Wagner-Saint Francis U: Scene Setter

The Wagner College Seahawks (5-5, 3-2 NEC) will be gunning for a winning season and a 4-2 final NEC record when they host the NEC Champion Saint Francis U Red Flash (7-3, 5-0 NEC) who clinched the league title with last week's 31-21 win over

Central Connecticut. With a victory over second-place Duquesne (4-1) in hand, the Red Flash, regardless of today's outcome, have guaranteed themselves their first trip to the NCAA Division I FCS playoffs.

Seahawks Coming Off Impressive 40-5 Win at Robert Morris

Junior quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) threw for 258 yards, senior running back Matthias McKinnon (Albany, NY / Bisho Maginn / Jireh Prep [NC] added 88 yards on the ground, and the Seahawks took advantage of three interceptions, including a pick-six from sophomore linebacker Santoni Graham (Arlington, VA / Bishop O'Connell / Fork Union Military Academy), in earning a dominant 40-5 victory at Robert Morris last week.

Something's Gotta Give

Wagner, which features the top-ranked scoring offense (29.4 ppg) in conference games, averages a league-high 6.1 yards per play against NEC competition. Saint Francis U, meanwhile, in five games against NEC teams this season, has limited conference foes to league lows in both points per game (12.2) and yards per play (4.0).

The Coaches

Wagner

Jason Houghtaling (say it Ho-tal-ling) is in his second season as the head coach of the Seahawks and, at age 35, is the third-youngest head coach in the FCS. He took over for Walt Hameline, who announced at the end of the 2014 season that he would be stepping down as head coach while remaining as Seahawk athletic director.

Houghtaling (6-15) was the Seahawks' associate head coach and offensive coordinator when the Green & White claimed a share of the 2014 NEC title (with Sacred Heart), and overall, has spent seven years as a Wagner assistant. In his final three seasons as offensive coordinator (2011, 2012, 2014), the Seahawks amassed a 16-6 NEC record with league titles in two of those three years. In 2014, the Seahawks' offense ranked No. 4 nationally in time of possession and did not commit a turnover in the final three games of the season. Houghtaling served as offensive coordinator at Cornell in 2013 before returning to Grymes Hill as associate head coach/offensive coordinator.

Saint Francis U

Chris Villarrial, a former National Football League All-Pro Offensive Lineman has guided Saint Francis U to its first-ever NEC Championship in 2016. In his sixth season as the head coach at SFU, Villarrial sports a record of xx-xx with the Red Flash. He was named the 25th head coach of the Saint Francis University football program on December 20, 2009. After serving one year as the offensive coordinator under predecessor Dave Opfar, Villarrial will enter his sixth season at the helm of the Saint Francis football program in 2015. The football program continued its renaissance in 2014, again matching its highest win total in the FCS era with five victories. That marks the third consecutive season with five wins for the Red Flash and the Flash's third straight season with a .500-record in NEC play, a first for the program since joining the NEC in 1996.

THIS IS WAGNER COLLEGE

As tenacious as any Seahawk, Wagner College enjoys a bucolic perch atop Grymes Hill overlooking Manhattan and the other boroughs of New York City. Founded in 1883 as a Lutheran proseminary, Wagner has evolved to become an independent residential liberal arts college enrolling a capacity of over 2,000 students. The location of the College above the gateway to one of the world's greatest financial and cultural capitals was the work of alumnus Frank Sutter who convinced the College's Board of Trustees to relocate Wagner here from Rochester in 1918. In this, the Rev. Sutter and the trustees were extraordinarily prescient. Their wisdom provided Wagner with a distinct geographical advantage over all other all liberal arts colleges in the country. Wagner is New York State's southernmost college and its 105 park-like acres represent the highest elevation on the eastern seaboard from Maine to Key West Florida.

The College's signature curriculum – the Wagner Plan for the Practical Liberal Arts – capitalizes on the best of a traditional, suburban, liberal arts college campus and the infinite array of educational opportunities afforded by New York City. Students intern in the world's leading financial institutions. They observe and experience diversity from the sophisticated workings of the United Nations to melting pots of multicultural neighborhoods. They circulate in the city's unparalleled creative environment of museums, media, and performing arts. This is their laboratory. They immerse themselves and are inspired by the city's sheer energy.

The contrast between the frenetic life of the city and the almost pastoral setting of the campus is the perfect metaphor for the melding of experiential and theoretical education that is the hallmark of The Wagner Plan. In small learning communities, students and faculty explore the conceptual foundations of the arts, humanities, and sciences. The faculty challenges students to consider new ideas, to master new skills and technologies, and to reflect and draw meaning from what they have experienced in and out of the classroom.

A lush canopy of mature maples and oaks shades Wagner's 105-acre campus of manicured lawns and gardens; historic and modern buildings; and sweeping views of Manhattan, Brooklyn, and New York Harbor. No wonder Wagner students voted their campus Most Beautiful in the Princeton Review's Poll in 2005. The carefully tended campus is yet one more manifestation of the nurturing environment Wagner provides its students.

Movie companies have frequently used the campus as a classic college setting, most recently for a movie titled "School of Rock" starring Jack Black (Shallow Hal). The picturesque campus was also used in a fall 2001 television series, The Education of Max Bixford, starring Richard



Dreyfus and as the site of a prospective private military school in the HBO series, The Sopranos. The school was also used as a backdrop for current shows, Rescue Me and Law & Order.

Since the adoption of the Wagner Plan in 1997, enrollment has increased by nearly 40 percent and student quality as measured by high school average and SAT scores have improved as well. Once largely a commuter campus, now 82 percent of all undergraduates live on campus in residence halls that offer "million dollar" views. Though continuing to serve students from metropolitan New York, the college draws most of its enrollment from beyond the immediate region.

By every measure – enrollment, endowment, and national reputation – Wagner is ascending the ranks of America's strongest small colleges that blend the liberal arts with a commitment to service and preparation for the professions.

Campus life includes the array of sports provided by an NCAA Division I program which is housed in a 93,000-square-foot sports center featuring an extensive fitness center, an indoor NCAA swimming pool and a basketball arena. A football and track & field stadium showcases a variety of playing fields throughout the campus including baseball, softball, lacrosse and soccer venues.

Wagner's alumni include Broadway Tony award winners, movie stars, film producers, playwrights, and Fortune 500 CEO's including the chairman of GE Investments, the chairman of Dupont Europe, the chairman Emeritus of The Oppenheimer Management Company and the chairman of the New York Power Authority.

Visitors to and residents of New York City alike enjoy access to a rich and diverse array of museums, cultural organizations, arts performances, sports teams, societies and attractions. Some of the best and most famous attractions in the world call New York City home. ATHLETIC HIGHLIGHTS

- The Spring 2016 season will go down as one of the most successful in the long and rich history of Wagner Athletics as three Seahawk teams - Women's Water Polo, Women's Lacrosse and Men's Golf - earned conference championships and went on to compete in NCAA postseason competition. For Water Polo, this marked the third consecutive year that head coach Chris Radmonovich has led the Seahawks to the MAAC Championship. Women's lacrosse, under first-year head coach Katie Rowan, and men's golf, led by veteran head coach Christopher Fourman, claimed their first-ever NEC crowns, and ensuing NCAA bids, in the history of their programs.
- The Wagner men's basketball team built a 14-point halftime lead and withstood a late St. Bonaventure rally in earning a 79-75 victory over the Bonnies of the Atlantic 10 Conference in the first round of the 2016 National Invitation Tournament (NIT).
- Senior-to-be Anu Nihipali made Wagner women's swimming & diving program history on June 27, becoming the first Seahawk to compete at the 2016 U.S. Olympic Team Trials, held at the Century Link Center in Omaha, NE.

INSTITUTIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

- Wagner College is a private liberal arts college located in Staten Island, New York, with a fulltime equivalent enrollment of approximately 2,000. Through its signature four-year undergraduate curriculum, the Wagner Plan for the Practical Liberal Arts, and its location in New York City, the College offers students a comprehensive educational program that is anchored in the liberal arts, experiential and co-curricular learning, interculturalism, interdisciplinary studies and service to society. Greg Senat: Two-Sport Athlete

A three-year member of the Wagner men's basketball team, who contributed to Wagner's 2016 NEC regular season basketball championship team, Greg Senat (Elmont, NY / Elmont / Marianapolis Prep [CT]) joined the Seahawk football team in March, 2016 and has started the first two games of the season at right tackle. A power forward on the hardwood, the 6-8, 280-pound Senat competed at tight end for two years during his high school career. A three-sport athlete, who also competed in lacrosse, in addition to basketball and football at Elmont HS, Senat was a member of the Spartans' jayvee football team as a sophomore in 2009 before being elevated to the varsity as a junior in 2010. He then transferred to Marianapolis Prep in 2010 where he focused solely on basketball.



Senat's Height, Leaping Ability Pay Dividends

Senior offensive lineman Greg Senat (Elmont, NY / Elmont / Marianapolis Prep [CT]), a two-sport athlete who doubles as a power forward on the Seahawk basketball team, used his 6-8 height and leaping ability to deliver a key special teams play, partially blocking a first-half field goal attempt in the 25-21 comeback win at Central Connecticut (10/15).



