A victory vs. the Colonials, though, would produce another streak, one that the Seahawks have never previously attained. Winners of four consecutive NEC games, Wagner will be seeking its first NEC five-game winning streak since becoming a charter member of the league in 1996. The Seahawks enter today's play 4-3 overall, 4-1 and in sole possession second place in the NEC. Robert Morris, under veteran head coach and former New York Jet leader Joe Walton, comes in with a 2-5 overall mark, 1-3 in the NEC. The Colonials will be coming in on a high having defeated Central Connecticut 37-31 last week.

THE SERIES

Wagner and Robert Morris have met 18 times and the Colonials hold a 12-6 lead in the all-time series that predates the formation of NEC football. Wagner earned a 38-21 victory in 1994, two years before NEC football came into being.

DOSCHER, WILLIAMS LEAD SEAHAWKS TO ROAD WIN OVER SAINT FRANCIS (PA)

Senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) was an efficient 12-of-17 passing for 163 yards and three touchdowns and rushed for another 33 yards while junior running back Dominique Williams rushed for 93 yards and two touchdowns to lift Wagner to a 31-24 win at Saint Francis (PA). The win came on the heels of victories over Central Connecticut, Bryant and Sacred Heart.

THE LAST TIME THESE TEAMS MET

Nov. 12, 2011 - Running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Bridgeton) ran for a career-high 216 yards on 32 carries and scored four touchdowns to spearhead Wagner to an impressive 38-17 Northeast Conference (NEC) victory over Robert Morris. Williams scored on runs of two, five and 56 yards as the Seahawks built a 24-3 halftime lead. In the final minute of the game, Williams notched his fourth and final touchdown of the game, a one-yard run. For the game, he averaged 6.8 yards per carry.

HAMELINE FIELD AT WAGNER COLLEGE STADIUM

In a stirring pre-game ceremony, the field at Wagner College Stadium was named after Walt Hameline who is in his 32nd year as athletic director/football coach. One of just eight active Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) coach to win 200 games, he also ranks 16th all-time among FCS coaches and 18th among active NCAA coaches. Heading into the Bryant game, Hameline has an overall record of 208-126-2

Thanks largely by the efforts of sophomore Otis Wright (Fort Lauderdale, FL/Dillard), the Seahawks are tops in the nation in kickoff return yardage (28.19) and, obviously, No. 1 in the NEC. Individually, Wright is third nationally in kickoff return yardage at 31.57 yards per return.

ROBERT MORRIS SEEKING SECOND STRAIGHT WIN

Robert Morris erased an eight-point fourth-quarter deficit to pick up its first league win of the season by a 37-21 count over Central Connecticut. The Colonials scored the game's last two touchdowns, a 27-yard pitch-and-catch from Jeff Sinclair to Donte Jeter followed by a two-yard TD plunge by Deontae Howard with 1:50 remaining. Central Connecticut received 377 all-purpose yards from running back Rob Holloman, who logged his first career 200-yard rushing day.

HAMELINE 7-3 IN FOLLOWING BYE WEEKS

Last week's victory over Saint Francis (PA) improved Wagner's record to 7-3 in games following a bye week during the AWalt Hameline era. The only time Wagner had two byes in the same season was during the 1987 team's march to the Division III National Title. The biggest gap between byes is 16 years (between 1989 and 2007). There have been only three times under Hameline when Wagner has had a bye in consecutive weeks (1982-83, 1986-87, 2011, 2012).

DOSCHER CONTINUES ASSAULT ON RECORD BOOK

Against Saint Francis (PA), last week, senior QB Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/Moore Catholic) became just the second Seahawk to enter the 5,000-yard passing club as he has now thrown for 5,153 career yards, second all-time behind Sciarra who amassed a staggering 5,902 passing

yards in just two seasons (2004-05) as a Seahawk. Doscher is also second behind Sciarra (473) in career completions with 386. Already far and away the school-record holder in total offense, Doscher annexed the 7,000-yard plateau vs. the Red Flash, upping his career total to 7,131 yards. In his career, Doscher has accounted for 63 touchdowns, 37 by air and another 26 by ground. In addition, his 1,978 yards rushing ranks him ninth all-time. The three touchdowns tossed by Doscher vs. Saint Francis (PA) moved him closer to third place on the Seahawk all-time list. The Staten Island native entered the game in fourth-place on the Wagner career list with 37 TD passes and is now just one behind Aaron Smith, who tossed 38 TD aerials from 1999-2001. Don Cavalli (1958-61) is the Seahawk all-time leader in TD passes with 46, followed by John Sciarra's 40 (2004-05), Smith's 38 and Doscher's 37.

WILLIAMS KEEPS ON CHUGGIN

With his 93 yards on the ground Williams increased his season total to 672 yards. Williams entered the game fifth in career rushing and increased his total to 2,652 yards, narrowing the gap between himself and fourth-place Kito Lockwood (1992-95), who gained 3,156 yards. By finishing seven yards shy of the century mark vs. Saint Francis, Williams has now rushed for 100 yards or more in 16-of-26 career games. He also saw his 100-yard streak end at three games. For the season, Williams has eclipsed the 100-yard plateau in four out of seven games.

SEVEN-PERSON HALL OF FAME CLASS TO BE RECOGNIZED

At halftime of the Wagner-Robert Morris game, the 2012 Hall of Fame Class, comprised of seven people, will be honored in a halftime ceremony. The new inductees include Lou DeLuca (Class of 1959, Contributor), Greg Kovar (Class of 1989, Football), Quincy Lewis (Class of 1993, Men's Basketball), Rich Robinson (Class of 1989, Football), Steve Slocum (Class of 1985, Football), Mike Venezia (Class of 1990, Baseball) and Patti Winterfeldt Svraka (Class of 1994, Women's Basketball). These seven individuals will be formally introduced at 10:00 am ceremony on Saturday.

ROBB-LIA TROPHY TRADITION TO CONTINUE AT HOMECOMING

A longstanding Wagner Homecoming tradition will continue on Saturday when the Seahawks host NEC rival Robert Morris. Annually at homecoming, two Wagner College football players are selected to receive special awards for outstanding play.

The top offensive player, selected by a Homecoming Panel comprised of former football letterwinners, awards the James Robb Memorial Trophy to the outstanding offensive player and Nick Lia Memorial Trophy to the game's outstanding defensive player.

This year's game is novel in that it features two former Robb Trophy Winners and one former Lia Trophy winner. In 2009, Nick Doscher took home the Robb Trophy and in 2011, Dominique Williams was the Robb winner. Also in 2011, linebacker Mike Lombardo was awarded the Nick Lia Memorial Defensive Trophy.

Established in 1949, the Robb Trophy was named in memory of James Robb, a Seahawk gridiron star who was killed in action during World War II. It was presented to Wagner's outstanding individual player in the annual Homecoming game until 1969. In that season, the Lia Trophy was introduced in honor of another Wagner football player, Nick Lia. The 1965 recipient of the Robb Trophy was killed in the Vietnam War. An outstanding defensive player and team captain, the Staten Island native was a graduate of Curtis High School.

In 2000, Lt. Nick Lia was honored for his athletic achievements by being inducted into the Wagner College Athletics Hall of Fame. Lia helped lead the 1964 football team to an undefeated season and captained the '65 team.

SEAHAWKS AT FIRST-PLACE ALBANY NEXT WEEK

A victory today would set up a showdown at Albany on Saturday, November 3. The Great Danes, perennial NEC kingpins, are a perfect 4-0 in the NEC (6-1 overall) heading into a road matchup vs. Sacred Heart. If both Wagner and Albany win today, then next week's winner will have the inside track at gaining the NEC title and accompanying invitation to the NCAA FCS Championships. It would be a tall order for Wagner as the Seahawks are 1-12 all-time vs. Albany. That lone win did, however, did occur in the state capital when the Seahawks won a 38-30 shoot-out on Sept. 23, 2000.

NEC Offensive Player of the Week

SEAN PATTERSON, DUQUESNE

Sr., QB, 6-2, 211 lbs., Toledo, OH/St. John's Jesuit



Patterson was responsible for all five of Duquesne's touchdowns in a wire-to-wire 35-3 Northeast Conference victory over Sacred Heart. Producing a NEC single-game season high five scores, the veteran quarterback spearheaded an offensive effort that moved the Dukes (3-1) back within one game of first-place Albany (4-0). The 6-foot-2 Patterson became the lone NEC quarterback to record three rushing touchdowns in a game this season, all three of which came on runs of at least 14 yards in length. He also threw a pair of scores to receiver Gianni Carter, his 10th and 11th touchdown passes of the season. The senior signal caller went 10-of-19 passing for 156 yards and netted 52 yards on the ground for 208 yards of total offense. Discounting the three times he was sacked, Patterson logged 76 yards on four rush attempts. A key component of his 19.0 yards per carry average was the 44-yard scoring scamper he accounted for, extending the Dukes' lead to 28-3 late in the third quarter. Patterson opened the game's scoring when his 14-yard run capped an eight-play, 51-yard drive with 12:58 left before halftime.

NEC Defensive Player of the Week

DORIAN BELL, DUQUESNE

Jr., LB, 6-1, 234 lbs., Monroeville, PA/Ohio State



Bell's 14 tackles and 4.0 sacks spearheaded Duquesne's stifling defensive effort against Sacred Heart. The linebacker, who is in his second season with the Dukes after transferring from Ohio State, was a difference maker in the 35-3 victory, logging 5.0 tackles for a loss and limiting the ball carrier to two yards or fewer on four other stops. Leading the way for a Duquesne defense that limited its opponent to 215 yards, Bell single-handedly stunted two Sacred Heart possessions, one with an interception and the other by forcing a fumble. Bell picked off a 1st-down pass on Sacred Heart's opening drive of the game. In the fourth quarter, his sack of Tim Little jarred the ball loose and was recovered by teammate Reggie Eiland at the Pioneers' 46-yard line. Bell paces the Northeast Conference in tackles per game (11.3) and forced fumbles (3).

