operations

Brian Murray enters his 12th year as a member of the Villanova University Athletic Department and his second as an Assistant Athletic Director in 2006. Murray is in charge of the department's financial affairs, manages the athletic budget and oversees the department travel office.

Murray began his Villanova career as an intern in both the ticket office and equipment room from 1994-95. Following his two-year stint, he worked as an intern in the marketing office from 1995-96.

THE JOHN "JAKE" NEVIN FIELD HOUSE

Officially opened on April 1, 1932 as the Villanova Field House, the Field House was renamed to honor long-time Wildcat athletic

trainer John "Jake" Nevin on November 22, 1985. Once the home of both the Wildcat men's and women's basketball teams, the building is currently home to the women's volleyball squad, as well as administrative offices and training

facilities. Originally built at a cost of \$350,000, the Field House has hosted Villanova's commencement exercises, numerous high school commencements, concerts, lectures, funerals, masses, dances and plays.

THE PAVILION

Officially opened in February 1986, The Pavilion is the current home of the Wildcat men's and women's basketball teams. With a seating capacity of 6,500, the Pavilion also has hosted commencements, receptions, banquets, dances and concerts since the opening. Also included in The Pavilion is a 200-meter indoor track, tennis courts and batting cages for the baseball and softball teams.

VILLANOVA STADIUM, GOODREAU FIELD & THE JUMBO ELLIOTT TRACK

Dedicated on October 8, 1927, and built at a cost of \$500,000, numerous improvements and additions have been made to the original home of the Wildcats since then. The structure is officially known as Villanova Stadium and seats 12,000 spectators. It has hosted football, field hockey, men's and women's lacrosse, men's

and women's soccer, and international track meets, as well as commencements and other functions. The playing field was dedicated to the memory of Leo J. Goodreau, a football player who died due to injuries in practice, on May 7, 1930. On September 27, 1980, the running track was dedicated to Villanova's legendary track & field coach, James "Jumbo" Elliott. In the summer of 1992, new surfaces were placed on the playing field (Astroturf-8) and track (Rekortan S). During the summer of 1997, state-of-the-art lights were installed, improving the quality of all Wildcat night contests. In the summer of 1999, a Stadium Renovation project took place with the addition of a press facility that includes, a 100-person meeting room for all Athletic Department members to utilize, along with a first-class facility for all media members to use. The stadium playing field currently features synthetic grass surface known as AstroPlay. The new surface was used for game competition by both the men's and women's lacrosse teams and by the Wildcat football squad beginning in the spring of 2002.

VILLANOVA SOFTBALL FIELD

Located behind Bartley Hall on the Main Campus is Villanova's softball field. In the Spring of 1998, the field was completely refurbished, improving the facility to one of the best in the Big East Conference. Improvements to the field include dugouts, warm-up areas and a new playing surface. To commemorate the opening of the new field, USA Softball Olympian and gold medalist Dot Richardson christened the new field by throwing out the first pitch in the Wildcats doubleheader with Boston College on April 7, 1997. During the spring of 2001, a press box was added to the Villanova Softball Field and the site was host to the 2001 Big East Softball Championship.

VILLANOVA SOCCER COMPLEX

Located behind St. Mary's Hall on the ever-growing West Campus is Villanova's soccer field. It was established in the fall of 1992 as the new home for the Wildcat men's and women's soccer programs and was recently leveled and resodded for a top-notch facility. During the summer of 1999, new bleachers were added to the facility that seats 1,500 people. In the fall of 2001, new locker rooms for the men's and women's soccer teams were added.

VILLANOVA SWIM CENTER

Completed in July, 1985 at a cost of \$1.5 million, The Swimming Center is home to Villanova's men's and women's swimming and diving teams, and the women's water polo squad. Measuring 25 meters by 25 yards, with depths ranging from 4 1/2 feet to 13 feet, it features 10 lanes for competitive swimming, two 1-meter diving boards, and 3-meter diving platforms. During the summer of 1999, new offices and a meeting room were constructed for the swimming and women's water polo coaching staffs.