Kicker James Cooper Moving Up On Single-Season, Career Lists

With his 2-of-2 effort on field goal tries last week at Robert Morris, James Cooper, a senior in his first season as a Seahawk after transferring from Temple, is now 15-of-17 for the season, including 12-of-12 from 30 to 39 yards. Cooper has now made seven straight field goals which is his longest streak of the season as earlier this season, he connected on six consecutive earlier this year.

Getting Better, Getting Younger

Not only are the Green & White significantly improved over last season but the Seahawks are also a much younger football team than in 2015. A total of 11 different Seahawks, including seven on the defensive side of the ball, have been in the starting lineup for the first time in their Wagner careers this season.

Second Time Over 40 Points This Season

Wagner's 40-5 win at Robert Morris last was the second time the Seahawks have hit the 40-point mark this season as Wagner earned a 45-20 win over Sacred Heart back on October 1. The top-ranked offense in the NEC this year in conference games at 29.4. This marks the first time since the 2009 season that the Seahawks have scored 40 or more points in a game two times.

Prior to this season, the last time Wagner reached the 40-point plateau was on September 6, 2012 when the Seahawks totaled 41 in a 42-41 loss to Merrimack. The last time that Wagner had scored 40 vs. an FCS opponent prior to this year was on November 19, 2011 when the Seahawks earned a 44-29 win at Monmouth.

Harris, Owens Named 2016 Team Captains

Najee Harris (Norristown, PA/ Norristown) and tight end Ryan Owens (Gainesville, NY / Letchworth), a pair of graduate students, will serve as captains for the 2016 Seahawks. In 2015, Harris finished second on the team in tackles with 58, including 46 solo stops. The 6-1 220-pound Harris was the team-leader in tackles for loss with 10, which included four sacks. In addition, he recorded two interceptions, forced one fumble and was responsible for six pass deflections and four pass breakups. In the season finale at Sacred Heart (11/21), Harris registered a career-high 10 tackles, including six solo stops and one sack. Owens is coming off of a 2015 campaign that saw him earn Second-Team All-Northeast Conference (NEC) honors. The 6-3, 235-pound Owens demonstrated his athleticism and versatility in leading all NEC tight ends in both receptions (29) and receiving yards (353), both of which paced Wagner as well, in addition to averaging 12.2 yards per catch. His top statistical game came at home vs. Bryant (11/7), when he registered career highs with eight catches for 131 yards, highlighted by a career-long 43-yard touchdown reception.

He also played 18 games in 2013-14 with the Detroit Lions and had two stints in 2015 on the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' practice squad before coming to the Jets.

Head Coach Jason Houghtaling

Former Wagner associate head coach/offensive coordinator **Jason Houghtaling** (hO - Tail- Ling) , was elevated to head football coach on November 25, 2014 and will enter his second season at the helm of the Seahawk program in 2016.



Houghtaling took over for Walt Hameline, who served in the dual role as Seahawk athletic director and head football coach for 34 years, before announcing that he was stepping down from his role as head coach. Hameline remains as Wagner’s athletic director.

Prior to his appointment as head coach, Houghtaling spent seven seasons on the Wagner sidelines, serving as offensive coordinator during Wagner’s 2012 and 2014 Northeast Conference (NEC) title runs, while in-between, spending the 2013 season as offensive coordinator at Cornell

In his last three seasons as Wagner’s offensive coordinator, the Seahawks have amassed a 16-6 NEC record with league titles in two of the last three seasons. The Green & White staged a dramatic 23-20 come-from-behind victory at Bryant, marching 65 yards in the waning minutes for the game-winning touchdown that gave the Seahawks a 7-4 record, a 5-1 NEC mark, and a share of the 2014 NEC title.

The 2014 Seahawk offense followed a similar formula to the 2012 Seahawks, finishing the regular season ranked No. 4 nationally in time of possession (33:02), while not committing a single turnover in the last three games of the season.

When he returned to Grymes Hill in the capacity of associate head coach/offensive coordinator in January, 2014, this marked Houghtaling’s third stint at Wagner. Known as ‘Hoss’ to his players and fellow coaches, Houghtaling was a Seahawk assistant coach from 2006-2009, before becoming head coach at Hudson Valley Community College in 2010. Following one season as head coach of the Vikings, he returned to Wagner as offensive coordinator in 2011, where he spent two seasons, including the 2012 NEC Championship campaign.



“Jason has a sharp football mind and he is an excellent teacher and leader of young men,” said Wagner College President Richard Guarasci. “He has prepared himself carefully to be a head coach of a Division I program. He completed his Masters degree in education from Wagner where he learned how to teach students with different and unique skills and personalities. I am delighted that he will lead Wagner’s football program and continue his partnership with Walt Hamline as they take Wagner into the next generation of athletic and academic success.”

During Wagner’s 9-4 NEC Championship season of 2012, that saw the Seahawks become the first team in NEC history to win an NCAA FCS Playoff game and rank in the Top 25 of both final national polls, Houghtaling tutored the Seahawks’ record-setting quarterback, Nick Doscher, as he evolved into one of the all-time great quarterbacks to ever compete at Wagner and in the

NEC.

Doscher operated Houghtaling’s offensive system with precision, finishing his career ranked No. 1 in Seahawk history, and No. 2 in NEC history, with 8,404 yards of total offense. His 6,100 passing yards are also No. 1 on the Wagner all-time list and No. 9 on the all-time NEC list. As a senior in 2012, Doscher fashioned a passer rating of 133.9, with 13 touchdown passes and just one interception, ending his career with a remarkable 221 consecutive pass attempts without an interception.

Led by Doscher, and star running back Dominique Williams, who is now a member of the NFL’s New York Jets, the 2012 Seahawks were one of the nation’s most balanced units, ranking No. 1 nationally with the fewest turnovers (6) in all of FCS football.

“I am thrilled that Jason Houghtaling will take over as Wagner head coach and I have full confidence that he will continue to keep the Seahawks on the path to success for years to come,” said Hameline.

“His work ethic, passion, football knowledge, recruiting contacts, and familiarity with Wagner College are all major assets that will pay huge dividends for our program. In Hoss, we have an individual who has the respect of everyone that he comes into contact with, and is highly-regarded by high school coaches both within our region, and on a national scale.”

During the 2013 season as offensive coordinator at Cornell, Houghtaling coached quarterback Jeff Mathews, who led the Ivy League in attempts, completions and passing yards, before signing a free agent contract with the NFL’s Atlanta Falcons. Following the 2013 season, Mathews, who is currently a member of the practice squad of the Indianapolis Colts, was named to the College Sports Journal FCS All-America Team and received the additional honor of participating in the East–West Shrine Game, serving as captain of the East squad.

During his first season as a collegiate offensive coordinator (2011), Houghtaling directed the talented Williams to impressive numbers. Williams ranked among the national leaders by rushing for 121.6 yards per game and 14 total touchdowns, while posting eight 100-yard games in 11 contests. The following season, Williams was a 2012 College Sports Journal All-American, in addition to earning First-Team All-NEC honors.

“Wagner is a special place for both my family and I, so it’s truly an honor to be selected to continue to build this program,” said Houghtaling. “I thank Coach Hameline and Wagner College President Dr. Guarasci for entrusting me with this position and can’t wait to lead this program, coach our current players, and attract even more elite student-athletes in the coming years.”

When he first arrived at Wagner in 2006, Houghtaling served as running backs coach, before heading the Seahawk offensive lines from 2007-2009.

With an emphasis on New York State and Florida, Houghtaling has been the lead recruiter for a host of student-athletes who have gone on to enjoy outstanding careers on Grymes Hill. The list of top Wagner student-athletes that Houghtaling has recruited include New Jerseyan Dominique Williams, New York State natives Quintin Anderson, Tyrone Collins, Chazz Legette, Stefan Gage, Patrick Gibbons, and Sidiq Soulemana, as well as Floridians Keith Hernandez, Frantz Placide and Otis Wright. In 2010, his one season as head coach at Troy, NY-based Hudson Valley, he tutored two All-Conference performers.



Houghtaling began his collegiate coaching career at prep powerhouse Milford Academy in Berlin, NY, where he helped lead the Falcons to a 20-3 mark as defensive coordinator, while also serving as defensive line and strength and conditioning coach. A 2004 graduate of the University of Binghamton with a degree in History, Houghtaling earned a Masters in Education from Wagner in 2009. He originally attended Lafayette, where he was a defensive lineman for the Leopards, before injuries cut short his playing career and he transferred to Binghamton.

A native of Windsor, NY, Houghtaling got his start in coaching at his high school alma mater, Windsor Central High School, where he spent two seasons working with the Black Knights’ offensive line and linebackers under the head coach he played for, Dan Hodack.

Houghtaling and his wife Mary are the proud parents of two daughters, Abbie and Emma.

**RICH
SCANGARELLO**
Offensive Coordinator

Rich Scangarello, who spent six years as a collegiate offensive coordinator before serving the 2015 season as a quality control assistant for the NFL's Atlanta Falcons, enters his first season as offensive coordinator.

With the Falcons, his responsibilities included assisting the offensive line coach with weekly run-game preparation, coordinating the defensive scout team for the offense, as well as breaking down film of upcoming opponents.