NEC Special Teams Player of the Week

ROB HOLLOMON, CENTRAL CONNECTICUT

So., RB, 5-7, 170 lbs., Philadelphia, PA/Kent State



Hollomon accounted for the longest kickoff return in the last eight seasons of NEC play on his way to an unbelievable 377 yards of all-purpose running in Central Connecticut's 37-31 setback at Robert Morris. The sophomore running back took a third-quarter kickoff 96 yards for a touchdown. The 96-yard return topped the 95-yard return CCSU's Josue Paul produced in 2009 and was one yard shy of the NEC-record 97-yard returns Sal Davis (Stony Brook) and Shon Brownlee (Stony Brook) had in 2004 and 2002, respectively. Hollomon's endzone sprint came right after Robert Morris extended its lead to 23-14 on a 27-yard touchdown pass with 3:14 remaining in the third quarter. Hollomon returned a total of two kickoffs for 112 yards and also gained a yard on his lone punt return attempt. The Kent State transfer gained 208 yards rushing and 56 receiving.

NEC Rookie of the Week

MARCELIS BRANCH, ROBERT MORRIS

Fr., CB, 5-11, 175 lbs., Homestead, FL/Miami Southridge



Branch produced a number of key defensive plays throughout Robert Morris' NEC victory over Central Connecticut, and the rookie was especially impressive down the stretch. The freshman cornerback recorded three pass break-ups and an interception in helping the Colonials capture their first NEC victory. Branch also logged six tackles, including four solo stops, and returned one punt for 13 yards. The rookie was at his best in the fourth quarter of the 37-31 triumph. With the game tied at 31-31, Branch made a leaping interception at Central's 38-yard line. RMU scored the game-winning touchdown on the ensuing possession with 1:50 to play. Branch made sure Robert Morris held onto that advantage by making two tackles and breaking up a pair of passes on CCSU's final drive.





Somerset, NJ – (Oct. 8) For the second consecutive week, a Wagner football player has been named Northeast Conference (NEC) Offensive Player of the Week, as junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Milford Academy) picks up this week's honor following his 20-carry, 122-yard performance in Saturday's 12-3 win at Sacred Heart, the league office announced today.

Williams' honor comes on the heels of the NEC Offensive Player of the Week award earned by senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) following a 246-yard passing day that carried Wagner to a 31-21 win over Bryant on September 29. Williams continues to imprint his name in the Wagner record book, climbing to fifth place on the all-time Seahawk rushing list with 2,559 rushing



yards.

The highlight of this past Saturday's game for the 5-9, 200-pound Williams came 5:50 into the opening quarter when he burst free up the left sideline en route to an 81-yard touchdown run that gave the Seahawks a lead they would never relinquish.

It marked the longest rush by a Seahawk since Chris Davis ran 85 yards for a touchdown vs. Robert Morris on October 28, 2000. Williams' jaunt was also the longest rush in an NEC game in five years. In fact, it was five years ago to the date that Monmouth's David Sinisi went 99 yards for a score against Sacred Heart on October 6, 2007.

Williams would add another touchdown, this one on a two-yard burst, in the second quarter. The South Jersey product finished the game with 147 total yards from scrimmage, including 25 yards on two receptions.

Aided by his career-long run, Williams produced his third straight 100-yard rushing day and fourth of the season. It also marked the 16th time in his 25-game Seahawk career that Williams has hit the century mark.

Williams' rushing day, combined with the leadership of Doscher and a ferocious effort by the Seahawk defense, carried Wagner to its third straight victory, all of which have been conference wins. The victory over Sacred Heart moved the Seahawks into sole possession of third place in the league standings at 3-1, while evening the Green &

NICK DOSCHER NAMED NEC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK
Somerset, NJ - (Oct. 1) - Senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) was at the center of the effort in Wagner's 31-21 victory over Bryant on Saturday, completing 16-of-26 passes for 246 yards while running for another 68 yards on 17 carries in earning Northeast Conference (NEC) Offensive Player of the Week honors.



The veteran quarterback was responsible for four touchdowns, two via the air and two by ground vs. the Bulldogs in accounting for 314 yards of offense, which is the highest total offense output in an NEC contest thus far this season .

This is the eighth time that Doscher has been recognized with a weekly honor by the NEC. As a freshman in 2009, Doscher was tabbed NEC Rookie of the Week five times and was the league's Offensive Player of the Week once en route to earning NEC Rookie of the Year and First-Team All-NEC accolades. In his sophomore season of 2010, Doscher earned one NEC Offensive Player of the Week citation which also came in a win over Bryant.

The 6-foot-2, 225-pound Staten Islander's four touchdowns accounted for are tied for the highest by an NEC player this season, matching the four touchdowns Albany's Will Fiacchi totaled Danes' Sept. 8 victory over Robert Morris.

Doscher set season highs in all passing categories with his 16-of-26 passing for 246 yards and two touchdowns in the win over Bryant. The 246-yard passing day was the fourth-highest of his career and marked the 10th time in his career that he has thrown 200 yards or more in a game.

With Wagner (2-3, 2-1 NEC) trailing Bryant by a 14-10 margin late in the third quarter, Doscher turned the tide by throwing a pair of scoring strikes within a 2:08 span. His five-yard touchdown toss to sophomore tight end Bryant Watts (Burlington, NJ/ Florence) capped a six-play, 50-yard drive and gave the Seahawks the lead with 2:36 left in the third quarter. Following a quick three-and-out series for Bryant, Doscher struck again by delivering a 70-yard scoring strike to sophomore wide receiver Anthony Carrington (Toms River, NJ/ Toms River) that increased Wagner's advantage to 24-14.

The former Kansas City Royals' minor league catcher turned college quarterback put the Green & White on the scoreboard by plunging in for a one-yard touchdown early in the second quarter 4:44 after Bryant opened the game's scoring. His 19-yard fourth quarter scoring scamper, which came on a 2-and-9 play, put the finishing touches on the win, extending the Seahawk lead to 31-21 with 1:29 left in regulation.

Wright was tabbed as the NCAA.com FCS Special Teams Player of the Week, the NEC Special Teams Player of the Week and is one of four Kickoff Returner Performers of the Week named by the CFPA, along with Fabian Truss of Samford, Dartmouth's Miles Gay and Justin Grant from Richmond.

Wright sparked Wagner on several occasions during what was a career day for the sophomore, totaling 189 yards on five kick returns. In addition to the 89-yarder, which came on the first play of the fourth quarter, Wright nearly broke free on several other kickoff returns, as he ripped of a 37-yarder as well as another that went for 25 yards.

Wright's 89-yard kickoff return was the longest by a Seahawk since November 21, 2009 when Frantz Placide also had an 89-yarder for a touchdown in the season finale vs. Albany. The touchdown return was also the longest in NEC play since Central Connecticut's Josue Paul returned one 90 yards against Wagner on Oct. 30, 2010.

WILLIAMS MAKES NEC TOP PERFORMER OF WEEK LIST VS. CCSU

Week of September 22 – at Central Connecticut Junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Milford Academy) rushed for 121 yards and two touchdowns to lead Wagner to a convincing 31-13 road victory over Central Connecticut. After being held under 100 yards rushing in consecutive games, Williams eclipsed the 100-yard mark for the 14th time in his 23-game career.

SENIOR FREE SAFETY PATRICK O'CONNOR NAMED NEC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Somerset, NJ – (Sept. 3) Wagner College senior free safety Patrick O'Connor (Leominster, MA/ Leominster) spearheaded a defensive effort that held FBS member Florida Atlantic (FAU) scoreless for three quarters and nearly carried Wagner to a road upset of the Owls and, as result, was named the NEC Defensive Player of the Week it was announced by the league office.

In his first game since being named a team captain on August 25, the 6-1, 190-pound O'Connor registered a game-high 10 tackles (five solo, five assisted) in the Seahawks' 7-3 setback on Friday night in Boca Raton. In helping to lead a Seahawk defense that allowed just 327 yards of total offense, O'Connor, made four tackles that limited the opponent to a three-yard gain or less and also came up with a key fumble recovery.

With Wagner holding a 3-0 lead and FAU facing a 3rd-and-2 from the Seahawks' 9-yard line on its first possession of the fourth quarter, the junior safety pounced on a ball that was jarred loose by senior linebacker C.O. Prime (Laval, Quebec/ Montreal, Canada).

The 10 tackles matched a career high for O'Connor, who also had a 10-tackle effort at Bryant on September 29, 2011.

Senior linebacker C.O. Prime earned a spot on the NEC Honor Roll following his six-tackle game at FAU while forcing a big fumble when the Owls were inside the Seahawk 10-yard line.

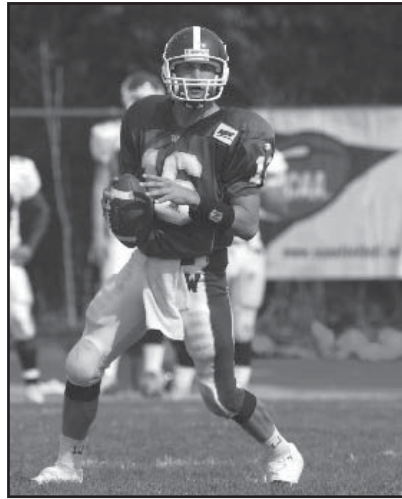

The 29-yard fourth quarter run by junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Bridgeton/ Milford Academy) during the Sept. 29 31-21 win over Bryant, which was highlighted by his hurdling over a defender, made ESPN's College Football Plays of the Weekend, checking in at No. 10. Wagner was leading 24-21 late in the fourth quarter and had the ball near midfield when Williams delivered an extraordinary run that will keep Seahawk fans buzzing for quite some time. The play was highlighted by the explosive 5-9, 200-pound Williams leaping over a Bryant defender, before steam-rolling another would-be tackler. The highlight reel run gave the Green & White a first down at the Bryant 20. Two plays later, Doscher scampered his way for a 19-yard touchdown to put the Seahawks up 31-21 with less 90 seconds to play

UCONN TRANSFER HAS COMING OUT PARTY VS. BRYANT

Senior defensive end Jerome Williams (Burlington, NJ/ Holy Cross) wreaked havoc in the Bryant backfield all game long. For the UConn transfer and first-year Seahawk, it was the best game of his five-game Wagner career. With Wagner clinging to a 24-21 lead and Bryant facing a third-and-two at the Bulldog 47, the 6-2, 255-pound Coleman burst through for an 11-yard sack on third-and-two from the Bryant 47. Williams made his presence felt throughout the contest, finishing with six tackles, three tackles for loss (minus 24 yards) and two sacks (minus 20 yards), all of which were career highs.

