The Wagner Seahawks are looking to snap a four-game losing streak and gain their first NEC win of the season when they travel to Fairfield, CT to meet undefeated Sacred Heart at 1:00 pm on Saturday. The Pioneers, picked to finish seventh in the NEC Preseason Poll, are the league's surprise team at 5-0 while the Seahawks come in with a 1-4 mark. This is Sacred Heart's NEC opener.

About the Seahawks

The defending NEC Champion Seahawks were picked No. 1 in the 2013 NEC Preseason Poll and No. 24 in the 2013 Lindy's Annual Preseason Poll, is 1-3 on the season and opened the season with a 28-21 come-from-behind win over Georgetown in the season opener on August 31. The following week, Wagner was edged by Merrimack in a 42-41 shoot-out on Sept. 6. In the last three weeks Wagner has been blitzed by Syracuse (54-0, 9/14), Delaware (49-9, 9/21) and Bryant (47-28, 9/28).

Dominique Is Unique

The Seahawks are led by 5-9, 205-pound senior running back Dominique Williams, a tough, sturdy and elusive back, and one who enters the Delaware game ranked fourth all-time in Wagner history in rushing yards (3,838) and third in scoring (258 points). Williams enters the Sacred Heart game ranked fourth all-time in NEC history with 4,808 all-purpose yards and eighth in rushing. Williams is a 2013 College Sports Journal Preseason Third-Team All-American and a 2012 Preseason All-NEC selection. In 37 games as a Seahawk, Williams has topped the 100-yard rushing mark 24 times.

Coming Out Party For Redshirt Freshman QB Chris Andrews

Last week's game vs. Bryant served as a coming out party for redshirt freshman quarterback Chris Andrews (Queens, NY/St. Joseph's/Valley Forge Military Academy). The athletic, left-handed Andrews came on in the second quarter and went on to account for 269 yards of offense but it was not enough to offset the 173-yard rushing, three-touchdown day by Bryant's Paul Canevari as the Bulldogs posted a 47-28 win on Homecoming at Hameline Field. Andrews was spectacular at times, completing 16-of-25 passes for 223 yards and three touchdowns – all career highs – while picking up another 46 yards and a touchdown on 17 rushing attempts. Senior wide receiver Tyree Watkins (Camden, NJ/ Camden/Duke) had four receptions for 90 yards, including touchdown receptions of 67 and nine yards

16th All-Time Meeting Between Seahawks & Pioneers

Sacred Heart and Wagner will be meeting for the 16th time. In a series that began in 1998, the Seahawks lead 8-7, including last season's 12-3 road on October 6 2012.

Head Coach Walt Hameline

Now in his 33rd season as head coach, Walt Hameline, who doubles as the Seahawks' athletic director, owns a sparkling 214-131-2 (.620) record. In 2012, he led the Seahawks to their first-ever Northeast Conference (NEC) Football Championship with a thrilling 23-17 come-from-behind win over Duquesne on November 17, 2012, while clinching a berth in the 2012 D-I Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Championship. The win personified the Green & White's as Wagner began the campaign with three straight losses, before winning its next nine games. In defying the odds throughout its triumphant march to the school's first-ever NEC title and the conference's first-ever NCAA FCS win, Wagner compiled a 9-4 record, including a 7-1 mark in the NEC. The Seahawks finished the season ranked 21st in The Sports Network Top-25 Poll and 22nd in the FCS Coaches Poll, marking the first time an NEC team has ended the season with an appearance in both official Top-25 polls. The accolades soon began to pour in for Hameline. After being named the NEC Football Coach of the Year, he was tabbed the 2012 FCS National Coach of the Year by both College Football News (CFN) and the College Sports Journal (CSJ). In the 2012 home opener against Monmouth, Wagner College Stadium was renamed Hameline Field in his honor. On November 6, 2010, Hameline became just the eighth active FCS coach to win 200 games with a 31-20 victory over Monmouth, is 54th on the all-time NCAA wins list (any level) and one of just 36 coaches to win 200 games at one school. The 1987 Kodak National Coach of the Year, after guiding Wagner to a 13-1 record and to the Division III National Championship, Hameline currently ranks sixth in victories among all active FCS coaches.

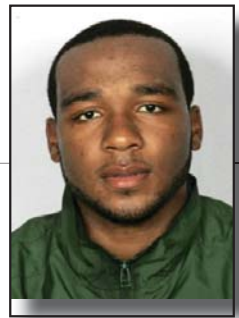

Williams Cracks Century Mark...Again

Fifth-year senior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/Bridgeton/Milford Academy) gained 104 yards on 13 carries s. Bryant in topping the 100-yard rushing mark for the 24th time in his 37-game career. Williams is No. 4 All-Time in career rushing yards with 3,838. Next on the list is Alonzo Patterson (1979-82) at 4177 yards.

Stat of the Day

Dominique Williams began the game vs. Bryant with five rushes for minus 16 yards (-3.2 yards per rush). On his last eight carries, he churned out 120 yards (15 yards per rush), aided by a 52-yard third-quarter jaunt, to finished with a 13-carry, 104-yard afternoon.

Most Frosh Passing Yards Since 2009

The 223 yards that Chris Andrews passed for vs. Bryant are the most by a Seahawk freshman since Nick Doscher threw for 260 yards on October 10 2009 en route to a 37-24 road victory.

Over 400 For Second Time

Wagner's 403 total yards vs. Bryant marked the second – highest output of the season as the Seahawks amassed 418 yards vs. Merrimack on September 6.

Season Highs vs. Bryant

Against the Bulldogs, the Green & White set season highs in passing yards (239) passing attempts (31) yards per play (6.0) and yards per rush (4.6). The most telling stat however, may have been the season-high four turnovers that the Seahawks committed.

Cooper Sees First Action, Gains First Start

Junior safety Daquan Cooper (Philadelphia PA/George Washington), a transfer from Temple who saw action in his first two seasons with the Owls primarily on special teams, gained a start vs. Bryant in her first game in a Seahawk uniform. The 6-0, 180-pound Cooper tied for third on the team with seven tackles including four solo stops.

Robb, Lia Trophy Winners

Senior wide receiver Tyree Watkins was the recipient of the James Robb Memorial Offensive Player of the Game Award vs. Bryant while junior linebacker Trevor Loveland (Cherry Hill, NJ/Cherry Hill West) earned the Nick Lia Memorial Defensive Player of the Game honor after recording a game-high 10 tackles including four tackles for loss a sack, and a blocked extra point. Loveland is tied for the team lead in tackles with redshirt junior safety Blake Bascom (Monroe Township, NJ/ Monroe) with 30 tackles. The 6-3, 230-pound Loveland has 19 solo tackles and 11 assisted stops, to go with five tackles for loss, one sack, one forced fumble and one blocked kick.

Watkins Continues to Make Impact

Senior wide receiver Tyree Watkins (Camden, NJ/ Camden/ Duke) had four receptions for 90 yards, including touchdown receptions of 67 and nine yards vs. Bryant. For the season, Watkins leads the Seahawks in receptions and yards having snared 20 passes for 294 yards and three touchdowns, a 14.7 average, and three touchdowns.

Wagner-Sacred Heart: The Last Time:

Wagner 12, Sacred Heart 3

October 6, 2012

FAIRFIELD, CT – Junior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Milford Academy) burst free for a career-long 81-yard first-quarter touchdown, later added a two-yard touchdown run en route to a 20-carry, 122-yard effort and the Wagner defense did the rest as the surging Seahawks made it three wins in a row with a 12-3 Northeast Conference (NEC) victory at Sacred Heart.

In posting their first road win over the Pioneers since 1998, the Seahawks improve to 3-1 in the NEC and into sole possession of third place in the league standings while evening their overall record at 3-3. Sacred Heart, meanwhile, falls to 1-4 overall, 1-2 in conference play.

Williams cracked the 100-yard plateau for the fourth time this season, out of six games, and 16th time in his 25-game Seahawk career. He remains in fifth place on the Seahawk all-time rushing list with 2,559 rushing yards. Next on the list in fourth place is Kito Lockwood, who amassed 3,156 yards from 1992-95. His 81-yard run surpassed his previous career-long dash of 79 yards vs. Robert Morris on November 12, 2011.

Senior quarterback Nick Doscher (Staten Island, NY/ Moore Catholic) was a force on the ground all afternoon, grossing 83 yards (netting 53 yards) on 18 carries. But the Pioneers did a nice job limiting the Seahawk passing game as Doscher finished 6-of-13 passing for 82 yards and was sacked five times for minus 30 yards in losses.

Doscher's 53-yard day on the ground moved him into the top 10 on the Wagner all-time rushing list with 1,945 career yards. He needs 29 yards to move into ninth place ahead of John Campbell (1998-2001) who gained 1,973 yards during his career.

Defensively, Wagner was paced by a quarter of seniors in cornerback Torian Phillips (Staten Island, NY/ Port Richmond/ Syracuse) and linebacker Mike Lombardo (Jupiter, FL/ Jupiter Christian/ Arkansas St.), who led with eight tackles apiece, while strong safety Sidiq Soulemana (Bronx, NY/ DeWitt Clinton/ Hudson Valley CC) and linebacker C.O. Prime (Laval, Quebec, The Kent School) added six tackles each.

The Seahawk defense harassed SHU QB Tim Little into an 8-for-20 passing day for 67 yards. Running back Keshaudas Spence paced the Pioneers on the ground with 72 yards on 12 carries. Wagner out-gained SHU 288-214, enjoying a 206-147 advantage on the ground.

The fast and aggressive Seahawk defense, which entered today's contest ranked No. 1 in the NEC in scoring defense, allowing 18.4 points per game, lowered that average to 15.8 points per outing. Wagner's defense also entered the game ranked second in pass defense (170.4 yards per game) and reduced that figure to 153.2, and second in total defense (353.8), which now stands at 318 after holding the Pioneers to 214 yards.