Prior to joining the Falcons, Scangarello spent three seasons (2012-14) as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Northern Arizona University (NAU). In 2013, the Lumberjacks' passing unit connected on 235 out of 387 passes for a 60.7 completion percentage, while totaling 2,425 passing yards, in addition to 14 thrown touchdowns. In 2012, Scangarello helped mentor quarterback Cary Grossart who went on to finish his career with the top completion percentage in NAU history at 66.3. He also posted the second-best completion percentage in a season with 66.7. Overall, the Lumberjacks finished tied for 27th in the nation in scoring offense with an average of 31.6 points per game.

Prior to his tenure at NAU, Scangarello served two seasons as offensive coordinator, assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach at Millsaps College in Jackson, MS.

Before spending the 2009 season on the NFL's Oakland Raiders staff as assistant quarterbacks coach and offensive quality control assistant, Scangarello was a four-year member of the UC-Davis staff where, in 2008, he promoted to co-offensive coordinator, leading an offense that ranked 11th in the FCS in total offense at 426.5 yards per game, while scoring at 28.5 points per game.

The Roseville, CA native is a 1996 graduate of Sacramento State where he earned a degree in business administration.

Tony Brinson, who enters his 23rd season as a collegiate football coach in 2016 and his sixth season at Wagner, will serve as defensive coordinator for the Seahawks in 2016.

During his five seasons on Grymes Hill, the veteran North Jersey native has worn many hats, having served in the roles of recruiting coordinator, in addition to coaching the Seahawks' special teams, defensive line and linebackers.

A member of the coaching staffs that led Wagner to the 2012 and 2014 (regular season) NEC Championship squads, in his time at Wagner he has produced two team MVPs, three Defensive MVP's four All-Northeast Conference plays and four NFL free agents, including current New York Jet Julian Stanford.

His more than two-decade career has taken him up and down the eastern seaboard where he has developed a host of deep and lasting recruiting relationships and contacts.

"Tony Brinson is a really good football coach and he has a lot of responsibilities, both on and off the field and I'm excited to have him lead our defense" said head coach Jason Houghtaling. "He's also a terrific recruiter and is very, very organized. Tony is a veteran guy, carries himself the right way, and does what you expect of a top football coach."

Following the 2011 season, the aforementioned Stanford signed a free agent deal with the Jacksonville Jaguars after earning first-team All-NEC accolades. The 6-2, 225-pound Stanford earned a spot on the team's final roster, went on to make an early impact on special teams which led to his starting six of Jacksonville's 16 games.

One of 19 players to play in all 16 games for the Jaguars, Stanford finished his rookie campaign with 23 total tackles, including 18 solo stops. In making the Jaguars' roster, Stanford became the first Seahawk to appear on an active NFL regular season roster since Wagner Hall of Fame member Rich Kotite (1967-1972).

Stanford then signed a free agent contract with the Detroit Lions in 2013. Two of Stanford's teammates, also tutored by Brinson, inked NFL free agent deals following the 2011 season in safety Jeremiah Brown and DE Quintin Anderson and were in training camps with the Jaguars and Tampa Bay Buccaneers, respectively, before becoming a member of the Jets in 2015.

Custavious Patterson enters his fifth season as an assistant coach at Wagner in 2016.

After serving as offensive coordinator in 2015, he will return to coach the wide receivers, where he previously had great success, which included mentoring a group that helped the Seahawks' claim the 2012 Northeast Conference championship.

For the last two years, Patterson has had the distinction of serving as a head coach in the third annual Dream Bowl, a premier College Football All-Star Game featuring top FCS, D-II and D-III student-athletes, held on Martin Luther King Day in Virginia Beach, VA.

Patterson arrived on Grymes Hill in 2012 after spending the previous six seasons as an assistant coach at Fordham University

Last season, as offensive coordinator, Alex Thomson started nine games at quarterback and led the team with 1,395 yards of total offense (1,085 passing, 300 rushing). The last first-year quarterback to do this was Nick Doscher in 2012. With Patterson directing the offense in 2015, OL Andrew Oberg and TE Ryan Owens were named to the All-NEC Second Team, RB Otis Wright received College Sports Madness and NEC Player of the Week, while WR Andre Yevchinez earned James Robb Award as Offensive MVP of the Homecoming Game.

In 2014, as Quarterbacks Coach, Patterson tutored QB Chris Andrews, who led the Seahawks to a 4-1 record down the stretch, leading the team in Total Offense (1,025 - 657 passing, 368 rushing) and earning NEC Player of the Week for his efforts in the season-ending win at Bryant made the Seahawks' NEC Co-Champions.

While coaching the wide receivers in 2013, senior WR Tyree Watkins was the NEC's sixth-ranked receiver (4.1 per game), corraling 45 passes for 484 yards and four touchdowns. Watkins also earned the James Robb Trophy as MVP of the Homecoming Game. A Florida native, Patterson handles the Seahawks' recruiting efforts in the Sunshine State.

Former Michigan St. standout offensive tackle and professional player Stefon Wheeler enters his third season at Wagner in 2016 and second heading up the coaching efforts of the Seahawk offensive line.

Wheeler arrived on Grymes Hill after serving three seasons as an assistant at his alma mater, Milford Academy, in Berlin, NY, and the last two seasons as Offensive coordinator/Recruiting coordinator.

After starring along the Milford offensive line in 2000, where he led the Falcons to a 10-3 record, Wheeler was awarded a full scholarship to Michigan State where he went on to start 35 games at left tackle. A two-time All-Big 10 Honorable Mention selection, he was voted to the Spartans First-Team All-Decade squad in 2012.

"Stefon Wheeler learned under Jeff Stoutland, who's now the offensive line coach of the Philadelphia Eagles, he brings NFL playing experience to our program, and does a tremendous job with our offensive line," said head coach Jason Houghtaling.

A 2005 Michigan St. graduate, Wheeler signed a free agent contract with the New Orleans Saints in 2006 and played in NFL Europa for the Cologne Centurions in 2007. While playing left tackle overseas, he helped open holes for the league's leading rusher. Later in 2007, Wheeler signed with the CFL's Toronto Argonauts.

Wagner alumnus Steve Ciocci returned to Grymes Hill in the role of defensive line coach for the Seahawks in July, 2016 following a one-year stint on the Pace University football staff.

During his time as an All-Northeast Conference (NEC) offensive lineman and offensive line assistant coach at Wagner, Ciocci certainly made a name for himself, on and off the playing field.

On the field, the 6-4, 290-pound right tackle started 25 consecutive games for the Seahawks to close out his career and earned his first All-NEC nod in 2012 by opening holes for All-NEC running back Dominique Williams and providing protection for All-NEC quarterback Nick Doscher.

Off the field, there has perhaps never been a Wagner student-athlete who made his presence felt, or leant himself to more charity and civic-minded causes in the local community, than Ciocci.

The Seahawks, who finished the 2012 season at 9-4 in a landmark campaign, claimed the school's first NEC Football title, became the first NEC program to win an FCS playoff game, and ranked 21st in the nation in the final Sports Network FCS poll. At year's end, Ciocci was invited to participate in the FCS Senior Scout Bowl and Pro Grass International Scout Bowl.

A Staten Island native, David Fredrickson enters his second season as an assistant coach at his alma mater after serving as a mainstay, two-year captain, and eventual All-NEC center.

After earning the starting center spot in 2011 preseason camp, Fredrickson, a rare left-handed center, started all 46 games in his Seahawk career, playing an integral role on the 2012 and 2014 NEC Championship teams. On the Seahawk staff, Fredrickson will tutor Wagner's tight ends and tackles.

"Obviously everyone around here knows who David is. He started 40-plus straight games for us at the center position and was an All-NEC player," said Seahawk head coach Jason Houghtaling. "He has an energy and an enthusiasm about the game, he wants to be a football coach. We know what we're going to get from him, which is what we want - high energy, high effort and someone who is accountable."

Fredrickson originally attended Idaho State University in Pocatello, Idaho, where he was a member of the football team, following a standout career at Poly Prep in Brooklyn where he played for Staten Island native and former NFL star Dino Mangiero.

Max Wassel enters his second season as an assistant coach in charge of the inside linebackers following a brilliant playing career for the Seahawks.

"Max Wassel was a four-year guy here, started his last two years, fought through an injury, went on to be a captain for us, an All-League player and just another one who really illustrates and exemplifies what we want out of our coaches, and out of our kids," said Seahawk head coach Jason Houghtaling.

As a senior in 2014, Wassel was a terror all season from his inside linebacker spot en route to earning First-Team All-NEC honors. Seemingly always around the action, the 5-11, 235-pound Totowa, New Jersey native was tops on the team with 81 tackles, a 7.5 average per game, which ranked No. 6 in the NEC. In addition, his 21 tackles for loss (for minus 61 yards) ranked No. 2

in the NEC while his 52 solo tackles ranked No. 3 in the league. He added four sacks (minus 35 yards), along with three pass deflections, two interceptions and two forced fumbles.

Against Sacred Heart on November 1, Wassel wowed the Seahawk faithful on hand as well as the audience viewing the game on ESPN3.com, by totaling an astounding 18 tackles, which was the highest individual tackling mark by an NEC player in 2014.

Eric Franklin enters his second season as an assistant coach at Wagner, tutoring the outside linebackers after assisting with the defensive backs in 2015.