LANDMARK 70-YARD TD FROM DOSCHER TO CARRINGTON

With Wagner leading 17-14 late in the third quarter, QB Nick Doscher then stepped up in the pocker and found sophomore Anthony Carrington (Toms River, NJ/ Toms River South) all alone at the Bulldog 30 and the smooth-gliding wide receiver did the rest with his legs as the play went for a 70-yard touchdown. The Doscher to Carrington hook-up gave Wagner 14 points in a span of 2:30 and, more importantly, a 24-14 lead at the 1:03 mark of the third quarter. For Carrington, the 70-yard reception was a career long and it was also the first touchdown of his career.

CORNERBACK DIEUDONNE WITH GAME-CHANGING INT

Midway through the third quarter, after a Wagner three and out and ensuing punt, Bryant took over at its own 43. The Bulldogs moved the ball to the Seahawk 49 and appeared bent, at this point, on taking the game over. Seahawk sophomore cornerback Jarrett Dieudonne (Fort Lauderdale, FL/ Dillard/ Purdue), however, had other ideas. The 6-1, 195-pound Dieudonne turned in a game-changing play, picking off a Westerhaus second-and-13 pass at the Wagner 34 and returning it 16 yards to midfield. Dieudonne's first pick of the season third of his career,

led to a six-play, 50-yard drive capped by a five-yard TD toss from Doscher to sophomore TE Bryant Watts (Burlington Township, NJ/ Florence).

NNICK DOSCHER NOTES

*Doscher set season highs in all passing categories when he completed 16-of-26 passes for 246 yards and two touchdowns in the 31-21 win over Bryant. The 246-yard passing day vs. Bryant marked the 10th time the 6-1, 230-pound Doscher threw for 200 yards or more in a game. It was also the fourth-highest passing game of his career.

With Wagner trailing 14-10 in the third quarter and facing a third-and-nine from the Bryant 49. QB Nick Doscher hit sophomore tight end Bryant Watts the middle for a key 30-yard gain down to the Bulldog 19. Three plays later, Doscher found Watts in the left corner of the end zone for a 17-14 Wagner lead with 2:36 to go in the quarter. The score marked the fourth lead change of the game and gave the Seahawks the lead for good. For Watts, it was his second touchdown of his career as he also caught a five-yard score at Georgetown (9/8).

DAVID LOPEZ GOES PLUS-50....AGAIN

With Wagner leading by a scant 7-6 margin late in the first half at Central Connecticut (9/22), senior QB Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) executed the 2:00 drill to perfection, negotiating the Seahawks to the Blue Devil 34-yard line. Wagner whittled the clock down to three seconds before calling time out and brought on senior kicker David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage). The Devils then called a timeout themselves to try and ice the 2010 second-team All-NEC selection. Undeterred, Lopez calmly drilled the 51-yard field goal to give the Seahawks momentum and a 10-6 lead heading into halftime. When Wagner scored a touchdown early in the third quarter, the Seahawks went on top 17-6 and never looked back. For Lopez, it was the second-longest field goal of his career, bettered only by a 54-yard effort in a wild double-overtime win at Georgetown on October 9, 2010.

"I told myself when I came to Wagner that I really wanted to make an impact in the community. I had no idea that I'd be recognized in this way, so I was a bit shocked."

Most recently, Ciucci was among a group of student-athletes who represented the college at a July 10 news conference to announce a partnership between the Wagner Athletic Department, ShopRite and the Staten Island Advance announcing a community-minded effort that featured the declaration of an ambitious goal of donating 25 tons of food to Project Hospitality, an organization that feeds thousands in the Port Richmond area.

Ciucci, who was named to the 2012 All-NEC Preseason Team, has been a mainstay on the Seahawk offensive line since transferring from Temple in 2009. The 6-4, 290-pound Ciucci, a business administration major who graduated with a 3.45 GPA, was a member of the NEC Fall Academic Honor Roll in 2010 and 2011 and has started 25 of the 33 games in which he has played at Wagner, 15-straight.

Julian Stanford Makes Jacksonville Jaguars' 53-Man Roster, Sees Action in First Three Games



Jacksonville, FL - Rookie linebacker Julian Stanford was profiled by Jacksonville Jaguars senior writer John Oehser in an article entitled, "Truly Blessed."

Oehser examines Stanford's rapid rise from undrafted free agent to his current role of special teams standout and integral member of the Jaguars' linebacking corp.

Stanford is the first Seahawk to see action in an NFL regular season game since December 19, 1971, when Wagner Hall of Famer Rich Kotite saw action in the final game of his career while playing for the Giants.

On August 31, the very same night that his former teammate, Julian Stanford, was earning a spot on an NFL roster, some 225 miles to the south, 2010 Wagner graduate stepped onto a different stage when he spoke at the Republican National Convention.

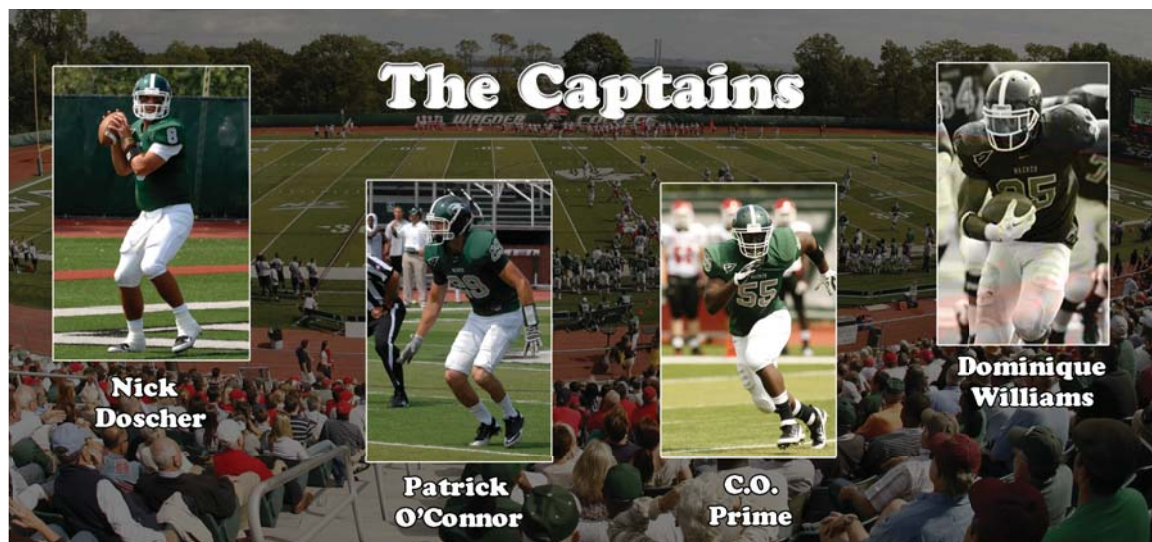
A dynamic All-NEC performer for the Seahawks from 2007-2010, Placide, who majored in sociology, spoke in support of former Florida Governor Jeb Bush's school choice program that allowed him to attend Archbishop Curley Notre Dame High School in Miami where he was a standout scholastically as well as athletically.

"I first met the governor in my sophomore year of high school when he visited with a select number of students at our school," said Placide. "He recently reached out to asking if I would speak at the Republican National Convention as someone who has been a success story through his school choice program, he continued. "It was quite an honor and a thrill to be asked to take part with something of this magnitude."

During his Wagner football career, Placide was one of the top special team players in Seahawk history in addition to being a stellar defensive back. In 2010, following his senior season, he earned First-Team All-NEC return specialist accolades for the second-straight year, while also adding a Second Team accolade as a defensive back. The Miami native blocked two kicks that season.

On August 25, Wagner College Head Football Coach Walt Hameline named four captains for the 2012 season.

The four Seahawks who were elected by their peers to lead this year's team are senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic), senior defensive back Patrick O'Connor (Leominster, MA/ Leominster), senior linebacker C.O. Prime (Laval, Quebec/ The Kent School-CT) and redshirt junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgton, NJ/ Milford Academy).



For Doscher and Williams, it marks the second consecutive season that they will serve as team captains.

Doscher took the Northeast Conference (NEC) by storm as a true freshman in 2009, earning NEC Rookie of the Year and First-Team All-Conference honors. That season, he passed for 1,330 yards while rushing for another 769 yards and was a five-time NEC Rookie of the Week winner. The 6-2, 220-pound Doscher played four years as a catcher in the Kansas City Royals' farm system before trading in his catching mask for a facemask. The 25-year old enters the 2012 season having already secured the No. 1 spot in Wagner history with 6,037 yards of total offense. He's also third all-time in completions (324), and touchdown passes (31). His 16 TD passes in 2010 are tied for fifth on the Wagner single-season list.

O'Connor is a heady defensive back and a sure tackler whose game is marked by its consistency. He enters the 2012 season with 62 career tackles to his credit. During his sophomore campaign in 2011, the 6-1, 190-pound O'Connor saw action in 10 games while starting nine at safety, in helping to lead a Wagner defense that ranked No. 1 in the NEC in rushing defense (141.1 yards per game), red zone defense (71.8%) and in takeaways (29). He finished the year with 55 tackles, 2.5 tackles for loss, and two fumble recoveries. He recorded a career-high 10 tackles (seven solo, three assisted) at Bryant (9/24) and in the Seahawks' 38-28 season-opening win over Saint Francis (PA) (9/3), O'Connor collected eight tackles, including one for a three-yard loss, and had one fumble recovery.

Prime is one of the top returning defensive talents in the NEC who finished the 2011 campaign second on the team and 10th in the NEC with 81 tackles for the Seahawks' high-ranking defense. He also recorded 1.5 tackles for loss, three forced fumbles, three pass-breakups, one interception, and one fumble recovery with his four forced fumbles tied for tops in the NEC. In the week one victory over Saint Francis (PA) (9/3), the 6-1, 255-pound Prime recorded seven tackles, one forced fumble, and returned an interception 37 yards for his first career touchdown, leading to the 38-28 Seahawk victory. For his efforts vs. the Red Flash, he was named the NEC Defensive Player of the Week (9/5). Prime has ascended in tackles each year as a Seahawk with 48 in 2009, 71 in 2010 and 81 in 2011, giving him 200 career tackles, which is No.1 among all active Seahawks.