The three points allowed by Wagner are the least allowed since November 3, 2007 when the Seahawks blanked La Salle 28-0 on Grymes Hill and the least allowed to an NEC foe since a 7-0 win at Saint Francis (PA) on October 19, 2003.

Sacred Heart, meanwhile, was held to its lowest point total since the 2010 season when the Pioneers were shut out at Saint Francis (PA), 41-0. It was the fewest points scored at home by the Pioneers in a loss since the 1998 season when SHU fell 24-3 to Iona.

Neither team could muster any sustained offense at the outset of the game. After Wagner won the toss and deferred, SHU managed one first down before having to punt. The Seahawks then went three-and-out on its opening drive, resulting in a punt before the Seahawks defense returned the favor, forcing a second Pioneer punt. It was at this point when Williams struck, taking a first down handoff and rumbling 81 yards to paydirt. The extra point try by senior David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage) was blocked, leaving Wagner in front 6-0.

The teams exchanged punts once again with Wagner taking over at its own 38 with 28 seconds left in the first quarter. After the teams changed sides of the field to open the second quarter, Doscher went to work on the next play, connecting with senior wide receiver Cody Morgan (Boston, MA / Boston College HS/ Syracuse / Milford Academy) on a 25-yard completion to the Pioneer 34.

Two rushes for 10 yards by Williams, a two-yard Doscher run and a five-yard pickup by redshirt freshman Ralph Greene (Tigard, OR/ Tigard) brought about a third-and-five from the SHU 17. The reigning NEC Offensive Player of the Week then broke SHU's back as Doscher took off on a 14-yard scramble down to the three. A plunge by sophomore fullback Patrick Gibbons (Carthage, NY/ Milford Academy), sandwiched around two Doscher runs, netted just one yard and left the Green & White facing a fourth-and-goal from the two.

The Seahawks then called timeout at the 10:00 mark of the half to discuss strategy.

Following the timeout, head coach Walt Hameline elected to forego a field goal attempt and sent his offensive unit on the field. In turn, the Seahawk offense rewarded their coach's faith as Williams barreled into the end zone to make it a 12-0 game. Lopez' extra-point try was no good, however, leaving it a 12-0 game.

The deepest penetration either team would make the rest of the half came on t The final scoring drive by either team began when sophomore punter A.J. Firestone's 33-yard punt angled out of bounds at the SHU 7. From there, quarterback Tim Little engineered an 18-play, 90-yard drive that elapsed 9:31 off the clock and resulted in a 20-yard field goal by Chris Rogers that made it 12-3. The Pioneers were bent on making it a 12-7 game but the Seahawk defense came up with a tremendous goal line stand.

On first-and-goal from the four, junior nose tackle Tom Lindley (Mastic Beach, NY/ William Floyd/ Michigan) and sophomore LB Trevor Loveland (Cherry Hill, NJ/ Cherry Hill West) combined to hold RB Greg Moore to a one-yard gain. On second down, 230-pound RB Keshaudas Spence was nailed by Prime for no gain. On third-and-goal from the three, Little threw incomplete, settling for the field goal.

The closest either team got to the end zone the rest of the way was late in the fourth quarter when the Seahawks went 52 yards in 12 plays, chewing valuable time off the before giving the ball up on downs with just 40 seconds left to play.

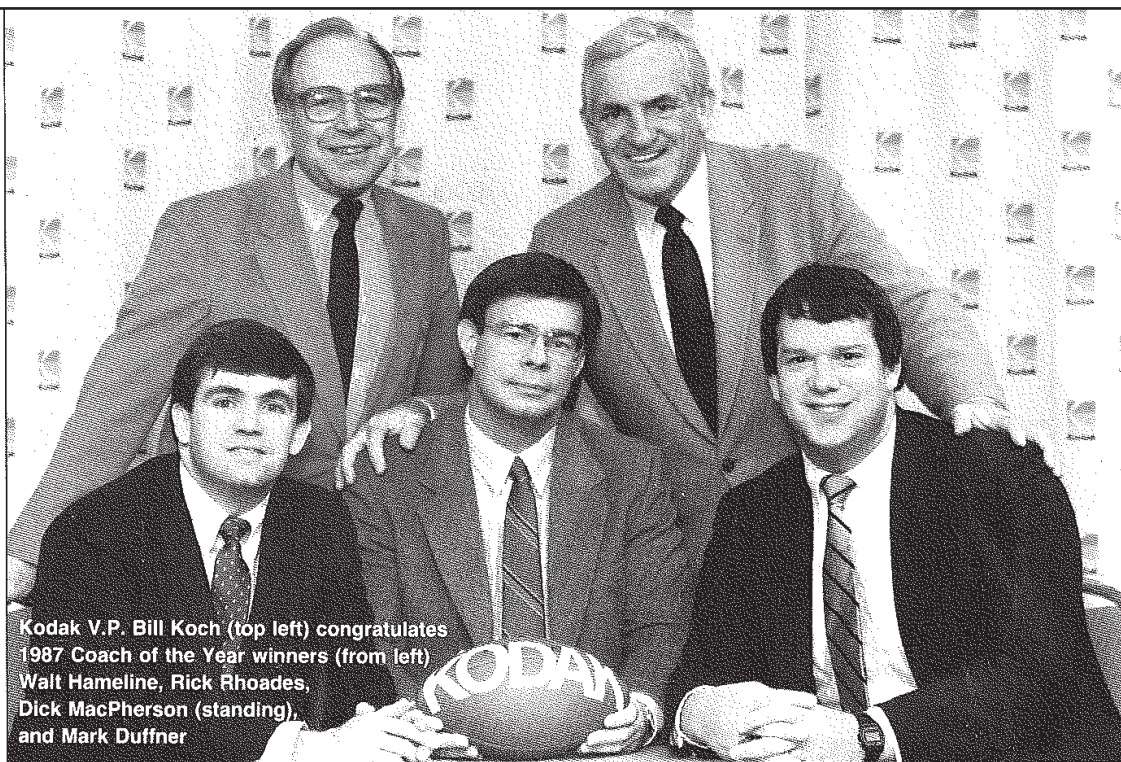

Misley Launches Pigskin with Arm & Leg



Redshirt junior quarterback Matt Misley (Park Ridge, NJ/ Park Ridge), who doubles as the Seahawks' starting punter, had a sparking second half to finish with 174 yards passing and a touchdown while completing 16-of-28 passes in week two vs. Merrimack (9/6). Making the third start of his career, Misley also ran the ball effectively in Wagner's read offense, gaining 98 yards on 16 carries. For the game, he wound up with two passing



touchdowns and one rushing score. In the first half, Misley completed 5-of-13 passes for 41 yards while after intermission, he connected on 9-of-15 aerials for 133 yards. On the ground, Misley rushed six times in the opening half for 29 yards. In the second half, he shook loose for 69 yards rushing on 10 carries. For the season, Misley has completed 46-of-88 passes for 443 yards, three touchdowns and seven interceptions. As the Seahawks' starting punter, Misley has 33 punts for 1,232 yards with a ling of 54 at Syracuse (9/14) with a 37.3-yard average.

Williams, James Earn NEC Weekly Honors

Fifth-year senior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Bridgeton/ Milford Academy) and redshirt sophomore cornerback Deangelo James (Miami, FL/ American Senior) were named Northeast Conference Player of the Week and Co-Defensive Player of the Week, respectively, for their efforts in Wagner's season-opening 28-21 win over Georgetown on August 31.



This marked the fifth time in Williams' career that he has copped NEC Offensive Player of the Week honors, having done two times in each of the last two seasons. He also picked up one NEC Rookie of the Week honor back in 2009. For James, who was a running back for the Seahawks before being converted to cornerback last spring, this was his first NEC weekly honor.

Williams, the first three-time captain in Wagner football history, carried the load for the Seahawk offense against Georgetown, helping the Green & White overcome a 21-7 halftime deficit against. Williams rushed 32 times for 162 yards and the game-winning touchdown, a six-yard run around right end, punctuated by a soaring dive into the right side of the end zone, with 2:48 remaining in regulation.

The 2013 College Sports Journal Third-Team Preseason All-American and All-NEC Preseason team member scored Wagner's second touchdown of the day in the third quarter when he took a lateral from senior wide receiver Tyree Watkins (Camden, NJ/Camden/Duke) and scampered 10 yards to paydirt on an unscripted hook-and-ladder play. The 5-9, 205-pound Williams, who averaged 5.1 yards per carry against the Hoyas, outgained the entire Georgetown rushing attack by 83 yards.

Trailing 21-7 at halftime, Wagner needed a near-perfect second-half effort and James and his teammates delivered, as the Seahawks surrendered just 26 yards after halftime. James delivered one of the key plays in the win, a scoreboard and momentum-changing third quarter pick-six that turned the tide of the game. With Wagner trailing 21-14 early in the fourth quarter, James stepped in front of a pass thrown by Georgetown quarterback Isaiah Kempf and returned the interception 24 yards for the game-tying score.

The speedy 5-10, 170-pound Miami native, who added five tackles and a pass break up, shares this week's defensive player of the week honor with Duquesne sophomore linebacker Sam Martello who had five tackles in a 35-24 victory over former NEC member Albany.

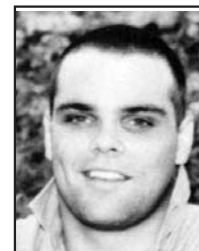
The NEC Special Teams Player of the Week is Bryant senior kicker Tom Alberti, who drilled a 30-yard field goal with 38 seconds left to play in carrying the Bulldogs to a 17-16 victory over Holy Cross. Dillon Buechel, Duquesne's redshirt freshman quarterback, earned NEC Rookie of the Week honors after completing 21-of-28 passes for 309 yards and two touchdowns in the Dukes' victory over Albany.