Franklin was a standout safety at the University of Maryland. A fourth-year defensive back who was a key contributor where he saw action in 40 games with 25 starts for the Terrapins, amassing 181 tackles with 13 pass breakups and three interceptions.

Following his 2013 graduation from Maryland, he served as an assistant coach at his high school alma mater, Archbishop Curly High School in Baltimore, MD.

In 2013, Franklin served as wide receiver/tight ends, defensive backs and special teams coach before assuming the duties of defensive coordinator in 2014. He has also worked as a coach at the Danny O'Brien Elite Football Camp.

In his four-year career at Temple, Johnson was a three-year starter at cornerback who amassed 77 tackles for the Owls. The Mustangs went a combined 15-7 in his two seasons and were the New Jersey Athletic Conference co-champions in 2014, finishing with a 9-2 record that was capped with a victory in the ECAC North Central Bowl. Morrisville State ranked among the top 20 nationally that season in three major statistical categories, ranking fifth in third-down percentage and 13th in both total offense and rushing offense.

"His experience will be a tremendous asset to our players and program and, having been a four-year player here, he will offer a unique perspective for our guys."

OL Matt Diaz, TE Ryan Owens, P Bryan Rafano Named to 2016 All-NEC Preseason Team

East Rutherford, NJ – Senior offensive lineman Matt Diaz (Edison, NJ/Edison/Milford Academy), fifth-year senior tight end Ryan Owens (Gainesville, NY/Letchworth), and junior punter Bryan Rafano (South River, NJ / St. Joseph's-Metuchen) were named to the 27-man, 2016 Preseason All-NEC Team, the league office announced today at the #NECFB Social Media Day today at MetLife Stadium.

Defending league champion Duquesne was picked as the NEC preseason favorite with six one first-place votes. Sacred Heart, which picked up one first-place ballot, was chosen second in the annual predicted order-of-finish. Saint Francis U found itself in third place when the survey results were tallied, followed by Bryant, Central Connecticut, Robert Morris and Wagner.

The last time that the Seahawks were picked last was in 2012, a year that saw the Green & White stun observers by recording nine consecutive wins earning and earning the NEC Championship and a first-round NCAA FCS Playoff victory over Colgate.

For the third straight season in 2016, Diaz is expected to be a leader up front, anchoring the left tackle spot for the Green & White. At 6-6, 290 pounds, he is a mobile and talented offensive lineman who boasts a wealth of explosion at the point of attack, in addition to his tremendous size. This marks the second consecutive season that Diaz has earned a spot on the #NECFB Preseason Team. Last season, he suffered a leg injury in preseason camp and ended up seeing action in just six games, taking over the starting left tackle position in the last five games of the season.

The 6-4, 235-pound Owens was named to the 2015 All-NEC Team following a breakout season that saw him lead the Seahawks in both receptions (29) and receiving yards (353). An athletic tight end, who combines outstanding size with good hands, quickness and agility, the upstate New York native recorded a career-high 131 yards on eight receptions and a touchdown vs. Bryant (11/7) last season.

Owens, who capped the season with a five-catch, 57-yard effort at Sacred Heart (11/2), started all 11 games a season ago and caught at least one pass in 10 contests. A member of 2015 NEC Fall All-Academic Honor Roll, he enters the 2016 season with 53 career receptions for 586 yards (11.1 average) and three touchdowns in 33 games.

The 6-1, 180-pound Rafano will be looking to build upon a stellar 2015 campaign in which he started all 11 games on the season and took all 68 of the Seahawks' punts, totaling 2,689 punting yards on the year while averaging 39.5 yards per punt. In front of more than 56,000 fans at BYU (10/24), he totaled 425 punting yards on nine attempts, including five 50-plus yard efforts, highlighted by a career-long 57-yard boot. For the season, the 2015 NEC Fall All-Academic Honor Roll member recorded eight 50-plus yard punts.

The 2016 Seahawks, under the direction of second-year head coach Jason Houghtaling, open the season on Thursday, September 1 vs. St. Anselm College (NH) under the lights in a 6:00 p.m. start at Hameline Field. The Green & White will then host Concordia College (MI) on September 10 at Noon. Following a bye week, the Seahawks will conclude the opening month of the season by traveling to FBS member Boston College of the ACC on September 24.

Led by Owens, along with fellow co-captain and fifth-year senior linebacker Najee Harris (Norristown, PA / Norristown), Wagner entertains NEC rival Sacred Heart on October 1 in a Homecoming clash at 6:00 p.m., before hosting Ivy League member Columbia on October 8 in another 6:00 p.m. start. The Green & White then hit the road for three consecutive games. On October 15, the Green & White travel to New Britain, CT to meet Central Connecticut in a 1:00 p.m. matchup before playing their third NEC game of the season at Bryant on October 22 at 1:00 p.m.

Wagner closes out the month of October at FBS member UMass, before closing the season with three straight Noon NEC matchups. This pivotal three-game conference stretch begins at home vs. defending NEC champion Duquesne on November 5, continues at Robert Morris on November 12, and concludes with the regular season finale at home vs. Saint Francis U.

The 11-game schedule features a cross-section of opponents who hail from four different classifications; FBS (Boston College and UMass), Division II (Saint Anselm), NAIA (Concordia) and FCS (Columbia, as well as the six NEC rivals).

Staten Island, NY – Junior quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ/Keyport) passed for 176 yards and two touchdowns, in addition to scoring on a 59-yard run, while junior running Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY/Salisbury School) rumbled for 147 yards and a score to lead the Wagner football team to a convincing 38-16 victory over Saint Anselm tonight at Hamline Field.

The Seahawks outscored the Hawks 28-6 in the second half in breaking open a game that was tied 10-10 at halftime. Not to be lost among the many offensive superlatives on this night was a virtuoso defensive effort turned in by the Green & White, particularly in the second half.



The only points allowed by the Seahawks following the halftime break came on the game's very last play when Saint Anselm quarterback Gianni Gavalas tossed a 15-yard touchdown pass to Kyle Hill on fourth down as time expired.

In the second half, the stingy Seahawk defense held the Hawks to just 166 yards from scrimmage.

Sophomore inside linebacker Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County), who began his collegiate career at FBS member Central Florida, led the Wagner defensive charge with a game-high 10 tackles, including seven solo stops while senior cornerback Tiquan Garner (Brookville, NY/ Long Island Lutheran) responded to his first start with nine tackles and two pass breakups.

Also recording career highs in tackles for the Green & White were junior free safety Jesse Flaherty (Oceanport, NJ/ The Peddie School) and sophomore inside linebacker Santoni Graham (Arlington, VA/ Fork Union Military Academy) who recorded eight and five stops, respectively.

"Great to get a win," said coach Jason Houghtaling.. "We came out in the first half and had to deal with some adversity and our guys responded really positively and with real energy. I think we played extremely hard, which was great to see.

"I thought the defense really came alive in the second half," he added. "Tony (coordinator Tony Brinson) changed up some calls at halftime, but what was really important was the way everyone stayed together. I thought we hit harder and played harder after halftime.

For the evening, Thomson, finished 17-of-31 through the air, both career highs, for 176 yards. On this night, the 6-5, 225-pound Thomson was the ultimate distributor, as his 17 completions went to nine different receivers. For Knight, the 147 rushing yards also marked a career high and are the most by a Seahawk since October 26, 2013 when current New York Jet Dominique Williams ran for 177 yards on 33 carries vs. Georgetown. The 488 yards of total offense churned out tonight by the Seahawks marks their highest output since October 2, 2010 when the Seahawks amassed 460 yards in a 29-21 victory over Bryant.

The second half was a scoreless defensive stalemate until senior running back Matthias McKinnon (Albany, NY/ Bishop Maginn/Jireh Prep [NCJ]) barreled into the end zone from five yards out, with just eight seconds remaining in the third quarter, en route to an eight-carry, 94-yard night. This score capped a 12-play, 63-yard drive and gave the Seahawks the lead for good at 17-10.

After forcing the Hawks into a three and out, Thomson took off on a nifty 59-yard touchdown run on 2nd-and-10 from his own 41 yard line. On a designed pass play, the Jersey Shore native pulled the ball down and dashed up the left sideline, before cutting back to the middle of the field, aided by a punishing downfield block from junior wide receiver John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Washington Township/Lackawanna JC [PA]).

The career-long 59-yard Thomson jaunt extended the Seahawk lead to 24-10 with 13:50 remaining in the game.

On their ensuing possession, Gavalas led the Hawks smartly into scoring range but on a 2nd-and-10 pass from the Seahawk 16, sophomore cornerback Sterling Lowry (Syracuse, NY/ Nottingham/Milford Academy) came up with a big interception in the end zone to snuff out the threat.

After Wagner took over on its own 20 following the touchback, McKinnon ripped off a 43 yard run all the way to the Hawk 37. On the very next play, Knight did the rest as the 6-2-, 220-pounder raced straight up the middle for a 37-yard touchdown. This score, which came with 41 seconds to go in the third quarter, made it a 31-10 game and effectively put the game out of reach. The Seahawks would add one final touchdown to complete a spree of 28 unanswered points when Thomson hit All-Northeast Conference (NEC) tight end Ryan Owens on a 21-yard touchdown strike with 2:52 to play to make it a 38-10 game.