Williams has developed into one of the household names in the NEC as well as on the national stage and enters the 2012 season in eighth place on the Wagner all-time rushing list with 1,982 career yards. In 2011, he gained a team-leading 1,338 yards on 274 rushing attempts (4.9 yards per carry attempt) while finding the end zone 14 times on the ground last season. The 1,338 yards rushing rank sixth on the school's all-time single-season rushing list while his 90 points scored on 15 touchdowns (14 rushing, one receiving) tied for sixth on the Seahawk all-time single-season scoring list. The 5-9, 200-pound Williams averaged 121.6 yards rushing per game which ranked fourth in the NEC and 11th nationally. For the season, Williams ran for 100 or more yards in eight of Wagner's 11 games, highlighted by a career-high 216 yards on 32 carries and four touchdowns in the 38-17 win at Robert Morris (11/12).

Head Coach Walt Hameline

Entering his 32nd year as Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach at Wagner College, the relentlessly energetic and optimistic Walt Hameline continues to amass an astounding record of achievement and consistency.

On Nov. 6, 2010, Hameline became just the eighth active Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) coach to win 200 games with a 31-20 victory over Monmouth and ranks 66th (tied) on the all-time NCAA wins list (any level). He is one of just 36 coaches to win 200 games at one school and enters the 2012 season with an overall record of 204-123-2 (.622) over his 31-year head coaching career at Wagner.

In April 2012, Hameline was the recipient of the 2012 Distinguished Service Award from the Metropolitan Basketball Writers Association (MBWA). Distinguished Service Awards are presented by the MBWA to individuals who have made significant contributions to college basketball.

"I have had the privilege of knowing Walt since I came to Wagner a decade and a half ago, and he has always been, in my opinion, one of the very best representatives of our college community, and one of the finest men I've had the pleasure to know," said Richard Guarasci, president of Wagner College. "He has my congratulations and the best wishes of all of us here at Wagner. This award is richly deserved."

Hameline has enjoyed a long and proud association with metropolitan area basketball and the NIT. For more than two decades, he was one of five metro area athletic directors, along with his peers at NYU, Fordham, Manhattan and St. John's, who helped comprise the Metropolitan Intercollegiate Basketball Association (MIBA). Along with NIT Executive Director Jack Powers and the sitting ECAC Commissioner. MIBA, of which Hameline was a past president, selected teams for both pre-season and post-season NIT's while directing other functions such as the annual NIT All-Star Summer Tour.

At the April Met Writers Award Dinner, Hameline had the honor of being introduced by esteemed sportswriter Jim O'Connell, who has been the national college basketball writer for The Associated Press since 1987.

"The dean of area athletic directors, Walt is an emotional man to say the least," said O'Connell. "He's one of those people who always seemed to be going somewhere in a hurry but he was headed there with a smile on his face. Accept when he puts on the eye black and becomes a football coach," O'Connell quipped.

While his coaching success is immense, Hameline has been equally effective as an administrator. Under Hameline's leadership, the Seahawk athletic department has undergone an ambitious expansion in both sport offerings and facility improvements. Hameline was influential in establishing the Seahawk Golf Classic, and the Seahawk Club, a pair of initiatives aimed at increasing funds for the scholarship endowment and complete financial support for the athletic department.

Most recently, under Hameline's leadership and thanks to the generosity of one of his former offensive lineman, Marc Lebovitz, Wagner College Stadium was the beneficiary of a striking state-of-the-art video scoreboard in 2010. Lebovitz, a member of the Seahawks' 1987 Division III National Championship football team and a 1991 Wagner graduate, is now a highly-successful New Jersey businessman. The scoreboard represents a major facility upgrade for the Seahawk football program, while also benefiting the women's soccer, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, and men's and women's track and field programs who share Wagner College Stadium.

In 2009, the athletic department formally dedicated the modern, fully-functional, 3,076 square foot Dr. Gregory P. Knapp '66 H'00 Strength Room in the Spiro Sports Center. The realization of this significant undertaking was performed thanks to the generosity of many people, chief among them Dr. Thomas G. Moles '65 H'00, a lifetime member of the Wagner College Board of Trustees and former Seahawk football player who made a major gift towards the project in the name of his good friend, the late Gregory Knapp '66 H'00. Knapp, who passed away in July 2009, was also a lifetime member of the Wagner College Board of Trustees and a former Seahawk football letterwinner.

In 2006, the Wagner College Stadium field was resurfaced with a state-of-the-art Field Turf playing surface, a multi-purpose surface that is used for football, women's soccer and lacrosse. In the spring of 2002, Wagner introduced women's water polo to its slate and the Seahawks now feature 20 sport offerings.

In 1997 Hameline governed the opening of Wagner's football stadium and outdoor track & field facility and was instrumental in erecting the Spiro Sports Center in the spring of 1999 - a 93,000 square-foot building which houses a 2,100-seat, multi-purpose arena, a six-lane swimming pool, team locker rooms and all athletic department offices. In 1995, Hameline oversaw the opening of new athletic facility at the base of Grymes Hill. The facility is presently home to the Seahawk softball team, and underwent a vast reconstruction in 2007.

Hameline's overall coaching ledger includes five ECAC Championships, three NCAA Tournament appearances and the 1987 NCAA Division III National Championship — all told, 10 post-season appearances in 29 seasons. Hameline won his 175th career game - all at Wagner with a come-from-behind victory over St. Francis (PA) in the 2005 season finale. He became the winningest coach in Wagner College history in 1990.

The highlight, of course, is the 19-3 win over heavily-favored Dayton in the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl for the 1987 NCAA Division III National Championship. Against one of the toughest

schedules in the nation, Hameline's Seahawks rolled to a 13-1 record, winning more games than any college football team in America. The team earned the school's second Lambert Trophy, symbolic of football superiority in the East among Division III schools, and ECAC Team of the Year recognition. Following the season, in addition to Sports Illustrated writing a feature story, a host of national and regional organizations recognized Hameline, highlighted by his being named the Chevrolet National Coach of the Year.

An active member of the American Football Coaches Association, under Hameline's stewardship, 94 players have earned All-Northeast Conference (NEC) honors, 47 first-team selections and another 47 named to the second team. In addition, five Seahawks have earned NEC individual honors: 2009 - QB Nick Doscher, NEC Offensive Rookie of the Year; 2007- RB Jason Butler, NEC Offensive Player of the Year; 1999 - Rick Sarille, NEC Offensive Player of the Year; 1999 - Mike Steed, NEC Defensive Rookie of the Year; 1997 - LB Daryn Plummer, NEC Defensive Rookie of the Year

The 60-year old administrator has been a key developer of the NEC, serving on numerous committees, and is a past president of the league. Nine years ago, Hameline was honored for his playing, coaching and administrative achievements when he was inducted into the Utica Sports Hall of Fame. In addition, Hameline was given the All-America Football Foundation Johnny Vaught Lifetime Achievement Award in 1998.

An outstanding defensive back at Brockport State, Hameline received his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education in 1975, and went on to earn his Master's Degree in education from the University of Albany in 1977.

Hameline resides in Colts Neck, NJ, with his wife, Debi, and they are the proud parents of daughters Kristen and Kelly.

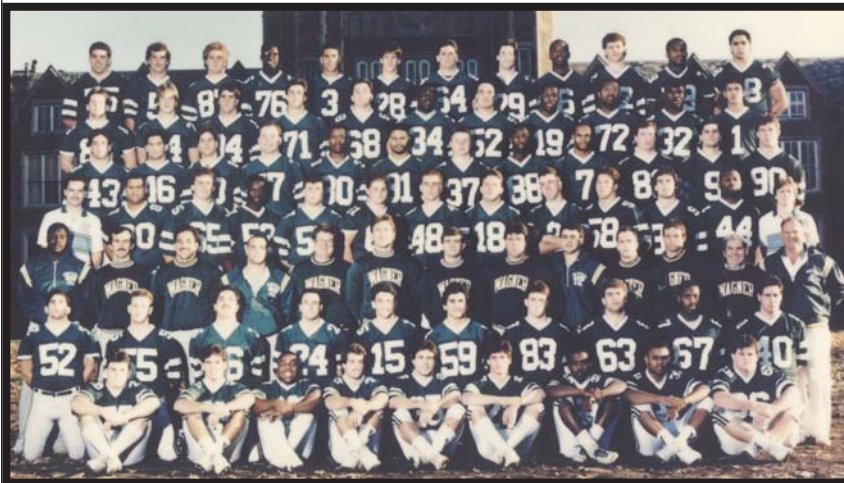

1987- "The Unforgettable Season"

On September 15, 2012, the 1987 Seahawks were honored on the 25th anniversary of their Division III National Championship in a ceremony on a field that had been dedicated just minutes before as **Hameline Field** at Wagner College Stadium

It's a story that's been told many times. It's the story of a tiny college in New York City that defied the odds... and won it all. It's the story of the 1987 Wagner College Seahawks football team.

A group of tough, yet wide-eyed young men, guided by an energetic, enthusiastic, and driven seventh-year head coach. A 36-year old man named Walt Hameline who, a quarter century later, still plies his same trade; nurturing, prodding, molding, disciplining and, above all, leading young men,

The greatest day in the long and illustrious gridiron history of Wagner College came on a sunny December 12, 1987 in Phenix, Alabama, as the Seahawks captured the 1987 NCAA Division III National Championship with 19-3 victory over the University of Dayton in the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl.

Winners of seven straight and 12 of 13 heading into

the championship, Wagner rose to the challenge, jumping out to a 19-0 first-half lead. The Green & White never looked back in cruising to the College's first and only national championship in any sport.

Quarterback Greg Kovar got Wagner on the board early, finding split end John Chaney in the end zone from 22 yards out with just under two minutes left in the opening quarter. Fullback Tom Pugh put the Seahawks up 13-0, bulldozing in from one yard out. Wide receiver Keith Johnson capped the Seahawk scoring 20 seconds before intermission, hauling in a 22-yard Kovar spiral for the 19-0 halftime lead.

With Kovar on his way to a 301-yard day, the defense took over from there, holding Dayton to just 234 yards of total offense and 2.9 yards per play. Defensive end George Gaspar led the way with 16 tackles and a sack while linebackers Artie DiMella and Chris West made 13 stops each.