2013 Wagner Hall of Fame Class

JOHN CHIOFALO *Class of 1987 - Football*

In a career that spanned from 1983-1986, was one of the most versatile and productive players in the Wagner's long gridiron history. A muscle-bound, aggressive and fearless 5-8, 205-pound fullback/return specialist, Chiofalo helped propel the Seahawks to 32-10-1 record during his career. In his freshman season of 1983, the Seahawks went 8-2-1 and claimed the ECAC Championship. After helping Wagner to a 6-4 mark in 1984, Chiofalo's efforts helped lead the Green & White to consecutive 9-2 records and ECAC titles in 1985 and 1986. The North Massapequa, NY native totaled 1,852 career rushing yards which ranked fourth on the Seahawk all-time list at the time of his graduation, on 337 carries (5.5-yard average) and 11 touchdowns. A four-year starter at fullback, and team captain in 1985 and 1986, he added another 645 receiving yards on 64 receptions with four touchdowns. One of the top special teams performers in Wagner history, the sure-handed Chiofalo accounted for 1,066 yards on 121 punt returns, an 8.8-yard average, while tallying 246 yards on 11 career kickoff returns. His punt return attempts, punt return yardage and yards per punt return remain No. 1 in the Seahawk all-time record book. Chiofalo is married to Ronelle Prickett, and is the proud father of Jonathan (18), Alexis (13) and Maria (7). A resident of Staten Island, NY, he is a territory manager for Tri-Lift NJ.



TIM KELLEY *Class of 1984 - Football*

Tim Kelley ran the Wagner offense for the majority of three seasons, compiling a 19-3-2 record (83.3%) as a starting quarterback, while leading the Seahawks to both an NCAA Tournament appearance, and the inaugural ECAC New York-New Jersey Metro Championship in his final collegiate game. Kelley guided the Green & White to victory in his first 12 games as a collegiate starter. During his four seasons, Kelley helped produce a sparkling 33-6-2 record (82.9%). All four of the teams he played on won eight or more games. His 10-touchdown, 1,404-yard senior season catapulted him into second place on Wagner's all-time yardage list at the time of his graduation. His 103 completions in 1983, at the time, placed him second in the Green & White career record book. Kelley earned Pizza Hut Division III All-American Honorable Mention accolades for his play in the 1983 campaign, which was capped by a 48-7 trouncing of nationally-ranked and previously-undefeated St. John's in the ECAC Metro Championship. Kelley led Wagner to a series of one-sided victories as a senior in the 1983 season, highlighted statistically by a 56-7 rout at Fordham. In that game, Kelley threw for 254 yards and three touchdowns. The 6-1, 190-pound Kelley led the team to two more 400-yard offensive performances, against New York Tech and Kean. The Constantia, NY native passed for 1,143 yards as a junior while leading the Wagner to an NCAA tournament appearance. In the 1982 season, Wagner was undefeated in the regular season with a 8-0-1 mark behind Kelley's leadership. Kelley and his wife Debra reside in Manlius, NY, and are the proud parents of Jordan (23), Ryan (20), Andrew (17), and Alexandria (14). Kelley is the president of Pyramid Management Group, Inc.



BOB MACKISEY *Class of 1983 - Football*

Bob Mackisey was a consummate, all-around linebacker during his four years playing for the Green & White, patrolling the middle of the Seahawk defense from 1979 to 1982. Cerebral, instinctive and athletic, Mackisey helped spearhead the Seahawks to a 25-4-2 (.839) record during his three seasons as a starter and two postseason appearances. After going 5-5 in his freshman season, the Seahawks improved to 8-2 in coach Bill Russo's final season in 1980. With Mackisey firmly entrenched as the leader of the defense, Wagner went 9-1 under first-year coach Walt Hameline in 1981, followed by an 8-1-1 record in 1982. Mackisey teamed with 1995 Hall of Fame inductee Sal D'Alessio to form one of the most productive linebacker tandems in Wagner history. The 6-0, 215-pound Warwick, RI native recorded 350 tackles during his extraordinarily productive career, which remains cemented in fifth place, more than three decades later, on the all-time Seahawk list. An Associated Press Honorable Mention All-American as a senior in 1981, Mackisey recorded 126 tackles that year, which ranks fifth in the Wagner single-season record book. In addition, Mackisey is ranked No. 1 all-time in career assisted tackles (255), single-season assisted tackles (116) and single-game assisted tackles (22 vs. New Haven - 10/23/82). A team captain in his senior season, Mackisey went on to serve as an assistant coach for the Seahawks from 1984-1986. Mackisey and his wife Kellie reside in Warwick, RI and are the proud parents of sons Casey (19) and Aaron (16). A retired lieutenant with the Rhode Island State Police, he is currently a lieutenant with the Brown University Police Department and serves as a volunteer assistant football coach at Bryant University.



SUSAN MOFFAT *Class of 1998 - Women's Basketball*

Susan Moffat was one of the most prolific scorers in Wagner College women's basketball history, and her name can be found throughout the Seahawk record book. At the time of her graduation, in 1998, the 5-10 shooting guard was Wagner's all-time leader in made three-pointers, fourth in points and fifth in scoring average. Through the end of the 2012-2013 season, Moffat ranks second in made three-pointers, is tied for fifth in scoring average, and sixth in the all-time scoring with 1,481 points. The Somerville, NJ native averaged 13.8 ppg during her time on Grymes Hill, and 59 three-pointers per season. Her 68 made three-pointers in both her junior and seasons rank third for a Seahawk in a single season. As a senior, Moffat helped lead the Seahawks to new heights, as the Green & White posted a 12-4 mark in Northeast Conference play, winning nine out of 10 contests to close out regular season play. Wagner finished tied for second in the NEC and advanced to the 1998 NEC Championship game. Moffat was named to the NEC All-Tournament team in her final year with the Green & White. As was the case in her senior year, Moffat was Wagner's leading scorer as a junior, averaging a career-high 16.6 ppg and posting a career-best in rebounds while leading the Seahawks to the NEC semifinals. As a junior in 1996-97, she led the Green & White to an 18-10 record and a mark of 11-7 in the NEC. With Moffat again at the helm as a senior in 1997-98, the Seahawks went 17-12 overall and improved to 12-4 in NEC play. Wagner appeared in the NEC tournament in all four of Moffat's years as a member of the Wagner program. Moffat resides in Los Angeles, CA with her husband Kouri. She is currently a VP of J.P. Morgan Private Bank and co-founder of NextStep, a not for profit, community-based fitness and wellness center for those living with paralysis.



JOHN WHITE *Class of 1994 - Baseball*

John White enjoyed a spectacular three-year career on the diamond for the Seahawks from 1989 to 1991 before leaving school following his junior season of 1991 to pursue a professional career. A 21st-round draft pick of the Montreal Expos (555th pick overall) in the 1991 Major League Baseball Draft, White played minor league ball in 1991 and 1992 for the Expos organization before returning to Grymes Hill to finish his English degree, which he earned in 1994. Owner of a robust .343 career batting average, which is tied for seventh on the Wagner all-time charts, White hit the ground running as a freshman in 1989, copping both Northeast Conference (NEC) Rookie of the Year and NEC Tournament honors, following a season where he batted .351. The Nyack, NY native backed up his outstanding freshman campaign with another great season as a sophomore, batting .333. As a junior in 1991, he batted .346 and earned First-Team All-NEC honors. For his career, White hit 111 home runs with 59 RBI in 92 games, with 77 runs scored, 28 doubles, six triples, and 13 stolen bases. White's stellar defensive play in centerfield is another asset that caught the attention of professional scouts as the fleet-footed White went on to play for the Jamestown Expos of the New York-Penn League and the Albany Polecats of the South Atlantic League. White, who resides in Yorktown Heights, NY with his wife Angela and their two children, Brian (5) and Isabella (1), serves as athletic director and baseball coach at Evander Childs High School in the Bronx, NY.

NEC Offensive Player of the Week

KYLE HARBRIDGE, SAINT FRANCIS

Sr., RB, 5-10, 195 lbs., Easton, PA/Easton

Harbridge did just about everything he could to orchestrate a possible upset of No. 16 Fordham. The senior ball carrier ran 29 times for 291 yards and three touchdowns as Saint Francis took a lead into the fourth quarter. The 291 yards are the second-highest single-game rushing total by a Division I FCS player this season, only four yards off SDSU's Zach Zenner's top mark. Harbridge also logged four receiving yards and 89 kickoff return yards for a total 384 all-purpose yards. Harbridge, who has reached the 100-yard rushing mark in each of his four games this season, put Saint Francis on the scoreboard with a 67-yard touchdown run 2:52 into the second quarter. On the Red Flash's first possession of the second half, Harbridge broke off a 66-yard scamper to set up SFU with a 1st-and-Goal at the Fordham 2 and punched it in on the next play. Harbridge was far from done. He ripped off a 71-yard scoring scamper to give Saint Francis an 18-17 lead with 3:21 left in the third quarter, and then converted the ensuing two-point try by hauling in a pass from Max Ward.



NEC Defensive Player of the Week

JD ROUSSEL, SACRED HEART

Sr., CB, 5-10, 185 lbs., Pawtucket, RI/St. Raphael Academy

Roussel made three interceptions to lead a swarming Sacred Heart defense that pitched a shutout at Patriot League member Bucknell. The cornerback made three tackles and became the first player in Sacred Heart's Division I history to pick off three passes in the same game. With his help, Sacred Heart limited the Bison to 164 yards and blanked an opponent for the first time since October 5, 2002. Roussel's first interception came with Bucknell driving late in the first half. On a 1st-and-10 play from Sacred Heart's 40-yard line, Roussel pulled in Trey Lauleta's pass at his own 25. The senior denied Bucknell again on its first possession of the second half, picking off a deep ball in the end zone. His final interception allowed SHU to set up in victory formation and ice their fifth straight win.