Wagner took an early 3-0 lead in this one on a 37-yard field goal by senior James Cooper (Linwood., NJ/ Mainland Regional/Temple). After Saint Anselm ran off 10 straight points to make it a 10-3 game, the Seahawks tied things up 10-10 heading into halftime when Thomson found senior wide receiver Keith Foster (Newark, NJ/ Weequahic/Milford Academy) in the end zone on a six-yard pass to complete a seven-play, 78-yard drive.

For Saint Anselm, which competed in the NCAA Division II classification as a member of the NE-10 Conference, completed 22-of-40 passes for 263 yards one touchdown and was intercepted twice. His favorite target was wide receiver Zach Bartak who wound up with 13 receptions for 122 yards.

Staten Island, NY – Staten Island, NY – Wagner excelled in all three phases of the game on a stifling hot afternoon at Hameline Field, as the Seahawks amassed 239 yards through the air, 125, more on the ground, and returned a punt 77 yards for a touchdown while allowing Concordia to gain just 116 yards of total offense, en route to a dominating 38-0 victory.



In jumping out to the its first 2-0 start since 2006, junior quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ/ Keyport) completed 18-of-27 passes in accounting for all of Wagner's 239 aerial yards (all career highs) junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) surpassed the century mark for the second straight game in rushing for 112 yards, while senior Andre Yevchinez (Binghamton, NY/Binghamton) delivered his first career punt return for a touchdown, a nifty 77-yard effort up the left sideline in the second quarter.

The 38-0 win is Wagner's first shutout since a 20-0 blanking of Robert Morris on November 8, 2014.

Wagner jumped on top quickly in this one when Knight raced 71 yards for a touchdown on the game's second play from scrimmage. That's the way the score stood until Yevchinez received a punt at the Wagner 33, made several defenders miss early, before ambling his way up the left sideline for the 77-yard score that extended the Seahawks' lead to 14-0 with 7:07 remaining in the first half.

After the Seahawks' defense forced the Cardinals into a three-and-out, Wagner put together a crisp eight-play, 62-yard drive, keyed by a 41-yard completion from Thomson to junior wide receiver John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Washington Township/Lackawanna CC) that gave the Green & White a first-and-goal at the Concordia four-yard line. Two plays later, senior running back Matthias McKinnon (Albany, NY / Bishop Maginn / Jireh Prep [NC]) bulled his way into the end zone over right tackle in extending the Seahawks'

bulge to 21-0.

With Concordia backed up deep in its own end following an 11-yard loss on a bad snap, Wagner wisely used all three of its timeouts in trying to preserve time. After taking over at the Cardinals; 28 following a short punt, the Green & White covered the 28 yards in five plays with Thomson delivering a dart to Williams in the end zone on a 15-yard TD strike to with just four seconds left in the half to make it a 28-0 game at the intermission. The Seahawks received a break on this drive when Concordia was called for offside while Wagner was in the process of missing a 37-yard field goal, which gave the drive new life.

The only scoring in the third quarter came on a 37-yard field goal by senior James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple) that extended the Seahawks' lead to 31-0. The final score of the game came with 8:25 left to play when Thomson capped a six-play, 65-yard drive with an 11-yard TD toss to sophomore wide receiver Willie Dale (Staten Island, NY/St. Peter's) which fashioned the final score at 38-0.

"I thought we did some good things in all three areas – offense, defense and special teams," said second-year head coach Jason Houghtaling. "As was the case last week, our guys continue to play hard. Obviously Denzel's (Knight) big run got us off to a good early start. While Alex (Thomson) put up some good numbers, I think if you ask our guys, a lot of them would say they could have done some things better out there. Defensively, we rotated a lot of different guys in there, I think we played six different outside linebackers, and we did some really good things I though on that side of the ball.

"Special teams, I think we did a solid job there also," Houghtaling continued. "Of course, Yevy's (Andre Yevchinez) return was a great play, he received some nice blocking there and did the rest himself. But also, we kicked a field goal, our kickoffs were good and Bryan Rafano did a really nice job punting the ball (45.4-yard average, career-long 62-yarder). So, overall, I'm very pleased heading into the bye week. These guys continue to play for another, complement one another, and are playing hard."

As he did in last week's 38-16 season-opening win over Saint Anselm, when he had 10 tackles, sophomore linebacker Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF) paced Wagner this afternoon with seven stops. Recording five tackles apiece for the active and aggressive Seahawks' defense were fifth-year senior linebacker Najee Harris (Norristown, PA/Norristown), sophomore linebacker Santon Graham (Arlington, VA / Bishop O'Connell / Fork Union Military Academy), senior defensive end Jordan Baskerville (West Point, NY / James I. O'Neill / Milford Academy) and senior linebacker D.J. Paul (Dix Hills, NY / Half Hollows East). Recording one sack apiece for the Green & White were Graham, freshman linebacker Cameron Gill (Douglasville, GA / Chapel Hill) and sophomore defensive end Julian McLeod (Miramar, FL / St. Thomas Aquinas).

For Concordia, starting quarterback Seth Suida, under duress much of the game, was limited to 5-of-15 passing for 44 yards while being sacked twice. In the rushing department, the Cardinals were led by running back Joe Conner's 34 yards on nine carries. Defensively, Ty Peterson led the way by recording a game-high nine tackles, including a pair of sacks, while Nick Holshoe and Jay Koski contributed seven stops apiece.

Chestnut Hill, MA – The Wagner football team took an early 7-0 lead on a 55-yard touchdown run by junior QB Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ/ Keyport), and trailed by just a 14-10 count midway through the second quarter, before falling to Football Bowl Championship (FBS) Subdivision opponent Boston College, 42-10, at Alumni Stadium.



Playing their sixth FBS opponent all time, and first from the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC), the 2-1 Seahawks open Northeast Conference (NEC) play on Saturday, October 1 with a 6:00 p.m. matchup vs. Sacred Heart in a game that will be seen on ESPN3.

Thomson finished the day 13-of-25 passing for 62 yards. Due to 47 yards lost on sacks, the 6-5, 220-pound Jersey Shore native was credited with 20 net yards rushing on eight attempts.

After BC (2-2) responded to the early 7-0 deficit with 14 straight points, the Green & White mounted an 11-play, 37-yard drive that resulted in a 33-yard field goal by fifth-year senior placekicker James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple), who has now been successful on 3-of-4 field goal attempts, in addition to a perfect 11-of-11 on extra points.

Despite being on the field for 76 plays, as the Eagles held a 37:12-22:48 edge in time of possession, the Wagner defense was able to force the Eagles' offense into a number of negative plays in front of 22,728 fans, the fourth-largest crowd to ever witness a Wagner football game.

Leading the way defensively for the Seahawks was junior linebacker Randall May (Sparta, NJ/ Sparta), who had a game-high eight tackles, including seven solo stops, along with sophomore linebacker Santoni Graham (Arlington, VA / Bishop O'Connell / Fork Union Military Academy), who was in on six stops. Senior punter Bryan Rafano (South River, NJ / St. Joseph's-Metuchen), had a productive game on a busy afternoon, punting the ball a career-high 10 times with an average of 40.3 yards per punt. The 2015 Second-Team All-NEC performer ,and a 2016 Preseason All-NEC choice, launched a game-long 52-yarder in the second quarter.

"It was certainly nice to take that early lead and we did some good things out there against a very big, talented and well-coached team," said Seahawk second-year head coach Jason Houghtaling. "We lost some battles at the line of scrimmage, and struggled to get their guys blocked at times. Some guys got a little excited playing here, but I thought overall we played really hard on offense, defense and on special teams. We'll clean up a few things and get ready for Sacred Heart in our NEC opener."

"As I've said before, I really like our football team, the way they prepare and go about things," Houghtaling added.

Boston College sophomore quarterback Patrick Towles, a fifth-year senior transfer from Kentucky, had 46 yards on seven carries to go with 157 yards on 9-for-16 passing for the Eagles. Junior running back Jonathan Hilliman, a bruising 253-pounder, rushed 19 times for 83 yards and two touchdowns.

Labady Sees First Action

The contest vs. Boston College marked the Seahawk debut for junior running back/return specialist Franklin Labady (Hialeah, FL/Milford Academy), a speedy transfer from the University of Cincinnati. On the afternoon, the 5-8, 165-pound Sunshine State native, who sat out the first two games of the season due to injury, returned five kickoffs for 78 yards against the Eagles.

Clifford Gains First Start

Sophomore center Daniel Clifford (Hoboken, NJ/ Hoboken) gained the first start of his young career.

Staten Island, NY – Senior running back Matthias McKinnon rushed for 157 yards on 24 carries and two touchdowns, while junior quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) completed 15-of-28 passes for 276 yards and three touchdowns to carry Wagner to a thrilling 45-20 win over previously unbeaten Sacred Heart on Homecoming.

With a boisterous crowd of 3,002 fans on hand at Hameline Field as well as a global audience watching on ESPN 3, the two teams combined for 59 first-half points, as the Green & White amassed a staggering 405 first-half yards in sprinting out to a 39-20 lead at the intermission.

Both defenses held the upper hand in the second half. Following a scoreless third quarter, junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) shook loose on a 67-yard touchdown jaunt with 7:17 remaining in the game for the only points of the second half.