PIKE FIELD

Located across the street from Villanova Stadium, this practice facility was re-built in 1994 at a cost of \$350,000 to include a complete state-of-the-art throwing area for track and field meets that allows three events to be contested simultaneously. This field, equipped with a drainage system to ensure high quality conditions year-round, also serves as an outstanding practice field for Villanova's varsity teams as well as intramural competition.

VILLANOVA TENNIS COMPLEX

A brand new tennis facility was constructed on Villanova's West Campus during the summer of 1999. This new facility is home to both the Wildcat men's and women's tennis teams. Recreational courts are also available on the South Campus adjacent to Stanford Hall, and on the Main Campus behind Kennedy Hall.

ATHLETIC TRAINING ROOM

Villanova's Jake Nevin Field House features a full-service athletic training room. The facility contains state-of-the-art equipment specifically for the treatment and rehabilitation of athletic injuries. This facility now contains 2,200 square feet of training space. All advanced treatment and rehabilitation is performed under the supervision of four full-time National Athletic Training Association certified personnel. In the cases requiring physical therapy needs, or sub-specialized medical evaluation, outside consultants are utilized.

WEIGHT TRAINING & CONDITIONING FACILITIES

Villanova University offers one main weight training & conditioning facility underneath Villanova Stadium for all Wildcat student-athletes. Recently, the weight room was renovated

to a 5,900 square foot training center with weight training and cardiovascular machines. There are also other weight training and conditioning facilities for the general Villanova University community on the South Campus and the West Campus. The South Campus facility was also renovated in the summer of 1998 to fit the needs of the general student body.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT CENTER

Located within the Jake Nevin Field House is the Villanova Athletic Academic Support Center. Working in conjunction with Dr. Dan Regan, Villanova's Academic Advisor for Athletics, Associate Director of Academic Support Amy Miller administers the daily operations of this full-service facility. In addition to monitoring the academic progress of all Wildcat student-athletes, the center includes work space for student-athletes and computer workstations with word-processing and laserjet printers for use by student-athletes. Also, various computer programs are offered, such as a resumé writing program.

ACADEMIC RESOURCE CENTER

The Villanova Department of Athletics expanded Academic Support's domain into the newly renovated stadium press box. With the addition of a new infrastructure during the summer of 1999, the department's new Academic Resource Center was formed. The benefits of the ARC include:

- Improved efficiency of academic support services to student-athletes.
- Expansion and consolidation of several academic resources, such as freshmen-mentoring and tutoring programs.
- Ability to offer a more personally tailored academic support system to those student-athletes in need.

The ARC includes:

- Private and semi-private tutoring areas.
- Computer equipped study hall housing 20 laptop computers.
- Increased space for freshmen-mentoring.
- Conference area for lectures and study hall.

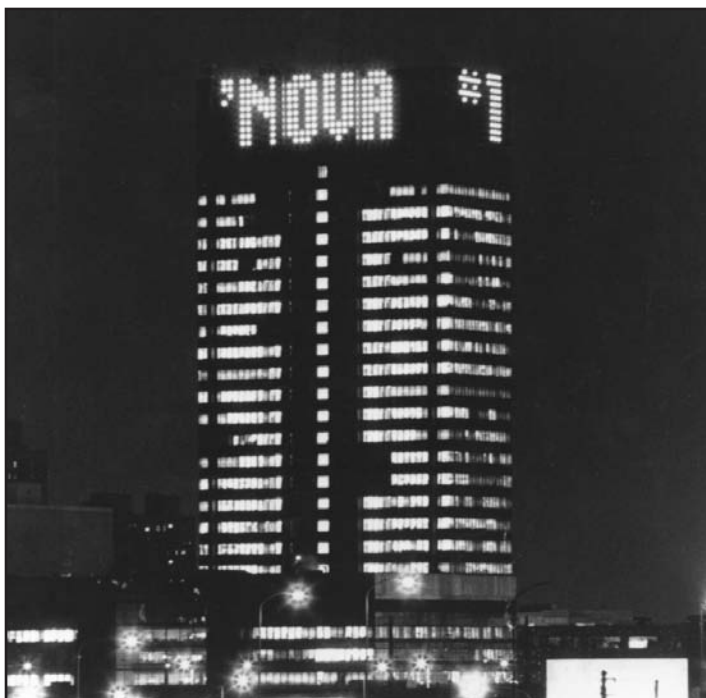