NEC Special Teams Player of the Week

ANTWAN EDDIE, ROBERT MORRIS

Jr., CB, 5-10, 190 lbs., Homestead, FL/South Dade

Eddie has become quite a threat during his first season as Robert Morris' primary punt returner. The cornerback broke free for an 88-yard punt return for a touchdown in the Colonials' 37-31 double-overtime win at Big South member VMI. With two returns for 110 yards at VMI, Eddie accounted for the second-most punt return yardage in RMU single-game history. Eddie, who posted the fourth-highest single-game punt return total in program history during a Week 2 win over Morgan State, gave the Colonials' a 14-7 lead 00:23 into the second quarter with the longest kick return of any kind that the NEC has seen thus far this season. Eddie's first punt return went for 22 yards, setting RMU up at its own 34-yard line for an eventual touchdown drive.



NEC Rookie of the Week

PAUL CANEVARI, BRYANT

R-Fr., RB, 5-11, 210 lbs., Warwick, NY / Don Bosco Prep

Canevari carried the bulk of the load for a rushing attack that gained 301 yards and propelled Bryant to a 47-28 victory in its NEC opener. The redshirt freshman running back ran 27 times for 173 yards and three touchdowns as the Bulldogs topped NEC preseason favorite Wagner for their first road win of the season. Canevari scored touchdowns on runs of 1 and 8 yards as Bryant built a 17-0 lead 6:00 into the second quarter and never looked back. He added an 11-yard scoring scamper to make the score 41-14 in favor of Bryant with 5:19 left in the third quarter. Canevari, who averaged 6.4 yards per carry at Wagner, has rushed for 387 yards and six touchdowns over his first four collegiate games.

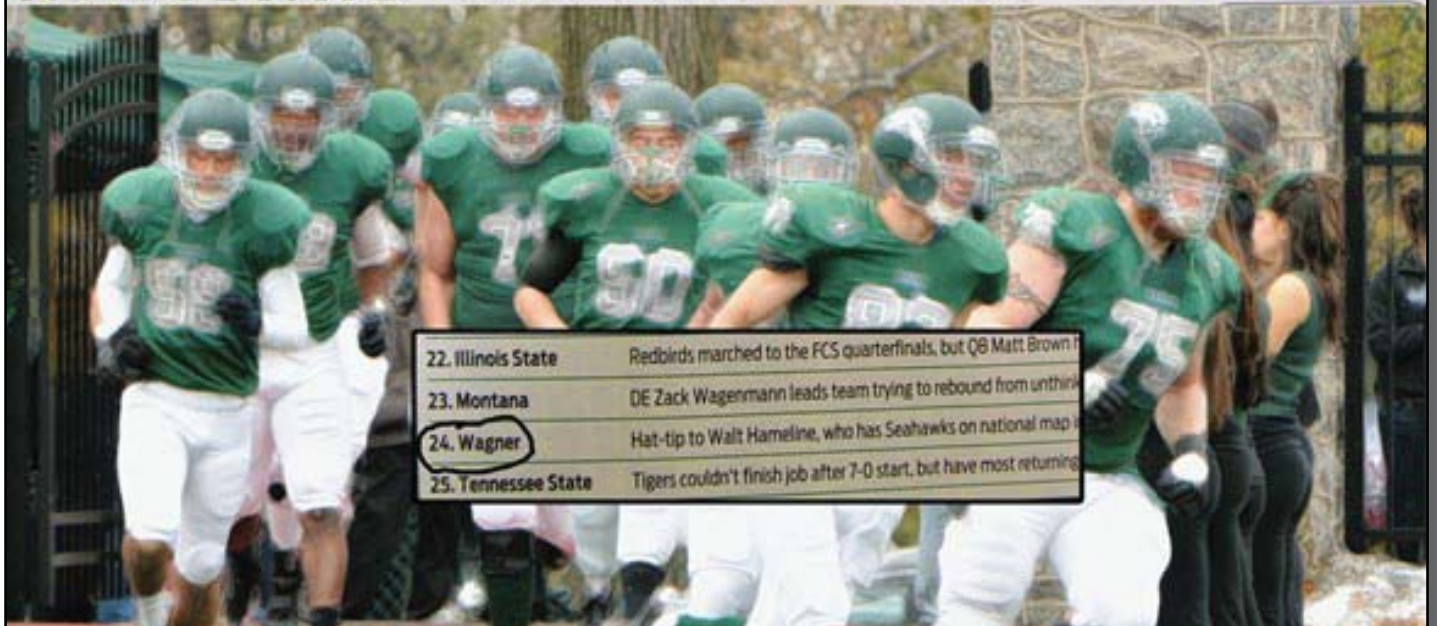

Wagner Picked No.1 In NEC Preseason Poll, Five Seahawks Named All-NEC

Seahawks Picked First in NEC Preseason Poll for First Time

The defending Northeast Conference (NEC) Champion Wagner College Seahawks were picked No. 1 in the 2013 NEC Preseason Coaches Poll for the first time since the league was formed in 1996, and the Seahawks had five players selected to the 25-man 2013 Preseason All-NEC Team, the league office announced on August 12.

Wagner Ties RMU For Most on All-NEC Team with Five

The five Seahawks named to the All-NEC Team tied Robert Morris for the most in the conference and include redshirt junior cornerback Jarrett Dieudonne (Fort Lauderdale, FL/Dillard/Purdue), redshirt junior center David Fredrickson (Staten Island, NY/ Poly Prep), fifth-year senior kicker David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage), redshirt junior tight end Bryant Watts (Burlington, NJ/ Florence) and fifth-year senior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Bridgeton/Milford Academy).

Green & White Garner Four First-Place Votes

In finishing atop the NEC preseason coaches' poll, the Green & White earned four of the seven first-place votes. The remaining three top nods went to Duquesne, which claimed the poll's runner-up spot for the third year in a row. Bryant took third place in the poll ahead of six-time champion Robert Morris, which came in fourth. Saint Francis took fifth ahead of Constitution State rivals Central Connecticut and Sacred Heart, who finished sixth and seventh, respectively.

Thumbnail Sketches on Seahawks' Five 2013 Preseason All-NEC Selections

Jarrett Dieudonne is a returning First-Team All-NEC performer who contributed mightily to the Seahawks' 2013 NEC Championship. The multi-skilled 6-1, 190-pounder recorded multiple tackles in 12 of the Seahawks' 13 games in 2012 and tied for first on the team with three interceptions. He tallied four or more tackles in seven games last season, highlighted by six-tackle contests against Monmouth (9/15) and Eastern Washington (12/1). A highlight of his season came in the stirring come-from-behind win over Holy Cross (11/10) when he recorded a 66-yard fumble recovery. Dieudonne is one of Wagner's four captains.

David Fredrickson is a 6-2, 290-pound Staten Island native who earned the starting center spot in 2011 preseason camp and has gone on to start the next 24 games, including all 13 during Wagner's 2012 NEC Title run. Cerebral and physical, the left-handed Fredrickson has displayed both consistency and durability throughout his Seahawk career and is one of the unquestioned leaders of the Seahawk offense. Fredrickson is one of Wagner's four captains.

David Lopez is one of the top kickers in Seahawk history and returns as a fifth-year senior having converted 35-of-56 over his accomplished career. The 35 made field goals rank tied for second in Wagner history while his 100 made PAT's rank fifth. In helping lead Wagner to the 2012 NEC title, Lopez connected on 16-of-21 field goal attempts, a 76.2 percentage, with a long of 51. In field goal tries of 39 yards or less, Lopez was 11-of-12. He was also successful on 32-of-35 PATs. As a sophomore in 2010, Lopez earned Second-Team All-NEC honors.

Bryant Watts is a physically-gifted athlete and a huge target at 6-5, 250 who runs extremely well. In addition to being an effective receiver, Watts uses his strength and wide frame to gain leverage at the point of attack, which allows him to be an effective blocker. In 2012, he appeared in all 13 games, starting in eight, and caught six passes for 83 yards and two touchdowns. He recorded career highs with three receptions for 48 yards and a touchdown to key a 31-21 win over Bryant (9/29).

Dominique Williams has evolved into one of the household names in the NEC as well as on the national stage and enters the 2013 season with 3,308 career rushing yards, which ranks fourth in the Seahawk all-time annals. The strong, agile 5-9, 205-pounder rushed for 1,228 yards last season, placing him seventh on the school's all-time single-season list, just 10 yards behind the sixth-highest mark of 1,338 that he gained in 2011. A First-Team All-NEC choice in 2012, his 105.6 yards per game in 2012 rushing ranked third in the NEC through the end of the regular season, as did his 133.3 all-purpose yards per game. Williams is one of Wagner's four captains.

Williams Becomes Wagner's First Three-Time Captain, Joined by Dieudonne, Ortiz, Fredricksons 2013 FB Captains

Fifth-year senior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgton, NJ/ Milford Academy) has become the first player in Wagner history to be voted a team captain for a third time and will be joined by red-shirt juniors Jarrett Dieudonne (Fort Lauderdale, FL/ Dillard/ Purdue), David Fredrickson (Staten Island, NY/ Poly Prep/Idaho St.), and Yamir Ortiz (River Vale, NJ/ Pascack Valley), as captains of the 2013 Seahawks.

Williams was first named a captain in 2011 and became the 14th Seahawk to ever be a two-time captain last season in 2012, and now stands alone as the sole three-time captain in the 83-year history of Wagner football which began in 1927. For Dieudonne, Fredrickson and Ortiz, this marks their first season as captains.