Wagner's impressive victory was the Northeast Conference (NEC) opener for both teams, as the Seahawks improve to 3-1 on the season, while the Pioneers, who were coming off a 38-10 win at No. 20 Stony Brook, saw their record fall to 4-1.

Defensively for Wagner, redshirt freshman linebacker Santoni Graham (Arlington, VA / Bishop O'Connell / Fork Union Military Academy) paced the Seahawks with a game-high 11 tackles, including eight solo stops. Fifth-year senior outside linebacker and co-captain Najee Harris (Norristown, PA/ Norristown), added six tackles, a total that was matched by junior free safety Jesse Flaherty (Oceanport, NJ / Red Bank Catholic / The Peddie School), who also contributed a big interception in the Seahawk end zone on the last play of the first half.

Flaherty's INT was one of two that Wagner snared in its own end zone, as freshman cornerback Myron Morris (Miami, FL / Booker T. Washington) stepped in front of a third-quarter pass intended for wide receiver Moses Webb, to quell another Pioneer threat.

For Sacred Heart, quarterback RJ Noel connected on 23-of-52 aerials for 327 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions while running back Ose Imeokparia added 48 yards rushing on 11 carries.

McKinnon opened the scoring with a 41-yard first-quarter touchdown run, setting the tone for a dominating 264-yard team rushing performance. A missed extra pint left the score at 6-0 before Thomson found Knight on a five-yard TD strike to make it a 12-0 game as the Seahawks were unsuccessful on a two-point conversion attempt.

After Sacred Heart pulled to within 12-6 on a seven-year touchdown pass from Noel to Webb, the Green & White scored the next 13 points on a pair of long field goals by senior James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple). After converting on a 39-yard try, Cooper then hit from 52 yards out on a career-long boot that hit the crossbar before bounding through.

McKinnon's second touchdown of the night gave Wagner a 25-6 lead with 3:20 to play in the opening half. SHU then responded with a 99-yard kickoff return by Nate Chavious which made it a 25-13 game.

Undaunted, the Seahawks answered right back with a quick-strike three-play, 63-yard drive, highlighted by a 50-yard touchdown pass from Thomson to a leaping John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Washington Township/Lackawanna CC (PA). The 6-6 junior wide receiver gathered the ball in at the five-yard line before diving into the end zone.

William's TD put Wagner in front, 32-13 before Noel led SHU on a five-play, 75-yard drive, capped by a 29-yard TD pass to wide receiver Andrew O'Neill to make it 32-20. Incredibly, Wagner had an answer here as well, as senior wide receiver Keith Foster (Newark, NJ / Weequahic / Milford Academy) made a leaping touchdown grab of his own, this one covering 39 yards, to make it a 39-20 game.

Noel then marched SHU to the Wagner 36 but his high-arching pass on the half's final play was picked off in the end zone by Flaherty.

Wagner ended up with 540 yards of offense, 276 through the air and another 264 on the ground, while the Pioneers generated 435 yards of offense.

Staten Island, NY – Wagner delivered a top defensive performance in holding Columbia without a touchdown, but the Seahawks were unable to generate enough offensively to maintain a 13-6 halftime lead in dropping a hard-fought 15-13 decision on Saturday night.

With the loss, the Green & White fall to 3-2 on the young season while Columbia improves to 1-3. Wagner, which is 1-0 in Northeast Conference (NEC) play following last week's resounding 45-20 Homecoming triumph over Sacred Heart, return to league play on Saturday, October 15, when they travel to Central Connecticut for a 1:00 p.m. tussle that will be seen live on ESPN 3.

Seahawk junior linebacker Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF) spearheaded a Wagner defensive effort that repeatedly turned Columbia away in the red zone, and included two goal-line stands, in registering a game-high 12 tackles, headlined by three sacks. Redshirt freshman linebacker Santoni Graham (Arlington, VA / Bishop O'Connell / Fork Union Military Academy) added nine tackles while senior Tiquan Garner (Brookville, NY / Long Island Lutheran) continued his fine play, coming up from his cornerback spot to record eight tackles (all solo), including a sack and three tackles for loss. The 5-9, 165-pound Garner also recorded three pass breakups.

Columbia freshman placekicker Oren Milstein was a perfect 5-of-5 on field goal tries on this damp, drizzly evening at Hameline Field, with the five made kicks setting a Columbia record. While the Lions were unable to find the end zone, a stout defensive effort allowed the five field goals - a pair of 18-yard kicks, along with makes from 33, 36 and 39 yards - to stand up.

After Columbia came up with a fumble on a strip-sack of Wagner junior quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) at the Seahawk 28 on the Seahawks' first offensive possession, the Green & White turned in their first goal-line stand when fifth-year senior linebacker Najee Harris (Norristown, PA / Norristown) stuffed Columbia quarterback Anders Hill on 3rd-and-goal from the one. This forced the Lions to settle for a Milstein 18-yard field goal and a 3-0 lead with 8:40 left in the opening quarter.

Following a touchback on the ensuing kickoff, Seahawk junior running back Franklin Labady (Hialeah, FL / Milford Academy), a speedy 5-8, 165-pound transfer from the University of Cincinnati, bolted up the right sideline for 54 yards on first down, racing all the way to the Columbia 21-yard line. Labady's dash set up a 38-yard field goal by reigning Northeast Conference (NEC) Special Player of the Week, James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple), as the senior tied the game at 3-3.

Following an exchange of punts, Thomson found running back Matthias McKinnon (Albany, NY / Bishop Maginn / Jireh Prep [NC]) in the left flat on a 3rd-and-11 screen pass from the Lions' 47, and the senior did the rest, breaking several tackles en route to a nifty 47-yard touchdown which gave the Seahawks a 10-3 lead.

A Cooper 32-yard field goal with 2:50 left in the half extended the Wagner lead to 13-3 as the senior improved to 7-of-8 on field goal tries this season. Columbia answered with a 15-play, 59-yard drive that resulted in a 33-yard Milstein field goal with just three seconds left in the half to make it a 13-6 game at the intermission.

Columbia would knock on the door three more times in the second half, with the Seahawk defense forcing the Lions to settle for Milstein field goals of 39, 18 (following another Wagner goal-line stand), and 36 yards. The latter boot, which came with just 4:40 remaining in the game, gave the Columbia its first lead of the game at 15-13.

On its final drive of the game, Thomson kept Wagner's hope alive by lofting a high-arcing 25-yard completion to 6-6 junior wide receiver John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Washington Township/Lackawanna CC [PA]) on a clutch 4th-and-10 hook-up. A pair of completions to sophomore tight end Chris Woodard (North Tonawanda, NY / North Tonawanda), of 15 and five yards, respectively, moved the ball to the Columbia 35.

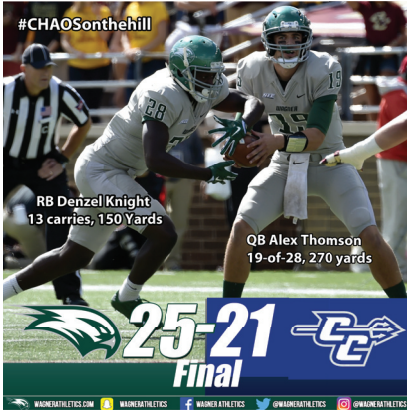
Following a Lions' timeout with 1:43 left, McKinnon was held for no gain on 2nd-and-5 before Thomson was sacked for a seven-yard loss, on third down, back to the 42. With no time outs remaining, this set up a desperate 4th-and-12 situation, and when Thomson's hurried pass attempt to Woodard fell incomplete, the Lions took over on downs and ran out the clock in holding on for the 15-13 win.

New Britain, CT – Wagner outscored Central Connecticut 15-0 in the fourth quarter in posting a thrilling 25-21 come-from-behind Northeast Conference (NEC) road victory at sun-splashed Arute Field and live on ESPN3.



Junior quarter Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) led Wagner on fourth-quarter touchdown drives of 90 and 54 yards en route to a 270-yard passing performance. Thomson's second-highest career passing day came on 19-of-28 accuracy, with senior wide receiver Andre Yevchinecz (Binghamton, NY/Binghamton) corralling four receptions for 88 yards.

Junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) rushed for a career-high 150 yards on just 13 carries, an effort buoyed by first quarter runs of 51 and 70 yards with the 51-yarder coming on Wagner's first play from scrimmage and the latter which gave the Seahawks an early 7-0 lead.

Senior running back Matthias McKinnon (Albany, NY / Bishop Maginn / Jireh Prep [NC]), who was named the ESPN 3 Player of the Game, added 73 hard-fought yards on 18 carries, in addition to coming up with four catches for 69 yards.

Wagner took early leads of 7-0 and 10-7 before CCSU turned a turnover and a host of penalties into a pair of second-quarter touchdowns in talking a 21-10 halftime lead.

Following a scoreless third quarter, senior kicker James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple) trimmed the deficit to 21-13 with a 37-yard field goal on the very first play of the fourth quarter. The ensuing CCSU drive proved to be a key sequence in the game.

After running back Cameron Nash sprinted 58 yards to give the Blue Devils a first down at the Seahawk 25, the Wagner defense stiffened, forcing the Central into a 4th-and-3 at the 10-yard line. Rather than attempting a 27-yard field goal, CCSU rolled the dice with a fake, but starting quarterback/holder Jacob Dolegala overthrew well-covered tight end Brian Kowalczyk in the back of the end zone.