Following the season, their story grew as six players were named All-American, including three first-teamers. Their story was even splashed across a two-page spread in *Sports Illustrated*. Over these last 25 years, the Seahawks' achievement has been well-told.

It will be told again and again.

WAGNER DROPS OPENER TO FBS MEMBER FAU 7-3

BOCA RATON, FL August 31, 2012) – Wagner delivered a staunch defensive effort and redshirt junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Bridgeton) ran for 117 yards but it was not enough as Florida Atlantic escaped with a 7-3 victory in the 2012 season opener for both teams in a game that was streamed live on ESPN 3.

Wagner, which led 3-0 after three quarters before the Owls struck for an early fourth-quarter score, was playing its first-ever FBS opponent.

After missing wide right on a earlier 43-yard field goal try, senior kicker David Lopez (Plantation, FL / American Heritage) gave the Seahawks a 3-0 lead by converting on a 39-yard field goal with 11:13 remaining in the opening half. The field

goal capped a crisp five-play, 60-yard drive, the Seahawks' longest of the evening, a 6:52 march that spanned the first and second quarters.

The drive was helped by a 15-yard unsportsmanlike penalty on the Owls and was keyed by a gutsy 16-yard strike from senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) to sophomore wide receiver Anthony Carrington (Toms River, NJ/ Toms River North) on a fourth-and-two from the FAU 35-yard line which gave the Green & White a first down at the Owls'10-yard line. However, Doscher was sacked for a one-yard loss on second and 7, which was followed by a four-yard run by Williams on third-and-eight. Facing fourth-and-four at the Owl 13, Lopez was then called on and he came through.

The teams then traded punts but Wagner received a golden break on theirs when the highly-lofted boot from redshirt sophomore punter A.J. Firestone (Mecersburg, PA/ Mercersburg, Academy) was inadvertently touched by Owl return man Travis Jones, who was trying to get out of the way of the ball. Seahawk redshirt freshman defensive back Adebwale Godwin (Staten Island, NY/ Curtis) recovered the muffed punt, giving Wagner a first-and-goal at the FAU six-yard line with 4:44 left in the opening half.

A hurried Doscher threw an incomplete pass on first down before being thrown for a one-yard loss on second down. On third-and-goal from the seven, the Owls turned in one of the biggest plays of the game as D'Juan Smith came up with an interception in the deep right corner of the end zone before being tackled for a touchback. The way the Seahawk defense was playing, a 10-0 lead would have put FAU in a huge hole and, even if Wagner had to settle for a field goal, a 6-0 advantage would have provided the Seahawks with a little more cushion and a lot of momentum heading into halftime.

In the second half, Florida Atlantic turned the quarterbacking reigns over to Graham Wilbert, the starter in 2011, in place of Stephen Curtis who the Seahawk defense limited to 4-of-10 passing for 37 yards in the first half. With Wilbert at the controls, the Owls picked up the pace offensively as he completed passes of 14 and nine yards, respectively to lead FAU to the Wagner 22 before the drive stalled on a third-and-10 incompletion. Wagner did make FAU work for its yardage as it took the Owls 12 plays and 5:37 to move the ball 42 yards. The drive resulted in a missed field goal.

At the outset of the fourth quarter, Owl running back Maseo Jackson shook loose on a 28-yard scamper to the Seahawk 43. On the next play, Graham found Byron



Hankerson over the middle for 28 yards down to the 17-yard line. Following a three-yard keeper from Graham, Mason darted through the middle of the line for five yards where, at the nine-yard line, senior LB C.O.Prime (Laval, Quebec/ Montreal) delivered a crunching blow, jarring the ball loose with junior safety Patrick O'Conner# (Leominster, MA/ Leominster) recovered the ball at the nine. FAU had marched 74 yards in nine plays, a quick-strike drive that took just 3:08.

While the drive did not turn directly into points, it helped keep FAU in control of the field position battle as the Owl defense forced Wagner into a three-and-out. Following a Firestone 39-yard punt, FAU took over at the Green & White 39. On the very first play from scrimmage, Graham connected with Hankerson on a 39-yard touchdown delivery to put FAU in front for good at 7-3.

Sophomore running back Otis Wright (Fort Lauderdale, NY/ Dillard) was one of 18 Seahawks who made a return to their native state of Florida when Wagner faced FAU. Firestone had a solid evening, averaging 41.6 yards on five punts, including the career-long 51-yarder.

Defensively, O'Connor registered 10 tackles while senior defensive back Matthew McGuinness (West Caldwell, NJ/ Caldwell), senior linebacker Mike Lombardo (Jupiter, FL/ Jupiter Christian/ Arkansas St.), and senior linebacker Theodore Clohessy (Staten Island, NY/ St. Joseph by the Sea) had seven tackles apiece.

Wagner head coach Walt Hameline was coaching his 331st career game while on the opposite sideline, Carl Pelini was making his head coaching debut.

"The kids gave it everything they had. I was really proud of them from a physical standpoint. We lined up and were physical with this team and played to the last down. But we're not into moral victories. Obviously we played very hard and our guys can look each other in the eyes, but it's really disappointing when you have a chance to beat a team and you don't take advantage of it. They have pretty good players and sooner or later they're going to make some plays. To give up seven points to a Sun Belt (Conference) team in the season opener, I'm proud as Dickens of our team. We didn't win the football game, but we didn't lose the physical battle, I can tell you that." - Walt Hameline

WAGNER DROPS TOUGH 13-10 DECISION AT GEORGETOWN WASHINGTON, DC (SEPT. 8, 2012) – Georgetown junior kicker Matt MacZura booted a 35-yard field goal with 1:42 left to play which lifted the Hoyas to a defensive-minded 13-10 decision over Wagner at steamy, hot and humid Multi-Purpose Field.

er, MA/ Leominster) led the hard-hitting Seahawk defense with a career-high 13 tackles while senior inside linebacker C.O. Prime (Laval, Quebec/ Montreal) finished with 10 stops.

Coming up with seven tackles apiece was a trio of seniors in cornerback Matthew McGuinness (West Caldwell, NJ/ Caldwell), strong safety Sidiq Soulemana (Bronx, NY/ Hudson Valley CC) and inside linebacker Mike Lombardo (Jupiter, FL/ Jupiter Christian/ Arkansas St.).

Senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) went 10-of-16 passing for 124 yards, after going a perfect 6-for-6 in the first half for 66 yards. Redshirt junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Milford Academy)



was held to less than 100 yards rushing for just the eighth time in his 22-game career, finishing with 66 yards on 22 carries. Fifth-year senior wide receiver David Crawford (Carrollton, TX/ Hebron) led the way for Wagner in the receiving department with six catches for 72 yards.

At the game's outset, Wagner won the coin toss and elected to defer to the second half. After forcing the Hoyas to punt, the Seahawks promptly put together a well-executed 11-play, 66-yard march. The crisp drive culminated in a 12-yard touchdown pass from Doscher to redshirt sophomore tight end Bryant Watts (Burlington, NJ/ Florence) on a third-and-10, to put Wagner on top 7-0 with 5:29 left in the opening quarter.

Doscher also began the drive with a 12-yard gain, this one being a rush as he rolled to his right before tucking the ball under. On second-and-three from the Hoya 47, Doscher picked up the first down on a twisting seven-yard run up the middle. The Seahawks then put the ball into the hands of Williams four straight times which brought about a first-and-10 at the Hoya 12.

After two Doscher runs netted zero yards, the savvy veteran rolled to his right and found his big tight end Watts at the three-yard line and the 6-5, 260-pounder dove into the end zone from there.

For Watts, it was the first touchdown reception of his career and for Doscher it was his 32nd career touchdown pass. Doscher is fourth on the all-time Seahawk list as he trails Aaron Smith (1999-2001) who is in third place with 38 career TD passes.

The Hoyas returned the kickoff to their own 24 before embarking on a 19-play, 72 yard drive that resulted in a 21-yard field goal by Matt MacZura. It appeared Georgetown was bent on tying the game after a two-yard by running back Nick Campanella gave the Hoyas a first-and-goal at the Seahawk three. O'Connor stuffed quarterback Aaron Aiken on first down for a one-yard gain. On second-and-goal, Campanella was stonewalled for a two-yard loss by the combination of junior defensive end Davon Johnson (Baltimore, MD/ ASA College) and redshirt freshman linebacker Tim Bristol (Baltimore, MD/ Hereford).

Facing third-and-goal from the Seahawk five, a hurried Aiken threw incomplete which brought on the kicker MacZura who drilled the 21-yarder with nine seconds left in the first quarter to make it 7-3.

Early in the second quarter, Georgetown defensive back Richard Shankle stripped the ball from Crawford recovered it at the Seahawk 43. Aiken hit wide receiver Max Walzenegger for 21 yards to the Wagner 22 on first down. On the next play, Wagner thought it had itself a chance to take a 14-3 lead.

Hoya running back Wilbur Logan gained seven yards to the 15 where he was crunched by senior McGuinness and O'Connor. The ball was jarred loose and then

scooped up by redshirt sophomore cornerback Jarrett Dieudonne (Fort Lauderdale, FL/ Dillard), who appeared to have open field ahead for a potential touchdown. But the runner was ruled down and Georgetown maintained possession at the Seahawk 15.

After the Hoyas worked the ball down to a first-and-goal situation at the one, for the second time in the game, the Green & White came up with a big goal-line stand. After three rushes netted minus three yards, Georgetown elected to go for it on fourth-and-goal from the four but Aiken fumbled as the jubilant Seahawks defense raced off the field.

The Seahawks maintained their 7-3 through halftime and well into the third quarter before the game turned on a key sequence. Facing fourth-and-four at the Wagner 48 with inside of five minutes remaining in the third, Georgetown was forced to punt. MacZura, who doubles as Wagner's punter, lofted a high-arching punt which was batted out of bounds by Dustin Wharton at the three-yard line.

Backed up near its own goal line, Wagner went three-and-out as Doscher's third-and-seven pass sailed incomplete. Georgetown's Kevin Macari then fielded a 41-yard punt by redshirt sophomore A.J. Firestone (Mercersburg, PA/ Mercersburg/ Penn St.) at the Wagner 45, angled to his right before picking up a few blocks in weaving his way to the Seahawk 12-yard line.