One of five Seahawks named to the 2013 Preseason All-NEC team, Williams has evolved into one of the household names, both in the NEC as well as on the national stage. A highlight of his season came in the stirring come-from-behind win over Holy Cross (11/10) when he recorded a 66-yard fumble recovery.

Cerebral and physical, the left-handed Fredrickson has displayed both consistency and durability throughout his Seahawk career and the 6-2, 290-pounder is one of the unquestioned team leaders both on the field and in the locker room.

Ortiz has been a somewhat under the radar-type player who quietly contributed to the success of Wagner's recent veteran-laden teams. In 2012, the 6-1, 240-pound defensive end developed into a playmaking force in helping the Seahawks capture the NEC Championship. Now entering his fourth season in the program, Ortiz is poised for a potential breakout season in 2013 after recording 22 tackles and three sacks while starting all 13 games during Wagner's title run.

WALT HAMELINE, HEAD COACH

Walt Hameline completed one of the most magical and memorable seasons as Wagner Athletic Director/Head Football Coach in 2012, continues to amass an astounding record of achievement and consistency in college athletics while approaching each day with relentless energy, passion and enthusiasm.

In 2012, Hameline led the Seahawks to their first-ever Northeast Conference (NEC) Football Championship with a thrilling 23-17 come-from-behind win over Duquesne on November 17, 2012, while clinching a berth in the 2012 D-I Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Championship. The win personified the Green & White's as Wagner began the campaign with three straight losses, before winning its next nine games.

The eighth victory came in the NEC title win over Duquesne, with the ninth straight coming the following week over Colgate in the first round of the NAAs. The Seahawks then went to Eastern Washington where they stood shoulder-to-shoulder with the No. 4 team in the nation in the Second Round game, seizing a third quarter lead before falling 29-19.

In defying the odds throughout its triumphant march to the school's first-ever NEC title and the conference's first-ever NCAA FCS win, Wagner compiled a 9-4 record, including a 7-1 mark in the NEC. The Seahawks finished the season ranked 21st in The Sports Network Top-25 Poll and 22nd in the FCS Coaches Poll, marking the first time an NEC team has ended the season with an appearance in both official Top-25 polls.

The accolades soon began to pour in for Hameline. After being named the NEC Football Coach of the Year, he was tabbed the 2012 FCS National Coach of the Year by both *College Football News (CFN)* and the *College Sports Journal (CSJ)*. Hameline was also named as one of the 20 nominees for the *Eddie Robinson Award*, which since 1987 has been awarded annually to college football's top head coach in the Division I FCS.

Shortly after receiving the news of his twin National Coach of the Year honors, Hameline, who owns a 213-127-2 (.626) record in his 32-year career, was inducted into the *New Jersey Sports Writers Association Hall of Fame*.

Not to be lost amid the host of accomplishments by the 2012 team, is the fact that Hameline helped lead the school to a 30-0 victory at nationally-ranked Albany in the week following Hurricane Sandy. After returning from the state capital, Hameline joined many of his team members aiding in the recovery efforts in some of Staten Island's hardest-hit areas.

In the 2012 home opener against Monmouth, Wagner College Stadium was renamed Hameline Field in his honor.

Additionally, Hameline had his first former player crack the NFL ranks when Julian Stanford made the Jacksonville Jaguars' 53-man roster, becoming the first Seahawk in the NFL since Wagner Hall of Famer Rich Kotite suited up for the New York Giants in 1972.

Two years ago, on November 6, 2010, Hameline became just the eighth active FCS coach to win 200 games with a 31-20 victory over Monmouth, is 54th on the all-time NCAA wins list (any level) and one of just 36 coaches to win 200 games at one school.

Hameline has also had tremendous success in his role as Athletic Director of the Seahawks' now 20-sport program. In April of 2012, Hameline, who has enjoyed a long and proud association with metropolitan area basketball and the National Invitation Tournament (NIT), was the recipient of the 2012 Distinguished Service Award from the *Metropolitan Basketball Writers Association (MBWA)*. Distinguished Service Awards are presented by the MBWA to individuals that have made significant contributions to college basketball.

For more than two decades, he was one of five metro area athletic directors, along with his peers at NYU, Fordham, Manhattan and St. John's, who helped comprise the Metropolitan Intercollegiate Basketball Association (MIBA). Along with NIT Executive Director Jack Powers, Hameline helped select teams for both preseason and postseason NIT's, while directing other functions such as the NIT All-Star Summer Tour.

Under Hameline's leadership, the Wagner Athletic Department has undergone an ambitious expansion in both sport offerings and facility improvements. Hameline was influential in establishing the Seahawk Golf Classic, and the Seahawk Club, a pair of initiatives aimed at increasing funds for the scholarship endowment and complete financial support for the athletic department.

Most recently, under his tutelage and thanks to the generosity of one of his former offensive linemen, Marc Lebovitz, Hameline Field was the beneficiary of a striking state-of-the-art video scoreboard in 2010. Lebovitz, a member of the Seahawks' 1987 D- III National Championship team and a 1991 Wagner graduate, is now a highly-successful New Jersey businessman. The scoreboard represents a major facility upgrade for the football, women's soccer, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse and men's & women's track and field programs.

Prior to the momentous 2012 season, Hameline's overall coaching ledger included five ECAC Titles and three NCAA Tournament Appearances, highlighted by 1987 NCAA Division III National Championship. In the Championship Season of 1987, Wagner posted a 19-3 win over heavily-favored Dayton



in the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl to earn the title. Against one of the toughest schedules in the nation, the Seahawks rolled to a 13-1 record, winning more games than any college football team in America.

The 1987 team earned the school's second Lambert Trophy, symbolic of football superiority in the East among Division III schools, and ECAC Team of the Year recognition. Following the season, in addition to Sports Illustrated writing a feature story, a host of national and regional organizations recognized Hameline, highlighted by his being named the Chevrolet National Coach of the Year. In 1990, just three years winning the school's only National Championship, Hameline became the winningest coach in school history.

The 62-year old administrator has been a key developer of the NEC, serving on numerous committees, and is a past president of the league. Nine years ago, Hameline was honored for his playing, coaching and administrative achievements when he was inducted into the Utica Sports Hall of Fame. In addition, Hameline was given the All-America Football Foundation Johnny Vaught Lifetime Achievement Award in 1998.

An outstanding defensive back at Brockport State, Hameline received his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education in 1975, and went on to earn his Master's Degree in education from the University of Albany in 1977.

Hameline resides in Colts Neck, NJ, with his wife, Debi, and they are the proud parents of daughters Kristen and Kelly.

Eddie Robinson Award, presented annually to the NCAA FCS National Coach of the Year following Fordham's magical campaign.

Masella has been a part of staffs that have won league titles at CCSU (2004, 2005), UMass (2003) and Louisiana Tech (2001). He and his wife Leslie-Ann are the proud parents of T.J. (17) and Jack (15).

Tom Masella returns for his second season as the Seahawks' offensive coordinator after helping the Green & White to the 2012 NEC Championship and a second round NCAA FCS appearance. Masella, who also serves as the program's Associate Head Coach, coached the quarterbacks a year ago while helping mentor Nick Doscher into a First-Team All-NEC selection. Masella is also the lead recruiter in the five boroughs of New York City.

A 1981 graduate, Masella played on the first Hameline-coached team at Wagner and, during his four years on Grymes Hill, intercepted 14 passes, ranking fourth on the Seahawk all-time list.

Masella began his coaching career with the Green & White as an assistant under Hameline from 1982-84, before serving as the defensive coordinator at the United States Merchant Marine Acad.

The Staten Island native has been a head coach at four different schools; Fairfield, Boston University, Central Connecticut and Fordham. In addition to Wagner and the Merchant Marine Academy, he has also served in various assistant coaching roles at UConn, UMass and Louisiana Tech.

Masella came to Wagner after serving as the head coach at Fordham, where in 2007 he guided the Rams to an 8-4 record, the Patriot League Championship and a berth in the FCS playoffs while being named the conference and AFCA Regional Coach of the Year.

He also was named the *New York Daily News* Bronx Sportsperon of the Year as well as being a finalist for the

In 2012, Jeremiah Brown and Julian Stanford inked free agent deals with the Jacksonville Jaguars while Quintin Anderson was picked up by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

The Michigan native handles the Seahawk recruiting north of New York City, in Westchester, Rockland, Putnam and Dutchess Counties. He also leads Wagner's efforts in Maryland and Virginia. Hall has also recruited up and down the eastern seaboard as well as in the Midwest (Michigan, Illinois, Minnesota, Wisconsin).

Hall, who graduated from UMass in 2003 with a dual degree in sociology and education, and his wife Ayesha are the proud parents of Malik (3) and Kayah (1).

Malik Hall was the mastermind behind the NEC's No. 1 defense in 2012, spearheading Wagner to the league title and a second-round NCAA FCS Playoff appearance.

Statistically, the numbers produced by the 2012 defense reflect both dominance and balance as the Seahawks led the NEC in scoring defense (16.3) and total defense (312.2) and pass defense efficiency (115.1) while ranking second in pass defense (168.2) and third in rushing defense (144.0).

Hall is in his second stint at Wagner and enters his third season overall on the Seahawk sideline. In 2010, his first as the Green & White's Defensive Coordinator, saw a marked improvement in all facets of the defense. He then coached at UMass, in 2011, before returning as the Wagner Defense Coordinator last season.

In his tenure with the Seahawks, Hall has seen four of his pupils sign NFL free agent contracts. C.O. Prime became the latest NFL player, signing with the Indianapolis Colts.

Much of the groundwork that led to the 2012 NEC title was laid in 2011 under Brinson's direction as defensive coordinator. That season, Wagner led the NEC in three different categories: rushing defense (141.1 yards per game), red zone defense (71.8%) and takeaways (29).