Taking over on their own 10, the Seahawks used a mixture of run and pass to march 90 yards in 13 plays over a span of 5:58, with the drive culminating in a five-yard touchdown strike from Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) to senior wide receiver Brandon Peoples (Abington Township, PA / Archbishop Wood/Milford Academy) with 6:15 left in the game.

This score made it a 21-19 game and Wagner went for the two-point conversion in an effort to tie the game, but Thomson's pass to Peoples in the right flat was low and incomplete, leaving the Devils with a two-point lead.

After the Wagner defense forced CCSU into a three and out, the Seahawks took over in excellent field position at their own 46 with 5:06 left. A pair of Thomson completions to junior wide receiver John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Washington Township/ Lackawanna CC [PA], the latter a 15-yard grab with 1:46 left, gave the Seahawks a first down at the CCSU 11.

McKinnon knifed his way for 10 yards to the one and punched it in from there to give Wagner a 25-21 lead with just 1:06 remaining, which is the way the score remained after Thomson's two-point pass attempt to Yevchinecz in the end zone was incomplete.

The Blue Devils returned the ensuing kickoff to their own 17 and reached their own 48, but a Hail Mary pass from Dolegala was intercepted by senior safety Tim Hayes (Los Angeles, CA / Crespi Carmelite / Wyoming) at the goal line, as the Seahawk celebration began.

In addition to outscoring CCSU 15-0 in the second half, Wagner outgained the Devils 210-136 following halftime.

"We went out there in the second half and played with a great deal of passion and it was awesome," said Houghtaling. "We had bad snaps, too many penalties, all kinds of things going on out there, but credit the kids and the coaching staff. At the end, we drove down the field, made plays, and won a football game. So that's what it's all about."

For the game, Wagner amassed 467 yards of offense, 270 through the air, and 197 rushing, while CCSU gained 358 yards of total offense. Dolegala wound up 18-of-36 for 243 yard and two touchdowns. Nash was the Devils' leading ground-gainer with 97 yards on 13 carries. Defensively, linebacker Randall LaGuerre came up with a game-high 14 tackles.

Defensively for Wagner, junior safety Jesse Flaherty (Oceanport, NJ / Red Bank Catholic / The Peddie School)

Smithfield, RI – Wagner junior quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) completed 17 of 37 passes for 230 yards and a touchdown, but it was not enough, as Bryant earned a 27-17 Northeast Conference (NEC) victory..



The loss is the Seahawks' first in NEC play, as the Green & White fall to 2-1 in the conference and 4-3 overall. With the win, the Bulldogs are now also 2-1 in the NEC and improve to 3-4 overall.

Defensively, sophomore linebacker Santoni Graham (Arlington, VA / Bishop O'Connell / Fork Union Military Academy) paced the Seahawks with 13 tackles while fellow sophomore linebacker Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF) added 11 stops.

For Bryant, running back Brendan Famiano rushed for 98 yards, Dalton Easton threw for 172 yards, and Matt Sewall returned a kickoff 97 yards in leading the Bulldogs' to victory.

After taking a 3-0 lead on a 42-yard first-quarter field goal by Rickey Perez, Bryant increased its lead to 10-0 with 7:59 left in the first half on a four-yard run by bruising 6-2, 268-pound fullback Hunter Taute, which capped a 14-play, 80-yard drive.

The Seahawks struck right before halftime when Thomson engineered an eight-play, 64-yard march, finished off by a one-yard touchdown run from senior running back Matthias McKinnon (Albany, NY / Bishop Maginn / Jireh Prep [NC]) with 18 seconds to play in the half, to make it a 10-7 game at the intermission.

Sewall opened the second half with his first long kickoff return of the game, a 60-yard jaunt up the right sideline all the way to the Seahawk 30-yard line. Bryant matched inside the Wagner five before the Seahawk defense put together an impressive goal-line stand, forcing the Bulldogs to settle for an 18-yard Perez field goal and a 13-7 lead.

Later in the quarter, the Green & White embarked on a nine-play, 62-yard drive that culminated in a 33-yard field goal by senior James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple) that drew Wagner to within 13-10 at the 3:29 mark.

This is when Sewall struck for his back-breaking 97-yard kickoff return that made it a 20-10 game with 3:24 to go in the third quarter.

That's the way the score remained until Thomson hit senior wide receiver Andre Yevchinez (Binghamton, NY / Binghamton) on a clutch fourth-and-seven screen pass over the middle for a 32-yard score. This Thomson to Yevchinez connection came on the first play of the fourth quarter, ending a seven-play, 72-yard drive that made it 20-17.

The Bulldogs, however, countered with a seven-play, 74-yard drive. Dalton hit wide receiver Taylor Barthelette on a 23-yard score, as Bryant went ahead by a 27-17 count and hung on from there.

"The kickoff returns had a major impact on the game, no question," said second-year head coach Jason Houghtaling. "On the first one, we didn't execute the kick the right way and on the second one we kicked it down the middle and just had one guy blown out of his lane. You're not going to win games doing those things. There were definite positives on both sides, but overall we just didn't get it done."

Junior John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Washington Township/ Lackawanna CC (PA)) was Thomson's favorite target as the 6-6 wide receiver finished with a career day, hauling in six passes for 112 yards, highlighted by a 42-yard fourth-quarter pickup. Junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) snared a career-high five receptions out of the backfield for 34 yards while Yevchinez finished with 73 yards receiving on four grabs.

In the rushing department, McKinnon led the way with 43 yards on 13 carries.

For Bryant, Dalton's 125 yards passing came on 14-of-25 accuracy with Haute the leading receiver with three catches for 39 yards. On the ground, Femiano's 98-yard rushing day came on 15 carries while Taute churned his way for 59 yards on 14 carries. Defensively, middle linebacker Jesse Nemerowicz recorded a team-high eight tackles.

Overall, Wagner held the statistical edge, outgaining Bryant 359-314 while leading in first downs by a 23-18 count but the Seahawks were undone by those two long kickoff returns.

Amherst, MA – Wagner junior Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) threw for 295 yards, the highest output by a Seahawk quarterback in 10 years, with junior wide receiver John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Lackawanna JC) hauling in six reception for 80 yards and a touchdown, but the Green & White could not overcome a 27-0 halftime deficit in falling at UMass, 34-10.



With the win, the Minutemen, who compete in the Football Bowl Subdivision level (FBS) improve to 2-7. With the loss, the Seahawks fall to 4-4 on the season.

“Whenever you play up, a team from the FBS, you can’t do things to hurt yourself and at the beginning today, we hurt ourselves several times,” said Seahawk second-year head coach Jason Houghtaling. “Credit UMass too. Maybe some of those penalties are due to us trying to block their speed.

“We eventually got some stops and did some good things offensively, but we just made too many mistakes today to beat a team like this,” he added..

The Green & White moved the ball well early but were undone by 75 yards in penalties in falling behind by a 14-0 count after one quarter. Trailing 7-0 following a 28-yard touchdown pass from UMass quarterback Andrew Ford to wide receiver Adam Breneman, Thomson hit speedy junior wide receiver Franklin Labady (Hiialeah, FL / U. of Cincinnati) for

a 47-yard pickup down to the Minutemen 14-yard line. But an unsportsmanlike penalty following the play pushed Wagner back 15 yards and, after Thomson was sacked on third down, Wagner was forced to punt.

Late in the first quarter, UMass left-handed quarterback Andrew Ford threw the second of his three first-half touchdowns, this one a six-yard toss to Brenemen, as the Minutemen opened a 14-0 lead on an 84-yard drive that was aided by another 15-yard personal foul on the Seahawks.

With 12:37 left in the opening half, Ford went to work again, finding wide receiver Andy Isabella on a 55-yard scoring strike, his third of the half, to extend the Minutemen lead to 21-0.

After Logan Laurent booted a pair of field goals, from 33 and 22 yards, respectively, UMass took a 27-0 lead into the locker room at halftime. Thomson was 8-of-14 passing for 141 yards in the first half but the Seahawks had nothing to show for it, thanks in large part to five penalties and two sacks.

Ford opened the second-half scoring by scrambling 16 yards for another score that extended the Minutemen lead to 34-0 with 8:49 left in the third quarter.

Taking over on their own 23 following the kickoff, Thomson led the Seahawks on a 14-play, 67-yard drive that culminated in a 27-yard field goal by senior James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Temple U), who improved to 11-of-14 on field goal tries for the season, to get Wagner on the board.

After junior defensive end Jordan Baskerville (West Point, NY / Milford Academy) forced UMass to punt with a third-down sack of Ford, Wagner found its offensive rhythm. With a drive that began at the Seahawk seven-yard line following the Minutemen punt, Thomson led the Seahawks on an efficient 16-play, 93-yard touchdown drive.

Thomson was 6-of-7 through the air during this scoring march, finding four different receivers, including Williams on a two-yard toss with 6:29 left to play, which fashioned the final score at 34-10.

UMass wound up with a 507-367-yard edge in total offense with Ford leading the way by completing 25-of-39 passes for 355 yards and those three scores. The Minutemen had a pair of receivers top the 100-yard mark, as Breneman wound up with eight grabs for 138 yards while Isabella also caught eight passes, with his receptions going for 123 yards and one touchdown.