After Aiken misfired on first down, he dropped backed to pass on second down before taking off on a 12-yard touchdown scamper with 2:26 to play in the third quarter, giving Georgetown a 10-7 lead.

Wagner answered with a nine-play, 42-yard field goal drive highlighted by a gorgeous 19-yard third-quarter catch by Crawford as the outstretched 6-4, 215-pounder made a leaping grab of a well-placed Doscher pass along the left sideline. On third-and-two from the Hoya 27, Williams was stopped for no gain and Wagner turned to senior kicker David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage), who drilled a 44-yard field goal with 5:19 remaining in the game to knot the score at 10-10.

Georgetown then moved the ball to its own 47 before the Wagner defense again bowed its neck, forcing the Hoyas to punt on fourth-and-four with 3:44 to go. But a key personal foul penalty on the Seahawks extended the drive, giving the Hoyas a first down at the Wagner 38 with 3:44 left. From there, the Hoyas worked the ball to the 19, setting up MacZura's 35-yarder that put Georgetown on top 13-10.

MONMOUTH OUTSCORES WAGNER 38-17

STATEN ISLAND, NY (SEPT. 15, 2012) – Monmouth senior quarterback Kyle Frazier completed 22-of-28 passes for 138 yards and two touchdowns while running for another score and running back Julian Hayes ran for 103 yards on 20 carries to lead Monmouth to a 38-17 win in the Northeast Conference opener for both teams at newly-named Hameline Field at Wagner College Stadium.

In a stirring pre-game ceremony, the field at Wagner College Stadium was named after Walt Hameline who is in his 32nd year as athletic director/football coach. One of just eight active Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) coach to win 200 games, he also ranks 16th all-time among FCS coaches and 18th among active NCAA coaches. Hameline has an overall record of 204-125-2



Prior to kickoff of the Wagner-Monmouth game, the field at Wagner College Stadium was named Hameline Field in honor of long-time AD/Head Football Coach Walt Hameline.

Monmouth took an early 7-0 lead when Frazier run pulled the ball down and out-raced all of the Green-clad shirts down the left sideline for a 16-yard touchdown with 5:03 left in the opening quarter to cap an eight-play, 62 yard drive.

The Seahawks answered on their ensuing drive with a 29-yard field goal by senior David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage). Sophomore running back Otis Wright (Fort Lauderdale, FL/ Dillard) gave Wagner excellent starting field position with a 25-yard return up the middle to the Seahawk 41 yard line.

The Hawks countered with a quick-strike five-play, 64-yard drive as Frazier hit WR Tristan Roberts on a 19-yard touchdown pass with nine seconds remaining in the opening quarter to open a 14-3 cushion. After the Monmouth defense forced Wagner into a three-and-out, Monmouth went on the march again, putting together a six-play 41-yard drive with running back K.B. Asante plowing in from three yards out as the Hawks built a commanding 21-3 lead with 10:31 to go in the half.

The Seahawks then demonstrated their best offensive efficiency of the day in a five-play, 57 yard drive as junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton Academy/ Milford Academy) scampered around left end for a nine-yard score to make it a 21-10 game with 2:04 to go before halftime. The key play in the drive was a 25-yard bullet delivered by senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) to sophomore wide receiver Anthony Carrington (Toms River, NJ/ Toms River North) on 2nd and-8 from the Wagner 45 which gave the Seahawks a first down at the Monmouth 30.

After an exchange of punts, Wagner took over at its own 31 but two incompletions, a holding penalty followed by a sack made it fourth-and-28. Monmouth took over at its own 45 following a 42-yard boot by redshirt

sophomore A.J. Firestone (Mercersburg Academy/ Mercersburg). A Wagner personal foul penalty on first down got things going for the Hawks who needed just 41 seconds to find paydirt as Frazier hit WR Lamar Davenport on a 17-yard touchdown with just 41 seconds left in the half, which gave the Hawks a 28-10 bulge and momentum heading into halftime.

That's the way the score remaining until the final play of the third quarter when Hayes scored on a two-yard run to make it a 35-10 game. The highlight of the day then came for Wagner when Wright burst free up the middle and angled to his left en route to an 89-yard touchdown return on the following kickoff, cutting the Seahawks deficit to 35-17 with 14:45 left to play.

Monmouth held a 367-145 edge in total yards, including a 229-54 advantage on the ground. In addition to Hayes' 103 yards rushing, Asante added 65 yards rushing on 14 carries. Roberts led the Hawks in receiving with 58 yards on six catches.

The stifling Hawk defense harassed Doscher into a five-of-17 passing day for 54 yards while being sacked four times. Williams led Wagner with 47 yards rushing on eight carries.

Defensively, the Hawks forced three turnovers and registered six sacks on the afternoon. Junior linebacker San Sullivan had nine tackles to lead the way.

Senior linebacker Mike Lombardo (Jupiter, FL/ Jupiter Christian) and senior free safety Patrick O'Connor (Leominster, MA/ Leominster) had 10 tackles apiece to lead the Wagner defense.

Williams, Doscher Lead Wagner To Convincing 31-13 Win At CCSU

New Britain, CT - Junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Milford Academy) rushed for 121 yards and two touchdowns while senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) added 65 yards on 11 carries to lead Wagner to a convincing 31-13 road victory over Central Connecticut in Northeast Conference (NEC) play.

In notching their first victory of the 2012 season, the Seahawks improve to 1-3 on the season while evening their NEC record at 1-1. The Blue Devils, meanwhile, remain winless in falling to 0-4 overall, 0-2 in league play.

After being held below 100 yards rushing in consecutive losses to Georgetown (9/8) and Monmouth (9/15), Williams and the Seahawk offensive line returned to form as the 5-9, 200-pound speedster eclipsed the century mark for the 14th time in 23 games.

Senior linebacker C.O. Prime (Laval, Quebec/ Ontario), senior strong safety Sidiq Soulemana (Bronx, NY/ Hudson Valley CC) and senior linebacker Theodore Clohessy (Staten Island, NY/ St. Joseph By the Sea) led the defensive charge with 10 tackles apiece with Soulemana and Clohessy adding an interception and a sack, respectively.

Yet another senior, placekicker David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage) also made his mark by booting a 51-yard field goal as time expired in the first half to extend Wagner's lead to 10-6.

Wagner outgained Central Connecticut 383-330, including a 271-165 advantage on the ground.

The Seahawks got on the board first when Doscher capped a nine-play, 58-yard drive by scrambling over the right side, absorbing a bit hit in the process, in finishing a three-yard touchdown run with 2:49 left in the first half.

The game's first scoring drive began on the Seahawk 42 which is where sophomore cornerback Jarrett Dieudonne (Fort Lauderdale/ Dillard) and freshman linebacker Stephon Font-Toomer (Bethlehem, PA/ Liberty) surged into the backfield to combine on a hit on RB Rob Hollomon for a loss of one yard on fourth-and-three.

The big defensive play was the second fourth-down stop made by the Seahawk defense in as many possessions. One possession earlier, sophomore DB Anthony Emmanuele (DePew, NY/ DePew) and Clohessy got penetration and stoned CCSU quarterback Andrew Clements for no gain on fourth-and-two at the Wagner 22 after CCSU head coach Jeff McInerney eschewed a 39-yard field goal attempt.

Following Doscher's touchdown, the Blue Devils quickly answered when Clements hit WR Deven Williams on a 38-yard bullet over the middle on the first play of the ensuing drive, giving CCSU a first down at the Wagner 38. Three plays later, Clements found WR Anthony Julbes on a 17-yard score.

Okoye then got a paw on Juan Duque's extra-point try as Wagner clung to a 7-6 lead.

That's the way the score stood until Wagner took over on downs at its own 30 with 49 seconds left in the half. Doscher hit fifth-year senior WR David Crawford (Carrollton, TX/ Hebron) on a 24-yard on the first play of the drive. Facing fourth-and-three at the Blue Devil 39, the Seahawks called a timeout to set up a short dart from Doscher to sophomore TE Bryant Watts (Burlington, NJ/ Florence) for a first down at the Blue Devil 34.

With three seconds to go in the half, after each team called a time out, senior placekicker David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ Heritage) calmly drilled a 51-yard field goal, the second-longest of his career, to give Wagner a 10-6 halftime lead.

Wagner extended that lead on a Wright 27-yard touchdown run early in the third quarter as the 5-10, 180-pounder shed multiple would-be tacklers. Wright's hard-charging score put a cap on a well-executed 10-play, 75-yard march. Williams built the lead to 24-6 later in the third quarter with a two-yard TD run.

Clements cut the Seahawks' advantage to 24-13 with a two-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter but Williams dashed any hope for a home team comeback less than two minutes later when he took off on a 37-yard dash to paydirt to make it a 31-13 score.

On first victory and NEC victory of the season.

Doscher Throws For 246, Williams Runs For 106 In 31-21 Win Over Bryant Staten Island, NY – Senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) completed 16-of-26 passes for 246 yards and two touchdowns while junior running back Dominique Williams ran for 106 yards on 15 carries and added another 61 yards receiving to lead Wagner past Bryant 31-21.

Fresh on the heels of last week's 31-13 win at Central Connecticut, the Seahawks improve to 2-3 on the season, 2-1 in Northeast Conference (NEC) play. Bryant falls to 0-5 overall, 0-3 in league play.

Wagner was leading 24-21 late in the fourth quarter and had the ball near midfield when Williams delivered an extraordinary 29-yard run that will keep Seahawk Nation buzzing for quite some time. The play was highlighted by the explosive 5-9, 200-pound Williams leaping over a Bryant defender, before steam-rolling another would-be tackler.

The memorable highlight reel run gave the Green & White a first down at the Bryant 20. Two plays later, Doscher scampered his way for a 19-yard touchdown to put the Seahawks up 31-21 with less 90 seconds to play.

After a defensive-minded first half resulted in a 7-7 deadlock at intermission, things began heating up in the second half. A 39-yard field goal by senior kicker David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage) put Wagner on top 10-7 at 10:38 of the third quarter. The Bulldogs, however, answered with a 45-yard kickoff return and then, on the first play of the drive, quarterback Mike Westerhaus found wide receiver Jordan Harris along the left sideline for a 54-yard touchdown with 10:37 remaining in the quarter to give Bryant a 14-10 lead.