Brinson arrived on Grymes Hill in 2011 after serving three years as an assistant at Columbia and four at Rhode Island. Previously to that he spent four seasons at Bryant and Kean. Following his 1995 graduation from the University of Rhode Island, Brinson began his coaching career as a student assistant/running backs coach with the Rams.

Tony Brinson enters his third season at Wagner and his 20th overall as a collegiate coach. Brinson covers the Seahawk recruiting efforts throughout Northern New Jersey.

In his three seasons at Wagner, Brinson has tutored four Seahawks that went on to sign NFL Free Agent contracts. Following the 2011 season, Julian Stanford signed a free agent deal with the Jacksonville Jaguars after earning first-team All-NEC accolades. Stanford garnered a spot on the team's final roster and went on to play in all 16 games, making six starts

Two of Stanford's teammates, also tutored by Brinson, inked NFL free agent deals following the 2011 season in safety Jeremiah Brown and DE Quintin Anderson and were in training camps with the Jaguars and Tampa Bay Buccaneers, respectively.

In Wagner's historic run to the 2012 NEC title and FCS Playoffs, linebacker C.O. Prime recorded a team-best 98 tackles and earned second-team All-NEC honors. Last April, the 6-1, 255-pound Prime inked a deal with the Indianapolis Colts.

In 2005, Patterson served as wide receiver coach at Central Connecticut, after spending 2004 on the staff at Leon High School in Tallahassee, FL.

Patterson also possesses professional coaching experience. In 2007, he completed a Minority Coaching Internship with the New York Giants, working with the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

In the secondary, Fullen tutored ball-hawking First-Team All-NEC cornerback Jarrett Dieudonne, who paced the Green & White with 11 pass breakups and three interceptions.

Fullen covers recruiting for Central New Jersey and Eastern Pennsylvania for the Seahawks

After spending one season as Linebackers Coach/Video Coordinator at Brockport State, Fullen served two years as a member of the Fordham coaching staff.

In his first years with the Rams, he handled all aspects of video editing and film exchanges, before taking over as running backs coach in spring in 2008. That season he helped develop running back Xavier Martin into the Patriot League's leading rusher.

Prior to arriving at Fordham, Fullen served as an assistant coach at Arizona Western College, where he was the special teams coordinator/running backs coach from January through May of 2007. Previous to that Fullen was an assistant coach at Cortland State for two seasons. Ben Martin begins his first season on Grymes Hill as Wagner's offensive line coach after serving as running backs coach at Princeton last season.

Martin will cover recruiting for Southern New Jersey, Sections 5 and 6 in New York, Eastern Pennsylvania, along with his home state of Massachusetts.

In 2012, Martin was an integral part of a Princeton program that posted its biggest turnaround in more than 20 years. The Tigers went 5-5 in Martin's one season there, including a 4-3 Ivy League record. These marks came one year after Princeton won just one game the year before. Last season the Tigers rushed for 100-plus yards in nine games (out of 10), headed by a 262-yard effort vs. Lafayette.

Martin has been an assistant coach for four collegiate programs since 2007, highlighted by a two-year stint as Offensive Quality Control Coach at Texas A&M under Mike Sherman, who won three NFC North titles while as head coach of the Green Bay Packers.

Prior to his tenure at Texas A&M, Martin spent the 2008 and 2009 seasons as the run-game/recruiting coordinator at Merrimack, where he helped develop one of the nation's most prolific Division II offenses. During his second year, when the Warriors won the NE-10 Championship, his rushing attack paced the conference

in scoring, total and rushing offense. Merrimack averaged 482.6 yards of total offense and 251.6 yards of rushing offense per game, figures that both ranked among the top-five in the nation.

Martin began his coaching career at Curry College (MA) as an offensive line/tight ends coach, helping the school to a conference title in 2007.

Before embarking on his collegiate coaching career, Martin was a standout offensive lineman at Trinity College (CT), where he helped the Bantams set a NESCAC record win streak while winning three conference titles prior to his 2005 graduation.

Justin Hinds is in his second season at Wagner and will coach the defensive line in 2013.

In 2012, the Seahawk defensive line performed at a high level all season and played a pivotal role in the winning the NEC title and advancing to the Second Round of the NCAA FCS Playoffs.

Hinds was also instrumental in the development of Daevonte Barnett, who earned Freshman All-American honors by the College Sports Journal while recording 34 tackles and 2.5 sacks.

A four-year member of the Rowan University football team, Hinds served as captain of the 2008 Profs and was the team's senior class representative that year.

He also represented the school in 2008 at the NCAA Student Athlete Leadership Conference and was a member of the Student Athlete Advisory Committee and the Rowan Accounting Mentorship Program.

Hinds began his career as the defensive line coach at his alma mater in 2009, before taking over as defensive coordinator at Plainfield HS (NJ) in 2010, where he managed a staff of six coaches. In 2011, he coached at Woodbridge High School (NJ) while assisting with the strength and conditioning program. Steven King enters his second season as running backs coach in 2013 after guiding Wagner's potent ground game a year ago.

In 2012, the Seahawk running game, keyed by junior Dominique Williams' 1,228-yard campaign, helped key the first NEC Football Title in school history and a trip to the Second Round of the NCAA FCS Playoffs.

For the year, the 5-9,200-pound Williams totaled 1,228 yards on the ground, placing him seventh on the school's all-time single-season list, just 10 yards behind his 2011 mark of 1,338 set in 2011.

Following the season, Wagner became the first NEC school to finish ranked in both Major Top 25-Polls, as the Seahawks were 21st in the FCS Sports Network Poll and 22nd in the Coaches FCS Poll.

A native of Hempstead, NY, King currently handles recruiting throughout Long Island.

King arrived at Wagner after spending the 2011 season as wide receiver coach at Nassau Community College. Prior to his time at Nassau, King served as the running backs and defensive backs coach at East Meadow (NY) High School from 2007-2011.

Before joining the coaching ranks, King played for four years at the University At Buffalo, where he won the Bulls' Most Improved Player Award as a sophomore. He led the team in rushing yards his junior season, and in rushing touchdowns in both his junior and senior seasons.

The 6-2, 225-pound Stanford earned a spot on the team's final roster and went on to make a big impact on special teams early in the season which led to his earning a spot in the starting lineup in six of Jacksonville's 16 games.

Staten Island, NY – Fifth-year senior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Bridgeton/ rushed for 162 yards on 32 carries and the Wagner defense turned up the intensity in the second half as the Seahawks overcame a 21-7 halftime deficit by outscoring Georgetown 21-0 in the second half in posting a 28-21 win in the season opener for both teams at Hameline Field.

With Wagner trailing 21-14, redshirt sophomore cornerback Deangelo James (Miami, FL/ American Senior) turned in the defensive play of the game, intercepting a pass from quarterback Isaiah Kempf along the left sideline and returning it 24 yards for a touchdown to tie the game at 21-21 with 11:58 left.

The fired-up Seahawk defense then forced the Hoyas into a three and out, resulting in a punt that gave Wagner good field position at its own 48. The Green & White then methodically worked the ball down the field, going 58 yards in 15



plays, which took 7:22 off of the clock. With 5:21 left to play, Wagner faced a 4th-and-1 at the Hoya 24. After initially sending the field goal unit out, head coach Walt Hameline called time out and sent his offense back out onto the field.

Following the timeout, Williams blasted for three yards over the right side for the first down. Three more runs by Williams netted 18 yards, giving the Seahawks a first-and-goal at the Hoya 10. After a Wagner holding penalty and two rushes for 11 yards by freshman running back Matthias McKinnon (Albany, NY/ Bishop Maginn/Jireh Prep (NC), Williams swept around right end for a six-yard score to give Wagner a 28-21 lead and the Seahawk defense did the rest.

Wagner won the opening coin toss and deferred to the second half, choosing to put its defense on the field first. Georgetown then quickly went to work from its own 16, marching 84 yards in 13 plays in 4:58, culminating in a five-yard touchdown run by Kempf to make it 7-0 with 10:08 left in the opening quarter. Kempf found wide receiver Jake DeCicco three times for 48 yards, including a 24-yard strike to the Seahawk five which set up his own TD run.

Following an exchange of punts, Wagner took over at its own 38 and put together an eight-play, 62-yard drive capped by a nine-yard touchdown pass from redshirt junior quarterback Matt Misley (Park Ridge, NJ/ Park Ridge) to senior wide receiver Tyree Watkins (Camden, NJ/ Camden), a Duke transfer seeing his first action as a Seahawk. For Misley, the touchdown pass was the first of his career and tied the game at 7-7 with 3:38 left in the first quarter.

The Hoyas regained the lead on a crisp 14-play, 71-yard drive that 5:04, spanned the first and second quarters, and was culminated in a two-yard touchdown run by Jo'el Kimpela that put Georgetown on top 14-7. The defenses then held serve as the teams combined for five consecutive punts. A punt by Georgetown's Matt McMura set in motion a sequence that resulted in the Hoyas seizing control of the game before halftime.

With 4:44 to play in the half, McMura sailed a 41-yarder that was downed at the Wagner two. After a Seahawk three-and-out, Misley, who doubles as Wagner's punter, got off a 42-yard boot that was downed at the Seahawk 48. Kempf went to the air on first down, finding wide receiver Justin Hill for 20 yards to the Wagner 28. Facing third-and-four at the Wagner 22, Kimpela shook loose for

18 yards to make it first and goal at the four. Two plays later, Kempf found his tight end Daniel Sprotte for a one-yard score to give the Hoyas a 21-7 lead and momentum heading into halftime.