Williams’ six-catch, 80-yard receiving day came following a six-catch, career-high 112-yard effort at Bryant last week. Senior wide receiver Nour Aly a(North Caldwell, NJ / West Essex also got into the act, recording career highs with four catches for 39 yards, while fellow senior wideout Andre Yevchinecz (Binghamton, NY / Binghamton) wound up with three receptions for 43 yards.

Senior tight end and preseason All-NEC selection Ryan Owens (Gainseville, NY / Leftwich) also had three grabs for 38 yards, as Thomson spread the ball around to eight different receivers on the afternoon.

In the rushing department, junior halfback Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) led the way with 43 yards on 10 carries, while his senior running mate Matthias McKinnon (Albany, NY / Jireh Prep) added 34 yards on 13 carries.

Defensively, senior cornerback Tiquan Garner (Brookville, NY / Long Island Lutheran) recorded a career-high 10 tackles,

Staten Island, NY – Wagner jumped out to a 10-0 lead and led 17-14 at halftime, before Duquesne mounted a second-half comeback in earning a 28-20 Northeast Conference (NEC) at Hameline Field.



The teams entered today's play tied for second place in the league standings with identical 2-1 conference records. With the victory, the defending NEC champion Dukes improve to 6-3 overall and 3-1 in conference play, while the Seahawks fall to 4-5 on the season and 2-3 in league.

The Green & White will make the long trek to Robert Morris on Saturday, November 12 at noon before returning home to meet first-place Saint Francis U in the regular season finale. The Senior Day kickoff between the Seahawks and the Red Flash is also at noon.

On the game's first possession today, Wagner moved the ball sharply, as junior quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) led the Seahawks on a 10-play, 52-yard drive that resulted in a 33-yard field goal by senior James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional / Temple) to take an early 3-0 lead.

After forcing the Dukes into a three and out on their first possession, the Seahawks marched 65 yards in nine plays, with Thompson scampering in on a 10-yard touchdown score with 4:48 left in the first quarter, increasing the Wagner lead to 10-0.

Duquesne answered with 60-yard touchdown burst by freshman running back A.J. Hines with 42 seconds remaining in the opening quarter to make it a 10-7 game, a run that capped an eight-play, 82-yard drive.

The Seahawks responded with an impressive drive of their own, navigating 80 yards in nine plays with junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) barreling in from one yard out at the 11:54 mark of the second quarter to again make it a 10-point game, 17-7.

It was then Duquesne's turn to go back to work, as quarterback Dillon Buechel guided the Dukes on a seven-play, 74-yard drive, culminating in a five-yard run by P.J. Fullmore which sliced the deficit to 17-14.

In the third quarter, Wagner covered 64 yards in 11 plays before the drive stalled at the Dukes' 22-yard line. Cooper came on to nail a 39-yard field goal to give the Green & White a 20-14 lead with 8:09 remaining in the third quarter. In going 2-for-2 on the day, Cooper is now 13-of-16 on field goal attempts for the season and a perfect 11-of-11 from the 30-39-yard range.

Once again, Duquesne answered a scoring drive with one of its own as the Dukes executed an impressive 12-play, 83-yard drive that was capped by an 18-yard touchdown pass from Buechel to wide receiver Blair Roberts as part of his 4-catch, 110-yard afternoon, which gave Duquesne its first lead of the game at 21-20 with 1:54 left in the third quarter.

The Dukes then put the game away with another long drive, this one an 11-play, 85-yard march which featured the pivotal play of the game. With under five minutes left to play and the Dukes facing a 4th-and-2 at the Seahawk 18, Hines burst through the middle of the line and broke several tackles in churning his way for an 18-yard TD run that made it a 28-20 game with 4:34 left.

Thomson wound up 17-of-31 through the air for 218 yards with a long completion of 43 yards to senior wide receiver John Williams in the third quarter. Senior tight end Ryan Owens (Gainesville, NY / Letchworth) had five catches for 67 yards, while senior wide receiver Nour Aly (North Caldwell, NJ / West Essex) recorded a second straight career game, finishing with five grabs for 60 yards, both career highs. A week ago at UMass, Aly posted the career highs with four receptions for 39 yards.

On the ground, Knight paced the Seahawks with 61 yards rushing on 23 carries. Wagner was hampered by the absence of senior running back Matthias McKinnon (Albany, NY / Bishop Maginn / Jireh Prep) the team's second-leading rusher, who sat out the game due to injury. In McKinnon's stead, junior Franklin Labady provided a spark with 54 yards rushing on just five carries.

Defensively, sophomore linebacker Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF) led the way with 10 tackles, seven of which were solo stops. Senior cornerback Tiquan Garner (Brookville, NY / Long Island Lutheran) added seven stops for the Seahawks.

For Duquesne, Buechel was 13-of-22 passing for 171 yards and one touchdown while Hines wound up with 136 yard rushing on 22 carries and two scores. Defensively for the Dukes, linebacker Nathan Stone and defensive back Abner Roberts came up with 10 tackles apiece.

Statistically, Wagner led in total yards (355), passing yards (218-171) and first downs (23-17) while the Dukes held a slight edge in rushing yards (148-137).

Moon Township, PA – Moon Township, PA – Junior quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) threw for 258 yards, senior running back Matthias McKinnon (Albany, NY / Bisho Maginn / Jireh Prep [NC] added 88 yards on the ground, and the Seahawks took advantage of three interceptions, including a pick-six from sophomore linebacker Santoni Graham (Arlington, VA / Bishop O'Connell / Fork Union Military Academy), in earning a dominant 40-5 victory this afternoon.



The Seahawks raced out to a 27-3 halftime lead and never looked back in evening their overall season record at 5-5 while moving to 3-2 in NEC play. The Green & White will host first-place Saint Francis U in a Saturday, November 19 noon shoot-out on Senior Day at Hameline Field.

With the game tied 3-3 in the early going, Thomas hit big-play senior wide receiver John Williams on a 69-yard touchdown strike to cap a 4-play, 82-yard drive, in making it a 10-3 game. Seahawk senior defensive back Tim Hayes then came up with his fourth interception of the season, the first of three against RMU QB Joe Carroll. Hayes' pick came at the Colonials' 10-yard line and the Californian returned it 35 yards to the Seahawk 45.

On third-and-5 from midfield, Thomson connected with sophomore wide receiver Willie Dale (Staten Island, NY / St. Peter's) on a 49-yard hookup down to the one yard-line. Thompson flipped a one-yard TD pass to Lucas De Pofi (Endicott, NY / Union-Endicott) on the ensuing play, extending the Seahawk lead to 17-3 with 12:05 left before

halftime.

On RMU's next possession, junior defensive back Jesse Flaherty (Oceanort, NJ / Red Bank Catholic / Peddie) came up with his third interception of the season, picking off Carroll at the Wagner 41. This turnover led to a 27-yard field goal from senior James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional / Temple) which extended the Seahawk lead to 20-3 at the 6:16 mark of the opening half.

Senior defensive lineman Kendel Bramble (Freeport, NY / Baldwin) pounced on a fumble at the RMU 15 on the Colonials' following drive, which led to a one-yard TD burst by McKinnon with 5:06 to go in the half as the Seahawks took a 27-3 lead into the intermission at halftime.

On the Colonials' opening possession of the second half, Graham stepped in front of a Carroll pass and returned the interception 43 yards for a touchdown and a 33-3 Seahawk lead.

"I thought that we had a tremendous week of preparation and that's what led to today's performance," said second-year head coach Jason Houghtaling. "The kids worked really hard in practice all week. And today, we came out and played really hard and executed well."

"Defensively, we causes turnovers, were very active on that side all game long," he continued. "And on offense, we were down three key guys who were out with injuries in Diaz (senior LT Matt Diaz [Edison, NJ / Edison]), Yevy (senior wide receiver Andrew Yevchinecz [Binghamton, NY / Binghamton] and Foster (senior wide receiver Keith Foster [Newark, NJ / Weequahic / Milford Academy])."

"All in all, a really complete effort and we're going to enjoy this one and then begin our focus oin Saint Francis U," he added.


RMU then tallied its lone points of the second half when the extra point try was blocked by Amir Fenwick and returned all the way by Zach Cooper for a rare defensive PAT, resulting in two points for the Colonials which made it 33-5.

Wagner's final points of the game came on a crisp 12-play, 92-yard drive, which culminated in a four-yard touchdown run by junior RB Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School), which fashioned the final score at 40-5.


Thomson's 258-yard passing day came on 18-of-31 attempts, with two touchdowns. Williams, who entered the game ranked ninth nationally at 19.4 yards per reception, had four grabs on the day for 110 yards, led by the early 68-yard score. McKinnon's 88-yard afternoon came on 22 carries.

For the game, the Seahawks outgained the Colonials, 428-168, holding RMU to just 21 net rushing yards. Defensively, a host of Seahawks got into the act, led by junior linebacker Randall May who recorded a team-high four tackles. Five different Seahawks were credited with three tackles apiece.

For RMU, Carroll was harassed into a 6-for-28 passing performance for 102 yards and had those three INTs. On the ground, TJ Neal led the way for the Colonials with 34 yards rushing on 13 carries.