After a Wagner three and out and ensuing punt, Bryant took over at its own 43. The Bulldogs moved the ball to the Seahawk 49 and appeared bent, at this point, on taking the game over. Seahawk sophomore cornerback Jarrett Dieudonne (Fort Lauderdale, FL/ Dillard/ Purdue), however, had other ideas. The 6-1, 195-pound Dieudonne turned in a game-changing play, picking off a Westerhaus second-and-13 pass at the Wagner 34 and returning it 16 yards to midfield.

On third-and-nine from the Bryant 49, Doscher hit sophomore tight end Bryant Watts (Burlington, NJ/ Florence) over the middle for a 30-yard gain down to the Bulldog 19. Three play later, Doscher found Watts in the left corner of the end zone for a 17-14 Wagner lead with 2:36 to go in the quarter. The score marked the fourth lead change of the game and gave the Seahawks the lead for good.

With momentum and the loud crowd of 2,037 on its side, the Seahawk defense rose to the occasion, forcing Bryant to punt when Westhaus was hurried by redshirt freshman defensive back James Howell (Brooklyn, NY/ Fort Hamilton) and threw incomplete on third-and-five.

Following the Bryant punt, a five-yard run by redshirt freshman running back Ralph Greene (Tigard, OR/ Tigard), and a Doscher incompleteness brought about third-and-five from the Seahawk 30. Doscher then stepped up and found sophomore Anthony Carrington (Toms River, NJ/ Toms River South) all alone at the Bulldog 30 and the smooth-gliding wide receiver did the rest with his legs as the play went for a 70-yard touchdown.

The Doscher to Carrington hook-up gave Wagner 14 points in a span of 2:30 and, more importantly, a 24-14 lead at the 1:03 mark of the third quarter.

The resilient Bulldogs responded with a nine-play, 69-yard drive in 3:54 that was capped by a one-yard touchdown run by Jordan Brown which made it a 24-21 game. The scoring march was kick-started by a 23-yard strike from Westhaus to wide receiver Jordan Harris on the drive's first play.

Wagner then chewed off 6:42 on its next drive before stalling at the Bulldog 34. Lopez then came on to try a 52-yard field goal but his attempt was blocked by Jeremy Woodson. At this point, the Bulldogs had life, trailing just 24-21, when they took over at their own 39 with just over six minutes to play.

Once again the Seahawks came through in a big spot when senior defensive end Jerome Williams (Burlington Township, NJ/ Holy Cross) burst through for an 11-yard sack on third-and-two from the Bryant 47. The UConn transfer and first-year Seahawk made his presence felt throughout the contest, finishing with six tackles, three tackles for loss (minus 24 yards) and two sacks (minus 20 yards).

Still leading by a scant 24-21 margin, Wagner took over at its own 29 and on the third play of the drive Williams turned in his highlight reel launch, hurtling his way to a 29-yard gain the Bryant 20. Two plays later, Doscher weaved his way through traffic for a 19-yard touchdown, to make it a two-score game 31-21 with just 1:29 to go.

Bryant marched down to the Wagner 32 before the Seahawk defense came through again, forcing Westhaus into three straight incompleteness, the last one coming on a fourth-and-five from the 32. The Wagner defensive brain trust dialed up another blitz as redshirt freshman safety Shan Berry (Orlando, FL/ University) hurried Westhaus on the fourth down throw.

On play of QB Nick Doscher

"I think he's coming into his own. He's as tough as nails. You want go to war with him any day of the week. We threw the ball a little bit more and we threw it efficiently. Nick looked like his old self. I like the fact we had to play four quarters. The kids are getting a taste of what it's like to win and now we have to keep going." - Walt Hameline

Williams Runs For 122 Yards, Two TDs, Defense Shines In 12-3 Win at Sacred Heart

Fairfield, CT – Junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Milford Academy) burst free for a career-long 81-yard first-quarter touchdown, later added a two-yard touchdown run en route to a 20-carry, 122-yard effort and the Wagner defense did the rest as the surging Seahawks made it three wins in a row with a 12-3 Northeast Conference (NEC) victory at Sacred Heart.

In posting their first road win over the Pioneers since 1998, the Seahawks improve to 3-1 in the NEC and into sole possession of third place in the league standings while evening their overall record at 3-3. Sacred Heart, meanwhile, falls to 1-4 overall, 1-2 in conference play.

Williams cracked the 100-yard plateau for the fourth time this season, out of six games, and 16th time in his 25-game Seahawk career. He remains in fifth place on the Seahawk all-time rushing list with 2,559 rushing yards. Next on the list in fourth place is Kito Lockwood, who amassed 3,156 yards from 1992-95. His 81-yard run surpassed his previous career-long dash of 79 yards vs. Robert Morris on November 12, 2011.

Senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) was a force on the ground all afternoon, grossing 83 yards (netting 53 yards) on 18 carries. But the Pioneers did a nice job limiting the Seahawk passing game as Doscher finished 6-of-13 passing for 82 yards and was sacked five times for minus 30 yards in losses.

Doscher's 53-yard day on the ground moved him into the top 10 on the Wagner all-time rushing list with 1,945 career yards. He needs 29 yards to move into ninth place ahead of John Campbell (1998-2001) who gained 1,973 yards during his career.

Defensively, Wagner was paced by a quarter of seniors in cornerback Torian Phillips (Staten Island, NY/ Port Richmond/ Syracuse) and linebacker Mike Lombardo (Jupiter, FL/ Jupiter Christian/ Arkansas St.), who led with eight tackles apiece, while strong safety Sidiq Soulemana (Bronx, NY/ DeWitt Clinton/ Hudson Valley CC) and linebacker C.O. Prime (Laval, Quebec, The Kent School) added six tackles each.

The Seahawk defense harassed SHU QB Tim Little into an 8-for-20 passing day for 67 yards. Running back Keshaudas Spence paced the Pioneers on the ground with 72 yards on 12 carries. Wagner out-gained SHU 288-214, enjoying a 206-147 advantage on the ground.

The fast and aggressive Seahawk defense, which entered today's contest ranked No. 1 in the NEC in scoring defense, allowing 18.4 points per game, lowered that average to 15.8 points per outing. Wagner's defense also entered the game ranked second in pass defense (170.4 yards per game) and reduced that figure to 153.2, and second in total defense (353.8), which now stands at 318 after holding the Pioneers to 214 yards.

The three points allowed by Wagner are the least allowed since November 3, 2007 when the Seahawks blanked La Salle 28-0 on Grymes Hill and the least allowed to an NEC foe since a 7-0 win at Saint Francis (PA) on October 19, 2003.

Sacred Heart, meanwhile, was held to its lowest point total since the 2010 season when the Pioneers were shut out at Saint Francis (PA), 41-0. It was the fewest points scored at home by the Pioneers in a loss since the 1998 season when SHU fell 24-3 to Iona.

Neither team could muster any sustained offense at the outset of the game. After Wagner won the toss and deferred, SHU managed one first down before having to punt. The Seahawks then went three-and-out on its opening drive, resulting in a punt before the Seahawks defense returned the favor, forcing a second Pioneer punt. It was at this point when Williams struck, taking a first down hand-off and rumbling 81 yards to paydirt. The extra point try by senior David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage) was blocked, leaving Wagner in front 6-0.

The teams exchanged punts once again with Wagner taking over at its own 38 with 28 seconds left in the first quarter. After the teams changed sides of the field to open the second quarter, Doscher went to work on the next play, connecting with senior wide receiver Cody Morgan (Boston, MA / Boston College HS/ Syracuse / Milford Academy) on a 25-yard completion to the Pioneer 34.

Two rushes for 10 yards by Williams, a two-yard Doscher run and a five-yard

pickup by redshirt freshman Ralph Greene (Tigard, OR/ Tigard) brought about a third-and-five from the SHU 17. The reigning NEC Offensive Player of the Week then broke SHU's back as Doscher took off on a 14-yard scramble down to the three. A plunge by sophomore fullback Patrick Gibbons (Carthage, NY/ Milford Academy), sandwiched around two Doscher runs, netted just one yard and left the Green & White facing a fourth-and-goal from the two.

The Seahawks then called timeout at the 10:00 mark of the half to discuss strategy. Following the timeout, head coach Walt Hameline elected to forego a field goal attempt and sent his offensive unit on the field. In turn, the Seahawk offense rewarded their coach's faith as Williams barreled into the end zone to make it a 12-0 game. Lopez' extra-point try was no good, however, leaving it a 12-0 game.

The deepest penetration either team would make the rest of the half came on the final scoring drive by either team began when sophomore punter A.J. Firestone's 33-yard punt angled out of bounds at the SHU 7. From there, quarterback Tim Little engineered an 18-play, 90-yard drive that elapsed 9:31 off the clock and resulted in a 20-yard field goal by Chris Rogers that made it 12-3. The Pioneers were bent on making it a 12-7 game but the Seahawk defense came up with a tremendous goal line stand.

On first-and-goal from the four, junior nose tackle Tom Lindley (Mastic Beach, NY/ William Floyd/ Michigan) and sophomore LB Trevor Loveland (Cherry Hill, NJ/ Cherry Hill West) combined to hold RB Greg Moore to a one-yard gain. On second down, 230-pound RB Keshaudas Spence was nailed by Prime for no gain. On third-and-goal from the three, Little threw incomplete, settling for the field goal.

The closest either team got to the end zone the rest of the way was late in the fourth quarter when the Seahawks went 52 yards in 12 plays, chewing valuable time off the before giving the ball up on downs with just 40 seconds left to play.

Doscher Tosses Three TDs As Seahawks Post 31-24 At Saint Francis (PA) Loretto, PA - Senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) was an efficient 12-of-17 passing for 163 yards and three touchdowns, junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Milford Academy) added 93 on 19 carries and the Seahawks never trailed in posting their fourth consecutive win by a 31-24 count over Saint Francis (PA).

By winning its fourth straight NEC game, Wagner, a charter member of the NEC Football Conference which was formed in 1996, will now gun for its first-ever five-game conference winning streak. The quest for this milestone will take place on Saturday, October 27 vs. Robert Morris on Homecoming Day. Kickoff at Hameline Field at Wagner College Stadium is set for 1:00 pm.