Wagner took the opening kickoff of the second half and worked the ball to its own 41. Hameline then rolled the dice on a fourth-and-one, but McKinnon was stopped in his tracks as Georgetown took over at the Wagner 41 looking to add to its 21-7 lead and blow the game wide open. The Seahawk defense, however, had other ideas. After Kempf hit wide receiver Zack Wilke for five yards on first down to the Wagner 36, the Seahawk defense forced consecutive incompletions in forcing Georgetown to punt.

Following another exchange of punts, Wagner received a shot in the arm when redshirt sophomore James Howell (Brooklyn, NY/ Fort Hamilton) came up with a 19-yard punt return, working his way nimbly up the right sideline and giving the Seahawks possession at the Hoya 41. Three rushes by Williams, sandwiched around and incomplete pass, brought about 3rd-and-3 at the Georgetown 19.

What transpired next is one for the video archives. It began when Misley hit Watkins in the right flat for nine yards and, sensing the presence of two defensive backs closing quickly, the heady receiver then deftly tossed a lateral to a trailing Williams who covered the final nine yards, side-stepping a defender, en route to touchdown which cut the Seahawk deficit to 21-14 with 6:54 remaining in the third.

That's the way the score stayed until Williams came up with his game-changing pick-six early in the fourth quarter.

While Georgetown had its way in the first half, out-gaining Wagner 250-116 while picking up 15 first downs to the Seahawks' seven, the second half was all Wagner. The Seahawks' aggressive defense found a rhythm in the second stanza, limiting Georgetown to just 33 yards of offense and two first downs over the game's final 30 minutes. Conversely, Wagner managed 185 yard of second-half offense while picking up 10 first downs.

Staten Island, NY – In a game that featured a combined 851 yards of total offense, 83 points, 52 first downs and five lead changes, the Merrimack Warriors eked out a 42-41 victory over Wagner before 2,634 fans who witnessed the first-ever night game at Hameline Field.

Senior quarterback Joe Clancy completed 35-of-50 passes for 309 yards and four touchdowns, including the game-winner, a three-yard toss to wide receiver Shane Ferguson with 30 seconds to play that capped a 14-play, 96-yard drive.

For Wagner, fifth-year senior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Bridgeton/ Milford Academy) rushed for 110 yards on 25 carries and two touchdowns in breaking the century mark for the 22nd time in his 32-game career. Redshirt junior quarterback Matt Misley (Park Ridge, NJ/ Park Ridge) had a

In the second half, with the newly-installed permanent lighting system now taking full effect, Wagner opened with a bang as Williams took it in from 26 yards out to top off a crisp 8-play, 69-yard march to draw the Seahawks to within eight points at 28-20. This touchdown drive kicked off a 21-0 Seahawk surge, which mirrored the 21-0 second-half surge that Wagner put on Georgetown a week ago in posting a 28-21 comeback win.

Misley then found senior wide receiver Cody Morgan (Boston, MA/Syracuse/Milford) in the back of the end zone on a six-yard hook-up to draw Wagner to within one point at 28-27 at the 5:12 mark of the third quarter. The Misley to Morgan connection capped an 11-play, 89-yard drive.

The fired-up Seahawk defense then forced a three and out, leading to field position at the Merrimack 49 following a Warrior punt. From there it took Wagner 11 plays and 4:35 to find paydirt as Misley raced in from eight yards out to give the Seahawks their first lead of the night at 34-28 with 13:42 to go. After a promising Merrimack drive eventually ended with a punt, Wagner took over at its own 10-yard line. On first down, however, freshman running back McKinnon (Albany, NY/ Bishop McGinn/Jireh Prep) fumbled on first down with the Warriors recovering at the Seahawk 15. Five plays later, Clancy tossed a two-yard TD pass to senior tight end Greg Devine to put Merrimack back out in front, 35-34 with 8:15 left.

Undaunted, Misley led Wagner on a nine-play, 69-yard march with Williams knocking his way in from three yards out to put the Green & White back into the lead at 41-35. A blocking in the back penalty on Merrimack sent good feelings throughout the crowd and forced the Warriors to set up shop at their own four-yard line with just 4:59 to play.

Clancy then went to work, as Merrimack marched steadily up the field, en route to a clutch, well-executed drive that culminated in a three-yard TD pass from Clancy to Shane Ferguson who got open in the right flat. Nick Zwaan's sixth extra-point of the game gave Merrimack a 42-41 lead. Wagner would make things interesting by driving to midfield but the game ended when Misley was sacked and fumbled, setting off a Warrior celebration.



sparkling second half to finish with 174 yards passing and a touchdown while completing 16-of-28 passes. Misley's favorite target was senior wide receiver Tyree Watkins (Camden, NJ/ Camden), a transfer from Duke, who had six receptions for 89 yards. Fellow senior wide receiver Cody Morgan (Boston, MA/ Boston College HS/Syracuse/Milford) had three receptions for 33 yards and a touchdown. Making the third start of his career, Misley also ran the ball effectively in Wagner's read offense, gaining 98 yards on 16 carries.

Defensively, Wagner was led by redshirt freshman linebacker Najee Harris (Norristown, PA/ Norristown) who had a team and career-high nine tackles, while redshirt junior cornerback Jarrett Dieudonne (Fort Lauderdale, FL/ Dillard/Purdue) added eight stops. The Warriors, who compete at the Division II level in the Northeast-10 Conference, were led defensively by linebacker Jimmy Holland and defensive lineman Justin Hood who finished with 10 tackles apiece.

Merrimack jumped out of the gates quickly as Quinn McDonough returned the game's opening kickoff 97 yards for a touchdown to make it a 7-0 game 14 seconds into the contest. Ferguson with 30 seconds to play that capped a 14-play, 96-yard drive. Late in the first quarter, junior linebacker Trevor Loveland (Cherry Hill, NJ/ Cherry Hill West) caused a fumble that was recovered by redshirt junior defensive end Yamir Ortiz (River Dale, NJ/ Pascack Valley, NJ) at the Merrimack 13. On the very next play, Misley scampered in for his first career rushing touchdown in tying the game at 7-7.

The Warriors countered with a nine-play, 75-yard drive capped by a 13-yard TD pass from Clancy to wide receiver Frankie Dunn that made it 14-7 at the 1:31 mark of the first quarter. Merrimack opened a 21-7 lead early in the second quarter by marching 63 yards in 13 plays, with Clancy taking it from one yard out with 10:29 to go in the half.

The Seahawks would answer back with a 30-yard field goal by fifth-year senior David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage) to make it a 21-10 game. Merrimack then executed a quick strike six-play, 68-yard drive, in just 1:14, culminating in a Clancy 21-yard TD toss to wide receiver Jere Brown that made it 28-10. Wagner responded with a drive of its own that resulted in a 47-yard field goal by Lopez with 3:01 before halftime which made it a 28-13 game at intermission.

Syracuse, NY - After opening the season with losses to Big 10 foes Penn St. and Northwestern, Syracuse hit on all cylinders this afternoon in posting a 54-0 victory over Wagner in front of 33,299 fans at the Carrier Dome in the 2013 home opener for the Orange.

In gaining the first victory in the Scott Shafer Era as Syracuse head coach, the Orange moves to 1-2 while the Seahawks also saw their season record fall to 1-2. Shafer took over for Doug Marrone following the 2012 season after Marrone accepted the head coaching position of the NFL's Buffalo Bills.



Thanks to a smothering Syracuse defensive effort, Seahawk fifth-year senior All-American running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/ Bridgeton/ Milford Academy) was unable to showcase his vast array of skills as the Orange limited him to 34 yards on 17 carries.

Backup quarterback Terrel Hunt came off the bench and sparked Syracuse with five first-half touchdown drives to carry the Orange to a 37-0 halftime lead. For the afternoon, the sophomore signal-caller completed 15-of-18 passes for 265 yards and three touchdowns. In Syracuse's last two games combined, a September 7 matchup against Northwestern and today's matchup with Wagner, Hunt has been under center on seven drives which have resulted in six touchdowns and a field goal.

Hunt's favorite target vs. the Seahawks was wide receiver Jarrod West, who caught five balls for 147 yards and a score. Running back Jerome Smith gained 61 yards on 14 carries and ran for two scores to lead an Orange ground attack that 236 yards rushing on 48 carries. Through the air, Syracuse was 28-of-35 for 359 yards. Starting QB Drew Allen played sparingly, appearing at the outset and close of the game, and finished 8-of-11 for 62 yards and a touchdown.

After Allen took the first three series of the game, he departed in favor of Hunt with 7:07 left in the opening quarter and Syracuse ahead 3-0. While the Wagner defense appeared to have a bead on Allen, the tone and tenor of the game changed dramatically when Hunt entered. He immediately led a 12-play, 68-drive, capped by a two-yard run by Smith around the left side. After a missed extra point, Syracuse led 9-0.

On his next chance, Hunt led the Orange on a quick-strike three-play, 64-yard touchdown drive. Syracuse took over on its own 36 following a Wagner punt and the first play of the drive, Hunt hit West over the middle for 42 yards down to the Wagner 22. Following a holding penalty, Hunt then found running back Prince-Tyson Gully on a sideline route for a 30-yard score and a 16-0 Syracuse cushion with 14:01 remaining in the second quarter.

Following another Wagner three-and-out, Syracuse took over on its 4 and Hunt navigated 59 yards in eight plays, ending with a Smith eight-yard TD burst on a sweep to the left to make it a 23-0 lead. Running back Devante McFarlane then put the Orange on top 30-0 with a three-yard drive with 5:34 left in the half. Hunt finished the first 30 minutes with a

flourish, moving the Orange 73 yards in six plays, highlighted by a 41-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Christopher Clark for a 41-yard scoring strike with 2:20 left before intermission that made it 37-0.

Syracuse held a major statistical edge, outgaining the Seahawks in total yards by a margin of 595-87. The Orange, which held Wagner without a first down until the closing minutes of the first half, held a 27-5 advantage overall.

Under duress throughout, redshirt junior quarterback Matt Misley (Park Ridge, NJ/ Park Ridge), completed 4-of-11 passes for 11 yards and one interception while being sacked twice before giving way to redshirt freshman Chris Andrews (Queens, NY/ St. Joseph's/Valley Forge). The left-handed Andrews completed 1-of-8 passes for 14 yards while adding another 12 yards rushing on three carries. Andrews' lone completion went to redshirt freshman wide receiver Patrick Murphy (Staten Island, NY/ Tottenville). For the local product, it the first reception of his career.

Junior safety Nevon Williams (Teaneck, NJ/ Teaneck) recorded a game-high eight tackles for the Seahawks while redshirt freshman linebacker Najee Harris (Norristown, PA/ Norristown) and junior linebacker Greg Hilliard (Brockton, MA/Brockton/Suffield Academy/UMass) added seven stops apiece.

The crowd of 33,299 was the largest that Wagner has ever played in front of, topping the 18,128 who witnessed North Dakota State's 59-28 win on September 19, 2009. That game, played at the Fargodome in Fargo, ND, also marked the only other time that the Seahawks had played in a domed stadium prior to today. The only two current Seahawks who played in that game are fifth-seniors Williams and place-kicker David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage).

Newark, DE – Quarterback Trent Hurley completed 10-of-12 passes for 226 yards, and four touchdowns, three of which went to wide receiver Michael Johnson, as Delaware posted a 49-9 victory over Wagner under the lights at rain-soaked Delaware Stadium.

With the loss, the Seahawks fell to 1-3 on the season while the Blue Hens improve to 3-1. The Seahawks open Northeast



Conference play with a Homecoming tilt vs. Bryant on Saturday, September 28 at 1:00 pm.

In the past two weeks, Wagner has played in front of two of its three largest crowds ever. On September 14, 2013, the 33,299 fans at the Carrier Dome in Syracuse were the most to ever witness a Seahawk football game. Tonight's crowd of 15,723 is the third-largest crowd to attend a football game involving Wagner.

Fifth-year senior All-American running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/Bridgeton/Milford Academy) picked up 80 first-half rushing yards on 17 carries en route to a 25-carry, 120-yard evening. This marks the 23rd time in his 36-game Wagner career that Williams has eclipsed the century mark. The 5-9, 205-pound Williams entered the game ranked fifth among active FCS rushers with 3,614 yards on 724 carries (5.0 average).

Through the air, redshirt junior quarterback Matt Misley (Park Ridge, NJ/Park Ridge) was 14-of-28 for 138 yards. His favorite target was senior wide receiver Tyree Watkins (Camden, NJ/Camden/Duke), who had five receptions for 66 yards, all in the first half. Redshirt junior safety Blake Bascom (Monroe Township, NJ/Monroe) recorded a career and game-high 12 tackles for the Seahawks

Quarterback Brian Gehring, a transfer from Laney Junior College (CA) by way of Tigard, OR, led Wagner on a late drive that he capped with a one-yard touchdown

The Seahawks, who will be looking to defend their 2012 NEC

title, were picked No. 1 in the league's preseason poll while the Bulldogs were picked third.

Delaware marched 78 yards in six plays on the game's opening drive as Hurley hit tight end Nick Boyle on a 19-yard score to make it 7-0. Wagner answered with an 11-play, 51-yard drive that was capped by a 41-yard field goal by fifth-year senior kicker David Lopez (Plantation, FL/ American Heritage). On its first play following the ensuing kickoff, Hurley connected with Johnson on a 77-yard hook-up to make it 14-3.

That's the way the score remained until Johnson hauled in a 21-yard score to cap a four-play, 52-yard drive that made it a 21-3 game with 52 seconds remaining in the opening quarter. Blue Hen running back Jalen Randolph then ripped off a 14-yard TD run to open the second-half scoring at the 12:26 mark to widen the lead to 28-3. Johnson got behind the Seahawk secondary for a 31-yard TD reception with 5:34 to go in the quarter. Running back Andrew Pierce capped the first-half scoring with a seven-yard TD jaunt with 3:48 left in the half to give Delaware a 42-3 halftime lead. Hurley did not play in the second half as his 10-of-12 passing for 226 yards and four scores all came in the opening half. Pierce was the Blue Hens' leading ground-gainer on the evening with 63 yards on 12 carries.

Staten Island, NY – Redshirt freshman quarterback Chris Andrews (Queens, NY/St. Joseph's/Valley Forge Military Academy) accounted for 269 yards of offense off the bench for Wagner but it was not enough to offset the 173-yard rushing, three-touchdown day by Bryant's Paul Carnevari as the Bulldogs posted a 47-28 win on Homecoming at Hameline Field.

Bryant improves to 3-1, 1-0 in the Northeast Conference (NEC) on the season while the Seahawks, in dropping their fourth straight, fall to 1-4, 0-1 in league play.



Andrews was spectacular at times, completing 16-of-25 passes for 223 yards and three touchdowns – all career highs – while picking up another 46 yards and a touchdown on 17 rushing attempts. Senior wide receiver Tyree Watkins (Camden, NJ/Camden/Duke) had four receptions for 90 yards, including touchdown receptions of 67 and nine yards.

Fifth-year senior running back Dominique Williams (Bridgeton, NJ/Bridgeton/Milford Academy) gained 104 yards on 13 carries in topping the 100-yard rushing mark for the 24th time in his 37-game career.

Watkins was the recipient of the James Robb Memorial Offensive Player of the Game Award while junior linebacker Trevor Loveland (Cherry Hill, NJ/Cherry Hill West) earned the Nick Lia Memorial Defensive Player of the Game honor after recording a game-high 10 tackles including four tackles for loss a sack, and a blocked extra point.

Bryant, which now leads the all-time series with Wagner 4-2, Bryant galloped out to a 27-7 second-quarter lead, gaining points and momentum early when cornerback Bobby Rutland intercepted a pass thrown by Seahawk redshirt junior starting quarterback Matt Misley (Park Ridge NJ/Par Ridge) on the game's fourth play from scrimmage to give the Bulldogs possession at the Wagner 30. All-NEC wide receiver Jordan Harris gained 18 yards on a reverse and when Wagner was called for a facemask penalty, Bryant had the ball inside the 10, setting up a one-yard touchdown run by Canevari to make it 7-0.

After forcing a pair of Wagner punts, Bryant took over at the Seahawk 34 and marched to the Seahawk four but the Seahawks came up with a spirited goal-line stand as the Bulldogs settled for a 21-yard Tom Alberti field goal and a 10-0 lead. Bryant extended its lead to 17-0 in the second quarter when Harris took the handoff from quarterback Mike Westerhaus on an end-around, pulled up instead and hit fellow wide out Chad Ward in stride for a 49-yard completion. Canevari followed with an eight-yard touchdown jaunt.

Wagner needed just three plays to respond when Andrews came in at quarterback and hit Watkins along the left sideline for a 67-yard touchdown on the drive's third play to cut the deficit to 17-7. Alberti's second 21-yard field goal capped a nine-play, 45-yard drive to make it 20-7 and running back Ricardo McCray followed with a 16-yard TD reception, catching the ball in the right flat on at the 10 on a screen pass and doing the rest with his legs. The Westerhaus to McCray connected staked the Bulldogs to a 27-7 lead at the 1:05 mark of the first half.

The Seahawks responded with an impressive nine-play 82-yard touchdown drive as Andrews executed the two-minute offense to perfection finding Watkins for a nine-yard score with six seconds left in the half to give the Green & White momentum and a 27-14 deficit at halftime.

At the outset of the second half Wagner appeared to have life as the Bulldogs fumbled the exchange on the opening snap with Seahawk sophomore defensive end Mike Mentor (North Bergen NJ/North Bergen/Fork Union) coming out with it from the bottom of the pile at the Bulldog 24. With the crowd of 2,493 now on its feet, the Seahawks were poised to possibly make it a one-score game. But Andrews was stripped by Bulldog linebacker

Colin McNamara on the very next play, cornerback Michael Johnson scooped up the loose ball and raced 78 yards for a touchdown, a momentum-swinging play that put Bryant on top 34-14.

Bryant slammed the door when cornerback Sam Sammons made a diving interception along the sideline to give Bryant the ball on the Wagner 27. Three plays later, Canevari scampered 11 yards into the end for his third score of the game which made it a commanding 41-14 Bryant struck quickly on its next possession as Williams burst up the left sideline for 49 yards, setting up a 28-yard touchdown run by Andrews which made it 41-21. Canevari found the end zone three plays later for his third touchdown of the game, and when Loveland came up with the blocked PAT Bryant led 47-21.

McCray opened the fourth quarter with a four-yard TD run to put the Bulldogs in front 47-21. The Seahawks countered with another quick scoring drive, needing just four plays to cover 70 yards. The big play was a 29-yard hook-up from Andrews to junior wide receiver Anthony Carrington (Toms River NJ/Toms River) on first down which had 15 yards added to it on a late hit, making it first down at the Bulldog 26. Two plays later, Andrews hit Carrington on a 10-yard touchdown strike to make it a 47-28 game with 10:50 to go. The Bryant defense took over from there as this proved to be the final points scored in the game.

The teams combined for 844 yards of total offense with the Bulldogs finishing with 441 while the Seahawks gained 403 yards. Westerhaus was 9-of-20 passing for 91 yards. Maduka Nwanekezi and Sebastian Amedee led a Bryant defense, which recorded five sacks with seven tackles apiece.

Seahawk redshirt junior cornerback Jarrett Dieudonne (Fort Lauderdale FL/Dillard/Purdue) turned in an unsung performance coming up with seven tackles while limiting the explosive Harris to two receptions for 13 yards.