With the victory, Wagner improves to 4-3 overall, 4-1 in the Northeast Conference (NEC), maintaining their stranglehold on second place in the league standings behind 4-0 Albany, which was idle this week. The last time Wagner jumped out to a 4-1 NEC start was in 2009 when the Green & White started 5-1 in the league before dropping their final two NEC contests. The Red Flash, meanwhile, fall to 3-5 overall, 2-3 in NEC play.

The current four-game winning streak is Wagner's second four-game skein in its 19-year NEC football history. Wagner also accomplished this feat in 2009 and has, on four occasions, put together three-game NEC winning streaks; in 2000, 2002, 2007 and 2011.

The last time Wagner owned a five-game winning streak overall was in 1994. The last time the Seahawks won six or more consecutive games was in 1988. That season, the Seahawks sandwiched eight straight wins in between losing the season opener and dropping the season finale.

Neither team committed a turnover on the afternoon in a game that saw the Red Flash out-gain Wagner by a 196-174 margin on the ground and by an overall margin of 353-337.

Saint Francis received a productive day from quarterback John Kelly, a mobile signal-caller in the same mold as Doscher, who rang up 157 yards through the air while adding 109 yards on the ground. Wagner handed the Red Flash their first loss of the season at DeGol Field and their first Nov. 5, 2011 when Saint Francis fell to Monmouth 48-45.

Defensively for Wagner, the Seahawks were led by the play of five seniors who recorded seven tackles or more. Strong safety Sidiq Soulemana (Bronx, NY/ Hudson Valley CC) led the way with 12 tackles, including four solo stops while linebacker C.O. Prime (Laval, Quebec/ The Kent School) and defensive end Jerome Williams (Burlington, NJ/ Holy Cross/ UConn) had nine and eight tackles, respectively. Finishing with seven tackles apiece were free safety Patrick O'Connor (Leominster, MA/ Leominster) and Torian Phillips (Staten Island, NY/ Port Richmond/ Syracuse).

Saint Francis had the ball with 4:28 remaining in regulation and down by just a 31-24 count. But on a critical third-and-seven play, blitzing senior linebacker Theodore Clohessy (Staten Island, NY/ St. Joseph By the Sea) turned in the defensive play of the game, sacking Kelly for an 11-yard loss, forcing the Red Flash to punt on fourth and 18, Following the punt, Doscher shook loose on a 12-yard first-down run which sealed the win as it allowed the Seahawks to run out the clock.

While Wagner was in control afternoon, the feisty Red Flash answered nearly all of the salvos delivered by the Green & White. Wagner jumped on top 7-0 when an 18-yard pass from Doscher to sophomore wide receiver Anthony Carrington (Toms River, NJ/ Toms River South) keyed an 11-play, 69-yard drive that resulted in a 10-yard Williams touchdown jaunt.

Following an exchange of punts, Saint Francis (PA) tied it at 7-7 when quarterback John Kelly hit wide receiver A.J. Alexander on a 60-yard score.

Wagner struck back quickly, buoyed by a 61-yard kickoff return by sophomore Otis Wright (Fort Lauderdale, FL/ Dillard). Originally, the Seahawks were set to take over on their own 15 but an offside penalty on the Red Flash forced a re-kick and Wright, who entered the game ranked seventh in the nation in kickoff return yard average (30.2) and tops in the NEC, took advantage. Wright's return gave the Seahawks a first down at the Red Flash 28 and Wagner went up top on first down with Doscher hitting senior wide receiver David Crawford (Carrollton, TX/ Hebron) on the first play of the drive, 28-yarder, to make it 14-7.

Senior kicker David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ Heritage) would later nail a 34-yard field goal with 1:37 go in half to extend the Seahawk lead to 17-7. Saint Francis,

with Kelly executing the two-minute drill to perfect, quickly moved down the field to set up a Josh Thiel 43-yard field goal as time expired in the half to make it a 17-10 lead at halftime.

The Green & White came out of the gate hitting on all cylinders in half number two, as Doscher led a crisp seven-play, 73-yard march that he capped by hitting a wide open Williams in the left flat for a touchdown and a 24-10 lead. Once again, Wright was in the middle of the action, this time bursting free on a 31-yard run down to the six which set up the Doscher to Williams score.

Undaunted, the Red Flash put together a 10-play, 77-yard drive as Keion Wade finished it off with 6:50 left in the third quarter with a 12-yard TD scamper to make it 24-17.

The game's back and forth nature continued as Wagner responded with its longest drive of the season, a mammoth nine-play, 90-yard march that took 5:39 off the clock and resulted in an 12-yard touchdown pass from Doscher to senior wide receiver Darnell Sapps (Syracuse, NY/ Corcoran). In hauling in the first TD of his career, Sapps gave Wagner a 31-17 lead with 1:06 to go in the third.

Highlights in the drive included a 20-yard Williams reception followed later by a 28-yard grab by Crawford. Junior wide receiver Cody Morgan (Boston, MA/ Boston College HS) also got into the act, catching a nine-yard pass over the middle, in traffic, on third-and-five from the Saint Francis 25, which kept the drive alive and made it first and- 10 at the 16. Three plays later, Doscher hit Sapps to make it a two-score game.

Trailing 31-17, Kelly and the Red Flash answered back with a 12-play, 81-yard drive that culminated in a seven-yard Kelly run to make it 31-24 with 10:30 left in the game. The defenses took over from there as the two teams were forced to punt twice over the next four possessions. The final punt of the game was forced on the Clohessy sack with 90 seconds left.

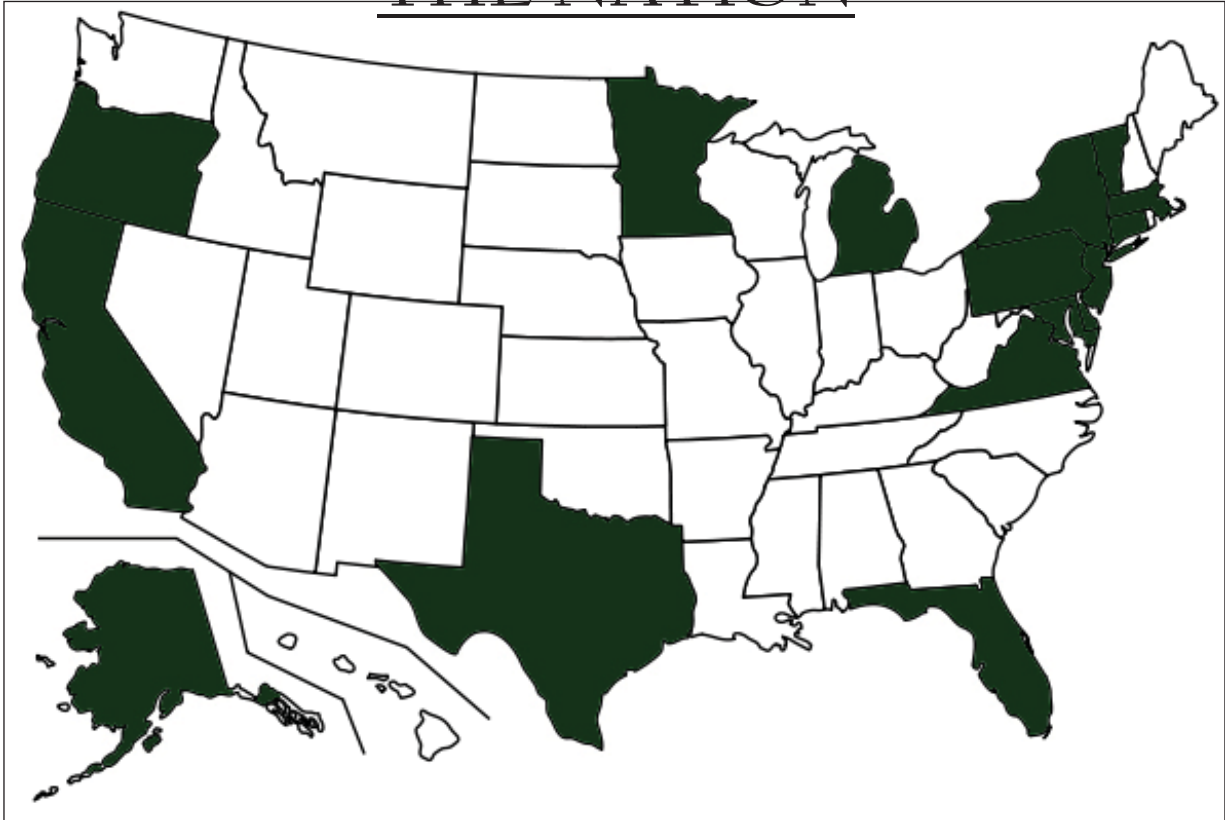

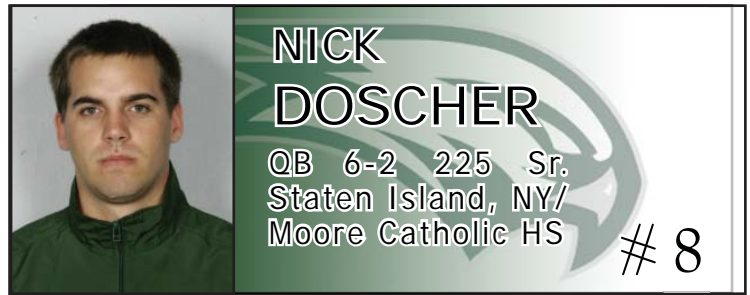

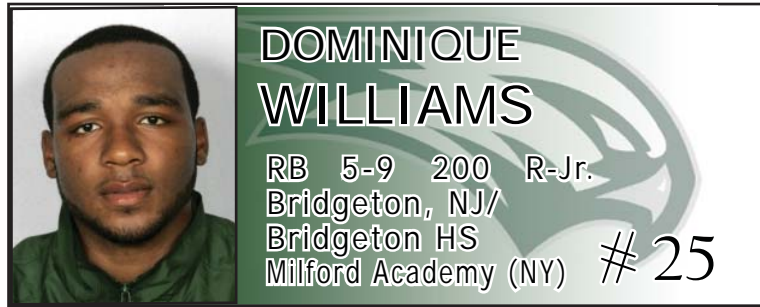
